Intriguing RFL season looms

With another summer sporting season in the books, the slate has been wiped clean across the six RFL clubs, and 2024 is expected to be one of the best seasons vet.

With little separating the top five sides for most of the season, 2023 was one of the most hotly contested premierships in recent memory, ending with Barmera-Monash defying the odds to win the flag from third spot.

The Roos' win over Renmark, which recovered from a points deduction to finish atop of the ladder at the end of the minor round. was one of the lowestscoring RFL grand finals of all time.

While Barmera-Monash starts the season as premiership favourites, it has lost some backline talent, with Jack Sullivan and Michael Mock departing, while forward dynamo Sam De Michele also leaving the club.

However, one of the biggest RFL signings in recent history has landed at the Lakeside, with former Adelaide Crows forward (and West Adelaide star) Jono Beech returning to his iunior club.

Beech brings with him fellow SANFL experienced players Chris Bonney and Mason Middleton, along with Luke Thomas.

On the other side of the Fisher Cup is Berri, which has welcomed one of its

favourite sons in Brenton Woolston back to the club as A grade coach.

'Woolly' has a monumental mountain to climb with the Demons, who went winless in both the A grade and B grade in 2023, but a change in the football department could bring success to Demonland.

Finishing second was unfamiliar territory for Josh Vater and Renmark, after three straight flags, but expect the talented Rovers to again challenge for the title this year.

Assisting them in the hunt will be ex-local Nick Gillard. who returns to the club after time spent in both the SANFL with Central Districts, and the Adelaide Footy League.

The RFL world was sent into a spin in February when the much-loved Terry Eleftheriadis left Loxton North after just one season back at the club.

However, to their credit, the Panthers swooped on Dave Higgins, who brings with him a wealth of experience

after time spent with Glenela, Collingwood, and most recently Tailem Bend.

While North has lost a number of players. opportunity has arisen for its junior crop, as it looks to atone for 2023's straightsets exit from the finals series.

The Ricciuto name is back at Waikerie, with Reuben, the nephew of Adelaide Crows legend Mark, to pull on the black and white stripes in 2024.

Michael Kilsby's side showed glimpses in 2023, ultimately finishing inside the top four, before being bounced out in the opening weekend of finals.

However, with a bulk of the playing list aged under 25, Waikerie is expected to play an exciting brand of football in 2024.

Finally, the time is now for Luke Harder's Loxton to take the next step and break a premiership drought which stretches back to 2006.

Loxton is arguably the most

intriguing side in the RFL in 2024.

For Harder's second season in charge in 2024, Loxton will boast plenty of talent. including several recruits making the move to the club.

Former Hope Valley ruckman Bravden De Prinse headlines the inclusions. while the athletic Rogan Kennedy will no doubt cause opposition coaches some headaches throughout the

Barmera United still booming

Like other sports in town, Barmera United Soccer Club is enjoying a prosperous and successful period, largely driven by strong player numbers and solid administration.

Last year the Pelicans won the A grade men's Top Four Cup and finished second in the premiership, continuing a run of success atop – or near – the Riverland soccer totem pole.

Illustrating the club's strength, the initial senior men's squad exceeded 26 players last year, but unfortunately the demise of the Riverland B grade competition left a number of players without a game each week.

In addition, the senior women finished second behind the powerful Renmark Olympic side.

Expect Barmera to continue to exhibit that strong showing in season 2024, armed with some of the most talented men and women in the region.

Marty Barber is acting as player-coach for the A grade men, assisted by Kevin Barber, who is doubling as senior women's coach.

Marty remains one of the best senior

players in the Riverland, but will again be flanked by other top talent, such as Dimitri Kanakaris, James Wallace and Riley Haigh.

Club newcomer Brayden Croxton is coaching the Pelicans under 16 girls team and is expected to line up in the senior men's team.

Club president Joe Lewin said Croxton is a welcome addition to the club.

"Brayden used to coach Gawler Eagles," Mr Lewin explained.

"He's a good asset for us."

While Barmera United's early trainings were impacted by hot weather, Lewin said the club had unearthed a potential star in the form of Jack McCracken, from the Northern Territory.

"He actually played in the Alice Springs competition," Mr Lewin said.



"He's a first-year under 16 and a very talented player. He's been training with the A grade side, so we're hoping to slot him in somewhere.

"Fortunately, a few of those really good senior players are still there and they're going to be the ones that gel that whole side together, I think, given their experience."

Mr Lewin said Barmera's excess player numbers last year meant the club was right being the push to re-establish a men's B grade competition.

"It's especially (important) for our kids who are no longer eligible for the under 16 competition," he said.

"That sort of leaves them in limbo if they're not quite good enough for A grade."

Mr Lewin is coaching Barmera's under 12s team.

It has been another off–season of significant change for the Berri River Rangers, with new coach Peter Exarheas taking the reins.

Berri has had a high squad turnover for the second season running, with a number of players departing the region.

This means River Rangers will rely on their department of youth yet again, as they seek to climb up the ladder following a third-place finish in the league last season.

While conceding the year ahead appears to be challenging, Exarheas said Berri would experiment with a new game plan throughout the season.

"At the moment we have a really young squad, so it will be challenging but certainly a lot of trial and error for us," he said.

"Our biggest focus is working at a better game plan which suits us and our play style to help us springboard up the ladder and push for a place in the

Top Four Cup final."

Inconsistency was one of Berri's biggest struggles last season, with results varying wildly.

After beginning the season with a 12-0 victory over Loxton United, River Rangers lost their next three matches, illustrating a pattern of results over the season.

This left Berri languishing in third place behind Renmark Olympic and Barmera United, and this preceded a first-round exit in the Top Four Cup against the Pelicans.

Exarheas says this means the club is working on a defensive approach throughout the pre-season as it hopes to stop the rot: conceding 47 goals across the season.

"We will be a stronger side defensively, but we always want to move the ball a lot quicker when we have it in our possession," he said.

"You have to play to your strengths, so we need to shut down the opposition's best players and then counter attack and be positive when we have the ball.

Progression will continue to be key for the Tigers, with the club keen to continue focussing on development in 2024.


"We are very much a family-orientated club," Perram said.

Clarke said while some returning players would be crucial, giving opportunities




to youth was also a priority. "We have some more senior and experienced players returning for the 2024 season depending how they get through pre-season, which will be valuable to the squad," he said.

"We are happy to have had Todd Kitto join our club this year. He has previously played for Seacliff in the Premier League competition and is a recognised highprofile player at state level for Hockey SA," Stokes said.

"Todd also has a very expansive knowledge in coaching being the Vanuatu National coach, Hockey SA state coach and high-performance coach, and founder of KM Coaching who hold clinics throughout the state.

"His introduction to the club, as a player and resource for coaches, will be invaluable."

Stokes added that "we are looking forward to continually support our club, players, parents, families, volunteers and sponsors during the 2024 with club events and promotions throughout the year".

Liam Richardson will coach the women's A grade side this year.

"They've picked up a few

extra players and have decided to take the step up," Carr said.

After playing in last year's winning side. Carr said he was looking forward to his coaching role.

"I moved up here 18 months ago for work and have played hockey pretty competitively all my life.

"I feel I have some knowledge I can give back to the team, as well as the iuniors."

A new foundation for Renmark hockey

Ensuring player numbers remain sustainable is a priority for Renmark Hockey Club this year.

Renmark Hockey Club president Kylie Radloff said a number of teams would merge with Loxton for the 2024 season.

"The Renmark Hockey Club are focusing on rebuilding for the 2024 season and developing our talented up-and-coming juniors," Radloff said.

"Due to a shortage of players, we have been in negotiations with Loxton Hockey Club about combining many of our teams this year in order to keep the competition going.

"It is important for hockey in the Riverland on the whole to remain viable, and we are focusing on what we as a club can do to contribute to its continued success."

Radloff hoped this would allow the club to focus on recruitment and



youth development.

"Numbers are a bit down this year, and as a result, we are not nominating an A grade men's or women's team," she said.

"Our junior numbers in the under 14s and under 18 women's grades are strong, and we are working in cooperation with Loxton to combine our under 12 mixed and under 18 men's teams this season."

Radloff said key female players Ella Pick, Kaela Smart and Amanda Schubert would be assets for Loxton's side.

"Due to not nominating any A grade teams this year, several of our senior men and women players will be joining other clubs to help bolster their numbers," she said.

"With Loxton nominating an A grade women side... some of our talented juniors in Ella Pick and Kaela Smart will add their strength to the team, along with veteran goalkeeper Amanda Schubert.

"In the B grade competition, both Renmark sides look to be competitive, and will be aiming to be in the finals action come September.

"The Renmark/Loxton combined team won the U/18 men's premiership last year, and are looking to be a strong contender again this year."

Radloff expected Renmark's B grade sides would contend for trophies this season.

"Our B grade men are a solid team with years of experience, and will be drawing on this to be a competitive force come finals," she said

"Our B grade women have been in the mix for the past few seasons, without being able to quite seal the deal.

"With many of our seniors playing in both the A grade and B grade competition for several seasons, burnout had been a big issue for our teams come finals.

"Without the pressure of stretching players to fill both A grade and B grade teams, we expect both our men and women to have strong seasons and be contenders for the big dance at the end of the season."

Radloff said creating a foundation for future success was a goal.

"With some exciting new junior players joining our club, we will be focusing on developing those players and building their skills, while also focusing on continued recruiting efforts for the future," she said.

"Regarding our senior teams, we will be looking to continue the positive culture we pride ourselves on at Renmark, and work toward creating a solid foundation of senior players to build on for future seasons.

"Giving juniors the opportunity to step up and play in the B grade will help their confidence and hopefully encourage them to continue with hockey down the track."

Waikerie's B grade men also won their grand final against Berri 5-2 last year.







Barmera building some positivity

A refreshing absence of 'coach–speak' allows Jane Gartner to talk realistically – but still optimistically – about how Barmera Netball Club has approached the 2024 season.

Appointed A1 coach a long way out (relatively speaking, for netball) from the season, Gartner is banking on a positive atmosphere around the club translating to strong on-court performances.

"We've been trying to bring everyone together, and make it a fun, comfortable atmosphere, with lots of laughs as well, which is nice," she said.

"For me personally, that's how I like to play netball, so that's the kind of vibe we're trying to bring for the kids and the seniors as well.

"We try to have open and

honest communication with everybody, because people don't like that in-the-dark, secret squirrels crap.

"I think everybody is appreciating it so far." Since losing the 2021 A1 grade final against a powerful, undefeated Renmark side, Barmera has slipped back down the ladder to more familiar

territory over the past two

seasons.

The 2024 season looms as another step in the rebuilding phase, with Gartner and the club keen to keep developing juniors to complement the smattering of returning seniors.

Chloe Drogemuller is the main absentee from the team that finished with a 2-13 win/loss record in 2024, while A2 regular Millie Koumbarakos has shifted to Renmark.

Working with an A1-A2 squad, Gartner said the club expects further improvement from talented

junior trio Ayla Gilgen, Layla Moore and Hallie Hodgson, who have all had a taste at senior level

Fresh from a solid A1 debut season in 2023, Jemma Kassulke is also expected to be a major contributor in 2024, while veteran midcourter Sue Whitbourne is lining up again.

"Sue has put her hand up to play again this season and it's good to have her playing that senior role for the girls again," Gartner said.

"We've also got Jenna Selfe who will come back and play in A1 or A2 capacity, depending on her commitments.

"And Khaleisha Barnett had last year off, when she travelled, but she'll be back to seniors this year. She'll be really handy.

"It's good that we've retained pretty much all the A1 group from last year in the squad.

"We have a youthful bunch, but they're pretty fit and raring to have a crack, and that's all I can ask for."

Former A1 coach Sam Wellington is supporting Gartner this season, while newcomer Jacinta Turner is coaching the club's A2 side.

"Jacinta's come over from Victoria and she's great," Gartner said.

"She'll bring a lot of different insight, I think. The game's not different over there, but they might have different



structures and different formats.

"It's just been nice for us to have a different point of view"

Far from being negative about the prospects of tackling the A1 season with a bunch of young underdogs, Gartner is – again – realistic about her assignment.

"It happens regularly with all the juniors that play," she said.

"They cycle through, then the next kids step up and hopefully build their confidence and skill set, and are solid contributors for the club at senior level.

"Last year was the changing of the guard, so you've got to push the next line of girls to step up. We'll keep building them."

Gartner, 42, played A1 for Barmera as a junior, then left the region for 13 years, before returning and again playing at the top local level in 2021.

She "stepped back" to a lower grade in 2022, then was playing-coach for the club's B1 side last year.

"I decided at the end of last year that I wanted to try to make a positive change for the Barmera Netball Club and put my hand up early to coach." she said.

Reid said once again contending for a trophy was a goal for the 2024 season.


"To make finals we need to work hard all season," she said.

She said the club was also welcoming some past players back into the fold.


"Some of them haven't played for a few years and are returning, which is great to see," she said.



New era at **Panther Park**

The RFL world was thrown into a spin when longstanding coach Terry **Eleftheriadis resigned** as coach of Loxton North in February.

Plenty of interest now surrounds Panther Park following the appointment of highly regarded Dave Higgins as senior coach. What might he bring to the

The Panthers were one of the most interesting stories of 2023, sitting pretty atop the RFL ladder after 10 rounds with an 8-2 record However, they ultimately dropped to second place behind Renmark, then bowed out of the finals series in straight sets. But with Higgins in charge now, the slate has been wiped clean.

He is excited about the prospect of coaching in the Riverland – a key reason why he took on the job.

"Obviously it's all a big unknown for me, being new to the club and new to the league." he said.

"But I'm enthused and encouraged by the core group we have.

"We've got a pretty good mix of experience and youth, and the coaching group are really passionate about

footy so I'm looking forward to working with them and learning from them.

"I'd just got back into coaching so I had a bit of renewed interest, and then once I spoke with (football operations manager) Ben Williams, his enthusiasm was contagious so I thought 'why not?'.

"I really enjoyed my time at Tailem Bend, and I enjoy the country footy feel and the community footy idea."

Higgins says he will have minimal expectations of his group in 2024 as he navigates his new coaching challenge.

However, he wants his side to be competitive and build on the progress made by the club under Eleftheriadis' auidance in 2023.

"My expectation is we're going to be competitive. enthusiastic, have a crack, and just enjoy ourselves," he said.

"Where that leaves us at the end of the year I'm not sure because I don't know about our opposition, apart from the fact that some clubs have recruited well and have been strong for several

Higgins says the Panthers are going to be an exciting team to watch in 2024, with free-flowing football high on the agenda.

"I like to operate that style, but I need to work out our strengths and weaknesses and build our game plan from that." he said.

"I just want us to be really hard to play against, and what that means needs to be figured out, but we'll be



building on our strengths regardless."

The department of youth is going to be a talking point for North in 2024, with Higgins focusing on junior development as the club looks towards the future, while having a focus on the current season.

"My understanding is we've had a lot of players play senior footy over the last two years, so I'll certainly be looking to further develop those guys," he said.

"There's talk that there's going to be a few coming



from last years under 18s team so there will be a focus on those, but that doesn't take away my focus on the other players at the same time.

"But, these guys might be 10-year players at our footy club, so it's my duty to develop them as best as I can to be senior footballers for Loxton North.

"There is a focus on them,

but it certainly won't be at the expense of the rest of our playing list."

Waikerie will field one of the youngest sides in the RFL A grade competition, with a bulk of the team under 25.


Kilsby admits this could open his side up to inconsistency, but the Magpies will remain an exciting team to watch in season 2024.

"As a football club and football department, we have taken the opportunity to recalibrate key aspects on how we operate and perform on and off the field.

"We are enthusiastically looking forward to the 2024 season to track our club's performance and celebrate the successes when they are achieved."

Woolston says pre-season training has been positive, with many of the group showing they have what it takes to play at the top level.

Competition for spots has also gone up a gear, with Dion Brauer and Brad Rosenzweig among newcomers pulling on the red and blue in 2024, following their recent moves from Morphettville Park and the Southern Mallee Suns respectively.

"A real boost in the lead up to the 2024 season has been the support received to improve club performance, he said.

"They will further complement our top-line


players that have served and played representative football over past seasons."




"I think every team would be eyeing finals off, and that's certainly the goal, but it is a pretty tight competition and each team on their day can beat anyone," Harder said.

second in charge at Tigerland, and he says he feels he has a better handle on the Riverland Football League.

"We're a lot fitter than we were this time last year, and I've definitely been putting the kilometres into the boys." he said.

"I've changed a bit from my first year as senior coach last year, and we're now showing signs of natural development with areas of improvement.

"Our training has been a bit different from what it was, in a positive way, and the attitude of the group has been unreal with the young kids leading the pack.

"The senior boys have been inspired by the younger ones coming through on the track. They come with great energy every session.

While the Tigers missed finals footy in 2023, they're no stranger to featuring at the pointy end of the competition.

Loxton played off in preliminary finals in 2021 and 2022, ultimately coming up short at the hands of Renmark and Waikerie respectively.

Harder says the bulk of his side knows what to expect in finals football.

"The self-belief is definitely there, but we just need to focus on round one against Berri to start with," he said.

"If the processes are going how we want them to, everything will take care of itself.

"At the moment we're not looking too far ahead, but the boys have been there before, so hopefully we can push past our injury issues from last year, and have a bit of luck go our way, we can feature at the pointy end.

"It's going to be a very even competition, having looked at what some of the other clubs are doing..."



Entering the season as reigning premiers – following its 2023 grand–final triumph over Renmark – is a task Barmera– Monash hasn't faced for 11 years.

Many teams face the prospect of a premiership hangover the year after achieving the ultimate glory, but the Roos have attacked the off-season hard and will no doubt be in premiership calculations yet again.

The return of former West Adelaide SANFL star – and Adelaide Crow – Jono Beech to his home club is one of the biggest coups the RFL has seen in years. In addition, the return of former Roos players Chris Bonney and Mason Middleton, both with SANFL league experience, together with Luke Thomas,

makes Barmera-Monash a formidable proposition.

Head coach Fraser Sampson achieved premiership success as a player at Renmark on multiple occasions, so it's abundantly clear he knows how to attack an off-season burdened by expectations.

"My experiences at Renmark have certainly helped me at Barmera as I saw firsthand how a successful program is built and sustained each year," he said.

"Regarding the external expectations, I focus my energy towards achieving our own goals and executing our game plan, rather than the opinions of others.

"Our big message is to embrace the challenge (and) this group showed during finals that we can handle the pressure.

"My messaging will certainly be around

focusing on our game plan and controlling what we can."

The 2024 season will be Sampson's second in charge of the Roos, and his focus is clearly on the entire club, not just its senior program.

He says club culture remains as a topic high on the agenda, with a return to finals for the club's B grade side for the first time since 2018 on the cards.

"I am really excited to have another opportunity to work with this senior group and build on the development we made in 2023," he said.

"We will continue to work hard on creating the best club culture we can. I'm really motivated to work with the other coaches to push everyone to find ways to improve their own game. "Our targets are around building a positive club culture and buying into a team-first game plan. If we are able to achieve these targets, it will result in successful on-field results."

While Barmera-Monash has recruited spectacularly well, quality players have left the club in the form of defensive duo Michael Mock and Jack Sullivan, along with premiership hero Sam De Michele, who won The Murray Pioneer trophy for best on ground in the grand final.

However, Sampson said the current group has responded well to preseason training, zoning in on strength and conditioning training.

"Training numbers have been quite strong with around 40 each night. Toby Gartner from Body Boss Studio has been great in running the strength and conditioning component of our pre-season." he said.

"We completed three training sessions before Christmas, then started again mid-January."

Barmera-Monash's defence was outstanding in 2023, but the Roos rarely racked up big scores and winning margins.

"Hopefully we manage to score more freely than we did last year," Sampson said.

"However, we will continue to place a strong emphasis on our defence as we believe this is a strength of our group.

"On the back of our successful under 18 season, we have a great stock of young talent coming through including Campbell Marks, Lucas Warnett, Rory Moore, Lachie Marks, Nick Richardson, Aidan Scordo, Braiden Bagguley, Sam Vanderwoude, Hayden Carter and Cohen Harris."



"A few years ago we sat down and set out a purpose for the senior group, and that hasn't changed," he said.


"That purpose is not driven by wins and losses, but around building a sustained culture of success and enjoyment.

"Both of those aspects are really important to us, and we obviously want success but that can look different to some.


"You're always vying to win the premiership, but at the end of the day there's five teams who don't win a premiership, and I would hope those teams don't think their seasons were wasted.

"We want to work hard and get better, and through that we'll win some games of footy, which will be the

outcome of the stuff we're after."

Renmark came into 2023 with a points deduction to its name following a player eligibility issue throughout the 2022 finals series.

That meant starting last season's campaign with -4 points. Vater says while the group didn't address the issue, it played a role in the feeling around the club.

"It probably was a negative that was hanging over our heads a little bit..." he said.

"It'll be nice to actually start on zero

points, and to not have it as a factor on players' minds about where we sit on the ladder, because it took until round four to get back to zero points.

"We still ended up finishing top, which was an amazing effort, but to not have that hanging over our heads will be nice.

"(It) probably changed how we used players a bit last year, and my philosophy on development players was thrown off a bit because we just needed to get points on the board."

Vater said his group had been motivated from the first training of the season.

"I think it stirs a fire in the belly when you don't have the success and you feel like you've underperformed and you were so close," he said.

"We've seen really good numbers out on the track throughout pre-season, and hopefully that only continues to arow.

"We've been training our seniors with our under 18s side which has been really good and that's only going to

help us in the long run."

Under Vater's guidance, the Rovers have been known to play a fast style of football, and it is something which has held them in good stead.

They're expected to perform well again in 2024, and challenge towards the top end of finals with boom recruit Nick Gillard returning home.

As season 2024 approaches, Vater says an exciting brand of footy is forecasted for Renmark Oval.

"I'd expect some of our players to take another step up, and really look to take the game on," he said.








game expected in 2024.

Eaton says the biggest goal from his side in 2024 will be to remain competitive, with the competition appearing to be stronger than 2023.

"We didn't go into last year thinking we'd go through undefeated, and it wasn't something we talked about until about seven or eight games into the year," he said.

New coach, new aspirations at Murrayville

Armed with a new coach who knows how to win arand finals. Murrayville looms as a realistic premiership threat in the 2024 **Murray Valley football** competition.

Mick Durdin famously lifted East Murray to a flag in 2003, when the Murray Valley competition was called the RFL Independents.

Family ties brought him to Murrayville last season and after a year observing on the sidelines, he has taken on the top job - and is aiming high.

Murrayville finished third at the end of the minor round, just percentage behind second-ranked Brown's Well, but had an off day against Ramco in the first semi-final, to make an early exit.

However, some new recruits and renewed enthusiasm among the existing player base has hopes high that the Blues - renamed from the



Bulldogs in 2023 to avoid a clash with Wunkar - can go at least a couple of steps further this year.

"I think we'll be very competitive (but) it'll take time for the team to react to my new game style," Durdin said.

"I expect we'll come home with a head of steam."

Durdin's footballing message has always revolved around accountability, and woe betide any of his players fond of running forward without manning up.

"You must man up, you must apply pressure," he said.

Murrayville look to have the tools to mount a serious charge at the title, bolstered by a number of newcomers.

Heading that list are former Loxton North pair Keenan Wilksch, who was runner-up in the RFL B grade medal, and Brandon Martin. Wilksch should play in the midfield. while Martin is a versatile type, capable of playing at either end.

Joining them at Murrayville is Loxton recruit Jasper Hoffmann, a winner of RFL B grade medal. Hoffmann has A grade experience and can play midfield, but is a particularly damaging forward with several bags under his belt.

Further adding to the scoring power at Durdin's disposal is prolific RFL

Independent goal kicker Dean Hill, who played in five premierships with Paringa and booted over 700 goals along the way.

"The big fella is keen and has lost a lot of weight." Durdin said.

"It's great to have him on board."

In addition, 2023 leading goal kicker Nathan Wright-Bramfit will also slot into the forward line, giving Murrayville a potent look.

Returning to the club is ruckman Malcolm Moore. who had some experience with Southern Mallee Suns in the River Murray competition last season. Moore played with Murrayville in 2022 and was described by Durdin as having "a lot of raw ability".

Other leading lights for Murrayville this season are likely to be Cooper Wisneske, co-captains Geordie Franks and Clayton Sporn, and Durdin's son. Jake, who will welcome Moore's arrival to share the ruck duties.

Durdin is also expecting big contributions from Ryan Lewis, Clayton Godden and others.

Influenced by farming duties, training numbers were light on initially, but have lifted in recent weeks, and overall the club looks to have plenty of depth. Durdin has coached a handful of senior clubs and

says joining the Blues has been a smooth transition.

"I've been made to feel very welcome, even last year when I was only watching," he said.

"A new bloke come out and said 'everyone's made me feel so welcome, why wouldn't I play footy out here?'. so that shows what sort of club it is.

"We had a Saturday training in January. Some new blokes came out, but weren't sure they were going to play. Well, they mixed with the blokes afterwards and that convinced them to play with us, because they've been made to feel so welcome."

Durdin's assistant is Riley Watson and together the duo will be plotting a path through a potentially tricky opening four matches, against BSR, Wunkar, Sedan and Brown's Well - all with a young line-up.

"Those matches will sort out where we're going," Durdin said.

"People might say I'm only playing the kids because I haven't got enough numbers.

"That's wrong: I'm playing the kids for one reason: because they're good enough.

"And they've been improving every week during preseason."


