

How are the player numbers looking for this year?

We have no new recruits at this stage, with three senior women out:

- Season 2021 captain Tessie Mitchell has set her sights at the next level and is playing for White City FC Beograd in 2022.
- Left midfielder Amber Coombe has a baby on the way, thus is taking the season 2022 off.
- Right back Claudia Wright has relocated to Adelaide to attend university.

Have key names from last



season returned for this year?

Jiii Mitchell, who missed the first half of the 2021 season, is looking for a big season ahead. Pairing up with young super striker Macy Bourton they will make a potent forward line.

In the backline Georgia Skilton will glove up again for her third season, after winning a spot the 2021 Riverland Team of the Year as goalkeeper. Georgia will be supported in the backlines by Riverland Team of the Year duo Sarah Beams and Tilly Albrecht. Kayla Tsorotiotis and Marlee Coombe will marshal the midfield, with Karrie Megan in support.

Youngsters Matilda Mitchell, Makayla Rayner, Hannah Beams, Maddy Munchenberg and Hannah Beams will all play pivotal roles in keeping the team energised.

Did the team play any preseason games? How do you expect this will help preparations?

We (had) a pre-season game against Nicolas Point. Pre-season matches

allow us to assess our strengths and weaknesses.

What do you feel will be important to replicating last season's success?

To replicate last season's success, first and foremost we will need to remain disciplined, focus on the tasks at hand. remain committed to each other and to our club, be good sports and respectful of the world game.

Are you expecting tough competition from the other sides?

Three different sides have been premiers over the last three seasons. For Barmera, being runners-up in both the 2019 and 2020 premierships, and the Top 4 Cup in 2021, was always going to provide that extra drive for us to succeed. We know we are the side all others want to beat in 2022. There is no such thing as an easy game, so hopefully Covid-19 doesn't get to play a part. Hopefully the best team wins and the Pelican flag waves victorious in 2022.

How are the team numbers looking so far?

Early numbers in pre-season are looking strong. It's best we've had for a few years, which is going to make selection for the A grade really difficult.

It's a good problem to have for the A and B grade though.

Are there any big names returning from last season?

Most players are back from last season, which is great to see, and there's a couple new ones. We had a few injuries last season, so if we can get back a fit James Wallace and Marty Barber, it's going to be kev for us.

How have things been going in trainina?

The intensity and dedication shown by the players so far has been really impressive. Like most clubs we're starting to work on match fitness, touch and gelling as a team. In the following weeks we'll be working on formation and set-up on match day.

What do you think will be

important for Barmera's success this season?

Not finishing last would be a start. In all honesty I thought we were competitive in most games last year, only to let a cheap goal in, or have an early one scored against us, which puts us on the back foot. So for me, having a solid defence is big part of how I want to play.

Do you expect it to be a competitive A grade this season?

I thought last season's A grade competition was the best in a long time. Renmark ran away with it in the end, but there were plenty of competitive matches throughout the season.

Players and supporters are really loyal to the club. How does this help?

As a club we've probably got the smallest catchment area in regards to recruitment which is reflected in our playing numbers. Barmera has always punched above its weight I think that's why we have such loyal support from players and supporters. I think we enjoy being the underdog.

SOCCER BERRI RIVER RANGERS

Can we expect the young players to shine for Berri again this season?

Berri has always had a young side, because we promote our under 16 or under 17 players to compensate for players who leave to go to Adelaide. Let's say we had a squad of 14 players last year, I would say eight or nine of those have gone to Adelaide, or won't be playing. They are fly-in, fly-out workers, or are going to university.

The younger players always seem to adapt well to the senior competition?

We've got a lot of natural sporting talent, like most senior sides in community sport. There's a lot of young, enthusiastic and skilful players, and they could play soccer or football.

You name it, they are naturally gifted.

The step up to the senior grade is pretty steep, and it takes a while to get into the mindset and the pace of the game. The backline in particular takes a while to settle, and get used to where their teammates are going to be.

After a couple of weeks of gelling and building chemistry, they'll get used to reading the game.

What will be key to going that extra step and claiming the premiership this season?

There was a lot of 'what ifs' last season. We struggled against Loxton last year, but I think that was more mentally than anything.


We started the season with four losses, but similar to this year, we lost quite a few players out of the district. We had a new backline and midfield, and we were bringing some of our under 16 and 17 players into that side.

It took a while for them to gel, but once they did, we held our own. By the end of the season we were around the mark.

Are you expecting a tough A grade competition in 2022?

It's pretty tight year in, year out. In a four-team competition, someone can skip away, or it can be really close.

(In 2020) it came down to the last round we had against Barmera, and I would expect the same kind of competition this year.

Patty Fournaros-Carney, women's coach

How is the women's team shaping up?

We eased our way into the outdoor season after futsal ended. The squad is growing from week to week with almost enough players to field two women's teams. There will be great opportunities to work with youthful enthusiasm and a wealth of experience. The challenge I'm looking forward to as a coach is working toward the perfect balance for our team/s.

Any changes from the side from last year?

Many players have returned from last season, some have moved on. The excellent problem for Loxton United to have is the large number of juniors putting their hands up to play, and former players coming back after several seasons away.

Are there players to look out for this season?

Several LUSC players have just finished an outstanding season of futsal. Ruby Payne and Makayla Lockwood will be strong players to look out for. They continue to challenge each other to grow and strengthen their skills. I personally can't wait to see what that will translate into for season 2022. Gretel Pumpa was our most consistent player last season and she will again be such an important player for the

LUSC women's team, as will Lisa-Marie Perre and Eira Dalzell.

How are some of the young players on the team improving?

LUSC is in an extremely fortunate position regarding the young players on the women's team. Last vear Eira Dalzell, Lisa-Marie Perre and Charlotte Formby were all identified as part of the Football SA U12 State Identification Program (SIP). The amount of talent that these young players have is tremendous. It is a very exciting time for the club. The fact that they will have an incredible influence over the success of the women's team this year at such a young age is all credit to them. Sarah Setchell is another young player to look out for in 2022.

What are your goals as a team this season?

The goals that we are setting as a team for the season are along the lines of us setting a higher standard for ourselves development-wise. We had some success last year which was a reward for our effort. It is pleasing to hear from a coach's perspective that the group wants to continue to strive to improve on multiple levels, to work together and support each other for even greater achievements this year.

What's been happening with the men's team?

The major out from last season would be the retirement of former LUSC president/ captain Geordie Franks, who has been the beating heart of the LUSC senior men's teams for many years. His departure leaves a huge void. From a playing perspective he is irreplaceable. More than half of the senior team have gone to Adelaide in 2022 for tertiary studies and the remaining players have left the Riverland area or are unavailable due to their work commitments.

Any players to keep an eye on?

LUSC will be exploring the opportunity to have visiting seasonal workers play this season. International players have been the reason for the success of other Riverland clubs in past seasons. They bring a very exciting brand of the world game to the Riverland which is always a pleasure to see.

How is the team hoping to build on a Top 4 Cup Final appearance last season?

Currently the main goal for LUSC is to be able to field an A grade team for season 2022. The numbers are slowly growing for the B grade team however it is a requirement for the first team to be filled. All avenues are being explored to ensure that a competitive team can be added to the RSA competition.

Is the competition expected to be more even overall this year?

It is hard to say. There wasn't a huge opportunity for pre-season fixtures due to Covid protocols. How even the season will be overall, remains to be seen.

How are the teams shaping up this year – both men's and women's?

What do you guys have to do to build on last season?


As you can see we have lost a lot of players from last season. We will be working to build the skills of a number of new entrants into our team.

Shane Phillips, A1 coach

How is the team shaping up this year?

We are sort of like everyone else, we lose a few players and get a few that come in. But I think we have got good replacement players for the ones we have lost. We have good likes-for-like, which I think is positive.

How has preseason gone?

We started with some tryouts and pre-season training started in late March. We went in with the focus to just get faster. Our aim is to try and improve our speed over last year by about five to 10 per cent. We are going to try and speed up our hand release, so we get quicker through our hands. I think that's an area where, at times, we were a little bit slow last year. We have got some drills that we are going to be incorporating into training to get our speed of ball movement up. We were fairly quick last year, so if we can get faster again... that is the style we want to play.

How else are you looking to build on last season?

We want to build on our structured stuff. It is about first year when you look at it, and the second year you can refine it and get more of the structured, set-piece plays incorporated with more confidence because people have played it a bit more. That is what we are hoping to do. Consolidate what we did last season and actually do it a lot faster.

Tell me something good that's happening at the club in 2022?

I have been the main campaigner to get back out there. Like everyone, our numbers have been solid but we are just seeing that these girls want to work as hard as they can, which is really encouraging.

Who are the other coaches at the club/who have you got helping you out?

Benita Dillon is coaching the A2s, so we'll be covering for each other if one of us is not available. Leonie (Haigh) has stepped back as club president and she's taken the team manager's role, so that is a little bit of a change. We are probably unusual, for netball, to be in a fairly steady, stable state.

Parents, friends, club


members and senior footballers have taken to the sidelines to cheer on their girls on a weekly basis and so they should, the girls are dynamite.







Clint Ridgway, senior men's coach

Fourth last season, how do you bridge the gap and is there a big gap between the top two and the rest?

To be honest I don't believe it is hard to bridge the gap in a six-team competition, but what we as a club have done really well over the past few years is retain our juniors, in particular those lads coming out of under 18s. This extra depth within our senior ranks makes a lot of difference as you're not relying on topping up teams week in and week out with young kids. The thing Waikerie and Renmark have had over the rest of the competition in the last few years is the depth within their senior ranks, which is shown through both A and B grade ladder positions. The biggest challenge for us is changing the mindset and perceptions of not only players but supporters, and external eyes regarding pre-conceived ideas around how good those top two teams are compared to the rest of the competition.





How is the women's team shaping up this vear?



Change has probably been thrust


upon us personnel wise. We have turned over a few players but also have some good new blokes coming in and some former players coming back. From a game-style point of view, not really.


Heath Kelly. They are all hitting their peak football years and I'm sure they will all have great years.
