

## Movement of bee colonies into SA means varroa outbreak now 'highly likely'...

A SENIOR Riverland politician is "deeply concerned" at the potential risks caused by a decision to allow bee colonies from varroa mite outbreak areas into South Australia.

PIRSA has announced the movement of bee colonies from varroapositive interstate jurisdictions into South Australia will now be permitted entry under specific movement conditions, in an attempt to support business continuity for the beekeeping industry and pollination-dependent partners.

A PIRSA spokesperson said an incursion of varroa into South Australia was "highly likely".

"While PIRSA is allowing bee movements from varroa-positive jurisdictions, there are strict conditions in place for permitted entry," the spokesperson said.

"PIRSA is also increasing compliance activities, including border checks permit verification, and surveillance. This reflects a balanced, risk-managed approach developed in consultation with the South Australian Varroa Industry Advisory Committee.

"Allowing the movement of hives from varroa-positive jurisdictions with strict controls supports critical pollination services and business continuity for South Australian agriculture, while maintaining strong biosecurity safeguards

"PIRSA's varroa development officers are available to assist all

beekeepers — commercial or recreational — with hive management, biosecurity practices, and monitoring and education."

"Strict conditions" in place for the permitted entry of colonies into SA include:

- □ No proximity to known varroa detections within 25km in the past 12 months.
- □ No previous varroa detections in the beekeeper's operations.

□ Mandatory testing, certification, and pre-treatment protocols.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia Nicola Centofanti said protecting the state's horticultural industries needed to remain a priority.

"The Minister (for Primary

Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven) has now confirmed what industry has been warning for months, that there is a significant shortfall in local hives, and the situation is continuing to deteriorate," Dr Centofanti said.

"While I welcome the acknowledgement of the problem, the government's response remains deeply concerning. Opening our borders to hives from varroa-affected jurisdictions is not a decision that should be taken lightly.

"The risk to South Australia's bee population, and by extension our food and fibre industries, is real, and must be managed with absolute rigour and transparency."

Dr Centofanti said "South Australia is now facing a pollination crisis, with hive numbers in steep decline".

"Without healthy, local hives, our pollination-dependent crops are at risk and with them, the economic future of key agricultural sectors," she said.

"We need a co-ordinated plan to rebuild South Australia's hive capacity, including targeted drought support for apiarists, incentives to keep hives in pollination service, and greater transparency around the health of our state's beekeeping network.

"Proactive leadership is needed now more than ever. This is not just a seasonal hiccup, it's a structural biosecurity and food production risk that must be treated with the urgency it deserves."

### \$97,000 Loxton North project added to budget **HUGH SCHUITEMAKER**

A \$97,000 shelter and viewing structure at Loxton North has been approved in the local council's budget - without ratepayers having the chance to provide feedback on the spend.

The Loxton North Recreation Grounds Committee's (LNRGC) initial request to include funding for the structure was declined, and not included in the Loxton Waikerie council's Draft Annual Business Plan presented for pub-lic consultation.

However, it has since been

#### added to the council's 2025/26 budget, after a notice of motion - from local councillor Michelle Hill - was passed at the council's meeting last month.

The project is described as a "shade, shelter (and) viewing structure".

Just seven written submissions were received on the Draft Annual Business Plan, however council has linked the \$97,000 allocation in its approved budget to the fact that five of the seven submissions referenced the absence of a Loxton North project.

"During public consultation on the Draft Annual Business Plan, 70 per cent of submissions highlighted the community's support for a budget allocation for the Loxton North Sporting Precinct," a council spokesperson said.

Council CEO David Beaton said the process of including a project outside of the initial Draft Annual Business Plan was commonplace.

#### **Property damage incidents at Renmark businesses**

### **Riverlander in court over** sex offence charges

A RIVERLAND man has pleaded not guilty to historical child sex offences that spanned a period of almost five years.

Nicholas Lawrence Moore, of Loxton, last week pleaded not guilty to gross indecency, and a retrospective charge of maintaining an unlawful sexual relationship with a child now known as sexual abuse of a child.

Moore, 57, last Thursday appeared in the Adelaide Magistrates Court, via video link from the Adelaide Remand Centre, to enter pleas for the alleged offences, dating back to 2015.

Court documents that were obtained by The Advertiser allege Mr Moore engaged in numerous sexual acts with - "or towards" his alleged victim, between 2015 and 2019, when she was under the age of 17.

It is also alleged Mr Moore committed an act of gross indecency in front of a person under the age of 16 years, at Loxton, between January 2015 and August 2019.

It is understood Magistrate Brian Nitschke remanded Mr Moore in custody to face the District Court in October.

## Eyes on last two streams of Wine Recovery Program

INCREASING domestic demand for South Australian wine, and developing leadership within grapegrowing communities, such as the Riverland, is the focus of a major industry initiative.

The SA Wine Recovery Program, established last year by the State Government, represents a \$2.5m commitment, developed following recommendations from the National Viticulture and Wine Sector Working Group, and established to support the wine industry following recent adverse events and market disruptions.

Stream two aims to boost demand for South Australian wine, with the domestic market being the largest single outlet.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said "the three streams of the Wine Recovery Program have been designed to have broad benefit across the wine industry, with these next streams focused on increasing national demand and continuing to boost the upskilling of our industry professionals".

"The State Government is committed to supporting our wine and grape sector after a very difficult period of significant external challenges," Ms Scriven said.

"The Wine Recovery Program is delivering benefits for South Australia's grape and wine industry and the regional communities that are integral to its success.

A State Government statement on the matter said "recognition, preference and demand for South Australian wine in the domestic market will be grown through a South Australian wine promotion". Stream three will provide credentials to position the South Australian wine industry as the leading sustainable wine state in Australia, with growers and winemakers being preferred as business partners, both locally and worldwide.

The third stream will also focus on improving governance capability of regional producers and industry leaders, and those from representative organisations, to enable them to address the challenges facing the wine industry.

SA Wine Industry Association CEO Inca Lee said "This program represents a valuable investment by the State and Federal governments in our growers and winemakers, at a time when the industry is working through significant adjustments and disruptions".

"It's designed to support long-term success across South Australia's wine regions," Ms Lee said.

"Boosting domestic demand is important and this program supports targeted action to grow our presence at home while lifting our sustainability credentials and strengthening governance across the sector.

"It's a practical, forward-focused plan that will deliver benefits for the people and places behind South Australian wine."

Federal Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Julie Collins said "this investment demonstrates the commitment to supporting the Australian grape and wine sector to address challenges and ensure the industry's long-term sustainability".

"The project is a great example of the partnership between the Commonwealth and South Australian Government, industry and growers to build local and international demand and capability," Ms Collins said.

Winegrape Council SA CEO Lisa Bennier said "we welcome the Wine Recovery Program and its clear focus on supporting South Australian grape growers, winemakers, and our regional communities.".

"The three streams will help address some immediate challenges facing our industry, while also backing the people and places at its heart," Ms Bennier said.

"In South Australia we recognise the real strength in working together, and we value the genuine collaboration with the State Government and SAWIA to develop and deliver these positive outcomes." Mr Whetstone said.

RIVERLAND politicians say measures aimed at supporting the local wine industry through ongoing challenges, under a program started in 2024, "The national wine

"The national wine industry engine room is the Riverland, and its bearing the brunt as commercial wine sales continue to decline globally.

"That's why good information and transparency is key to good decision making by our primary sector, not recycled political spin by the Labor Government."

Barker MP Tony Pasin said tangible support for winemakers, and grape growers, facing financial difficulty was still lacking.

"The latest offering from the State and Federal Governments for a wine industry in crisis is embarrassing," Mr Pasin said.

"It offers no real relief for wine grape growers,

many of whom are facing financial ruin. "It is perhaps not surpris-

"What Riverland wine grape growers and the wine industry more broadly needs is immediate financial relief and support to transition. In truth the industry needed that 12 months ago. Instead we get half-baked, half measures which are quite frankly

insulting." Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti said the recovery initiative "falls short of addressing the immediate and pressing challenges facing grape growers and winemakers across South Australia".

"This announcement is nothing more than a rehash of old news dressed up as something new," Dr Centofanti said.

"The reality is that our wine industry has been on its knees for over 18 months... growers aren't asking for media releases, they're asking for help.

"This is the worst wine grape crisis in a generation, and the Albanese and Malinauskas Governments are still tinkering around the edges. There's no urgency, no new funding, and no tangible support that actually reaches growers where they need it.

"The industry deserves better than spin. It deserves action, and this falls well short."

THE Riverland's Federal MP says recommendations from an industry report examining dealings between wineries and grape growers should be implemented "as quickly as possible".

Wine Australia on Monday released the review of regulatory options for the wine and grape sector report – also known as the Emerson report – examining fair trading, competitive relationships, contracting practices and risk allocation between grape growers, winemakers and retailers.

A summary for the report – authored by Craig Emerson – states "a mandatory code is the only viable option" to ensure balanced dealings between wine grape growers and large wineries.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said implementing the reports recommendations before the next vintage would be beneficial to the Riverland Wine industry.

"I welcome the recommendations of the Emerson Review and note that they echo the calls I and others have been making for many months," Mr Pasin said.

"I call on the Albanese Labor Government to accept those recommendations and set about implementing them as quickly as possible.

'Given that the industry has been

in crisis for so long the (Federal) Government ought to ensure the measures set out in the review are operational in time for the next vintage."

"I would like to thank Dr Emerson for his comprehensive and considered report," Ms Collins said. "This is an important piece of work on an industry all Australians should be very proud of.

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# A blow to Tim's farming plans

A RIVERLAND farmer is facing one of the toughest dry seasons in memory, as relentless drought conditions continue to devastate crops and stretch resources.

Tim Paschke, a grain producer from Holder, near Waikerie, has described the current season as among the worst he's experienced, with dry sowing, severe winds, and ongoing feed shortages pushing both his farm, and his resilience, to the limit.

Mr Paschke, who farms approximately 14,000 acres, said this year's conditions have been worsened by a combination of persistent winds, and years of reduced ground cover.

"We sowed a lot of our cropping dry, we sewed up to 14,000 acres in before the rain," he said.

"But accompanied with the lack of rainfall last year and, obviously, the previous year before that, our wheat stubble cover for the ground has obviously diminished over the last couple of years.

"This year, by May, we should have farmed most of the land, but the lack of rainfall, only 5mm by July, has left us with nothing but a soil full of seeds, and no sprouts."

With little-to-no stubble left to protect the fragile sandy soils of the region, wind erosion has become a destructive force on the farm.

"When we've got a dry sow accompanied with some of the worst wind we've seen,

a lot of our paddocks are not holding," Mr Paschke said.

"The wind that is coming through is grabbing the sand and blowing it through the fences, pulverising any bit of stubble cover that we've got remaining."

Despite applying best-practice soil management techniques, Mr Paschke said the severity of the drought has outstripped all efforts.

"We've used low-to-zero till farming techniques, but it hasn't done anything, so until it rains properly, we can't reseed," Mr Paschke said.

"At this point, if we don't get a significant amount of rain in the next four weeks, I don't really know if we're going to reap a grain at this stage."

Livestock management has also taken a hit, with the farm now relying entirely on hand feeding.

"We've got all our lambs closed in feedlots because we knew there was going to be a shortage of cover," he said.

"In July, you would have thought we would have had some green feed, but we haven't.

"As lambing season begins, we have let our sheep into the last remaining uncropped stubble paddocks, but that feed won't last too much time.

"We'll be hand feeding all the way through that, and at the end of eight weeks, if it hasn't rained, we'll probably just have to sell them because there is going to be no

food for them."

The financial and emotional toll the drought has taken on Mr Paschke is increasing at this stage of the season.

"I can't afford to buy feed, and I'm not going to do a 12-month stint by scattering what we have left, that is, if it rains next year," he said.

"I've got to hand feed sheep for another 18 months, and I'm simply not going to do it.

"It is not good for my mental health and certainly, not good for my bank balance."

Looking ahead, Mr Paschke says selling stock and waiting out the drought may be the only option.

"As a last resource, we might have to sell them and buy them back in once the drought's lifted," Mr Paschke said.

"We have some paddocks that we can't run livestock on and probably won't be for about 18 months."

The situation echoes the hardship facing many in the Riverland and Mallee regions.

### Council ticks off major flood recovery project

THE reconstruction of Riverview Drive is now complete, marking another "significant milestone' in Berri Barmera Council's flood recovery works.

Riverview Drive, in Berri, suffered significant damage as a direct response to building an earth levee along the road during the 2022/23 River Murray Flood.

However, after public consultation. securing additional external funding and expanding the scope of the project, the works are now complete.

Berri Barmera Council CEO Tim Pfeiffer said the highly-anticipated project was worth the wait.

We know that locals have waited a long time for this project and thank Riverview Drive residents and road users for their continued patience,' he said.

"It is satisfying to tick this project off of council's to-do list, made even more satisfying by the delivery of a high-quality result and a significant budget saving."

Mr Pfeiffer said through "careful" planning and cost management, the project was delivered \$416,000 under budget.

Council will receive 70 per cent of the project funding for the likefor-like road renewal through the South Australian Government's Local Government Disaster Recovery Assistance Arrangements.

With Riverview Drive and the remediation of culturally-heritage sites at Lake Bonney now complete, Mr Pfeiffer said Lyrup Road was Council's last major flood-recovery project.

"We are continuing to work towards the repair of Lyrup Road following last year's funding announcement, which saw the State Government commit to 100 per cent of the project funding," he said.

"We are working with State Government departments for potential flood-mitigation measures to be considered in the redevelopment of Lyrup Road.

We thank these State Government departments for wanting to futureproof and make additional upgrades to this important Riverland road."

RIVERLANDERS travelling across two major local bridges can expect to experience delays due to roadworks until "mid-November".

The State Government on Monday announced the Gurra Gurra Creek Bridge, located on Bookpurnong Road, and the River Murray Flood Plain Bridges, located on the Sturt Highway between Renmark and Paringa, will receive scour repairs.

Bridge scour occurs when fast-moving water washes away the dirt and rocks from the bridge's foundations, creating holes in the piers and abutments, which weakens the bridge.

As part of the State Government's \$40m plan to fix infrastructure damaged by the 2022-23 River Murray Flood, the repair works will be carried out on the piers and abutments of the Gurra Gurra Creek Bridge, and the River Murray

Flood Plain Bridges.

Floating barriers will also be installed within the Gurra Gurra Creek water course to isolate the work area from water vessels. The adjacent bridge spans will remain open for recreational water activities.

The repairs will take place from Monday to Friday between the hours of 7am and 5pm, and works are expected to be completed by mid-November 2025.

Locals are advised speed restrictions will be in place during working hours, and some lane restrictions may be required at times throughout the works, with speed and lane restrictions removed outside of working hours.

Once works are completed on Gurra Gurra Creek Bridge, the current load restriction applying to mobile crane trucks will be removed.

The works form part of the River Murray Flood Recovery

**Upgrade works on Riverland Bridges** Program, and it is understood the project will support 15 fulltime jobs during the construction period.

> "The 2022-23 River Murray floods were a stark reminder of how vital our bridges are during a major flooding event and the importance of maintaining our bridge infrastructure", a Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said.

"We understand these bridges are a key link to connect families, businesses and communities and we thank you for your patience as we undertake this important work.

"Scour repair is a critical step in protecting the structural integrity of our bridges and ensuring the safety of the local communities who use them daily.

We'll work hard to minimise disruptions and complete these repairs as efficiently as possible.'



## **Backing one of our best**

FRIENDS of a life-long volunteer and Riverland emergency worker are asking fellow locals to join them in helping restore "independence and dignity" of one the region's most dedicated faces.

In joint partnership, the Rotary Club of Berri and the Berri Bike Boys launched a major fundraising appeal last week, with the initiative aiming to raise \$102,276 to purchase and modify a wheelchair-accessible vehicle for long-serving Riverland paramedic and volunteer Michael Cook.

"Michael has been, and is, a valued part of the Berri Bike Boys for more than a decade, and was a Rotarian for 20 years, recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow, and served in multiple leadership roles including president," Berri Bike Boys member Jim Rosenthal said.

"He is a pillar of the community, and has always been there for everyone else — we had to do something for Michael because he is just an inspiration to us all.'

Suffering a spinal injury that paralysed him from the neck down after his wheel caught while on a ride with the Berri Bike Boys in 2023, Mr Cook has had to both readjust to living his life as a quadriplegic, while also shouldering the financial burden of his new reality.

Ineligible for the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) due to being over 65 at the time of his accident, Mr Cook, now 72, has to outlay funds for Calvary St Catherine's Aged Care facility - where he now resides — while also upkeeping his home.

Additionally, if he wishes to go beyond the Berri CBD, he must pay for the Disability Taxi Service in the Riverland, which is both cost prohibitive and its hire is dependent on staff availability.

"I routinely have to go to Adelaide for specialist appointments, and that can cost up

to \$1500," Mr Cook said.

"When I wanted to go to Loxton for my mother's funeral, it was \$250 return, and when I wanted to go to a Barmera funeral of a friend, it was \$170.

"The taxi also can't guarantee it will be available on weekends.'

With a legacy of community service as a paramedic, a volunteer with St John Ambulance, the Country Fire Service, and Berri Regional Hospital Emergency Department, Mr Cook - who was also in Operation Flinders and was a member of the Loxton Hockey Club - said the restriction of his chair is difficult to manage with his love of the outdoors and adventure.

"I have to admit, (being so restricted) plays on your mind," he said.

"I have been home for a year now, and I still haven't been able to get a far as Bunnings, as often I am completely reliant on using my wheelchair.

"I am just very limited where I can go ---even in the CBD sometimes the pathways are too rough for my chair, and I also have to be mindful of the weather if it's raining or incredibly hot.'

Rotary Club of Berri president Bruce Richardson said acquiring a Toyota HiAce bus — which will be fitted with wheelchair access — for Mr Cook was more than just mobility, but restoring Michael's independence, dignity, and connection.

"There has been such a commitment and dedication from both Michael and Vesna to find the positives in something very difficult," he said.

"However, since the accident Michael has missed out on connections that once were very much a part of his life.'

Mr Cook said being around friends, family, and his wife has been the key in his rehabilitation for the past year.

"I really don't know how I would've pro-

gressed in my recovery without the support I have received," he said.

"It helps so much with my mental health, just to know people are behind you and they want you around.

It makes you really want to try and reach that full recovery.

"I was in a rehabilitation centre in Adelaide for 12 months, but my recovery since I have been home has completely outweighed anything I did in the city — that's purely because I am in my own environment, with really good friends around me, and my wife, Vesna.

"The amount of work my wife does for me every day is amazing. Vesna has been such a support to me and there every step of the way while also still working three days a week — she is an absolute inspiration to me.

"I must admit, some days I do get down.

However, having this support system makes all the difference.

"To be able to get out in the community more would just be amazing and continue to help my rehabilitation so much."

Having raised more than \$18,000 from the Rotary Australia Compassionate Grants program, Berri Bike Boy contributions, and local donations, Mr Cook said he "couldn't express in words the gratitude and thankfulness (he) felt".

"Life is pretty tough at the moment, so I can't believe so many people see fit to give away their hard-earned money to me - I am just so grateful," he said.

#### Cultural heritage lake sites now restored THE restoration of several Lake Bonney cultural heritage sites is now complete thanks to a local working partnership.

Berri Barmera Council, together with River Murray Mallee Aboriginal Corporation (RMMAC), Aboriginal Affairs and Reconciliation (AAR), and Green Industries SA (GISA), saw the remediation of several sites which were affected by emergency management provisions during the 2022/23 Murray River flood.

Berri Barmera Council Mayor Ella Winnall welcomed the restoration of the Aboriginal cultural heritage sites.

"Council strongly advocated for these works, and it is pleasing to see the sites now restored in a way that respects and protects their Aboriginal cultural heritage significance," she said.

"The effort by all involved parties to ensure these sites were restored in a sensitive and culturally-appropriate way is commendable.'

During the 2022/23 Murray River flood, hundreds of sandbags were imported to protect cultural heritage sites around the Lake Bonney foreshore under declared emergency management provisions.

Unfortunately, the supplied sandbags and their contents were made with unsuitable materials and were required to be carefully removed to protect the underlying cultural heritage sites.

In addition to the sandbag removal, additional sand was brought in to add further protection to the sites, with the project completely funded by GISA.

River Murray Mallee Aboriginal Corporation (RMMAC) board director and senior cultural heritage officer Philip 'Willow' Johnson said he was "pleased" with the restoration efforts.

"I'd like to think our ancestors will be looking own and smiling on us knowing these sites have been restored," he said.

"They are very important, significant sites."

North Lake is now fully accessible, with remediation of campsites 2 and 4 and the walking trail to commence in coming months.

The remediation of the campsites and walking trail is part of the State Government's Community and Recreational Asset Restoration Program.

## No news for a bargain

THE challenge of ensuring global tech giants such as Google, and Meta – operators of Facebook - fairly renumerate news publishers for the content shared through their platforms is again examined in today's Pioneer.

Despite increasingly sophisticated technologies meaning the vast collection of humanity's knowledge is largely at our fingertips – be it through a PC, phone, tablet, video game console, or smart TV - it seems the issue of misinformation, and its effects, are only getting worse.

A look at everyone's favourite hegemonic state, America, over the past 10 years can show how damaging misinformation can be throughout a society.

Despite being the one to coin the phrase "fake news" into the public vernacular, it was Donald Trump who arguably benefitted the most from misinformation during his first crack at a presidential election, in 2016, when campaigns run from Russian-run propaganda companies had the sole objective of sabotaging Hilary Clinton's chances.

However, misinformation surrounding Mr Trump really reached a peak from 2017 onwards, with the emergence of the QAnon movement. While the space for this editorial is – rather fortunately – too small to go into many specifics, this conspiracy evolved from internet message boards and proposed Mr Trump was a would-be saviour in a war on child sex trafficking.

A 2022 survey showed 16 per cent - getting toward one in five – of total Americans were QAnon believers, which rose to 25 per cent when looking at Republican voters

Mr Trump's second stint in the Oval Office has also provided a platform to a figure with views on public health matters that could be described as flat-out dangerous.

Robert Francis Kennedy Jr – perhaps better known by his initials RFK - currently serves as the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services. He holds this position, as the nation's top health advisor to an estimated population of more than 347 million - while being an ongoing proponent of the theory that vaccines cause autism in children.

Mr Kennedy's appearance on the Joe Rogan Experience podcast – one of the most listened to forms of entertainment on the planet – a little over a year ago reflects the issue that conspiracy theorists are no longer kept to the fringes of society. In some cases, they are holding positions of power.

As one final example of the destructive effect misinformation can have on young people, a 2019 American survey revealed a third of the country's population aged between 18 and 24 were unsure of the planet's shape.

As with the countless conspiracy videos on Youtube and TikTok, all of the – hopefully useful – information mentioned above can be sourced within a matter of minutes through internet searches. So the danger is not so much in the facts being covered up, it is in the changing of the way the public thinks and learns, and what information they choose to class as reliable.

On the other hand, whether you're a young footballer looking at the results, or a homeowner seeking insight into council rates, every time you read a newspaper, efforts are being made by trained professionals to ensure factual integrity, and balance, are the top priorities.

Vaccines don't cause autism, the Earth is a sphere, and newspapers remain the best source of trustworthy information relating to your local community.

From applying organic bait and hanging traps to checking fruit and vegetables for signs of infestation, every visit plays a role in stopping the spread of fruit fly.

But even with careful planning, nature doesn't always cooperate.

Last week's strong winds made it difficult to apply bait, so our baiting teams paused their work and were quickly reassigned to other important field tasks.

These occasional changes are a reminder that biosecurity responses rely not just on science and logistics, but also on trust, local knowledge, and strong community support.

We're incredibly grateful to Riverland residents for continuing to open gates, share information, and adapt with us.

Your co-operation is making a real difference, especially in unexpected times such as when visits need to be rescheduled.

#### Flu vaccines must be administered safely

THE South Australian Government's decision to allow

pharmacists to administer the flu vaccine to children under five must be carefully monitored for safety.

Increasing access to flu vaccination is a vital public health goal – particularly for children under five, who are at higher risk of severe illness from influenza.

Vaccinations must be delivered safely, effectively, and within a co-ordinated, medically supported framework.

While increasing access to pharmacists to vaccinate children under five may improve convenience and uptake, it is important to ensure this policy is backed by appropriate training and clear, established protocols, to ensure children are referred to GPs and paediatricians if they require more comprehensive care.

It is the expectation of the Australian Medical Association in South Australia (AMA SA) that all policy initiatives are followed up by ongoing evaluation to ensure the policy is safe and effective, that any adverse events are recorded and reported, and that any risks are reviewed and addressed.

The AMA SA stands ready to work with the South Australian Government to advance public health policies that are guided by medical evidence and serve the interests of the community - especially as the flu continues to surge.

We're facing a perfect storm - rising patient presentations, ongoing pressure on GPs to care for all patients, and the added strain of healthcare workers falling ill with the flu.

This pressure is reflected in our emergency departments. The latest ambulance ramping figures show 5382 total hours lost in June - making it the second-worst month ever recorded.

At this time – and always – we expect that any changes to public health policy, especially those involving vulnerable patients such as children, are co-designed with clinicians and carefully evaluated.

Our aim must be not only to increase vaccination coverage, but to do so in a way that supports safe, high-quality care for every South Australian – young and old alike.

#### 500,000 reasons for a diabetes check

THERE are an estimated 500,000 Australians currently unaware they have Type 2 Diabetes, putting them at risk from the serious health impacts associated with it - are you one of them?

National Diabetes Week 2025 started last Sunday, and the Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) is urging rural and remote Australians to make an appointment with their doctor for a diabetes health check.

Everyone should take diabetes seriously. Diabetes contributes to more than 21,000 deaths in Australia each year.

It is among the 10 leading causes of death in Australia, with men 1.7 times more likely than women to die from it.

Among other things, it is a leading cause of stroke, heart and kidney disease, dementia, preventable blindness, and limb amputations.

While type 1 diabetes accounts for around 10 per cent of all cases, type 2 diabetes makes up 85 per cent – and,

worryingly, that's increasing. In fact, the number of people living with type 2 diabetes in Australia almost tripled between 2000 and 2021, from around 400,000 to almost 1.2 million.

While type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease that cannot be prevented and must be managed through life-long daily insulin therapy, type 2 diabetes can often be prevented and managed through better lifestyle choices.

Three-in-every-five cases of type 2 diabetes are preventable through early diagnosis and intervention – including things like eating healthier foods, exercising more, losing weight, quitting smoking, and managing your blood pressure and cholesterol.

The most important first step is finding out whether you have type 2 diabetes, or are at a heightened risk of developing it – that's why getting a regular check-up with your doctor is so crucial.

We urge all rural and remote Australians, particularly those who are over 40 years old, to book an appointment with their local doctor to check their diabetes risk – and if they are diagnosed with type 2 diabetes, to ensure they get on top of it early.

It is also crucial that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 18 years and older have an annual diabetes screening test.

Those diagnosed with type 1 or type 2 diabetes should also see their doctor and/or other health professionals at least

annually for regular checks of their eye health, feet, blood pressure and kidneys, to reduce the risk of long-term complications. Gestational diabetes will normally be managed during a woman's pregnancy by her healthcare team.

If you are diagnosed with diabetes, it is crucial you do all you can to keep it well managed - that includes getting regular check-ups.

When it comes to acting on potential symptoms of type 1 diabetes, early intervention is crucial. If you or someone you know experiences the sudden onset of symptoms like an unquenchable thirst, a feeling of being inexplicably tired, the need to urinate more frequently than usual, or overnight bedwetting, don't delay in seeing your doctor or getting to hospital these are the classic symptoms of type 1 diabetes, and if left untreated type 1 diabetes can be fatal.

While type 1 diabetes, or juvenile diabetes, is mostly diagnosed in younger people, adults can certainly also be diagnosed with it – so it is important to take heed of the warning signs and to act fast in seeing a doctor or getting to hospital to be assessed.

#### No worry in our tap water supply

SAINT-Louis, France, has banned tap water after tests showed contamination of PFAS (poly-and per-fluoroalkyl substances), chemicals commonly used in products such as fabric protectants, waterproof clothing, food packaging and fire-fighting foams.

Whilst PFAS are a concern, a water contamination high enough to cause harm is unlikely to happen in Australia.

The contamination of PFAS in drinking water in Saint-Louis, France is clearly concerning, especially for those directly affected.

However, while headlines like 'PFAS at four times the recommended limit' sound alarming, the actual limit is incredibly low and in France, no harm has been demonstrated yet.

A tap water ban or similar situation is unlikely to happen in Australia, except in the event of a serious industrial accident. Most potable water supplies in Australia either have no detectable PFAS, or concentrations below even the recently introduced guidelines for Australian drinking water.

We often overlook the fact that the mere presence of something does not mean it will automatically cause harm. For example, we know we can get skin cancer from UV light, but that does not mean we will get cancer as soon as we go outside.

Although there are places in Australia where extensive use of PFAS-containing firefighting foams has occurred, for example airports or fire-fighting training grounds, these areas are known and managed. **PROFESSOR OLIVER JONES**

## **Tee-rific support for Berri Golf Club**

#### MADISON EASTMOND

A MAJOR golf course has received \$245,400 in state funding to complete essential upgrades over the next two years.

The Berri Golf Club has successfully applied for the State Government's Community Recreation and Sport Facilities program (CRSFP), with the recent funding supporting an upgrade of \$445,000 for the club's irrigation system.

"For many years, the club has been dealing with the issue of (pipe) blowouts which create huge water and irrigation inefficiencies," Berri Golf Club vicepresident Doc Clifford said.

"It's been a major concern, and it was getting to the point where every week we were having a major blowout, and the loss of water was very costly both financially and environmentally.

"The time-consuming and expensive repair work also puts added pressure on our greenkeepers, who must delay general course works to fix them.

"So, to be awarded with the grant is just amazing. "With the new irrigation infra-

structure, we will be able to

develop the course further, and improve it to be fit for purpose for the many golfers and community groups who utilise our facilities." Berri Golf Club president

Wayne Thiele said the grant will make up half of the estimated project cost, and has taken three to four years off the initial project timeline that was initially outlined when relying on the committee to self-fund the works.

"As a committee we had already done some diligent saving which has been collected from fundraising events and from our valued sponsors over the past four or five years," Mr Thiele said.

"We will be making up the difference to get the project completed but obtaining the grant has been unbelievable.

"It's a mammoth job, but now we're way further in front than we ever thought we would be now we can start the work and provide the community with the best course possible in a much quicker timeframe."

With the space also home to the Big River Golf and Country Club, The Par 5 Shacks, and Earth Restaurant, Mr Thiele said it was important for the committee to maintain the facility so it could continue to be "one of the major hubs of the Riverland".

"The club is right in the centre of Berri, and it's a major drawcard for both locals and visitors from all over Australia" Mr Thiele said.

"Overall, for the Berri Golf Club to continue to be a major destination for the local community and for visitors to the area, we need to continue to take the steps to improve all of our facilities.

"The upgraded irrigation infrastructure will allow us to water the course more efficiently, which will result in huge improvements in the quality of the grass coverage and health.

"The club is such an important part of the region, and we are just so glad we can keep on improving it and ensure another 40 to 60 years of security."

Though recently recovering from a maintenance shed fire at the beginning of this year, Mr Clifford said the upcoming works will place the club "in a better position than it ever was".

"We have fantastic committee members, regular volunteers, and wonderful club members who are so appreciative of the effort being put in," Mr Clifford said.

"The positivity around the club is just fantastic."

"Over the past couple of years — this grant included we have received more than \$320,000 in grant support which has been significant to the club. It has allowed us to improve many of our facilities and has greatly assisted in establishing a positive and secure future for the club as we move forward.

"Right now, is a really exciting time for the Berri Golf Club and the future is looking very positive."

Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Emily Bourke said "the CRSFP program tackles the issues that can impact South Australians being active and having access to inclusive spaces".

"We are supporting clubs and organisations to deliver fit-forpurpose infrastructure to boost grassroots participation, with a strong focus in our regions," Ms Bourke said.

Manager of the Waikerie Hotel Motel Brenton Franks said the dinner service on Saturday night had to be cancelled due to health and safety reasons caused by having no running tap water.

"We had about 160 guests booked in for dinner that we missed out on, but these things happen sometimes," Mr Franks said.

The hotel catered for its in-house guests. and people staying at the off-site motel in rooms and cabins were also offered the chance to purchase these meals as well.

Mr Franks said it was unfortunate that the town lost its main water supply on Riverland Enduro weekend, which is one of Waikerie's busiest times of the year.

"It is usually one of our busiest weekends," he said.

"We did not have any trading during the whole of Saturday,"

"We had a great day trading in the hotel on Friday and Sunday, but sadly nothing in

between,"

Mr Franks said unfortunately the toilets were unable to work at the hotel and motel with the water that was still in the system on Saturday, until SA Water switched on the mains late in the evening.

This caused the closure for the whole day on Saturday.

Mr Franks said the guests who attended the enduro on Saturday had been hoping to enjoy a shower, but unfortunately had to wait until late that evening when the water was restored.

### SA Water investigating Waikerie pipe damage

SA WATER said its crews have successfully completed water network repairs in Waikerie, with mains water supply fully restored for local customers.

A spokesperson said crews worked throughout Saturday to complete the complex pipe repairs, which temporarily impacted mains water supply in the town.

"Pipe repairs were completed on Saturday evening, with supply progressively restored following this," the spokesperson said. "As a result of the inci-

dent, water and silt entered the exterior yard of two properties, and we are working to support these

residents and return their properties to the state they were in before this event.

"We supported our customers throughout this event by establishing a temporary water collection point at the Waikerie Football Oval, with several critical customers, including the local hospital, connected to a water tanker to maintain supply."

SA Water said some customers may notice a slight discolouration or temporary change in taste to the water, which can occur as a result of any sediment stirred up during the process of recharging the pipe.

"Importantly, your water

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remains safe to drink, and this can be easily cleared by running an outside tap for a minute or two," the spokesperson said.

"We thank our local customers, the local council and the broader community in Waikerie for their patience and support while we completed repairs as quickly and safely as possible.

"While it's too early to detail exactly what caused this incident, our team will undertake further investigations to understand the condition of the affected section of pipe."

## Waikerie's burst water main blues

A BURST water main near the Waikerie SA Water Tower, on Burns Street, resulted in a number of nearby properties becoming inundated with water on Friday night.

Due to the flooding, SA Water had to turn off the town's water supply for about 27 hours in some areas.

Waikerie CFS captain Shaun Arnold said the properties that were affected were in Kleemann Street, and Cates Avenue.

He said the water reached some sheds in the area, but fortunately failed to inundate any homes.

Mr Arnold said fortunately an SA Water staff member was able to promptly switch off the water entering the water tower quickly.

"We did some sandbagging around properties in the area," he said.

"The water did impact around some houses in nearby Warrawee Lodge also, but there was no internal damage there," Mr Arnold said.

"We believe the water was heading to below the old tennis courts, but due to the ground being as dry as it was, it appears to have been soaked up before it got that far," he said.

Mr Arnold said 12 Waikerie CFS volunteers from three units, and the Barmera SES attended the scene.

He said staff members from the District Council of Loxton Waikerie also provided assistance in closing Burns Street to motorists, and putting up signage.

One of the Waikerie residents who experienced flooding on her property due to the burst water main was Pat Brandon, who lives on Cates Avenue.

Mrs Brandon has lived in her home for 20 years and was shocked to hear from a neighbour via a text message the water from the burst water main on Friday night had entered her property.

She went outside and witnessed with her neighbours the water quickly moving down Kleemann Street into her street, Cates Avenue, and into her yard.

Mrs Brandon and her neighbours are

grateful to two local teenagers. Lachlan Sweet-Collett and Jack Coombe, who armed themselves with shovels to collect nearby dirt to try and prevent the water from entering properties in the neighbourhood, including hers.

'They were brilliant, they went right up the street and helped everyone and anybody,' she said.

"They also followed up with a couple of people who were impacted on Saturday.'

Mr Arnold also praised the actions of the two boys and said their assistance was valuable to his CFS crew.

"Those two lads did do a good job and saved us a lot of time and effort," he said.

Mrs Brandon is glad that the water failed to come inside her home, but said it did run into her property, under her house and into her shed.

She said hopefully the water caused no structural damage to her house, which is on stilts, and she would be seeking advice from SA Water on this.

SA Water on Monday offered to help Mrs Brandon clean up the mud left behind by the flooding.

Waikerie couple Brian and Kerry Rogers' property was also flooded on Friday night, but fortunately they were able to prevent the water from coming inside their home through their front door.

Mr Rogers said they were surprised to see water on their street and in their yard after they returned home from Friday night happy hour at the Waikerie Bowling Club.

He said the water flooded their yard and shed, but they are grateful no real damage had occurred.

The water also brought in bark chips from their neighbour Mrs Brandon's property, and left behind a lot of mud and dirt.

"We are fortunate that there was no real damage, it was a matter of cleaning up for us," Mr Rogers said.

Mr Rogers, 79, began cleaning up on Saturday and Sunday morning and said he would continue with the task, but would welcome some assistance from SA Water if that was possible.

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## **Citrus SA responds to labour hire breaches**

A LOCAL senior citrus industry figure is confident Riverland growers are utilising existing system measures to minimise potential employment risks, after a recent report revealed 92 per cent of audited labour hire providers in South Australia were noncompliant, placing citrus labour hire firms among the worst offenders.

Chair of Citrus SA and Sunlands-based grower, Mark Doecke, acknowledged the seriousness of the findings and reaffirmed the industry body's stance on ethical employment.

"Citrus SA promotes the use of legitimate labour hire contractors and agrees with Citrus Australia that there is no place for underpaying workers," Mr Doecke said.

The report highlighted a range of troubling practices, including wide-spread cashin-hand payments and the absence of payslips, indicators of underpayment and non-compliance with workplace laws.

Mr Doecke noted the labour hire licensing system was intended to prevent such exploitation. "The labour hire licence system was supposed to address the underpayment of workers, and it is disappointing that these issues are still being reported," he said.

As inspections have increased over the licensing of labour hire operators, Mr Doecke urged growers to take more responsibility in verifying who they contract.

"Citrus SA encourages growers to verify the credentials of any contractors or workers on their farms," he said.

The Fair Work Ombudsman also flagged difficulty in contacting labour hire providers, and in obtaining necessary employment records.

Mr Doecke was realistic when asked how Citrus SA can support growers in selecting reliable labour hire partners. "It is very hard for any

organisation to recommend

businesses," he said.

"Word of mouth is a good tool between growers to help weed out the unsatisfactory contractors."

With substantial fines now being handed down to employers found to be in breach of their legal obligations, Mr Doecke said Citrus SA continued to remind its members of the importance of compliance.

"Citrus SA periodically reminds growers of their obligations when employing anybody on their farms," Mr Doecke added.

"Citrus SA agrees with Mr Hancock who said many horticulture industries wanted a national labour licensing scheme that protected all labour hire workers from bad actors."

The Riverland is one of Australia's most productive citrus-growing regions, and as the peak season progresses, industry leaders are calling for stronger enforcement and a cultural shift toward full compliance, both to protect workers and to safeguard the sector's reputation.

### New hearing aid simulator gives back control

A DIGITAL tool developed by PocketAid is giving Riverlanders the power to explore hearing support without stepping into a clinic or committing to costly devices.

The free online Hearing Aid Simulator allows users to 'test drive' the benefits of hearing aids in the comfort and privacy of their own homes.

PocketAid CEO Don Hudson said it's a breakthrough for anyone hesitant to acknowledge hearing challenges, for people living in regional and rural areas, where access to in-person hearing services can be limited.

"The simulator is perfect for anyone curious about hearing improvement, who may have previously been unsuccessful with hearing aids or hesitant to explore them," Mr Hudson said.

"It delivers a powerful preview of the kind of clarity, tone balance, and speech recognition now possible with ready-to-use technology."

An estimated one-in-four Australians will

have some level of hearing loss within 25 years, yet many will go undiagnosed, with reasons often including stigma, cost, and the logistical burden of seeking help.

The free tool allows users to input their own audiogram, or choose a hearing loss profile – mild, moderate or severe – and then experience realistic listening simulations in 12 real-world scenarios such as:

□ Having a conversation in a busy café.

U Watching television.

Talking on the phone.

The simulator also allows family members to gain insight into a loved one's hearing loss, helping them understand their challenges and better support them.

Early intervention is critical, as untreated hearing loss has been linked to cognitive decline, falls and social isolation, and an increased risk of dementia.

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## **Two public meetings on Renmark Paringa Council**

TWO meetings inside four days – one staged by council, the other by a critic – will discuss Renmark Paringa Council's future plans, projects and rate increases.

Tomorrow night the council will host a public feedback session on its 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget, along with other planning documents.

Then, on Sunday afternoon, Renmark woman Jenny Troeth - founder of a community group dedicated to helping and advocating for local ratepayers - will hold her own "public forum", aimed at giving locals another chance to speak on council matters, including a planned 11.25 per cent rate increase.

The council session is at the Renmark Club from 5pm to 7pm tomorrow, when residents can speak directly to council staff and elected members.

Mrs Troeth's meeting is at Hotel Renmark, on Sunday, from 2pm to 3.30pm.

Mrs Troeth, who founded the soon-tobe-rebadged Renmark Paringa Houseboat Collective and contested the federal seat of Barker for One Nation at the May Federal Election, encouraged locals to attend both meetings.

## Weed warriors protect the Murray

THE Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) have successfully undertaken a \$808,900 project aimed at eradicating priority pests to protect the sustainability of the Murray River, and its wetlands, floodplains, creeks, and tributaries.

Funded through the Landscape Priority Fund, the MRLB completed the threeyear project, Weed Warriors of our Waterway, earlier this year, tackling six weed species across 560,000 hectares of "flood footprint" along the Murray River.

"It was pretty exciting for us to receive funding for a project like this, as weeds and pests often aren't high on the priority list," MRLB Riverland district team leader Hannah Spronk said.

Eradicating weeds – including yellow water lily, arrowhead (sagittaria), cacti, African boxthorn, boneseed, and golden dodder — that sit along a "major invasion pathway" that receives weed seeds from Queensland, New South Wales, and Victoria, Ms Spronk said the MRLB had to conduct "extensive river and creek surveys to measure the infestations across.

"A lot of (these seeds) are pushed out by floods and fluctuating water levels, so we wanted to get a complete

picture of what we were dealing with — especially post our (2022/2023 Murray River) flood," she said.

"One of the great things is that we haven't really seen major infestations of the yellow water lily, except downstream in our region.

"Having this information means we can be on the front-foot with surveillance, because the best way to stop these species from becoming established is when they first start to appear.

'We're now able to do targeted control.'

Surveying 22,500 hectares, and treating 6176 hectares, Ms Spronk said the past three years of work will allow fragile ecosystems of the waterways, and native vegetation, to thrive in the future.

"Weeds quickly outcompete native vegetation and change the structure," she said.

"Weeds can also be fruit fly hosts, and for the aquatic weeds, such as the yellow water lily, entire wetlands can be suffocated — which is not great for the aquatic life, or for humans who would like to access the waters."

Partnering, connecting with, and educating with landholders, five councils, Aboriginal peoples, volunteers, and user groups to undertake the Weed Warriors initiative, Ms Spronk said

such works will continue over the coming years with the recent \$998,733 River to Recovery grant.

"The funding has allowed extra capacity and dollars to do pest control work across flood-effected areas," MRLB sustainable landscapes manager Renata Rix told The Murray Pioneer earlier this year.

"The floods pushed a lot of weed seed into areas further afield than normal, while also giving everything a good drink.

"The proliferation of weeds has led to an increase of rabbits, which also eat native growth (that) has thrived post-flood.

"The main goal of this project is to help the community get on top of weed control and pest issues for their relevant land usage be that recreational, environmental, or industry — as well as capitalising on the environmental positives that did come from the flood, such as the regeneration of native plants.

"Local government has been under the pump with post-flood impacts to their budget, having to account for a lot of infrastructure repair.

"Pests are always a priority for us, so it's great to be able to manage this issue for the community — if left unmanaged, we would lose the benefit of the flood."

#### **Growing Herbs in Winter**

While many herbs that thrive in summer don't cope well in colder months, several varieties grow happily through winter - especially in pots. The key to success is using a deep pot (at least 20cm) to allow room for root growth. Choose an organic, free-draining potting mix with added slow-release fertiliser, and fill the pot to about 5cm below the rim to avoid water runoff.

#### Try fast-growing leafy greens:

- Coriander is good to grow at this cooler time of the year. Be gentle with the roots when transplanting, and it's fine to plant in clumps.
- Perpetual spinach is like silver beet it will take about two seasons before it begins to grow well, but a single punnet can produce plenty of seedlings
- Rocket tastes quite 'mustardy' and can be good in a mix with the blander lettuces because it adds a bit of bite.

Water all these leafy greens regularly with a diluted seaweed solution and in about six weeks' time you'll start harvesting.

#### Perennial herbs to consider:

- Thyme grows naturally in gravelly soil so when grown in pots it needs particularly good drainage.
- Rosemary comes in many different types, from tall growing shrubs to prostrate forms that can cascade over the edge of a pot.

Once planted, water thoroughly to settle herbs into the soil. Mediterranean herbs are hardy and only need watering every 2-3 weeks, while leafy greens need more frequent watering (every 4-6 days). To harvest, simply pinch off the growing tips - this also helps promote bushier, faster growth.

the claims by the 1970s' safety authorities, I questioned whether they actually saved lives. (Just another can't-be-told-teenager). I turn the key, press down on the clutch,

move the column gearstick in and up, check the road behind, then reverse our white holden station-wagon out from its angle park onto Ral Ral Avenue.

I know I'm not backing into oncoming traffic, so why this ominous threat? He explained that as I backed out, the car

was still rolling backwards slightly, while I'd turned my head to the front.

In other words, the reversing car must come to a complete stop before I look forward.

Fair point, and while I realised its importance especially with little kids around the place, I was still smarting from his threat.

Anyway, we proceed, he giving instructions and unnervingly making notes.

Parallel parking had been a nightmare, and I'd practised at home heaps using steel droppers and cricket stumps as markers.

the Paringa Bridge, including its low-speed limit, then after negotiating backstreet stop signs and three-point turns, we headed to Renmark Oval for the final test.

"You call that a hill?" Surprised, I put the gear into first, then release the clutch and the handbrake near the steering column, touch the accelerator and - without rolling backwards - I'm home and hosed.

It literally felt like a child's life was vanishing. My bike, which had served me through miles and miles of Renmark North roads, was slowly drifting away, replaced by a dazzling now freedom.

Visions of Saturday night drive-ins; sports matches and trainings; school; friends; parties; everything seemed brighter.

Country kids on country roads now driving modern, fast cars. Vehemently, we want their freedom to be equally brilliant, equally freeing, but their safety to be continuously front of their minds

"This National Diabetes Week we want to highlight the importance of prevention and early diagnosis of type 2 diabetes and the prevention of complications from all types of diabetes.

"These are critically important to protect the health of Australians now and into the future."

Nigel Rollbusch, owner of Waikerie and Barmera-based Rollbusch Quality Meats operations, officially this month took over the Loxton Abattoir, which will now be known as the 'Riverland Abattoir', from previous owners Chris and Michele Schwartz. The couple operated the abattoir for 37

years. It is the only certified meat processing facility within the Riverland and Mallee

area. Mr Rollbusch said it was important the abattoir maintained its certification to process meat for the domestic market.

"I did not want to see it go to outside investors who may have not allowed local

"I am a firm believer the less stress on animals the better the quality of product," he said.



## ndis update **NDIS indispensable** for rural communities

THE National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) plays a vital role in improving the lives of people with disabilities in rural South Australia. It offers essential supports, enhances independence, and fosters inclusion - particularly where traditional services struggle to reach.

Rural and remote communities in South Australia face significant barriers, including fewer allied health professionals, limited service providers, greater distances to travel, and cultural factors like stoicism or reluctance to seek help.

The NDIS Rural and Remote Strategy acknowledges these challenges, guiding the rollout across remote and Indigenous communities.



By providing individualised funding and choice, rather than a one-size-fitsall bundle, NDIS empowers individuals through tailored supports - whether that's assistive technology, therapies, home modifications, or transport. This independence is transformative - but only if services are accessible. Thin markets remain a critical issue, as participants may receive funding but lack providers to deliver on-plan goals.

Yet the NDIS has already delivered positive outcomes. New local services have emerged, early intervention for children has become more feasible, and participants in some areas have accessed tailored employment and lifeskills training, fostering community inclusion, and economic participation

However, recent cuts – like reduced travel reimbursements - threaten these advances by making rural service delivery less viable. Without targeted solutions - higher funding rates, cultural competence, telehealth support, and workforce incentives - the gap between rural and urban participants may widen.

For rural South Australia, the NDIS remains indispensable - not just as financial support, but as a mechanism for equity, choice, and real inclusion. It drives lasting change, but continued commitment and adaptation are essential to ensure every South Australian can fully participate, no matter their postcode.

Set up within the cabin sections of an old ute, the driving simulator operates with graduated driving modules to aid a participant's capacity to eventually achieve a driving licence.

'We have had a brilliant response from clients," Support & Connect managing director Dylan Blackley said.

"Since it has been put in, the 10 available monthly slots have been booked

out. "We would really love to extend our heartfelt thanks to the Renmark Lions Club for their generous financial support.'

Renmark Lions president Paul Farr said the community group was "pleased to (provide Support & Connect) with the piece of equipment for their recreational hub".

"Given that most of the clients using the hub may not have access to a motor vehicle to be taught how to drive, Dylan saw the need for a driving simulator to assist with this purpose," he said.

"We are pleased with the final result of Dylan's efforts in building the simulator within the recreational hub, which is proving to be well received by the clients.'

Creating Support & Connect 18 months ago, Mr Blackley said his goal was to "close the gap (he) saw (as a support worker) for young people on NDIS".

"I really saw the need for young people on the NDIS to have a space, but also young mentors to support them," he said.

"Over the past 18 months, we have had massive successes with cli-

ents, just in improved wellbeing, looking to rent their own homes, and learning about finance.

"This has all come about by lifting the barrier of providing the right mentor."

Providing the Berri recreational hub six months later, Mr Blackley said his "passion to fill service voids for young people in the NDIS" was the drive to expand Support & Connect.

"Something that was meant to be two years down the track, became something I was doing six months into running Support & Connect," he said.

"Being down in the country, we're starved of so many resources and facilities as it is, especially for our young individuals they miss out the most.

"As a kid, I went through some (difficult) things, so I have always had that passion to help where I can.

## Sustainability the goal in 2025 reforms

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is undergoing significant reforms in 2025, impacting both participants and providers. These reforms aim to create a more sustainable and efficient scheme while ensuring participants receive appropriate and fair support.

#### NEW FUNDING PERIODS FOR PLANS

From May 19, NDIS plans began including defined funding periods, such as 1 to 3 months, rather than lump-sum allocations . Participants can request variations or reassessments if they disagree with amounts or schedule.

#### PRICING CHANGES EFFECTIVE JULY 1

On June 16, National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) released its 2025–26 Pricing Arrangements and Limits (PAPL), effective July 1, 2025. Highlights included:

• Early childhood supports extended to age 9 (up from 7).

- Physiotherapy rate reduced by \$10 to \$183.99/hr, dietetics/podiatry down by \$5 to \$188.99/hr, psychology increased to \$232.99/hr nationally.
- Disability support worker (DSW) rates up approximately 3.95 per cent, aligning with wage and super increases.
- Nursing and home care rates also increased by approximately 3.2 per cent.
- National standard pricing removes regional variations for therapies.

### MAJOR TRAVEL

From July 1, provider travel claims are capped at 50 per cent of the hourly service rate, charged per trip — being 60 minutes in rural areas . While the NDIA frames this as promoting efficient scheduling and consistent pricing, providers warn it may make rural outreach financially unsustainable, and reduce service access.

#### COMPLIANCE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION

The new price guide includes clearer rules around provider duties, conflict of interest, and marketing standards. Enhanced audits and penalties, of up to \$15m, are being enforced to ensure guality and trust.

#### A SCHEME GEARING FOR SUSTAINABILITY

These reforms follow the 2024

legislative package that saved approximately \$14bn over four years . The goal: reduce annual growth from 15 per cent, to around 8 per cent, rein in costs, boost efficiency, and enhance foundational supports .

The 2025 NDIS reforms aim to make funding more controlled, market-aligned, and sustainable, supporting workers, with stronger compliance and pricing transparency. But the reduced travel reimbursements and therapy rate cuts may squeeze rural and remote service delivery, raising concerns about equity and access for participants outside urban areas.

- Double check all documents to avoid delays.
- Seek help from LACs, support co-ordinators, or advocacy services if needed.
- If you're declined, you can request an internal review - and from March 28, this is done via a new online form.

A RIVERLAND politician has urged the Federal Government to listen to regional voices and act on current employment industry reports.

The recent Jobs and Skills Australia report, which explores the current employment and education landscape across regional Australia, has highlighted promising trends and areas for urgent attention.

The Jobs and Skills Roadmap for Regional Australia Phase 1 outlines the unique challenges facing regional communities like those in the Riverland, while also identifying key opportunities to strengthen the local workforce through better access to education and training.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said "the Roadmap for Regional Australia acknowledges both the strengths and challenges our region faces in securing a skilled and resilient workforce".

"I have long advocated for investing into training and education in our region to ensure that young people are supported in building their careers in their own communities," Mr Whetstone said.

"However, we still need to see real,



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practical action by our governments, not just reports, that address challenges like digital connectivity, housing affordability, childcare access, and reliable transport."

One of the report's standout findings is the participation rate of Australians aged 25 to 54 in the workforce, reaching an alltime high, sitting at 85.4 per cent.

"That's a significant increase and one that does need to be considered when discussing the bigger picture in terms of Australia's future productivity," said Jobs and Skills Australia commissioner, Professor Barney Glover.

The report also revealed a growing concern among young people, aged 18 to 24, stating fewer are entering higher education or the workforce.

Mr Glover warned this shift could undermine the long-term strength of the regional labour market.

"If that younger group of people about to enter the prime workforce of 25-to-54 year olds is becoming less engaged in both employment and education, we're looking at a risk to maintaining that level of participation and productivity as a result," he said.

"That's why our Regional Roadmap places a strong emphasis on breaking down the barriers to regional Australians in education, training and employment."

According to the report, those barriers including financial stress, poor digital connectivity, limited childcare and transport options, housing affordability, and the impacts of disability and health issues, have a wider range and often overlap

Mr Whetstone said "I urge the Federal Government to ensure regional voices are heard and these reports are actioned".

'We need the appropriate support to ensure regional Australia remains the backbone of this country's workforce and productivity," he said.

The report also says gaps in basic language, numeracy and digital skills, often developed in early schooling, can prevent people from accessing further education or employment.

The roadmap sets out several forwardfocused strategies, including the creation of centralised hubs to support students and jobseekers, aiming to improve the frequency and quality of data collection to better guide decision-making.

"This roadmap is a big step towards making sure the jobs and skills system in regional Australia helps individuals achieve their goals," Mr Glover said.

The report is now open for public consultation, with locals encouraged to provide feedback before October 2, with the collected input used to shape Phase 2 of the roadmap.

## Special help needed for nursing study

RIVERLAND nursing professionals are encouraged to share experiences towards a new mental health study.

It has become apparent that people with combined mental health and substance use disorders need particular care. A local mental health nurse is working on a PhD addressing this need for care and the factors that are involved.

Elizabeth Hove was born in Zimbabwe, trained in in the UK as a mental health nurse, and relocated to Australia in April 2009.

She previously worked at the Berri Mental Health Unit and remains in the Riverland working from home as a mental health professional, while also studying and working on her thesis.

Her study explores the factors that influence nursing

care for people with combined mental health and substance use disorders within public mental health settings. To get this information, she needs registered nurses to complete an online survey, and possibly an interview.

The nurses need to be in clinical, educational, management or other positions, with at least six

months of nursing (fulltime equivalent) experience, currently registered with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulations.

Ms Hove said "I am passionate about nursing care for people with combined mental health and substance use disorders".

"My 18 years of professional experience in mental health settings has always been a personal journey," Ms Hove said.

"I advocate and champion for the rights, wellbeing and dignity of individuals experiencing mental health and substance use disorders.

"This led to my PhD studies, intending to explore factors influencing nursing care for people with combined mental health and substance use disorders in mental health services.'

The Nebula Program is an initiative designed to empower emerging visual artists from across South Australia's regions, with a biennial three-day experience held in Adelaide that offers a curated series of workshops, forums, artist talks and networking events.

Taking place this September, the program looks to strengthen artistic practice, building vital industry connections, and help recipients take the next steps in their career.

Karl said they applied to Nebula as a means of creating those connections for career progress, and to find the right community they can look to for guidance.

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## Mickan's Parkinson's fundraiser is back

RIVERLANDERS have been encouraged to step on the bike for the Pedal To Fight Parkinson's 2025 fundraiser, inspired by a local sporting icon.

Pedal To Fight Parkinson's raises money for research into treatments and potentially a cure for Parkinson's, through a 24-hour stationary cycling challenge, making a third comeback to the Adelaide Oval, from 12 noon on Wednesday, July 23 to 12 noon on Thursday, July 24.

This event was originally inspired by, Riverland football great Mark Mickan, legend of AFL and SANFL, and ambassador for The Hospital Research Foundation Group Parkinson's. Mark was an inaugural inductee in the SA Football Hall Of Fame in 2002.

The event faced some struggle during the Covid-19 pandemic, being placed on hold, but returned last year in 2024, as a Hospital Research Foundation Initiative, with over 13 teams raising more than \$115,000 for research funding. SANFL CEO Darren Chandler said "the football community is renowned for rallying to support one another and the Pedal to Fight Parkinson's event is a tremendous example of this".

"Such an event can bring hope to people, and shows the resilience of a community to bring around happiness," Mr Chandler said. The Hospital Research Foundation Group CEO, Professor Paul Flynn said "we're extremely proud to be teaming up with Mark and the SANFL once again for Pedal to Fight Parkinson's".

"Mark is one of the great people of football in South Australia and it's fantastic to see the football fraternity really embrace this event." Prof Flynn Said.

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# Local news and the global fight for our fair share

WHEN people pick up The Murray Pioneer, they expect more than just headlines. They expect honest reporting about what is happening in their neighbourhood, from Renmark, Berri, and Loxton, to Waikerie and the wider regions.

Local papers like this one do more than defend democracy, they live its values every day by earning trust and staying connected to the people they serve.

But that work is under threat when global tech giants profit from sharing our stories without paying their fair share to keep local reporting alive.

That is why Australia's push to force companies like Google, Meta and TikTok to pay local and regional publishers matters so much in communities across our region. The News Bargaining Incentive would help ensure local papers, including this one, are not left carrying the cost while international platforms pocket the profit.

Earlier this month, Canada scrapped its own digital services tax after Donald Trump threatened tariffs in retaliation. The backdown made headlines worldwide and sparked fears Australia's plan might face similar pressure.

But the powerful US tech lobby has made it clear that Australia's approach is different, and less likely to attract the same backlash. Unlike a broad digital services tax, Australia's measure is focused on making big tech fairly compensate local newsrooms for the trusted reporting our towns rely on.

The Computer and Communications Industry Association, which represents Amazon, Apple, Google and Facebook owner Meta, told The Australian Financial Review that while Australia's scheme is still on their radar, it is not seen as a direct attack like Canada's tax was. That is reassuring for local publishers working to keep journalists in work and trusted news in Riverland towns, and the other small rural communities that depend on fair and accurate local coverage.

Meta has already walked away from paying for Australian news, while Google has kept up agreements covering more than 200 outlets. But the risk remains that without strong laws, tech companies could stop paying any time, leaving local papers, and the communities they serve, worse off.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has ruled out backing down during trade talks, and assistant treasurer Daniel Mulino says the new law is still a "key priority" for the government.

Under the plan, any platform that refuses to pay would face a new charge worth hundreds of millions of dollars each year. Those that strike fair deals with local publishers can offset that charge, giving them a clear incentive to support trusted local news instead of fighting it.

Former ACCC chair Rod Sims says Australia must stand by its own laws, describing this as vital for a healthy democracy. That is especially true in towns like ours, where local papers are often the only connection people have to independent information about what is really happening in their own backyard.

Local papers like The Murray Pioneer have a responsibility not just to exist, but to earn and keep trust. We do this by being present in the community, asking tough questions, celebrating local wins, telling uncomfortable truths and giving people a place to feel heard, whether that is in Renmark, or any of our surrounding towns.

As the government prepares to release its long-awaited consultation paper, local publishers will be watching closely. Because when it comes to holding big tech accountable, this fight is about more than just billiondollar companies or trade deals. It is about whether our region keeps its local stories, its local voice and its local trust.

### Sport grants to empower women and girls

LOCAL sporting clubs and organisations are able to apply for state government program funding new facilities and equipment for girls and women.

Over \$9.1m in funding is available through the third year of The Power Of Her – Infrastructure and Participation Program (IPP), aiming to deliver dedicated facilities, programs, and equipment to sporting clubs in an attempt to boost female participation.

Rhiannon Pearce, assistant minister for junior sport participation said "we want to level the playing field when it comes to girls and women in sport"

"We know those who participate in sport have a more positive body image and improved wellbeing than girls who do not"

"This program plays a pivotal role in helping to achieve this and, with this year being the biggest yet, I have every confidence we will see some real trailblazing initiatives brought to the table".

## Non-mainstream schooling review to ensure student engagement

ENSURING all Riverland children can "access the best possible education" is the goal for a review into non-mainstream education options throughout South Australia.

The State Government earlier this month announced a review of schools, services and programs would be undertaken, examining how to engage students who receive their education outside of mainstream public education.

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said increasing inclusivity, and strengthening laws to ensure students attend school, was a focus. "This review is more than just reflecting on the structures of these important education options – it is about reimagining how we support students facing barriers," Mr Boyer said.

"The work follows on from other significant work undertaken by the Malinauskas Labor Government... these actions have been about making schools a safe, inclusive experience where young people can access the best possible education, to ensure their own pathway into productive work.

"Many of these sites have evolved over time to meet specific needs, but without a broad framework to help shape the service delivery, so this review is long overdue and is an opportunity to shape a responsive, and inclusive approach that meets the complex needs of learners today and builds a stronger, more just system for the future."

Of the 174,000 students enrolled in South Australian public schools across a year, about 10,000 engage in a non-mainstream program.

Proposed legislative changes include the introduction of a statutory warning letter that would be sent to parents for failing to enrol a child, or failure of a child to attend, and will look at the potential to introduce expiation fines.

A state government media release on the topic said attendance at schools nationwide fell in the wake of the global Covid pandemic, and has been slow to return to pre-2020 levels.

In 2023, a specialist attendance team was established to tackle student absenteeism as a response to a trend of student disengagement.

"Non-mainstream education is a large part of ensuring students can remain engaged in education and finish their schooling, even if it's not in the traditional sense," the media release read.

With home schooling programs seeing high enrolments from children and young people with disabilities, a focus of the review will be identifying "what common barriers exist for young people with disabilities, to determine if this is a localised or system-wide issue".

Open Access College deputy principal Jeane Schocroft said outcomes from the review would "support the learning of young South Australians who might have complex and diverse needs".

#### LWDC to offer support for drought-affected properties

Loxton Waikerie Council has declared recent adverse weather conditions, which include drought, frost, and wine grape supply surplus, as exceptional circumstances, and will be offering support to local ratepayers through:

 Postponement of rates without interest penalties.
 Interest-free payment agreements for up to 24 months.

Loxton Waikerie mayor Trevor Norton said "we are open to hear about everyone affected through these extreme conditions".

"We want to help, and everyone is more than welcome to schedule an appointment with me at council to discuss the situation," Mayor Norton said.

Affected properties and producers might be eligible to apply under the Special Circumstances – Adverse Conditions provision. Applications will be

assessed sensitively, and all applicants will be informed in writing of the outcome.

Darwin, and Alice Springs. After their return to Renmark, Ken joined Riverland Fruit as a fruit classer, before working eight years for Simarloo, in an accounting/computer programming role. His next position was as business advisor for 13 years, for the Riverland Development Corporation, at a time when the local economy was under pressure due to severe

water shortages. The Riverside Estate project began in 2007, however by 2014 it was in receivership and subsequently taken over by Jim Turner, who employed Ken as manager with the responsibilities of accounts, maintenance and gardens. The new investment structure honoured the promise of the former developers to build the impressive recreation centre. In 2014, 32 homes had been built, and today 64 have been completed, with six more in the pipeline. Retirees buy a License to Occupy, and their investment is secured under the Villages Act. Monthly fees cover water, telephone, gardening, house maintenance, and insurance, while living in a securely gated community that is RAA monitored.

Ken finds his work to be rewarding and enjoys the daily camaraderie among the retirees. Ken and Claire have travelled widely in Asia, USA, Canada and Europe in their 44 years of marriage with their three children.

# Refreshed literacy focus for state's public schools

NEW literacy-focused initiatives are set to be introduced to Riverland public schools, with long-term goals to improve South Australian student performance in the area.

The State Government earlier this month released an updated Literacy Guarantee, aimed at improving the overall literacy of students in South Australian public schools. Minister for Education, Training and

Skills Blair Boyer said a focus on literacy ensured "we are setting up our students with a strong foundation for continued learning".

"South Australia has led the way in literacy for this country," Mr Boyer said.

"We introduced a year 1 phonics check in 2017, under former Education Minister Susan Close, years ahead of anyone else, with some states only beginning a trial from next year. The improvements we saw as part of the checks, were seen across several student groups, including Aboriginal students, students who speak English as an additional language or dialect, and students in country schools.

"We are continuing to build on that work and ensure new teachers have the skills and resources they need as they enter the workforce.

"If we get the basics right, it makes it easier for students as they progress through school.

Work under the new guarantee will include expanding the focus of literacy coaches to support schools with all aspects of reading, a stronger focus on literacy in preschool, developing additional resources for teachers and providing free online support and resources for parents to use from birth onwards.

The program will also aim towards:

- Launch of a Reading Academy to support early career teachers in teaching reading – focused on providing mentoring and resources to ensure teachers start their career with the strongest foundations to teach reading.
- □ Increased professional learning in literacy for teachers at all levels of schooling.
- □ Úpskilling of preschool teachers in literacy using the department's early years literacy guidelines.
- □ Provision of free, online resources for parents to help their children build their literacy skills.

It is understood the initiatives will begin at the start of 2026, and will be fully rolled out during next year. The work will be targeted at schools with high numbers of graduate teachers, with the program extended more broadly in following years.

# All signs point to a bumper Cup day

SOLD-OUT marquees, \$4000 confirmed for a "human race" and an upgraded irrigation system have organisers of the 2025 Mindarie-Halidon Cup meeting anticipating a bumper event in September.

Early interest in the meeting – to be held on Sunday, September 14 – has been highlighted by all marquee sites being pre-sold in record time, according to Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club president, Geoff Redden.

"After such a successful meeting last year, the 'buzz' around this year's meeting is already evident," Mr Redden said.

"We're still two months out from the race day, but committee members are all fielding plenty of feedback and inquiries, which augers well for the club.

"Marquee sites are all gone, but of course there's plenty of tickets available for everyone – both pre-event, and at the gate on the day. A \$4000 "human relay race" was successfully trialled for the first time last year and will return in 2025, offering local sporting clubs a chance to win "serious money" by racing up the Halidon home straight on Cup day.

"It's \$2000 for first place, so it's not to be sneezed at," Mr Redden said.

"(Sponsors) Sportsbet were keen to run with it again, because it went so well last year."

Despite the lack of rainfall across the district this year, Mr Redden said the track was in excellent condition, as preparations step up.

"We have a brand new irrigation system and that's been a great addition," he said.

"At the moment the track is looking very green and healthy, and we'll soon be starting our preparations to have the surface in tip-top condition for all the visiting horses and jockeys on race day."

Mr Redden said the club was still "on a high" after recently receiving a double dose of good news via the sports controlling body, Racing SA.

The club was successful in its bid to host the first official barrier trials at Halidon, meaning it will become an even more integral and valued player within the SA industry. The trials have been earmarked for Monday, September 29, just over two weeks after the meeting.

In addition, following a recent chute upgrade, the club has been given the green light to stage 1200-metre events – rather than 1000-metre events – at its 2025 meeting, allowing more horses to race at the meeting.

The club will stage a meeting for members and other volunteers this Sunday, from 2pm, to be followed by a working bee.

WITH the RFL taking the weekend off due to the SA Country Championships carnival held in Port Pirie, one Riverlander tasted the ultimate success.

The best in country football took to the state's mid-north for the championships, with the Riverland falling under the Eastern cohort.

Joining forces with players from the Hills Football League, Murray Valley Football League, and River Murray Football League, the RFL was represented at playing level, coaching level, umpiring level, and through support staff.

The Eastern Zone side in the women's competition made it two titles in consecutive years, and Barmera-Monash young gun Ebony Johnson was in the thick of the action.

"It was awesome to go back-to-back, and I think we were the first team to ever do that at women's level, so that was pretty cool," she said.

"I think our team bonded really well, and everyone only knows each other from the two trainings we do, and then the three days we're together, but we had a really good captain.

"She got everyone to be really engaged in team-bonding games, and we were very much like a team from the first game which I think helped us dramatically."

Johnson had a connection to Eastern coach Damien Venning, who coached the young Roo at West Adelaide.

She said that connection, alongside her efforts throughout the 2024 titles helped her earn selection for this year.

"I was pretty lucky that I had a connection to the coach so he knew what I could do (from) more than just two training sessions," she said.

"Everyone who was part of it made everyone feel really good and made sure everyone fit in, and they looked at your strengths and helped you develop everything.

"I love playing representative footy, especially the high-level competitions because the Riverland is dying out a little bit.

"I was supposed to be on holiday a little bit earlier and fly out on the Friday, but when I found out I would be in the team I changed my flight, because I wanted to play three real games of footy this year, as what we play in at home isn't quite the same.

"It's really good that they offer that opportunity to country people to play at elite levels, and so I think it was a really good experience."

Eastern qualified for the grand final after a 31-point Friday night win over Southern, and a 13-point victory over Eyre Peninsula on Saturday afternoon.

Fixtured against South East in the grand final, Eastern shot away to a 10-point lead at half time, setting up the win.

From there, it kicked two goals to one in the second half, with South East burning opportunities in front of the sticks, and ultimately seeing Eastern over the line by 12 points.

"Heading into the grand final, we were all confident, but we knew that we couldn't just walk out there and win, we had to actually play," Ebony said.

"This year our connection with the men's group wasn't as strong as last year, but that's mainly because we stayed in different locations.

"That being said, we still tried to get to as many games of theirs, and vice versa which was pretty good, because although you don't know many people in the zone, you're in the same colours and everyone supports everyone, which is pretty cool."

Ebony was the lone representative in the women's side, but the men's group featured Waikerie's Kade Hilton, Loxton's Harley Campbell, and fellow Roo Lucas Warnett.

Alongside the three players, Interleague coach, and former Waikerie star, Damien Stevens was an assistant coach, while Kayla Tsorotiotis, Cameron Scott, and Mitchell Werner all officiated, with Tamika Uzzell a trainer.

In a tough tournament, the men's side defeated Southern by one point on Saturday morning, but were unable to repeat the dose shortly after, falling to Eyre Peninsula by two points.

In the third vs fourth decider, Eyre Peninsula again got the better of the Eastern side, winning by 27 points, despite the best efforts of Hilton, who was named in the best, and booted a goal.

Riverland football resumes this weekend, with three mouth-watering clashes as the run home to finals is officially on.

## **Smarties caramel slice**



#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 150g (1 cup) plain flour
- 110g (1/2 cup) brown sugar
- 40g (1/2 cup) desiccated coconut
- 125g butter, melted
- 2 x 395g cans Sweetened
- Condensed Milk
- 100g butter, extra, chopped
- 1/3 cup (80ml) golden syrup
- 200g block Dark Chocolate 1 tbsp vegetable oil
- 3 x 50g pkts Nestlé Smarties
