Riverland council progressing on mission toward ‘financial sustainability’...

BALANCING BBC’S BOOKS



BERRI Barmera Council’s mission to rein in its spending and ensure its “financial sustainability” has gained further momentum.

Just weeks after the council announced it had cut a list of programs from its initial 2024/25 budget, in order to reduce its projected deficit and avoid rate rises, an internal audit process has acknowledged Berri Barmera’s new focus, put in place since the appointment of CEO Tim Pfeiffer in late 2023.

“The controls of the council were improved after the appointment of new management which took place at the end of 2023...” the council’s Audit and Risk Committee said at its recent meeting.

The committee also acknowledged the current administration’s “recent successful efforts to address the financial management issues, internal controls and the financial sustainability of council”.

Kindy Care trial starts in Riverland

A STATE-first trial of after preschool care started in two Riverland preschools last week.

Delivered by Department of Education staff, Loxton Preschool Centre and Renmark North Preschool will trial the initiative of Kindy Care to help support families who need care for their children outside of regular preschool hours of 9am to 3pm.

"Kindy Care will help relieve pressure on working families and provide their children with continuity of care outside of the regular preschool hours," Minister

for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said.

"This an exciting reform that will lead the nation. It builds upon our existing investment into improving government preschool facilities and out of hours care, providing families with greater options and a higher quality of education and care."

"The Royal Commission into Early Education and Care highlighted the need for government preschools to provide care options that meet the changing needs of working families."

"We want to make it

easier for families, who are already facing considerable cost-of-living demands, to access affordable quality care for their children. Supporting people to actively participate in the workforce is a key ambition of these reforms and will have many wide-reaching benefits."

Kindy Care trials will continue into 2025 and provide feedback to determine a broader rollout, with Glossop Community Preschool set to deliver the initiative next year with third party providers.

Bashers go for the Gold Cost

A CONVOY of 72 vehicles took off from the Renmark starting line on Saturday morning for the 36th annual SA Variety Bash.

Traveling more than 3000kms, the eight-day journey through rural Australia to the Gold Cost is aimed at raising \$1.5m for children in need.

"The Bash remains our flagship fundraiser, which helps us meet the ever-

expanding demand of our grants for SA kids in need, their families, other children's charities, schools, hospitals and community groups," Variety SA CEO Mark McGill said.

"In the past year alone, Variety SA has positively impacted the lives of over 88,000 children in South Australia through 244 grants totalling \$6.23m."

Representing the Riverland, the Lyrup team

— Joe Romeo and Sindy Lloyd, with Matthew and Lisa Lloyd — were a "mix of nerves and excitement" for the journey ahead on Saturday morning.

With their Holden Commodore station wagon transformed into the Scooby Doo Mystery Machine Bash Car, all the team had left to do were last minute preparations of "making sure there are enough toys on board to give out to the children and that the car is ready to go".

"We just can't wait to see the kid's smiling faces when we roll into towns," Lisa said.

"We're also excited to meet the other teams and make the kind of friendships for life they've all told us about — they say once you're in the Variety Bash, you are family forever."

Though entering in as rookies for this year's Bash, the team finished 15th out of the convoy in raising \$34,826, earning them the award of a Silver Door Panel — an honour given to cars that raise more than \$22,000.

"We just want to say a huge thank you to the wider community for getting behind us and supporting us — it's amazing what they have done for us," Ms Lloyd said.

sick children, disabled, and those not able to do what we can normally do," he said.


"It wouldn't happen without volunteers."

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

Market update worries the wine industry

RIVERLAND grape growers and wine industry continue to feel economic pressures according to recent figures published by Wine Australia.

A market update meeting hosted by Wine Australia and Riverland Wine, held last week at the Barmera Club, was aimed at providing international sales figures, plus updates on new market opportunities and marketing strategies.

Wine Australia senior analyst Sandy Hathaway said "three out of the last five Australian vintages have been below average in size".

"The red crush (700,000 tonnes) has fallen more than the white average (804,854 tonnes) since 2021 and both warm inland and cool/temperate regions have seen a significant drop in the red crush, but despite the lower crush, red stock levels are still well above average in size".

According to recent data, revenue per hectare of Riverland shiraz has also declined, from almost \$15,000 per hectare in 2021, to an average of \$3500 per hectare in 2024.

Wine Australia market insights manager Peter Bailey said "Riverland chardonnay, Riverland cabernet Sauvignon and Riverland


merlot revenue per hectare has been declining with a slight improvement in 2024".

"One of the causes are the long-term decline in global wine consumption per capita and a growth in premium wines more than offset by steady decline in commercial wines," Mr Bailey said.

"The premiumisation trend is stronger in the domestic market than the international market, while global wine production has exceeded consumption for the past 20 years," Ms Hathaway said.

"Premium wine re-entering mainland China increased the overall export value in 2023-24, but volume of exports are at its lowest since 2003-04, and today's exports to mainland China is still a small fraction of the historical peaks achieved to the market," Mr Bailey said.

Positive results for mobile phone ban in schools

SIGNIFICANT improvements in student behaviour and positive interactions are among results from a ban on phones in schools, including schools in the Riverland.

A recent report from the Department of Education, the mobile phone ban at public secondary schools has generated a 63 per cent decline in critical incidents that involved social media between terms 1 and 2 of 2024, compared to the same period in 2023.

Included in the decrease is cyber bullying, circulation of explicit issues, derogatory content and other concerning online behaviours.

Premier Peter Malinauskas said "as the community grapples more widely with the issue of damage caused by social media platforms, the State Government has taken decisive action to protect young people in school hours to ensure the appropriate use of

devices".

"We knew this was the right thing to do and one year on, the evidence is in, children are playing with each other, not on their phones," Mr Malinauskas said.

The past 18 months also highlighted a decrease in matters reported of students refusing to comply with the policy or their overall behaviour with mobile phones, including kicking or punching.

Principals reported immediate progress and changes in student behaviour, especially around extracurricular activities or clubs to be available in break times.

Data showed a:

- 54 per cent decrease in student behaviour issues during terms one and two of 2024.
- 44 per cent fewer policy compliance issues during terms one and two of 2024.

Election plans already?

IT'S tough being made to watch on from the sidelines.

Ask any athlete about having to watch their teammates from the bench or stands due to being injured and the common answers are that it's a painful and frustrating experience.

It would stand to reason that politicians whose party is in opposition to government – at both state and federal levels – would have similar feelings about being unable to exert their desired influence across their respective electorates.

While the opposition political parties are 100 per cent a necessity for a democratic society such as ours to function properly and fairly, they are unable to shape the state, or nation, to the traditions of their political stances.

Having been in opposition since 2022, our local political figures – who fall into the Liberal Party side of the chamber – too seem to be becoming restless in the side of opposition, and while we could be up to 12 months away from heading to the Federal poll booths, are already making their plans and proposals clear should the Liberal Party regain government.

As was seen in last week's edition of The Murray Pioneer, expanding support for the wine industry has been an early commitment from the Barker MP, and national opposition spokesperson for trade.

This is support that is clearly still needed among the local wine sector, as evidenced by some sentiments – that the oversupply of red wine is predicted to be a continued burden for numerous years – of last week's Riverland Wine meetings, and yesterday's Finlaysons Wine Roadshow in Renmark.

Make no mistake, those running from the opposition know exactly which cracks to try and widen that will relate to their bases of voters, both in regional areas and metropolitan centres.

The next election may be even further away at the State Government level, however the relatively unexpected decision from David Speirs to stand down as SA Liberal Party leader throws an early curveball into the party's preparations.

Vincent Tarzia now takes the spotlight as challenger for the Premier's chair, and with time to become as recognisable across the state as in his local stomping ground of Norwood.

It has only been within the last month that Mr Tarzia was given a tour of the Riverland and a rundown of the current key issues in the region – from our Chaffey MP – and any approach involving a balancing of country and metropolitan priorities will no doubt be favoured in rural areas, where Liberal Party votes are undoubtedly going to be at their strongest.

There's still a long way to go, but as we start the next election races, has one side been quicker from the block?

THE YEARS GO BY



Loxton Olympians Grant (left) and Zachery Schubert have both achieved success representing Australia at the peak of their sport. Grant, son of Bruce and Glanys, was born in 1980 and played hockey as a striker. He was named World Young Hockey Player for 2003, and between 2003 and 2010, represented Australia in nine international events. These included two Olympics, winning a gold medal (Athens, 2004), and bronze (Beijing, 2008), and gold medals at the Commonwealth Games (Melbourne, 2006) and the World Cup (New Delhi, 2010). Zach says that his cousin Grant was a role model for him, inspiring an Olympic dream and talking about training and attitude. Zach, son of Tim and Julie, was born in 1995. He played beach volleyball, representing Australia at the 2024 Paris Olympics. He and his teammate did well in qualifying matches and, though losing a knockout game against USA, creditably 'held their own'. Bruce and Tim are two brothers of five sons and a daughter to Vic and Nita, from Paruna, south of Loxton. Vic was one of 15 children, many of whom did well in various sports. Interestingly Zach now specialises in crickets. Not the sport, but in developing a local industry growing crickets and other insects as renewable sources of protein for human consumption.

A political scam?

A SCAM: Where a payment of a fee for a proposal or idea does not give you a return or a result on that investment.

Last Thursday I attended one of the information meetings regarding the coming vintage and future of the wine grape industry.

Simply put:

- There is a decline in consumption of alcoholic beverages.
- The wine industry is experiencing a steeper decline than other alcoholic beverages.
- Wine grape production exceeds demand on a world market and Australia's is greater than other countries.
- Wine stock levels, particularly red, exceed market requirements.

- Wine-per-litre prices are below a sustainable production level. Reds more so than whites.

- China will not be the market it previously was. Early sales, mainly premium wines, are a restocking phenomenon. There is a very high reduction of wine consumption in China, particularly the commercial bracket.

None of this would be news to any diligent grape grower.

On a Riverland perspective, Riverland Wine has received its fair share of flack regarding a perceived inaction for grower assistance.

Riverland Wine is dedicated, feels the same emotional issues as us, and has some good proposals, but is being stifled by government inaction and ignorance.

Apologies for my little outburst but it comes through frustration and anger in the way the community I have been involved in for 65 years is being treated and ignored.

The Riverland Wine Industry Blueprint has put forward some initiatives that could assist in grape grower viability.

This paper was endorsed by the SA Government, with a government minister being a part of its structure and initiatives.

The government knew that financial assistance would be required to implement the pro-

posals put forward in the paper. The government also presented the blueprint to the grape grower with no financial support available.

Government continues to – via levies and taxes – take money from the grape grower, who should expect some kind of return on those funds.

Those taxes include a considerable financial gain from the compounding tax on every bottle of wine sold.

I believe the State Government has used this blueprint as a scam, and has used hard-working, dedicated locals to instigate it.

So, give/sell us a proposal, take our funds, and we get no return. Does that equal a scam?

One of the main proposals of the blueprint is a stimulus or incentive to transition from the current wine industry practices, either varieties or crops. If you inquire, there is nothing available.

The government has put up \$50,000 for mental health, enough to cover a clinician for three months.

The government has also put up \$250,000 to look into alternatives. I believe administration will use all that.

The grower requires assistance now. The grower is into a new vintage, operating at below-cost returns, facing the prospect of putting grapes on the ground or mothballing the crop, creating more debt and trying to hold a family together.

Some indicative cost figures included \$18,000/ha to mothball vines and \$600/tonne to break even. This includes growers' time at basic wage.

Governments tell us it all takes time.

Well, it didn't take long to spend \$30 million on duplicating an AFL standard oval at Lyndoch when one was just finished at Tanunda.

It took only three months after being elected to change the position of the new Women's and Children's Hospital at a cost of hundreds of millions of dollars, then sneaking the budget costs

into the SAPOL and emergency services budget to cover some of the moving costs.

I believe this jeopardises the effectiveness of our law enforcement and ambulances.

It took only months after being elected for hundreds of millions of dollars to change the design of the Southern Expressway T2D roadway.

I believe the Liberal Party focuses on the big end of town and those wineries, who I understand are doing it tough also.

But the root of the problem is at the supply end: the grower.

Supply needs to be reduced to bring everything back in balance. It is the supply/grower end that is being ignored and neglected.

Articles in The Murray Pioneer and other media, along with inquiries for assistance, have significantly reduced.

Is it complacency, a feeling of hopelessness, or just giving up? I hope it is not a case of isolation and seclusion as that is an indication of depression and if that is the case the government has a far bigger issue than a floundering wine industry.

Responsible for lake's history?

WHAT has been achieved by covering the mussel middens around Lake Bonney?

In my opinion it is a total disaster, with sand bags holding the covering down breaking up and blowing into the lake and the foreign material that filled the bags being scattered everywhere.

Mussel middens are a part of Aboriginal history and are numerous along the Murray and its flood plains. These shells are evident on at least 90 per cent of the shores of Lake Bonney.

Mussel shells on middens at Pike River have been carbon dated at 30,000 years.

One would expect they would be of similar age at Lake Bonney; that is 25,000 years older than the Egyptian pyramids.

Soil erosion and floods that have occurred for thousands of

years have exposed and covered these middens and this will keep happening for thousands of years to come.

Now that the lake has been protected from four-wheel-drive vehicles chopping up the dunes where middens are evident, explanatory signs should be erected explaining to the public what middens are, how the mussels were cooked, and any other information about the 30,000 years of occupation.

Whose responsibility is it to fix this?

Need to keep regions connected

THE State and Federal governments must ensure flight services across regional South Australia are maintained, following news Rex Airlines has entered voluntary administration.

Around 2.5 million people fly with the regional airline every year, and it plays a vital role in connecting remote and regional areas to major cities.

Rex also provides regional South Australians access to essential services such as health-care and education, which might not be readily available locally.

Rex employs around 1500 people nationwide, and there are concerns hundreds of jobs could be axed.

While only flights between capital cities have been affected at this stage, there are fears for the future of Rex's regional operations.

Labor must come up with a plan to ensure routes currently serviced by Rex in South Australia continue if the airline fails.

Rex Airlines is a lifeline for many South Australian regional communities, providing crucial access to services, so the uncertainty surrounding its future is deeply concerning.

While regional flights are still operating – for now – those who rely on these services are worried the airline is on the brink of collapse.

Rex provides services between Adelaide and Port

Lincoln, Mount Gambier, Broken Hill, Ceduna and Coober Pedy, and plays a key role in the social and economic wellbeing of these regions.

For these communities to lose connectivity would be catastrophic, so we cannot allow regional South Australia to be cut off.

Regular, reliable flights are not only vital for our economy but the health and wellbeing of our regions.

Many regional health services are reliant on professionals flying into centres such as Mount Gambier.

It's also important we don't end up with a monopoly on these services, to keep prices competitive for consumers, especially during the cost-of-living crisis.

State and federal Labor need to ensure these services continue for the maintenance of vital health services and for the broader South Australian economy.

The possibility of Rex Airlines ceasing operations is alarming.

Although at this stage Rex is saying that all regional planes are still flying as scheduled, we are truly concerned what the long-term arrangements are going to look like for our communities, and are urging both the State and Federal governments to seriously consider steps they can take to ensure that Rex doesn't fail, because the ramifications would be disastrous for regional South Australia.

TWO Berri Regional Secondary College students have been acknowledged for volunteering hundreds of hours toward the community last week.

Year 11 students Lily Rothe and Felix Harvey were part of the five South Australian students invited to travel to Adelaide last week and receive recognition from Minister for Human Services Nat Cook and Volunteering SA&NT chief executive officer Hamilton Calder for pitching the most community service hours through a new volunteer pilot program.

Funded by the Department of Human Services and supported by the Department for Education with Volunteering SA&NT and the Student Volunteer Army (SVA) New Zealand, the SVA Service Award program is an online platform that allows students to log their volunteer hours and celebrate milestones by achieving bronze, silver, and gold badges.

The initiative began following the Christchurch earthquakes in 2010 in an effort to mobilise students to help with recovery efforts and has now been trialled across six South Australian Secondary schools.

"We're thrilled with the results of the pilot," Volunteering SA&NT chief executive officer Hamilton Calder said.

"Ultimately, we'd love to see the platform used in schools across the state."

"The future of volunteering is in good hands when you see how many hours these students have given back to their communities."

"We've had some wonderful feedback from students. They say the app is easy to use and they appreciate the recognition it provides them for their efforts."

Submitting 18-months worth of donated and ongoing time she had spent at local sporting clubs, the school community, Cottage Homes, and Lions Club to the Volunteering SA&NT platform, Ms Rothe was able to pitch 303 hours of volunteering.

"I have been volunteering since I was in Year 5," Ms Rothe said.

"I really love volunteering because it makes me feel like I am giving back to the community, and also like I am part of it too."

"I help in local sports with coaching Berri Swimming Club's junior Dolphins."

"I also help out at the school with events and the canteen — I really like to work with food so I volunteer with the Lion's Club barbeques too."

Ms Rothe said she owes her passion for community service to her family.

Completing a Certificate II in Hospitality, Mr Harvey said he wants to continue to provide for and interact with the community by becoming a barista and opening a café. Ms Rothe said giving back was too at the top of her future priorities, planning and preparing to study medicine at University.

"Like volunteering, it will let me help the community," Ms Rothe said.

Council's 'financial sustainability' mission...

Balancing BBC's books

BERRI Barmera Council's mission to rein in its spending and ensure its "financial sustainability" has gained further momentum.

Just weeks after the council announced it had cut a list of programs from its initial 2024/25 budget, in order to reduce its projected deficit and avoid rate rises, an internal audit process has acknowledged Berri Barmera's new focus, put in place since the appointment of CEO Tim Pfeiffer in late 2023.

"The controls of the council were improved after the appointment of new management which took place at the end of 2023..." the council's Audit and Risk Committee said at its recent meeting.

The committee also acknowledged the current administration's "recent suc-

cessful efforts to address the financial management issues, internal controls and the financial sustainability of council".

The council's annual business plan for 2024/25 forecast an operating surplus of just \$21,700, after planned "operating savings" of over \$450,000.

Mayor Ella Winnall said the audit committee's comments reflected "a lot of work to get things back on track".

"We still have a lot of work to do, but it's great to see the work of the administration has been recognised by the audit committee and in particular from independent members," Mayor Winnall said.

"Obviously the community expect good financial management at council, and it's been a priority for the elected members in making sure the rate-payers' money is treated with

the utmost respect and delivers good value for the community."

In a joint overview contained in Berri Barmera's annual business plan, Mr Pfeiffer and Mayor Winnall said delivering essential services, including flood-recovery efforts, renewing community assets and tackling high-priority projects, "must be achieved in a financially constrained environment, with a modest increase in rates..."

Among the defunded projects cut from the council's original 2024/25 budget were the Loveday Internment Camp (\$53,877) and the Rally for the Riverland initiative (\$50,000).

A total of \$453,775 of cuts were outlined and subsequently supported by elected members.

Brett's burgers named SA's best

RIVERLAND residents are being reminded to prepare gardens ready for spring as the region continues the fight against fruit fly.

While no new Queensland fruit fly outbreaks have been declared in the Riverland since early March 2024, with spring just around the corner, the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) is urging residents to clean up their gardens in preparation of the warmer weather.

PIRSA incident controller of the fruit fly emergency Jason Size encouraged Riverland residents to channel their inner gardener and get their hands dirty to protect their garden against

fruit fly.

"As we prepare to enter Spring, remember to pick, collect, check, call," he said.

"When out in the garden, make sure to pick your ripe fruit and vegetables as soon as possible and prune your fruit trees so you can pick them more easily next season."

"Check your fruit and vegetables for any blemishes and call the Fruit Fly Hotline on 1300 666 010 if you spot anything in your garden."

"Remember to also collect fallen fruit off the ground and dispose of it correctly by double bagging it in two sealed plastic bags and put it in a general waste bin."

Riverland residents and produce growers are reminded they can search their address on the fruit fly interactive map online (fruitfly.sa.gov.au/outbreak-map) to see how fruit and vegetable movement restrictions affect them depending on where they live, travel, work or go to school. It also provides information on what they need to do within the 1.5km red outbreak area and 15km yellow suspension areas.

The total number of outbreaks in the Riverland remains at 51. Of the Riverland outbreak areas, 28 have been without any detections in the last 12 weeks, with some recording no detections for more than a year.

The end date for all Riverland

outbreaks is currently 23 December, however, the outbreak end date depends on no fruit flies being detected in red outbreak or yellow suspension areas for at least 12 weeks.

In order to meet area freedom requirements, fruit fly eradication activities and restrictions on fruit movement in the Riverland are likely to continue beyond the outbreak end date.

Current sterile fly (SIT) releases are occurring at Renmark, Renmark North, Renmark South, Renmark West, Renmark West, Chaffey, Cooltong and Paringa until 2 September.

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Riverland students jump (and play) for joy

RIVERLAND Special School students from Foundation to Year 12 will now be able to enjoy a gymnastics program which has been revived through grant funding.

The school was awarded \$5000 from Credit Union SA's School Impact Program, with the funding to cover the cost of two instructors at the Riverland Gymnastics Academy so students can attend regular sessions for the remaining semester.

"The School Impact Program is something new just launched this year by Credit Union SA," Credit Union SA senior manager brand and business development Joann Skene said.

"We wanted to provide a fairer way for all schools to access funding for important projects that sometimes slip through the cracks of traditional fundraising like school fates or raffle tickets."

"We know it is increasingly hard with cost of living, and we know that will continue. This funding helps to top up schools so they can provide facilities or activities for kids to do at school without having to ask parents put their hands in their pockets."

Providing funding between \$2000 to \$20,000, the School Impact Program

aims to support activities that include:

- Equipment or facility upgrades on campus.
- Student experiences such as school camps or excursions.
- Teacher wellbeing including training, or student support such as lunch or sporting programs.

"We transfer it so (the schools) can start spending it straight away. We don't ask for receipts because we trust that the schools know how to manage funds," Ms Skene said.

"It's basically a quick top up of extra fundraising money that lets the school leadership teams, principals, and curriculum leaders give back where it's needed."

Junior Primary teacher Sarah Gaylard said that Riverland Special School were excited to provide access to a gymnastics program that would run for longer than just a few weeks.

"The school is always grateful for funding that supports students to engage in activities and opportunities," Ms Skene said.

"When we told them all that they would be doing gymnastics at the end of last term, there were lots of very excited faces."

"They're so glad to be back... as this is something our SRC have consistently highlighted as a key interest

of students."

The Riverland Special School was one of 15 South Australian schools that received funding from Credit Union SA.

"We support regional schools exactly the same as metropolitan schools," Ms Skene said.

"When the first round went live in January, we had over 300 applications from schools and over 50 per cent came from the country and regional schools."

"Our judging panel, which included a Department for Education executive member, came and sat in and looked at the short-listed applicants and

saw where the need would have the greatest impact.

"When we awarded the funding, we were able to give it to 15 of those schools — 10 of the 15 were regional schools which was just fantastic."

Ms Gaylard said the funding has allowed the school to enhance its PE program, and also provide benefits for the children's overall wellbeing.

"It's great for their gross motor development, and development of fundamental movement skills which are things like jumping, balancing, skipping, hopping," she said.

"It's also been a great opportunity for the kids to

September.

"Well you can just see the smiles on their faces... we're very thankful to Credit Union SA for this funding opportunity."

Ms Skene said Credit Union SA plans for the School Impact Program to provide \$1m in funding to South Australian schools across the next 10 years.

"\$71,000 was given in that first round," she said.

"Our goal is to deliver \$100,000 a year... we would like to give more than \$40,000 for the second round so we would well achieve that goal."

Credit Union SA encourage schools to enquire about the second round before applications close on 13


September.

"It is a very simple process," Ms Skene said.

"It takes around 3 to 4 minutes to complete online and it just needs to be a member of school leadership team that applies."

Chinese exports driving almond demand

RIVERLAND almond producers are among those economically benefitting from increased overseas exports into China.

Australian almond exports remain on record pace after the first four months of the 2024-25 selling season.

The Almond Board of Australia's (ABA) latest monthly Position Report revealed overall almond sales are up by more than 10 per cent compared to the same time last season, while exports are up by over 14 per cent.

Sales into China have

been the major factor. Improved quality and greater availability after what appears to be a record-sized crop has led to increased buyer activity and increased volumes.

Sales compared to last year have more than doubled and remain the engine room of the almond marketing campaign.

Pricing has returned to far more sustainable levels when combined with the lower exchange rate with the US dollar.

Indian sales have been subdued in comparison but remain virtually on par with

last year's record volumes, while additional marketing focus on Asia Pacific countries has resulted in increased activity.

For the first time the industry has sold almost 50,000 tonnes in the first four months and is well placed to deliver significantly improved returns to growers.

The pre-season crop estimate for the season was 164,700 tonnes. The ABA is due to announce the season's actual intake next month.

When I never understood why

AT certain times when you're a kid, the whole world can seem a mystery. You're going along nicely then something unexpected happens, punctuating your previously innocent, contented existence.

I never discovered why Loxton had two football teams when it wasn't even the biggest Riverland town. That's a big sacrifice and big contribution.

Why did town kids walk to the drive-in? I felt sorry for them, heading home with blankets wrapped around them late at night once the movie had finished. Where were their parents? How far did they walk?

The Trumper sisters had great voices, but choosing to sing "The things that you're liable to read in the Bible, ain't necessarily so" at the church concert left a child's mind wondering.

Talking about church, why did our pastor accept a call to another congregation? We liked him and I thought he liked us.



Elvis Presley had everything – good looks, fame and adulation, unthinkable wealth, and an angel-sent voice – so why the addiction to drugs? I knew he'd be fine if he just came and stayed with us on the block for a while.

After all that drudgery, some kids didn't get paid by their parents for cutting apricots and that seemed unjust. Fair enough, some families went on big holidays instead, but my preference was for the money.

Soon, months after the world watched the astronauts land on the moon, we heard on the news that lots of Americans thought the landing was just filmed on a movie set. Talk about being on another planet.

Just as I was at peace with gentle-on-my-mind Cat Stevens, Bread, and Simon and Garfunkel, all those peaceful sensibilities were confronted by AC/DC, Black Sabbath, and Led Zeppelin. I actually knew some high school kids who paid money for that.

Stronger powers to ensure fair water use

A SENIOR government figure says ensuring water resources are used sustainably across the Murray-Darling Basin, including in the Riverland, is a key priority.

Inspector-General of Water Compliance (IGWC) Troy Grant earlier this month outlined expectations for fair water use across the Murray-Darling Basin.

Mr Grant said sustainable diversion limit compliance assessments for the 2022-23 water year failed to produce "a complete picture".

"I'm checking Basin states are only taking an agreed, environmentally sustainable amount of water from the system to maintain a healthy Basin for all users across agriculture, the environment, First Nations and communities," Mr Grant said.

"Yes, all reported jurisdictions were compliant but I'm not satisfied it's conclusive.

"NSW couldn't be assessed due to unac-

credited water resource plans (WRPs).

"Mechanisms like the SDL assessment can't be enforced without WRPs and are central to a successful Basin Plan."

NSW currently operates under a bilateral agreement allowing its SDL models to change yearly, however this will be prohibited when WRPs are in place.

"There were zero WRPs in NSW when I called this out in 2022 and I'm pleased the state is on the right track to uphold its share of water compliance, with 16 of 20 WRPs now accredited and operational," Mr Grant said.

"This means the missing piece of the Basin-wide picture in SDL compliance will start coming to light in my next assessment. Make no mistake, I will hold jurisdictions to account."

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
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AC Parrott to provide our JPs with police insights

'Upgrades and enthusiasm' with 32 days to go

INDUSTRY support, course upgrades and continued enthusiasm are marking the official countdown to the 2024 Mindarie-Halidon cup meeting.

Just 32 days remain until the event, to be held at the Halidon racecourse on Sunday 15 September.

The Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club's committee and band of volunteers have been busy doing their annual preparations for the meeting, however this year's lead-up has also included a substantial renovation at the historic course.

The ageing bar facility has been demolished and replaced with a new \$50,000 structure, jointly funded by the club and thoroughbred racing's state body, Racing SA.

Finishing touches are being put to the structure, which will offer better and "more efficient" conditions for workers,

plus an extra shade area and superior services for patrons.

"It's looking great out at the track," said club president Geoff Redden.

"The new bar will be a welcome race-day addition and an asset for us going forward."

"But we've put in a lot of additional work, particularly over the past month, to make sure the course is looking its best for our meeting."

Mr Redden said both Racing SA and industry participants had already pledged their support for the club, which was devastated by the race-day cancellation of the 2023 meeting due to a freak – and "never-to-be repeated" – on-track irrigation leak.

"Racing SA and their dedicated country racing body, Country Racing SA, have both been amazing," Mr Redden said.

"They have supported the club incredibly well over the past year, including the final few months leading up to our 2024 meeting."

"Thankfully, the industry participants – trainers, jockeys and so on – have indicated they're eager to return to Halidon this year to help make our meeting a success."

"I guess when you had a situation like last year, you worry a bit, so we're grateful and relieved to know those key players are right behind us."

"The final piece in the puzzle will be the attendance of racegoers from across the Mallee, the Riverland and beyond, so we're rolling out the red carpet and inviting them to come back again this year."

"The committee and all our members and supporters can't wait to host this year's meeting on 15 September. We've

actually got a major working bee on Sunday 25 August, from 10am, with a barbecue lunch supplied, so we're hoping to get a few workers along on that day to help move things along further."

Despite the race-day cancellation, a bumper crowd of 2000-plus people rolled up for the 2023 meeting. Mr Redden said the best way to obtain tickets for the 2024 event was to book online via Moshtix.

"But some tickets will also be available at the gate," Mr Redden said.

Local faces at water resource conference

LOCAL mayors and a senior irrigation industry figure participated in discussions of how to approach South Australia's future water use at a major conference.

Riverland Irrigation Trust CEO Rosalie Auricht, District Council of Loxton Waikerie (DCLW) Mayor Trevor Norton, and Mid Murray Council Mayor Simone Bailey,

were among local attendees at the Securing South Australia's Water Future event – hosted by the Committee for Economic Development of Australia – in Adelaide.

Ms Auricht said discussion of how to decrease reliance on River Murray water resources was a highlight.

"It provided an opportunity to hear from the State Government, public sector leaders and aca-

demia highly invested in the water space," Ms Auricht said.

"A key announcement was that SA Water has committed to cap its reliance on the River Murray at the current level.

"This means that water for future growth across the State must be found in other ways. 31GL has already been found in the Adelaide area through better management, reduced evaporation, recycling and reuse of stormwater.

"Two desalination plants are planned to be commissioned for (the) Eyre Peninsula, an area that has had increasing reliance on the River Murray for its water supply.

"Anything that reduces reliance on the River Murray, while supporting state growth, is good news for our Riverland irrigation communities."

An RDA statement on the event said "our region has been working with the SA Government

on developing a business case for significant change under the Murray-Darling Basin Plan, which was acknowledged in the keynote speech".

"We look forward to the discussions we have helped to organise between SA Ministers, government agencies, and regional stakeholders," the statement read.

"It is great to see our region coming together to transform the future of water security."

Survey shows sustainability crucial for grain

DATA from a state survey has shown an increasing focus on sustainability among grain growers, including those in the Riverland.

Grain Producers SA (GPSA) last week released results of the 2023 South Australian Grain Industry Environmental Sustainability Survey.

Almost 160 grain producers across the state participated in the 2023, with 64 per cent of respondents agreeing that sustainability is a critical issue. More producers also believe that sustainability will be crucial for market access in the next five years.

GPSA chief executive officer Brad Perry said the results reflected an "ongoing shift in attitudes and actions towards sustainability within the industry".

"The findings from the survey underscore the proactive steps many South Australian grain producers are already taking to improve sustainability on their farm," Mr Perry said.

"From managing pests and weeds effectively to enhancing soil health and maximising energy use, it is clear through the findings from this survey that South Australia's grain producers are leading the way in sustainable farming practices.

"GPSA remains committed to supporting grain producers in their sustainability journey and will continue to advocate for policies and practices that enhance productivity and profitability, while enhancing the sustainability credentials of the South Australian grain industry."

Key highlights from the survey report included:

- 66 per cent of respondents are getting their sustainability information from agronomists (a significant increase from 31 per cent in 2022).
- 93 per cent have taken some form of action on environmental sustainability.
- Those who feel that climate variability has impacted on their property or farming practices rose by 7 per cent and those who don't feel the changing climate is hav-

ing an effect dropped from 45 per cent in 2022, to 37 per cent in 2023.

- Those that believe access to genetically modified (GM) crops is important in achieving sustainability increased to 47 per cent, with 24 per cent disagreeing.
- 20 per cent agree that carbon farming is an important opportunity.
- 50 per cent reported using weather station networks to plan and manage applications, a significant increase over the 17 per cent who reported using weather station networks in 2022.
- 54 per cent of respondents reported actions to improve nutrition efficiency.
- 73 per cent are actively managing wind and soil erosion.

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Sally's equine adventure entertains WAB ladies

IN 2022 Sally Black and Les Webb sold their home at Paringa and took to the road with their caravan and two dogs. They had registered their resumes with Aussie House Sitters and had 18 months to fill before their new home at Riverside Renmark was completed. Sally's considerable experience with horses and cattle gave them broader options.

After visiting Ouyen and Bendigo their first 'sit' was at Seymour, north of Melbourne, a beautiful area of trees, hills and wildlife. A stone chateau-style house was their home for six weeks and they were responsible for two horses, sheep, cattle, a cat and a dog. On Sunday mornings they were awakened to an artillery serenade from nearby Puckapunyal Army Camp. They were assured the cows in calf would not be giving birth during their stay, however 10 of 11 pregnant cows dropped their calves.

The next 'sit' was a 40-acre property in Bright for three wet weeks where they lived in their van and had to feed two horses, cows, calves and a three-legged dog. The livestock was fed on bread and products

from the local bakery and it was a daily duty to feed the rosellas and magpies. There was an opportunity to visit family on the ski slopes of Falls Creek and catch up with friends in the Kiewa Valley. A wet visit was made to Corryong, which has a yearly Man from Snowy River Bush Festival and hosts many regular horse events.

A five-month 'sit' was made at Metung, living in a three-room cottage overlooking Lake King. Idyllic views in every direction took in seaside, grazing lands, valleys and mountains. Their charges were six horses, cows and sheep. Sally's favourites were Tiny, a 24-year-old Clydesdale, and a 34-year-old toothless moulting pony named Zeke.

Shepparton was a four-week 'sit' looking after a fat pony named Lolly. Health issues necessitated a return to SA and a five-week stay in Mount Pleasant in an old converted dairy, caring for two dogs, one cat, a 25-year-old horse named Arthur and 25 named sheep. Deer were a consistent problem as they came at nightfall to raid gardens and orchards.

The next 'sit' for two weeks at Aldinga Beach was different, caring for 22 exotic colourful birds that lived in the sitting room and talked all night. There was dismay when one escaped and tremendous relief when it returned the next day.

The last 'sit' was for six weeks in a new home in Nuriootpa, caring for a schnauzer named Herman. All 'sits' came with their own personalised care instructions and Herman's comprised eight pages of highly detailed care.

Following Sally's talk the AGM was held and office bearers elected are Heather Everingham (president), Jenny Curtis (vice-president), Sally Black/Jocie Cooper (secretary) Ruth Patton (treasurer), Di Scheiner (raffles) and Elaine Leedham (gifts). The WAB state theme for 2024/25 is Life is for Living, project is Operations Flinders for Girls and country of study is Egypt.

Australian documentary seeks 1000 rural women

THE voices of Riverland women are being sought for a new documentary on Australia's rural, regional, and remote communities.

Rural Daughters, a feature-length documentary by CheekyMac Productions, will follow the personal journeys of Australian rural women in their efforts to overcome barriers, effect change, and live a successful, purpose-driven life in the regions.

In addition to their stories, a nation-wide 1000 Rural Women Survey has been developed to capture the experiences of rural women on a broad range of topics from national disasters, health and domestic violence, societal attitudes, racial prejudice, tall poppy syndrome, community lie, leadership, and female role models.

The documentary and survey were born from

producer, director, and writer Dannielle McAlpine Johnson, who is from Gippsland, Victoria.

Ms McAlpine Johnson said she aims to garner more than 1000 survey responses to provide a statistical snapshot of rural women.

"Surveying 1000 rural women is a bold target, but we hope women take this opportunity to tell us about their lives and be a part of a collective voice in the Rural Daughters story," she said.

"These women are the backbone of rural Australia and we are putting our heart and soul into telling their stories — how they overcome adversity, find purpose, break limitations and lead in their communities in the most unique and innovative ways."

Commissioned by the Community Enterprise Foundation, the survey has been developed by

Federation University's Collaborative Evaluation and Research Centre together with CheekyMac Productions — both organisations led by rural women.

"Our involvement in this documentary is an opportunity to showcase that a regionally based university can make a difference with regional communities and, in particular, advocate for rural women on issues that matter," CERC professor Joanne Porter said.

The documentary and survey results are expected to be used to inform policy and develop educational resources in Australian schools.

Environmental benefits to be provided by new wetland

FOLLOWING its revitalisation, a major local wetland will be available for all Riverlanders and visitors to the region.

Under the National Water Grid Fund's Connections Funding Pathway, the Waikerie Hart Lagoon Wetland will officially reopen 20 August, at 1.30pm, with an event aimed to celebrate everyone

involved in the project.

District Council of Loxton Waikerie chief executive officer David Beaton said "The new wetland rehabilitates the old Waikerie effluent ponds and creates a significant environmental asset for the community".

The new wetland system will receive and treat stormwater runoff

from surrounding areas, generating significant environmental benefits and providing the community with new walking trails, bird watching in the bird hide, a nature play area, a new shelter and a board walk.

"The treatment of the water via the wetland and filtration system will mean the stormwater can be converted to Class A water for safe

irrigation along the riverfront," Mr Beaton said.

Other important benefits include:

- Improved water quality
- Reduced impact of stormwater on local waterways and ecosystems.
- Promotion of sustainable water use practices.

- Local water use for irrigation, firefighting and industrial processes.
- Reduced demand for potable water.
- Reduced risk of flooding and erosion.
- Community protection from the impact of storms and floods.

Last chance for Riverland youth to have their say

MISSION Australia is calling on Riverland youth to have their say in the Youth Survey 2024 before it closes on 16 August.

Annually collecting responses from young people between the ages of 15 and 19 nation-wide, the survey will explore the thoughts, personal concerns, and what young Australians see as important.

Mission Australia SA state director Sue Budalich said young people must be listened to and their concerns taken seriously.

"In the 2023 Youth Survey, many South Australian young people told us that they've experienced discrimination or unfair treatment," Ms Budalich said.

"Young people should be able to freely express themselves and Mission Australia strives to ensure our services are safe and supportive spaces for everyone."

The results of the survey are published in November and shared with schools, across the non-profit sector and with all levels of

government, to influence and inform policies, services and programs that support and affect young people.

In 2023, nearly 1700 young people in South Australia completed the survey, naming the environment (44 per cent), equity and discrimination (33 per cent), and the economy and financial matters (32 per cent) as the issues they believe are most important in Australia.

The survey includes questions on mental health and wellbeing, sources of support and community connections, housing and financial situation, climate change, and personal concerns such as body image, bullying, discrimination and stress.

Additional focus areas for 2024 are social media use, loneliness and opinions relating to alcohol and drugs.

Boost to local tourism products and experiences

OPERATORS of Riverland environmental tourism businesses can apply for an ongoing funding program.

The \$2m allocation is part of the State government's Experience Nature Tourism Fund.

Created to support new nature-based tourism within the region, the funding initiative is set to deliver \$500,000 each year, over four financial years.

A total of 33 innovative experiences and nature tourism products have been supported to date, increasing business presence and attracting a growing number of domestic and international visitors.

Minister for Tourism Zoe Bettison said "We want to share our state's incredible natural landscapes, rich cultural history and stunning wildlife with domestic and international travellers in a responsible and sustainable way."

Experiences or products need to be near a national park, reserve, wilderness protection area or marine park.

"This is a great

opportunity for operators wanting to enhance or develop a nature-based tourism offering that will deliver an experience in our natural environment" Ms Bettison said.

Under the previous two rounds, almost \$1.6m was awarded to 33 projects. This included accommodation refurbishments, marketing support and advertising or the purchase of equipment for tours and experiences including walking, e-bikes, wellness and photography.

"As we continue to work to grow visitor numbers, I encourage South Australian tourism businesses to consider an application to the Experience Nature Tourism Fund" Ms Bettison Said.

Round three of the South Australian Tourism Commission's Experience Nature Tourism Fund closes on Friday 16 August.

10 years of certainty for new South Australian construction code

NO further changes to the new National Construction Code (NCC), which includes homes in the Riverland, were among announcements made by the State Government last week.

Following the implementation of new construction standards in South Australia, home-builders raised concerns about future changes to the NCC that could impact business.

The State Government has committed to maintaining the new standards of the NCC for the next 10 years, aiming to provide a long-term certainty to the industry.

From 1 October, all newly built homes in South Australia need to be seven-star energy efficient and the State Government has worked closely with the housing and construction industry to formulate an effective pathway to ease the transition into the new NCC liveability and accessibility regulations.

Minister for Housing and Urban Development Nick Champion said "the changes to the NCC seek to deliver better living standards to South Australians, with the government acknowledging the need for greener, more accessible homes".

"As a government, we also realise this is a big change for the building and construction sector, so I have worked closely with industry associations to develop a range of concessions to help ease into the new regulations," Mr Champion said. The new NCC standards were due to commence nationwide in May 2023, but recognising the current pressures of the industry, including market capacity, supply chain disruptions and workforce shortages, the commencement date was updated to 1 October.

Different housing affordability provisions have been made that include:

- Any development application for a house or apartment that has been lodged prior to 1 October will be considered under NCC 2019.
- Allotments having a frontage of less than, or equal to 10m, or irregular allotments with an area of less than 300m will not be required to comply with Liveable Housing Design provisions.
- An exemption from the Liveable Housing Designs provisions for small buildings less than, or equal to, 60m that are built

offsite.

- Workers and tourist accommodation will continue to operate under the energy efficiency provisions of NCC 2019.
- An exemption from installing a toilet on the entry level where there are no habitable rooms located on that level.
- Applications for building rules consent submitted prior to 1 January 2027, on allotments for which a development application for land division had been lodged prior to 1 January 2024 can be considered under NCC 2019.
- A concession on the energy efficiency requirements for lightweight and transportable homes

Greater consideration will be given to accessible designs that allow for South Australians with mobility limitations to transition through life stages in their own homes.

There will be a scheduled review of these regulations after 18 months to ensure that the proper transition methods from NCC 2019 to NCC 2022 are being carried out.

Last hoorah for single-use plastics

BUSINESSES across the Riverland are being encouraged to get themselves ready for the next stage of South Australia's single-use plastic ban.

Businesses are required to move towards greener alternatives this month and use up existing stock of soon-to-be banned items.

Certified 'bioplastic' food and beverage containers will be allowed with certified compostable bags.

Food scraps will have to be put in the green bin, which will be processed into after compost used by SA farmers, growers and the local wine industry.

South Australia has been addressing the real impact associated with single-use plastics and numerous harmful plastic products, being the first state in Australia to implement a ban.

SA now has the largest number of banned items since the current single-use plastic ban was initiated in 2021.

Banned items include:

- Plastic barrier bags for fruit, vegetables, nuts and confectionery.
- Thick plastic bags including supermarket or boutique-style plastic bags and singlet-style takeaway bags.
- Single-use plastic hot and cold beverage containers (including coffee cups) and their lids, including single-use plastic food containers for ready-to-eat takeaway food.
- Expanded polystyrene (EPS) consumer food and beverage containers.
- EPS trays.
- Plastic food bag tags, and plastic confetti and plastic balloon sticks/ties.

The Plastic Free SA Program will deliver free support to local businesses.

"I've recently come back from Tasmania with the Australian Masters Championships, and although we didn't do extremely well results wise, it was good fun to have a hit."

Montgomery's earnest yet absurd take on a classic game show host is delightful to witness, teasing and taunting his guests with double entendres, surreptitious synonyms and trick questions.

Tonight's premiere sees Tom Gleeson, Urzila Carlson, Nazeem Hussain and Danielle Walker attempt to work out how many 'z's are in "pizzazz", before facing a challenge inspired by Australian currency and trying to make their hometowns proud, with the winner returning next week as carryover champ.

Later episodes feature Wil Anderson, Peter Helliar, Steph Tisdell, Tim Minchin, Luke McGregor, Geraldine Hickey and a slew of up-and-coming comedians sure to lighten up your Wednesday evening.
