Road's reopening a boost for battling wine industry

THE reopening of Bookpurnong Road earlier than many predicted – is a timely shot in the arm for the Riverland's under-siege wine industry, local industry experts say.

Avoiding the lengthy Loxton-Berri detour will translate to significant cost savings for growers, harvesters and transport operations already facing a challenging vintage due in part to oversupply issues.

This month's reconnection of Bookpurnong Road, including to heavy vehicles, comes as vintage hits full swing, amid an overdue

burst of hot weather, and has been hailed as a godsend by a Loxton North-based Wishart Contractors, plus a local industry body.

Mayors rally behind dual-lane highway

THE Riverland's three mayors have united behind the idea of duplicating the Sturt Highway from Adelaide to the region, joining a federal politician in calling for a dual-lane road to improve safety.

Mayors Peter Hunter (Renmark Paringa), Trevor Norton (Loxton Waikerie) and Ella Winnall (Berri Barmera) all said they wanted to see a dual-lane highway prioritised after Barker MP Tony Pasin recently urged the state and federal governments to pursue the

Mr Hunter said it was important to get all stakeholders "in sync"



that duplicating the Sturt Highway would be the "big priority".

"We have about four to five people die each year on the Sturt Highway, and we have hundreds of crashes on the Sturt Highway each year," he said.

"I think our priority ought to be the safety of people coming to the Riverland or going to Adelaide, our health services and tourists.

"If we want to encourage tourism to the Riverland, then we have to allow visitors to get here quick-

"There are so many advantages with that and I think we need to all be in sync and telling the same

Mr Norton agreed duplication of the highway from Adelaide to the Riverland was the "top priority", but also called for betterment of Bookpurnong Road to withstand future flooding.

'We need to see the Federal Government's plan for what that highway's going to look like so that we can review and support it," he said.

"Bookpurnong Road needs to be

bettered, and the State Government are working on that, but we can't let them off the hook in terms of putting it back so it can withstand a 2022 flood again or worse."

Ms Winnall said duplicating the Sturt Highway would ensure travel between the Berri Barmera district and the city was "safer and easier".

"Like many Riverlanders, I travel up and down the Sturt Highway a lot – and we all know how many near misses there are," she said.

Every time the news breaks of another accident on the Sturt Highway I have a flurry of calls from Mum to check it's not me.

"Just the other week I was first

on the scene to a major accident outside Truro involving a truck and

'These incidents are far too common. So much of that would be prevented if it were dual-lane.

"The new overtaking lanes going in at the moment are getting us closer, but there's no doubt in my mind that it needs to be fully duplicated for all road users' safe-

In a statement Mr Pasin said the full duplication of the Sturt and Dukes highways from Adelaide to the Victorian border was "the number one infrastructure priority in Barker".

Planning needed for 96-yearold bridge

THE Paringa Bridge is "not a long-term option for high-productivity vehicles" and planning for the future of the Sturt Highway as a heavy vehicle route is required, according to a local politician.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said crossing the 96-vear-old bridge posed an "issue along the Sturt Highway" for heavy vehicles.

Mr Pasin recently met with federal Opposition Leader Peter Dutton and Riverland mayors at the site of a controversial proposed crossing at Spring Cart Gully, north of Lyrup.

"An alternative crossing at Spring Cart Gully is not a new proposal – it's been discussed for very a long time, but we need to get serious about whether this is the correct solution for the issues that exist with the

Paringa Bridge," he said.

"This is a conversation that the Riverland community and the local councils need to have.

"What I'm calling for is this corridor to be properly planned out for the future.

"We need to fully understand the social and economic impacts of all proposals.

"I've been calling on the State Government to investigate duplication of the Sturt Highway to allow for high productivity vehicles that are capable of carrying up to 30 per cent more freight, leading to less trucks on our roads.

"This investigation would obviously need to consider the options for an appropriate river crossing and Spring Cart Gully is one of the options available."

However, Mr Hunter said options other than Spring Cart Gully also needed to be

'At some point in time they are going to need to deal with the bridge, but going over Spring Cart Gully is (going to cost) billions of dollars," he said.

"You're exceptionally high, and have a long way to go across for the sake of a very small amount of time saved.

"If we come to the point the Paringa Bridge needs to be replaced, then there are opportunities to put one alongside it at a fraction of the cost (of a Spring Cart Gully crossing).

"We've got to sit down and look at the other options."

Mr Hunter suggested an upgraded Wentworth Road could be used as a heavy vehicle route.

"Renmark Paringa, with the agreement and support of the other councils, has upgraded Government Road to a massive degree," he said.

'That's part of the link. There's the potential there, without anywhere near the cost we're talking at Spring Cart Gully, to improve that road to the border...

'Wentworth has already indicated that they wish to seal their side of it.

"If we could get heavy transport going that route... everyone's a winner."

Mr Norton said local councils needed to review Federal Government planning for the Sturt Highway as a heavy vehicle route before supporting any proposals.

"Let's have a look at a plan if there is one," he said.

"If there's not, let's make sure we create a plan that deals with heavy vehicle movement through the Riverland."

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said the twilight event allowed Riverlanders to celebrate the end of the recent flood.

"It was exceptional that SAFM's Bec and Soda showed river communities how much they care by offering such a professional outdoor experience at no cost to locals," Mr Hunter said.

"We really appreciate the Fringe performers giving up their one-night break to travel to Renmark and provide entertainment.

"(It was) a great example of South Australians supporting others in need."

The event featured a performance from well-known comedian and TV host Tom Gleeson, plus Dave Thornton, Ivan Aristeguieta, Marcus Birdman, Frankie McNair, Luke Benson, Laser Kiwi and Harley Breen.

Renmark North Cricket Club committee member Ben Lennon said teammates – who cooked a barbecue on the night – were eager to support the event

Gurra Road work to start this week?

A RIVERLAND council says works to repair an important local road are expected to be finished by the end of the week.

Gurra Road, which links Lyrup to Bookpurnong Road, remains closed due to damage sustained while it was submerged during the flood event.

A Renmark Paringa spokesperson said



initial assessments of the road had revealed "significant damage".

"Works are currently under way... and are expected to be completed in the next week or so," the spokesperson said, via a Facebook

"Once these works are completed, contractors will commence the road rehabilitation to Martin Road and Gurra Road.

"There are significant repairs required on these roads which will take a considerable effort from local contractors.

"We realise that the water has receded and (the) community would like access to roads and other infrastructure, but public safety is still our main priority and we will not reopen them until it is safe to do so."

Council's flood bill \$5.3m and counting

A RIVERLAND council is optimistic the State Government will reimburse "a large proportion" of its budget that needed to be spent during the Murray River flood event.

Preparation and recovery works associated with the flood have so far cost Renmark Paringa nearly \$5.4m, more than a third of council's entire \$15m budget for 2022/23.

However, Renmark Paringa director of corporate and community services Tim Pfeiffer expected council to be compensated for the majority of costs associated with flood recovery.

"To date Renmark Paringa Council has spent \$5.372 million on undertaking its successful flood preparation works," Mr

"A large proportion of the expenditure to date either has been or will be covered by the South Australian Government."

Works before the flood included the remediation of local levee bank networks, plus the installation of DefenCell sandbags at the Renmark riverfront and numerous industrial-sized pumps around the town.

Councillor slams fellow councillor's meeting plan

A LOXTON Waikerie councillor's proposal to reduce the number of council meetings in Waikerie from six to three per year has been labelled "opportunistic, parochial (and) divisive" by a fellow councillor.

Loxton-based Cr Sonya Altschwager's notion of motion was lost at the council's January meeting, voted down 6-3.

However, it still drew the ire of a fellow councillor, Waikerie-based Kent Andrew, who missed the January meeting, but spoke against Cr Altschwager's motion at last week's meet-

Cr Altschwager previously said the change would create "greater equity" for elected members, as councillors who live more than 50km from Loxton – the council's "principal office"

- receive an annual allowance, unlike those who live within 50km of Loxton.

The travel remuneration starts at \$454 per annum (30km to 50km from principal office), then increases to \$775 (50km-75km), \$1162 (75km-100km) and \$1649 (100km or more).

Currently meetings are held between Loxton and Waikerie on a rotational basis.

Cr Andrew last week spoke passionately against Cr Altschwager's lost motion, also describing it as "not in the interest of a cohesive new council".

During the meeting Cr Andrew was cautioned by Mayor Trevor Norton over the criticisms, with Mr Norton mentioning the elected members' code of conduct.

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A bunch of benefits

Avoiding the lengthy Loxton-Berri detour will translate to significant cost savings for growers, harvesters and transport operations already facing a challenging vintage due in part to chronic oversupply issues for red wine varieties.

This month's reconnection of Bookpurnong Road, including to heavy vehicles, comes as vintage hits full swing, amid an overdue burst of hot weather, and has been hailed as a godsend by a Riverland grape cartage business, plus a local industry body.

Max Wishart, managing director of Loxton North-based Wishart Contractors, said his trucks faced an extra 45 minutes on the road had the detour remained in place, adding up to \$40 of fuel costs per trip.

"There's going to be a lot of transport traffic on that road," he said.

"We will probably be doing (between) four to eight loads a day over to Berri and return to Loxton, so it's very important.

"Some of the freight is time sensitive, so instead of that load being taken over to the Berri winery, which from Loxton takes 20 minutes, it would take an hour or more.

"So then you need two or three extra trucks on the job instead of one."

Riverland Wine executive officer Lyndall Rowe said while the shorter route represent-

ed a "significant saving" for those involved in the chain, it presented additional benefits for growers.

"It also means that grape growers can harvest their crops in a timelier fashion," she

"It's important for growers to be able to harvest their grapes when it best suits for optimum maturity, and to ensure no winery

price penalty for not delivering within specification.

"This includes baume, colour and acidity." Mr Wishart said like many others across the region, his employees who live in Berri, Renmark and Monash had been negatively impacted by the detour, which was in place from December 1 until February 11.

Meanwhile this week's heat wave is

unlikely to accelerate the 2023 vintage, Ms Rowe said.

"The burst of hot weather will result in the grape vines shutting down, which means grapes won't ripen any faster," she said.

"They ripen most effectively with warm sunny weather.

"(In addition) the hot weather may lead to sunburnt grapes and hence lower quality."

Trucks back on Bookpurnong, Kingston roads

BOOKPURNONG Road and Kingston Road reopened to heavy vehicles - greater than 4.5 tonnes – last Friday.

Following recent successful reopenings to light vehicles six days earlier, further pavement and bridge testing confirmed both roads could safely accommodate heavy vehicle

A Department for Transport and Infrastructure spokesperson said the reopenings would allow the freight and trucking industry to more easily transport important supplies to communities across the region, without having to use detour routes.

Overmass/oversize vehicles and mobile cranes that have access on RAVnet mapping service are also permitted to use these roads from tomorrow.

"Road users are asked to continue to stay off the road shoulder on both roads as they may be soft under traffic and have been washed away in places," the department said.

"Traffic cones are in place to cordon off

the shoulder in areas of concern."

The Department will continue to inspect both Bookpurnong Road and Kingston Road for any defects and failures, warning that additional restrictions at short notice may be required if substantial defects occur.

"Road users are reminded to comply with all road signage and always drive to the conditions, with some speed restrictions in place," the department said.

"Please continue to be mindful of other motorists and staff on site, with work commencing... to trim and remove of unstable trees along the road."

THE YEARS GO BY

Upgrade unlikely anytime soon?

THE importance of Bookpurnong Road was brought into sharp focus in recent months.

The disconnection of that main, direct conduit linking Loxton and Berri – or the south side of the river to the north side of the river – caused all sorts of inconveniences and expensive detours.

Like the flood itself, it was something of a looming havoc on the horizon. We knew it was coming, but were helpless to prevent it.

Instead, most Loxton-Berri commuters simply girded their loins and resigned themselves to spending a whole lot more time getting to and from work, and other nonnegotiable travel commitments.

By comparison, those regularly doing the Renmark-Loxton trip endured only minor inconveniences - an extra six or seven minutes added to their trip, one way.

But most who travelled the Stanitski Road detour would surely be breathing a sigh of relief now that Bookpurnong Road has

As mentioned above, it's faster and shorter, but also at busy times, Stanitski Road felt like an accident waiting to happen. Impatient drivers and trucks that barely fitted on their side of the road made for occasional hairraising moments, best combatted by defensive

And – as outlined in today's Murray Pioneer – the business community is also grateful to have the road restored, cutting additional costs associated with those longer, more expensive trips.

Stoked by our two local lower house members, Barker MP Tony Pasin and Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, plus some local government elected members, talk has naturally turned to ensuring this effective separation of the Riverland never happens again.

Floodwaters may return later, rather than sooner, but even if spared a similar high river for another 47 years, locals want the stretch of Bookpurnong Road from the Berri Bridge to Bookpurnong Hill elevated and open at all

Riverland council representatives took their chance to press this home to Premier Peter Malinauskas during one of his numerous Riverland visits, but anyone expecting significant works on Bookpurnong Road anytime soon may be disappointed.

Importantly, and thankfully in the short term, the road surface has held up remarkably well to its inundation.

Much better than visiting Department for Infrastructure and Transport officials had expected, in fact.

Soon after the road was blocked, The Murray Pioneer heard several gloomy predictions of the road being out until late 2023, including some coming from sources claiming insight or inside knowledge.

However, motorists were allowed back on Bookpurnong Road soon after the surface was clear of water. Heavy vehicles were also given the green light significantly earlier than most predicted, and likewise the 110km/h speed

limit restored. Essentially, Bookpurnong Road is back to normal, save for a few patch-up jobs.

Reading between the lines of State Government language around the road and its surface, it seems funding required to 'lift' Bookpurnong Road and prevent future flooding events will need to come from the Federal Government.

That particular tier of government is dealing with the fallout from plenty of other natural disasters, meaning spending a motsa on a road that has virtually returned to its pre-flood operating level – located in a blue-ribbon Liberal electorate – could hold little appeal.



The Clarion's office at the Loxton Historical Village with the Village Minstrels in the background, about 1980: Clarion means 'clear', so Loxton's first newspaper lived up to its name by bringing clear news accounts from the Loxton district for the local community. It was published by Jack Irving and The Murray Pioneer, the long-running Renmark-based newspaper. The Great Depression brought hard economic times for the local community and The Clarion, although a creditable little newspaper, could not remain viable. In June 1956, wellknown local Len Chinner and friends began the Loxton Community Newsletter to again have locals bring local news for local readers. Four years later, in April 1960, the successful Newsletter was bought by The Pioneer which then for the next 60 years produced the awardwinning Loxton News. 99.9 per cent agree

IN response to Jim West's letter ('Climate change claims delusional', Murray Pioneer 8/2/23), the reason I said Jim West should toss out his climate change denier handbook is that his comments clearly come from the words of the discredited Professor Ian Plimer.

A regular claim by Prof Plimer is that we have been unable to prove our CO2 emissions are at fault regarding climate change.

The AAP FactCheck article "Geologist misleads with climate change 'proof'" claim by Lachlan Coady (1/11/22) gives a detailed answer that refutes Prof Plimer's claim that we have been unable prove our CO2 emissions are at fault regarding climate change.

Prof Plimer stated: "I don't have opinions. I have facts. They are repeatable and validated." Fact #1: No one has ever proven that human emissions of carbon dioxide drive global warming.

For more than two decades I have been asking scientists for this proof."

The verdict of the fact check is that Mr Plimer's claim is meaningless, misleading, has been presented incorrectly and out of context.

That is because proof does not exist in science, but experts say the evidence puts the theory beyond any reasonable doubt.

"Proof only occurs in pure mathematics.'

Professor Steven Sherwood, a research team leader at UNSW's Climate Change Research Centre, said: "We do not 'prove' anything in science, we cannot even prove the sun will come up tomorrow.

"We also do not 'prove' things in court – we only demand that guilt be demonstrated beyond a reasonable doubt.

"We know beyond any reasonable doubt that CO2 is driving the warming we are seeing.

'When it comes to humancaused climate change, there are multiple lines of evidence that human activity is driving current climate change.

"We know beyond any reasonable doubt that CO2 is driving the warming we are seeing

1) We can measure the impact of CO2 on the planetary energy balance.

2) We know from the laws of physics that this leads to warm-

3) We observe the expected warming.

"The increase in observed global average temperature is only possible with observed increase in CO2 concentrations due to human activity," he told AAP FactCheck.

This is one example where letters to The Murray Pioneer show the authors have been fed halftruths and misrepresentations.

This isn't the forum to argue technical and scientific points, but it's been shown that over 99.9 per cent of world class climate scientists agree that human activity is the main driver of climate change.

Labor achieving 'very little' on Basin

I WAS reminded again recently of Labor's hollow divisive promises of the 2022 election, and their inability to provide clarity and transparency for Basin communities.

I attended a South Australian Parliamentary Budget Estimates Committee and asked representatives from the South Australian Department of Water and Environment questions on, what probably sounds like two polar-opposite issues: flooding and environmental water recovery under the Basin Plan.

Regarding flooding, I

expressed my gratitude for the hard work of the departmental staff but raised questions about river height data predictions and the recently signed Murray Mouth dredging contract.

However, I was disappointed with the answers I received regarding progress made on water efficiency projects.

The Basin Plan includes environmental water recovery targets to be delivered against by July 1, 2024, only 17 months away. This isn't long given the impact to stakeholders of the pathways ahead – including large scale water buy-backs that can hurt regional communities.

I support water efficiency projects as a way to achieve these targets and improve irrigators' productivity and climate resilience, and the economic benefits that arise from these projects.

Progress on these projects appears to have stalled since Labor, in SA and Australia, came into power. Both claimed that it was only Labor who could deliver the environmental water promised under the Basin Plan.

This is despite the South Australian Water Minister, Susan Close, appointing a Commissioner for the River Murray at a cost of \$2m over four years.

When department officials were asked what progress had been made on new water efficiency projects since March 2022, the response was "very

They were unable to confirm a single project that had been approved since that date.

So, almost one year on and "very little" has been achieved despite voters being told that only Labor could save the Murray in time.

This is a stark contrast to the 12 months prior to the election when over 22 gigalitres of environmental water was approved. While there was a way to go to reaching the full water recovery targets, we had a plan, and basin communities knew what it was.

Basin communities are now in the dark on what actions - if any - the South Australian and Australian governments will

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take.

On the one hand we've been told that there's an amount of money set aside for water buybacks, but then we are told that "there are no Commonwealth water purchase programs currently open".

I feel for the SA bureaucrats who are trying their best under the poor leadership of the Water Minister, who took a month's personal leave during the floods that her own government described as "the worst natural disaster" in our state's history.

For the sake of transparency, it's essential the South Australian and Australian governments come clean and reveal to Basin communities their pathway forward for the Basin Plan.

Beyond buybacks

MURRAY-Darling Basin governments must move #BeyondBuybacks if they are serious about tackling the greatest environmental threats in the Murray-Darling Basin.

In NSW Irrigators' (NSWIC) recently launched a new campaign, we are calling on ministers to move beyond the Basin Plan's simplistic 'just add more water' approach.

The focus, funding and sense of urgency must shift.

The biggest threats include invasive species like carp, habitat degradation, blocked fish passage, and cold-water pollution.


Buying back more water from farmers won't fix that. The 2100 billion litres recovered under the Plan so far is delivering many environmental benefits, but if these degradation drivers are not addressed, then just adding water will only ever be tinkering around the edges.

Our #BeyondBuybacks campaign comes as the Basin Ministerial Council plans to meet early this year to progress the implementation of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

We've seen billions of dollars spent buying water, reducing the capacity to grow food and fibre, to survive droughts, and maintain a steady economic foundation to keep towns alive.

Where is the same sense of urgency and funding to address the key degradation drivers?

Over-allocation was the big issue of the early 2000s, but with one in three litres of irrigation



water now permanently out of production, reducing total diversions for irrigation, towns and other industries to just 28 per cent of inflows, it's time to get serious about fixing degradation drivers.

Under NSW law, irrigators are the last in line for water, with allocations low or zero during droughts, so buying back irrigation water is not the silver bullet many think.

Buybacks are also not a cheap option when community socioeconomic impacts are accounted. Of course, water is important but it does not stand alone. We need an integrated catchment management approach, rather than just a water management approach.

In 2019, scientists recommended complementary measures, saying:

"While recovering water will provide good outcomes, as a sole intervention, it is not enough to deliver the desired environmental benefits...

'Recovering water is not enough to deliver all the anticipated environmental benefits.

'In a highly modified system, equal attention should be given to addressing other threats that water delivery alone cannot ameliorate.'

It is important for women to know that early menopause, inflammatory conditions such as rheumatoid arthritis and lupus, and complications during pregnancy – such as pre-eclampsia, hypertension, and gestational diabetes – are all important risk factors for women.

So, if you are a woman over 45 please have a heart health check with your GP and discuss your obstetric history with them if you have had children.

Local black spots ignored, says Pasin

THE Riverland and Mallee's mobile phone black spots have been ignored in the latest round of Federal Government "target funding".

Mobile infrastructure will be deployed in 54 locations across Australia, as part of the \$40m announcement, and Barker's complete omission from the list has angered local federal MP, Tony Pasin, who described it as "a huge blow".

"Looking through the list of 54 target locations, it strikes me that many of these locations appear to be in marginal or Labor-held seats," Mr Pasin said.

"This is incredibly disappointing for the hundreds of locations across Barker that are struggling with mobile coverage."

Mr Pasin said when in power the Coalition had made "great headway" in addressing mobile black spots, delivering more than 1270 new mobile base stations across Australia, including 30 in Barker over its three terms in government.

"Last time Labor was in government they invested zero dollars and delivered zero new mobile phone towers for Barker and in

Rate relief for Paisley residents

A SIX-month council rate remission will be provided to Paisley Island and Paisley Creek Estate ratepayers after their properties were inundated due to the River Murray flood.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said until the water goes down in the Paisley area, near Blanchetown, council will not know how much it can help the residents with the clean-up.

"There is a fair chance no one is going to be living there for this whole period; they won't have access to their properties, they definitely won't be able to live in them and the last thing they need is having to pay rates on properties they can't use," he said.

"It's a complete rate relief, and if you look at the Rate Financial Hardship Relief Policy, sometimes it's just not collecting any rates or charging any interest, but my understanding is that we won't be charging them any rates at all."

The initial rate remission will be six months, with Mr Norton saying council would assess the situation once the water is out of Paisley Island and Paisley Creek Estate.

"It's basically to not have to put them through the process of having to apply for



rate relief," he said.

"Six months down the track before it expires we will have hopefully had a really good look at the situation and see what we can do to help them in the short term and also help them in the long term and maybe extend it."

Flood-affected properties will also not have their values amended for the current 2022-23 financial year, as advised by the Office of Valuer General.

"What generally would happen if someone's house is flooded, the value would drop and therefore you have to recalculate the rates and once everything is all good again, you have to revalue it again," Mr Norton said.

"So, the Valuer General said 'we are not going to touch the value of any of these properties during this period'."

While the Paisley area has been identified for rate relief, other affected ratepayers are advised to apply for a similar arrangement via the council website.

Historical Village to reopen its doors

THE Loxton Historical Village is set to reopen on Thursday, March 16, after it was forced to close in December due to the River Murray flood.

While a reopening date of March 4 was initially floated, a Loxton Historical Village committee member advised more time was needed to reinstate displays, and give the vil-

lage a general tidy-up.

The village has been closed for over two months, but has escaped any damage after levee banks were extended in preparation for the flood event.

"The village itself is fine, there is no damage at all," said Loxton Waikerie council director commercial and community services, Andrew Waters.

"There has been some damage to the septic tank (at) the public toilets which adjoin to the village, but the village will be able to reopen with some portable and disabled toilets within the village."

The extended levee bank will also be removed from around the village, with the existing levee bank staying in place.

"SA Power Networks have been there to

assess the power and they have given the all clear for power to be turned back on," Mr Waters said.

"We just need an electrician to go there and do a certificate of currency which will happen... this week.

"Apart from that, they (the village) are planning to open in a few weeks and everything will be back to normal soon hopefully."

\$8.5m regional arts boost

SUPPORTING "sustainable cultural development" in Riverland communities is the aim of new funding for a regional arts body.

Country Arts SA earlier this month announced the Regional Arts Fund would receive an extra \$8.5m in funding – over four years – under the 'Revive: a place for every story, a story for every place' plan.

ANY opposition to water buybacks is "misguided" and no evidence exists to show they harm river communities, the SA Water Minister claimed yesterday.

In a vigorous attack on the SA Liberals ahead of a meeting of Murray-Darling Basin states this Friday, Susan Close called for unity over water buybacks, which the State Opposition says take irrigated land out of

Dr Close said the SA Liberals' opposition to buybacks, led by Riverland-based upper house leader Nicola Centofanti, risked delivery of the 450 gigalitres of additional flows promised to SA under the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

In her media release, Dr Close said NSW and Victoria continually fail to meet water savings targets and that "according to the SA Liberals' logic, a foreign company is allowed to buy water to make a profit, but the Commonwealth shouldn't be allowed to purchase water from willing sellers to protect the sustainability of the Basin".

Dr Close said there was "no evidence of voluntary buybacks harming river communities", quoting the Murray-Darling Basin Commission report that stated:

"Buyback did not cause a mass exodus of people from farming or irrigation most buyback agreements related to partial sales of entitlements only. The vast majority of those who sold entitlements retained water delivery rights.'

Dr Close said the SA Liberals needed to support South Australia "getting its fair

"I'm not sure why Nicola Centofanti thinks it's her job to defend interstate governments, but her advocacy for them is undermining our capacity to get the water we were promised," Dr Close said.

However, Dr Centofanti, the Opposition spokesperson for water and the River Murray, said Dr Close's comments show the minister "clearly does not understand the water market".

"And (Dr Close) does not appreciate the difference between an individual or company purchasing water, which remains in the consumptive pool, versus the government purchasing water and removing it from the consumptive pool," Dr Centofanti said.

"She also clearly does not appreciate the angst of our regional communities.

"None of this is surprising to hear from a city-centric minister who has literally spent more time overseas than in the Basin and who has outsourced her responsibilities to an inner-Sydney-based 'River Murray

"Our concerns are around the lazy approach of large-scale, mass buybacks, when there are other options still on the

"For example, we know that water efficiency projects have been successful in recovering environmental water and making irrigators more efficient, but we've seen next to no effort in this space since state and federal Labor took office."

Local Liberals targeting water minister

SA Water Minister, Susan Close, has again been targeted by the State Opposition, for both her performance during the flood, and a new Murray-Darling Basin Authority

Earlier this month, the SA Liberals renewed their attack on Dr Close for being overseas during the River Murray flood's local peak, while last week her Riverland-based shadow, Nicola Centofanti, noted some wording in the latest Basin Plan Report Card.

"(It shows) that there has been 'minor movement' in the past six months and that meeting the June 30, 2024 deadline to recover 450

gigalitres is now 'highly unlikely," Dr Centofanti

"After almost 12 months, no efficiency measure projects and not a single gigalitre has been secured by Susan Close, who instead has been focused on international trips and holidays."

Dr Centofanti said the former SA Liberal government had contracted 23 gigalitres in efficiency projects during the final 12 months of its term.

In addition, in parliament earlier this month. Dr Centofanti's Liberal colleague, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, also went on wide-ranging attack against the deputy premier, and stated he was "disappointed" that she took leave during "the worst natural disaster in the state's history".

However, the State Government dismissed the criticisms from the Riverland pair, including the "lazy Susan" jibe directed at the minister.

"The State Government is getting on with the job of helping River Murray communities recover from the biggest flooding event since 1956," a government spokesperson said. "Instead of supporting the recovery effort, our political opponents are focused on inventing silly names and spreading inaccurate information which just reflects poorly on them.'

Support for '\$100 held' citrus system

THE practice of citrus packers withholding money from growers as a risk management tool during poor seasons has been termed a "fair system" by a prominent Riverland industry figure.

As an example, under one packer's payment plan - which is not used by all operators - the packer pays growers the agreed amount per tonne, minus a flat figure of \$100.

This \$100 can ultimately be returned to growers once the fruit is sold, or be kept by the packer in the event of costly delivery/ selling problems, such as fruit quality or transport issues.

The Murray Pioneer understands the system has its local fans and critics, however Citrus SA chairman - and Waikerie citrus grower – Mark Doecke says overall it is "the fairest way of doing it".

"It can be better for (the packer's) business to take that bit of money early, rather than have a container full of fruit arrive in poor condition where the shed wears it, and it's potentially not their fault," Mr Doecke said.

"They've said to growers, 'Okay, you're going to get \$500 a tonne, but we're keeping \$100 just in case we have trouble. And if we don't have trouble, we'll pay that at a later

"Last season (2022) every packing shed here and in Mildura had trouble with fruit outturn but prices in Mildura were \$200

a tonne less than the packing sheds here, because they built that risk factor into their prices."

However, Mr Doecke said the system could potentially disadvantage growers providing high-quality fruit when their citrus is mixed in with lesser-quality fruit.

"So, the packer gets that \$100 per tonne from those growing good fruit as well," he

The Pioneer understands the other concern with the system is that the withheld amount is a flat figure, rather than a percentage of the price paid per tonne.

However, Mr Doecke said those growing lower-quality fruit were most likely to be affected.

He said while difficult growing conditions, including an unusually cold 2021 spring and mild 2021-22 summer, had made life difficult for some Riverland growers, packers had also faced several other challenges, including longer-than-usual shipping routes impacting

In better news for the industry, Mr Doecke said the outlook for the looming navel season was positive.

"Demand is good," he said.

"It's the old story: if you've got good quality fruit you have the best chance of a good

Mr Doecke said the valencia season is now ending, with mandarins starting in March, ahead of navels in late April onwards.

Waste station vouchers for flood recovery

RIVERLANDERS have been invited to register for a program aimed at supporting the disposal of items damaged in the recent flood

Local property owners with flood-affected material and debris are set to receive five free vouchers for Riverland waste transfer stations, under a program announced yesterday and jointly funded by the State and Federal Governments.

SA Premier Peter Malinauskas said the initiative would help local government to extend tra station opening hours, put on more staff, and to cover the costs of recycling and land-

"The clean-up effort will gather momentum once the waters have fully receded and roads become more accessible to heavy vehicles to come in and assist floodaffected residents, property owners and businesses," Mr Malinauskas said.

"I ask people in affected communities to please remain patient because we have a long way to go, and



a lot of recovery work to do now as we move on with the clean-up phase.

"More than \$120m in joint funding has been provided so far to support community recovery and represents the largest amount spent on a single disaster event in South Australia."

Federal Minister for Emergency Management, Senator Murray Watt said "through some of the worst flooding South Australia has ever seen, the people of the River Murray region have shown tremendous grit and resilience".

"We understand that recovery continues long after the flood waters recede, and we will continue to stand shoulder to shoulder with the Malinauskas Government in rolling out support for as long as communities need," Mr Watt said.

Ute and trailer-sized dropoffs with any flood-damaged building material - including wood, metal, masonry, carpet, e-waste and furniture will be accepted, however any asbestos material will be refused.

Out-of-towners 'disadvantaged'

A SALISBURY couple planning to retire to their flood-hit Blanchetown holiday shack are frustrated at the lack of State Government financial support.

Judy and Danny Smith's two-storey shack was extensively damaged in the River Murray flood, however they are ineligible for stamp duty relief – of up to \$48,830 – on the purchase of a new home because they are temporary residents.

Mrs Smith said she and her husband, along with other holiday home owners who have had their properties damaged by flood, had invested in the town as

"I am not going to take anything away from per-

manent people who live at Blanchetown (because) they deserve everything they can get their hands on," she said.

"(But) it is not like it is a place we have rented out to somebody.

We have put our money in the town and we are without the property at the moment."

Mrs Smith said the couple still pay rates on the property and are now concerned about the cost of rebuilding.

However, an SA Government spokesperson said the assistance on offer to owners of properties damaged by the River Murray flood was appropriately targeted to provide support to those in the community that need it most.

He said this included

appropriate support if a person's principal place of residence had been impacted by the flood waters.

The spokesperson said the assistance enabled displaced residents to access emergency accommodation and to return to their home at the earliest opportunity.

He said holiday home and shack owners who were not permanent residents in the structure impacted by the flood could take advantage of free structural and waste disposal needs assessments, once roads and waters allowed access to heavy vehicles.

The spokesperson said it was important to note these assessments were needed before large scale clean-ups could start in the coming

"Hopefully the flood bank will dry out to enable light vehicles to access the boat ramp," he said.

Mr Perry said it appeared to be in good condition.

"We need to ensure it hasn't been undermined on the edges," he said.

"Where the concrete is in the water you can't usually see it, but we are pretty confident it will be okay.'

Mr Perry said the Loxton Waikerie council flood recovery committee which meets fortnightly – was responsible for deciding which sections of the levee bank would be removed.

Mid Murray Council calls for flood patience

MID Murray Council, state agencies, and service providers are requesting patience across the district as flood waters recede and roads dry out.

In its Recovery Response Operational Schedule issued on Friday the council said while it understood the eagerness of people wanting to return to their properties, recovery across the area was expected to be an extensive process.

The council said it was continuing to implement its opening process methodology based on the Department for Infrastructure and Transport's process.

It said infrastructure condition assessments were ongoing and, where possible, cleaning of debris from roads had com-

The council said in cases of limited damage and following a period of two weeks to dry out, light (less than 3 tonne) vehicles may be permitted to access roads at a reduced speed.

"If damage is evident, closures are likely to remain, until the extent of road degradation can be investigated and remediation strategies conducted," the latest update said.

The council said it would ensure essential road access was assessed as a priority.

It said access and remediation of public open space, public conveniences and marine facilities would follow once the road process had been com-

Morgan Ferry reopens

MORGAN Ferry reopened to light vehicles – under 3 tonnes – last Friday.

Use of this ferry will be initially restricted to light vehicles, emergency vehicles and local school buses due to weight requirements imposed by the Mid Murray Council on the connecting

The council says it will continue to monitor the connecting ferry roads and their condition, aiming to raise the weight limit as soon as it is safe to do

Marine Services staff have been car-

rying out regular inspections along the river of ferries and equipment, such as cables, anchor points and ramps, with the remaining ferries now on standby to reopen once the connecting roads can be safely reopened to traffic.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport says it is continuing to prioritise necessary repairs to State Government-managed access roads as the water further recedes and is working closely with local councils to ensure locally managed ferry roads can be re-opened as soon as possible.

Riverland towns get mobile signal boost

RIVERLANDERS now have access to subsidised installation of mobile signal boosting devices to help improve mobile connectivity in the region.

The Mobile Network Extension Devices Pilot Program, a joint initiative of the State Government and Telstra, provides a subsidy for the installation of Telstra GO Repeaters.

From today, residents and business owners living in the Renmark Paringa, Berri Barmera, Loxton Waikerie and Mid Murray districts have been made elgibile for the program.

SA Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister Clare Scriven said connectivity was "vital for people living and working in our regions".

"I am very pleased that the Malinauskas Government has been able to work with Telstra to expand the Mobile Network Extension Devices

Pilot Program to make it easier for more regional South Australians living and working in the Riverland," she

"As the Riverland recovers from the recent devastating floods, this subsidy means more locals will have access to a signal boost while at home or work."

The Telstra GO Repeaters can be installed at a home or business to help improve mobile reception by amplifying the network signal a mobile device receives.

They are also be able to help people connect to the Telstra Mobile Network from further away than normally possible, or in areas where the signal may struggle to penetrate.

Participants in the program will need to purchase the device, either outright or through a payment plan.

Telstra's regional general manager for South Australia Michael Patterson said mobile coverage was impacted by factors including the type of device being used, distance from a tower, hills and terrain, tall trees or built infrastructure.

"Sometimes it is not possible for a variety of technical, financial or community reasons to construct a new base station but using an external aerial and a phone booster at individual locations is a great way to improve coverage," he said.

"Long term, Telstra will continue to seek to improve mobile connectivity for people living and travelling in River Murray communities, but this initiative will help deliver new and improved connectivity for residents, and we commend the State Government for expanding this program."

The pilot program is open until June 30, 2023.

Hotel redevelopment comes right on time

THE timing of redevelopments to the historic Hotel Renmark could hardly be better.

Eighteen months ago structural engineers were engaged to evaluate damage and plan remediation to ensure the integrity of the hotel building.

Thanks to a sizeable investment - up to \$500,000 - much of the remediation has been completed, however an unexpected, thankfully harmless event on Thursday night underlined the importance of the commitment.

"Unfortunately an area of capping on the overhanging soffit that had not been identified at risk broke loose and fell onto the street," said Hotel Renmark general manager, Darren Baker.

"Staff at Hotel Renmark responded by blocking off the carparks and walkway to the public."

Measuring approximately 35cm across and weighing about 7kg, the capping fell harmlessly to the ground, however the Para Street parallel carparks immediately fronting the Main Bar remain blocked off.

"The board and management would like the public to know that we are working to keep the 126-year-old building safe," Mr Baker said.

"And we are continuing our exciting redevelopments to ensure the hotel remains operational for another 126 years.'

Women are suffering

HEART awareness month, or REDFEB, is a time to increase your awareness of the under-diagnosis and under-treatment of heart disease in women.

Heart disease is the top cause of death in Australia, killing someone every 30 minutes, with 42 per cent of deaths due to a heart attack.

While more men die from heart disease than women, it remains one of the main causes of death in women.

Research conducted by the University of Sydney recently found women admitted to Australian hospitals with serious heart attacks were half as likely as men to receive proper treatment.

Women were also found to die at twice the rate of men six months after discharge.

"We've found over recent years that women are doing worse after their heart attacks, they're more likely to have another heart attack, and more likely to die or have heart failure than men within the five years following their heart attack," said cardiologist Dr Monique Watts, a heart failure cardiologist and specialist in women's heart disease.

Dr Watts believes an issue surrounding heart disease is a focus on malespecific symptoms and risk factors.

"Most medical research is conducted in studies of men, and therefore clinical guidelines, symptom checklists and treatments are tailored to men," she explained.

"It means women are diagnosed

worse heart disease outcomes than men

with heart disease seven to 10 years later than men, and are less likely to be referred for heart tests or heart surgery.

"We know that smoking, high cholesterol, being over-weight and a sedentary lifestyle are all risk factors discovered from research on men. What isn't well publicised are the very clear and specific risk factors for women.

"Early menopause, inflammatory conditions such as rheumatoid arthritis and lupus, and complications during pregnancy - such as pre-eclampsia, hypertension, and gestational diabetes - are all important risk factors for women. Even smoking confers a much higher risk of heart disease for women than it does in men."

This REDFEB, Heart Research Australia



Heart Research Australia CEO Nicci Dent

is imploring women to be more active in seeking help when experiencing heart problems rather than neglecting them.

"Time is critical when it comes to heart

disease and a huge issue with women is the delay to treatment," said Heart Research Australia CEO Nicci Dent.

"Women go to hospital later after symptoms start, which reduces the window of opportunity for effective treatment and increases the risk of complications and damage to their heart.

"There are many things that contribute to this. One big problem is the myth that women aren't at risk. Traditionally heart disease has been viewed as a bloke's disease, but globally heart disease is the number one killer of women."

Women tend to develop symptoms of heart disease at a much later stage of the illness compared to men, and the symptoms are often more vague or 'non-specific', which add to a delay in diagnosis and receiving time-critical care.

"Many women don't experience the crushing chest pain that is a classic symptom of a heart attack in men," Ms Dent said.

"Some feel extremely tired or short of breath. Other atypical symptoms include nausea and abdominal, neck, and shoulder pain."

For earlier identification of cardiovascular disease and more timely and appropriate medical intervention it is advised women over 45 - or over 35 for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders have a heart health check, and discuss their obstetric history if they have had children, with their current GP.

THE experiences of German World War II Internees from Persia (Iran) who were detained at Loveday and Tatura, Victoria, will be told during a one-day symposium on

'German WWII Internees from Persia and their Fate in Australia' has been organised by Western Sydney University's Adjunct Professor and curator of Persian arts, Dr Pedram Khosronejad.

Berri Barmera Council and The Loveday Internment Camp Committee are hosting the event, to be officially opened by Berri Barmera Mayor Ella Winnall.

The forum will hear from Helga Girschik, 87, the sole female German internee survivor from Persia of those captured in 1941 and brought to the Tatura Internment camp.

The children of German civilian prisoners will also share their history. Their fathers were taken into custody in Persia, shipped to Australia and incarcerated in internment camps at Loveday and Tatura.

An exhibition investigating the role of tangible heritage in the life and resettlement of German civil internees, plus prisoners of war from Persia, will also be on display in the Barmera Soldiers' Memorial Hall, on Saturday, March 4 and Sunday, March 5.

The display will feature family photo albums, personal diaries, letters and arts from the internment camps.

The symposium's keynote speaker will be Flinders University Professor Peter Monteath, who will examine the historical perspectives of the internment of Germans in Australia.

The National Museum of Australia's senior curator, Canberra-based Libby Stewart, will also make a presentation.

Four decades dedicated to preserving Loveday's history

FORMER Berri Barmera councillor Rosemary Gower has spent many years promoting the Riverland as a tourist destination, being involved in a wide range of major festivals and events, taking coach tours, and preserving local history.

The 76-year-old Riverland historian and freelance journalist has researched the history of the Loveday Internment Camp (LIC) off and on for nearly 40 years.

Rosemary was the catalyst in organising the German WWII Internees from Persia and their Fate in Australia symposium at the Bonney Theatre in Barmera on Saturday, March 4.

The event is being presented by Western Sydney University with support from Berri Barmera Council and the Loveday Internment Camp committee.

Rosemary will be one of the speakers.

Keynote speaker Professor Peter Monteath from the Flinders University, will be joined by Professor Pedram Krosronejad from the Western Sydney University and descendants of German civilian prisoners from Persia.

TWO of the speakers visited the former camp site with Ms Gower when she was the official tour guide at the Cobdogla Irrigation & Steam Museum.

She jokingly says the significance of being born the day 'Peace was Declared' in Europe, on May 8, 1945, was probably the reason she has a fascination for war history.

Her father, Bill Shueard, was serving in the Pacific in the RAAF when she was born.

Rosemary's research on Loveday has enabled her to meet many "very interesting people over the years", and one of the highlights was setting up the display on Loveday at the Barmera

Visitor Information Centre. Another exciting event was the launch of the DVD, which contained live footage taken at the camp during the

It is the only live-recorded history of the Australian internment/POWs camps in the country.

The patron of the Loveday Internment Camp, Major General Peter Phillips, officiated.

He served several terms as National RSL president and met Rosemary when he and his wife visited Loveday to see where his father served as an army dentist.

OVER the years, Rosemary has taken many overseas academics, archaeologists, anthologists, historians, descendants of Japanese, Italian and German internees, former guards and prisoners, and film crews for tours of the camp sites.

Her tour includes the wood camp at Woolenook, upstream from Renmark.

She regularly takes coach tours and family groups out to the former camp site and has addressed schools and groups.

Her most distinguished guests were the Japanese Ambassador Shingo Yamagami and his wife Madame Yamagami, along with their official party, when they visited the region as guests of the Berri Barmera Council to tour the former camp site in May

The Consul-General of Japan Junji Shimada, who is based in Melbourne, also took part in the visit and his office and Rosemary have continued to communicate.

High-profile former RSL national president, the late Bruce Ruxton, also flew in to launch an exhibition of photographs taken at Loveday when the collection Rosemary put together was on display at the Cobdogla Irrigation and Steam Museum.

Over the years, Rosemary has interviewed former staff members and internees who were at the camp and she is currently writing a book on the LIC relating the many interesting stories she has recorded.

She enjoys sharing her knowledge about the fascinating World War II history of Loveday with the younger generation. Her passion has been to preserve this important part of local history.

A SESSION featuring the speakers involved with the March 4 symposium will be held for primary school students in the Berri Barmera district on Monday, March 6, from 9.30am.

Secondary school history students from across the Riverland have also been invited to attend an afternoon session later that day, starting at 1pm.

Agriculture experts at Paringa's doorstep

ON the border side of Paringa, just off the Sturt Highway, sits a prominent agricultural business filled with passionate team members.

Hoods Agrimotive owner Norm Hood has been in the agricultural industry for 54 years, and is committed to servicing his customers the only way he knows how.

"My first boss when I started and I respected him like another father to me, he was that good - he said to me on the day I officially started, 'Norm, anyone can sell new machines, but very few can back them with support and parts'," Mr Hood said.

"I personally treat all of my customers as friends, because they're not just a number in the computer. When I'm out travelling on the road, I couldn't name a customer that wouldn't invite me in for morning tea and a sit

"It's a one-on-one, personalised relationship that I have set up."

Hoods Agrimotive shifted to Paringa in 1982, after some time in Renmark, and the change did wonders for the busi-

"No other business is only three metres off the main Sturt Highway," Mr Hood said.

"We found it was too difficult with big machinery in Renmark, because of having to cross the river when most of the machinery goes out here anyway.

"I wanted to change, I wanted to get better exposure and this property became available. I thought, 'You can't get any closer to the Sturt Highway', plus there is no dealership with a view like the one we have out the back here, especially when it was under flood.

"It gave us better exposure to more people, and to everyone who drives a car up and down that road from anywhere in Australia, and we are able to do a lot more with our parts and services being in Paringa.

"Paringa was a change I made because I felt it was just so much better for the business. Paringa, like the rest of the Riverland, is home to a wonderfully friendly community."

Hoods Agrimotive is "very visual" to visitors to the region, situated on the side of the Sturt Highway for all to see as they enter Paringa.

The business services a wide range of customers, covering a

350km radius, all in the name of living by Mr Hood's philosophy of backing up his initial service.

"We've got customers who want us to go that far and we actually supply parts over the broader Australia," he said.

"We have customers in Western Australia, many


throughout New South Wales and Queensland, plus many down and around Melbourne...

More than meets the eye across the river

AS the gateway to the rest of the Riverland, Paringa is often seen through the windows of a vehicle as people drive on past.

But there is more to Paringa than meets the eye, and residents would tell you there are hidden gems across the

PARINGA BRIDGE

A lot of us drive across the iconic Paringa Bridge regularly, but do you know the history of the big, red structure? Forming part of the Sturt Highway,

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Lot 12 Sturt Highway, Paringa

the bridge is integral in carrying traffic - including road trains and B-doubles, among many other vehicles - across the River Murray between Renmark and

One of only four suspension bridges still spanning the River Murray, the Paringa Bridge opened in 1927 and will celebrate its centenary in just four years'

The bridge is of particular structural significance thanks to its advanced engineering which allows a section of

the bridge to be raised, allowing larger river traffic, such as houseboats, to pass underneath.

A pedestrian walkway - once catering to rail traffic - sits in the middle of the bridge, permitting trail walkers passage.

BERT DIX MEMORIAL PARK

Overlooking the River Murray, Bert Dix Memorial Park provides a unique vantage point of the Paringa Bridge.

While the park, located along Lock 5 Road, was hit hard during the flooding event - almost completely disappearing

under the high river - it is back to being a great place to take a leisurely stroll or enjoy a sit down at one of the park benches.

Lock 5 Road - which was recently reopened to traffic after river flooding caused its closure for some time - leads to a popular, yet sometimes dangerous, sandbar. Along the road you also pass its namesake, Lock 5, which was inundated with water during the 2022/23 flood event.

SILO ART

As an official part of the Australian Silo Art Trail, the Paringa silos are a great photo opportunity, and if you are lucky to be passing through at night you can see them in a new light.

Four distinct images take pride of place on the front and back of the two silos, with local characters selected to act as silhouettes and the story of the region told through iconic images.


With a viewing shelter and platform, and an abundant amount of information available on the silo art, spare a few minutes to learn about the beautiful images and the history behind the silhouettes.

COMMUNITY MUSEUM

Just a quick walk past the silos, the Renmark Paringa Community Museum features a vast range of vintage farm and agricultural equipment, set in a landscaped native garden.

Farm machinery, implements, tools, static displays, historical steam engines and much more waits for families to wander through and enjoy.

The store will officially open on Wednesday, March 1, will be open seven days a week, and the opening hours will remain the same:







Chaffey outbreak region's 28th

RIVERLAND growers are being urged to participate in a fruit fly baiting program after the region's 28th current outbreak was declared.

PIRSA last Friday declared a new fruit fly outbreak at Chaffey after male specimens were found in a trap on a commercial prop-

Riverland Fruit Fly Committee chair Jason Size said it was crucial local growers registered for PIRSA's self-baiting program.

"Commercial Riverland growers in red outbreak areas are eligible to be part of the fruit fly self-baiting program and will be supplied with free fruit fly bait and lures to use on their properties," Mr Size said.

"Wine grape growers in red outbreak areas are also being offered Entrust to mix with their sulphur sprays.

"I urge growers to check their eligibility and sign up for the self-baiting program that is available to them, don't leave it up to others to do the right thing – you have

PIRSA general manager of the fruit fly response Nick Secomb said an increased number of outbreaks were expected during warmer conditions.

"If your block or house is in the Chaffey red outbreak area, please keep your fruit and vegetables on your property and don't share, sell or give them away," Mr Secomb said.


"By identifying fruit fly

in the Riverland and implementing our eradication processes quickly we maximise our chance to eradicate this pest."

Meanwhile, the detection of fruit fly in traps has extended the boundary of the existing Barmera outbreak area to now include some properties on either side of Thiele Road, Swinstead Road and Bassham Road.

Primary producers impacted by current fruit fly outbreaks are encouraged to contact the free Family and Business (FaB) support program by visiting the website (pir.sa.gov.au/fabs).

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Sunraysia company offers environmentally sustainable aquatic weed control

MILDURA-based Aquatic Weed Control Australia is a global leader in removing aquatic weeds, algae, and bio-organisms from irrigation infrastructure.

Owner Andrew Ryan began his business two years ago in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic.

His clients include water authorities, irrigators, golf course owners, and water ski clubs.

Mr Ryan uses residue-free chemicals to clear weeds, algae and bio-organisms from irrigation channels, pipelines, dams, and irrigation dripper lines.

He uses a 16-wheel amphibious motorbike, suitable for use on land and

"You just drive it off the trailer straight into the channel," he said.

Mr Ryan said the chemical he mainly uses is acrolein, which comes in a 200litre cylinder and is injected 300mm under the water surface, using dry nitrogen on the back of his aquatic vehicle.

He said the chemical is carefully measured out of the cylinder using

"You pressurise it with dry nitrogen and it is like a beer barrel," he said.

Mr Ryan previously worked for a company based in Finley, in the NSW Riverina, that provided this type of ser-

He said when the owner of that business passed away, he decided to take over provision of this service, the only one of its kind in Australia.

Mr Ryan said his method of weed and organism control is far more effective than the manual methods irrigators traditionally use.

"You can mechanically remove weeds, but you can only do it for a certain num-

ber of times within irrigation channels," he said.

"If the channel is meant to be running at two-metres deep and you keep digging it out at 2.5-metres deep, you will lose water in evaporation and seepage."

Mr Ryan said his technique conserves water and the weeds simply break down.

He is eager to provide his services to irrigators and water authorities across the Riverland and Sunraysia.

Tech brings better local stroke care

STROKE treatment is being delivered up to 30 minutes faster in the Riverland, thanks to an innovative telehealth platform delivering faster diagnosis times at a local hospital.

The SA Telestroke service is using cloud-based platform Zeus to gather information about rural and regional patients, with the Riverland General Hospital (RGH) becoming the first regional hospital in SA to link brain imaging to the platform last week.

State Health Minister

Chris Picton said "regional epicentres" would benefit from the "new life-saving technology".

"Every minute counts with a stroke, and the faster we can deliver treatment, the better, to help save lives," he

More than 440 SA Telestroke Service calls have been made using the Zeus platform since it was introduced in 2022, slashing unnecessary hospital-tohospital transfers by 72 per

The expansion of infor-

mation available using Zeus comes after the recent opening of a dedicated stroke prevention clinic at the RGH.

SA Health Rural Support Service executive director Debbie Martin said the first year of using Zeus had already led to better outcomes for patients who have experienced stroke.

"We are confident that patient outcomes will continue to improve, particularly with eight regional hospitals directly linking CT scans to Zeus over the next 12 months," she said.

Don't Grow These Vegetables Next to Each Other

Some plants compete for nutrients or space, or they attract damaging insects or fungus. Here are some incompatible plant combinations. A garden is like a community. Some members of that community live quietly next to each other, and others demand their own space. Some will even rob valuable nutrients from nearby neighbours. Make sure your companion plants happily coexist. Here are a few plants that don't play well with others.

Asparagus and Garlic

These two incompatible plants share the same need for nutrients in the soil, and asparagus is a real quitter if it can't get everything it needs. Your best bet is to give asparagus its own bed with no competition. But if you must give it a friend, try parsley or dill.

Celery and Carrots
We often pair them on a vegetable platter, but these plants should avoid each other in the garden. Both need water and shade and seek a taller leafed-out companion like beans to keep the soil moist. Use thyme as a companion to celery, which will smother weeds and moisten the soil.

Eggplant and Fennel

Eggplant and Fennel
Eggplant is a member of the nightshade family, and fennel produces a chemical that slows nightshade growth. Instead, choose bush beans as eggplant's companion. Eggplant loves the nitrogen that the bush beans add to the soil. And the bush bean repels the Colorado potato beetle, which has a taste for eggplant.

Cucumber and Rosemary
The cucumber can take on the flavours, so keep rosemary, basil and sage away until blending them into a delicious salad in the kitchen.

Lettuce and Garlic

Poor garlic hinders many plants, including producing chemicals that wilts lettuce in place. Keep lettuce away from garlic's cousins, too – onion, leeks and chives. Instead, plant lettuce next to that power pair of carrots and radishes. The shallow roots of quick-growing lettuce won't disturb the root crops.

Parsnips and Carrots

These two root crops like the same growing conditions, but both are susceptible to the carrot root fly. So, it's best to give them their own space, far from each other. Both plants would rather line up with radishes, as the little round radish grows quickly.

Pumpkins and Summer Squash

Pumpkins are aggressive garden plants. They can choke out summer squash such as zucchini that competes for water and space. Pumpkins will also cross-pollinate with other squash varieties, affecting your harvest. Pumpkins like to sprawl and snake up corn's thick stalk. The two vegetables are harvested at different times, so they won't compete for precious water in the late summer.

"That was when all the creativity was flowing. We could just forget about the stress of making the movie, just have fun and play."


Mr Whitrow said he was pleased with how the Riverland footage came up on the big screen.

"He did a lot of his composing and recording from the bomb shelter near his house during the war, so there is an element of intensity in his work I think that was very present while he was creating it."

Now that the Riverland showing is over, Mr Whitrow is working on getting his movie to reach as many people as possible.

"The aim is to get it in some more cinemas around the country within the next month or two," he said.

"After that we are going to push for DVD and streaming services fairly quickly.

"I just want to thank all the people of the Riverland that made this film possible and especially to (local) Kate Strachan."







Prostate cancer nurse to support Riverlanders

LOCAL men impacted by prostate cancer will receive more specialised support, with a dedicated prostate cancer specialist nurse being introduced to the region.

Michelle Bissell, who recently joined the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA) Specialist Nursing Service, will be primarily based out of Murray Bridge, but will serve the entire Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) by undertaking regular regional site visits.

Ms Bissell said she was "thrilled" to have the opportunity to "make a difference in the lives of men in our community".

"Every man diagnosed with prostate cancer needs to know that they have access to support, particularly with making treatment decisions that are right for them," she said.

"I'm looking forward to being the local go-to-person that can provide them with the information to help them make informed decisions, navigate the health systems, and be supported every step of the way.'

PCFA CEO Anne Savage said the service would strengthen awareness and action on prostate cancer in the region.

"Fewer than one in three men in the local region detect prostate cancer at its earliest stage, when the disease can be more effectively treated," she said.

"We know that many men... may have difficulty with accessing services due to the distance to treatment, which is why the provision of specialised services and support especially for this regional community is so important.

"Michelle will play a key role in helping to strengthen community education and supporting men and their loved ones from the point of diagnosis throughout their treatment, helping men navigate difficult treatment decisions and access the services they need."

Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (LHN) CEO Wayne Champion said Ms Bissell's support would help "hundreds of men across the region".

"There's no doubt that Michelle's work will improve and save lives..." he said.

"For men across the Riverland, it's a timely reminder to act early if you notice any changes downstairs. "If in doubt, get it checked



He previously played 149 league games with North Adelaide, 66 for Woodville, and 19 for South Australia, between 1957 and 1970.



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Richards wins it for Mum and Dad

YEARS of heartache and tragedy "inspired" an Adelaide runner to a memorable win in the 2023 Nippy's Loxton Gift men's 120m final on Saturday night.

Last year's fourthplacegetter Brett Richards stormed to victory in the heats before blitzing the final, in the rapid time of 12.32 seconds, comfortably ahead of Jack Doney in second and Jesse Cordoma in third.

The 28-year-old has done it tough in recent years, with the Adelaide High School graduate losing both of his parents in the past five years.

The win is the latest triumph in an impressive career that saw the speedster named SAAL Athlete of the Year in 2016, but Richards believes Saturday night's victory holds a special place in his highlight reel.

"To be honest this is probably up there," he said.

"I've won the Bay (Sheffield) 70m before as well, but with losing Mum and Dad, that was a huge inspiration.

"I'm emotional because it's been a huge five years for life. Losing Mum and Dad was tough and this one's definitely for them. It's been a huge battle."

Richards is a veteran of

the event, having competed in Loxton a number of times across his career.

He heralded the competition on show and event organisers for putting on a "fantastic meet".

"I've been in the sport for quite a while, so I'm surprised my legs are still ticking over really," he said.

"But, I've always loved this meet and you literally can't fault the competition

Meanwhile, teenage sensation Amelie Burge saw off strong competition in the women's 120m final to be crowned champion in front of the packed crowd.

After placing second in her semi-final, Burge managed to edge ahead of Ellie Whittingham and Kayla Lemm at the finish line in the final, with the latter two unable to be separated in a dead heat.

The 16-year-old Burge fought past Liana Channon early in the race before hitting the front and managing to maintain the lead until the end, running an impressive 13.89.

"This is my fourth Loxton event, but I definitely haven't run that fast before," Burge said.

"I was just happy to be in the final so yeah, I'm pretty happy with how it went.

'The atmosphere up here is so good and all the locals

A PAIR of Renmark teenagers stormed to victory at last Saturday's Nippy's Loxton Gift carnival, putting on a show for the local crowd.

Angelo Otero, 17, and River Dowling, 13, shone in their respective races, picking up a sash each, with Otero also managing a podium finish.

Dowling, who donned the red guernsey as the race's only scratch runner, went into his under 14 70m contest as the favourite, something his mum Wendy said he has become accustomed to in recent times.

"He's already run in 10 Gifts this year and it's his second sash so far. He's pretty confident going in and he's always wearing that red guernsey," she said.

The Gift presented a rare opportunity for the youngster to race in front of some familiar faces.

Otero also relished the opportunity to run in front of the locals and credited the crowd for spurring him on during his pursuit of the finish line.

"When I was on the starter's line for the 120m, Terry McAuliffe got to me and gave me a full introduction and told the crowd to get behind the Renmark boy, so there was a bit more pressure there," he said.

"But, it was great to have the tra support, especially when I was coming down the straight where the grandstand was.

"When I crossed the line there was a tent to my right, and the amount of people that got up and clapped me, it was pretty special.

Especially at the end of the race when I didn't have much left in me, I just wanted to win for the home crowd and it's always good to have that extra support.'

Otero started the day with a bang, placing third in the under 18s 120m final, before a delay due to issues with the timing equipment threw a spanner in

the works for his under 18 300m event.

"I warmed down after the 120m and I was getting ready to warm up for the 300m, but they announced the delay so I wasn't sure what to do," he said.

"I had a quick bite to eat and had a heap of water and then the next minute they announced they were getting ready for the 300m.

"I shouldn't have had what I did. It was a full peanut butter and jelly sandwich and a hot cross bun with butter in it, so it wasn't the greatest before the race. It did give me that hit of energy though.

"I went into the race with a game plan. There was a guy around 8m in front of me so I wanted to get on his tail as quick as possible, preferably before the bend, which I did.

"I could hear Luke Rigby, who's a great runner. He was coming right behind me and I was going to try and kick off of the bend, but because I heard him coming I went a bit earlier than I usually would.

"With about 30m to go I didn't have much left but I just went as hard as I could."

Like Dowling, Otero now has his eyes on a greater prize, with the teenager eyeing off the Stawell Gift in April after a hot start to 2023.

CEO of Rural Business Support Brett Smith said the funds will help farming families, with over 500 farms known to be affected by the recent natural disaster.


"We are already seeing an increase in requests for support from farmers who have been impacted by the flood and are doing it tough," Mr Smith said.
