Loxton driver blows 0.193

A RIVERLAND man has instantly lost his licence after being found driving nearly four times over the legal alcohol limit.

On Saturday 28 December, Loxton Police reported a 48-year-old man, from Loxton, for drink driving.

It will be alleged that he was driving a motor vehicle on Bookpurnong Road, at Loxton North, when he was stopped for a random breath test and returned a positive result of 0.193.

He was issued with a six-

month instant loss of licence and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

On Sunday 29 December, Murray Mallee Police reported a 62-year-old man, from Paralowie, for driving unlicensed.

The man was stopped at the Yamba quarantine station, and checks revealed he was unauthorised to drive. As a result he had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

On the same day, Berri Police stopped a car on Tapalin Street, at Renmark, for a ran-

dom driver test.

The driver, a 60-year-old man from Renmark West, was breath tested and he returned a positive result of 0.054.

He was issued an on the spot fine for \$951 and he accrued four demerit points. Checks revealed he was suspended from driving and he was subsequently reported for this, and his vehicle was impounded for 28 days.

All offenders will be summonsed to appear in Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

POLICE are investigating a weekend break-in at a Loxton motorcycle and chainsaw dealer.

About 3.15am on Sunday 5 January, offenders cut the padlock on the front gates of Loxton Motorcycle Centre, on Bookpurnong Road, before reversing up to the rear door of the premises.

"The offenders have then forced the rear door before stealing a quantity of Stihl chainsaws and Stihl gardening equipment," SA Police said in a statement to The Murray Pioneer.

"CCTV images show a light-coloured SUV



and three persons are seen to be involved in the break-in.

"The three persons are described as having heavy builds."

\$20.9m funding announced for Murray-Darling Basin water savings...

Where's the benefit?

SENIOR Riverland politicians have questioned the potential benefits of a multi-million dollar environmental plan to use treated wastewater – rather than Murray River water – to water public areas and “to supply some industries”.

The Federal and State Governments last month announced \$20.9m in funding to build infrastructure allowing local governments to substitute Murray River water with storm water, treated wastewater or other alternative water sources.

The program will generate an estimated water saving of 1270 megalitres, providing 1149 megalitres of South Australian Murray River high security entitlements, aimed to enhance environmental outcomes for the Murray-Darling Basin.

However, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said directly support-

ing Riverland irrigators would be a better use of taxpayer money.

“What we’re seeing is one rule for local government, one rule for SA Water, and another rule for irrigators,” Mr Whetstone said.

“My sums work out at \$18,189/ML for this infrastructure, (so) why aren’t they offering that to irrigation communities for infrastructure?”

“As I understand it, about 26GL of water flows out to sea every year from our treatment plants... yet they are going to line the pockets of local government to water parks and gardens with treated water.

“I would like to see that money

put into efficiencies, so we can help our farming communities.”

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti, said further details were needed on the potential outcomes of the initiative.

“It is good to see the state and federal Labor governments getting on board with the water-use efficiency measures that the Liberal Party has been calling on for the last two years,” Dr Centofanti said.

“The efficiency Measures Water Recovery Strategy was announced by the federal Liberal government under then minister for water, Keith Pitt, in March 2021, which instigated state-led programs to substitute Murray River water with treated stormwater and wastewater.

“There are clear benefits of this program reducing pressure on both irrigators and urban water users,

especially in dry periods, however, the comment that this will provide ‘1149ML of South Australian entitlements to enhance environmental outcomes’ is not clear if there will be a benefits to irrigators as well as environmental flows.

“Much of this work was started a long time ago, and the call for focus on water efficiency has been loud and clear from the opposition for some time.”

SA Minister for Environment Susan Close said “it is vital that our local governments are able to reduce the amount of water they draw from the Murray-Darling Basin through the use of alternative water sources”.

“This funding is a great example of the Australian and South Australian governments working together to support both local governments and South Australian res-

idents to secure our state’s future water supplies,” Dr Close said.

Federal Minister for the Environment and Water Tanya Plibersek said “improved and more sustainable infrastructure will deliver water savings now and will set us on a path to secure and sustainable water management in the future”.

“South Australia is home to two of our most important water resources – protecting these systems is an investment in Australia’s future,” Ms Plibersek said.

“I thank Minister Close and South Australia for working with us to deliver for their environment and their communities.

“I look forward to continuing to work with all our state and territory counterparts to ensure our water resources and our communities have a more sustainable future.”

Council votes for a mayoral apology

A RIVERLAND mayor could be forced to apologise to his council for remarks a fellow elected member has described as “inappropriate, offensive and insulting”.

A motion requesting Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton apologise to his council was moved by Waikerie-based councillor Kent Andrew at the council’s December meeting, and subsequently carried with a 5-3 vote.

The comments related to a discussion at the council’s October meeting regarding the Waikerie Institute.

At last month’s meeting, Mayor Norton declared a conflict of interest and left the chamber, leaving Cr Jody Flavel as the presiding officer when Cr Andrew moved his motion, which was seconded by Cr Clive Matthews.

Cr Andrew’s motion read:

“That Council request Mayor Norton apologise to Council for the comments he made at the council meeting... in relation to the current and ongoing water supply and disposal issues at the Waikerie Institute, which were inappropriate, offensive and insulting, by referencing a lack of

action from the former District Council of Waikerie.”

Cr Andrew previously raised the issue publicly at the council’s November meeting, via a question without notice.

The council’s minutes from the November meeting state that:

“Acting Mayor Flavel responded that the question relates to a personal matter and determined that the question was not required to be answered.”

Prior to the apology motion going to a vote last month, Cr Sonya Altschwager called for a division.

Councillors voted mostly down town lines, with Loxton-based councillors Altschwager, Mike Vowles and Craig Ferber all voting against the motion.

Waikerie-based councillors Andrews, Matthews, Ian Light and Gary Pfeiler all voting in the affirmative, along with Loxton North-based Michelle Hill.

The Murray Pioneer contacted Mayor Norton, who said he was currently unable to comment on the matter, while Cr Andrew – a former elected member of the pre-merger Waikerie council and mayor from 1991 to 1993 – provided the same response.

The Pioneer asked Loxton Waikerie CEO


David Beaton about the next step – specifically whether Mayor Norton would be forced to apologise, and if so when – and whether ratepayers could expect to incur any cost over the issue.

Mr Beaton declined to provide answers to any of the questions, but said some of them “are for the Mayor as to his actions”.

The Pioneer understands no deadline has been set for any apology to be issued.

Ian and Bryce in the Loxton spotlight

COMMITMENT to benefitting the surrounding community, and helping fellow Riverlanders, has seen two well-known locals recognised with major council awards.

Ian Cass was last month named as the 2025 Loxton Citizen of the Year, with Bryce Westbrook also named Young Citizen of the Year.

Mr Cass said following an example provided by his mother, and well-respected local figure, Jan, had led to the award.

"I was quite humbled by it, and I didn't

expect it at all," Mr Cass said.

"I was quite emotional and there was a few tears, because I was quite surprised, but it's a lovely honour to have.

"I had the ultimate teacher in my mother, Jan, who did so much, for so many, for so long. I learned from Mum."

Mr Cass' key achievements and contributions to the community include:

- Volunteer at the Loxton Agricultural & Horticultural Show Society.
- Participant in the TAFE On-Farm Training Scheme and Loxton TAFE Board member and student representative.
- Loxton student representative on the Riverland TAFE Council.
- Sheep convenor for the Loxton Show of 37 years and member of the Management Committee.
- Mallee Board member for the Local Action Planning and vice chairman for eight years.
- Wunkar Country Fire Service firefighter of 15 years.
- Participant of numerous working bees at the Loxton Lutheran School, and organiser and co-ordinator of the Lutheran School Continental.
- Backstage organiser for Rosie Clarke ballett concerts and Riverland Musical Society productions.
- Involved in Little Town production for 15 years.
- Played a large role in planning and writing for the Back to Wunkar 2001 book "Wunkar A Harvest of Dreams"
- Volunteer for Loxton Lutheran School plays and end of year concerts of 11 years.

□ Junior basketball coach of 10 years.

□ Helped restart the Loxton Garden Club as president.

Mr Cass said the contributions of volunteers were vital to keeping numerous local major events, and community and sporting groups operating.

"If people don't volunteer to do all this work, then events and sports won't happen," he said.

"Our society wouldn't have what it does without people going out of their way to do things.

"We don't want to see these things go... most country events rely on volunteers. We all work together as a group, and it happens.

"Loxton is such a wonderful community, and we support each other. There's so many people out there doing voluntary work to make sure it happens, and we need that to continue.

"There's a huge amount of hours over a year that go into all of those events, to make them happen, and without them, we wouldn't be as close a community."

Mr Westbrook said many relatives, friends and fellow locals had congratulated him on the award.

"Mum told me and I was very happy," Mr Westbrook said.

"My face was (beaming)... I feel so proud. My Mum wanted to ring my pop and nan, and all my friends, and they were all very impressed.

"Being in the community is amazing for me. People see me and say 'you're the happiest boy in the world', they wave and say hello, and know I'm happy because I'm smiling.

"I want to help people in the Riverland, to make them happy, and to help them respect everyone else in the Riverland."

Mr Westbrook has previously been the recipient of:

- Novita Client Government Achievement Awards 2024.
- Gold, Silver and Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award, received at Government House.
- Head prefect at Riverland Special School (RSS), recognised at Government House
- Woodbury Award (RSS).
- Gold Medal at the South Australian Para Secondary Schools Boys Cross Country.
- Gold Medal at the South Australian Special Olympics in Basketball and awarded best in tournament.

Mr Westbrook said contributing toward the community's benefit, and acting as a role model for others, had been personally rewarding.

"It's not about (winning awards), it's about helping yourself, and helping others in the Riverland," he said.

Meanwhile, Christmas Wonderland Loxton was named as Loxton Event of the Year.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said "these awards highlight the dedication, passion, and selflessness of those who work tirelessly to strengthen the connections that make our district so special".

"From community champions to devoted volunteers, the recipients of this year's awards exemplify the spirit of generosity and service that keeps our community thriving," Mr Norton said.

Clare, Nicola debate on tomato support

RIVERLANDERS have been urged to add more tomatoes to their summer diets, after “a bumper crop and some interstate restrictions” have resulted in a South Australian oversupply of the fruit.

A State Government announcement last month advised responses to the Tomato Brown Rugose Fruit virus (ToBRFV) outbreak had caused an oversupply of tomatoes in the state.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven encouraged consumers to take advantage of current low costs for tomatoes.

“We are currently at the peak of the tomato growing season and, as a result, there is an abundance of tomatoes on South Australian market shelves,” Ms Scriven said.

“I encourage consumers to support our local growers by including fresh tomatoes in as many dishes as possible over the coming summer months.

“The past months have been extraordinarily difficult for the tomato industry, with some interstate trading restrictions hitting growers

particularly hard.

“We have done everything we can to assist growers in meeting the certification requirements to access WA and Queensland markets as quickly as possible, including opening a dedicated lab here in Adelaide.”

However, Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for South Australia, Nicola Centofanti said a direct consumer campaign – similar to the 2018 ‘cut them up, not cut them out’ initiative in response to the discovery of needles in strawberries – was needed in order to support tomato growers.

“While I appreciate the Minister’s sentiment, talk is cheap and the Labor Government must put their money where their mouth is,” Dr Centofanti said.

“In fact, this does not even need to be new money. This campaign could and should be driven out of the government’s existing budget. Isn’t this what the Department of State Development exists for – to promote local products and industry?”

“Many growers are telling me their tomatoes are ripe and ready with

nowhere to go due to continuing delays in testing and they are worried that their crops will be wasted if not consumed locally.

“Good, targeted marketing campaigns work, and it is critical that the Government works in a timely manner to deliver a campaign that ensures our South Australian tomato growers survive into the future. The greatest support that all South Australians can give the industry is to keep buying tomatoes this summer.”

Ms Scriven said following successful containment measures, the State Government was “well on the way to achieving eradication of this virus”.

“If the virus had spread across the state and country, it would have devastating consequences on all tomato, capsicum and chilli growers every single year,” Ms Scriven said.

Refurnished Guide Hall opens its doors

THE Renmark Girl Guide Hall is close to completing an \$82,000 refurbishment, with the renovated space preparing to open its doors to long-term and new Riverland members of all ages.

Receiving a total of \$50,000 from the Department of Primary Industries and Regions in 2023, along with a \$4000 community support grant from Renmark Paringa Council, and a further \$28,000 from the Girl Guide SA Development Fund, the Renmark Girl Guide Hall has undergone major refurbishments over the past two years, with the local building reroofed and externally recladded.

While still waiting on a back veranda and front alcove to come, and with future plans for landscaping and a refresh of the interior space, Renmark Guide leader Emily Griggs said while the hall was “still an ongoing project” the organisation was excited for local members to enjoy the restorations.

Recently returning to the organisation after concluding her previous role as principal of Berri Regional Secondary College (BRSC), over the past two years Ms Griggs has become an active Guide leader and has seen the local organisation grow to 16 consistent members.

Joined by her daughter, Lillian, at the beginning of last year, Ms Griggs hopes girls and women across the Riverland consider becoming part of the Renmark, Berri, Barmera, or Special School Guide community, and enjoy the “vast” and “long-term benefits” of being a member or a leader.

“I was involved in Guides with my sister when I was a girl, and whether I knew it at the time or not, the skills and confidence I learned were fundamental in my growth (as a young woman),” she said.

“Coming back to Guides now, I have a much broader perspective and respect (for the organisation).

“As a young girl, you do not understand deeply how important it is to develop such confidence and capabilities — it is an organisation that helps young women build courage, empowerment, confidence, and develop a range of skills so they can be active citizens and leaders in their own life, as well as in their community.

“Lillian has been able to meet new peo-

ple and learn real life skills since joining Guides last year... and it’s such a special thing to be able to do together.

“Guides creates important memories.”

The last of its kind as an organisation in the region since the Riverland Scouts recently closed their doors, Ms Griggs said Girl Guides was a unique and significant program for young rural women that needs to be supported by the local community.

“Many organisations like Guides have closed because of the need for volunteers to keep them running,” she said.

“We are hoping our Guide Hall will now be of interest to community groups and organisations for hire.

“Since we only use it once a week and the majority of our funding is used to maintain the building, it would be great to be able to subsidise the cost.

“We would also love more members and leaders.

“I would encourage any girl or woman in the Riverland to become a member... take part in volunteering, or becoming part of the leadership team for Guides.

“Guides is such an important organisation that can do amazing things for young women in our community, as well as give back significantly.”

Girl Guides Riverland will be hosting a Come n Try day on Monday 17 February at Barmera, from 6:30pm, at Berri, from 5pm, and Renmark, 5:30pm. There will be free water-themed activities for girls aged from 5 years old, and girls will be able to visit three times before becoming a member.

The volunteer dilemma

AN unforced tendency for most locals to support each other is often one of the more fortunate aspects of life in the Riverland.

Each year, January provides us the opportunity to put a spotlight on the selflessly inspirational figures in the community, through each council's citizen, and young citizen of the year awards.

However, while celebrating the achievements and contributions of such locals is important, it is also vital that the surrounding community recognises the increasing difficulty in finding new volunteers, particularly those who are willing to dedicate such time, over so many years, as an Ian Cass or Alan Eckermann.

This growing challenge is no single person's or entity's fault, it is clear for anyone to see that added financial, employment and family pressures is for most adults eating into the spare time that could otherwise be used to coach a children's sports team, or volunteer for the CFS or SES.

While nobody can be blamed for this, the flow-on impacts are becoming more and more common for Riverland clubs and community groups. Far too often we are now seeing long-serving volunteers, who need to step down from senior roles on committees due to age or health restrictions, with nobody else in a position to be able to take over.

The announcement that Waikerie's Neighbourhood Watch branch would be shutting down – as detailed in today's edition – is another clear example of this. After 34 years of involvement with the group – since its inception – co-ordinator Lynette Nitschke retired, and a replacement has yet to step forward.

Now, one could argue that Neighbourhood Watch lacks the glamour and excitement compared to volunteering as a football or netball coach, however, it remains an important and appreciated, perhaps even underappreciated, community group.

We can also look to the challenges in recruiting new volunteers being experienced by local emergency service groups, which has forced a number of CFS and SES branches towards the brink of closure.

It seems like all sections of the community are suffering from this vulnerability. If we see such organisations potentially having to fold at the moment, is a lack of volunteer coaches next going to hit sporting clubs for instance?

But where does the answer lie? Extra time, sadly, is unable to be produced from thin air, and for many, economic commitments will understandably be prioritised over potential volunteer duties.

Developing a desire to volunteer toward the benefit of the community among young people is probably then crucial, and such desire is evident in Loxton's new Young Citizen of the Year Bryce Westbrook.

Young people are seemingly currently experiencing a social environment of growing negativity and isolation when spending most of the time behind screens. Conversely, and as Bryce points out, there are self-rewards to volunteering, and most involved with community groups or sports teams will attest to the social connections that can be created.

A quick consideration of some of the events and facilities in the Riverland that would shut down without volunteers paints a bleak picture, and many local groups would see a big difference with even one more person becoming involved.

Who are they? An interesting family photograph (left) was recently found behind a coloured print (right) in an old wooden frame. The identity of the family is being investigated by LoxStory, the district's archive group, for Loxton-resident Deb Griffiths. The framed print belonged to her recently passed sister, Jan Paterson. Neither she nor her family can identify who this fine photo is of, their details, and if they would like the photo returned. The photographed clothing gives clues to its date. Contrary to usual expectations, people in the 1800-1900s changed fashion quite frequently, especially the younger ladies. The clues for women include dress style (skirt length and sleeves), hats and hair style. Men changed the style



and the cut of their suit jackets, waistcoats, collars and ties, and their hair styles (including facial hair). Their hats are also a good indicator. Other helpful clues include the 'sudden' appearance of shaggy rugs in studio pictures



(like this one) with odd bits of furniture. A visit to the studio (most towns had one) was quite common, especially for 'special occasions' like in this lovely photo. Unusually, several women are wearing lapel watches. Our

best guess is that the photo was taken around 1905 to 1910. The artwork is print Number 1290, entitled 'Well Guarded' by NB Roney. Who is the family; any clues? INVESTIGATOR: Carolyn Wood. PHOTO: Deb Griffiths.

Queries about council development

Logic tells us that answering questions from your ratepayers is a much better way of communication – and here are a couple of such queries:

❑ What are the totals costs to date of the proposal?

❑ Can we ratepayers be guaranteed the project can be protected against floods and will

reasonable-cost insurance be available?

q What liability would fall on council if the project failed at any stage, including completion?

Of course there are many more queries, and probably the only way to get answers is for council to come out with complete and open transparency.

And, in future, I would say "concerned citizens/ratepayers" is a much more respectful way of addressing Renmark's "fear-mongers".

Councils are hurting the regions

THERE was once a time when rural councils, now local government, represented and supported their communities.

They were operated and managed by locals for the betterment of the community. They were generally respected by the community with some kind of business acumen.

A weak local government will create a weak community.

Today they are a committee of locals guided and managed by personnel often based outside the area and generally from the metropolitan area, with no concept of rural living or requirements.

We now have councils converting horticulture zone areas into dual-zoned areas with rural living or residential.

Now primary producers are being pushed out by manipulative decisions restricting them from operating businesses that have been in place for decades prior to any housing.

They are being stopped from developing and transitioning into more modern growing techniques, using less water, less and non-toxic chemicals, quieter and higher production methods, to create better, viable food-producing activity.

It is still horticulture, and the Riverland has always been at the forefront of developing and implementing the latest horticultural technologies.

If the councils want to expand into these areas, they need to purchase the land, allow the houses to be subdivided off and compensate the primary producer to move to a new, suitable, horticulture-friendly region.

Similar horticulture activities are co-habiting well within the Two Wells, Virginia, Angle Vale and Lewiston areas.

The decisions of councillors and the councils are allowing an outside influence to create a considerable amount of stress and anxiety among numerous primary producers.

There is a significant cost to formalising these development

applications, even before any development costs are incurred. The application process and refusal are greatly affecting their mental health, wellbeing, family members and business viability.

It's weak local government weakening the community resolve.

If they persist with their unscrupulous, manipulative actions, I think there needs to be a class action for restriction of trade against councils, planning and development committees, and councillors.

Many of these primary producers have moved to our area, are having a crack, working their butts off, attempting to diversify, transition and create a secure food source that will end up fresh, green and clean on our tables. Not contaminated, imported second-grade rubbish.

Unless we keep our primary producers viable, the Riverland will have no industries, processors, manufacturers, sporting or community clubs.

Waikerie loses its Neighbourhood Watch

A VOLUNTEER organisation committed to preventing crime in the Waikerie area has gone into recess after 34 years of operation.

Waikerie Neighbourhood Watch met for the last time at a lunch at the Waikerie Club on 5 December.

The group consisted of 25 zone leaders, who between them donated a total of 379 years.

Three of these volunteers were with the organisation since its inception 34 years ago.

At the final meeting, Waikerie Neighbourhood Watch's former police co-ordinator Dave Miller presented certificates and badges of service to the group members

who attended.

Mr Miller served in the police co-ordinator's role for many years.

Past area coordinator of the organisation, Lynette Nitschke, said the role of these zone leaders included delivering 1000 newsletters, each quarter, across Waikerie and surrounding areas.

She said the group lost its police co-ordinator in the middle of last year, after he transferred to the Barossa Valley and a replacement could not be found.

"Not having police input was a big part of why we felt the group could not continue," Mrs Nitschke said.

She said a reduction in staff numbers at Waikerie meant police

could no longer provide a co-ordinator.

Mrs Nitschke served in the voluntary role of Waikerie Neighbourhood Watch area co-ordinator for 24 years, and had given 12 months' notice of her intention to retire from the role by December.

Unfortunately, her efforts to find a replacement for herself have so far been unsuccessful, which was another main reason for the organisation folding.

"I felt like I needed a break, I have reached a time in my life where I feel I need to be able to go on holidays," she said.

"I enjoyed it, it was great, and I loved it, but there comes a time in

your life when you need to change tack a little bit."

Mrs Nitschke said being an area coordinator had meant that she had to also attend regional meetings as well.

"We did keep in touch with all the other areas to ensure we knew what was going on there," she said.

"We learnt from other towns as well and if we thought someone had a good idea, we would try and include that into what we did also."

Mrs Nitschke said the Barmera and Renmark branches of Neighbourhood Watch also folded last year, and Loxton was the only town that still had one.

"People are no longer attending Neighbourhood Watch meetings

and all of the area co-ordinators have been doing it for a long time," she said.

Waikerie Neighbourhood Watch decided at its final meeting to transfer its remaining funds to the Riverland Neighbourhood Group, to purchase safety alarms for people affected by domestic violence.

Mrs Nitschke said if an area co-ordinator could be found in the future, the organisation could reopen, as Suzi Huf was still offering her services as area secretary.

"I would be happy to explain to anyone who is interested about what the requirements are," she said.

State headquarters pays tribute to Lynette

NEIGHBOURHOOD Watch (NHW) SA has paid tribute to long-serving Waikerie volunteer Lynette Nitschke, describing her as "one of the incredible people" who has been a part of the organisation almost from the start.

The state-wide part of the organisation is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, with Waikerie Neighbourhood Watch operating for 34 years, before it folded last month.

One of the main reasons the group had to fold was because an area co-ordinator to replace Mrs Nitschke, who retired last month, was unable to be found, even though she gave 12-months' notice of her plans.

"It's understandable that Lynette would like to hand the batten to someone else after 24 years and it's disappointing that no one has been found to take her place," a NHW spokesperson said.

The Renmark and Barmera NHW groups have also closed.

"NHW SA provides fantastic opportunities for community members to undertake activities to improve safety and build important community connections, so we never like to see a group fold," the spokesperson said.

"We can support NHW groups that are struggling by providing tailored resources for distribution that promote the group as well as ideas to take the group in a new, more sustainable direction."

The NHW spokesperson said South

Australia Police (SAPOL) Crime Prevention Sections can also hold public information meetings in regional areas to recruit new members and gauge the level of community interest in maintaining a group.

"All regional NHW groups are supported by their local SAPOL Crime Prevention Section, which is responsible for engaging

with the local community to prevent and reduce crime, providing information, education, and law enforcement," the spokesperson said.

"For allocating resources such as police co-ordinators, NHW volunteers can contact their SAPOL Crime Prevention Section if they require additional support.

"NHW SA has recently started rolling out NHW Facebook groups and, in selecting groups for the roll out, gives consideration to those that require reinvigoration."

Renmark and Paringa Historical Society formed

MADISON EASTMOND

A RENMARK and Paringa Historical Society has recently been formed, with passionate locals dedicated to collecting, digitising, and protecting the district's past and guaranteeing it can be used for future generations.

Formed to collect information and protect it through digitisation, the Renmark and Paringa Historical Society was formed late last year to undertake the momentous task of gathering and uncovering historical material of the region to capture its past.

"It has taken almost two years to get the (Historical Society) to this point," Renmark and Paringa Historical Society public officer Richard Mast said.

"It seems very logical that the district needed this type of society and the community has been asking for it a long time.

"So far, we have had a really good response.

"We have received many family histories, as well as documentation from organisations which is very significant. The community has lost many organisations, such as Scouts, over the years, so if these organisations have documents, photographs, artefacts, pieces of material and so on, we need to find them, because that's the stuff that represents the history of our community during that period of time we can't access any other way."

Along with rebuilding and

understanding Renmark and Paringa's history, Mr Mast said the not-for-profit society is working towards developing a website that all locals will eventually have free access to.

"Over these past two years we have set up a system that can catalogue any historical information that comes our way," he said.

"If physical artefacts have to be kept, they will be stored at (local historical museums), but the goal is to digitise every document, photograph, and convert every video or slide, which then will be uploaded, or have the location of the information logged, on the website.

"To understand our past and to have context of where we live can connect the lives of the individual to the history of the district.

"We want to be able to make sure this information is all shared, so we need to locate any and everything we can, and then of course, get the permission to digitise it — this is our main focus currently."

With plans to develop a membership to the society, Mr Mast said the organisation was also looking for volunteers to participate in its endeavour to recover local history, with roles including:

- ❑ Finding photos, documents, videos, slides, logs, journals, newspaper clippings, posters, postcards, and anything that represents personal or the district's history.
- ❑ Identifying individuals,



organisations, businesses, clubs who have, or could have, historical material.

- ❑ Identifying individuals who are prepared to share their oral history.

\$750k helping hand for new Loxton rentals

NEW rental houses will be built in a Riverland town in an attempt to increase accommodation options for key workers.

The State Government last month announced \$750,000 in funding – through the \$10m Regional Housing Initiatives Program – for Adelaide-based Cornerstone Housing to assist in the delivery of 15 long-term rental dwellings in Loxton.

Minister for Housing Nick Champion said regional communities were "important economic generators, but housing is incredibly limited, so the government is investing in these 10 projects to enable further growth".

Locals rescue missing jet skiers

A MAN and woman from Adelaide, who had to be rescued on Thursday evening after their jet ski overturned on the Murray River, are grateful to the quick actions of two Waikerie men who found them.

Simon Jenke, and his son Nathan, decided to help search for the couple after learning through social media they had been reported missing, after failing to return to the Number 2 Boat Ramp, at Edgar Bartlett Drive, at Waikerie.

“Since we share a love of the river and we know the area like the back of our hand, we decided to hop in our boat to try and find them,” Mr Jenke said.

He said they found the couple about a kilometre downstream from the Number 2 Boat Ramp and the jet ski, which had become submerged with water, was located about 1.5km further away.

“We took them back to the boat ramp and then planned to retrieve the jet ski, which had sunk,” Mr Jenke said.

But on their way to retrieve the jet ski, Mr Jenke and his son had to assist two men whose jet-ski had also broken down.

Mr Jenke said the men had managed to move the couple’s jet ski to a safe place on the river bank, but it was still half submerged, when their own jet ski stopped working.

He said fortunately everyone ended up being safe.

Mr Jenke said he understood the jet ski would be retrieved by a property owner located close to where it became submerged.

He said he and his son made the decision to help the couple because they hoped others would do the same thing for them if they found themselves in trouble.

Mr Jenke said they knew it would take the Barmera SES about 30 minutes to reach the scene.

In February last year, Mr Jenke and Nathan’s heroic actions also saved the life

of a Monash man who was driving a station wagon that collided with a stobie pole at a service station, on the Sturt Highway, at Waikerie.

Mr Jenke, after noticing the accident and the stobie pole on fire, rushed into the View Point Café and grabbed a fire extinguisher and put out the fire, before the CFS and emergency services arrived.

Ramco resident, and Loxton Waikerie councillor, Clive Matthews also supported relatives of the couple who were reported missing on Thursday evening.

Mr Matthews, who was at his home situated close to the Murray River, was working in his shed when he heard two men yelling out in an attempt to locate the jet skiers.

“They just happened to pull up by my drive way, so I raced down there, as I had assumed that someone may have had an accident,” he said.

Mr Matthews attempted to locate the yellow jet-ski and the couple with his drone, but was unsuccessful.

He then decided to try and assist in the search, by taking his tinny to the boat ramp, but was grateful to see Mr Jenke and his son were taking part in the rescue effort.

A spokesperson for SAPOL said just after 8pm, on Thursday 2 January, police received reports of an overturned jet-ski at Waikerie.

They said the pair were rescued and their jet ski was found nearby.

Barmera SES also attended.

The police spokesperson said no serious injuries were reported.

The family expressed to The Murray Pioneer they were thankful to police and emergency services and the members of the local community who came out to find them.

Funding to help prevent suicide in the Riverland

A RIVERLAND suicide prevention network is one of many South Australian sporting clubs and community volunteer groups that has received funding to support initiatives and training to address suicide in local communities.

The Riverland Community Suicide Prevention Network last week received \$4760 from the State Government’s Suicide Prevention Community Grants, with the funding planned to be used towards free community education and training sessions in the new year.

“It’s going towards training sessions with the CORESs (Community Response to Eliminating Suicide) program (that have been previously delivered) to schools, local community, and sporting clubs,” Riverland Community Suicide Prevention Network chair Val Fewster said.

“The aim of the program is to empower people to recognise the signs of suicide, intervene before a crisis occurs, and lead the person

at risk to the appropriate service.

“Our goal is to have a Riverland without suicide, and the CORES program raises awareness and reduces stigma around suicide, and it engages people in the community no matter what their background may be.

“There has been a lot of mental health education that has been undertaken in the region, but there is only a small amount of suicide information in those programs — the CORES program focuses on suicide and its prevention.”

At a time where the Riverland region has been hit with frost and rain, with many farmers losing their harvest, Ms Fewster said the grant has come at a good moment to aid the community.

“We will certainly use the grant money in the most meaningful way,” Ms Fewster said.

“Whether that be short courses in schools, or progress the courses around the Riverland, starting with Berri Barmera, and then Renmark and Waikerie.

“We are hoping to engage

70 people in the course, and if we do, more than 200 community members will benefit from that education (being used and applied in the Riverland).”

Premier’s Advocate for Suicide Prevention Nadia Clancy said “by prioritising suicide prevention, (the state) can break the stigma surrounding mental health and encourage open conversations when people need them, wherever they are”.

“Access to mental health resources through prevention programs can be the lifeline someone desperately needs,” she said.

“We want to have empowered communities across South Australia, who can help their neighbour, teammate, or friend when they’re struggling, or know where to get them the support they need.”

Safety for summer in the Riverland

THE Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) is warning Riverlanders to be aware of heatstroke and to take care when cooling off in inland rivers, dams, and lakes.

“As the temperatures rise, we need to ensure we are staying well hydrated by drinking plenty of water, applying sun protection like broad-brimmed hats and sunscreen, and staying out of direct sunlight and radiant heat so we don’t end up needing to be treated in hospital for heat exhaustion or heatstroke,” RDAA president Raymond Lewandowski said.

“While we know that farmwork doesn’t stop over the summer holidays, it is best not to keep working outside in the middle of a scorching summer day.

“Look to work in the early morning and then late in the afternoon and evening, and have the middle of the day off.”

With drownings being as much of a danger in inland waterways as at coastal beaches, RDAA advice for safety surrounding local rivers, dams, or lakes includes:

- Always closely supervise children around water.
- If you are not a strong swimmer, don’t swim.
- Don’t eat a huge meal before going for a swim.
- Don’t drink alcohol before going swimming, and don’t swim while intoxicated or under the influence of drugs.
- Don’t go swimming alone, and don’t swim too far from shore.
- Wear a life jacket, particularly if you are going to be in a boat or undertaking activities like water skiing.
- Know what is in the water in inland waterways, to ensure you are not diving or water skiing into shallow areas, rocks and submerged branches.

It's the middle of a bumper apricot season and the fruit is coming off the trees thick and fast.

Dad is generally a calm man, so this change in his behaviour catches our attention. He's just added another picker for a few days to ensure the apricots don't fall on the ground. He is stressed.

The apricots are almost over-ripe and can't sit in the dip tins for long.

There's a big effort needed today, Dad declares, so if we can get three full stacks cut, we'll go to Lake Bonney for a swim tonight.

A feverish response ignites the shed.

Dad uses these incentives selectively. We get to work. There's still chatter and laughter – if only to ease the boredom, stiff back, and aching legs – but our speed is constant, and lunchtime is unusually short. Motivation is not waning.

Finally, although we finish after five, three sulphur houses are under wraps. Relief, but no time to celebrate as everyone, our cousins included, dash home to change into bathers and grab a towel.

The station wagon fits 10 of us with ease and we're headed to Barmera via the Tarcoola Street bumps, where our stomachs' ups and downs mirror those of the road.

Turning right, we head to Barmera.

Up the hill and past the golf course, a destination that seemed a place for the more leisurely people. Later as a young adult, I'd play a round of golf with a girlfriend in our bikinis and sneakers on a 40-degree day when no-one, but sprinklers, were around.

Up and over the hill and there's the Riverland Raceway. We'd been there once or twice. Today, I reflect with respect at the ease with which kids roamed around freely in the dark when the event lost a youngster's interest.

We whiz past the Lyrup turnoff – that winding, dusty road to our grandparents' place taken on many a Sunday, and when

crossing the river, the punt man baggiped us with his ancestral Scottish tunes.

Seeing the Berri Cannery in full swing was strangely reassuring, the odour less so. Hundreds of workers' cars in the carpark were evidence of enormous activity and therefore the demand for our Riverland products. I just assumed that would never change.

Next, we approach Earth's most enchanting place on a Saturday night for a family in a station wagon – the Berri Drive-In. We'll catch some passing moments of a 'silent to us' movie on the way back.

I quietly acknowledge the Berri Hospital where Mum apparently delivered me, because the Renmark Hospital was inundated by the inconceivable levels of the 1956 flood.

It had already been a long, hot day and impatience is growing as we glide through Glossop and past the high school. Later we'd meet them in interschool sports day battles.

Barmera is approaching, and the challenge to see who'll be the first to hit the cool waters of the lake is on. However, those in the boot have already lost.

Finally, everyone is in, duck diving, jumping, diving – or was it bellyflopping – swimming, floating, yelling, bombing, racing – and happiness is complete. Lake Bonney welcomes everyone with open arms.

Dad looks relaxed and Mum has gone to the café for fish and chips. Honestly, what more could any kid ask for?



Lindsay Point hit by fruit fly

FRUIT fly response activities in the Lindsay Point area will be ramped up over the next few weeks following the recent declaration of the Lindsay Point B Queensland fruit fly outbreak.

With the total number of outbreaks in the Riverland now at 55, officers from the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) are applying approved bait and monitoring for any further signs of fruit fly in the affected areas.

Local residents and businesses will also receive information in relation to the outbreak and associated response activities.

Residents, workers, travellers and others who may be impacted by the Lindsay Point B outbreak are advised to search their address on the fruit fly interactive outbreak map (fruitfly.sa.gov.au/outbreak-map) to check if the fruit and vegetable movement restrictions affect home, travel, working or school arrangements.

Incident controller of the fruit fly emergency response Jason Size said it was important for people travelling through the area to use the quarantine bins in the region to dispose of at-risk produce.

"Although this outbreak is technically in Victoria, where Queensland fruit fly is now endemic, we need to protect our Riverland region and it is why it is prohibited to bring fruit across the border into South Australia," Mr Size said.

"Please use the quarantine bins in the region, when crossing at borders and entering the Riverland, to safely dispose of anything that could be a risk to our hard-working growers and horticulture industry."

Mr Size also encouraged Riverland residents

to take precautions during the summer heat while continuing the fight against Queensland fruit fly.

"We're grateful that residents pick ripe fruit and collect fallen produce off of the ground – through this simple action we were able to remove more than 400,000kg of at-risk produce in 2024 that fruit fly would otherwise be thriving in," he said.

"However, in helping us it's crucial you drink plenty of water, wear protective clothing, and don't forget to apply sunscreen – we want everyone to stay cool during the warmer weather and enjoy their holidays."

Mr Size said it was best to check gardens first thing in the morning, or early in the evening, to avoid the hottest parts of the day.

Mr Size also highlighted the critical need to avoid composting host produce.

"Cleaning up fallen fruit from your garden helps break the fruit fly life cycle," he said.

"But composting or burying at-risk fruit and vegetables can create the perfect environment for fruit flies to breed, or inadvertently protect eggs or larvae.

"Residents need to double bag any at-risk host fruit and vegetables, and put them in the general (red) waste bin – not compost or bury the waste. If you do not have a kerbside red bin service, seal the produce in an airtight plastic bag and contact the Fruit Fly Hotline on 1300 666 010 for advice." PIRSA is releasing sterile flies at Lindsay Point, Loxton, Murtho, Murtho B, New Residence, and Pyap until 23 February. Visit the website (fruitfly.sa.gov.au/sit) for more information.

The end date for all Riverland outbreaks is currently 17 March 2025.

All in the family at Cobdogla Primary School

THE Drogemuller family have recently celebrated quite a unique occasion.

As with many long-standing descendants of Cobdogla Primary, it is somewhat of a tradition to follow in the footsteps of those before them. But for Dean and Michelle Drogemuller, of Loveday, 2024 had special significance when they would have all seven grandchildren at Cobdogla Primary School at the same time.

The youngest of their grandchildren, Madison, started reception in term three last year, while the eldest, Lloyd, has just finished year 6 with proud accolades, as he was presented with the Tim Whetstone Certificate of Achievement Award for 2024.

This generation might be leading the way ahead, but before them, their fathers, grandfather and great-grandfather all made their mark at Cobdogla Primary.

The first to enter the hallowed turf at 'Cobby', back in 1927, was great-grandfather, Lloyd Drogemuller (senior).

A time of great growth in the district, along with Cobdogla's expanding school and the growing Drogemuller family tree, Lloyd was seventh of a large family from Cobdogla whose siblings were some of the first pupils at the school in 1917.

Lloyd went on to become a lock master, raising a large family and living at Lock 3, Overland Corner.

Soon the second generation were enrolling at Cobby, with Lloyd and Helen's family. With Dean being the seventh child to follow in his father and sibling's footsteps, they all became heavily involved in the school community.

Dean went on to enjoy a long and rewarding career for over 34 years at ETSA, in Barmera, now SA Powernetworks.

By the time Dean and Michelle's three boys, Steven, and twins Paul and Neil, were ready to start school, it was the 1990s and the Drogemuller name was firmly etched in the woodwork.

Many cousins had also gone to Cobby school, which had now grown to 148 students over six classes. Michelle also began working there, enjoying her job as an SSO. As time moved on their boys all found careers in the Riverland, married and had children of their own.

By 2018, it was time to see the fourth generation of this family enrol at Cobdogla Primary School, when Neil and Amy's eldest son, Lloyd, started in reception.

Not long after, his brother, Rylan, and sis-

ter, Alora, would join him. Meanwhile Paul and Joni's boys, Damien and Kyle, joined their cousins, along with Steven and Cindy's girls, Lucy, and the last to enrol, Madison, in July last year.

Education has come a long way at Cobdogla since the school's inception, with many changes over 104 years, but numerous local families, like the Drogemullers, are very proud and grateful to have been a big part of it.

SA schools' response to Disability Royal Commission

RIVERLAND public and private schools will take steps towards a more inclusive state education system with recommendations made by the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation of People with Disability.

In 2023, the Disability Royal Commission made 222 recommendations on how to improve laws, policies, structures, and practices to ensure a more inclusive society that supports the independent of people with a disability.

Of those, 15 recommendations are related to the education system.

The State Government, alongside Catholic Education South Australia (CESA), and the Association of Independent Schools of South Australia (AISSA) jointly announced they would prioritise implementing recommendations that seek to drive significant system change to improve learning and wellbeing outcomes, prevent discrimination and exclusion, and ensure a more inclusive education for students with disability.

The agreed actions across sectors include providing annual de-identified data to the Minister for Education covering enrolment refusal or cancellation for students with disability, and consistent information about the grounds, length and use of suspensions, exclusions and expulsions.

We are the first state in the country to come to an agreement with all education sectors and stand together to make a public commitment," Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said.

"I am proud that South Australia has led the way by joining the public, Catholic and Independent education systems together to respond to the recommendations of the Royal Commission.

"Having a consistent approach across schools is an important step forward for education in our state and a testament to the work of all three sectors – that education should be equitable and accessible for all young people in South Australia."

Top students land Barker MP's award

A NUMBER of last year's highest-performing Riverland students were recognised by the region's Federal MP.

Tony Pasin last month announced the 2024 Barker Shield Award recipients from Berri Regional Secondary College, Loxton High School, and St Francis of Assisi College.

Mr Pasin said "it is a great privilege to be able to formally recognise the valuable contribution of students that are making a difference in their school community and achieving at an eminent level".

"Congratulations to all students for their scholastic and community achievements of 2024, and whether they are continuing study or entering the work force, I wish students from all schools across Barker all the best for 2025," Mr Pasin said.

Math and science add up for Riverland year 4 students

AN international report detailing student performance in maths and science has found Riverland year 4 students are among those continuing to improve despite concerns about disrupted learning due to Covid.

The Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) recently released a report, on behalf of the Commonwealth, State and Territory Governments, analysing the performance of Australia's year 4 and 8 students in the Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS).

The TIMSS takes place every four years, evaluating the mathematical and scientific knowledge and understanding of year 4 and year 8 students, enabling countries to assess progress over time.

ACER today noted that year 4 students whose first years of schooling occurred during the Covid-19 pandemic have defied concerns about disrupted learning to achieve Australia's best-ever result in the maths and science assessment.

TIMSS describes achievement of the students on a scale with four international benchmarks, related to their skills and knowledge, and then groups the students in terms of attaining the National Proficient Standard (NPS), very-low performers and very-high performers.

Testing is done in all states and territories and, in South Australia, the proportion of year 4 students at or above the National Proficient Standard for both mathematics and science improved, and the number in the bottom category (very low performers) fell.

Since 1995, maths achievement of year 4 students has improved across all jurisdictions, and from 1995 to 2023 the numbers of very-low performers decreased by 7 percentage points in South Australia.

South Australia also improved significantly in year 4 science between 1995 and 2023, with a 11-point increase in the proportion of students who attained the NPS. Results for year 8 students in South Australia were more mixed, with a decline in maths from 2019 to the tests in 2023, but an improvement in science between 2011 and 2023.

"I'm pleased to see the improvements students have made in important areas like science and maths as we need young people engaged in these topics so they can be part of the economic future of South Australia," Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said.

"This international report card contains good news for educators in the wake of the global Covid-19 pandemic, which we know disrupted the learning and engagement of young people around the world."

\$100,000 donation to support mental health in rural Australia

ZOETIS has raised \$100,000 for the Beyond Blue Support Service to assist mental health initiatives and reduce stigma around mental illness in rural and regional Australia, including the Riverland.

Factors such as inflation, cost-of-living pressures, climate change, and the lingering impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic have underscored the importance of mental health support, particularly for farmers and rural communities.

The funds raised play a role in sustaining Beyond Blue's 24/7 mental health support services, which include counselling, advice, and referrals. These services are essential for providing support to individuals in rural and regional areas who face additional barriers to accessing mental health care compared to their urban counterparts. To date, thanks to Zoetis's donation, more than 15,500 people have been able to get the support they need through the service.

"The partnership between Zoetis and Beyond Blue goes beyond financial contributions," Mr William said.

"It's about making sure that no one in rural Australia feels alone in their struggle with mental health, and that help is readily available. We want to encourage early intervention and remind people that reaching out

\$1m funding boost toward domestic violence crisis line

THE State Government has announced additional funding to help address domestic, family, and sexual violence (DfSV) in the Riverland.

Starting in January, the State Government have allocated almost \$1m annually to the Domestic Violence Crisis Line to boost staffing levels and enhance the helpline's capacity to respond to calls outside business hours.

In 2023, the Domestic Violence crisis line, operated by Women's Safety Services SA, received an average of more than 2600 calls per month.

This investment will increase the capacity for the Crisis Line to respond to callers and reduce the amount of unanswered calls. While in the past, on average, four out of five calls to the crisis line are answered, one in five remain unanswered due to resource constraints. Recent data for June 2024 revealed an even greater strain, with only 70 per cent of calls answered, leaving one in three callers without immediate support.

Further, \$200,000 has been approved per year for the Personal Protection App. The app, which provides a direct link to SAPOL via a 24-hour monitored security centre, is a tool for individuals at risk of DfSV.

The increased funding will enable the app to annually support an additional 120 individuals.

"Domestic, family and sexual violence is devastating, it impacts so many across our state, with tragic consequences," Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence Katrine Hildyard said.

"We know it plays out in every suburb, town and regional area. Unfortunately, no community is spared.

"This additional funding reaffirms our Government's strong commitment to helping ensure that wherever survivors live, they will receive the support they need, when they need it.

"We acknowledge that every unanswered call represents a missed opportunity to provide safety and support. By boosting staffing and expanding the capacity of critical services like the Domestic Violence Crisis Line and the Personal Protection App, we are taking tangible steps to address the growing demand for help.

"This funding will save lives."

The Domestic Violence Crisis line can be accessed by all South Australians needing advice and support on 1800 800 098.

SA wine exports to China top \$550m

SOUTH Australia's wine producers, including those in the Riverland, are benefitting from growing values of exports to China.

Data released last month by the State Government showed exports of South Australian wine to China exceeded \$550m since recent tariffs were lifted compared to \$2.8m in the previous year.

Minister for Trade Joe Szakacs said exports to the state's main three markets – China, the US and India – continued see sustained growth.

"For 21 months in a row

our state's rolling-year exports have exceeded \$17bn, which has consistently supported jobs and opportunities for South Australians," Mr Szakacs said.

"Our top three trading partners together represent more than \$7.5bn in export value, so to see growth in all those markets is a tremendous result in what is a chal-

lenging global climate.

"As a government, we're committed to providing local businesses with clear pathways to global expansion through our network of global trade offices, a calendar of international trade events, and by connecting SA with the world through more direct flights into key markets."

More defibs available to save lives in 2025

RIVERLAND not-for-profit community or sporting organisations can apply for grants of \$1000 to assist with the cost of purchasing an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for their building or facility.

Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) will become mandatory in relevant state government owned buildings, facilities, and emergency service vehicles from 1 January, under the Automated External Defibrillator (Public Access) Act 2022.

Eligible not-for-profit community or sporting organisations can apply with the next round of applications, opening from 3 February to 30 April.

To be eligible, the not-for-profit organisations must be in South Australia and meet certain criteria, such as having an active Australian Business Number (ABN).

"Having more defibrillators in state-owned buildings and facilities across South Australia will save lives," Minister for



Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"And anyone can use a defib – no training is required, the defib will talk you through the steps to take.

"Every minute matters in an emergency, and it could be the difference between life and death."

Top tips for holiday electric vehicle use

THE Riverland is among regions seeing increased usage of electric vehicles (EVs) by locals and visitors this summer.

Nearly one-in-ten new car sales are EVs, with more than 100,000 added to Australian roads in 2024. To keep up with growing demand, the number of locations offering fast and ultra-fast chargers has nearly doubled in a year, reaching 1059 locations nationwide, with over 1849 high-power public chargers.

Electric Vehicle Council head of legal, policy and advocacy Aman Gaur said "Australians love a summer road trip, and more of them than ever before will now be clocking up the kilometres in electric cars".

"Australia has hit an annual record for new EV sales, surpassing 100,000 this year," Mr Gaur said.

"That means we should expect to see more EVs on our roads and accessing public chargers during these holidays.

"Luckily, the public charging network is growing to keep up with demand. Over the past year, the number of public chargers and their locations has nearly doubled across the country, with more public and private investment in the pipeline to expand this further in the new year.

"Charging this summer is set to be smoother than ever, thanks to more public chargers in more places and a maturing EV charging sector that has overcome initial challenges."

Mr Gaur said increased usage of EVs benefitted both tourism in communities and the environment.

"More EVs on our roads is a good thing, making summer holidays as cheap as possible and reducing pollution in our communities," he said.

"For many, this will be their first holiday road trip behind the wheel of an EV, navigating the

best ways to charge along the way.

"Some of our top tips for EV charging etiquette are don't overstay your charge, leave home with a full battery, and be courteous to your fellow EV drivers."

Top tips for EV charging etiquette:

❑ Leave home with a full charge and charge up at the place you're staying before you head home if you can. This will reduce the amount you need to use public fast chargers, and create more availability for others.

❑ Don't overstay your charge. When you're using public chargers, take what you need, then make space for the next driver, especially if there's a queue. Topping up to 80 per cent will take a lot less time than filling all the way to 100 per cent, because the charging rate slows down as the vehicle battery gets close to full.

❑ Be kind. There's more than 100,000 new EVs on our roads this year, with some drivers set to use public fast chargers for the first time this summer holidays. If someone needs help understanding how it works, offer to lend a hand.

❑ Look after the charging equipment. Put the charging equipment back as you found it to avoid damage and for the next person's ease. If the unit is damaged or impaired, report it immediately to the charge point operator.

The Electric Vehicle Council is also asking EV drivers to help improve the public charging network further by completing a survey following their summer driving experiences. Interested drivers can sign up online (www.electricvehiclecouncil.com.au/ev-ownership-survey-2024/) to complete the survey.

Data shows Riverlanders have damaging attitudes towards suntanning

CONCERNING new data shows that tanning culture is still a significant issue for Riverlanders.

Funded by the Cancer Council, data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics has revealed more than 100,000 South Australians have tried to get a suntan in the last 12 months.

Cancer Council SA prevention co-ordinator Diem Tran said dangerous attitudes towards suntanning are a major concern.

"This new data shows us that not enough South Aussies are actioning the SunSmart message," she said.

"Any damage to the skin caused by overexposure to

harmful UV radiation from the sun, including a tan or sunburn, increases your risk of developing skin cancer.

"There's no such thing as a safe tan. Every time your skin tans, the damage adds up to increase your risk.

"Suntanning contributes to two in three Australians getting skin cancer in their

lifetime. As we approach the holiday season with many South Australians spending more time outdoors and heading to the beach, sun protection is particularly important."

"When the UV is 3 and above, we really encourage South Aussies to slip on sun protective clothing that covers your arms

and legs, slop on SPF 50 or 50+ sunscreen, slap on a broad-brimmed or bucket hat, slide on sunglasses and seek shade wherever possible."

South Australians can check the UV Index and recommended sun protection times by downloading the SunSmart Global UV app.



Koala State number plate grants issued to SA's dedicated wildlife rescue organisations

RIVERLAND motorists can now help fund wildlife rescue organisations to care for native animals through the sale of Koala State number plates.

Going towards the South Australian Wildlife Rehabilitation Grants programs, the Koala State number plates provide a one-off \$50 donation to help fund wildlife rescue organisations.

Helping to cover the cost of new supplies, equipment, training, or vet fees, the Koala State number plates cost \$151, which includes a \$70 plate fee, a \$50 donation, and a \$31 reallocation



fee for vehicles already registered in SA.

So far, 2200 plates have been purchased, with a total of 12 licensed not-for-profit and volunteers receiving first round grants of up to \$5000.

"Wildlife carers sacrifice their time and money to look after our wildlife, often working around the clock to provide for sick or injured animals," Minister for Climate, Environment and

Water Susan Close said.

"I'm pleased these grants will assist the selfless volunteers and rescue groups to better care for wildlife through improved facilities, food supply or health care.

"A big thank you to those South Australians who have rallied around our wildlife organisations by purchasing a Koala State number plate. The plates are still available for purchase and make an ideal Christmas gift for friends and family."

AIMING to develop the capabilities of Riverlanders to support each other in the face of mental health and wellbeing challenges, the Our Town Berri team has spent the past five years establishing community-led initiatives to encourage inclusion, connection, and town pride.

Supported through seed funding and short-term government grants, Our Town is a place-based, mental health scheme that is taking place across six rural South Australian towns, in which teams consult deeply with members of their communities and then provide networking and learning opportunities in response.

Established in 2019 with seven Berri volunteers, Our Town Berri conducted one year of research before acting to establish the true wellbeing needs of the Riverland community, with four key insights of improvement including:

- ❑ 'The light on the hill went out': Berri wants to reclaim and build an identity.
- ❑ 'It's hard to see the river for the reeds': Services should connect and network to support the wellbeing of a community, but many are falling through the cracks.
- ❑ 'The river connects us': When generations and groups come together, the impact is felt across the community.
- ❑ 'Navigating uncharted waters': Life events and transitions have connections to wellbeing, but strong communities support these transitions.

Now currently operating with 10 core team members and support from the South Australian Centre for Social Innovation, Our Town community steward Julie Ahrens said the philanthropic work the team has undertaken has made a "significant impact" within the Berri community.

"Our Town Berri is truly unique, in the fact we are not aligned to any service," she said.

"We are a not-for-profit, community-led initiative and have charitable status. Our Town is completely community led, as well as owned — if someone comes to us with an

idea, we help to involve and network community members to make it happen.

"We help with support processes, innovation, and aid the community in leading their own change.

"Everything we do is an attempt to capacity build in the community and tailored to the insights we discovered when speaking to Berri residents.

"We also trial programs to see what is working and what isn't, so we know we are making a productive impact.

"We have truly listened to our community and the programs we have supported are being incredibly well received."

In just the past year, Our Town Berri has continued to support ongoing initiatives, as well as help introduce new programs into the Riverland town, including:

- ❑ Riverland Families First: A Mother's Group program, with inactivities that include art sessions, nutrition workshops, and yoga classes.
- ❑ Reconciliation Garden: A collaboration with Berri Regional Secondary College and the Aboriginal community, students have engaged to create a garden and fire-pit area on campus.
- ❑ Berri Primary School Art Wellbeing Program: A wellbeing-focused art group led by local artist Karl Raams, which provides a creative and supportive space for students to engage with mental health topics through art.
- ❑ Native Food and Culture program: Held at Berri Regional Secondary College, the program empowers First Nations girls and women to explore careers in food and agriculture.
- ❑ Community Breakfasts: Core team members hosted community breakfasts, fostering connections with around 30 Riverlanders.
- ❑ Friends of Berri: Regular informal meetings saw participation and discussion from local people about community needs and opportunities.
- ❑ Youth Mental Health First Aid Training with KAIZEN Business.
- ❑ Raise Mentoring: 13 year 8 students and

volunteer mentors met for one hour every week throughout terms two and three, with a focus to build resilience, school belonging, and set goals.

- ❑ Volunteering: More than 5000 hours of student volunteer efforts through an Our Town Berri Community Connector.
- ❑ The Nunga Driving program: Supporting young Indigenous people to get their driver's license by providing subsidised driving lessons.
- ❑ P.O.T. LUCK You Are Enough edition: An open mic and stage for local artists, writers, and creatives alike to share in an evening of storytelling and connection.
- ❑ Baby and Child First Aid Training.

"We work to people's strengths and create community opportunities with them," Ms Ahrens said.

"Our support creates rich connection and we are always trying new things."

Most recently, Our Town Berri was one of four organisations in South Australia invited to the second roundtable of the Investment Dialogue for Australia's Children in Adelaide last year as an example of an exceptional model community-led work and impact.

"In the Riverland, all the different towns have different strengths," Ms Ahrens said.

"I think when you only identify Berri as 'the business centre', you can forget the depths of the people, it's diversity, and the amazing opportunities that happen in Berri that can further be elevated.

"Our Town Berri can be an empowered, well-connected, and mentally healthy community, and that's what we're continuing to see and achieve."





The below is a copy of a letter from SA MINISTER FOR PLANNING NICK CHAMPION to Renmark woman ANN RYAN regarding the proposed JANE ELIZA ESTATE DEVELOPMENT...

DEAR Ms Ryan,

Thank you for your recent correspondence to the Premier Peter Malinauskas regarding the Master Plan for the Jane Eliza Development, at Renmark.

As the matters you have raised fall within my portfolio responsibilities, the Premier has asked me to respond on his behalf. As you are aware, Wel.Co is currently preparing a master plan and associated investigations for the Jane Eliza Project.

The Master Plan process will explore opportunities for development to occur within the designated 'study area', including residential, commercial and mixed-use activities, a marina and associated industries.

Presently, the 'study area' mostly falls within the Neighbourhood Zone and Infrastructure (Ferry and Marina Facilities) Zone of the Planning and Design Code (the Code).

Notwithstanding this, the entire 'study area' is located

within the 'River Murray 1956 Flood Level', with a portion located in the 'River Murray Floodplain Protection Area'.

In addition, the primary study area is subject to the following overlays in the Code:

- Hazards (Bushfire – Urban Interface) Overlay
- Hazards (Flooding – Evidence Required) Overlay
- Murray-Darling Basin Overlay
- Native Vegetation Overlay
- Water Resources Area Overlay

The current planning provisions will only partially facilitate the proposed development options being contemplated by the Renmark Paringa Council and Wel.Co. Therefore, an amendment to the Code to change the zoning would be required. This process involves detailed investigations and assessment of the suitability of the proposal, including the implications of building in a flood-prone area, the potential for the proposed development and associated infrastructure to

impact on the existing development and surrounding environment.

The Code Amendment process also includes engagement with relevant government agencies and key stakeholders whose expertise would be relied upon to determine the suitability of the proposal, including the environmental and flood implications, before a decision would be made to approve the Code Amendment or not.

I can confirm that council has not sought to initiate a Code Amendment for the Jane Eliza Project. Furthermore, if a Code Amendment was initiated, it would be publicly notified, and the community would be given an opportunity to participate in the public consultation process before any decision is made. I trust this information is of assistance.

Local drivers caught for road offences

NUMEROUS drivers are set to appear in court after being caught for road offences in the Riverland last month.

About 12.30 am, Saturday 14 December, Berri police were on the Sturt Highway, at Renmark, and observed a silver Holden SUV driving without any headlights. Patrols stopped the driver, who failed to produce a valid driver's licence.

The 36-year-old woman, from Lewiston, was arrested and charged with failing to comply with a driver direction, driving without lights and driving without a licence. She was bailed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court on 20 January.

Later that day police were on Strangman Road, at Waikerie, when a white Holden sedan was stopped and the driver submitted to a drug test. The 41-year-old driver, from Waikerie, tested positive to methamphetamine and cannabis. He was issued a three-month loss of licence and his sample will be submitted for

further analysis.

Also on Saturday 14 December, Murray Mallee Police were conducting speed detection duties on the Sturt Highway, when a driver was clocked traveling at 125km/h in a 80km/h zone. The driver was stopped and issued an on-the-spot expiation notice for exceeding the speed limit and was issued a six-month loss of licence.

On Sunday 15 December, police were on the Sturt Highway, at Paisley, when they stopped a white Holden sedan and submitted the driver to a drug test. The 39-year-old man, from Munno Para West, returned a positive result to cannabis. He was issued a three-month loss of licence and his sample will be submitted for further analysis.

Also on that day, Berri police were conducting speed detection duties on the Old Sturt Highway, at Glossop, when a vehicle was clocked driving at 70km/h in a 60km/h zone.

The driver was



stopped, and checks revealed the 67-year-old man's licence was suspended. He was reported for driving suspended, exceeding the speed limit and his vehicle was impounded.

He will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Then, on Monday 16 December, a maroon ford SUV was observed doing burnouts on Draper Road, in Berri. Patrols stopped the driver nearby and submitted him to a breath test, which returned a positive result of 0.076.

The 29-year-old was reported for misuse of a motor vehicle and issued an expiation notice for exceeding the legal limit. He will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Renmark man caught drink driving at .121

POLICE detected a Renmark man driving at more than double the legal alcohol limit last month.

On Sunday 22 December, Renmark Police stopped a red Holden hatchback on Red Gum Street, at Renmark, and submitted the driver to a breath test that returned a positive result of 0.121.

The 29-year-old Renmark man was reported for drink driving and issued a six month loss of licence, and he will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Also, on Friday 20 December, Berri Police stopped a silver Ford utility on Kay Avenue, Berri, and submitted the driver to a breath test, which returned a positive result of 0.090.

The 31-year-old male driver was reported for drink driving and issued a six month loss of licence, and he will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Saturday 21 December, Murry Mallee Police stopped a black Ford SUV on the Sturt Highway, at Blanchetown, and submitted the driver to a roadside drug test which returned a positive result for cannabis.

Checks revealed the 27-year-old Loxton woman was also suspended from driving. She was reported for drug driving and driving suspended. Her sample will be sent for further forensic analysis.

Riverland-based MLC NICOLA CENTOFANTI has provided the following opinion piece regarding concerns for regional South Australian communities...

Regional SA: Resilient, but why should we have to be?

WHY is it, when people talk about resilience, they appear to only speak about the regions? And how did we get here?

Yes, regional communities are famously resilient. It's a badge of honour for many of us, and rightly so.

But why is it that regions are constantly asked to demonstrate this resilience at a level far beyond what is expected of metropolitan areas? Why is it acceptable for rural towns to endure substandard infrastructure, limited services, and economic neglect, while Adelaide thrives with the advantages of constant investment and development?

Distance is a reality of regional life, no one disputes that. Not every town can, or should, have every service available. However, every region deserves access to a reasonable standard of essential services.

For too long, this has been treated as an unattainable luxury, rather than the basic right of the people who keep this state's agricultural and resource sectors alive.

Take healthcare, for example. I was shocked to find out that Mount Gambier Hospital does not have ICU beds.

How is it that the second largest city – that happens to be in regional SA – cannot support its own criti-

cally ill patients?

Furthermore, the absence of general practitioners in rural areas isn't just inconvenient, it's a threat to public health. The same can be said for aged care, and mental health services; essentials that underpin a community's wellbeing.

And what about schools? Time and time again, regional families are expected to settle for underfunded, and understaffed schools with fewer resources than their urban counterparts.

Then there's the shrinking presence of banks in country towns, leaving residents and businesses struggling to manage their finances. And for those families wanting to access childcare, the waitlists are often endless.

Supermarkets, when they exist, often carry fewer choices at higher prices. A bitter irony for communities surrounded by farmland that feeds the state.

Even something as simple as maintaining quality roads can seem out of reach in regional South Australia, as patchwork fixes and neglect leave residents wondering why their taxes don't stretch beyond Adelaide city limits.

What's especially frustrating is the sense of being overlooked, even as regional South Australia pro-

vides so much for the state. From the paddocks of the Eyre Peninsula to the vineyards of the Coonawarra, regional communities drive economic output in ways that Adelaide relies on but rarely acknowledges.

And yet, time and again, they are last in line for investment, development, and opportunities to grow. It's not just about fairness. It's well past time to call for regional equity.

football for RFL club Barmera-Monash.



Change of scenery

CANDID character actor Miriam Margolyes calls Australia home, but when a film role looked like taking her to New Zealand, she became struck by how little she knows about our Kiwi cousins across the ditch.

Determined to overcome what she terms as her own ignorance, Margolyes sets out to learn more about the Land of the Long White Cloud and its inhabitants in this two-part road trip adventure.

Beginning in capital Wellington, self-proclaimed nosy parker Margolyes wants to find the heart and soul of the country – but did not expect it would be located at a rugby game, a sport she “loathes”. Can 30,000 die-hard fans (and meeting national women’s team, the Black Ferns) change her mind?

The next stop on Margolyes’ odyssey is the Whanganui River, where the local Māori iwi (or tribe) have won legal ‘personhood’ for the sacred waterway – a measure that will protect the health and life force of the river by recognising its rights as a living being.

Taking the long route to Auckland, the *Harry Potter* star confronts her antipathy for “grown-ups living in a fantasy world” on a stop in Hobbiton, calls into a refugee resettlement centre and visits a Panguru school where all the classes are conducted in Māori language.

Never one to shy away from asking difficult questions, the straight-shooting Margolyes uses her gift for connecting with everyday people to uncover the challenges New Zealanders face in the world today and learns unexpected lessons along the way.
