# THE BIG SQUEEZE

YEARS of leftover stock clogging Riverland wineries is poised to slash local growers' incomes by up to 40 per cent for certain grape varieties at the upcoming vintage.

Early indicative 2022 prices for wine grapes have begun to be released, with decreases of more than \$200 expected for several key red and white varieties.

A Berri-based wine industry figure – speaking with the Murray Pioneer on the condition of anonymity – said June data indicated more than two years of wine stock remained in storage across some areas of the region.

"This number is (now) far

worse considering the decline in the last six months," they said.

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
"Shipping issues will be around for the next 12 months, and we will also never see the shipping prices we had 12 months ago. It is now all three to four times the amount and will increase even further."

# Bike crash info wanted



Police are seeking to speak with the driver of this ute in regards to a fatal motorbike crash at Paringa earlier this month.

POLICE are seeking to speak with the driver of a vehicle seen at the area of a fatal crash in a Riverland town earlier this month.

The ute – possibly a navy 2006 Nissan Navara utility – was seen travelling east along the Sturt Highway, about 2.45pm on Monday, December 13, having just passed the Paringa Hotel Motel.

Seconds later a Honda sedan and a Honda motorbike collided near the intersection of Murtho Road and the Sturt Highway.

A SAPOL spokesperson said "investigators stress the ute was in no way involved in the crash at Paringa earlier this month, but they believe the driver may have vital eyewitness testimony about the circumstances leading to the collision".

A 62-year-old Paringa woman – who was a pillion passenger on the motorbike – died at the scene, while the 66-year-old male rider, also from Paringa, was taken to the Riverland General Hospital in a critical condition before being airlifted to the Royal Adelaide Hospital.

A 30-year-old Renmark man, who was driving the sedan, avoided injury and was subsequently arrested and charged with aggravated careless driving.

It is understood he is set to face court on March 8.

# **Kingston Road saga to continue over Christmas**

MORE road works continued on a controversial stretch of local road earlier this week, with speed limit reductions likely to remain over the Christmas period.

A section of Kingston Road near Pyap – just outside Loxton – has been the subject of much attention over the past month, after substandard roadworks earlier this year saw part of the near-new surface lift during a recent hot weather spell.

Following safety concerns, speed limits were cut from 110km/h to 40km/h for the duration of the works.

Some areas of the stretch under road works have now been increased to 60km/h.

A Department for Infrastructure and

Transport spokesperson said the new works carried out earlier this week addressed road surface concerns.

"Spray seal works across the whole road width are currently under way on Kingston Road, near the Stott Highway intersection to address surfacing issues," the spokesperson said.

"Works on the 5.6 kilometre stretch are expected to be completed on Tuesday this week, with speed restrictions to remain in place until the new road surface has sufficiently worn and line marking is complete."

The road's recent deterioration prompted anecdotal reports of bitumen routinely lifting from the road surface, damaging vehicles and sparking safety concerns.

#### Charges over fatal Murbko jet ski crash

AN Adelaide man is set to face court following a jet ski accident that saw a teenager lose their life in the Riverland last week.

Emergency services were called to a stretch of the Murray River near Echidna Avenue, at Murbko, around 2.20 pm on Thursday, December 16, after a jet ski collided with two young swimmers.

A 14-year-old Roxby Downs male was pulled unconscious from the water, but lost his life at the scene.

A younger child who was with the 14-year-old received

minor injuries and was taken to hospital as a precaution.

A 43-year-old Craigmore man, who was riding the jet ski, was charged with aggravated causing death by dangerous driving and aggravated causing harm by dangerous driving.

It is understood he was bailed to appear at the Adelaide Magistrates Court on February 23.

Detectives from Murray Bridge CIB, with the assistance of Marine Safety officers and SAPOL's Water Operations Unit, are investigating the incident.

# Haystacks spark fire near Loxton

EMERGENCY crews were called to fire at Woodleigh, near Loxton, on Saturday afternoon.

A Country Fire Service (CFS) spokesperson said crews were called just after 4pm with reports of a haystack fire near the Brown's Well Highway.

"A total of 14 CFS and one Metropolitan Fire Service fire truck and two CFS bulk-water carriers responded over the time of the fire," the spokesperson said.

"It is estimated more than 1000 bales were on the one-hectare site, and heavy loaders arrived at 8.30pm to help crews separate the bales to extinguish them.

"The fire was contained and the property handed back to the owner at 2.30pm Monday..."

# **CBD** move for Berri library

BERRI'S library service is set to relocate from its home of 23 years on Kay Avenue to the town's CBD, with a local high school to take over the current site.

Berri Barmera Council has formed a working group to oversee the relocation of the community library services due to the Berri Regional Secondary College - formerly known as Glossop High School - requiring fulluse of the current library facility to cater for the 800 students set to start the school year at the amalgamated campus.

Since January 1999, council and the school had operated the library under a joint-use agreement, allowing the facility to cater to the public and students.

"Change is inevitable, and although the joint-use agreement has worked very well over the past 23 years the needs of the school and the council regarding their library services have altered to a point that it is probably time to look at alternative arrangements and plan for what would be best for all library patrons into the future," said council CEO Karyn Burton.

Berri Regional Secondary College principal Emily Griggs said the school had "deeply appreciated the connection" it shared with council through the joint-use agreement.

"With the consolidation to Berri Regional Secondary College from 2022, our physical needs as a school will continue to evolve and



grow," she said.

"The relocation of the Berri Community Library will support the school's future expansion and allow a strong public education presence on Kay Avenue.


"On the finalisation of the agreement, Berri Regional Secondary College students and staff will continue to engage with our own site resource centre while also maintaining strong connections with services offered through the Berri Barmera Public Library to support our students' learning."

A council spokesperson said bringing the library into the CBD would have "many advantages", with the former Irving's building at 29 Riverview Drive identified as a "likely location".

"A relocation to the Berri CBD will bring about a number of benefits to businesses within the CBD by way of additional visitors to the area, as well as provide other service-related and financial benefits to ratepayers and the broader community," they said.

"The opportunity to provide community members with a modern 'community hub' incorporating its library and information services is exciting."

The working group will consult with the community in the coming weeks to "ensure that all public library patrons are catered for".

be paid for shiraz grapes, depending on the winery, with cabernet sauvignon selling for between \$340 and \$370, and chardonnay

The figure said a decline in global and domestic wine consumption – caused by the Covid-19 pandemic - would also limit the capacity of Riverland wineries for the 2022 vintage.

between \$400 and \$450.

"Production increased in 2021 by 21 per cent (and that) increase is a huge amount when sales are declining," they said,

"Wineries are still holding large volumes of 2019 and 2020 red stock that was allocated for China.

"Production now needs to be a calculation of what we can sell and what we will get shipping for, but also needs to factor in the stock we are holding (that) needs to be sold. It's not a case of 'there is space in the winery, so bring the fruit in'.

"Wineries are now required to make a huge stock write-down in value in order to sell the past vintage stock. This will equate to millions and millions of dollars."

Riverland Wine interim executive officer Andrew Weeks said co-operation between wineries and growers would be crucial during the next vintage.

"Growers should be talking constantly, and as early as possible, with their intended grape purchaser," Mr Weeks said.

"Make sure there's a very clear understanding about what the requirements are, so they can plan their business and the coming vin-

"Things are still very fluid in the wine industry... what we see reflected in grape prices is a result of what's happening in the largevolume bulk-wine market.

"If wine grapes are in demand

because winemakers are making lots of money, they'll be able to pay more for fruit. When it's in low demand and you've got a heap of fruit lying around, grape prices drop.'

However in positive news for the industry, a free trade agreement signed this week with the UK is expected to open up more export opportunities for Australian wine grape growers.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said

Australian wine producers would have "immediately improved access to the UK market at lower or zero duties".

"Australian farmers will benefit from the historic deal by having better access to a market of more than 65 million UK consumers who value safe, sustainably produced foods and beverages with the strong provenance Australia offers." Mr Pasin said.






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# Waikerie Lions to be moved on

A PRIME river-front spot in Waikerie will soon be vacant for potential tourism and hospitality ventures after a local council decided to move on its current service club tenants.

At Friday's Loxton Waikerie council meeting, elected members unanimously agreed to give the Waikerie Lions Club three months' notice from January 1, 2021, evoking its lease over the Lions' Den, also known as the old Bond store.

Councillor Clive Matthews moved the motion and said he gets "constantly" asked why the Lions Club remains in the river-front location.

"It's been going on for eight years that council has been trying to negotiate with the Lions Club to relocate," he said.

"That building should potentially be something for tourism or something like that in Waikerie."

Council agreed to offer vacant shedding at Penaluna Drive to the Waikerie Lions Club, plus use of the common room and toilets under a shared-facility lease.

Council also agreed to consider installing a second roller door into the shed and a new meter box, plus assist with the relocation.

"We now have a vacant

building at Penaluna Drive, which is up where the Men's Shed and Rotary is, so all the service groups are there," Cr Matthews said.

Councillors also agreed to investigate what the river-front building requires to advertise for expressions of interest for commercial development, with a focus on tourism and hospitality.

Council's director of commercial and community services Andrew Waters said negotiations with the Waikerie Lions Club were ongoing.

"They've had numerous site meetings at the Apex shedding (at Penaluna Drive) and have a few concerns that their caravan is too large and it may not be perfect for their needs," he said.

Waikerie Lions Club president Pam Stendara reiterated that the former Apex shed at Penaluna Drive was "not big enough".

"The food van needs electricity, so it would have to be fully functional with a sink, like we have at the Lions' Den," she said.

"Give us something. Don't keep saying you don't have any money, because they are spending millions down at the river front.

"They are not giving us better than what we have now"

Mrs Stendara said Lions' eight-metre long food van

would struggle to fit in the former Apex shed.

"We need a proper facility to move," Mrs Stendara said. "We are not happy unless

they extend that shed.
"We will go out on the street – there is nowhere else

to go. It will be, 'Council

kicks out service club'."

The Waikerie Lions
Club's lease with council for
the river front Lions' Den
is \$250 per year, with CPI

annual increase.

The Waikerie Lions Club currently has 20 members and holds monthly auctions at the river front.

Mrs Stendara said the club agreed that the Lions' Den could be transformed for tourism potential.

"We agree fully that something else could go down there," she said.


"If they extend that (Apex) building, yes we will go. But other than that, we will dig our heels in."

Meanwhile at Friday's meeting, council also agreed to consider a budget allocation in the 2022/23 Annual Business Plan for multi-use shedding in Waikerie.

This multi-use facility could be used by local service and volunteer groups who have expressed required storage needs.

Mr Waters said the additional shedding "would assist with their (Lions club) storage needs".

#### Lake's soaring salinity 'needs attention'

LAKE Bonney is facing a serious salinity problem and needs solutions sooner, rather than later, a local environmentalist has claimed.

Barmera man Joe Gropler says the lake's current salinity level is roughly double its historical average and no plans exist to address the problem.

In a letter to the editor in today's Murray Pioneer, Mr Gropler has proposed a series of measures to address the situation, including the installation of a solar-powered pump at the lake's southern-most tip to pump saline water to evaporation basins at Cobdogla and Loveday.

"This would extract the water through Chambers Creek, Lock Luna and the full length of Lake Bonney, thus ensuring good mixing of fresh water," Mr Gropler says.

"At the same time it would ensure the lake water does not discharge back to the river, causing salinity issues."

Mr Gropler believes the lake's current salinity level is around 10,000EC units, well up on its long-term average of around 4500CE units.

He said heading towards a state election was the perfect time to call for measures to address the lake's salinity.

"Our timing is good as we have an election coming up and Lake Bonney has won and lost political careers," he said.

"We have an opportunity to fix Lake Bonney once and for all. With the Commonwealth Environment Water Holder now owning water for the environment we have the ability to freshen Lake Bonney."

#### **Under our councils' Christmas trees?**

HEADING into 2022, what might the three Riverland councils wish for under their respective Christmas trees?

Local government elections are less than a year away, and the Loxton Waikerie council's looming battles might be the most interesting of the trio.

Among local councils, the divide between titular towns is most pronounced at Loxton Waikerie, partly due to simple geography, but also due to some sections of the community harbouring concerns about perceived funding imbalances.

At the 2018 election, Waikerie produced a mayoral candidate to run against incumbent – and ultimate victor – Leon Stasinowsky. Frances Asher's candidacy generated a cracking electoral contest, though some would argue it further entrenched intra-district division.

However, that occasionally rowdy division seems to have subsided in the subsequent three years, with council acutely aware of the imbalance claims and how they play out across the community, particularly in Riverland West.

So, Loxton Waikerie council's Christmas list might be headed by 'more harmony across the district, both pre-election and post-election', although a percentage of ratepayers might prefer another robust, healthy and information-packed campaign, for both the mayoral position and all elected

Berri Barmera Council has already received a wonderful gift in 2021: seeing the back of the controversial Berri riverfront redevelopment.

But it could be forgiven for sitting on Santa's knee – or just talking to him from 1.5 metres away - and asking about its CEO position, and shoring up its leadership.

Karyn Burton resigned recently and the council is set to appoint an interim CEO while the search continues for a permanent replacement.

While not exactly a merry-go-round, the CEO's chair has been occupied by three different people since 2018, not ideal for continuity given the various challenges council has faced.

It would love to lock in a long-term CEO to guide it through the coming years and the hurdles it is certain to encounter.

Meanwhile Renmark Paringa Council might ask for its own Christmas miracle this year.

Because if it is seeking a solution/outcome for the Westpac building scenario that pleases everyone, it has roughly the same chance as locating a real-life unicorn.

Council has stated its preferred option is to retain ownership of the site and find a long-term lessee, but all sorts of possibilities remain. What if the site was developed, and even expanded?

Perhaps the much-talked-about Riverland wine centre or another major development could find a home there?

Few topics get a certain cross-section of Renmark residents as riled as river views, as the Murray River Queen's arrival in town

The Westpac building is in a prime riverfront spot, so expect plenty of debate about it in 2022. Renmark Paringa Council has a major decision looming, and knows whatever it decides will be unpopular with some local residents, but backed by others.

#### Vandalism: when will council learn?

AGAIN I am dismayed when reading the Murray Pioneer's December 8 edition, when the Berri Barmera Council is claiming victim status.

Some person or persons have been damaging, vandalising, or causing costly mischief with council property or assets, and it requires the community's help.

I call total BS on the Berri Barmera Council claiming victim status.

Neglect is more like it. The council has had these same problems for years, of people damaging and defacing public property and assets, costing a huge amount to repair or replace.

This includes burning two public toilets.

But all council did was fix it and play catch-up, rather than take a proactive step of protecting the public and the assets and property.

I know, I was on council when that happened. It was the same requests for public help, then the insurance company paid for the replacements, so the problem went away.

At the time there was the usual talkfest about what could be done, and how could council cut down on these costs to the ratepayers

As usual it petered out and nothing was done, until one councillor wanted a certain public area and asset – which they had an interest in – monitored.

Then it was a matter of buying expensive monitored security cameras and working in conjunction with SAPOL, which I thought was a good idea. But the exorbitant cost for monitoring one building was ridiculous.

In my tiny mind there were many problems of public property being damaged, and I felt that money being spent prudently to deal with all of them long term, including the building in question, was a better solution.

Among other things, we had at that time four-wheel-drive idiots damaging sacred sites and making dangerous 'racetracks'

at Apex Park in Barmera and all through North Lake. Others were vandalising toilets, including the one at the jetty, defacing property and public signage.

There were parking problems and public drunkenness. The latter was sometimes violent, requiring SAPOL intervention.

None of this is a good look for a town relying on tourism, so the safety issues alone screamed for council to act.

I spent roughly three weeks carefully gathering information from any business local and intrastate that dealt with security, trying to find a value-for-money and suitable system that would meet the needs of the council and the community.

The final proposal I took to the mayor and CEO for inclusion on the agenda was the best I could get at that time.

The system was two part. The first was high-definition cameras, with 360-degree view, night vision and accessible by a manager or a police officer on their phone. Sixteen cameras would cover the entire main street area, from Rocky's Hall of Fame to the new centenary cross of remembrance on the lakefront, with the recording pod in the council office section of the library.

The second part was six cameras mounted on an eight-metre long, 100mm square pole. They would be fully self-contained solar and battery powered cameras, providing clear night vision and accessible by a council manager by phone.

All council had to do was identify the problem areas and put a 100mm mount for the pole, making it a movable security system.

Unfortunately my efforts fell on deaf ears. After pleading my case and presenting the figures to the mayor and then CEO, I was politely thanked, and strongly advised that the system I had proposed was not for our towns because - to paraphrase, "tourists might think we were a police state and it would affect tourism".

That ended any more discus-

sion on the matter, but council introduced a policy on CCTV "just in case we need it"

The system or one similar, at that time would have cost the council \$24,000. In the past three years how much would have been saved by this deterrent?

Victim status? No, I don't believe that is warranted.

Let's call it what I believe it was: short sighted and neglectful, and not for the first time.

#### What's happened at Lake Bonney?

WHAT has happened at Lake Bonney since it was reconnected to the River Murray 10-plus years ago?

Here are four things:

1. The overall salinity has dramatically increased to just under 10,000EC units from a historical level of 4500EC units. Unfortunately, regular testing of water quality is no longer carried out at Lake Bonney.

2. Lock 3 is micro managed to ensure no Lake Bonney water salinizes the River Murray. That is, the only fresh water the lake receives is the evaporation losses from the lake.

3. Irrigators in the adjacent irrigation districts have, at their own cost, changed to efficient drip irrigation. This has lowered the ground water contours surrounding the lake, thus reducing the saline ground water from entering the lake.

4. The Berri Barmera Council, after testing of water at the national water testing facility at Bolivar, moved all effluent drains away from Lake Bonney.

So, what must be done?

Lock 3 is structurally compromised, and the overpaid and underperforming have known about this for a considerable time.

This is of grave concern and is the reason there is no weir pool manipulation between Lock 3 and Lock 4.

They simply can't take the risk. If Lock 3 was to collapse it would simply roll over backwards. A wall of water three metres high would race downstream, probably destroying Lock 2, and this in turn would increase the wall of water to six

If you think that this will be the end of it, think again. Our locks were built in the 1920s, so they are 100-year-old structures, built with concrete minus any reinforcing mesh or rods, and held in place by pylons belted into the riverbed.

They were designed to have water as back pressure on the downstream side. This means locks upstream could then be compromised as well.

Our whole state depends on the integrity of our lock system. No water for even a few weeks during summer and we all know what would happen.

As a matter of urgency we need an immediate independent engineer to evaluate the situation. Our timing is good as we have an election coming up and Lake Bonney has won and lost political careers.

We have an opportunity to fix Lake Bonney once and for all. With the Commonwealth **Environment Water Holder now** owning water for the environment we have the ability to freshen Lake Bonney.

There is a comprehensive large drain adjacent to the Sturt Highway that runs from Barmera to Cobdogla and Loveday evapoYou've gotta be joking!

ration basins. Remember that these basins need water coverage to stop acid sulphate soils stinking the towns out.

If we placed a solar-powered pump on the southern tip of Lake Bonney we could pump saline Lake Bonney water to the evaporation basins at Cobdogla and Loveday.

This is only a low lift, as the drain to Cobdogla and Loveday is gravity, thus making this a relatively cheap fix. According to the report from salinity and drainage consultant Ken Smith. we would only need a pump of about 80lt/sec, the size of a large fruit block pump.

This would extract the water through Chambers Creek, Lock Luna and the full length of Lake Bonney, thus ensuring good mixing of fresh water. At the same time it would ensure the lake water does not discharge back to the river, causing salinity issues.

If Lake Bonney is maintained in a healthy, lower-saline condition, it would be able to be included in SA's active storage.

This may seem a low priority at this time, but we know the next drought is only just around the corner. Even without the

drought, SA will struggle to get its entitlement because of all the extra plantings of both cotton and almonds.

If we have doubled the salinity in just 10 years, what will the salinity be in another 50 years? JOE GROPLER

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# Council pulls pump track payment

A RIVERLAND council is withholding payment from an interstate contractor after being left dissatisfied with upgrades completed on a local park.

At Berri Barmera Council's most recent monthly meeting, Cr Trevor Scott described the quality of work on a new pump track installed at Berri's Colin Jennings Apex Park as "embarrassing", and asked staff if the issues would be rectified.

Infrastructure services manager Dave Otto de Grancy said council had complained to the interstatebased contractor about the problems and was currently withholding funds.

He said a local contractor would be engaged to complete remedial works.

"It doesn't look very nice at the moment, but we've got a winning solution," Mr Otto de Grancy told elected members.

The park is currently in the final stages of a \$299,755 renovation, fully funded by the federal government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

Council CEO Karyn Burton said the pump track contractors had "let council down".

"We have withheld payment to the contractor on that so that we can engage some other contractors to finish it off with a result that is far better than what has been left there," she said.

"The bitumen was fine. I believe it is the compaction and the structural work that has not been done to satisfaction, and I believe it wasn't done to the plan that we paid for as well.

"We will get a local contractor to rectify that."

Ms Burton said the pump track, once completed, would be a unique feature for the town.

"Cr Scott said there are already

kids using it, and (Barker MP) Tony Pasin said a similar pump track in Mount Gambier is used all the time," she said. "We expect once it's done and finished it will be an asset for the community."

Works on the pump track - to be used by bike riders - had been delayed due to the contractor being unable to cross the border into South Australia while border restrictions were in place.

#### LGA chief steps in as **Berri Barmera CEO**

A FORMER Murraylands and Riverland Local Government Association CEO has been approached to take on acting CEO duties at the Berri Barmera Council early next year.

Peter Bond, who also previously held the role of Rural City of Murray Bridge CEO, has been put forward to take over the role from when current CEO Karyn Burton leaves council on January 28, 2022, until a new CEO is appointed.

In a report to last night's ordinary council meeting, executive assistant to the mayor and CEO Jesse Lang said recruitment timelines from Adelaide-based recruitment agency McArthur "may not allow a commencement date" for the new CEO that "aligns with the current CEO finish date"

"Mayor Peter Hunt has sought external interest for an interim acting CEO, as council does not have a deputy CEO to act in the position until the CEO position recruitment is finalised and the successful applicant commences," she said.

Ms Lang said Mr Bond had indicated his "availability and willingness to act in the position for the necessary time".

At a special meeting with council in November, McArthur's South Australian managing director Steve Nolis said he expected council would be able to appoint a new CEO by the end of January, with the chosen candidate to start at the beginning of March.

"Just seeing the look on their faces when they come in and I say they can have a toy. Some of them say 'can I really have one and


"All the children that come along and look at the lights can choose a free toy."


The display has been up since the start of December, and will continue until New

# Diamond duo's enduring bond

IN 1946, the world was recovering from the end of World War II, Tupperware had just made its first sale and bikinis were on debut

It was also the year Loxton locals Allan and Wanda Hucks said their vows at Madge Memorial Methodist Church in Adelaide, making 2021 a rare diamond anniversary.

"There was an enormous thunderstorm and I thought, 'How the heck are we going to get to the church?'," Mr Hucks said of the occasion, 75 years ago.

"Three o'clock came and the sun came out and it was beautiful.

"It was really incredible."

Mr Hucks, 96, remembers the bridesmaids in a shade of pink and described the day as a "real get-together".

"Wanda had organised her two cousins to be bridesmaids," he said.

"Her brother was the best man and my brother was the groomsman."

The couple soon had five children, Anthony, Michael, Gayle, Karen and David. After living their early married life at

Forreston in the Adelaide Hills, the Hucks relocated to Loxton in 1970. Mr Hucks, who is still well-known for fix-

ing things and tinkering to help out the couple's children, plus neighbours and friends, worked for ETSA for 34 years.

"I've got to take my hat off to Wanda," he

"With ETSA, I worked anywhere over South Australia and I know of two occasions where I was away for three months.

"I really admire what she did. I was working damn hard, but the work she put into looking after the kids.... she saw that Tony never missed his cricket or his football.'

The couple travelled extensively throughout Australia and have eight grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren. Due to ill health, Mrs Hucks, 94, relocated to Riverview Lutheran Rest Home in early 2019.

"I used to try and miss (visiting) only one

# SA Health reveals Riverland Covid plan

THE Riverland General Hospital will assist with stabilising "acutely unwell" Covid-19 patients before their transfer to Adelaide and may be called on to provide inpatient care as case numbers rise, a new report says.

The hospital is one of 11 across regional South Australia designated as "Covid-19 accepting hospitals" that will assist with transferring patients to the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Women's and Children's Hospital or Flinders Medical Centre.

As patient numbers increase, regional hospitals may be called on to treat Covid-positive patients who are "not acutely unwell, such as those presenting for other reasons who happen to coincidentally be Covid-19 positive".

Details of how Covid-19 cases would be managed were made public for the first time, with a series of documents including the Covid-19 Regional Response Strategy released by SA Health earlier this month.

Chair of the Covid-19 Regional Response Governance Group and Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (LHN), Wayne Champion, said each region would have its own strategy for dealing with Covid-19

"Individual operational plans are being developed by the six regional LHNs unique to their own geography to address local service delivery needs, resource capacity and clinical capability, while community response plans have been developed in partnership with each of the 21 designated Aboriginal communities across South Australia," he said.

The strategy also provides further information regarding supervised regional care facilities, which recently went out to tender, including a proposed site in the Renmark area.

The facilities, which can be activated ondemand to manage regional outbreaks, will "provide a safe environment for people who are close contacts and require quarantine or Covid-19-positive cases who are required to isolate under supervision".

Deputy chief public health officer Dr Emily Kirkpatrick said about 95 per cent of cases would be managed through home-based care or Covid-care facilities.

"While South Australia has been caring for Covid-19 patients since the beginning of the pandemic, our hospitals and health services have been planning to ensure we can safely and effectively respond to the acute care needs of the expected increase of positive patients, whilst continuing to deliver highlevel non-Covid acute care," she said.

"As part of these new strategies, clear escalation pathways have been developed for Covid-19-positive patients who may deteriorate and need to go to hospital, including for adults, children and adolescents, pregnant women and neonates, as well as addressing how Aboriginal communities will care for and manage positive cases whist also working to protect other members of their community."

# Renmark's car crash hot spot

INATTENTIVE driving and the misjudgement of other traffic have been flagged as possible causes for a number of car crashes occurring at the same intersection in a Riverland town.

Renmark's Ral Ral Avenue, Murtho Road, and James Avenue intersection has seen numerous car accidents recently, with three – including a car rollover – occurring in the period between November 23 and December 10.

MFS regional commander Garrick Lehmann said the intersection was known for frequent vehicle collisions.

"I go through there often," Mr Lehmann

"I guess people are being a bit inattentive, because they have only been slow-speed accidents.

"There must be some potential misjudgement about what the other traffic is doing, because it is dual lane and dual turning.

"We get a lot of calls there and accidents





Two other accidents, resulting in no serious injury, then occurred on the other side of the intersection on December 9, and December 10, respectively.

have happened over previous years as well, so that comes down to inattentive driving and misjudging other vehicles."

Mr Lehmann said heavy traffic at the intersection – including school pick-up times – created extra hazards for drivers.

"Even in the slower areas, make sure to have that situational awareness and think about the potential of what other cars might be doing as well," he said.

"People just need to be a bit more mind-

ful and be a bit more aware of other drivers.

"Drivers might not have their full attention to the traffic volume, and are making some errors which are resulting in an accident."

Mr Lehmann advised Riverland motorists extra care would be needed on local roads during the holiday period.

"There's traffic increases, and people coming in from other areas might not be aware of all situations," he said.

#### Christmas crackdown targets real-time petrol pricing

RIVERLAND service station operators failing to provide real-time price data could face fines of up to \$10,000 these holidays.

The state government last week began a blitz on rural petrol retailers, to ensure compliance with South Australia's real time petrol price monitoring trial

Minister for Local Government Josh Teague encouraged Riverland motorists to consult real-time fuel price apps in order to find the lowest price.

"This blitz comes as South

Australian consumers face high prices at the pump, just as families get set to pack up the car and head away for Christmas holidays," Mr Teague said.

"Officers will be conducting unannounced inspections at petrol stations across the state.

"Every dollar counts at this time of the year. Using an app that uses real-time data can help you hunt down a bargain at the bowser.

"These apps use our real-time fuel price data, so you can rest assured knowing you're getting the most up to date price information."

Retailers who fail to comply with real-time pricing requirements could face penalties of up to \$10,000.

Consumer and Business Services (CBS) commissioner Dini Soulio said regional areas would be a focus for compliance and enforcement officers.

"CBS has issued three expiation notices, and more than 80 complaints have resulted in CBS issuing warnings to retailers following the detection of a sus-

pected breach," Mr Soulio said.

"Of these warnings, 25 complaints related to retailers in rural areas – so this issue isn't just restricted to metropolitan service stations.

"CBS has received more than 440 complaints since the scheme kicked off – and 108 of those relate to rural retailers."

#### Council's plan to extend Loxton's 80km/h zone

THE 80km/h speed limit exiting Loxton, heading to Berri, could be extended by almost half a kilometre

Loxton Waikerie council has requested the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) approve a plan to extend the existing speed restriction by 400m to include the Proud Avenue intersection.

The council says "practical safety aspects" are behind the request. The DIT had previously rejected council's proposal to extend the 80km/h zone by 2km.

#### CIT's 'landmark' deal with energy giant

A PARTNERSHIP between reliability of the energy system, a global company focused on energy sustainability and a local irrigation trust is set to deliver Australia's largest battery storage network in the Riverland.

Energy company Enel X earlier this month announced an agreement with Central Irrigation Trust (CIT), which will see more than 8 megawatts of battery energy storage systems (BESS) established at the trust's Riverland sites.

CIT CEO Greg McCarron said using the battery system would allow for a reduction in energy costs.

"This project marks significant progress towards achieving CIT's sustainability goals, allowing us to lead by example," Mr McCarron said.

"The BESS will allow us to significantly lower our carbon footprint while supporting the grid, the community and our customers, at no cost to us.

"This will contribute to the

enable more renewables, help avoid power outages, and reduce our energy expense.'

Under the agreement, the BESS will be financed, managed, and optimised by Enel X, in order to minimise risk for CIT.

It is understood the project's first stage will see 4.4 megawatts of BESS installed across four CIT sites during the first half of

Head of Enel X Asia and Oceania, Jeff Renaud, said the company's Distributed **Energy Resources Optimisation** Software (DER.OS) would maximise the project's economic value by analysing site energy demand, weather forecast inputs, and electricity grid conditions.

"We are thrilled to work with CIT to deliver this BESS, which will intelligently manage the Trust's energy use," Mr Renaud said.

"Our customised, turn-key solution will help CIT opti-

#### Not quite one born every minute, but almost two a week

A LOCAL hospital is on the verge of cracking a milestone, with 100 new arrivals expected by year's end.

The Loxton Hospital Complex averages about 70 to 80 babies per year, but is currently at 94 with more due in the coming days.

Loxton Hospital Complex director of nursing and midwifery services Merridee Seiboth said 100 babies birthed at the hospital in 2021 was a testament to staff and the community.

"There are many things here that I think support good outcomes for women in terms of their care, but also that family time and culture," she said.

"I think it's appealing to people.

"I think our Health Advisory Council do a very good job of supporting the hospital and the nursing home.

"Our community stretches across many postcodes... it will always be a needed

The Loxton Hospital Complex currently has six midwives and two obstetric doctors.

Dr Peter Hamilton, who works alongside fellow obstetric doctor Peter Tait, said the increase was due to a number of factors, including the cessation of birthing services at the Waikerie Health Service.

"A few from Waikerie have driven this way because their service has been somewhat impaled... and we are getting a few drift over from Renmark and Berri," he said.

"I think it's good to have choices about the style of care and options involved. People will drift either way.



"It's good to have multiple sites that can provide (obstetric) services.

"So I think it's great that the Riverland still has two at least, but it would be nice to have Waikerie going again."

While staffing levels were "adequate", Dr Hamilton said recruitment was ongoing.

"We are hoping to recruit another couple of doctors if we can, both for general work and for obstetrics," he said.

"We are really still a bit overstretched, as everyone is.

"We have enough, but we'd love another one or two bums on seats, for sure.

"(Obstetric doctor) Kerrianne Harvey is back in the middle of January and Dr Mark Herrmann will be around for some weekends, but he is still based primarily in Murray Bridge."

Dr Hamilton said doctors work with the team of midwives to ensure the best outcome for families.

"It's good for women to have choice about their doctors and style of service," he added.

"I think it's good in general for people to be able to deliver as close to home as possible."

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#### Adopt a tree in Berri Barmera

BERRI Barmera Council will soon trial an 'adopt a tree' program to assist with increasing the district's tree canopy for the district.

Local residents will be able register interest in adopting a street tree which they will be required to water and pull weeds from as it grows.

Council will provide participants with a bucket and tree-care guide, and assist with pruning, spraying for pests and fertilising the tree.

The program, which was first suggested by the Barmera Improvement Committee, will now be trialled on a single street in Barmera for one year before being offered to other towns, after it was endorsed



by council at its November meeting.

In a report to council. infrastructure services administration officer Michelle Fourie said the program would allow council to increase its rate of tree replanting.

"New plantings require large amounts of attention within the first five years of being planted, with regular pruning, weekly watering, and additional tree care to ensure long-term health," she

"Increasing the current rate of replanting is expect-

ed to place an unsustainable amount of pressure on council's parks and gardens team and may result in both newer and older plantings not receiving the appropriate level of care.

"Acknowledging this, the Barmera Improvement Committee discussed the possibility of council acquiring assistance from community members to provide additional care for street

"This would then relieve the parks and gardens team of the pressure of trying to care for an already abundant number of plantings in each town and, in turn, enabling additional trees to be planted throughout the council

Development of the Taylor Riverfront Precinct was supported by a \$1.39 million grant through the federal government's Building Better Regions fund, and \$550,000 from the state government's Places for People Program.

#### Zane's an agtech rising star

A 17-year-old from Loxton received an award for his up-and-coming agricultural business venture recently.

For his business venture Agtech By Design, Zane Sheffield was given the Rising Star Award at the Australian eChallenge 2021 awards on Wednesday, December 8.

The awards, hosted by the University of Adelaide, support entrepreneurs across the nation to create business solutions and help bring the ideas to market.

Agtech By Design, currently in the production phase, is an artificial intelligence (AI) weed seeker and sprayer.

"Farmers can select which weed they want to spray, and then the robot will be able to identify each individual weed and spray the weed that the farmer selects," Zane said.

"We're halfway through prototyping at the moment. We're just working on the AI part of it but we've got most of the equipment working which is really good for us."

The idea originally came in 2020, when Zane asked his dad how the work on his fruit block could be improved.

"He needed something to go along and spray the weeds more efficiently, so that led to an autonomous weed seeker for my year 10 business studies," Zane said.

"Now, it's progressed into a tractor-mounted sprayer that uses AI."

For the eChallenge Awards, Zane completed an eight-week course and a venture showcase before making two seven-minute pitches in the semi-finals and finals to become a finalist.

Zane, who will enter year 12 at Loxton High School next year, plans to see how the business progresses and will apply for university regardless of Agtech By Design's outcome.

"The Australian eChallenge supports the best young entrepreneurs in the nation to conceive innovative business solutions and supports them to bring them to market," said University of Adelaide's Professor Noel Lindsay.

"It is a springboard for the leaders of the future to devise business opportunities that deliver practical solutions to real-world challenges."

Ms Hunter and Mr Roach were known for their musical careers, plus their advocacy and volunteer work, with the pair caring for over 30 young at-risk Aboriginal children.

Ms Hunter was born in Renmark and years later returned to the region, living in Barmera and Monash before moving to Victoria. She died of a heart attack in 2010.

# Facebook users: newspapers 'essential' to communities

MORE than half of people who do not read local newspapers believe they are essential to their communities, a national survey has found.

Findings from the survey show that 64.5 per cent of respondents consider a printed copy of a local newspaper an essential service to their communities. Further, 48 per cent, or just under half, state that if they ever did read a local newspaper, they prefer to do so in print, compared with online (33 per cent) or via social media (13 per cent).

The survey, conducted in July and August this year, sought the views of 400 Facebook users, who do not read a local newspaper, about the role of local news within their communities.

The research targeted participants in areas that were being served by independent local newspapers within the Country Press Australia (CPA) network, including The Murray Pioneer.

The findings come as many local newspapers have struggled to survive during the pandemic. Deakin University Associate Professor Kristy Hess, who is leading the research, said the Facebook survey supported findings from a previous national study of local newspaper readers, her team conducted last year, highlighting a passion for the printed product.

"The fact that social media users examined here (in the latest survey) also indicate a preference for print is perhaps especially profound," she said. Cost and accessibility were the key reasons these Facebook users did not engage with a local newspaper in print or digital format, said Dr Hess.

"Many participants highlighted that the absence of a home-delivery service or easy way to access the paper created an impediment to accessing the physical copy," she said.

"They also indicated that they resisted paying for local news and would engage if it were free. "This resonates with findings from our first survey of newspaper readers – that is, the existence of a culture of 'free' where people believe local news content should be readily available without cost to audiences."

Bruce Morgan, executive director, for CPA, said the survey results were unsurprising and reinforced the mood of many regional communities.

"It is not just about the survival of local independent (newspaper) businesses, but that it is fundamental to community well-being, and to basic democratic notions of accountability within those communities," he said.

"Issues around accessibility and cost are also not surprising and reflect swings in community expectation in recent genera-

tions. Most independent publishers are adapting to that, having learned from the mistakes of the big corporate players who are now deserting the regions."

Both surveys are part of a national threeyear Australian Research Councilfunded project involving researchers from Deakin and RMIT

universities, with support from Country Press Australia, the peak media body for independent news organisations. The project is about to enter its third year.

Associate Professor Hess said the voices and perspectives of everyday people were often missing in policy discussion about the future of local media.

Almost 30 per cent of Australia's population, close to 8 million people, live outside major cities in rural and regional areas, and are less-well serviced than their urban counterparts.

designed for outdoor use." The MFS further warned consumers to make sure that adequate ventilation was provided to transformers which are commonly used for Christmas tree lights.

"White line markings on roads, especially useful for corners with bad turns were started in 1925, strip maps were introduced in 1936, then went out of fashion and back again, traffic lights were introduced in 1937, no new cars were registered in 1944 due to World War II, seat belts were introduced in 1971 and much more happened that we just take for granted today.

"The RAA even predicted in 1991 that hybrid cards would exist by 2010. Their vehicle inspection services, network of registered mechanics and road safety

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

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#### Jet ski tragedy sparks warning

ROYAL Life Saving Society-SA is urging people to be vigilant on waterways following the tragic death of a teenager in a jet ski accident at Murbko near Blanchetown last Thursday.

Police said a jet ski collided with a 14-year-old male from Roxby Downs, plus a younger child who received minor injuries and was taken to hospital as a precaution.

A 43-year-old Craigmore man has been charged in relation to the incident and has been granted bail to appear in the Adelaide Magistrates Court in February.

Royal Life Saving Society-South Australia's general manager of operations, Jake Culkin, said the incident was "devastating" and - after sending his condolences to those impacted - said the accident was a reminder of the need for to remain safe this summer.

Mr Culkin said the easing of Covid-19 restrictions meant people were now travelling further away for holidays to unfamiliar waterways.

Recent research by Royal Life Saving Australia indicates about one-third of all Australians who drown die more than 50km from home.

The report said water users needed to be mindful that unfamiliar swimming, boating, and fishing spots increased the risk of drown-

Royal Life Saving Australia said sandbars, rips, unpredictable currents, debris below the water surface and swiftly changing local conditions were all often well-known to locals, but harder to spot by visi-

Mr Culkin said operators of boats and jet skis needed to be mindful of the speed limits and conditions of the waterways they were travel-

ling in. "They need to be vigilant of the conditions and other

users," he said. Mr Culkin said in South Australian waters anyone operating any type of recreational vehicle with an engine, including jet skis, must hold a boat licence.

He also said it was important to avoid alcohol and drugs when operating a jet ski or boat.

Mr Culkin said people should wear a life jacket when boating or fishing and avoid going alone to an isolated waterway.

"We always recommend going with someone else, ideally someone who knows lifesaving skills such as CPR and can assist as needed," he said.

Mr Culkin said children in waterways should also be at an arm's length of an adult when in the water.

AFTER the release of next season's fixtures last week and a number of clubs' pre-seasons in full-swing, the RFL Independent competition is gearing up for a huge 2022 and BSR has a new man at the helm.

Alan Harvey has taken on the top job with the Redbacks and the former Sedan Cambrai coach has enjoyed a positive start to his time with BSR.

"I'm absolutely impressed to tell you the truth," Harvey said.

"I started back in 2012 when I got the B grade gig at Brahma Lodge Football Club," he recalled.

"I was still playing a bit back then, so I went down there as a player coach.

"I was lucky enough to get an A grade flag and made finals for the first time in about 20 years with the B grade, so I started off my coaching career very well.

"I went to North Pines for one year in 2015 and then I got the job at Sedan in what was their last year in the Hills league.

"I did their last year in the Hills and their first year back in the Independents."

BSR has been busy this off-season, already announcing a number of new signings, with Harvey tipping Jake Reynolds, James and Bobby Mapstone, Cameron Horstmann and Jacob Verrall all to make a huge difference for the Redbacks.

His time coaching in the city as well as the country has allowed him to gain perspective on the different challenges clubs can face depending on their location.

"Numbers is the big one and the ease of being able to attract players to the club is massive," he said.

"Being in the country you've either got to find some sort of incentive, whether it's petrol money or money in their pocket, that sort of thing.

You have the luxury in the city of blokes just rolling up to your footy club so you pick up a few bonus ones you weren't expecting.

Harvey describes himself as a "stickler for fitness", and is looking to bring a sense of professionalism back to BSR.

"Last year the boys were only training one night a week, a 45-minute session and the drills were pretty basic," he said.

"With me, I'll sit at home most nights and I've got a book full of 100 or so drills and I'll scribble down ideas that I've got and try to put them in place.

"The excitement at the moment up there is that everything's a little bit differ-

The introduction of double-headers has Harvey and the rest of BSR excited and he believes that making sure the Independent competition stays alive is important.

The project has received \$1.5m from the Federal Government's Building Better Region's Fund.

Waikerie Football Club president Aaron Thompson said an updated development application for the new clubrooms was expected to be submitted to Loxton Waikerie council early next year. The Waikerie Football Club's previous development application involved knocking down the existing building and replacing it with new clubrooms.

However, after seeking advice from a consultant, the club decided to explore building the new facility on the river-front end of the oval.

Mr Thompson said tenders would be sought for a builder to develop an "early contractor engagement proposal" before the development application was lodged with council.

"The builder will help us refine it and see if we can save some costs somewhere and get the building right before we commit to a price," he said.

Mr Thompson said having a builder involved early would hopefully speed up the process, and the club would receive the results they were after in the clubroom's construction.

He said it would be ideal for a Riverland company to become involved in the planning and construction of the new clubrooms.

"It will be an open tender through Loxton Waikerie council," he said Mr Thompson said the strong support of

Mr Thompson said the strong support of the Waikerie community had ensured the football club had experienced a healthy profit this year despite the Covid-19 pandemic.

"Our main source of income would be our clubrooms, hence why we are redeveloping it." he said.

"Our bar, our canteen and game day (are) pretty important to us and sponsorship on top of that helps run the club."

Mr Thompson said the football club also had a strong membership base, which ensured its financial viability.

"With us building a new clubroom, we are intentionally saving money towards its construction," he said.

Mr Thompson said fortunately this year
