Businesses closed over illegal smokes

THREE Riverland businesses have been shut down until September after being found to be selling illegal tobacco and vape products.

The State Government’s illicit tobacco taskforce last week seized more than 1000 packets of illegal cigarettes, 500 vapes, and 15kg of loose tobacco, during raids on six stores in the region.

Following the raids, 28-day closure orders were issued to two businesses in Berri, and to Smart Smoke, in Barmera.

The Shell Get and Go in Glossop, Waikerie Tobacconist, in Waikerie,

and a supermarket on Twentyfirst Street, in Renmark, were issued 72-hour interim closure orders.

Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels said ensuring no organised crime groups were profiting from illegal tobacco and vapes was a priority.

“The Malinauskas Government has been relentless in its fight against illicit tobacco and vapes with South Australia having the toughest penalties of any state or territory,” Ms Michaels said.

“These six stores have

suffered the consequences... of being involved in this illicit trade and investigations into their actions are continuing.

“The illicit tobacco taskforce will continue to be out in force, raiding stores and shutting them down across the state.

“It is largely organised crime behind the illicit tobacco and vape trade in Australia and we are not going to let these criminals use the profits of this illegal market to wreak havoc in our communities.”

It is understood several stores also received on-the-spot fines.

Boat and trailer stolen from Paringa

LOCALS are being asked to provide any information that may assist the location of a boat and trailer stolen from Paringa.

The boat and trailer were stolen from a property on the Sturt Highway, at Paringa, between July 27, and August 4, after the tow ball lock was cut off.

The home-made 5m-long black boat, with ZR181S painted in white on the side, has a 50HP Yamaha outboard motor and a toolbox mounted on the front, containing camping equipment.

The boat was on a silver home-made boat trailer, with the registration S602TAF.

Anyone who knows the whereabouts of the stolen boat or trailer or has information that may assist the investigation is asked to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000, or online (www.crimestopperssa.com.au).

Fire causes \$600,000 damage to prime mover

ABOUT 13 CFS firefighters on three trucks and support vehicles attended a B-double fire in the parking bay area of a service station on the Sturt Highway, near Blanchetown, on Saturday.

The CFS said the fire started in the prime mover of a wide-load truck upon vehicle ignition.

It said crews effectively extinguished the fire in the prime mover and saved the contents of the load, as well as preventing any spread of fire to fuel bowzers within 15m of the truck.

The CFS said although \$600,000 damage was sustained to the prime mover, an estimated \$8m load was saved by the quick work of first responders.

SA Police assisted the CFS on scene, containing and isolating the incident from the public.

No injuries were reported.

Council softening the community blow

CONSIDERATION for cost-of-living pressures on the community has seen Renmark Paringa Council lower its proposed 2025/26 rate rise to 9 per cent.

Renmark Paringa Councillors, at a special meeting held last Tuesday, endorsed an amended 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget, with the decreased general rate rise.

The 9 per cent equates to an increase of \$97 a year for an average residential household.

The endorsed option was one of three rating scenarios presented to elected members.

A Renmark Paringa statement said “after considering detailed financial modelling, the long-term implications of each scenario, and feedback received from sections of the community during consultation, the option was chosen as a balanced compromise that addresses immediate affordability pressures, while maintaining a path to

long-term financial sustainability”.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said elected members were required to make a difficult decision that balanced competing priorities.

“This was not an easy decision,” Mr Hunter said.

“Elected members were faced with the challenge of weighing cost-of-living concerns expressed by parts of the community, against our responsibility to plan for the long-term financial viability of council.

“Ultimately, we’ve chosen a path that eases some of the immediate pressure, while still keeping us on track to return to an operating surplus by 2028/29.”

During the consultation period, residents expressed concern about the affordability of the originally proposed 11.25 per cent increase.

Mayor Hunter said council valued the community input received through the consultation process.



A session was held by council, on July 17, at the Renmark Club, before a separate community meeting on July 20.

“We appreciate those community members who took the time to provide feedback and engage with us on the budget,” he said.

“It has reinforced the importance of maintaining clear communication and transparency around these significant decisions.

“Council looks forward to continuing to build on this positive relationship with our community and will look for opportunities

to further improve how we share information and engage on key issues in future.”

Council’s current financial position also continues to reflect the significant and ongoing impact of the 2022/23 Murray River flood, with damage to infrastructure and “unanticipated recovery costs” placing substantial pressure on the budget..

“The financial hit we took during the 2022/23 flood has had long-lasting effects,” Mayor Hunter said.

“It pushed us into a deficit position, and we’re still managing the recovery to council’s budget.”

To support the revised rating approach and ensure council continues moving toward financial sustainability, a number of strategic initiatives are being undertaken.

A comprehensive review of council’s rating structure will be undertaken in the next planning cycle to assess equity, efficiency,

and alignment with strategic objectives.

The review will consider elements such as differential rates, fixed charges, and the impact of growth.

Council will continue to explore asset rationalisation opportunities, including the potential sale of underutilised assets, and will continue to actively pursue grants that help reduce its reliance on ratepayer funding.

Mayor Hunter said council remains committed to careful planning and ongoing dialogue with the community.

“This is one step in a much broader recovery journey,” he said.

“With a clear plan, prudent financial management, and an ongoing focus on open communication, we’re laying the foundations for a stronger and more resilient future for the Renmark, Paringa and Lyrup communities.”

Ann refusing new National Trust revenue fee

THE chairman of Renmark’s Olivewood museum says she is “fed up” with a lack of support and consultation from National Trust SA.

National Trust SA is seeking its branches across the state to contribute a new 10 per cent fee from total revenue toward “consolidated auditing, insurance and financial compliance”.

Olivewood Historic Homestead and Museum committee chairman Ann Ryan said the fee for the Renmark branch – which she is also chair of – would be approximately \$7000.

“In April they started sending out invoices to the different branches,” Ms Ryan said

“They say it’s to cover all the different work they do with the finances at the Adelaide end, and that includes insurance and auditing.”

Ms Ryan said maintaining existing exhibits, and expanding the museum, would be better use of the money raised through Olivewood.

“We get donations... and why should I have to give away a portion of that?” she said.

“We pay all the expenses in terms of water, electricity, and repairs. They don’t

ever financially contribute to a branch.

“We sold a piece of land back in 2017. They got the money from it in Adelaide, and they say they let us have the interest off it.

“It’s almost as if they are trying to bleed the branches dry.”

Ms Ryan said volunteers had been directly responsible for raising money to purchase, and maintaining, many of Olivewood’s major exhibits.

“This was the first branch in South Australia, and was formed in 1956,” she said.

“This branch wasn’t left Olivewood. That committee raised the money and bought it,

then raised the money to do the big shed, and to build the cottage and pay it off.

“There’s never been any money from Adelaide. We’ve spent more than \$1m, just on buildings and purchasing.”

Ms Ryan said long-standing legislation regarding the National Trust required a review.

“The National Trust Act of South Australia is 70 years old, and there’s nothing to cover the branches or volunteers,” she said.

“I want that to be looked at. I don’t just want to see head office throwing things at us without consultation.”



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Our grape growers forgotten again?

THE Riverland’s Federal MP says direct support for local wine grape growers is still lacking, while bail-outs have been provided for “major industrial players”.

Barker MP Tony Pasin has questioned the \$135m in support provided by the Federal, and South Australian and Tasmanian State Governments, for the Nyrstar Port Pirie and Hobart smelters, while local wine grape growers experience ongoing economic difficulty.

Mr Pasin said Riverlanders were seeing support for “major industrial players”, while local communities continued to face wine industry challenges.

“It seems the answer to every industrial challenge in this state is a taxpayer-funded cheque — unless, of course, you’re a wine grape grower.”

“The people of Barker are sick and tired of subsidising jobs in other parts of our state,” he said.

Mr Pasin said the Federal Government’s lack of support wine grape growers demonstrated a clear double standard in how taxpayer dollars are allocated.

“It’s insulting, unjust and unconscionable,” he said.

“Labor will open up the treasury cheque-book for... Port Pirie and Whyalla, but when it comes to struggling grape growers employing thousands in regional communities — they’re simply ignored.”

Mr Pasin said “spiralling energy costs” were having wider impacts on South Australian industries.

“This isn’t just about Port Pirie or Whyalla or indeed South Australia — it’s about the cost of doing business in Australia full stop,” he said.

“The real reason manufacturers are lining up for government handouts is because the cost of energy is crippling them.”

Mr Pasin said the pursuit of a net zero emissions target was “driving up costs and undermining the competitiveness of local industries”.

SA Premier Peter Malinauskas said the support package was aimed at “setting Pirie up for a more prosperous future”.

Hunter receives the greatest gift

AFTER a stranger's decision saved the life of their youngest child, a Riverland family is advocating for more people to become organ donors.

Born with Ornithine Transcarbamylase (OTC) deficiency — a rare genetic disorder that results in excessive accumulation of ammonia in the body — Hunter Fletcher received a life-saving liver transplant in 2023, with the surgery now securing a happy and long-life for the Glossop two year old.

"The surgery has been life-changing — for all of us actually," Hunter's mother, Caitlyn Kourasanis, said.

"Hunter is now a happy and healthy little boy."

Though born a seemingly healthy baby in 2022, three days later at the Berri Regional Hospital, Hunter began to show signs of severe sickness.

"We were told he might not survive the flight to Flinders Hospital," Ms Kourasanis said.

"He was transferred immediately into the paediatric intensive care unit at the Women's

and Children's Hospital and we were met with an entire team of doctors.

"For the next couple of weeks, we took it hour by hour."

While under specialist care, doctors were able to identify that Hunter was missing a liver enzyme, with the genetic testing also providing a diagnosis to the family's other baby boy, Harvey, who had passed 11 months previously from what was thought to be Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).

Father Peter Fletcher and Ms Kourasanis were informed by doctors that Hunter's case — which saw the missing liver enzyme cause ammonia levels of 3800 micromoles from an expected 50 micromoles — is the "highest they have ever seen".

"We were then informed, because of the high levels, Hunter had sustained severe brain damage," Ms Kourasanis said.

"However, he just kept proving them all wrong and pushed through completely."

Though surviving his initial health crisis, Ms Kourasanis said Hunter's life before his liver transplant was "very difficult", with necessary round-the-clock, four-hourly feeding, and six-hourly medication doses.

"Myself and Hunter had to move into the Ronald McDonald house, and for 12 months, I was up every three hours caring for him," she said.

"Aside from the strict diet, any sort of stress on the body, teething, heat, or a virus, could cause his ammonia levels to rise — I was always worried for the worst.

"Yet, Peter and I eventually began to know the signs so well nothing ever got critical again — the highest his levels ever reached again was 200."

Receiving the transplant in November 2023 — shortly after his first birthday — Ms Kourasanis said the surgery has been "life changing", with Hunter now completely cured of OTC.

"It's amazing, he is just a normal two-year-old," she said.

"While some children face delays after being diagnosed with OTC, Hunter is just thriving ahead."

Brother Harrison Fletcher supported claims of Hunter's recovery, with his little brother "definitely as annoying as he should be for two-years old".

Now, Hunter's family are advocating for

more people to consider being an organ donor.

While South Australia significantly leads the nation in organ donation registration, only 40 per cent of South Australians aged 16 to 24 are on the register, compared with 70 to 84 per cent for older age groups.

More than 1800 Australians are currently waiting for an organ transplant, with more than 200 dying waiting in the past five years. An additional 14,000 on dialysis for kidney failure might also benefit from a transplant.

"I never even thought about becoming an organ donor until Hunter was diagnosed," Ms Kourasanis said

"It's something everyone should consider — it saves people's lives."

People can register on the DonateLife website (www.donatelife.gov.au), through their driver's licence registration or renewal, or through Medicare.

It’s all about trust

THERE is often a difference between the desires of those working in cities, and what is best for regional communities.

It seems as though tensions among members of National Trust branches across South Australia towards the organisation’s head office have been increasing to high levels.

The cause of the abrasion between the two sides – as detailed in today’s edition of The Murray Pioneer – is the introduction of a 10 per cent fee on the overall revenue of branches, that would be directed toward the organisation’s head office, in Adelaide.

Although the National Trust itself may be an entity largely unknown outside of its own staff, many locals would be familiar with its branch at Olivewood, in Renmark.

For anyone who has visited Olivewood, the enthusiasm shown by the museum’s volunteers in ensuring local history is preserved and maintained is easy to see.

That goes back to establishing the log cabin exhibit that was the original home of Charles Chaffey, to the re-location and decoration of the salvaged Argo Barge.

As is rightly pointed out by the Olivewood committee chairman, these major projects have been undertaken largely through efforts of local volunteers, and through funds raised at the museum.

While many in the district may not be considered ‘regular visitors’ to Olivewood, the collection of physical artefacts, historic photos and information on the establishment of Renmark is often a benefit to the entire community.

While the need for the National Trust head office to be supported in conducting audits, and handling insurance matters for its numerous branches can be understood, asking the group of Olivewood volunteers to hand over 10 per cent of its turnover seems a bit steep, to say the least.

Is this a case of regional areas, such as our Riverland communities, again losing economic resources due to the oversights of staff working in city centres, seeking to install blanket regulations without proper understanding of the potential impacts?

Seeing that the head office of National Trust SA is located within the grounds of the immaculate Ayers House – on North Terrace in Adelaide’s CBD – might be an indication that the needs of rural communities might not be top of the priority list.

So, it seems as though the Olivewood committee could hardly be blamed for asking themselves the question of whether they would be better off separating from the National Trust?

As the museum’s chairman has also pointed out, does the State Government need to start looking at where some of the longer-standing legislations surrounding heritage and history need to be updated?



Gwen Kroeger, compassionate community contributor, mid-1990s.

Gwen (née Braddock) was born at Outer Harbour, in 1913. She studied at Adelaide Teachers College, becoming registered in early-1934, and was posted to the Loxton Higher Primary School. Gwen met Friederich Gerhard (Fritz) Kroeger in Loxton. They married on Christmas Eve 1936. Gwen then gave up teaching for her new role as wife, and later, mother of six children. Fritz, from Germany had ‘jumped ship’ in Port Adelaide, in 1927. He was ‘found on the footpath’ by a passer-by, Loxton’s German Pastor Meier, who brought him to Loxton. Fritz soon established a mechanical and electrical business in a tin-shed, still visible in Edward Street. In addition he made 32-and-240-volt installations, and provided a service re-charging batteries for radios. Gwen ‘kept the books’ for Kroeger’s Electrical, although heavily committed to many community roles. These included president of the Mothers and Babies Health Association, Tennis Club vice-president, playing for many years, and in establishing Loxton High School and the Riverland Special School. Gwen was caring and compassionate, serving Save the Children, Girl Guides, as lay preacher in the Uniting Church, and as an active justice of the peace in 1971, serving the Loxton District Court. To help others, she wrote a book about her experience with diabetes and its control by diet. Fritz died in 1976, aged 74, and Gwen, in 1997, aged 84. Lives well-lived. Empower families, protect our children

THE horrifying reports of alleged wide-spread abuse in Australian childcare centres have rightly shocked the nation.

For any parent, the safety and wellbeing of their children is paramount. When that trust is broken, the consequences are devastating for families and corrosive to society’s confidence in institutions meant to protect and care for the vulnerable.

In the wake of such revelations, it is natural to hear calls for more government action, more regulation, more oversight, more checks.

But too often, government responses are designed to demonstrate activity, rather than to deliver genuine solutions.

When government solves one problem, it too often creates two more.

Proposals such as mandating child welfare officers in every centre, or expanding already extensive background checks may sound comforting, but risk creating more bureaucracy and inflating the cost of childcare, placing additional stress on

household budgets, without actually making children safer.

It is time to think differently. It is time to empower families.

We must support Australian parents in making the choices that best suit their families, whether that means staying at home to care for their children, or returning to work.

A practical reform would be to consider lifting the cap on the Child Care Subsidy (CCS) for in-home care, making it a more viable option for shift workers and families seeking greater flexibility.

More broadly, we should explore income splitting for tax purposes, an approach that would provide families with greater financial freedom and reduce dependence on formal childcare.

Australia’s income tax system is one of the few in the developed world that taxes individuals in isolation, regardless of family responsibilities.

It does not recognise or reward unpaid care. It actively penalises families who make the choice for one parent to stay at home or work part-time.

Why should a household making joint financial decisions be taxed as individuals?

Under a voluntary income-splitting model, families would be taxed based on their combined income, split evenly across adults, with tax brackets applying to the average. This would ensure families are not punished for how they choose to care for their children.

It would give proper recognition to unpaid care, reduce demand on formal childcare, and ease cost-of-living pressures for all families.

How can we better support informal care arrangements by recognising the vital role of grandparents and extended family members?

We need a system that will support families who choose to rely on trusted relatives, those

who already love and know their children, instead of being forced into formal childcare arrangements out of economic necessity.

In many cultures and communities, this is already the norm. Our tax system should support, not hinder, these family-centred solutions.

If we truly want to keep children safe and support Australian families, we must give them the financial tools, freedom and flexibility to decide what works best for them.

It is time for a serious national conversation about how our tax system can better reflect the realities of modern family life and provide the support that strong families and communities need.

EV sales power ahead in 2025

ELECTRIC vehicle sales in Australia are off to a strong start in 2025, already outpacing the first half of last year, according to the Electric Vehicle Council (EVC).

New figures from the EVC and other sources show that more than 14,000 additional battery electric vehicles (BEV) and plug-in hybrid vehicles (PHEV) have been sold in Australia so far this year, compared to the same period in 2024.

Between January and June 2025, EVs accounted for more than 12 per cent of all new car sales, up from 9.6 per cent during the same period last year.

In June 2025 alone, electric vehicles accounted for almost 16 per cent of all new cars sold.

Electric vehicle sales are powering ahead in 2025 with more Australians than ever before getting behind the wheel.

Monthly EV sales set a new Australian record in June as well, with market share breaking through 15 per cent for the first time ever.

The transition to electric vehicles is picking up speed - that's because of federal government support through policies and incentives, and more Australians recognising that making the switch is good for the environment and their wallets.

We've seen really important changes come into effect in Australia this year in the New Vehicle Efficiency Standard, which is bringing consumers more choice in electric cars and



more competitive prices.

More than 350,000 people are driving EVs in Australia today – tradies in utes, mums and dads ferrying their kids in SUVs, suburban dwellers zipping around in hatchbacks and small business owners delivering goods from vans. Once people make the switch to electric driving, they tend to stick to it.

While the growth in electric vehicle sales is encouraging, it's crucial that Australia maintains this momentum by expanding infrastructure, increasing incentives, and supporting innovation such as vehicle-to-grid technology.

More EVs on our roads benefit all Australians, delivering quieter streets, cleaner air, and greater protection for our environment.

Co-ordinated action on pest plants and animals

HOUSEHOLDERS' Options to Protect the Environment (HOPE) Inc is raising concerns about the significant and ongoing threat posed by introduced weeds and pest animals to Australia's environment, agriculture, and economy.

For many years, HOPE Inc has recognised the detrimental impacts of these unwanted invaders, which have either been introduced deliberately or accidentally, disrupting native ecosystems and causing substantial losses across various sectors.

From the insidious spread of weeds that outcompete native flora, to the devastating impact of pest animals on agricultural production and biodiversity, the issue of invasive species demands a unified and effective response.

The cost of invasion
Weeds, defined as plants 'in the wrong place', can aggressively colonise diverse environments, impacting everything from farm fields and gardens to national parks. Similarly, pest animals, ranging from feral herbivores to disease-carrying insects, cause significant damage to crops, forestry, and infrastructure, while also threatening native wildlife.

Controlling the spread
HOPE Inc recognises managing these pests requires a multi-faceted approach, including:

- ☐ Prevention: Robust biosecurity measures to prevent new introductions.
- ☐ Early intervention: Rapid response to new incursions to prevent establishment.
- ☐ Strategic control: Implementing safe and effective

control measures, which may include manual removal, biological controls, such as targeted grazing by animals like goats, and carefully considered chemical applications as a last resort.

Shared responsibility
HOPE Inc emphasises that the responsibility for managing pest plants and animals is shared across various levels, including individual landowners, community-based Landcare groups, Local Government Authorities (LGAs), and state and federal government agencies. Co-ordinated efforts and adequate funding are crucial for effective control and eradication programs.

Understanding who is responsible and ensuring effective collaboration between all stakeholders is paramount to tackling this national challenge.

HOPE Inc calls for increased awareness, research, and the implementation of cohesive national strategies, potentially building upon existing frameworks like national Threat Abatement Plans, to mitigate the adverse impacts of weeds and pest animals on Australia's unique natural heritage and productive landscapes.

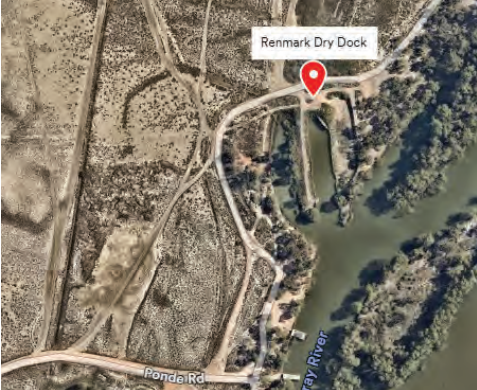
Renmark dry dock to support local houseboat community...

HOUSEBOAT HOORAY

THE Riverland houseboat community will have access to critical maintenance services as part of a new partnership between Renmark Paringa Council and Smooth Flow Group.

The Renmark dry dock, which had previously served large river vessels, will soon undergo preparatory works by Smooth Flow Group to allow the service and maintenance of smaller boats, delivering essential infrastructure to support the region's houseboat community.

The contractor will install additional pylons to increase capacity, enabling the facility to accommodate multiple houseboats at a time, including smaller vessels.

The dry dock's operation comes at no cost to council and is intended as a tempo-

rary measure to meet immediate community needs ahead of the future Jane Eliza development and planned off-river marina.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said the decision responds directly to concerns raised by local houseboat owners and operators.

"We've heard clearly from the community that access to a local slipway and maintenance infrastructure is critical. Partnering with Smooth Flow Group to operate the dry dock is a practical way to meet that need while we work towards longer-term solutions," he said.

"Houseboats play a vital role in our local economy and tourism sector. This interim solution ensures that owners and operators have access to the services they need without

leaving the region."

Mr Hunter said the partnership with a local contractor was another positive aspect of the agreement.

"This is a great example of working with a skilled local operator to deliver a cost-effective, community-focused outcome," he said.

"Smooth Flow Group understands the operational requirements and is well-placed to manage the facility over the next 12 months and beyond if required."

Smooth Flow Group will manage bookings for the dry dock.

Off and racing...in October

THE 2025 Mindarie-Halidon Cup Day meeting has been moved – from September to the potentially more crowd-friendly October – to allow the club time to restore its track following damaging recent weather events.

The enduring drought, plus three days of strong winds – which hit before recent rains – saw a significant volume of dry, sandy soil deposited along approximately 300 metres of the track.

The soil inhibited that stretch's natural growth and altered its surface, leaving the track unlikely to be ready in time for the meeting's original September 14 date.

However, Racing SA and the club have joined forced to take a "proactive" approach to the scenario, rescheduling the meeting to Sunday, October 19.

Club volunteers have moved the sand and have already begun preparations for the new date, including communicating with mem-

bers and sponsors.

"We couldn't be sure the track would recover in time for a meeting on September 14, so with Racing SA we made the decision to shift to October," said club president Geoff Redden.

"The last thing we wanted was a late cancellation of the meeting, so we're grateful our big day could slot into this new date.

"Naturally, we apologise for any inconvenience to anyone, but likewise we also hope everyone who was intending to go on September 14 can be there on October 19."

Mr Redden said the decision "was not taken lightly", but was "clearly the sensible choice".

Racing SA's Adelaide-based track staff inspected the Halidon course in recent days ahead of the joint decision. Mr Redden said early feedback from industry participants had been positive.

"Firstly, we've been heartened by the sup-

port and efforts of Racing SA, who have been great," he said.

"And Racing SA has spoken to a couple of prominent metropolitan trainers who also supported the decision and said they'll be there on October 19.

"We're now working towards that new date and are encouraging all our regular racegoers to attend."

The new date is "smack bang" in the middle of the nation's spring racing carnival and Mr Redden said the likelihood of slightly warmer weather could be a silver lining to the rescheduling.

"No guarantees of course, but there's a better chance of ideal weather conditions, deeper into spring," he said.

"And the new date moves us further away from the Riverland Football League grand finals (on September 13), plus other winter sport finals, and the Riverland Field Days (September 12-13)."

Mr Redden said severe dust storms several weeks ago led to the sand drift.

"We had something like this once before, but never as severe as this," he said.

"There were two days in a row of severe dust storms, then another one, about three or four days later.

"That sand that was dumped on the racing surfaced stopped the regular growth underneath."

Racing SA praised the Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club's efforts to remediate the affected area.

"Their hard work and co-ordination have (already) shown promising progress, highlighting the community's commitment to restoring the track for the upcoming cup meeting," Racing SA said.

"Along with the club and its volunteers, Racing SA appreciates the patience and support of everyone involved."

Despite the rescheduling, the club will still conduct its first ever Racing SA official trials, which were originally set down for September 29. Regarded as a coup for the club, strengthening its position within the SA racing landscape, the trials will now be held sometime after the cup meeting.


The latest weather-enforced change continues a run of bad luck for the club, which was forced into a race-day cancellation of its 2023 meeting, after a freak irrigation leak on the eve of the meeting. Last year's meeting went ahead as planned, with a bumper turnout to the club's Halidon racecourse.

The club has forged ahead with multiple infrastructure improvements over the past two years, aimed at making the race-day experience better for both industry participants and spectators.

This year's meeting will again offer over \$150,000 in prizemoney, including the \$40,000 Mindarie-Halidon Cup, to be run over 1800 metres.

SEVERAL teams of Riverlanders joined a covey of more than 130 vehicles last Saturday, as part of the annual SA Variety Bash.

Travelling more than 2300km across South Australia, the eight-day journey from Adelaide’s West Beach, to Tanunda, hopes to raise \$2.6m for children in need.

Lyrup’s Matthew and Lisa Lloyd, and Loxton’s Domenic Perre, Rhain Hondow, Simon Bullock, and Brendan Schulz are the two teams representing the Riverland for 2025, with Loxton local Lyn Appleton — riding with Orroroo team The Roo Racers — also at last week’s starting line.

Speaking with The Murray Pioneer ahead of the cruise, Mr and Ms Lloyd said they were excited to complete their Variety Bash in a new-and-improved Scooby Doo Mystery Machine themed 1996 VS Commodore wagon.

“The children all loved DOO last year,” Ms Lloyd said.

“So, we thought we’d give DOO a little makeover, by adding signage, characters to the panels, and a bright, coloured flag to fly above DOO this year.”

Hoping to reach silver door status once again by raising more than \$22,000 for the cause, Ms Lloyd said the chance to give back to those who need it most is what has inspired the team to “keep coming back to

the Bash.

“Last year’s Bash was just fantastic,” she said.

“Seeing some of the children Variety has helped along the way was hugely rewarding, and made all the effort and time we put into it worthwhile.

“It’s a definite yes that the DOO will be back for the 2026 Variety Bash, although the team may look a little different — we will just have to wait and see.”

Made up of a “mix of (six-year) veterans and newbies”, Loxton’s Fireman Sam team has worked to raise more than \$12,000 this Bash.

“The cause hits the hearts of everyone who has kids — and the cause emanates the need to support those kids that are not as lucky as our own,” Mr Perre said.

“Living in the Riverland really makes you aware there are lots of people and companies that truly support (local people), so (it’s been) really heart-warming to see even the small business owners supported us just as much as the bigger ones.”

“The 2025 Bash has a great sense of anticipation around it,” Variety SA CEO Mark McGill said.

“We have over 130 cars heading into the Northern Outback reaches of our state spreading goodwill along the route via direct grants to children and families in need and significant economic benefit to the regions.

“The long game is the incredible impact

this fundraising will make to the tens of thousands of children next year.”

Though holding a long-term passion for cars, Ms Appleton joined her Orroroo team, The Roo Racers, as a rookie of the 2025 race.

“I am involved in the (Orroroo) Black Rock Dirt Circuit, and when one of their original team mates couldn’t make it this year I was given the opportunity,” she said.

“I am very excited to complete the trip —

everyone gets a turn at driving and navigating, so it should be a lot of fun.”

Fundraising across Orroroo and Loxton, Ms Appleton said the team had been able to raise more than \$24,000 “thanks to the generosity of the local community”.

“The SA Variety Bash is just amazing — the money they raise is so important,” she said.

“It’s great to see the Riverland be so supportive to this cause.”

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Teamwork makes the dream work for SA Water Morgan maintenance

THE collaboration of SA Water crews from across South Australia has enabled the safe completion of important upgrades to the 358km-long Morgan to Whyalla pipeline, improving the reliability of this important drinking water network.

The complex work involved replacing the above-ground pipeline's crossover valve used to isolate sections of the trunk main for repairs and help maintain the supply of drinking water to more than 130,000 homes and businesses who rely on it across the Barossa, Mid North, Yorke Peninsula and Eyre Peninsula regions.

Sourcing water from the Morgan Water Treatment Plant, the pipeline is among the longest drinking water pipelines in Australia.

SA Water's senior manager of maintenance Colin Bell said detailed planning was required to minimise any disruptions to customers where possible during the recent works.

"While our Morgan to Whyalla pipeline continues to safely operate, we proactively identified the benefits that replacing the valve would provide to the infrastructure's performance and reliability into the future, while helping to best maintain supply to our customers in the event of any unplanned repairs," Mr Bell said.

"Acknowledging the need to temporarily interrupt water supply to Morgan to safely remove and install the new valve, our people from teams such as maintenance, engineering and field operations came together to plan how best to complete this vital work, while minimising impacts to the community.

"This included undertaking repairs overnight when water use by our customers is typically at its lowest.

"We also proactively notified the community in advance of the works being undertaken and provided practical steps to take while their supply was temporarily interrupted, including pre-filling buckets for use in their toilet cistern, and topping-up spare jugs of water for drinking or cooking."

Mr Bell said the complex repairs saw the existing 750mm-diameter valve cut out and replaced within a matter of hours, with normal water supply restored for the township by the following morning.

"To safely undertake repairs of this size and scale in a rapid turnaround is a credit to our dedicated team working to improve services for our customers," he said.

"We'd also like to thank the local Morgan community for their patience while we completed repairs and restored normal water supply as quickly and safely as possible."

Temporary water interruption for Waikerie

SA WATER is advising Waikerie residents the town will experience a temporary water interruption for eight hours, from 10pm, next Tuesday.

In a letter to Waikerie residents, SA Water said following a main break in July, its staff would be undertaking works on its water main in Waikerie to ensure consistent future water supply.

The corporation said an interruption to the water supply for the town of Waikerie

was required to complete these works.

It said the water supply would be unavailable from 10pm, on Tuesday, August 19, to 6am, on Wednesday, August 20.

SA Water suggests residents prepare for the interruption of water supply by filling their toilet's cistern and buckets for flushing, a number of jugs or bottles for drinking and cooking, sinks for washing hands and dishes, and their bath for any

additional water needs.

It also advised residents when the water supply is restored to run an outside tap, until the water runs clear, before using hot water services and appliances, such as washing machines.

Speeders and drink drivers caught by police

A MAN caught speeding by more than 30km/h, and a woman driving while nearly four-times over the legal alcohol limit, were among motorists charged by police in the Riverland recently. At 3.40pm, an 18-year-old Evanston man was reported for driving with a suspended licence on the Old Sturt Highway, at Berri. His vehicle was impounded for 28 days, and he will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

At 8.40pm, on the same day, a 35-year-old man, from Virginia, was reported for driving disqualified on the Sturt Highway, at Blanchetown, and will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date. Around 9.15am, on August 3, a 35-year-old man, from Moorook South, was reported for driving unlicensed on Edward Street, in Loxton. He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date. At 11pm, on the same day, a 31-year-old man, from Andrews Farm, was reported for speeding and drink driving. A man was then reported for drink driving, after being stopped at Paruna, at approximately 3.30pm, on Sunday July 27. The 63-year-old, from Paruna, was stopped on Railway Terrace and allegedly produced a

blood alcohol reading of 0.105. He was issued with a six-month instant loss of licence and will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date. On the same day police reported a 54-year-old woman, from Berri, after she was stopped on the Old Sturt Highway, at Berri, at around 6pm. She allegedly returned a positive result to methamphetamine when submitted to a drug test. Stay informed, stay in control: Tax rules, super changes, and Centrelink benefits can all impact your finances. It pays to check in regularly with a professional.

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Retirees better off by more than \$11,000 each year thanks to super

A LANDMARK new report finds new middle and low-income retirees in the middle wealth group have been the biggest beneficiaries of compulsory super, with an extra \$11,388 to spend each year on things they need or love like living costs, holidays and making memories with family.

Super Members Council analysis also finds without compulsory super, half a million more Australians - 512,000 - would rely on the Age Pension, costing taxpayers \$12bn in 2026-27, rising to \$14bn in 2028-29.

The Super Members Council's Retirement Revolution: Super's

Coming of Age report is the first sweeping study on Australia's retirement incomes since the Government's Retirement Income Review in 2020.

It publishes first-of-its-kind modelling by SMC, showing the newest retirees in the middle wealth group were receiving an average of \$20,800 a year more in super income than similar retirees two decades ago, and \$11,388 extra after accounting for lower Age Pension entitlements.

Over the past two decades, super balances have more than tripled for middle wealth retiree

households and more than doubled for the second-lowest wealth retiree households.

As each successive generation retires with super, the evidence shows this money is lasting longer into their retirement years, with the proportion of people in their 70s with super income tripling over the past 20 years.

Before the introduction of universal super with the Super Guarantee laws in 1992, financial assets were concentrated in the wealthiest 10 per cent of households. Fast forward three decades, and they are spread across every income group, thanks in large part to super.

While super is transforming retirement for many, the report highlights some groups remain vulnerable.

Retirees who rent, live alone, or retire involuntarily due to health or caregiving responsibilities, face significantly lower incomes and wealth. Retired renters for example, have median incomes three times lower than homeowners and median wealth nearly 30 times lower.

Women, single retirees, and those in insecure work are also more likely to be knocked back by unpaid super, lower lifetime



earnings, and less access to tax concessions than higher-income Australians. These gaps underscore the need for targeted reforms to ensure super delivers for all Australians.

Australia's ageing population, rising mortgage debt in retirement, and complex system settings will place increasing pressure on the retirement income system.

Without reform, the gender and housing wealth gaps will widen, and the system's sustainability could be undermined.

Super Members Council CEO Misha Schubert said the super system is doing what it was designed to do to transform incomes and standards of living for everyday people, but there is

more work to do.

"Australia's super system is lifting the retirement incomes for millions of everyday Australians, ensuring they have more money for the things they love and need," she said.

"Without super and with Australia's population ageing, the Age Pension would be under enormous strain, leaving the Budget worse off and less money to spend on things like health, education, roads and rail."

"Super is one of Australia's great social and economic success stories. It's time to build on that success and ensure it works even better for those who need it most."



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Rituals holding the community together

OUR house feels unusually zippy this Saturday morning; people moving around and things being organised.

In a few hours, some of the neighbourhood will gather at our place. Drinks are on ice in the laundry trough, and sandwiches are appearing.

Just home from England, our cousins' slideshow will depict their experience for those of us who haven't been outside of Australia, let alone on a plane.

It's a long night, the narration is detailed, the slide projector overheats causing delays, moths fly around the projector light, and kids fall asleep on the floor.

Slide evenings were a ritual then, so too was bringing back souvenir teaspoons from travels to the UK. With royal emblems or Union Jacks attached to their top, we kids wondered why teaspoons caused so much fuss.

Rituals gave our communities a sense of togetherness and continuity and reflected the generosity and sharing spirit of that time.

For example, kids donkeyed a stranded friend, perhaps offered after a Malvern Star hit upon a patch of three-corner jacks. Despite the generosity, donkeying tended to be painful for rider and passenger.

Picking up hitch-hikers was common too. Wearing his uniform, a cousin serving in the Australian Army regularly hitch-hiked from Puckapunyal, never failing to hitch a ride to, or from Renmark.

A New Year's Eve ritual transpired when larrikins ventured out after midnight to paint the new year's date somewhere on a bitumen road with white paint, offering a prankish 'community service'.

At home, radio dramas were central to family entertainment. The Argonauts and Blue Hills stayed the longest, Dad loved the Singers of Renown, and on Tuesday nights, with our ears glued to the radio, we sat on the lounge floor following The Life of Dexter Dutton.

The midday ABC news on the kitchen wireless, followed by the Country Hour, was Dad's unmissable priority, tuning in for market fruit prices – while we kids had no idea they were the lifeblood to our existence.

Furthermore, test cricket on the wireless has been an Australian institution, probably since before WWII.

The annual Sunday School Picnic, on Renmark's No. 2 Oval, brought the Lutheran community together for an easy afternoon of activity.

Yes, it had a picnic atmosphere, gorgeous weather, and the attendees were church going, but the adult races were fierce, and ultimately hilarious.

In their three-legged races for example, some pairs went for speed over symmetry, resulting in Christians finding themselves spreadeagled across each other on the turf. And we kids looked on in puzzlement.

If we owned them, we wanted our white Dunlop Volleys – designed for tennis, but they also served me for running, netball, table tennis and basketball – to keep their whiteness.

It was a Saturday ritual to squeeze the liquid shoe whitener with its sponge applicator over the shoes, then carefully paint it on evenly.

Somehow, my shoes never looked the same after that first job and never quite recovered.

School and church working bees – when men brought picks, shovels and wheelbarrows to help build playgrounds and sandpits – brought common purpose and a beautiful sense of camaraderie.

Meanwhile, random breath testing might've saved lives, but also ended progressive dinners, a popular 1970s fad,



when friends drove from house to house for entrees, then main course, desserts, and coffee/after-dinner mints.

Had I ever taken part, I would've nailed the after-dinner mints.

It's arguable whether rituals served or reflected the closeness of the community back then, but the argument is inconsequential.

It was probably both, but the point is that it was a trusting, inclusive and deeply interconnected community built from the foundations of similar life experiences for us all.

Pruning Roses for Healthier Blooms

Pruning roses is essential for maintaining plant health, encouraging vigorous growth, and ensuring abundant blooms. Whether you're tending hybrid teas, floribundas, or climbing roses, proper pruning enhances both beauty and longevity.

When to Prune

The ideal time to prune roses is in late winter or early spring, just as new growth begins. In warmer climates, this may be as early as July or August. Look for swelling buds as your cue to start.

Tools You'll Need

Use sharp, clean pruning shears to make precise cuts. For thicker canes, loppers or a pruning saw may be necessary. Always disinfect tools before and after use to prevent disease spread.

How to Prune:

1. Remove Dead or Diseased Wood: Cut back to healthy tissue, identified by white centres in the cane.
2. Shape the Plant: Aim for an open centre to improve air circulation. This helps prevent fungal diseases.
3. Cut Above Outward-Facing Buds: Make 45-degree cuts about 6-7 cm (1/4 inch) above a bud that faces away from the centre.
4. Trim for Size and Structure: Reduce height by one-third to one-half, depending on the rose type and desired shape.

Aftercare

Feed your roses with a balanced fertilizer and water deeply. Mulch around the base to retain moisture and suppress weeds.

Regular pruning not only rejuvenates your roses but also keeps your garden vibrant and flourishing. With a little care and attention, your roses will reward you with stunning blooms season after season.

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Speeding targeted in state police operation

RIVERLAND motorists were urged to avoid speeding on local roads during a recent South Australia-wide police operation.

During last month's week-long Operation Safe Speed, South Australia Police detected 768 speeding offences.

The state-wide operation was conducted between 12.01am, on Monday July 21, and 11.59pm, on Sunday July 27, with the aim of reducing road trauma from vehicle collisions and deterring speeding on South Australian roads.

During the operation, 408 drivers were fined, arrested or reported across the state.

Sadly, two lives were lost, and 16 road users were seriously injured during the time of the operation. There were no extreme or excessive speed detections during the operation.

During the same seven-day period conducted in

October last year, 1042 speeders were detected.

Superintendent Shane Johnson, of the Traffic Support Branch, said, “while it is pleasing to see less overall speed detections during this operation when compared to previous operations, we still have a long way to go to reduce trauma on our roads”.

“I urge drivers to not take risks on the road, don't speed, consider the consequences of being seriously injured or injuring someone else just because you were in a hurry or rush to be somewhere, it is simply irresponsible and reckless,” Supt Johnson said. “Drivers need to understand that speed limits are in place to make our roads safer for everyone.” A total of 46 drivers were also detected with a blood alcohol concentration over the legal limit, and 86 tested positive to drugs, during the operation.

Sterile fruit flies taking flight for Riverland

THE resumption of sterile Queensland fruit flies releases across the Riverland has begun this month, in an aim to stop outbreaks of the pest and protect the region.

Each week, low-flying planes will release millions of the sterile flies across outbreak-affected areas, as part of the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA's) sterile insect technique (SIT) program, starting with Renmark and nearby towns.

General manager of the fruit fly response program Jason Size said this pest-control method is a key tactic used to reduce wild fruit fly populations, and remains a vital part of the broader response strategy.

“When sterile fruit flies mate with wild flies they stop the next generation before it begins, effectively breaking the fruit fly life cycle,” Mr Size said.

“Aerial SIT releases allow us to cover large areas quickly and efficiently, which supports our baiting, surveillance and hygiene activities on the ground.”

Ahead of the scheduled flights, PIRSA took advantage of a surplus of sterile flies in late July and conducted a one-week ground release in selected hotspots with vehicle-mounted units and static bins used to release sterile flies across parts of Renmark, Renmark North, Cooltong, Chaffey, Berri and Glossop.

“We used satellite-based land sur-



face temperature mapping and data to identify areas where fruit fly might still be active, despite the cold winter conditions which discourage fly movement,” Mr Size said.

“While aerial release is our standard method, road or static releases allow us to act quickly when needed, especially in specific locations or where aerial release may not be possible.”

Aerial SIT releases will take place weekly in the Riverland and continue until Autumn 2026.

In the 12-week period from May 5, to July 27 2025, no fruit flies were detected in 25 of the 56 Riverland outbreak areas. In the same period, some flies were detected in 31 of the 56 Riverland outbreak areas.

Lessons to learn from NZ visit

SOUTH Australia has much to learn from New Zealand’s trade and export strategy, says Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone.

Mr Whetstone, also opposition spokesperson for trade and investment, recently made the trip overseas to meet with his New Zealand counterpart, who has committed to doubling NZ’s export value within the next decade.

Mr Whetstone said the New Zealand Government had a big job ahead of them, but that it’s the perfect time for South Australia to start taking notes.

“New Zealand’s export value has already grown 10 per cent in the last 12 months,

with a large focus on agriculture, forestry, international education, and technology,” Mr Whetstone said.

“By comparison, SA’s overseas export value fell 5.5 per cent on the previous 12 months in the latest ABS release.

“Major South Australian commodities like wine and seafood are in freefall. Outside of China, our wine exports are at their lowest value in the last decade, and their lowest volume in 20 years.

“I was given a better understanding of how New Zealand protects its wine industry and continues to avoid international trade barriers, especially exporting premium wine to China.

“It is clear that the New Zealand government holds its wine sector in high regard as a sacred commodity, and lends it the respect it deserves.”

Mr Whetstone said during his visit, he had a productive conversation with NZ Minister for Trade and Investment Todd McClay, about the future of South Australia’s relationship with the country.

“The Labor Government has turned its back on New Zealand and completely taken our trade relationship for granted,” he said.

“While ministers flaunt lacklustre trade strategies, South Australia’s exports to New Zealand are down by over 20 per cent.

“It’s evident that more needs to be done to revitalise our relationship with New Zealand and to embrace their success.

“The last few months have seen some important steps in the right direction, with Air New Zealand establishing direct flights to Adelaide, from both Auckland, and Christchurch.

“Qantas will also begin a seasonal route between Adelaide and Auckland, from October, to May 2026. As our national carrier, I’d like to see these flights extended throughout the year to promote more exports and tourism.

“I was also honoured to meet with the chair of the New Zealand Parliament’s Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade Committee, Tim van der Molen, as well as other regional MPs with electorates like Chaffey.

“As the food bowl of South Australia, the Riverland and Mallee both have an inspiring story to share with the rest of the world,

especially when it comes to our premium goods and produce, which are the envy of other markets.”

Mr Whetstone also met with SkyCity Group to discuss future investment in South Australia.

“SkyCity has been trialling a new hospitality scene in New Zealand and has big new plans for the sector in metropolitan Adelaide,” he said.

“This kind of innovative investment in our state is a welcome change, and as a region, we need to make a conscious effort to promote South Australia as a premier location to invest and to do business in.”

Rural consumer and business confidence dips on the back of drought

INDUSTRY confidence among Riverland businesses has slipped among ongoing pressures on agriculture, according to data from a major survey.

The latest BankSA State Monitor survey, undertaken from July 9 to 16, revealed a 14.9 point decrease in Riverland business confidence, from 102.4 to 87.5 points, while consumer confidence also dropped by 1.4 points, from 100.4 to 99 points.

Riverland businesses were found to be less optimistic about adding employees in the future and their own business improvement, but fewer businesses had experienced a drop in turnover

BankSA agribusiness regional general manager Les Ryan said the survey was conducted at a time when rural areas continued to deal with record low rainfall and drought conditions.

“It’s tough in the regions and both consumer and business confidence measures are sitting just below the 100-point benchmark, but our rural communities are fighting hard to overcome external impacts such as the severe drought and the devastating algal bloom along our coast,” Mr Ryan said.

“Other contributing factors have been continued worries around the future of the Whyalla Steelworks and emerging concerns regarding Nyrstar Australia’s smelting operations at Port Pirie.

“The announcement that the Golden North production facility would relocate from Laura to Murray Bridge would have had a negative and positive impact on the Mid North and Riverland, region and the Southern region respectively.”

The survey also states the algal bloom along South Australia’s coastline is also impacting the regions, particularly people involved in the aquaculture and tourism sectors.

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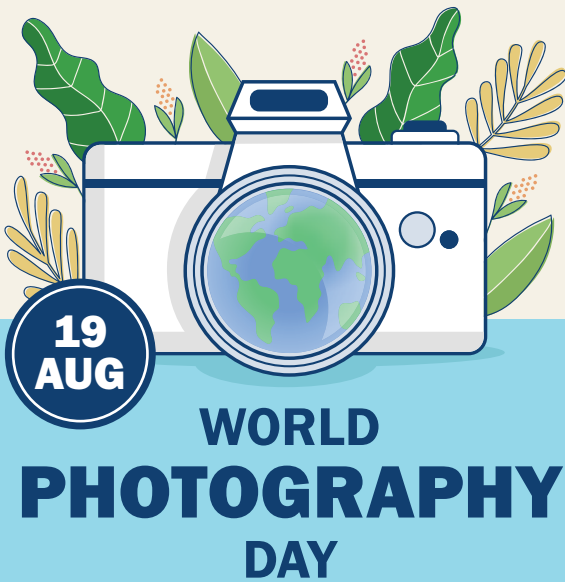
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Darren to speak for justices A memorable career with the SA police

In December 2024 Supt Fielke was appointed to the role of officer in charge of



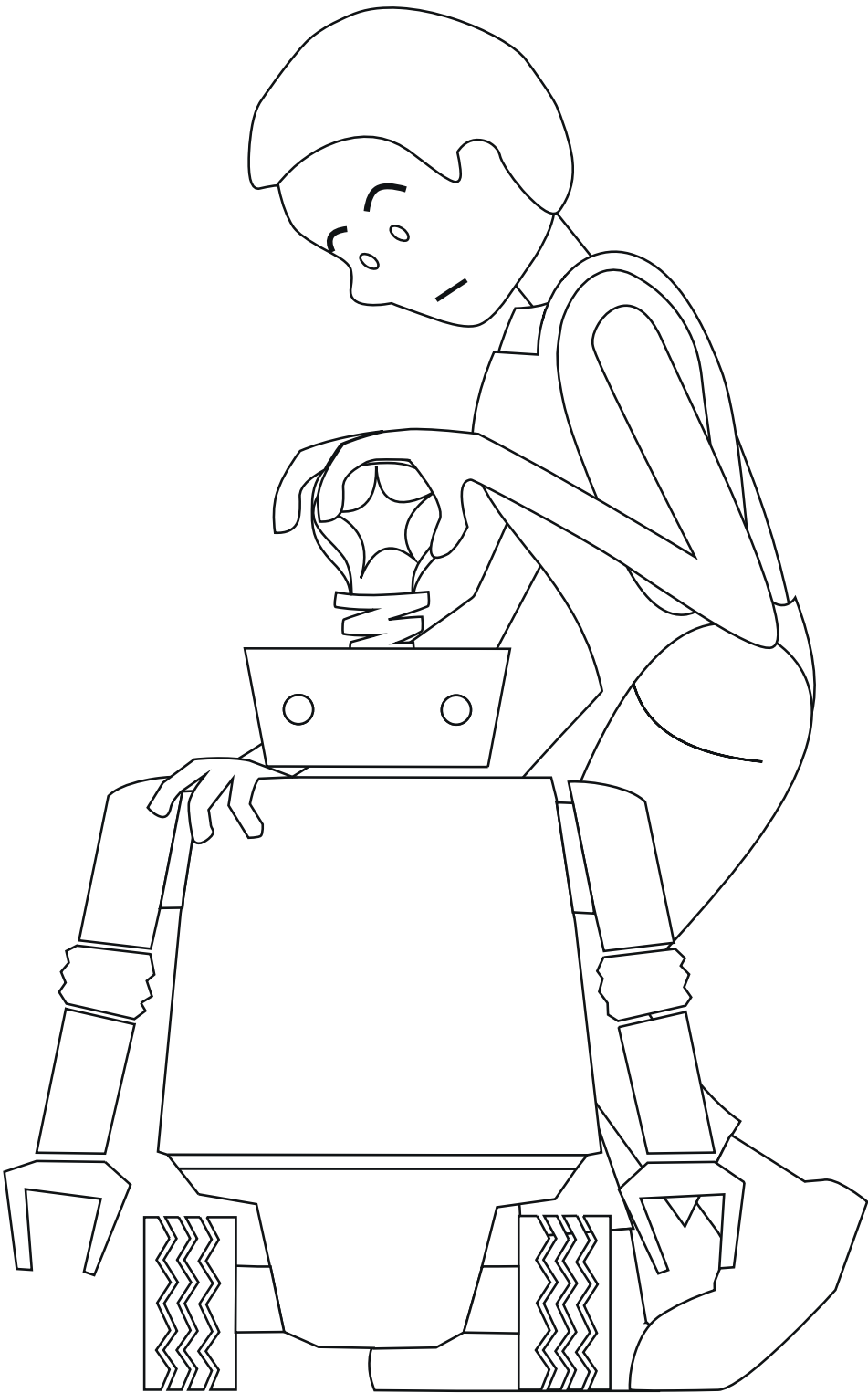

South Australia set to ban personal mobile devices in early years services

THE State Government is introducing a ban on the use of personal mobile devices in early years services to strengthen safety and better protect young Riverland children. All South Australian childcare and preschool services will be required to implement a policy and procedure, addressing the use of personal devices and ensure this is in line with the National Model Code. All services will be required to provide assurance and a copy of these documents to the state's independent regulator, the Education Standards Board (ESB), by the end of September. Services that fail to provide policies and procedures, or are not compliant with these requirements may have conditions imposed, including fines of up to \$50,000 or even suspension.

The National Model Code outlines that only service-issued devices should be used when taking images or videos of children while providing education and care. Personal mobile devices capable of taking images or videos, personal storage, or file transfer media are unable to be in possession of any person while they are working directly with children. "The safety and wellbeing of our children is paramount, and we are working quickly to strengthen the safety requirements for long day care services and preschools," Minister for Education Blair Boyer said. "The (State) Government has demonstrated that it has zero tolerance for poor behaviour from early childhood providers – which is why we have significantly increased funding levels to our independent regulator, the EBS by \$7m, resulting in a doubling of staff and a 63 per cent increase in service visits. "All providers in South Australia must now ensure they have provided their policies and procedures to ban the use of per-

sonal mobile devices to our independent regulator. "This ban is in line with changes recently announced by the Victorian Government, and demonstrates our commitment to child safety. Further information on supporting services with the implementation of the roll-out will be provided by the ESB who will undertake 'spot-checks' to ensure appropriate monitoring and compliance with these requirements." EBS chief executive Benn Gramola said "the Education Standards Board fully supports the ban of personal mobile devices in long day care services and preschools". "Our priority is to minimise any risks to the safety, health and wellbeing of children," Mr Gramola said. "We're aware a large number of services have already implemented the National Model Code, which is great to see and highlights the proactive approach that many in the sector are already taking to address this issue. "The ESB will provide further information to those affected by these changes to ensure everyone understands their responsibilities. "Services who do not comply with this ban may be subject to regulatory action including placing conditions on their service approval." The ban is the first in a series of actions being investigated to strengthen safety for children in early childhood education and care services.



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Investment benefits Riverland community

INVESTMENT properties aimed at bringing key workers to the Riverland, and improving housing accessibility, are now for sale in Renmark.

Five homes in Renmark – two with two bedrooms, and three with three bedrooms – were recently listed for sale through Renewal SA’s Office for Regional Housing.

Director Matt Hunt said the sale opportunity offered potential investors “access to decade-long lease-back deals at attractive rates”.

“At a time of significant market instability, what we have on offer is an attractive opportunity for investors to include a strong and stable investment into regional South Australian housing into their portfolios,” Mr Hunt said.

The homes were all built in the past 18 months by local construction companies, through the Regional Key Worker Housing Scheme (RKWHS).

All houses will be occupied by government workers in education, healthcare or law enforcement, with tenancies managed through the Department of Infrastructure and Transport’s Government Employee Housing office.

Mr Hunt said Renewal SA sale

documents confirmed weekly rental returns of up to \$540 for a two-bedroom home, and \$655 for a three-bedroom home.

“These starting weekly rentals will be subject to fixed annual increases of 2.5 per cent, and regular market reviews,” he said.

“There is no vacancy risk to the investor for the full ten-year lease period and possible five-year extensions.

“Our contracts also cover tenancy management, property maintenance and property refresh services at the end of leases, where we will paint, re-carpet, fix any damages and landscape.”

Mr Hunt said the properties could be sold individually, in groups, or as a portfolio of assets.

“We are open to all 26 houses being sold in one transaction, but we don’t expect that will happen,” he said.

“Previous opportunities of this kind have lent themselves to investors with self-managed super funds and smaller-scale investors looking for strong, safe opportunities.”

Mr Hunt said future initiatives similar to the RKWHS could unlock other opportunities to improve

housing accessibility.

“We are actively working to unlock dozens of innovative opportunities for investors to be involved

in, either by purchasing completed homes from the government, or through mechanisms that enable direct private investment in govern-

ment-leased housing,” he said.

Regional borrowers losing access as banks centralise services?

RIVERLAND borrowers, particularly those needing agricultural and commercial finance, are finding it increasingly difficult to access personalised banking support, according to a senior industry figure.

Think Mortgage head of regional and agribusiness Nic Wilson said regional closures, combined with reduced hours at remaining branches, has made in-person banking “harder than ever for rural clients”.

“Many of our clients are finding it harder than ever to get personal, in-person service from banks,” Mr Wilson said.

“Branches have either shut completely or cut back their hours, and many relationship managers who used to be based in regional areas are now covering huge territories from centralised hubs.”

Mr Wilson said the lack of access can have

impacts on regional businesses, particularly in the agricultural sector.

“In my experience, when a farmer or regional business owner wants to talk through their finance options, they prefer to do it in person,” he said.

“Regional borrowers are often forced to drive further and further just to speak with someone in person, (and) that travel time takes them away from running their businesses. It can have a real impact on productivity and profitability.

“There was a time when bank managers and relationship managers were embedded in regional towns and easily accessible. These days, it’s more common for them to cover large areas from central locations.

“Many relationship managers do an excellent job despite the growing demands on their

time. But the centralised model does make it harder for some clients to get face-to-face support when they need it most.”

Federal government data shows 36 per cent of regional branches have closed since 2017, although major banks agreed to halt regional closures until at least 2027.

Mr Wilson said in-person options were decreasing for Riverlanders needing to resolve day-to-day banking issues.

“There’s still a need for clients to be able to access local bank staff for ongoing matters, and that’s getting harder to do,” he said.

“Regional borrowers face the same risks and decisions as those in the cities, but with fewer options and longer wait times.

“Banks need to find ways to maintain meaningful access to their regional clients, not just digitally, but in person, where it counts.”

Local Danny's police experience wows Waikerie Probus Club ladies

JULY saw the Waikerie Ladies Probus meet at the Cadell Club for an enjoyable lunch and talk by Danny McGuigan.

Danny is a Cadell-born man, recipient of the Order of Australia for his effort to retain the Cadell ferry, and is well known for his other cultural and tourism activities in the town.

After a typical Riverland childhood, Danny was involved in the fruit industry, but then decided to join the police force.

After completing training in Adelaide and five months service there, he transferred to Whyalla with his wife and child. He was their aboriginal liaison officer.

The next move was to the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara lands – APY for short – and this was a huge area. To get an idea of the distance, think width wide Waikerie to Mildura, and length wide Waikerie to Naracoorte. Danny was the only white police officer there, assisted by Aboriginal aides.

His expanded family thrived. The Aboriginal people were mainly full-blood, which is the term they used at the time.

It was a great area with a caring community, but it had issues with alcohol and petrol misuse.

It is rumoured that the inhalation of petrol was introduced by US servicemen stationed in the Top End during World War II. A loss of work on cattle stations also impacted families.

Women tried to follow traditions, though that became harder, especially for the older ones with no clan, relying on Centrelink and food donations, including rabbits from Danny.

Danny's next placement was Yalata.

Art bloomed in the communities and he has a fine collection of artworks, some of which he showed.

He considers the Pitjantjatjara people to be the best trackers in the world, including Jimmy James, from Ernabella.

When a safe was stolen, it

was the women who tracked the thief.

Danny's love of football helped, as about 10 different community groups played at the football carnivals going from Thursday to Monday every fortnight, with two 10 to 15-minute halves, and he was involved with every one.

After Yalata, the family moved back to Whyalla, then to the Riverland, with stints at Berri, Morgan, Swan Reach, Blanchetown and Waikerie, followed by retirement.

Danny told various stories about his experiences and exploits, and finished by saying that the Aboriginal people used to have the perfect lifestyle, with enough food and water shared by families. Life was good.

On August 26, members will meet back at the Waikerie Bowling Club, at 10am to hear speakers from the Waikerie and Districts' Flower Show Committee, and the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board. Guests welcome.

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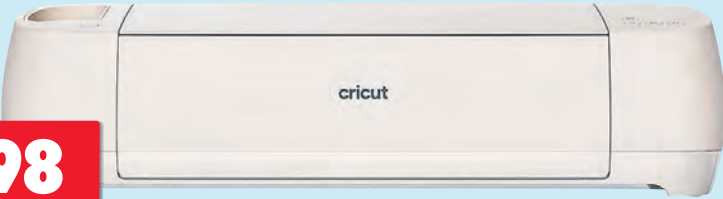

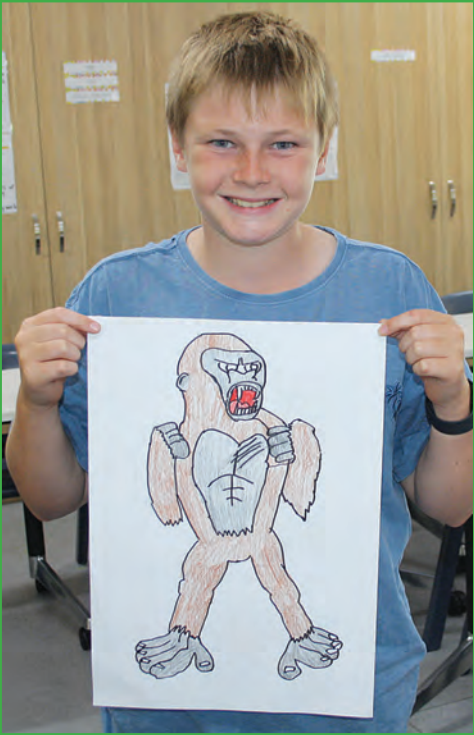

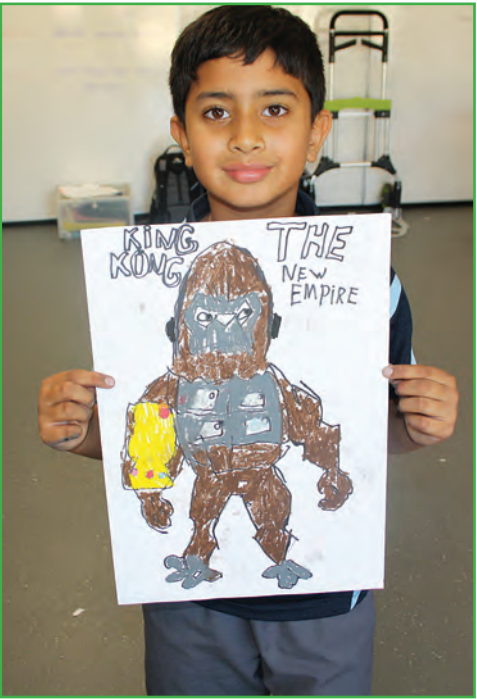

Champion Oncidiinae went to oncidinae kaiulani, grown by Stephen and Marianne Lynch. Champion Seedling – Any Other Genera, went to dendrobium tweetas x (grey ghost x hot coals), also grown by Stephen and Marianne Lynch.

Many other exhibitors received prize cards of firsts and seconds for their entries, so it was quite a successful show

for all members.

Potting and mounting demonstrations were carried out during both days, and the trading table was well patronised.

Blanchetown’s gathering place for community spirit

THE Blanchetown District Hall is a hive of community activity where local residents gather for exercise and leisure activities.

Blanchetown District Hall and Community Committee spokesperson Lorraine Lambe has been taking part in a weekly yoga class at the hall for the past three years.

She said the session, each Monday, from 10am until 11am, caters for all fitness levels and began after a group of local women obtained a grant for the class.

Ms Lambe said the grant expired and they no longer have an in-person instructor, but due to the strong interest, they were able to keep the class running via a live stream online from the United States.

“It is appropriate for our age and we just do what we can, as it is not like yoga for young people,” she said.

“It is very good for our mental health and wellbeing and hardly anyone knew anybody in the town before we started doing this.”

Ms Lambe said the husband of one of the yoga class participants recently passed away, but because of the companionship the activity offers, she has decided to remain at Blanchetown.

“It would have been so isolating otherwise, but now she has friends,” she said.

Frozen meals are also available for purchase each Wednesday at the hall, from 2pm, for \$11 or \$3.30 for those who have an NDIS, or Home Care package, and are eligible.

Ms Lambe said the meals are prepared by the Cadell Training Centre and are home-cooked.

On Wednesdays free produce is on offer from the hall.

Ms Lambe said once a fortnight, on a Wednesday, the Salvation Army Riverland visits from approximately 12.30pm, offering low-cost groceries and free bread and produce, and on the alternate Wednesday, free produce is also available to those who need it.

Residents should check Facebook for the latest information about times.

An over-50s fitness class, subsidised by Reclink Australia, will also return from next Tuesday, at 1.45pm, at the hall and will continue each Tuesday.

Ms Lambe said Mid Murray Council assisted in obtaining some funding for the strength training sessions, which hopefully will become self-funded by participants in

the future if enough locals take part.

A quilting group is held fortnightly on a Wednesday at the hall, from 9am to 3pm, and on the first Saturday of the month, a bingo session is also run, from 1pm.

People from the area are encouraged to contribute to the Blanchetown Community

Garden once a fortnight, on a Saturday, from 2pm to 4pm.

A ‘Book & Plant Swap’, is available at the front of the Blanchetown District Hall 24/7.

Have the Panthers locked in the finals?

THE path to the 2025 Riverland Football League’s A grade finals series became a lot clearer on Saturday afternoon, following a sensational second half from Loxton North.

"During my time I've never been super fussed about the minor premiership as an accolade.

"The thing I'm most proud of is that we've had significant injuries to key players for a large quantity of the season.

"If you couple that with the challenge of trying to sustain success, and the pressures that come with that, to be able to be consistent enough is pretty cool, and I'm pretty proud of that for the whole club."

Renmark will travel to Loxton this weekend to face the Tigers, while Waikerie returns home to face Berri in the 5RM Game of the Day.

The Magpies will also officially open the redeveloped Waikerie Community Hub, as both A grade matches kick off at 2.40pm.

BARMERA created a five-point gap in the top two following the latest round of Riverland A grade men’s soccer, after a comprehensive win over Berri last weekend.

Barmera only had a two-point gap on third-placed Loxton heading into the match with the River Rangers, but quickly had things on song.

Berri is yet to record a point in season 2025 after 12 matches, and Barmera took just two minutes to capitalise.

Cooper Ebert opened the scoring, and Jake Sweet doubled the lead on 22 minutes, before Daniel Greer pinched one back for Berri.

However, classy attacking midfielder Dimitri Kanakaris had Barmera in high spirits into the break, putting his side ahead by two goals in stoppage time.

The second half was an onslaught as the Pelicans recorded a massive nine goals, leaving Berri with no answers.

Ebert took his tally to four for the day, and Kosta Zois also bagged a second half hat-trick, aiding Barmera to victory.

Elsewhere, Renmark extended the gap at the top of the ladder, defeating Loxton 3-0 in a controlled performance.

Olympic found goals via Cole Davy, Gareth Johansen, and Andy Son, shifting nine points clear at the top.

Loxton failed to hit the scoreboard, despite the best efforts of Travis O’Shaughnessy, while Damien Crettenden also produced an admirable showing.

Elsewhere, a stunning 10-goal haul from Barmera star Amelia Koumbarakos helped her side to a massive 15-goal win over Berri.

As part of the day, the under 14 girls and women’s teams will play in pink socks, and with pink match balls. A Pink Round Cup will be presented to the winning women’s team.

Blackley said numerous local businesses had also provided prizes for a raffle to be drawn on Monday.

“We’ve been hugely supported by our local businesses and sponsors,” she said.

“For our end of year club fundraiser, we’ve received over 30 amazing prizes, with a portion of the funds raised being donated to BCNA. A special thank you to all the generous businesses who donated.

“We’re hoping to raise \$1500 through this year’s Pink Round. Every dollar counts and will go directly to supporting breast cancer awareness and research. “We encourage everyone to come dressed in pink and help us support this important cause.”

Blackley said local participation numbers for women’s soccer were continuing to increase.

“We’ve seen a huge rise in girls playing the sport, and it’s been incredible to watch the momentum build,” she said.

“A total of 61 girls across all our grades are representing our club this year. It’s the biggest in the Riverland, and the future of women’s soccer looks bright for Renmark Olympic.”

Kayla’s Tsorty-ing her way to WA

CHANCES are that if you have been to a Riverland Football League A grade game over the last seven years, you’ll have made notice of umpiring for all of the right reasons.

The centre point to that reason is Kayla Tsorotiotis, who has been umpiring in the RFL since 2018, but recently took her talents to Western Australia.

The 21-year-old was selected to umpire in the SA Country v WA Country match, at Subiaco Oval, last month, following a successful weekend at the SA Championships, in Port Pirie, a fortnight prior.

“The selection for the state game is from the Country Championships which were held at Port Pirie this year,” Tsorotiotis said.

“The SANFL umpire representatives award the finals appointments based on performance at the championships.

“The three field umpires who are selected to officiate the men’s 1v2 grand final have the opportunity to be selected for the state game which alternates between Adelaide and Perth.

“I received a phone call from SANFL and was asked if I would be interested in heading to the state game, as the umpire of the championships had a very unfortunate injury the weekend before the state game, which meant he was unable to officiate in Perth.

“It was quite a bittersweet moment as the umpire who was selected to go couldn’t due to the injury although I was very excited to be given such a great opportunity.

“I was super excited to attend the state game. It’s an amazing opportunity to umpire some very high-level country football.

“The experience itself was just unreal. The facilities at Subiaco Oval were just incredible.”

When Tsorotiotis isn’t officiating in the RFL, she can be found lending her skills to other associations across the state.

As well as playing netball on Friday nights for the Barmera Netball Club, she is little stranger to both the Yorke Peninsula, and Northern Areas Football Leagues.

“I have experienced the Yorke Peninsula and Northern Areas Football Leagues so far,” she said.

“Each association is so different, and I love experiencing the variation that each have to offer.

“It is really hard to compare them all, because every game of football has its challenges as an official, but I think we are really lucky here in the Riverland.

“We have quality games of football, very respectful players and spectators, and excellent support from the association. There’s nothing more you could ask for.

“The championships is always my favourite weekend of football, and not only is the football amazing, but the umpires and people that attend the champs are just as amazing.

“I love the social side to the champs, making new connections with different umpires from different leagues, and having the opportunity to umpire with different people as well is always a lot of fun.

This year we were able to use radios which was a relatively new experience for me and definitely something I enjoyed this year.”

Tsorotiotis made her way umpiring in football following a friend suggestion, and although it took some convincing, she is grateful for the decision she made.

Despite all of the highlights that umpiring has to offer, she said the abuse the officiating team receive is “unfair and unnecessary”.

“In 2018 I first started mid-way through the season on the boundary after being convinced by the girls who joined at the beginning of the season,” she said.

“I was really not keen on umpiring football but had said to the girls if they enjoyed it I would follow along and give it a go, and I am so glad that the girls convinced me,

because I have loved it ever since.

“It was also really special being able to umpire the girls who I have grown up with, Amelia Magiarapis, Molly Jericho and Claudia Wright, and then later on my little sister Georgia, and Amelia’s siblings, Alexis and Nicholas.

“There are a few challenges (for umpires), but from my perspective and experience I think it is gaining new umpires.

“Umpiring isn’t the most pleasant job in the world, I won’t lie. Being yelled at... is really awful and something I was not used to.

“But it’s not something you should have to get used to, because without us there is no football game.

“I think sometimes passion gets in the way of spectators and people in other official roles.

“But we are really lucky to have the full support of our league to really stamp this

type of behaviour out of our game, and for that I am always grateful. I think our panel is really grateful of that support.”

Despite the challenges faced on a weekly basis, Tsorotiotis said she still recommends umpiring to anyone looking to get involved, with the positives outweighing the negatives.

“There are pros and cons to everything that you do, but there are more pros to umpiring than most think,” she said.

“We have an excellent panel with some amazing people within, and I like to think of our umpiring group more as a little family.

“We have a laugh and a lot of fun at training and in games, and all of our umpires are supportive of one another, and will always have your back on and off the oval.

“If you have ever considered umpiring, come and have a go. The worst that can happen is that you decide that you don’t like it, but you’ll never know if you do enjoy it unless you give it a go.”

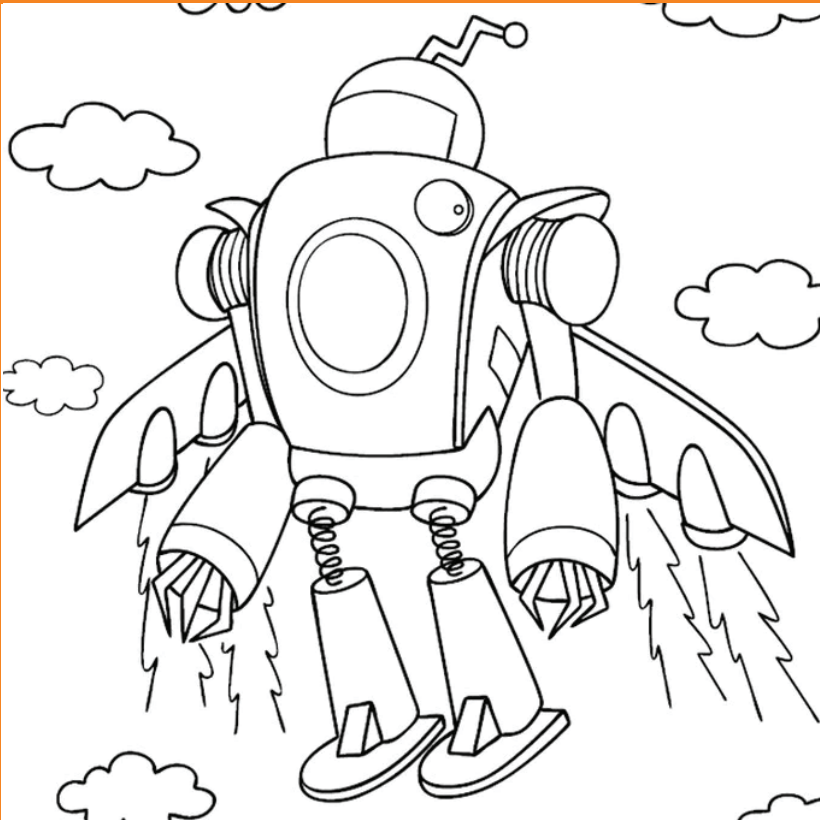

Brown Butter Honey Cakes



METHOD:

1. Preheat oven to 160°C (fan-forced). Line and grease a 12-hole cupcake tray
2. Cream butter and brown sugar until pale and fluffy (4–5 mins). Mix in honey, then eggs one at a time.
3. Add sifted flour and ginger, lemon juice, and mix gently until just combined.
4. Spoon ¼ cup of batter into each case (or ⅓ cup for domed tops). Bake 20–25 mins, then cool for 10–15 mins.
5. For glaze, melt butter, stir in honey and vanilla, then whisk in sifted icing sugar.
6. Glaze cupcakes while still warm.

- 165g unsalted butter, softened
- 100g brown sugar
- 180g (½ cup) Pure Honey
- 3 eggs
- 300g self-raising flour
- 1 ½ tbsp (30ml) lemon juice

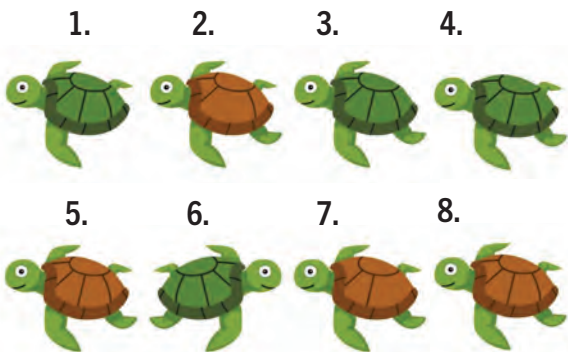
