Whirlwind of developments across Riverland

ANOTHER visit from the Premier, who announced his government had secured over 22,000 nights of last-resort accommodation, a fact-finding trip by the nation's emergency services minister, and ongoing concerns about false flow data dominated the Riverland's fast-moving flood scene yesterday.

Peter Malinauskas travelled to Morgan to unveil a \$1.2m commitment to provide up to 500 beds – on a given night – to match expected demand from people seeking emergency accommodation.

The Premier's second visit inside a fortnight followed a visit earlier this week by federal Emergency Services Minister Murray Watt, who was updated on flood preparation and infrastructure issues, while also meeting with representatives from the struggling local wine industry.

The visits and flood preparations progressed amid a backdrop of lingering dissatisfaction over the shock announcement that River Murray flows into SA were significantly higher than was being reported, potentially impacting the mitigation efforts of locals.

Riverlander blows 0.286

A LOCAL is set to appear in court after he was found driving nearly six times over the legal alcohol limit.

Police stopped a 47-yearold Barmera man who was driving on Farmer Street, in Barmera, on Monday, December 5, when he allegedly returned a positive reading of 0.286 to a breath test

Police issued the man with an instant 12-month loss of licence.

A 22-year-old Royal Park man had previously been reported by police for driving with a disqualified licence on Wattle Street, in Renmark, on Saturday, December 3.

It is understood both drivers had their vehicles impounded for 28 days, and will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Family in court over boat crash tragedy

THE family of a former local man who died in a boating accident that occurred in the Mid Murray region have sued a fellow relative for his involvement in the matter.

Family members of Gawler man Chad Gill, who lost his life following a 2019 boat crash at Swan Reach, last week launched a \$100,000 personal injury lawsuit against Mr Gill's cousin, Alexander Gill, it was reported in The Advertiser.

Mr Gill sustained fatal injuries after his boat was overturned in a collision with Alexander Gill's vessel, who was initially charged with causing death by dangerous driving and attempting to pervert the course of justice after the accident.

The Advertiser reports that it is understood the matter remains in court and will be heard again next year.

Goalposts moving on flow forecasts

PREDICTED maximum River Murray flows into SA – impacting the flood-hit Riverland first – continue to rise, despite assurances they remain "within forecast limits".

An anomaly was uncovered last Thursday, when flows were confirmed to be approximately 23GL a day higher than reported – from 157GL to 180GL – but in the same SA government announcement the peak-flow forecast continued to creep upwards.



Last week's flow update showed the peak flow would be "between 190 and 200 gigalitres a day", which a media release from SA Minister for Emergency Services Joe Szakacs claimed was "largely consistent with previous projections".

However, just 35 days earlier, on November 3, the SA government said the latest advice it had received showed the River Murray's peak flow projection "remains at 135 gigalitres per day".

Issued by Mr Szakacs and Deputy Premier and Minister for Climate, Environment and Water, Susan Close, the same media release warned of a "moderate possibility" of a peak of 150GL a day and only a "low probability" of 160GL a day.

Just over a week earlier, on October 25, a media release from

Dr Close – about new flow information available at a government website – said "latest modelling predicts river flows of up to 120 gigalitres a day".


Murray discovers Watts up in the Riverland

FLOOD preparation, infrastructure issues and meetings with grape growers were among the items on federal minister Murray Watt's agenda when he visited the Riverland on Monday afternoon.

The Minister for Emergency Management and Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry spoke with grape growers in Renmark, headed to Loxton to visit the Incident Management Team Centre, before meeting with all three Riverland mayors to address some of the infrastructure issues facing the region.

Mr Watt was joined by the SA Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services of South Australia, Joe Szakacs, Chaffey MP Tim

Whetstone, and SA Liberal Senator Anne Ruston.

"There is obviously a lot of good preparation being done to try and shield communities from the flooding that we know is coming," Mr Watt said.

"It's pleasing to hear that the expected peak maybe won't be quite as severe as what was originally thought, so that can give people a little comfort.

"Nonetheless we are still looking at the biggest flood the region has seen in a very long time.

"I think these sorts of times really test different levels of government but I am really pleased we have had very good co-operation between the federal and South Australian governments so far."

Speaking with grape growers in Renmark, Mr Watt said "even before these floods came along, it was no secret that the wine industry locally was doing it pretty tough".

"Now the floods are happening I expect we will see some financial support for these growers as well," he said.

Kingston Road is expected to be closed by week's

end and Mr Szakacs said local road closures were being "really well managed" by the Department for Infrastructure.

"All of the closures are being deemed on an absolute needs basis and I'm really confident they are being left open for as long as possible," he said.

"The truth is a number of these roads will become inundated, and sometimes because we are trying to keep these roads open as long as we can, then the notice of closure is often sometimes short.

"I know that creates a bit of anxiety for the community, but I want to give my assurance that we are keeping them open as long as we

"I have been throughout the Riverland the last couple of months and I have been hearing and seeing how abundantly clear how this water is affecting transport, not just road, but also the ferries

"So we are just trying to minimise that impact."

Premier back for Morgan

THE SA Premier met with Morgan community members, including Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey and a local caravan park owner, yesterday to hear first-hand about the impact of the River Murray floods.

Peter Malinauskas examined the levee being built along the town's riverfront to prevent the rising waters from impacting too much on the town's infrastructure.

He also inspected the Morgan Riverside Caravan Park.

The caravan park's owner, Leigh Cock, is anxiously watching the river levels and is hoping the levee will keep the water away from most of his business infrastructure

Mr Cock said he has

already seen 32 of his unpowered sites submerged by the rising river.

His caravan park also has 49 powered sites and 55 semi-permanent sites and 14 cabins, but he told The Murray Pioneer he is no longer taking online or phone bookings.

Mr Cock said bookings over spring – usually one of his best seasons – were "down more than 80 per cent".

He said he was only taking walk-in guests, mainly people working in the area, and had provided accommodation to about six locals who had been displaced due to their homes being flood-

Mr Cock said he was unsure whether he would be open during the summer school holidays.

"We are still operating

if people arrive and come through," he said.

"We will allow people to be here if we are comfortable, but future bookings at the moment are being paused.

"We are just doing emergency relief for peo-

ple who have to move out of their homes."

Mr Malinauskas encouraged tourists to still visit the Riverland and Mid Murray council

He said visiting the area was still a "safe

proposition".

Mr Malinauskas said the one in 50-year event was "spectacular to see and safe to look at provided people followed the appropriate rules and guidance particularly around road closures".

Beds secured for our 'highly anxious' Riverland communities

EMERGENCY accommodation will be secured for Riverlanders impacted by the current Murray River flood event in an attempt to calm "anxious" local communities.

The state government yesterday announced a \$1.2m committment to pre-book emergency accommodation for locals displaced from their homes due to the flood.

The initiative, run through the Short-Term Emergency Accommodation Plan, will provide up to 500 beds on any given night in a variety of locations.

Premier Peter Malinauskas said the accomodation would be booked for individuals and families, and would include motels, powered caravan sites and cabins in Berri, Glossop, Waikerie and Barmera.

"I understand the affected communities are feeling highly anxious this week as the river continues to rise," Mr Malinauskas said.

"I want to offer reassurance we are doing everything we can to provide support to River Murray communities as the situation develops.

"Be assured, we have taken prudent steps to make sure people will be supported if they have nowhere else to go.

"If your primary place of residence is flood-affected, you can be assessed to get assistance with emergency accommodation now"

Mr Malinauskas said 16 Humanihut structures, able to accomodate 64 people, would also be constructed at the Riverland Exhibition Centre, which could also hold 200 caravans with power and amenities.

It is understood the government has also taken lease of a fully accessible site suitable for people with mobility issues and care needs.



Barker MP says Riverlanders were 'let down' by incorrect flow rate info

A LOCAL federal MP has been left "incredibly disappointed" by the announcement measurements of Murray River flows entering South Australia were incorrect.

The SA government last week revealed daily flow data at the South Australian border had become inaccurate.

Data last Thursday morning showed flows into South Australia of approximately 157GL/day, however later in the day it

was confirmed the level was actually around 180GL/day.

Barker Liberal MP Tony Pasin said local residents attempting to prepare for flood risks needed accurate flow data.

"I'm incredibly disappointed that flood predictions were so far off the reality we are now facing," Mr Pasin said.

"I've heard from many Riverland residents that they prepared their properties based on the advice given by state government agencies regarding river flows and that given the



new number of 220GL, they are now feeling ill prepared.

'Yet again, Riverland residents are feeling let down by the state government.

"It's simply not good enough and when the immediate crisis is over, I'll be calling for an investigation into how and why these predictions were so extraordinarily inaccu-

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said improved methods of measuring flows over the border were necessary.

"The department have fallen into a false sense of security using historical data," Mr Whetstone said.

"You can't compare 1974 to 2022, because the landscape has changed signifi-

"Once upon a time it was an open flow, particularly with a lot of the floodplains. Now there's a lot more sophistication with farms that have bigger equipment.

"They're building large levees around their farms (upstream), and that's directing water into South Australia. So there's more water on the river and less on the floodplain.'

The latest DEW SA River Murray Flow Report - released on Friday, December 9 advised floodwaters had "spread across" much of the floodplain near the border, with flow also occurring through anabranches and across floodplain areas that are normally dry".

"This situation is extremely challenging for measuring river flow," the report read.

"The current observed flow and river level is also much higher than what has previously been gauged during field visits at many monitoring locations, or it has been almost 50 years since field measurements were made at this flow.

"Consequently river managers advise that at these current flood levels, River Murray flow estimates should be interpreted with a high degree of caution."

The report stated daily calculated flows into South Australia were no longer "considered to be a useful measure in relation to the forecasted flow and water levels".

"The difference between the forecast and calculated flow to SA has increased, which is now understood to be caused by an increasing amount of flow bypassing the river monitoring site and the topographic changes," the report read.

Mr Whetstone said constant challenges presented by the flood meant it would be necessary to learn from errors.

"I hope we learn as we go along with practical experience, because using historical data is clearly flawed," Mr Whetstone said.

"As long as we're learning, we will be bet-

"More Riverlanders have not seen a flood event than have. It's a historical event, but at the same time we're learning."

It is understood peak flow prediction levels - of between 190GL and 220GL - have remained unchanged despite the discrepancy in data.

DefenCell to protect the Berri riverfront

WORKS to install temporary flood barriers to protect the Berri riverfront have begun, with the local council securing 1km of DefenCell to mitigate potential inundations.

The first barriers along Riverview Drive were installed on Monday near the Clarke Road intersection in front of the Berri Riverside Holiday Park, with the temporary levee to run along the riverfront to Crawford Terrace.

The levee is designed to protect properties and infrastructure along the riverfront – including businesses, parks, reserves and community facilities – ahead of peak flows later this month.

At a recent community meeting in Barmera, Berri Barmera Council CEO Dylan Strong said the barriers had been secured through the SA State Emergency Service (SASES).

"It is not anticipated with the current flow data available to council that the entire area would be subject to inundation, but there are areas along there that are low and would allow water to overflow Riverview Drive and fill on the other side of the road," he said.

Council has also explored options for protecting low sections of Riverview Drive towards Martin Bend, with the SASES and SAPOL liaising with property owners to advise them on actions they can take to prepare for the event.

Meanwhile, locals and volunteers have been remediating existing flood levees in Winkie, Loveday and Overland Corner.

Although under current modelling council has determined the areas are not in need of "immediate remediation with respect to risk to public safety, community infrastructure and number of properties", residents in low-lying areas were working together to protect their properties.

some work in those areas on those levees, and also some self-protection around homes on some of those horticultural blocks where they might not be protected by a '56 levee," Mr Strong said.

Council has also issued a safety warning for locals around flood water, given the speed of current river flows.

"If any of you have been down to the riverfront recently, you would see the water is absolutely racing through there," Mr Strong said.

"There is (also) significant submerged infrastructure there which is not visible from the foreshore at all.

"I must stress that they do pose a significant risk to public safety...

"In alignment with the current restrictions of the Department of Infrastructure and Transport, Lake (Bonney, in Barmera) itself is still open for use for recreation outside of a 250m buffer zone that runs along the lake foreshore."

Mr Strong also thanked council staff, work crews and volunteers for their efforts on flood preparation works across the district.

RPC ups its local flood defences

A TEMPORARY levee has been constructed along a Riverland town's riverfront space, as part of the local council's "dedication" to preparing the community for peak flows.

Renmark Paringa Council last week installed a DefenCell sandbag barrier at the Renmark riverfront, between the Visitor Information Centre and the former Westpac Bank building.

A Renmark Paringa Council statement said support from local business Costa Group was integral to constructing the DefenCell levee.

"Costa Group have seconded over 30 members of its Pacific Islander workforce for this project," the statement read.

"Renmark Paringa Council would like to extend its sincerest thanks to Costa Group and in particular to the 30 individuals who are compacting material into DefenCell to enable it to work effectively.

"This task is extremely labour intensive and council resources alone would not have been able to complete the project in time for the peak."

It is understood council has also requested additional DefenCell units be installed through to the Taylor Riverfront Precinct.

The council statement advised Renmark's levee banks would be further heightened due to the disparity between flow rates and expected river levels.

"Council has recently become aware that the relationship between the flow in gigalitres and the water level in Australian Height Datum (AHD) is not exactly as expected," the statement read.

"The flow modelling that the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) is undertaking is proving to be accurate but the associated water levels, particularly in the vicinity of Renmark, are proving to be higher than expected.

"Council is in constant contact with DEW, has begun stockpiling clay in strategic loca-

tions and is able to increase levee bank capacities across the entire 38km network.

"Works have already commenced in some areas to further increase the height of our levee banks."

Goblins in the flow modelling

AMID considerable fanfare, Oxford Dictionaries last week anointed "goblin mode" its word of the year for 2022.

For the record, goblin mode – coined in reference to people reluctantly emerging from Covid-19 lockdowns – means "a type of behaviour which is unapologetically self-indulgent, lazy, slovenly or greedy, typically in a way that rejects social norms or expectations".

This slang term took hold on social media, hardly surprising given other recent winners include "vax" (2021), "climate emergency" (2019) and "selfie" (2013).

However, if an award existed for most despised word of the past few years, "modelling" would surely be a contender, particularly in the Riverland, currently grappling with its greatest flood event since 1956.

Last Thursday we learned of an alarming discrepancy surrounding the daily data on water flow into South Australia.

Early in the day we were told flows were at 157GL per day, but just hours later the figure had suddenly jumped to 180GL per day. Essentially, what was coming across the border each day was different to the figure being recorded and distributed to governments, authorities and flood-hit communities like the Riverland.

The divergence actually made perfect sense to a number of keen local observers, who had been quietly pointing out that under the same flow figures, the river in 2022 was substantially higher than the river in 1974.

But this was more a calculation problem than a modelling fault.

Modelling starts to become a dirty word if we look back just a few short weeks.

On November 3, hardly eons ago, the SA government told us the latest advice it had received was that the "peak flow projection remains at 135GL per day". It warned of a "moderate possibility" of 150GL per day and a "low probability" of 160GL per day.

Around a week earlier, on October 25, the government said modelling predicted "river flows of up to 120 gigalitres a day".

Fast forward to last Thursday and the latest SA government release tells a forecast flow of between 190GL and 220GL per day into Renmark by the end of December is "largely consistent with previous projections".

Using "consistent" in that summary – from 135GL per day to possibly 220GL per day – is stretching credibility.

And given the bulk of the substantial rainfall was already in the system before November 3, it seems the modelling – charged with taking into account all relevant factors – is seriously out of whack, and anything but consistent.

Flows of 120GL per day, even 135GL per day, look pretty good right now.

Once this flood event is over, perhaps the methods of River Murray flow modelling need to be examined, given people have been making crucial decisions based on this information.

In recent times "modelling", and those responsible for producing it, have a bit to answer for. Remember Covid-19 modelling?

We were told to expect substantially more infections and deaths than eventuated, and took many nation-altering – and since-proven unnecessary – precautions as a result.

Which makes another SA government release – pushed out on November 12, apparently without considering the inaccuracy of flow modelling, or the weather records of 2022 – both deliciously ironic and spectacularly fanciful.

"Modelling shows hotter days and less rain for South Australia to 2050 and beyond..."

It seems we can't forecast river flows six or eight weeks ahead of time, but we can confidently predict the weather 30 years from now, and make decisions based on those predictions.

Positive news on Red Cross bus

IT was about 12 months ago that I was whining and carrying on about poor treatment regarding the Red Cross medical bus.

Boy, has my attitude changed. I had to visit a cardiologist at the Ashford Cardiac Clinic on November 30. My appointments are usually organised for me some time prior to the date.

Kelly was the lady I spoke to back then to arrange for me to travel on the bus.

Because I am no spring chicken and a country person from Victoria, I know very little about Adelaide and where their various buses etc. run.

I asked Kelly if a Red Cross

car in Adelaide could collect me from the cardiac clinic and convey me to the country bus terminal, on Franklin Street. She told me she would make inquiries.

Cobby museum future in doubt after snap closure...

The end of the line?

VOLUNTEERS fear it is the end for the Cobdogla Steam and Irrigation Museum after receiving notice they would be locked out from this Friday.

Cobdogla Steam Friends Society president Robin Bawden said the group was informed of SA Water's decision on Tuesday, with the agency citing safety concerns stemming from the flooding River Murray as the reason for the closure.

"I put to them that although the water might be dangerous, most of the museum's not going underwater," Mr Bawden told The Murray Pioneer.

"They said it was just too dangerous...'

Mr Bawden said volunteers would be unable to move accumulated artefacts from the site, including 20 tractors, two "huge" steam engines, a railway and train carriages, before they are locked out.

"If they carry on, it's the end of the museum," he said.

"To relocate it would be probably hundreds of thousands of dollars and endless work.

'We've got 56 members and about 25 of them work down there, but we're all retired people and we haven't got the equipFLOOD EVENT

ment (to move it). And where would we go?

"We have a paddleboat in the water which they say we must

"I explained to them that the river is closed and it's flowing so fast you'd need 200 horsepower to pull it and (the boat has) got to be looked after.

"They've just been totally unreasonable.'

The decision comes after SA Water withdrew its \$70,000 annual sponsorship of the 34-year-old museum in June.

"They cut off our funding but... we thought we were working towards them handing the property on to us," Mr Bawden said.

"We've had several meetings along these lines.

"It's Crown land, leased to SA Water, and we were all working, I thought... towards putting the lease in our name.

"Then (Tuesday) morning out of the blue they rang us up...

'We've got a caretaker there and they've said that he and his wife have also got to be out by

Mr Bawden said volunteers were concerned about leaving the museum unattended due to fences around the site being taken down to make way for levee banks.

"We've got tens of thousands of dollars in equipment that will be open to vandalism and theft," he said.

"It's a shocking thing from our point of view.

"We're very proud of our museum but SA Water doesn't seem to give that much credence."

An SA Water spokesperson said a safety assessment found it was "no longer safe for volunteers or the general public to access the site, while River Murray floodwaters are entering and increasing the hazards present".

"The site will be temporarily closed to volunteers and the public from 5pm this Friday," they said.

"We have provided the Steam Friends volunteers with an alternate location to temporarily relocate items from the site that are at risk of impact by floodwaters.

"We understand the volunteers don't like this outcome, but we simply cannot compromise on a serious safety issue that could harm our people, the volunteers or general public.

"As previously discussed with the Cobdogla Steam Friends Society, our sponsorship concludes on 31 December this year, but given the flood event we will wait until the water levels subside to discuss permanent site management arrangements."

Mayor's Kingston Road reassurance

SUGGESTIONS the imminent closure of Kingston Road will have "disastrous" consequences have been dismissed by the local mayor.



Trevor Norton says Loxton Waikerie council has been planning a detour around Moorook for months and that the unsealed route will be maintained to an adequate standard throughout the period of increased traffic.

Mr Norton's reassurances follow concerns raised by Barker MP Tony Pasin, who last week urged the SA government to install levees along the sections of Kingston Road likely to be flooded.

Mr Pasin warned of significant ramifications if the road was flooded, as it is the major link between Loxton and Berri following the closure of a key section of Bookpurnong Road, near the Berri Bridge. Others have expressed similar concerns on social media.

However, Mr Norton said the detour around Moorook would ensure minimal dis-

"A detour around Moorook via Heinrich Road and Drogemuller Road has been planned for months and is in place currently," Mr Norton said.

"This is an unsealed road in good condition which only adds a couple of kilometres

"Increased traffic on the detour roads will necessitate ongoing maintenance and council is prepared to ensure they remain in good condition throughout.

"Calls for flood mitigation works on Kingston Road to keep it open are unresearched and without substance.

"Those making these claims have not detailed any levee engineering, time, or costs for their proposal.

"Further claims of the detour being a disastrous ramification to those travelling this route are grossly overstated and not helpful.

"Council and DIT have planned for this occurrence, with the best possible alternative to keep our communities connected.'

The Department of Infrastructure and Transport has closed Kingston Road to heavy vehicles to limit further damage to the road and keep it open to other traffic for as long as possible.

Mr Norton said the road would close to all traffic if water rises to the road's edge.

He reminded locals to visit traffic.sa.gov. au or the council's Facebook page for the latest road closure information.

Meanwhile owners of the Moorook General Store have this week said they will seek government support to help combat a drastic drop in their custom, due to the flood.



Mental health boost for Riverland

THE state government will provide increased specialist and early intervention mental health services as part of a \$1m package to assist River Murray flood affected communities.

SA Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton announced the first part of the SA Floods Mental Health Response during a visit to Waikerie last week.

The program will promote positive mental wellbeing for individuals, families, and communities to reduce the risk of mental ill-health and suicide.

Mr Picton said it would also ensure mental health services were equipped to manage increased demand associated with the floods.

"We know that floods not only have an impact on property, but they also have a significant mental health impact," he said.

"Similar to other emergencies, like fires, we know we will need additional mental health support for the region."

The package will include more psychological and mental health nursing services provided by the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network, to engage further staff through FocusOne Health in partnership with the Country SA Primary Health Network.

Increased psychiatrist support via Telehealth from the Rural and Remote Mental Health Unit will be provided by the Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network.

The funding will also provide additional staff for the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services to provide more child mental health support.

This will include assessment, care plans and therapeutic interventions.

Wellbeing SA will also run community resilience and wellbeing programs throughout affected communities.

Extra support will be provided to the Mid-Murray Suicide Prevention Network and the Riverland Community Suicide Prevention Network.

An extended hours service for young people will increase capacity to respond to new and existing referrals, plus Telehealth psychiatry reviews and partnerships with schools to identify at-risk children,

Mr Picton said additional programs would be announced over the coming weeks to respond to community need as the flood crisis continues.

Legal service's \$60k for flood support

A RIVERLAND legal service has received \$60,000 in state government funding to help support flood-affected residents.

The funding will assist the Riverland Community Justice Centre, located in Berri, to ensure locals get the necessary legal support to respond and recover from the floods.

Services in the region will include legal awareness workshops, outreach to other affected areas and specialist legal support around issues such as insurance matters.

SA Attorney-General Kyam Maher said in the wake of a natural disaster "people need immediate, face-to-face support".

"There are a lot of services where it's a lot easier... face-to-face at a time when there are issues being raised that people haven't thought of before like insurance matters, family law, child access and custody matters," he said.

"As we go on over the com-

ing weeks and months, if people have any questions at all about legal matters, they can contact the Community Justice Centre here in Berri to get those first answers and see what other help and advice there is around for them."

Riverland Community Justice Centre lawyer Georgie Portus said the service was able to work in collaboration with other agencies through the emergency relief centre located in Berri.

"When people are coming in to the relief centre those services are all available to them," she said.

"That means they're not reading a million different numbers and they're not struggling to get the information they need. It's all in one spot for them."


Ms Portus said the service had gained experience by working on the Bushfire Legal Project during the 2020 Kangaroo Island bush-fires.

"Through that we've learned a lot as a service about why community responses are so important and what that response is on a community level – all the way to the federal level and how all those stages work together to meet those community needs," she said.

"Every emergency is going to be different, every disaster is different and every community is different, so the fact I'm a local here and volunteer for the SES unit means I know the geography of the place and know what those community needs are.

"Mixing that great base of knowledge we have with our local knowledge is what we're striving to do."

Community Justice Services SA CEO Cathy McMorrine said the service had already begun holding community forums and workshops distributing information on what services people may require during flood.

'Why is it only them?'



THE SA government has been queried about singling out education staff for \$300 travel allowance payments resulting from flood-forced road and ferry closures.

A one-off payment will be made to Department for Education school and preschool staff whose travel to and from work is impacted by the flood.

The taxpayer-funded payments are not available to any other public sector or private sector workers and Riverland-based Liberal MLC Nicola Centofanti said the scheme is unfair.

"I think there are other situ-

ations that deserve support or assistance that are being overlooked, such as people having to travel between towns for medical reasons," Dr Centofanti

The closure of a stretch of Bookpurnong Road adjoining the Berri Bridge earlier this month turned a 40km Loxton to Berri trip – and vice versa – into a 140km haul for commuters, adding as much as \$80 to their weekly fuel bill.

Likewise, ferry closures and the impending shutdown of Kingston Road are leading to significant detours for motorists.

Education Minister Blaire Boyer said the one-off payments to eligible education staff would help ease the extra costs associated with the longer trips and help them cope with pressures surrounding the flood.



"It will cover extra fuel costs for those staff driving extra distances...in turn helping them manage the cost of living at an already challenging time of year," he said.

"We know that this is just one of many impacts for our staff, many of whom are residents who are coping with all the stress and impacts being felt in the general community."

Mr Boyer said the funding will apply to about 60 teachers and ancillary staff from 36 different school, pre-schools, playcentres, kindergartens and OSCH services.

The \$300 payments are part of the state government's \$51.6m support package for River Murray communities,

announced late last month.

Dr Centofanti said the education staff payments were an example of inconsistencies within the package that benefited some over others.

"The reality is that the government have taken a very 'ad hoc' approach to the assistance package which is unfortunately leading to winners being picked," she said.

"This is resulting in others in our community, many of whom are vulnerable and are just trying to go about their daily lives as best they can, being left without support."

Speaking about Bookpurnong Road in last week's Murray Pioneer, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the government's financial support should be extended to all Riverlanders who would normally use the road for work-related travel.

Reshuffle to protect aged care residents

THIRTY Renmark aged care residents are being relocated from their rooms this week after the second phase of SA Health's flood contingency plan was triggered on Saturday.

Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) CEO Wayne Champion said families of the 30 residents located in low-lying sections of the Renmark Paringa District Hospital's aged care facility had been contacted and offered a choice of a room change in the hospital facility or relocation to a different facility.

"Two of the aged care buildings and the main hospital building at Renmark Paringa District Hospital are situated on higher ground than the rest of our aged care buildings," he said.

"Pleasingly, these buildings are located above the anticipated peak water height.

"It is possible to safely accommodate all of the remaining aged care residents and three of the remaining hospital patients in these buildings, ensuring that the residents are above the river water level...

"Alternatively, some families may wish to have their loved one at home over the Christmas period, in which case we will support them with additional community-based home support services.

"Initial conversations indicate the majority of families would prefer for their family member to remain on site, where they will continue to receive care from the same team, be with other aged care residents and access their usual recreational activities."

The second stage of the facility's relocation began on Monday after the RMCLHN received advice from the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) regarding the anticipated peak flood level at the hospital levee.

"SA Health has complete confidence in the work that the Renmark Paringa District Council has undertaken to strengthen the hospital levee," Mr Champion said.

"We are relying on it to protect the facility so that our aged care residents can relocate back into their normal homes when flooding has subsided.

"We are conducting the resident relocation out of an abundance of caution, to protect the health and wellbeing of our vulnerable aged care residents, who could easily slip or fall and therefore be subject to undue risk in the very unlikely event of a levee failure.

"We will continue monitoring the water levels and will inform staff, residents, families and carers of any further requirements to change accommodation arrangements."

Last week, 20 of the facility's most vulnerable residents were relocated to other facilities in the region, with one other to be relocated to Adelaide.

SA Health said one family contacted regarding stage two indicated they wished to care for their loved one at home over the Christmas period.

As of this Saturday, 61 aged care residents and five hospital patients remained on site, with the hospital temporarily ceasing patient admissions

Barmera 'angry' about lake disconnection

A LAKE Bonney crusader says Barmera is "angry" about the lake again being blocked off from the river system.

Berri Barmera Council said protecting infrastructure, including Barmera's wastewater network, was behind the installation of an earthen levee at Nappers Bridge, completed earlier this month.

However, John Beech, a founding member of the Save Lake Bonney group, has condemned the move and told a flood meeting last week the lake would suffer without water flow. Mr Beech said extending a levee to protect the infrastructure in question would have been preferable.

"Having been here in 1956 and seen where the flood level was, I think the prudent thing would've been to extend (the existing levee)," Mr Beech said.

"The caravan park have got the levee there – what's that about a kilometre of flood bank – and that would've kept Barmera safe."

Mr Beech told the River Murray Flood Community Meeting, held at the Barmera Recreation Centre – that the lake relies on the occasional "good flush out" and that blocking it off from the river system, as happened in 2007 during the Millennium Drought, was the wrong decision.

"There is a slight salinity problem with the lake – it seems to cope but we do rely on floods to really push that salinity down," he said.

"We welcome a flood and we... condemn the annexing of the lake from the river.

"The lake is part of the river system, and I do believe legally that (it) should not be annexed ever from the river system...

"The town is extremely angry about that. We've seen it before."

Berri Barmera Council CEO Dylan Strong told The Murray Pioneer last week that infrastructure deemed at risk of inundation – had the inlet remained open – included the Barmera stormwater network, plus the wastewater network supporting Barmera, Cobdogla and Loveday.

"Community recreational

facilities/parks and reserves and low-lying residential areas close to the foreshore are also protected from potential inundation by the Lake Bonney Levee network," he said.

"The community wastewater network runs adjacent the Lake Bonney foreshore and consists of sub-surface mainline, sumps and pumping stations and connects to the wastewater lagoons between Barmera and Monash."

Mr Beech, who worked on the 1956 flood bank around Cobdogla, said installing infrastructure below the 1956 flood level was a mistake – a declaration welcomed by many at the gathering.

"You talk about the infrastructure, well if you put infrastructure on a floodplain it's going to be flooded," he said.

"So more fool you if it's not secured against flood."

Mr Beech played a major role in having the lake finally reconnected to the river system in 2010

'Considerable work' still required on carp virus

A REPORT on the potential feasibility of a biological carp-control measure that took six years and cost \$10.4m to produce has determined further investigation into the use of a virus on the pest is required.

The federal government earlier this month released the completed National Carp Control Plan (NCCP), aimed at investigating "whether the carp virus can be used as a biological control... within Australian waterways".

The plan's executive summary stated "effective, long-term carp control is difficult".

"Carp are widespread, abundant and possess biological traits that mean their populations tend to rebuild rapidly following reductions," it read.

"No silver bullet for carp control currently exists, nor will biological control constitute such a solution.

"Modelling conducted under the NCCP indicates that biocontrol using the carp virus could reduce carp populations by approximately 40 to 60 per cent, and 60 to 80 per cent in less-resilient carp populations."

The federal Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry website advised "all Australian governments will determine how the advice in the NCCP will be used to decide whether or not to proceed further with the potential release of the carp virus as a biocontrol agent".

"The process will ensure every aspect of the NCCP is adequately examined and considered before approaching agricultural ministers for an initial decision," the website stated.

"The Australian and state and territory agriculture ministers will be the ultimate decision-makers on whether to proceed further with the biological release program following a formal review of the NCCP.

"Ministers will not consider

content in the NCCP and associated documentation until this process is completed."

Development of the NCCP lasted for more than six years, cost \$10.4m and involved 11 national and international research institutions, and more than 40 research scientists.

The department's website advised "considerable work is required before any potential release of the carp virus could occur".

"In terms of its nature and scale, this proposal is unprecedented in Australia," the website stated.

"It is necessary to complete a comprehensive and rigorous assessment."


No one was injured in the incident, but extensive damage was caused to the car.





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

A LIFELONG Renmark man's connection to the town, which spans generations, is set to be highlighted at next year's Australia Day awards.

Renmark man, and internationally regarded citrus expert, Ian Tolley was last week named as Renmark Paringa Council's 2023 Citizen of the Year.

Mr Tolley said he was left "speechless" when told he would receive the award.

"It's the first recognition in the region of what I've been doing," he said.

"When I was asked to be the guest speaker at the Australia Day ceremony last year, I was very happy to be recognised as a dyed-in-thewool local, and to be able to say what I did... but this was different altogether."

Mr Tolley was one of the first Australians to be awarded a Churchill Fellowship, was a previous chairperson of the Renmark High School, chairman of the Renmark Agricultural Bureau, and received an Order of Australia medal in 1995.

Mr Tolley said leading the plan to re-locate the Renmark High School to its current location, and sup-

porting the development of the Chaffey Theatre, had highlighted his contributions to the local community.

"It took me nine years to make the change to the new high school," he said.

"I was able to get the Chaffey Theatre built because we had factoredin the facilities in our plan. Our application was the best because it was thousands of dollars cheaper.

"My work has been so diverse and has covered a range of areas people would be surprised at.

"I'm still going and still touring.'

Ryde Clothing founder Nathan Woodrow was named Renmark Young Citizen of the Year, while the Remark Rowing Club's Wharf to Woolshed Long Row 2022 received the Event of the Year award.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said Mr Tolley and Mr Woodrow both displayed a "commitment to enhancing our community life".

"We appreciate their active citizenship within our community through the extensive voluntary work they have contributed," Mr Hunter said.

"I proudly look forward to presenting the recipients with their awards at council's Australia Day celebrations."

Mr Tolley said the award also served as recognition for previous generations of his family who helped establish Renmark.

"I've observed in recent decades how lucky we were that there was some very bright people involved, including the Chaffey Brothers, and my grandfather, in the establishment of Renmark," he said.

"My uncle was the first engineer of what was going to be the Renmark Irrigation Trust, then he handed (the role) over to my father, who was there for 27 years.

"The Tolley name has been here forever."

The awards will be presented at council's Australia Day Celebrations, to be held at the Renmark Club, on Thursday, January 26.

Flood markers spark 'panic' in Renmark

A LOCAL council says "miscommunication" with a state government department led to flood markers being incorrectly installed in Renmark.

Three 2m-high flood markers were last week installed at locations along Renmark Avenue by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT).

Photos of the markers were soon shared online, with numerous locals commenting on the Riverland Forum Facebook page that unnecessary "panic" would be spread through the community as a result.

A statement on the Renmark



Paringa Council Facebook page later advised installation of the markers was "not authorised by council".

"Flood markers were installed on Eighteenth Street and Renmark Avenue," the statement read.

"There was a misunderstanding within DIT and the markers will be removed.'

The Advertiser reported Premier

Peter Malinauskas said "things are going to go wrong" during the flood event.

"Over the weeks and months ahead, there will be mistakes that are made by a contractor or a private levee that breaks," Mr Malinauskas said. "These things are going to happen and what matters is the way we respond to it.

"I'm actually grateful because once the error was identified, the department was sent to its quick rectification."

The markers were removed by Wednesday morning.

Renmark to avoid a flood crisis, Mr Tolley predicts

HUGH SCHUITEMAKER

A LIFELONG local remains optimistic Renmark will avoid large-scale flooding consequences, despite predicting an increase on current peak River Murray flow

Renmark man Ian Tolley OAM assisted the co-ordination of emergency responses during 1956 and said a lack of specialised machinery at the time made it difficult to prepare, and respond to the flood event.

"We were in emergency conditions for three months and it showered or rained the whole time," he said.

"There was no heavy equipment to renew or heighten the 1931 flood banks, so that work fell to Ferguson TE20 tractors, and the placing of very large numbers of sandbags around the town by hand.

"The big news every day was that the water level had risen an inch overnight. Eventually it began to fall an inch overnight and we could begin to think we had survived, as the flow peaked at 341GL/day."

Mr Tolley expected water coming into South Australia from the Darling River would add to current expected peak projec-

purposes...



through the Barmah Choke," he said.

'The Darling River joins the Murray River below Mildura at Wentworth, and it is in flood now that the Menindee Lakes are over-

However, Mr Tolley said improved machinery, communications and flow measurements would allow for a better response to potential flood emergencies.

"A month ago I estimated we could face 160GL/day, when most other estimates were between 90GL/day and 120GL/day," he said.

"Now I think the figure could reach between 200GL/day to 220GL/day, which is still well below the levels we saw in 1956.

"This time Renmark has at its disposal a lot of mechanical equipment that is very fit for these purposes, and that has refreshed the town's 38km of flood banks.

"Communication and the co-ordination of resources is much now much better, and this leads me to believe we will survive in much better shape compared to 1956."

BIG4 announces temporary closure despite levee bank

RISING flood levels along the River Murray have caused the temporary closure of the BIG4 Renmark Riverfront Holiday Park, just days after a neighbouring park was evacuated.

The park announced the closure via social media last Friday, after notifying guests who were already booked in of the closure via email.

"As the water levels slowly increase here in Renmark, we have decided to make the decision to temporarily close our park," the Facebook post reads.

"We are contacting affected incoming guests directly to either reschedule, receive a voucher or refund.

"We would like to reassure you that we are not flooding, however, our team need to




now concentrate on maintaining our levee to protect the park from the high waters expected at the end of December.

"We look forward to re-opening and welcoming everyone back as soon as it is safe

The park, visited by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and SA Premier Peter Malinauskas earlier this month, is protected by a levee bank built to 1956 flood levels.

The closure follows the evacuation of six people from the nearby Riverbend Caravan Park last Tuesday night following an order by the SES.

Park owners say flood closure 'sensationalised'

OWNERS of a Riverland caravan park say "sensationalised" announcements regarding its closure, including false reports of a levee breaking, have contributed toward "reputational damage" to the region during the current flood event.

Renmark's Riverbend Caravan Park was closed until further notice last week due to risks associated with the Murray River flood.

However, Edwards Group CEO, and Riverbend Caravan Park owner, Stephen Edwards said no immediate danger was posed to guests.

"This is very early in the response phase, so I hope to have a chance to talk more broadly to the SES to see how things like this might be better handled going forward, and how their communication might be improved," Mr Edwards said last week.

"The way they handled the evacuation and public announcements was disappointing as it sensationalFLOOD EVENT

ised a sense of urgency that wasn't necessary.

"It is important we work together with SES, other relevant authorities and industry bodies to develop a best-practice response that prioritises safety but also mitigates damaging fallout and reputational damage to our region."

A Flood Emergency Warning released by the SES on Tuesday, December 6, stated "the Renmark Riverbend Caravan Park levee is failing and there is a risk of flood waters threatening the safety of people in the park".

"Park residents and visitors need to evacuate immediately," the warning read.

"The park is closed until further notice."

Mr Edwards said a total of six guests were relocated from the park "with ample notice before the SES emergency warning and media release were published online"

Mr Edwards said a team of staff would remain on site "to ensure the levee banks remain sturdy and minimise damage to the Park".

"While we understand the importance of flood preparation and ensuring the safety of our community, it is perhaps timely that we all take away some learnings from last night," he said.

"There was a miscommunication of the flood evacuation and it's important to correct this misinformation.

"The levee did not breach nor was the park inundated with water, and there was no immediate danger to anyone, including guests and staff.

"We have been consistently working with the SES and authorities on the engineering of our levees to ensure the continued safety of our guests, and support the measures in place to prepare for the higher rivers coming our way."





Nicola & SA Health drop in to issue mozzie warning

CHRISTINE WEBSTER

PEOPLE living along SA's River Murray are being urged to take precautions against mosquitoes in what is predicted to be a "significant season" for the pest due to the flood.

Chief Public Health Officer Professor Nicola Spurrier issued the warning during a visit to Waikerie last Wednesday, predicting that mosquito numbers were "going to explode because there was so much water around".

Professor Spurrier reminded Riverlanders to get vaccinated against Japanese encephalitis if they spend at least four hours per day outdoors on most days.

"People who are most at risk are those that work and live along the Murray River," she

More than 10,000 people living or working in eligible postcodes along the River Murray, Lakes, and Coorong communities have been vaccinated against JEV since a targeted program began in October.

Nine JEV cases have been recorded in SA since December last year, with all cases hospitalised and two deaths.

"That was part of last year's mosquito season," Professor Spurrier said.

She said the cases were "all clustered around the Murray

Professor Spurrier said anyone from the age of two months was eligible to be vaccinated against JEV.

We have a special vaccine for the little ones, two-months to nine months old, and also for women who are pregnant or breastfeeding and people who are immunocompromised," she

Wellbeing Chris Picton said Mr Champion's outdoor lifestyle meant it was important for him to receive the JEV 'jab'

"He spends a lot of time running and cycling so he is going to be certainly protected with a vaccine," Mr Picton said.

Professor Spurrier also advised people to remain vigilant in protecting themselves against mosquito bites.

"A vaccination against JEV does not protect against other mosquito-borne diseases," she

Professor Spurrier said people should also be aware of the dangers posed by the Ross River and Barmah Forest viruses, plus Murray River encephalitis, none of which people can

be vaccinated against.

She said she made sure to dress appropriately for her visit to the Riverland.

'You need to have loose-fitting long-sleeved light-coloured clothing to cover most of your body," she said.

Professor Spurrier said people needed to cover all their skin with insect repellent to stop the mosquitoes from bit-

"If you leave a little patch without the insect repellent, that is where the mosquitoes will bite you," she said.

Emergency services and shack owners eligible for JEV vax

ELIGIBLE SA emergency services workers assisting during the River Murray flood and atrisk shack owners have become eligible for the Japanese encephalitis (JEV) vaccine.

SA's Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton and Chief Public Health Officer Professor Nicola Spurrier made the announcement at the Waikerie Health Service site last Wednesday.

People living in River Murray towns in SA have already been eligible to receive the JEV vaccine since a targeted vaccination program began in October.

Professor Spurrier said emergency services workers and volunteers who would be in Murray River, Lakes and Coorong areas for at least four

weeks or more and be outdoors for four hours on most days would be eligible to be vac-

"It is for people who are actually going to be here with boots on the ground for at least a four-week period," she said.

Professor Spurrier said this four-week period did not have to be a continuous period.

"Emergency services workers who come and go over a four week period would also be eligible," she said.

Mr Picton said a number of emergency services workers who came from outside the flood-affected areas would be supporting communities along the river during "this prolonged flooding event".

"This is a very serious disease," he said.

"We don't want people to contract it and get ill because

Mr Picton said around 3000

holiday homes along the banks of the River Murray would be impacted by flood waters and it was important to protect their owners from the mosquitoborne virus.

"Those people will obviously want to spend time there. particularly in the clean-up operations at their properties," he said.

"A lot of that time will be outside and they will be at risk."

New tool for levee fault reporting

ENSURING Renmark's levee bank network is able to withstand the current flood event is the goal of new graphic aids produced by the local council.

Renmark Paringa Council last week released a levee-monitoring tool aimed at assisting "the community in identifying faults in the levee network and how to report them".

A post on the Renmark Paringa Council Facebook page said reporting any suspected faults in the levee network was crucial.

"Council staff and contractors will be monitoring the full 38km levee network daily and in some instances, some levee banks will be monitored twice daily," the post read.

"The integrity of our levee network is vital

to protecting our towns and if a fault is found it is imperative that it is reported to council.

"Our levee-monitoring team will respond to reported faults straight away as timing is crucial in order to repair any

The visual tool includes representations of four potential levee faults, including water seepage through the levee, under the levee, seepage adjacent to a pipe and slumping.

The Facebook post urged locals to prioritise safety when near any section of the levee network.

"The levee-monitoring tool is not intended to encourage people to monitor the council's levee network on our behalf, as we have a fully established monitoring team and schedule for this," the post read.



'Bring in the army'

The Liberals are calling for the state government's flood support package to SA River Murray communities to be expanded.

SA Libs call for more local flood support

CALLING in the army and setting up a JobSeeker-style scheme are among measures the SA Liberals say would better support the flood-hit Riverland community.

The state opposition has called for Labor's "one-size fits all" \$51.6m package – dedicated to River Murray communities - to be expanded to ensure businesses stay open and proactive landholders who took early mitigating measures are eligible for support.

"As I speak to people in river communities there is huge appreciation for the work being done but there are also residents and business owners who are falling through the cracks when it comes to support and communication," said state opposition leader David Speirs, who spent two days touring the Riverland and Murraylands last week, accompanied by local Liberals Tim Whetstone and Nicola Centofanti.

"One of the biggest areas of concern is loss of power and emergency accommodation, and the communication around this simply hasn't been good enough.

"As we saw during the 2019/20 bushfires, the defence force could be a significant help with prevention works as well as going door-to-door talking to people impacted.

'Those who have personally gone to great lengths to protect their properties by building levees or purchasing generators and businesses who stay open are also currently missing out on support.

"Expanding grant eligibility criteria as well as JobKeeper-style assistance would mean more people who need help will get support and local economies will be better

"It's currently a one-size-fits-all approach but it's clear that that size doesn't fit many."

Dr Centofanti, the Liberals' upper house leader and spokesperson for the River Murray, said the initial assistance packaged was welcomed, but flawed.

"Unfortunately we are seeing too many people miss out either because they are ineligible or the process is too difficult for them," she said.

"Those that have taken proactive action to protect themselves should not be worse off."

Chaffey MP Mr Whetstone hosted a community forum in Swan Reach last week, with Mr Speirs in attendance, and echoed Dr Centofanti's concerns.

"River communities are anxious for what's to come and while they welcome the government's support package, many who need help are finding out they are not eligible," Mr Whetstone said.

"Access to housing, power and water are key concerns for local residents and businesses and I will continue to provide constructive advice on how the government can better support people who need it."

Hammond MP Adrian Pederick also joined Mr Speirs on his trip through the Riverland and Murraylands.



Flood event puts state government's housing plan on hold

THE flood has forced the creation of a long-term housing and infrastructure plan for the Murray Mallee to be placed on hold.

The SA government says postponing the plan will give communities the time and council resources necessary to weather the flood event – and incorporate any rebuild efforts into long-term planning for the towns.

Consultation on the Murray Mallee regional plan – led by

the State Planning Commission was due to start this month, however it will now commence in December next year.

The decision follows ongoing consultation with the Local Government Association and allows more time to assess the extent of flood impacts across the Riverland and Murraylands as communities respond over the coming months.

"We have listened to councils and are prioritising the immediate needs of flood-affected residents," said Minister for Planning, Housing and Urban Development, Nick Champion.

"Efforts to mitigate impacts on homes and businesses need to come first.

"Long-term planning in the region will be crucial - but we can't plan properly unless we know the full extent of the damage caused.

"We are determined to give councils the tools they need to deal with the emergency flood threat and ensure long-term planning requirements in the region are met."

Mr Champion said regional plans focus on how each region will look and function over the next 15 to 30 years.



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Protecting heritage from flood damage

A DESIRE to protect local history from potential flood damage has seen a Riverland museum temporarily close its doors.

Olivewood Historic Homestead and Museum was closed last Thursday due to the increasing risks surrounding the current flood event.

Olivewood committee chairperson Ann Ryan said the decision was made in an attempt to best prepare for peak flows expected in Renmark this week.

"We're not trying to scare people, but it's preventative,"



Loxton Historical Village coordinator Julie Noble said the village was "happy to see council are reinforcing and extending the levee".


"They have told us they are doing this work up to 250GL a day, so even if we get to the 220GL which we might in a couple of

"I went to primary school in Canberra and I had a teacher called Ms Cummings and I thought she was fabulous - that was when I decided to become a teacher," she said.

"I'm well-known for a few of things: my loud voice, my laugh, my class camps... and my plays at Christmas concerts.

"You're supposed to have a two-minute or three-minute slot and my plays would go 15 to 20 minutes.

"They're good memories. The friendships you have with staff, and teaching children of children that you've taught... that's a 'woah'

"They're definitely things that will stay with me for some time.

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
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Fruit fly zone extended

THE detection of fruit fly larvae in backyard fruit has seen a quarantine zone inside Renmark extended.

PIRSA last Wednesday announced the Renmark West fruit fly outbreak boundary had been extended to now include the Industry Park area off Airport Road.

A PIRSA spokesperson advised local workers "need to be aware not to move fruit from lunchboxes off this site".

There are currently 16 active fruit fly outbreaks in the region, including at Lindsay Point across the Victorian border.

The expected end date of all outbreaks is currently February 22, however this may change if further detections are made.

IT'S the case of the mysterious Christmas cherry theft.

A Renmark resident says her backyard cherry tree was last week "stripped" of its 5kg bounty, while the handful of fallen cherries were also taken.

Subsequent social media inquiries indicated other Riverlanders had experienced similar thefts, prompting the woman to contact PIRSA (Primary Industry and Resources SA) to check whether the region's fruit fly response might be responsible.

"My social media post said that either the thieves were very tidy, because they cleaned up the few cherries that were on the ground as well, or that PIRSA had taken them," the woman said.

"The tree's in my backyard, so I would have thought you'd need to be

looking for it.'

However, PIRSA has reassured The Murray Pioneer that its co-ordinated fruit fly response - being carried out by its so-called orange shirt brigade played no part in the unsolicited cherry-picking.

"PIRSA has no record of fruit being stripped from this cherry tree due to the presence of fruit fly," said Nick Secomb, general manager of the PIRSA Fruit Fly Response Program.

"While fallen fruit can be picked up and infected fruit taken from trees, when either of these actions is taken the property owner is notified and the data is recorded by PIRSA.'

While Mr Secomb said PIRSA has strict protocols in place for the collection of fallen and fruit-flyinfected fruit and its staff are easy to spot, he encouraged locals to report any suspected fruit thefts.

"PIRSA fruit fly staff are identifiable by their orange overalls and each staff member also carries official photographic ID," he said.

"Suspicious behaviour is encouraged to be reported to SAPOL on 131 444.

"We take all public inquiries around this area seriously and look to work with the community when issues are reported.

"We are proud of our fruit fly team, who work to the highest of standards to protect the community and local economy, and after investigating, feel extremely confident none were involved in this."

The Renmark resident said PIRSA took her query seriously and that its staff were "fantastic". Meanwhile she is left lamenting the costly theft over Christmas, with cherries currently retailing for between \$23 and \$25 per kilogram.



Tree-mendous tribute to Queen Elizabeth

QUEEN Elizabeth's 70-year reign has been honoured and her memory preserved in living colour via the completion of a project in Barmera.

A tree-planting program along Queen Elizabeth Drive was recently completed to honour the late monarch, after \$20,000 was awarded through the federal government's Planting Trees for The Queen's Jubilee Program to the Berri Barmera Landcare group.

Grant and cut-price fees for Catholic school

EXCITING things are happening at a local Catholic school, which is buoyed by news of a \$400,000 grant, as it prepares to introduce reduced fees for 2023.

St Albert's Catholic School, Loxton, has been named as a recipient of a \$400,000 Commonwealth grant, which will go towards the construction of a new nature play area, upgrades to outdoor learning spaces and the school's music room, and a technology room for cooking lessons.

In addition, the school will reduce its annual school fees for 2023, including providing additional relief for lower-income families.

This announcement fol-

lows reductions made in 2021 as part of Catholic Education SA's Making Catholic Schools More Affordable initiative, including "unprecedented" fee reductions in every Catholic parish primary school in South Australia.

All 85 other Diocesan Catholic schools across SA have – at a minimum – frozen fees for 2023.

St Albert's Catholic School principal Jacky Swanson said the school was thankful to be able to offer the fee reduction to families "with the support of Catholic Education SA"

"These fees have been set with local families in mind," Ms Swanson said.


"Every parent can know

that we are here to help support them in this challenging and uncertain time."

Catholic Education Diocese of Port Pirie director Nichii Mardon said the decision to reduce fees at St Albert's "recognises the ongoing financial pressures being faced by many families".

Since joining the school in July, Ms Swanson has made a number of changes, including building on the existing music program that sees students from reception to year 6 learning an instrument, implementing literacy programs that will be in place in 2023, and additional counselling sessions for students.

Ranson Riverland's latest record-breaker

FOLLOWING the despair of the cancelled Hysterical Carnage Backyard Ultra marathon event in Loxton last month, one Riverlander has achieved 'redemption' after setting an Australian record recently.

Competing in the 12-hour time-based ultra at Glenelg last fortnight, Holly Ranson and her fellow competitors aimed to run as far as they could in the allotted time

Ranson's total distance of 136.6km smashed the previous record of 133.5km, with race organisers now in the process of officially writing her name into the record books, pending the times becoming official.

runners remaining in last month's Riverland-based event when the race was called off due to poor weath-

The anti-climactic ending to the Loxton event inspired her to head to the city and finish the year on a high.

"I had the fitness and didn't want to waste it and I had the desire to feel like I'd completed something by the end of the year," she said.

"It hadn't been on my agenda before but then I thought I'd go down and give it a crack.

"It's filled that void of there being no end (in Loxton). It felt like I was missing something but now I feel like I've achieved some-

Ranson is a veteran of long-distance running events, but said breaking records had never crossed her mind until recently.

"It's not something I'd ever really thought of and I don't even know when it started for me, to be honest," she said.

"It's not something that's motivated me and it's not even something I really knew existed until a few months ago.

"But, once I get my mind set on achieving something, I have to go out and test it. Now that I've achieved this, lots of other things seem achievable, so I'll probably keep chasing records.

"It's pretty special to have

your name goes in the record books and that might stand for a while, whereas if you win one race that'll probably just have a different winner next year."

Ranson believes the key to success in long-distance events is the mental aspect of being able to stay motivated during the marathon, something she trains for in the lead-up to race day.

"You're running at a relatively slower pace, so it's not like sprinters who need to have superior technical skills and need to be great runners," she said.

"When you do longer distances at slower paces it really comes down to your mental strength and your

"It's that and then just breaking the race down into small, manageable time chunks so it's more like one small accomplishment after the next, whether it's one lap or one hour, and not focusing on the big scale of

Dinghy delay in 2023 FLOODEVENI

A SPORT unique to the Riverland has been forced to delay the start to its 2023 season amid the region's biggest flood event since 1956.

The Riverland Dinghy Club announced last week it would postpone the beginning of next year's season indefinitely and president Scott Jenke has hinted at a potential reshuffle of the traditional fix-

"We thought we would postpone it rather than cancel it and we'll operate with a revised program," Mr Jenke said.

"There might be a total re-jig of the program where events we normally run later in the year might be at the start of the season and then



we switch back to the short-course

"It's likely that we run two short-course events in succession, whether that's under lights in front of the Renmark Club on a Friday and then a circuit race later that weekend...

"The traditional opener with the Dash for Cash and the Dinghy Derby might be in rounds four or five instead of round one.'

Although the final event of the

2022 season went off without a hitch amid higher-than-normal water levels, flows have since doubled, leaving the club unable to use its desired courses.

"Now we're at double the flow of the Hunchee Run, we actually can't even control the course due to the fact that we're entirely on flood plains," Mr Jenke said.

"It's going to be very hard to funnel the races where we need them to race."

The dinghy season's return date is yet to be nailed down, but Mr Jenke is keen to get going as soon as it is safe to do so, as are the majority of racers.

"It depends on how quickly the

river is going to recede, that's basically the issue," Mr Jenke said.

'We'll start watching the recession of the water but we're predicting that the water is going to stay high for a long time, and government predictions say that as well. It doesn't take Einstein to identify

"To run the races that we run along the Renmark foreshaw we need the flows to be low enough that we can put our pontoon in and the elevation of the river needs to drop back.

We probably couldn't run the event at anything above 50-60GL. We've put the pontoon in during moderate flows but nothing like


"We know our racers are keen. One or two might lose interest with that extra few months off, but the majority or our racers have endorsed the club's decision and said 'as soon as you can get us back on the water, we'll be there'.

"I think we've got a very big responsibility to the community. As soon as we can put on a national event, it's going to help the Riverland recover financially.

"To bring that money into the area as soon as it's safe to do so, we definitely want to do it for the community. We know tourism will need a big bounce-back and we'll do it as soon as we can."

More out than in as RFL silly season continues

THE Riverland football silly season is in full swing, with rumours of player movement and coaching changes drifting from town to town as the new year approaches.

All six RFL clubs have locked in a coach for next season, with many having already started pre-season training as the weather starts to warm up again.

Despite each club being linked with a host of new faces, the reality of this offseason so far is that there have been more departures than arrivals in the RFL.

Renmark triple-premiership coach Josh Vater is no stranger to the RFL landscape and offered his thoughts as to why we haven't seen a plethora of new players arriving in the Riverland so far this summer

"I've got a few thoughts but it's all quite generic and not specific to any club. Some I assume would still be chasing pretty hard. There might be more to be announced by some clubs," he said.

"My perception is that some clubs, and this isn't to say the guys leaving aren't good people, but they might be focusing more on cultural development rather than performance development.

"Clubs need to make sure they recruit people that they want at their footy club."

Vater himself was recruited to Renmark in the late 2010s and works in the area as a teacher at Berri Regional Secondary College.

Despite now living locally, Vater knows how hard it is to get players to commit to playing away from their place of residence.

"The main thing really is we live a fair way away from Adelaide, so to travel is actually really challenging," he said.

"Yeah, there's some people getting paid, but money doesn't necessarily make it easier.

"It's really challenging on your time, your family, your partner and mentally having to jump in the car for three hours and then perform and fit in socially and all those things.

"It's not easy to do long term and anyone who does more than a few years, I take my hat off to them and I take my hat off to the club that they're at.

"If a club is able to keep a player travelling for a few years, they must like what they do at the club because it's more than money keeping them coming back."

"So, you hope that clubs are focusing on getting those sorts of people and getting their clubs in a strong cultural position so that players want to be there and it's not just a payday.

"I know it (money) is a factor, but you wish it wasn't a big factor in why players move around. You hope that players want to be at clubs."

Vater's Renmark has lost a number of key players this off-season due to relocation and retirement, while would-be challengers Loxton, Waikerie and Berri have also lost stars.

"I think it will be a strong competition still and probably an more even one," he said.

"I expect the top four to be different to what it was this year, which I think is a sign of an even competition."
