# ROCKS ON, ROCKS OFF

NO dancing means no rock are unique to South Australia, 'n' roll - and any relief announced this Friday will be too late.

SA's Covid-19 restrictions on outdoor entertainment have forced the hugely popular Renmark Rocks On event to be cancelled for the first time.

The committee announced the decision this week and said the conditions, which made holding the festival unfeasible.

"Many arrangements have been put on hold pending confirmation of restrictions and the protocols required," the committee said.

"We just snuck into the dates for 2020, and in 2021 we were able to still dance with limited numbers...

"(However), 2022 has proven to be an unfortunate headache."

SA Premier Steven Marshall is widely tipped to roll back dancing restrictions at a media conference this Friday, but the change will arrive too late for Renmark Rocks On organisers.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the initiative would generate 20 construction jobs and another five logistical roles for the Riverland.

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# A new seven-figure smile for Almondco

A MULTI-million dollar loan for a major Riverland almond business is set to increase its production capacity, and create new jobs for the region.

The state government on Monday announced Almondco would receive an \$8.1m loan to build a 10,000 square metre warehouse at its Renmark processing headquarters.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the initiative would generate 20 construction jobs and another five logistical roles for the Riverland.

"Almondco already supports hundreds of jobs in the region and the new 27,000-bin warehouse will create another 25 jobs during construction and ongoing," Mr Whetstone said.

"This expansion will further provide a boost for local employment and open up new export opportunities due to higher processing capacity.

"This is good news for the local economy and local jobs and I am proud to be a part of a government which is backing South Australia's regions?

Almondco managing director Brenton Woolston said utilising the new warehouse would increase the site's processing capability to 50,000 tonnes per year – compared to 29,500 in 2021 – by 2025.

"Almondco is proud of its history and is pro-actively planning and executing its growth strategies to meet increased tonnage from its contracted grower members across the Australian almond growing regions," Mr Woolston said.

"The ongoing support from the state government is pivotal in optimising sustainable returns to our growers."

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, David Basham, said the warehouse would complement the recently installed processing facility, high-capacity optical sorting line, and wastewater plant

The Renmark Rocks On committee on Monday announced the 2022 event would be cancelled due to ongoing challenges caused by

A statement from the committee said current restrictions on entertainment activities - with dancing allowed in South Australia at dance studios and for wedding couples - made holding the festival unfea-

"Our number one priority has been to keep our attendees Covid safe, but... we need time to source financial sponsorships to provide the necessary funds to do an event like ours," the statement read.

"Many arrangements have been put on hold pending confirmation of restrictions and the protocols required.

"We just snuck into the dates for 2020, and in 2021 we were able to still dance with limited numbers, but not have the markets. (However), 2022 has proven to be an unfortunate headache.

"We are extremely grateful to our small committee and helpers



for going above and beyond to try to get a positive and sustainable answer from the state government and the powers that be in SA Health."

The first Renmark Rocks On was held at the Renmark Hotel, in March 2013, with 120 attendees over two nights.

The festival had also received

the Renmark Paringa Council Event of the Year award for 2022.

The Murray Pioneer understands Renmark Rocks On 2023 has been scheduled for March 16-20.

# Aussie wine takes \$1bn hit n 2021

THE Riverland wine industry is feeling the sting of a near \$1bn drop in the value of Australian wine being sent overseas.

Figures from the latest Wine Australia Export Report - released earlier this month showed a 30 per cent decrease in the value of exported Australian wine during 2021.

Wine Australia general manager for corporate affairs and regulation, Rachel Triggs, said wine exports to China had reduced by 97 per cent in value during the year, or nearly \$1bn.

"The pandemic is still disrupting the ontrade, the global freight crisis is continuing to cause shipping delays and increased freight costs, and while there was export growth to many destinations, it will take time to offset the loss in trade to mainland China," she said.

'This is not something that will happen overnight, nor within a year.

"The 2021 calendar year represents the

first full 12-month period since very high deposit tariffs on Australian wine imported to China were imposed, and the global impact of the challenging operating environment can now be observed in full.

"Because the export figures are compared to the prior 12 months, we'll keep seeing significant differences in the year-to-date export figures as a result of the deposit tariffs until the end of 2022."

The report also revealed 10 per cent less 2021 vintage wine had been shipped during the year, compared to wine from the 2020 vintage during the previous 12 months.

Ms Triggs said challenges surrounding shipping costs and times were expected to continue in 2022.

"Exporters experienced both increased delay times and increased costs of containers over the past year," Ms Triggs said.

"Australia also represents only 1 per cent of global container throughput, so we are at the mercy of bigger international players with this increased demand for freight. The crisis is not expected to be resolved before the end of 2022.

"A relatively high share of the small 2020 vintage was brought forward to ship in 2020, leaving a smaller amount left to ship in 2021.

"The 2020 vintage was the smallest vintage since 2007 and much of it was shipped in 2020 to the UK and the US in response to increased demand for Australian wine during Covid-19 and ahead of the Brexit transition

However, Ms Triggs said a number of other international markets - including Hong Kong, Singapore, and South Korea - had increased consumption of Australian wine.

"Exports excluding mainland China increased by 7 per cent in value to \$2bn and decreased by 6 per cent in volume to 613 million litres," she said.

"This is the first time that exports excluding mainland China have reached \$2bn for a calendar year since 2009."

# \$900k funding for Riverland wine programs

THE Riverland wine industry is set to benefit from more than \$900,000 of industry funding announced this week - to deliver nearly 30 research, biosecurity and promotional programs.

Funded under the Riverland Wine Industry Fund, projects include local weather station maintenance, the implementation of an app to help improve grape quality, a dedicated region-based fruit fly co-ordinator, and funding towards the Riverland Wine and Food Festival 2022.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the Wine Industry Funds are important for local regions to deliver projects that may not otherwise happen.

'The Riverland is Australia's largest wine growing and producing region, so it's critical we continue to support the industry to innovate and grow," Mr Whetstone

"By putting the prioritisation of the projects in the hands of those on the ground in the region, it ensures that any gaps are addressed, enabling projects and services to be developed that provide real value to the local growers and winemakers."

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, David Basham, said the projects would provide ongoing resources and support to the local wine and viticulture sector.

"The \$273 million Riverland wine industry is a critical part of our state economy and the \$900,000 of industry funds will help deliver new projects which

will drive growth and create jobs," Mr Basham said.

"South Australia is without doubt the country's 'wine state' and projects like this will only further enhance this reputation.

"The funding provides the capacity to innovate, the ability to adopt best industry practice and the resources required to respond positively to the demands of the modern market.

'Riverland Wine will distribute the funding which will cover areas such as regional promotion,

improved grape and wine production and policy issues that are impacting the health and state of their industry.

"The projects or initiatives to benefit from the fund have been identified as a high priority by Riverland's wine makers and winegrowers."

# Sole traders, family businesses feeling Covid pressure...

# Shutdowns still hurting

MANY Riverland businesses are feeling the struggles of the current Covid-19 pandemic, having to shut their doors due to Covid infections or the protocol surrounding close contacts.

Loxton-based Riverland Sheds was closed for a week recently, with staff exposed to a positive Covid case, forcing the business owners and three of their employees into isolation.

Riverland Sheds owner Mel Sharrad said it was disappointing to have to close the business.

"In the first three days, we had three clients we were going to do roller doors for and a fence, so that was four clients and we had to say, 'Sorry, can't'," she said.
"It would be around

\$30,000 for the week that you haven't got coming in because you haven't done the job, maybe more.

"But, you are still paying the wages."

Mrs Sharrad said she was left with just one staff member, who was away when the others were exposed to the close contact.

"You can't do sheds with one person," she said.

Mrs Sharrad said she was fearful of more downtime to the business in the future if staff members test positive or become close contacts again.

"We just don't want to have to do this again," she

Loxton Chamber of Commerce business and

events manager Sonya Altschwager praised local businesses for complying with Covid-19 regulations and doing their best to keep doors open.

"We understand a lot of them are sole traders, so they are going to be potentially hit more than others

who have higher staffing levels, who they can rotate through," she said.

"Sole traders and family businesses are what make up most of our business community.

We have to do what we've got to do."

# Footy club's shed talks not set in concrete

LOCAL councillors have raised concerns about recently-aired suggestions surrounding new infrastructure for a Loxton sporting club.

At Friday's Loxton Waikerie council meeting, elected member Kym Webber said he heard a recent ABC Riverland interview with a Loxton Football Club representative, who stated council would build a new shed when the

Loxton Sports Club was demolished.

"What's going on?" Cr Webber told the chamber.

"The way (the representative) verbalised it, it was that it was going to happen and we were supporting it.

"It's just disappointing, that's all."

Fellow councillor Clive Matthews said it was "frustrating" to hear suggestions about decisions yet to be made.

"I heard the same interview and as

an elected member... there was no mistaking what (was) said," he said.

"It was that, 'Council is installing a 27m x 9m shed that will have roller doors each side'.

"It's very frustrating when you hear

"It hasn't even come to council and you're hearing about it, whether it's true or not."

Council CEO David Beaton refuted

any suggestion the new shed was confirmed.

# Footloose fallout for Rocks On

DESPITE the results of a poll released this week, the SA government made the right decision to reopen its borders on November 23

The Renmark Rocks On committee might well ponder that date and wonder what went wrong... but more on that later.

Of the 602 South Australians surveyed, 51 per cent disagreed with the reopening decision, while just 42 per cent agreed.

An interesting follow-up question to that 51 per cent might have been, "If not November 23, then when?".

Whether or not the government was adequately prepared for the opening is a separate, but not unrelated question.

But in at least aspiring to move back toward pre-Covid normalcy, even slightly, Premier Steven Marshall was headed in the right direction. And it is again worth remembering that whether by design or accident, or a combination of both, South Australia has done vastly better through the Covid-19 pandemic than Queensland, NSW and Victoria, with less lockdown days in particular.

However, that would be cold comfort at the moment for Renmark Rocks On organisers, who seemingly had little choice but to cancel their 2022 event, scheduled for next month.

South Australia's ongoing – and patently ridiculous – dancing ban meant the committee was unable to guarantee to the hundreds of visitors that they could in fact dance. And dancing is a major part of the festival, which has grown rapidly since it was first staged by a bunch of enthusiastic locals in 2013.

Restrictions are being lifted incrementally in South Australia, and an announcement on the dancing ban is tipped to happen as soon as Friday, when the government's latest Covid-19 update is staged.

Our real-life Footloose experience could be over.

But the Rocks On committee and all those looking forward to the March weekend will have to wait another year – and it didn't need to be this way.

If we accept the shaky premise that dancing in nightclubs is somehow a high-risk Covid-19 activity, it must be noted that the Renmark Rocks On experience is something quite different.

Rock and roll dancing, with a designated partner, in a much more open environment, would be more "Covid safe" than a cramped, dark nightclub dancefloor.

An organiser told The Murray Pioneer this week that Renmark Rocks On 2022 was to be an alcohol-free event – another major difference to the nightclub scenario.

Perhaps most frustratingly, if the ban is lifted this Friday, the event could have been staged after all. However, as pointed out, organising such an event is a major undertaking that cannot be switched off and on at a whim, or the latest SA Health guidelines in this case.

It also takes time to undo plans, so the cancellation call had to be made early enough for visitors in particular to cancel bookings etc.

It has been estimated that the event brings half a million dollars to the region.

As of today, South Australia is the only state with a dancing ban. It is impossible to quantify what material benefit, if any, this ban has achieved, but likewise it is impossible to argue that it has achieved nothing.

"It would have been much worse without a dancing ban."

In 2019, those exculpatory words could only have come from a Hollywood film. They are today's reality in a post-Covid existence.



'Snow' Halls, World War I veteran, killed in the bombing of Darwin, February 19, 1942:

Commemorative events last week were held in recognition of the fall of Singapore and the tragic chain of events that followed 80 years ago. In early February that year, the invading Japanese army unexpectedly swept down the Malay Peninsula. By the 15th, the British allied forces in Singapore, including many Australians, surrendered. Great suffering and the deaths of many soldiers followed in the infamous Changi Prison, the devastating activities of the Burma Railway, and Hell-fire pass. On the 12th, the makeshift hospital ship, the Vyner Brooke, had steamed out of Singapore carrying many wounded soldiers, some civilians and 65 Australian army nurses. On the 14th, the ship was sunk, bombed by enemy aircraft. Many passengers made it to shore, but of necessity soon surrendered. On Radji Beach, 22 Australian nurses remained but were marched into the sea and shot from behind. One survived to tell the devastating story. On the 19th, the Japanese bombed Darwin, killing some 250 civilians and military personnel. One was civilian post office telegraphist 'Snow' Halls. Many other raids followed. The dark days of February 1942 saw many casualties: soldiers, nurses, and civilians. Lest we forget.

**ED:** Telegraphist Halls, with bombs falling, remained at his post to dispatch an urgent Morse code message to Adelaide, advising that Darwin was under attack. He sent the message just before the bomb that killed him exploded on the post office. He was Peter Magarey's grandfather.

I AM mostly satisfied with our elected members and the performance of the Renmark Paringa Council.

However, we can only wonder why our councillors chose to backflip their earlier decision to encourage developers to create an exciting opportunity for Renmark at 180 Murray Avenue.

What a time-wasting outcome this has been for developers and council staff.

As the mayor indicated in his responses on ABC Radio, one reason was no "wow factor" in the development options being considered, and yet, how can this be when no fully developed proposals were presented to council?

We may never know what could have been possible, what a reported \$30m investment in the site could have achieved for the community, the region, and the state.

I have no doubt that if developed carefully to preserve our history and the natural character of the river, the wow factor would have been the experience that visitors would have had on the site

# **Develop Renmark's** Westpac building

I AM writing in disgust at the very thought of wanting to remove the former Westpac building in Renmark, just to gain 32 metres of river front.

# Roadside vegetation being destroyed

WE live on Mindarie Road, Pyap West, and late last year we observed two actions which resulted in the cutting down/ removal of native roadside vegetation.

The first event was the cutting down of Mallee trees underneath a 66kV transmission line.

While there is a requirement to maintain sufficient clearance underneath power lines, for most of the length of Mindarie Road the minimum clearance met the power line regulations.

Our concern was that trimming the trees actually increased the fuel load and hence the fire risk, besides leaving the trimmings in an untidy state.

We contacted Murray Zircon, who are responsible for maintaining the transmission line, expressing our concern.

They replied, saying that they would tidy up the cut branches. In January this year we recontacted them asking when the work was going to be done.

No reply. We are still waiting. The second event occurred when the District Council of Loxton Waikerie (DCLW) graded Mindarie Road, as it does

metres either side.

This involved uprooting small trees and bushes, including some roadside markers.

Along its length, Mindarie Road is sufficiently wide to allow the unhindered passage of farmers' machinery.

The reason for this clearance

was not obvious.

Expressing our disappointment, we emailed a councillor, who contacted us say that the matter would be followed up.

Having not heard from DCLW, we contacted the councillor again who replied that an officer would contact us.

So far we have heard nothing. It dismays us that roadside vegetation seems to be considered a nuisance rather than an asset to be managed and maintained for the habitat it provides.



# Hotel's new look, new name



A NEW-look restaurant and increased accommodation options at the communityowned Renmark Hotel - soon to be known as the Hotel Renmark - are part of a longterm development estimated to be worth

The Renmark Hotel has announced renovations of the Nanya would begin on Monday, as part of long-term upgrades to the premises.

Renmark Hotel general manager Darren Baker said both formal and casual dining would be offered at the new bistro.

"The big works in the Nanya start on Monday," Mr Baker said.

"We'll give the inside a complete facelift, and the deck outside will go as well. We're going to build a two-storey deck outside, and our aim is to become a one-hatted restaurant (through the Australian Good Food Guide).

"You have to meet a criteria, and we think we can get that. That's our goal.

"That will be there Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights.'

Mr Baker said it was necessary for the hotel – which will revert to its original name during the process - to cater for a range of dining and accommodation preferences.

"We thought it was time, when we're moving into a new stage of revitalising the hotel, to rebrand," he said.

"If we don't make change, then it just stays the same.

"Tourism is booming, and there is a shortage of accommodation in the Riverland."

Mr Baker said views of the River Murray would be highlighted as part of the redevel-

"About eight carparks will be removed, and the reason for that is because they are on hotel land," he said.

"The footpath will be re-directed around, and that allows for uninterrupted views of the river.

"The carparks on the other side of the road will stay."

It is understood the entire construction project will cost between \$13m and \$16m.

Mr Baker said the group accommodation - located in the former Galaxy Room building and funded through a \$1m grant under the federal government's the Murray-Darling Basin Economic Development



Program – would also generate benefits for

other local businesses. "Work on the group stays has been happening since November, and that's really

progressing well," he said. "It's probably at 70 per cent completion, and we're hoping it will be ready in May.

"That can host community groups that are visiting the region, and the more heads on pillows is better for the community.

"They all travel here, buy a coffee and eat somewhere else, and that's exactly what the town needs.'

# Vietnam export access good news for growers


RIVERLAND stone fruit growers are set to benefit from successful negotiations to sell fruit into a new international market.

# River-front plan nothing new, says town stalwart

# 'I heard that 65 years ago'

MARGARET Duggin says keeping Renmark's river front open - free from buildings – was an aspiration 65 years ago.

Debate is raging about a recent decision to demolish the former Westpac building on Murray Avenue to open up extra river frontage within the town's traditional retail zone.

Those against the plan want the site developed, while certain others backing the demolition have pointed to a council motion from 22 years ago that ostensibly favoured extra river frontage.

However, Mrs Duggin says that objective pre-dates the 2000 council vote, and in fact goes way back to 1957.

Mrs Duggin worked at the Renmark Council office from 1956 to 1962 and said town clerk Jim Lewis had clear views on the subject, specifically the building at 180 Murray Avenue.

"It was after the 1956 flood of course, and they were doing rehabilitation work (along the river front)," she said.

'The first thing he said – only to us in the office, I don't think it went to council - was that it was a pity that building hadn't fallen into the river.

"He said, 'Why didn't the council have the brains to push it into the river to reclaim some of the river bank?'.

"He said it should never have been put there in the first place – and that was 1957.

"So, Rod Thomas (former mayor) was talking about 22 years ago, but Jim Lewis was saying this 65 years ago."

While some may disagree with Mr Lewis's view, nobody can dispute Mrs Duggin's recollections.

"I'm actually the only person still alive who worked for the Renmark council in the 1956 flood," she said.

"And I've got a pretty good memory."

Mrs Duggin also backs the recent decision to demolish the building.

"I've been all around the world and if you go somewhere where there's a sea or a river and that's what you want to look at," she said.

'You don't want to be upstairs. You stay in a motel unit to sleep, you're not sitting there looking out at this scenery.

"Where they should put a motel is across the road, where all those damned old decrep it-looking buildings have been since 1956."

# Doctor influx brings some good health to Riverland

A NEW crop of more than 15 doctors have started working in the region's local health network, following the launch of a new medical training pathway last month.

The influx of junior doctors includes medical interns and registered medical officers (RMOs) who are part of the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network's (RMCLHN) new Riverland Academy of Clinical Excellence (RACE).

RMCLHN executive director of clinical innovation Professor Paul Worley said the interns began in January, while RMOs started in early February.

"We have five interns based in Berri, Barmera and Renmark, and we have the RMOs in Berri, Loxton, Murray Bridge and Mannum." he said.

"It is so encouraging to have seen the enthusiasm with which the junior doctors have taken up our positions.

"We have already attracted a number of doctors who have (brought) additional skills to our region.

"For instance, three of our trainees have public health qualifications, so we're in a position now to establish a public health unit within the LHN."

Intern Dr Kyle Selga, who grew up in Renmark, said the opportunity to undergo his training in the region was attractive to him.

"It's a new program in the country, and I like living in the country as well," he said.

"It was a lifestyle choice, and you also get more supervision one-on-one with a consultant instead of running around with a team of about 20 in Adelaide."

Dr Selga said the five-year contracts offered through RACE, as opposed to the typical one-year or six-month contracts for junior doctors, was also a "selling point".

"Having a five-year contract instead of having to renew it and chase after a job every year makes it easier to plan for the future as well," he said.

Prof Worley said the success of the program, which gives junior doctors experience in hospital and general practice settings, reflected "the quality of the doctors and the health services in the region".

"These junior doctors are seeking the very best supervision in their training and they're recognising that they can get that excellent training here in the Riverland,"

"Once you've lived in our region for five years, I think you'll be convinced to stay here for your career.

Prof Worley said the RMCLHN would look to expand the program and recruit more doctors for its 2023 intake.

"Also next year we will be working with the two GP colleagues to ensure these doctors have access to training in all the wonderful general practices in our region," he said.

"The key outcome is that

we have a region where – both in our general practices and our hospitals – we are training the workforce we need and no longer having to rely on a locum workforce.

"Some of the junior doctors had already been work-

ing as students in the region. "That's the aim of the pro-

gram – that you come here as a student and you don't have to leave."



# 'End of lease is end of lease'

A WAIKERIE service club's lease of a prominent river-front building will cease as planned next month - despite some protestations.

In December, Loxton Waikerie council agreed to evoke the Waikerie Lions Club's lease of the old Bond store with a view to seek expressions of interest of the site for commercial development, preferably with a tourism and hospitality focus.

However, at this month's meeting, councillors quashed the Lions Club's recent request to

store its food van and barbecue trailer in the premises until the building is occupied.

"If end of lease is end of lease, I believe everything should be removed from the site," Loxton Waikerie councillor Kym Webber told the chamber.

Councillor Deb Thiele said it was wrong to assume the building would be vacant and "doing nothing".

"We've had no ability to do anything about (the building) because the Lions have been there," she said.

Councillor Clive Matthews said he "completely agreed" with Cr Thiele.

"As long as there is stuff in er installing a second roller door that shed, we can't move forward with anything, as far as I am concerned," he said.

"End of lease is end of lease.

"There are other sheds and other community groups that have vans that don't live in sheds. "We are trying to accommodate them, but this has gone on and I think it should be completely empty.'

In December, council agreed to offer the Lions club vacant shedding (the former Apex shed) at Penaluna Drive with use of the common room and toilets under a shared facility lease/license.

Council also agreed to consid-

into the shed and assist Lions in relocating.

In December, Waikerie Lions Club president Pam Stendara told the Murray Pioneer that the vacant shedding at Penaluna Drive was "not big enough".

However, Cr Thiele said there were other options to consider.

"I am sure there are a few sheds around Waikerie," she

"I know in other situations, they work within their community to find where sheds for non-for-profit and community organisations are and shedding is found."

# **Council looking** to sell properties

A RIVERLAND council is seeking to market the sale of unused property and a local research centre.

Renmark Paringa councillors at last night's general meeting voted on a motion to create a land development and marketing strategy for the sale of council land at 64 Cowra Street, 49 and 61 Eighteenth Street, and the McCormick Centre for the Environment.

A council report on the matter said utilising the land was crucial to the ongoing growth of Renmark.

"As council is aware, the availability of vacant land in our council area is in scarce supply and the opening of additional land is required to grow regional communities," the report read.

"During the last year, staff have fielded several queries relating to Lot 64 Cowra Street, and 49 and 61 Eighteenth Street, ranging from the development of residential housing, affordable housing, aged services and tourist accommodation.

"Council has also been approached by NDIS service providers for vacant land to build NDIS housing based on a shortage of this type of accommodation in the Riverland.

"In addition, council has for several years tried to attempt to find an alternative use for the McCormick Centre for the Environment that will provide a community benefit but doesn't have a negative financial impact on ratepayers.

"To date, no long-term solution for the McCormick Centre for the Environment has been found."


"What we are seeing is medical students travelling to the city for their studies, getting offered jobs in the city, and then staying there," he said.

He said high river flows and damage from boats had caused erosion of the retaining wall, which was designed to protect the river bank.

"Council is considering its options at present and looking at how to repair the issue," Mr Scales said.

# Crime Stoppers takes aim at illicit guns

CRIME Stoppers SA is putting its support behind a national effort to reduce the number of illegal firearms in the community by asking Riverlanders to share what they know about illegal guns and safely surrender any they may have, without penalty.

Crime Stoppers is partnering with SA Police to raise awareness about this important community safety campaign, which builds on the success of a national firearms amnesty promotion last year that led to more than 11,000 guns surrendered or seized.

Crime Stoppers SA CEO, Nigel Smart, said with an estimated 260,000 unregistered guns across the nation, all South Australians should think about how they would feel if they stayed silent about an illegal gun which was then used to harm or kill someone.

"South Australia is certainly not immune from the devastating impacts that come with having illegal firearms in the hands of criminals," Mr Smart said.

"We have seen the tragic loss of life and severe injuries that occur when people turn a blind eye and allow illegal firearms to remain in the community.

"The demand for illegal firearms is driven by organised crime groups right through to low-level individual criminals, who want and use firearms to protect their interests, threaten and intimidate and commit violent acts.

"If you suspect that someone has an illegal gun, share what you know with Crime Stoppers before it is too late. Report safely without the need to say who you are, get

involved, or put yourself at risk of harm."

During the three-month campaign, a range of community engagement and promotional events in regional and metropolitan communities across South Australia will encourage people to share what they know about illegal guns, and to safely surrender any they may have in their possession.

Being caught with an unregistered or illegal firearm outside of amnesty conditions could result in a significant fine, imprisonment and a criminal record.

# **Technology to monitor pickers and save time**

RIVERLAND growers are set to benefit from the development of new technology aimed at allowing workers on fruit orchards to operate more autonomously.

AgPick Technology, in collaboration with Berribased Ingy's Citrus, have recently developed the AgPick Orchard app, aimed at increasing productivity and ensuring fruit traceability for horticultural properties

Ingy's Citrus director Michael Ingerson expected utilising the technology would save his business 15 hours each week in manual data collection.

"We're generally on the forefront with technology," Mr Ingerson said.

"If we can identify an automated way to save time and create efficiencies, we're all for it."

AgPick Technology chief

executive officer, Henrietta Child, said the app would help growers meet requirements of the incoming Horticultural Award.

"The technology will work with pickers' own equipment, it will not be reliant on supervisors and there will be no badge or bin scanning in the orchard," Ms Child said.

"It's a 'hands-off' solution yet provides information about who picked a bin and where they picked it.

"With pickers registered in the system, the app uses GPS locating to enable monitoring and reporting of pickers' progress with little or no supervision.

"The new app is very light on data use and will run on most phones with GPS functionality. Training is minimal as the app does it all for us."

Ms Child said the technology would also be beneficial

for other Riverland horticultural industries.

"Ingy's Citrus approached us with some concepts for an automated picking solution and asked us to make it happen," she said. "We're excited to be working with such a forward-thinking and dynamic operation.

"Any fresh produce operation which harvests by hand can use it, and implementation can be very straightforward.

"But it has particular relevance to tree crops and environments where pickers may be working with less supervision."

# 'Disappointment' at new fruit fly detection

RIVERLANDERS have been advised to monitor backyard trees for fruit fly larvae, after a new local detection extended quarantine measures.

Fruit fly restriction dates in Renmark West and Pike River were last week extended until May 6, after the detection of larvae on a residential property in Renmark.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the pest continued to pose risks for local growers.

"Fruit fly is one of the world's worst plant pests and causes havoc for our fruit and vegetable growers and billion-dollar horticulture industry," Mr Whetstone said.

"This is another detection in a backyard, and we are urging people to exercise hygiene, remove all fruit and make sure any fallen fruit is picked up.

"The extension of the outbreak is disappointing as our growers have worked hard to help eradicate fruit fly outbreaks.

"While we have a great success rate in eradicating fruit fly, we want to keep it that way and we need eve-

ryone to do the right thing."

Fruit fly outbreaks in Berri, Monash and Cooltong were previously declared over in December.

PIRSA general manager of the fruit fly response, Nick Secomb, said control methods – including the release of sterile fruit flies – would continue in the Renmark West and Pike River zones.

"Summer months typically see an increase in fruit fly detections due to the warmer weather," Mr Secomb said.

"The Riverland eradication program currently under way will now be extended to address this detection, including sterile fly releases.

"If you live near the detection site, you may also be visited by our fruit fly officers in orange overalls to check your fruit for signs of fruit fly.

"Special arrangements for the movement of commercial produce will continue, and now we are approaching citrus season, unfortunately the 6 May end-date will impact citrus growers in the affected area."

# **Local clinics to administer Novavax**

NOVAVAX Covid-19 vaccines are beginning to be rolled out through Riverland general practices and pharmacies, with the jab becoming available in South Australia from this week.

Renmark and Berri medical clinics have both announced they will offer the jabs, while pharmacies in Berri, Loxton and Waikerie are listed as Novavax clinics on the federal government's vaccine clinic finder.

Premier Steven Marshall said about 40 GPs and pharmacies, plus three state government-run clinics, would distribute the vaccine across

"It is important for South Australians to take every

opportunity to receive a Covid-19 vaccine which is why we continue to provide access to Covid-19 vaccines across our state, utilising supplies provided by the Commonwealth Government," he said.

"This is another opportunity for South Australians who are yet to be vaccinated to protect themselves, their family, their work colleagues and the broader community – and is another weapon in our arsenal in the fight against Covid-19."

SA's chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said the arrival of Novavax meant South Australians have even more choice when it comes to getting vaccinated.

"It is important that South Australians are comfortable with the vaccine they receive," she said.

"It is wonderful that they can now choose between a number of different vaccines including mRNA vaccines Pfizer and Moderna and now the protein vaccine Novavax.

"Novavax is available for people aged 18 and over, so if this is the vaccine of your choice, please make an appointment as soon as they become available.'

Novavax vaccinations will be administered in two doses, at least 21 days apart.

CONSTRUCTION has started on new energy infrastructure, set to run through the Riverland, that is expected to save local homes \$100 per year on power.

Premier Steven Marshall and deputy premier Dan van Holst Pellekaan last week attended the commencement of construction for the power interconnector between South Australia and New South Wales – known as project EnergyConnect – in Robertstown, north of Eudunda.

ElectraNet interim chief executive, Rainer Korte, said the first transmission poles for the interconnector had now been installed.

"Project EnergyConnect is a key project of national significance that will help improve the affordability, reliability and security of electricity supply for South Australians and strengthen the national electricity market," Mr Korte said.

"Once completed and energised, Project EnergyConnect will deliver an expected annual bill saving of around \$100 for a typical South Australian residential power customer, while larger customers can expect greater savings, depending on their power use.

"Its route passes through high-quality renewable ener-



gy zones, facilitating the transition of more renewable energy into the national electricity market.

"In South Australia, the new interconnector will enable more wind, solar and battery projects to connect to the network."

Mr Marshall said when completed, the project would attract "billions of dollars" worth of renewable energy investments into the state.

"Project EnergyConnect is exactly the type of major economic investment that South Australia needs if we are to continue to lead the nation for economic growth and continue to grow job opportunities now and into the future," Mr Marshall said.

"Project EnergyConnect will be a freeway for renewable energy produced in South Australia and exported to New South Wales, reducing electricity prices and fuelling economic growth in both states."

"Importantly, it will strengthen the power grid, so we can securely add more renewable energy." Mr Korte said construction of the interconnector was expected to create more than 200 jobs for regional areas, plus an extra 250 estimated ongoing positions.

"Job opportunities during construction include civil workers, riggers, lines workers and related support teams," he said.

"To deliver the South Australian component of the project there will be about 600,000 hours of labour required during the two-year construction period.

"Construction in South Australia will use 15,000 cubic metres of concrete and over 11,500 tonnes of steel.

"There will be about 380 new transmission towers built and 2500 kilometres of new conductor installed in South Australia."

It is understood construction work in South Australia is expected to be completed in late 2023.

# Boarding school parents call for changes to Covid contact rules...

# 'Unworkable and unfair'



"UNFAIR" and "unworkable' Covid-19 close contact rules for boarding school students are forcing some Riverland parents to make snap six-hour return trips to Adelaide – and could ultimately impact their children's learning and mental health.

Under an SA Health policy, boarding school students are effectively regarded as household members of any Covid-19positive boarders, meaning affected students are sent home or immediately isolated in their rooms as close contacts.

Parents of boarders believe the requirements discriminate against their children, as "day students" are subjected to less restrictions, including in some cases Covid-19 testing, despite having the same risk of catching or passing on the

After being contacted by parents in his electorate during the first few weeks of the new school year, Barker MP Tony Pasin has written to SA Education Minister John Gardner, backing private school calls for changes to the close contact definition for boarders.


Loxton mother Michelle Pannell says her family has already been affected by the rules and predicts further impacts unless the current system is scrapped.

"We feel that if changes are not implemented to remove restrictions and allow boarding schools to operate properly it will have adverse effects on students of all levels but particularly those doing year 12 or year 12 subjects," she said.

"Further to this, it is causing a large amount of stress and anxiety and is a genuine concern in regards to mental health."

The SA Health rules have led to a nightmare start to the 2022 school year for Renmark mum Merridy Crook, who has already made four return trips to Adelaide to collect her Covid-free daughter.

"My personal issue... is that the school doesn't want students there

who are unwell to stay within the boarding house," she said.

"Pre-Covid, students would be managed as they would at home: see the doctor, get treated and rest in their rooms.

"I have driven to Adelaide four times in less than three weeks for minor illnesses, not Covid-related. I have told the boarding home staff that I cannot keep doing this, it is ridiculous.

"But they keep saying SA Health have suggested that all unwell students go home.

"The reality is children get sick often with minor illnesses."

Mr Pasin told Mr Gardner that directions governing boarding school students in South Australia were "unworkable" and could affect their learning.

"As there is no requirement on schools to provide a hybrid model of online and face-to-face learning, families of boarders are concerned that their children are missing out on the educational opportunities of

their classmates," Mr Pasin said.

"Along with the vast distances some families will have to travel to collect children who will then be required to isolate in their home. there is a real and disproportionate risk that some children will spend nearly as much time in isolation as at school."

Ms Pannell also said movement restrictions on boarders at her daughter's school – beyond the school's boundaries - were illogi-

"My confusion is why boarding school students are prohibited from areas outside the school for social and sporting purposes and tested three times a week when day students can travel in and out of the school grounds daily, socialise and attend sporting events anywhere, and are not tested, unless enforced by their parents," she said.

"It simply doesn't make sense, as the day students could easily spread Covid to boarders.

"This is not something I am

questioning boarding schools about, as they are doing a great job, but our health minister and politi-

Ms Crook's daughter is also subjected to some outside-school restrictions specific to boarders, plus a RAT three times a week.

While I don't mind the three RATs per week as a surveillance of the (students), it makes no sense when they are sitting in classes next to day students who are not being tested and are free to do as they please outside of school hours," she said.

'They need to test all students and teachers, not just the boarders.

"I feel that if a student tests positive, instead of isolating the students in the cohort, they should just increase surveillance on (these) students and let them carry on with their schooling."

Ms Crook said a fellow Riverland boarding mum reported her child returned a positive RAT last week and – if confirmed Covid positive - likely caught the virus from a day student in class.

"Hence why all students need to be tested, not just the boarders," she said.

SA Health advice states that:

"All boarders within a cohorting group will be considered 'household contacts' of a positive case in the boarding house.' Ms Pannell questioned why

South Australia has different rules to interstate. "Why (do) our rules for board-

ing houses vary from other states, despite Covid being a worldwide pandemic?" she said.

"My frustration is what detriment this will have on students in the future in regards to lost opportunities and year 12s or those studying year 12 subjects in regards to general disruptions; that it possibly will continue to effect boarding school students and boarding houses unless the rules change; (and) that the stress on students, staff and parents is detrimental to mental health."

# Water market reform one step closer

ENSURING the water trading market operates fairly for Riverland growers and irrigators was the goal of new recommendations recently presented to a federal minister.

Murray-Darling Basin states recently supported advice from water markets principal advisor Daryl Quinlivan - provided to Minister for Water Keith Pitt - regarding potential reforms of the temporary allocation market.

Mr Pitt said the recommendations would support the development of policies that minimised the potential for manipulation of the water market.

"A mandatory code of conduct for water market participants, measures to improve transparency of water market information, and changes to ensure a level playing field for all entitlement holders are some of the recommendations presented within the initial advice," Mr Pitt said.

"Importantly, there's a commitment to improve regulation to better protect against potential market manipulation and maintain confidence in the system.

"This is an important step in delivering water markets that operate more effectively and efficiently and don't burden users with unnecessary costs."

Mr Pitt said engagement with a water resource advisory group - including South Australian representative, and Renmark Irrigation Trust general manager, Rosalie Auricht – was integral

"State Governments have been and continue to be well engaged in the development of the advice," he said.

"Water markets give farmers a critical tool which enables them to manage their business enterprises.

This advice is a down payment on the roadmap that the principal adviser will deliver in June 2022.

"I look forward to receiving the final advice on how cost effective, practical reforms can be implemented to improve water markets for all users.'

# The music of Joni Mitchell at Barmera

A CASE of You: The Music of Joni Mitchell is a love letter to one of the most inspiring singer-songwriters of the Woodstock era.

Now in its sixth year of touring, the show is coming to the Bonney Theatre next month and creator, musician and performer Deborah Brennan can't help but think it's fitting that lyrics composed over 50 years ago still hold as much relevance today as they did back then: You don't know what you've got 'til it's gone.

"Against the backdrop of a post-pandemic world, Brennan connects the musical dots from Joni Mitchell's formidable body of work

– which echoed the zeitgeist of the turbulent 1970s – and crafts them into a memorable soundtrack of her own life

wrapped in a contemporary story of free-spirited travel, love and reflection," a spokesperson said. Delivered in a different

# Keeping it all in the family

FROM being the face of SA Health's early Covid-19 campaign, to playing an IGA supermarket shopper, and back to her Barmera roots.

Acclaimed actor Emma Beech's latest role is a major departure from those two uncredited, but high-profile TV/social media spots, but is deeply personal, funny and close to her heart.

Beech – born and bred in the lakeside town – wrote and acts solo in The Photo Box, which had its genesis in a clean-up of the Beech family home in Barmera, and the trove of photographs subsequently divided up between John and Betty's nine children.

Beech was performing in the State Theatre's 2019 production of Jasper Jones when she took possession of the photographs. She decided to open the box at a performance art night in Adelaide, sharing her candid, unscripted reactions with an audience.

Among the usual "embarrassing hilarity" of hairdos and frocks was a shot of her mother, taken aged 40, holding baby Emma, born eight years after the last of her siblings.

Beech was around the same age when she saw the photo, and the mother of five-year-old triplets herself. Suddenly struck by the unexpected parallels, the idea of The Photo Box sprung to life.

"The brief of the show is, 'What stories do each photo tell, and what stories would all those people in the photo tell?," Beech says from Adelaide, during a break in pre-show preparations.

"I thought it could be fun – and a bit of a Barmera expose."

To be staged at the Adelaide

Festival Centre early next month, the "direct address performance" has a simple, but engaging premise. After introducing the concept – then her family and friends – to the partially lit audience, Beech, 42, will turn her attention to the photographs.

"I talk through each of them,"

"And sometimes I do a little scene on stage where I'm playing everyone in the scene.

"Like, there's a scene in the hardware store, in Barmera, where (my brother) Pete is talking to a customer

"I'm the customer, then I'm Pete. So I just slip in and out of being those two people, then I slip back into being me.

"It's like I'm hosting a dinner.

"I do a whole Christmas story, about one of the big Beech family Christmases.

"We had one particularly bad Christmas and I tell the story of that one. It's brilliant.

"Then pretty soon I slip out and in and talk direct to the audience again."

Beech's life journey will also feature in The Photo Box.

"I do my family half the time, then I've got my 20s when I went a bit rogue, then back into my childhood," she said. "Because I tell so many different stories it needs to have a light touch." Promotion for The Photo Box says the 90-minute show is about a town "where everyone knows you and a girl left to make her own mistakes and grow herself up".

"Family, choices, memory and myth-making, and how the baby of a big Catholic brood became devoted to the search for unsentimental truths."

The Photo Box is at the Space Theatre, Adelaide Festival Centre, from Thursday, March 3, to Monday, March 7.

# **0** years of Chigros memories and stories

REACHING a milestone anniversary of 50 years in business is no small feat, and one Renmark business owner has many loyal customers and memories to show

Chigros Motors is a family-owned business with a solid local reputation.

It was started in 1972 by John Chigros. together with his father Andy, mother Joan, and then-wife Diane.

Originally a repairs workshop located on Ral Ral Avenue, the business moved to its current location on the corner of Renmark Avenue in 1990, taking the place of the old Golden Fleece service station.

At the time, the business was expanded to include a car lot on Kay Avenue, Berri.

This lasted about a decade before Mr Chigros decided the time and energy was better focused solely on the Renmark

Mr Chigros said he was simply taking it 'day by day".

'It's great being able to be here for 50 years, especially in the current circumstances," he said.

"(In the early days) people followed us as motor mechanics, panel beaters and spray painters, with a wrecking yard. Then we added the used cars."

Mr Chigros said the secret to being successful throughout the years was making sure he offered what customers needed.

"First, we had our trades, but we had to have the initiative to follow what was in demand at the time as far as used cars and the wrecking yard was concerned,' he said.

The last 50 years have not come without trials and tribulations, including surviving a fuel shortage in 1979, the costs associated with the rise in inflation, and the recession in the late 1980s.

"(During the fuel shortage) the cities panicked and people sold their sixcylinder and V8 cars, but in the country we kept buying them and were able to get the larger cars a lot cheaper.

"You had to be on the bandwagon to follow the markets all the way through. The Commodore had just come out, so we were buying six-month old cars... it was quite an era."


Chigros Motors survived through many changes in the industry.


"Some you saw coming, and some you didn't," Mr Chigros said.



selling okay, but we had to try to keep the cashflow invested into the stock."

Mr Chigros said he had few regrets or things he wished he did differently.

"There are businesses that have done a lot more than I've done, but you have to have courage to go that far," he said.

"I was offered a lot of dealerships, like Toyota, Ford, Hyundai and Suzuki, but I declined because there are good and bad models.

"We've just stuck to reliable models so

we don't have warranty work, and people come back. That has really paid off."

After 50 years, Mr Chigros still enjoys the customer service side of the business.

"I still enjoy selling vehicles, and the good times where the customer is excited buying the car as well," he said.




Andy Chigros said the Queen never paid the bill.

Mr Chigros said one of his car-related highlights over the past 50 years was


driving a newly purchased armoured vehicle, a "scout car", down Adelaide's Grand Junction Road.

because the police came to check it twice," Mr Chigros said.

These days, when he's not selling cars to the Riverland community and beyond,

most of Mr Chigros' hands-on work is dedicated to building and restoring boats.

He is heavily involved in the Riverland Dinghy Derby, with 41 years of experience, trophies and a feature in an international Red Bull campaign in 2014 to show for it.

"They came roaring in with their cameras and fancy lighting," he said.

"It got Renmark and the Dinghy Derby on the world scene.'

since he was 15, said he still enjoys working on cars and helping customers.


"Just the satisfaction of fixing (the cars) when they've got a problem, and being able to diagnose it and sort it out to get them back on the road," he said.


"I like the interaction with the local customers and being able to help them - explaining to people who don't know what I'm doing in layman's terms so they've got an actual idea of what they're paying for.

# Riverland town to star in tourism podcast

STORIES about Waikerie and its art scene will feature in a podcast to promote the area to tourists.

The podcast will be produced by geo-located podcasts company Storytowns, which works with local councils, government, and tourism organisations to promote regional and rural towns.

Storytowns' founding director Jarrod Pickford visited key tourism sites around Waikerie last week and also met with some of the town's local identities to gather material.

On Monday, Mr Pickford visited Waikerie's Silo Art site and spoke to Waikerie author and artist Liz Frankel, who co-ordinated and obtained funding for the silo art project in 2017.

"Most locals might see the bins, but not actually see the story behind it, so I was able to speak to Neville," Mr Pickford said.

"Apparently these bins have been here for many years, they had fibreglass ones beforehand."

Waikerie historian Meredith Arnold spoke to Mr Pickford about the history behind the Dr Cecil Lucius Strangman Chinese testimonial banner displayed at the Waikerie Visitor Information Centre.

Mr Pickford said the podcast will feature Mrs Arnold telling him the story behind the banner, as they look at it through a magnifying glass.

Waikerie-born former Adelaide Crows premiership player and radio presenter Mark Ricciuto will narrate the podcast, which will be launched on March 13 when the River Fringe festival begins in the region.

The River Fringe is being presented by Loxton Waikerie council.

Rain Moth Gallery chairperson Karen Richardson said the Waikerie-centric podcast would benefit the whole community by promoting the area to tourists.

"It will highlight a lot of hidden secrets we have in our town that locals are unaware of too," she said.

"When you see the chil-

dren's faces light up, when they see Santa, it is brilliant."

Ms Centofanti said Santa's Cave at Waikerie had become a popular tourist attraction.

The acquisition of a Covid-friendly chair, funded by Loxton Waikerie Council, last year, enabled Santa Claus to return to his Waikerie home after restrictions in 2020 forced his visits to be cancelled.

Ms Centofanti said numbers were back to normal last Christmas.

She said tourists from all over Australia come to see Waikerie's Santa's Cave and many are regulars who are amazed by the displays.

"Their mouths just drop open and they can't believe how we set it up every year differently," Ms Centofanti said.

The AGM will be held at the Waikerie Community Meeting room, near the Waikerie Men's Shed, on Monday, February 28, at 7pm.

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





# Mid-Murray's \$167k firefighting boost

THE Mid-Murray Council has received \$167,250 from the federal government to improve firefighting infrastructure and water-access points across the dis-

The money has been allocated through the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery grants program.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the 2019-20 bushfire event highlighted the urgent need for water access points and supply.

Mr Pasin said the funding would provide a fire tank within the scar area and a supplementary water source access point at a separate location.

He said the money would also be used to upgrade a community facility and include a toilet amenity refurbish-

Mr Pasin said the project would provide "an essential water source provision" for future firefighting requirements, while raising community resilience and engagement through the provision of essential infrastructure for the ongoing development and sustainability of the immediate region.

The program's overall funding has been boosted to \$390 million to further support communities around Australia to recover from the 2019-20 bushfires.

"As part of the \$2.1 billion National Bushfire Recovery Fund, the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants program is backing projects which the affected communities have said will best support their ongoing recovery,"

"The grants will fund a broad range of recovery and resilience projects, from social and community wellbeing right through to projects that support local jobs, small businesses and infrastructure.'

THANK you for providing your readers with a balanced opportunity and freedom to express views of public interest.

This is a policy absent from mainstream media in Adelaide I have experienced.

# **Bangka Island Massacre marked**

LAST Wednesday, February 16, 2022 marked the 80th anniversary of the Bangka Island Massacre.

On the morning of February 16, 1942, 22 Australian nurses, survivors of the sunken merchant ship SS Vyner Brooke, were marched into the surf by Japanese soldiers off Bangka Island, east of Sumatra.

The massacre represented one of the darkest chapters of World War II.

Sister Vivian Bullwinkel, born in Kapunda, was the sole survivor of the massacre.

After being shot, Sister Bullwinkel feigned death lying in the shallow bloodstained water until the Japanese troops had left.

Following her recapture Bullwinkel spent three and a half years as a prisoner of war before returning home to Australia at the war's conclusion


After leaving the Army in 1947, Sister Bullwinkel continued in a number of senior nursing roles and was awarded many honours, including the Florence Nightingale Medal.

She was also made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) and a Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (MBE).

On this 80th anniversary of the Bangka Island Massacre, I wish to remember all the women of the Australian Army Nursing Service – in particular Sister Bullwinkel and her courageous colleagues murdered at Bangka.

## **Rural health** training program coming to Berri

AN innovative program will be established in the Riverland to improve access to health services and provide training opportunities for health students.

Barker MP Tony Pasin announced on Monday Flinders University would receive \$1.94 million from the federal government to establish a new model of personcentred, multidisciplinary health training placements for the Riverland and Mallee Coorong (RMC) region.

Mr Pasin said Flinders University would work closely with RMC Local Health Network and Aboriginal Medical Services to provide 18 students each year the opportunity to partake in 4-6 week training placements, equating to 360 weeks of placements in local communities over the next two years.

"Additionally, Flinders will employ several local academic and administrative staff to work in the region, attracting and retaining the health workforce," Mr Pasin said.

Mr Pasin said the project would extend the Flinders' existing rural health training activities into new, more remote settings, plus provide a greater range of health professions.

Flinders will hold recruitment activities in schools to create career pathways for young health professionals.

The project works with local health services to create more placements for students from Flinders, University of South Australia, University of Adelaide, and TAFE SA.

"Flinders will extend collaborations with the local Aboriginal Medical Service, Moorundi, and multiple community and non-government health services providers," Mr Pasin said.

Students from indigenous and rural backgrounds will be given priority by Flinders University.

A house will be purchased by Flinders University for student accommodation in Berri, to actively encourage students to stay in the region and add to the overall rural experience.

## Regional students eligible for tertiary payments

RIVERLAND students may be eligible for up to \$5000 to assist with relocation costs while undertaking tertiary study this year.

To help school leavers moving from regional areas to study at a VET, university, or higher education provider, Services Australia offer the Tertiary Access Payment.

The Riverland is considered an outer regional or remote area, meaning students enrolled in full-time study can apply for \$3000 during the first semester and \$2000 during the second semester.

Eligible students can only receive the payments once, and only in their first year of study.

To be eligible, students must:

☐ Study a certificate IV or above

☐ Study at least 75 per cent of a fulltime load over an academic year

☐ Start their study immediately following the completion of year 12, or equivalent

☐ Be aged 22 or younger the day they start their tertiary course

☐ Have parents or guardians with a combined parental income limit under

Regional and remote students may also be eligible for other support payments such as Youth Allowance, ABSTUDY, rent assistance, fares allowance, student start-up loans and relocation scholarships.

Gutsche and Albrecht began to go to work and started to chip away at Parilla's total, with Loxton making it to the drinks break without losing another wicket.


Following the interval, the Tigers accelerated, with both batsmen looking settled at the crease.

Each RFL club has entered a team and all are ready to go, with a member of each side gathering at the Barmera-Monash Football Club to launch the season last Thursday

Fresh from a day at school, the kids donned the tribal colours they will be throwing on each Monday night for the next six weeks and joined each other in a brief kick

Many of the players in attendance had never met before, but all had plenty in com-

When asked which footballers they look up to, a chorus of "Erin Phillips" and "Chelsea Randall" rang out from the girls.

All of them want to play in the midfield, so they can get first hands on the ball and control the game.

Above all else, each player in attendance was beaming with excitement, stating they are keen to get out there and test themselves against the girls from the other Riverland clubs.

"To play against other Riverland teams is pretty cool," said Barmera Monash's Jessie Priest.

"I team managed Barmera last year and that was good, but I just wanted to be out

The competition is set to be ground-breaking off the field as well as on it, with a number of coaches stepping into the game for the

One of these is Waikerie coach Sarah Schiller, who by her own admission says she has "not a lot" of experience in footy.

"Not much, apart from taking Waikerie Primary School's football teams to competitions up in Berri," Schiller said.

"I've taken the boys and assisted them while we had a coach and I've taken the girls to the Crows Cup and we won that in Berri which was nice.

"Most of the girls in this team are the girls that I took to the Westies Cup and the Crows Cup so they've played together already.'

Schiller is an experienced hockey player and coach, but her motivation to try her hand at another code went far beyond just having an interest in footy.

The competition offers the girls a chance to play in a competition affiliated with the RFL without boys, something that Schiller is

"I just want to see the girls out there doing it and succeeding for themselves and not always having to be in a mixed team," she

"They actually can stand on their own two feet and have the skills and ability to be a strong group of girls by themselves.

"Often in the mixed teams they get pushed to the side a bit if they're not as strong as the boys so it gives them a chance to develop their own skills."

With the competition running outside of the regular RFL season, the participating teams have the chance to garner plenty of

Waikerie Football Club has played a vital role in ensuring the team is ready to go and Schiller is grateful for the support received from the Magpies.

"The Waikerie Footy Club has been incredibly supportive. I've had them ringing me all the time, making sure I'm all right and that the girls have everything they need,"

"They've been amazing and it's a credit to how they conduct themselves as a club.

"The senior women's team has been talking about not training on the Monday of the first game and coming to have a look at the under 15s game in Berri, so they're really

excited about it.

"Having it on the Monday night is a brilliant idea and getting them playing the game rather than just doing skills and drills, is going to help numbers grow even more.

The allure of other sports is just one thing Hogg believes is providing a barrier to participation, but by running the competition so "That was the main reason I got involved. but we only have about six players between the two clubs, so player-wise it's not great," early in the year on Monday night's, there is no overlap with the major winter sports.

Hogg also wanted to ease the thoughts of anyone who might think that football is too rough of a sport for girls of such a young

"I think there's a bit of a misconception of how rough the sport is," he said.

"I think it's only as rough as you make it and you don't need to be in a position where you're going to be hurt.

"It would be a good opportunity to have a go at a new sport, in a carnival-type atmosphere where there's no pressure to perform.

"There's no points, there's no gold medals, it's just a great opportunity to come out and have some fun and have a taste of the sport and see if it's for you.

"Even if it's just for one night, it's enough to say 'at least I've had a go at that'."

Both clubs will still field teams, with player sharing from the other RFL clubs a viable option to ensure that the show goes on.

Hogg stressed, though, that even coming out to a single training could be a good opportunity and will help aid the development of the girls that already want to play.

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
