Festival Fair back and better than ever

THE 2022 Riverland Rose and Garden Festival Fair is set to be the biggest and brightest ever,

The fair will kick off the festival in style on Saturday, October 15, from 9am to 2.30pm, at the Jarrett Memorial Gardens, Renmark.

"The market is fully subscribed, with more than 40 stall vendors registered to occupy some 84 sites, which is a record," said festival committee spokesperson Richard Fewster.

"The significant boost in numbers has been brought about by 10 Victorian exhibitors who were unable to attend for the past two years due to Covid border restrictions."

The market will include the normal wide variety of stalls, including: handcrafts, homemade cakes and biscuits, greeting cards and gifts, clothing including tie dye, soaps and hand creams, pickles, jams, condiments, garden art and accessories, books and poetry,

face painting, jewellery, plants, toys, candles, and much more.

This year's festival will be officially opened by the president of the World Federation of Rose Societies, Henrianne de Briey, who will disembark from the historic PS Industry upon arrival to the Jarret Memorial Gardens.


The popular Riverland Kennel Club dog obedience display will return for a third year, with the event, run by Sue Laidler, expected to be a hit once again.

Successful festival surveys back for 2022

FOLLOWING the success of event surveys accessed by unique QR codes, run for the first time during last year's Riverland Rose and Garden Festival, the initiative is back for a second year.

The survey process was created to accurately report visitor numbers and statistics at certain events throughout the region using a QR monitoring system, developed by the festival committee together with PIRSA regional co-ordinator, Barbara Cowey.

The survey was conducted at more than 35 open gardens and festival attractions, with unique QR codes set up at the exit points of festival attractions and open gardens for visitors to leave feedback.

Over 1100 visitor responses were recorded using the new online tool, compared to just 74 in 2020 using a manual system.

Festival spokesperson Richard Fewster said the results of the survey indicated "very strong support" for the event.

"Most of the visitor feedback we had was amazing," Mr Fewster said.

"People loved last year's festival and many indicated their intention to return this year, and bring some more people with them.

"Without the Cowey Survey Tool it would be almost impossible to collect the data without having a team of 20-plus people to gather the



information from each venue.

"The QR reader allowed visitors to log onto a site and answer 12 simple questions in under a minute, including where they had come from, their experience during their visit, how they had heard about the festival and any other comments they wished to share.

"From that point of view, it was completely unobtrusive and in fact drew favourable comments from several people who used it. "From a data collection point of view and with its internal analytical capability it can provide an almost limitless series of reports and responses."

The success of the QR reader and the sentiments it reflected from visitors to the event was a double-win for the festival committee.

"The results showed that just under 14 per cent of those who attended the festival had come from outside of the region," Mr Fewster said.

"So, the system has been a success, giving us all this extra information, and the responses we received showed that people are loving the festival.

"It really gives us extra encouragement heading into this year's festival."

With the collection of this data, the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival committee has obtained funding for the event.



Roses are forever for Cucina's gala dinner

DELICIOUS food, wine, music and more will be on show at the first Riverland Rose and Garden Festival gala dinner held outside of the Renmark district.

Cucina 837 at Salena Estate in Bookpurnong will host this year's gala dinner on Friday, October 21, with the theme 'roses are forever'.

Marketing manager Salena Muirden said staff were "really excited" to host the dinner, with plenty planned to "make the night one to remember".

"We've got a three-course dinner planned, with alternate drop for each of the courses," she said.

"For the \$100 ticket, attendees will get the dinner and a glass of bubbles

on arrival as well.

"We've got The Bowerbirds, who will be playing music for the evening, and we've got a few little activities to get people up and involved which lean into the theme of the festival.

"Guests will be able to purchase their own drinks as they go."

Mrs Muirden said it was "fantastic" the festival had expanded to include the entire Riverland.

"We've been advocates of what the Rose Festival does for the Riverland and the tourism element it provides as well," she said.

"We know people come from all over the state and interstate to see what we do here with these beautiful flowers.

"We've slowly, over the last couple of years, been getting more and more involved.

"We saw that the next progression

that we could take was to host the gala dinner."

Mrs Muirden said the event was

a major tourism draw for the whole region, and its reputation was still growing.

"It does a lot for the area, and I think it will be even bigger now it has expanded into being a regional event," she said.

"People from across the Riverland want to get involved more now and there are beautiful gardens in other towns now that are being highlighted...

"The Riverland is beautiful

everywhere, and it's important when events like this get promoted – especially outside of the region – that we do promote the Riverland as a

"That's how people look at us – we're a Riverland region, not just one town or the other.

"Because of that, we are absolutely ecstatic to be the first business outside Renmark to be chosen to host the gala dinner."

Tickets are \$100 and are available online or over the phone.

"If people are interested in coming, tickets are available on Eventbrite and are available on our Facebook page," Mrs Muirden said.

"People can also call us up and book over the phone."





Waikerie flower show a 40-year institution

THIS year will mark the 40th Waikerie and Districts Community Flower Show.

The show is believed to be one of the oldest of its kind in SA and this October's event will be based on the theme 'bright and beautiful'.

Waikerie and Districts Community Flower Show committee president and secretary Glennis Crawford said the event began in 1980 as a fundraiser for Waikerie's St James Anglican Church.

She said the show was run by the town's Anglican Ladies Guild for 30 years, until members felt they could no longer continue.

Mrs Crawford said the event was so popular in Waikerie that a public meeting was held to identify how to keep it going – with a community committee subsequently elected to do

The Waikerie and Districts Community Flower Show committee became a sub-committee of the Waikerie and Districts Garden Club for legal purposes.

Mrs Crawford believes the event has only been cancelled twice since it started: firstly when it became too difficult for the Anglican Ladies Guild to organise, then again in 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The show is traditionally held during the third week of October and usually coincides with the Renmark Rose Festival, which was renamed the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival last

Last year the Waikerie event became part of the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival for the first time.

Mrs Crawford said service clubs, schools, church groups, volunteers, local businesses and Loxton Waikerie council all provided "wonderful support" to the

She said gardening enthusiasts across the Waikerie district can enter a wide range of categories in the show.

"We all like to think that we can grow some perfect-looking flowers, particularly roses," she said.

"But nothing needs to be perfect."

The categories include cut flowers, roses, Australian native plants, pot plants (including orchids), floral art, children's exhibits and floral photography.

Mrs Crawford said this year no fresh fruit or vegetables would be included in displays or section categories due to the discovery of fruit fly in the region.

"Fruit growing is such an important part of our community," she said.

"We need to ensure we eradicate this pest in our district."

Mrs Crawford said she hoped fresh fruit and vegetables could feature again in the future.

Entrants need to bring in their exhibits to the Waikerie Memorial Institute on Thursday, October 20. between 2pm and 7pm.

The show opens to the public on Friday, October 21, from 10am to 5pm, and will feature a free floral art demonstration at 2pm.

It is also open on Saturday, October 22, from 10am to 2pm, with free children's floral art workshops from

Bookings are required for the workshops.

Never too young to be a gardener

STUDENTS at Renmark North School (RNS) are proving you are never too young to start learning how to care for gardens and the environment.

The Young Environmental Leaders (YEL) program has been running at RNS for about five years, through Cindy Kakoschke from the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board, which runs the program for schools across the region.

Susy Vaughan joined the school community three years ago, and is the teacher in charge of the RNS YEL group, made up of students in years 5 and 6.

"I've got a degree in environmental management so when I came on board they asked me if I wanted to do it," she said.

Susy said the group tries to meet once a week, with a variety of projects around the school already in place and more exciting things in the pipeline.

"Last year we applied for a Woolworths Junior Landcare Grant and we were awarded that," she said.

"Our topic was Save the Bees and the idea was that we would plant a few more fruit trees.

"Our fence at the front of the school was re-done, so they pulled out our garden at the front. We did a new garden with the students – we went and bought the plants and they sorted out where to plant them – and

"We've done a bit of work down at the Irrigation Trust with Cindy, on things like vegetation mapping and water quality," Susy said.

Students undertake theory work and extensive research to make sure the correct plants are purchased for the projects.

bees needed and what sort of plants we needed to get for them," Susy said.

"They needed to work out what fruit trees to plant this year. Apple trees need a pollinator, so we got two apple trees to make sure they pollinate off each other."

The YEL group is not a curriculum subject, but an extra lesson for interested students, and this year the interest was so great a questionnaire was given to students to detail why they wanted to be part of the

Students in YEL have undertaken more gardening and environmental care outside of school because of the lessons, according to Susy.

"Some of them come in saying, 'Susy I did this on the weekend, I spoke to Mum and Dad about putting these plants in," Susy said.

"Some of them like to do gardening anyway, and a lot of them took their families out of school hours to the floodplain to show them what the watering site was.

"They're proud of what they do at school and like to show what they have done."

TIM FIELD RIVERLAND NATIVE PLANTS NURSERY OPERATIONS MANAGER

MANY people love their roses, but have you ever seen our native Sturt's desert rose? How about our local native rosemary, mint, peach or jasmine?

The Riverland is home to more than 1200 native species that can be found across our Mallee and floodplain habitats, including many that are hard to find.

A South Australian success story

WHEN Kelvin Trimper began investigating different rose fertilisers in the 1990s, he never expected to help create one of the most successful rose fertilisers in Australia.

The Renmark-born rosarian and former president of the World Federation of Rose Societies noticed more experienced rosarians were getting better results with their roses, prompting him to start investigating what they were doing differently.

"I started to poke around and ask a few questions, as one does when you've got a bee in your bonnet," he said.

"I recognised that they were all basically making up their own fertiliser brews, using a standard off-the-shelf fertiliser as their base, but then they were adding extra ingredients to it.

"The ingredients varied from person to person, but one common ingredient they were all adding was extra potassium."

The potassium-boosted roses were higher quality, flowering more frequently and had stronger stems.

"What I was interested in initially was the fact that they were getting increased flowering and betterquality flowers," Mr Trimper said.

"So, I thought, 'Okay, I need to



find a fertiliser company that will make me a rose fertiliser."

After shopping around for almost four years to find the perfect company, Mr Trimper eventually was introduced to Neutrog Australia Pty Ltd, an Adelaide Hills-based business, selling fertilisers mainly to farmers and commercial growers.

"I was on the board of the Botanic Gardens at the time, which led me to meet Angus Irwin, who is one of the founders of Neutrog," he said.

"I said to him 'This is what I would like to do', and he agreed.

"We made a formula that was 8 per cent nitrogen, 4 per cent phosphorus and 12 per cent potassium.

"We made three tonnes; one tonne went to amateur rose growers like me, another tonne went to commercial growers and another went to the botanic gardens.

"Everybody had success. We were just blown away with the results."

Neutrog officially launched the formula in 2001, and it is now recommended and endorsed by several rose societies around Australia.

Sudden Impact for Roses fertiliser is a South Australian success story, and the product has raised around \$1 million in royalties for rose societies around Australia.

"That money has been used by those societies to promote the rose and provide information to the community," Mr Trimper said.

"Various rose societies are also involved with supporting community gardens, and community garden

"Really it's about ensuring we make sure roses still feature in our gardens and ensure that we produce good, quality information that we pass on to members of the public."

Essentials for rose growing success...

SPRING ROSE GROWING CULTURE NOTES FOR SOUTH AUSTRALIA

SPRING heralds the start of the growth and flowering period for roses.

Waking from their winter slumber, rapid growth occurs in September and the first flush of flowers can be expected in mid to late October in warmer areas, including Adelaide, and in early to mid-November in cooler areas of the state. The average daily temperatures rise from 16.8°C in September, to 19.9°C in October and further increase to 23.1°C in November. Average monthly rainfall decreases from 57mm in September, to 37mm in October and to 33mm in November. Increases in temperature and the reduction in rainfall may require the application of supplementary irrigation later in the spring. If damp conditions occur when roses are in their rapid growth period, they can be susceptible to fungal outbreaks which can severely impact their growth and performance. This is a critical period for rose care and attention.

- 1. Watering Generally, watering will not be required until October. The exceptions are newly planted and potted roses which may require regular watering commencing September. These should not be allowed to "dry out". Irrigation systems should be checked in early September to ensure they are working effectively. Leaks and other problems should be fixed prior to hot weather to avoid costly delays when the first dry spell arrives. Young, newly planted roses will benefit from alternate, fortnightly applications of liquid Seamungus and GoGo Juice as part of their watering regime.
- 2. Mulch If mulch was not applied immediately after pruning, it is essential that it be laid down early in spring. Neutrog's Whoflungdung is an excellent mulch recommended by the Rose Society. It's a certified organic mulch which is biologically activated, nutrient rich and weed free. It comes in 20kg compressed bales and can be easily spread. Spread a layer about 5cm in depth and water in to reduce odour and to settle it down. Mulch performs four key tasks:
 - Significantly reduces evaporation (saving up to 40 to 50 per cent of the irrigation otherwise required).
 - Cools the surface and maintains moisture levels around surface roots (in the top 10cm of the soil).



- Breaks down to feed the root zone of roses and enriches the good microbial activity in the soil.
- Reduces weed problems which often germinate with the onset of warmer weather.
- 3. Flowering Spring is often regarded as the best flowering period for roses. Providing the rose bush is healthy and actively growing, strong stems will yield many beautiful blooms either singly or in clusters depending on the type of rose. To encourage repeat flowering, removal of old blooms is recommended. If blooms are one per stem, the old bloom, and a portion of stem down to second five-leaflet leaf is recommended to be removed to ensure the regrowth produces another flower. In a cluster of blooms, remove the old middle bloom to enable the surrounding buds to open. Once these have finished, the cluster should be removed with the stem down to the second five-leaflet leaf.
- **4. Fertilising** It's time to feed your roses! It is recommended that Neutrog's Sudden Impact for Roses be applied when the young shoots are around 2cm in length. Application prior to forecast rain is helpful, as this will take the fertiliser with it to the root zone as it soaks in. Otherwise, water the pellets in after application. Sudden Impact for Roses in its pelletised form will break down over the next two to three months and, slowly but continuously, feed the plants. It is important to note that the higher potassium and other trace elements in Sudden Impact for Roses is designed to strengthen the cell wall structure of rose leaves and result in increased resistance to fungal diseases. They also improve the quantity and quality of flowering. If plants are not performing well, supplementary applications of

Seamungus and GoGo Juice should boost the plant back into strong growth.

- **5. Pests and diseases** The emergence of new growth in spring heralds the return of pests and diseases which can frustrate those wanting clean, healthy bushes. Fortunately, there are now many natural remedies for pests. These include the presence of predatory wasps to control aphids and bacterial laden sprays such as Success or Dipel to control both bad insects and grubs. Occasionally, initial outbreaks of aphids can be severe and these should be washed off or sprayed with a natural product, such as Nature's Way Natrasoap Pest Spray until their peak infestations are reduced and the predatory wasp can get them under control. Pest oils can also be used to control insects and will assist in fungal treatment. Fungal issues often infect roses in early spring and, if left untreated, can severely impede the performance of a rose plant. Prevention is better than a cure and applications of preventative fungal sprays a fortnight apart in early spring will certainly stop major outbreaks of mildew and black spot. Natural oil sprays, such as Eco Oil, and milk spray (one-part full cream milk to 10 parts water) are great "gentle on the environment", preventative sprays. Mancozeb or triforine sprays offer chemical treatments which have proven very effective. If a major outbreak occurs, regular fungal spray treatments will be necessary to get these diseases under control.
- 6. Newly planted roses It is important to regularly inspect the performance of newly planted roses. The roots of young plants are still being established. They are prone to drying out and may need supplementary watering to help them develop in their first year. If initial growth is not strong and vigorous, regular applications of liquid Seamungus and GoGo Juice will assist the plant to establish a regular growth pattern.
- 7. Other tips for spring There are regular rose shows which feature roses in the spring. These provide a great opportunity to view roses on display including some of the recently released varieties. It's also an opportunity to have unknown roses identified and to ask the experts rose-growing questions. Rose enthusiasts will receive abundant information and enjoyment from joining the rose society and sharing experiences with other rose lovers. Rose Petal Jam recipes



Rose petal jam (marmellata di rose)

Recipe from Cinnamon & Salt - Emiko Davies Prep time: 15 min Cook time: 35 min Skill level: mid

200g freshly picked rose petals Juice of 1 lemon 600g (2 3/4 cups) sugar

Note: The success of making a rose petal jam depends on the roses themselves, which should be small, deep pinkish-red roses with thin petals, perfumed and freshly picked - not at all wilted or old. It is also important to choose rose petals that you know have not been sprayed, for example from someone's garden. Do not use commercial roses for this. For this recipe you will need about two large mixing bowls full of petals.



Gently rinse the rose petals and lay them on a tea towel (dish towel). Use another tea towel to carefully dab them to remove some of the excess moisture. Place them in a large mixing bowl with the lemon juice and about 200 g (7 oz; approximately 1 cup) of the sugar. Rub and carefully 'massage' the petals with the sugar and juice until they are no longer velvety but limp (still whole, however) and the mixture begins to look like a pulp. Set aside.

Place the rest of the sugar in a saucepan with 625 ml (21 fl oz/2½ cups) water. Bring to a simmer over a medium heat and cook until the sugar is dissolved. Add the massaged rose petals and continue simmering until the syrup thickens slightly and the petals no longer float, stirring occasionally. This takes about 30 minutes.

- Note that this jam is not the same consistency as a traditional jam, but rather it is a perfumed syrup with softened, delicate petals in it. A saucer test will help you quickly see if the jam is ready: place a saucer in the freezer before you start and when you want to test the jam, add a small blob of it to the cold saucer. As it cools down, quickly look at how the syrup behaves when you turn the plate to let it run (it should run slower than water, as it will be slightly thickened). Be careful not to overcook the syrup as it will harden.
- 4. Transfer the hot jam to sterilised glass jars, fill to the top, seal tightly and leave to cool. If instead you are filling the jars with cooled jam, once sealed, place them in a saucepan filled with water right up to the neck of the jar and boil for 5 minutes to help seal the jar completely, then let cool. Store in a cool, dry place until opened and then store in the fridge, where it should be consumed within a few weeks. I particularly love this rose petal jam drizzled over thick yoghurt or ricotta.



Apple and rose jelly

Recipe from Homemade Jams & **Preserves - Family Circle**

Prep time: 20 min + overnight draining

Total cooking time: 1 hour Makes: 1 cup (250ml)

1.5kg apples 2 unsprayed roses 300g caster sugar

2 teaspoons rose water

Chop the apples and put them in a pan with 1 litre water. Cook over low heat for 45 minutes, or until the apples have broken down into a

2. Place a jelly bag in a bowl, cover with boiling water, drain and suspend the bag over a large heatproof bowl.

- Ladle the puree into the bag. Do not push the fruit through the bag or the jelly will become cloudy. Cover the top of the bag loosely with a clean tea towel, without touching the fruit mixture. Allow the mixture to drip through the bag overnight, or until there is no liquid dripping through the cloth.
- 4. Put two small plates in the freezer. Pull the petals off the roses and wash them gently in cold water. Discard the pulp and measure the liquid. Pour the liquid into a large pan and add $1 \frac{1}{4}$ cups (310 g) sugar for every 2 ½ cups (600 ml) liquid. Stir over low heat until all the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil and boil, stirring often, for 5-10 minutes. Remove any scum during cooking with a skimmer or slotted spoon. Start testing for setting point.
- 5. Remove from the heat, place a little jelly onto one of the cold plates and place in the freezer for 30 seconds. A skin will form on the surface and the jelly will wrinkle when pushed with your finger when setting point is reached. Remove any scum from the surface. Stir in the rose petals and rose water, then leave to cool slightly until the jelly is beginning to set (this will ensure that the rose petals are suspended in the jelly).
- 6. Pour the jelly down the sides of clean, warm jars and seal. Turn upside down for 10 minutes, then slowly invert to disperse the petals. Label and date. Store in a cool, dark place for up to 6-12 months. Refrigerate after opening for up to 6 weeks.

Note: The amount of jelly will vary slightly according to how juicy the apples are and which types of apples are in season.





Rose jelly

Recipe from Jams, Jellies & Preserves - Grandma's Special Recipes

Prep and cook time: 15 min

Standing: 20 min Difficulty: easy

Makes: 750g jelly

2

110g rose petals, see note

1 cup (250ml) boiling water

500g caster sugar 1 lemon, juice

34 cup (190ml) liquid pectin

Few drops rose water

Put the rose petals into a bowl and pour over the boiling water to cover. Cover and leave to stand for 20 minutes.

2. Strain the liquid through a sieve into a measuring jug. Make up to 250ml if necessary with boiling water.

Pour into a pan and stir in the sugar and lemon juice until the sugar

Remove from the heat and stir in the pectin. Bring to a boil and boil rapidly for 1 minute. Stir in the rose water.

Pour into hot sterilised jars. Cover, seal and label.

Grandma's note: Use heavily scented red or pink petals that are free from chemicals and pesticides – roses bought from a florist aren't suitable. Remove the heel - the white part at the base (this has a bitter flavour) – and wash the flowers gently before use.


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COINCIDING with the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival this year is the 19th World Federation of Rose Societies World Rose Convention.

The convention will be held at the world-class Adelaide Convention Centre from October 27 to November 3.

Convention chairman Kelvin Trimper AM was born and raised in Renmark and has contributed to the rose festival on many occasions.

Mr Timper confirmed the convention would proceed as both face-to-face and online, offering options for rose lovers locally and around the world.

The World Federation of Rose Societies (WFRS) was founded in 1968 in England by representatives from the rose societies of Australia, Belgium, Israel, New Zealand, Romania, South Africa, Great Britain and the United States of America.

Its initial purpose was to hold international rose conferences and act as a clearing house for rose research.

Henrianne de Briey, president of the WFRS, will visit the Riverland at the start of the festival.

She will attend the opening night dinner at Mallee Estate on Friday, October 14 as the special guest of honour, and officially open the 10-day event at the Festival Fair on Saturday, October 15.

As daughter of the founding president Lily de Gerlache, Ms de Briey – who was elected president in 2018 – often says she was "born in a bed of roses" and followed her mother in almost all of rose exhibitions organised by the Belgian Royal National Rose Society.

"Roses became a passion for me from my grandfather and then my mother," Ms de Briey said.

"I am looking forward to South Australia, to see its roses and discover the natural environment which has so much to offer in this regard. "In 2019 I was able to stay in Adelaide and visited Melbourne before flying to Kangaroo Island. It was a great moment for me to see the island and its beauty.

"I will never forget that trip – it was just before the terrible bushfires.

"While in the Riverland I am very much looking forward to visiting Calperum and Banrock Stations. If possible, a cruise on the most famous River Murray would be great if the planning with the 19th WFRS Rose Convention make it possible."

Plum and rose petal jam

INGREDIENTS

Recipe from taste.com.au Cook time: approx. 45 mins

2kg just-ripe plums, stoned and quartered

Juice of 2 lemons

1 cup water

1.5kg caster sugar (or jam sugar)

½ cup rose petals, washed and loosely-packed

2 tsp rose water

METHOD

- 1. In a saucepan over high heat, bring plums, lemon juice and water to the boil. Cook, stirring, for 20 minutes or until plums are softened.
- Add sugar. Cook, stirring until dissolved. Add rose petals. Increase heat to high. Cook, stirring, for 15-20 minutes.
- On a cold plate (place in the freezer during cooking process) put 1 teaspoon of jam liquid. Stand for 1 minute. Run finger through – if it wrinkles, remove jam from heat. Stir in rose water.
- 4. Pour jam into sterilised jars. Seal immediately. Cool.




Michael is passionate about gardening. He has written for dozens of magazines and delivered hundreds of talks, workshops, training programs and lectures.
