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Baby buck\$ to help hospital

THE Loxton Waikerie Mayor believes a \$550,000 upgrade to the Loxton Hospital Complex will help progress the surrounding local community.

The operating theatre at Loxton Hospital Complex is set to receive crucial upgrades to its infrastructure, with the State Government funding aimed to provide a better space for the delivery of clinical services and ensure the highest quality, health

and safety outcomes can continue for local staff and patients. With works scheduled to begin in September, upgrades to the operating theatre's walls and flooring, and the initialisation of a new air conditioning, will be undertaken by Metron Design Building Services.

During the construction works some services, such as birthing deliveries and surgical lists will be temporarily located at the Riverland General Hospital, in Berri, until the new theatre works are complete.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said "the upgrade to Loxton hospital's operating theatre (are) a very welcome investment in the health and wellbeing of (the) community".

"Access to quality health services close to home — particu-

larly birthing and surgical — is vital, particularly in regional areas like ours," Mayor Norton said.

"It is great to see the South Australian Government recognise the importance of regional health infrastructure and committing to this significant upgrade.

"Our community looks forward to seeing the benefits of this investment once works are completed."

The Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) said it was continuing to work with clinicians and patients to minimise disruption and will ensure that the same midwives, antenatal and postnatal care are available during this time.

"The health and wellbeing of consumers across the Riverland Mallee Coorong regions is the RMCLHN's highest priority," RMCLHN chief executive officer Wayne Champion said.

"We are upgrading the operating theatre in Loxton Hospital Complex to ensure that patients and consumers from Loxton continue to have access to the best possible care when they need elective GP procedures, or interventional birthing services, safeguarding access to these services for years to come. "The theatre closures are being co-ordinated with Riverland General Hospital to ensures our consumers can continue to access quality healthcare across the region during the construction period.

"I also want to acknowledge the work of the Loxton and Districts Health Advisory Council, who have fundraised over many years to support the hospital's existing high-quality ward and birthing suite environments that patients and consumers enjoy at the Loxton Hospital Complex."

RMCLHN executive director of medical services Caroline Phegan said "by utilising the services of Riverland General Hospital during these upgrades, consumers from Loxton can continue to access planned and unplanned maternity theatre care, including birthing, locally within the RMCLHN".

"We are dedicated to ensuring consumers receive high-quality care at all services across the RMCLHN," Dr Phegan said.

"Expectant women who may be impacted by this upgrade at Loxton Hospital Complex are encouraged to reach out to their GP Obstetrician and Midwifery Group Practice midwifes."

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said the State Government was "passionate about providing quality healthcare services across South Australia, including the Riverland".


"The community of Loxton can be proud of its hospital and the incredible doctors, nurses, midwives and other staff who work there – and it's important we make sure that they have modern facilities to deliver their important work," Mr Picton said.

"Importantly, this operating theatre upgrade will help to ensure the future of birthing at Loxton hospital long into the future.

"Loxton Hospital Complex's operating theatre upgrade is just one of many projects that the (State) Government is delivering as part of its commitment to build a bigger health system for regional South Australia"

The hospital's helipad is also being upgraded to better comply with the new Civil Aviation Safety Regulations while also improving the safety of operations at the site — pivotal to the transport and care of MedSTAR patients both to and from Loxton.

Construction work on the upgraded operating theatre is expected to be completed early next year, with all services resuming at Loxton at that time.

'Options' on the table

RENMARK Paringa elected members will consider new options in an effort to lower council's proposed 2025/26 rate rise.

Renmark Paringa councillors at last week's general meeting passed a motion to lay the 2025/26 Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget – including a proposed 11.25 per cent rate rise – on the table.

A Renmark Paringa Council statement regarding the matter advised "council administration will present options to elected members as per the recommendation at a meeting in the near future".

"The selected option will then be utilised to update and endorse the Annual Business Plan and Budget, Long Term Financial Plan and Infrastructure and Asset Management Plan," the statement read.

"The date of that special meeting will be announced as soon as possible."

The council statement advised a range of financial strategies were implemented in an attempt to avoid or minimise general rate increases, including:

- Capital program optimisation – Deferred \$5.7m in capital spending to future years.
- Pursuing grants Secured funding through programs like the LGA Financial Sustainability Pilot.
- Asset and land rationalisation – Surveyed community use of council-owned buildings and identified surplus properties for potential disposal.
- Review of Fees and Charges
 Conducted a comprehensive review and benchmarking to inform the Annual Business

Plan.

- Cost reduction in materials and contracts – Achieved a 6 per cent budget reduction, including a temporary freeze on grants and sponsorships.
- Renewable energy initiatives
 Continued efforts to reduce energy use and related costs.
- Staffing and contracted services review Assessed opportunities for service consolidation and efficiency through automation.
- Discretional rate rebates review – Planned a review of all non-mandatory rate rebates.
- Debt reallocation Explored shifting debt to long-term financing to improve sustainability.
- Service standards review Identified potential savings by adjusting current service

levels.

- Internal process optimisation – Reviewed ICT strategy and created a short-term role to support project delivery.
- Events review Analysed community events and proposed a scaled-back events and sponsorship program.

The council statement advised "these efforts were undertaken before considering any increase to general rates, which remained a last resort".

Listening proves effective, says Jenny

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Renmark woman Jenny Troeth said the decision from elected members reflected the potential impacts of the rate rise.

"It definitely was appropriate, and it was in line with the sentiment that was expressed through the council consultation process," Ms Troeth said.

"I believe it was also very strongly the sentiment expressed at the people's meeting (on Sunday, July 20).

"On the questionnaire I don't think there was anybody who didn't oppose the increase. The reasons were many, and varied."

Ms Troeth said attempting to lower the proposed rate increase would benefit local individuals and families struggling with cost-of-living challenges.

"It's an unknown entity as to what they'll do, and how much the percentage will be reduced down," she said

"At least they are prepared to do something, the reaction just depends on how far down it comes."

Ms Troeth said the process showed consultation between council and the community was necessary for positive outcomes.

"(The public meeting) certainly validated the community feeling, and it gave everyone a chance to have their say and voice their concerns," she said.

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Local's grim superannuation warning

A RIVERLANDER who has potentially lost more than \$290,000 in savings is urging fellow locals to monitor what is happening with their superannuation funds.

A Renmark couple, who asked to be kept anonymous, were among approximately 7000 Australians who lost superannuation due to the collapse of the First Guardian Master Fund.

The man said the financial loss had left him facing an uncertain future.

"My fund was a Pension Fund, and it went from not-far short of \$300,000, to \$3000," the man said.

"I've gone from being comfortable for a number of years, to having nothing straight away.

"(We've) got to start selling off all the assets. There's ways you can lodge a complaint, but that could take forever and lead to nothing. "It's horrific what some of the

people are going through.' The man said he and his wife had little inclination such a large amount of their money would be lost.

"We had a message two weeks

ago saying (the company) was in trouble, and they were appointing liquidators," he said.

That was the first we heard of it. Two weeks later we got a message what the funds would be, there was no warning.

"I can almost understand, because if they were in that sort of trouble and they let people know, it would have turned into a nightThe man encouraged fellow

Riverlanders in a similar position to constantly monitor their super levels. "When I first started work, super

wasn't compulsory, then the government brought it in," he said. "(The government) said it would

be guaranteed at the end. That guarantee doesn't mean much."

A RIVERLAND creative has been selected among eight other regional artists to take part in one of the state's most sought-after professional development programs later this year.

We look forward to welcoming the participants to Adelaide. This year's participants represent an exciting and diverse cross section of the state's creative talent.




"They will gain invaluable insights and connections through access to some of South Australia's most respected visual artists, curators, and industry experts.

MEMBERS of a Riverland martial arts club are calling for competition from far and wide to meet them on the mat next month, with an upcoming local tournament the first of its kind to take place in the region.

Hosting the first local Country SA Taekwondo Tournament, on August 24, Christophers Taekwondo Academy Riverland is encouraging any and all martial arts groups and athletes to join them for a day of fun, learning, and competition.

"We just really wanted to provide our athletes and local clubs the chance to enjoy and participate in a tournament, without having to travel to a city," Christophers Taekwondo Academy Riverland lead instructor Josh Christophers said.

"The tournament is going to be very friendly and feature high level coaches and great opportunities to grow as an athlete.

"Anyone who is trained is welcome to come along and have fun — all chest and head guard equipment will be supplied on the day."

With almost 60 athletes training at the Berri-based dojang — once previously the old Scouts Hall — Mr Christophers, and Riverland instructor Aubrey Bastian, said they have been working hard to grow a local interest in the traditional art since 2022.

"Six years ago, I started Christophers Taekwondo Academy in Adelaide, which has now grown to three locations in the city," Mr Christophers said.

"However, the Riverland location began when Aubrey — who was training with me — had to move to the Riverland to be with family.

"He rang me up after noticing a lack of Taekwondo in the area, and it just grew from there."

With more than 45 years of training and experience, Mr Bastian now teaches up to five classes a week for Riverlanders of any age, gender, or skill level to enjoy, with the hosting to complete beginners and competitive, state and national black belts.

"It's been so much fun starting up a Taekwondo club in the Riverland," Mr Bastian "Taekwondo is a Korean self-

laekwondo is a Korean self-

defence and striking-based martial art, that involves kicking, punching, blocking, and because we keep the teaching very traditional, grappling techniques.

"Our classes are 50/50 young and old, and 50/50 men and women — it's a fantastic mix and really a testament to how great the culture of the club is.

"It's a sport that is an alternative to football and netball, and keeps you young, fit, and healthy — I mean, look at me I am almost 70 and feel amazing.

"It's also a great sport to teach discipline, and give yourself a mental health outlet that is community-based and the whole family can enjoy and do together".

Mr Christophers said the Country SA Taekwondo Tournament was going to be an opportunity for local athletes to "gain experience they would otherwise have to travel to (metropolitan areas) to access".

"It's a big commitment to travel and compete in Adelaide and beyond," he said.

"It can also be an intimidating environment, so we are excited to offer a friendly and relaxed option for local people, where they can compete against other fighters

"We're going to offer people between two-to-three matches each, with experienced coaches refereeing and then providing feedback afterwards — it's a great way to learn and grow.

"We will also have state and national champions attending, who will not only coach, but demonstrate their skills in matches against each other — that way local athletes will be able to see what one day they could be capable of."

Excited about the keen interest and passion already shown from his Berri athletes, Mr Christophers said he hoped the upcoming tournament will be the first of many in the region.

"We have up to 40 athletes from Berri attending, 25 from Adelaide, as well as people attending from the local karate clubs, Horsham, and Lameroo," he said.

"It's going to be a fantastic day, so we would just love to get as many martial arts groups involved as possible."

All cards on the table

THE hardest choices require the strongest wills.

A rather simple line from an Avengers film, but one that so very well encompasses events seen across the Renmark Paringa Council area across the last 14 days.

It would be fair to say that following two separate community gatherings regarding council's proposed budget and business plan for 2025/26 council's consultation session on Thursday, July 17, and a public meeting held the following Sunday – a level of angst among certain sections of the community had increased to high levels.

This emotion was evident in the approximately 20 members of the district – far more than any other month in recent memory – that braved the temperature on a very cold Tuesday evening to attend council's regular

general meeting. It was here that councillors would decide whether or not to endorse the proposed budget. For some in the gallery it undoubtedly would have felt like the last line of defence was being tested.

The outcome – with councillors electing to postpone implementation of the rate release – has been well discussed across the district in the past seven days, but shows that elected members, and also council staff, are willing to consider the needs of the ratepayer base, especially in the challenging times a lot of the public is experiencing.


While the feeling in the room immediately following the meeting seemed positive between those in the gallery and council staff, and elected members, the decision certainly leaves council with a challenging couple of weeks ahead.

It is back to the drawing board, so to speak, with council staff now having to examine what measures can be taken in an attempt to soften the rate increase figure.

Agreeing what actions are required to reach this destination is undoubtedly set to pose the next challenge for elected members, extending what is likely to have been a mentally exhausting series of meetings, percentage figures, and decisions.

There are those in the community that see this as a big victory, but what was key to making this possible?

As has been pointed out, some fact checking of statements being made at the Sunday public meeting could have been beneficial to all interested minds, however – as some people often feel more comfortable expressing concerns in a forum setting $-i\hat{t}$'s importance in illustrating the potential impacts of the proposed rate rise on household and business budgets will mean that day is likely remembered by all as important for the community, in one sense or another.



THE YEARS GO BY

The paddle-steamer Etona 2 was purpose-built in 1899 as a missionary-boat for SA's Anglican church River Murray Mission. It replaced the valiant little steam-powered-launch Etona 1, which had been plying the River on-mission since 1891. The paddle-steamer Etona 2 was bigger with shallower draught. During the drought years of 1896 to 98, Etona 1 had run aground down river from Blanchetown. The Anglican Missioner, Reverend WJ Bussell, had been undertaking six-weekly circuits from the sheep stations around the Meningie Lakes, up-river to Overland Corner and Renmark. This included services at 27 river locations in a river mission-field of some 1500km. In Loxton, Rev Bussell stopped at Habel's homestead, and at Stasinowsky's Landing. A stone plaque south of the present-day Loxton North pump-station now commemorates the latter. During 1894, the government had established Village Settlements along the river, from Morgan to Renmark. This grew the mission work 'spectacularly', soon including an extra 1500 people, and there were others in scattered local communities and rapidly developing towns. With the low rivers, Rev Bussell 'took horse' and rode horseback some 650km to reach parishioners between Morgan and Murtho, until Etona 2 was commissioned in 1900. Etona 2 served the mission faithfully until improvements in road transport, the pending arrival of the railway, and the establishment of church buildings in each town superseded the need for river-based transport. In January 1913, Etona 2 was sold to the Connor family as a fishing vessel. PHOTO: LoxStory.

Starting as a fresh-faced 17-year-old finance clerk at the former District Council of Berri, Peter quickly demonstrated leadership qualities that saw him move to the Yorke

Peninsula in a management role. In 2004, Peter's love for the Riverland drew him back to take on his first full-time CEO role at the District Council of Loxton Waikerie. During Peter's 14-year tenure as CEO at Loxton Waikerie, I had the pleasure of working with, and learning from him.

Always the consummate professional, with a strong moral compass and a cheeky sense of humour, Peter fostered an enjoyable and productive working environment.

In September 2006, when I was appointed CEO of the District Council of Cleve, it marked the beginning of a 19-year relationship of mutual support - talking through challenging situations. Sometimes we would speak twice a week, other times not for months. But I always knew Peter was there, offering a listening ear and considered opinion.

In April 2018, Peter was appointed to perhaps his most challenging role — as CEO of the Port Pirie Regional Council.

Recognised as one of the topfive regional growth areas in Australia, Port Pirie presented many challenges, which Peter faced head-on during his sevenyear tenure.

Beyond his outstanding career in local government, Peter was also an accomplished A grade tennis player. And anyone who watched him play footy for the Berri Demons will remember him spinning out of packs - not unlike Zac Butters does these days.

Congratulations, Digger. The

South Australian community is indebted to your outstanding service to the regional areas of our state.

I look forward to seeing you washing dishes in Vicky's café in Crystal Brook. Enjoy a well-earned retire-

Rates rising as services diminish

MANY aspects of the Renmark Paringa Council's plan sound excellent in theory, such as enhancing wellbeing, inclusivity and recognition of First Nation's people.

But the actual measures and the inclusion of outlying rural areas of the council, such as Gurra Gurra, are not.

Regarding the proposed Jane Eliza developments: this plan is totally bewildering.

To build in such a floodprone, vulnerable area seems insane.

Elsewhere in Australia, councils and governments are paying people to move away from flood plain areas to higher land as climate change impacts and '100-year floods' become more frequent.

I have lived through and remember well both the 1956 and the 2022/23 floods and respect the power of our river when it floods. Surely building on high ground at Paringa would make more sense if you wish to increase the size council's population?

And if such an incomprehensible development as Jane Eliza was to proceed, the developers should pay, as they are the ones who will profit from it, rather than the ratepayers, who will not only be hit by increased rates now but also higher insurance premiums when the floods do come.

Regarding flood readiness: this is currently very inadequate.

I believe Gurra Gurra was ignored and neglected by the council in 2022/23.

Levees built were done by the property owners at their own expense.

At first, we were all told to evacuate, regardless of whether our homes would flood or were well above the predicted flood levels. This was because of the council and State Government's failure to honour the agreement reached with Gurra residents before the 1997 building of the Berri Bridge.

The short access road from the Gurra Road to the new bridge road was promised to be built to the level of the Gurra Road. After the 1956 flood, all the property owners along the Gurra Road (including my parents) paid for the entire cost for the road to be raised above the 1956 flood level as far as Martin Road - despite the devastating losses each family had suffered and the years it took to replant and have fruit and income produced from the orchards.

This road did not flood in 2022/2023 and kept our properties safe from flooding from the back creeks and Lake Gurra Gurra.

However, flooding from the main river either did or would have occurred without the building of private levees.

Finally, after strong advocacy and various meetings, a temporary and narrow dirt bank was built over that short (approximately 250 metres) of bridge access road, allowing car access. This was much appreciated, though inadequate if cattle needed to be removed because of flooded pastures.

However, that temporary road enhancement was removed after the flood emergency and no response made to all representations asking for a permanent solution.

For those who did need to evacuate Gurra Gurra, little or nothing was done to support them.

Families were told that they would have to shoot their dogs or cats, or dispose of them in other ways, as they could not take them to a motel or to any

shelter.

So, families had to find various, often expensive solutions. Furthermore, a large portion of the current council deficit relates to the huge overrun in the cost of the replacement of a bridge in Renmark which is still vulnerable to future flood damage.

It is no wonder that your endeavours to gain support to raise rates and to extend building on the flood plain at our expense are unlikely to gain any support from Gurra Gurra residents and many other ratepayers.

Regarding rate increases: outlying rural areas of the council receive very few benefits or services from the council.

We rarely visit or shop in Renmark. The only service we receive is that of the collection of our red bins weekly and our yellow recycling bins fortnightly.

This we pay for separately as an additional charge and I very rarely use the service, as I try to reduce waste, to avoid any nonrecyclable items and packaging, and otherwise reuse and recycle through the Berri recycling centre.

Rates collected from the Gurra Gurra and Lyrup etc. areas should be used primarily to benefit those areas. But rates have been going up and up while the services have diminished, even vanished.

Clubs applaud beer excise freeze

CLUBS Australia has welcomed the Albanese Labor Government's formal move to legislate a two-year freeze on draught beer excise, following today's introduction of the Excise and Customs Tariff Proposals in the House of Representatives.

The announcement delivers on a key election commitment and provides meaningful relief for clubs and their members.

Beer excise has gone up 83 times since 1983, making it one of the most relentless tax increases in the country. This freeze is a long-overdue break for community clubs and the people they serve.

The freeze will encourage people to keep heading to their local club to socialise with friends and family, where alcohol is served responsibly in a safe and social environment.

We applaud the government for progressing its commitment to freeze the excise on draught beer.

Holistic approach for lasting benefits

THE latest Murray-Darling Basin Plan Evaluation has again shown that only a holistic approach to water management can deliver lasting, basin-wide environmental improvements.

The Basin Plan Evaluation and Sustainable Rivers Audit, released last week, note that water recovery targets have been met, and ecological improvements have been observed.

On the socioeconomic front, some towns had navigated the reform process without major disruptions, but the Murray-Darling Basin Authority found others were not so fortunate.

The MDBA's Evaluation has acknowledged the importance of complementary measures, noting that integrated and targeted water management programs are the most successful at improving environmental outcomes.

NSW Irrigators' Council (NSWIC) has long advocated for a collaborative and coordinated approach that looks



beyond simple volumetric targets, and we are pleased this is finally being recognised.

Factors cited by the MDBA as crucial to river health include "water quality, riparian and floodplain management, pest control, instream habitat, river operations, constraints and works, and environmental water portfolio management".

"This is a step in the right direction, underlining that investment in complementary measures is essential if we want to achieve enduring ecological improvements.

These complementary measures minimise impacts on irrigated agriculture and are supported by industry, environmentalists, and scientists alike.

Irrigated agriculture and the communities that depend on it have endured the immense reform and borne much of the brunt of the Basin Plan, with the MDBA conceding its Basinwide economic figures 'may mask the divergent experiences at the local level'.

NSWIC trusts the next Basin Plan will focus on how to best use the more than 3000GL of water recovered since 2000 under the 2012 Plan and earlier reforms, rather than simply recovering more water from farmers.

Water buybacks have often come at the expense of vulnerable irrigation-dependent communities like Collarenebri, Menindee or Deniliquin, that have never rebounded since water recovery took place.

We need to acknowledge the hard work done to date and admit environmental goals cannot be met by simply putting more water down the river. Our focus must now shift away from water recovery and towards how to best make use of the water that we already have.

Sleepless in crisis

ONE-in-six counselling contacts to Kids Helpline is suicide-related, and three-quarters come outside business hours.

RIT weighs in on MDBA report

HUGH SCHUITEMAKER

FURTHER emphasis is needed on measures other than "just adding water" to improve the health of the Murray-Darling Basin, a local irrigation authority says in the wake of the latest Basin Plan report.

Responding to the MDBA's 2025 Basin Plan Evaluation, which assesses achievements and lessons learned from the past 13 years, Renmark Irrigation Trust CEO Rosalie Auricht welcomed an acknowledgment of irrigation efficiency, but warned that local growers had already done more

than their share.

"The Trust and its growers invested heavily to remain viable with less water during the waterrecovery phase (of the Plan)," Ms Auricht told The Murray Pioneer.

"The state-run SARMS 3IP water-recovery program certainly did deliver a positive outcome for our community. However, it has reduced the Trust community's long-term water security by 23 per cent making the community more vulnerable when water supply becomes restricted.

"Unfortunately, the current Commonwealth ad hoc buyback

program is making it impossible to foresee and plan for future buyback impacts.

"The low-hanging fruit has already been harvested."

In summarising the report, MDBA chief executive Andrew McConville said while implementation was not complete, the evaluation found evidence that "rivers, wetlands and lakes are in far better shape under the Basin Plan".

However, Mr McConville conceded that some irrigators had suffered under the Plan's implementation.

"At a Basin scale there have

been substantial benefits, but it is also the case that for some irrigation-dependent communities this reform has been tough, with direct impacts," he said.

Mr McConville said the MDBA anticipated a "shortfall in water recovery under the Sustainable Diversion Limit Adjustment Mechanism".

He said the evaluation drew on more than 30 lines of evidence, including environmental monitoring, "lived experience", social and economic studies, and technical information.

Meanwhile the NSW Irrigators

Council (NSWIC) said irrigated agriculture and the communities that depend on it have endured "the immense reform and borne much of the brunt of the Basin Plan", given the MDBA conceded its Basin-wide economic figures could mask divergent experiences at local levels.

Rain welcomed but more needed...

FOURTH-generation Mid Murray farmer Michael Dreckow has received the first decent rainfall of the year on his property, at Mount Mary, west of Morgan.

The sheep producer recorded 18mm of rain in his gauge over Friday and Saturday.

"It started early on Friday morning and then it stopped around lunchtime, and then we had a bit more rain overnight, and then a little bit more overnight on Saturday night," Mr Dreckow said.

He said prior to this month's rain only small amounts had fallen on his property.

"It was not enough to make an impact, as there was little bits and pieces everywhere," Mr Dreckow said.

He is hoping for followup rain in spring after the latest downpour generated some natural grasses on his property for his sheep.

try and as soon as it rains, the sheep wander out into the paddock, so I guess the rain must wash a bit of the dirt off the bush, and freshen things up," Mr Dreckow said.

"They are all out there looking for a bit of a pick, so I can back off a bit on the hay, they are not hanging around.

"We definitely need a wet spring to enable us to get some feed now."

Mr Dreckow only has a few bales of hay left to feed his livestock, and throughout the year he has been feeding them grape marc, sourced from Berri, and orange peel supplied by a Waikerie grower.

The Mount Mary farmer was grateful to receive two donations of hay last year from interstate to help him feed his sheep, and has added his name to the waiting list to receive some more from Rural Aid.

"They said the list is pretty long and (they) are finding it harder and harder to source hay," Mr Dreckow said.

"I am not expecting anything any time soon."

Mr Dreckow said the charities interstate that were providing donations of hay to South Australian farmers had done "an amazing job".

"They are trying to help so many people, so you can see why they are fully stretched," he said.

"We certainly appreciate everything they do."

Mr Dreckow has his fingers crossed for more rain this week, but is concerned that it might dissipate over the Mount Lofty Ranges, before it reaches Mount Mary.

FARMERS in the Riverland West have welcomed the arrival of rain after six months of some of the driest conditions they have ever experienced.

Record-low rainfall figures have been recorded since the start of this year in numerous areas of South Australia.

Third-generation farmer Brenton Kroehn is making the most of the 15.5mm of rain he received on his property on Friday, at Kanni, near Waikerie by sowing a later crop of barley.

He spent the weekend preparing the ground to start planting about 283 hectares of barley on Monday.

Mr Kroehn said it was important to make the most of the latest rain by planting crops to cover his paddocks.

"It is really important that I get that in and I should have this done by about Thursday," he said.

"Hopefully we don't get too much wind for the next couple of weeks, this week's forecast is pretty mild.

"We shouldn't experience too much drift."

Mr Kroehn is hoping that his new barley crop will be established before any wind events occur again in the area.

He said if the rain continues he may be able to harvest the barley, or if the weather conditions are drier it could still be used as feed for his sheep.

Mr Kroehn also planted 161 hectares of barley and oats about four-to-six-weeks ago.

"I sowed that deliberately into reasonable cover by planting them into stubble from last year," he said.

"They are not going too bad, they are a bit patchy in spots and have had a little

bit of wind damage, but they have held on okay.

"Certainly since the rain on Friday, their colour has picked up, you can already see a bit of growth, which is really good."

Mr Kroehn said it was important to cover his paddocks with crops to prevent soil erosion.

"If we go into summer with bare paddocks, they will blow away and there will be a lot of damage done," he said.


"When the erosion starts, it is very had to stop and you lose the organic matter on top."

He is hoping for the rain to continue and favourable weather conditions in spring.

"We don't want it too hot or windy and we are going to need follow up rain," Mr Kroehn said.

RIVERLANDERS seeking to gain an insight into scientific processes, and help study local bird and insect populations, are invited to participate in upcoming activities being run by a local ecologist.

Renmark Irrigation Trust (RIT) ecologist Freya Harrihill will next month host a Guided Bird Tour, and Insect Collecting Workshop, as part of National Science Week.

Ms Harrihill said allowing larger numbers of locals to participate in scientific activities relating to local wetlands was a goal. "My main focus is looking at under-represented groups in the STEM

ed groups in the STEM space," Ms Harrihill said "I wanted to keep it broad. The events will be really welcoming for kids to attend, and they will be hands-on activities.

"But the whole family can come and participate together. We're wanting to get as many people engaged as possible."

Ms Harrihill said the events would help provide an understanding of how bird and insect populations were responding to environmental initiatives. "Bird monitoring is really important, as the environmental watering directly impacts birds," she said.

"Insects are quite understudied in a lot of environments, and I thought it would be interesting to do a baseline study, so we can work out how environmental watering could be benefitting insect populations.

"I'm hoping to expose people to real-world scientific methods, and to make this accessible."

The Guided Bird Tour will take place from 9am to 10.30am, on Sunday August 10, and the Insect Collecting Workshop will run from 2pm to 3.30pm, on Saturday, August 16.

Free regional heavy vehicle workshop being held in Loxton

RIVERLAND producers will be able to attend a free and practical upcoming mechanical workshop, offering producers the chance to boost safety, compliance, and confidence when operating heavy vehicles pre-and-post farmgate.

Grain Producers SA (GPSA), in partnership with the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (NHVR), is delivering another round of heavy vehicle workshops, funded by the NHVR's Heavy Vehicle Safety Initiative.

The Roadworthy Heavy Vehicles... Made Easy workshop, will be held on August 21, at Max's Mechanical Workshop, in Loxton.

The event is open to grain pro-

ducers, and all Primary Producers SA (PPSA) commodity group members, who own and operate their own heavy vehicles.

The workshop program is designed to take the complexity out of vehicle compliance by giving producers a clear understanding of their obligations, including road safety awareness, maintenance responsibilities, and how to use the NHVR Heavy Vehicle Inspection Manual as a practical tool.

The GPSA-run sessions will be delivered by Bernie O'Hara from National Transport Consulting, who will walk producers through both the regulatory requirements and the common pitfalls that catch operators out. GPSA chief executive officer Brad Perry said the workshops are about putting producers in control of their road safety obligations.

"We want to make it as easy as possible for grain producers and other commodity group members to get their heavy vehicle compliance right," Mr Perry said.

"This initiative is about more than ticking boxes, it's about ensuring your vehicles are safe, your business is protected, and your team can operate with peace of mind. We know compliance can sometimes feel like a moving target - this program helps bring it into focus.

"GPSA is proud to once again partner with NHVR on this initia-

tive, and we're grateful to the local mechanics who are providing their time and expertise to support our workshops."

In addition to the theory and practical sessions, each producer will be eligible for a free roadworthy inspection following the workshop with a participating local mechanic.

Places for these inspections are limited and must be booked through GPSA following the event. Workshop attendees will gain

 insight into:
 The NHVR Heavy Vehicle Inspection Manual and how it

Inspection Manual and how it applies to farming businesses.

□ Key heavy vehicle and road safety risks and how to proac-

tively address them.

- Legal obligations for heavy vehicle owners and operators.

Mental health support for drought affected farmers

RIVERLAND farmers in need of mental health support due to drought conditions are set to benefit from additional State Government support, aiming to provide continuous community engagement and increased wellbeing.

Three new programs will be available for farmers and regional communities impacted by drought, with \$1m in targeted mental health and wellbeing support, as part of the State Government's response to drought conditions across South Australia.

Developed in consultation with industry experts, the wellbeing programs will be delivered by organisations already established within regional communities.

- □ Fat Farmers: This grassroots not-forprofit organisation will establish eight new physical activity groups across drought-affected regional areas, building on its existing network of 23 community groups. The program focuses on promoting mental wellbeing through social connection and exercise, tailored to local needs.
- □ Breakthrough Mental Health Foundation: The foundation will host a series of community wellbeing events and mental health first aid training sessions in regional towns. These will include seven men's and seven women's-focused workshops,

as well as seven first aid training sessions to equip locals with skills to support their communities.

Grain Producers SA: Hosting five Great Grain Quiz Nights across drought-impacted areas, GPSA will bring community members together in a relaxed setting to foster social connection, conversation, and wellbeing.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said "this additional \$1m investment has enabled development of initiatives following feedback from farmers and industry".

"We've heard clearly from the sector that mental health support must be delivered by trusted people who are already part of our



divided into seven categories. Entries for the Junk Art Sculpture close Friday, August 1.


Loxton Chamber of Commerce business and events manager Sonya Altschwager highlighted the creative workshops for this year.

Riverland wine industry forgotten?

A RIVERLAND politician has voiced his concerns over a recently announced support package for wine exporters, aimed to tackle ongoing challenges that have impacted global trading.

Almost \$4m will be delivered to support South Australian wine exporters over the next two years, with the State Government last week announcing the Global Wine Growth Program, ahead of the broader trade and investment strategy launched today.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said "the commercial wine sector is being hit hard by the global decline in sales and consumption".

"Once again, this Labor Government are playing the popular game, particularly with the premium wine product," Mr Whetstone said.

The new program, co-designed alongside the South Australian wine industry, will focus on delivering strong commercial outcomes and building the state's global recognition.

The program's announcement comes ahead of South Australia's Trade and Investment Strategy to 2030, which will be launched by SA's Premier Peter Malinauskas and Trade and Investment Minister Joe Szakacs today.

Markets including China, the US and UK, will be its main focus, plus emerging wine markets like South East Asia.

Mr Whetstone said "the wine industry engine room is the Riverland, and this government have forgotten where it is and how important it is in the big picture."

South Australian wine accounted for more than two-thirds of Australia's total global wine exports until March this year, totalling more than \$1.9bn, with SA being home to more than 700 wineries across 18 distinct wine regions, producing 80 per cent of Australia's premium wine, and responsible for 70 per cent of the country's wine and grape research capability.

The Global Wine Growth Program expands on the substantial success of the \$1.85m Wine Exporters China Re-engagement Support Program, announced in March 2024, which saw South Australia recover 90 per cent of its all-time peak wine exports to China in just one year, outperforming other states.

Minister for Trade and Investment Joe Szakacs said "South Australia is Australia's undisputed wine capital, and this program will ensure that this crucial industry cannot only adapt to changing global markets but thrive within them".

"Through the State Government's Wine Exporters China Re-engagement Support Program and the Wine Export Diversification Program, we've seen the industry lift exports back to near record levels," Mr Szakacs said.

"Now we're taking the next step to seize on this opportunity."





Loxton artist brings new life to Lions Club bench

AN UNUSED bench will be transformed into a new piece of Loxton public art, which will find its permanent home alongside the Murray River Queen (MRQ), as a special request from its owners.

A collaboration between local artist Lyn Anstey, and MRQ owner Donna Neal, will see a once-forgotten bench become a colourful tribute to community spirit, combining personal memory with creative expression.

Painted in vibrant blue and orange, a nod to the Lions Club colours, the piece celebrates Donna Neal's late father, while also inviting conversation among locals.

When Ms Neal heard the old Lions Club bench seat was about to be thrown away, she knew she had to save it, as a piece of community history, and as a tribute to her late father, who was a Lions Club member.

Ms Anstey was approached to design the bench and offered several creative options.

"Ms Neale liked the idea of the blue and the oranges, because of the significance with the Lions Club," Ms Anstey said.

The bench has already become a talking point on the Loxton riverfront.

"So many people stop and chat

about it when they're coming by, they love it," Ms Anstey said.

"Public art is just amazing, because if you walked past a bench seat that was plain and ordinary, they keep walking, but when they walk past something with colour, they smile."

The transformation is still ongoing, with plans to continue painting the remaining end of the bench to complete the tribute in the next couple of weeks.

"The project stands not only as a tribute to a beloved father, but also as a reminder of the power of art to connect people and breathe new life into forgotten corners of the community," Ms Anstey said.

Local businesses urged to stay vigilant on GST fraud

RIVERLAND businesses have been warned against engaging in fraudulent GST practices, as authorities have uncovered a growing national trend of falsified invoices and inflated refund claims, particularly in the property and construction industries.

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is cracking down on a growing wave of GST fraud, warning businesses against lodging dishonest claims and falsifying invoices to obtain inflated GST refunds. The ATO has identified a concerning trend, in which real businesses are creating fraudulent invoices in order to claim credits for services or transactions that never occurred.

The ATO is urging businesses to act with integrity, report wrongdoing, and come forward voluntarily if involved, stating that serious penalties, including prosecution, are to be expected.

ATO assistant commissioner Adam O'Grady said "the ATO is seeing a rise in dishonest GST claims".

"Despite previous warnings from the Serious Financial Crime Taskforce, we're still seeing attempts to cheat the system – not by individuals creating fake businesses, but by legitimate businesses lodging dishonest claims," Mr O'Grady said.

While the majority of businesses are doing the right thing, the ATO is concerned about a small, but troubling number of operators attempting to claim millions in GST refunds by misrepresenting their financial activities.

"These arrangements often involve two-related businesses fabricating transactions to justify inflated GST refunds," Mr O'Grady said.

"Some even claim credits for services that were never delivered, or for property purchases that never actually occurred."

The ATO has released a formal Taxpayer Alert to notify businesses of these arrangements, and is encouraging people across the business community to remain alert.

Common examples of these fraudulent schemes include:

- □ Claiming GST credits for construction work that was never carried out.
- □ Charging for 'management fees' or services that were never rendered.
- □ Lodging claims for property purchases that are yet to take place.
- □ Multiple businesses claiming GST credits for the same invoice.
- □ Completely fictitious invoicing to generate refunds.

"These scams are often disguised as clever tax minimisation strategies," Mr O'Grady said.

"But the truth is, if it looks too good to be true, it probably is. These are not harmless loopholes - they're serious acts of fraud."

Consequences can include interest charges, significant financial penalties, and even criminal prosecution.

Cases may be referred to the Commonwealth director of public prosecutions.

The ATO is urging Riverland residents to remain vigilant and report suspicious activity.

'We know the majority of businesses are honest and hardworking, this kind of behaviour undermines trust in the system and puts compliant operators at a disadvantage," Mr O'Grady said.

The ATO is also encouraging businesses who may have inadvertently become involved in such arrangements to come forward voluntarily.

To report suspected GST fraud confidentially, tipoffs can be made online or by calling 1800 060 062.

Waikerie's Cooper on target at fly shoot championship

A 12-year-old Waikerie boy has won the South Australian Fly Shoot Rimfire 200 yard Championship, at the Monarto Shooting Complex.

In extremely windy conditions, Cooper Ward scored 196 points and achieved one fly hit in the recent competition.

His accuracy earned him first place in the junior category and the overall competition, beating his dad Craig, who came second overall, scoring 176 points and winning the senior category.

The event involves using a .22 Rimfire rifle to shoot at a round target for points.

Competitors who hit the fly in the centre of the target achieve bonus points.

Mr Ward said the windy conditions made it a tough event.

"It is really hard shooting in the wind because you are trying to fire that little bullet about 183m away from a gun that was designed for 50-to-100m," he said.

"That little bullet gets ripped around

by the wind anyway, so you are trying to compensate and allow for that."

Cooper's brother, Cohen, 10, who only started shooting about five-months ago came second in the junior category and fourth outright, with a score of 137 and one fly hit.

Mr Ward said the Riverland dominated the competition in numbers and results.

Out of the 10 competitors, five were from the Riverland, from Waikerie, and Markaranka, near Taylorville.

Liam Wilson, from Markaranka, came third in the juniors and his dad, Jamie, came second in the seniors and third overall.

The Wards and Wilsons practise their shooting at the SSAA Barmera Pistol and Rifle Club.

Mr Ward said the Riverlanders were the underdog in the competition and surprised themselves.

"A lot of the other competitors were experienced with a lot of years of shooting," he said. "I was hoping for something good

for us in the competition, but I was not

expecting the results that we achieved. "I was kind of taken aback by how

well we did because we don't have the best equipment like some of the other entrants to practise with."

Mr Ward said the windy conditions deterred some shooters from taking part, as entries were down compared to last year

He said rifle shooting was a good sport for youngsters.

"As a sport it is progressing and is something that younger people can excel in, because they have younger and better eyes," Mr Ward said.

"They have less mental strains and can focus on shooting," he said.

"There is a 14-year-old boy from Queensland who has just been selected to compete in the World Juniors, for the under 25s.

"When Cooper participates in shooting, he can focus and concentrate on the task.

"I liken it to archery and throwing darts, it requires concentration and technique.

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Council and community effort results in rate rise reduction

IN the face of rising costs and financial pressure across the board, Mid Murray Council has delivered a welcome surprise for ratepayers in its 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget: a reduced rate rise, down from the 4.84 per cent initially proposed, to a final increase of 3.84 per cent for existing ratepayers.

This 1 per cent reduction is thanks to the collective efforts of council and community, who have worked together to improve council's long-term financial sustainability. It's a small, but meaningful win that reflects the values we hold dear in the Mid Murray: supporting one another, working collaboratively, and finding practical ways to ease pressure where we can.

Over the past two years, our community has played a vital role in council's sustainability review. This process has been about more than just cutting costs, it's been about reshaping how council operates to ensure we're using resources wisely and delivering the best possible outcomes for our region. The savings we've achieved so far have helped place us in a stronger financial position and enabled us to reduce the rate increase below what was originally forecast.

Of course, we know that many in our community are still doing it tough. The cost of living continues to rise, and council is not immune, as our own operating expenses are increasing year on year. That's why we remain committed to keeping rates as fair and reasonable as possible. If you're experiencing financial difficulty, please reach out and ask about our Hardship Policy, we're here to help.

Community feedback also continues to be an essential part of council's decision-making. In recent months, residents have shared their views on asset management, development planning, dog and cat management, wastewater services, and financial planning. Your input helps shape our priorities and ensures we're investing in the areas that matter most. Thank you to everyone who has contributed, and if you haven't yet, I encourage you to get involved in future engagement via the website (engagement.mid-murray.sa.gov. au).

On a broader level, council continues to advocate for more equitable funding for regional communities. It was an important opportunity to highlight the unique challenges faced by rural councils like ours and to call for fairer funding models. While the Federal Government acknowledged the increased responsibilities placed on local councils, it unfortunately ruled out the Australian Local

MDA calling for carp virus release

A PEAK Murray River representative body says use of the cyprinid herpesvirus 3 (carp virus) is needed to address "overarching" issues caused by the pest.

The Murray-Darling Association (MDA) is advocating for the Federal Government to implement available carp management methods, including utilisation of the carp virus.

MDA CEO Mark Lamb said carp had damaged the Murray-Darling system through erosion along riverbanks, the devastation of native plants, and causing water quality issues with "serious impacts to communities reliant on the precious resource for survival". "The impact of European carp is a uniting factor across the Basin, its impact transcends State boundaries," Mr Lamb said.

The Federal Government in 2016 began investigating the use of the carp virus to control numbers of the pest, culminating in the Fisheries Research and Development Corporation publishing the National Carp Control Plan, in 2022.

Mr Lamb said the MDA was engaging with experts, industry, and local governments, to understand what infrastructure exists in a suitable format to process dead fish following the use of carp management methods.

THE 2023 ban on mobile phones at public high schools, including in the Riverland, has continued to show improvements in student behaviour and wellbeing.

New data has been released as the mobile phone 'off and away' policy reached the two-year anniversary of its full introduction.

Department for Education incident reporting shows there has been a 72 per cent decline in matters related to mobile phone use in terms 1 and 2 of 2025 – compared to the same period in 2023, before the ban was in place.

This represents reported matters centered on students failing to comply with the policy or overall behaviour involving phones, along with a reduction in issues involving social media – such as cyber bullying, circulation of explicit content, or other concerning online behaviour.

Issues related to social media have seen a huge drop of approximately 80.5 per cent from June 2023, when the policy was implemented, to the same time this year – from 154 down to 30.

Behaviour issues have decreased by 60.3 per cent from June 2023, to the same time this year, from 111 down to 44.

Analysis also shows that most of the issues reported in these categories have taken place off site, or outside of school hours.

Building on the ban, students will also receive updated education about online safety, risks of inappropriate engagement, and how to get support around digital safety and appropriate use of devices.

Additionally, more students are feeling a greater sense of wellbeing and school connectedness, according to the most recent Wellbeing and Engagement (WEC) Collection student survey.

About 73 per cent of South Australian public school students took part in the survey across 476 schools. Of those surveyed, 61 per cent reported feeling strongly connected to school in 2025, an increase from 59 per cent in 2022.

High wellbeing related to connectedness to school among year 7 to 9 students rose from 51 per cent in 2023 to 54 per cent in 2025, and among year 10 to 12 students, from 54 per cent in 2023, to 58 per cent in 2025.

Of those surveyed, 42 per cent reported a strong sense of school belonging in 2025, an increase from 39 per cent from 2023.


"As the community grapples more widely with damage caused by social media platforms, this government has taken decisive action to protect young people in school," Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said.

"This nation-leading mobile phone ban has been an important change, which helps students concentrate on their studies and build face-to-face relationships.

"While other states and territories have now followed our lead, South Australia remains the strongest ban in the country, with the 'off and away' policy also implemented during recess and lunch – meaning students are off their phones and interacting with each other through sports or club activities. We knew this was the right thing to do and the data is reflecting that.

"This has also been reflected in the wellbeing data which shows students are more connected to their school, which in turn, results in better academic achievement.

"Given our investments in a range of wellbeing initiatives for our schools, this is incredibly pleasing."

ZOETIS has reaffirmed its commitment to supporting the wellbeing of the country's farming and regional communities, like the Riverland, by continuing its longstanding partnership with mental health organisation Beyond Blue.

Zoetis has partnered with Beyond Blue since 2016, donating more than \$900,000 to help fund mental health support services for people living outside major cities.

This year marks the 10th year of the partnership, with Zoetis aiming to raise \$100,000 in 2025 by donating \$5 from each sale of the company's livestock, pig, poultry and companion animal vaccines and parasiticide products up to \$100,000, to reach the \$1m milestone.

Livestock business unit director Fred Schwenke said the campaign reflects the need for a long-term approach to addressing mental health in regional areas.

'Supporting rural Australia on its long journey to better mental health is not a quick fix - it's a sustained and compassionate effort," Mr Schwenke said.

"We know farmers and rural communities are strong, but they're not invincible. Improving mental health outcomes requires more than just awareness; it needs consistent, meaningful action and unwavering, longterm support.

"That's why, 10 years on, Zoetis remains firmly committed to its partnership with Beyond Blue."

Australia's rural and remote populations face a unique set of challenges.

While mental health conditions occur at similar rates across the country, people in rural areas often face greater barriers to getting help, as access to services can be limited by distance, cost, poor connectivity, or concerns about privacy and stigma.

Farming communities in particular are under pressure, dealing with everything from natural disasters and economic instability to the emotional toll of isolation.

Recent data shows around 30 per cent of farmers have experienced a decline in their mental health in recent years.

The biggest factors include weather events and natural disasters, reported by 47 per cent of farmers, followed by financial pressure at 36 per cent, and rising costs at 35 per cent.

Almost half of Australian farmers report experiencing feelings of depression, while 64 per cent say they have dealt with anxiety.

Alarmingly, 45 per cent of farmers say they have had thoughts of selfharm or suicide, and nearly a third have attempted it.

Every two minutes, someone in Australia contacts the Beyond Blue Support Service.

Free and confidential, the service provides 24/7 access to experienced counsellors, offering support when it's needed most.

The most common issues people seek help for include anxiety, depression, relationship difficulties, grief and adjustment issues, all of which are compounded by the stressors of rural life.

Beyond Blue CEO Georgie Harman calls each contact "a moment of courage".

When someone in rural Australia picks up the phone or jumps online to talk to Beyond Blue, it's often the first step in turning things around,"

Ms Harman said.

"It takes strength to reach out for support, but getting help early can ease distress and stop issues from escalating.'

"This partnership with Zoetis is so vital for us, as it helps make that step possible for more people. To date, funds donated by Zoetis have helped over 17,000 people across rural and regional Australia access mental health support through our Support Service."

The majority of people who contact the service report an improvement in their wellbeing, with 76 per cent saying they felt less distressed after making contact.

Between July 15 and October 31, Australians can support the Zoetis and Beyond Blue initiative by purchasing eligible Zoetis livestock, pig, poultry, and companion animal vaccines or parasiticide animal health products. Zoetis will donate \$5, up to \$100,000, to Beyond Blue Support Services, to help more people in rural communities access the support they need.



RFL community raises awareness for DV

A JOINT promotion to raise awareness of domestic and family violence was undertaken last Saturday between the Riverland Football League, and the four Riverland Rotary Clubs.

The colour purple has been used to identify the domestic violence issue, so everyone attending the grounds were encouraged to wear purple as a token of support.

Rotary Club of Loxton spokesman Peter Angel was enthused by the exposure the issue received from the event.

Farm firefighting program expanded

A STATE program to help landholders, including those in the Riverland, purchase essential firefighting equipment has been expanded, aiming to provide additional support and community water tanks, with grants from \$300 to \$10,000 available.

The latest round of Farm Firefighting Unit (FFU) grants enables farmers to buy equipment they need to safely respond to fire emergencies and help keep their communities safe.

Eligible items in this category include FFUs, water pumps for use on vehicle, first aid kits, UHF radios, fire blankets, heat shields and personal protective equipment.

In 2025-26, items for Farm Firefighting Units will receive funding from \$300 to \$5000, an increase on previous' rounds cap of \$3000.

The fourth round will also allow landholders to purchase community firefighting water tanks for the first time.

Dedicated firefighting tanks will improve water access in more remote areas and boost community preparedness and resilience.

Eligible applicants include farmers, farming businesses, rural landholders and rural community groups. The State Government program, reinstated with a \$2m budget, has supported more than 650 farmers across the past three rounds, funding around 1300 individual pieces of equipment in dozens of local council areas.

Tanks are required to have a minimum capacity of 22,000L, fire service fittings and other items such as stands and pipe fittings and be compliant with local council rules. Successful applicants will have approved items, which must be new and fit for purpose, reimbursed in full, or a portion of a purchase reimbursed across both categories. For Round Four, consideration will be given to unsuccessful past applicants or those who did not apply in the first three rounds. Previous recipients remain eligible. Successful applicants must ensure their FFU is registered with the CFS to receive reimbursement and notify the CFS of the new water tank location. New grants for community-led solutions in rural healthcare

THE Rural and Remote Community Support Grant, offered by the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM), is now open to the Riverland.

Designed to back community-led projects that help attract, train, and retain doctors in areas where they are needed most. the grants are available to support a wide range of local initiatives that will assist registrars (trainee Rural Generalists and rural General Practitioners) to live and work in rural, remote and First Nations communities throughout their fellowship training.

Initiatives could include improving accommodation options, assisting registrars' families with childcare or schooling needs, or establishing a program to attract registrars and supervising Rural Generalists (RGs) to a region.

ACRRM president Rod Martin said the grants would empower local com-

munities to shape the future of rural healthcare.

"People living outside the urban footprint know best what their communities need," Dr Martin said.

"This grant recognises that knowledge and provides real support to help build and strengthen the medical workforce they need.

"We want to see more RGs living and working in rural, remote and First Nations locations long term, and we know that community support is a huge part of making that happen."

Eligible applicants include local health services, Aboriginal Medical Services, community groups, and ACRRMaccredited training practices.

Applications are open until 1 October and will be assessed by ACRRM monthly.



HOUSE break-ins, shop theft and car theft continued their decline across the state, including the Riverland, according to the latest crime statistics.

South Australia Police (SAPOL) released its rolling year crime numbers up to May, revealing the total number of property related offences decreased by eight per cent (7,604 offences) and a noticeable reduction in most offences within the same category.

A 10 per cent reduction in robbery and related offences was also recorded, marking the sixteenth successive decrease within the same category.

The May figures also revealed a 14 per cent decline in aggravated robberies, while non-aggravated robberies increased by three per cent.

Within the property related offences category, theft and related offences record-

Non-residential break-ins also showed another healthy decrease of nine per cent, with 318 fewer offences reported, from 3,708 to 3,390.

The May rolling year statistics revealed that acts intended to cause injury, which includes serious assault resulting in injury and common assault, increased by four per cent, from 23,546 to 24,428 incidents reported.

The number of assault police incidents reported decreased by four per cent, from 626 to 601 incidents.

Reported homicides have returned to traditional levels, with 10 recorded in the rolling year period, compared with 23 in the corresponding period. A similar number were reported in the March and April periods.

\$3.3m boost to strengthen family based care

TWO state-wide programs supporting Riverland children to be placed with their extended families and other families have received funding from the State Government.

The Finding Families and Additionally Approved Carers programs have been allocated a further investment of \$3.3m to continue operating.

Through Finding Families, a team of social workers focuses solely on finding safe, nurturing and stable family-based placements with extended family, travelling to communities across the country to meet with children's relatives as part of that process.

Through the program, 115 children and young people, 39 of them Aboriginal, are now in stable placements with families. A total of 81 of these children are aged 10 years or younger.

Following the success of the initial 12-month pilot, the State Government has further invested in the Finding Families program for another 12 months, so it can be further evaluated.

The Additionally Approved Carers Program is also gathering steam and has provided 6090 nights of care for children and young people since January 2024 - up from approximately 4000 just four months ago.

Through the program, social workers identify kinship carers willing to take on another, unrelated, child or young person on an emergency respite or short-term basis in many cases, diverting them from entering residential care.

"Children and young people dealing with really complex issues deserve for us to constantly explore and evaluate new ways to help them safely live in family environments," Minister for Child Protection Katrine Hildyard said.

"This new investment allows dedicated staff to continue their efforts to find the best places for young people.

"When it comes to the protection of the children who most need us, we know there is more to do but this investment, and our ongoing reform, are, pleasingly, beginning to show promising results.

"I am very grateful to the carers who open their homes and hearts and selflessly dedicate themselves to supporting young people, and giving them opportunities to thrive now and into the future."

Dementia Australia launches Diversity Grant Program

Dementia Australia CEO

Professor Tanya Buchanan said the 2025 Diversity Small Grant program comes at a time when dementia Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are approximately three-to-five times higher than that of the general Australian population and at least 28 per cent of people living with dementia in Australia being born in a non-English speaking country.

"Dementia Australia's 2025 Diversity Small Grant program is part of our commitment to facilitating equity of access to dementia information and support,' Prof Buchanan said.

"Following unprecedented demand and more than 200 applications in 2024, we are proud to offer the Diversity Small Grant program for a second year.

Alongside up to \$30,000 in funding, successful recipients will receive a complimentary dementia education session, and ongoing support and guidance from Dementia Australia.

The Diversity Small Grant program is a Dementia Australia initiative funded by the Australian Federal Government.

Heroic Hoad celebrates incredible RFL milestone

ONE of the most extraordinary milestones was achieved on Saturday afternoon in round 12 of the Riverland Football League's B grade competition.

Brooke Hoad broke the RFL games record back in 2021, but the veteran ruckman reached game 500 against Loxton North last weekend.

It's an achievement only 32 players in South Australia before him have gained, and despite 499 games under his belt, the 48-year-old said he was nervous during the week.

"I was sort of always thinking I wasn't going to get it, but as it got closer and closer,

I was just happy to finally get there which was good," he said.

"I had plenty of phone calls after the club put the post up on Monday afternoon from people I went to school with and a lot of other messages too.

"Winning the B grade medal was a big achievement, but beating the games record was really special to me, but they all add up when you do look back."

Waikerie's players wore specially designed 'Hoady 500' warm-up t-shirts prior to the senior matches, which he said was a big surprise.

Having played with the Magpies since his junior years, Hoad said he has always enjoyed the athletic side of football. "I always went to training, and that was obviously a key factor in reaching that record, but the older you get, the harder it can be," he said.

"Luckily, I was able to hang in there long enough, and I had a few good coaches in the B grade such as Jackson Sutton, and Brendan Turner who gave me the games to get there.

"There's a few younger lads that I try to give advice to, but I try not to say too much, but we've got a young side which can happen from time to time.

"It was a big surprise to see the boys in their shirts, and Jacki (Venning) did a great job in organising that, and I didn't know anything about it." Hoad drifted forward to hit the scoreboard in the 32-point loss to the Panthers, which he said was unexpected.

He hopes his career can continue even further, with the 'r' word of retirement coming around the corner.

"I ended up drifting forward and kicking a goal which was unexpected, but I did try and give a few off too," he said.

"My plan was to finish the year out, but in terms of next year it will just be about seeing how the body lets me train and what happens there.

"I'm happy to fill in if they need me, but if there are younger boys there I'm happy to step outside, but you're never really retired."





Banana Bread



INGREDIENTS:

- 125g unsalted butter, plus extra for greasing (at room temperature)
- 2 large free-range eggs
- 4 ripe bananas

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- 2 tablespoons runny honey
- 2 tablespoons unsweetened apple juice
- 250g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting
- 1 big pinch of ground cinnamon
- optional: 50g pecan

METHOD:

- Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/gas
 Lightly grease a 1-litre loaf tin with butter.
- 2. In a large bowl, beat the soft butter until creamy. Add eggs and beat until mostly combined (don't worry if it looks lumpy).
- 3. Mash 3 bananas and mix them in. Stir in honey and apple juice, then fold in the flour and cinnamon gently.
- 4. If using, chop pecans and fold them into the mixture. Spoon into the tin, slice the last banana and press into the top.
- 5. Bake for 40–50 minutes, or until a skewer comes out clean. Cool slightly in the tin, then transfer to a wire rack.
- 6. Slice and serve with butter, honey, jam, or chocolate spread. Enjoy!
