THERE'S A MAYOR IN THERE?

THE emergence of a Riverland West candidate to tackle Loxton Waikerie deputy Trevor Norton, plus the confirmation yesterday of a third Berri Barmera contender highlighted a pivotal day for the 2022 local mayoral elections.

In announcing his candidacy, Waikerie man Bob Nicholls flagged an unexpected push to reconsider the ward system, while also suggesting council meetings be held halfway between the two towns, in Moorook.

A former Yorke Peninsula councillor, 74-year-old Mr Nicholls' presence sets up another potentially divisive 'Waikerie vs Loxton' election to replace retiring Mayor Leon Stasinowsky, despite Cr Norton residing in Kingston-On-Murray.

Berri Barmera's mayoral race also took a turn yesterday, when local businessman and vocal council critic Ralf Nobile officially joined the field.

The 2022 election will be Mr Nobile's second crack at the top council job, after his unsuccessful 2018 campaign, when he was defeated by incumbent Peter Hunt.

If, as expected, Mayor Hunt confirms his candidacy in the coming week, Berri Barmera voters will be faced with a three-way contest, after deputy mayor Ella Winnall declared her intentions a fortnight ago.

If elected in November, Mr Nobile has pledged to either freeze council rates or restrict increases to below CPI, and vowed to explore establishing a new industrial area outside of Barmera, on councilowned land adjacent the Riverland Field Days site.

Nominations for mayor and councillor close on September 6.

RPC program tackles 'land shortage crisis'

DEVELOPING land surrounding Renmark's golf course, and overcoming a housing shortage crisis, are among the goals of a new council initiative that would see 75 per cent general rate rebates offered to eligible projects.

Renmark Paringa Council last week announced its Residential Land Expansion Incentive 2022-2025 program, aimed at encouraging development opportunities "consistent with the creation of a vibrant and prosperous community".

Under the program council will offer a rebate of 75 per cent on general rates, and Community Waste Management Scheme (CWMS) rates, on all unsold rated land parcels within a new subdivision of six or more allotments each year, for a maximum of three years.

Renmark Paringa chief executive officer Tony Siviour said council was committed to facilitating developments that met the requirements of the scheme.

"This incentive is essential to unlocking land in the Renmark Paringa area for development," Mr Siviour said.

"We are currently facing a housing and land shortage crisis, not only in Renmark Paringa but across the region and state, which is affecting the ability of our community to sustainably

grow.
"Renmark Paringa
Council is proactively
looking at options to
unlock land for residential development, including this Residential Land
Expansion Incentive.

"I encourage any

landowner that may be eligible for the Residential Land Expansion Incentive to contact council and further explore the opportunity."

The program is focused on neighbourhood, rural neighbourhood, and Golf Course Estate zones in the council area.

Development projects would need to fall under the category of residential housing, urban renewal, rural living allotments, social and affordable housing, or land overlooking the Renmark Golf Course, to be eligible.

Subdivision projects with six or more allotments requiring infrastructure inputs must be completed, and titles issued, before the rate rebates would be approved.

Projects that commenced construction before July 1, 2022, would also be considered.

Key council staff will be made available to assist landowners and developers, and will provide pre-lodgement meetings to ensure all potential options are discussed with applicants.

CWMS rebates would only apply to properties connected to council's wastewater system.

It is understood the Residential Land Expansion Incentive will apply to registered interest received from July 1, 2022, until April 30, 2025.

A LOCAL council has selected a Victorian-based partner to deliver the "largest and most significant development in the history of the Riverland", expected to add \$400m into the region's economy.

Renmark Paringa Council yesterday announced Wel.Co had been selected as development partner for the Jane Eliza Estate project.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Neil Martinson said the project was aimed at addressing housing availability shortages, and achieving "long-term sustainable population, tourism and economic growth" in the community.

"It gives me great pleasure to announce that council has selected Wel.Co as the development partner to expand the Jane Eliza Estate and deliver a nationally significant mixeduse marina precinct," Mr Martinson said.

"Council has been impressed with Wel.Co's approach during the selection process.

"They share council's vision for the site and have a genuine passion for building communities."

It is understood the land development project will generate more than \$400m in economic value, with a projected annual contribution of \$109m upon completion.

Wel.Co has previously delivered large-scale regional developments in Gawler, plus Bendigo and Echuca in Victoria.

Wel.Co founder and managing director Andrew Welsh said the company would work further with council on technical investigations, and community engagement, as part of its plans for the site.

"As a national developer, with a focus on regional areas, Wel.Co is very excited to

be partnering with council on this landmark project that will deliver massive benefits to the local community and economy," Mr Welsh said.

Approximately 100 boat moorings will be housed within the mixed-use marina precinct, with council's masterplan for the development also involving approximately 780 residential allotments.

The expression of interest process, which began in December 2021, was supported by Alinea Group and Norman Waterhouse Lawyers.


Alinea Group principal Ben Koop said Wel.Co possessed a high level of experience in regional developments.

"The project is an incredibly exciting, generational project," Mr Koop said.

"The state-significant scale of the project is set to provide a substantial new growth driver for Renmark and the broader Riverland as one of Australia's most compelling river-based lifestyle communities.

"Council set a bold vision for a world-class masterplanned community, centred around a new mixed-use marina precinct. This will play a key role in supporting one of the state's premier houseboat destinations.

"Wel.Co has really embraced this vision and brings a wealth of expertise as development partner to realise the full potential of this exceptional project."



Berri CCTV a 'win-win



CCTV in Berri's CBD is hoped to be the answer to disorderly behaviour driving away trade, as the local council begins investigations into placing cameras in the

At last Tuesday's monthly Berri Barmera Council meeting, elected members passed a motion without notice - put forward by Cr Trevor Scott – for staff to investigate and act upon installing CCTV in Berri's Vaughan Terrace.

The motion followed discussions stemming from a Berri Traders group meeting, where SAPOL's Riverland operations manager, Senior Sergeant Mark Howie, discussed methods to reduce anti-social behaviour along the street.

'What we'll find is that as soon as a police car is seen or a uniformed officer is seen, everyone is on their best behaviour and we don't see any offences..." Sen Sgt Howie told The Murray Pioneer.

"It's something that's been going on for a couple of decades, according to some traders, and we've never got to a point where we've thought about environmental or technological factors we can implement to limit

"(CCTV) is an idea that would not only help deter people from poor behaviour or committing offences, but would also give us greater scope to identify who are doing these things without involving any of the business owners who are around there or general wit-

"Whether it's drinking in a dry zone, disorderly behaviour or offensive language, we can manage that after the fact, which can be very handy.

"It will benefit us and it will definitely benefit the local business owners in the main street.

"It'll be a win-win."

A Berri Traders spokesperson said behavioural issues had at times had impacted businesses in the town's CBD.

"We think the installation of CCTV would be a great idea in Berri as it has proven to work in other council areas..." they said.



Berri Barmera Council has begun investigations into placing CCTV in Berri's Vaughan Terrace to deter anti-social behaviour which has impacted local business owners.

"While it's not always possible (for police) to be on the scene to witness any bad behaviour, the CCTV footage will enable the police to have a better chance of establishing if and when a problem occurs and dealing with it appropriately.

"The traders hope the introduction of CCTV will see a decline in the amount of bad behaviour in the CBD.'

Council CEO Dylan Strong said the new cameras would be an extension of council's existing network of CCTV located near council facilities.

"We'll work with SAPOL now to look at what the requirements are within Vaughan Terrace and incorporate council's existing policy as far as CCTV goes," he said.

"More than likely, we will explore the installation of camera around the main street pavilion building (formerly Alfresco's Café), which has recently been upgraded.

"The future community use of that building will be part and parcel of the area being activated in the right ways and at the same time keeping people safe."

Snr Sgt Howie said managing mental health and vulnerable persons was also a key part of SAPOL's response.

Local Health Network (RMCLHN) mental health team, Housing SA or ac.care, then

we have direct liaison with the managers to see what holistic approach we can provide to offer those people support, rather than what may be seen as a purely punitive approach by police," he said.


"Police will investigate any offences but we will also act as a liaison between all the key stake holders to assist people in need.

Police patrol members will continue taking all of these things into consideration when dealing with people."





Candidate's wish list: Bring back wards & meet in Moorook

REINTRODUCING the wards system and holding the main monthly meetings in Moorook – at night are among the campaign pledges of the newest Loxton Waikerie mayoral candidate.

Waikerie man Bob Nicholls has become the second confirmed contender – joining deputy mayor Trevor Norton - and launched his bid by outlining several changes he would push for if elected. Heading the wish list would be proposing a return to the wards system, which would see councillors elected from specific geographic sections of the Loxton Waikerie district, rather than all councillors representing the entire council area.

Just over half of South Australia's 68 councils still operate under the wards system, and Mr Nicholls said the system would encourage "better representation" of both towns.
"It would be a safety net to ensure that all the elected members don't come from Waikerie or Loxton," Mr Nicholls said.

The 74-year-old also said the monthly council meet-ings should be held halfway between the towns, at Moorook.


"I believe that council should be accessible to as many ratepayers as pos-

sible," he said. In addition, Mr Nicholls wants the monthly meetings moved from their existing Friday morning timeslot to a 5.30pm to 10pm format, to make it easier for councillors who work or run their own busi-

He said Yorke Peninsula Council's after-hours meetings were "more efficient" as elected members had an incentive to ensure they finished at a respectable time and "not at midnight". **Both Renmark Paringa**

and Berri Barmera councils both meet on Tuesday nights, while Loxton Waikerie meets on Friday mornings.

A WAIKERIE resident who ran for council in 2018 is challenging Loxton Waikerie deputy mayor Trevor Norton from Kingston-On-Murray for the mayoral post.

Bob Nicholls, a former Yorke Peninsula councillor from Port Vincent, has announced his intention to run for the top job against Cr Norton.

Incumbent mayor Leon Stasinowsky is retiring from council after serving in the role for 12 years and being an elected member for 40

Mr Nicholls, who is celebrating his 74th birthday today, spent two terms on Yorke Peninsula Council from 2006-2014, before moving to Waikerie in 2015.

He said his election platform for Loxton Waikerie mayor would centre around creating a more respectful environment at the council.

"I don't think enough respect is shown to elected members, council staff, and volunteers who are important people," Mr Nicholls said.

He said if elected mayor he would endeavour to reduce the amount of division between Waikerie and

"If we can have an allencompassing council, it makes for a better environment and better life," Mr Nicholls said.

He said it was the council chamber that sets the tone.

"I come from an area where we had a wonderful council," Mr Nicholls said.

"Maitland and Ardrossan are fierce rivals on the football field, but we all worked for a common goal: promotion of the council."

Mr Nicholls worked for the Commonwealth Bank for 27 years including at Renmark and was also a small business operator for 20 years. His father was born in Renmark.

Mr Nicholls said being retired meant he would have lots of time to devote to the role.

Не is presently a Warrawee Lodge Retirement Village board member, Waikerie RSL member and a playing member of the Waikerie Bowling Club.

Mr Nicholls said the fact that Loxton had a larger population of ratepayers than the Waikerie area could not be ignored, but said both districts' assets should be considered as belonging to the whole council area.

"The whole spread of the council area own those assets - whether it be the Waikerie Bowling Club council asset, or the sporting facility in Loxton," he said.

Mr Nicholls said as mayor he would find ways to efficiently manage the demands for services while keeping rates and charges as low as possible.

He is urging Loxton Waikerie residents to vote in the November council elec-

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Goal to crash mayoral race with 'zero rates rise' promise...

A THIRD contender has emerged for Berri Barmera mayor, with Ralf Nobile promising to be "a working mayor", dedicated to keeping rate rises to a minimum, if elected later this year.

Mr Nobile, who contested the election in 2018, is the second confirmed candidate, alongside deputy mayor Ella Winnall, however incumbent Peter Hunt has previously indicated his intention to stand for a fifth term.

Last time around, Mr Nobile received just under 1000 votes, roughly half of Mr Hunt's tally.

A vocal critic of the council in recent years, Mr Nobile said being unimpressed with Berri Barmera's recent track record motivated him to have a second shot at the top job.

allow a 1 per cent increase..

"When you see something's not right, you've got to stand up," he said.

The 59-year-old said if elected he would aim to freeze council rates, or at least keep any increase below inflation.

"We'd get a forensic accountant to come in and see where our liabilities are, and where the money's going," he said.

"We would aim to either leave council rates exactly what they are, or maybe only allow a 1 per cent increase.

"They've built houses in Berri Barmera... that's extra income from rates, fees and charges, so it should be achievable.'

Monash-based Mr Nobile sold his long-established Sturt Highway fruit stall, near the Big Orange, several months ago, but said he would continue to

work if elected, and would aim to make life easier for businesses across the council's district.

"I drive a truck for Berri Transport, but I've also got my own truck and I do the table grape season for Sunraysia," said.

"I want to be a working mayor, because if I'm going to talk the talk, I want to walk the

"I've been in private enterprise since I was about 23 and I know what it's like to run a business."

During the 2018 election campaign, Mr Hunt said also mayoral contenders should have local government experience as elected members, however Mr Nobile has again dismissed those suggestions.

"I've had experience working

with council – I had four years of trying to get my fruit stall up," he said.

"So, I've been dealing with councils from the outside.

"It's a benefit to come from the outside, because when you're brought up in that council culture, it breeds its own people. Just like a farmer, when you breed your own livestock, eventually you get bad traits."

Mr Nobile is a former Liberal Party member, but said he became disenchanted with the party during John Howard's prime ministership, because the former PM "sold everything".

Mr Nobile also urged more young people to nominate as councillors for the 2022 SA local government elections. Nominations close on September

Plan for industrial area

COUNCIL-owned land near the Riverland Field Days site in Barmera would become a Riverland industrial hub, if Ralf Nobile's mayoral plans become reality.

The newest Berri Barmera mayoral can-

didate says the land is ideal. "It should be the new heavy industrial land development for the Berri Barmera," he said.

"It has to be a decent size, so we can attract multinational companies or big companies that want to come and invest here, build new factories and new buildings. "Existing businesses could also move out there.

"We need a massive industrial area, because that's how you attract people.

"They're owning their own premises, so they're not paying rent. It's to their own benefit, not to the benefit of their landlord."

Mayoral fields take shape

THE final pieces in the local mayoral elections seemingly come together today, with the announcement of two more candidates.

Ralf Nobile is a familiar name to plenty of locals and visitors, but also a familiar face after running his highly visible - and successful - Sturt Highway fruit stall, just outside Berri, for many

He ran for Berri Barmera mayor four years ago, losing to Peter Hunt comfortably, but not embarrassingly. On that occasion, Mr Nobile was something of a late starter, particularly in campaigning, but this time around he has entered the battle earlier, and with the benefit of past

Nonetheless, in 2018 almost 1000 Berri Barmera residents thought Mr Nobile was a better bet for mayor than Mr Hunt, who collected over 2000 votes

Motivated by a disenchantment with the council, Mr Nobile is often outspoken and has a rough-edge style that contrasts starkly with both Mr Hunt and deputy mayor Ella Winnall, the other confirmed starter.

Whether his gruff, straight-talking approach attracts more voters this time around remains to be seen.

The presence of three candidates adds extra interest to the election, via additional voting permutations.

However, all this is predicated on Mr Hunt confirming his candidacy in the coming days, ahead of the September 6 deadline.

Mr Nobile is proudly outside of the council tent, a point referenced by Mr Hunt during the 2018 campaign, when the incumbent declared that mayoral candidates should have experience as elected members.

Is there appetite for change across Berri Barmera, and if so would that change be to the current deputy mayor, or a complete outsider, in the Donald Trump mould? Someone who promises to upset the applecart?

Down the road, local political junkies will be thrilled at the prospect of another election battle at Loxton Waikerie.

In recent years the council has made concerted efforts to unite its two communities, who face a geographical divide that has often spawned unrest, distrust and negativity.

Waikerie man and former Yorke Peninsula councillor Bob Nicholls officially challenged deputy mayor Trevor Norton this week.

Mr Nicholls will no doubt draw on his council experience in the coming months. As today's Murray Pioneer story suggests, he has already shown a willingness to float ideas that some would consider bold, and others might label 'thought bubbles'.

Prosecuting the case for wards might be easier than promoting Moorook as a venue for meetings, but should Mr Nicholls be able to back up his ideas with sound logic, and bring ratepayers along for the ride, he could win considerable

Cr Norton enjoys the cut-and-thrust of chamber discord, meaning he should be ideally suited to a combative mayoral campaign.

So, all Riverland residents now have a choice in their respective mayoral elections. Use your vote wisely.

CCTV welcomed

WELL done to Berri Barmera councillor Trevor Scott for being the catalyst for the installation of CCTV in Berri's CBD.

Cr Scott worked in 5RM's old Vaughan Terrace studio for many years and would have witnessed first-hand the antisocial behaviour that has dogged the spot for too long.

The situation has become so chronic that affected traders and community members have been reluctant to speak up, for fear of reprisals.

It's time to end the litany of excuses for those behind this behaviour.

They are wholly responsible for their actions and from now must be held accountable for them





Pinefield School, Gordon Road, Pike River, about 1926: This school was in the Renmark District Council. It began, it seems, in 1924 with teacher Gladys Higgins and 15 to 19 students. On May 23, 1925, land for the school (Section 136, comprising 2 acres or 0.8 ha) was granted to Loxton farmers and "trustees of the Pinefield School" Johann Gustav Pfeiffer, Frederick William Obst, Eduard Gotthold Rothe, Otto Julius Obst and Carl Wilhelm Klau. The school held an Arbor Day In that year for tree-planting, and for sports with parents and students. A heavy rain (105 points, 25mm) followed the event. In 1926, Hildegard Meier, daughter of Pastor Julius Meier of St Peter's Loxton, began teaching, having studied at Immanuel College, Point Pass, and later Adelaide Teachers College. She was highly regarded and when in 1929 she left, a "big crowd:" attended her farewell, including Loxton's brass band. It was said, she "will be greatly missed in the district". Hildegard was captain (Brown Owl) of the first Loxton Girl Guide group. In 1933 she married local farmer Bert Auricht. Loxton local Win Hansen is a daughter. The school closed in 1936. Remnants of the

school, made of mud bricks, are still evident. PHOTO: LHC

It's time for one Riverland council

IF you had any doubt for the need to merge our three local councils into one Riverland council, you need look no further than page 4 of The Murray Pioneer last week ('Local mayoral candidates plan to prioritise', 24/8/22).

In a joint statement, mayoral candidates Trevor Norton from Loxton Waikerie council and Henry DuRieu from Renmark Paringa Council correctly outline the benefits of joint planning and shared resources, including "applications being processed quicker, together with consistent interpretation of planning rules across the region".

They go on to say that "builders, tradies and developers will appreciate compatible rules and ratepayers will benefit from efficiencies and their savings".

Which leads directly to the obvious question: If Mr Norton and Mr DuRieu can both recognise the numerous benefits of sharing resources between councils, why can't they recognise the numerous benefits of one management team?

Why do the ratepayers of the Riverland need to pay three separate management teams to come to the same decision?

How does this possibly represent value to the ratepayer?

As I have stated previously on this forum, one merged Riverland council would provide immediate savings of over \$1m annually in unnecessary duplicated management wages, which could be passed onto to all ratepayers in the form of lower council rates.

Surely if they are being truly honest with both themselves and the ratepayers, Mr Norton and Mr DuRieu must be able to see that one Riverland council is the only way for our region to move forward as a unified community, and the sooner this is achieved, the better

If our three councils were in private industry instead of public, it would have happened vears ago.

With council elections coming up in November, clearly the time to merge our three councils into one is now.

I encourage all members of the community to question the candidates in the upcoming council elections as to whether they really have the best interests of the community at heart by commencing the process of merging our three councils into one, or whether they will continue to put self-interest ahead of the community by imposing an extra \$1m of unnecessary duplicated management wages on the ratepayers of the Riverland each year.

Infrastructure for aged in Waikerie?

IT'S okay to have these big announcements, such as a \$20m retirement village to be built at Waikerie that will be a 81-home complex.

This will be built in conjunction and adjacent to the residential park, Waikerie Lifestyle Village, which I believe presently has 73 homes completed, with approximately 130 people living there.

When the retirement village is completed, another I understand 150 people will be moving in, making a combined total of 280 residents.

Certainly these homes are designed for people over 55, but the approximate age of the residential park is /0-plus. That younger age group is not moving in, so I ask, where is the infrastructure for this age demographic?

Who's accountable for this? Is it up to the council that sold the land to the developer to understand that if you are going to allow these places to be built then the infrastructure for this older age group should be in place?

Even in the release of \$20m village expansion (Murray Pioneer, 3/8/22), Loxton Waikerie Mayor Leon Stasinowsky said the 81 new

homes at the retirement village "would help address the present housing shortage".

He went on to say Waikerie was earning a strong reputation as a retirement destination, due to its weather, location and facilities, such as the hotel and the hospital.

He goes further to say this is a "win-win situation". It takes me back a decade ago when he also announced his excitement about the 47 homes only that were being built on the caravan park site.

It was also good to read a story in The Murray Pioneer written by the deputy mayor of Loxton Waikerie, Trevor Norton.

In his Conduct Becoming column he said: "Whatever the case, it requires councils to take a closer look at their community and towns to figure out growth strategies.'

Here, here.

Now must surely be the time to look. Aged and ageing people will need the infrastructure so people are not being sent miles and miles away to find accommodation, which will mean leaving behind families and loved ones.

Recently in a Melbourne paper, Professor Irene Blackberry, a director at La Trobe University, said it was "hard enough finding a suitable residential aged care facility these days".

"Spare a thought for those in rural Australia, where residential aged care facilities are closing, forcing rural families apart as elderly residents are moved hundreds of kilometres away," she

To top this story off, the land where the retirement village is being built had an application two decades ago for an aged care facility to be built on the said piece of land knocked back.

It's good to build wonderful sporting facilities, but at the end of the day people who support them will also need the agedcare facilities, because not everyone will be able to access home support.

Then the links from the WEF to our former national health minister, the recently retired Greg Hunt, a WEF policy director in 2000-2001.


No reports via mainstream media journalists here.

A sunny smile for local museum

THE donation of a renewable energy system has the potential to "eliminate" electricity costs for a local volunteer-run museum.

Paringa-based YES Group recently announced it would donate a solar system for use at the Renmark Paringa Community

Museum chairman Wayne Henry expected the addition of solar power would "drastically" decrease the museum's operating costs.

"Electricity is our second biggest overhead for the museum, after insurance, and the museum's only income is from entrance fees," Mr Henry said.

"We hope this will drastically lower, if not eliminate our bill.

"The funds we save from the solar system will be used to upgrade the museum."

YES Group managing director Mark Yates said the museum generated tourism benefits for the surrounding community.

"Yates Electrical Services is proud to be supporting a local volunteer-based organisation with the donation of a 3KW solar system to assist in reducing its operational costs," Mr Yates said.

"The intention is that the PV system will eliminate all electricity operational costs from the Renmark Paringa Community Museum.

"It's fantastic to also be collaborating with our neighbours and working with a group that is proactively aiming to improve the experience for the broader community and tourists that visit the area."

Mr Henry said the museum was also in the process of installing a community garden, using materials donated from local busi-

"We currently have six wicking beds and plan to put more in," Mr Henry said.

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Barmera feeling the electric vehicle buzz

A NEW electric vehicle charger, paid for by the RAA, is set to be installed in Barmera by the end of 2023, as part of the organisation's statewide charging

Following a deputation from RAA EV charging network program manager Anita Saunders at last Tuesday's council meeting, Berri Barmera councillors unanimously endorsed in principle installing a charger in a carpark off Sturt Street, behind the town's main street retailers.

Mayor Peter Hunt and CEO Dylan Strong were also authorised to begin negotiating documentation pertaining to the new charging

The charger is expected to be a DC charger, capable of producing up to 300km range in 10 minutes.

The RAA, with funding from the state government, will pay for the installation, electricity usage, service and maintenance of the charger, with the cost to consumers expected to be about 35 cents per kWh, in line with current standard retail rates.

Mr Strong said council staff had been working with the RAA for months to find a suitable spot, with the preferred location chosen by elected members ahead of the carpark next to the town's visitor information centre.

'We'll return to the RAA now with the in-principle support and start to look at what that looks like in a tangible outcome and getting the charger installed," he said.


"One of the beauties of EV charging stations is that they require the tourists, more often than not, to stop and stay for a little while as their car charges up.

"One of the main intentions of finding a suitable location for this site has been to look at the surrounding small businesses, whether they be retail outlets or cafes and coffee shops, so that while we have visitors in town and their cars are getting charged up, those people are visiting our small businesses and putting cash in the tills."

Elected members also discussed making improvements to the Sturt Street carpark to make it more appealing to visitors.

(The Sturt Street carpark) is really underutilised at the moment..." said Cr Trevor Scott at last week's meeting.

"(An upgrade) would bring more people into the main part of town."

Flows down slightly, storage up

MURRAY River flow into South Australia has reduced over the past week to around 46,000ML per day and falling, according to Flowtracker.

Updated this week, Flowtracker documents the river flow throughout the entire Murray-Darling Basin, and also shows the current water storages.

The impacts of the high river are being felt across the region, despite the dip.

"Total water storage in the Murray-Darling Basin remains high at 93 per cent," said Justin Dixon, of Mapping Services, which produces Flowtracker.

"A large number of open barrage gates (269) at the Lower Lakes is allowing good flow to the Coorong and Murray Mouth.

"The weir structures at Lock 7 and Lock 8 have been removed allowing for unregulated flows past these locks."

Flowtracker also shows that the Darling River continues to see significant flow of around 21,000ML per day.

Tim, Nicola 'not convinced' by new river


TWO Riverland politicians have spoken out against the state government's selection for a senior monitor of River Murray resources.

The state government last week

announced barrister Richard Beasley had been appointed as South Australia's inaugural River Murray commissioner.

Minister for Water Susan Close said the

appointment would ensure South Australia had input into River Murray management decisions.



Mr Beasley acted as senior counsel for the 2019 South Australian Murray-Darling Basin Royal Commission.

However, Riverland-based MLC Nicola Centofanti said Mr Beasley lacked first-hand experience with River Murray communities.

"A successful advocacy role in the

Murray-Darling Basin requires having the confidence of the Basin communities which include irrigators, other businesses, and the public," Ms Centofanti said.

"I'm not convinced that appointing a Sydney lawyer, who believes water buybacks are the only way forward, will wash with these communities."

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone asked for Mr Beasley's salary to be disclosed.

"We know there is \$2m set aside for the role over four years, but Labor – and now Mr Beasley - refuse to disclose exactly how much the commissioner will be paid," Mr Whetstone said.

SES issues flooding warning

THE SES is warning rising River Murray levels are likely to cause minor flooding in shack areas between Cadell and Mannum.

Shack areas likely to be affected include, but are not limited to, Morgan, Brenda Park, Scotts Creek, Walker Flat and Bowhill.

Flows into SA are expected to exceed 60,000ML a day in two to three weeks' time, and the SES said the flows were expected to remain high for several weeks.

The SES advised residents and shack owners in the areas affected to follow their emergency plan and prepare their family and home for flooding. Those affected are also instructed to move items of value to a safe place and ensure their drains and gutters are clear.

Residents are also urged to regularly mon-

itor river levels in their local area and avoid becoming isolated by floodwaters.

People in the area should also camp on higher ground, away from the river bank.

The Department for Environment and Water said flows into SA were expected to fall to around 40,000ML a day this week, but increase again early next month, due to rainfall in the upstream catchments about two weeks ago.

It said the flow into SA was likely to exceed 60,000ML a day on or around September 13 and continue rising to more than 70,000ML a day by mid-late September.

Completing plan a 'mammoth task'

MURRAY-Darling Basin state governments need to "lift their game" in order to complete water reform targets, according to new data.

The Murray-Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) earlier this month released its six-monthly report card on the progress of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

MDBA chief executive Andrew McConville said the report showed recovering 450GL of water for the environment had become a "mammoth task".

"The SDL Adjustment Mechanism water saving projects in the southern Basin are... slipping behind," Mr McConville said.

"With less than two years before their deadline, the seven at-risk state projects require concerted effort by Basin states if they are to deliver the expected reduction in water recovery for irrigation communities.

"Work to achieve the 450 target, coupled with the SDLAM projects, needs to be done – only then will we see a steep change in the environmental health of the Basin.

"We can already see what great benefits can be achieved by returning water to the river environment, with 2100GL in entitlements secured since the start of the Basin Plan. These benefits have been evident through the hard drought years and again in the wet times that we're experiencing now."



Accredited plans from Queensland, South Australia, Australian Capital Territory and Victoria remain in operation. The MDBA has provided guidance to Basin Governments on the process to amend water resource plans so the plans can evolve and adapt to new information and improvements.



New South Wales has formally submitted 1 of the 20 water resource plans to the MDBA and provided 5 water resource plans for review ahead of forma



Achieving the water recovery target is close to completion, with approximate of the surface water and 92% of the groundwater targets recovered as at 30, 2022. There was no Bridging the Gap water recovery between 1 January and April 2022, Further work is needed to achieve the full recovery targets.



While local supply measures are progressing, substantial work remains to deliver the system-scale projects. All projects interact as a package, and successful delivery at the local scale cannot offset the lack of progress of the critical system-scale projects. Seven SOLAM projects were recently assessed by Basin governments as being at high or extreme risk of not being completed by 30 June 2024.



Sustainable diversion limit adjustment mechanism - efficiency measures

Two further Efficiency Measures projects under the Off-farm Efficiency Program were announced in January 2022 (NSW Murrumbidge trigation Automation Finalisation Project; 5A Marion Water Efficiency Project). However, these are relatively minor in the context of the 450 GL efficiency measures target. Only 2 GL of the additional 450 GL has been recovered, with a further 22.1 GL contracted for



Meeting the 2024 timeframes for many environmental works projects will challenging, but good progress has been made with policy and manageme measures that form part of the toolkit. Business case development work is continuing on a number of the environmental projects.



A range of improvements are still being delivered (e.g., Pre-requisite Policy Measures improvements: Enhanced Environmental Water Delivery). Environmental water is playing an important role to fill in gaps between inflows and maintain water levels in key rivers, forests and wetlands, but outcomes are being limited by not having

Mr McConville said completing the plan was vital to the future sustainability of the Murray-Darling system.

The report card shows critical elements, which will benefit Basin communities and the rivers, wetlands and floodplains, are well behind," he said.

"What the Plan has achieved to date is remarkable, but we are now in the last miles of a long, hard marathon and governments need to up their pace and finish what they started 10 years ago.

"The Basin Plan is designed to secure a sustainable future for the environment, industries and communities – and it's working.

"Now is the time to rebuild real momentum and deliver the rest of this good plan for the benefit of all Australians."

Councils managing infrastructure amid high water levels

RIVERLAND councils are dealing with the impacts of high water levels across the region, with several pieces of infrastructure currently inaccessible.

As of last week, Berri Barmera Council's Bruno Bay boat ramp pontoons in Cobdogla had been removed and access to the boat ramp restricted, while pontoons at Barmera's Sue Fieldhouse boat ramp have also been removed.

These pontoons had begun taking on water and had been damaged prior to the recent high water levels.

The boat ramp can still be used without the pontoons, which will be reinstalled once repaired.

Parts of both the Lions Walk, from the

Bonney Walking Trail have been washed out or inundated.

Strip lighting along the Berri wharf and Barmera jetty have also been removed.

Meanwhile, a recent post on the Renmark Paringa Council Facebook page advised high flows had restricted access to a boat ramp at the Big 4 Caravan Park.

"As a result of the increased Murray River flows into South Australia, the old boat ramp at the entrance to the Big 4 Caravan Park has been temporarily closed," the post read.

"The new boat ramp adjacent to the old ramp is still accessible.

"Council will continue to monitor the water levels and reopen access to the boat ramp once deemed safe."





Smoking out elite-level teamwork

TEAMWORK and communication were core skills tested for local firefighters as part of an annual equipment assessment.

Riverland MFS firefighters earlier this month took part in the annual breathing apparatus proficiency drill, held at the Berri MFS Station.

As part of the drill, firefighters are required to enter a modified shipping container - filled with smoke to simulate a structure fire - and navigate a number of obstacles to locate simulated casualties.

MFS Riverland and Central regional operations co-ordinator, Todd Miles, said communication between firefighters was vital to success in structure fire situations.

"It was very successful, and it was a good refresher for them," Mr Miles said.



"They picked up some pieces of knowledge that will help them remember what they've got to do when going to a job.

"Communication is the biggest skill tested in the exercise... (plus) safety, and the correct use of protective equipment.

"It's about putting the crews through some of the uncomfortable positions they will experience on a job."

Mr Miles said participating in the exercise which had been postponed for the past two years due to Covid-19 restrictions - helped ensure all Riverland MFS firefighters could efficiently respond to emergencies.

"They'll all know when they turn up that this is what they have to do, and what they have to get ready," he said.

"All those things are key in the situation when you're under pressure.

"It's part of our ongoing skills maintenance that we try and get out to deliver these exercises.

"Every year we try and go out to give them a refresher in all of those key skills, so when they are in the situation they don't have to think, it's just muscle memory.

Medical responses piling the pressure on CFS firies

A SENIOR CFS firefighter says increased training and support is needed for Riverland volunteers assisting in medical emergencies.

CFS chief officer Mark Jones recently raised concerns surrounding an increasing demand on the organisation's volunteers to assist ambulance crews in responding to medical emergencies.

Mr Jones said CFS volunteers responded to these incidents without pay, and without the same support as paramedics.

"The CFS is not funded in any way for these non-statutory roles and, in the interests of patient safety and the mental wellbeing of CFS responders, a higher level of training and support would seem to be vital," Mr Jones said.

"Our volunteers are routinely called upon to attend traumatic events beyond the scope of their firefighting duties and these jobs fall outside of most people's expectations when they join the service.

"I have seen the number of SAAS assist jobs that our volunteers are expected to attend grow significantly. This is something that has occurred without any formal agreement or additional support for our volunteers doing an already tough job.'

It is understood CFS volunteers have attended approximately 1000 medical incidents during the past year in South Australia.

Opposition spokesperson for emergency services, Adrian Pederick, said the increased demands would impact the service's ability to recruit new volunteers.

"Further training and upskilling of volunteers is non-negotiable, otherwise CFS members will be hung out to dry when attempting to deal with complex medical incidents," Mr Pederick said.

"Detailed guidelines would also need to be established to identify what call-outs the CFS would be required to respond to.

"Our CFS members do a fantastic job attending fires and other incidents including road crashes, but adding extra pressure on these volunteers will significantly impact attraction and retention in the service.'

Mr Jones said further mental health support was required for CFS volunteers, who often know the victims of emergency situ-

"There is already a great reliance on CFS volunteers to provide SAAS with assistance, particularly in regional SA," he

"Our firefighters are keen to play any role which helps them to support their neighbours, however, it is in these small communities where the trauma of these sorts of jobs hits hardest. Our volunteers are regularly turning up to an incident where they personally know the casualty and are having to deal with the mental trauma of this.'

Mr Du Rieu said utilising new development opportunities to promote economic growth in the community would be a priority if he was successful.

"We have a massive opportunity at the moment, and I'm so proud of what our community is doing in our area," Mr Du Rieu

"To me the Renmark Paringa council area is a jewel in the Riverland, having visionary founders and leaders with a rich and diverse history along a beautiful stretch of the river.

"I want our community to grow in a respectful way, and we need to keep growing to attract the services and facilities that attract people to live here.

"This will increase our rate revenue to secure improved services like better healthcare and, to maintain our exceptional sporting facilities.

"I'm unashamedly pro-development. The bigger we can make our town means we can attract and support new medical facilities, services and childcare.

"This is critical in creating jobs for locals, retaining youth and attracting more professionals to the town.'

Mr Du Rieu – a fifth-generation Riverlander - said it was necessary to support the growth of new and existing industries alongside the agricultural sector.

"I want to encourage our younger generation and entrepreneurs to grow our local economy, while appreciating and fostering the opportunities our district holds," he said.

"We need to work towards a future Renmark Paringa where the economy is sustainable and not solely reliant on agriculture.

"We have a great opportunity to bring Renmark Paringa in line with the rest of the Murray-Darling Basin, where tourism is as big an industry as irrigated agriculture.

"This will enable growth for the district, encouraging further development and services for the council area's sustainability."

Mr Du Rieu said overcoming a shortage of available residential land would also be key to the area's future growth.

"We're lacking residential building blocks and houses, at a time when there is strong demand for housing," he said.

"A further supply of residential land will create new opportunities for expansion in the building industry, and will assist in solving the area's housing affordability challenges.

"We also need to encourage landowners to activate land that is available for development by providing incentives and support.

"Council is trying to stimulate landowners to get started, which is a vital strategy I will continue to support.

"If I am successful in the election, I will actively chase external funding to reinstate our flood bank system throughout our council area to maintain a flood-resilient area."

Mr Du Rieu established Garbusters - the first independent refuse collection business in the Renmark Paringa council area – at 22 years of age, and currently operates HRD Drafting out of his Murtho home.

He has also previously been president of both the Renmark Club, and Renmark Football Club committees.

Mr Du Rieu said his prior experience with business and community groups would be an advantage when advocating for the area.

"I feel that my experience in community organisations and my first term on council as deputy mayor has given me greater insight how to support our exceptional council staff and our community," he said.

"I want to give back to the community that has been so important and wonderful to myself and my family.

"Working together will ensure another five generations and beyond can enjoy Renmark and Paringa – not only as we know it, but as an even more sustainable, opportunity-rich place to live and work."

Mr Du Rieu said he had appreciated working with outgoing Mayor Neil Martinson, who will step down at November's local government election.

"I congratulate Neil on his 16 years of service as Mayor of our community and wish him all the best for the future," he said.

SIM city: Much more than just catching up

THE District Council of Loxton Waikerie covers 8000 square kilometres, spanning from Paisley on the Murray River to Peebinga in the Mallee

And it was last Wednesday in the Mallee when a new Optus mobile phone tower was switched on at Peebinga, by Barker MP Tony Pasin.

It was a landmark occasion for the area and a great opportunity to listen to the famers and processors, who will benefit from it.

One was an old friend, another was from a family I have known through football for almost 40 years, while the remainder were farmers and businessmen operating around the Mallee settlement.

During the gathering, Tony summarised the conditions of the Mobile Black Spot Program and how this group had achieved suc-

The federal government has committed \$380m to the program over five rounds. It has been coinvested with state governments, local governments, businesses, community organisations and telecommunications providers to build towers across regional Australia.



Tony's government contributed 50 per cent of the cost of the Peebinga tower, while those present pledged significant financial support – and Loxton Waikerie council invested \$10,000.

Pledging co-funding was only a part of the journey for this persistent group, which lobbied and negotiated for the tower for years.

Additionally, council has also successfully supported another tower at Paruna, but was not as fortunate with an application for Taplan.

Telstra base station upgrades at Pata, Wunkar and Maggea have also been partnered in the past.

Anyone reading this far will be thinking, 'You don't have to go that far off the beaten track or out of town to be without mobile phone service'.

And there would be four bars on that.

It is a constant challenge for us all to maintain communication by phone, email, and/or internet

across our regions.

At home these links are about staying in touch, but for business this connectivity is also about the economics of doing business day to day, every day. New equipment and controls rely heavily on telecom connectivity, as do daily markets.

Even with a new tower on their doorstep, mobile service is not guaranteed everywhere around Peebinga. During discussion on Wednesday, I discovered this is mitigated using dual SIM connections (Optus and Telstra).

Most devices have this capacity - even my ageing Nokia. It is achieved either by installing two separate SIM cards and plans, or by downloading the extra as a prepaid plan.

I am now "dual SIM-ed". It is my fortunate stroke of

serendipity against mobile service pitfalls, while we work together for better rural connection.

Strategy plots council's path back to growth

A PLAN to bring growth back to the Berri Barmera district after more than two decades of population decline was endorsed by council last week, with a view to start implementing the strategy immediately.

The Berri Barmera Growth Strategy, which has been in development by consultants Holmes Dyer for more than a year, was adopted by council at its ordinary meeting last Tuesday night.

The broad strategy covers a range of areas including population, housing, urban infrastructure, increased productivity and greater tourist numbers.

Among the targets laid out by the plan are population growth of 2500 people and 1800 new dwellings over the next 20 years.

Mayor Peter Hunt said he was "pleased" that the long-awaited strategy was adopted.

"The strategy shares our vision and clear targets against which council will provide a coordinated, strategic and planned approach to create growth in our district to 2040 and beyond," he said.

"(The strategy) also outlines ways council can advocate for and attract investment, increase our population, grow job opportunities and at the same time provide many benefits for our existing community."

Council CEO Dylan Strong said the strategy was a "pivotal document" for the district's future.

"At a strategic level, the growth strategy will be central to reshaping council's strategic and community plan, which will happen after the upcoming elections," he said.

"At an action-based level, one of the bits of feedback that

we had from the community very strongly is that they wanted to see some action on the ground, and wanted to see that strategy start to be delivered in the short-term, rather than two, five or 10 years in the future."

Mr Strong said council staff had already begun looking into some of the "quick wins" in the strategy's implementation plan.

"A few of the items we are talking about as an example are (facilitating) a combination of affordable-level housing and premium-level housing," he said.

ing," he said.
"We have demand outstripping supply at the moment.
That's not specific to Berri, that's right across our council

"The Growth Strategy identified that there is more than 100ha of land presently zoned as residential within the township of Berri which has not yet been developed.

"There are also other areas of land which may require code amendments in order to open them up and encourage development.

"Looking into the type of infrastructure, whether that be wastewater, electricity, water supply, sealed roads, kerbing and footpaths, the assessment of the need for those things and the action required in terms of starting to invest in those items starts immediately.

"We've identified those parcels of land in Berri and Barmera and some of our smaller settlements, so the strategy now is to get out there and start to get that stuff done."

Beyond facilitating the

development of residential dwellings in the district, Mr Strong said other immediate deliverables included investigations into a "premium arts and culture festival or major event on the foreshore of Lake Bonney" and finding a new long-term site for the Berri Library, potentially in conjunction with a new civic centre and community hub.

He said the Growth Strategy would work in synergy with council's Arts and Culture Strategy, which was also adopted last week.

"Key to delivering the Arts and Culture Strategy is council's ability to resource that strategy, so what council has asked me to do is to turn what is proposed as a strategy into action and start to deliver some of that," Mr Strong said.

"Council's current model can't accommodate the delivery of some of those extra activities, so that's the next bit of work we have in front of us."

Despite council preparing to enter caretaker mode from September 6, Mr Strong said it was "full-steam ahead" on the deliverables from the two strategies.

"There's obviously been a great deal of community input invested into these documents," he said.

"And council, on behalf of the community, are really keen to see those actions rolled out."

A total of 71 people and organisations contributed feedback during the final consultation period.

More than 70 per cent of participants in an online survey agreed or strongly agreed with council's approach and the strategy's content.

The strategy is available to view on council's website (www.berribarmera.sa.gov.au).

New club

IF it ain't chrome, it ain't and believed pre-1978 classic.

A yearning to preserve the integrity of the term 'classic' could spark the creation of a new club for Riverland car lovers.

Thanks to revised SA government regulations, cars just 25 years old now fall into the 'classic' category and potentially qualify for discounted club-aligned registration.

However, members of the Riverland's two established car clubs are adamant the 'classic' label should be reserved for pre-1978 vehicles, typically built with plenty of flashy chrome and retro appeal.

So, to allow proud owners of post-1978 cars to enjoy the benefits and camaraderie of club membership, while also keeping the 'classic' label for classics, a meeting is being held this weekend to form a new Riverland

The joint initiative involves the Riverland Customs & Classics (RCC) group and the Riverland Vintage & Classic Car Club (RVCCC), and RCC president Bill Sweet explained that members of both were "finding it difficult to accept (post-1978) cars as classics"

and believed pre-1978 cars were "the final cars of the classic chrome bumper era".

"As the vehicles now eligible for this scheme... do not really fit within either of the clubs' guidelines, the decision has been made to sponsor a new and exciting club to cater for these and later model vehicles," Mr Sweet said.

"This is an opportunity for those who own special-interest vehicles that will fit within the proposed new club's membership criteria to meet with like-minded people and access cheaper registration through the club registration log book scheme."

Under the SA government's new rules, as of July 1 owners of historic or left-hand drive vehicles 25 years or older can access car registration fees under the conditional registration scheme. Previously, vehicles had to be 30 years or older to qualify.

With a 400-strong membership, the RVCCC is understood to be finding it difficult to cater for another five years' worth of suddenly-eligible vehicles.

Mr Sweet said the RCC believes a new club would

attract plenty of interest and fill a local void.

"Basically this means the RVCCC will cater for all the old vintage, veteran and classics as per their constitution, RCC will cater for classics including those highly modified up to 1978, and the new club would cater for those from 1978 onwards," he said.

"This would be an ideal situation."

RCC is sponsoring the upcoming meeting and will assist in the club's establishment by "aiding with protocols, administration and government recognition". The RVCCC is similarly supportive

"So, if you own one of these vehicles and are looking to meet and cruise with like-minded people and aspire to be a foundation member of the new club, put your thinking caps on to dream up a cool club name and get along to the meeting," Mr Sweet said.

The meeting will be held this Sunday, September 4, at the Berri Senior Citizens Club site, on Crawford Terrace, Berri. A show and shine will be held at 1.30pm, followed by the meeting at 2pm.

IF a new Riverland club exclusively for owners of post-1978 cars is created, expect Craig Schloithe to sign up.

Thanks to recent SA government changes, Mr Schloithe's 1993 Nissan Skyline will be eligible for reduced registration fees from next year, but he agrees the car is no "classic".

"I've got electric mirrors, electric windows, air conditioning, power steering, all the cons of a modern car," he said.

"When you think 'classic' you think old school, steel body, chrome bumpers; you think '60s and '70s.'

Regardless, Mr Schloithe backs the idea of establishing a new club, dedicated to owners with vehicles outside the 'classic' genre, labelling

it "a great idea".'

"Because a lot of the cars that are almost 30 years old now don't actually come into the chrome bumper category," he said.

"They're not what a lot of people would call classics, even though technically they

Mr Schloithe was also enthusiastic about being able to take advantage of the conditional registration scheme

that delivers discounts to financial members of registered clubs across SA.

Under the scheme, the average 12-month registration is just \$85, delivering an approximate saving of around \$600, and allows owners to drive their historic vehicle up to 90 days a year while recording each day's activities in a log book.

"I'm not a member of any club at the moment, but I'd

love to jump on board and put my car on club 'rego',' Mr Schloithe said.

"It's cheaper and I only ever bring it out on weekends, so it's perfect for me because 90 days covers every weekend.


"And my insurance comes down if I go under club rego

While Paul Farr's 1972 Torana fits neatly into the 'classic' category, the

Renmark car lover also agrees creating a new club makes sense.

"I'm sure there'll be enough interest around for it," he said.

SA Treasurer Stephen Mullighan said the reduced fees aimed to encourage owners to keep their classic and special vehicles on the road "whereas otherwise it might not be an affordable option".

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Local cop to be sentenced for drug trafficking

A RIVERLAND police officer and his exwife face up to 10 years in prison after being found guilty of trafficking a controlled drug.

According to the ABC, Daniel John Schatto, 46 – who worked as a police officer in both Berri and Renmark - was found guilty by a jury earlier this year after his exwife Natasha Marie Schatto, 38, was found with up to \$3300 worth of methamphetamine in April 2020.

The court heard Mr Schatto financed his former wife to buy the drugs knowing some "of the drugs purchased by Ms Schatto

During a pre-sentencing hearing in the Adelaide District Court, prosecutor Timisha Ward told the court prison was the only appropriate sentence for the crime.

Mr Schatto's lawyer, Nick Healy, told the court his client had an "exemplary police career" and was trying to "appease his wife". The pair will be sentenced in September.



have an opportunity to provide their views on the establishment of First Nations Voice to SA parliament at two local "consultation sessions" being run by the state government.

"A Voice to South Australia's Parliament will provide Aboriginal people the opportunity to express concerns and put forward ideas at the highest level of decision-making in our state," Mr Maher said.

'We want Aboriginal people involved in the early stages to help shape how The Voice should be established, and how it would work with South Australia's parliament."

Mr Agius said establishing a Voice would "provide better outcomes for Aboriginal people of South Australia". Sessions are being held statewide during August and September.

Police investigate chemical spill

THE Waikerie post office was forced to close on Friday morning due to the leaking of an unknown chemical from a par-

The incident happened at about 8.45am and the post office was closed until about 11am.

A police spokesperson said three people who experienced mild symptoms following the spill were taken to Waikerie Hospital by SA Ambulance.

The CFS cordoned off an area of the footpath in front of the post office, while the parcel containing the chemical was made secure and the premises made safe.

Waikerie CFS captain Shaun Arnold said the unknown potent substance leaked out from a sealable plastic sandwich bag. He said post office staff discovered the spillage when sorting out parcels inside their prem-

"We believe it was only one chemical, which had a chemical reaction with something in the atmosphere, which caused it to leak," Mr Arnold said.

He said staff quickly placed the leaking parcel into a bag and contained it to a mail sorting trolley, which they pushed outside.

Mr Arnold said the parcel was made safe and taken away by police for a forensic examination.

Two Waikerie CFS units, SAPOL and SA Ambulance attended the scene.

Mr Arnold said a hazmat expert in Adelaide advised CFS personnel at the scene.

Police were understood to still be investigating the incident earlier this week.

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What to consider when choosing a school

THE Riverland has many incredible schools for parents and caregivers to choose from when making the decision of where to send their children for their education.

Whether you are looking at the public system, or perhaps private, the Riverland has something to cater for every family.

With schools in every town, you can choose to enrol in a school close to home, or venture out of the district for a school offering options preferred by you and your child.

It is important to consider key things when deciding on where to send children to school, including which school will suit your child's personalities, strengths, needs, and interests.

Consider how different schools match your personal values and preferences,

meet your family's practical needs, compare on factors like size, classes, facilities, results, etc. and communicate and build relationships with families.





New mobile base hits black spot

PARUNA and Peebinga residents are now experiencing better mobile phone service thanks to round five of the Mobile Black Spot program.

The new Optus mobile base station was switched on in Peebinga – south of Paruna – last week after the local community, including Loxton Waikerie council, farmers and business owners, pulled together to make a case for improved service in the region.

The new station was secured under the former Coalition federal government, and Barker's Liberal MP Tony Pasin paid tribute to the community's efforts.

"This community were incredibly active in lobbying government and the telecommunications companies to demonstrate the economic benefit to the region improved service would bring," Mr Pasin said.

"I've been working with the Peebinga community since 2018

to see improved service. To have this tower on and operating is a great result.

"I'm proud that the Coalition government listened and delivered for Peebinga."

Mr Pasin said better mobile coverage was particularly important for rural communities.

"Mobile phone connectivity is no longer a luxury but a necessity for doing business and a key piece of safety equipment," he said.

"I am pleased to see that with the support of the Coalition's Mobile Phone Blackspot Program, Optus has been able to erect towers at Paruna and Peebinga."

Mr Pasin said the Peebinga tower switch-on followed the Optus switch-on at Paruna in April this year, also co-funded through round five of the program.

He said the Coalition's \$380m investment through the program had generated a total investment of more than \$875m, to deliver

more than 1270 new mobile base stations across Australia.

He said in contrast Labor had "invested zero dollars and delivered zero new mobile phone towers when they were in government".

"Communities across Barker have been a direct beneficiary of Coalition Government investment, with improved mobile service delivered to 32 locations across the electorate including Mindarie, Murtho, Meribah, Pata, Wunkar, Nildottie, Pata, Wynarka and Mundulla West," Mr Pasin said.

Mitolo Family Farm's John Mitolo said improved mobile service was a significant benefit to the business.

"The new mobile phone tower at Peebinga has brought not only a much-needed improvement to our overall daily communications as a business, but more importantly, huge safety benefits to our team, Mr Mitolo said.

Importance of making your end-of-life wishes known

END-of-life wishes workshops were successfully held in the Riverland on August 16 and 17.

The Making Your Wishes Known workshops are about providing a space of time for to consider what is important to have in place for one's end of life wishes.

Workshop facilitator Rhonda Smedley said it is important to be prepared for end of life, much like preparing for the beginning of life.

"However, this is not

always an easy conversation to have with yourself and your loved ones," she said.

"The workshop, with the support of the facilitator and a workbook that is provided, gently brings awareness to the audience about the myriad of issues that need addressing.

"(It will) help them know what is already in place, and what things have not been considered."

Two workshops were held in the Riverland, one in Barmera on August 16 and

one in Berri on August 17.

"Both the Barmera and Berri workshops were booked to capacity," Ms Smedley said.

"Everyone's experience is different, so the conversation around a coffee table enabled each person to share their story, knowing they were listened to well.

"The feedback from both groups was extremely positive, leaving everyone to appreciate more fully that their lives certainly have

meaning and purpose despite talking about a topic that is often taboo."

Ms Smedley also highlighted the importance of having these workshops in the Riverland.

"Sadly, regional areas of our state are compromised because of distance and lack of resources," she said.

'Coming from a country background, I personally knew this dilemma and felt that it is something we could provide freely."

Founder and managing director of digital marketing agency Creative Little Soul, Ms Symeonakis lives with multiple sclerosis and trigeminal neuralgia, and has permanent disabilities, including vision loss, but has banked 20 years of experience in hospitality, entertainment, marketing and public relations.


More than 3700 nominations – from organisations of all sizes, across virtually all industries – were submitted from 67 nations and territories for consideration this year.

Creative Little Soul has grown from a onewoman show to a buoyant agency, boasting an ever-expanding team of creatives who tackle anything from logo design, to branding, copywriting, email marketing campaign and social media marketing.

Described as "a serial entrepreneur and chronic illness advocate", Ms Symeonakis grew up in Renmark and lived in the town until her 20s. She now resides in Sydney, but continues her association with the Riverland, offering advice, training and support to the region, where her family still lives.

Without her knowledge, Ms Symeonakis was nominated for the award by her team at Creative Little Soul. She said the nomination and the award were both "humbling" and "a big surprise".

"I was able to read (the team's) comments

which were very touching and also that of the judges which was very motivational and kind," she said. "When you're in the midst of doing all the things it's hard to focus on what's ahead.

To keep her staff employed during the pandemic, Ms Symeonakis founded two other businesses. She also worked with the Rural Business Support organisation to help other small businesses effected by the pandemic to find ways to connect with new audiences and "get online".

"I also did my Riverland ambassadorship online course too," she said.

"So, I always share and put the region and area forward to people, letting them know all about the great exports and businesses the region is home too.

"I am very proud to come from SA and the Riverland, which is one of the most beautiful places on earth, and I feel grateful to have grown up and lived there. I try to send as many people as I can there for a holiday or have (Riverland) products tried and stocked."

Another judge said they were "deeply touched with the way she treats her employees and her team, the way she supports them and helps them with their needs whether its related to work or their health".

We've lost another gifted bush balladeer and wordsmith

ON August 12 a dear friend of Bill and I succumbed to cancer, at Bouldercombe, Queensland, 15 months after having what was thought to be an ear infection.

Bush balladeer and wordsmith Keith Jamieson OAM included many towns in his popular touring bush ballad shows, touring around Australia for many years.

He had been at the Mildura festival, and that is where he introduced Queensland songbird Sharon Heaslip to us.

Jammo's partner Alisha Smith, the 'Finger Picking Chicken', learnt the bush ballad guitar technique from the legendary Barry Thornton, who had a good friendship with Jammo.

Their daughter, Caitlyn Jamieson, grew up on the road with Jammo and Alisha and inevitably became a part of the show, and continued to tour with them.

She is a multi-instrumentalist, as well as being a singer, and has started a band up, though it isn't country. However, I feel she will still be involved with the bush balladeers.

Mid Murray Council commences Swan Reach's river revitalisation

WORK is set to begin next month on the first stages of a significant revitalisation of Swan Reach's Len White Reserve.

Mid Murray Council said stage one and two of the project will include riverbank reclamation works to improve the riverfront area and an upgrade of the full existing play-

New asphalt paths will also be installed, connecting the playground to existing paths, along with the construction of two disability accessible carparks and a new toilet facility.

Works on these stages are expected to begin towards the end of next month with completion anticipated in March 2023.

The Mid Murray Council is delivering the project, with financial support through a \$244,970 grant from the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund's infrastructure projects stream and \$110,000 from the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program Phase 2 grant scheme.

The council also received \$44,310 from the State Government's Open Space and Places for People grant funding program.

The new pathways are being provided as links to the Murray Coorong Trail under the Murray Darling Basin Economic Development Fund.

Mid Murray Mayor Dave Burgess said the project would enhance the picturesque Swan Reach riverfront and create improved facilities for locals and visitors.

He said council had worked closely with the local community to create the concept for these improvements in line with the Swan Reach River Front and Len White Reserve

Mr Burgess said despite some challenges including materials shortages delaying the start of these works, and the impending high flows, council was excited the project would

soon begin.

The project will begin with the playground upgrade next month which is estimated to be completed in December.

Council said this would then be followed by remediation works along the river bank from the jetty to the downstream end of the

Due to the current high river levels it is expected this will take place from February through to March 2023.

"The upgraded playground will create a popular meeting and play space, with new equipment including swings, trampolines, climbing frames, exercise equipment and nature play elements," Mr Burgess said.

"The addition of connecting paths will make Len White Reserve more accessible, and its connections with the Murray Coorong Trail will put it on the map for more visitors to discover."

Replacement toilets at the reserve are expected to start in October.

The new toilets will include a three cubicle facility including one with disability





Hogan and Bullock were named best in the loss for Loxton, as the side bowed out of the finals in straight sets after losing to Renmark the week prior.



Renmark GF-bound despite rule breach

AN "oversight" of an RFL constitutional rule threw the Riverland footy world into a frenzy over the past few days, after Renmark fielded an ineligible player in last Saturday's A grade second semi-final.

The player in question took to the field the previous week for the B grade side, therefore breaching a rule that the RFL has had in place for the finals for a number of years.

The RFL was alerted to the breach following the contest via an email from Waikerie president Aaron Thompson, leading to a Monday-night meeting of the RFL commission.

The commission heard Renmark's side of the story at the meeting and determined that the club would receive a \$5000 fine, with \$2500 of it suspended for the next 24 months.

The club will also lose four premiership points for the 2023 season and will be allowed four fewer player-approved points than its rival RFL clubs next year.

The Magpies found themselves



the subject of online criticism after it was alleged that the club was seeking the result to be overturned.

"After the ABC article we did get a phone call from (RFL president) Mark Wright querying if that's what we wanted," president Aaron Thompson said.

"I straight up said to him 'No, that's not the case at all'.

"All we did was send an email querying why the player was out there – that's all."

Mr Thompson went on to laud the efforts of the RFL and said that the commission "handled it beautifully".

"I think the punishment is fair, and we were uncomfortable with a forfeit because that benefits us," Mr Thompson said.

"We felt strange about benefiting from Renmark getting punished.

"This way, they're punished without anyone else getting a benefit from it right now, so I think it's not a bad way to go about it.

"It's been quite humorous that Renmark are the ones that have been found guilty of cheating and we're the ones coming out like the villains."

Mr Wright said penalising Renmark with a loss for the weekend's game was "looked at", but ultimately decided against.

"The RFL spent considerable time looking at a number of penalty options," Mr Wright said.

"There's no doubt that there was a breach, so we had to – in line with our constitution and the best interest of the RFL – come up with a solution.

"One of those scenarios was the forfeiture of that match from Renmark, which would've seen Renmark play Loxton this week.

"But, in consideration of a number of options, we decided against that and went with what we gave."

Mr Wright detailed the substance of Renmark's defence, and

said that there was "no intent" from the club to break the rules.

"There was an acceptance by Renmark that they were in the wrong and it wasn't something they did deliberately," Mr Wright said.

"They had a late withdrawal on a Friday night with an injury and felt the most appropriate action was to bring this lad up to play, so it was essentially an oversight of the rule. "They were well aware of the rule, but there was certainly no malice intended on their behalf and it certainly wasn't to discredit the spirit of the game or the spirit of the RFL rules."

Renmark president Robbie Bonner declined to comment on the situation, with the club's board to meet in the coming days to dis-

Rovers triumphant in one-sided second semi

with the latter at the heart of the player ineligibility conflict that has dominated discussion over the past few days.


Tristan Geehman and Steven Braun shone for Waikerie off of half back, but the ball was down there too often for the Magpies to handle.

RFL doubles down on its 17s/18s call

WHILE it may have been overshadowed by a dramatic weekend of RFL footy, the RFL's decision to move from under 18s to under 17s in 2023 dominated discussion late last

Concerns were raised as to whether the RFL had consulted the clubs before making the change, but RFL president Mark Wright remains adamant that the commission has made the right call and acted appropriately.

"The clubs have been well aware of a proposal to change the age groups for many years," Mr Wright said.

"My mantra for the RFL is to improve what we're doing and make it

better for the Riverland and we've had the same systems for 30 years, but it doesn't make them the right systems.

"We're trying a new system here, the numbers stack up for what we're trying to do and we've already produced the data to the clubs.

"Yes, you could say they weren't consulted in the decision, but they've been consulted about the whole change for many years.

"We get appointed on the commission to make decisions and to administer the RFL on behalf of the clubs."

The move has been made to ensure that the RFL B grade competition remains functional, with a number of clubs struggling for numbers across the

2022 season.

Mr Wright acknowledged that some clubs may have concerns about numbers in the senior colts, but urged people to "look at it from a holistic approach at an RFL level".

"People are reluctant to change, but if we don't implement change nobody is going to know what the benefit is, Mr Wright said.

"Numbers are declining and they

fluctuate and it's not going to suit every club every year. We're trying to achieve consistency.

"This is certainly not a quick-fix measure and is something that might take a couple of years to sort itself out.

"My argument is that you need to work with the RFL. We're doing this for the best interest of football in the Riverland. That's how we're looking at RIVERLAND EIGHTBALL RESULTS:



We have also introduced a sitdown café in the function pavilion so you can sit, relax and enjoy local produce courtesy of Salt and Pepper Catering.


Whilst we are continuing to plan on bringing you the normal Field Days as in the past, this year will include some changes.

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RFDS simulator

THE Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) portable simulator will return to the Field Days this year.

The simulator is a full-scale replica of the fuselage of the Pilatus PC-12 aircraft used by RFDS in SA and NT.

It has been built principally for training RFDS crews, as well as for building public awareness within the community at major events.

Both the cockpit and the cabin are a 1:1 reproduction of the actual aircraft.

While the cockpit is static, the cabin area is 'live' in that it provides functional oxygen, suction and storage systems, as well as power to operate medical equipment.

"The layout of the cabin area is an exact reproduction of the setting experienced by patients and RFDS staff," an RFDS spokesperson said.

"The standard stretcher configuration is two stretchers; we can carry two patients (adult or child), with the added ability to carry a new-born in a humidicrib secured to a stretcher."

Both the PC-12 and the RFDS Medi-Jet 24 are single-pilot aircraft. The RFDS Medi-Jet 24 has three stretchers.

Field Days executive officer Tim Grieger was pleased to have the RFDS presence.

"The RFDS simulated aircraft is always fascinating," he said.

"The RFDS has a big expansion planned for the Riverland, of course, and they'll be raising awareness of that while they're

The simulator will be on show at site 20, near the Bank SA stage.

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

Veterans SA connecting with locals at Field Days

VETERANS SA will attend the 2022 Riverland Field Days, aiming to connect veterans and their families in the region with services and support.

The agency recently consulted with the local veteran community, inviting input on the services they wanted to meet with at the Field Days, to be held in Barmera on September 16-17.

As a result, Veterans SA will be joined by Open Arms (veterans and families counselling), Legacy Club of South Australia and Broken Hill, Military and Emergency Services Health Australia, Australian Partners of Defence and the Barmera RSL sub-branch.

The partnering organisations will provide veterans and their families in the region with direct access to advocacy services, counselling and wellbeing support, family support and concession and discount information.

Veterans SA director Chantelle Bohan said enabling regional veterans to access the services and support they need was "a critical part of the agency's strategic plan".

"We want to ensure that veterans and their families in the Riverland are aware of the support available to them as well as facilitate local access to services," Ms Bohan said.

"Regional field days are a great opportunity to reach our community and hear directly about matters of importance, as well as connect veterans and their families with organisations that they may not be aware of."

Recent data collected in the 2021 Census indicates approximately 950 former serving personnel living in the Riverland. Veterans SA and its exhibiting partners will be located on stalls 55. 57 and 59 in the exhibition pavilion.

THE return of the Riverland Field Days this year will also see the return of a popular wearable art competition.

The Ag-Art Wear competition encourages entrants to create a piece of wearable art made with materials of an agricultural/horticultural nature, such as those produced or found on a farm or block.

Ag-Art Wear co-ordinator Sarah Plush said she was looking forward to the return of the Riverland Field Days after two years of cancellations.

"Field Days being able to happen again just brings everyone from the community back out," she said.

"Seeing the designs up on stage again will be great. I've missed it the last couple of years... just the buzz and excitement you get when the event happens."

Mrs Plush described the 2019 competition as "very successful".

"We had some new people who hadn't entered before and also quite a lot of high school students," she said.

"That was good to see them competing as younger designers – they have that different take on things."

Mrs Plush said the recycled wear

category would return this year, after a successful first run in 2019.

"Recycled wear is probably more popular this year," she said.

"That's something that we'll definitely be keeping because I think up-cycling is the way we're going at the moment, rather than the ag-art – which seems to be a bit of a dying artform."

With entries slightly down on previous years, Mrs Plush said interested people still have time to enter, with the cut off for entries on Friday, September 9.

"If I don't have the outfits by then... as long as people contact me to say they have an outfit they want to enter but they just haven't quite finished it yet, then that's fine," she said.

"I do have some outfits that people made for last year's event, that obviously didn't happen, so they will use them this year."

Entry into the competition is free, with a total prize pool of \$1000 and cash prizes awarded to winners.

"The cash prizes are a little bit higher this year, which the Field Days organisation has kindly donated," Mrs Plush said.
