Disappointment at drop in rural jobs

A SENIOR Riverland politician says declining regional employment rates illustrate rural areas need to be a higher state government priority.

Figures released last week by the Australian Bureau of Statistics show the number of unemployed people living in regional South Australia grew from 6500

in November, to 9300 in December 2024.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said further support was required to generate new jobs and apprenticeships in the Riverland.

“I don’t think it’s a coincidence that our regional areas unemployment rates are growing,” Mr Whetstone said.

“These figures provide yet more evidence that the Labor

Government is not interested in supporting regional South Australia.

“We need the government supporting initiatives that support training and employment, as well as more training and apprenticeship positions.

I have been calling on the Malinauskas Government to spend more in the Riverland and all regions to help stimulate our economy.”

Berri wharf causes steep concerns

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Berri local, David Moritz, has labelled the Berri wharf as "unsafe" for the Riverland community, concerned a lack of ladders, lifebuoys, safety rails, and deteriorating concrete could "cause a serious accident."

"There are no ladders because (the council) doesn't want to interfere with the houseboat-mooring space," he said.

"But, if someone was to fall from the edge, they would have to try to pull themselves out from the water and the distance between the water and (concrete

lip) of the wharf is almost 1m — I don't think I would be able to reach the top, let alone get myself out.

"There are also no lifebuoys available.

"I have been told that is because they 'go missing' due to public-misuse, but I really don't think that is a good enough reason to not have one available on the riverfront.

"The concrete steps are also a real problem as they have no safety railing... and further along, the swimming steps are in a state of disrepair and not sound.

"All of the steps are really steep and could be really dangerous for all our community, especially the elderly — it's meant

to be a community space, so it should be accessible for everyone."

Mr Moritz said he was "frustrated" regarding the length of time council had taken to respond to his concerns.

"I first raised my concerns in 2019, when the wharf was being built," Mr Moritz said.

"I could see that there were some safety problems that were not being considered at all.

"I also wrote an email detailing my concerns in December 2023, but never received a response.

"It's disappointing that I have had to keep asking — it makes you feel like a bit of a pest, but I think this is really important."


Tim Pfeiffer said several elected and staff members were "activity working with Mr Moritz" and were "aware of (his) safety concerns regarding the Berri wharf and surrounding area".

"Late last year, council undertook a risk assessment of the Berri wharf and surrounding area," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"Council is now working through actions from the risk assessment to ensure the area meets safety requirements."

Mr Moritz said while he is still concerned for those using the wharf in its current state, he said he feels positive about future council efforts to make the riverfront safe once more.

"I just hope something comes from it this time," he said.



Without ladders available at the wharf, Mr Moritz said the "almost 1m" distance from the concrete edge to the water would be almost impossible for someone to pull themselves back up onto.

Wendy's netball legacy earns an OAM

BERRI woman Wendy Gambling has been recognised for a lifetime of service to Riverland netball, with her commitment to the sport and its players as an administrator and volunteer earning her a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) as part of the 2025 Australia Day Honours.

Announced as an OAM recipient on Sunday, Ms Gambling, 81, said she was feeling "very emotional and very proud" after receiving such momentous recognition.

"I have always had a passion for helping young people in sport," Ms Gambling said.

"It was always about helping them find a pathway to get better and excel — I wanted to make sure country kids had a chance."

Playing for her hometown, Ms Gambling's love for netball began when she was part of the Renmark Netball club as a teenager.

However, her allegiance soon shifted to Berri when she was married, becoming a dedicated member for the next 30 years of her life.

"Because I enjoyed playing the sport myself so much, I wanted to keep being involved and go further," she said.

Receiving her life membership in 1975, Ms Gambling was a coach from 1969 to 1982, while also umpiring, and organising countless working bees to raise funds for clubaoms, lights, resurfaced courts, and carnivals.

However, Ms Gambling's role in establishing the sport in the Riverland began when she became a member of the Riverland Netball Association, in 1969.

President in 1986, 1990, and 1994, receiving life membership in 1980, and patroness since 2009. As publicity officer, Ms Gambling has promoted netball for the past 57 years as a key voice on 5RM and ABC radio, a friendly face on WIN SA, from 1979 to 2012, and as score provider to The Murray Pioneer for 20 years.

Ms Gambling was also instrumental in implementing indoor stadium Friday night A1 games to lift the profile of players, coaches, umpires, sponsors, and competition for spectators, continually seeking sponsorships to televise grand finals from the early 1980s.

Becoming a Netball SA Riverland Representative and council member in 1985, only recently stepping down in 2021, Ms Gambling was also involved

with state netball as a SA country team manager, from 1985 to 1996.

A representative team manager 24 times with Country Championships, State Championships, Australian Masters and Central Masters Games, and World Masters Games in Brisbane, Mazda and Dairyville Cup series, and as representative team umpire. Ms Gambling's involvement also extended to being a convenor and selector of the SA Country Squad and teams for 15 years.

"One of my proudest achievements is receiving life membership with Netball SA in 2000," Ms Gambling said.

"That was huge to me, because I was the only country person outside of a 35km radius from Adelaide to receive it."

"Looking back, it's a great way to remember my involvement with state netball — lots of things happened in that journey, and what an amazing journey it was."

However, Ms Gambling's legacy and working with Netball SA is most notably seen in the establishment of a Murray Region Netball Academy.

Trials co-ordinator and Riverland delegate since 1997, Ms Gambling worked to establish a program in the local area to identify and develop young players in 2006, working to create a legacy of quality players and provide a pathway to progress to state teams and beyond.

The Netball Academy was a turning point for a lot of Riverland talent and a stepping stone for star players," she said.

"It's made them better players for higher competition, and most of our top players are now teenagers, rather than senior women.

"Although Netball SA stopped the program around the state in 2022, the skills have been well established in coaches, and can be passed onto players still.

"Our players are strong, dedicated, and known to work hard."

When speaking to The Murray Pioneer about one of the community's most-decorated members, Berri Barmera Mayor Ella Winnall said "Wendy's dedication to not only netball, but the whole Riverland community is commendable".

"Wendy embodies community spirit and is such a worthy winner of the OAM honour for her dedication and passion within the Berri Barmera and wider community," she said.

"There wouldn't be many local

sportspeople who don't have deep respect for Wendy and all she has done."

With almost far too many to name, Ms Gambling's volunteer and community efforts throughout her life also include:

- Gymnastics coach at Paringa and Berri Riverland Youth Clubs for 15 years.
- Riverland Special School netball coach for five years.
- Former Masters Netball Club team manager.
- Riverland Recreation and Sports forum member, 1995 to 2000.
- Riverland Junior Sports Award chair, since 2006.
- Sportsperson of the Year Award judging panel, since 2012.
- Appointed Justice of the Peace from 1989 to 2022.

Ms Gambling has also received a number of awards and recognition for her OAM to sit besides, including:

- Life membership with Paringa Youth Club.
- SA Recreation Institute Country Women's Award.
- Riverland Contribution to Sport Award, 1982.
- SA Community Recreation, T.B. Prescott Award, 1983.
- Volunteer of the Year Award, 1996.
- Australian Local Hero, 2007.
- Berri Barmera Citizen of the Year, 2007.

Though still currently found on 5RM on the Saturday morning program, The Sideline View, Ms Gambling said she thinks 2025 might be her final year as public-

ity officer for the Riverland Netball Association.

"It's been a marvellous experience, and it makes me so proud to think I opened up pathways for young Riverlanders," she said.

"Young ones have kept me volunteering all these years, and it always makes it worth it when I see them on the court — many of them have been outstanding players who have now been able to go to state teams."

"I would do it all over again, I have enjoyed every moment."

To the first lady of Riverland netball

THE fact Wendy Gambling will leave a sizeable hole in the Riverland netball scene if she steps back from her duties at the end of 2025 – as she all but confirms in today's Murray Pioneer – underlines this remarkable woman's ongoing commitment to the sport.

However, her volunteer work over the decades has already helped to ensure the sport will survive and thrive locally well into the future.

Without Wendy, who knows where Riverland netball would be, but it is safe to say it would be less prominent, less stable, and have lower participation numbers.

Wendy has achieved just about every honour available to a country sports administrator, plus a few – like being made a life member of Netball SA – that normally elude those living beyond metropolitan borders.

Her latest accolade, an Order of Australia Medal, is a neat and entirely appropriate way of both summarising her exhaustive list of achievements and simply saying 'well done'.

The scores of people who have dealt with Wendy during her life, particularly regarding netball or other sporting matters, will have found her warm, pleasant, incredibly helpful, but also strong-willed when necessary.

This determination and sense of purpose has propelled many of the success stories outlined in her lengthy list of achievements.

And on occasion Wendy has been unafraid to swim against the tide and stand up for what she believes is right, despite criticism – from inside and outside the Riverland netball fraternity.


One example has been her efforts to explain that local football and netball programs can never align completely, in the manner of some other country SA regions. Over-simplified arguments to the contrary – that ignore factors like Renmark having nearly four times the population of Waikerie – were met with a patient, but firm response.

Likewise her dogged belief that Friday night netball would elevate the sport's profile in the Riverland was met with resistance from some quarters, but has proven to be the right call.

However, mostly Wendy has been a wonderful worker and organiser: one of those people who gets things done. The Murray Pioneer has benefited enormously from Wendy's untiring efforts over the years, from providing weekly reports, to organising excited team members for premiership photos, to ensuring presentation nights run smoothly, and informing us about junior achievers – and everything in between.

Clearly her volunteer work has been a true labour of love. She has done herself and her sport proud and has truly earned the unofficial title of 'the first lady of Riverland netball'.

THE YEARS GO BY



Printed button badges first appeared in England around the time of Queen Victoria's Jubilee in 1897. Printed on thin metal, they were covered by celluloid, a clear plastic derived from cotton and invented by John Hyatt in UpState New York, in 1869. These replaced more expensive cast metal, or enamel badges. During WWI, the buttons, used to raise money for the war effort, were sold from trays during meetings, on trams, buses and at railway stations and rallies. It became not only fashionable, but patriotic to show on your lapel that you supported various military units, hospitals, nurses or other noble causes. The

Loxton Historical Village has a collection of badges including Bookpurnong School's Arbor Day on 29 August 1923, Loxton Jubilee Celebrations in October 1945, and those in last week's Murray Pioneer 'The Years Go By' column about Australia Day Celebrations in Loxton. (Australia Day was first celebrated by all States, on 26 January in 1935, 90 years ago). The present two examples feature a river scene with a passing paddle-steamer, at Moorook, for Red Cross Day in 1918, and a button badge of Renmark Citizen's Bandstand to celebrate Renmark's Jubilee in 1937. Albanese's Forgotten Patients

SIR Robert Menzie's 'forgotten people' is a term that has stood the test of time. It is as true now as it was back in the 40s that the struggles of hardworking middle Australians are often overlooked when it comes to government support and the rhetoric of politics.

Right now, it is these Australians who are struggling to make ends meet amongst the pressures of Labor's cost-of-living crisis. Their mortgages are skyrocketing, just the same as their energy bills and their grocery costs. Household budgets are being squeezed to the last drop.

When it comes to healthcare, I would argue that it is these Australians who are the forgotten patients.

For working Australians in particular, it has never been harder or more expensive to see a GP than it is right now.

We know that the rate of GP bulk billing has dropped dramatically under Labor's watch. The Government can sugar coat their tripled bulk billing incentive, which targets children and concession card holders, all they want – but the reality is that the rate remains 11 per cent lower than when the Coalition left government.

But it is even worse when you look at the accessibility for hard-working Australians. A recent report from the independent organisation Cleanbill found that only 20.7 per cent of GP clinics across the country will bulk bill a new adult patient without a concession card.

It is those patients, who are

not eligible for a concession card and cannot get access to bulk billed appointments, who are now facing the highest out-of-pocket costs on record.

In fact, according to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, patients are now paying 45 per cent more in out-of-pocket costs under the Albanese Government.

It is clear that the gaps in the system have widened, and more and more struggling households are falling through the cracks.

This is forcing Australians to make the difficult decision to avoid seeing their doctor because they just cannot afford it. In this cost-of-living crisis, every dollar saved counts.

According to Cleanbill, more than 1.5 million Australians chose not to go to the doctor in 2023-24 because they were concerned about the cost.

This is a 25 per cent increase on the year prior, and the health implications of this rising figure are extremely concerning.

This is not a choice that Australian households should be faced with.

Anthony Albanese was elected on a platform of "no one left behind" – but this is clearly another broken promise as millions of hardworking Australians are being left behind.

It is time that Albanese's forgotten patients are supported to access the healthcare they need.

Bullying and back to school time

One of the most significant concerns, according to Kids Helpline, continues to be bullying.

The impacts of bullying can lead to low self-esteem, health problems, poor grades and tragic outcomes.

In the last 12 months, over 3000 (5 per cent) of Kids Helpline counselling sessions were directly related to this issue, highlighting the need for more intervention.

Australia ranks second highest for teen bullying among 24 OECD countries. Unfortunately, one-in-seven young people, aged 10 to 14, expressed thoughts of suicide when they made initial contact with Kids Helpline counsellors relating to bullying in 2024.

Disappointment at drop in rural jobs

A SENIOR Riverland politician says declining regional employment rates illustrate rural areas need to be a higher state Government priority.

Figures released last week by the Australian Bureau of Statistics show the number of unemployed people living in regional South Australia grew from 6500 in November, to 9300 in December 2024.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said further support was required to generate new jobs and apprenticeships in the Riverland.

"I don't think it's a coincidence

that our regional areas unemployment rates are growing," Mr Whetstone said.

"These figures provide yet more evidence that the Labor Government is not interested in supporting regional South Australia."

"We need the government supporting initiatives that support training and employment, as well as more training and apprenticeship positions. I have been calling on the Malinauskas Government to spend more in the Riverland and all regions to help stimulate our economy."

"We, yet again, urge the (State)

Government to invest more into our Riverland economy, where it is so obviously needed."

However, Treasurer Stephen Mullighan said long-term figures showed a decline in regional South Australian unemployment.

"Since the State Election, in March 2022, the number of unemployed people in the regions has dropped from 11,200 to 9,300, according to latest data from the ABS," Mr Mullighan said.

"Over the same period of time, more than 52,000 jobs have been created across the state, around 15 per cent of them in the regions."

"While South Australia's unem-

ployment rate increased by 0.3 percentage points to 4.2 per cent in December, this was due to an increase in participation."

"The current total jobs count is the second highest in South Australia's history, only behind October 2024."

Opposition treasury spokesperson Sam Telfer said issues surrounding unemployment had negative impacts throughout regional towns.

"Regional South Australians are grappling with rising unemployment, which has significant ripple effect on communities as a whole," Mr Telfer said.

"It's extremely disappointing that this Government has failed to provide and deliver an economic plan for our regions – making me wonder what the future holds for families living outside of Adelaide."

"Unemployment in South Australia is not just a problem impacting those in the regions, we're now seeing the number of unemployed youths across the state grow too, which is extremely concerning."

"Whether it's inflation, electricity bills, water bills or unemployment, the economic climate in South Australia continues to decline."



Merle celebrates her century

RENMARK woman Merle Havelberg celebrated her 100th birthday last week, marking a lifetime full of family, friends, hard work, and helping others.

Born on a farm in the west coast of Denial Bay, Ms Havelberg (nee Kloeden) has spent a century in South Australia, living a life "that was very busy right from the start".

"I was one of five children, and (spent my childhood) taking care of my (younger) brother and mother after she developed epilepsy from a horse fall," Ms Havelberg said.

"However, (that experience) really taught me how to give love to others and share

kindness — I think that's why I have always tried to help people whenever I could."

Moving to Whyalla as a teenager, Ms Havelberg got work at a local stationary shop before meeting her husband, Ralph.

Courting for five years until they were each 21 years old, the two were married during WWII in 1947 and soon had four children: Adele, Bethne, Mark, and Virginia.

While raising her children, Ms Havelberg worked jobs in the early morning to support her family.

"My husband and I were a team," she said.

"I worked at the Whyalla Hospital as head chef for fourteen years, and also the local

bakery — I would have to be up at 3am and working most mornings.

"I would then come home, and Ralph would head out to work."

As a hard and efficient worker, Ms Havelberg was always promoted to the top and head positions throughout her career.

"I was on the go all the time," she said.

"I just really loved to do my best."

Following her children to the Riverland when she and her husband retired in 1989, Ms Havelberg excelled in the Renmark teams for golf and lawn bowls.

"I used to get my photo in The Murray Pioneer all the time because I used to beat a lot of people," she joked.

Reflecting on her life, Ms Havelberg said her highlights included working with her good colleagues at the Whyalla hospital, sports, and her Christian values.

With 46 years at the St James Lutheran Church, in Whyalla, and another 35 at the St Johns Lutheran Church, in Renmark, Ms Havelberg said she has gained and built a great community from her faith.

"One of the two events for my birthday was at the church," she said.

"I felt like the queen, everyone was so kind and wished me happy birthday."

Joining more than 40 family members and friends at the Paringa Hotel, last Sunday, for her birthday celebrations, Ms Havelberg said support from those closest to her and "putting her faith in God" has helped her live a long and happy life.

"It was a lovely celebration," she said.

"I have received so many birthday wishes — even from the King and Queen and (Australian) Prime Minister."

"I am excited to be going through and take my time reading them all."

Wilson Street building update

INVESTIGATIONS to determine the structural integrity of Berri Barmera Council's former principal office are continuing, with further assessments under way.

An external engineering report into the former principal office, 19 Wilson Street, Berri, was undertaken in 2022, which identified structural concerns leading to Berri Barmera Council's office relocation to 5 Riverview Drive.

A second and more in-depth report was completed by a different engineering firm in 2024, following the appointment of Berri Barmera Council CEO Tim Pfeiffer.

Mr Pfeiffer said the second engineering report identified only minor building movement.

"Ensuring the safety of elected members, staff and community members is always of the most critical importance and cannot be compromised," he said.

"At the recommendation of the second engineer, the building is now undergoing a thorough spot-level survey to accurately capture the current degree of distortion within the existing concrete slab, referencing an external benchmark."

"Surveyors commenced their initial survey in October 2024, with the next survey scheduled for March 2025."

"This survey will determine whether there is movement/distortion within the slabs."

Beri Barmera Council elected members were presented with the structural investigation and assessment update at last night's monthly meeting.

"Once the next spot-level survey is complete, Council will be armed with better information that can inform future considerations for the 19 Wilson Street site," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"Progressing the strategic assessment of 19 Wilson Street is an absolute priority."

Along with the thorough spot-level survey, the second assessment also recommended an underground plumbing assessment, crack repairs and roofing/downpipe repairs.

"Further works will be undertaken once the result of the spot-level survey is known," Mr Pfeiffer added.

"We have been listening to the feedback from the drought roundtables held across the state with key regional stakeholders and the advice received from the Drought Advisory Group.

"These truckloads of hay will provide some immediate relief and we encourage farmers to explore the assistance available in

the drought support package to help upgrade infrastructure and strengthen the ability to tackle the challenges of drought."

Aussie Hay Runners founder Linda Widdup said "this is more than an act of charity, it's about people coming together to ensure we all survive this drought with the least possible damage to our farmers and small rural towns".

"We couldn't be prouder working alongside the South Australian Government, and we wish to acknowledge and thank everyone who has been involved in making this run happen – and believe me, there's been a lot involved," Ms Widdup said.

"As always, our reputation is of utmost importance to us and every single bale is top-quality oaten or wheaten hay with the highest nutritional value possible, it's so fresh, it's just been baled."

"Aussie Hay Runners are extremely proud to help farmers, it's not a handout – it's a hand up."

Government welcomes AEMC ruling on South Australia's energy security

THE potential use of mothballed energy generators is aimed at ensuring reliable supplies to South Australia – including the Riverland – in the event of a future gas shortage.

The Australian Energy Market Commission (AEMC) last week confirmed a decision allowing mothballed South Australian generators to be used if required to provide temporary backup supply, in the event of a future gas shortage.

Utilities operator Engie last year mothballed the 63MW Snuggery, 75MW and Port Lincoln peaking generators, ahead of their permanent closure in 2028.

Minister for Energy Tom Koutsantonis said the change

would allow additional capacity to be returned to the system if required in the event of a load-shedding scenario, prompted by a shortage of available backup gas.

"The State Government makes absolutely no apology whatsoever for moving forthrightly to secure appropriate backup generation that ensures there is consistency of supply in the event of a gas shortage," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"I am glad the AEMC has agreed to our request to grant the South Australian Government authority to direct Engie to utilise two currently mothballed power stations... if required between now and when the long-delayed interconnector to New South Wales

comes online.

"The strong intent is that this safety-net need never be used – but it is simply common sense to ensure we have every available lever to pull in the event of a gas shortage."

"The last thing we want is a future scenario where the market operator institutes load shedding and we have additional capacity sitting idle, unable to be switched on."

Mr Koutsantonis said the AEMC had identified potential reliability gaps across South Australia in the coming years.

"Our system relies on gas as a backup to cheaper renewables," he said.

"In any system, it makes sense to back up thermal generation – and the backup for thermal generation is diesel. This is not remarkable – almost every jurisdiction in the country has diesel capacity."

"This step, while welcome, would not have been necessary if the former Marshall Liberal government had not sold off our backup gas-fired generators when they were elected in 2018," he said.

"Between that disastrous penny-pinching move, which compromised South Australia's energy security to marginally bolster their budget bottom line, and their ill-fated decision to put all their eggs in one basket with Project Energy Connect – which has seen multiple

delays and blowouts on the NSW side of the border – the Liberals have left our state more vulnerable to future blackouts in the event of a gas shortage."

Mr Koutsantonis said "it is incumbent on a responsible government to plan for the worst while demanding reliability".

"As far as I'm concerned, every state should have sufficient capacity to look after itself first and not rely on other jurisdictions," he said.

"While it's unlikely to be used, that's why we sought the ability to bring in this additional generation if it is ever necessary."

Leah's skills supporting Waikerie Medical Centre

SUPPORT from a nurse practitioner is ensuring more local patients at the Waikerie Medical Centre can receive treatment.

Nurse practitioner Leah Paley has since September been working at the Waikerie Medical Centre.

Ms Paley said using her previous experience to benefit Riverland patients – and support local doctors – was a goal.

"We have the ability to assess, treat, diagnose and prescribe for patients," Ms Paley said.

"We see minor injuries and illnesses for patients of all ages. We work collaboratively with doctors, but we're also able to work autonomously."

"I started by completing a Bachelor of Nursing, and worked at Modbury Hospital for 18 years, then I did a Certificate in Emergency Nursing, a Graduate Certificate in Emergency Nursing, a Masters of Advanced Practice, and my Masters of Nurse Practitioner."

Waikerie Medical Centre GP Ken Wanguhu said with a shortage of doctors in the community, Ms Paley's support meant more patients were being seen each day.

"It's a massive help," Mr Wanguhu said

"We are very, very short of doctors at the minute. Where we would ideally have eight-to-10 doctors working full time, we have two partners working full time, and one working part time, who mostly works full time because she can't get the time off."

"We have two trainee registrars... where normally we would have three or four, and the others are people on the RACE program, who are junior doctors and trainee medical officers, who are just starting their journey into general practice, so the amount of work we have to do is very high."

"So to get a senior nurse practitioner that is very experienced and steps into the role, and hits the ground running, is a big plus. We're seeing a lot more patients every day."

Dr Wanguhu said Ms Paley's skills and previous experience were invaluable additions to the practice.

"Leah is still a nurse, and we have a shortage of nurses as well, not just doctors, so she's able to fill both gaps, and that's very unique," Dr Wanguhu said.

"She's been very good, (and) she's been very highly appreciated. For emergencies and on-call, she's made a huge difference."

"We would like to see (her scope of practice) expanded, so she can use her full skills."

Ms Paley said the experience so far working at the Waikerie Medical Centre had been personally rewarding.

"I'm finding in Waikerie, in rural and remote (areas), compared to a metropolitan emergency department, it's the same but different," she said.

"There's a lot more conditions I haven't been exposed to up here."

"I've been able to bring (my) experience up here, but I'm learning a lot from the doctors here, and they are all fantastic."

"I've received a lot of good feedback, thankfully. When patients can't get in to see their normal doctor, they are quite appreciative to come in and see me."

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Renmark Club

Day of Mourning service at Barmera Church

THE Day of Mourning service, led by David Badger on 25 January, attracted a good number of attendees from across the Riverland.

The haunting Wiyathul (Yearning for Place) music of Gurrumul Yunupingu set the atmosphere for the event.

We heard about the original Day of Mourning service, in Sydney, in 1938, when Yorta Yorta activist Willian Cooper called on Aborigines to observe a Day of Mourning on 26 January "concurrently with the white man's Day of Rejoicing to celebrate the 150th year of the coming of the white man to Australia". His hope was that this would draw attention "to the present deplorable condition of all Aborigines".

We heard about the events leading up to the Rufus River Massacre. After Charles Bonney and Joseph Hawdon pioneered the stock route from Sydney to Adelaide beside the River Murray in 1838, they were followed by a flood of others. By April 1841 at least 36 overlanding parties

had travelled the track, bringing with them about 480 people, 90,000 sheep and 15,000 cattle, plus horses, bullocks, drays, and goods through the territory of the Maraura.

Conflict erupted when the local Indigenous people attempted to protect their land and livelihood from the damage caused by the intruders. After several armed official and unofficial groups, sent to the area from Adelaide to 'solve the problem', were defeated by the Maraura, on 27 August 1841, a group of mounted police and volunteers attacked and slaughtered a non-hostile group at the Rufus River, near Lake Victoria.

We heard Bob Randall sing 'Brown skin baby', his own painful story of being taken as a child from his mother in Central Australia and placed in a mission off the coast of the Northern Territory.

Mr Badger read Kevin Rudd's foreword to the book 'Sorry and Beyond', by Brian Butler, where Mr Rudd urges Australians to maintain the practical efforts to make good the apology offered to



Make sure you get the best fuel prices

LOCAL and visiting motorists in the Riverland have been encouraged to utilise real-time fuel pricing data to save when at the pump.

Service stations in the Riverland are among those regularly targeted by Consumer and Business Services (CBS) to ensure with compliance real-time petrol pricing.

Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels said motorists filling up when prices are low rather than at the top of the cycle – often a difference of 30c to 40c per litre – could save an estimated \$486 each year.

"If you're planning a getaway... make sure you are getting the best priced fuel," Ms Michaels said.

"We know cost-of-living pressures are continuing to bite and using the real-time petrol price monitoring apps is the best way to ensure you're not paying more at the bowser than you should, with ACCC data revealing people can save more than \$400

annually by shopping around and buying fuel when it's cheapest.

"If the price at the pump doesn't match the price on the app, please report it to CBS."

RAA fuel expert Mark Borlace said under the fuel pricing information scheme, retailers are required to report their prices to a central database within 30 minutes of changing the price at the pump.

"A recent RAA survey found 53 per cent of drivers now shop around for fuel before they fill up – up from 22 per cent in 2021 – with more motorists making it a habit as cost-of-living pressures increase," Mr Borlace said.

"Use the RAA app to find the cheapest fuel near you, and in your destination if you're heading away."

Anyone who believes a service station is in breach is encouraged to report it to CBS by visiting the website (www.cbs.sa.gov.au/fuel).

Be fruit fly mindful while going back to school

DEAR Riverland residents,

As we approach another school year, I'd like to extend my best wishes to all returning students and teachers.

As you pack lunches, please keep in mind the guidelines for bringing fruits and vegetables to school.

Check the website (fruitfly.sa.gov.au/outbreak-map) if you're unsure whether you live or go to school in a red, yellow, or green area.

In a red outbreak area: Home-grown restricted fruits and vegetables cannot be moved from your property, but I encourage you to enjoy them at home.

In a yellow suspension area: Home-grown restricted fruits cannot be taken to a green area, including school, so please leave those behind.

In any area: You can move restricted produce if it's canned, cooked, dried, frozen, grated, or pureed.

Some delicious fruits and vegetables without restrictions include honeydew, pineapple, rockmelon, watermelon, carrots, beans, potatoes, and pumpkin. Please visit the website (fruitfly.sa.gov.au/restricted-produce) for more information.

Lunchbox ideas:

Fresh pineapple cut into chunks.


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

Applications open for regional events funds

RIVERLAND clubs and community groups seeking to stage events in the region are invited to apply for the Regional Event Fund 2025-26 Program, aimed at boosting regional SA visitation.

The funding, managed by the South Australian Tourism Commission (SATC), encourages development of new and innovative regional events, aiming to grow existing events, while driving tourism and boosting the regional economy. Funding is offered across two event categories: Established Event Funding and Development Event Funding.

Interested event organisers can apply for up to three years' funding of up to \$50,000 per year for an Established Event, and up to \$20,000 per year for a Development Event.

Minister for Tourism Zoe Bettison said “I encourage all those planning to host an event between September 2025 and August

2026 to look into applying for the Regional Event Fund”.

"This is an incredibly important initiative which helps bolster our event offerings across the state, in turn triggering potential visitors to commit to a trip and discover the best of our tourism regions," Ms Bettison said.

"The diversity of events supported each year through the South Australian Tourism Commission's Regional Event Fund perfectly demonstrates the strengths of our regions, and I look forward to seeing this continue through the next round." The Regional Event Fund is open for applications until 5pm, on 18 March 2025, supporting events staged between 1 September, to 31 August 2026.

Ms Tink is happy to see how her classes have evolved into regular sought-after performances by the women.

"They love dressing up, putting makeup on, and getting out there to perform," she said.

"They have costumes for every dance they do."

"It started off as an exercise class with dance steps for them to remember."

Ms Tink said it ensured this group of women were using their brain regularly.

The dance teacher usually travels to the

northern part of Australia for three months when the weather turns cold and her dedicated students still continue with their dances.

"They practice and send me videos and tell me what they are doing and surprise me with their dances when I come back," Ms Tink said.

Ms Tink's exercise dance classes began again for the year last week and are held every Tuesday from 10am at the CWA Hall at Waikerie.

New boating Strategy to boost water safety

A NEW state-wide strategy has been designed to help combat irresponsible and dangerous behaviour among boat operators in the Riverland.

The State Government last week released the South Australian Recreational Boating Safety Strategy 2025-2030, which outlines 25 key actions across five priority areas to improve safety on our waterways.

The strategy includes cracking down on dangerous jet ski behaviour, the introduction of new boat licence reforms, simplifying life jacket and safety equipment requirements, lower speed limits, increasing education, and expanding the use of technology, such as mobile apps.

Tragically, three lives are lost on average in South Australian waters each year from boating-related drownings.

The initiatives aim to support the State Government's target of reaching zero fatalities and harm among recreational boaters and other water users by 2030.

- With speed a common factor in boating trauma, speed limits will be lowered in areas frequently shared by people and vessels, and where there are bridges and locks.
- Swim-only and non-powered vessel zones will also be created, and jet ski riders will not be able to circle, weave or ride erratically near moored vessels and dwellings.
- Boating safety education will soon be expanded in schools across the area, at boat ramps, and through retailers who are often the first point of contact for people purchasing marine safety gear.

□ More webcams will be rolled out across the state, giving boaters an instant snapshot of weather, boating conditions and boat ramp traffic through a 24/7 live feed that can be accessed online to help them plan and predict risks.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said "heading out onto the water should be a positive and fun experience for everyone, but our waterways can also be unpredictable and dangerous". "With this landmark strategy, we hope to prevent future trauma by supporting and enforcing safer behaviours on the water, regardless of whether you are heading to the river, enjoying beachside waters or are offshore boating along the coast," Mr Koutsantonis said.

Other short-term actions include a new 1km shoreline restriction for Special Permit holders aged 12 to 15 years, providing them with an extra layer of safety. They also will need at least six months supervised on-water experience before they can sit for the practical test if they want to operate solo.

Boat licensing will also get a modern transformation, with an online education component being added alongside the current theory test - similar to obtaining a driver's licence - strengthening the learning experience. The strategy has recommended simplifying lifejacket and safety equipment requirements. Boaters in semi-protected areas will have the option of carrying electronic visual distress signals instead of flares, providing they have extra safety equipment onboard.

Mentoring program launches to support SA veterans

RIVERLAND military veterans and their families are encouraged to apply for a state-wide program aimed at assisting navigation of career and business pathways.

The State Government last week opened applications for the 2025 Veterans SA Career and Business Mentoring program.

Minister for Veterans' Affairs Joe Szakacs said the program "equips participants with critical skills for success", by connecting them with experienced South Australian business leaders.

"This program is an exciting opportunity for those within our veteran community to gain important skills and guidance as they transition to new careers or pursue opportunities beyond their military service," Mr Szakacs said.

"By connecting with leading industry experts and business professionals, participants can glean insights, gain valuable advice and expand their networks, enabling them to take their professional lives and careers to the next level."

"We also recognise the unique challenges many children of ADF families face when pursuing study and embarking on their own careers, impacted by frequent relocations and disruptions to schooling and education due to the nature of military life."

"This year we're thrilled to expand eligibility for the program and give adult children of veterans access to this unique opportunity to realise their own career goals."

2024 Veterans SA Career and Business Mentoring Program participant Katerina Blekic said the eight-week program is open to transitioning and former Australian Defence Force (ADF) members, reservists, Defence partners and – for the first time – veterans' children who are over 18 years.

"Being a Defence partner certainly comes with its challenges, in particular moving fre-

quently and having to switch jobs can leave you feeling unsettled and stuck in limbo," Ms Blekic said.

"I started to lose my confidence and I was seeking that growth and networking."

The Veterans SA Career and Business Mentoring Program was a real game-changer. It gave me the support I needed and set me on a clearer path professionally and personally.

Thanks to the support of my mentor, I was able to get my confidence back and step out into the defence community by moving into a new role within the defence industry."

Mentor applications are open to professionals from across the South Australian business community and have previously included former-serving ADF members wanting to give back to the veteran community.

2024 Veterans SA Career and Business Mentoring program mentor Amy Ormrod said participating in the program had been an "incredibly rewarding experience".

"As a long-term Defence spouse, I have first-hand experience of the difficulties that come with separating my life and career from defence," Ms Ormrod said.

"Fortunately, I've been able to successfully carve out my own career and be independent."

"That's why I think this program is so important because defence spouses are included. I was fortunate to be paired with defence spouse, Kat, and help her navigate some of those unique challenges and support her career growth and development."

What it means to be Australian

THERE'S many that have tried to define exactly what it is to be Australian, but it's hard to do, because we're a strange lot.

While Australia is a melting pot of multiculturalism, whose identity was initially defined by our British roots, we have evolved and continue to evolve to this day.

What we have become as Australians was, in a small part, what we initially built our country from, that romanticised notion of a wealthy country built off the sheep's back from some outback frontier, or to a greater extent, that of our young sons, forging our national identity with courage, hard work and mateship on the battlefields of foreign lands.

While our past still helps define us from what, and how we built this country over the last 220-plus years, it laid the foundations of who we are becoming as a people today, a country that is prepared to celebrate what we have built, but is also prepared to accept the mistakes of our past without having to be asked.

That's a country that knows itself and is comfortable with itself, who knows what's right and wrong.

Ultimately, Australians have become a laid-back but fair people, who have a sense of community and who understand if you're prepared to work for it, you can still make it here.

Australians will celebrate

those that have started from scratch and made something of themselves over those that have been born into privilege and wealth. It gives us a sense of hope to see the little guy get up from nothing, because it says to us all we can still make it here, and you still can too.

We're a laid-back people, ultimately because we're comfortable with ourselves and who we are, but also our great lifestyle.

You can live anywhere you want in Australia. You can enjoy the beach and you can still determine how much you want to earn to support the sort of lifestyle you want. To an extent, in aspiring for a better lifestyle in years past, we became more self-absorbed in ourselves, in our quest for a 'better life'.

However, I sense a shift in our country. I sense one that is slowly becoming more outward thinking, one more interested in each other and the communities we live in.

In the bush our communities are what have defined us and bonded us together from the beginning, but what we should also be proud of is that many of our suburbs across the country have re-engaged in that sense of local community more and more recently.

Whether it be through a sense of belonging, or sadly through a tragedy, or a local cause from an outsider, our suburbs seem to

be rediscovering that power of local community, looking after one another and giving back to a greater good.

I sense our cities are really re-embracing community more, not just because of tougher and uncertain times, but I have a purer belief that there is a rediscovery, that it not only gives us that sense of belonging, but it's the right thing to do.

Above all, I think our most endearing trait as Australians is that we're a fair people. While we normally remain laid-back and content with our lot in life and won't actively engage in the day-to-day running of our country, we still have a great sense of fairness when provoked.

Australians will express themselves when provoked to right a wrong, or if they perceive someone or something getting an advantage that the rest of us don't get, they'll engage. That's what gives Australia our balance in courting our country's future.

If Australians don't feel they can get a fair go, that their communities aren't supported or their lifestyles aren't being preserved, they're woken from their content and become a people prepared to demonstrate that with conviction.

That's what I believe it is to be Australian. It's not complicated, it's the simplicity we've created and the beauty of living in the greatest country on earth.

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Pasin in line for minister's role

Barker MP Tony Pasin will become a federal minister if the Coalition wins this year's election.

Mr Pasin was promoted to Opposition Leader Peter Dutton's shadow ministry last weekend, being appointed spokesperson for roads and roads safety.

It is a step up from his previous role as assistant spokesperson for infrastructure and transport.

Mr Pasin said he was "honoured" to join Mr Dutton's A-team and uniquely placed to be across his portfolio, given the size of his electorate.

"As someone who drives over 100,000km a year and who, as a local member representing primary industries (that) rely so heavily on road freight, I understand how important Australia's 880,000km of road network is to safely connect people and goods for our nation's economic prosperity," he said.

Mr Pasin also wasted no time targeting the Albanese Government's actions in the space since its 2022 Federal Election win.

"The Coalition left government handing over a 10-year, \$120 billion pipeline of infrastructure projects," he said.

"Unfortunately, the Alba-

nese Labor Government has not had the same level of commitment to Australia's infrastructure needs and has cancelled, cut and delayed almost \$30 billion in infrastructure funding since 2022.

"Our roads have deteriorated significantly under Labor, stifling productivity and exacerbating safety concerns.

"In fact, Australia's road toll now sits at well over double the target set in 2021 under the National Road Safety Strategy.

"Australia needs... renewed focus on roads and road safety. We need better insight into road trauma to ensure that road safety initiatives and infrastructure funding is being directed where it is needed

to address the road safety crisis that has been unfolding on Australian roads."

Mount Gambier-based Mr Pasin claimed Labor was "failing Australians on the efficiency, productivity and safety of our roads".

The elevation rewards Mr Pasin's polling results since being elected in 2013. At the 2022 election he was one of the Liberal Party's best performers, again being elected on first-preference votes alone, and earning 66.6 per cent of the two-party preferred vote.

Despite the comfortable victory, Mr Pasin suffered as a result of the 5.7 per cent national two-party-preferred swing against the Coalition, suffering a 2.3 per cent downturn on his two-party-preferred vote.

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Industry 'will survive Trump tariffs'

GrainCorp says it will cope with any fallout from new US President Donald Trump's tariffs.

Inaugurated last week, Mr Trump has threatened to slap massive tariffs on overseas goods in a bid to get the US economy back on track.

However, GrainCorp boss Robert Spurway said because food is a "very resilient" sector, the grain indus-

try would cope, one way or another.

"We've seen this before when tariffs were imposed on Australian barley by China," Mr Spurway told *The Australian*.

"It disrupted trade routes... (but) it opened up new markets in the Middle East, Mexico and elsewhere.

"We're very comfortable with our strategy, which is

to overcome adversity with diversification.

"The Australian agricultural sector has generally been very successful with that, and GrainCorp is leading the charge."

The Australian reported that GrainCorp experienced a 21 per cent drop in annual revenue to \$6.51bn with net profit plunging to \$61.8m from \$249.7m.



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



Waikerie/Ramco are in action at home against Monash.

Meanwhile, the A grade competition sees Renmark North play host to Parilla, and Berri welcome the Mallee Bushrangers to town, as the race to the finals series heats up.





Record investment rolling out to urgently build a skilled workforce

RECORD investment into the training of South Australian trainees and apprentices – including in the Riverland – is aimed at helping young people secure jobs in trades and professions the state needs.

The State Government earlier this month announced \$1.44bn in funding, on top of an additional \$880m from the Commonwealth, to “shore up workers in crucial fields”.

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said the investment would “ensure apprentices and trainees are being trained in the sectors South Australia needs

for the future of the economy”.

“We are injecting \$2.3bn, an historic increase in funding, to give South Australians the skills they need to secure the in-demand jobs that our state is calling out for,” Mr Boyer said.

“The Equipment and Capital grants program is critical to attracting and maintaining a pipeline of skilled workers to help meet our urgent housing, infrastructure, defence industry, care and energy skills needs now, and into the future.

“Through the Equipment and Capital Grant program,

we are ensuring that students can be confident their training facilities are contemporary and furnished with the most up-to-date equipment and technology available.

“This is part of our clear plan to tackle the skill shortage, get people into training, and ensure students are finishing their courses – and that investment in skills is where it matters most for areas of critical need.”

The skills investment rolling out this year focuses on five key areas:

- Ensuring training places are

available in areas of need.

- Making sure students complete their course.
- Having TAFE as the public provider at the centre.
- High-quality training and making sure apprentices are safe at work.
- Lifting the state’s skills level.

Over the next five years, the State Government will support 160,000 new subsidised training places, in areas of critical need, with a total \$225 million investment allocated for 2024-25 alone.

INGREDIENTS


- 200g unsalted butter, softened
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 cup caster sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 1/2 cups self-raising flour, sifted
- 1/2 cup milk
- Pink and blue food colouring
- 2 1/2 cups icing sugar mixture, sifted
- 3 tsp milk
- Yellow food colouring
- 100s and 1000s, to decorate



METHOD

1. Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan-forced) and line two 12-hole muffin pans with paper cases.
2. Beat butter, vanilla, and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Stir in half the flour, then half the milk. Repeat with remaining flour and milk.
3. Divide batter in half. Tint one portion pink, the other blue.
4. Spoon 1 tbsp pink batter, then 1 tbsp blue batter into each case. Swirl with a skewer for a marbled effect.
5. Bake for 15-17 minutes. Let cool for 2 minutes in pans, then transfer to a wire rack.
6. For icing, mix icing sugar with milk to make a spreadable consistency, tint yellow, and spread on cakes. Top with 100s and 1000s. Let icing set, then serve.


