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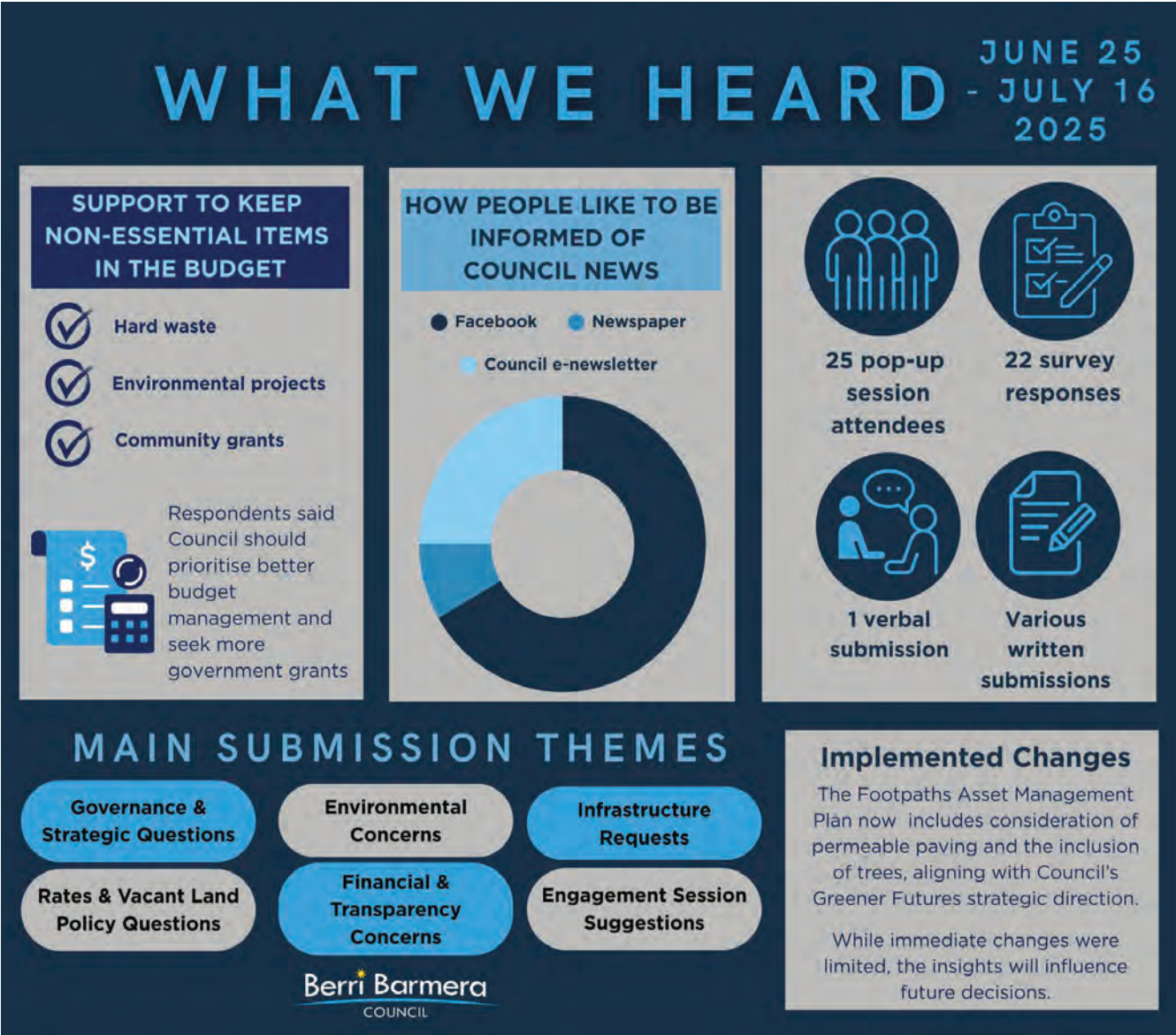
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A new way for water?

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“CIT advised its irrigation members in June... that as from July 1, 2025, they would be required to balance their water accounts

monthly,” Mr McCarron said.

“This means that they must ensure they hold enough water allocation on their water accounts to offset any water use during the month.

“The CIT Board made this change after considering a range of factors increasing risks for individual irrigators and Irrigation Trusts in balancing their water accounts. A significant factor was the continuing reduction of permanent water entitlement held within CIT, which is now well below annual water use volumes.

“As a result, CIT irrigators are increasingly reliant on the availability of water allocation on the temporary market. Increased reliance on the allocation market and exposure to the fluctuations in water allocation availability and price meant changes in how water

accounts are managed was required.”

It is understood CIT account payments will remain on a quarterly basis.

Mr McCarron said examining what water market options were available, and best suited to their needs, would benefit individual irrigators.

“CIT will support customers with increased availability to information through its web-based customer portal, telemetry system, linked water account balancing and through the CIT Water Exchange,” he said.

“Transitioning to monthly water account balancing may require some growers to review their current practices and they have a range of water market options available to choose from.

“CIT will monitor the transition closely and remain flexible to address any unforeseen challenges.”

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“We had such an incredible time performing in Barmera last year and couldn’t wait to bring the Decadent 80s show back,” Mr Tilbrook said.

“Unfortunately, despite a promising start in ticket sales, as the event drew closer, sales weren’t sufficient to cover the substantial costs involved in touring a production of this scale. With around four weeks to go, we had to make the difficult, and heartbreaking decision to cancel.

“Putting on a live show takes a lot behind the scenes: travel, production, accommodation, marketing, and more. While performing is our passion, and not our main source of income, the risk of incurring thousands in losses makes it hard for us to ‘wait and see’ on late ticket sales.

“We know people are juggling busy lives, and committing early can be tough, we get that, truly.”

However, Mr Tilbrook said community feedback was welcomed regarding how the event could be staged locally in future years.

“(The) unpredictability makes it challenging for us to plan big shows in smaller

regions,” he said.

“We always try to be flexible, which is why we offer refunds for those who can’t attend at the last minute, but even that isn’t always enough to offset the financial pressures.

“We’re not giving up on the Riverland. We’d love to find ways to return and celebrate together again.

“If your community has thoughts or suggestions on how we can make future events more viable, we’d really love to hear them.”

It is understood winners of The Murray Pioneer’s ticket giveaway for the show were each given a \$50 Amazon voucher instead.

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Subdivision for Cobby Steam Museum?

NEGOTIATIONS between a local community group and the State Government have resulted in a possible subdivision of Crown Lands to possibly lease the Cobdogla Steam Museum site.

The Cobdogla Steam Friends Society (CSFS) have been advocating for ongoing access to the Cobdogla Steam Museum from

SA Water since the site faced closure from the 2022/2023 Murray River flood.

Resolving to advocate and investigate different options to transfer the site to the CSFS in 2023, a status update on the matter within Berri Barmera council’s July agenda outlined a May meeting — undertaken by Berri Barmera CEO Tim Pfeiffer, Mayor

Ella Winnall, and senior executives from SA Water and Crown Lands — in which SA Water would consider subdividing off the Humphrey Pump from the site.

“(SA Water would gift) most of the remaining assets to CSFS and extinguish their dedication over the land,” the report read.

“Crown Lands would consider entering into a direct lease of the museum site with CSFS subject to a range of terms and conditions, particularly relating to the CSFS’s financial and membership sustainability.

“Whilst subsequent progress has not been fast, this remains the most up to date status of the matter”.

BIG4’s Berri Riverside Holiday park party

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She’s a dancing queen

A RIVERLAND dancer has been recently accepted into one of Australia’s most prestigious youth ballet companies, marking the next step in her dream to become a prima ballerina.

Seven-year-old Portia Woolston — of Winkie — received the news of her acceptance into the Brisbane City Youth Ballet Company (BCYB) last week, with the Rosie Clark Dance Studio ballerina now preparing to make her debut in five 2025 Christmas and New Year performances of The Nutcracker.

“I am a bit nervous, but I am very excited to dance on stage,” Portia told The Murray Pioneer.

“I am always dancing and singing.” Beginning dance class when she was two, Portia dances three nights a week at her Berri dance studio, learning the styles of ballet, contemporary, tap, jazz, hip-hop and acrobatics.

Though Portia said she loves all types of dance, ballet was, and has always been, her favourite.

“I like that (the music) is nice and quiet,” she said.

“You have to balance (a lot), and you wear tutus — it’s very pretty.

“I like leaps, turns, and expressing myself through the music.”

Founded in 2004, BCYB provides aspiring young dancers with performance opportunities and coaching, with the company performing twice a year in theatres such as the Brisbane Powerhouse, Griffith University’s Conservatorium Theatre, and the Gold Coast’s Home of the Arts.

With between only 50 and 80 young dancers selected from the auditions, Rosie Clark Dance Studio principal Natalie Woolston said

she was “beyond proud” of her daughter’s achievement and acceptance into the company.

“It’s all very exciting and very magical,” she said.

“We sent in a recorded audition and really didn’t expect anything, until we got the call to let us know Portia had been selected.

“We are just over the moon, because there aren’t opportunities like this available for dancers below the age of 10 in South Australia. Any exposure if you’re looking for such opportunities is vital.

“She is a beautiful dancer, and shows you can do anything if you set your mind to it and work hard — it’s just amazing, and we’re so proud.”

Offering a wide dance syllabus to the those in the Riverland of all ages for more than 30 years, Ms Woolston said the studio “has always felt passionate about making quality dance training available to everyone”.

“We offer classes from ages two to adults, with our oldest members in their 70s,” she said.

“We also offer classes in all styles, dance exams, fun classes, and exercise classes, and host an all-school dance concert each year, with the 2025 performance coming up this term.

“Dance is great for fitness, but it also teaches commitment and discipline, helps on memory, wellbeing and mental health, and is a great social activity where you can express yourself.

“There are many benefits that dance can bring, it’s beautiful thing to have in your life.”

FocusOne Health empowers the futures of Riverlanders

A BERRI mental and general health service provider has recently been awarded funding from the State Government to boost the numeracy, literacy, and digital skills of Riverlanders.

Receiving one of 22 Adult Community Education (ACE) grants earlier this month, FocusOne Health is now set to continue offering a six-week interactive course, EMPOWERING YOUR FUTURE, with the project designed to support unemployed and underemployed adults, youth, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Delivering the program since 2011, participants build foundation skills and workplace readiness in a safe, social and engaging learning environment, with group-based learning increasing confidence, social skills, and literacy levels.

“Before joining the program, I felt stuck and unsure of my future,” a previous EMPOWERING YOUR FUTURE participant said.

“Now I’ve got a resume, confidence, and a plan.

“It’s changed everything.”

The recent round of state funding — a collective \$14m investment — comes as a recent survey by the Australian Industry Group has revealed nearly 90 per cent of Australian businesses are suffering productivity issues due to low levels of language, literacy, numeracy and digital literacy among workers.

Additionally, almost 44 per cent of the adult population find everyday reading and writing challenging, and about 160,000 Australian job seekers say they have difficulty with English language needs, or completed less than year 10 schooling.

“The statistics around adult liter-

acy and numeracy are shocking and we must do more to make sure this figure goes down,” South Australian Minister for Education, Training, Skills Blair Boyer said.

“Literacy and numeracy are key to finding work, from writing a resume and interview skills, to being able to handle documents and reports when fulfilling their roles.

“It can be embarrassing and distressing for those people who don’t have these skills.

This funding initiative is about building up people with low levels of literacy and numeracy, by providing them with the skills, knowledge and confidence they need to succeed in the workplace.”

Federal Minister for Skills and Training Andrew Giles said “foundation skills are transformational – with the power to improve lives, communities and workplaces”.

“Foundation skills delivered in

community settings give adults a safe and welcoming space to build their skills and confidence as they move towards further training and employment,” Mr Giles said.

“South Australia has a proud tra-

dition of supporting fee-free foundation skills in vocational education and training, and adult community education, and the Australian Government is proud to partner in such an important initiative.”

Changing with the times?

CHANGE is often necessary to keep up with the ever-developing economic and social demands of the modern world.

As detailed in today’s edition of The Murray Pioneer, Central Irrigation Trust (CIT) irrigators are now required to have their water accounts balanced at the end of each month.

While to the outside observer the technicalities of this announcement can be hard to get through, it is a change that reshapes some irrigation practices that have been long held in the Riverland, and perhaps speaks to the direction – by necessity – water resource management is heading.

As is fairly pointed out by the CIT CEO, Berri Barmera is experiencing an ongoing decrease in the amount of permanent water entitlements being held within the district. This is pushing irrigators toward increased dependence on the temporary market.

While growing reliance on purchasing temporary water has its risks, the factors that have led to this situation should also be examined.

It’s no secret that ongoing challenges within the global wine industry are having a dramatic impact on Riverland grape growers. The prices growers have seen on key varieties like shiraz for their hard work in recent vintages have been below production costs – a fact that is also well known – and are expected to remain at these pressure-inducing levels for at least another year or two.

It’s a conundrum we’ve been hearing about for years, and it seems that increasing numbers of grape growers are now making the ultimate decision to exit the industry, and sell off the vineyard.

For many at an older age, this also means selling off permanent water entitlements – either to the Federal Government through current buyback programs, or onto the temporary market – and for those needing a financial boost in order to comfortably live through their retirement, there could be little blame.

However, what will the impacts on the Riverland look like if these trends continue to the long-term?

While the volumes still held in permanent entitlement within the Renmark Irrigation Trust (RIT) area understandably remain at a level where the pressures seen on CIT are yet to become as severe, its district is far from invulnerable to the same factors that have seen permanent entitlement leave the area.

Is this ultimately leading us down a path where we are putting the capacity of Riverland agricultural production at risk?

It is important to remember that permanent entitlement sold out of the Riverland is most often also taken out of the South Australian productive pool, meaning if this pattern continues, a smaller number of irrigators will be left footing an increasingly larger bill.

Perhaps more thought to the Riverland’s future needs to be considered?



Portable pedal-organ used by the Church of England’s River Murray Mission, about 1899. It is unclear how this organ found its way to the Loxton Historical Village, where it is on display. The organ may have been used on the first Etona, the steam-powered launch commissioned by the church in 1891, but more likely the instrument was used on the second Etona. This paddle-steamer, commissioned by the Mission in 1899, was sold in 1912, and its contents distributed to local churches. Both Etonas plied the Murray on four-to-six week mission circuits pausing for services provided by the Missioner at various locations. The little Mission boats were quite self-sufficient, and the presiding minister was often well loved and highly respected. At most landings, the many parishioners didn’t fit in the little onboard chapel, which seated 12 to 20 people. In this setting, the service would be held on the riverbank and the organ easily brought out and suitably placed for hymns to be sung. An interesting story tells that the future leader of the entire British Army in North Africa once played this organ. In 1903 teenage Bernard, son of Tasmanian Bishop Montgomery, and later the famed WWII field marshall of Alamein (photo) travelled on one Etona journey and played the organ for such services. Extract from open letter to Minister for Urban Development

DEAR Minister Nick Champion,

We understand you are aware of the proposal for up to 750 houses and a marina on the Jane Eliza floodplain area, just north of the Renmark township.

Many residents and ratepayers have very serious concerns about any building on the floodplain. We do not have such concerns about the proposed marina.

A recent episode of the program 60 minutes, on Channel 9, was a comprehensive criticism by the Insurance Council of Australia of any building on floodplains, and indicated recent flood events and some of the cost and damage exposures of such developments. Similar criticisms and concerns of flooding risks are being more noticeable from many sources – even the Federal Government – as time progresses.

Current insurance costs are climbing largely and rapidly, and it is our understanding some areas – especially with a floodplain postcode, are becoming un-insurable.

We feel the estimated heights of Murray River floods that we will have in the future over and above 2022/3 levels are such that bank protection may most likely not be possible. Our town is at risk and we think the proposed development most likely cannot be protected from those major flood events.

PlanSA-amended building requirements for floodplains in 2023 require houses to be built on stilts 3m to 4m high, with a lower section open, or roller doors only to allow flood waters through. Would this be a requirement for the Jane Eliza development?

Before more money is spent, we are aware of the Code Amendment process which normally you could not make a decision on until all the steps are undertaken. We urge you to announce that this proposal of building on this floodplain does not meet with your approval because of the very-high flood risk.

Turning point in youth health?

THE Australian Medical Association (AMA) has welcomed new data showing a significant decline in vaping rates among Australian teenagers, describing the findings as a turning point in youth health, and a testament to the power of strong policy, education, and community awareness.

Data recently released by Federal Health Minister Mark Butler shows vaping rates among children aged 14 to 17 years have fallen from 17.5 per cent at the start of 2023, to 14.6 per cent in April this year.

The figures are drawn from the Cancer Council’s latest Generation Vape research, which is considered the most comprehensive survey on vaping in Australia.

The “eighth wave” of data includes responses from about 3000 young people and shows a broader decline in vaping across all age groups. The findings are deeply encouraging.

We’re witnessing a real shift in behaviour and attitudes, and these results mark a significant step forward in protecting young Australians from the harms of vaping.

We’re seeing fewer teens picking up vapes, less curiosity about vaping, and a growing sense of embarrassment around being a ‘vaper’.

That signals a real cultural change — and that’s a win for families, schools, and communities.

Among the most promising findings are:

- ❑ Vaping rates among Australians aged over 15 have reduced by more than a third.
- ❑ Vaping among adults aged 30 to 59 has halved.
- ❑ Exposure to vaping content on major social media platforms has dramatically decreased.
- ❑ Fewer teens are purchasing vapes themselves, and curiosity about vaping continues to decline — with fewer than one-third expressing any interest in vaping.

The message is getting through. Teens are telling us vaping is no longer seen as cool or aspirational, that it’s not something ‘everyone does’ anymore.

It’s a turning point in how young Australians view vaping — and a major stride for public health.

The AMA reaffirmed its commitment to supporting evidence-based strategies to reduce youth vaping and smoking, and called for continued vigilance as new products and marketing tactics emerge.

This is not the time to take our foot off the pedal.

We’ve made significant progress, but we must keep pushing forward to protect the health of the next generation.

Reports confirm Basin decline

RECENT reports from the Murray-Darling Basin Authority – the Sustainable Rivers Audit and Basin Plan Evaluation – confirm what communities, scientists and First Nations have warned for years – basin ecosystems are in decline.

Without bold action to recover more water and let it flow, the rivers that sustain life across south-eastern Australia face collapse.

When we put water into wetlands, we know it works. We see fish breeding, birds nesting and life returning.

But right now, those rivers are losing resilience. Without a radical shift in political will and investment, the next audit might read like an obituary.

This audit indicates we are at best winning slowly. But in the face of a changing climate across the basin on top of poor health, to win slowly is the same as losing.

Waterbirds are the canaries in the coal mine. Their disappear-

ance tells us that wetlands aren’t functioning. Without thriving wetlands as a food source, the birds don’t nest and breed.

The health of native fish rated poor across the basin, and is collapsing in the Darling-Baaka. The large-scale fish kills that devastated Menindee are no longer one-off events. They are symptoms of systemic decline.

If the rivers don’t flow, native fish can’t recover. Connectivity between rivers is key.

Rivers need to be allowed to flow and connect to each other, they are not isolated channels.

The basin’s agricultural economy is doing okay, but freshwater ecosystems aren’t. It’s time to stop exaggerating impacts of water recovery and start focusing on solutions.

The good news is that environmental water works. When floodplains get water, ecosystems respond.

Fish spawn, birds breed, trees regenerate, but the current scale of water recovery is nowhere near enough.

Right now, water for the environment is trapped in the channel because of political and physical constraints. Constraints relaxation, allowing the river to swell over its banks and letting it flow isn’t an optional extra, it’s the only way to keep the wider floodplain alive.

Water Justice must be central to a renewed Basin Plan. We are still concerned that governments are failing to meaningfully progress toward water justice.

First Peoples are the original owners of water in every river, stream, lake and creek, but they currently hold 0.11 per cent, and 0.21 per cent of water entitlements in the northern and southern basin.

First Nations are rights holders. Water justice must mean resourcing First Nations to make decisions about water in their country – whether that’s through applying United Nations standards for the rights of Indigenous peoples, funding restoration works, and or supporting the purchase of water for cultural flows.

These reports should be a turning point. They show the Basin Plan is working, but not fast enough and not at the scale needed.

If we want living rivers, healthy communities and water justice, we can’t afford to repeat the last 10 years.

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Babe saves lives

DO you remember when the movie Babe was released to much acclaim? Well, not if you were born this century – it came out 30 years ago this year.

It turned many viewers into vegans – they realised that the bacon had been eating is not just a (carcinogenic) meat, but flesh from an intelligent, sensitive pig.

The lead actor, James Cromwell, who went vegan on the second day of filming, said that Babe “helped me see pigs not as ingredients, but as individuals. They love. They grieve. They dream. Their hearts beat with the same quiet tenderness we feel in a dog’s gaze or a cat’s purr. They are someone, not something”.

Yet piglets, like Babe, continue to be torn away from their distraught mothers just a few weeks after birth.

Workers chop off their tails, snip their teeth with pliers, and castrate the male piglets. The young pigs then spend their short lives in cramped, crowded pens on filthy slatted concrete before being slaughtered in terror at about six-month-old.

The RSPCA is currently considering legal action against a piggery in South Australia where pigs were filmed wading through muck up to their stomachs and eating the corpses of their dead littermates.

As Cromwell said, “going vegan lowers your chances of suffering from heart disease, cancers, strokes, and diabetes. And... it’s the best way to end animals’ suffering”.

Being vegan means you can spare nearly 200 animals per year, help protect the environment, and improve your own health.

Homelessness fuels productivity crisis

HOMELESSNESS Australia is issuing a stark warning to the Federal Government about a surge in families losing their homes, and the serious threat it poses to national productivity ahead of the upcoming roundtable.

The new snapshot, Raising the Alarm: Australia’s Family Homelessness Emergency, shows almost 5000 extra people in families with children turned to homelessness services for help over a two-year period, a five per cent spike.

The fresh analysis being launched as part of this year’s Homelessness Week found 92,476 people in families with children received help from a homelessness service provider in 2023-24, an increase of 4,654 in the two years since 2021-22.

How can you hold down a job, contribute to the economy and



keep your family safe and healthy when you don’t have a safe and stable home? This is a massive threat to productivity in Australia, and this data shows it’s getting worse.

We have a growing number of children and families moving from couch to couch, or sleeping in cars and tents, looking for the next safe place. This means parents miss work, and can slip into unemployment, children disengage from school, and the health costs associated with homelessness spiral.

While the increase in homeless parents undermines productivity today, the growing number of children growing up without a safe stable home, and unable to fully engage in education and maintain good health poses an enormous problem for productivity in the future.

Key findings of the snapshot included:

- ❑ Families are slipping over the edge faster. The number of parents and children using homelessness services jumped 5 per cent in just two years, while those already homeless when they asked for help leapt 11 per cent.
- ❑ The crisis is huge, yet still growing. In 2023/24, 92,476 people in families sought help; almost half (39,000) had already lost their housing.
- ❑ Services are overstretched. Even after getting support, 32,451 family members were still homeless, which is up 7 per cent.
- ❑ Homelessness hurts productivity by disrupting work and study, driving up health care costs, and reducing children’s future labour force participation.
- ❑ The share of homelessness

service clients with a waged income has climbed from 10.5 per cent, to 12.1 per cent, in two years.

As the Federal Government looks for ways to boost productivity in Australia, it’s clear that fixing our homelessness emergency is one of the best ways to get a great return on investment for taxpayers.

Being homeless costs a lot of money, and makes it harder for everyday Australians to contribute to their communities, but there are clear actions we can take to end homelessness, while also boosting the economy. It’s a no-brainer.

The homelessness sector is calling on the Federal Government to make homelessness its top priority this term and to take action, including:

- ❑ A National Housing and Homelessness Plan with clear targets, timelines and accountability to drive down homelessness.
- ❑ New investment in homelessness services to deliver more support to prevent homelessness and Housing First programs, in partnership with the states.
- ❑ Increased investment in social housing to achieve a 10 per cent share of all homes, and increased income support so people can afford to rent.

Help change the future for women

EVERY day in Australia, 19 women are diagnosed with gynaecological cancer and heartbreakingly, six will lose their lives.

For those living in regional and rural communities, the challenges are often even greater, with delays in diagnosis, limited access to specialists, and long travel distances adding significant strain to an already devastating experience.

Riverland Wine chair Jim Markeas said important updates regarding the global wine market, and water resource challenges, were shared during the meeting.

“Ciatti gave informative insights to where Australian wine sits in the global wine market space and how we stack up against our global competitors with pricing and volume,” Mr Markeas said.

“Current market trends with consumer behaviour and preferences were also presented.

“Rural Co brokers gave an in-depth explanation of how the temporary water

markets works and gave insight to what growers need to look at when making decisions about trading water in or out.

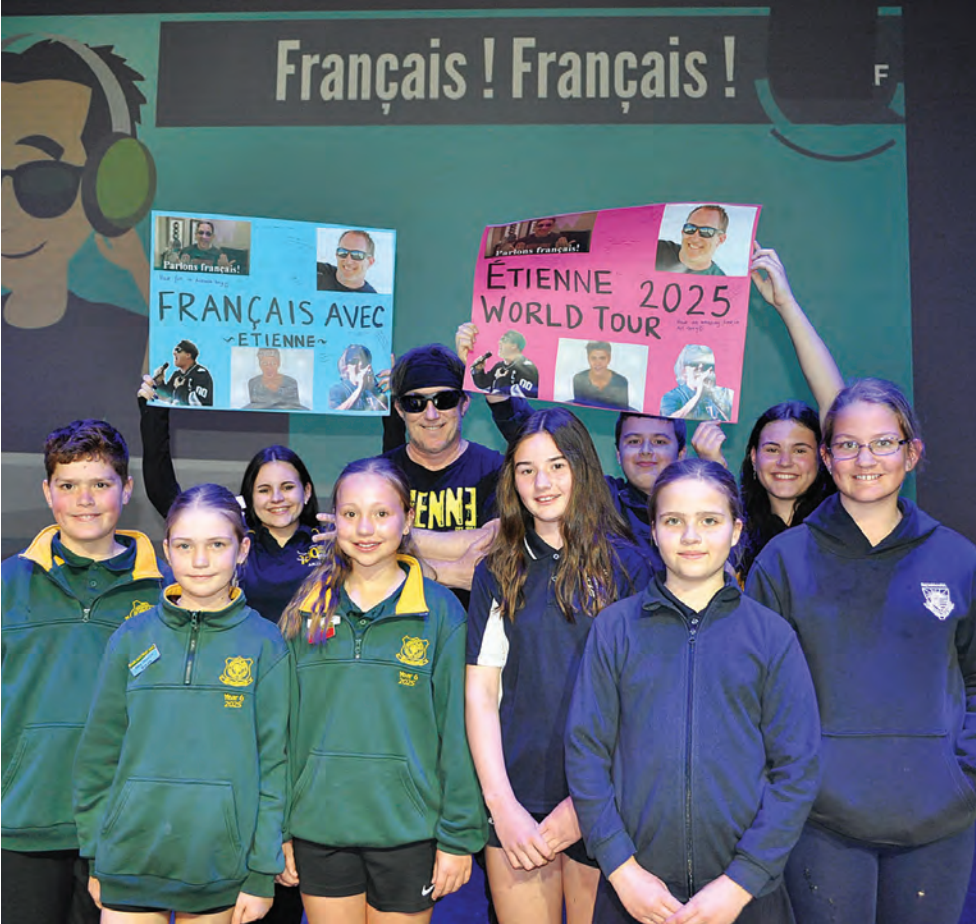
“CIT also explained how changes in water regulations on water trading is effecting water balancing policy moving forward as SA irrigators.”

Mr Markeas said attendees also raised questions regarding new water balancing rules and received insights of how to ensure compliancy throughout the irrigation season.

Mr Markeas said providing the latest industry updates and information to members remained a priority.

“This allows growers to make better informed operational and financial decisions in their business moving forward, as one size does not fit all,” he said.

Meanwhile, Ebony Petch was named as the recipient of Riverland Wine’s \$5000 Grape Succession Grant at the meeting, in recognition of “her passion and contribution to the future of our industry”.

Étienne rocks the Riverland

ARRIVING in the Riverland as one of the only regional stops on his world tour, a French-Canadian rock star took to the Chaffey Theatre stage this week to teach local students language through music.

Performing two concerts in French and Spanish, language teacher, and well-known rockstar, Étienne made his only regional school stop on Monday, performing a setlist of rock and rap-inspired educational music for Berri and Renmark primary, and high school students.

“Last year when I was in Adelaide, I was approached by (Renmark High School French teacher) Jasmine (Sotiroulis) asking if I would come perform in the Riverland,” Étienne said.

“I couldn’t think of a reason why not — it was a case of ‘absolutely, lets do this’.

“I am so glad we got it organised, because it has just been amazing — it’s been a lot of fun and I have gotten an amazing reaction from

local students.”

Beginning his career accidentally, when a song he made for his students became popular with fellow education providers, for the past three decades Étienne has gone from the classroom, to keynote conferences, and performing sold-out concerts in theatres and arenas to fans and students worldwide.

“The underlining mission of my concerts are to excite students into learning a language,” Étienne said.

“My job is just getting them hyped up and having fun learning and speaking the language with some simple songs they can sing along to.

“Everyone is always dancing and having a good time — I hope it just makes young people realise that learning a language is powerful and a fun experience.”

Ms Sotiroulis said it was “surreal” to be able to invite Berri Regional Secondary College, Renmark West Primary, and Renmark Primary to join her students

for the exclusive chance to see Étienne.

“I have always used Étienne’s music to teach my students, so I just can’t believe we have had the chance to see him perform in person,” she said.

“His music makes some of the less exciting aspects of language learning — verb conjugations for example — so much more engaging for the students — what he does is so fantastic.

“There is no one else on the planet that does what Étienne does.

“For me, as a regional teacher, Étienne provides an invaluable resource and highlights there are other people who feel just as passionate about language learning.

“In the current global climate, language teaching is suffering extreme shortages — so, the work of Étienne is so important to combat and support these education programs.”

A RIVERLAND martial arts teacher is offering free tai chi, meditation, and breathwork classes to the local community.

“Tai chi means the supreme ultimate movement, and it’s a practice that is known as an internal art,” Mr Pearce said.

"It's gentle, and low impact with slow movement — while karate is the yang, tai chi is the yin."

With the only requirement to attend class being able to climb 30

stairs, Mr Pearce said Sunday evening class is perfect for any age or ability level.

"It's a fantastic form of exercise because everyone can do it — I currently have an 80-year-old who attends and loves the classes," he said.

“It’s all about being in control of your body, with the movements and breathing relieving stress, helping flexibility, and improving balance.

"The class also includes having some good laughs — there is a real sense of community here, and it's a great environment."

Practicing and teaching karate and tai chi in the Riverland for the past five decades, Mr Pearce said his passion for the arts was born when he first travelled to Japan.

Receiving incredible benefits both physically and mentally throughout his life, Mr Pearce said he felt “incredibly passionate” about sharing and offering such a special practice with the community.

“These days mental health is such a big thing that many struggle with, and tai chi is such a good tool to incorporate for help,” he said.

“It’s simple movements, but it does make you fit, and does help with wellness.

“If someone has a bit of free time in their week, I encourage them to put on something loose, and join us for an hour — it will be worth it.”

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RFDS group hits \$165k raised in 24/25

THE Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) Riverland support group held its AGM on July 17, in Berri.

Robin Foley and Laurie Guppy will both serve for a second year as president, and treasurer, respectively, while Heidi Stanojevic will take on the secretarial duties.

The RFDS will keep flying thanks to the tremendous support from group members and the Riverland community, with \$165,000 being sent down to RFDS Central Operations in the 2024/25 financial year.

A trailer purchased with funds from an RAA Grassroots Grant was delivered and is now being fitted out with shelves and signage. This trailer will store equipment used in fundraising efforts all over the Riverland.

Even though less people are carrying cash the RFDS donation tins are still very successful, bringing in \$15,765. The tins are distributed across the Riverland and are serviced by authorised RFDS team members. Treasurer Laurie Guppy estimated that the

total weight of the coins was 400kg.

Laurie's head shave raised \$3800, and raffle sales brought in \$9220.

RFDS volunteer support officer Lindy Allchurch attended the meeting and spoke about new world-leading developments currently being trialed. The most interesting is a mobile CT scanner for diagnosing a stroke, which will enable timely diagnosis and treatment by RFDS or ambulance staff, thus preventing long-term brain and physical disability.

The group values the support they had from clubs and businesses, in particular Loxcare, the auto car clubs, Lions and Rotary service clubs, the Loxton Garden Club, and all the smaller donors.

The Riverland Rose and Garden Festival, and the open gardens, are also wonderful fundraisers.

This year the group is looking forward to the Riverland Fields Days when they will have the RFDS simulator on site, and drink sales. Rose week will fol-

Maddern Ave set for closure

BERRI drivers travelling along Maddern Avenue can expect detours in the coming weeks, to allow for essential infrastructure upgrades to a local medical service.

Facilitating upgrades for the Riverland General Hospital Helipad, Maddern Avenue will be closed to local traffic, from August 11 to August 20.

A report on the matter within council's July general meeting outlined that currently, there is "no formal pedestrian crossing between the hospital and the adjacent helipad, creating a significant safety risk for staff and patients during urgent transfers".

"To address this, SA Health has identified the need for a wombat crossing (raised pedestrian crossing) to be constructed on Maddern Avenue, Berri, directly linking the hospital to the helipad," the report read.

"These works are considered essential to improve pedestrian safety and meet the increasing demand for medical transport access."

Appropriate detours will be in place, with signage and public notifications to minimise disruption.

The updated policy applies to the flags in front of either the Waikerie Civic Centre, or the Loxton Institute.

Basement waste water tank proposal rejected

DISTRICT Council of Loxton Waikerie investigations towards installing mains water at the Waikerie Institute Soldiers Memorial Hall have seen SA Health advise no approval will be given for a waste water tank in the basement area.

Council CEO David Beaton said other options being considered included an above-ground wastewater tank, located between the McCoy Street toilets and the Institute.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie is working with a local plumber and wastewater engineer to investigate the installation of mains water to the Institute.

Methods to capture, contain and correctly dispose of wastewater that is compliant and sanitary are also being investigated.

Mr Beaton said council was also investigating the installation of a below-ground tank, which would be contingent on soil assessment, footing assessment, and building structural

integrity assessment in the same area,

“Although, the presence of salt damp damage could affect this possibility,” he said.

Mr Beaton said council recently attempted negotiations with Australia Post to acquire a small parcel of land to place a wastewater tank within, which was unsuccessful.

“Once the wastewater assessments have been completed, works and plans can continue on building upgrades,” he said.

Government investigating arts work security

THE State Government will create a taskforce to investigate work insecurity and income inequality experienced by artists and arts workers across the state, including in the Riverland.

The State Government recently unveiled an \$80m State Cultural Policy, A Place to Create, including the recommendations of our Artists at Work Taskforce, established in March 2024 to develop strategies to improve working conditions for artists.

Of the 56 recommendations, the State Government will respond to 51 with new actions.

Key supported initiatives within the response include:

- Review and amend the Procurement Framework, and other procurement policies, to better support outcomes for local arts and cultural suppliers.
- Conduct outreach activities in the community to ensure the

benefits and value of arts and culture are better understood and maximised across the community.

- Undertake a comprehensive review of the current state awards that apply in the arts and culture sector, to ensure compliance and consistency with current modern awards
- Offering an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Cultural Safety Training program for the arts, culture and creative sector.
- Reviewing grant programs and mechanisms within CreateSA to ensure they are accessible and equitable.
- Investing in research and data analysis to grow understanding of arts, culture and creative workplaces and their challenges and help inform future policy development.

“Our arts, culture and creative sector contributes so much to South Australia and it is vital that we ensure the sustainability of the sector for the long-term,” Minister for Arts Andrea Michaels said.

“South Australia is renowned for our cultural institutions, our events and our world-class festivals and it is essential that the people behind them - our artists and arts workers - are valued in their workplace.

“We want South Australia to be the best place for artists to live and work and we will now work to deliver on the recommendations made so South Australia can continue to be a place where our arts, culture and creative sectors grow and thrive.

“I would like to thank all of the taskforce members for their considered and valuable input.”

Corina helps local women to thrive

A RIVERLAND doctor is working to spread the word on women’s health and wellness, with her medical podcast designed for any local listening ear wanting to become educated, empowered, and motivated to thrive in mid-life.

Inspired by a passion to help Riverland women best manage their health, Renmark general practitioner (GP), and obstetrician, Corina Sims, began her podcast Opt to Thrive more than a year ago, with the project focused on providing free education for perimenopause and menopause.

“While perimenopause and menopause are natural processes for women, some women experience symptoms which can be really disruptive to their daily life and wellbeing,” she said.

“It’s a topic and experience many feel underprepared for and completely lost in, which only can become more difficult in later life.

“After menopause, women are at increased risk for cardiovascular disease, metabolic diseases, and osteoporosis. However, while women can become at risk from their early 50s, we don’t normally scan many women for osteoporosis until 70 years old.

“Care for women is more than just managing hormonal symptoms, and it requires access to information that isn’t readily available, and that’s something I feel really passionate about changing.”

Shifting from obstetrics to focus on the establishment of the Together Through Menopause and Perimenopause Clinic — run out of the Renmark Medical Clinic — shortly after beginning her podcast, Dr Sims said she became focused on closing the gap in women’s health when she herself reached menopause, and experienced how difficult it was to access “true, reliable,

and clear information”.

“Most women are starving for information,” she said.

“Even I, as a doctor, was taken back by my symptoms — it really made me ask, ‘why?’

“I have decided that it is a multifaceted issue, with so much research only being undertaken, coupled with a push to share it, recently.

“Culturally, women’s cycles have also always been a point of shame and embarrassment, and while we’re getting there, as a wider society, we are still not very good at having those discussions.

“It just made me realise something really needed to be done.

“So, after I took the time to work out what was going on with me, I began to start the process of sharing everything I had learnt.

With the Together Through Menopause and Perimenopause Clinic only one of two specialised services in the state, Dr Sims said the addition of her podcast is “a fantastic tool” to expand the accessibility and reach of her work,

“The clinic has a two-

month waiting list, with women from Mildura, the Barossa, and further using my service,” she said.

“However, the podcast has now reached more than 750 cities, and more than 45 countries.

“The podcast is also a place for me to share well-being and mindfulness tips, as well as information surrounding hormone therapy, sleeping tips, contraception around menopause, and so on.

“Ultimately, the spread of this information lets women know they have power to lower all these risks and live happy, healthy longer lives.

“Women make up more than half the population and conversations like this are well overdue — it feels fantastic to finally start having them.”

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SA volunteer program helps children in care to reach new highs

AN all-important volunteer program that provides vital state-wide support to children and young people engaged with the child protection and family support system, including in the Riverland, has grown and is showing promising signs of further increases through a targeted recruitment campaign by the State Government.

As of July, volunteers in the program are at 207, a marked and significant increase of 15 per cent since April.

The program sees volunteers spend 29,000 hours each year providing support to children and young people in care. The targeted recruitment campaign has seen the Department of Child Protection (DCP) reach out to potential volunteers through career expo promotion, and sharing volunteers' stories via social media and other channels.

Volunteers come from a diverse range of life experiences, and are aged from 18 all the way to 88. This brings both valuable youth and experience to the volunteer program. Volunteers help create a safe and nurturing environment where children and young people can grow and thrive, and provide additional support to child protection and family support workers and carers, allowing them to focus on other aspects of support needed by children engaged with the system.

Volunteers help in a range of ways including transporting children to school or sporting and other activities, helping with homework, supporting young people as they learn to drive, and supporting chil-

dren at special events.

This is a cause particularly close to volunteer Dylan Strudwick's heart. The 31-year-old spent about a decade in foster, kinship and residential care, and has long considered and engaged in ways to give back to the sector that helped keep him safe and develop as a youngster.

Dylan is helping create safe and supportive environments for children through his volunteer role in addition to his job as an individual support worker, supporting people with disabilities.

Dylan says during his time in care, his "lights" included some of the staff supporting him, along with his foster carer who helped him through difficult times – the pair remaining close to this day. He decided to volunteer to be a "light" for someone else.

While his main role is transporting children, he says one of his most rewarding assignments was working with a carer to set up a backyard trampoline for two foster siblings.

"I wanted to give back to the DCP community – to all the people who helped me and improved my quality of life," Dylan said.

"It feels like I'm on the way to helping the people who have helped me in the past.

"When I was going through foster care, I felt so scared and alone, but there were people who made me know that I wasn't alone; I had a voice and I could ask questions, and there was a light at the end of the tunnel.

"I wanted to be a light for someone else –

to give someone a bit of hope."

Minister for Child Protection Katrine Hildyard said the initiative's volunteers show "extraordinary support and compassion in their efforts".

"Child protection and family support is a whole of community responsibility, with a role for everyone to play in supporting children and young people to feel safe, loved and nurtured and to know they are not alone," Ms Hildyard said.

"The (State) Government is always looking for more volunteers to help children and young people who have gone through some extremely tough circumstances.

"If you think you may be able to help, please reach out to the department – I've heard several volunteers say it's one of the most rewarding things they've ever done."

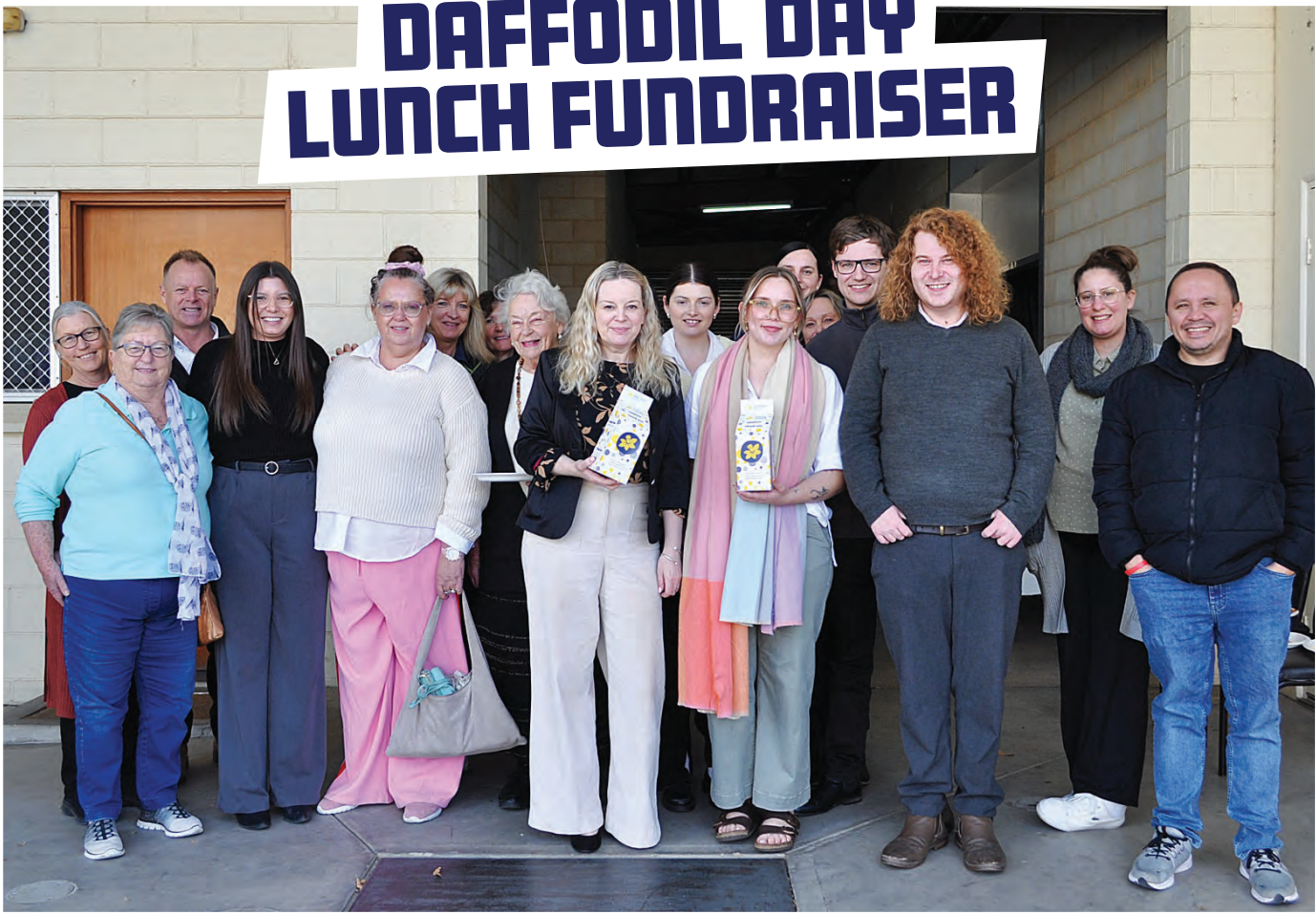

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Resilience and positivity help Riverland mother overcome significant challenges

A RIVERLAND mother has demonstrated remarkable resilience and positivity while on the brink of homelessness, all while bravely battling an aggressive cancer that has altered her life forever.

Donna*, and her young child, now happily live in a safe, stable home following a turbulent 12-month period that included a brush with homelessness after fleeing family violence, as well as months of agonising treatment that altered Donna’s physical capabilities.

Donna’s story is being shared as part of National Homelessness Week – which began on August 4, and runs to August 10 – to highlight the often complex and compounding challenges that people are navigating when they seek support from country agency ac.care.

The future is full of optimism for Donna, thanks to her positive mindset and determination, but it has been a long journey that took a distressing turn around Christmas 2023 when, while living with a relative, she experienced family violence and had to flee to keep herself and her child safe.

This shattering incident came just as Donna prepared to travel to Adelaide for cancer treatment, after receiving a shock cancer diagnosis several months earlier.

After returning to the Riverland, Donna contacted ac.care’s Berri Community Centre, where the Riverland homelessness service team quickly worked to find a safe housing option while she and her child stayed with another family member.

“Finding a safe home not only helped me, but it also helped my baby as well, as

you do not want to raise your child in a violent home,” Donna said.

“That is how my childhood was, so it was really important to me to not have my child living the same lifestyle that I did growing up.”

While securing a safe place to live was a priority, Donna also recalls the small gestures of support from ac.care Riverland homelessness service case manager Shane that provided comfort during this difficult time.

“Shane helped me out with the gas bottle and some money to get to and from Adelaide for my appointments,” Donna said.

“He also helped me with some food, as well as anything that I needed doing.”

However, just as stability began to return, Donna was rushed to Adelaide, where she received the devastating news the cancer had shifted to her spine.

Donna underwent multiple significant surgeries to remove cancer from her body, and had medical implants put in place to help retain her ability to walk.

Her recovery was prolonged after enduring a stroke during recovery, as well as experiencing radiation burns during treatment.

“I couldn’t see my daughter for 21 days

after that, and all up I spent around five months away from her throughout the year,” Donna said.

Additionally, Donna had to self-fund many costs related to her treatment, including accommodation, as she was unable to access supported housing due to radiation exposure, which posed a risk to immunocompromised people.

“I was meant to do it again around Christmas last year and I said to the doctors, I just can’t – I can’t fund it,” she said.

While her health remains a priority, Donna took a major positive step forward last September when she moved into a new home with her daughter. This also marked the start of her relationship with ac.care Riverland homelessness service case manager Jacque, who has been guiding them through this new chapter while continuing to provide small, but impactful support.

“It has been good to have someone that says ‘give it to me and I’ll take that burden and you worry about you in here, and I’ll deal with that out there’,” Donna said.

“I don’t think a lot of people understand what pressure that takes off a person when they are at their most vulnerable.

“Jacque has been like a warm embrace and for someone who grew up in a rough life, it is something you can’t express.



“Sometimes you have to remind yourself, even through all those dark moments, that there are people out there who will go above and beyond to help you out.

“And look where I am now, I love my house, and me and my child are so settled – we are so happy.”

Donna encouraged others facing challenges to contact ac.care for support in regaining control of their situation.

“We can’t take away all the bad things that have happened, but it’s given me this whole other bunch of good stuff in life that you need when you’re at your lowest,” Donna said.

“That is one thing money can’t buy – security, freedom, a safe place.

“That is what I have been given thanks to ac.care, not just for me, but for my child too, and that is priceless.”

Fellas, if you’ve got time for footy, you’ve got time for this

AS we reach the business end of the footy season, an Aussie health-tech company is encouraging blokes to make good use of the advert breaks, for the sake of their hearing.

It’s Saturday arvo, the chips are within reach, and the footy is blaring from the TV.

The kids or grandkids are asking questions you’ve expertly tuned out. Maybe your wife’s saying something from the kitchen, but between the crowd noise and commentary, you’ve got no idea what it was.

You nod, smile and raise an eyebrow like you’re paying attention. It’s a move you’ve perfected.

But here’s a thought – what if it’s not just selective hearing?

If you’ve ever found yourself straining to hear the halftime footy panel or turning the TV volume up a little more each week, maybe it’s time for a different kind of kick.

A quick play that could change the game.

Let’s face it, most blokes don’t exactly leap into action when it comes to health. Men are adept at ignoring it, powering through or joking about it.

Hearing loss is one of those things. Slow, sneaky and easy to brush off.

But here’s the reality – one-in-six Australians already have hearing loss and most don’t do anything about it.

CEO of Australian health-tech company PocketAid, Don Hudson, reveals, on average, it takes someone seven years to seek support for hearing loss, and often up to 10 years.

“Men over 50 are significant-

ly more likely to be affected and many won’t realise it, or admit it, until it starts to impact their relationships, their confidence and their ability to do the things they love,” Mr Hudson said.

Mr Hudson’s company has developed a new way to check where you’re at, and what help is available to you, without setting foot in a clinic.

Test drive hearing aids without leaving the couch.

It’s called the Hearing Aid Simulator. It’s a world first, it’s free, online and it takes less time than half time.

“It’s like a hearing aid ‘test-drive’,” Mr Hudson said.

“But with the simulator, there’s no need for an appointment. You can jump online whenever you have a few minutes to spare.”

The simulator walks you through 12 real-world scenarios like watching TV, chatting in a café or having a conversation in the car. You’ll hear what someone with hearing loss hears in those situations, and then what it sounds like with hearing aid support.

To personalise the simulation, you can input your own hearing test results or simply pick a preset hearing loss level – mild, moderate, or severe.

“It’s private,” Mr Hudson said.

“There’s no need to tell the guys on the group chat or at the club, though wouldn’t it be great if you did.

“Think of how many people could be getting more enjoyment out of life if we spread the word about how easy it is to check out hearing support.”



No pressure or judgement.

There’s little doubt stigma around hearing aids remains. They may be seen as something for ‘old people’, or a sign that you’re fading. But, according to Mr Hudson, that thinking is outdated, and it’s holding people back.

“Modern hearing support is subtle, smart and life-changing,” he said.

“Just like you wouldn’t go around with foggy glasses, why put up with missing half the conversation?”

In case you’re wondering, yes, it’s often the higher frequencies that go first. That means the softer or higher-pitched voices of children and women. The bits you pretend

not to hear might actually be the bits you’re physically unable to.

So, the next time you’re on the couch and the game cuts to adverts, resist the urge to reach for a coldie. Instead, crack open the laptop, your phone or iPad, jump onto the website (www.pocketaid.com.au/hearing-aid-simulator), and give it a go.

You might just hear what you’ve been missing... and you won’t even have to stand up.

“It’s just a small moment that could lead to a big difference in how you hear the people around you, and how connected you feel to the important people in your life,” Mr Hudson said.

So, if you’ve got time for the footy, fellas, you’ve got time for this.

Search is on for SA’s top country tradie champions

A WELL-known Riverland construction professional is encouraging young locals to be nominated for an industry initiative highlighting the state’s best tradespeople.

The hunt for the Riverland’s top tradie is on, with \$5500 up for grabs as a new partnership between the Construction Industry Training Board (CITB) and some of the state’s top sporting bodies seeks to inspire more young people to pick up a trade.

The Built in the Regions partnership calls for regional apprentices and recent graduates to nominate themselves or a mate who they think is good on the tools and a champion in the local community.

Not only will the successful tradie receive \$2500 to boost their own career, but a bonus grant of up to \$3000 will be given to a local sport or community club of their choosing, with both the SANFL and Netball SA partnering with CITB to support regional talent and grassroots sport.

CITB CEO Holly Willcox said ‘Built in the Regions’ aims to encourage young people living in South Australian country areas to consider pursuing a trade and to help build the local workforce’s capacity.

“We want to spread the message to young tradies that they can kick-start their career close to home and that pursuing a trade offers great pay and a great lifestyle,” Holly said.

“A career in trade is a career for life, and when you live in the coun-

try, life is all about the community around you, so we’re excited to partner with SANFL and Netball SA to spearhead this campaign which endorses both.”

It’s a narrative 2023 South Australian Apprentice of the Year, and Berri Demons footballer, Hugo Kregar knows only too well.

Hugo was raised in Berri, took on a carpentry apprenticeship, and is now working as a construction estimator and project manager in his family’s Riverland building company.

“I grew up around building sites and always looked up to the carpenters from a young age – what I saw was an industry full of opportunity, both for career progression and personal growth,” Hugo said.

“I completed CITB’s Doorways2Construction Program in year 11, and that really set me up for success by giving me a great understanding of the working environment and skills needed to perform at a high standard.

“Taking on an apprenticeship, you’re paid to learn and there are so many incentives, pathways and support for career growth.”

Hugo, who is now embedded as the next generation in the family business Michael Kregar Building, understands how important it is to invest in local communities.

“CITB are doing a fantastic job to grow the skilled workforce, especially in regional South Australia – we all need to play a part in encouraging other young, local people to stay in the region and that means providing them with the right job opportunities,”

he said.

Hugo said he’s only too happy to spread the word among mates and the footy community about the chance to secure a \$5500 boost.

“\$2500 is a significant amount for any young local tradie and given our local community organisations are mostly reliant on volunteers, the additional \$3000 is going to go a long way,” Hugo said.

As well as the grant money, the successful tradie in each

region will be named Trade Up Ambassador for their local community.

“We are looking forward to hearing the stories of the fabulous young men and women who are helping to build our regions and to support the football and netball clubs that are often the backbone of our regional communities,” Holly said.

Encouraging young artists to find their wild voice

THE University of Adelaide’s Wildlife Crime Research Hub is calling on Riverland high school students to help raise awareness about conservation and wildlife crime through art.

The Hub has officially launched the Wild Voice Youth Art Conservation Competition, ahead of the Wildlife Crime Showcase at the Adelaide Zoo, from November 14 to 28.

“Art is a powerful tool to inspire empathy, critical thinking and personal connection to the environment, especially for younger audiences who may find scientific or legal language less accessible,” hub director Professor Phill Cassey said.

Students from years 7 to 12 can create a drawing, painting, mixed media, collage or digital art piece on one of two themes.

The first, Habitats for Survival – Defending against Wildlife Crime, encourages young artists to create artwork of a thriving native habitat highlighting the impact of illegal activities like poaching, land clearing or logging.

As part of the second theme, Recycled Wildlife Portraits, students will use discarded or recycled materials to create a portrait of an endangered or trafficked native species affected by wildlife crime.

“We want to empower students to become active voices for wildlife protection by expressing their understanding of habitat loss, endangered species and sustainability through art,” Prof Cassey said.

“The competition aligns with efforts to prevent wildlife crime and promote conservation using accessible, creative means.”

Winners in the years 7 to 8, years 9 to 10, and years 11 to 12 age groups will be awarded passes to experiences at Zoos SA and Monarto Safari Park, as well as annual National Park entries, which will be announced at the showcase.

“The showcase has been organised in collaboration with the Art Gallery of South Australian and the Adelaide Zoo to really raise awareness of the impact wildlife crime has on our environment,” Wildlife Crime Research Hub manager Katie Smith said.

“We want to challenge the idea illegal wildlife trade only happens overseas, and will use immersive exhibits from partner conservation organisations, storytelling and photography to help illustrate those points.”

Landmark trade and investment strategy to drive South Australia’s wine exports

INCREASING international exports for South Australian wine to benefit the state’s industry – including the Riverland’s – is among the focuses of a new major state strategy.

Providing “an uplift in support for local wine exporters as ongoing challenges continue to impact the global trading environment”, was among the goals of the SA Trade and Investment Strategy to 2030, launched last month by the State Government.

The strategy has been designed to co-ordinate effort across government and industry to boost the state’s economic growth through improved export and investment outcomes in global markets where South Australia has competitive advantages.

Minister for Trade and Investment Joe Szakacs said “targeted business missions - supported by government and industry partnerships, leveraging major events and utilising government

trade advisory services” would drive international engagement for the wine sector.

“Our state is on the cusp of a generational opportunity to expand our economy – for the benefit of all South Australians,” Mr Szakacs said.

“Our economy continues to grow strongly and in the last year has outpaced every other state. To harness our strengths, we are launching the most comprehensive plan of its kind in the nation.

“While global trade instability creates challenges, it also can create opportunities – but only if we choose to act quickly and decisively.

“We know that South Australia has what the world wants, and we are telling the world: South Australia is open for business.”

The strategy also identifies “improving trade and investment outcomes for First Nations, regional and women-led businesses” as a main target.

Other key sectors identified in the Strategy include food and agribusiness, renewables, defence and space, tourism, mining and mineral processing, international education, critical and emerging technologies, health and medical.

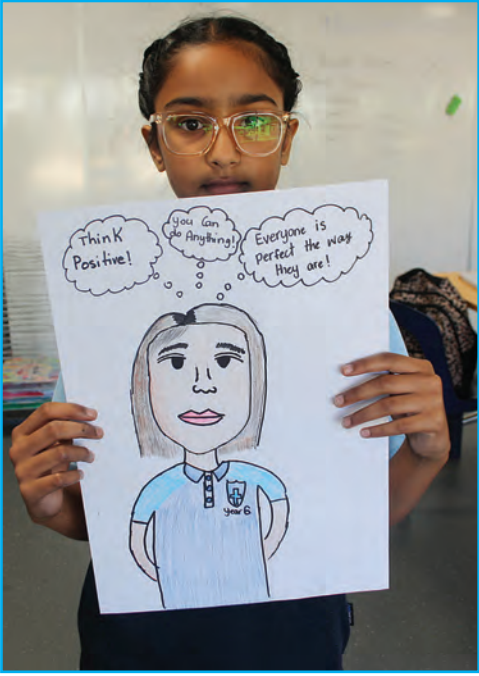

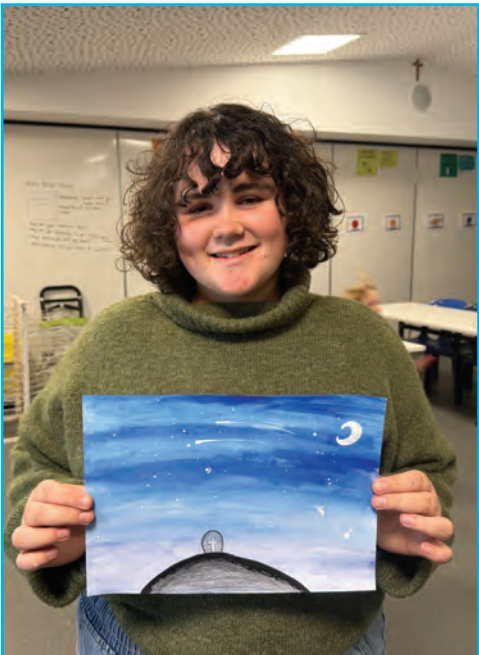

Medium-size businesses can apply for energy grants

A NEW round of energy grants to help Riverland businesses reduce their energy costs will open this month, this time allowing medium-sized businesses to be eligible.

Applications will open later this month for eligible businesses, and not-for-profits with up to 199 employees, for a new round of the State’s Government Powering Business Grants, with successful applicants able to access up to \$75,000 to invest in energy-efficient equipment that helps reduce their power bills.

Minister for Small and Family Business Andrea Michaels said “we are about to open another round of our popular powering business grants designed to help businesses reduce their power bills”.

“For the first time, we are extending these grants to medium-sized businesses,” Ms Michaels said.

“We know that power bills are a particular pain point for businesses and so this grant is providing real relief where it is needed, with businesses in the last round saving thousands of dollars each quarter on

their power bill.

“I encourage businesses to think about what they may like to apply for now and to get in early once applications open.”

The new \$20m round will match the business, dollar for dollar to assist purchasing equipment such as solar panels, batteries, more energy-efficient refrigerators, freezers or dishwashers, or to make improvements to their building to ensure more efficient heating and cooling. The previous round saw more than 1000 businesses across South Australia share in \$23.6m worth of grants. The top three industries to receive grants were retail, hospitality and accommodation, and manufacturing. The most popular equipment installed was battery and solar systems followed by more energy-efficient appliances and motors, pumps and compressors.

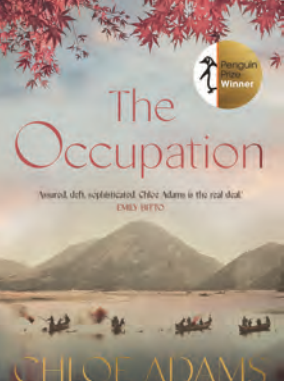

CLAIRE Leslie Hall’s Broken Country is a haunting, emotionally charged debut that explores deeply the themes of love, loss and betrayal.

In Dorset, England, in 1955, 17-year-old Beth Kennedy first meets her 18-year-old neighbour Gabriel Wolfe (home from boarding school for the summer) by the lake on his family’s property. Their attraction is instant, passionate and intense, and swiftly their love story begins. Their summer romance is an all-consuming first love experience for the two of them, much to the displeasure of Gabriel’s mother.

After Gabriel begins university, a young American woman enters his life, and Beth is left heartbroken when their relationship abruptly ends.

In 1968, Beth is now married to Frank Johnson, a local farmer who has loved her from afar since he was a teenage boy. Frank is a reliable man who she can count on. He’s been by her side through thick and thin, through their joy and heartbreak.

When her brother-in-law shoots a dog going after their sheep, Beth doesn’t realise that the gunshot will alter the course of their lives. For the dog belonged to Gabriel Wolfe, the man Beth loved as a teenager, who broke her heart all those years ago.

Beth’s life is upended with Gabriel moving back to his family’s estate, with his son Leo. Leo reminds Beth of her son, Bobby, who passed away tragically in an accident on the farm at just 9 years of age.

Having Gabriel living in such close proximity brings back old memories and temptations. There are secrets that threaten her present stability and cause tension in her marriage, and within her broader family unit.

Caught between the life she’s built and the one she left behind, Beth faces impossible choices with explosive consequences.

A fatal gunshot kills someone on the farm. Someone has been murdered, someone else stands accused. The novel launches into a mystery that’s as much about emotional truth as it is about uncovering what happened.

The characters are complex, conflicted and scarred from their past lives. Beth’s story invites readers to explore the depths of human connection, the weight of choices and the resilience of the human spirit. An impressive blend of genres, Broken Country is one of those books that lingers long after you turn the last page.

Have the Rovers won the minor premiership?

DESPITE three rounds still remaining in the 2025 Riverland Football League's A grade season, Renmark all but locked in the minor premiership on Saturday afternoon.

Travelling to Berri to face off against the Demons, Renmark entered three-games clear of then second-placed Waikerie.

However, following the Magpies' slip-up in Barmera, the Rovers still hold that gap, this time over the Roos.

Standing in Renmark's way was a Berri side desperate for a victory to remain inside the top four, and return to the finals series for the first time since 2022.

Renmark were ahead in just 10 seconds after playing coach Josh Vater got the clearance, and Nick Gillard kicked the opening goal of the match.

The Rovers extended their advantage to 14 points soon after through Nick Stockman, before Darcy Minchella gave Berri reprieve on the quarter time siren with his first.

Both sides were unable to find the big sticks in the second term, but it was Renmark who squandered the most chances.

The Rovers failed to convert on five occasions, despite only allowing Berri one shot on goal for the quarter, leaving the visitors 12 points ahead at the half.

Berri started the second half exactly how it wanted, after a downfield free allowed Minchella his second goal of the afternoon.

However, Renmark responded, as is often the case, with captain Matt Woolford kicking a classy left-foot snap, before Nathan Zunic pushed the margin to 18 points shortly after.

Missed opportunities from Mitch Foulds and Geordie Franks proved costly for the Dees in the third term, and they were made to pay after Adren Herrador goaled late on the run to push the lead out to 23 points at the last break.

Renmark were held goalless in the final quarter of the match, and a pair of late goals from Franks gave the hosts a chance, but they ultimately fell 11-points short.

Berri first-year playing coach Henry Labastida said that while his side has improved from recent seasons, the Demons want to be in finals calculations.

"Where we are now from previous years is a massive improvement, but now there's an opportunity to play finals, and that's what we're aiming for," he said.

"Unfortunately, throughout this season we've lost five games with-in two kicks, and had opportunities to win the game, but that just comes down to having the desire to win in those situations.

"It's all a learning curve for everyone, especially at this stage of the year when we're trying to implement new things, but it's certainly looking promising.

"When I came in I spoke to the club about building a strong foundation before anything else, because getting a solid foundation in terms of commitment, is the most important thing.

"I wasn't even looking at the finals, but now that we've got an opportunity to get there, we're going to try our best to get there, and these next three games are really crucial for us to achieve that goal."

Berri held the reigning premier to just five goals on the weekend, in near-perfect conditions at Berri Oval.

Woolford pair Dan and Matt performed well, finding plenty of the ball and driving Renmark into attack at every opportunity.

The duo were well supported

by the ever-consistent Lachlan Lellmann and Vater, but the Rovers' free-flowing play was limited at times, despite the third quarter burst.

Patrick Minchella was a strong contributor for the Dees, while Peter Safralidis and Rory Moroney both worked hard.

Labastida said he was pleased with the way his side defended throughout the afternoon, something which has been a focus at Demonland in 2025.

"Our backs are really starting to come together and know how each

other play," he said.

"Throughout the season we've been within Renmark on three occasions, and there are a few things we need to focus on and get better at to get over the line,

"But at the same time, that comes down to experience and playing together, and we've only really gelled this season.

"When we stick together next year, it's going to be a bit stronger."

This weekend sees Renmark return home to face Waikerie in a chance to make the minor premiership a certainty, with the Magpies hoping to get back into the top two.

Meanwhile, Berri welcome Loxton North to town in a massive clash, featured as the 5RM Game of the Day, with both A grade matches beginning at 2.40pm.

Berri defeated the Panthers in round four by 40 points, but were unable to get over the line at Panther Park in round nine.

If the Demons can win they will jump back inside the top four, but a loss makes the finals a difficult prospect. Something which Labastida is fully aware of ahead of the game.

"It's pretty much a do or die in terms of if we want to be there at the end, so we know we need to win," he said.

"We'll just go to it as normal and continue to believe in ourselves and continue the way we're playing.

"Really, it's just more about believing in ourselves to be able to win these games."

"I'm pretty excited to work with the rest of the committee, and the level of commitment from everyone who came to the AGM was great.

"He's been pretty important for us, but we certainly won't take any risks by taking in injured players.

"There's certainly a level of anxiety and excitement about this weekend, and we've got a full understanding of the situation and what we need to do about it.

"Berri play their home ground very well, and we've struggled there in the past, so that's certainly going to be a challenge for us.

"The situation is obvious, and we're looking forward to it, but we're under no illusion about how difficult it's going to be."

“We’re hoping that the next step is that the clubs have seen the outcome of it, and can start inviting these players into their clubs and start building that relationship with these players and families.”

Ms Mudge said skills were high over the six weeks, in what was a strong standard of football across each club.

Just Berri and Barmera-Monash compete in this year’s senior competition, but there is hope for more in future years.

“Over the six weeks they definitely grew, and Loxton North, Barmera-Monash, and Waikerie all trained during the week, so they were quite strong,” she said.

“Loxton North also had the higher percentage of top-age players, whereas a lot of the others had younger players, nor were they training.

“For a first time, the feedback to me was that six games was enough, but I do feel that if clubs take it on, it will be up to them if they do trainings or not and making sure it works with other sport.

“If we can support the juniors, it will speak for itself as they develop and get older.”

Stoeckel kicks his way to Kent State

IT is little secret that the United States College Football system is one of the biggest in the sporting caper, and one Riverland product is going to be among the action this season.

College Football is played on Saturday in the US, giving it exclusivity from the high school systems and the NFL, played on different days.

In 2024, games averaged over 21.6 million viewers, and now Renmark’s Jake Stoeckel has won a contract to Kent State University.

“I’ve been offered a full-ride scholarship to Kent State University in Ohio, playing American football as a punter,” he told The Murray Pioneer.

“We come on, it’s about field position, we’re kicking the ball to the other team, and there are 53 guys on one team, so there’s plenty going on.

“I’ve been training in Melbourne with Pro Kick Australia the last two years to work towards that, and we get the film of us kicking and go through it.

“They have relationships with the coaches over there, and my film was sent to the coaches, and that’s how I was offered the scholarship.”

The 22-year-old started his journey in a unique manner, having done work experience at AFL club Essendon.

It was there where he was introduced to 400-gamer Dustin Fletcher, who set him on the path to Pro Kick Australia.

“I moved over to Melbourne, and I was doing work experience at the Essendon Football Club, and I was talking to Dustin Fletcher, and both of his boys do it,” Stoeckel said.

“I kind of just went down and had a kick and started a bit after that, but that’s how I really got into it.

“I’ve got mates all over the country there that have all gone through Pro Kick Australia, and some have ex-AFL backgrounds.

“Having the skill of already being able to kick the ball... it is a little bit different, but it does translate quite well.

“From what I gather, our job is to kick the ball, and if everyone does their role... for us it’s sort of dependent on you putting the ball 40 yards with decent hang time, and then let everyone else get down the field and cover it for you.

“They try not to worry about you, because they’re worried about getting down the other end of the field to make a tackle.

“The way we set up the film we use numbers, so if you punt the ball 45 yards, there is about 4.5 seconds of hang time.

“That gets collated into one video, and then I had over 100 clips of film to go through with my coaches.”

Stoeckel is well-known in Renmark, having tried his hand at many local sports.

He believes gridiron could work in the Riverland, stating that “if there was enough interest, it would definitely be worth it.”

“Our home stadium (Dix Stadium) is a 27,000-seater, and we’re in the Mid-American conference and the way they run it is that you have the top 136 teams split into conferences.

“We play Florida State, Oklahoma, and Texas Tech who are powerhouses, and almost everyone has heard of them, so they’ll be massive games.

“The campus is huge and you actually need to drive around to get from one side to the other because there’s people studying and people doing activity.”

Stoeckel’s season with Kent State kicks off at 1.30am, on Sunday August 31, against the Merrimack College Warriors.

The season is set to run for just under three months, and will conclude on November 29 prior to the playoffs.
