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Stabbing investigations continue

POLICE are investigating after a man was found stabbed in Renmark on yesterday afternoon.

Paramedics attended the scene in Banksia Street, Renmark at about 2.30pm, on Tuesday 9 July.

A 36-year-old Renmark man was found with a stab wound to his abdomen and was taken to the local hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

Riverland CIB detectives and crime scene investigators attended the scene and investigations are continuing.

Paringa Bridge out of order

THE malfunction of a major local bridge is impacting Riverland boat operators.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) confirmed yesterday the Paringa Bridge was currently "unable to lift due to a mechanical issue."


"Maintenance staff will be on site today to assess the bridge and plan for repairs, which will be undertaken as quickly as possible," a DIT spokesperson said.

"River users are advised to check the

clearance height on onsite boards before passing under the bridge. This may change depending on environmental factors, including wind and water flow.

"Houseboat operators will not be able to pass underneath the bridge until repairs are complete. We apologise for any inconvenience caused."

"Road users travelling on the bridge are not impacted by this issue."



Major emergency unfolded at Glossop

A COBDOGLA man, 84, passed away following a car accident last week.

Emergency services attended a two-car collision on Thursday 4 July, just after 4.15pm, on the intersection of Scott Road and Jury Road, at Glossop.



A Ford Falcon sedan travelling south-west on Scott Road collided with a Subaru Outback travelling south-east on Jury Road.

The passenger of the Ford sadly lost his life, while an 82-year-old passenger, also from Cobdogla, was taken to hospital with minor injuries.

The driver of the Subaru, a 21-year-old man and his three passengers, a 24-year-old man, a 25-year-old man and a 27-year-old man, all from Loxton North were uninjured and are assisting police with their enquiries.

Road closures were in place while Major Crash attended the scene, but all roads have reopened.

The man's death is the 46th life lost on South Australian roads so far this year.

The 6 for 10

RENMARK Paringa Council has proposed a fixed-annual rate increase of 6 per cent, for 10 years, to support the completion of an "unprecedented" capital works program.

Renmark Paringa councillors at a special meeting held on Monday night voted to adopt council's draft 2024/25 Annual Business Plan and Budget for the purposes of community consultation.

Council expects to collect \$610,292 in general rates in 2024/25, with property valuations rising by 10.32 per cent during the past year.

A council report on the matter stated the proposed 6 per cent increase per year, for 10 years, was aimed at managing increased costs.

"While we would prefer for this to be less, it is noted that council has traditionally been a low-rating council and it could be argued some of the financial pressure we are feeling is due to not raising rates as much as we should have in previous years," the report read.

"Be that as it may, council intends to continue to manage our finances in a prudent manner so that we remain financially sustainable."

Loxton Waikerie council in May adopted a 3.5 per cent rate rise, while Berri Barmera Council will aim to counter a 15.28 per cent rise in property values by reducing its rate in the dollar for residential properties.

Meanwhile, Renmark Paringa said it was "in a position of having to deliver two of the largest inter-generational capital projects that council has ever constructed as a result of the recent 2022/23 Murray River floods".

"Council is conscious of the rising cost-of-living impact on our local households and businesses and as such are trying to keep any rate rises as low as possible," the council report read.

"This year council proposes a 6 per cent rate rise, which follows a 6 per cent increase last year."

"Council will continue to maintain the current rate structure which comprises differential rates based on land use and a fixed-charge component. The fixed charge is proposed to be \$425, which is an increase from \$400 in 2023/24."

Renmark Paringa chief executive officer Tony Sivior said "formulating the Annual Business Plan and Budget for 2024/25 has been a challenge given the current economic climate and financial pressures experienced by everyone in our community".

"Some tough decisions were required to be made to ensure the rate rise for our residents was reasonable."

"Council is currently delivering two of its biggest projects in our history and that has been a major factor is needing to defer a number of projects to coming years."

"The need to replace the Twentyfirst Street bridge due to the 2022/23 floods was unpredictable and therefore the cost was unable to be factored into Council's long term financial planning."

"This has been a large factor in the need to re-shuffle project priorities."

Waste service charges are set to remain the same at \$320 for three bins, and \$240 for two bins.

Council has budgeted for \$21.7m in capital projects for 2024/25 – up from \$4.91m in the previous year – including the Twentyfirst Street bridge replacement, the Renmark Wastewater Treatment Plant Renewal, the Paringa town centre revitalisation, Renmark Wharf Upgrade, and Rowing Club deck upgrade.

A \$1.86m operating deficit has been projected in the draft budget, however, council expects to return to an operating surplus by 2031/32 under its long-term financial plan.

Community consultation on council's Draft Annual Business Plan closes at 5pm, on Wednesday 31 July.

Meanwhile, councillors also approved a motion offering a rate remission of \$500 to local wine grape growers to help them during the current industry challenges.

It is understood details about how wine grape growers can access the remission will be communicated in the coming weeks.

Renmark Paringa Network examining support to continue operations...

We want to rally

DIFFICULTIES in sourcing sustainable funding have forced Renmark Paringa's business network into hibernation.

The Renmark Paringa Network (RPBN) last week decided it would "enter a period of hibernation where we put all operations on hold".

A statement from the RPBN board, dated 3 July and contained within the letters to the editor of today's The Murray Pioneer, said a lack of ongoing funding had prevented the network's full operations.

"Despite our dedication we have been unable to deliver on our programmed activities in the last 12 months because we have been unable to secure ongoing financial support to keep our organisation operating," the statement read.

"Our membership fees afford us to keep up regular contact with our members, maintain a social media presence and offer business training sessions, but it does not afford us to run any of the big strategic goals and initiatives we have on standby that would really give value to our members."

"Without the capacity to deliver any meaningful and high-visibility initiatives, our members are feeling disappointed that they are not getting the value they deserve, and our board members are disheartened that they are not allowed to provide their fellow

members with a satisfying experience."

"Therefore, the board of the RPBN has decided, with heavy hearts, that we must enter a period of hibernation where we put all operations on hold."

The network was established in November 2019 following a community meeting led by Pat Mickan.

The board's statement said support for the network to continue its operations needed to be evaluated.

"Does the business community want an organisation such as the RPBN to exist to advocate for them, and throw its support behind initiatives and projects currently within its strategic plan or in some other form?" the statement read.

"Will this show of support and strength in member support allow the RPBN to access a more ongoing source (or sources) of revenue that will allow it to deliver upon what it promises its members?"

"The board believe without answering these two questions that a Business Network, or Chamber of Commerce, whatever you would like to call it, will stand little chance of success."

It is understood the RPBN board will seek to hold a community meeting later this month to examine the level of community business support.

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
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Water buyback tender to open next week

PROGRAMS to buyback water from areas such as the Riverland, in order to fulfil the Murray-Darling Basin Plan, are set to begin.

The Federal Government last week announced the first tender for 70GL of water, under the Voluntary Water Purchase Program, would be opened on Monday 15 July.

Federal Minister for Water Tanya Plibersek said fulfilling Murray-Darling Basin Plan targets would benefit local communities and the environment.

"For 10 years, Basin communities were short-changed by the Coalition, who sabotaged water recovery, tied up programs in impossible rules, delayed the Basin Plan, and prolonged uncertainty," Ms Plibersek said.

"We've changed all that and since passing the Restoring our Rivers legislation last year, are on track to deliver the Murray-Darling Basin Plan in full.

"Our implementation plan also provides transparent, clear information on how progress towards the 450GL target is tracking – helping to restore trust in this country's water management.

"Not only will regional communities prosper when the Murray-Darling Basin river system is healthy – we all will. That's what our government is focused on."

The Federal Government's Restoring our Rivers: Framework for delivering the 450 GL of additional environmental water was also released last week, and includes:

- progress on the Basin Plan so far and an implementation plan to guide the delivery of the 450 gigalitre target over the next 12 months
- a link to the water trading strategy to

help water market participants make informed decisions

Ms Plibersek said other water recovery methods were also being supported.

"We continue to prioritise non-purchase options to recover water, such as investing in water saving infrastructure, and are supporting Basin communities that may feel the impacts of water recovery with a record \$300 million investment," she said.

Buybacks to 'damage' local communities?

FEDERAL Government water buybacks will increase the price of temporary water for Riverland irrigators and the cost of food production, according to senior local politicians.

The Federal Government last week announced the first tender for 70GL of water, under the Voluntary Water Purchase Program, would be opened on Monday.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said Riverland communities and councils were "extremely concerned about what these open slather buybacks will do to their towns, businesses, and local environment."

"The information released shows the Labor Government doesn't know which communities will bear the brunt of this buyback scheme," Mr Whetstone said.

"Instead, it clearly says there is no fixed volume to be recovered from each

state, each catchment or each water right type.

"A motion was passed by councils from across Australia calling on the Albanese Government to reject open market buybacks and put communities at the heart of any water recovery plans because of the damage they will do to our towns.

"This is on the back of ACCC Commissioner Mick Keogh admitting that water buybacks increase prices to access water for irrigators, increasing the cost of food production."

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the result of buybacks would add further economic pressure to Riverland communities.

"While the documents indicate SA water holders are eligible to partake in this process, areas with a high concentration of network customers are excluded, leaving many Riverland water holders scratching

their heads as to whether they are in or out," Mr Pasin said.

"Labor's open market EOI process risks creating a race to the bottom, leaving water holders and communities worse off.

"Labor has left Riverland wine grape growers to wither on the vine with little-to-no financial support to assist in restructuring the industry.

"Now, as if to rub salt in the wound, the Albanese Labor Government is using an opaque and confusing system to remove water at the lowest price possible."

Mr Whetstone advised maintaining water resources for primary production should be a priority.

"If you're considering selling your water, offer it to your neighbour or your fellow irrigator first," he said.

"Once it's in the government's hands, it's gone forever."

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


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

An oar-some announcement

COLLABORATION between Renmark Paringa Council, the State Government and a local rowing club is set to support a \$1.7m infrastructure upgrade.

Renmark Paringa councilors at last month's general meeting passed a motion to adopt the construction of the upgraded Renmark Rowing Wharf as a council project in its 2024/25 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

The project is set to be fully funded through a \$1.7m Department of Environment and Water (DEW) Constraints Measures Program grant.

Renmark Rowing Club president Tony Townsend

said the current wharf structure was becoming unsuitable for use.

"It's been a long time coming and the current ramp is a bit over 30-years old now and it's served its purpose," Mr Townsend said.

"It's becoming well worn, and unsafe at times when water levels increase, which is likely to occur more often in the future, due to environmental flows and other reasons.

"To have a floating structure to the calibre of what's been designed for the community – and with rowing in mind – is fantastic.

"That will allow us to row in higher flows, and we won't be putting members at risk."

Renmark Paringa acting director infrastructure and environmental services, Tim Tol, said collaboration with the rowing club had been key to the project.

"The asset has been designed in conjunction with the Renmark Rowing Club to make sure it's fit for purpose and supports events like the Riverland Rowing Regatta and similar events into the future," Mr Tol said.

"Once we pair this asset upgrade with the significant Renmark Riverfront Wharf Upgrade, our stretch of riverfront will be even greater for the community.

"The entire process so far has been a positive collaboration with the Renmark Rowing Club and council

looks forward to seeing this improved asset help their club go from strength to strength.

"The project will result in a 70m-long wharf with 6m ramps down on either side to allow the Renmark Rowing Club to host large meets and become a premier destination for rowers statewide."

Berri-based Tonkin Engineering were appointed as designers for the upgrade.

Mr Tol said the partnership with DEW would benefit both council and the surrounding community.

Renmark Paringa Council's involvement is essentially in-kind support and we'll have some external management resources to help manage this project,

which has been factored into the costings," he said.

"Council has received 100 per cent funding from the DEW Constraints Team so that is essentially enabling us to take this on.

"It's a collaborative approach between two levels of government and a very active community group, and it facilitates a sport that utilises our most-prized asset being the River Murray.

"It also is a great cost outcome for Renmark Paringa Council in that we can deliver an increased community asset which aligns with multiple outcomes within our Community Plan with having an active population, and an active community through various methods of

recreation and sport."

Mr Townsend said the upgraded wharf would help the Rowing Club expand its membership.

"It's all part of the big picture," Mr Townsend said.

"If you've got good infrastructure, that makes it easier for people who want to inquire and come along.

"You've got to do whatever you can to keep attracting new members, and new pieces of infrastructure to utilise... is a great outcome for our club and the community in general."

Mr Townsend said the rowing club was "extremely appreciative of the work done by the DEW Constraints Team and Renmark Paringa Council".

RDFS seeking new volunteers

Best for business?

IT'S often said everyone loves an underdog story.

It will be intriguing to see the local reactions that stem from the Renmark Paringa Network's announcement it has been forced to pause its operations, detailed inside today's edition of the Pioneer.

It's hard to forget the day in November 2019 when one of the town's most beloved figures, Pat Mickan, proudly stood before an audience of local business operators at the Renmark Club and laid forth the reasons why a business network would be a valuable asset for the community, and the processes in which it could be established.

It was an inspiring speech coming from someone who was so central to the community, and at the time was running her own business.

Her words captured the minds of numerous members of the Renmark Paringa business community, that would indeed establish the network, and in the years since have become the committed volunteers behind the group's board.

These are people taking time away from running their businesses – and potentially losing revenue – in an attempt to make the surrounding community economically stronger.

However, and those on the network's board would be some of the first to admit, the return on value for membership has been lacking. The reason given is that a source of reliable and ongoing funding has yet to be secured.

This leads us to the current question the board needs answering – does the local community want the Renmark Paringa Network to continue?

While few would say any major warning signs exist, it might be fair to say that Renmark's business community specifically is at a bit of a crossroad. While national retailers have been attracted to the town within the last year, and everyone would have noticed the activity occurring at the infamously long-vacant former Target building on the corner of Renmark Avenue and Ral Ral Avenue, pressure seen across the state is also pushing local smaller businesses to the edge of sustainability.

We've seen one family operated restaurant recently close its doors, and local speculation is that others, and businesses in other sectors, could follow the same direction.

Would the current economic pressure on small-and-medium-sized businesses therefore make it wise for Renmark Paringa operators to stay banded together with the network's structure?

It seems to be in every Renmark Paringa resident's best interest to have a business community as active and successful as possible, and we see examples in other Riverland towns of how a business network structure supports these goals.

One way or another, the network will receive an answer at a community meeting planned for later this month. For those that remember the fate of the previous Renmark Paringa Traders group, this narrative may seem a bit familiar.

However, if the support is there, those members of the Renmark Paringa Network board will undoubtedly be ready to work and take this underdog group to a success story.

THE YEARS GO BY

Paul King, founder/manager of King's Bakery, East Terrace, Loxton, at work on-site of the present-day Country Bakehouse. At right is his then-new Vanguard delivery van in approximately 1950. Paul, born in Adelaide in 1920, moved with his family to Bayah in 1924, into a small railway-siding between Caliph and Wunkar. He attended Pyap West school for two years, riding the five miles in a horse and cart with his aunt, Mrs Lloyd Cockshell, then for three years on horseback. He recalled "my education there did not reach great heights, but I did get a prize for good attendance". The school only went to grade 5, so Paul was then sent to Caliph for three years, sometimes walking the 8 miles a day, though more often "riding a push-bike and



donkeying my little sister Betty, (later, Mrs George Scarfe), which I didn't appreciate at the time". But "it was good for building up stamina", he



said. Having obtained his QC (Qualifying Certificate) at Wanbi, in 1935, Paul moved to Loxton to attend the Higher Primary School, boarding with an elder sister. In 1938 he moved to Alawoona to work for his brother-in-law in the bakery. They serviced all the stores along the line from Wanbi to Taldra. So began Paul's life-long interest in baking. Remembering Gaston

TWENTY years ago the Gaston report recommended that there should be one central hospital at Berri – even though Barmera is the centre of the Riverland – and all the other Riverland hospitals should close.

There were worrying conversations about it in every affected community. At that time I was on chemotherapy, being administered at the Barmera Hospital. My neighbor, Maxine Thiele, was working as a district nurse around the Barmera area, and my father was one of her patients.

At the end of each day she would come and have a cup of coffee with me and agonise about the anxiety of patients out in the blocks who relied on the goodwill of friends and neighbors for transport. I made notes of our discussions.

We discussed the isolation of the elderly put into residential care in another town, when there wasn't even a bus service between Riverland towns. Soon after a service began, but I understand it isn't often enough now.

Then a friend, Judy Andison, rang and asked if I had seen the notice in The Murray

Pioneer about a public meeting the coming week following the Riverland Health Services (RHS) AGM. It was a tiny notice on the bottom of the notice for the RHS AGM.

I said I hadn't, and I hadn't been able to get a copy of the Gaston Report either. She said she had one, which I borrowed and very quickly read. Using notes of my discussions with Maxine I wrote a letter, that ended by urging residents to attend the public meeting, and I faxed it off to The Murray Pioneer and local radio and TV stations. This prompted interviews on radio and the nightly local TV news with me, as president of the Barmera branch of Australian Red Cross.

This resulted in a very rowdy crowd making their opposition heard at the Barmera public meeting.

We kept our hospital, though they reduced it, but importantly we kept our doctors, who moved their surgery into the east wing of the hospital, thereby also closer to the elderly in residential care.

There are so many people working in those Barmera facilities now, so many cars parked around those facilities now that doctors running late with their appointments may cause parking scarcity, like around the big Berri Riverland General Hospital.

Since the Gaston report we've had a pandemic and a river in flood. Just as well we fought to keep our hospitals 20 years ago and rejected Gaston's recommendations.

So a big salute of gratitude: to protestors past, and to health professionals past and present.

Workforce gap hurting the regions

AGED care providers in rural and regional Australia need urgent staffing support, as the Labor Government fails to make

any headway with their serious workforce shortfall.

Evidence during recent Senate Estimates showed that the Labor Government is still overseeing an aged care workforce gap of 4043 registered nurses for the 2024-25 financial year.

This workforce gap looms over the sector as the next tranche of the government's staffing requirements comes into effect on 1 October.

In just a few months' time, aged care providers will be required to find even more additional staff – in the midst of a workforce crisis – in order to provide an average of 215 care minutes per resident, per day, including 44 minutes of direct RN care.

It is rural and regional Australia where we know there are extremely shallow workforce markets, that will be most impacted by the government's workforce gap.

I had the privilege of visiting an aged care home in Whyalla, where residents told me how fortunate they feel to have access to a local facility that allows them to receive the care they need in their home town, remaining connected to friends and loved ones.

With the new October care minutes looming over the sector, at the same time the Department has admitted to a serious workforce shortfall, the government must take urgent action to protect aged care access in communities like Whyalla.

While the government's made the decision to allow 10 per cent of the new care minute requirements to be provided by enrolled nurses, more needs to be done to give provider's flexibility and support.

The government and the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission need to put appropriate safeguards in place that recognises shallow workforce markets, particularly for aged care homes in the bush.

Otherwise, we know that they will be risking even further home closures under their watch.

Large crowds kicked off a march from the Berri Senior Citizens Club to the Berri riverfront for an official opening, welcome to country, and flag raising.

"This is a day that is so important for Aboriginal people and the community as a whole," pastor and local Voice to Parliament member Sheryl Giles said.

"Every step this morning is a step towards reconciliation."

Celebrating the unyielding spirit of indigenous communities, the NAIDOC theme for 2024 was Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud and Proud. Paying homage to the theme, the opening to the Riverland's NAIDOC Week was marked by a performance from Tyreece Giles, 12, on the didgeridoo.

"We still practice culture in

many ways. While the materials we use have been adapted to society, the practice is still important," Ms Giles said.

"An example is that didgeridoo. Though it is made with polypipe, the sound and the purpose are still just as important."

Berri Barmera mayor Ella Winnall said "as we gather to celebrate NAIDOC week, we recognise and honour the contributions of our First Nations people to our community and our nation," in a speech for the event.

"Let us use this week to come together in unity and respect, and to learn from indigenous wisdom and amplify indigenous voices. Through understanding and appreciation, we can ensure that the fire of their culture continues to burn brightly for generations to come."

The day's events concluded with the community nominated and voted NAIDOC awards recognising local excellence, contribution, and achievement.

Indigenous ranger Amanda Morgan was acknowledged for her work on Calperum Station with the

Caring for Country award.

"I have been doing it for about fifteen years," Ms Morgan said.

"It was good to be acknowledged by the community and my people. It's something to put up with the kid's trophies."

Teacher Shane Karpany was also awarded for his extensive cultural work in the community with the Lifetime Achievement of the year award.

"I am very honoured," Mr Karpany said.

"At the schools where I work — Berri Primary, Monash Primary, and various schools around the Riverland — I teach about local Aboriginal culture and dreaming stories. They were the stories our elders taught us, so it's about passing that on."

"It makes me so proud to share my culture and help bring reconciliation and everybody together."

"Nowadays kids have superheroes like Ironman, but for me my superheroes were my parents and I always just wanted to be like my dad. I have become what my dad really wanted (me) to become, and

the award today is an acknowledgement of that."

"The awards have been a great showcase of excellence," Riverland Aboriginal Health nurse unit manager Darryle Barnes said.

"This is a really important way for people to be recognised," Mr Barnes said.

Senior business and culture partner to ac.care and state Voice member to Parliament Rob Wright said, "today has been awesome and celebrated well. It's great to see heaps of young people involved and as award winners too!"

"It's good for the kids to see such success and the different ways it can look," Mr Wright said.

NAIDOC Week will continue until Sunday 14 July and organisers and community members welcome all to come and enjoy the celebrations.

"NAIDOC is about getting everyone involved, not just the Aboriginal community. It's really important to us to break down those barriers," Mr Barnes said.

A boat-load of issues

A RIVERLAND council has begun a debt collection process against a local houseboat business over “significant” owed funds.

An information only report with updates regarding ongoing negotiations between Renmark Paringa Council and Liba Liba Houseboats was included in council’s June ordinary meeting agenda.

The report states council has advised Liba Liba Houseboats its lease would “not be renewed past the current term date of 1 March 2025, and Renmark Paringa Council have requested Liba Liba provide a plan for exiting the lease, removing the infrastructure, and returning the site to (council)”.

The report also states “there is a significant amount owing” from Liba Liba Houseboats to council, and “despite repeated attempts, there has been no response” from operators.

Council then engaged ARMA Debt Resolution (ARMA) to recover the amount.

The report states Liba Liba Houseboats advised ARMA “the electricity is not working, and they are therefore unable to operate and do not want to enter into a payment arrangement”, however council advised on 7 June 2024 the debt collection process would progress.

An investigation through the Local Government Association Mutual Liability Scheme found Renmark Paringa Council had

no liability for damage caused to electrical infrastructure at the area.

A structural condition assessment and a contour survey – arranged and paid for by Renmark Paringa Council – of the slipway at the marina were conducted, showing the following actions were required:

- Replace all railway tracks, including any rotted or uneven sleepers.
- Paint support structure in suitable corrosion-resistant coating.
- Undertake a follow-up inspection by a suitably qualified and experienced engineer once the above work is completed.
- Develop and implement opera-

tion and maintenance manual that addresses the WHS risks, operational requirements, and maintenance requirements.

- Undertake regular inspections of the structure to assess the condition, identify defects and address defects.

Council advised Liba Liba Houseboats it was a safety requirement that these recommendations be appropriately addressed prior to the slipway being recommissioned.

The council report stated “further updates will be provided as the matters progress”.

The Murray Pioneer has contacted the operators of Liba Liba Houseboats for comment.

Dozens of boats unable to take part in rally event

THE owners of about 30 boats found themselves moored around Renmark after a build-up of silt and low River Murray levels in two areas prevented them from travelling to Wentworth, in south-west NSW, for a popular rally.

Owners of the PB Curlew, Jim and Heather Maywald, from Good Hope Landing, east of Waikerie, said it was disappointing for the boat owners who were unable to pass through Warrakoo and an area below Lock 7 to take part in last weekend's Wentworth Junction Rally.

"There are a couple of tricky spots where the river is shallow from sand deposits and the vessels can't get through," Mr Maywald said.

"Since the flood it has gotten worse," he said.

Mr Maywald and his wife left Waikerie on 24 June and found themselves unable to reach Wentworth.

"About 18 paddle wheelers were travelling up from SA and various other house-boats and cruisers," he said.

Water authorities pledge support to boat users

THE Murray Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) and Transport for NSW Maritime have indicated their support to boat users unable to traverse the River Murray from SA into NSW due to a blocked navigational channel.

The MDBA said it actively looks for opportunities to support recreational events and align with other objectives and outcomes that states wish them to achieve.

About 30 boats were unable to pass through Lock 7 to enter NSW and take part in the Wentworth Junction Rally last weekend.

"We publish our annual operating outlook and

Among the boats were several from Mannum that started their journey around 17 June.

On 26 June, the Maywalds and several other boats who were in the same predicament decided to moor at Renmark instead.

"It was a bit awkward with all the riverfront development underway," Mr Maywald said.

The couple and other boat operators spent last week in Renmark visiting the Woolshed Brewery and Chowilla Station, before making their way back home to Good Hope Landing.

Mr Maywald said groynes that had been placed along the River Murray, during the early years of the paddle boat industry, were no longer pushing water into the navigation channels.

He said it was unfortunate water management authorities were unable to clear the channels to allow SA boaters to travel to Wentworth.

"We have been told they would have to double the

flow of the river to clear the area below Lock 7 to allow the water to go through," he said.

"It is a sad situation that they can't clear a couple of channels for us."

"It is not rocket science. If the flood has deposited the sand, let's remove it so that boats can still navigate along the river."

Mr Maywald said it was also disappointing for the organisers of the Wentworth Junction Rally, with numerous boats from SA wanting to take part.

"They would not have had the number of boats they had hoped taking part in the event," he said.

The Murray-Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) said it actively looks for opportunities to support recreational events.

"We publish our annual operating outlook and provide river flows on our website as well as outlining how we are operating each week in the River Murray weekly report to support community events," a MDBA spokesperson said.

The spokesperson said they would investigate if natural processes would rectify the issue without the need for further intervention.

"Transport for NSW Maritime does acknowledge the impact that this sand build up is having on vessel operators and we hope to see a return to normal vessel operating conditions in the near future," the spokesperson said.

New planning rules a 'better preparation' for flood events

NEW planning rules are aimed at mitigating the impacts of future flood events on shack communities, including those in the Riverland West.

The State Government last month introduced the River Murray Flood Resilience Code Amendment, aimed at providing guidance to "rebuild more flood-resilient developments".

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the amendments would improve the development of structures with lower levels.

"I want to make sure it's not a bureaucratic nightmare to rebuild on a flood zone," Mr Whetstone said.

"We have a wide and varied landscape, so this planning amendment was a bit of a blanket approach. I was pretty happy with the outcome, (but) it won't please everybody."

"A lot of the heartache and damage from the flood was from people with enclosed lower levels... (and) it has made it pretty tough to insure."

Mr Whetstone said it was necessary to ensure new developments were better protected against potential future flood events.

"It's better preparing us for the next flood," he said.

"I want to see that we are more resilient. As regional communities we need to be more resilient than living in the city, and I'm hoping these planning amendments will help us do that."

"This is just one small step in a bigger picture."

Riverland-based MLC Nicola Centofanti said further infrastructure projects needed to be finished for flood recovery to be complete.

"We welcome the changes to the planning rules for housing along the River Murray," Dr Centofanti said.

"It is important to ensure our communities build infrastructure that is resilient against future flooding events, however, given the Minister (for Planning, Nick Champion) is – in his own words – keen to help the Riverland community and other river communities "build back better", I would encourage the minister to ensure that his government supports other outstanding flood-recovery infrastructure projects with practical resources."

Amendments to the Planning and Design Code include the following for rebuilding in flood-affected areas:

- Minimum floor height along the river is based on updated one-in-100-year flood event data
- 4m is prescribed as an acceptable – rather than a maximum – finished floor level height
- An increase to 5m for the overall roof height above the finished floor level and overall building height to 9m
- Updated resilient design and material requirements for underfloor structures, including installing roller doors or similar on all four sides of any enclosed area to ensure floodwaters can pass freely
- Glass doors being listed as an unaccepta-

ble solution for external material in under-floor areas

□ Streamlined assessments for sheds, carports and garages that are located behind a riverfront dwelling, removing previous red tape

□ A requirement for open space areas to be maintained around underfloor storage areas, with the maximum storage area increased to 60m², from 15m²

□ Rezoning the flood-affected shack settlement at Paisley to the Rural Shack Settlement Zone to assist development applications and rebuild efforts

Minister for Planning Nick Champion said feedback from flood-affected communities, councils, state government agencies, and the building and construction industry, helped develop the amendments.

"These changes will provide clear and consistent design standards to help communities rebuild."

"We need new houses to be built to a high standard so that if there is another significant flood event, the impact will be significantly less."

"River communities are an important part of regional South Australia and it's important we make these changes to help them build back better."

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Councils secures funding to explore housing potential

THE Federal Government has provided nearly \$341,000 to the Mid Murray Council and \$150,000 to Loxton Waikerie council to fast-track housing developments in both districts.

A total of 80 projects across Australia have received a share of the national \$1.5bn Housing Support Program.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey told The Murray Pioneer the funding would enable council to kick start its growth, management and housing strategy.

"This is a key project that is part of council's 2024-28 strategic plan, that we recently endorsed," she said.

"Receiving this funding right at the start of our strategic plan is amazing."

Ms Bailey said the council would also invest \$80,000 towards the project in the form of in-kind project management.

She said it would enable council to investigate which areas were best to invest in and the type of infrastructure that would be required.

The project will identify potential growth areas in 11 towns including Mannum, Morgan, Tungkillo, Blanchetown, Swan Reach, Sedan, Truro, Keyneton, Cadell, Palmer and Cambrai.

"Detailed township plans will be developed, and a state-of-the-art spatial mapping tool will also be used," Ms Bailey said.

"This will allow council to be strategic when planning assets and infrastructure to support sustainable growth across our community," she said.

"This strategy will seek to address the current housing crisis by identifying growth areas, employment and residential land supply and demand across individual towns.."

Ms Bailey said across the council district housing was in "incredibly high demand".

"Council isn't a developer, so we have been limited in finding solutions to improve access to housing in our area," she said.

"Now, thanks to the Australian Government's investment in our region through the Housing Support Program, council can create a plan for the future that provides a blueprint for sustainable, achievable housing growth across the Mid Murray district."

Ms Bailey said the project would also help inform the State Planning Commission in preparing its regional plan for the area.

"This strategy will seek to address the current housing crisis by identifying growth areas, employment and residential land supply and demand across individual towns," she said.

Ms Bailey said it would also provide an understanding of the development challenges and opportunities in the district.

"All of this information and planning will show us where new housing and employment land could best be located over the next 20 years."

Ms Bailey said the project would position council to ensure its assets and infrastructure supported planned growth.

"It would ultimately fast-track housing construction and lead to increased housing choice and diversity," she said.

Mid Murray Council will start working on the strategy in August 2024 and finalise it by May 2025.

Ms Bailey said community engagement would occur during the process to enable local input into the strategy.

Loxton Waikerie council's \$150,000 Federal Government grant will be part of a \$210,000 project to develop and deliver master plans, design documentation and development applications in Loxton, Loxton West and Waikerie.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said the Housing Support Program was an important part of the Federal Government's \$32bn Homes for Australia plan, which is building more homes across Australia.

"A place to call home is not a luxury or a nice-to-have, but a fundamental need, and our Homes for Australia plan is making this a reality for more Australians," he said.

Riverland 'deserves better' than Sky News withdrawal

RIVERLAND free-to-air TV viewers suddenly deprived of Sky News Regional – as of last week – "deserve better", a state MP says.

People across the Riverland and the state's South-East – plus sections of NSW – lost access to Sky News Regional on Monday 1 July after Sky's affiliation agreement with WIN Television ended.

It means popular opinion programs like *Outsiders*, *The Bolt Report*, *Sharri*, *The Kenny Report* and *Paul Murray Live* are no longer available to viewers in these areas, along with the raft of news offerings on Sky.

One Nation MLC Sarah Game said the decision was a slap in the face to locals looking for some political balance in their everyday viewing.

"I consider Sky News one of the most important news and opinion services across Australia's media landscape, providing crucial balance to the rest of our media," said Ms Game, an SA-based politician in the state's upper house.

"I have heard my supporters in the regions impacted by this decision, including the Riverland, are most upset about losing the Sky free-to-air service."

"Not everyone can afford to pay for their news service, whether that be via streaming subscriptions, Foxtel, or other means."

The Murray Pioneer understands WIN Television's decision was made for economic reasons, including a Federal Government spectrum tax, which industry figures say is outdated and unjustified.

"Firstly I would encourage WIN Television to explore every option available that might enable them to reverse this decision, though I understand commercial enterprises exist to make money," Ms Game said.

"Also, I call on SA Labor to amp up pressure on their federal counterparts to open their eyes to the plight of regional media."

The withdrawal of Sky News Regional coincided with two free-to-air TV channels being switched off in Mildura as of July 1. The closure of the Mildura Digital Television service will now be the subject of a Senate inquiry. "I am well aware of the financial challenges facing the regional broadcast landscape, including the cessation of Mildura Digital Television earlier this year, resulting in the Victorian town of Mildura now being without a Ten signal," Ms Game said.

"However, only last week the Albanese government unexpectedly threw a last-minute lifeline to keep Network Ten on air for half a million Western Australians."

"I'm calling on the Federal Government to display similar empathy for the thousands and thousands of regional South Australians impacted by the sudden loss of the Sky News channels."

The Paul Murray Live Show broadcast live from Renmark in late April, while Ms Game has appeared on several Sky News shows since being elected in 2022, including being interviewed by Sky News stars Andrew Bolt and Rita Panahi.

Free TV Australia said regional television in Australia had "hit a crisis point".

The group called for the introduction of

a new plan to make regional TV broadcasting sustainable and also urged the Albanese Government to step in.

"With content spend going up, and revenue going down, the costs of providing regional TV services across the wide Australian land mass are a serious concern – particularly when you consider the excessive spectrum tax they pay every year," said Free TV CEO Bridget Fair.

"The tax was introduced as a temporary measure in 2017 and should have been abandoned years ago."

"The solutions to keeping the lights on for regional TV are squarely in the hands and control of the Albanese Government."

Free TV is calling on the government to abolish the spectrum tax and amend the Prominence and Anti-Siphoning Bill to ensure that "all Australians can watch their live and free sport no matter how they get their free TV, and can find their local TV services on their current TV sets without needing to buy a new one".

Free TV also wants the government to review regulatory imposts on commercial TV stations that do not apply to digital competitors that sell advertising against them – such as licence area restrictions and rules that limit ownership arrangements.

Sky News recently introduced its own streaming service, which is available for \$5 per month (SkyNews.com.au). Sky's website is free to access for stories and some videos, while Sky News Radio also provides free audio of its TV shows.

Minister for Communications, Hon Michelle Rowland, said the Federal Government was unable to salvage the service for locals.

"The Australian Government recognises the importance of a diverse and sustainable media sector, and the key role that news media outlets play in keeping communities informed," Ms Rowland told The Murray Pioneer.

"(However), this is a commercial decision for Sky News and WIN TV, and the Government does not seek to intervene."

The Federal Government's recent seven-year extension of the agreement to provide the Viewer Access Satellite Television (VAST) service is the reason funding is being provided to carry the Network 10 signal in Western Australia. VAST is a taxpayer-funded safety net for remote and regional Australia, with more than 1.5 million Australians receiving commercial broadcasting services via the satellite service.

New SARM scheme for young doctors to complete training in rural South Australia

YOUNG doctors training in the Riverland have increased access to medical services for locals.

Medical education in rural areas has become a key element in healthcare access to residents within the Riverland, and presents doctors with the opportunity to join the rural workforce, delivering career opportunities for existing ones and improving access to quality healthcare.

The new South Australia Rural Medical Program (SARM) allows medical students to undertake their entire training in the Riverland.

Flinders University deputy dean Claire Drummond said the initiative was aimed at "tackling the critical shortage of doctors in regional areas".

"Our rural medical program will play a critical role in addressing doctor shortages in SA country areas, with studies showing that the best prospect for keeping and attracting doctors to rural Australia is to offer training and placements in those areas," Prof Drummond said.

Research shows students who choose to study in rural areas are more likely to work in regional cities, small towns or communities when they graduate.

"We want to immerse our medical students



in these regional areas for training so that they can see firsthand the wonderful aspects of living and working in a welcoming rural community," Prof Drummond said.

The new program and funding will allow the university to expand its education area, meaning students can undertake their entire four years of study in the Riverland.

The SARM program will be available to 46 students per year from 2025.

"Our goal is to graduate cohorts of locally trained doctors who are well-rounded, understand the impact of social factors on health, and incorporate cultural sensitivity into their daily practice," Prof Drummond said.

Starting in 2025, priority admission for the SARM Program is for residents of rural South Australia, Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander applicants and applicants from interstate with rural backgrounds.

The new program and funding will allow the university to expand its education area, meaning students can undertake their entire four years of study in the Riverland.

The SARM program will be available to 46 students per year from 2025.

THE importance of discussing mental health challenges was highlighted to Riverlanders by a well-known charity.

The Ski for Life Mates on a Mission initiative, conducted by Mike Rolls and Ben Pettingill, also known as 'Legless and Blind', recently held numerous sessions at Riverland schools and sporting clubs.

Mr Pettingill said connections to the Ski for Life event promoted Riverland participation in the initiative.

"I think being a Ski for Life program... and having that existing relationship throughout the Riverland (meant) there was definitely an appetite from the community," Mr Pettingill said.

"It was very grateful and excited that a charity that skis through every year was then putting a program on for the community, and giving back to a community that has supported the event for a number of years."

"We spent a full day at all the high schools, then we had the community events that were really well supported as well, with great turn outs and really powerful, impactful conversations off the back of it."

Mr Pettingill said the will-

ingness to speak about mental health openly was increasing in regional communities.

"It's getting there (but) I think there's a stigma that still exists, and that's why we'll keep doing what we're doing," he said.

"The hard part is the numbers of lives we lost to suicide in 2022, that hasn't necessarily changed... however I don't think you can ever put a number on it, and you'll never know the lives you save through those conversations, because people don't know had bad they would have gotten if they hadn't have spoken up."

"We've had a lot conversations where people have said 'thanks for the session, I'm going to seek professional help'... so you can only hope it's making a difference."

"Getting tough people to talk

about tough stuff is what the program is all about, and doing it in a real and down-to-earth way, and having a laugh as we do it. We're trying to make people comfortable as we have those difficult conversations."

School sessions were held at Waikerie High School, Swan Reach Area School, Berri Regional Secondary College, Renmark High School, and St Francis of Assisi Renmark, with community events held at the Waikerie Football Club, Renmark Rovers Football Club, Barmera-Monash Football Club, and Berri Football Club.

Mr Pettingill said promoting responsible discussion of mental health challenges among young people was an ongoing goal.

"The youth programs equip our next generation with proactive tools to not only look after

their own mental health, but support that of their peers, and to not be afraid to put an arm around someone and say 'how are you going?'" he said.

"They can talk about the hard parts of life, and I think that's important, because there's more than enough pressure growing up for young people, and bottling it up isn't going to help."

Mr Pettingill said other Riverland sports clubs and community groups could apply through Ski for Life to host Mates on a Mission sessions.

"If they are connected to Ski for Life, clubs and community groups can apply for a similar program, otherwise there is Ski for Life grants available as well that can support getting us to the town," he said.

Free male mental health session

RIVERLAND men are encouraged to attend a free information session aimed at discussing mental health throughout the community.

Male mental health has become an important topic in recent years, mainly due to being overlooked.

Steph Noon, a qualified healing and wellbeing coach said the statistics can and must change. "Most of the men share the same concerns and struggles, yet often feel they are alone in their feelings,"

"Increasing community connectedness leads to stronger relationships and decreased isolation. Most importantly, normalising individual experiences can have a powerful positive impact" Ms Noon said.

Living in rural and remote areas has raised a red flag, with men facing significant stress caused by isolation, relationship conflicts and family pressures. Financial concerns, natural disasters and pressure to overachievement in their jobs have been among causes of depression.

Understanding that the

concept of meeting in a Men's Circle may feel unfamiliar, Steph is providing an opportunity to learn more, ask questions, and meet Steph personally.

According to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW), rural populations are twice as likely to die by suicide if compared to urban residents. The alarm was raised when the study showed that 75 per cent of those who took their own life were male (ABS, 2022).

With the need to change and improve men's mental well-being, 'Men's Circle' for the men of the Riverland was created.

The initiative aims to provide an opportunity to bring men together in conversation, fostering empowerment and developing well-being tools and strategies to increase personal growth.

The event will be held on 23 July from 9 am at the Loxton Hotel, followed by free morning tea. Anyone is encouraged to attend.

No new local fruit fly outbreaks declared

FRUIT fly outbreaks in the Riverland stayed stable during the last fortnight, with the total number of current outbreaks remaining at 51.

A total of 22 areas within the Riverland have been detection-free for the last 12 weeks, with a number also having no recorded outbreaks in over a year.

PIRSA incident controller Jason Size said restrictions on fruit movement remained critical.

"As the school holidays approach, many travellers will be on the move" Mr Size said.

"It's critical that people don't bring any restricted produce into the Riverland Pest Free Area or across our state borders".

Fruit Fly Emergency Response general manager Con Poulos was positive about the fewer detections.

"We will continue our control measures such as hygiene, bait, trap, and sterile fruit fly releases because we can't be complacent about this ongoing threat," Mr Poulos said.

"It's crucial to dispose of any at-risk fruit or vegetables in roadside quarantine bins before entering the Riverland, and to keep all homegrown produce on your property if you're located in an outbreak area."

Quarantine teams from PIRSA will be on alert during the South Australia school holidays, with random roadblocks being set up to prevent and mitigate the entry of restricted produce into the Riverland.

Travellers are being reminded to be responsible and dispose of any fruits or vegetables in the designated roadside quarantine bins.

"Our goal is not to penalise travellers coming in and out of the region, but to educate them and protect the Riverland," Mr Size said.

"However, we must maintain vigilance to safeguard our produce industry."

Riverland residents and produce growers can search their addresses online (fruitfly.sagov.au/outbreak-map) to understand how these restrictions might affect them.

Failure to comply may result in fines if restricted produce is discovered during roadblock inspections. Travellers are also urged to check the list of at-risk host fruits and vegetables before packing.

The projected end date for all Riverland outbreaks is 23 December.

Community consultation needed for Riverland Water Safety plan

RIVERLANDERS are encouraged to offer consultation and feedback on the Riverland Water Safety Strategy by 31 July.

Aimed at reducing drowning incidents in the Riverland, the draft strategy results from a collaboration led by the Royal Life Saving Australia, involving input from 33 stakeholders from various organisations committed to drowning prevention and water safety in the region.

"The 2024 Water Safety Roundtable involved representatives from government, local councils, lifesaving, emergency services, ambulance, police, water corporation, aquatic facilities, and holiday parks," Royal Life Saving South Australia chief executive officer Jake Culkin said.

"The dedication and cooperation from all stakeholders involved has been remarkable and shows the level of commitment the Riverland's community has to water safety and drowning

prevention in the region."

"The strategy highlights key priorities and outlines goals to improve water safety and prevent further, unnecessary drowning deaths."

A 2023 Royal Life Saving report highlighted the Murray River as the leading inland waterway blackspot for drowning in Australia. The Riverland holds a fatal drowning rate 50 per cent higher than the national average and more than double the rate for the rest of South Australia, with 17 deaths recorded between July 2002 and June 2023.

Riverland stakeholders convened in Renmark in May, to workshop and co-design the Riverland Water Safety Strategy, reinforcing a collective commitment to preventing drowning in the region.

Key goals of the strategy include:

□ Ongoing Collaboration: Strengthening and expand-

ing the River Murray Safety Working Group to ensure consistent support for cooperative efforts.

□ State Policy Engagement: Advocating for increased marine compliance resources for the Riverland and aquatic facility infrastructure support.

□ Joint Campaigns and Messaging: Partnering to design and disseminate educational materials and safety messages with a unified voice to maximise impact.

□ Swimming and Water Safety Skills: Enhancing and supporting programs that teach essential skills and knowledge, ensuring equitable access for all.

"The River Murray, Lake Bonney, and other open water locations in the Riverland region are vital to the community's economic, social, and health outcomes," South Australia Police SS1C Riverland operations Mark Howie said.

"We are very fortunate to have these beautiful waterways, which offer places for recreation and relaxation."

"Unfortunately, the number of drowning deaths clearly demonstrates there is work to be done in improving water safety in this region. The Riverland Water Safety Strategy is crucial for safeguarding our community, and it is a step in the right direction to ensure that we provide safe enjoyment of these waterways to both residents and visitors."

"No one knows this region better than our community members, so I strongly encourage them to support this strategy and provide feedback."

NBN fibre upgrades underway at Waikerie

INFRASTRUCTURE construction company Fulton and Hogan has started the upgrade of the NBN fibre in Waikerie.

NBN Co regional development and engagement manager Travis Bates said about 850 homes and businesses would benefit from fibre upgrades in the area.

He said construction had started, with a view that customers should be able to place an order through an internet service provider of their choice by the end of the year.

Mr Bates said the fibre was inherently more capable of delivering faster upload and download speeds.

He said customers running more concurrent devices could upload and download files faster, experience higher-definition streaming, faster game downloads, and fewer interruptions.

"By pushing fibre deeper into communities NBN is further enabling the benefits its network brings," Mr Bates said.

He said this included supporting online education, tele-health services, the ability to work from home, gaming and streaming, connecting more smart devices, and strengthening social inclusion.

Mr Bates said the NBN network was best placed to enable Australia's digital future by facilitating access to high speed and capacity at scale.

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

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Local voices needed on telecommunications issues

RIVERLANDERS are encouraged to have their say on telecommunications issues with submissions to a federal government review closing in under a month.

Regional Telecommunications Independent Review Committee chair Alannah MacTiernan is urging locals to have their say via a short survey, before it closes on 31 July.

"This opportunity comes around only once every three years and the strength of each committee's recommendations back to government – and the actions they take – are underpinned by the views of people living in regional, rural, and remote communities," Ms MacTiernan said.

"People in regional, rural and remote Australia are relying on telecommunications services more than ever before and reliable, high-speed connectivity supports public safety, day-to-day business, social inclusion and access to essential health and education services."

"I would encourage every regional Australian to tell their friends, family, and colleagues about this opportunity and to get their own views in ahead of the closing date in a few short weeks."

The committee, established to conduct the Australian Government's Regional Telecommunications Review, is examining the experiences of people in regional, rural, and remote parts of Australia and the suitability of their telecommunications services.

Residents, businesses and community organisations can make a submission or complete the survey, with the terms of reference outlining key issues for the Committee to examine. An issues paper has also been released to shape ideas.

The input of local communi-

ties will form an essential part of the review, which will see the committee deliver its recommendations to the government.

Previous reviews have led to policy initiatives and programs such as the Mobile Black Spot Program and the National Audit of Mobile Coverage all a direct result of community feedback.

The terms of reference, set by Federal Minister for Communications, NSW-based MP Michelle Rowland, outline the key focus areas in the Review:

- Opportunities for new and emerging technologies to strengthen telecommunications systems in regional, rural and remote areas of Australia.
- The effectiveness of existing government initiatives.
- The Modernisation of the universal services arrangements.
- The Strengthening telecommunications in natural disasters.
- The extent to which the needs of First Nations communities are being met.

Prescribed burn success in Riverland

AUTUMN burning programs in regional parklands, including the Riverland, were aimed at limiting the spread and intensity of bushfires.

Conducted by the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS), the program completed a total of 90 prescribed burn programs in the past 12 months.

Following a dry start to winter, the 2024 program continued into June.

Favourable weather conditions and long autumn season helped the NPWS to complete more burns than its long-term annual average.

NPWS Fire Management director Fiona Gill said burns completed in the past 12 months helped to reduce bushfire fuel loads.

"We fully acknowledge that the prolonged dry conditions through autumn were very challenging for SA's agricultural sector, but they provided us with the right conditions to complete a high number

of vital prescribed burns," she said.

Nearly 60 burns were conducted in the Mount Lofty Ranges due to the region's high population and number of national parks and reserves.

Other bushfire mitigation activities, such as slashing, weed control and fire track maintenance were carried out during autumn to reduce bushfire risk on public land.

Large burns were undertaken in Ngarkat Conservation Park in the

Murraylands and critical areas of the Riverland.

Burns unable to be completed due to unsuitable weather are rolled over to the following spring or autumn as part of an ongoing, rolling three-year mitigation program.

The annual prescribed burn program is planned with the Bureau of Meteorology's forecast and includes extra controlled burns to allow for flexibility and unfavourable weather conditions.

"Staff planned and

prepared programs carefully and looked for every opportunity to undertake this important work, including performing burns which we had not been able to complete in previous years." Ms Gill said.

South Australia's prescribed burns are a shared responsibility between the Country Fire Service, government agencies that manage land (DEW, ForestrySA and SA Water), councils and private landholders.

Red Tree Services expanded to help grieving families

RIVERLAND families who have lost children unexpectedly can find support through initiatives of SIDS and Kids SA.

The State Government committed \$800,000 over four years in 2022 to SIDS and Kids SA to expand its Red Tree Foundation grief counselling service. Red Tree Foundation aims to contact newly bereaved families within 72 hours of referral, providing counselling and support through home visits, telephone calls, telehealth, in-office and off-sites visits. With a previous age limit of 6 years old, State support has allowed the organisation to offer support to families affected by the sudden and unexpected death of a child aged up

to 17 years.

Hundreds more counselling sessions are being offered to bereaved family members, with counsellor hours increased and community support groups expanded. The funding now also allows the organisation to expand its support to wider family units, which includes grandparents, aunts, uncles, and friends of affected families, through organised community support groups, dinners, and community events.

In 2023, Red Tree Foundation was able to offer 2099 counselling sessions, a 73 per cent increase on the 1210 sessions provided in 2020. Additionally, the not-for-profit organisation provides education,

training, and information about grief and loss, with the aim of promoting compassion and understanding around the loss of a baby, child, or teen.

"The response to the expanded services has been phenomenal. The additional funding has allowed us to help even more families, ensuring that support is always available for those who seek it," Red Tree Foundation CEO Liza Jankowski said.

The majority of referrals come from SA Health hospitals, but families can also self-refer or be guided to the service through other organisations such as SAPOL.

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Funding for a sound South Australian education

RIVERLAND school students will have access to expanded music education programs through a state-wide initiative.

The State Government recently announced it will commit \$7.5m in funding towards expanding music education in schools. With \$2.5m contributed annually for the next three years, the initiative hopes to ensure every child and young person has access to quality music education from the early years.

The recently released Setting the tempo report identified the benefits of music and learning in the classroom. Conducting a survey from teachers and representatives from 115 public and primary schools, 97 per cent agreed that music improves students' educational experience, while 94 per cent also saw a positive impact on literacy and numeracy skills, and reduced stress and anxiety among students.

However, many agreed that teacher training, dedicated facilities, and appropriate resources are lacking.

The extended investment will go towards buying more musical instruments for schools, extra training, upskilling non-specialist teachers to become music teachers and making music more accessible by having music spaces and rooms available at schools. The curriculum will include a music education that includes singing, playing a musical instrument, and song writing or composing.

"This research adds to the body of evidence linking music learning and students' educational, developmental, and personal wellbeing outcomes," The Tony Foundation's music education executive director, Emily Albert, said.

"Now, we must ensure access to resources and the good practices adopted by many schools are equally applied to all in the state, so no student is left behind in their learning journey."

Minister for Education, Blair Boyer, said "music education helps to develop thinking and learning skills, lifts literacy and numer-

acy standards and enhances wellbeing".

"Starting quality music education early and continuing to deliver music learning and opportunities provides benefits throughout a child's school life and beyond," Mr Boyer said.

Probus ladies hear keeping fit and healthy is the key

THE Waikerie Ladies Probus Club's June meeting focused on health and fitness, with guest speakers Hannah Lehmann and Helen Georges from the Berri Riverland Lymphoedema Clinic.

Many Riverlanders would be aware of Hannah's background and involvement in sport, particularly netball and basketball.

During Covid, Hannah completed fitness courses and then started training clients at her home.

Word of mouth spread and bigger premises were needed, so she moved her 1-4-1 Fitness business into the heart of town.

She now has about 25 personal training clients, and runs group sessions that include weight training and high-intensity activities.

She conducts riverside activities some Sunday mornings, has conducted boot camp sessions at the high school and occasional sessions for seniors.

Anyone interested in learning more can check Hannah's Facebook page.

She stressed work on maintaining muscle strength, balance, and co-ordination is desirable, while having also good social connections – like those Probus provides – as people age.

After morning tea, Helen, with associates Sue Frahn

and Donna Markellos, spoke about lymphoedema.

This highlight what it is, how it impacts people, how it is treated and how the lymphatic system, which includes tonsils, adenoids, and the spleen, ensures fluid balances in people's bodies and contributes to their immune function by helping the body get rid of toxins and wastes.

The lymphatic system can be impacted by surgery, injury, chemotherapy, radiotherapy, sunburn and both hot and cold extreme temperatures.

If people develop symptoms, such as areas feeling heavy, skin feeling tight and even close to bursting point, some skin areas being extremely hot, pins and needles, darting pains, painful joints, and swelling, they need to see a doctor and get a referral to a specialist. Treatment includes pressure, pumps, and compression garments, such as gloves, sleeves, and stockings.

People with limited budgets can get financial assistance for the garments through the SA Lymphoedema Garment Subsidy Scheme.

One thing that can help lymphoedema specialists and other specialists is a SOZO machine, which is the world's most-advanced device used to test fluid and

tissue in the body.

Helen invited Lyn Nitschke, from the Caroline Bristow Wig Library, to speak about the machine as the group, with the help of an Adelaide CWA group and a Riverland Lions Club, is trying to raise the funds needed to buy one to be placed in Helen's premises, instead of people having to travel to the Flinders Hospital.

A SOZO machine costs

about \$17,000. The machine measures muscle and bone mass, fat percentage, body fluid, protein and mineral content, basal metabolic rate and more. It can be used for athletes in training, for osteoporosis patients, to check how well people are recovering from surgery or illness, for rehabilitation, to monitor improvements over time or to check for deterioration and if early intervention is needed.

It sends a mild electrical current through the body via foot and hand pads. It is pain free but not suitable for people with pacemakers or other electrical implants, or pregnant women. It even generates reports that the therapists use to organise treatment.

There should be news soon about various fundraising activities which Lyn, Ellen Traeger and breast nurse Rebecca Semmens

hope people will support.

Modlinski stars as Renmark outmuscles Barmera in A1

A STAR performance from Sonja Modlinski helped Renmark overcome a fast-starting Barmera outfit in Riverland A1 netball on Friday night.

Berri enjoyed a fast start at The Precinct, taking a three-goal lead into the opening break as Brooke Franks made the most of her opportunities under the ring.

Star goal attack Abby Fenwick made a strong start to the contest with four opening quarter goals, before picking up an injury which saw her miss the remainder of the clash.

A major factor of Berri's success was due to the speed of ball movement from the likes of Eliza Jones and Chelsea Foulds.

Trailing by one-goal at the half time interval, Loxton stormed home and gave strong opportunities to star shooter Mackella Hogan, who finished with another remarkable 56-goal effort.

Hogan was well supported by goal attack Aimee Holmes, who finished with 11 goals, while Elise Foulds was at her best yet again.

The next round of Riverland netball is scheduled for 19 July, opening the start of the association's Pink Rounds where Berri is set to host Loxton North, while Loxton faces off against Barmera at The Precinct.

Netball's next generation on show in Loxton town

A LONG-standing event on the Riverland netball calendar was recently held again, with teams of junior players from across South Australia taking to Loxton.

The Loxton Junior Netball Carnival has been a permanent fixture in the Riverland since the 1980s, and current carnival co-ordinator Joanne Hondow has been involved for more than a decade.

Ms Hondow described the event as a major success, and said she sees Riverland netball continuing to improve over time.

"The weather was really helpful, but we did only have 19 teams which was down from 36 last year," she said.

"We're probably putting that down to Elizabeth running a carnival on the same day, and it clashes with SAPSASA too, so we're possibly looking at changing the date in the future."

"The teams that came all really enjoyed every-

thing. Most of the teams were from the Riverland, but we had some come from the Hills, and River Murray Netball Associations too."

"The teams love coming up here and look forward to coming back each year, which is really good too."

A total of 14 teams represented the region's towns, and although the Hills side took home wins in the under 15s, under 13s and under 11s competitions, the home sides competed strongly.

"It's something different for the girls, and although they are the same teams who play on weekends, they are shorter games and the scoring is different which is nice for the girls," Ms Hondow said.

"The Hills sides are representative teams so they're always really tough competition."

"I think this year was the first year we really gave them a run for their money, and we had three Riverland sides in the finals with them."

"The Loxton North under 15s put up a really strong fight and were just unlucky to miss out, and that was the same with the Loxton under 13s and under 11s."

"This is definitely the closest we've gotten to them, so we'll keep pushing, but I think Riverland netball is looking really strong from a junior perspective, which is exciting."

Ms Hondow hoped to continue the event next year and into the future, although plans are in place for continual improvement.

She said Loxton was an inaugural venue for the carnival, and recent upgrades to The Precinct further enhance why it is a good option.

"Loxton started it back then, and it's just something they've continued to do and it is their major fundraiser for the year," she said.

"It has always been run by Loxton and we got a lot of positive comments

about the facilities and the amazing set up we have, which only encourages the teams to continue to keep coming along."

Ms Hondow praised the work of the junior netball carnival committee during the carnival, and said the event would have been less successful without its hard work.

"I can't praise our catering team enough, and they did an amazing job with supplying food, and we had a lot of positive comments about that throughout the day," she said.

"We have an awesome committee, and the Loxton netball committee also supports the carnival committee and it always makes work much easier when we have a really strong group."

"Everyone gets in and gets the jobs done, and although it is an early morning start it's all worth it in the end."

IN one of the closest Riverland Football League contests of the 2024 season, Barmera-Monash managed to hold off a fast-finishing Renmark by just six points in a top-of-the-ladder A grade clash.

Kicking with a significant breeze towards the yacht club end of the ground, the Roos took a slim lead into the opening change, with Dain Austin booting the only goal of the quarter.

Controlling much of the possession throughout the second quarter, Renmark utilised the breeze to its advantage, and star forward Nick Gillard rose to the occasion.

Despite conceding the opening goal of the second quarter to Jono Beech, the Rovers found goals through Dan Woolford, before Gillard booted two goals in as many minutes to put his side in front at the major break.

Sam Butterworth starred for Barmera-Monash throughout the midfield, finding the ball with ease and providing opportunities for outside runners such as Fraser Sampson and Jameson Whitbourne.

As well as finishing with three majors, Beech spent time in and around the contest, particularly throughout the final quarter to put

the Roos in a winning position, while Luke Thomas held his composure across half back.

Coming into the game without playing coach Josh Vater, Renmark relied upon the leadership of captain Matt Woolford who stood tall, while brother Dan enjoyed what was arguably his best performance of season 2024.

Ricky Garrett played a crucial role across half back alongside veteran midfielder Jaryd Rowe, who also saw plenty of the football.

The win keeps Barmera-Monash in top spot, having amassed 10 wins on the trot, while Renmark follows closely in second position.

Following the competition-wide bye through the SA Country Football Championship competitions, the Rovers next fixture comes on 20 July against arch-rival Waikerie in Renmark, where it hopes to complete a season sweep of the Magpies.

Elsewhere, Barmera-Monash will return with a trip to Tigerland to face Loxton, hoping to further strengthen its grip on the top of the RFL A grade ladder.

Loxton North will remain on the road when Riverland football returns, taking on Berri at RFL HQ, while Waikerie travels to the kennel for a clash with the Rovers.







AFTER a one-year absence, the Riverland Women's Football League trophy has returned to the Berri Football Club on the back of a thrilling 11-point win over Barmera-Monash in the 2024 grand final on Thursday night.

Waikerie stunned the Demons in the 2023 decider, when a lone Sarah Campbell goal decided the contest.

"It was a shame not to see Waikerie in the competition this year, but the girls were certainly happy to make up for the loss last year."

The contest was littered with key moments, and the game shifted momentum in the third quarter when Barmera-Monash received a yellow card for a late tackle.

Geyer has been heavily involved with the Berri Football Club for a lengthy period of time, winning an A grade premiership with the Demons in 2010.

Furthermore, Geyer is a current B grade player with the Demons, and also assumes the role of fitness coach.

He said the positive culture of the women's outfit is significant, and has put them on the path to success.

"You just have to give the players credit for the culture they have built, and it's second-to-none from any side I have been part of," he said.

"They really just lead it from the front as a playing group, and that's how they get the results and success they keep seeing."

"It was a thoroughly deserved win by the girls because they have put in a 100 per cent effort both on and off the track to get where they are so they're all pretty elated."

Berri forward Stacey Geyer was awarded best on ground in the victory, and said she was surprised to win the medal.

"I thought there were quite a few other contenders in our team that

Food for the soul

SINCE being named Senior Australian of the Year in 2010, food icon Maggie Beer has been a passionate advocate for the wellbeing of the nation's older people. For the past 10 years, she and her foundation have been quietly running a food revolution in Australia's aged-care residences.

With nearly 200,000 Australians living in residential aged care – a number predicted to increase by 80 per cent in the next two decades – and the recent Aged Care Royal Commission finding as many as 68 per cent of them are malnourished or at risk of malnutrition, Maggie has a huge task on her hands.

In a bid to turn around these shocking statistics, the chef is leading a world-first experiment, joined by occupational therapist Elizabeth Oliver and registered nurse Julie Smith, that aims to overhaul the dining experience in a Perth aged care home over four months.

Last week, Maggie arrived at the Dr Mary Surveyor Centre, meeting with residents and staff while assessing the current standards and shortfalls. In this second instalment, breakfast is the first order for Maggie, sharing her porridge recipe with chef Sas and cook Richard before the real test awaits: what will 89-year-old Merle make of the changes?

Maggie's holistic approach to residents' health, wellbeing and enjoyment of their meals goes beyond good taste – her impact on the residents' lives is also sure to fill the hearts of viewers.
