Petition about Waikerie institute concerns

CONCERNED residents and ratepayers of Loxton Waikerie council have started circulating a petition to inform the Office of Public Integrity (OPI) about what they describe as the “sad state of the Waikerie Soldiers Memorial Hall and Institute”.

The details of the petition were put up on social media on 18 December. It is also available at a number of local businesses for interested community members to sign.

The petition states the institute was built in 1921, with the aim to draw attention of the OPI to “the neglect of the District Council of

Loxton Waikerie, since amalgamation as far back as 1997, to meet its obligation to maintain and improve assets of this kind”.

“Your petitioners therefore request the OPI to investigate why years of neglect and empty promises of action have led to the Waikerie community facility being overlooked and (in) a bad state of repair,” the petition said.

The petition said this was occurring “while grant monies are sought and spent in Loxton on a similar building/s”, and states “grant monies” being spent are in “the tune of \$7m in one instance, and over \$15m in another.

Horses seized at Morgan shelter

SIX horses, including two that were euthanised, were earlier this year seized at a Riverland West property belonging to a couple previously convicted of animal mistreatment.

It was reported in last weekend's edition of The Sunday Mail the RSPCA in October had seized six horses from the Morgan property of Shane Jones, and partner Carole Morris.

The pair in 2019 co-founded the South Australian Humane Animal Rescue Association (SAHARA), which in October lost its charity status.

Ms Morris in 2022 pleaded guilty to five counts of ill treatment of an animal, and was

fined \$5400, with Mr Jones pleading guilty to one count of the same charge, and being fined \$1250.

The pair were also banned from sitting on the SAHARA board and being involved in decision making.

The Sunday Mail reported Mr Jones last week said most of the 450 animals in their possession at the time the charges were laid – including more than 100 dogs – had been rehomed and further neglect was impossible due to regular RSPCA visits to the property.

However, when visiting the Morgan property last Friday, The Sunday Mail reportedly saw up to 100 animals – some kept in pens – including about 10 of the 70 horses owned

by Mr Jones, with most said to be having protruding ribs.

It is understood the six horses seized in October were owned by a third party, although an RSPCA-mandated monthly inspection at the property – conducted by a vet earlier this month – suggested at least 20 horses be euthanised because they were in poor health.

The Sunday Mail reported three former volunteers of the SAHARA property have described the couple as "animal hoarders".

RSPCA SA has confirmed there are ongoing investigations into SAHARA and Mr Jones.

'Dangerous and unusable'

AN important Riverland road – used to service Lake Victoria, and as a back-up source of water for South Australia – is both "dangerous and unusable", a long-time Riverland resident says.

Waikerie man and retired irrigator Ted Angove says work on an interconnector power line along the Renmark-Wentworth Road had caused significant damage to the surface.

"When can we expect the 'powers that be' to come back and repair the damage to the Renmark-Wentworth Road?" Mr Angove asks in a letter to the editor in today's Murray Pioneer.

"This power line that has been constructed is for the benefit of Australians, but at what cost to the locals who have to live with the damage to their infrastructure?"

Mr Angove says additional heavy traffic delivering material to the power line has resulted in serious surface damage, including vehicle-destroying potholes.

Fatal crash at Swan Reach

A RIVERLAND West woman has lost her life after her car collided with a tree last week.

At about 10.40pm, on Friday 20 December, police and emergency services were called to Anzac Avenue, at Swan Reach, near Blanchetown, after reports a black Ford Falcon sedan had left the road and crashed into a tree.

The driver and sole occupant, a 45-year-old Swan Reach woman, died at the scene. Major Crash officers attended the scene to investigate the circumstances of the collision.

The woman's death is the 83rd life lost on South Australian roads this year.

Minor injuries in Lowbank collision

EMERGENCY services were called to the Sturt Highway, at Lowbank, east of Waikerie, last Tuesday after receiving reports of a vehicle leaving the road and colliding with a tree.

Police said the male driver, in his 20s, was transported to hospital with minor injuries.

They are investigating the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Waikerie CFS, SA Ambulance, and police attended the scene.

Local, 27, on child sex charges

A 27-year-old Riverland man will face court charged with child sexual offences.

Thursday 19 December, following an investigation, Detectives from Public Protection Branch ANCOR unit, together with Berri CIB, arrested the man last week for procuring a child to commit an indecent act and two counts of failing to report reportable child contact.

The man was refused bail and appeared in the Berri Magistrates Court on Friday.

"This arrest is another great example of the tireless work being under-

taken by police to ensure the protection of children within our communities," SAPOL Public Protection Branch Detective Sergeant Nik Stollnow said.

"Members of the public who have information about people involved in child abuse and exploitation are urged to contact Crime Stoppers at www.crimestopperssa.com.au, phone 1800 333 000, or make a report at www.acce.gov.au/report.

"If you know abuse is happening right now or a child is at risk, call police immediately on 131 444 or triple zero (000) in an emergency."

'Vital' equipment stolen from Waikerie's pool

POLICE are investigating the theft of a defibrillator from a public swimming pool in Waikerie earlier this month.

Sometime between 10am on Friday 13 December, and 4pm on Monday 16 December, the defibrillator, installed in public places to save lives, was stolen from the town swimming pool on Sichler Street.

A police statement on the matter said "this piece of equipment is vital in keeping people safe and could potentially save a person's life".

Renmark Paringa Council calls to ignore Jane Eliza ‘fear mongering’...

Have no (flood) fear

LOCALS should ignore “fear mongering” views about the Jane Eliza Development, the Renmark Paringa Council says.

Responding to a series of letters and opinion pieces in The Murray Pioneer on the major expansion, in particular its floodplain location, the council has urged locals to look past the views of outspoken community members.

“Renmark Paringa Council has concerns over recent media coverage on the development, namely ‘opinion’ pieces from community members,” the council said in a media statement.

“The speculation expressed in the letters are personal views which could be construed as fear mongering.”

“Renmark Paringa Council will continue to make its decisions based on research, facts

and expert advice.”

The development is expected to include hundreds of new homes, townhouses and apartments, an expanded marina, plus provision for approximately 100 houseboats and 30 small recreational craft moorings.

However, in the wake of the 2022-23 Murray River flood, a number of locals have expressed concerns – via The Pioneer’s pages – about the project’s location.

The council has promised to update the community with flood modelling and hydrology advice “early next year”.

“Council has been working consistently over the past 18 months to ensure the project makes sense for the Renmark Paringa community,” it said.

“This includes considering both the risks and opportunities associated with the project.

“Council has identified considerable positives of the development such as the economic benefits of having a marina and boat maintenance facilities, plus the opportunities created for the construction industry, and the increased commercial and residential properties.

“Council is working with a number of experts to ensure the development is safe and viable.

“The in-depth research and analysis will be shared with community members as soon as possible.”

Meanwhile the council has also addressed concerns about the effects of the revamped Twentyfirst Street Bridge on water flow at Bookmark Creek.

“Council has heard the concerns and has provided engineering evidence that shows



the new Twentyfirst Street Bridge will provide improved flows in flood events,” council says.

The council information states that larger and additional culverts near the bridge – installed as part of the upgrade – will support extra flows.

It says pre-existing drainage pipes were “not sized to accommodate fast-moving waters”.

The previously problematic bridge was widened by almost 2 metres as part of the upgrade.

\$2.3m upgrade guernsey for Our Lady of the River School

THE Federal Government has provided Our Lady of the River School with \$2,300,000 in funding to deliver and upgrade new learning spaces for its students.

As part of a Capital Grants Program, Our Lady of the River staff and students will benefit from the construction of four new general learning areas with breakout spaces and intervention rooms, which will replace the current transportable classrooms.

Our works will include the relocation and expansion of the front office, and the conversion of an existing administrative space into the multi-purpose area.

“The grant will help us realise our goal of creating up-to-date learning facilities, which will benefit all of our students and our whole community,” Our Lady of

the River School principal Michael Slagter said.

“Our transportable classrooms have reached the end of their usable life and need replacement.

“Our building program will allow us to create four brand-new contemporary classrooms with break-out spaces, intervention support rooms and up-to-date resources to enable our school community and our students to have the best facilities to support their learning.

“We have done lots of work updating our pedagogy and practices, and these new facilities will enable us to realise this to its full potential.

“We are also updating our admin building to make it more accessible and workable for our staff and families, as well as building meeting rooms and a new wellbe-

ing space, to allow outside services a place to use when they support our students.

“Without the grant we would not be able to provide these facilities for our community.”

Senator for South Australia Don Farrell said “(he knows) that students thrive when they have access to high quality, up-to-date facilities”.

“That is why the (Federal) Government is committed to providing all schools with appropriate funding, so that students in communities like Berri can have access to the best education possible,” Mr Farrell said.

“The teachers, staff, and students at Our Lady of the River School have built a wonderful school community, and these new facilities will provide them with

better, more modern spaces in which to work, teach and learn.

“I congratulate Our Lady of the River School on their successful grant application and look forward to seeing the positive impact these new facilities will have on the

\$9m grant for 22 additional aged care beds at Loxton facility...

Bed-ly needed funding

A CHRONIC region-wide shortage of residential aged care beds will be eased via a \$9.2 million expansion to a Loxton facility.

An additional 22 beds, with separate sleeping and living zones, will be added to the Riverview Lutheran Rest Home, after it secured a Federal Government grant.

CEO Nicolle Jachmann said the expansion was badly needed.

"There is a shortage of residential aged care beds in our area, and we are generally full..." Mrs Jachmann said.

"So, sadly we are currently unable to accommodate many of those in need of assistance."

"This grant will now enable

us to proceed with our plans to expand in order to provide a supported home for more of the elderly in our community."

In addition to divided living and sleeping zones, the new rooms will boast private ensuites, creating a more home-like feeling for residents.

Solid and screen doors on each room will provide a personal homely space, where residents can entertain guests, in their private living space, instead of their bedroom," Mrs Jachmann explained.

The expansion also incorporates a common resident lounge dining area with uninterrupted clifftop views of the Murray River

and Katarapko National Park.

"Residents, staff and our board are all excited and grateful to be able to proceed with the project."

The local infrastructure project is one of 52 funded through Round 2 of the nationwide Aged Care Capital Assistance Program (ACCAP), which will see \$250 million spent on delivering more than 400 additional beds and providing for higher needs like dementia care.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor, Trevor Norton, said the local project was a game-changer.

"The \$9.2 million investment in Riverview Lutheran Rest Home is transformative for Loxton, addressing aged care bed shortages and

providing modern, home-like facilities," Mr Norton said.

"This project enhances care, creates jobs, and strengthens our community."

"We're grateful to the government for prioritising aged care in our area and supporting our elderly residents."

Federal Aged Care Minister Anika Wells said Round 2 of ACCAP would "help providers like Riverview Lutheran Care Home to deliver appropriate care and create more home-like environments, with comfortable and modern amenities, more liveable spaces and fewer shared rooms".

SA Labor Senator Don Farrell

said the funding would help the Loxton facility to "continue doing what they do best".

"Providing quality care for those who need it," he said.

"This significant \$9.2 million investment is great news for the Loxton and Riverland communities and demonstrates the Albanese Government's commitment to improving aged care in rural and remote areas right across Australia."

News of the aged care development follows the recent announcement of a partnership between Loxton Waikerie council and a community housing provider to deliver 15 new dwellings for essential service workers in Loxton.

20 years of festive magic with Ed and Marg

AFTER two decades of providing the Riverland with cheer and festivity, Ed and Marg Simpfendorfer will be breaking with tradition and saying goodbye to their beloved Christmas Tree Farm.

Tucked away off the Sturt Highway at Wonuarra, Mr and Mrs Simpfendorfer's Paringa Christmas Tree Farm has been growing and selling Christmas trees to the region, and beyond, for 20 years.

However, by finally acting on a long-term plan to retire, this year's silly season will be the couple's last.

"Our plans have always been that I retire and leave the property when I reach the age of 80," Mr Simpfendorfer said.

"Although I am a very-young 80, that time has come."

"Some independent living units became available this year and we just jumped at the chance of living in Renmark."

"Christmas will be very different next year and we're really going to miss the tradition of the farm."

Buying the property 44 years ago, the block was originally growing stone fruit and vines before Mr Simpfendorfer also decided to plant pistachio trees.

"Four decades ago we decided to take on this property," Mr Simpfendorfer said.

"It was a bit run down, and the house was unliveable, but we battled on regardless."

"Since then, it has grown into this lovely place... our family love coming back here."

As a self-confessed green thumb, Mr

Simpfendorfer said the Christmas tree farm started out as a hobby 20 years ago, with the trees initially grown for family and friends developing into a Riverland adored business.

"Gardening is sort of in my DNA," he said.

"I loved growing the seedlings, so my little hobby just grew over the years until we started selling the trees."

"It's been a great experience, we have really enjoyed it."

The Paringa Christmas Tree Farm originally grew native pines, but eventually switched to the Aleppo Pine to get the "lovely pine scent" and a "brighter green" for customers.

Taking between four-to-10 years to be ready for sale, Mr Simpfendorfer said growing Christmas trees has involved challenges.

"We have been through droughts and had to deal with pests like grasshoppers, mice, and rabbits," he said.

"It hasn't always been easy, but I love the work of caring for trees and being out there doing things like watering and trimming."

Overcoming each hurdle however, Mr and Mrs Simpfendorfer said they sell close to 50 trees per year, with this final festive season hitting record numbers and sales.

With loyal customers that stretch across the Riverland region and into Victoria, Mr and Mrs Simpfendorfer said the best part of the farm is "the excitement of families coming each year".

"Seeing all the children come down and picking out the trees with their families — that's the spirit of Christmas," Mrs

Simpfendorfer said.

"It's just a huge amount of fun."

"It brings back childhood memories for a lot of people, and it makes Christmas spe-

cial to have a real tree."

"We love watching the same families come back year after year, seeing the children get that year older, and creating the tradition of 'getting the tree' — it's a beautiful tradition to have and continue."

Looking forward, the couple said they were excited for retirement, with Mr Simpfendorfer planning many mountain bike rides for the New Year.

Although no longer providing centrepieces of celebration for the region, the couple still plan to keep their Santa hats on and Christmas spirit alive when they come to town.

"We are really happy to be staying in the Riverland community," Mrs Simpfendorfer said.

"We have such a strong family and friend connection (in the region)."

"We are going to miss catching up with the regular customers, and appreciate all the support and friendship we have received all these years — we hope the new owners carry on this beautiful tradition."

"Next year, we will probably go to Adelaide to see our daughters for the holidays."

"However, we will always have a real Christmas tree."

Attending the announcement ceremony held in Adelaide, Berri high achiever, Ms Baldock, has played a key role in bringing together her school community through a range of initiatives and activities in her final school year.

Taking initiative and leadership through her local Student Leadership Council (SLC) and as well as the South Australian Representative Council, Ms Baldock used her spare time in year 12 to fundraise for the Riverland community and be an advocate for lowering the voting

Getting to shake hands with Wright MP Blair Boyer, who previously has awarded her the Minister for Education award, Ms Baldock said receiving the Commendation was a "real shock".

"The fundraising began with our SLC team wanting to raise money for Relay for Life, but once the school finished doing that, some other students, teachers, and myself separated from the school

and decided to keep going," Ms Baldock said.

"That has been incredible — I have really loved raising the money for the community to make a difference.

"I also did a lot of work with the South Australian Representative Council advocating for civics in schools and lowering the voting age.

Looking forward to completing a degree in Creative Arts in Screen

and Media at Flinders University, Ms Baldock said she was eager to see where her hard work takes her.

"It's just been so great getting recognised this way," she said.

"I feel very proud."

As head prefect of Renmark High School and recent recipient of the Footprints in the Sands of Time award at her graduation last week, Ms Files has had a year of leadership, achievement, and impact.

Acting as CEO of her company

during Australian Business Week, speaking at Anzac Day on the role of the Women's Land Army in the Riverland, and winning a Teen Parliament \$10,000 scholarship for a parliamentary speech earlier this year, 2024 has seen Ms Files excel and prepare herself for a planned Bachelor of Arts in Politics and International Relations, with a minor in History and Sociology.

"I have been involved in the political world a lot this year and it has given me so many opportunities," she said.

"I won the scholarship by advocating for politics and civics in schools and Premier Peter Malinauskas loved my idea — I am in close communications with him on the regular and we share ideas."

"It eventually led to teaching civics being legislated in schools, so that was just an amazing moment for me."

"Since many (Renmark High School) students know I am into politics, they come and ask me questions and I can give them the information."

"It's just great to be making an impact like that."

Ricca Terra hosts industry mental health discussion

RICCA Terra hosted a wine industry wellbeing session in Renmark last week, with the workshop providing Riverland attendees the tools to improve and maintain their mental health.

Receiving funding from Treasury Wines, PIRSA, and Riverland Wine, the Renmark Ricca Terra wine room provided the venue for Workplace Wellbeing SA founder Rebecca Weatherill to pass on more than 200 evidence-based tools to prevent burn out and other mental health issues.

"I have been working in the wine industry for more than 20 years," Ms Weatherill said.

"In 2019 I experienced what we now know as burn out, however, there was no language for what I was experiencing back then. Eventually, I was forced to step away from full-time employment with very little savings and as a single parent.

"Through simple, but purposeful change to my daily life, I experienced a positive change in my mental health, so I decided to explore the science behind this and try to help others."

While receiving a Diploma in Positive

Psychology and Wellbeing and a Mental Health First Aid certification, Ms Weatherill's business, Workplace Wellbeing SA, developed.

Now sharing her journey with mental health, Ms Weatherill provides sessions that allow attendees to survey their own wellbeing, and then offer tools from the PERMAH (Positive emotions, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning, Accomplishment, Health) framework.

"The PERMAH model looks at the six elements that are essential to wellbeing,"

"Each are vital to our mental health, and we need to look across all six.

"Talks can be really inspiring, but I really love to share the science and practice skills that helped for me to make real change.

"I just hope (the Riverland) community can take away the many tools I have given them and experiment to see what works best for them.

Upgrades long overdue

RENMARK is a town boasting many sporting landmarks.

Pristine football and soccer fields, lawn tennis courts, cricket pitches, lawn bowls greens and the Alan Coulter Recreation Centre.

Whether it's summer or winter sports that are being played, it's easy to see why Renmark's various sporting facilities are so well patronised by both senior and junior players.

The Renmark Netball Club is certainly no different when it comes to boasting a sizeable – and dedicated – player base. With more than 240 players across its divisions, the club is truly at the heart of the surrounding community.

However, the difference between Renmark Netball Club and its neighbours – such as the Renmark Rovers and Renmark Olympic grounds – has for so long been the quality of playing surfaces and facilities.

It takes just a quick look at the club's courts to see that work needs to be done, and courts that see such a high amount of use need to be at the appropriate quality.

The recent approval of the club's Play Our Way grant application – detailed in today's edition of The Murray Pioneer – is a testament to the efforts of those involved in running the club, who have long had their eyes on upgrades for the courts.

While marking the culmination of the hard work needed to secure the grant, the announcement also potentially marks the first step in a long-term process for the club, with aspirations also existing for future upgrades of changerooms.

As pointed out by the Riverland's Federal MP, sporting facilities in regional communities can quickly become outdated for the needs of modern communities.

Some would be forgiven for arguing the Renmark Netball Club may have reached this point. Considering the number of players mentioned above, and the weather conditions of the Riverland's winters, the absence of a proper changeroom is quite noticeable.

As with any sporting club in the Riverland, these upgrades are necessary to keep groups sustainable and attracting new players – especially juniors – to their respective codes.

Considering how important our local sporting clubs are to their surrounding towns, ensuring playing surfaces, whether they be grass or concrete, are safe for players and are being appropriately maintained, should be a priority at all levels of government.

It may still be a long journey ahead for those involved at the Renmark Netball Club to see their full vision for the club's future to materialise, however the first step has now been made, and the planned upgrades will benefit both young and senior netballers for years to come.

Renmark-Wentworth Road dangerous

I SUPPOSE suppose one could say it is wonderful to see that the new interconnector power line, adjacent to the Renmark-Wentworth Road, north of Renmark, is now finished in South Australia.

When can we expect the "powers that be" to come back and repair the damage to the Renmark-Wentworth road?

This power line that has been constructed is for the benefit of Australians, but at what cost to the locals who have to live with the damage to their infrastructure (i.e. road)?

This road services not only the local community but also a huge Ramsar site in the Chowilla floodplain. Restricted access to this area is costing the state and the local community dearly.

It is all well and good to develop the infrastructure to deliver our renewable energy, but is it really necessary to destroy the existing road network to achieve that end?

One must also remember that the Renmark-Wentworth road is the main link for servicing Lake Victoria, which is the backup source of water for South Australia.

How many vehicles will government destroy if this road is not repaired?

It is going to take a lot more than just running a grader over it. I wonder if the cost of road repair was built into the contract for the construction of the interconnector.

There is a longstanding rule in this country: "If you come to the bush and use our facilities you leave the place in the same condition as you found it, as if you had never been there."

The road is bad enough at the best of times, being graded once, maybe twice a year. But with all the extra heavy traffic delivering material to the power line, the trucks have broken through the thin marl layer on the surface and left a road that is now so full

of potholes it is destroying all the vehicles that use it.

It should also be remembered that it is one of only two roads to NSW, the other being the Broken Hill Road.

The Renmark-Wentworth Road is both dangerous and basically unusable.

They're coming after our farmers

DID you read the article on page 33 of The Murray Pioneer on 20 November ('Climate reporting is here: How agribusiness can thrive')?

For background, under the Australian Labor Government's new laws for mandatory climate-related reporting, large companies such as supermarkets will be required to report on the CO2 emissions of their suppliers.

Therefore farmers will be required to supply this information to the supermarkets – or lose "preferred supplier status" (i.e. supermarkets won't buy from them).

Here's some quotes from the article, followed in brackets by what I think it really means:

"For farms of any size that supply to supermarket chains... a low-or-neutral carbon footprint becomes a competitive advantage..."

"A carbon-neutral supplier becomes the supplier of choice given the recipient business is now required to capture and report a carbon footprint via the supply chain."

"Agile farmers who respond swiftly to the demand will be ready to increase the chances of protecting their current customer contracts..."

(The Labor Government's message to farmers is: Spend a lot of time and money conforming to our emissions laws or we'll ensure that supermarkets stop buying the food you produce).

"Many more higher-intensity

farms... will have a footprint that needs to be reduced... and can look to work towards increasing sequestration practices across their operations via soil, trees and herd management methods."

(For a fee, we will advise farmers by calculating their net carbon emissions and then advising them on what farming practices they need to change to conform, or how many carbon credits they will need to buy. A side note here: Ever noticed how they always refer to CO2 emissions as 'your carbon footprint'? We easily identify carbon as black, soot and pollution. It's a bait-and-switch technique so that we don't think of CO2 for what it really is: essential food for everything in the plant kingdom – everything farmers grow for us to eat.)

"Supply chain emissions relating to the supply chain is funnelled into data form..."

(Farmers will have to pay to offset the supposed CO2 produced by trucking produce to market. The greater the distance to market the more they pay).

"...in response to consumer demand, a major supermarket chain implements buying requirements, whereby they will only purchase from suppliers that are carbon neutral."

(Pure gaslighting. We consumers are being told that this law foisted onto our farmers is because we demanded it. The result is that we the consumers will pay even more for all our food – except of course for food imported from places like China, where governments haven't imposed these costs on their farmers).

"The farm wishes to expand production and seeks a loan from the bank and additional insurance."

"The bank and insurer see the farm's carbon neutrality as an indicator of business longevity and sustainability, and respond favourably."

(Message to farmers: play

this government's game or we'll ensure that you can't get a bank loan or insurance).

"With a thriving farming enterprise backed by advisory support and live data, the farm's succession outlook becomes brighter. The advisor assists the farm in succession and legacy planning for future generations."

(Spend the big dollars on 1. A company that advises on your mandated climate-related reporting; and 2. Complying with their advice, or you won't have a farm to pass on to your children.).

In a previous letter to the editor I referred to CO2 studies done by scientific methods: observable, testable, repeatable and falsifiable experiments (not the "climate modelling" we are constantly shown which always prove to be wrong).

They showed that under current atmospheric CO2 levels (approximately 425ppm) plants now grow 20-30 per cent more than they did prior to the industrial revolution (approximately 250ppm), while needing less water.

And yet our government insists on chasing a CO2-neutral fantasy while passing the enormous cost of it onto the everyday consumer.

We're told to "follow the science", but not apparently if the science conflicts with your political ideology, which is promoted by scaring the crap out of young people with stories of environmental armageddon so that they will vote for your expensive, farmer-destroying "solutions".

So, is this really about "saving the planet"? Or is it governments exerting dictatorial control to force families off their farms and push other small businesses to the wall while benefiting large multinational companies that use creative accounting to show carbon neutrality?

"Her ongoing commitment has changed the way people look at Waikerie and has modernised things a little, but it also respects the old buildings that we have here."



FRUIT FLY OUTBREAK LINDSAY POINT B



Queensland fruit fly larvae has been found in Lindsay Point causing a new outbreak to be declared called Lindsay Point B.

A 1.5 km radius red outbreak area has been established for Lindsay Point B. If you live in the area, visit fruitfly.sa.gov.au to understand the restrictions in place.

Some fruit and vegetables cannot move from properties in the outbreak area.

We have begun eradication activities in the area. PIRSA field staff with ID will be visiting properties to apply organic fruit fly bait and check fruit for signs of fruit fly. If you need to discuss special arrangements for moving commercial produce from outbreak areas, please call the industry hotline on 1800 255 556.

What you need to do:

- **Keep** fruit on your property – do not share, sell or give it away.
- **Provide** us access to your garden so we can do our work quickly and efficiently.
- **Pick** your ripe fruit and vegetables.
- **Collect** fallen fruit, double bag the waste, seal it closed, and put it in a general waste bin.
- **Check** your fruit for blemishes and maggots.
- **Call the Fruit Fly Hotline** on 1300 666 010 if you find any larvae in fruit, seal the item in an airtight bag and arrange collection.

Petition about Waikerie institute concerns

CONCERNED residents and ratepayers of Loxton Waikerie council have started circulating a petition to inform the Office of Public Integrity (OPI) about what they describe as the "sad state of the Waikerie Soldiers Memorial Hall and Institute".

The details of the petition were put up on social media on 18 December. It is also available at a number of local businesses for interested community members to sign.

The petition states the institute was built in 1921, with the aim to draw attention of the OPI to "the neglect of the Loxton Waikerie district council, since amalgamation as far back as 1997, to meet its obligation to maintain and improve assets of this kind".

"Your petitioners therefore request the OPI to investigate why years of neglect and empty promises of action have led to the Waikerie community facility being overlooked and (in) a bad state of repair," the petition said.

The petition said this was occurring "while grant monies are sought and

spent in Loxton on a similar building/s", and states "grant monies" being spent are in "the tune of \$7m in one instance, and over \$15m in another.

"No such applications for grant money has been applied for the Waikerie Solidiers Memorial Hall and Institute, which was and always will be a vital central hub for the town for many large-scale entertainment activities," the petition said.

Loxton Waikerie council currently has \$200,000 allocated to Waikerie Institute upgrades (Stage 1) in the

current financial year's budget.

The project is working on "enhancing functionality of the Waikerie Institute by improving effluent disposal, water supply, kitchen facilities, and upgrades to the staging area", council said in its monthly project update for December.

Loxton Waikerie council has also allocated a further \$200,000 in its Long-Term Financial Plan for the 2026/27 financial year towards upgrading the institu-

Funding secured for netball court upgrades

A MAJOR Renmark sporting club will be able to upgrade its playing surfaces after securing a federal government grant.

The Renmark Netball Club has been successful in securing a Federal Government Play Our Way grant.

President Rachael Stoeckel said the funding would allow for needed upgrades to the club's courts and lighting.

"We're very excited and we've got lots of support," Ms Stoeckel said.

"We're the biggest club in the Riverland, (but) our facilities are not reflecting that."

"We want to keep improving. We can upgrade this to make it modern and better for the community."

Ms Stoeckel said the club also had future plans to upgrade its changeroom facilities.

"We found a company called

Club Builder, and they are a grant writing company, and we've been working with them on the steps of how to secure the funding," she said.

"We knew we wanted the courts to be done... and we made a commitment. There was a lot on our part, we had to gather a lot of information (and) we did a survey."

"They then helped us draw up a masterplan. Originally it was just going to be the courts and upgrading the building slightly, but now we've got aspirations for a bigger building."

"We have no changerooms... back in the grassroots days that was sufficient, but in this day and age it's not."

Barker MP Tony Pasin said improving the club's facilities would encourage further participation in the sport.

"I'm passionate about working with the community to help

deliver local infrastructure, particularly sporting facilities because of the vitally important role grassroots sport plays in regional communities," Mr Pasin said.

"I threw my full support behind local Play Our Way applications in Barker because it is imperative that facilities are functional and fit for purpose, particularly for projects that reduce barriers to participation in sport for women and girls."

"For too long, too many female club members have had to contend with sub-standard infrastructure and facilities, particularly in the regions. We desperately need to address this inequality because strong and inclusive grassroots sporting clubs help strengthen regional communities."

"I'm looking forward to funding being received to get work on the project underway as quickly as possible."

Free RV site concern

A RIVERLAND West holiday park operator is concerned about the impact Loxton Waikerie council's decision to make a temporary recreational vehicle (RV) site permanent will have on its business.

Owner of the Waikerie Holiday Park, the Edwards Group, said they fully supported the opening of the temporary RV camping site during the 2022/2023 River Murray flood, when the holiday park and numerous existing local free camping locations were temporarily closed.

But Edwards Group CEO Stephen Edwards said they had understood this site would be temporary, and would close once the holiday park and other free camping sites were reopened.

At its November meeting, Loxton Waikerie councillors unanimously carried a motion for the area adjacent to Waikerie's Silo Art to "continue to operate as a RV park for self-contained vehicles and that the signage

be changed to reflect the permanent nature".

Mr Edwards told The Murray Pioneer he had not been consulted prior to council making its decision in November.

He said due to the continued operation of the free RV site after the flood, the Waikerie Holiday Park had suffered a significant decrease in caravan and camping travellers.

"This is due to the directly competitive nature of this free RV park," he said.

"With the existing numerous free and low-cost camping options available within the local region, it is important to note that no extra demand is created through this additional free RV park, merely a redistribution of existing guests."

Mr Edwards said the local area already had seven free camps.

"Why add an eighth one?" he said.

"This free RV parking will add additional costs to council in terms of upkeep while adding no additional tourism

spend to the local economy."

"The Edwards Group would welcome the opportunity to work with council on more cost effective and economically beneficial ways to promote tourism in Waikerie and the surrounding region," he said.

Loxton Waikerie CEO David Beaton said while the objection was understandable, there were clear differences.

"The RV Park has no water, no toilets, no showers, and no power, so in essence it only competes with the other free camping areas that the Edwards Group acknowledge," he said.

"It has had a positive effect on businesses in Waikerie and has a place in the accommodation mix."

Mr Beaton said the holiday park was an essential business for Waikerie and the council was keen to support it during the flood.

"The Edwards Group have been invited to meet with the whole of council to understand their perspective and trading conditions," he said.

Former Riverland resident and wine industry figure ANDREW WEEKS has provided the following opinion piece in response to an article in last week's MURRAY PIONEER regarding the recent WINE INDUSTRY INQUIRY held in Renmark...

WHILE I commend Jason Perrin for his ongoing support for his fellow growers, there were some inaccuracies in his article.

Firstly, regarding the national advocacy body Australian Grape and Wine (AGW), there are historical and practical reasons for the current structure. I was involved in the formation of the new entity and served as the first chairman on the Vignerons Committee, so I am speaking from experience.

The reason for the merger was strong and ongoing feedback from federal politicians that wine industry representation was ineffective and fractured. With different voices publicly fighting each other about commercial issues, politicians had the choice of either picking sides or ignoring industry voices altogether. The industry was not being as effective as it should be for all its stakeholders, and there was support across grower groups to reform the national representation.

AGW was formed from the merger of the Winemakers' Federation of Australia (WFA) and Australian Vignerons (AV), the national grower advocacy body. The WFA board comprised representatives in three committees, namely the small, medium and large companies. When the new entity AGW was formed, the Vignerons Committee was added.

Importantly, the constitution of AGW has protection for the vignerons in Clause 15.10 (Page 15) that voting on the board must carry a majority of at least 80 per cent. This was instilled as an important safeguard to ensure that winemakers could not outvote growers as a group. The constitution is publicly accessible and can easily be found by Google search. So, the inference that growers have no representation because of their number is unfounded. In any case, winemakers and grape growers rarely act as separate voting blocs on AGW. In fact, small winemakers tend to be grape growers who make their own branded wine instead of selling their fruit to another entity. Many have more in common with the vignerons than with large corporate winemakers. I understand that most of the decisions are of benefit to growers and winemakers and are



made by consensus.

Most of the challenges that the Australian wine industry faces affect both growers and winemakers alike. The major differences revolve around commercial trading, such as the issues addressed by the Code of Conduct. Priorities such as international market access, biosecurity, access to agrochemicals, research needs and technical support are of common interest to both winemakers and growers. And there are other benefits for growers in being part of the merged entity. Wine companies tend to have more employees with the skill and knowledge in these complex fields to be able contribute to industry than grower businesses do, and many have contributed their employees' time on AGW for the benefit of the entire industry.

AGW like WFA before it is a voluntary membership organisation. National and international advocacy is expensive, and to be effective it needs a large operating budget. Large wine companies, with larger incomes and more at stake, pay higher membership fees than smaller members, with fees well beyond the capacity of an individual grower to pay. A new membership arrangement was included for grower representatives so that growers were able to get a seat at the table. But because it is a voluntary representative membership organisation, it is not feasible nor realistic to insist on a "compulsory restructure" with a "mandated 50/50 grower winemaker/grape grower requirement". There is no mechanism to compel this to happen, and even if it did, the high-paying members that fund so much industry work may disappear overnight.

There are also governance problems with this suggestion.

For a board to function effectively, it needs capable people, not just numbers of "bums on seats" to satisfy a particular quota. Governance principles dictate that the members act in the interest of the organisation. Members of the Vignerons Committee are conferred by grower/member organisations, bring their input from grower members, and work for the benefit of the whole industry through AGW. Suggesting that some of the Vignerons committee members are ineffective because of a simplistic assessment that they are not full-time growers reveals ignorance of governance principles and the function of a board. The vigneron representatives are not there to provide viticulture or grape-growing advice, they are there to provide oversight and input into the strategy and function of the organisation. Given the challenges in getting skilled, willing and able people to fill the volunteer board positions and to commit to the long hours of work and travel without being paid, it is unclear where the suggested additional grower representatives would come from.

The Code Management Committee, which oversees the content and operation of the Code of Conduct does have equal representation of growers and winemakers and has an independent chairman. But more importantly, the grower representatives on that committee are skilled, experienced and strong-willed, and they are effective advocates in the management of the Code.

A lot of the commentary around terrible grape prices blames wine companies and the effectiveness of the Code of Conduct, and implies that with fairer trading conditions growers' problems will be solved.

This view ignores the current reality of the global wine market. It is a fact that the world is awash with an excess of red wine, which is depressing its value and the value of the fruit that is used to make it. About a year ago California committed to removing 50,000 acres of vineyard, and Bordeaux around 9000 hectares. These areas are equal to the entire vineyard area, and half the entire vineyard of the Riverland respectively. The oversupply is not limited to the Riverland, it is global. So even with a highly effective Code of Conduct and excellent commercial protection for grape growers, it is unlikely that wine grape prices would be good at present due to the current market value of wine.

This does not remove the need for fair and equitable trading arrangements between buyers and sellers of wine grapes. After such a long period of failure to garner better wine company support for the existing voluntary Code of Conduct, it is understandable why many growers are now calling for a mandatory code. It is important, however, to recognize the limitations of any code of conduct and the impact of the global trend of falling wine consumption, a lot of wine in storage and a production capacity misaligned with sustainable sales.

It is important that these realities are known so that growers can make the best possible decisions for their future. While there is a moral case as well as a business case for greater transparency in business dealings in the wine sector, there are more important issues with the supply and demand balance and the inherent value of the fruit and wine being produced.

Myers set for re-election

KEVIN Myers, of Cadell, has been provisionally declared elected in the Eyre Ward Supplementary Election for Mid Murray Council after the distribution of preferences.

The scrutiny and count was conducted on Tuesday 17 December, at the Electoral Commission SA Central Processing Centre in Adelaide.

Three candidates nominated to fill the vacancy on Mid Murray Council created by the resignation of councillor John Forrester, in August.

On first preferences, Mr Myers received 208 votes, Jakob Gamertsfelder, from Morgan received 193 votes, and Angela Lukas received 183.

After the distribution of preferences, Mr Myers recorded 278 votes, Mr Gamertsfelder received 240 votes, and Ms Lukas was excluded from the count.

Mr Myers served on council for 16 years and was unsuccessful in his bid for the mayoral post in the 2022 council elections.

Simone Bailey was elected Mayor after defeating both Mr Myers and previous Mayor Dave Burgess.

In his Eyre Ward Supplementary Election statement Mr Myers said although he was still serving the community as Chair of the Heritage and Maritime Board, he felt he had a lot more to offer.

He said he has a "broad knowledge of how council works in the areas of planning, infrastructure and finance".

Riverland Voices heard at Parliament

MADISON EASTMOND

REPRESENTING the Indigenous communities of the Murraylands, South East, and Riverland, the First Nations Voice to SA has given an inaugural address to Parliament outlining the work and importance of the aboriginal body to achieve national change.

Riverland members of the First Nations Voice to SA gave a historical and collective address earlier this month, with Voice presiding member Leeroy Bilney outlining Indigenous issues to the State Parliament.

Through its establishment, the First Nations Voice to Parliament aims to ensure Indigenous people have a more direct say in laws and policies that impact them, while addressing systematic issues of representation.

Riverland State Voice member to Parliament Rob Wright said the experience was a "roller-coaster of emotions" and was a "reward for all the work (the group) had been doing" since it was formed in April.

Mr Wright said the address provided a space for the body to "showcase the work (the Voice) is doing" and outline the "challenges that have come" with the framework to address aboriginal issues.

"Currently, as Leeroy said in the address, we are trying to build the plane while also trying to fly it," he said.

"It's an imbedded, bureaucratic model — it's like trying to square off a round peg sometimes, and it's going to take time."

However, the Voice had made significant strides since its formation, having already contributed to government legislation, providing feedback on bills before Parliament, including legislation relating to Early Childhood Development and Preventative Health, and is set to provide formal contribution to the Royal Commission into Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence.

Along with 18 local meetings, three state meetings, and a meeting with the Premier and senior cabinet, the 46 elected members have also developed a code of conduct, terms of reference, and rulebooks, along with gathering and collating concerns and issues from local communities.

"Things such as incarceration, criminal justice, health and housing, education, we are overrepresented in a not-so-positive way," Mr Wright said.

"We would like a more holistic model to (address Indigenous issues)... address the removal of children with a focus on the reunification of families, with support for parents... and make sure that programs that work don't disappear like they historically have."

"However, we have been working on rebuilding trust and relationships (with Government) so that we can create meaningful change."

"...Leeroy's address came from a place of love, and trying to get both parties on the same page and affirm their commitment (on the Voice)."

"We thought it was received really well, and we're looking forward to another year of good work being involved with the Riverland community."

Personal bests achieved at nationals

THREE talented young Riverland athletes achieved some of their best performances in the recent School Sport Australia Track and Field Championship in Sydney for students aged 10 to 12 years.

Hunter Danton 12, of Morgan, Anna McCullough, 12, of Loxton and Chloe Golding, 10, of Waikerie, who are all members of the Waikerie Little Athletics Club, competed in the recent 10 to 12 year old national event, at Sydney Olympic Park.

Waikerie Little Athletics committee member Julia Golding, who is also Chloe's mum, said the three dedicated athletes were chosen to represent SA as a result of their performances at the SAPSASA Track and Field competition, held at Santos Stadium, in Adelaide in September.

She said the youngsters trained tirelessly leading up to the event, taking part in daily core strengthening, attending club meets at

Waikerie, gruelling training sessions at the town oval, and training with the Riverland Athletics Development Squad running group.

Ms Golding said they also travelled to Adelaide each weekend for a month leading up to the event so that they could train with their SA team, under specialist coaches.

"This enabled them to be prepared and ready to compete at their full potential in Sydney," she said.

"It was an experience all three of the young Riverland athletes and our families will never forget.

"Competing in such an iconic place against the best in the country

"The conditions were testing with humid, wet and hot weather, but this did not hinder their spirits or efforts.

"All three competed with grit and determination and came away with some incredible personal bests and wonderful results."

Ms Golding said the young athletes made new friendships, cheered teammates on, and learned a lot about competing against the best.

"How proud we are and how amazing it is that we have country kids taking it to the top athletes in Australia who are extremely well drilled and trained," she said.

Chloe who came ninth in both the 1500m and 800m for 10-year-old girls said it was an amazing experience to race on the warm-up track Australian sprinter Cathy Freeman used before winning a gold medal in the Sydney 2000 Olympics.

"I have learned that you aren't always the best, but you must always try your very best," she said.

"I am determined to make it to the nationals again next year."

Anna who finished 13th in the high jump and was part of the 4x100 relay team that came sixth overall in their age category said the highlight for her was knowing

that her family, school community, and classmates were cheering her on via a live feed as she was doing the actual event.

"It was very stormy, very humid, and very wet," she said.

Anna said she jumped clear for the first four rounds of her high jump competition, which started at 1.20m and reached 1.35m.

"I missed my next three attempts at 1.40cm and finished 1.35 metres and thirteenth in Australia," she said.

Hunter came ninth in the 12-year-old boy's discus with a throw of 32.8m, which was 45cm more than his previous personal best result.

In shot put, he came 13th with a throw of 9.55m.

Hunter said he enjoyed making the state team for the under 12s track and field nationals for the second year in a row.

"I competed against some talented competitors from other states in discus and shotput and I was extremely happy that I broke my

personal best in discus," he said.

Hunter said he was extremely grateful for the support of his sponsors; Foxtale Houseboats, in Morgan, Cadell Community Tourist Association, Cadell Club, Waikerie High School, and Waikerie Little Athletics Club.

"Without their help it would have been a challenge to get to Sydney," he said.

"I would also like to thank my friends, family, and my state coach Mel Fraser."

Ms Golding said competing in the national championship has made these athletes hungrier and more determined to push themselves to greater heights in the future.

"The three families are grateful for all the community support they received leading up to and during the event," she said.

River system prepared for summer demands

THE water resource needs for Riverland irrigation and environmental maintenance will be met through current storage levels, according to a major national report.

The Murray-Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) earlier this month released its Annual Operating Outlook (AOO).

MDBA executive director of river management Jacqui Hickey said managing the Murray River's response to changing conditions would ensure operations during the

peak demand period.

"The dry winter and spring meant bulk water transfers started early and remained within channel, allowing environmental water to be used to water the floodplains and wetlands," Ms Hickey said.

"The recent rainfall across eastern Australia has seen a temporary rise in river levels and reductions in irrigation demand, and storage releases. Further down the system, Lake Victoria is almost full – ready to support what is expected to be a high

demand summer and autumn.

"As at 11 December, Hume Dam held 60 per cent capacity, and Dartmouth Dam 89 per cent. The Menindee Lakes held 41 per cent and Lake Victoria 95 per cent."

"The MDBA continues to work closely with Basin states to coordinate water releases, monitor storages and manage to the condition. We are actively working with our partners to manage water quality risks including blue-green algae and salinity, and to ensure that com-

munities have the information they need to be safe and enjoy the water this holiday season."

The AOO is one of many planning tools that inform how water agencies can respond to a range of modelled scenarios in the Murray River.

Program in schools prevents violence against women and girls

AN education program designed to empower students in years 8 to 10 to foster gender equality, promote diversity, inclusion, and build healthy, respectful relationships launched in Riverland schools earlier this month.

The Raiise Respect Sporting Clubs and Schools Program, funded by the State Government, has been developed as part of the Raiise Respectful Club Environment Program that is already underway in sports clubs.

Raiise Respect is an interactive eLearning platform addressing critical topics including the role everyone plays in preventing violence against girls and women, respectful relationships and gender equality, using engaging modules that encourage active participation from students.

The program is being launched by Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence, Katrine Hildyard, and is planned to be ramped up across South Australia in 2025.

"The Raiise Respect program is a game-changer for schools and communities, equipping young people with the tools they need to create a future where respect and equality are the norm and harmful attitudes about women and the roles that men and women should play are a thing of the past," Ms Hildyard said.

"The State Government is working tirelessly to address domestic, family and sexual violence through prevention, early intervention, response and recovery and healing.

"We know that as we focus on advancing change to help prevent violence that harmful attitudes about women are being perpetuated, including online by the likes of Andrew Tate, and that our work must continue.

"We are determined to combat these harmful attitudes because every young person has the right to grow up in an environment where they feel and are respected and included. When we combine education with action, we create genuine change.

"Through Raiise, our students are building their confidence in speaking up against violence and inequality and learning to build the inclusive environments that benefit everyone.

"The impact of Raiise reaches well beyond our classroom walls; it shifts attitudes and helps create spaces where everyone is valued. I am really proud of our government's investment in this program."

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said "with reports about the rise of misogynistic behaviour, the (State) Government has a clear focus on countering this in our community".

"Schools can play a key role in promoting positive cultural change and addressing negative attitudes arising from social media," he said.

"We want to work with parents, carers and the wider community to ensure we are providing guidance and role modelling that builds on respectful relationship for all our young people.

"We all have a shared responsibility to ensure our young people have the support, strategies and knowledge regarding consent and respectful relationships. I believe that implementing respectful relationships education at the earliest opportunity can help counter this country's domestic violence shame."

Schools are invited to sign up for the program via the Raiise website, where they can access resources, lesson plans, and support materials. The program is available for a 60-day trial, allowing schools to experience its benefits firsthand. For those who wish to have the program facilitated, there is also an option for expert-led delivery by trained facilitators.

Sporting clubs who have engaged with the Raiise Respectful Club Environments Program will receive digital access to the program for the young people at their club at no charge.

Senator for South Australia Don Farrell said the "program will deliver critical support to a sector facing considerable challenges such as changing readership habits, increasing costs, and declining advertising revenue".

"I know how important local news is to keep our communities right across South Australia informed, engaged, and connected," Mr Farrell said.

"Hearing local voices discussing local issues makes a

world of difference to communities, and this grant will promote the important work of our terrific local media producers.

"I would encourage all eligible news publishers, from Renmark to Mount Gambier, to consider applying for this grant opportunity."

Federal Minister for Communications Michelle Rowland said "local and community news outlets play a vital role in keeping Australians up to date about the matters and events that impact them – enabling them to stay engaged and make informed decisions".

"Local and community news outlets play a huge role in supporting a diverse and inclusive news media sector that is so vital to the healthy functioning of Australian society and democracy," Ms

Rowland said.

"We want to see more local journalists and publishers reporting on the issues that matter to their communities."

"This funding will provide the urgent assistance local news outlets need as we continue our work on News Media Assistance Program – an ongoing program that will enable us to deliver effective support to the Australian news sector into the future."

Applications for the NMRP will close on 31 March, if funding is yet to be exhausted before this date.

On-farm drought grants open for applications

NEW state government grants are aimed to support primary producers, including those in the Riverland, experiencing difficulties caused by current drought conditions.

Now open for applications, the \$5m On-Farm Drought Infrastructure Rebate Scheme is focused on infrastructure projects assisting primary producers to manage dry conditions and strengthening their businesses for future droughts.

Eligible businesses can be eligible with a rebate of up to 75 per cent – to a maximum of \$5000 – for projects including water infrastructure upgrades, stock containment areas, grain and fodder storage, soil moisture monitors and weather stations.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said "building our economic, environmental, and social resilience to droughts is crucial to maintaining our state's robust primary industries and agribusinesses which generate more than \$18bn in revenue and employ over 78,000 people".

"Upgrading on-farm infrastructure and building on existing planning to identify opportunities for improvement will go a long way to ensuring we are in a stronger position to tackle drought and the associated chal-

lenges," Ms Scriven said.

"Equipping communities to also continue fostering community cohesion is also an important part of supporting our farmers and regional towns."

The rebate scheme was announced earlier in the year as part of the State Government's \$18m package to assist farming communities across the region who have been affected by the current droughts.

The package was also presented and informed during the drought roundtables held across the region and the SA Drought Advisory Group, which includes representatives from key primary industries groups, as well as state, federal and local government.

The Connecting Communities Grants were also announced as part of this package with grants of up to \$5000 available to industry, community, not-for-profit, local government, and incorporated groups to host events that embrace social connections and provide support.

Program gets Riverland teens off screens

THE State Government have made a \$2.38m investment through the Active State Collaboration Program to get young Riverland people active and away from their screens.

Applications for the latest round of the program open

today and feature a \$1.85m funding stream specifically targeting the critical 12-15 age group, where participation rates show a concerning decline during the transition from primary to secondary education.

Through the Active State

Collaboration Program, delivered through the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing (ORSR), organisations are funded to facilitate inclusive programs with tangible benefits for the future health and wellbeing of South Australia's youth.

Last year's Active State Collaboration Program supported 11 projects, providing more than \$1.4m, where sporting and other organisations partnered to deliver unique and special initiatives supporting the physical and mental health of South Australians.

Applications for the program close at noon on 5 March.

Cook a safe bbq this Christmas

RIVERLANDERS have been urged to ensure barbeques are maintained and operated safely during the holiday period.

Minister for Emergency Services Dan Cregan said MFS and CFS firefighters responded to 69 barbecue fires across the state in 2023-24, marking a 28 per cent increase on the previous 12 months.

"Adopting simple measures before firing up the barbecue will help ensure a safe and enjoyable festive period," Mr Cregan said.

"With the fire danger season upon us... proper use and maintenance will mean this summer staple doesn't become a risk to lives and property."

An 18-year-old woman from Swan Reach, near Blanchetown, was in October flown to hospital after she sustained facial burns from a barbecue fire.

MFS chief officer Jeff Swann said many incidents were preventable through simple safety checks and precautions.

"Barbeques left outdoors can deteriorate over time, so it's critical to inspect gas cylinders, hoses, and connections for wear, and to clean your barbecue to remove any grease that could ignite," Mr Swann said.

"Regular cleaning, particularly of the drip trays, is a simple yet effective way to reduce fire risk. A quick inspection can prevent dangerous accidents."

A pre-Christmas checklist to ensure a safe BBQ this bushfire season includes:

- Inspecting gas cylinders, hoses and connections for signs of damage or wear.
- Checking hose connections and control valves for gas leaks.
- Regular cleaning to avoid a build-up of fats and oils.
- Using barbeques outdoors in a well-ventilated area, at least four metres away from any combustible materials.

- Ensuring coals are fully extinguished after use.
- During the Fire Danger Season, checking for fire bans and any local council restrictions before lighting up – particularly for wood or solid fuel BBQs.

CFS chief officer Brett Loughlin said barbeques stored outside during the cooler months and exposed to the elements can deteriorate, increasing the risk of a fire hazard.

"During this time of year, it is important you stay informed about fire danger ratings each day in your area before undertaking any outdoor cooking to reduce the risk of fires starting," Mr Loughlin said.

THE FAIR-WEATHER GARDENER

WELL here it is, that time of the year when some of us stress about gifts, baking puddings, cakes, or buying presents without breaking the bank. We also try to get to all those Christmas parties.

GIFTS

You may have some of your presents sorted if you look to your garden and pantry.

Pots of jam, pickles and preserved lemons are always welcome.

You might even have potted-on some plants from your garden that can go into a fancy pot, or there is even time to create a potted herb garden for a special friend.

Another simple gift for those of you with tomatoes. Slowly roast halved tomatoes for up to four hours in the lowest oven temperature. Cool and pack in good quality Australian olive oil. It is a wonderful accompaniment for Christmas seafood.

I have seen some amazing wreaths made. You might like to try your hand at one. I covered one with succulents many years ago, and it's still going strong with the occasional squirt of water.

HERB GARDEN POT

Take a shallow pot and fill it with the best potting mix and pack it with a combination of tall-and-low-growing herbs.

Look to put in borage for the bees (grows easily from seed), basil, sage, parsley, thyme and for a pop of colour, nasturtium.

Make sure to provide a little note to the receiver that eventually they will outgrow the pot.



SAVING WATER

Well, we have had some unseasonal rain that has been devastating for our fruit growers. However, the rainwater tanks are full.

We still need to be aware that saving water will become increasingly necessary as summer continues.

HINTS

Cut back and dead head continually to reduce transpiration and keep the garden tidy.

Mulch is essential, and always apply to damp soil. If possible water with Seasol and a tablespoon of dishwashing liquid in a bucket of water, as this assists with the uptake of water.

Make sure there is a gap between the mulch and the plant to prevent collar rot.

Move pots to shadier areas, grouping similar plants together to simplify watering requirements. Don't overwater your indoor plants. More are killed by overwatering than anything else, so become an early riser and water in the morning, or in the cool of the evening.

However, watch out for diseases that thrive on moist conditions.

WOLLEMI PINE

Maybe this year you will go for a potted Christmas tree? If so, try our wonderful native Wollemi Pine.

This ancient tree grows well in a pot, but needs a bit of shade from our extreme heat. It is a warm temperate plant.

Mine has grown well for over 10 years on the patio.

Watch out for mealy bug, as it almost decimated mine, however when pruned we were overjoyed to see the new shoots everywhere.

CUT FLOWERS

Make your flowers last longer with a few simple steps.

As soon as you pick or purchase flowers, snip the stalks before you place them in water. Remove any leaves that will be under the surface, as they will rot and foul the water.

Leave other leaves on. Pick in the cool of the morning, or late in the afternoon.

Change the water every second day, snipping a small piece off the stems each time, and rinse out vases with bleach after use.

If picking roses in bud, snip stems and place in tepid water and keep in a cool place before arranging. This prevents them from opening too soon. Vases are limited only by your imagination. If it holds water, it can be a vase. Try a series of teacups, jugs, or teapots. Even bottles make great specimen vases.

ANTS

The ants are on the move. If you find them on your plants check for scale, remove the scale and spray the ants. You can spray with molasses, diluted in water, in a ratio of 10ml per litre. Using this means no harm to the environment and the mixture is quite beneficial to the plants.

FRANGIPANI

This beautiful but tough plant does well here and is a favourite of mine. It grows readily from a cutting, which can be a small or large branch.

When taking a cutting, place it in a shady spot until the cut edge forms a callus. Avoid planting it until then. They are just getting leaves and flowers here, and the best spot is against a sunny wall with a little summer shade.

It will thrive in sandy soil and even if you only have a small amount of room, it will grow in a pot. It takes very little water or fertiliser once established, but does respond to an all-purpose fertiliser in spring.



REMINDERS

Don't forget to cover up when out in the garden. A sunhat, gloves, sunscreen and long sleeves are recommended. I also wear sunglasses.

Have a wonderful Christmas, look after each other and your plants too.

Dotterel ferry refurbished at Morgan

ONE of South Australia's river ferries, nicknamed Dotterel, has completed its biggest journey, travelling more than 300km along the Murray River – nearly 10 times further than its daily run.

The mission to refurbish the ferry has now been completed at the Morgan Dockyard, with the Ferry Refurbishment Program starting up again after the Murray River floods.

For the Dotterel, which usually travels for just a few minutes and metres at a time, making about 135 crossings each day, the three-week journey to transport it from Narrung to the Morgan Dockyard, and the subsequent four-month refurbishment, was a major mission.

This important work is all part of the Ferry Refurbishment Program, an annual \$2m commitment by the State Government to maintain the vessels that ensure reliable river crossings for the communities that rely on them. This is in addition to the recent State Government announcement committing \$110m to operate the ferries over the next 10 years.

There are 12 Murray River ferry crossings across South Australia, from Lyrup in the Riverland, to Narrung at the Lower Lakes. Each ferry is traditionally named after a waterbird and plays a critical role in trans-

porting locals, visitors and emergency services, for free, 24/7, seven days a week.

To help keep them afloat and operating each ferry is required to be refurbished every seven years, including structural repairs, painting and some rewiring. Careful planning is required to relocate each ferry on a rotating basis to Morgan for refurbishment activities and ensure ferry services continue at each river crossing.

A small team of dedicated staff at the Morgan Dockyard work tirelessly to refit and refurbish each ferry.

The Morgan Dockyard is a far cry from where it was two years ago when the significant Murray River floods left the slipway and workshop underwater. The department continues to repair the site following the floods, while maintaining the ferry fleet.

After several months the refit of the Dotterel has now been completed. Workers have meticulously checked and cleaned the vessel from the deck to the hull, ensuring the vessel is in pristine shape. Now that it is refurbished, the vessel is back in operation transporting locals and visitors.

DIT marine and mechanical lead Joseph Rositano said "it is always a rewarding and proud moment for the team when you finish refurbishing a ferry".

"The planning involved in transporting and restoring a ferry while ensuring services continue at each river crossing is an important task," Mr Rositano said.

It has been quite the journey to transport the ferry from Narrung to Morgan with the vessel travelling more than 300km upstream to get to the dockyard.

The refurbishment program is fundamental to the safe operation of these vessels, with

each ferry requiring a refurb every seven years. This process involves checking the vessel from top to bottom, completing any works that need to be done such as painting, repairs and rewiring.

The Murray River flood event was a challenging time for everyone along the river and we are continuing to repair the site while maintaining our fleet.

rated more than 200 faces and there were lots of reindeer, Santas and Grinches roaming Elf Hall.




The Valley




WAB hears from Hugh

THE Paringa branch of Women in Agriculture and Business had The Murray Pioneer editor Hugh Schuitemaker as their final speaker of the year. Hugh grew up in the eastern suburbs of Adelaide, where he attended Norwood Morialta High School and recalled enjoying reading and English, and in year 10, at aged 14, when he took a journalism class. He completed high school in 2009 with the aim of studying journalism at UniSA, however he chose to spend a gap year travelling through south-east Asia before taking up his studies. The journalism degree attracts many students, however the dropout rate is very high as aspirations of being travel writers and foreign correspondents quickly disappear.

Hugh completed his three-year degree and his first employment for a few years was as a sports journalist covering local and international soccer. In 2018 he answered an advertisement for a journalist with The Murray Pioneer and after an intensive interview with former editor Paul Mitchell, he commenced work during a time of economic upheaval due to local climatic conditions. Dry conditions prevailed in 2018-19 and he learned first-hand about water allocation and the Murray-Darling system and its effect on Riverland growers and associated businesses.

This situation was followed by Covid-19, which lasted nearly two years and in 2022-23 an historic flooding event occurred, also with dire consequences for property, businesses and livelihoods. In

recent times the grape price crisis and effect of Chinese tariffs has had a huge impact on local industry.

Hugh enjoys being part of the regional media team where the impact of current events connects directly with the community. The Murray Pioneer is entrenched in the community, particularly with those not involved with online platforms. Community support is evi-

dent in social situations and especially in adversity. Working in a regional newspaper team differs to that of a metro media team, as there are opportunities to travel to other towns, witness events and attend council meetings. Each day presents new challenges whether involving health issues, agriculture/horticulture, politics or council matters.

After more than six years Hugh

admits to a personal preference for country life. He initially played local futsal, is a committee member of the local soccer club, enjoys cooking and is a member of a men's wine club.

Have your Riverland say on SA's next Youth Action Plan

THE State Government is inviting young Riverlanders, aged 15 to 25, youth-led organisations and those that support young people to provide feedback on South Australia's draft Youth Action Plan 2024-2027.

Once finalised, the plan will ensure the South Australian Government better meets the needs of young people, by delivering fairer and more equitable access to opportunities, resources and supports.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) has worked closely with young South Australians to help development of the plan across three rounds of consultations, where young people's voices were amplified, and their feedback incorporated.

The plan comprises six key themes identified by young people:

- Greater access to mental health support and services.
- Connection to services and activities available in the

young person's community.

- Increased access to age appropriate, affordable, and accessible sport and recreation activities or opportunities.
- More support with post-school pathways, including the teaching of 'life skills' or 'how to adult'.
- Greater access to housing and rental accommodation.
- Inclusion in decision making.

The draft plan includes a total of 27 key actions across the six key themes, which have been carefully crafted, tested and refined with young people.

The final Youth Action Plan 2024 – 2027 will be launched during SA Youth Week in April 2025. It will function alongside the existing programs that support and empower young people to reach their potential. Consultation is open until 17 January.

Basketball heads to its mid-season break

DOUBLE games were held in the past week for the Riverland Basketball Association, which now heads to its mid-season break.

The round saw Barmera and Renmark compete in two games each in the men's competition, splitting the respective results, despite avoiding a direct face off.

The fixtures for the week started last Monday night, where a rejuvenated Berri side took on Renmark in a top-of-the-ladder clash in round nine, earning a six-point victory.

Berri raced away to a seven-point lead at quarter time, and with that margin remaining at the half, the story of the match was set up.

Although the Steamers challenged in the third term, cutting the deficit to three at the final break, the Blazers held their nerve down the stretch to take out the win.

The return of Border Sports star Trequan Rudd-Morlaw made a clear difference in the match, as his 27 points helped Berri over the line, while Harrison Campbell continued a strong season with 19.

Renmark guard Declan Johnson was the key for his side with 22 points in a performance highlighted by six threes, as Reece Curtis also reached 15.

The other game of round nine in the division was held on Tuesday, as focus turned to Waikerie, where Barmera took full points back to the Lakeside.

Despite trailing by two points at the first break, the Lakers quickly rallied, emerging 15-point leaders at three quarter time, keeping the foot on the pedal for a 28-point victory.

Tall pair Mitch Wellington (21) and Riley Haigh (14) proved the Waikerie defence had no match for their height, while young gun Dillon Marks (12) gave the hosts headaches throughout.

Action continued the next night for Barmera as round 11 tipped off at The Precinct, where Loxton welcomed the Lakers to town.

Once again slow starters, the Supercats punished the opposition, bouncing to an 18-point lead at half time, building on the margin for the remainder to create a big gap.

Ultimately running out 24-point victors, Loxton dominated across the court, in what was a clear even spread of contributors.

Jasper Hutchinson recorded 16 points in a display that featured three triples, while Carter Wright (14), and Rogan Kennedy (13) both provided valuable contributions.

Haigh (18) and Wellington (15) once again provided valuable contributions for the Lakers, but scoring power was halted following strong Supercats defence.

Rounding off 2024's division one men's action was Renmark, which hosted Waikerie, claiming a 17-point win over the Warriors at Alan Coulter Recreation Centre.

It was full steam ahead for Renmark, rac-

ing away to an 18-point lead at half time, which would ultimately set up the margin differential.

Johnson had a scoring feast with 28, while fellow Steamer Brody Rover made life difficult for the Waikerie defence, recording 25.

Waikerie trio Kieran Hahn (15), Johnathon Twidgen (13), and Luke Exton (12) fought hard against the Steamers' tight defence, but it proved to be a mountain too tall to climb.

Division one women's action was also played over two nights, with one game of rounds nine and 10 played respectively.

The round nine fixture, held on Wednesday night, saw a dominant performance from Loxton on the road in Waikerie, racing to a 30-point victory.

Tight defence from the Supercats kept the Warriors to just one point at quarter time, and with the margin at 25 by the final change, the result was a foregone conclusion.

Star junior Bailey Hahn was key to the Loxton success, scoring 16 points, while Kiara Harman (14), and duo Mackella Hogan and Tarnie Shinnick each scored 11.

Round 10 action was held at the Barmera Recreation Centre, and it saw the home side at its very best, securing a 38-point win over Berri.

Barmera were on song from the outset, scoring 27 points in the first quarter to race out to a 14-point advantage, and with the margin out to 32 by the final break, the result was set up.

The Lakers were inspired by superstar player Chelsea Wutke's 29-point display that included five triples, while duo Tahlia Dillon and Khaleisha Barnett continued their strong run with 14 apiece.

Bella Gates fought hard for the Blazers with 19 points, and exciting prospect Mackenzie Pitt finished with nine, but the margin was too great to overcome.

Riverland basketball's division one competitions will return on Thursday 30 January, with one month of the regular season remaining before finals action.



What have we done wrong?

YOU would be hard pressed to find a footballing region in South Australia that stacks up on a similar level to the Riverland.

Yet somehow, we will be without a game of pre-season AFL football, a home-and-away AFL game, or any SANFL football in 2025.

The SANFL's fixture release last Wednesday saw the popular annual Russell Ebert Tribute Match between West Adelaide and Port Adelaide moved to Alberton Oval, and out of the Riverland.

Since its inception in 2022, the fixture has been one of the most popular events on the calendar – most recently highlighted by a crowd of 1736 at Waikerie Oval in April for this year's edition.

Looking at sporting events in the region, it's safe to say the match, in terms of pure popularity, is on par with something such as the Dinghy Derby, but with SANFL and AFL more accessible nationally, this probably shifts ever so slightly ahead.

Almost anyone you speak to will say the SANFL product is declining across a number of facets, including crowd numbers and the atmosphere games generate.

You need no further evidence than the fact Port Adelaide, one of the oldest clubs in world sport, wants to join the Victorian Football League (VFL). Just imagine hearing that 25 years ago!

As outlined by Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone in today's paper, the Riverland's footballing talent stretches far and wide.

Who the best players for the two South Australian clubs are is a debate for another day, and is probably without a clear answer, but the names Mark Ricciuto and Russell Ebert (even though Ebert played before the Power were created) are pretty obvious.

If the planets align in 2025, it is possible you could go to a match at Adelaide Oval, walk past the Russell Ebert statue on your way in, sit in the Mark Ricciuto Stand, watch Rhys Stanley or Aaron Francis play in an AFL game, and see advertisements for the Tony Modra locker room.

Do you really need to look any further to realise our history of footballing talent stacks up against most other regions in South Australia?

A \$14m upgrade is due to be unveiled at the Waikerie Football Club in 2025, and even if the game were to be played elsewhere, there are five other RFL grounds more than capable of hosting an SANFL fixture.

Also to be considered is the economic boost the Ebert Tribute match has provided to the Riverland community.

Many spectators at the 2024 pre-match function said they spent multiple days in the Riverland in the lead-up to the match, so you can only imagine the positive impact on local hospitality outlets and other retailers.

Without any state or national league football in 2025, the Riverland community has every right to be frustrated with the snub. But will anyone address those concerns?

Ebert tribute match on the move

DESPITE a successful three years of the Russell Ebert Tribute Match in the Riverland, the region will be without the fixture in 2025.

The 2025 SANFL fixture was released on Wednesday last week, and the popular match is scheduled to be played at Alberton Oval on Sunday 8 June.

The match has been a feature of the league's fixture since 2022, with the first two years held at Loxton Oval, before a shift to Waikerie in 2024.

West Adelaide Football Club CEO Ms Conny Wilson said the decision was made following consultation with the Port Adelaide Football Club.

"For three years the District Council of Loxton Waikerie, and the Waikerie and Loxton Football Clubs were critical for the Club in order to be able to play in the region," she said.

"They were instrumental in making this event possible through generous funding and resourcing.

"Having the support of the Ebert Family and Port Adelaide Football Club was also key to its success.

"WAFC (West Adelaide Football Club) felt that it was important to also involve Port Adelaide to share in the celebration of Russell's life and achievements.

"He was a part of the fabric of Port Adelaide, and it is an appropriate opportunity to acknowledge this. This does not mean we will not host games in the future.

"We are committed to our regional clubs and supporters. WAFC teams are not travelling in 2025 to play any regional games."

Outgoing RFL chairman Henry Crawford said the league failed to provide a submission to host a game in the region, as has been the case in recent seasons.

"We haven't submitted a bid in previous years, and the games which have been held here in previous years have been a relationship with West Adelaide and the councils," he said.

"Whilst we haven't submitted a request to have a game up here or

not, that's not an unusual thing for us to do.

"They're always a good spectacle, and it's good to get that exposure, but in order for it to happen, it's quite expensive, so it relies on the councils to come up with that cash."

"If any of the other RFL clubs or their councils, wanted to lobby and put forward a proposal to host a SANFL game, we'd absolutely support that in whatever way we could."

Ms Wilson ensured Riverlanders the club remains committed to its regional areas, with a high portion of its junior players coming from local RFL clubs.

"It is important to remain relevant. We are Adelaide-based and travelled for two regional games in 2024, (the other being Pt Lincoln against Norwood), and feel this is a good opportunity to reset and look at what else we can do for our Riverland clubs," she said.

"A lot of planning and co-ordination is required; and costs associated with travel need to be considered."

"The Club will be looking for funding partners going forward to ensure we can return. Both teams have very much enjoyed this particular fixture, and it is a meaningful game for everyone."

"We're really lucky to have the quality of young players coming out of the Riverland who go on to earn their place in the teams and development program."

A spokeswoman from the SANFL supported the comments made by Ms Wilson, and said the league is committed to its regional areas.

"Both Port Adelaide and West Adelaide agreed to play the Russell Ebert Tribute match at Alberton Oval in 2025, allowing fans the opportunity to honour Ebert at his home ground, and this request was approved by the League," she said.

SANFL remains committed to playing matches in the regions, with two other regional games being played in season 2025, and is therefore open to seeing this match return to the Riverland in the future, should the clubs request this."

A \$14m redevelopment of the Waikerie Football Club is due to be completed in the coming weeks, and Mr Crawford said representative football would work well at the newly redeveloped facilities.

"I think hosting a game (with the new facilities), would be great for the Waikerie community, and the league as a whole to host any games like that up here," he said.

"Obviously it's a pretty impressive facility, and would make a great venue to host any games at a high level."

"It's all very much driven by the councils, because they have to put up a significant amount of money, but it's very much up to individual clubs and their respective councils."

"The league welcomes any games, and we'd provide support in whatever way is feasible, but it very much has to be a club/council driven thing."

"It's a West Adelaide home game, so those responsible for the football side of it have assisted the opposition, and there's broadcast, and media that have their usual things in place."

"Really, the RFL have had very little to do with making the day happen."

Ms Wilson thanked the Riverland community for their support of the fixture in the region in recent seasons, and said a return is on the cards for the club in some capacity.

"I am confident our presence in the region over the last few years has continued to grow through clinics, club visits and successfully run with the help of local support staff this will continue to grow. Both our men and women's programs incorporate regular regional visits," she said.

"We love playing in front of our Riverland supporters. Many also travel from Adelaide for either the weekend, at a longer day trip – as was seen in Waikerie this year."

"We had good attendance and we would always like to grow that. We would also like to diversify and host women's league matches."

"It was very heartening to have such good crowds year on year, and especially to see them settle in for a day of football."

"We are always exploring ideas as to how we could develop not only a game in the Riverland but a great day out for both locals and visitors."

"We need partners and sponsors in order to deliver an event of that size, but cannot expect the same partners to contribute to the funding of this."

Local figures speak out about SANFL miss

DISSAPOINTMENT was the key theme of responses from a local politician and mayor, following the news of the movement of the Russell Ebert Tribute Match out of the Riverland in 2025.

The SANFL's fixture was announced on Wednesday morning, with the popular match moved to Alberton Oval, leaving the region without any state or national league football in the year ahead.

The match between West and Port, has been played across the past three seasons, with the first two fixtures at Loxton, before a move to Waikerie in 2024.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the news of the match being on the move was a big blow to the region on several lev-

els.

"Part of our economy is sport, and the people that follow the different codes, and not having a match up here is a blow to what has been a significant breeding ground to high-performing AFL players," he said.

"We have a proud, rich history of breeding those outstanding AFL players, and I'm sad we've missed the opportunity to keep a bit of that tradition alive."

"People that come up and stay are not only supporting the region, but they go away as ambassadors."

"When people come to town, they come to the region, and people come and stay and fill up all of the accommodation."

"That is the unseen economy that comes away from a visitation like having a SANFL match here, and they go home and tell

their family and friends, and they take a visit."

Mr Whetstone's view was supported by Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton, who said the matches had been a 'success' in previous years.

"The three Russell Ebert tribute matches have each been great events for Loxton and Waikerie and were very appropriate recognition of Russell and the Ebert family's commitment to our community," he said.

"The matches were also a great opportunity for our council and the region to demonstrate how much we value sport and outdoor activities and to display our grounds and facilities, that are as good as any in South Australia regional areas."

"Many visitors travelled to the games, some for the

whole weekend while others stayed on or have visited again, knowing what is available in the Riverland."

"Many of our accommodation and hospitality venues received added trade and benefitted economically from this."

Mr Whetstone said he will continue to advocate for high-level football matches in the Riverland, reaffirming the fact each of the six RFL ovals are in good condition.

"It's very disappointing that we've missed out, but if that's the case we can answer the questions why, but if there are no real good answers, maybe we just have to get ourselves better prepared for next season," he said.

"Everyone's restaurants are all pumping, and then there's fuel stations and food, and it's really

good for footy, and country footy as much as anything."

Waikerie Oval remains a clear choice for the region based on location, as well as a significant \$14m upgrade to the facilities, and Mr Norton said the redevelopment has been "significant".

The Waikerie Community Hub at the Waikerie Oval has, this week, been signed off as finished and will experience a "soft opening" in the coming weeks," he said.

"Council will be looking to highlight our newest facility and introduce it to the wider South Australian community as soon as we can."

"Hosting another SANFL football match or series of events would be a way of doing this."

INGREDIENTS


- 12 mini Oreo biscuits
- 250 g Cream Cheese
- 1/2 cup caster sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 1 tbs lemon juice
- 2 eggs
- 24 fresh strawberries
- 150 ml cream
- 2 tbs icing sugar



METHOD


1. Preheat the oven to 180°C and line a 24-cup mini muffin tin with paper cases.
2. Beat the cream cheese, sugar, vanilla, and lemon juice until smooth. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition.
3. Split each mini Oreo in half, removing the cream, and place one half in each muffin cup.
4. Spoon or pour the cream cheese mixture over the Oreo halves in each cup.
5. Bake for 20 minutes, or until slightly risen and cracked on the surface. Let them cool completely, then refrigerate.
6. Whip the cream and icing sugar together until thick and fluffy.
7. Cut the tops off strawberries to create a Santa hat shape.
8. Pipe whipped cream onto each cooled cheesecake, then top with a strawberry, gently pressing down.
9. Add a small dollop of cream to the top of each strawberry for a pom-pom.
10. Dust with icing sugar just before serving. Enjoy!
