Major local businesses struggling with rising electricity bills...

THE sustainability of Riverland horticulture is being pressured by “unavoidable” increases to electricity costs, according to numerous local business figures.

The Advertiser reported on

Monday a number of notable Riverland businesses were struggling with “surging power bills”.

Nippy’s joint managing director Ben Knispel said costs had increased despite attempts to use less electricity.

It is understood Nippy’s was

invoiced \$51,600 last June, for 260,073kw/h of electricity use at its Moorook plant.

However, this month the company’s invoice was \$109,580.10 – including almost \$34,350 of market or network charges – despite using almost 6,200 less kilowatt hours.

Nippy’s has also invested almost \$1m on solar panels, energy efficient lighting and special pump equipment.

“It just would be nice if we had reliable power 24 hours a day and grid stability because it’s a mess,” Mr Knispel said.

The motorcyclist, a 40-year-old man from Renmark, was taken to hospital with serious injuries, while a 37-year-old man from Chaffey was uninjured.

The road remained closed while SAPOL investigated the circumstances surrounding the crash, but was reopened sometime later in the evening.

Berri woman on drug charges after traffic stop

A WOMAN was arrested last Thursday after suspected controlled drugs were found in her vehicle.

At 2.45am, on Thursday 22 August, police stopped a 34-year-old woman driving a Nissan station wagon on Gordon Road, Gurra Gurra, near Berri.

Police directed the woman to a roadside drug test and conducted a search of her vehicle, where 56grams of a crystalline substance, suspected to be methamphetamine, were located.

The Berri woman was reported with failing to allow a sample of oral fluid analysis and charged with trafficking in a controlled drug and hindering police officials.

The woman was refused bail, her car was impounded for 28 days and she appeared at the Berri Magistrates Court on Friday, where she will reappear on 29 August.

Renmark man pulling vines as uncertainty continues for growers feeling... **'CRUCIFIED'**

A RIVERLAND grape grower has begun pulling his vines – describing it as a “nightmare” – amid uncertainty surrounding prices and a lack of supportive industry action.

Renmark West-based grower Ray Hartigan, 80, said he could no longer justify the impacts of poor economic returns.

“Financially I just can’t afford it,” Mr Hartigan said.

“I’m on a fixed income with superannuation, and I bought this (property) so I wouldn’t have to go chasing a pension.

“But I’ve done nothing but subsidise the wine industry, with all the fixed costs.

“There are no margins. It costs me \$350 a tonne to produce, and last year they offered to pay \$150 (at tonne). The year before they offered \$250 and only paid a percentage of that.”

Mr Hartigan – a Vietnam War veteran and long-time prominent figure in the Renmark RSL sub-branch – said a lack of action from both governments and the industry was still increasing pressure on growers.

“We’re here because of short-term policy, and a lack of integrity in the commercial world,” he said.

“The wineries have done nothing but crucify us.

“Policy in general has been about being re-elected, not what’s

good for industry.

“The separation of water from land is stupid; the (water) buybacks are short-term solutions, so how can you plan for the future?

“I also feel absolutely peeved by the behaviour of (wineries). They’ve been totally dishonest and they’re not good corporate citizens.”

Mr Hartigan said a majority of an estimated \$350,000 of growing infrastructure on his property – including posts, wires and polyethylene irrigation piping – would now be wasted.

“These vines are in a prime state, and to prepare to pull them out I’ve got to go through and cut every wire on every vine, and on the irrigation,” he said.

“It’s about \$6000 per hectare to remove it. I’ve been working on it for a month and a half.

“It gets worse, because (the posts) can’t be recycled. They will be stacked on my property ad infinitum.

“The ‘poly’... I’ve got to roll those up and take them to the dump. It’s a nightmare the whole thing and I’m on a small scale.”

Mr Hartigan said the wider Riverland economy had suffered due to the wine industry’s challenges.

“There’s people far worse off than me, but it’s a trickle-down effect,” he said.

“I was going to buy a new sprayer this year. I’m busy repair-

ing a 50-year-old tractor at the moment because I’m not going to buy a new one.

“All that comes out of the economy. Normally we injected about \$100,000 per year.”

Mr Hartigan said growers and businesses both needed financial stability to ensure agricultural communities remained sustainable.

“I’m sick of being told I’m living in an economy, I want to live in

a community,” he said.

“That’s a two-way deal, and you just don’t keep taking low-hanging fruit and squeezing it.

“They are protecting their margins.”

SA Water bonuses 'fly in the face' of Riverland

FINANCIAL bonuses paid to a state utility in recognition of efforts throughout the recent flood have been described as "self-indulgent" by a senior Riverland politician.

Figures released last weekend showed almost \$1m worth of bonuses were paid to SA Water staff for work done during the 2022-23 River Murray flood.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said Riverland communities were still seeing impacts from the flood event.

"It seems to be the way that governments... like to pat themselves on the back," Mr Whetstone said.

"We accept that if they do good things for

the region, particularly during a natural disaster like the 2022-23 floods.

"But when they are giving themselves significant renumeration for patting themselves on the back, I think that flies in the face."

"There are still unresolved issues that remain from the impacts from the flood, particularly to the Riverland."

Mr Whetstone said emergency service crews and volunteer groups had also been key to the flood recovery effort.

"It shows how insular SA Water in particular is," he said.

"I would have thought the flood recovery fund and all the government initiatives to support flood-affected communities should be front and centre."

"Yet we've got an ongoing (and) self-indulgent-type process."

Riverland-based MLC, opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, and chair of a Parliamentary Inquiry into the Murray River Flooding event, Nicola Centofanti, said "directly supporting the communities affected by the floods" would have been a better use of the funding.

"It is absolutely outrageous that while families along the River Murray are struggling to rebuild their lives, SA Water executives are being rewarded with taxpayer-funded bonuses," Dr Centofanti said.

"This is a slap in the face to those who were denied relief funding because they didn't meet the Government's narrow eligibility criteria."

"These bonuses are a clear indication that the Government is out of touch with the realities faced by those on the ground. We are calling for the Government to put people before bonuses."

However, and SA Water spokesperson said "a large part of our organisation was involved in a significant volume of extraordinary and ongoing work to prepare and respond to the River Murray flooding emergency".

"One-off performance allowances are made to SA Water employees in recognition of an individual's work during a financial year, which is deemed above and beyond their usual role or tasks," the spokesperson said.

"In 2023-24, around 900 of our people received this incentive payment, relating to performance in 2022-23."

"Performance allowances that year were between 1.5 and 2.5 per cent on top of a 1 per cent increase through our enterprise agreement. Above-target payments made for 2022-23 represent around 0.07 per cent of our operating costs."

"All performance allowances are approved by the SA Water board, with the scope and relevance of payments reviewed on a regular basis."

Minister for Housing and Urban Development Nick Champion said "all performance allowances were paid to staff earning under \$130,000 per annum, with the average performance allowance being \$985".

"Everyone saw the images and devastation caused by the River Murray flood event and SA water staff worked incredibly hard to support the community," Mr Champion said.

"Performance allowances are not paid to senior staff, executives or board members."

"No politician should sit in an air-conditioned office, pontificating how frontline workers should be paid to keep our sewers flowing."

"I have offered the shadow ministers the chance to roll up their sleeves and join me to see the daily struggles our workers face having to clear tonnes of tree roots and wet wipes from our sewer network."

Council provides response to call for better communication

LOXTON Waikerie council has responded to Waikerie resident Vin Dowd's open letter calling for better communication with the community.

Mr Dowd penned an open letter – contained within today's edition of The Murray Pioneer – following community debate regarding the removal of Waikerie's orange bins.

Director of commercial and community services Andrew Waters provided this response to The Murray Pioneer:

"Council is committed to its two-way relationship with residents and regularly looks for opportunities to engage with the community and seek feedback on a range of issues, beyond items that are required to go out for public consultation under the Local Government Act 1999," he said.

"In recent years, council has developed a community engagement framework and a purpose-built community engagement website, and encourages all residents to access the site and provide their input on their areas of interest.

"Occasionally, there will be a decision of council that will not be appropriate for consultation, for example, matters of public health and safety.

"However, council makes every endeavour to keep the public informed.

"Results from our engagement campaigns are reported back to the chamber for consideration during their decision making, and the monthly council meetings are always open to the public for attendance.

"Regarding methods of communication, we are regularly active on social media, have a range of information available on our website, regularly post project updates to our community engagement website, send monthly email newsletters to our subscribers, publish notices in the circulating papers, and provide information in rates notices where appropriate.

"We have also posted letters to residents with specific information that impacts them, and hosted community information sessions (such as last week for the AusCycling event).

"Our recent community engagement campaign asked community members how they prefer to seek updates from council, where Facebook was identified as the most preferred platform (67.74 per cent of votes), followed by council's website (61.29 per cent), email newsletter (43.55 per cent), and newspaper notices (41.13 per cent).

"We intend to initiate our same engagement campaign on an annual basis and will continue to take suggestions of new communication methods into consideration."

Local apprentice up for national award

A LOXTON youngster's passion for his work has earned a nomination for a major state vocational award.

Finalists for the 2024 South Australian Training Awards, aimed to recognise exceptional people working in the vocational, education and training sector, with Loxton's Callum Irlam among the nominees for Best Apprentice of the Year.

Mr Irlam has been working at the Loxton Community Hotel Motel for more than four years, getting his apprenticeship signed off 15 months early and demonstrating his passion and love for cookery.

"I applied for the state award because I had won the 2023 Apprentice of the Year at the Riverland and Mallee Vocational Awards, so I was encouraged to apply by my hotel to go for that award," Mr Irlam said.

"I had to do the application and interview online because I was sick but I'm pretty happy with being chosen as a finalist."

The Training Awards also recognise quality, diversity and ingenuity across the state, bringing recognition to students, apprentices and trainees on their achievements.

"I started commercial cookery at TAFE when I was in year 11 through the VET program at school, and I just did it as a fun thing, to get extracurricular experience because I always loved cooking," Mr Irlam said.

"The lecturer I had at the time encouraged me to think about it as a career, so I took that

advice on board, which after he got me in contact with the head chef here at the Loxton Hotel.

"I got a couple of trial shifts here and they were pretty happy with me, which then led to the apprenticeship."

The announcement coincided with National Skills Week, from the 19 August to 25 August, and was dedicated to uplifting the profile and status of the skills, vocational learning, and career opportunities that are available through vocational training.

"The past four months I've been second chef here at the hotel, which makes me very happy that they've trusted me at a younger age to be able to do that role," Mr Irlam said.

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said "the South Australian Training Awards are an important opportunity to recognise the outstanding achievements of apprentices, trainees, training organisations, students, and employers".

"More than ever before, our TAFE and vocational training sector is critical to giving South Australians the skills they need for the jobs they want," Mr Boyer said.

"Events such as the South Australian Training Awards highlight vocational training as an equal pathway that leads to high-quality, secure jobs – while building our state's future."

The winners will represent South Australia at the 2024 Training Awards on the 6 December at Canberra.

The awards highlight 14 categories –

seven for individuals and seven focused on organisations – summing up 120 nominations in total.

There is also an individual award, called the 'Voter's Choice Award' which is given to the individual who has the highest number of votes by the public.

Economies and communities

AS we edge toward the end of 2024 and a new vintage, signs of the ongoing, and still growing, pressure on Riverland wine grape growers can be seen in the actions of Renmark's Ray Hartigan, who is currently in the process of removing the vines from his property.

While a decrease in overall grape production is what the wine industry needs, both in Australia and internationally, and is arguably what some long-term industry and government strategies in South Australia are targeted toward, for some long-time Riverlanders it will undoubtedly stir memories of the larger-scale vine pulls previously seen in the region.

If not only worrying for fellow grape growers, this type of action is also likely to be of concern to operators of agricultural businesses, who are seeing less re-invested locally in terms of new machinery being bought, or extra labourers being hired.

However, in today's edition of The Murray Pioneer, Ray has also landed on quite a poignant juxtaposition, that being the priorities of the economy coming up against those of communities. Has the attitude of the country shifted too far toward ensuring the economy is as healthy as possible? Is this goal only achievable at the detriment to small communities, with local businesses eventually undercut by large franchises and young generations that take their skills elsewhere?

These were clearly not the targets for where Australia as a country was headed decades ago, however, has greater-than-expected population growth, and increased globalisation in most aspects of our lives, disconnected us from what is economically necessary to keep smaller communities sustainable?

Look at the position a man such as Ray has been forced toward. An 80-year-old Vietnam War veteran going through and removing vines, wiring, large wooden posts and irrigation tubing, all with minimal help.

Should this be an acceptable outcome to the financial struggle, and industry uncertainty, Ray and other growers have experienced over the past 12 months?

Have the comforts of modern, globalised living distorted our vision as to how damaged the local wine industry has become?

This is not to mention that Ray is a relatively small-scale producer, and the decision to pull his vines was made even after support measures had been announced by state and federal governments, meaning it's hard to see how the economic picture of the wine industry turns around without the global decrease in production mentioned above.

Is there any other directions to turn, or will vine pulls become a common sight heading into 2025?

THE YEARS GO BY



A light shining in the darkness: surreal lighting from St John's Lutheran church, Myrla, 2024. The Myrla Lutheran church was officially opened on 17 August 1924, 100 years ago. On Sunday 18 August 2024, over 90 local congregation members and visitors celebrated that centenary. Many of the early settlers in the Myrla area, which lies some 24km west of Loxton, were of German Lutheran heritage. They included families surnamed Auricht, Weiss, Zibell, Fettke, Hoffrichter, Schubert and Ernst, who prioritised community worship and preaching the Scriptures. In 1912 they sought to establish a congregation in the area. Under the leadership of Rev. J. Thiel of Morgan, they met in various homes. In 1914, the Myrla congregation and those of New Residence, Moorook and Loxton formed a new parish. In 1923, the influx of English-speaking settlers led to the decision to hold every third Lay Reading service in English. By 1926, English services were held alternately with the original German and by 1936, the ratio of three English speaking services to one German was adopted. - Postal mail outs
- Town hall meetings

That includes our State Government and in particular Minister Susan Close and her lack of engagement with the rural areas and tunnel vision on the environment.

I believe it is a scam, or should I say another scam. The wine industry blueprint being the previous one.

We have \$100 million of taxpayers' money being used to buy water from vulnerable irrigators.

The water is then given to a sector of our community, who in turn can lease it back to the irrigators that require it to grow food and fibre.

Current available water for leasing is about 54 gigalitres. That is water not committed to crop irrigation.

So far, the Federal Government has set its sights on the initial 450 gigalitres, then recently another 605 gigalitres,

now \$100 million worth.

The 1400 to 1600 gigalitres I have previously estimated as the total taking from irrigation is going to be more realistic than the 450 gigalitres everyone talks about.

Since when does government give public funds to a private sector with a ready-made investment strategy with no benefit to the general community?

A spokesperson stated that the recipients hold 0.17 per cent of the water entitlements but are 5.3 per cent of the population.

How much water is going to be given to the other 94.7 per cent of the population for free? This is Australia and we are all Australians.

What are the other previous issues surrounding water ownership the spokesperson talks about?

Of the many nations of the First Nations People within the Murray Darling Basin, which First Nations People will Minister Plibersek give this \$100 million parcel of water to become the new water baron?

Or will the government department take ownership so we then have a government water baron. I can imagine the arguments that are to occur over this ownership, incurring considerable legal costs, again from the taxpayers' purse.

I believe the government lies to extract an asset from our communities, promising some incredible result and nothing eventuates.

NSW, Victoria and South Australia have received over \$98 million for projects to environmental program and I can't see that a single one has had any kind of result. Where is the responsibility and transparency in the use of these funds?

There's still no funding to the grape grower for transitions to alternative crops.

Are politicians still lying to us regarding the wine industry situation when available industry figures tell a totally different scenario?

Take action to give gift of life

THE Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) is urging more rural and remote

Australians to take action and register to be an organ and tissue donor – and importantly, discuss their decision to donate with their family.

Only 2 per cent of Australians die in a way that makes it possible for their organs to be utilised – namely in a hospital and on a ventilator.

This very low number makes it critical for more Australians to register to become organ donors, and importantly to discuss this with their family so their decision is respected when they pass away.

While 80 per cent of Australians say they support organ and tissue donation, only around 36 per cent are actually registered as a donor on the Australian Organ Donor Register.

Increasing the percentage of Australians who are registered as organ donors to 80 per cent would be an incredible achievement, and would give many more seriously ill patients a second chance at life through an organ or tissue transplant.

Everyone over the age of 16 can register to donate their organs and tissues on the Australian Organ Donor Register.

It doesn't matter how old you are, whether you live in the city or in the bush, or even if you think you're not healthy enough – there is every chance that some of your organs and tissues may still be very suitable for donation.

It is crucial, however, that in order to be an organ or tissue donor, you have completed a few simple but important steps, and that you don't just think about becoming a donor, you take the steps to make it happen.

These steps include:

- If you live in South Australia, you can register to be a donor when applying for or renewing your driver's licence. This is then transferred directly to the Australian Organ Donor Register.

- Even if you have registered, your family will still be asked whether you wanted to be a donor and to give their consent before donation proceeds – so if you want to become a donor, it is crucial that you discuss this with your family, as well as registering formally to be a donor.

Your family will also be

involved in each step of the donation process and asked to provide vital health information. As such, it is important that you prepare your family so they are comfortable being part of the process.

We know that many Australians would be happy to donate their organs, eyes or tissue when they pass away, but they just don't take that next step of registering to be a donor and talking to their family about it – sadly making it a wasted opportunity.

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Major local businesses struggling with rising electricity bills...

Power price pain

THE sustainability of Riverland horticulture is being pressured by "unavoidable" increases to electricity costs, according to numerous local business figures.

The Advertiser reported on Monday a number of notable Riverland businesses were struggling with "surging power bills".

Nippy's joint managing director Ben Knispel said costs had increased despite attempts to use less electricity.

It is understood Nippy's was invoiced \$51,600 last June, for 260,073kW/h of electricity use at its Moorook plant.

However, this month the company's invoice was \$109,580.10 – including almost \$34,350 of market or network charges – despite using almost 6200 less kilowatt hours. Nippy's has also invested almost \$1m on solar panels, energy efficient lighting and special pump equipment.

"It just would be nice if we had reli-

ble power 24 hours a day and grid stability because it's a mess," Mr Knispel said.

"It's just so frustrating doing the right thing, trying to reduce our footprint.

"But it's all over the place. We're growing and we're doing ok, but we will have energy price increases, sadly, and we can't absorb these costs forever."

Century Orchards chief executive officer Brendan Sidhu was recently misquoted in the media as saying his annual electricity bill has skyrocketed to \$100,000 per annum, when this figure was actually for his monthly bill.

Century Orchards' annual bill is now well over \$1m, which has increased from about \$700,000 two years ago.

Another prominent local almond and wine grape grower, who spoke to the Pioneer on condition of anonymity, comes out of contract in December 2025 and has been told to lock in a 'forward contract' before prices hike even further, but at best needs to expect

a 60 per cent increase in power costs.

This would take his annual costs from \$400,000 to almost \$700,000. The grower was told South Australia is heavily reliant on expensive gas power, especially when renewables like wind and solar are unable to supply the grid.

"Some growers are simply not able to offset their power costs with solar due to proximity to the grid, or lack thereof, so for some the rising costs are totally unavoidable," the grower said.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said Riverland horticultural production required high electricity inputs.

"We are a high-energy user in the Riverland," Mr Whetstone said.

"We have to lift water, harvest fruit, process fruit and keep it cold. Where we've got manufacturing... these are significant costs that have been absorbed by these Riverland businesses.

"We are an exporting region, we grow

everything for an export market and what doesn't go to exports goes to the domestic market."

Mr Whetstone said increases in business costs would eventually impact local consumers.

"It has been a serious burden on day-to-day cost of living, that's impacting on the individual's cost of running a business," he said.

"The headline number at the moment is the cost of power, because it now is a significant part in the cost of producing world-class food."

"The cost of doing business in South Australia is at the point now where businesses are shutting on weekends... because of the cost of power, and it really does highlight the lack of respect (that) our primary producers deserve."

"At some point in time, that cost has to be reflected and passed on to the consumer."

Riverland community rallies behind Greg's GoFundMe cause

the middle of the night last July to a massive blaze in his Kingston-on-Murray home, thought to be started by lithium-ion batteries used to charge power tools.

"It didn't take very long for the fire to spread," Mr Black's

daughter Dee Black said.

"It would've gone up and then almost completely destroyed the house in a matter of minutes."

"Dad was only able to grab a few personal items before he got out — his neighbours were throwing him warm clothes over the fence."

Shortly after the fire, Ms Black — along with her two sisters, Alicia and Rebecca — decided to make a GoFundMe with a target of \$1000.

"Dad is a hard worker and he has had a hard run," Ms Black said

"He recently lost his partner to cancer, and had cancer himself not long after, so he is also still trying to pay for his cancer treatment."

"We really wanted to relieve that pressure of returning to work early."

"We don't know how long the insurance is

going to take and that won't cover everything, so we thought this might be able to get him some clothes and help cover any expenses that he has."

Now with over 73 donations, the total amount raised is at \$9460.

Ms Black said this wide-spread community support has "been absolutely amazing".

"Especially with cost-of-living prices, I wasn't expecting anyone to chuck in more than \$10 or \$20 here and there," she said.

"But people really quickly began jumping in and making huge donations — and it's all been from the community, family, and friends."

"The neighbours have also been awesome."

"The neighbours that gave dad clothes have also offered him ongoing accommodation,

SA Wine breaching export markets

LOCAL and regional wine growers and exporters are starting to see the benefits of wine exports since the China trade restrictions were lifted, with more than \$340m of SA wine delivered to the country.

The State Government last week announced Trade Minister Joe Szakacs would lead a delegation this month focused on improving and expanding the actual path of SA's wine, seafood, agribusiness and technology industry, in a bid to engage with current and potential Chinese buyers.

Mr Szakacs said "South Australia's wine exports continue to experience rapid growth, particularly to our largest two-way trading partner, China, and it is pleasing to see our state's wine exports are contributing 67 per cent of the total value of Australia's wine exports."

"I will travel to China and Hong Kong later this month where I will hold discussions with Chinese government, industry and business partners to emphasise South Australia commitment to productive two-

way trade, investment and people-to-people links," Mr Szakacs said.

However Chaffey MP, and opposition spokesperson for trade, industry and investment, Tim Whetstone said "while China's decision to lift import duties is positive, it will simply not resolve the issues facing growers and winemakers, especially in the Riverland and Mallee region".

"My concern is that we continue to put all of our focus on China," Mr Whetstone said.

According to the latest data, international markets received \$1.56bn worth of South Australian wine in the last twelve months leading to June, a 20 per cent rise compared to 2023.

"We have seen firsthand what happens when we put all our eggs in one basket, and the damage that it can do to long-term trade relations." Mr Whetstone said.

"As much as China is an important trading partner, we need to grow the economic activity in all our trade markets, not just China."

Other data released included:



- China has re-established itself as South Australia's top wine export market.
- Hong Kong became the second export market.

- South Australian wine exports grew by 19 per cent and accounted for two-thirds of the value of the country's total wine exports over the last year.

Barmera Primary invests in its students

BARMERA Primary have been able to support budding scientific minds after being awarded a Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) Grassroot Grant earlier this year.

Providing \$732,000 to support region-wide conservation and environmental efforts, the MRLB Grassroot Grant initiative will fund projects including revegetation, educational programs, and conservation works across the next year.

Along with local community groups, 11 schools and kindergartens were also recognised and

awarded funds directed to ecologically themed projects.

"Empowering the community to take a lead on ecological management is a pillar of our approach," MRLB presiding member Di Davidson said.

"Grassroots Grants are one way that we support locals to identify and tackle the projects that matter to them."

"Funding more school-based projects will mean that we're also supporting the next generation to care for our landscapes, whether they be native ecosystems or productive agricultural lands."

Awarded just under \$10,000, Barmera Primary science and tech-

nology teacher Leighton Pearce said the school is utilising the funds to support cohorts of developing scientists.

"We have a lot of students interested in science at Barmera Primary School and we're trying to support that," he said.

Working to deliver a "hands-on approach" to teaching, Mr Pearce said that over the past few years student's Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) in science results have been on the rise and provide the "evidence that students are really grasping the scientific concepts".

"The kids are just flourishing," he said.

Purchasing 23 biological micro-

scopes, more than 100 resin specimens, and scientific jigsaws, Mr Pearce said the new equipment will help continue a thriving Barmera Science program.

"We also have two microscopes that can be used by a teacher at the front of the class and project onto the whiteboard," he said.

"Students will be able to also get up close to butterflies, spiders, reptiles, amphibians, and the odd mammal with the resin specimens."

"Along with scientific equipment that will allow them to play and learn outside in the field, the younger year levels will also be able to use five sets of jigsaws

that focus on life cycles — giant magnets that display life cycles have also been purchased to support that learning."

Now into his second year of teaching at Barmera Primary, Mr Pearce said he hoped his passion for science continues to be passed onto his students.

"It's fantastic — the kids just always want to know more and more."





Lack of service to rural healthcare causing more hospitalisations

FIGURES released last week reveal many illnesses among Riverlanders could have been prevented and avoided hospitalisation with accessible primary care.

According to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, many parts of rural Australia have higher rates of preventable hospitalisations. This has highlighted the need for early interventions and ongoing care, particularly for non-communicable diseases.

Unfortunately, Australia's rural populations, which make up more than 7 million people, often lack access to such preventive measures.

"We often see rural communities neglecting or putting off their health issues due to limited access to primary care, exacerbated by the tyranny of distance and cost of services," National Rural Health Alliance chief executive Susi Tegen said.

"This leads to a cascade of problems, including overwhelming an already strained hospital and emergency system. This brings us to consider the need to increase strategic and fit-for-purpose investment in rural health care."

"Given Australia's annual health spending deficit of \$6.55b in rural Australia, as discovered through independent research last year, we strongly advocate for greater investment in rural health care for communities, which enable multidisciplinary and place-based solutions according to needs."

"The Alliance proposes the Primary care Rural Integrated Multidisciplinary Health Services (PRIM-HS) model, which is community-led and co-designed to meet the specific health needs of communities to promote the preventative aspect of health."

Ms Tegen said that with a federal, state, and territory government partnership, the model will aim to improve primary healthcare experiences by providing "culturally safe and high-quality care to become a major contributor to reduce the rates of potentially preventable hospitalisations in rural Australia".

Grants for local wellbeing

COMMUNITY groups and organisations, including the Riverland, are encouraged to apply for a social grant aimed to support infrastructure and local wellbeing.

The Stage Government 2024-25 Social Impact Grants are now open for applicants looking to fund short-term projects, resources, materials and programs, with eligible organisations able to receive up to \$30,000.

The available funding is organised under a two-tier structure that includes:

- Grants of up to \$10,000 for equipment purchases and resources to support community participation and volunteering, resources for community spaces, or to build digital connectivity and access.
- Grants of up to \$30,000 to go toward minor infrastructure upgrades for better physical access and other devices to support inclusion of priority groups, programs that respond to community need, enhancing places where people gather, or for inter-generational projects, mentoring and skillsharing.


Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said "the opening of the Social Impact Grants round is an exciting opportunity for community groups to apply to bring their innovative projects to life".

Designed to encourage and support strong and inclusive communities, the new round of the Social Impact Grants also aims to advance social and emotional community wellbeing by prioritising projects that financially support local communities.

Further details to new applicants can be accessed through an online information session, scheduled for 15 August at 11am. Applications are open until 12 September.

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

Waikerie celebrates its \$2.8m wetland site

THE Waikerie community recently celebrated the completion of a \$2.8m dollar wetland system designed to recycle stormwater runoff, improve water quality, and boost the environment.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton welcomed about 60 people to the unveiling of the Hart Lagoon Wetland system.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, Loxton Waikerie council project manager Daniel Brown and representatives from the Neilly Group Engineering team that designed the wetland, and Landscape SA and Waikerie and Ramco primary school representatives were among those who attended.

Federal Environment and Water Minister Tanya Plibersek and Barker MP Tony Pasin both sent their apologies, as Federal Parliament was sitting.

Mr Norton said the Waikerie Stormwater Reuse Project that involved the construction of the wetland system "exemplified a great commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship".

The project in 2021 received joint funding from the Federal and SA governments of \$1.8m under the National Water Grid Fund's Connections Funding Pathway program.

This enabled council to engage the engineers to develop concept designs and organise relevant development approvals before the 2022/2023 flood caused the project to be put on hold until October 2023 when the Neilly Group were engaged to construct the wetland system, which was completed in June.

Mr Norton said the project enabled treated stormwater to be used as a community resource and had repurposed the former effluent ponds to beautify and enhance Waikerie's riverfront.

"This project was made possible by the hard work, dedication and knowledge of our local contractors and staff," he said.

"The expertise of Neilly Group Engineering, from the initial design of the wetland until project completion has provided Waikerie with vital infrastructure that

not only meets our current needs, but also prepares us for future challenges."

The wetland site also features new walking trails, a bird hide for watching birds, a nature play area, shelter, and a board walk.

Mr Norton acknowledged the significant role Landscape SA and its youth environment teams from the Waikerie and Ramco primary schools played in beautifying the Hart Lagoon area.

"We were thrilled with the opportunity to engage with the students over the course of the project's development to hear about all the work they have put into the area over the years, and to have them on site, planting over 300 trees.

"This is a huge effort that will go a long way in establishing a healthy and sustainable wetland."

Mr Norton told the official opening one of the most remarkable aspects of the project was how the wetland system operated.

"Behind me sits the sediment basin, where stormwater runoff from the town is collected

and solids drop out of the water in the first stage of water treatment," he said.

"As the sediment basin fills, water enters the wetland deep and shallow zones.

"Once the water plants are established, the plants will naturally filter the water as it moves into the final storage pond.

"From the storage pond, the solar pump works to pump the water to two large holding tanks situated on the riverfront, which can be accessed for local fire-fighting when required.

"The water will then proceed through final filtration and UV treatment, where it can then be reused for local irrigation along the riverfront and at the oval."

Mr Norton said the wetland was also a new community asset that promoted healthy lifestyles with additional walking trails that further activated the Waikerie riverfront area.

Student representatives from both Waikerie and Ramco primary schools also spoke about their involvement with the Hart Lagoon Wetland.

PARTICIPANTS of the Leaders Institute of South Australia's Governor's Leadership Foundation (GLF) Program visited Calperum Station last Thursday.

"Ultimately, they are learning how to exercise leadership when they have no subject matter expertise and no positional authority."

Dentist and University of Adelaide academic, Poppy Anastassiadis, was one of the 42 GLF program participants invited to Calperum.

"I wanted to broaden my exposure to different experiences, ways of leadership, and the ways people are influenced and grow with the experiences they have," she said.

"The day has been truly amazing and I have learnt so much."

A RIVERLANDER was among three state finalists in a recent prestigious award, aimed to showcase outstanding achievements of rural women across the country.

Local Suzi Evans and finalist Susie Williams, joined South Australian winner Nikki Atkinson at The AgriFutures Rural Women's Award, Australia's leading award in acknowledging and supporting the essential role women play in rural industries, businesses, and communities.

Ms Evans was one of the state finalists recognised for her innovative work 'Workbench for the Mind', focused on grief management to construct a better and more resilient life, utilising practical tools and extensive knowledge of positive psychology and mental health first aid, based on her personal journey through the unexpected loss of her son, Muzz.

"The AgriFutures Rural Women's Award is the highest recognition for rural women in Australia," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said.

Major Traffic operation held across SA

MOTORISTS in rural South Australian areas, such as the Riverland, were among a total of 96 caught for driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol during a recent state-wide police operation.

Operation Stop Drink Drug Drive was conducted from Friday 16 August to Sunday 18 August and involved both static and mobile testing across rural South Australian roads.

The weekend-long operation returned 63 positive blood alcohol level tests and 33 positive drug detections with three additional drivers failing or refusing to comply with any of the tests.

Police also issued 77 immediate loss of licence notices and impounded 57 vehicles.

Officer in charge traffic services Branch, Superintendent, Darren

Fielke appealed to all drivers to take responsibility for their actions and avoid driving if they have been drinking or have taken drugs.

"Operation Stop Drink Drug Drive is a key road safety operation that focuses operational police resources toward detecting drink and drug drivers across the State," Supt Fielke said.

"Using our South Australian roads responsibility and obeying the road rules is not an optional choice."

A previous operation took place over the weekend of 26 to 28 July, with 78 drivers detected for alcohol or drug-related offences.

"These results are higher than last month's Operation Stop Drink Drug Drive and this shows there are still people making the wrong choice when it comes to drink and

drug driving which places their lives and the lives of others at risk." Supt Fielke said.

"South Australia Police has a calendar full of state-wide road safety operations targeting the fatal five offences, including drink and drug driving. My message to road users who make the wrong choice is that if you do the wrong thing, you will be caught."

Stop Drink Drug Drive operations are a part of Operation Safe Roads 2023-2026 with a mission to target 'fatal five' offences on South Australian roads.

On 22nd July 2024, South Australia Police announced plans to expand drug testing capabilities to include cocaine hydrochloride from 2025.



"(Leon's Restaurant) is designed so that those participating can get experience in a close-to-real environment," TAFE lecturer Gary Webb said.

Students completing Certificate II in Cookery, Certificate III in Commercial Cookery, Certificate IV in Kitchen Management, and Certificate II in Hospitality, took part in the cooking challenge.

"We're trying to replicate à la carte, where food is cooked to order with a bit of pressure that we also manufacture," Mr Webb said.

"Those that are studying front of house will also take the order, deliver the food, and clear the table."

"It is as real as it can get while still being a simulated environment."

Seating up to 30 guests

for lunch and 40 guests for dinner, Mr Webb said the restaurant is an opportunity for students to further enhance and develop skills learned in the classroom, and "make people as job ready as possible".

"When they walk into a commercial kitchen they will have a strong understanding and generally know what to expect," he said.

"It also shows (students) the reality of the profession and aids in adjustments to career paths.

"It is just such a great opportunity as the program is student focused.

"A normal restaurant is entirely customer focused, but with (Leon's Restaurant) it is about learning — of course we want the customers to enjoy their food, but if the dish isn't right students are to make it again.

"However, that being said, I don't think I had to return anything back this year aside from a bit of garnishing — this year really was fantastic."

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

Nicola encourages local feedback into herbicide review

A SENIOR Riverland politician is encouraging local primary producers to provide feedback for a major review into the use of certain herbicides.

The Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority (APVMA) is currently reviewing the registration of paraquat and diquat herbicides.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti, said the herbicides "have a valuable place in SA farming operations, and when applied correctly are effective and safe methods of weed control".

"Many outside the sector may not be aware, but herbicides and other agrochemicals play a vital role in the sustainability of broad-acre farming."

"By using herbicides from above ground, it reduces the need to remove weeds from below. The success of no-till agriculture has made an important impact on preserving carbon capture in soils and reducing topsoil loss."

"The role of the APVMA is to assess the safety and environmental impact of agricultural chemicals, so this is well within their remit to review."

"But already I have feedback from several farmers across a range of crop types who are very concerned that the use of these valuable herbicides may be heavily curtailed, or even removed."

Flinders MP Sam Telfer said the review would seek to verify and affirm chemical product registration, and active constituent approvals and the condition of approvals, and identify and cancel product and chemical registrations that fail to meet the statutory safety, trade or labelling criteria.

"It is important industry voices are heard and that we are regarded as responsible users of agrochemicals," Mr Telfer said.

"The rapid brown-out of weeds and short withholding periods of these herbicides, offers a broad range of benefits in cropping and pasture production, as well as a reliable weed control option in orchards and vineyards."

"Broad spectrum knock-down herbicides such as these have enabled the uptake of no-till farming, a practice that has improved soil structure, boosted yields and significantly reduced wind erosion, as well as reducing reliance on other chemicals and extending their effectiveness."

"Losing Paraquat as a part of our agri-management tools, or severely reducing its usage, would have disastrous outcomes for farming businesses and regional communities."

Submissions for the APVMA review can be made until 29 October.

Water operations keep Riverland flourishing

THE Department for Environment and Water (DEW) will be undertaking water operations across the Riverland this summer aimed at maintaining positive environmental outcomes of the River Murray Flood.

"Every year we plan for delivering environmental water and that plan varies depending on different water potential resource scenarios," DEW team member Jan Whittle said.

Operations at Katarapko floodplain are set to raise water levels by up 2m Australian Height Datum (AHD) and raise Lock 4 by 10cm above normal pool level. However, if River Murray flows are expected to exceed 30 GL/day at the SA border, operations will not proceed as levels will naturally rise and achieve inundation equivalent to the planned operations.

Similarly, a lower level operation at Pike floodplain will be raising water levels 55cm above normal to 15.1m with Lock 5 remaining at normal pool level. If higher flows are experienced, a slightly more extensive inundation will be possible by raising water levels 75cm above normal, to 15.3m AHD, and raising Lock 5 by 10cm to 20cm above normal to support flow through the Pike

River anabranch.

"Conditions are relatively dry, so we are looking to do modest operations by just wetting lower-level areas of the floodplains adjacent to the creeks," she said.

"Since the flood, trees have been flourishing and there is a lot of regeneration like seedlings and saplings of River Red Gum, Black Box, and other vegetation — it's all looking really good."

"We are just looking to top up the area and give those saplings a bit of a drink, (and) freshen up the soil water in the banks adjacent to the main creeks."

Ms Whittle said the water operations will also aid the region's fauna, by creating shallow foraging habitats for waterbirds and provide a cue for frog breeding.

"Raised water levels can trigger frog breeding," she said.

"This is really important as the Pike floodplain is actually a stronghold for the southern bell frog which is an endangered species."

To continue the environmental boost across the Riverland, Ms Whittle said DEW will also pump water to targeted floodplains such as Chowilla.

"We are conscious that the birds got a good boost through the flood, so we want to provide them with the resources so some of

those younger birds can continue to thrive," she said.

"At Chowilla the flows aren't strong enough to complete a big operation, but (DEW) have pumped water into Lake Limbra and the water-birds have been flourishing."

DEW site manager Ali Stokes said "waterbird monitoring undertaken throughout the pumped delivery of water for the environment to Lake Limbra "has recorded a diversity of waterbirds with 34 species observed utilising the lake".

"Abundances of 2000 birds have consistently been recorded at the lake on any given survey morning," she said.

"Species include deep-diving grebes, ducks and cormorants, large and small waders, and fringe-dwelling species."

"All species of duck expected for the region are utilising the lake, including four threatened species: freckled duck, musk duck, blue-billed duck and Australasian shoveler. In addition, hundreds of swans have flocked to use the site and are showing signs of breeding."

100th anniversary of Pilgrims of Zion Lutheran Church, Bookpurnong

ON Sunday 8 September, the members of Pilgrims of Zion Lutheran Church, at Bookpurnong, will, with past and present members and friends, celebrate 100 years of the current church on Bookpurnong Hill.

Anniversary Committee chairman Trevor Fielke said all past Ministers of the Church had been invited, along with the SA/NT Bishop Rev Andrew Brook, from Adelaide, and past 'son of the congregation' Pastor Maurice Fielke, from Queensland, both of whom will give a short address.

Bookpurnong Church has had 16 ministers over the life of the congregation, which began back in late-1900 when young families were coming to settle in the Bookpurnong area. Johann Wilhelm Pfeiffer, and brother Traugott and their families, were the first members of the small congregation, along with two scrub cutters, Albert and Reinhold Walther.

A healthy influx of Lutheran families with young children from 1907 onwards saw the government provide and pay for a teacher for a school, which was built on the property next to the current church, in 1913. It doubled as the Lutheran Church on Sundays, as the congregation had outgrown the first little church near the river.

Mr Fielke said this second house of wor-

ship was built and paid for by the members, who also boarded the teacher.

He said the name, The Evangelical Lutheran Zion Pilger Church at Bookpurnong Incorporated, was given to the new church, but eventually it was changed to the English version of Pilgrims of Zion Lutheran Church, Bookpurnong, and remains so today.

The history of the Pilgrims of Zion Lutheran Church at Bookpurnong is a dedication of Christians who wanted a home of worship and with the ever-growing congregation, a third church building was built on land adjacent to the second school/church, opening on 7 September 1924. By 1930 the Congregation consisted of 98 baptised and 73 communicant members, the highest on record. Mr Fielke said today the church has less than 20 regular worshippers.

A souvenir history book is being printed and will be available on the day for \$5.

Morning tea is from 9am, with a worship service at 10am, followed by a light lunch.

WAB state conference in Port Lincoln

THE recent state conference in Port Lincoln of Women in Agriculture and Business (WAB) was attended by members and their partners from all over rural SA. It was hosted by Charlton branch and after a welcome from Charlton president Liz Mickan, the conference was opened by Flinders MP Sam Telfer. Sam was a former mayor of Tumby Bay and descended from an early settler family. His electorate is huge, extending to the SA/WA border, and its gulf waters produce 80 per cent of SA's seafood, harvested by the largest commercial fishing fleet in the southern hemisphere.

The first guest speaker was retired doctor Mike Damp, who emigrated with his family in 2000 from South Africa to practice in Whyalla. His talk focussed on the WAB theme for this year – Life is for Living – and he told two relevant stories of his work in Namibia, which illustrated courage, self-discipline and total self-reliance. He compared Australian life with that of native Africans, in which there are more inter-personal interactions and they are conducted with much laughter and looking to the future. By comparison, he said, Australians were obsessed by their 'rights' and live in an austere social environment where immediate gratification is preferable to long-term goals. Africans better understand death and embrace life as a special gift.

Next speaker Claire Webber identified herself as a go-between, working with fishermen and the government. She had studied marine biology in Tasmania and

after finishing her degree, was employed by the NZ Ministry of Fisheries as an observer on foreign fishing vessels, working 50 days on and 50 off. She spent her 22nd birthday identifying and rescuing protected seals out of fishing nets. The foreign fishermen, who had very little and only a few of whom spoke English, threw her an unforgettable party. She has worked in the tuna industry and currently holds an executive position with the SA Sardine Industry Association.

Lynne Walmsley spoke on life with a visual impairment and though blind she is a talented flautist, teaches line dancing, YogaFit and volunteers in National Parks with her husband. Research on impaired vision shows in the Australian population of 27 million, that 14 million have a sight impairment and 4 million are legally blind. Lynne's impairment was undiagnosed in childhood and progressed steadily to blindness, however she was able to complete her education with the support of friends and family. She was a good swimmer – part of her childhood was spent living on a boat – and she mastered using a dinghy and a canoe. She has worked for Lifeline and started a visual impairment support group which is still going after 36 years. Lynne loves cooking, baking bread weekly and walking every day. Hers was an inspiring and heart-warming presentation.

Sarah Prime's focus was life in the agriculture industry and by extension, the death of small farming towns. She described herself as a social entrepreneur who believes that with motivation and

innovation, dreams become reality. She started Champions Academy in 2015 to mentor young people and help them to recognise their potential. Her childhood was spent on the family farm, between Kielpa and Darke Peak, and she has witnessed firsthand the demise of rural communities when people leave to seek employment and opportunities elsewhere. She identifies the early signs that a town is in decline and sporting clubs are often the first indicators, when sports teams cannot be filled with players. Sarah has won many awards for her work, including national ambassador for rural women, and has started 40 programs involving 2000 people. She and her farmer husband have started a plastic recycling business aimed at the agricultural and fishing industries. This serves the double purpose of breathing life with employment into rural communities.

After an entertaining segment by the Out of Ten ukulele group of two men and two women, the WAB AGM was conducted while the men went to visit the Axel Stenross maritime museum. Last year's project was Foodbank and \$3728 was donated to this worthy organisation. Open forum questions concerned domestic violence and the ban on live sheep exports from Australia. The latter topic provided lively and heated discussion – WAB does not support the ban on all livestock exports. Australian farmers' care regarding the safe and healthy condition of livestock for export far exceeds that of any other country.

The following day members and partners were taken by bus to Boston Point to the Yumbah

Aquaculture business, where Tom Hyde spoke on the oyster/abalone/mussel industry. His firm has other sites on Kangaroo Island, Victoria and Tasmania. It was in the late 1990s that a group decided to grow abalone on land. Seawater is pumped over the 'spat' or larvae, and when three years old and weighing 150gms, they are harvested, currently bringing \$7 to \$8 each. The 'spat' are fed a hard wheat mixture containing vitamins, soy and minerals, which make these green lip abalone the best in the world and highly regarded by Japan and China, in addition to the Australian and US markets.

The group then visited the Poonindie Anglican church, which was formerly known as the Natives Institution, which commenced in September 1850 and completed in 1854 of bricks made on site. Josie Hage spoke of the vision of Bishop Matthew Hale, archdeacon of Adelaide, whose aim was to educate and train indigenous youth from Adelaide to gain employment. The men were taught farming and the girls housekeeping skills, and today the woolshed, school and manager's home are the only other buildings remaining of what was once a busy community. The men became good shearers and ploughmen, and worked for wages often for nearby farmers. At one time the mission had 250 acres under wheat and hay, with 150 cattle and 9000 sheep. The produce was shipped from Louth Bay to Adelaide and by the 1860s the mission was self sufficient. The school had a cricket pitch and in the 1850s and 1860s, cricket was played against teams from Port Lincoln and St Peters College in Adelaide, with return

matches at Poonindie. The mission closed in 1894 and the indigenous community were sent to missions at Point Pearce and Port McLeay (Raukkan).

Lunch was at the Cummins Institute where Wendy Holmes spoke on the town's mosaic workshop projects. We looked over the large studio at the rear of the hall where 12 to 15 work on a mural destined for the front of the Institute. The stobie poles in the town have been decorated with designs made of tile and crockery fragments. The toilet block in the railway park is amazing – inside and outside – and won the 2018 International Best Toilet Award.

The final speaker was Andy Christian, of Hatchery Asparagopsis, which is contracted to CH4 Global to grow seaweed. Parent plants of the red native species are harvested from the sea floor and algae is grown with seawater carted in and circulated over it. Growing algae on land allows more control over testing and measuring and is far more efficient to harvest. The product is frozen and sent to Lonsdale and after being processed into pellets with other ingredients, is shipped off to 'special' cows as a feed supplement to reduce methane emissions. There is continuous experimentation carried out to monitor this project.

The day concluded with a quick drive to Winters Hill lookout for views of Port Lincoln. The WAB 2024 theme of Life is for Living was reflected in the enthusiasm of all guest speakers and full credit to Sandra Wischki and the WAB Charlton branch for a very successful 2024 conference.



SA has lifted into space

A NEW satellite built by South Australian-based companies will aim to deliver critical space data for use by government and research institutions, including data covering the Riverland, particularly in the areas of sustainability and climate impacts.

The State Government-funded satellite Kanyini was successfully launched into orbit last week onboard a SpaceX rocket, being the first of its kind in Australia, built by SA-based companies – SmartSat, Inovor and Myriota.

"The launch of Kanyini is a significant milestone and pivotal step forward for South Australia's space sector, setting us up for further success on a global stage," Minister for Defence and Space Industries Stephen Mullighan said.

"We are excited for Kanyini to unlock more opportunities for research and development of innovative, sovereign Australian space technologies."

Kanyini is a six-unit CubeSat, roughly the size of a shoebox and weighing about 12kg that has been integrated with the latest technology for data transfer capability.

SmartSat CRC chief executive officer Andy Koronios said Kanyini was a huge leap for South Australia's space sector.

"The Kanyini mission is not just about sending a satellite into space; it's about building South Australia's capabilities and contributing valuable data for applications that enhance our lives here in South Australia," Mr Koronios said.

"We have now realised our mission of seeing home-grown South Australian space technologies launched into low Earth orbit."

The collected data will cover weather events, rainfall and information to help early bushfire detection, with technology that can detect fires from orbit 500 times faster than actual processing.

A key element in the satellite is the HyperScout 2 Flight Model hyperspectral imager, providing detailed images of the Earth, with high-level data processing and artificial intelligence (AI) capabilities.

With the satellite now in space Mr Koronios said "the coming months will be crucial as the team works to fully operationalise Kanyini and begin reaping the benefits of its data-gathering capabilities."

Images and information gathered will support active and future research on crop health, forestry and water management aimed to improve accuracy on existing natural disaster prediction models used in landslides and flooding.

The \$6.5m mission has helped to improve the hi-tech industry in the state's space sector.

The next milestone for Kanyini is to establish stable communications with its operation centre.



Roos go straight through to the decider

BARMERA-MONASH is the first side through to the 2024 RFL A grade decider following a thrilling three-point win over Renmark at Tigerland on Saturday afternoon.

In one of the games of the season the battle was close throughout the entirety of the afternoon, but it was Renmark who got the early jump, taking a 10-point lead into the quarter time huddle.

However, the Roos flipped the game on its head in the second quarter, kicking four goals to one and making the Rovers pay for inaccuracy.

Momentum swung throughout portions of the third quarter, and although Renmark had six scoring shots to two, it was Barmera-Monash who made the most of its

opportunities, converting in front of goal, and hanging on to a two-point lead at the final break.

With everything to play for in the final quarter, and a little over nine minutes played, it was Mitch Jenke who fired the Rovers in front.

However, after desperate moments of defending by Renmark, superstar recruit Jono Beech kicked truly at the 21-minute mark to fire Barmera-Monash into the lead, which it ultimately held on to.

Barmera-Monash playing coach Fraser Sampson said he was pleased with the way his side wrestled back momentum in the win.

"They started really well and I thought we were off in a few of our main areas, so we just had to reset and get back to winning the con-

test," he said.

"Making them pay for missed opportunities wasn't really a focus, it's just how the game played out. I'd like to think that some of their behinds were caused by our pressure."

"I was just very proud. To win that one when we certainly weren't at our best and weren't able to get the game on our terms shows that we can find multiple ways to win, which was pleasing."

Beech trumped the scoring across the day, finishing with four majors, while Fletcher Dillon's two goals also proved important.

Saxton Mitchell impressed for the Roos down back, as did duo Justin Bonney and Aedan Lyon, helping to shut down a potent Rovers forward line.

Captain Sam Butterworth found

plenty of the ball across the afternoon in the middle of the ground, while Ben Drogemuller also proved influential.

"Ben has been building really well in the last month or so," Sampson said of Drogemuller's game.

"After a very limited pre-season he naturally had a slower beginning of the season, but his back half has been very solid."

Tim Woolford saw a large portion of the ball across the day through the middle of the ground, as did brothers Matt and Dan.

Playing coach Josh Vater drove Renmark off half back at every opportunity, launching the ball inside 50 on many occasions alongside young gun Bailey White.

Renmark now gets set to face off against the high-flying Waikerie in

this Saturday's preliminary final at the kennel, while Barmera-Monash earns a week off before hoping to secure back-to-back premierships.

"As a club it is a really exciting time to have three grades already through to the grand final, and the opportunity to get all grades in this weekend," Sampson said.

"We have plenty to work on from the weekend, so we will review where we can get better and also have a keen look at Renmark and Waikerie this weekend."

"We will just focus on our game plan and what we need to improve on this week, then we will start planning for the opposition next week."

"Both sides have some key players that we will certainly need to be prepared for."

Magpies keep marching on

ward and if we need to we can isolate him up forward," Kilsby said.

"He stopped going to West Adelaide, so I said to him you're not doing the SANFL pre-season so you really need to stay on top of your fitness."

"He's got a lot of power in his legs so over the first 10m he's really explosive and nobody can catch him."

Waikerie midfielders Kade Hilton, Ben Smith, and Stephen Hausler in particular found a lot of the ball, benefitting from the service of ruckman Bradley Burgemeister.

Burgemeister was strong

against Loxton big man Brayden De Prinse, who has been a strong recruit for the Tigers in 2024.

Salmon duo Brock and Luke fought valiantly in defence against a potent Magpies forward line, while Rogan Kennedy provided an attacking threat alongside playing coach Luke Harder.

Waikerie is forced to travel into enemy territory for the preliminary final bout against the Rovers, but Kilsby said he is looking forward to embracing the challenge ahead.

"They'll be confident for sure, but there has to be a bit of doubt in their minds because they know we're coming."

TWO of the Riverland Football League's fiercest rivals will meet on Saturday afternoon at Renmark, hoping to earn a spot in the 2024 decider, with the loser to have its season come to a close.

Both sides come into the clash in relatively even form, after stringing together a strong month of football together, excluding the final round clashes with Barmera-Monash and Loxton North respectively.

That being said, Waikerie will come in to the game full of confidence, following a 36-point elimination final win over Loxton on Sunday afternoon, keeping its season alive in the process.

Local leagues prepare for grand final double

IN a move away from recent normality, the Murray Valley Football Netball League's (MVFNL) 2024 grand final will be held on the same day as the Riverland Football League's decider, on Saturday 7 September.

"If our attendance numbers are the same as last year, and we've got a similar dollar figure coming through then we'll continue to make our own decisions as to what works best for us."

While umpiring numbers are remaining strong in the RFL, Mr Martinson conceded that the MVFNL has struggled with getting

officials this year.

Needing to break out into other leagues to gain access to umpires is something which he said has been crucial throughout 2024.

"Our umpires are all through the clubs, so unfortunately they often go without using the red and yellow cards, so we're trying to improve their skill set in that area," he said.

"It's just reiterating that if there is a problem out there, they need to do those sorts of things, but this year Marc Worsfold has been able to source umpires from the Murray Bridge competition, as well as two of our better local umpires as well."

"We're going to have a bit of a mixture there, and the local umpires won't be umpiring their own team, so it should work out really well."

Last weekend's fixture saw a Saturday afternoon double head-

er, where Brown's Well faced off against Wunkar at midday, followed by a battle between BSR and Murrayville at 2:30pm.

You can use your home's existing furnishings as a guide for choosing paint colours. Use big decoration pieces in your space as a reference point when finding your new paint colours – items that can't be easily changed like a large rug or kitchen countertops – and go from there. Using those design

elements will help you create a colour palette for your space, and thus find complementary paint colours.

If you're looking for multiple paint colours that look nice together, consider using a colour wheel.

The colour wheel is valuable if you understand that the placement of two or three colours on a colour wheel often gives you a decent idea that the colours will look nice together.

For example, complementary colours are on opposite sides of the colour wheel. Using two complementary colours usually

results in a vibrant and visually striking combination.

On the other hand, analogous colours are next to each other on the wheel and create a harmonious, cohesive, and tonal look.

Also ensure that your paint colour's undertone will make sense with your home's existing palette.

Working with undertones almost always boils down to cool versus warm. For example, if you're looking for a paint colour for a living room that already has a rug with cool undertones, choose a paint colour with cool undertones as a complement.

After you've gathered inspiration and landed on colours that speak to you and might work in your house, the next step is to bring home paint samples.

To do so, go to your local hardware store and pull samples from your favourite colours, then hang them up on your wall. Leave the samples there for a few days and really spend time with them before deciding on a colour.

If you're considering using white on your walls, you'll need to decide between a warm or cool white. Warm whites can have undertones of brown,

yellow, green or red, create a welcoming feel to your home, whereas cool whites can appear to have undertones of grey, mauve or blue and can create a modern or contemporary look.

Using deep, strong colours such as grey and black can introduce a contemporary feel in your room. Using a darker charcoal grey can create a sophisticated approach to a master bedroom. A lighter silver grey can brighten up a dark room and using a light grey on your main walls can add a touch of elegance.

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
