## It's a new dawn, it's a new day, it's a new life...

#### And I'm feeling pretty good about where the RFL is headed.

As much as the on-field comings and goings dominate the front bar chat in the off-season, one of the biggest changes has been at head-office level in the RFL world.

Mark Wright's tenure as RFL chief came to an end late last year, with the straight-talking local police officer accepting a role within the SANFL and West Adelaide set-up.

'Wrighty' hit the challenge of leading the RFL head on, but now it's time for a set of fresh eyes to oversee the RFL landscape.

Henry Crawford is a stalwart of the Waikerie Football Club, residing as president of the Magpies for the better part of a decade.

But, it now comes time for him to cast his allegiances aside, for the most part, and govern the RFL to the best of his abilities.

In terms of strategy, the 38-yearold vineyard manager is looking to approach the gig in the polar opposite manner compared to his predecessor.

Wright governed the RFL with great authority, generally opting to make decisions at committee level irrespective of what the six RFL clubs thought was best for the competition.

Whether that is the right way to go about it depends on where you sit. It certainly saved a lot of time in the decision-making process and allowed for next to no opportunity of any club coming out ahead of another due to a

war of words at delegate level.

Wrighty did what he thought best for the RFL at each turn, and Crawford looks likely to do the same, but from a different angle.

Since stepping into the role, Crawford has preached a club-first approach to league governance.

He has repeatedly stated his commitment to consulting the clubs at every turn to garner the best outcome for the league.

Nothing can outline that more than his decision, made on the advice of the clubs, to overturn the old committee's choice to move from an under 18s to an under 17s competition.

The clubs didn't like it, they took a vote and Crawford acted accordingly.

This approach is going to make for a lot of work for Crawford and his team. but could lead to a bright future for the competition.

Clubs are always crying out for more of a say, and in truth the league belongs to the supporters and the volunteers.

They are the ones that deserve the benefits, and perhaps with club delegates acting on their behalf and a committee not only ready but begging to listen, they stand to reap the rewards under Crawford's rule.

Time will certainly tell as to whether his new-look approach will pay off. Perhaps his biggest challenge is helping get the RWFL moving in the right direction again.

The women's competition was going gangbusters prior to Covid, but at the time of writing, the prospect of having a mere four-team league looms large

with Loxton in a state of flux.

Drew Nelsson will be at his side as women's football co-ordinator, and he too has preached the club-first approach.

The under 15 girls come and try days are a good start.

By identifying the needs of the clubs and acting upon them, the new committee has given itself every chance of success, but there may be a time when Crawford and company need to put their foot down. Six proud clubs are unlikely to see eye-to-eye all the time.

Since stepping into the role, **Crawford has** preached a clubfirst approach to league governance.

## Pelicans looking to fly again

"Anything less" than another Top Four Cup and Senior Men's premiership would be considered as an unsuccessful season for one of the Riverland Soccer Association's most imposing sides.

Barmera United senior men's captain James Wallace said some new names had joined the club's returning group ahead of the 2023 campaign.

"We've got a few new players we didn't have last season, and a couple who have retired which is unfortunate," Wallace said.

"It's good to see new players coming in, and a lot of players that were in the under 16s last year have been stepping up and coming out.

"The players that have been coming out are quite capable as well. They aren't just coming out to fill numbers, but they are good players.

"Our core group is really quite good, and we're all friends outside of soccer so we know each other and how we all play."

The Pelicans finished nine points clear of Renmark Olympic in 2022, having won 13 of 15 games in the regular season, before defeating Berri 5-0 in the Top Four Cup final.

Wallace said pre-season preparations would be key to the Pelicans' hopes of retaining the trophies.

"It's about making sure we all get out on the track," he said.

"Hopefully everyone is on the same page and we have really good training sessions out there that represent the games. "It's not just drills we've been doing, but match simulation and getting a feel for it, which will put us in good stead.

"I hope it's a really competitive division again, because that's when it's at the best level. I hope the other teams are up for it, because we are."

Wallace expected Barmera's strikers to once again contend for the competition's top-scoring honours.

"If we can replicate it that (this season) would be great and we do want to do that," he said.

"We've got multiple forwards who are very capable in Dimitri Kanakaris, Marty Barber and Jacob Trudgian.

"We're very fortunate to have them on our team and I think we'll be strong all over the pitch."

However, Wallace said the team's defensive height and physicality would also create challenges for opposition.

"Our defence is something we take pride in and Masud Akaso, who's been our goalkeeper, is phenomenal," he said.

"He's a life saver back there and I think teams are going to struggle to break us down, because we're tight-knit and because of our physicality."

## River Rangers plan for rapid rebuild

Despite a high squad turnover, the Berri **River Rangers hope to** narrow the gap to the ladder leaders during the 2023 Riverland soccer season.

Senior men's coach John Papametis will try to put together a side to compete against top two finishers Barmera and Benmark. while the women's team returns to the open women's competition after a one-year absence.

Former club president and current committee member Todd Goodman said squads for both teams had come together slowly but surely.

"Our men's side will feature a high percentage of players around 20 years old, and we'll be hoping some of our under 16s will step up as well," he said.

"At this stage, we're looking good on numbers. The women's squad is picking up in numbers as well as we get closer to the start of the season."

Goodman said the men's team would have a "fairly high turnover of players" as has become typical of the club, but had retained its two leading goal scorers from 2022.

"We're a fairly young team, so we lose a lot of people to work and uni... we'll go through our usual turnover of about 50 per cent," he said.

"Tommy Pipinis is having his gap year, so he's helping out John with training and will be back to play. Daniel Greer has also been out on the track.

"There are a few of the older guys from last year who will be back, so we're looking relatively settled."

Young talent brought in throughout the 2022 season are expected to become mainstays in the men's squad as well.

"We blooded a few under 16s last year who stepped up and played open men's. and we're expecting them probably back in there." Goodman said.

"People like Mitchell Cawse, Yianni Exarheas are some of our under 16s last year who filled in for us and will get regular game time this year."

Goodman said he believed high honours are a possibility for both of the senior sides.

"Everyone wants to be competitive for the premiership and the Top Four Cup," he said.

"I don't think that's out of reach for any of our senior teams.

"(Barmera) will be strong, they always are. They have a strong program over there. In the senior sides they'll

probably be the ones we're chasing... but we'll certainly be up for any challenge they want to present."

With the high turnover, Goodman said getting players to gel from early in the season would be key to the club's prospects.

"Because we play for a premiership which is based on points, you have to start relatively strong in a fourteam competition," he said.

"If you start dropping too many points early in the season, it's fairly hard to catch up.

"We'll be looking to put the best team on the park, and hopefully they gel and get a few wins under the belt early on and we'll build from there."

Numbers also look strong for the women's side, with Mr Perram and Mr Perre keen to welcome back a number of familiar faces.

## Preparation the plan for Olympic

Regaining Riverland soccer silverware and ensuring the sustainability of player numbers are the 2023 targets for one of the region's most successful clubs.

Renmark Olympic Soccer Club under 16s coach, and senior men's assistant coach, Nick Sotiroulis, said returning players would again be crucial this season.

"I think we'll have basically the same core as last year and our aim is to improve," Sotiroulis said

"I'm quite confident we'll have a better side than last year. The under 16s that played last year will have another year under their belt.

"It was a testing time last year, because it's very hard to play 16s and then step up and play (seniors).

"This year their bodies will be one year more developed..."

Sotiroulis said training sessions had so far focused on increasing the team's stamina and endurance.

"I think it's important to do stamina work and then finish off (training) with a game," he said.

"As you start getting run in your legs, then you can start getting into the skill work.

"There's no point trying to do the skills if your legs aren't going to be up to it." Olympic finished the 2022 senior men's competition in second place with 10 wins and four losses, nine points behind top side Barmera United.

Sotiroulis expected the two teams would again contend for trophies this season.

"The rivalry (with Barmera) has always been there," he said.

"We had a very good side last year, but where we failed was Barmera's core group were training for a while together, whereas we put a side together a week before we started.

"When the players haven't done a good two-month pre-season, their muscles aren't right. In pre-season when you're running and you feel something you can back off, but in a game you'll keep going."


However, Sotiroulis said continuing to develop Renmark Olympic's young players would be the priority for 2023

"Every team has a target to do the best they can and win the championship," he said.


"Unfortunately we can't all win the championship, so we've got to keep developing. That's all we can do.

"As long as everyone has given 100 per cent you can't ask for more.

"For seniors the highest achievement is to win the championship. For 16s if you can win a championship it's a bonus, but my role as coach is to get the boys skilled and prepared."

## 'We're gonna play the kids'

An exodus of stars will push a number of youngsters into the Berri Hockey Club's senior ranks in 2023.

The club boasts a strong history of promoting juniors into the A grade from a young age in order to further their development.

Riley Burgess is one of the most recent players to progress through the ranks, with the youngster representing the Australian country under 21s side in an overseas trip earlier this year.

of it. So we've got to make sure we manage them really well.

"We're not scared to give people the opportunity but when we do give it to them, we want to make sure we bring them through rather than push them through.

"We bring them up to the standard, not just chuck them into the deep end." The Demons will be without Burgess on-field this season as he pursues hockey and schooling in Adelaide, but despite his departure, plus that of a handful of other A graders, Berri still boasts plenty of firepower.

One such weapon is Maddy Spano, who tours Malaysia with the Australian women's country side this month.

After playing her first season with Berri as part of both the men's and women's sides, Spano is primed to play a crucial role in Berri's pursuit of the title in both competitions this year.

"She's been out doing extra trainings," Mr Stokes said.

"You can tell that she's got

the touch at the moment. She's been training really well and she's ready to go.

"It is awesome for both of those guys (Burgess and Spano).

"We've lost Riley to Adelaide for schooling now, but it's good that we get to see kids from when they first started go all the way through.

"It's not necessarily for us to get reward for that, it's so we can show that we've got a program in place to promote junior players to be the best they can."

Stokes conceded that the side may just scrape through with its senior numbers, but 2023 looms as an exciting year for the club as it looks to compete through all grades.

"There are a couple of older players coming back into the A grade side who have had a year or two off," he said.


"We have a good mixture of young and old players.

## New faces... and a familiar one too

A recent Riverland A1 netball resurgence, of sorts, will be challenged by a substantial player turnover at Barmera this season.

After languishing near the bottom of the ladder for many seasons, Barmera has emerged as highly competitive in recent years, and even a title contender during the early stages of the 2022 season.

An untimely injury to star midcourter Tahlia Dillon coincided with a downturn in the team's results, before Barmera eventually bowed out in the first week of the finals, losing a thrilling first semifinal to eventual premiers Loxton North in overtime.

Unfortunately for the club, the athletic Dillon will be absent in 2023, enjoying an overseas camp posting.

Some other players from the 2022 campaign will also be missing, along

with left-of-centre coach Shane Phillips, replaced by Sam Wellington.

Fortunately, Barmera has received a major boost with the return of Chloe Drogemuller, back at the lakeside after 17 years in Adelaide and a sterling Premier League career.

Drogemuller played 125 Premier League games for SASI (South Australian Sports Institute) and one-time powerhouse club Garville, captaining the latter for several seasons.

She retired in 2016, but was coaxed back to Premier League again in 2018 and 2019, playing a handful of games.

A specialist goal attack, Drogemuller, 34, is likely to form a potentially outstanding combination with reigning Riverland A1 best and fairest Ashleigh Haigh.

"It'll be her and I in the circle and I'm really looking forward to that," Drogemuller said.

"And we've got some young players

across the mid-court, so that should be exciting too.

"We'll have a good season, I think."
In addition to their goal circle
combination, Barmera will rely on even
contributions from their remaining A1
list, including players like Katri Stavrou,
who is benefiting from increased
exposure at A1 level.

Overall, the off-season and pre-season were extremely encouraging for the Barmera Netball Club, which is entering a 17B side this year, club president Amanda Sampson explained.

"We haven't had a 17B team for around six years," she said.

"So we are extremely happy about this and think this is a great advantage for our club moving forward.

"We had higher numbers trialling from the previous year, which resulted in (that) extra team which is amazing.

"We are confident for another successful year in 2023 and will keep building on that success and looking forward to a good season."

During the pre-season a number of players attended gruelling training sessions at Body Boss Studio in Barmera, hoping to get an edge heading into the new season.

"The players that attended Body Boss Studio enjoyed it and hope to expand on it again next year," Ms Sampson said.

## Focus firmly on 2023

So from under 15s to under 17s we always say for them to come out and train with us, have the opportunity to sit on the bench on a Friday night... and when they feel strong enough as an individual they can trial for us."

After two seasons, the Tigers will be without star player Emily Beaton, who has secured a job working with Fox Sport commentating for the Thunderbirds.

A focus this year is having more senior players available to help the juniors.

"Last year, unfortunately, our A2s was predominately juniors – girls who played 17s, as well as juniors so they were backing up two games every week..." Bullock said.

"They just want to be successful and I think losing to Renmark three years in a row is definitely a motivation. But, we'll set ourselves small goals and chip away at it."

The Magpies fell at the final hurdle again last year, going down to Renmark in a grand final only a mother could love.

This season looms as one of major

interest, with a number of key players departing the club for the 2023 campaign.

Key forward Dean Hill will suit up for the Swans again in 2023.

But, with Riverland West clubs Sedan-Cambrai and BSR recruiting heavily, helped in part by their proximity to the state's capital, and the success this has brought with it, the Swans are looking to change their tune in 2023.

Max Blanck initially signed on to coach the Swans this campaign but had to depart early, leaving Gardner behind the eightball in the recruitment stakes.

"In previous years we haven't been inclined to pay any players and get them over but we've struggled in the last few years," Gardner said.

"We're looking to pay some players for the first time, but it has been difficult trying to find players that aren't already committed somewhere else."

Premiership aside, Paringa's main goal remains building a strong family environment, which Gardner believes should translate to on-field success.

"It's something that I've been saying for years," he said

"I've got four kids and a partner who doesn't really get into football, so we're trying to make it a bit more attractive for partners and kids to come to the footy and enjoy it.

"If the partners felt more welcome, essentially we might not have lost players in the past.

"I think every club claims to be a family club, but going forward we definitely need to do that if we want to sustain a decent club where people want to come and play."
