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
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Winter sport arrives again

Arguably Riverland soccer's most cohesive unit, Barmera United are hoping to set a foundation for years of success in 2025.

The Pelicans finished the 2024 Riverland Soccer Association season as comfortable runners-up to Renmark Olympic, and suffered a 3-2 loss to Loxton in the Top Four Cup semifinals, which many observers would have labelled an upset.

Senior men's coach Marty Barber said many players had been eager to hold extra preparations for the 2025 season.

"We started training earlier this season, compared to last season," Barber said.

"We've had a couple trial games, and we've been doing two compulsory sessions a week, plus some extra stuff for those that want to do it.

"We've had people down there most nights of the week during some weeks, so there's quite a nice atmosphere building at the moment."

Barber said a number of Barmera's well-known senior names would return to help guide the side's younger players this season.

"We're starting to see improvements in training, and the trial games were handy to see how the team looks," he said

"We've got quite a young team this year.

"We've got younger lads in Jude Bourton, Jesse Tsonis, Charlie van der Woude and Jack McCracken... and two of the boys back from Loxton in Crispin and Tony Mitchell, and they've brought Cooper Ebert with them too, who's a very-handy player.

"That's three big ins, and we have the same senior heads in the team."

Barber said maintaining positive attitudes throughout the season's challenging points would help the team's development for future years.

"It's feeling like it's a group coming through that could be dominant for a few years, depending on a lot of different factors of course," he said.

"It's always a team-first mentality for us.

"It will be important to try and stay as injury free as we can, because we've got a lot of quality, but not a massive squad, and because it's a young group, when things are challenging – which they will be – how we respond will be key.

"We're still building on the game plan, but we've brought in those extra couple players that will help it work a lot better, so I reckon we'll be moving the ball around quite well this year."

A new and experienced coach on the sidelines is set to support a fresh group of Loxton United Soccer Club (LUSC) players in their commitment to bringing success to the club.

Loxton's A grade squad, often studded with young names that possess a 'nothing to lose' mentality, can often throw up surprises for opposition sides. LUSC president Matt Perram said developing the skills of the team's younger players will again be a focus

After finishing the season third on the A grade ladder, with 17 points, Loxton's most-memorable win of 2024 though undoubtedly came in the Top Four Cup, with a gritty 3-2 triumph over Barmera that many onlookers would have labelled as an upset.

Perram said the appointment of Josh Sans as 2025 senior coach and football director had generated high levels of positivity among the club.

"We are excited to have a very experience player/coach who has joined the LUSC family," he said.

"He will bring a lot of experience and depth into our club, not only taking on the role of A grade coach but also in a football director role within our club, supporting the coaches, parents and youth from under 6 and up. We are very excited to have him commit to LUSC for season 2025 and beyond.

"We have had quite a few leave from last year, but in saying that we have some exciting players returning and some new players joining LUSC.

"Time will tell what our coach can get out of the players in our young, but enthusiastic senior teams. It will be a different season than 2024, but I am excited to see what we can achieve."


workers. Hopefully we can get some wins and have some fun along the way."

"We are hoping to have both A men and A women's teams, two B men's teams, an under 14 mixed team, and an under 12 mixed team."

Loxton continues to improve its culture of success through previous years, and motivation has been a key part during training.

"We start with encouraging participation and fun with our junior members



rather than focusing on competition," Schaefer said.

"We are making a concerted effort to develop player, umpire and volunteer skills and the use of these skills throughout the club.

"We are also working on building the social side of our club at senior level through J Ball, and other local programs to increase exposure and participation.

"This provides more ways for people to enjoy the sport, creating a strong social component for the club and ensuring members feel connected."

looking forward to seeing the game of hockey improve in the region on the whole. while keeping a keen eye on the Demons.


"I look forward to the Riverland competition getting stronger, and not necessarily just to do with the standard of the game." he said.

"Hockey is a smaller community, so you have the ability to get to know the people," he said.


"We have families with kids playing juniors and the parents playing seniors, it really is a family game.



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New direction planned for RFL

Potential expansion and sustainability of the women's game are among the focuses for the newly appointed independent chairperson of the RFL.

One of the most highly sought after vacant positions in the Riverland has been filled, following the appointment of an independent chairperson to the RFL.

Bruce Gehling won the race to the position, bringing a wealth of experience with him having previously coached at RFL club Berri, among several professional positions including at SAPOL, and with the Berri Hotel as its operations manager, and a board member of SANFL club North Adelaide.

Now retired and living in Waikerie, Gehling said his passion for country football was a key factor in accepting the position.

"Once I moved back to the Riverland, a few people spoke to me and over the last few years I haven't had a lot to do with footy, but now I've retired I've got more time on my hands," Mr Gehling said.

"A few people chatted to me, and with Henry Crawford having to vacate the role, I saw it as a good opportunity to be active and really involved in footy.

"This role sort of allows me to do things and put forward ideas that will hopefully be able to assist the overall longevity of RFL clubs."

Winds of change have swept through the Riverland Football League in recent years, most notably via the creation of the Murray Valley Football Netball League, meaning the Independents were removed from the league's banner.

Mr Gehling said he will put in place the necessary steps required to help the RFL flourish in every possible form.

"Everyone knows that country football is a battle, and so my plan will be to do

what we can as an overseeing league in helping the clubs stay buoyant," he said.

"Whether that be through advisor assistance or guidance, or direction from the SANFL, it's about keeping the clubs strong.

"We have to keep the relationships open with the clubs in regards to finances, and we can sustain what we've got.

"Perhaps after the settling period of 12 months we can have a look at the potential for expansion, and see whether that's required or available, or we can just consolidate with what we've got and keep enhancing that."

Mr Gehling is open to anything in the league, and expansion is certainly on that list, with the new independent chair open to adding to the six RFL clubs.

"Six teams is an interesting number, and it is workable, but perhaps growing to that is the key for helping us to continue surviving in the future," he said.

"I haven't got any specific thoughts on it at the moment, and there's no planning in place at the moment, but to survive you have to grow.

"Whether that's growth in the clubs we've already got, or in numbers, there are football clubs out there always looking for a home.

"If the RFL is strong player-andmanagement-wise, I think it may be a viable destination for some clubs that are looking for a league to call home."

Women's football in the Riverland continues to be one of the league's main challenges, with its sustainability continually brought into question.

In 2024, just Barmera-Monash, Berri, and Loxton North competed, with North combining with Loxton, Waikerie, and Renmark to help field a side.

The Rovers pulled out of the season just weeks before the opening round, with the league also operating a Thursday night fixture each week.

Mr Gehling said women's football is

going to be high on his agenda, with the league open to new ideas.

"Some immediate decisions need to be made in relation to senior women's football and what way we go with it... due to the lack of players in the Riverland willing to play football," he

"That's going to evolve over the next few weeks, and we'll be seeking feedback from the clubs in terms of what they're able to put on the park senior-wise.

"Junior-wise, hopefully we'll be able to gain assistance from the SANFL around growing the product, because it's no use having a competition if we don't have a competition.

"We need to focus on the seniors first and foremost and how we plan that, and then our focus will shift to the junior programs to make sure we have a viable system in place.

"Our challenge is making footy something that young people want to be involved in, and we have to keep it fun to keep the juniors coming through, otherwise we're in big trouble, so it's definitely a key focus."

Gehling held the top job at Berri in the early 2000s, helping take the club to a successful position on the RFL ladder before the Demons ultimately broke through for premiership success in 2010.

Gehling said he believes his background at club land will help him flourish in this role, understanding what each club requires from the league to set itself up for success.

"I've got a knowledge of RFL football, and when I arrived at Berri we were struggling a little bit, but we were able to structure a few things and add to our playing list," he said.

"I had a really good relationship with the committee there, and although I never had major involvement with the RFL, having a knowledge of club footy, which I've had in a number of country clubs, I think it will only help me in this role."

Panthers' time to pounce?

It has been a welcome change of pace this off-season for Loxton North, compared to the chaos the opening months of 2024 brought about.

The beginning of last year saw a change of coach in February at Panther Park, and when Dave Higgins accepted the role, and guided North to a 2-0 start, the Panthers' supporters were optimistic.

Yet, injuries and unavailability loomed over Loxton North, and before long, it was sitting in the bottom two, and ultimately found itself out of the finals race.

"We're going to have quite a sizable change in our squad, both physically and age wise this year," Higgins said.


"The game plan is still a little bit up in the air, because I haven't actually seen a few of the new recruits play, so it's a bit of a wait and see as to what best fits, and what the best balance is

"I don't feel fitness was the issue last year, I think it might have been the adrenaline of the offseason, but we were found out by some pretty good teams.

"We're just hoping that we're better set up this year from a game style and personnel point of view, to make sure we take that next step.

"That can be the challenge every week coaching young teams, but hopefully the experience some of them got last year will hold them in good stead, and it's onwards and upwards from here"



Magpie eyes on the grand prize

An up-and-down season 2024 for the Waikerie Magpies resulted in a preliminary final exit, marking change in the coaching department.

Appointing favourite son Jackson Sutton as its A grade coach last October, a sense of optimism surrounds Waikerie, as it embarks on its newest era.

Now with a brand-new building, and the reigning Whillas Medallist at their disposal, it's exciting times for the Magpies. Sutton said he is looking forward to assuming the head coaching reigns, with the Pies putting in a strong pre-season so far.

"There's decent numbers on the track, and the summer can be difficult because some people are doing harvest at the moment," he said.

"The boys are really motivated, and you've got your core group of A grade players who are ready for success again, because it has been a few years now.

"A lot of the 25-year-olds haven't experienced an A grade premiership again, so they're all super keen to try

and rectify that.

"It's a very-young list, but that's exciting because they have a lot of energy, and things are shaping up really well.

"We lost a fair-few players from last year, but at the moment we've worked to get some locals back, so we think we've got the right mix of players."

Sutton is a seven-time premiership player for Waikerie, and recently spent time as the playing coach of the club's B grade affiliate.

Sutton coached the Magpies' reserves to glory in 2023 on home deck, and with his side possessing some of the most attacking players in the Riverland, the Magpies want to take their game to a new level.

His experience with the club is set to shine in season 2025, with Waikerie hoping to be the most attacking side in the competition.

"One of the biggest driving forces of the pre-season has been about having a bit of spark playing footy again," he said.

"It's a style that probably can work against you at some points, but I still think it's a style we should all incorporate, so that the people coming to watch on Saturday see an exciting game.

"For me, that means kicking more goals, which I'm a big believer in, and that's the way we'll go about it.

Kade Hilton became the fourth-voungest Whillas Medallist last September. with the dynamic young midfielder also showing his class in attack.

Alongside him, Jarrad Bee produced a strong season in the middle of the ground. while Tristan Geehman again gave the Magpies driving force out of the back

Waikerie fell against Renmark at the kennel by 17 points in last year's preliminary final in a contested game of football. with the Magpies ultimately outclassed.

Sutton said he believes his group can go to the next level this year, with Waikerie widely expected for another finals campaign.

"Although we have lost a



couple, we've got some younger players coming through, so getting those boys into the senior system will be hugely beneficial as well." he said.

"I'm hoping they can lift us to the next level, but we do need to make sure our older blokes can stay injury free.

"If we can stay injury free, there's no reason we can't be near the top, but we are going to have to improve to match it with

those top sides.

"You need to have that burning in the back of your mind, so being switched on against the best teams in the league is a good thing."

Demons on the rise in 2025

It is no secret the Berri Football Club have been on one of the leanest patches in the history of the

RFL throughout the modern era.

Despite holding the most premierships in the competition, Berri's last A grade flag came back in 2010, and the Demons have only been back to the finals six times since.

Additionally, the club has the last two wooden spoons, winning just two games of its last 31, so the time for change is now.

Brenton Woolston's guidance only lasted one season, and the Berri Football Club appointed Henry Labastida last October.

The new leader of the Demons, who joined the playing group at the midway point of 2024, said he is excited for the challenge in front of him.

"Everyone is fit and ready to go, and the signs from our trial matches have been really positive, and we're just going through things that we want to improve for this year," he said.

"We want to make sure the boys are enjoying playing footy together, and bringing local boys back to the club alongside some experience can lift the boys up a bit more.

"We want to be strong and united when things get tough, and have a positive attitude and learn from the last couple of years and get out of that mindset.

"We just need to focus on what we want to achieve, and the way we want to play, and have fun."

Berri last played finals in 2022, falling to Loxton by eight points in the elimination final, but its last victory was the 2010 premiership.

So, with the unwanted statistic of no finals wins stretching into a 15th season, Labastida is tasked with guiding the Demons back to their glory days.

"I love finals footy, and that's what we play for, but speaking to the club, we have to make sure our fundamentals and our foundations are strong," he said.

"Looking forward to the next couple of years is a major thing to make sure the club is in good hands, and building a strong senior core who will stick around for a couple of years.

"Having Shay Hawkins who is one of our senior boys coach the under 18s is going to help build that connection with them.

"That was an under 18s side who made the grand final last year, so those guys will certainly get a taste of

senior level, and get them to be consistent in coming years.

"Our leadership group are really leading the way for the other boys to come through, and making sure the under 18s are training hard.

"The feedback I've received has been that the vibes are up, and the sheer number of players coming to training is high, which is good to see."

Berri snapped a two-year long losing streak in July last year in a thrilling onepoint round 12 win over Loxton North.

The Demons backed that up with a stunning Fisher Cup win, in Barmera, the following week, and it appeared they had turned a corner.

However, Berri finished the year with three-straight

defeats, but intriguingly, were competitive in a bulk of the 16 home-and-away matches.

Labastida said the willingness to get stuck into round one, with the Demons starting off against grand finalists Barmera-Monash, is through the roof.

"Like all of the other clubs, you don't know what to expect until the season starts, because you don't know what the other clubs have recruited." he said.

"It's going to be exciting for us to see where we're at, but



at this stage we're happy, and it's a positive feeling at training at the moment.

"It's always good to have a different insight, and trying to bring what I learned from Darwin to here, but you are at a disadvantage when you don't know about the players and have to build relationships.

"For me it's a case of so

far, so good, and everyone has appreciated what I'm putting into the club, and I've got great assistant coaches behind me who have helped and guided me through this stage."

Tigers alive for 2025

Holding the longest A grade premiership drought in the Riverland Football League, a sense of unrest is growing at Loxton.

The Tigers last tasted the ultimate success in 2006, and despite being a regular feature of the final four, a new era is underway at Tigerland.

Last October saw Loxton replace playing coach Luke Harder, who's side were bounced out in last year's elimination final, with Loxton North junior Nathan Brown.

Brown most recently spent time in Karoonda, and the playing coach is excited for his first season coaching in the region.

"At this stage everything is looking really good, and training has been fantastic, and we've had a really good response from the guys," he said.

"I feel like we're in a really good spot,

and we're having good numbers on the track, and everyone's looking healthy, so things are positive so far.

"I'm pretty old fashioned, and for me there is no substitute to hard work, so for me it's about making sure that every session we do we're training really hard.

"We're trying to get something out of each session, and continue to get better by developing as a team, so that's been my main message.

"I'm very big on having a teamorientated style of play, so we're making sure we're doing what we can for each other and ourselves to benefit the team."

Loxton have an exciting, young playing group, and although important players such as Rogan Kennedy and Will Gutsche have departed, Brown said he is excited about the side.

That, plus the opportunity to continue his coaching career, is what drew the 31-year-old to Tigerland, with Loxton looking to build on last year's

elimination exit.

"I had some chats with some other clubs around the place, but with Loxton I was really drawn to the fact that I can continue on as a head coach," he said.

"The plus side is that they've got a really talented young group, and they're only going to excel and get better this season.

"We've got some really good leaders among that too, who I've known for a while and played a bit of footy against as well.

"It's a very positive look on this season and moving forward, and I feel as though I have a good ability to gel with the young guys, as well as the older guys.

"It's looking very good at this stage,

and hopefully we can see some success on the field, and look to develop the guys coming through the under 15s and under 18s and get them playing senior football as soon as possible.

Loxton supporters strapped in for a rollercoaster season in 2024, with highs and lows present right from the word go.

The Tigers started with a round one win over Berri, and claimed the Proud Cup in round four following a stirring last quarter.

Yet the best win of its season came in round five – defeating eventual premier Renmark at the kennel – as well as defeating grand finalists Barmera-Monash in round 12.

However, inconsistencies pushed the Tigers into fourth place, with losses against Waikerie on three occasions, as well as a disappointing round nine loss at Panther Park.

To enjoy success in season 2025, Loxton will be looking for more consistent football, and that has been



a key focus for Brown this summer.

"Everyone's really hungry and you can just tell that on the training track with what we've been doing has been awesome." he said.

"It's a credit to the guys because they just keep rocking up every week, and you can definitely see there's a hunger there.

"A lot of them feel that last year they left a few stones unturned, and didn't finish as well as they could have.

"Injuries played a big part, but we've managed to do some really good

recruiting, and the younger guys that were playing good A grade footy last year have gone to another level this pre-season.

"I'm very happy with the list we have, and I'm confident that we can be playing finals again, and look to go a lot deeper."

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

Can the Roos bounce back?

If it could have grand final day back, there is little doubting A grade coach Fraser Sampson and the Barmera–Monash Football Club would snap at the opportunity.

Dominating all year, the 2023 premiers cruised through to the minor premiership, rarely faulting, despite a two-game slide in the middle of the year, largely due to injuries.

Aside from that, the Roos left little in their wake last year, winning 13 games, and winning straight through to the grand final in a second semi-final that was one of the games of the year.

Yet, everyone is back to square one as a new season dawns, and with the slate being wiped clean from 2024, excitement is building at the Lakeside.

"There is certainly an element of hunger from the senior teams that lost the grand finals," Sampson said.

"Numbers have been relatively consistent, but slightly down on last year, but this time of year is tricky



with summer sport finishing up.

"The under 18 group and those coming up to seniors this year have been really consistent with their training, and I'm looking forward to seeing their development throughout the year.

"Going into my third year with the club, I'm really looking to build on the foundation of the past two seasons.

"We have worked hard on creating a strong culture, and hopefully we can continue to improve both on and off the field."

As a club, the Roos earned a special club achievement in 2024 – making the grand final in all six grades.

Although Barmera-Monash won just the under 18s and under 15s grand finals, the Roos set the standard across their football club.

Captain Sam Butterworth leads the under 15s, helping foster the next generation, Steve Marks won the club back-to-back under 18s premierships, and Kayla Mudge has been a pioneer of women's football, so the signs are there for Barmera-Monash to be successful yet again.

A grade boss Sampson said season 2024 taught the club about hard work, with the Roos seeming connected as a club on the whole.

"Last year taught us that whole club buy-in is crucial," he said.

"Across the club, everyone was all in, and it really showed in the way we

played, and we managed to get all teams in the grand finals.

"It's always important to look for ways to improve, and we certainly have plenty of areas that we want to get better in.

"I try to have really clear messaging around what we are trying to achieve, and make sure we place more emphasis on the process, rather than the outcome.

"We want to be the mostconnected group, and we want to develop the offensive side of our game as a result."

Adapting to change is key for every sporting club, but that rings true for not many others louder than Barmera-Monash this year.

Although recruiting well – headlined by Steve Burton – who will be in conversations



as the best footballer in the Riverland, the Roos have been gutted.

Often priding itself on defence across the past two years, which has been the catalyst for success, Barmera-Monash will be missing key defensive pillars this year.

Tall defensive duo Aedan Lyon and Luke Thomas have departed, while veteran midfield bulls, and stalwarts of the club, Jake Smith and Ben Drogemuller, are also out.

Importantly, Barmera-Monash have retained a bulk of its scoring power, with Jono Beech, Matt Wutke, and Mitch Wellington donning the double blue again.

Captain Butterworth will steer the midfield ship, with pacey winger Paul Spilios on the outside, and reigning best and fairest Justin Bonney possess class down back.

The Roos have the tools to

go back to the top of the mountain, and the grand final burn of last year should be strong enough to have them in premiership calculations once again.

Bark-to-bark on the cards for Rovers?

Establishing itself as the most successful Riverland Football League club of the modern era, Renmark capped off a stunning 2024 season with another A grade premiership.

Renmark has been a feature of the past six grand finals, taking home the flag in 2019, 2021, 2022, and 2024.

Following 2023's grand final loss, the Rovers will reassume the role of being the hunted side of the competition, with its star players and game style forensically analysed by the other five clubs.

Now with 18 premierships to its name, the Rovers will be keen to continue this golden era of success, and superstar playing coach Josh Vater said the motivation is high at the kennel again.

"Everyone's come back really well and all are looking fit, and they've all done their own thing over the off-season which is nice," he said.

"You do have some challenges over the summer every year with players in vintage or playing summer sport and you want everyone training, but for the most part everyone looks fit and healthy and raring to go, so we feel really confident.

"Because we've been so fortunate to be successful for a few years, we've been in a similar position, and it's not uncommon for us to be hunted by the competition.

"At the same time, from all reports

every club has had player changes, and some have had coach changes, so everyone will be thinking they'll be around the mark."

Renmark will host the RFL grand final in season 2025 for the first time since 2018 – an A grade defeat to Waikerie – and Vater said the prospect was significant.

With one of the most complete playing lists in the competition, Renmark is one of the premiership favourites, but the Rovers boss said its remaining level-headed for his group was important.

"It does seem to be a bit of a thing among the clubs, in a similar fashion to centenary years, because everyone wants to win at home," he said.

"I personally am yet to win a home grand final, so I'm unable to say if they're better than any other year, but to me, it doesn't matter where we play if we're fortunate enough to make it.

"If we're good enough to be there, and to win it, I don't care where we play, but from a club point of view, it's massive for the club and a lot goes in to making it special.

"There are so many things to do, and so much that can go both right and wrong between now and then, so there's no point in thinking about it."

One of the key sticking points of Renmark's 2024 campaign was its consistency, recording 12 wins for the season and just four losses.

The Rovers started the season with four wins on the trot, and despite a two-game slide, managed to recover



and at no stage slipped out of the top two, although both defeats came on home turf.

Highlights for Renmark included a round seven win at Waikerie for the Gill/Lehmann Cup, while its biggest winning margin came in round 14, at Berri – crossing triple figures.

Reflecting on the 2024 successes, Vater said he was pleased with the way his group responded to the challenges they faced last year, ensuring there will be no guarantees once again.

"Just like everyone else, we enter each season hoping, and expecting we'll be around the mark and challenging again," he said.

"There is an element of estimated guess work, but at the same time there is a little bit on hope too, because you don't know how other clubs are shaping up with player changes.

"Every year we'll have challenges, but that is why you play sport, because nobody wants any team to win or lose every game, and you want an even competition.

"Last year we were relatively healthy, and as a group we adapted pretty well based on where we were from the year before, and we looked to change some things too.

"There were times last year where we thought our offence was going well and our defence needed work, but there were other times where that was flipped.

"We were able to make adjustments on both sides of the coin mid-year, and that's what I see my role is as a coach."

Every RFL club is back to square one as the new season approaches, but the Rovers will be keen to start well.

Vater knows what he needs from his group as Renmark seek to climb the mountain with the star-studded list, with its healthy inclusions yet again.

"You're always looking to adjust and update and get better, and you're always hoping to get better and get more out of the group," he said.

"No doubt there will be some people coming up from the under 18s pushing



for selection, and some other guys that played A grade might struggle.


"Healthy competition is something that is really important for any club, to keep everyone on their toes and working hard, and that comes down to performances on the training track and game day."

"It's going to be a challenging year to be honest, because we've had a lot of people leave the club for various reasons." he said.

"Some have young families, some have moved for work. and others are travelling so our numbers at training have been improving, but have been down on previous seasons.

"I think the fact that Brown's Well have lost the last two grand finals has definitely had an impact on motivation levels early on, but as we get closer to starting, I can see us starting to get back into it." Running defender Zack Joannou was named Brown's Well's best on grand final day, but he has since departed the club. Brown's Well's ability to defend the ground was one of its best strengths throughout the previous

season, holding much of its opposition to low totals.

"I believe Brown's Well supporters can expect a fast, open, and free-flowing game. We are looking to score, play with freedom and also bring a lot of fun energy into the match." Francis said.

"We really want to turn the ball over in dangerous spots and rebound with a lot of pace.

"Overall, I'm very excited to get back to playing footy, and although we have lost a few players, we'll still have a very competitive team.

"As always, it's not just about footy out here, so we need to make sure we're building culture to help set the club up for sustained success.'

Harrison Chandler and Max Fitzgerald were both impressive in attack for the Bombers throughout last vear, and will need to be at their best again.

Chandler finished as the league's leading goalkicker with 64, while Fitzgerald booted through 22 as the Bombers found paths to goal with ease throughout the campaign, leading to success.

Francis will be hoping to take the group back to the decider once again, but the question will be is if Brown's Well can overcome the prospect of grand final day?

"We'll just be managing expectations week-by-week this year, and the travel is something a lot of teams struggle with, so the message to the boys is how important it is to win all of our home games," he said.

"That's when we'll have our strongest squad, and week-to-week the team will fluctuate a bit, but we're just looking at the top four.


"That's what we're aiming for, and then we can reassess for the finals in terms of who is available from there.

It was a season of building for Wunkar in 2024, but as year two under Mark Wilksch approaches, optimism is high at the Bulldogs.

"A lot of the guys are making a lot of noticeable improvements from the extra session, largely around the skills.

"It's easy to question your fitness when you're not playing well and losing, but it's rarely questioned when you're playing well and winning.

"An extra hour a week of ball handling is really paying dividends, and it all adds up when you throw a little bit here and there."

Although Wunkar's medical room is full, with three players on the longterm injury list, Wilksch is looking to work with what the Bulldogs have at their disposal.

Expecting a close competition in season 2025, Wilksch is fully aware of the difficult competition he faces.

Admitting that the Bulldogs rode their luck at times last season, the Wunkar boss said his group will understand the importance of hard work this year.

"We fully understand that we're going to have to win more games to make finals, and you just don't know what the other clubs are doing," he said.

"The draw can skew that a bit, and

our two extra games last year were against the eventual grand final teams, and you're not to know that at the start of the year.

"While we had a win over Murrayville, admittedly in some of the other wins we were a fair way off where we needed to be.

"We can't concern ourselves with that, we just need to keep getting better ourselves, but we'll be a better football team this year than last.

"The game plan now is starting to come together this year, and everyone is starting to get a better understanding of how we want to play the game.

"We want to get to a place of being a perennial finals team, and it's a slow burn, but it's a solid one to make sure we're there every year and being really consistent."



Dillon ensures no swansong at Paringa

The Swans endured a difficult 2024 Murray Valley Football League season, finishing bottom with a 3-10 win/loss record and a miserable percentage of 29.77.

The club has its off-field challenges too, but it also has fresh hope, following the appointment of former coach Nick Dillon as senior coach for 2025.

Dillon has an outstanding track record with the Swans, playing in two senior flags (2005 and 2009), then coaching the club to a memorable 2013 grand final win over BSR during the first year of a successful fourseason stint at the helm.

After scaling the heights with the Swans, Dillon said his heartstrings lured him back to the club.

"The club was in survival mode and I couldn't sit back and watch it fold," he said.

"The club has been there for me through my toughest times and also provided me with some of my greatest memories and friendships.

"So it was a no-brainer to step up and do my bit to ensure the Swans survive."

Dillon, who also coached former Independent club Cobdogla, along with junior teams at Paringa and Renmark, has a habit of lifting clubs and teams languishing in the doldrums. He achieves it via hard work and good old-fashioned recruiting, despite the 'approved player points system' making the days of mass off-season player hauls more difficult.

However, working within these restrictions, Dillon and his recruiting team have already landed a lengthy list of either recruits or returning past players.

"Guys like Dean Hill, Jamie Gudgeon and Shane Menz have returned to the club, which has been fantastic for our younger guys – they are setting the tone," he said.

"Then we've picked up some great players too. Benny Carpenter is a fantastic addition to our back six.

"Kyle Hewitt (Wunkar) is as fit as I've seen him and training the house down, and Sam Di Cicco is a guy who comes from a soccer background and I can see him being a really important player for us.

"But I'm also really excited about the improvement from the existing group of players. Fraser Peters, Lachie Daniel and Brock Morey are looking much fitter and dedicated and that has been contagious throughout the group.

"Then there are guys like Mac Lane and Jacob Edwards who have been on the fringe of the side who are pushing really hard to earn a spot in our best 22."

While boosting player stocks is important, Dillon is acutely aware that small country footy clubs need other ingredients to survive and thrive.

"We've had a lot of players join the club for the first time and a lot of players returning as well," he said. "The committee is doing a good job with attracting new sponsors and things seem to be turning around, but it's only early days and we have a lot of work to do.

"Probably the biggest challenge we currently face is financial. We'd love to see more supporters and former players come watch our games this year which would help our bottom line in a massive way.

"The other one is our netball team. We'd love to see more players come out and give it a go as it's been a tough slog over the past few seasons."

Despite the ugly win-loss record last season, Paringa showed glimpses of what it could be, including a win over eventual premier Murrayville. Expect a muchimproved showing in 2025 and beyond.

"The club has been supportive and allowed me to coach my way and put things in place to help us succeed in the long run," Dillon said.

"We've set our goals for the year and the boys want to win a premiership.

"We may not achieve that this season, but we'll put



things in place to give them the best chance possible to do so.

"We've got goals like improving our percentage, winning more away games (and) beating some bogey teams that will hopefully give us some little wins along the way.

"But we're also realistic that the MVFNL is a tough competition now and we're coming from a long way back."
