

Riverland councils left high and dry as federal funding falls short... WHAT ABOUT US?

A RIVERLAND council says South Australian local governments are being left in the dark as the Federal Government continues to underfund critical local infrastructure and services.

The continued funding overlook comes at a time when costof-living pressures and the rising cost of providing services are hitting regional communities harder than ever.

Despite repeated pleas for support, Financial Assistance Grants remain stagnant at just half a per cent of national tax revenue – far below the 1 per cent councils were receiving 30 years ago.

This persistent shortfall is placing mounting pressure on local governments, which are now grappling with inflation, rising service delivery and building costs, and growing expectations from residents.

Renmark Paringa Council is a clear example of this growing crisis, now facing a deficit budget as inadequate federal funding pushes an increasing financial burden onto local ratepayers.

The 2022/23 flood has also been a significant factor in rising financial pressures, with Renmark Paringa Council still undertaking flood recovery projects.

While council received sup-

port via disaster relief funding following the 2022/23 flood, it fell "well short" of what was needed to fully support recovery efforts.

"The financial impact of the flood is still being felt by Renmark Paringa Council, and while it was substantial help to receive assistance for our recovery projects it has still meant significant costs have fallen to council and our ratepayers,' Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said.

"SA councils have continuously missed out on the appropriate level of funding to be able to run our day-to-day operations and provide services to our community.

"We are asking to receive an increased percentage of the national tax revenue to be able to continue delivering what our community needs and deserves."

On top of flood recovery costs, Renmark Paringa Council is being hit with rapidly rising expenses, including construction materials, contractor fees, insur-

Mr Hunter said these increasing costs were being felt across

thing we do, whether it's fixing roads, managing waste, or maintaining community facilities.

"But unlike households, local government has to contend with the cost shifting of services from other levels of government, with no extra funding to support them.

"We've been advocating for a fairer share, but until that happens, our ratepayers are the ones who unfortunately end up footing the bill."

The Australian Local Government Association has lobbied for increased support on behalf of the 537 local governments Australia wide, outlining where the funding is most needed.

These areas include \$1.1bn per year for enabling infrastructure to unlock housing supply, \$500m per year for community infrastructure, \$600m per year for safer local roads, \$900m per year for increased local government emergency management capability and capacity, and \$400m per year for climate adaptation.

It is understood historic depreciation issues accounted for \$3m of the deficit figure, contained within the draft of the annual report.

Asset Management Plans must be reviewed every four years and asset revaluations must be every three to five years. At Berri Barmera Council, some Asset Management Plans and asset revaluations were last updated nine years ago, without inflation being applied in the meantime.

The second major factor was the timing of the payment of the Federal Government's Financial Assistance Grants, which are currently \$2.9m per annum. Across Australia, these grants have been predominantly pre-

paid to councils for many years, however in 2023/24 it reverted to being paid in the correct year, leading to the artificial inflation of the deficit.

An additional \$1.7m of the deficit related to a range of overspends, with the largest portion attributed to ongoing flood recovery operations.

Berri Barmera Mayor Ella Winnall said elected members and the community were frustrated with the legacy issues.

"Elected members have been asking questions and raising issues for many years now and we are glad the new leadership within current administration is taking transparency and accountability seriously in providing answers to longstanding questions, she said.

"A deep review of council's services, assets, expenses and income is long overdue and I think the community expect that to be done as part of council's regular business.

"We need to look at our own operations and accounting practices first instead of always leaning on the ratepayer to address the issues."

Mayor Winnall said she has full confidence in council's administration to work through the financial issues.

"The council and the administration are absolutely committed to improving council's position so we can deliver strong outcomes for the community in the most efficient and effective way," she said.

"We'll be working incredibly hard over coming months and years to get the financial future of the council where it needs to be."

A broader regional issue for local government RENMARK Paringa Council is collectively manage \$28bn in getting shortchanged - councils

accompanied in its struggles. Neighbouring councils are

also feeling the pinch, with Mid Murray Council also strongly advocating for more federal support.

Without an urgent increase in federal support, Renmark Paringa and other Riverland councils face the tough choice of either increasing rates, or cutting back on essential services.

The South Australian Local Government Association has also called on the Federal Government to provide appropriate funding for local governments.

LGA president, and Mitcham Mayor, Heather Holmes-Ross said South Australian councils





RIVERLAND irrigators who have submitted tenders for water buybacks continue to be "left in the dark" as they wait for Federal Government confirmation of their success.

A statement provided last week to The Murray Pioneer by the Federal Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water, regarding the status of the Selected Southern Basin Catchments Open Tender, said "purchasing from this tender began in December 2024, and evaluation of tenders is continuing into 2025. Tenderers should monitor their emails for communication about their tenders. Once the evaluation process is complete, the department will inform all tenderers of the outcome".

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said a lack of consultation with local water users had harmed the tender process.

"Water buybacks could have a big impact on regional communities like ours," Mr Whetstone said.

"Less water for farming means a hit to our local economy, and I don't think those consequences have been properly thought through.

"Communities like ours should have a real say in water management decisions and there should have been more consultation to make sure local voices were heard.

"With the government entering caretaker mode, we are left in the dark with

little transparency or clear communication about what happens next."

A status update regarding the remaining Southern Basin Catchments tender said "evaluation of responses together with other information is underway. This will be used to inform the design of the next stage for this process, which is expected to occur in mid-2025".

Mr Whetstone said ensuring productive water remained in the local economy would have more benefits for the Riverland.

"If licence holders are considering selling water, please think about selling water to your neighbour or keeping it in the local economy," he said. "The hidden charges

and fees create a black hole that makes a sale to the Commonwealth Government much less appealing.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said direct support, rather than buyback programs, should be provided for Riverland irrigators and growers experiencing industry challenges.

"As much as I dislike water buybacks for the impact they have on regional irrigation communities, no one would blame a wine grape grower in the Riverland for participating in this EOI process," Mr Pasin said.

"The fact that a struggling wine grape grower may have to wait 12 months for an answer to their offer to sell, and that this water may be wildly undervalued

by that time is unconscionable.

"The Labor Government has failed to acknowledge the challenges wine grape growers are facing, they have failed to offer financial support during time of crisis and now they failed to support small operators who wish to participate in their buyback scheme.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for primary industries, Nicola Centofanti said the "buyback obsession is short-sighted, damaging, and ignores the very real human cost for irrigators, families and small businesses".

"This confirms what our river communities have feared all along — the Labor Government is forging ahead with water buybacks, while leaving locals in the dark,"

"Multiple procurement processes are underway, but there's still no clarity on where the water will come from, how much will be bought back, or what impact it will have on growers and regional jobs. This is creating an unacceptable cloud of uncertainty over our Riverland communities.

"With the Federal Government now entering caretaker mode, South Australians are left in limbo, waiting for decisions that could reshape the economic future of their towns - and they've had no say in the process.

"This is just the latest chapter in Labor's mishandling of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.'

Qfly pressure set to increase on Riverland?

THE possible end to fruit fly management processes in Victoria is expected to result in an increase in pressure from the pest on the Riverland's horticulture sector.

Funding for Victorian Queensland fruit fly (Qfly) management programs in Sunraysia is set to conclude in June.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said crossborder co-operation was needed to ensure Qfly populations are unable to migrate into South Australia.

'The increasing pressure from (Qfly) on our borders is a concern for the horticultural industry in the Riverland and South Australia," Mr Whetstone said.

"The decision by the Victorian Government to withdraw funding for important fruit fly management programs poses a significant risk for our growers here. We do not want our industry and efforts undermined by decisions made across the border.

"Both state Labor governments must come to the table and work together to protect our borders and an industry worth many billions of dollars to the national economy.

"We also need our eastern neighbours and Victorian associations to put pressure on their government to step up and take responsibility before the damage becomes irreversible.'

A State Government spokesperson said "in addition to the ongoing trapping, baiting and SIT releases within the Riverland, our border controls and zero-tolerance policy for some fruit and vegetables being brought into the state will continue to play a vital part in protecting our state from fruit fly entering".

"It is expected that there will be increases

in fruit fly pressure to the state, including the Riverland, due to less control measures being undertaken interstate," the spokesperson said.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for primary industries, Nicola Centofanti said "Victoria's reckless decision to cut fruit fly funding is not just a local issue - it's a direct threat to South Australian growers, jobs, and our pest-free status.

"If Victoria lets this pest explode, we'll be left to pay the price," Dr Centofanti said.

"Our growers already shoulder significant costs protecting their crops from Qfly - now they could be fighting a losing battle thanks to decisions being made over the border.

"It's unacceptable that the Victorian Government is walking away from proven, award-winning fruit fly management programs. This isn't just bad for Victoria it's a biosecurity breach in slow motion for South Australia.

"The State Government must urgently raise this with its Victorian counterparts and push for a co-ordinated, inter-state approach. If Victoria fails to act, then South Australia must demand federal intervention to prevent this looming threat."

"We cannot afford to sit on our hands while fruit fly pressure builds just across the border."

Riverland earns its medical degree

THE Flinders Rural and Remote Health SA Renmark campus on Monday celebrated the launch of its new South Australia Rural Medical (SARM) program, with 30 aspirating local doctors now able to complete their medical degree in the Riverland.

Hoping to address the health workforce gap in rural and remote areas, the SARM program is a postgraduate degree of a Doctor of Medicine that keep students in rural and remote areas for the entire four-years of study.

With students now able to complete the first two years in Renmark before undertaking clinical training across Flinders' extensive rural network, including in medical practices in Barmera, Berri, Loxton, Renmark and Waikerie, Flinders University vice-chancellor, Professor Colin Stirling, said the SARM program is a "game-changer for rural health."

"For the first time, medical students can complete their entire degree in regional South Australia – embedding them in local communities from day one," Mr Stirling said.

"We know that students

who train in the regions are more likely to stay and practice there, and this program will help to build a sustainable rural health workforce for South Australia."

Part of a cohort of 60, with another 30 students completing their rural studies in Mount Gambier. Flinders University College of Medicine and Public Health vice president and executive dean, professor Jonathan Craig, said the program was an "opportunity for students to get into medicine who otherwise would not"

"Flinders have taken medicine out of the ivory tower, and put it where it should be, directly into the community," he said. "That notion of equity,

which is that everybody in this country deserves a fair and equal access to education, is something (Flinders University) hold very acutely.'

Relocating to the Riverland from the Adelaide Hills to enrol in the SARM program after working as a podiatrist in the region for several years, first-year student Hilary Harrison said she was "excited to build on (her) background in allied health and leadership to make a meaningful contribution to (the) region.'

"I've loved working in the Riverland Mallee Coorong region, and starting medicine through the SARM program has been a dream come true," she said.

"I chose Flinders and the SARM program because I knew it would prepare me to become the kind of doctor I hope to be — grounded, community-focused, and practical.

"For me, the SARM program just made sense, as it is a natural extension of the path I was already on in rural health.

"It's still early days in the program, but already the learning has been hands-on and energising.

"The support from staff, the connection with other students, and the sense of belonging — it all makes a huge difference.

"I am really grateful to be part of the SARM program — it is learning in a rural setting, surrounded by the communities that have shaped me, and in a way that aligns with both my background and my future as a doctor."

'Confusion' surrounding bypass, says Barker MP

THE Riverland's Federal MP says a "lack of detail and confusion" still remain surrounding the future of the Truro Freight Route.

Funding for the project was included in Federal Labor's allocation of \$525m for a High Productivity Vehicle Network (HPVN), as part of last week's Federal Budget.

However, Barker MP Tony Pasin said the State Government would also need to agree to provide a portion of funding for the Truro Bypass.

"On the surface this sounds like the announcement we have been waiting for ever since the Labor Government cancelled the Truro Bypass, just months before construction was due to begin in 2023," Mr Pasin said. "Unfortunately, it didn't take long for the shine to wear off due to the lack of detail

and confusion about what Labor is actually proposing "What we found through the estimates process was that the funding the Albanese Labor Government has allocated to this project doesn't start to flow until 2026/27, and even then it's only a dribble – less than 2 per cent that year. Two elections will happen before 84 per cent of the money is

spent. "Furthermore, and perhaps most importantly, the Albanese Government's plan was made on an assumption that the State Government will contribute 50 per cent. The State Government have yet to agree to Federal Labor's plan, putting the whole project at risk."

Funding allocated for Truro township bypass

FUNDING for a Truro Township bypass has been included in the 2025-2026 Federal Budget, delivered by Treasurer Jim Chalmers.

The budget was released on Tuesday last week and on Friday, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese called the Federal Election for 3

May. Money for the bypass is included in Federal Labor's allocation of \$525m for a High Productivity Vehicle Network (HPVN).

Federal Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Catherine King said the project will result in increased freight efficiency and improved safety for all road users.

"Our government is committed to working with the Malinauskas Labor Government to get these projects done," she said.

"In this budget, the Albanese Government is investing in infrastructure in South Australia, in the projects that are needed to make our roads safer, our freight networks more resilient and our transport links to better serve communities," Ms King said.

A spokesperson from Ms King's office said stage one of the HPVN project would deliver the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass and include a Truro township bypass.

The spokesperson said the investment would draw heavy vehicle interstate freight away from Adelaide roads and support economic growth in regional

South Australia, as well as improve network resilience.

They said it would also incentivise transport operators to use the back-of-hills route to Adelaide's port and metropolitan area, rather than the South Eastern Freeway.

Stage one of the HPVN in the Federal Budget complements the Commonwealth's existing commitments to SA's key freight routes.

The previous commitments include \$400m through the Nationwide Freight Highway Upgrade program to deliver priority upgrades on SA's nationally significant regional freight routes and \$70m to the Sturt Highway upgrade.

Fit for a king - This grand 1929 model Cadillac limousine was originally used as a taxi. It operated from the Adelaide railway station. From about 1950 to 1958 it was used as a mail delivery car, working from Truro, Blanchetown, and Waikerie, from where it also carried bread and general goods and often was filled with mallee stumps on the return trip. In 1958, Ray Stiller, of Sedan, acquired the car from a Mr Petersen. A car built for the upper-class, the Cadilac was named after Antoine de la Mothe Cadillac, a French soldier who founded the city of Detroit, in 1701. This luxury car has a 341-cubic inch V8 motor and a 3-speed gearbox. It was dilapidated when Ray bought it. Much of the interior was missing, but Ray eventually began restoration, replacing the upholstery and the hood-lining, and doing some mechanical repairs. The car was then repainted by Hage's, of Nuriootpa. When Ray died, in 1980, his wife, Edna, stored the car in a shed, in Tanunda, where it sat for 43 years, until 2023. The car was used in a few weddings and in the Barossa Vintage Festival Parade, transporting the Vintage Festival Queen. Mark and Dianne Johns bought the car from Edna Stiller's estate, and now have the vehicle in Renmark. Even today, being nearly 100 years old, this rare, regal car still runs quite well. Trees died on the lake because of the locks and salinity from irrigation. Old photos show magnificent red gums. Many were still just alive in the 1940s and early 50s.

I was one of the very few who loved it when the lake water level dropped dramatically during the millennium drought and exposed the glorious white sands. It's impossible, but wouldn't it be great if, by magic, the natural rise and fall – before locks – could be replicated.

As for the old Glossop High School, what if an entrepreneur purchased it and made it into a low-cost retirement village. You'd be surprised where people would come from if the unit price was right.

Barmera is still, in my view, a delightful little town, even though Loxton is definitely the jewel in our Riverland crown. Sorry, Renmark – where I was born.

Action needed as tariffs shake trade

GRAINGROWERS is urging the Australian Government to respond to the latest wave of American tariffs with proactive trade diversification measures to counter against global volatility.

Opinions expressed in Letters to the Editor are those of <u>the writers</u>, and not those of the Murray Pioneer.

While the United States is not a major direct market for Australian grain, its role as the world's largest economy means its trade policies influence global market dynamics. Tariffs of 25 per cent have already been placed on goods imported from Canada and Mexico, and 20 per cent on imports from China, with media reports now suggesting tariffs will be put on imported agricultural products from 2 April.

The imposition of tariffs is expected to have significant global ramifications, with predicted retaliatory measures potentially adding further uncertainty to international trade.

With 65 to 75 per cent of Australian grain exported annually, the sector remains heavily exposed to external shocks beyond its control.

Recent experiences have shown how vulnerable we are to shifts in global trade policy. The lesson learnt is that we need to diversify and expand into new markets to enhance the long-term resilience of the grain industry, and safeguard against future disruptions.

Given the volatility of the global trading environment, we are calling for the Federal Government to invest \$100m into initiatives that ensure the sustainable growth and market expansion of Australian exportorientated agricultural businesses, including additional agricultural counsellors and funding for trade diversification grants.

These proactive initiatives play a vital role in mitigating risks and ensuring sustainable growth for Australian grain growers in an increasingly volatile global trade environment.

Protectionist policies threaten to disrupt international trade flows and place additional pressure on Australian grain exports, which are already exposed to the impacts of global market volatility.

Rather than waiting for a market disruption to occur, proactive investment and action by the Australian Government can help mitigate risk and deliver real long-term returns to the industry.

Figures a disastrous trajectory?

SUSTAINABLE Population Australia (SPA) notes that the Australian Bureau of Statistics' population report shows a fall in the population growth rate, from 2.54 per cent to 1.8 per cent per annum over the year to 30 September 2024, but notes it is still well above the OECD average, of 0.52 per cent in 2023.

Additions to Australia's public infrastructure, including schools, hospitals and utility services cannot keep pace when 484,000 people are added to the Australian population annually.

Such rapid pace of population expansion damages the natural environment and creates further hurdles for reduced greenhouse gas emissions.

Assuming an average occupancy of 2.5 people per household, an extra 193,600 dwellings are required to accommodate this population growth, never mind the current tent-city homeless. That's a lot more than the 158,690 new homes commenced in Australia last year.

Net overseas migration, immigration minus emigration, for the period was 379,800, a decrease from 548,800 people in the previous year.

This pace of population growth acts to raise accommodation costs, increases costs of living, damages Australia's environment, and is way beyond the economy's ability to supply the services that our modern society deserves.

We need to lower net immigration to its long-term average

of 70,000pa if Australia is to have any chance of stabilising its population below 30 million. Even though the total fertility rate is 1.5 and has been below 2 for two generations, the natural increase of births minus deaths, while falling slowly, is still over 100,000 annually.

This is largely due to the impact of immigration, which accounted for 78.5 per cent of population growth in the latest statistics.

Rapid population growth has a particularly damaging impact on the environment. The 2024 national environment scorecard, issued recently by Australian National University scientists, states that "new developments to accommodate Australia's rapidly growing population pose a particular threat to local ecosystems and species, especially along the east coast".

In the face of the forthcoming election, SPA calls for candidates and parties to formulate policies that keep numbers in line with the provision of infrastructure, prevent the encroachment on habitats of other species, and support a reduction of greenhouse gas emissions such that our agreed targets are met.

Views on wine industry code

AS a grape grower here in the Riverland, I support the call by Jason Perrin for indicative grape prices to be released by all wineries on 30 September, beginning this year.

I also understand and fully agree that if an expert determination request is lodged, as a result of the indicative prices, that a final decision is given to everyone by 31 October, beginning this year.

We need that.

I agree also with Mr Perrin that this has to be binding on both parties, so we don't have the big problem that we had in 2023 ever happening again.

He also says "if an early price must be binding, it will be a very conservative price...".

This is wrong also. The idea is indicative prices are issued on 30 September. Growers who aren't happy with any of the indicative prices can lodge an expert determination request. This process may or may not result in a higher price.

It is that expert-decided price that then becomes the final price.

An indicative price is not a 'final' price, it is a guide price, or suggested price, as a starting point for negotiation. English is not my first language, but I understand.

Wineries hardly ever issue a good price straight away, so it's nothing to do with an early indicative price coming out earlier than December, January or February, like now.

Any suggestions that an early indicative price may not work because the grapes are only just developing on the vines, and nobody knows what quality and wine making value they may have, is foolish and inexperienced in what has happened in the Riverland over years.

Even when we had colour testing, how many growers got more money from the winery for grapes of high colour?

The only people who benefited from that were the wineries, not growers. We did all the work for no extra reward. Suggesting any connection between indicative prices and baby bunches or good-coloured berries doesn't apply now. And if it did come in later, growers had better get a lot of extra money as a reward per tonne of grapes.

We already have wine grapes as a 'commoditisation', where we are paid on variety, with no payment regard for quality. There is a lot of confusion written in his article.

No-one has ever suggested

that a mandatory code will restore prosperity to the industry.

It has already been stated clearly, even for a person whose first language is not English, that a mandatory code is not a 'silver bullet'. The statement, "nor is it guaranteed to only have positive things in it" shows ignorance, I believe.

A mandatory code has not been worked on or put together yet.

How can anyone tell what is in it, and criticise it when it hasn't been written yet?

Mr Perrin for example, and others, have said clearly, that we don't get a code off the shelf, ready-made. He has said that what is put into a mandatory code is important, and also important who is involved in putting a code together.

We don't want people involved who are negative to begin with, think they know more than growers, and try to tell us what we need.

That causes us trouble. We need people who listen to what growers want, not people who to tell us what we should have.

That has been a long-time problem of people on committees: telling, but not listening. These people usually leave before they cause too much

Riverland's constant summer heat produces early mango crop

ONGOING heat has resulted in an early mango harvest for Riverland West mango producers G.M. Arnold & Son.

David Arnold, director of the long-established family fruit business that has been operating since 1915, said due to the long spell of hot weather, the harvest came early in the second week of February, and was over by the end of the month.

He said the early season failed to affect the quality or yield of their mango crop.

"We had a higher tonnage than we had last year," Mr Arnold said.

The Arnolds mainly send their kensington pride mangoes to Melbourne, and sometimes to Sydney.

"Prices were probably not as good this year because they were a month early," Mr Arnold said.

He said the early harvest in February meant that their Riverland mangoes were released to consumers at a time when mangoes from the northern states were still available.

"I prefer harvest in March," Mr Arnold said.

He said during February, keitt mangoes, from northern Australia, were still available in the marketplace.

"When our kensington prides are harvested in March there are usually less mangoes around from other states on the market, so it is a bit easier to fetch a higher price," Mr Arnold said.

The Arnolds planted their first mango trees, which they sourced from a nursery in Queensland, about 10 years ago. Mr Arnold said the aim was

to increase their yield each year. Mangoes are traditionally

grown in the tropical and subtropical regions of the Northern Territory, Queensland, New South Wales and Western Australia.

Mr Arnold believes Riverland-grown kensington prides taste better than those produced in northern parts of Australia.

He said mango trees usually begin flowering in the Northern Territory around July, and the fruit forms and is ready for harvesting around October, whereas in the Riverland the process is slower.

In the Riverland, mango trees start flowering in September or October, and harvesting of fruit begins in March.

"It usually takes about five or six months for our fruit to form," Mr Arnold said.

"I think our mangoes are less stringy and the seeds are smaller and because they end up being so much longer on a tree, they have more flavour and are sweeter."

Uniting with 'brothers-in-arms'

A RIVERLAND commemoration involving former servicemen from three different countries provided an opportunity to reflect on the challenges of the Vietnam War.

More than 100 people gathered at the Berri Riverland Vietnam Veterans & Post WW2 Memorial last Saturday for the 'Brothersin-Arms' commemoration of the Vietnam War's conclusion, hosted by the Riverland Vietnam Veterans Association.

Organiser and MC for the event, Loveday man and Vietnam veteran, David Langdon said positive spirits were high for the ceremony

"The Brothers in Arms Commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War was a truly unique event that brought together Vietnam War veterans from all allied defence force service branches - Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marines - from all three countries - Australia, America, and Vietnam - under the three national flags and three national anthems," Mr Langdon said.

"Moreover, among the 120 attendees, there were veterans who had served with American and Australian forces in other conflicts including in Korea, Middle East, the Gulf War, Afghanistan, and peacekeeping operations to East Timor."

American Vietnam veterans who spoke at the event included American Ex-Servicemen's Association president Warren Sapir, vice president Barry McDaniel, and Bill Burrell, who saw three tours in the Tonkin Gulf aboard the USS Goldsborough guided missile destroyer, between 1970 and 1974.

Army Cadets from both Berri and Waikerie units supported the ceremony with a catafalque party.

Mr Langdon said speeches from Vietnamese representatives, Republic of Vietnam Veterans Association president Dang-Tao Nguyen, and Vietnamese Community in Australia SA president Quin Tran, were also personal highlights of the commemoration.

"It was particularly moving to hear from our honoured Republic of Vietnam veterans of the war and also from Vietnamese migrants and next-generation families who had escaped the communist takeover of Vietnam and found refuge and new lives in the freedom offered by Australia," he said.

"Their stories are too often missing from our remembrance ceremonies and so this occasion was special in many ways.

"The commemoration of the end of the Vietnam War is especially meaningful to Vietnamese people of the former Republic of Vietnam, and their descendants here in Australia, as it is also to any of the allied service personnel and the democratic nations that share responsibility for defending our freedoms."

Representives of the veterans groups, and Berri Barmera Mayor Ella Winnall, were among attendees of a boat cruise along the Murray River following the ceremony.

Ms Winnall, who provided a speech at the commemoration, said "the Riverland Vietnam Veterans Association remains an active and vibrant group within our community".

"While today has many layers to its significance, (it) is only possible because of them. We wouldn't be here without their ongoing committment to each other, to our community and to honouring their history," Ms Winnall said.

"While today we have the opportunity to come together to recognise the bonds between allies, nations and our veterans, we must also take time to reflect on those who didn't make it home.

"We pay our respects to those that made the ultimate sacrifice and honour their memory with gratitude and respect."

2025 Riverland citrus looking superb

RIVERLAND citrus growers are anticipating high-quality fruit this season.

Citrus SA chairperson, and Sunlands irrigator, Mark Doecke said growers are expected to begin harvesting their early navel oranges in about a week.

"We are still harvesting the last of the Valencia oranges, with our early navels only days away from starting," he said.

Mr Doecke said the hot and dry autumn had been beneficial to SA citrus growers.

"The whole season has been warm and dry, leading to an early start, and citrus appreciates warm weather to maximise growth," he said.

Mr Doecke said the size was good across all varieties of citrus. "There are isolated pockets of sunburn due to the very-warm weather and some high-radiation davs

'Quality and taste will be excellent as a result of good growing conditions."

Mr Doecke said demand overseas for Riverland mandarins, oranges, and lemons continued to be strong this year.

"Our export markets are always keen to get our fruit because of quality and a trusted brand.

"Returns for our fruit overseas should be good, especially with the lower Australian dollar."

Code of conduct not a solution, says Chaffey MP

THE region's State MP is urging local wine grape growers to make "honest" decisions for their business futures, amid ongoing financial uncertainty in the Riverland's industry.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone last week spoke in State Parliament regarding ongoing economic concerns surrounding the Riverland wine industry.

Mr Whetstone said structural adjustment, rather than a mandatory code of conduct between wineries and grape growers, was necessary for the industry's recovery.

"The opinion of some in the Riverland's wine industry is that a mandatory code of conduct will fix the problem, but it will not," Mr Whetstone said

"It will not address the long-term challenges within the commercial wine sector. Instead, wine grape growers must be honest with themselves and look to consider the level of structural adjustment within their business

"They do not necessarily have to remove it all, but all their hard work and dedication to the industry must be recognised and

rationalised... they should look to include alternative commodities within their business model."

Mr Whetstone said an ongoing oversupply of wine being produced continued to generate pressure on grape prices.

'Between 95 and 97 per cent of the Riverland's wine is exported as a bulk product," he said.

"The consumption is in decline and the trend is also declining, (and) the government's role is to provide an education service on a viable alternative.

"It is about helping struggling growers to make informed decisions, and the current management regime of vinevards and vineyard properties is entirely in the hands of horticulturalists in the Riverland.

"We cannot keep doing more of the same and expecting the government to fix the problem.'

Mr Whetstone said local grape growers would "continue to lose ground and continue to lose money" if relying on a government solution to the industry's current challenges.

"There are economies of scale to make wineries more profitable, which can only mean more wine processed, and at the

moment the more wine processed, the less return to growers," he said.

"It is all about supply and demand. Instead, growers might consider focusing on reward for effort for better-quality varietals that are making returns.

"It is a variety versus varietal, a red versus white, decision to be made. While small parcels of Riverland fruit are being marketed, patches of alternative fruit are paying dividends, particularly in the white varietals."

Mr Whetstone said "driving consumer demand is the only thing that will give lasting certainty to the commercial (wine) sector"

"It is time for those grape growers to make a decision," he said.

"They cannot keep doing more of what they are doing and expect a different result.

"The world's consumption is in decline. The trend is that human consumption is becoming less and less.

"There are more challenging commodities within the beverage sector that are forcing those Riverland irrigators, those Riverland wine (grape) growers, to make a decision and make it soon."

ATO assistant commissioner Tony Goding said "the benchmarks are a valuable tool for small businesses wanting to stay in good financial health".

it may be time for a closer look

at your business plan, and businesses that remain within industry benchmarks are generally less likely to attract the ATO's attention.

"While we never use the benchmarks in isolation, small businesses who fall outside the ATO's benchmarks are more likely to trigger a closer examination from us to identify if they are making mistakes or deliberately doing the wrong thing," he said.

According to the ATO, deliberate shadow economy behaviours contribute nearly 60 per cent of the gross small business income tax gap or around \$11.2bn per annum in missing tax.

Approximately \$8.9bn of this is associated with under reporting of income and over claiming of deductions.

"The benchmarks are just one of the tools we use to tackle the shadow economy, along with community tip-offs and data

matching," Mr Goding said. "It's all about levelling the playing field for honest businesses who are being undercut by their dishonest competitors that aren't paying the tax they're supposed to."

The ATO's online learning platform (www.smallbusiness. taxsuperandyou.gov.au/) can support small business owners to prepare and further understand their tax and super obligations.

Offering some observations

INITIALLY I was not going to respond to the accusations made against me by Jason Perrin, Ian Penno and Ravinder Singh. I have no desire to waste my time in a point scoring exercise, and I don't want to inflict that on readers of The Murray Pioneer.

However, their contributions were replete with false statements apportioning comments to me that I did not make, so I need to offer some corrections. While I can confirm that

Vincent Tarzia is a "jolly good bloke" I do not work in his office, as suggested. The opinions I gave were mine and mine alone, based on my experience in the wine industry and being involved in grower representation and the Code of Conduct discussion for over 15 years. My current employment is irrelevant, and I made no mention of the Liberal Party, so the comment that "I would hope that this isn't a reflection of a Liberal view..." is misleading

My motive in urging caution that previous articles, in particular comments by Jason Perrin were placing excessive faith in a mandatory code of conduct, may have come from reading the analogy of a "21-gun salute" from a Chinese warship. Maybe it was the claim that the Senate Committee recommendations were a "landmark decision" for industry. Or perhaps it was the repeated dismissal of supply and demand balance as an "excuse", in denial of the clear evidence and uniform global commentary to that end. There are any number of cues that fed the conclusion that I, and others have made.

Many comments made by the contributors above were inaccurate and misleading opinions masquerading as facts. For example, I did not say that an early price notification to growers in September should not happen, nor did I oppose price determination or finalisation of price in October. I suggested that there may be unintended consequences in doing so and gave reasons for my opinion.

Finalisation of a price before fruit is mature may work for growers in a collective trading system, such as a co-operative, but wine grapes are sold to many winemakers across Australia. Many of these contracts include pricing based on fruit characteristics, assessed immediately before harvest. This gives the grower scope to get a better price if their fruit can be used to make highervalue wine. For these growers, setting a final price in October may be a negative outcome. A mandatory code of conduct will need to be a 'one size fits all', and relevant to all Australian grape growers, not just those in collective arrangements such as co-operatives, and not just growers in the Riverland.

Ravinder Singh accused me of writing "incorrect information" about many things, including an expert determination on price. He did not say which comments I made were supposedly "incorrect", and why they were inaccurate, so the accusation rings hollow. Importantly, I made no mention of expert determination in my letter at all. All three writers attributed comments to me that I never made. This is misleading and dishonest.

Nor did I express opposition to the adoption of a mandatory code of conduct. My exact words were:

"Firstly, it is not surprising that there is a strong voice calling for a mandatory code. Since the inception of the Voluntary Code of Conduct the uptake by many wine grape buyers has been sluggish, despite the strong support by some wine companies."

This is hardly opposition to a mandatory code. The idea of a mandatory code is not new, but there are pros and cons. Considering the ongoing delay in getting transparent and reasonable commercial trading across the wine sector, many growers have run out of patience and see this as the best option. This is understandable and totally justified.

To answer questions about my motives in writing this piece, I did it to bring facts and evidence into the discussion. I thought that encouraging growers to access independent industry data would be helpful in making better business decisions. I have provided factual data showing the trends of wine sales and citing the references to enable growers to 'fact check' my comments for themselves. I think that this is necessary to counter emotive phrases exaggerating the likely impact of a mandatory code of conduct and the casual dismissal of the impact of supply and demand balance, which is the primary cause of poor returns at present.

If growers read the paper by Kym Anderson along with other sources of factual data, they will better understand the drivers of price in the wine industry in the Riverland and will be able to make betterinformed decisions. If, as a grape grower, you have concluded that a mandatory code is essential, it suggests a lack of trust in your grape buyer. Why then, would you only rely on one source of pricing information from that buyer? Keeping up with market price information enables you to hold that buyer to account and enable you to keep track of the value of your fruit independently from the information given by wineries. Due to the good work of some of your grower representatives, Wine Australia now has an online dashboard that provides inland growers with this information. I strongly encourage growers to use this facility.

There were other misleading statements. Observations that there is an oversupply of wine grapes, particularly commercial red grapes, are based on factual evidence. There is wide-spread agreement about the clear evidence of a global consumer move away from commercial wine and toward higher-value wines. Growers around the world are reacting by removing commercial vineyards. Observing this trend and the causes behind it is not the same as telling growers to pull their vines out. An observation is not an instruction. Ignoring this trend, or suggesting that the Riverland region is somehow immune from it, is failing to face reality, and risks compromising good decision-making.

Globally, wine sales are transitioning from volume to value. This offers Riverland growers options, should they decide to take it. The Riverland is producing some high-value fruit and wine, and it is starting to get deserved recognition. The experience of a single truck of substandard fruit from the Barossa is hardly proof of a uniform disconnect between fruit quality and market value.

People are free to take this information on board or not, but I am puzzled why there should be anger at me for presenting a differing view based on factual evidence.

The argument being made is that growers should be paid higher prices regardless of the supply and demand balance, and independent of the quality of fruit that is being sold to the winemaker. The market data shows that this approach is unlikely to be successful.

I am reminded of the quote attributed to Einstein, that "continuing to do the same thing but expecting a different outcome is the definition of insanity". There is strong evidence that the wine industry in 10 years' time will be very different from what it was 10 years ago. Change is inevitable, and it is happening now. How individuals and businesses react to the current challenge and adapt to the future is their decision. However, people will only make sound decisions when using accurate information based on factual evidence. There is a difference between the world as it is, and the world as we would like it to be.

I started by saying that I did not want to engage in a point-scoring exercise, and to continue batting this issue back and forth. Aside from being tiresome, the prose is hardly 'Bonfire of the Vanities'. I encourage growers to use factual evidence to guide them in decision-making, to remain positive and focused on the future, and to seek and support the sound leadership that is needed to help transition out of the current hard times. The Riverland is an excellent region to grow almost anything, and with the right conditions and support, there should be a rosy future for profitable irrigated food and fibre production.

Local community to influence jetty spend

BERRI Barmera residents will have the opportunity to voice feedback regarding the potential financial impacts a new Lake Bonney jetty would have on the community.

Berri Barmera Council on Monday announced upcoming consultation with the community would take place regarding the affordability of a new jetty.

Berri Barmera CEO Tim Pfeiffer said the jetty project had reached the next stage of the process.

"The community was consulted with in 2023 to gain an understanding about what the community would like to see in a new jetty on a broad level," he said.

"Following a significant body of work on draft concept designs and the cost estimates provided by specialised, external consultants, it would have been financially irresponsible to push ahead without again consulting with the community."

A report to the March general council meeting presented several scenarios, including the option to demolish the existing structure without replacement.

The costs from the four scenarios range from \$200,000 to over \$6m, with the project only to proceed if external

grant funding is secured.

The scenarios were based on receiving a minimum of 50 per cent external grant funding and if endorsed, could see council rates rise between 1.42 per cent and 3.31 per cent.

"In coming months, council will be seeking the community's feedback about what they are comfortable spending in future years on a new jetty," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"The community will be ultimately funding a portion of this project and that is always at the forefront of our decision-making process."

It is understood the community consultation for jetty financial impacts will take place following consultation of the 2025/26 Annual Business Plan, in the coming months.

After community engagement has occurred, council will consider a preferred budget and design option to proceed to the project's detailed design stage.

At completion of the detailed design stage, the project would be shovel ready, allowing council to seek and apply for external funding.

Grants to tackle regional youth issues

GRANTS are now available for Riverland not-for-profit organisations working with local young people, aiming to engage them with local projects.

The Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal (FRRR) has opened up applications for grants of up to \$10,000 available for regional organisations, with the objective of kickstarting projects, based on ideas identified at the annual ABC Heywire regional Youth Summit, and inspired by this year's winners.

The ideas address some of the most critical issues affecting remote, rural and regional youth today, as workshopped by the 38 young participants at the week-long event, held in early February.

This year, the projects need to adopt, adapt and respond to one of the following ideas:

- Youth Ignite: Rekindling community spirit and improving trust between young people and their communities.
- How 2 Adult: Equipping young people with practical life skills needed for post-school life.
- □ Full Plate Pantry: Breaking down the stigma surrounding food insecurity in regional communities.
- HARK (Helping Australians in Rural Kommunities): Making career opportunities more accessible for young people living in the country.
- □ Wellness Wagon: Connecting regional young people with the health support they need.
- CommUnity: Using lived experience to educate and celebrate different cultural diversity.

FRRR's people portfolio lead Deb Samuels said "the success of youth-led programs such as Heywire have been demonstrated through the real impact that funded projects can make".

"It's a magical thing to see such drive and innovative thinking spring from young people in rural communities right across Australia," Ms Samuels said.

"It's so evident that they love living in the places they're from, and they are passionate about shaping a better, sustainable future for other young people.

"We have seen incredible initiatives and outcomes over the last 13 years of the program and this is a real testament to the value of empowering our youth to lead, to continue developing their skills and to know they are supported to play an active role in addressing issues that are relevant to them as young people in regional areas.

"There is such strength in harnessing the perspectives and lived experience of our young Changemakers and it's a real joy to see how past winners continue to show up for their communities.


"I look forward to seeing how the next generation of young rural leaders can work with their communities to deliver meaningful projects," Ms Samuels said.

Applications close on 30 April at 5pm, and recipients will be announced in August.



You do matter, you are appreciated

I APOLOGISE I was not present to greet the farmers who made the trip to parliament recently, as I am still recovering from spinal surgery.

I am so grateful to those who made the trip at short notice, during a busy time when you are all under the pump.

I want you to know that people value your work. Your courage and commitment, the way that you support your fellow farmers and the way that you step up during such difficult times is an inspiration.

I hear your frustration. Despite contributing billions in GDP annually and providing food for the people of South Australia and the world, the State Government is not offering a hand up during the current drought.

For the Premier to say that his government is going to "turn its mind" toward measures in the upcoming budget is a staggering admission of ignorance that help was needed months ago. By budget time, without significant rainfall, it will be too late for many farmers.

I have heard your anger around comments from the Minister for Primary Industries that fodder relief might encourage unsustainable stocking rates in the current conditions. Contrast that with the example given yesterday of a farm that has destocked from 2200 sheep to 350 bloodstock – noting that rebuilding will take five years. It's not as though this has

come as a surprise. On 19 September last year I issued a press release calling on the government to ensure that drought preparation be a priority.

I knew this was an issue because I had been speaking to many of you. It is beyond frustrating that only now, so late in the season as many dams are finally drying up, that the government is starting to twig that there is a problem, yet can only be motivated to find \$8.1m in new funding.

There is something missing here. Respect.

Respect that you know your business better than anyone else, and you know what to do – you just need the means to do it.

I know there is widespread support for our farmers in the community, and this grows as people learn more about the great work you do, producing the best food and fibre, generating income under challenging conditions.

More people understand the connection between your success and the cost of filling their shopping trolley.

You matter. Your work is appreciated. I will continue fighting for proper assistance to show you the respect that you

deserve.

Centennial anniversary for Lock 3

IN an historic milestone for the Murray river's network of locks and weirs, Overland Corner's Lock 3 is celebrating 100 years of service.

Lock 3 was the second to become operational in the South Australian stretch of the Murray River.

On behalf of the Murray-Darling Basin Authority, SA Water manages South Australian Locks, with senior manager of River Murray operations Garry Fyfe saying it is a terrific celebration for the state's second oldest river lock.

"This is a significant milestone that recognises the important role Lock 3, together with our broader network of locks, has played in the daily life of people boating on the Murray River for the past century," Mr Garry said.

"Construction on the lock was completed in late 1924, with Mr Charles Evans Adams December of the same year.

"Initially used by fleets of paddle steamers and cargo boats in the trade era of the early 20th century, recent decades have more seen the transition towards houseboats, ski boats, dinghies and kayaks as the primary vessels passing through Overland Corner.

"How we operate the lock in the modern day remains mostly the same by securing the vessel inside a lock chamber and raising and lowering the water levels to match the flow height on the other side of large hydraulic gates.

"While it is difficult to say exactly how many boats have used the lock over its century of service, our recent records show more than 15,000 lockages have been recorded at Overland Corner since the new Millennium.

"Our local lockmasters take pride in operating and maintaining Lock 3 for the

appointed as the site's first lockmaster in broader community as well as visitors to the Riverland region, and look forward to continue doing so for the next hundred years."


In what will be another milestone, Mr Fyfe said the site's lock chamber, used to facilitate the passage of vessels through the site, will undergo important refurbishments from late April.

"This will include our team draining the lock of its near 8,000,000L water capacity for up to 16 weeks while we conduct repairs to the chamber's interior and hydraulic gates," Mr Garry said.

There will be a temporary closure of the lock chamber for river users during this time, and we thank everyone for their patience while we complete these important upgrades as quickly and safely as possible."

This initiative, available now until 30 April, aims to make pest animal control more affordable and effective, particularly during the ongoing dry conditions.

Murraylands District team leader Casey Henderson said the initiative is designed to ease the financial burden on landholders, while ensuring vital rabbit control efforts continue.

"We recognise that landholders are under immense pressure, and we want to make sure rabbit control remains accessible, even during difficult times," Ms Henderson said.

"By reducing costs and providing free equipment hire, we're helping to support on-ground efforts to protect the landscape.

"Even in dry conditions, rabbit populations can persist and cause damage to crops, pastures, and native vegetation.

"Taking action now will help prevent numbers from increasing when conditions improve."

'We must incorporate gas, coal or uranium for cheap baseload power."







Canines at capacity

RSPCA South Australia is keen for Riverlanders to begin putting thoughts of a new family member of the canine variety into action.

The RSPCA animal care centre at O'Halloran Hill has seen a recent increase in dogs arriving from various sources and wants the 35 available to adopt to find their forever homes as soon as possible.

Currently, seven very special pups are available for a discounted adoption fee of \$199 until 5 April, with the 76.5 per cent reduction on the usual \$850 fee still including pets that are desexed, vaccinated, microchipped, and have their parasite-prevention medication up to date.

RSPCA SA head of animal operations Billy Tubman said "all the usual protocols will be in place to ensure the specially chosen canines are well-matched to their adopters."

"We're reducing the price but we're certainly not reducing the procedure – for the wellbeing of both the dogs and their adopters, it's important that these adoptions work out," Mr Tubman said.

"When people adopt from us, they get a lot of post-adoption support – even in-house help with behaviour concerns, if necessary, to make the new family member's transition from shelter-life to home-life as seamless as possible."

Describing the current high-demand situation as "a perfect storm", Mr Tubman said the organisation was reaching out to the community as a proactive move ahead of the Easter break.

"There are just three weeks to go until the Easter long weekend, which is usually a busy time for our inspectors and rescue team, partly because of reports of people not making proper provisions for their pets' care while they go on holidays," he said.

"We want to get ahead with finding dogs their forever homes so that we have enough space to accommodate ones who may need to come into our care over this upcoming four-day break."

"Through coordinated land-use planning and integrated infrastructure delivery, these plans aim to ensure liveability, sustainability, and economic viability for decades to come."



GREATER fines and D Enhanced informationextended police powers are among new laws aiming to reduce criminal activity, including in the Riverland, and the risks posed by the illicit tobacco and e-cigarette trade.

The State Government has developed new laws, in consultation with Police Commissioner Grant Stevens, Preventive Health SA and Consumer and Business Services (CBS), to crackdown on the illegal trading of tobacco products and vapes in South Australia.

The new laws include:

- □ The introduction of greater police enforcement powers.
- □ New penalty levels and increased fines of up to \$6.6m for the supply and possession of commercial quantities of illicit tobacco and vapes.
- □ The creation of new offences for a person who allows a premises to be used for prohibited conduct, such as the sale of illicit products.

sharing powers to support enforcement operations and allow for improved communication with owners, building managers and the public.

Police will be able to undertake general drug detection, random weapon and explosive searches, including the use of detection dogs and metal detectors, in locations suspected of unlawful conduct across the Riverland.

Minister for Police Stephen Mullighan said "the State Government is giving SAPOL the tools it needs to crackdown on the illegal tobacco and vape trade, granting greater search powers and introducing the toughest penalties in the country".

"This trade represents an unacceptable risk to the community, especially our young people, and that's why we're sending a message to criminals that it won't be tolerated in South

Australia," Mr Mullighan said.

South Australia will have the harshest fines in the nation for supplying or possessing 'commercial' and 'large commercial' quantities of prohibited products, with anyone in possession of a 'large commercial' quantity facing a fine of up to \$2.1m for a first offence and up to \$4.2m for a second or subsequent offence.

A body corporate will face an initial fine of up to \$4.5m and then \$6.6m for a second or subsequent offence. Currently, the highest penalty in the Act is up to \$1.5m for corporations, and \$700,000 for an individual.

New provisions will allow owners to end a retail lease if the tenant has been issued a long-term closure order by authorities, and an offence will also be introduced to penalise owners, or a person responsible for a premises, who actively allow their space to be used for prohibited conduct under this law.

Free mental health support initiative helping SA's small business owners

BEYOND Blue is encouraging small business owners currenty struggling with their mental health to utilise the free NewAccess for Small Business Owners (NASBO) service.

Beyond Blue CEO Georgie Harman said small businesses play a critical role in local economies across Australia but often face unique challenges.

Many small business owners are stressed and overwhelmed," Ms Harman said.

"They carry a huge burden trying to juggle the demands of running a business while balancing day-to-day life, dealing with the increasing costs of running a business, and other professional and personal challenges.

"If left unchecked, these issues can snowball to mental health conditions and hopelessness

"NASBO catches people early and coaches them back to good mental health.

"People don't need a referral, and one-inseven participants fully recovers.'

Since 2021, Beyond Blue's NASBO ser-

vice has provided free, targeted, practical mental health support to more than 7000 small business owners who reached out for help when feeling overwhelmed, like their business is struggling, or like they are unable see a way forward.

NASBO offers six free treatment sessions and two follow-ups using evidence-based cognitive behavioural therapy. It can also link people with other services, like financial counselling, and operates outside of standard business hours.

Each small business owner is paired with a mental health coach, who has a background in small business themselves.

More than 90 per cent of NASBO participants said they feel more able to cope with the stresses after the coaching sessions and service data shows that almost 70 per cent of participants recovered from a mental health condition.

Mali's eyes on India export opportunity

INCREASING export opportunities in a major overseas market for wine, food and agribusiness, which could benefit Riverland primary producers, was the goal of a recent international delegation.

SĂ Premier Peter Malinauskas last month led a delegation to India, focused "on seizing opportunities (for)... trade in the billion-dollar export market".

Mr Malinauskas said India was now South Australia's third-largest export market, valued at over \$1bn, trailing only China and the US.

"I am committed to ensuring that we fully capitalise on every opportunity presented by the world's fastestgrowing major economy," Mr Malinauskas said.

"We currently export over \$1 billion in goods to India, and there is potential for further growth as demand for our high-quality produce continues to rise."



First flu vaccines available

RIVERLANDERS are being urged to plan now for their influenza vaccination ahead of the winter season.

The first supplies of the free flu vaccine, specifically for people aged 65 and over, were last month delivered by SA Health to GP clinics, pharmacies and other immunisation providers.

In South Australia last year, more than 67 per cent of people aged 65 and over had a vaccine.

Free vaccines for others, including children and people at higher risk of severe influenza disease and developing flu-related complications, will be delivered from the end of this month.

For people who are at greater risk of severe disease, the flu vaccine is available free through the National Immunisation Program.

This applies to around 600,000 South Australians, including people aged 65 years and over, pregnant women, children aged six months to less than five, all Aboriginal people from six months of age, and people with certain medical conditions.

The number of flu cases are expected to increase, with 2025 cases of influenza reported in South Australia this year already, compared with 1469 at the same time last year.

"Already this year, South Australia has seen more than 500 more cases of flu compared to the same time last year," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"We're urging South Australians to plan ahead and book in for their flu shot to protect themselves and their families

"Last year, South Australia's flu vaccine uptake for all South Australians was higher than the national average and higher than any mainland state.

"I congratulate South Australians for rolling up their sleeves."

Chief public health officer Nicola Spurrier said "prevention is always better than cure

and this certainly is the case for influenza."

"I strongly encourage everyone to plan now to get their flu vaccine from their GP, pharmacist or immunisation provider," she

said. "If you are over 65 you should ring your usual immunisation provider to confirm that you can make a booking now.

"Parents, please start planning to have your little ones vaccinated – their vaccine will be here soon.

"I'd also like to remind immunisation providers to let their higher-risk patients know they are eligible for a free flu vaccination.

"This could include people with chronic heart problems or respiratory conditions, chronic neurological disorders that can affect respiratory function, chronic kidney failure and people with impaired immunity.

"And if your employer offers a program, make sure you are the first to sign up."

Flu symptoms include a rapid onset of fever, headache, muscle aches, fatigue, sneezing, runny nose, sore throat, cough, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea in children. While many people recover within a week, cough and fatigue may last longer.

In those most at risk, influenza can cause serious illness, complications and hospitalisation, and even death.

THE Venice Hotel, by Western Australia author Tess Woods, is a compelling novel that intricately weaves the lives of four very different women against the enchanting backdrop of Vencie. Each character arrives at Hotel Il Cuore with personal struggles, leading to unexpected connections and profound transformations.

Signora Loretta Bianchi, the hotel's renowned chef, faces a dilemma between a long-held passion and her loyal husband. Sophie, an Australian food writer, discovers more than culinary delights during her assignment. Elena, a young Venetian woman returning for her father's funeral alongside her Australian doctor husband, confronts the cracks in her seemingly perfect marriage. Gayle, an American tourist, finds her dream vacation taking unforeseen turns. Despite their differences in ages and background, the women all have tightly held secrets that gnaw at them, constantly creating tension in their lives. Their inter-twined stories highlight the resilience and solidarity that emerge

during times of crisis.

Woods masterfully captures Venice's allure, immersing readers in its beauty while addressing environmental concerns like rising sea levels and the impact of tourism. The story is told in chapters, each representing a day of the 12 days of Christmas, which adds depth and rhythm to the unfolding drama.

Themes of friendship, love and personal growth are explored with sensitivity, making the characters' journeys both relatable and inspiring.

The novel has received wide-spread acclaim for capturing the magic of Venice with vivid storytelling alongside an ensemble of strong female characters. It celebrates the strength of women, and the heart-felt exploration of connection, resilience and the unexpected paths life presents.

Campfires, Crows and Dinghies: A floating disaster

MOST people growing up reading books would have heard of author Mark Twain, and The Adventures of Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn, two kids living in and off the mighty Mississippi River in the early part of last century.

My two youngest grandsons, Solomon, 21, and Kale, 18, anticipated a modern day Australian version, and a possible present day version of my own commercial 'magic carpet raft' operation on the Murray, in the 1990s to early 2000s.

Well, the river hasn't changed all that much since my raft trips, previously written up in my books and in this column, back then. But it seems that what the banks of the river have lost in soil and biodiversity, they have gained massively in the other, far-less desirable B word – Bureacuracy. As you will see.

Over the last couple of months, Magic Carpet IV has been under construction here on my property, on the Fleurieu Peninsula. A more sophisticated - a word not normally associated with rafts - version of the others, made of timber construction, with 24 poly 200L drums. Built in two halves to make transport to the location possible.

The other rafts have been built on site, or near the river. A mate, Vlad, an engineer, loaned me his self-constructed adjustable trailer, a masterpiece that allowed the raft to be legally transported – just. Mates are better than gold.

Another one, Rolly, an earthmover, arrived with a bobcat equipped with forks. The 'vessel', measuring 21ft (6.4m) by 16ft (4.8m) when joined, was skilfully and precariously, loaded on to the trailer with a big sigh of relief from those present.


Leaving at 5.30am the next morning, Jeremy was towing the raft trailer with a Land Cruiser and I was towing my boat/ camper, with most of the gear required to launch a raft, without mechanical help, and supplies for eight days on the river.

Myself and Darren, of much 4WD and boat trip experience, would look at parts of the Murray and Goulburn rivers. At the end of the period we would locate a place on private property to leave the raft after the trip.

The road trip was uneventful. An organic farmer mate, Mark, met us north of Echuca, and after much effort on his part a suitable location was found to launch and fit out the raft. A very nice camp in a red gum forest, on the Goulburn River, was located.

Early next morning, with a rope slung over low branches, and the brains, experience and muscles of the party, the vessel's two halves ended up in the river to become one. The rest of the drums were attached, as were tyre buffers around the sides.

This was a weekend and though remote, there was other river traffic in the vicin-



ity from time to time. One could argue that there was not a lot of 'aligning' in the minds of raft travellers, cocooned in the sounds of silence, and those that travel in wake boats, or jet skis.

Bear in mind at this stage that all of this motorised traffic is legal, despite the fact that it continually erodes the river banks, and drowns out bird calls and silence.

At 9.30am, Magic Carpet IV, which tows an inflatable dinghy with a 5hp outboard motor, pushed off from the bank of the Goulburn River, and drifted at walking pace towards the Murray, 200m away. A good sight.

Jeremy, Darren and I spent the day at the campsite, before Jeremy headed back to SA with the empty trailer. We were having problems with the outboard on my boat, so we loaded it back onto the trailer, and drove in to Echuca to wait for the Magic Carpet's arrival the next day.

We had heard from the raft boys, who were travelling with a better-than-walking pace current and experiencing that very allusive thing, fun.

Around mid-morning I heard from Sol that they had been apprehended by the NSW Water Police and had been ordered out of the river.

To the officer's credit, once he ascertained that it was just five young blokes having a river adventure, not sure if he had ever read the Adventures of Tom Sawyer, he became friendly and reasonable.

He noted their safety features on board and that in other words, they were not irresponsible idiots.

He just wanted them to disappear. He was a good cop, and the boys reckon he was envious of their adventure.

All this changed rapidly though as there was communication between him and his boss, who advised the raft must be taken out of the river, dismantled and removed within 24 hours, otherwise fines would be imposed, although a hasty new rule might have been required for that.

So that's what happened, and what a sad example of the way our once free, exciting and adventurous country is going.

The boys managed to get permission to camp on the raft that night. They had travelled 15km. The next day, in 37C heat, we dismantled the raft in to the original two sections. Rather than offer the timber, worth \$2500, at bargain prices to the local men's shed or salvage firms, I decided to give it to Mark, my organic farmer mate, against his protestations I might add.

It was no easy job but the whole outfit was loaded on to two trailers and transported 30km to Mark's farm. It would end up on his large dam, providing a lot of fun for his family of young kids.

So here is just another example where I think the bureaucracy is denying Australians, young and old, what used to be our god given rights.

No, they would reason – it's far better to have young people glued to their phones, where they are much easier to control, and we, the people, mostly sit back and let them get away with it. It seems that fun is dead or dying in this once exciting and adventurous country.

The Brook Brothers, however, are not giving up on their pursuit of an exciting way of life. Like their grandfather, they will just have to learn to become more devious.

I know a large part of the population will be on their side.






The previous weekend saw nine athletes from Waikerie travel to Adelaide to compete in the State Challenge competition.

PARLIAMENT has been used to press the State Government for answers on a funding request to help maintain and retain standpipes, used for water delivery to drought-hit Mid Murray Council farmers and their families.

Council has applied to PIRSA (Department of Primary Industries SA) for a \$415,000 grant to automate some of the 14 standpipes in question, and/ or install a user-pays swipe-card system.

Via public consultation on the issue, the council heard that any interruption or cessation of standpipe usage at two locations in particular, Summerfield and Stonefield, would impact dozens of farming families who rely on the pipes to water their sheep.

At its March meeting, elected members agreed to keep seeking external funding sources for the provision of standpipes, and to explore other options while it continued to wait on a State Government decision.

The council's cause has been adopted by One Nation MLC Sarah Game, who asked Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, for answers in state parliament a fortnight ago.

"Can the government provide an update on the status of Mid Murray Council's funding application to PIRSA and outline when the council can expect an

answer?" Dr Game told parliament.

"(And) will the government concede that, due to the Mid Murray Council's population of less than 10,000 and its financial position recently being described by ESCOSA as 'potentially unsustainable', the council cannot afford to upgrade all its standpipes and therefore needs state government assistance to continue providing water to these farming families?"

Ms Scriven replied that she had met with Mid Murray Council Mayor Simon Bailey last year and had undertaken "fruitful discussions" about standpipes, but was unable to provide a solid date for the council.

"The application is under consideration, and we will be able to provide an answer as soon as possible," she told Dr Game.

Late last year, council – which owns the standpipes and pays to maintain them – considered closing its "regional" standpipes and maintaining only those in the townships.

The majority of the council's 49 responses received during public consultation on the issue focused on the Summerfield (27 responses) and Stonefield (15 responses) locations.

In his report to council, Mid Murray director of infrastructure and field services David Hassett conceded that the provision of standpipes was "an emotive matter, due to the importance of sourcing water within a rural and regional setting for domestic, livestock and other uses..."

However, Mr Hassett also said that the "relatively limited number of responses" showed the issue related to only "a small portion of the community and broader Mid Murray rate base".

Mr Hassett said if council chose to close a standpipe, users would be given an "appropriate notification period... to source alternative water supply prior to the service being stopped".

At last month's meeting, elected members endorsed a recommendation to explore alternatives for the provision of standpipes – considering the community consultation received and pending the outcome of the PIRSA funding application.

Council has already spent \$120,000 in recent years upgrading eight of its standpipes., however water reporting relies on customers providing accurate readings of their water use, and abuses of this honour system have cost the council an additional \$40,000 during that time.


