# Albanese come, Albanese go PNS PLEDCE

"HEARTENED" by the optimism of locals, the first sitting prime minister to visit the Riverland in 17 years has hinted at further assistance for the flood-hit region.

Anthony Albanese's lightning trip – kept under wraps until just hours beforehand – super-charged Renmark's Saturday morning, with the Labor PM visiting several local sites, including levees near the town's hospital and its biggest caravan park, plus a coffee shop.

Flanked by his Labor colleague, SA Premier Peter Malinauskas, other politicians and Renmark Paringa Council representatives, Mr Albanese said his government would work with other tiers of government to "deliver support" to the local community.

"Not just in preparing for the events that are coming, but also with the recovery that will no doubt require significant investment," Mr Albanese said.

"This is a difficult time, but I've been really heartened by the optimism of this local community, and the sheer confidence it can be resilient and get through."

Before Mr Albanese, the most recent sitting PM to visit the region was Liberal Party stalwart John Howard, back in 2005.

Before departing the BIG4 Renmark Riverland Holiday Park, Mr Albanese – since diagnosed with Covid-19 – suggested he could return to the region soon.

The PM's visit continued an extraordinary sequence of floodrelated events for the Riverland. The streak continued yesterday when Mr Malinauskas announced \$1.2m in "last resort" funding for River Murray residents displaced from their homes by the flood. PAGES 2-3 FULL COVERAGE

## \$1.2m for short-term accommodation

THE state government yesterday announced \$1.2m in funding for "a suite of options for short-term accommodation" for people displaced by rising flood waters.

Speaking at his River Murray flood update yesterday afternoon, Premier Peter Malinauskas announced the funding as a "last resort" option.

"This \$1.2m will go to the booking of a range of short-term accommodation options, up to 500

beds, in communities and locations that are as close as possible to those peoples' homes," he said.



"The simple fact

is we've got a very tight housing situation here in South Australia at the moment for anyone who has been trying to rent a home – both in metropolitan Adelaide and regional South Australia – there just simply isn't that many vacancies.

"The last thing we want to do is be providing cash but people just physically not being able to have a place to sleep, particularly on the short-term side of the equation."

Accommodation will be secured in a range of towns throughout the Riverland and Mid-Murray areas.

#### Driver drunk with baby

A RIVERLANDER has lost his licence and will appear in court after he was caught driving while nearly four times over the legal alcohol limit with a baby in his car.

A silver Holden Commodore sedan was stopped by police on the Sturt Highway, at Kingston-On-Murray, around 5.25am yesterday.

When breath tested, the 25-year-old male drive from Cambrai, who also had a three-month-old child in the vehicle, returned a positive result of 0.188.

The man was arrested, received a 12-month instant loss of licence, and was charged with driving with a prescribed concentration of alcohol while a child under 16 was present, misuse of a motor vehicle and driving with an expired licence.

It is understood the man was granted bail and will appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

GAYLE Gudgeon knew she was speaking for the entire Riverland when given the "extraordinary" opportunity to meet Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and address the media.

Co-manager of the Big4 Renmark Riverfront Holiday Park, with her husband Craig, Mrs Gudgeon was made aware on Friday that the PM and Premier Peter Malinauskas – plus their respective entourages – could be paying a visit the next day.

"The tourism industry's been hit really hard in the Riverland and the whole of South Australia," she said.

"We were just recovering from Covid obviously and having a really good year."

The giant levee separating the park from the raging River Murray was an ideal location for Mr Albanese to get a handle on the challenges facing the Riverland.

"It was very humbling and a great privilege to have them both here," Mrs Gudgeon said.

Mrs Gudgeon also said when Riverland tourism operators suffer the entire region suffers via the trickle-down effect. She said she remained grateful to guests who had decided against cancelling their bookings.

"We're open and honest," she said.

"We've told them there's no access to the river, and we wouldn't recommend they go on the river anyway, but we've got lots to entertain them..."

### Albo breaks our drought of PM visits

LABOR'S Anthony Albanese on Saturday became the first sitting prime minister to visit the Riverland in over

THE plight of local irrigators – plus the wider Riverland – was conveyed to Anthony Albanese via an impromptu chat during the Prime Minister's trip to the region last Saturday morning. Shortly after arriving at his



Park, Mr Albanese – accompanied by SA Premier and "good friend" Peter Malinauskas – climbed up to inspect the giant levee, recently installed at the park to protect it from the rising River Murray.

He spotted Platinum Ag Services manager and tourism operator Stephen Flaherty, and local irrigator and businessman Ben Taylor, who were enjoying a boat ride, and a four-way conversation between the two Labor leaders and the local duo ensued.

During the chat, the Riverland pair stressed the importance of irrigators being able to maintain power to their pumps, plus the need to prevent the region being decimated by the floodwaters, as has happened interstate.

Mr Albanese listened intently throughout the conversation, with Mr Malinauskas taking the driver's seat, supported by his prior knowledge of the local scene.

# Ibo fever floods into Renmark

WORK to upgrade Renmark's levee system before peak flows arrive earned prime ministerialacclaim as the town was once again visited by senior politicians, however the SA premier also revealed a disparity in River Murray height measurements.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese on Saturday examined upgrades to the Renmark Hospital levee bank, and the new levee built at the BIG4 Renmark Riverfront Holiday Park, during a lightning visit to the town with Premier Peter Malinauskas, Minister for Emergency Services Joe Szakacs and police commissioner Grant Stevens.

Mr Albanese praised work undertaken by Renmark Paringa Council and local contractors to build and upgrade existing levee banks.

"We have been... talking to business operators and local community members about the challenges this community is facing," Mr Albanese said.

'We've seen the preparedness that is being put in place for that (peak) event. What we're also seeing is the resilience of the local community.

"I want to pay tribute to all those who have made an astonishing effort to prepare this community for the coming days, weeks and months.'

Mr Malinauskas said manipulation of the river system since 1974 had resulted in a disparity between flow rates and the river's expected height.

"The flow modelling is proving to be accurate, but we have to continue to monitor how that operates relative to the height of the river," Mr Malinauskas said.



"Since (1974) there's been an extraordinary amount of work that's been undertaken up and down the river, including on private land holdings, which is informing the way the flow of the river operates, and what happens to the height of the river."

Mr Albanese expected further economic assistance would be required for the region.

"We'll continue to work with the South Australian government, and also with local government, to deliver support for these communities," he said.

"Not just in preparing for the events that are coming, but also with the recovery that will no doubt require significant investment.

"This is a difficult time, but I've been really heartened by the optimism of this local community, and the sheer confidence it can be resilient and get through."

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said it was crucial the Prime Minister and Premier witnessed the flood event's ongoing impacts.

We were able to take them to see the construction of our levee banks in two locations," Mr Hunter said.

"Both of our senior leaders showed genuine concern for our communities and offered to keep channels open to further explore opportunities for ongoing support.

"While no new announcements for funding were made, they have already created funding options, which are in place at the moment."

Mr Malinauskas said ensuring Riverland communities were prepared for upcoming peak flow events, with the first expected to reach Renmark next Wednesday, was a priority.

"The whole community around Renmark has done a lot of work to try and mitigate the risk where we can," he said.

"There is an inevitability, unfortunately, of approximately 3500 to 4000 properties being inundated as we see those peaks emerge throughout the course of this month.

"To that end, it is more about preparation from individuals themselves to address that."

# **Relocated:** Residents on the move

THE relocation of a quarter of all aged care residents at the Renmark Paringa Hospital began yesterday after river heights near the facility triggered the first phase of SA Health's predetermined contingency plan.

Yesterday, eight of the 21 residents who are "not independently mobile" were relocated to other Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) residential aged care facilities, including in Barmera, Loxton and Waikerie, with a further 11 relocations today and two later this week.

RMCLHN CEO Wayne Champion said all 21 families were contacted on Sunday morning.

"The height of the river has reached the level which SA Health pre-determined would require planned gradual relocation of the most vulnerable residents," Mr Champion said.

"They can't self-rescue in the very unlikely scenario of something happening with the levee in the middle of the night, so for their safety we are relocating them in a calm, orderly manner.

'We have a very high level of confidence in the levee that's been reconstructed to protect most of the assets in the town of Renmark, the hospital levee that has been built to the 1956 flood level with a level of freeboard above that.

"We have no doubt that the levee will hold, however I'm not going to gamble people's lives if they're not able to self-mobilise."

Mr Champion said a second phase of the relocation was likely to happen "relatively soon" but was dependant on river heights in relation to the floor level of the lowest part of the facility, with a relocation of all residents "very unlikely".

"Whether or not we conduct phase two will come down to the forecasted river flow levels later on this week or early next week .... " he said.

"When we conduct phase two, the remaining residents

will be moved up into higher parts of the facility.

"With phase three we are talking about residents who are mobile and can help themselves and self-rescue in the case there happens to be a couple of inches of water on the floor, but obviously we don't want to expose anyone to that."

With the residents involved in the first phase of the relocation, Mr Champion said the process could be "challenging depending on he cognitive capacity of the residents".

"Where a resident is unable to make a decision on their own behalf, family



members and their alternate decision makers have been involved," he said.

"The families and residents that are able to make their own decisions are quite thankful for the level of communication they've received and that their safety and wellbeing is being put first and foremost and that we're conducting the transfer in a safe, orderly manner.'

Crescent resident Kris Weir, whose 95-year-old

mother Pat Menzel was being relocated to Loxton, said the decision to relocate residents was reassuring.

"She's fortunate her sister lives over there (in Loxton) so she'll be seeing her a lot more often than us," she said.

"We're just going to follow her over there and make sure she's put in a good spot and that it's not too traumatic for her."

Non-urgent patient admissions to the hospital have

been suspended to allow staff to assist with relocations, while some staff have volunteered to travel to other facilities to care for the relocated residents.

"They'll all be cared for by people who are familiar to them as well as the staff at the sites they are going to," Mr Champion said.

"That means the staff have continuity of employment and the staff at the receiving hospitals hopefully won't be overwhelmed."

The hospital residential aged care facility normally homes 81 residents.

A LOCAL MP says all users of a major road linking two Riverland towns - recently closed due to flooding - should be entitled to economic support.

A sizeable stretch of Bookpurnong Road was officially closed to all traffic last Thursday as Murray River flows into South Australia rose above 150GL/day.

Motorists seeking to travel between Berri and Loxton are now required to use the existing detour via Stanitzki Road to the Sturt Highway, through Paringa and Renmark and onto the Old Sturt Highway, Berri. The detour turns the 44km round trip into a 140km trek.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, speaking to The Murray Pioneer yesterday, suggested Bookpurnong Road should be reopened "as soon as possible", once Murray River flows decreased to approximately 130GL/day.

Mr Whetstone also said the SA government's financial support payments exclusively for teachers impacted by the closure should be extended to all Riverlanders who would normally use the road for work-related travel.










### **Diary of a** remarkable day

REGARDLESS of your political persuasion, having the Australian prime minister visit the Riverland during its biggest flood event since 1956 is a momentous occasion.

Those looking for new federal funding announcements were left disappointed, but at the very least Anthony Albanese himself is more aware of the plight of SA's River Murray communities, and by extension so is the rest of the nation.

The visit came about at short notice, following whispers earlier in the week that SA Premier Peter Malinauskas might be making another trip to the Riverland, but on Friday.

Instead, it all happened on Saturday morning, with the PM arriving in town and enjoying a beverage – and a few happy snaps – at Arrosto Coffee in Renmark, before being driven to the impressive levee behind the Renmark hospital, with Mr Malinauskas, Police Commissioner Grant Stevens, and SA Emergency Services Minister Joe Szakacs in tow.

As expected, Renmark Paringa Council representatives were thick on the ground, including newly elected mayor, Peter Hunter, while a sizeable media contingent was joined by those accompanying the PM and the Premier.

Although footage and photographs were being taken, the levee stopover was relatively brief, after the PM's chief minder advised the "presser" (press conference) would be at the Big4 Renmark Riverfront Holiday Park, also home to an imposing new levee.

Enduring the Riverland's hottest day for months felt somewhat incongruous and unrepresentative of the wet winter and spring we have experienced, helping to further swell the river.

With time apparently a premium, the party swiftly moved to the park, where the real show started. Before the media conference, Mr Albanese and Mr Malinauskas took a stroll, eventually striking up a conversation with two wellknown locals who had stopped at the levee, just metres from the gathering, in their boat.

The plight of local irrigators, particularly those facing the dire prospect of having power disconnected from their pumps, was put to the PM and the Premier in clear and easy-to-understand terms

Mr Albanese listened intently, leaving Mr Malinauskas to be the more active participant in the conversation, displaying his expert communication skills and effortless ability to be - or at least seem – across the issue and thoroughly engaged.

After that, the media conference began, TV network-branded microphones and recording iPhones at the ready, and by now a few curious park guests edging closer to the gathering.

Neither Mr Albanese nor Mr Malinauskas said anything remarkable during their respective addresses, likewise the other speakers, although park manager Gayle Gudgeon deserves a mention for her remarkably calm and natural interview.


The Q&A session was similarly uneventful, with the resolute, slightly domineering Channel 7 reporter quickly steering the conversation away from local issues to national issues, including the PM's favourite topic, climate change, and Brittany Higgins.

When he'd had enough, in familiar style Mr Albanese abruptly ended the media conference, taking a couple of steps away until he was asked for a comment on the Socceroos, due to take on Argentina less than 24 hours later.

The lightbulb over the PM's head was almost visible. He spun in a manner that would have made Argentinean star Lionel Messi – who he referenced – proud, returned to the microphones and milked some warm fuzzies from the Aussie team's surprisingly good World Cup showing.

Then it was job done, save for some photo opportunities in the park, including a Laborvoting couple whose first child was born on the very night 'Albo' ascended to the nation's top job.

The Prime Minister had suitably charmed and impressed most of those present, with his subsequent Covid-19 diagnosis merely adding another 'remember when' detail to a memorable day in the Riverland's history.



THE YEARS GO BY

The Hume Pipe Company's factory at Loveday, early-1920s: Samuel McIntosh, government engineer, SA Irrigation Department, and others established the Loveday irrigation settlement post-World War I. The Hume brothers of Keswick, SA, began making concrete pipes at Loveday for an irrigation system to supersede the existing open-channel system. Later claimed the 'largest pipe works in the world', the settlement comprised some 2000 men including over 400 factory employees who fielded Loveday's own football, cricket, and tennis teams. The factory supplied an array of pipe sizes for new fruit blocks across 4000ha of the local World War I Soldier Settlement Scheme. The blocks were flood irrigated with 'Loveday outlets' that regulated the amount of water for each crop row. Production of the pipes did not reach full capacity until - in 1921 - the Irrigation Department completed a tramline from Cobdogla to deliver materials for the factory. (The Cobdogla Irrigation Museum has restored the former tramline's steam engine, now a tourist attraction.) But from 1923, production had declined and by late-1925 little remained of the Loveday township. The Hon T. Pascoe, Minister for Irrigation, had said "if concrete pipe channels proved a success at Loveday, the system would revolutionise irrigation." In its own way, it did. **Climate crew sorely** lacking in science



#### **Foodbank Berri** capacity boosted

RECENTLY I had the pleasure of visiting the Foodbank facility in Berri and seeing the RAA Foodbank Mobile Food Hub.

For readers who may not know, Foodbank is Australia's largest food-relief organisation, providing food relief to more than a million people each month.

In the Riverland, Foodbank operates from its food distribution warehouse in Berri, providing free and discounted food to families and individuals across the Riverland via the RAA Foodbank Mobile Food Hub.

The custom-built truck is fitted out with shelving, fridges and storage spaces, and carries 2 tonnes of stock, making weekly trips to Barmera, Loxton, Renmark, Berri and Waikerie.

The federal government recently partnered with the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) to provide more than \$800,000 in funding through the first round of the Strengthening Rural Communities - Rebuilding Regional Communities (RRC) program.

Pleasingly, this program has delivered \$10,000 to boost the capacity of Foodbank SA Riverland to meet demand for food assistance, through the installation of a covered annexe at the Berri distribution warehouse.

With the rising cost of living being the most common reason why people across Australia are struggling to put food on the table, it's more important than ever to support organisations like Foodbank SA that do such an amazing job in supporting those in need.

A huge thank you to Peter and his team for showing me around and for all the amazing work they do for the Riverland.

### **SA Power: Disconnections** unavoidable for Riverland

SA Power Networks says electricity disconnections without notice are unavoidable, but remain a last resort.

Responding to criticism over sudden disconnections at flood-impacted sites across the Riverland, SA Power Networks head of corporate affairs Paul Roberts said the nil-warning practice is likely to become more common as the River Murray keeps rising.

"It is worth noting these are emergency disconnections being undertaken in a fast-evolving flood situation (and) safety remains our first priority," he said.

"We will endeavour to give as much warning as possible but that will get harder as the water rises and we have to locate the nearest safe point in the network to disconnect power supply to areas that are flooded or will be flooded within days.

"In an emergency power disconnection situation we actually are not required to give notice, though that is strongly not our preference or intent in our flood response."

Mr Roberts said SA Power Networks had engaged additional field crews and network asset inspectors across the region, but warned their task would become "increasingly challenging", making individual servicing more difficult.

"Our ability to complete case-by-case investigations when it comes to switching off customers is declining with time and the rapid rise of floodwaters, closure of roads etc.," he said.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone has been a vocal critic of SA Power Networks in recent weeks and said this week he was receiving "more and more texts from people getting their



power cut off unannounced".

"People are angry," said Mr Whetstone, expressing concern for both households and irrigators.

However, Mr Roberts cited a variety of reasons for people being disconnected without notice.

"When we notify some business customers we are notifying their head office as the contact point provided for SMS, but have found messages not always passed on," he said.

"When we get to (the) site not every home or property is occupied, nor are we always able to identify who a specific pump or other equipment is operated by.

"When we get to some locations we find water inundation beyond the SA government modelling expectations and have to disconnect further up the electricity network, which means multiple customers are affected and potentially some without notice."

Mr Roberts also said not everyone potentially impacted had registered for SA Power Network's SMS service, Power@MyPlace. People can do so via 13 12 61 or at the service's website (https://pamp.apps.sapowernetworks. com.au/).

He said the service is providing up to seven days' notice of the potential for disconnection and reaches about 80 per cent of SA Power Networks customers.

### Lake Bonney blocked for six to eight weeks... 'Unknown' downstream impacts

THE levee blocking the Lake Bonney inlet is expected to remain in place for six to eight weeks, with the potential downstream impacts and additional inundations caused by the closure yet to be determined.

An earthen levee next to Nappers Bridge closed off the inlet last Friday, as part of a levee network running for 7km to the west of the lake protecting "significant infrastructure" in Barmera.

Berri Barmera Council CEO Dylan Strong said infrastructure deemed at risk of inundation had the inlet remained open included the Barmera stormwater network and the wastewater network supporting Barmera, Cobdogla and Loveday.

"Community recreational facilities/parks and reserves and low-lying residential areas close to the foreshore are also protected from potential inundation by the Lake Bonney Levee network," he said.

"The community wastewater network runs adjacent the Lake Bonney foreshore and consists of sub-surface mainline, sumps and pumping stations and connects to the wastewater lagoons between Barmera and Monash.'

Mr Strong said the reopening of the inlet was dependent on a number of factors

including flood risks returning to a "manageable level", confirmation of no environmental risk to the removal, and when council can mobilise contractors to decommission the levee system.

"The State Emergency Service (SA SES) anticipates that the inlet closure will remain in place for six to eight weeks from the date of closure, conditions permitting," he said.

"Council is committed to liaising with SA SES, DEW (Department for Environment and Water) and other agencies throughout the flood event to determine a suitable and practical reopening timeline.

"It is the position of all agencies that the inlet should be opened at the earliest and safest opportunity.

"Lake Bonney remains open to all users, and is protected from the river flows by the temporary levee system at Nappers Bridge.

"Community and visitors can continue to enjoy the recreational activities that Lake Bonney offers."

Mr Strong said it was "difficult to determine any additional inundation" that may occur as a result of the closure, as the impact on flows downstream was "unknown".

"The Department for Environment and Water will continue to monitor the situation, and the community is encouraged to continue to check the department's websites for updates," he said.

"I encourage the community to continue to check the SES website for up to date modelling and inundation information."

COMMUNICATION to Riverland residents about power disconnections and possible forced evacuations - due to the flood has been "a train wreck", Tim Whetstone says.

The Chaffey MP has already been critical of SA Power Networks' handling of power disconnections, and has now voiced concerns about recent messaging from the SA SES (State Emergency Service), accusing both of "heightening anxiety".

The SES has been contacting people in what it describes as "likely inundation" areas of the Riverland via physical visits, text messages and phone calls, advising they risk "isolation from rising floodwaters".

Mr Whetstone says in some cases the warnings have been unnecessarily alarmist.

"People are receiving text messages when there should be no need for messages," he said.

"I'm getting people from Jane Eliza (in Renmark) getting told they might have to evacuate. Jane Eliza is '56 compliant – it's crazy.

"We want people to be safe, we want them to be informed, but we don't think it's necessary to scare people.

"We just want factual information, rather than 'one size fits all'."

The Murray Pioneer has received anecdotal reports of elderly residents being upset by the SA SES messaging, however, the service says the warnings are appropriately targeted.

"The criteria includes properties that may become isolated either by road closures to amenities or loss of power for example," said SA SES state duty director Kane Murray.

"It is a targeted approach led by planning and intelligence. "The flood event is dynamic in nature and therefore the situation may change, but at this stage the approach will not be changing.'

Mr Whetstone said his Berri office had been inundated with calls from locals, concerned about messaging from SA Power Networks and the SA SES, and dissatisfied with responses to questions.

"We've sort of given up on deferring inquiries to a government department, because people are not getting answers..." he said.

"So we're doing everything we can to answer the question, and give people some level of satisfaction that they know more after speaking to the office than they did before they spoke to the office."

One local, a part-time carer, was

critical of a message sent from the SA SES to a "normally levelheaded" 91-year-old.

"To broadcast this information to people who are in no way threatened by the flood is totally irresponsible and causes unnecessary worry and stress," they said.

On Saturday in the Riverland SA Premier Peter Malinauskas said he had been "putting the blowtorch" on SA Power Networks over electricity disconnections.

### SES messaging at-risk Riverland households

RIVERLANDERS in lowlying, "likely inundation" areas last week began receiving automatic phone messaging about flooding, including potential power disconnections and road closures.

Last Wednesday morning the SA State Emergency Service messaged more than 12,500 registered residents and/or businesses in seven separate geographical areas across River Murray communities.

The areas have been identified as being at risk of flooding, however those living on the outskirts of the mapped inundation areas have also been notified as they may be affected by secondary

impacts including road closures or the loss of utilities.

Text messages were sent to mobile phones while a pre-recorded message was sent to fixed phonelines. If fixed phonelines were unanswered, the automated system has been calling back up to three times within three minutes.

"Previously this messaging has been successful in informing communities regarding the impacts of bushfires and flooding in South Australia," said Derren Halleday, SA SES chief of staff.

"People in the specified geographical areas are advised of some of the risks and impacts associated with the rising floodwaters, such as potential isolation and disconnected power supplies as well as the River Murray Hotline phone number of 1800 362 361.

"The messaging works concurrently with the doorknocking of communities currently under way and will also reach those people who may have already left the area."

### Levees and safety focus of flood meeting

UPDATES regarding levee bank upgrades and safety warnings were the focus of a second flood information meeting in Renmark last week.

Approximately 300 locals attended the latest Renmark River Murray Flood Community Meeting, held at the Renmark Greek Church Hall.

Renmark Paringa chief executive officer



Tony Siviour - who spoke at the meeting - said large DefenCell sandbags would be used to construct a temporary levee on the Renmark riverfront.

"The levels there vary a bit, but the DefenCell bags are 1.5m wide by 600mm high," Mr Siviour said.

"If we run it from the Visitor Information Centre to the Westpac (building), that would give us enough coverage."

Mr Siviour expected all upgrades to Renmark's levee network would be completed before the first predicted flood peak on December 14.

"We've engineered that (levee system) to cater for flows of 250GL/day, plus we've also allowed for a buffer of 200mm," he said. "We're being conservative with what

we're doing with our levees, and have gone higher than (current predictions). "There's 22 segments that make up the

levee system, and we've got three left to complete..

"We will finish them before the first peak flows come."

Mr Siviour urged the community to prioritise safety when near the levee system, particularly the flooded area of Twentyfirst Street.

"Please don't drive on the levees," he said. "They are being compacted by a 10-tonne

roller, that is specifically there to compact them. Driving on the levee will not help and if anything, it's going to create wheel ruts.

"Please do not play in floodwaters, particularly around Twentyfirst Street (because) it's very fastflowing through there."

### **Pasin calls for** more support as flood event 'harm' looms

A COMMITMENT of further resources for Riverland communities during the current flood event was missing from the Prime Minister's visit to the region, according to a senior local federal MP.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese on Saturday toured the Renmark Hospital levee bank, and the BIG4 Renmark Riverfront Holiday Park, with Premier Peter Malinauskas, SA Minister for Emergency Services Joe Szakacs, Police Commissioner Grant Stevens, and Renmark Paringa Council representatives.

Mr Malinauskas had last month announced a \$51.6m financial support package for River Murray communities. However, Barker MP Tony Pasin said

further assistance would be required for homeowners and businesses impacted by upcoming peak flow events.

"(The visit was) an important acknowledgement by the Prime Minister that we could suffer significant harm," Mr Pasin said.

"Fly-in visits are great, but want I want to see is real support and real resources for the local community.

"There was no commitment for further funding... and that's a real concern to me. "I've written to the Premier identifying

issues that need urgent attention.' Mr Pasin last week wrote to Mr

Malinauskas outlining a number of concerns surrounding the current flood event, including alternative accommodation for displaced locals and what he believes has been a lack of communication regarding power connections.

# **Owners confident as historic pub faces familiar flood foe**

OWNERS of the Riverland's oldest pub are urging visitors to support struggling local operators as the region's tourism industry battles negative perceptions of flooding.

Part-owner of the heritagelisted Overland Corner Hotel, Brad Flowers, said the pub had seen a "significant downturn" in patronage in the past few weeks as visitors' concerns over the flooding situation have grown.

"We hadn't really seen any change in patronage until probably about two weeks ago when Adelaide media outlets started sending all the doom and gloom reports," he said.

"Whenever you checked the news there were stories that basically we were all drowning." However, Mr Flowers said the hotel was still encouraging people to visit and see the "once-ina-lifetime" flood event. "We want everyone to be safe,

but in saying that it's a beautiful time to be up here so we're trying to encourage everyone to come up to the Riverland and look at what's going on," he said.

"We've had a lot of phone calls, a lot of emails, a lot of text messages from people in Adelaide, the Adelaide Hills and beyond showing their support.

"People have been coming up from Adelaide just to show their support and have a look.

"The region in general is extremely safe and people have been driving around looking at all the points of interest and visiting tourism operators... "This is our busiest time of

the year usually, so there's a lot flo the of people doing it tough at the pul

moment – houseboat operators, accommodation and so on.

"So we're all trying to band together and push the positive message out there."

To help keep the 163-year-old pub safe, Mr Flowers said works had been undertaken to maintain the 1974 levee bank protecting the hotel's courtyard, with levee banks also built at the nearby historic quarry and across the now-closed section of Old Coach Road.

With the hotel having survived many major floods including 1931, 1974 and 1956 – when flooding almost reached the pub's roof – Mr Flowers said he was confident preparatory works would keep the business safe under current flow projections.

"Over the course of the next few weeks we'll do as much maintenance as we can on the current levee banks," he said.

"We're blocking the stormwater drains and preparing ourselves as best we can.

"We're not concerned for the building – she's a lot tougher than I am.

"This hotel is synonymous with flood, so seeing it over the levee bank out in the back courtyard is pretty amazing and it's now about promoting to people to come and have a look.

"This region balances on tourism, and the river is the lifeblood of the whole region, so getting everyone to work together and stick together is really important."

# Waikerie's shock after suspected drowning

THE Waikerie community is in mourning following the suspected drowning of a nine-year-old boy at the town's pool on Saturday.

Police said afternoon patrols and paramedics were called to the Waikerie Swimming Centre after the boy was pulled from the pool unconscious.

A police spokesperson said paramedics worked desperately to revive the boy before rushing him under CPR to Waikerie Hospital where he sadly died.

They said police were preparing a report for the state coroner and there were no suspicious circumstances.

SafeWork SA said on Monday it was still investigating the incident after being notified of a death by the pool's operator at about 5.15pm on Saturday.

A spokesperson said a verbal non-disturbance notice (NDN) was issued by SafeWork SA on Saturday evening to ensure the site was preserved.

A SafeWork SA inspector and an investigator attended the site on Sunday morning to make inquiries and conduct an interview.

The spokesperson said on Monday the NDN had been lifted and inquiries were still continuing.

Loxton Waikerie council in a statement on Facebook on Sunday extended its "deepest condolences to the parents and family that lost their loved one".

### **Council working to reduce risk of** stormwater flooding at Waikerie

#### **CHRISTINE WEBSTER**

STORMWATER detention dams are being built to alleviate the risk of heavy rain flooding Waikerie during the high river event.

Loxton Waikerie Council CEO David Beaton told a recent Murray River Flow community forum in Waikerie "stormwater was the biggest issue" for the town.

"Because the stormwater rushes down and the pipes go into the river, the big pipes that we have got will not be able to displace the water well enough," he said.

"So the slope and the

hydraulic pressure has the potential to affect all the pipes up through the town and potentially blow some of them out."

Loxton Waikerie council director of infrastructure services Greg Perry told The Murray Pioneer constructing the dams would reduce the risk of the town flooding during "big rain events" once the high river covers the end of the pipes.

He said a smaller detention dam was being built adjacent to Ramco Rd near the lifestyle village and a larger one near the Waikerie Fauna Park on the corner of Edgar Bartlett Drive and Ramco Road.

"They are detention dams to take some edge off the storm water as it comes down," Mr Beaton told the meeting.

"They won't have a great capacity, but what they will do is give more time and move the water away and protect the town infrastructure."

The council's flood defence strategy for the district is based on the scenario of 250GL a day.

# **Drinking water** supply warning

DRINKING water supplies and sewage services could be temporarily interrupted in some low-lying Riverland areas due to the current flood event.

SA Water has identified and prioritised its operational locations that could be impacted by the high flows, and is preparing these sites for the expected peak – around December 15 - but has warned its customers to be prepared.

"The main challenge we have is the potential for inundation of our treatment infrastructure in low-lying areas adjacent the river, as

well as what this means for the connecting networks," said SA Water's general manager customer and commercial, Danny Moore.

"This could lead to temporary drinking water supply interruptions, if our ability to deliver or safely treat the water is limited, or a temporary disruption to your sewer service, if we need to isolate impacted sections of the pipe network to help reduce sewer overflows caused by floodwater infiltration.

"Some of the things we are doing to mitigate this include raising the height of protective embankments, deploying back-up pumps and generators, and storing extra materials and equipment, in case site access and transport routes are cut.

"One of the things you can do now to help manage through the start of a potential water supply interruption, is store water in large containers or similar, aiming for around 20 litres of water per person in your household."

### SA Water's contact call-out to Riverlanders

RIVERLANDERS are being asked to register their mobile phone numbers with SA Water to ensure the utility can provide important information about any flood impacts on residents' water and wastewater infrastructure.

While the safety and reliability of local water or wastewater services provided by SA Water currently remains intact, preparations are under way to help maintain this status, where possible.

However, SA Water's Danny Moore said this may change as high flows reach peak levels over coming weeks.

"If our ability to maintain your normal water or wastewater services changes, we want to let you know what's happening, what we're doing to manage it and what we might need you to do to help," Mr Moore said.

"We will use a range of communication channels to share this information with the community, but for updates specific to your area, direct contact, such as via SMS, will be the most helpful."

# Ex-local cop avoids jail after appeal

AN ex-Riverland police officer has avoided a jail sentence for a drug-related offence after his appeal was found successful.

Former Renmark police officer Daniel John Schatto, 46, last week had an appeal against a three-and-a-half-year prison sentence upheld in the Court of Appeal.

Mr Schatto had previously been found guilty of trafficking a controlled drug, after providing ex-wife Natasha Marie Schatto, 40, money to purchase methamphetamine in April 2020.

Ms Schatto was then stopped by police during a trip back from Adelaide and was found to be in possession of approximately 3.4g of methamphetamine.

The Advertiser reported the Court of Appeal, consisting of President Mark Livesey and Justices Sam Doyle and Sophie David, concluded hardship to Mr Schatto's children, and the fact his offending was limited to a short period of time, were reasons to suspend the sentence.

Mr Schatto, who was initially given a non-parole period of 22 months, was released from custody with a suspended sentence.

A STRONG, community feeling greeted the SA Minister for Education when he visited Riverland towns and school students with Adelaide Crows players last Thursday.

The visit – an initiative of The Advertiser Foundation – brought players Jordan Dawson, Jordon Butts, Will Hamill, Harry Schoenberg and Lachlan Sholl to Renmark High School (RHS) and Waikerie High School for a kick and catch session, and opportunities for autographs and photos.

Students from Renmark Primary School, St Joseph's School Renmark and St Francis of Assisi also joined RHS for the session on Thursday morning. Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer joined the kick and catch session with students, taking on a pack tackle from half a dozen students at RHS and losing.

Mr Boyer said it was "fantastic" to see people still positive and enjoying the Crows' visit amid the flooding event.

"It's great to see the Crows players here because I think kids and our young people – school students – feel that anxiety more," he said.

"We need to keep that at the front of our minds around how they're feeling about the rising flood waters... they have parents, grandparents and friends who are stressed, so

that plays out at school sometimes.

"It doesn't matter where they go to school, we're all here to support them and they're here to support each other.

"I thought that was a great moment here at Renmark High with everyone out on the school oval, boys and girls, kicking the ball with the Crows stars and no one cared where they went to school. They were Riverland kids and they were looking out for each other."

During a visit to the Riverland last month, Mr Boyer visited St Francis of Assisi and inspected the levee bank just down the road on Twentyfirst Street.

"I've had a number of chats with Nathan Hayes, the principal at St Francis of Assisi, and they're still positive about the school being okay," Mr Boyer said.

"In some respects, you think a natural event like this, that's slower moving, gives you time to prepare, but it also takes a real toll on people's mental health because it's there and pushing down on them for the foreseeable future. It's not a quick event."

In a bid to help ease the impact on public school staff affected by road and ferry closures due to flood waters, Mr Boyer said a one-off payment of \$300 will be available.

Eligible staff will be advised through their respective schools on how to apply for the payment.

"When you're paying up near \$2 a litre for fuel in the country that has a big impact on people," Mr Boyer said.

"We have that ready to go quickly so that those staff who are affected can get some financial support.

"I'm here to let all the students and staff at all schools know that if they need anything, I want them to contact me directly as soon as they can. We'll come up as often as we have to."

ENSURING Riverlanders remain safe, and avoiding unnecessary power disconnections, are the goals of a new flood event policy.

The state government last week announced a 50m exclusion zone would be put into effect around powerlines standing in floodwaters.

Minister for Energy, and Minister for Infrastructure, Tom Koutsantonis, said the measure would "help minimise the potential for disconnection of power" to Riverland communities.

"To help maintain electricity supply to the Riverland region, the majority of power lines will remain live," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"This needs to be supported by an exclusion zone to reduce any potential risk to the community.

"The exclusion zone will allow the continued safe operations of powerlines in flood plains.

"This will then assist irrigators and communities outside the reach of flooding, who rely on power supplied by powerlines now standing in plains affected by flood waters.'

Mr Koutsantonis said "keeping people clear of electricity infrastructure (was) the safest course of action" during the current flood event.

"The government is relying on the community to observe these

### SA Power backs government's safety measure

SA Power Networks says the state government's announcement of a 50-metre exclusion zone around electricity powerlines standing in River Murray floodwaters will keep people safe and reduce the potential for power disconnections across the Riverland.

"Flood modelling shows that at the 160GL flood level around 3000 stobie poles will be standing in water and a further 1000 will be inundated if levels reach

NEW 80km/h speed limits have been implemented approaching two "substantially completed" Riverland roundabouts on the Sturt Highway, with minor finishing works to be finalised early this month.

The project included the installation of single-lane roundabouts at the two Sturt Highway-Old Sturt Highway junctions, located east of Barmera and north of Berri, plus asphalt resurfacing, new line marking, upgraded LED lighting and improved drainage.

With major works mostly complete, an SA Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) spokesperson confirmed speed limits at the approaches to both junctions would be posted at 80km/h.

"Permanent new posted speed limit signage is expected to be installed... as part of the minor finishing works for the project," they said. "Temporary 80km/h posted speed limit signage has been reinstated at both locations until the permanent signage is installed. "Temporary speed and lane restrictions may be required when the remaining minor finishing works, including line marking and other signage amendments, are undertaken.

"These works are expected to be completed in early December 2022."

The junction upgrades formed part of an \$87.5m commitment by the federal and state governments, funded 80-20, to upgrade the Sturt Highway between Renmark and Gawler, as part of the Roads of Strategic Importance Initiative.

### Levee approval reforms 'save precious time'

"URGENT" changes have been made to state government planning legislation in an effort to ensure Riverland homes and businesses are better prepared for the current flood event.

The state government last week announced reforms allowing local councils to construct flood levees without planning approval.

Minister for Planning Nick Champion said "saving precious time and enabling the structures to be put in place as quickly as possible" was a priority. "There's a real risk that without this change, a significant number of homes and businesses will be inun-

dated," Mr Champion said. "We want to remove any barriers councils may face in protecting their communities from the emergency flood threat – which is why

we've acted so quickly. "Our government stands ready to provide urgent and flexible support to those impacted and responding to their evolving needs." Previously councils needed to lodge a formal development application before works on a levee could commence, however Mr Champion said "community feedback made it clear an immediate response was needed to minimise the impacts of rising floodwa-

ters". Following the flood event councils will be required to remove the levees and reinstate the land, or seek approval for any levees to become permanent.







### Remembering days of some comic relief

THE entire length of Quarte Street is unusually empty as I lethargically pedal my way to school one morning.

It's not a dislike of school, it's just that today's energy is low, plus I'm late again, explaining why I have the road to myself.

I've ridden this route hundreds of times and know it intimately, so for a while, something unusual up-ahead, a motionless object on the roadside, has caught my eye.

Closer now, I see it's a package wrapped in heavy brown paper. Laying my bike down, I pull back some of the paper and am utterly flabbergasted.

All second-hand but fully intact, there must be at least 30 comics inside. Briefly, before I squeeze the package into my school bag, I note that all the good ones – Superman, Batman, Phantom, Richie Rich and Archie – are there.

I plan to reveal this glorious find to no one, at least until my arrival home, but school has suddenly become energetic and exciting. My arrival home tonight will be triumphant.

I once read that a woman asked Albert Einstein how she could best develop her children's intelligence.

"Read books to them," was Einstein's reply.

"Thank you, but I already do that," the woman responded.

"Then read more books to them," he said. So, assuming comics qualify as books, I'm saying our generation must be some of the brightest intellects that have ever walked this planet!

Before TV's arrival, comics were hugely popular, kids devouring each one and more than once, losing ourselves into another world, just as television did later. But one could argue there were more highbrow hobbies than comics.

Studies could be done on whether Monopoly, the first popular family board game, actually helped develop the Baby Boomers' financial acumen. Or was getting out of jail a greater preoccupation? Some collected stamps, lifting them from

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envelopes from far away countries, displaying them behind plastic covers.

Collecting birds' eggs was one hobby that, well, made little sense. From memory, you made pin pricks at either end of the egg and then blew the contents out. I tried it once, but those multi-coloured, speckled eggs were for the fascination of others.

Some lost themselves for days to weeks constructing models with Meccano sets. Possibly the precursor to Lego, its metal strips, plates, wheels and gears were connected with nuts and bolts. This was enchanting to girls and boys equally.

Autograph books, each page a different pastel colour, were originally intended for autographs, but having met zero famous people, girls ultimately converted the book into messages to each other: 'You are my friend forever' or 'You love Scott' with a heart.

Losing my marbles to brothers just lifted the temperature too high. There were aggies, tom bowlers and cat's eye, and having knocked your opponent's marble out of a designated area, usually drawn in the dirt with a stick, you could keep it. To enable the next game, you returned them.

Some kids, who years later probably topped their science classes, and whose parents could afford it, had chemistry sets and microscopes, under which they studied the bone structures of frogs caught from the channel, for example.

Truthfully though, nothing compared with the magic of the bespectacled Clark Kent, the ever-curious Lois Lane and the heroic adventures of Superman; or the virtuous jungle exploits of The Phantom, The Ghost Who Walks; or the material largesse of the richest kid in the world, Richie Rich, who was so rich, his middle name was a \$ sign, yet he was kind and generous to everyone. Long may they all live.

Project co-ordinator Kathy Elliott said she hoped the service could help drag back some of the tourists lost to the region due to the high river.

"I figured that turning a negative into a positive by offering a Murray River flood experience could generate interest, which it has," Ms Elliott said.

"I felt this was important in bringing tourists to our region during the holidays, particularly given the loss of visitors who come to the Riverland for the summer period to enjoy cruising the river on a houseboat or for various water activities and attractions.

"Our aim is to spread the message that the Riverland is open for business and to come and enjoy the amazing spectacle that Mother Nature is offering.

"The chorus of birds and frogs is incredible to hear and although the river is flooding there is still plenty to see and experience."

Ms Elliott said she hoped the service would capture tourism traffic off the Sturt Highway "going in both directions".

"The Waikerie Airport runs adjacent to the Sturt Highway and as a federal road it is very busy," she said.

"This would allow us to encourage people to make stopovers in the Riverland (and) there are opportunities to bring coach tours with accommodation packages incorporating land-based tours and/or a scenic flight.

"Either way the views will be spectacular."

Departing from Waikerie, the flight routes will take passengers over the Riverland as far as Renmark and Ms Elliott said specific-area tours can be prearranged.

The idea sprung from a Waikerie-centric social media discussion and a connection with the aviation industry through Ms Elliott's husband Ross.

"I proceeded to contact sever-

al operators and Arid Air responded promptly," she said.

"Within hours they had all the logistics covered and were very enthusiastic in offering scenic flights out of Waikerie Airport.

"They have located a Cessna 210 Turbo plane and a fuel truck all the way from Marree, where the owners also run the Marree Hotel."

The aircraft can take five passengers, plus the pilot, and all passengers have a window seat. Ms Elliott said additional aircraft could be added if bookings build.

She said Destination Riverland and SA Tourism were "right behind" the venture.

AN ex-local has invited Riverlanders to gain a unique perspective of the current River Murray flood event.

Former Riverlander, and commercial pilot, Oliver Du Rieu's company Country Aviation – in partnership with Mildura-based Ramair – will conduct flights to observe the impacts of the flood on Renmark and its surrounding areas.

Mr Du Rieu, son of previous Renmark Paringa deputy mayor Henry Du Rieu, said the flight provided an opportunity to witness the full extent of inundation at local floodplain areas.

"In the last few months with everything going on, I have had an increased amount of requests to get up and go for a flight around the Riverland as we see the water levels rise and fill the flood plains," he said. "Knowing that people might **FLOOD EVENT** only see something like this once in their lifetime. Linear data

in their lifetime. I wanted to come up with a way to help get people up in the air and out for a look.

"I teamed up with the guys from Ramair... and have organised two weekends of flights leaving Renmark.

"If interest continues as it is, we are thinking of adding another couple of dates before New Year's (Day)."

The flights will be run from December 16 to December 17, and from January 6 to January 7, departing from the Renmark Airport and travelling to either Customs House, Neds Corner, or Wentworth.

She received special letters from Barker MP Tony Pasin, and Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, who came to visit her to celebrate the special occasion.


"I am just generally interested in life, I have had a wonderful life and done lots of things," Mrs Williamson said.

People are encouraged to bring their own chairs or rugs.



Go Tell the Bees That I Am Gone is the ninth book in the popular Outlander series written by Diana Gabaldon. The book begins with Brianna, Roger and their children returning to Fraser's Ridge and into the arms of their beloved parents, Claire and Jamie. It's 1779 and war is brewing on the horizon. The Ridge is home to


both Patriots, with whom Jamie sides, and Loyalist tenants so it's only a matter of time before tensions boil over and the shooting starts. The sieges of Charles

Town and Savannah are described in detail, along with journeys to Philadelphia and upstate New York by Brianna, Roger and their family, and Ian, Rebecca and their family.

The first few hundred pages of the book are like a family catch-up. All the main characters are reintroduced to us with glimpses into their background and how they came to be settlers on Fraser's Ridge. New characters are also introduced and few escape without a backstory.

The Ridge is split apart when the two opposing sides meet on the battlefield. One side is led by former sea captain Charles Cunningham, who has 'seen' his future and is convinced he knows the date of his death (which is several years away), and the other is led by Jamie.

Jamie has come across A History of the American Revolution written by Claire's former husband from the 20th Century. The



book contains a list of those killed at the Battle of Kings Mountain, in October 1780, and his name is in it. Is it possible to outrun your own death?

There are several side stories woven into the main story line, one featuring Jamie's son, William Ransom, who is still coming to terms with the discovery of his true father's identity.

Another concerns Lord John Grey, his brother, and their extended family. There are conflicts to

settle, and reconciliations to make before it's too late. We catch up on what

Fergus, Marsali and their growing family have been up to since the tragic death of Henri Christian.

As with all the Outlander novels, Claire has been the captivating heroine. Her personality, strength and medical knowledge shine in Go Tell the Bees That I Am Gone.

Her enduring love and devotion to Jamie is vividly portrayed in the final battle scene, leaving the story with a cliffhanger ending.

Gabaldon's painstaking research brings this historical period to life with a stunning depiction of simple, everyday life, along with a sweeping account of the Revolutionary War.

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


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# **Cost-cutting sees Berri SafeWork SA office close**

THE region's only SafeWork SA office is expected to close next month in a move expected to save the state government about \$250,000.

The Berri SafeWork SA office will close in January as part of the agency's budget-saving measures required in the 2022-23 State Budget.

In October, then-Safe-Work SA executive director Martyn Campbell told parliament's Budget and Finance Committee closing the office, the base for two agency inspectors, would

save about \$250,000 and would be the "most significant cost saving for this financial year".

A SafeWork SA spokesperson said the exact date the of the closure was not yet known and would depend on "a range of factors" including the River Murray flooding situation.

"The Berri office handles a significantly lower volume of work than any of SafeWork SA's other regional offices," they said. "The two inspectors based at Berri are considering their positions, including options to remain with the agency.

"The two closest SafeWork SA offices to the Riverland are Adelaide and Port Pirie, which will service the region following the closure of the Berri branch.

"SafeWork SA does not have a public-facing counter service at any of its regional offices. "Public inquiries will continue to be handled by the Adelaide customer service centre.

"The function that SafeWork SA inspectors undertake in regional and metropolitan areas is field based and triaged through a central reporting system."

### **Speeding driver blows 0.158**

A LOCAL man has lost his licence for over a year after he was caught speeding while more than three times the legal alcohol limit.

Police detected a Volkswagen sedan travelling at 156km/h in a 110km/h zone of the Sturt Highway, at Blanchetown, just before 4.30pm on Thursday, December 1.

When breath tested, the driver also allegedly returned a positive result of 0.158.

The 42-year-old Renmark man lost his licence on the spot for 18 months, and had his car impounded.

It is understood he will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.







ac.care requested the cake donations be presented to its Riverland foster carers, who work hard to support children all year round by taking them into their homes.


The cakes will also support ac.care's various Christmas appeals, including support for people experiencing homelessness or poverty in our community.

# Fire safety key despite wet weather, says MFS

LOCALS have been urged to maintain a focus on the risks of home fires despite ongoing wet conditions this summer.

Riverland MFS branches recently issued a warning surrounding the dangers of home fires caused by cooking appliances.

An MFS spokesperson said a number of recent home fires in the region had been caused by unsafe cooking practices surrounding oil.

"Use extra caution when cooking with high heat and when cooking with fats or oils," the spokesperson said.

"Do not leave the stove unattended for even a short time, and heat cooking oils slowly.

"Low-heat cooking must also be monitored regularly."

The spokesperson recommended locals to "equip your



kitchen with a fire blanket and fire extinguisher".

"Never throw water onto an oil or fat fire," the spokesperson said.

"Use a fire blanket or a dry chemical powder fire extinguisher to smother the flames.'



LOXTON-born Aussie beach volleyball star Zach Schubert made history last week at one of the most prestigious tournaments in the world.

The 26-year-old, alongside teammate Thomas Hodges, made it all the way to the final of the Beach Pro Tour Elite 16 competition in Torquay.

The duo faced off against Frenchmen Youssef Krou and Arnaud Gauthier-Rat in the final after winning an epic three-set thriller in the semis to qualify for the gold medal match.

The Australians went down by two sets in a close contest but walked away with a silver medal, making history for their country.

"It was actually a pretty big moment because it was the best an Australian men's team has ever done on the world tour. It's the highest medal we've picked up," Schubert said.

"There's been a few good results, like we got a fourth-place at the Olympics but we've never actually won, and we managed to pick up second.

"This is my highest achievement by a country mile."

The duo went into the contest in a rich vein of form, placing second at an Asian tour beforehand as well



as securing a number of fifth-place finishes at other events on the tour.

"Obviously you aim to win every event and we had some pretty consistent results leading up to it," he said.

"We were building towards some kind of breakout but just missing the mark by one spot every time.

"It was week seven of the tour and we'd played 33 games in that seven weeks, so we were pretty gassed and probably didn't think we were going to get there.

"We lost both sets but you have to lead by two points to win the set, and we lost both by two points, so we just missed the mark against a pretty solid French team.

"We actually beat them recently as well in Dubai, so they're obviously improving too. It was a good game."

The result was extra satisfying for Schubert, who believes the association thought he was "on the way out" after a number of injury concerns last year.

"We qualified for the Olympics last cycle but didn't get selected for the team, but that's sport," he said.

"It comes down to more than one event and just because you win the qualifying, it doesn't mean you're the highest rank. They obviously want to medal at the Olympics.

"Obviously there's so much politics in the sport and we haven't had the greatest support from the federation compared to other teams.

"It was a bit like, I had doubleknee surgery and they thought I was done, so it was nice to prove them wrong."

The result has propelled Schubert and Hodges up the world rankings, but the pair still has work to do heading into 2023.

"We were ranked fourth in Australia and around 160th in the world but we've pulled this out and had a consistent year, so now we're number one in Australia and top 20 in the world," he said.

"I'll be looking after the body now because obviously after seven weeks straight it'll be good to chill out and do stuff I enjoy.

"We won't start training again until January and the Olympic qualifiers start next year.

"You need to be top 15 in the world for that, so we're still a little bit off the mark and we need to TAUSES BOURNE BOURNE

Schubert says he has plenty of work to do off the court as well as on it, with his recent success coming at a personal cost. "It was just a pity because I missed my best mate's wedding to play in Torquay," he said.

"So I've got a lot of groundwork to do with that one."
