RENMARK Paringa residents Renmark Club, last Thursday. turned out in high numbers to discuss opinions surrounding the local council's economic position, and planned projects, at two public forums over the last week.

Renmark Paringa Council welcomed feedback regarding its 25/26 Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget during a consultation, at the

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said the session allowed for

direct consultation between the public, councillors and council staff. "Council was satisfied with how the session was conducted," Mr Hunter said.

"The approach allowed for meaningful dialogue, with attendees engaging directly with staff and Hotel Renmark, which saw an estielected members.

"We valued the opportunity to listen to concerns and provide context around the decisions council is facing.'

The council-organised session was then followed on Sunday afternoon by a public meeting, held by Renmark woman Jenny Troeth, at mated 130 attendees.

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Happy Haven working towards improvement

A RIVERLAND Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) is "confident" negative data from the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority (ACECQA) "does not reflect the service's current performance and compliance with National Quality Standards". Data from the ACECQA — as

of April 1, 2025 — states Happy Haven OSHC Cobdogla is currently 'working towards' meeting the approved National Quality Standards of the children's education and care industry. With the April 2020 assess-

ment stating the service only meets physical environment as one-out-of-six rating standards - which also include educational programs and practice, children's health and safety, staffing arrangements, relationships with children, and governance and leadership — Happy Haven OSHC CEO, and managing director, Nicholas Smith said the "results reflect a point in time of the life of the service, and are not necessarily indicative of current standards and performance". "Happy Haven OSHC has a

strong commitment to the provision of high-quality OSHC services to children across South Australia," Mr Smith said.

"Happy Haven OSHC Cobdogla was relatively new when the assessment and rating process took place (with the) rural location and small school each (presenting) their own challenges.

"This was also at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, which presented unique circumstances for OSHC services."

Recent data from the Education Standards Board indicates that 54 per cent of services receiving a 'working towards' rating are new services undergoing their first assessment and rating process, which only become increasingly successful once practices become embedded in the program.

"Using ACECQA's register of all early childhood education and care services, (date reveals that) Happy Haven OSHC Cobdogla opened in January of 2019," Mr Smith said.

"With the assessment and rating taking place over five-years ago, we are confident those results are not reflective of the service's current performance and compliance with the National Quality Standards, nor of its importance to the community of Cobdogla.

"The team of dedicated educators and support staff are proud of the service being proCobdogla Primary School, and of the continuous improvements achieved since the Assessment and Rating process occurred in April of 2020."

Reported in an early July edition of The Advertiser, recent data from the ACECQA has also revealed that 15.5 per cent of South Australian childcare centres are operating with staffing wavers, which — issued by the independent regulator, the Education Standards Board provides exceptions from certain staffing requirements outlined in national or state laws and regulations.

The figures include long day care, preschool, and out of hours care settings.

Additionally, a national study survey released earlier this month from the United Workers Union, reveals that 77 per cent of childcare workers say their centre is operating below minimum staffing requirements at least weekly.

Of the more than 2000 workers represented, 216 were from South Australia.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said "the government must ensure any childcare centres in the Riverland that fall below standard are identified, reviewed and any issues promptly fixed".

"Chaffey families deserve the

vided to families and children of Cobdogla Primary School, and of the continuous improvements best care for their children and our children deserve the best start to their education," he said.

> "With such a large number of SA childcare centres being reported as not currently meeting the National Quality Standards, I have serious questions about the government's readiness and ability to implement their commitment of universal three-year-old preschool from 2026".

\$200K damage from structure fire at Morgan property

A STRUCTURAL fire was contained, after a Morgan property's shed, caught alight, and cause more than \$200k worth of damage.

Approximately 40 South Australian Country Fire Service (CFS) firefighters, aboard eight trucks, arrived at the property, just after 12 midnight, on July 21.

CFS Crews worked using breathing apparatus equipment to control the fire, which had spread to the roof of a nearby house, and damaged another room and a kitchen.

Local residents were alerted to the incident and no injuries were reported, but damages have been estimated at more than \$200,000.

SAPOL, SA Ambulance and firefighters remained on scene until the area was deemed safe. Causes of the fire are still unknown.

Motorists stopped while driving under the influence

THREE motorists were caught drug and drink driving in the Riverland over the weekend. On Saturday, July 19, highway patrols stopped a motorist on the Old Sturt Highway, at Berri.

The driver, a 63-year-old man, from Monash, was roadside tested, and returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.149.


He had his vehicle impounded for 28 days. He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Also over the weekend, a 24-year-old man, from Renmark, was stopped during a routine check in the Riverland, and tested positive for driving under the influence.

The driver will be summonsed to appear in court, pending forensic analysis.

A 39-year-old woman, from Cobdogla, was also reported for failing to comply with directions to submit to a drug test.

All three drivers received an instant loss of licence.

MFS water carrier joins Olivewood Museum

A HISTORIC fire truck which serviced the Renmark district for two decades now has a new home at a local museum.

The vehicle will share space alongside a Garford fire appliance from the early 1900's, as a key exhibit at Olivewood museum, aiming to honour the regions rich firefighting history.

The Olivewood Historic Homestead and Museum, in Renmark, is now home to a Kenworth L700, known in the Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) as the Renmark 6142, which made its final journey on Monday, travelling through Renmark, before being officially donated to the Museum. The decommissioned MFS Bulk Water Carrier fire appliance was built in 1988, and was originally used as a Skyjet aerial appliance for the New South Wales Fire Brigade.

MFS regional commander Garrick Lehmann said "a piece of our history has been donated to the Olivewood museum".

"They will be able to show it to the public and showcase its connection to the local town communities," Mr Garrick said.

"This vehicle responded to hundreds of fires over its 20-year service within the district, and it is a unique vehicle that was actually made in Australia.

"It is a really good piece of history that we've been able to donate.

"Renmark 6142 has served the Riverland community in times of devastation and need.

"Now it will take its place alongside another retired fire appliance at Olivewood museum, becoming an interesting and educational exhibit. We are pleased it will remain in the community for all to see."

Olivewood Historic Homestead and Museum chairman Ann Ryan said "when they were decommissioning the water tanker, the plan was for it to go overseas".

"The local fire crew said that they'd prefer if it stayed in Renmark," Ms Ryan said.

"We already have the Garford that they restored, so this new piece adds to the local fire brigade's display." In 2004, the MFS purchased the vehicle and made suitable modifications to give it a new life as a Bulk Water Carrier. Stationed at Renmark, the vehicle served the Riverland for 19 years, where it remained until its decommissioning, in November 2023.

Important upgrades were done in 2016, including the fitting of a new 11,000L water tank, with the capacity to exert 580L/min of water.

Renmark 6142, which was been replaced with a new Bulk Water Carrier, carried a long history within the Riverland, having responded to hundreds of incidents over nearly two decades of dedicated service for the MFS.

High enthusiasm shown at Renmark public meeting

MEMBERS of the Renmark Paringa community voiced concerns over the local council's proposed rate increase at a public meeting last weekend.

An estimated 130 of the district's residents attended Sunday's meeting, held at Hotel Renmark, to discuss views surrounding Renmark Paringa Council's draft annual

Local woman Jenny Troeth - who organised the meeting – said the proposed 25/26rate increase, of 11.25 per cent, and communication between council and the community, were main discussion points at the meeting.

"I'm still a bit overwhelmed at the amount of people that came," Ms Troeth said.

'More importantly, out of it all, I believe it served a purpose.

"Transparency with the council came out a lot, and the impact the rate increase will have on the community was highlighted. The Jane Eliza was discussed and that was reflected in a lot of the comments.

"The council consultation process was also a big contender... I feel 90 to 100 per cent of questionnaires said council could be more forthcoming with information to ratepayers. There's a significant amount of people that rely on the media for information (about council), whether that be social media, or as the questionnaire showed, predominately the paper."

Sunday's public meeting followed a previous consultation session, held by Renmark Paringa Council, at the Renmark Club, also surrounding the draft annual business plan and budget.

Ms Troeth said feedback from attendees would be provided to council, with plans being made towards holding another public meeting.

"I have removed names, as per the privacy policy, and I'm hand-delivering it all to the mayor," she said.

"By Monday I had four-or-five people who had asked if there will be another meeting, and the answer to that is yes.

"I'm going to need a format, and I need more consultation with ratepayers... I need to be able to demonstrate where we've gotten to and what we see for the future.'

Renmark Paringa Council declined to comment regarding Sunday's meeting when

The 'meaningful' evening with RPC

RENMARK Paringa provided its ratepayers an opportunity to give feedback on the council's economic position and planned projects – including the Jane Eliza development - last week.

Renmark Paringa Council last Thursday held a community consultation session regarding its 25/26 annual business plan and budget, at the Renmark Club.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said the session allowed for direct consultation between the public, councillors and council staff.

'Council was satisfied with how the session was conducted," Mr Hunter said.

"The approach allowed for meaningful dialogue, with attendees engaging directly with staff and elected members.

'We valued the opportunity to listen to concerns and provide context around the decisions council is facing.

'While it was disappointing that a small number of attendees displayed poor behaviour at the registration desk, deciding to not participate and then to have no input at all, overall, the achieved its purpose with approximately 60 residents involved."

Mr Hunter said the main issues raised at the session centred on:

□ The proposed 11.25 per cent rate increase, and whether this level of increase is necessary.

□ Affordability concerns, particularly for those on fixed or low incomes.

□ Balancing service levels with the need for longterm financial sustainability.

Queries about specific projects, particularly the Jane Eliza development. Mr Hunter said a level of

misunderstanding existed surrounding council's 25/26 budget and business plan.

"It was also clear during the session that many attendees had not read the annual business plan summary or the underlying financial and infrastructure plans, and were basing their views largely on headlines from The Murray Pioneer and commentary on social media," he said.

"This highlights an ongoing challenge for council to ensure factual information

session was constructive and is not only presented but understood by the community."

Mr Hunter said "council remains committed to ensuring our community is heard and involved in shaping decisions that impact them". "Council believes the consultation process has provided reasonable and accessible opportunities for the community to have their

say, through written submissions, the online engagement portal, speaking with elected members, and the public meeting," he said. "There were also hard

copies (of) all three strategic documents available for viewing at the Civic Centre and the Renmark Paringa Library.

"We appreciate the feedback received and will carefully consider all feedback before finalising the annual business plan and budget.

"The strong turnout at council's feedback session demonstrates the value of creating spaces for dialogue... we will consider holding similar sessions in future consultation processes where it adds value alongside our other engagement methods."

Water prices Christine's a country star a 'supply and demand dynamic'

A SENIOR Riverland irrigation industry figure has advised local grape growers longterm plans surrounding their businesses are "essential" amid potential pressure from the cost of temporary water.

The ABC yesterday reported "ballooning water prices in Australia's largest wine grape-growing region are pushing farmers to the brink".

However, Renmark Irrigation Trust CEO Rosalie Auricht said numerous vears in a row of favourable conditions had softened water market prices.

"The water market's temporary water prices are driven by the economics of supply and demand, (and) plentiful supply in recent years resulted in exceptionally low temporary water prices, even below \$20," Ms Auricht said.

"While SA entitlement is at 100 per cent allocation this year, some interstate water allocations have started the year quite low. That reduced supply will push the temporary price up. "Irrigators who rely

on the temporary water market now need to contend with this factor. When increasing temporary water prices coincides with an extended downcycle in commodity prices, it becomes extremely difficult for those irrigators. Having a long

term business plan for securing your water requirements is essential for irrigation businesses.

"The water market reform will not change this overall supply and demand dynamic, it will simply add to farmers costs.'

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said direct support for a structural adjustment of Riverland wine production was required.

"Water prices form a significant component in the cost of production," Mr Whetstone said.

"There is no doubt any upward pressure on water prices is having an adverse impact on an industry already hurting. The government's water accounting is also a factor in driving water prices.

"These ongoing challenges facing the industry clearly illustrate that more support is needed from both the State and Federal Government.

"In the last week alone, we have seen the (State) Government announce millions of dollars in support for the premium export market, but nothing for our local growers -

another slap in the face. "Assistance in terms of structural adjustment is what many are asking for and the reality is, it is what is needed. A water bank would also be welcome as a level of assistance from the State Government to ease the extremes in market prices.'

"I love writing my own songs and performing on the world stage, its overwhelming.

"Being there gives me the opportunity to meet a lot of international musicians that I can collaborate with.

For the ISSA Awards in August, Christine is nominated in the International Female of the Year, Entertainer of the Year, Vocalist of the Year, Single of the Year, Songwriter of the Year, Musician of the Year, Emerging Artist, and ISSA Representation of the Year categories.

For the Red Carpet awards in the Netherlands, she is nominated in the Vocalist of the Year, Traditional Original Song, Songwriter of the Year, Collaboration-Songwriter of the Year, Spirit of the West, Best Country Song original, Country Voice of the Year, Musician of the Year, Music video of the Year and Modern Country Original categories.

Ms Clifford started her music career at the age of 28, but her real passion for music started when she learned to play the piano and the guitar as a child.

"I started singing in public at a late age I think, after I came up from Adelaide in 1996 and performed at the Barmera Country Music Talent Quest," Ms Clifford said.

"I won some awards before, went around the state doing presentations and some interstate performances, with

numerous bands, but then life got in the way and I had a musical break for 15 years.

"I was born in Adelaide, but the Riverland is my home. It has brought me my life.

Ms Clifford's husband Greg, is also a musician, and has supported her career through all the years. As a couple, they decided to return to music a few years back.

"My husband also is a drummer, so he had a break as well apart from doing sound for other bands," Ms Clifford said.

"Five years ago, we decided to get back into it again, and I'm just blown away with everything.

"I ask myself, at my age. What am I doing? You must take it while it's there.

"For me, the importance of going to Atlanta, and the Netherlands, is to meet and collaborate with other musicians. Whether I win an award or not, it's not my main goal.

"I'm very grateful for all of the people that voted and to be a finalist with the ISSA, and even more thankful with the Red Carpet Awards, because there is no voting for that one, it goes straight to judging.

Ms Clifford recently learned, that she was also nominated for other prestigious American awards.

"Three of my songs have also been nominated and are finalists in the Intercontinental Awards." She said.

"I found out not too long ago, which came as a shock, but again, I am overwhelmed by the support of the people and the industry. It is a dream."

Ms Clifford has remained grounded

throughout her journey, reminding herself to enjoy every moment and take the best out of every situation.

"I'm pretty grounded because I don't expect anything, I think that's what it is," Ms Clifford said.

"I won't even write a speech in preparation, because I don't expect to win. I expect to just collaborate with people and enjoy the moment.

"It is such a great atmosphere, especially with the ISSA, because this year they are having a summit, and we are going to be doing songwriting workshops, listening to keynote speakers and meeting up with industry experts."

Ms Clifford won the Emerging Artist award at last year's ISSA Awards.

"The ISSA Awards are a voting award, you get nominated and people vote for you," Ms Clifford said.

"If you get enough votes, you can become a finalist in each category, and then those finalists go to a judging panel, composed of previous winners and industry professionals."

Ms Clifford said living in Loxton had provided her a feeling of openness, as opposed to living in a big city.

'I was born in Adelaide and came to the Riverland in 1996," Ms Clifford said.

"The Riverland inspires me to write, and it inspired one of my favourite songs, called the Overland Corner Hotel Song, due to me being a regular performer there.

"At the moment I have four studio albums out now, of which two were done while living up here and collaborating with musicians around this area as well.

"My guitar was fabricated by Malcolm Rowe, who is very know in the area.

EDITORIAL THE YEARS GO BY

Consultations and meetings

IT'S likely been a long time since the Renmark Paringa district has seen such anticipation and excitement for meetings surrounding the local council.

However, public interest in the decisions being made by council particularly in relation to this year's rate increase – has been at such high levels, two separate gatherings were required even before last night's monthly general meeting.

The six-days' worth of proceedings began with Renmark Paringa's organised session, held at the Renmark Club, where attendees were able to speak with council representatives in a somewhat one-on-one format.

Although this kind of public dropin session regarding a Draft Council Business Plan and Budget was a first in IN May I presented three apples recent memory for Renmark Paringa, the sense of frustration from some attendees on the evening, and in the days since, would be difficult to avoid.

Some reasoning can be seen in the way this consultation session was structured. The most number of attendees were able to spend time with a representative of council, ask questions and air concerns, while minimising the potential of one or two questions being drawn out.

However, any such restrictions were absent from a public followup meeting that was held at Hotel Renmark, on Sunday, where some of the more vocal of council's critics were given the opportunity to air some grievances.

The years of community experience, varying skillsets and knowledge among those offering feedback and opinions at the Sunday meeting should be taken into account, however, fact checking a few of the statements being made in the public sphere may have been beneficial.

In pondering on what options now lie ahead, while it can be rightly pointed out that Renmark Paringa's rates burden benchmarks relatively well against other councils of similar size, comparisons again to Loxton Waikerie's 25/26 proposed increase of 2.5 per cent – captured attention.

It is likely another story in this edition, regarding a revision to Mid Murray Council's budget that has seen their proposed rate rise drop from 4.94 per cent, down to 3.84 per cent, will spark some similar comparisons.

Both Loxton Waikerie and Mid Murray have also been clear that the current cost-of-living challenges were a factor in keeping this year's rate rises minimal.

Last Thursday's session would certainly have at least provided council with a large volume of feedback and community views, which would have been added to with surveys distributed at the Sunday meeting.

How much influence will this public input have on council's next steps?

The Church of England's mission launch the Etona, at Murray Bridge, 1890's. In 1892, the Church of England, in Adelaide, established the River Murray Mission, appointing Reverend JGK Mackenzie its first chaplain. The missioner travelled a sixweek circuit of some 250 miles, perhaps by horse-and-sulky, or braving the elements, on horseback, or foot, attending to the needs of the isolated but growing river communities. He visited parishioners and others who had no access to Christian ministry, which included pastoral care, weddings, burials and what became SA's first travelling lending library. To make outreach

more effective, in 1891 the church purchased a small, steam-powdered, propellordriven launch, the Etona (Etona 1), once owned by SA Police as a patrol vessel, named Patroller. The much-loved Archdeacon Bussell ministered from 1894 to 1912, during which time little Etona 1, with its tiny chapel, was replaced in 1898 by a new and larger paddle-steamer, built at Milang, and also christened Etona (Etona 2). The well-to-do Eton public school, in England, provided support toward both vessels. Etona 1 was a very small vessel and money and space were tight, but the missioner and family were careful. It is said of

Food security needed on agenda

AUSTRALIA has a looming food security crisis, yet it is not being sufficiently acknowledged by politicians, according to a regional community group.

The Murray Regional Strategy Group says it is time to realise the current and impending dangers if action is not taken.

Recent reports have highlighted the need to recognise the problem, yet scant attention is being paid at a political level.

The Federal Government has indicated we need to address national food security, but we have seen no firm actions, apart from announcing a 'Feeding Australia' strategy that Federal Agriculture Minister Julie Collins says will focus on biofuels and preventing checkout

shocks. This ignores they key ingredient in food production and there-

fore security, which is water. We must review water policy and the impact it is having on food security. You can't grow food without water, and at present there is insufficient effort to ensure we are effectively managing this precious resource.

A National Food Security Preparedness green paper, compiled by the Australian Strategic Policy Institute (ASPI), has raised serious concerns about Australia's food security.

Various reports are highlighting the need for Australia to ensure we maintain self-sufficiency with food production, yet in contrast we are increasing our imports at an alarming rate.

This trend not only poses a long-term risk, but in the immediate term it is increasing the cost of food at our supermarkets. Everyday Australians are paying the price because we are not prioritising fresh, clean, locally grown food.

The ASPI report recommends Australia should treat food security on par with defence.

One of the important starting points can be including food security in the 2026 review of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

Under the Basin Plan the Australian Government is spending \$13 billion of taxpayers money, which is having a 'double negative' impact by increasing the national debt, and reducing our food security.

Instead of removing water from food production, we should be undertaking projects that help us grow food while also protecting the environment. There are numerous options, but the government is taking the easy way out, which is buying water from farmers and storing it in dams for future use.

As a nation, we need to come to terms with the flawed water management that is unnecessarily plaguing our future food security and has already increased the cost of food at the supermarket.

It is only going to get worse. Changes to water policy have not only significantly reduced the amount of water available

to farmers for growing food, but also created a dysfunctional water market that allows corporates and investors to profit, at the expense of farmers and families who want cheaper food.

Imports of staple foods such as dairy products and wheat continue to rise, and under current policy settings this trend will continue

There should also be particular concern around fruit and vegetables. With less available water for growing these essential, healthy fresh foods, there will be a double whammy of increased imports and higher prices at the supermarket.

I do not believe there is a full community understanding of the impact when you reduce water availability and then have the obvious additional effect, which is affordability. As the water becomes more expensive, the amount of food our farmers can afford to grow is also reduced.

Mr Moar said at present the impact of the Basin Plan on national food security is not part of the 2026 Basin Plan review, yet including it in this process is imperative.

Australia and the world are starkly different today than when the Basin Plan was embedded in a new Water Act nearly two decades ago. So much has changed, including

science around Basin Plan flow volumes, potential water saving projects and much more.

Yet for some inexplicable reason we have governments which are not prepared to even consider alternatives that can bolster our food security, reduce fresh food prices, protect the environment and save jobs. This is hard to comprehend and

Diabetes prevention demands tax

AUSTRALIA must introduce a tax on sugar-sweetened beverages to curb the nation's escalating obesity crisis, as the recent National Diabetes Week put a spotlight on prevention.

The evidence is clear — sug-

ary drinks are fuelling rates of obesity, which is a risk factor for many chronic diseases, including type 2 diabetes.

The Australian Medical Association (AMA) is calling for a tax on sugar-sweetened beverages at a rate of 50c/100g of sugar.

This is a tax levied against beverage manufacturers, forcing them to reformulate their products to contain less sugar, or face higher costs.

National Diabetes Week highlighted the urgent need for government investment in a range of preventive health measures.

The evidence shows that sugary drinks are fuelling rates of obesity and chronic disease – and a sugar tax is our best chance at getting on top of this crisis.

For people at risk of developing type 2 diabetes, reducing sugar intake through swaps like drinking water over soft drinks can make a profound difference to their long-term health.

Obesity rates in Australia have been increasing for at least 25 years and will continue to increase without decisive action.

The AMA's interactive map shows Australia has failed to keep up with international progress on reducing sugar consumption.

Australia lags behind the rest of the world, with more than 100 jurisdictions having implemented a successful sugar tax already - it's time for us to catch up.

Our proposal for a tax on sugary drinks would drive down annual sugar consumption by 2kg per person, while raising \$3.6 billion in government revenue that can be invested in other crucial preventive health measures.

The Federal Government needs to get tougher with soft drink manufacturing giants by hitting them with this commonsense tax model.

Last year it was revealed the sugar content in popular soft drink Fanta had increased by 60 per cent, despite industry assurances that sugary drinks were being reformulated.

We are now calling on the Federal Government to act decisively by implementing a sugar

tax — and with the resumption of parliament soon, now is the time to ignite this debate. National Diabetes Week

served as a powerful reminder that we cannot afford to delay action on sugar reduction any longer — it will reduce the burden on our health system, and importantly, it could save lives. ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR JULIAN

Deepfake videos a public health risk

ARTIFICIAL intelligence technology is being exploited to mislead the public into purchasing unproven and potentially harmful treatments for serious illnesses, including diabetes.

The Australian Medical Association (AMA) is calling on the federal government to crack down on this dangerous practice, which involves "deepfake" AI videos that mimic reputable health professionals.

The AMA has written to Federal Minister for Communications Anika Wells, urging the government to introduce clear and enforceable regulations on health-related advertising online.

We are now living in an age where any video that appears online has to be questioned — is it real, or is it a deepfake?

Deepfake videos are becoming more and more convincing, and this technology is being exploited by dodgy companies peddling snake oil to vulnerable people who are dealing with serious health issues.

Several trusted clinicians including Dr Norman Swan, former AMA president Professor Kerryn Phelps, and Professor Jonathan Shaw — have had their identities misused in deepfake videos that promote unproven products.

In Professor Shaw's case, the deepfake video was advertising an unproven dietary supplement as a treatment for type 2 diabetes. A fake version of Dr Swan was used to denigrate scientific evidence as "stupid", while selling supplements or weight loss products purporting to treat heart disease, diabetes or obesity.

These videos encourage consumers to abandon clinically validated therapies in favour of unscientific alternatives.

Disturbingly, many health professionals only become aware they have been impersonated when patients raise questions about discontinuing their pre-

scribed treatments or request information about where to purchase so-called 'miracle cures'.

I first discovered a fake profile impersonating me when a family member called to ask if I really believed in what they were selling.

In addition to the very serious health risks, these scams also pose a financial risk to vulnerable Australians.

In the letter to the Communications Minister, the AMA urged the Federal Government to introduce clear and enforceable guardrails governing the use of AI in healthrelated advertising and communications, particularly for content hosted by digital platforms and social media providers operating in Australia.

The AMA recommends a regulatory framework that includes: □ Mandatory identification of

- the individual or company responsible for any online material promoting a medical product or service.
- An accessible portal for individuals to report fake or misleading AI-generated or other content.
- Unsubscribing mechanisms to allow users to opt out of unsolicited medical advertising.
- Takedown requirements mandating platforms to remove harmful content within a specified period after a complaint is lodged.

□ Enforcement powers, including the ability to issue infringement notices for noncompliance.

Social media giants also need to do everything in their power to stamp out these dangerous videos.

At the moment, this is an endless game of whack-a-mole, so it is important to implement strict and enforceable rules and deterrents.

MADISON EASTMOND

A RIVERLAND childcare service has received \$96,550 in state funding to grow and upskill the local workforce and address a critical shortage in the sector.

Part of a \$10.9m investment into the state's early childhood education workforce, the Riverland Early Learning Centre has recently received a Flying Start Workforce grant to fund the upskilling of more than 60 employees, and provide free access to a Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care to up to 25 interested Riverlanders.

Delivering the course in partnership with the Riverland Early Learning Centre, Academy of Early Learning Training manager Kathrine Biddell said 17 spots had already been snatched up by locals hailing from Renmark, Berri, Loxton and Waikerie.

"When we saw the grant, we just thought it would be a fantastic opportunity for both our centres on both Seventeenth and Eighteenth Street," Ms Biddell said.

"Being regional as well, local people just don't have the same opportunities as what is available as the city — aside from TAFE SA, there is no centre-based training available, and the flexibility is limited.

"The fact this is completely free for anyone to take part in is just amazing and such a great opportunity.

"It's also just fantastic for the Riverland as a whole, because those who are doing the training are set to come back into either our service to work, or - because we are partnering with a Berri and Loxton centre — will go towards their staffing pools in those towns."

Ms Biddell said the funding will also include the upskilling of more than 60 pre-existing local employees in professional development disability and mental health workshops.

We're upskilling across the region, which is so important because we have a responsibility to the children of the future," she said.

Riverland Early Learning Centre Seventeenth Street manager Mikala Smith said the funding and initiative would address a "critical" challenge in the Riverland, such as wait lists to centres and short staffing

"Childcare has a massive turno-

ver in staff — it's a massive burnout industry," Ms Smith said. "As you could imagine, being

in a room with up to 25 children, for eight hours a day, can be quite demanding.

"So, we applied to this grant to try to get a head start on staff retention, increase the pool of the local sector, and alleviate that pressure — with more staff, there can be more work-life balance and opportunities to break up the working week.

"Also, every centre in the Riverland has a waitlist, some up to two years.

"Regulations deem it's oneeducator-for-every-four children, it cannot be stretched or gotten around, so to increase staff will also increase the opportunities for local families in the area."

Previously working in disability and aged care, Berri local Talia Eichenberger said free access to the certification has "changed everything" for her.

"I have always had a passion for childcare and really wanted to study to gain the qualification," she said.

"However, I live and rent on my own, so there was never any way for me to access the training.'

Running for the next 12 months, all potential students need to join the local program with the ability to commit to a weekly Tuesday session, a Working with Children Check, and a passion for early learning childhood development.

Though first introductory sessions of the course began last week, Ms Biddell said anyone interested in the remaining positions has the next four weeks to register.

"There is a (four)-week buffer, as we are starting with first-aid and safe environment certification, which can be made up later down the track," she said.

Office for Early Childhood Development chief executive Kim Little said "the early childhood workforce is central to the delivery of universal three-year-old preschool and associated reforms to support young children to thrive and reach their full potential".

"We need to grow a valued workforce of teachers and educators across all South Australia if we are to give every three-year-old child the same access to two years of preschool," she said.

"This is especially true for rural and regional communities, where families often face more limited options.

"By investing in the next generation of teachers and educators, we aim to give all South Australian children access to two years of quality preschool programs in the communities they live in."

A LOXTON-born news presenter has been awarded one of the most important journalism accolades in Australia, for his work on the truecrime podcast 'Just Married: The Anthea Bradshaw Mystery'.

9News Adelaide's Ben Avery has been named the Journalist of the Year at the Media, Entertainment & Arts Alliance 2025 South Australian Media Awards.

Recognising excellence, impact, journalistic research and his indepth storytelling, Ben was also the winner of the Radio/Audio Journalism - Feature award.

In Just Married, Ben examines the 1994 murder of Anthea Bradshaw, an Adelaide woman who, after marrying her high school sweetheart, was found dead in a Brunei apartment just 96 days later.

Mr Avery reflected on his achievements and what made him create the podcast.

"I had been researching Anthea

Bradshaw's murder for more than 10 years and thought it was important to tell the story," Mr Avery said.

"I worked closely with Anthea's family, who have long campaigned for more to be done to investigate the case.

"I was very pleased to see Anthea's story resonated with listeners all over the world and the podcast generated more than 1.3 million downloads.

"The podcast uncovered important new clues, but unfortunately Anthea's murder remains unsolved.

'While it's nice to win awards, the outcome I'd really like is for the killer to be brought to justice.

"I would encourage people to listen to the podcast and do everything they can to raise awareness about the case."

Mr Avery grew up in the Riverland, and his regional background was one of many key elements to approach his passion for storytelling.

Parliamentary committee fact find in the Riverland

SA PARLIMANT's Joint Committee on the Mental Health and Wellbeing of Veterinarians in South Australia visited the Riverland earlier this month to discuss issues faced by regional practices.

Meeting with the staff of Berri-based based Riverland Veterinary Practice, the Joint Committee inquired into the mental health impacts of demanding work conditions on veterinarians across the state, and collected evidence, concerning:

- □ The causes behind veterinarian burnout, mental health, and suicide.
- □ Identifying preventative measures and initiatives to improve working conditions.
- □ The role of education in workplace preparation. □ Identifying the industry's
- social and economic benefits
- □ Related matters.

Riverland-based politician, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti who attended the meeting — said it "was a privilege to visit the Riverland Vet Clinic and it was especially meaningful, having worked as a country vet there for many years".

"It was a great opportunity for committee members to gain a deeper understanding of what life is really like in a regional veterinary practice: the highs, the heartbreaks, and the incredible skill and investment involved," Dr Centofanti said.

"(Also) to hear firsthand about the realities of working in a regional veterinary practice: the long hours, the variety of work, the rewards, the personal commitment, and the emotional toll that often comes with the job.


'We had open and constructive conversations about the mental health challenges vets are facing, particularly in regional areas, and the need for better support structures across the profession.

"This is an important piece of work. Over the coming weeks, we'll continue engaging with vets and experts across the state to inform a set of practical recommendations aimed at improving mental health and wellbeing outcomes for South Australian vets."

Independent MLC Sarah Game said "there is something very concerning going on with the veterinary industry".

'We have highly resilient, highly capable people, yet they are taking their own lives and leaving the profession," Dr Game said.

"I hope that this inquiry will bring about real change to the extraordinary financial hardship, the very long hours and the incredibly high-pressure environment these people work in.'

Couple faces court over animal abuse charges

A RIVERLAND couple counts of failing to comwill be required to return to court after being charged with several counts of animal cruelty offences.

Morgan couple Shane Jones and Carole Morris - who operated the South Australian Humane Animal Rescue Association (SAHARA) charity – last Wednesday appeared in the Berri Magistrates Court, after being charged with 44 alleged offences under SA's Animal Welfare Act.

The couple were charged with 41 counts of ill-treatment of an animal and three ply with an animal welfare notice.

The charges relate to the alleged treatment of a range of animals, including one goat, one camel, two dogs, nine cats, 24 horses, and poultry. The alleged offences stem from an inspection conducted by RSPCA inspectors on October 15 2024.

The RSPCA alleges its inspection found a pig unable to use its rear legs, which was later found to have a severed spinal cord, and was euthanised on humane grounds, a dog with such severe dental disease that it could not eat, a horse suffering from a chronic wound infested with maggots.

It is understood the pair were granted bail and are yet to enter pleas, and will return to the Berri Magistrates Court on August 13.

Under South Australia's Animal Welfare Act, the maximum penalty for animal cruelty, in the event of a guilty finding, is \$20,000 or two years' imprisonment.

For aggravated cruelty, the maximum penalty rises to \$50,000 or four years' imprisonment if guilt is established.

Working towards water trading solution?

STEPS are being taken to ensure a major local irrigation trust will again be able to make water trades.

Renmark Irrigation Trust has been unable to trade water since the beginning of July, due to new regulations under the Federal Government's water market reform.

A Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) spokesperson said restoring 'transparency, integrity and confidence in water markets in the Murray-Darling Basin" was a commitment.

"The Australian Government... is making significant progress in implementing key areas of reform," the spokesperson said.

"The Water Markets Intermediaries Code introduces new rules for water markets intermediaries, which will provide important protections to market participants and align standards with those that exist in other similar markets. Extensive stakeholder consultation was undertaken in the development of the Code in 2024-2025, both with key stakeholders and with the public.

The Australian Government is taking steps to help minimise the regulatory burden on industry. Specific provisions were included in the Code to recognise the unique role and function of irrigation infrastructure operators (IIOs).

"IIOs were also provided with alternative options for professional indemnity insurance to enable them to keep costs low in circumstances where they only facilitate a small number of trades each year."

The spokesperson said "in response to stakeholder feedback, the code is being rolled out in two phases, (as) this will provide timely protection to market participants while giving brokers, irrigators and other intermediaries more time to prepare for the new obligations".

CONSIDERATION for economic difficulties effecting local households has seen Mid Murray Council decrease its proposed rate increase.

Revisions to Mid Murray's 2025-2026 Annual Business Plan and Budget – endorsed at a meeting last week – has seen council's proposed average general rate increase for existing properties fall from 4.94 per cent, to 3.84 per cent.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey said the updated plan delivered a more balanced outcome for ratepayers, and considered current cost-of-living pressures impacting the community.

"Council's original aim was to strike a balance between longterm sustainability and affordability—and through constructive community engagement and a commitment to identify additional operating savings, we've been able to refine our approach to ease the pressure on ratepayers," Ms Bailey said.

"It's been a tough few years for our district, and our decision to reduce the proposed general rates increase reflects council's commitment to sustainability and affordability.

"We are fortunate that we are in a position to be able to do that, thanks to the extensive work we've done as a council over the past couple years to cut costs and increase efficiency."

Full cost attribution across the council – allocating all internal administrative costs to the relevant areas – is among key changes in the 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget, and is aimed at ensuring the administrative costs associated to services such as Community Wastewater Management and waste collection are covered by those who use them, rather than being subsidised through general rates.

Ms Bailey said improving the long-term sustainability of council remained a priority.

"This is about making the services we provide our community more equitable and sustainable," she said.

"By fairly attributing all service costs to the people actually using those services, we can avoid additional increases to general rates, while protecting the future viability of those services our community values."

Ms Bailey said greater support and funding from the State and Federal Governments was a necessity to secure the future of rural communities. "Regional and rural councils

like Mid Murray are facing disproportionate challenges," she said. "We're working hard not only

to manage our budget wisely, but to also ensure our region gets its fair share of resources to meet the needs of communities across our vast district."

Other council priorities include progressing the externally-funded Mid Murray Tourism Precinct Planning Project, which will develop strategies to support enhanced economic development, community development and growth in the district, and continuing to work with the State Government to seek greater protection for the River Murray International Dark Sky Reserve.

New QRVs adding to local CFS capacity

THE CAPACITY of numerous Riverland CFS units to respond to emergency situations is set to increase through the addition of new vehicles.

Waikerie, Barmera, Paringa and Morgan CFS brigades will receive new Quick Response Vehicles (QRVs) under a statewide roll-out that was supported by funding from the Federal Government.

CFS acting deputy chief officer Brenton Hastie said the ultra-light tankers were engineered for agility and rapid response, and were "ideal for rapid deployment in rugged terrain".

"These vehicles are mainly used for combating grass and scrub fires and are a significant investment in the safety of our volunteers and communities, particularly those operating in hard-to-access areas," Mr Hastie said.

"They feature fire apparatus safety systems such as a in-cabin water system covering all windows, an in-cab breathing system, and radiant heat curtains in-cab, covering front and side windows.

"The modular stowage system and integrated telecommunications make them highly adaptable for local brigade needs."

The QRVs come equipped with essential operational tools, including a manual hose

reel, a driving light bar, in-cabin pump start, and scene/perimeter lighting on both sides.

To further support CFS field operations, each QRV includes a 20L fridge, a 240V inverter for battery chainsaw charging, and in-station charging compatibility through a low-voltage connection.

SA Minister for Emergency Services Emily Bourke said the vehicles provide rapid response in locations where traditional fire trucks can be unable to access, including in steep areas with narrow roads or fire tracks.

"These state-of-the-art vehicles are important additions to the CFS' fleet and will support our volunteers and their communities heading into the fire danger season," Ms Bourke said.

"Designed for versatility and rapid response, we've seen how QRVs excel in allowing crews to access the harshest environments.

"This rollout is a major investment into providing volunteers a diverse and modern range of resources to keep South Australians safe."

Federal Minister for Emergency Management Kristy McBain said ensuring volunteers have the best possible equipment was a necessity.

"These new quick response vehicles will

make a real difference for volunteers on the ground, giving them the tools they need to act fast and stay safe in some of South Australia's toughest terrain," Ms McBain said.

"We're proud to support this rollout through the Protecting Our Communities

program, helping to boost local resilience ahead of what's expected to be a challenging fire season.

"Backing the CFS with modern, fit-forpurpose equipment is part of our shared commitment to keeping communities safer and better prepared when disaster strikes."



The scholarship will provide:

Ms Wallis said "the agriculture program is highly regarded and definitely made me realise my interest in agriculture, as well as gaining confidence to step into the field". Ms Wallis' interest in the industry was nurtured through work on her family's farm, for her local stock agent, and at Viterra Pinnaroo, doing grain classification.

"I love the connections I am making in the industry, and the array of opportunities appeals to me," Ms Wallis said.

"When starting the degree, I originally wanted to work within animal production, but now I'm finding research and trial opportunities very exciting."

Ms Wallis has also worked at an onion harvest in the Mallee.

Mr Haslett said soil health was now a main interest of his.

"My University of Adelaide study started out in the faculty of mechanical engineering, as I enjoy solving problems and designing solutions," Mr Haslett said.

"However, I have been drawn back to a focus on agriculture and in particular to my current soil science major.

"I have a strong interest in this field and a firmly held belief that understanding and correctly managing our soils is critical to the long-term viability of food production on our farms.

Jenaya setting an example through the SEM program

INCREASING numbers of young doctors are staying in the Riverland to train and practice with the support of an ongoing initiative.

At 25 years old, Jenaya Shelton is a Single Employer Model (SEM) participant in the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) and is training to be a rural generalist.

After graduating from the University of Adelaide in 2022, Dr Shelton decided to pursue a rural internship position, having grown up in Berri. She loves the beauty of regional and remote communities, and helping people in need

Dr Shelton is currently training at the Renmark Medical Clinic and has a special interest in paediatrics. She is also enrolled in RMCLHN's Riverland Academy of Clinical Excellence (RACE) Rural Generalist Training Program.

Dr Shelton said being part of the SEM provides stable employment, and the chance to build connections and lay down roots in a regional community.

"The SEM made my decision to return home to the Riverland easier, knowing that my local health network was willing to provide secure employment throughout my training," she said.

"This helped make my transition into community general practice as smooth as possible — the ongoing support from the RACE Medical Education Unit has been a highlight of my junior doctor years.

"The SEM means that I don't have to be consciously planning my next career move. This has helped me to consider other aspects of my career, including the specific needs of the region and additional training to better support my community.

"I love the idea of increasing the healthcare services available to people in regional areas — any part I can play in reducing physical, financial or emotional burdens of healthcare for people living outside of major cities is the goal, and the two-minute commute to work helps too."

Dr Shelton previously completed medical placements in Port Augusta, Mount Gambier, Quorn and Victor Harbour. Since 2023, she has worked in other locations across the Riverland.

When Dr Shelton is outside the clinic, she enjoys travelling, kayaking on the Murray River, listening to classical music and spending time in her veggie patch.

A trial of SEM run by the RACE in the RMCLHN has operated since 2023, with up to 20 generalist trainees at a time.

Rural Generalist Program lead Mike Beckoff said the Riverland program continues to receive positive feedback from general practices and trainee GPs.

"Following the successful SEM trial in the RMCLHN - where the medical workforce has increased by some 25 per cent and rural generalist registrars have indicated they appreciate receiving quality medical training in their own LHN - they have also indicated their willingness to remain and provide sustainability to the local workforce and, more importantly, contribute to the health of their rural communities," Dr Beckoff said.

"Further SEM trials now underway in the other five rural LHNs, with governance sitting under the RGPSA Steering Committee, pave the way for a significant increase in rural generalist training in SA, thereby enabling our rural and remote communities in SA to have access to more rural generalists." SA Minister for Health Chris Picton said

retaining more doctors would lead to better medical support for regional communities.

"The Single Employer Model will help to address one of the biggest health workforce issues in regional and remote areas - recruiting and retaining doctors," Mr Picton said.

'We have seen how successful the Single Employer Model has been in the Riverland for the past two years, increasing the medical workforce by more than 25 per cent in the region.

"Bringing in more doctors to regional South Australia continues our recruiting drive to boost the state's health system, where we have hired nearly 2800 extra health workers since 2022."

Federal Minister for Health Mark Butler said the initiative meant it was "easier for people in regional South Australia to see a doctor close to home".

"We want to attract more doctors to regional South Australia and this innovative approach will help to retain the doctors we need to continue to provide essential primary healthcare services to South Australians," Mr Butler said.







A STATE utility has assured Riverlanders local water supplies are "safe to drink" following recent testing.

SA Water investigative water quality sampling in the Murray River showed no detection of human-made class per-andpoly-fluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).

SA Water's senior manager of water expertise Lionel Ho said ensuring the safety of drinking water was a priority.

"These results confirm catchment assessments with our regulator SA Health which identified there is a low risk of PFAS contamination in our state's water supplies, and for the Murray River, this is further buoyed by recent testing by our interstate counterparts upstream which also showed no detection of PFAS," Dr Ho said.

"As an additional assurance, all our water treatment plants along the river – which supply large parts of regional South Australia and some metropolitan areas – use proven technologies that can effectively remove or significantly reduce PFAS. These are granular and powdered activated carbon, which adsorb contaminants as part of the treatment process.

"For this month's sampling in the river, we targeted three locations to best represent – from a geographic perspective – the upper, middle and lower The driver behind this work is to maintain the community's confidence in their water...

in the river, along with other regional water sources around the state, to be assessed with our regulator SA Health," he said.

SA Health principal water quality adviser David Cunliffe said the sampling was necessary as health-based guidelines for PFAS are set to be reviewed by the National Health and Medical Research Council.

"The driver behind this work is to maintain the community's confidence in their water, and SA Water's customers can be assured from this latest round of testing that it remains safe to drink," Dr Cunliffe said.

"In South Australia, we are also fortunate there are no large industries near our main drinking water sources, nor are there large populations or places where fire-fighting foams containing PFAS have been used (such as airports), which are all common PFAS risk factors.

"This is particularly pertinent, as we know the best solution to any water quality challenge involving PFAS is to remove the source, i.e. the products that contain PFAS."

Wine sustainability certification assistance program announced

THOSE in the Riverland wine industry can now participate in a new sustainability project, aimed at accelerating sustainability credentials for South Australian wine businesses. The South Australian Wine

The South Australian Wine Industry Association (SAWIA) has announced it will soon open registrations for a new sustainability certification program, part of the SA Wine Recovery Program, to assist 75 grape and wine businesses to achieve certified membership with 'Sustainable Winegrowing Australia' (SWA) by May 2026.

SAWIA chief executive Inca

Lee said "this project will help to cement the South Australian wine industry as the leading sustainable wine state, with our growers and winemakers being preferred business partners, both locally and around the world".

"With environmental, social and governance requirements becoming increasingly critical to both domestic and international trade, sustainability certification is no longer just nice to have, it's a market expectation," Ms Lee said.

"We recognise the significant cost pressures wine businesses

are experiencing, and this project offers a structured, supported, affordable path to SWA certification, removing key barriers of cost and complexity.

For a participation fee of \$500 (ex GST) per business, selected participants will receive:

- Tailored training via three regional workshops delivered by the Australian Wine Research Institute (AWRI).
- One-on-one expert support from SAWIA to prepare for the audit (up to four hours per business).
- □ On-site support from SAWIA on the day of audit (up to six

hours per business).

\$1000 (ex GST) audit cost relief as a rebate upon successful certification.

The project is supported by the Government of South Australia through the Department of Primary Industries and Regions, and funding contributed by the Australian Government.

State knife handback program's success

UNDER new SA laws, more than 500 knives have been surrendered to police stations across the state, including those in the Riverland.

Since the beginning of the State Government's knife laws at the start of July, South Australian's have voluntarily handed knives, swords and machetes, avoiding penalties of up to \$20,000 or two years of imprisonment for possession of these weapons.

Minors aged under 18 are barred from buying sharp knives under any circumstances.

SA residents have also been given three months to anonymously surrender any pro-

hibited weapons to their local police stations. Attorney-General Kyam Maher said "since this surrender period was announced South Australians have been handing in an average of roughly 40 illegal swords and machetes a day".

day". "We appreciate seeing so many members of the community being ready to back these new laws in by doing the right thing and getting rid of these dangerous weapons," Mr Maher said.

"It's an encouraging start to this phase of our nation-leading knife crime reforms, as we work to better protect our state and hold offenders to account."

People should check whether their possession of swords or machetes will remain lawful and, if not, surrender the weapons to a local police station during the next three months.

Figures collated by SAPOL have shown that between June 29 and July 11, a total of 139 swords, 231 machetes and 115 other dangerous weapons – including bayonets, daggers and ninja stars, have been surrendered to police.

Protect your tax return from scammers

RIVERLANDERS looking to lodge their tax returns are being urged to stay aware of any suspicious activity, and use the new security features included in the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) App, designed to give users real-time control over their tax affairs through alerts, and instant account locking to help stop fraudsters in their tracks.

As numerous locals prepare to lodge their tax returns, scammers are actively seeking new ways to exploit personal information, and if successful, they can use stolen details to commit fraud against the ATO and carry out broader identity theft and financial crimes across the community.

Scammers are getting smarter, but so are the protective features in the ATO app, which now includes new security measures, such as:

Real-time messages when changes are made to an ATO record.

- Quick account locking when receiving a real-time message to prevent unauthorised access or fraudulent refunds.
- Using a digital ID like myID to securely access online services. It's unique and helps protect from identity theft and fraud across platforms like tax, education, and government services.
- □ Knowing how to spot and report scams impersonating the ATO. It only takes a few seconds to stop and check an interaction is legitimate.
- □ Remember, the ATO will never send a link asking for personal information or to log into online services.

Multi-factor authentication. These features are designed to provide an extra layer of security to help taxpayers protect their information and stay in control of their tax affairs.

ATO assistant commissioner Rob Thomson said "this is the time of year when people are awaiting their tax returns, or expecting to hear from the ATO, and scammers know it".

"That's why we've strengthened the ATO app with new security features. It's fast, free, and puts security in your hands, giving you the power to monitor your account in realtime and instantly lock it if something doesn't feel right," Mr Thomson said.

'Downloading the ATO app is a simple and effective way to stay one step ahead.

Impersonation scams have risen 150 per cent over the past 12 months, with 90 per cent of these, being carried out by fake emails.

The app enhancements bolster the ATO's existing fraud controls that have been in place for some time to detect unusual or out of pattern behaviour on taxpayers' accounts.

If you receive a notification and something doesn't feel right, lock your account immediately in the ATO app, and verify and report the interaction on the ATO website or by calling 1800 467 033 during business hours.



Grain Producers SA (GPSA), in partnership with the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (NHVR), is delivering another round of heavy vehicle workshops, funded by the NHVR's Heavy Vehicle Safety Initiative.

The Roadworthy Heavy Vehicles... Made Easy workshop, will be held on August 21, at Max's Mechanical Workshop, in Loxton.

The event is open to grain producers, and all Primary Producers SA (PPSA) commodity group members, who own and operate their own heavy vehicles.

The workshop program is designed to take the complexity out of vehicle compliance by giving producers a clear understanding of their obligations, including road safety awareness, maintenance responsibilities, and how to use the NHVR Heavy Vehicle Inspection Manual as a practical tool.

THE State Government is taking to social media to support young Riverlanders in understanding the importance of consent and respect in response to a disturbing rise in sexual violence across the country.

For ten weeks, the State Government will share images and videos on social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, X and LinkedIn to boost awareness around the various forms of sexual violence. These include taking and sharing of intimate images without consent, pressuring people into sex and disrespecting boundaries.

The content aims to empower young people with the tools to recognise, prevent and respond to sexual violence, whether it happens online or in person.

Research from Our Watch, a leading organisation in the prevention of violence against women in Australia, highlights how prevalent misconceptions of sexual violence are amongst young people. Our Watch surveyed 1000 young Australians aged 14 to 20 years old and whilst the majority of those surveyed claimed to understand healthy relationships, 27 per cent confused controlling behaviours as signs of healthy boundaries.

29 per cent of young Australians surveyed thought forcing physical touch out of love was a healthy boundary while 54 per cent believed that if a boy wants to have sex with a girl, it is up to the girl to make it very clear she doesn't want to.

"The rise of sexual violence - in all of its forms - is disturbing," Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence Katrine Hildyard said.

"Sexual violence isn't always physical - it can manifest itself in insidious ways, like taking or sharing an intimate photo of someone without their permission or intimidating someone online.

"Just as is the case with physical sexual violence, these other, unacceptable forms of sexual violence can also have serious and long-lasting impacts on wellbeing and relationships, and the rapidly changing nature of technology makes preventing and tackling them more complex than ever before. "Our Government

wants to ensure that young people have all the tools they need to understand, prevent and respond to every form of sexual violence.

"We need young people

to feel confident to speak up and help us to create safer spaces online – and everywhere else - for everyone.

"To do this, we want young people to have a clear understanding about what constitutes sexual violence and how they can play their part in helping to prevent and end it. That is what this push is all about."

Zahra Foundation head of specialist practice, and survivor, Rabia Aftab said "if a friend changes how they dress, act, or speak overnight it might not be 'just a phase', it might be a trauma response".

"Don't ignore it, pay attention, ask questions, believe them, and seek help," she said.

"When consent is missing its sexual abuse. Coercion, manipulation, guilt-tripping, love bombing, these are red flags too.

"Silence only protects perpetrators. Let's break the silence speak up and support each other.

"Educate yourself and know that it never is your fault."

Organ donor plea to young South Australians

Young Riverlanders are being urged to register as organ donors, and have conversations with their families that could help save lives.

While South Australia significantly leads the nation in organ donation registration, only 40 per cent of South Australians aged 16 to 24 are on the register, compared with 70 to 84 per cent for older age groups.

South Australia is the only state where people can register on the Australian Organ Donor Registry through their driver's licence. Anyone aged 16 or over can register.

Advocates want more young South Australians to sign up and talk to their families about their wishes.

One organ donor can save the lives of up to seven people, and change the lives of many more through eye and tissue donation.

More than 1800 Australians are waiting for an organ transplant, but sadly in the past five years, more than 200 have died waiting.

An additional 14,000 people on dialysis for kidney failure might also benefit from a transplant.

Families have the final decision in organ donation. When people are registered, eight-out-of-10 families give consent for the organ donation, but that drops to four out of 10 if the family is unaware of their relative's intentions.

"South Australians should be proud of the fact that we lead the nation in organ donation registration, (and) our sign-up rate is more than double the national average,' Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"There is no doubt this is helped by our unique system of being able to register when you get or renew your driver's licence.

"We're urging even more South Australians - particularly young people -

to register to give the gift of life to others. "Getting your driver's licence is the perfect opportunity to sign up.

"Of course, no young person or their family wants to imagine the worst happening at the wheel, but having those serious conversations about responsibility on the roads is the perfect time to talk about the amazing gift of organ donation."

DonateLife SA medical director Stewart Moodie said young Riverlanders should "talk to (their) family, and have that conversation".

"Time and again we see that it helps a family in the midst of their devastation when the person has registered and discussed their wishes," Dr Moodie said.

"This is particularly important for the family of a young person, where they see that their tragedy can do such good.'

People can register on the DonateLife website (www.donatelife.gov.au), through their driver's licence registration or renewal, or through Medicare.










IN a game with so much on the line, Barmera-Monash held its nerve to defeat Berri in round 11 of the Riverland Football League's A grade competition.

Barmera-Monash entered the game hoping to close the gap on Renmark in top spot, having survived a scare in the previous outing against Loxton North.

Meanwhile, Berri hoped to further entrench itself inside the top four, with both North and Loxton breathing down its necks.

In overcast conditions at the Lakeside, it was a slow start to the day, which ultimately set the tone for the remainder of the afternoon.

With just under eight minutes gone, Roos coach Fraser Sampson kicked the first of the day, and ultimately the only one of the first term to put his side nine points ahead at the opening change.

Berri forward, and ex-SANFL league player Tyson Lindsay sprung his side to life in the second quarter with back-to-back goals in the first five minutes of the term.

Lindsay's first goal proved one of the best of the RFL season so far, dribbling one

through while hard up against the boundary line.

However, the Roos stole the lead back with a pair of goals into the half-time interval, with both Tony Drogemuller and Lucas Warnett slotting majors.

Missed opportunities proved to be the storyline of the third quarter for the visiting side, after Roo Mitch Wellington exchanged defence for attack to have the margin at 17 points.

The Demons failed to convert from five chances in a row prior to the three-quartertime break, leaving the margin at 12 points at the last change.

Warnett put the result beyond doubt in the final quarter with a brilliant goal from the boundary, helping Barmera-Monash earn a hard-fought 19-point victory in scrappy conditions.

Warnett proved the only multiple goalkicker for the Roos, with the home side also missing several chances to put the game beyond doubt earlier on.

Justin Bonney was superb across half back for the home side, finding the ball at ease, and curbing the influence of dangerous Berri smalls for the third time this year.

Coach Sampson made little mistakes with ball in hand, as did skipper Sam Butterworth,

while Jack Austin held his own in the ruck against Berri pair Brody Thompson and Ondre Hunyadi.

For the Demons, Brad Rosenzweig failed to give in across the whole afternoon, continuing his impressive campaign following his switch into the middle of the ground.

Captain Shay Hawkins cut off several attacking pieces of attacking play from the Roos, while an injury to forward Jake Egel also hurt the chances of the visitors.

Berri defender Jacob Grieger also took out the 2025 Stanley James Memorial Dudley Achee Medal for his valiant efforts in defeat.

This weekend sees Barmera-Monash make the trip to Renmark for the second time this season when it takes on the Rovers in a grand final rematch, hoping to close the gap for top spot in the process.

Meanwhile, the loss for Berri saw it fall out of the top four, and a massive clash with the Tigers at The Precinct awaits, as the fight to stay in the finals hunt ramps up.

A TOP-two berth is officially a possibility for Waikerie's A grade side in 2025, following a five-goal win over Loxton in round 11 of the Riverland Football League last Saturday.

Waikerie entered the weekend's clash on home turf hoping to continue its winning ways prior to the competition-wide bye, while Loxton was hoping to respond from a 65-point horror show against Renmark.

The Magpies got away to a strong start from the outset, piling on six goals unanswered in the opening term, leading by 36 points at the opening break.

Reigning Whillas medallist Kade Hilton was the key piece of the opening term, kicking three goals, while goals from Shaun King, Ryan Turner, and Brad Burgemeister had the Pies in a strong position.

Magpies coach Jackson Sutton said his group made the most of an early breeze towards the river end, but credited his group for the way it played.

"The boys are pretty selfmotivated at the moment, and they got a bit of a lift from Brad Burgemeister coming back from injury," he said.

Waikerie currently sits third on the ladder, trailing Barmera-Monash only on percentage, while the Rovers are two games clear at the top, and Sutton said his side will control what it can control.

"For us it's about controlling what we can control, and although no one wants to say it, luck goes a long way too, and injuries can play a huge role," he said.

"It's about keeping the healthiest possible list, and tweaking what we can with making a few changes here and there.

"There are still things that I do have in my arsenal that I want to try, so it's about pulling those moves at the right time, and making sure the boys are enioving it

The boys were very excited. and rightly so," North coach Dave Higgins said.

"They played out four quarters on Saturday against high-quality opposition, and got the result they deserved, so they were pretty proud of themselves

'We know what he's bringing and we can structure up around him that way."

Renmark will be hoping to respond this weekend when it returns home to clash with Barmera-Monash, still sitting two games clear in top spot.

Loxton North is still wrapped up in the close nature of the competition, but the win on the weekend saw it leap into the top four for the first time in 2025.





GET ready to celebrate more than one incredible milestone for Australia's favourite renovation show, The Block, in the beautiful country town of Daylesford, in Victoria.

The Block is back for its 21st season – which includes its 1000th episode – and will premiere Sunday, July 27, at 7pm, on Channel 9 and 9Now.

Daylesford, about 80 minutes from Melbourne, is known as one of Australia's top weekend getaway destinations, and the capital of spas and mineral springs.

For the first time in the show's history, the teams this year will build homes from scratch that are exactly the same in layout and size, once again designed by longtime Block architect Julian Brenchley.

Also new this year, all-nighters are outlawed, and the building site will be locked every night. This means timemanagement skills from the contestants are a must, or some rooms won't be completed in time.

Host Scott Cam is back for his 19th

season, joined by co-host Shelley Craft in her 18th season with The Block. Plus, Dan Reilly continues in his role as sole foreman, while Marty Fox, Shaynna Blaze and Darren Palmer return for the make-or-break weekly room judging.

"Since all the houses have identical layouts, it really comes down to the contestants' own creativity where they'll have to think outside the box to catch the judges' eye for a win," Scott said.

"They have to produce something spectacular from week one."

Shelley believes the unique twist of the houses being new builds will resonate with Block viewers and also help the contestants.

"For the contestants it's a fresh start every week," she said.

"Rather than a dirty, grubby, messy start where they had to demolish a room and rebuild it in a week, coming into a clean frame is a much better mindset to be in." The five teams who will build a house in Daylesford are:

- Plumber Sonny (44) and dental practice manager Alicia (42), married couple from QLD
- Barber Robby (37) and hairdresser Mat (41), best mates from SA
- Geologist Han (29) and social media and marketing analyst Can (31), couple from WA
- Police officer Britt (30) and police officer Taz (30), married couple from WA
- Dance teacher Em (33) and engineer Ben (32), married couple from VIC

The Block's executive producer and creator Julian Cress said the five couples cast this year have brought the show back to basics for season 21.

"What the audience can expect this year is what I would call a classic Block series," he said.

"We have a really diverse cast of hard-working people who are very competitive, engaged with their design, and of course we will have some highs and lows."

Julian said Daylesford was an idyllic location for The Block. The production and the entire crew moved there for three months during the build and were embraced with open arms.

"There is a reason why Daylesford is the number one weekend tourist destination in Australia – it's a very beautiful town with an amazing community," he said.

"We hope to show how incredible Daylesford is to not only Australia, but to the rest of the world."

This year there will be another first for Australian television: a purposebuilt Sponsor Village onsite, which transforms how sponsor interaction is done on a program like The Block.

The Block moves to Daylesford and premieres on Sunday, July 27, at 7pm on Channel 9 and 9Now.





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
