ANOTHER major Loxton sporting club will be absent – permanently – from the town's \$13 million sports hub.

Conceived – and funded – to unite sports in one central location, The Precinct has now lost tennis from its list of future resident sports, joining lawn bowls.

A lack of space at The Precinct – which started life as the "Loxton Recreation Complex" – has been cited as the reason behind the decision to instead fund upgrades to Loxton Tennis Club's existing grass-court facility.

Ratepayers will now pay \$50,000 to purchase a new mower, plus another \$15,000 annually to mow the courts, as the local council commits long-term to the club remaining at its current location, at the town's western entrance.

A FEW last-minute projects

Business Plan includes the 1 per cent rate increase, the actual increase payable by ratepayers will depend on the movement in capital value of their property, with council predicting a majority would have a decrease or less than 1 per cent increase.

The budget also includes valuation increases through "natural growth" and increases to both Community Wastewater Management System fees and kerbside bin collection. A major addition was \$100,000 of operating expenditure to go towards detailed designs for the Loxton Visitor Information Centre and Library and the Waikerie Recreation Centre.

Loxton Waikerie's last

minute budget inclusions

Other notable additions were \$114,466 for the Waikerie RSL disabled toilet, \$18,264 for the Stanley Street crossing in Waikerie, and \$10,000 for Waikerie Memorial Garden.

Loxton Tennis Club will also benefit from a total of \$65,000 to upgrade its current facilities.

Meanwhile, since the release of the Draft Annual Business Plan, council has increased its operating surplus, which was originally estimated at \$52,000. In the report, Loxton Waikerie council chief finance officer Stacey Portolesi said a "number of amendments had been made". "The first being the final

adjustment to the rate revenue as a result of the final Valuer-General valuations..." she said.

"This resulted in additional rate revenue of approximately \$27,000.

"Council received advice regarding the Roads to Recovery Grant. Council will receive \$743,520 in the 2021/2022 financial year. This figure was previously budgeted at \$750,955."

Mrs Portolesi said council staff also identified savings within the fuel budget.

The Annual Business Plan now proposes an operating surplus of \$194,000. "Overall council's draft operating surplus of \$52,000 has increased to \$326,000," she said. Other key budget items for the

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plan include: Completion of an \$8 million project, in conjunction with the Federal Government, to increase safety of B-double routes and sealing portion of Taplan Road.

Construction of a "community hub" at Waikerie.

Construction of Loxton Retirement Village community centre.

□ Continued toilet refurbishment, including maintenance, renewal, upgrade and new toilet blocks.

□ \$250,000 of community event and project support.





Funding boost for local 'Gopher' film

THE Riverland will be home to a film set later this year, thanks to a Federal Government boost.

Six Foot Four Productions, together with the Loxton Chamber of Commerce, were successful in a Regional Arts Fund Project grant, worth \$23,675.

ing that concept and adding a bit of a twist at the end."

The proud former Riverlander said he was looking forward to filming in the region.





"It will showcase the Riverland and how amazing the drive along the Sturt Highway is and the landscapes we have along the way," he said.

"The plan is to predominantly find local people who I can upskill to work on the production, then down the track I can use them for other projects."

Funding brings club up to par

AMENITIES at a Barmera sporting facility will be completely renovated thanks to more than \$100,000 in Federal Government funding.

Barmera Golf and Tennis Club changerooms and toilets will be upgraded using a \$104,620 grant received last week under round three of the Murray-Darling Basin Economic Development Program. Barmera Golf Club president Neville McPherson said the toilets and changerooms, the original facilities from when the club was built in the 1970s, were in desperate need of renovation.

"It'll mean that the kids who play tennis will have changerooms as well and it'll bring our facilities up to scratch," he said.

"We've had funding and done a lot of work on the rest of the place, so really this is the last bit that we need to do."

Mr McPherson said the club had committed \$45,000 of its own money towards the project, which it hopes to have completed in the coming months.

"The tennis club has a big state tournament coming up in September, so hopefully we can have it done by then," he said.

"The place will now be fairly well set up as a venue that people can hire for milestone events, like weddings and the like, as well."

Mr McPherson thanked the Federal Government and Murray-Darling Basin Authority for approving and funding the project.

"It's something a club like ours wouldn't be able to do without the Government's support," he said. "So, we're particularly pleased and really thankful that it has happened."

As of 30 June, the eradication response had also:

- collected over 180,000 kg at-risk Riverland fruit
- released over 100 million sterile (SIT) flies in the Riverland.

Primary producers impacted by current fruit fly outbreaks have access to the State Government's free **Family and Business Support (FaBS) program**.

Fruit fly impacted growers can have an informal, confidential and independent conversation with a local Riverland mentor – by phone, or in person.

Our trained local mentors work closely with other service providers such as Rural Financial Counselling and local health networks, as needed.

Waikerie defends need for two-court stadium

WAIKERIE needs a two-court stadium if it wishes to cater for any future development, according to the local netball club's president.

Waikerie Netball Club president Naomi Campbell is calling upon Loxton Waikerie council to consider a two-court option as part of its current Community Sports Centre public consultation.

"Our main concern is that without a second court in the stadium, we actually end up turning people away," she said.

"It's great that council are looking at doing something, but we are concerned it's a Band-Aid fix for now and not planning for the future for the town.

"We need to put money back into the town, into the infrastructure and into the assets of the town to ensure we have what it needs to encourage people to come and move here."

Loxton Waikerie council is seeking feedback on the plan, which includes a redevelopment of the existing building to accommodate a full-sized basketball/netball court.

The plan also includes a new

ground level multi-use area, spectator seating, new kiosk, ground level gallery/viewing, storage and new wet area amenities to support the Waikerie Swimming Pool.

Ms Campbell said the netball club would provide feedback asking council to "look at the big picture". "Not so much for the imme-

"Not so much for the immediate needs now, but we are hoping the town is going to grow," she said.

"To me, my favourite quote is, 'build it and they will come'."

Ms Campbell said the current stadium poses a number of safety risks.

"I don't believe it is up to occupational health and safety standards because (the court) doesn't have enough run-off," she said.

"There's also issues with it leaking and I know they keep fixing it, but it keeps leaking.

"Even just a few weeks ago,

there was a nail sitting up in one of the floorboards."

Ms Campbell also raised concerns about the down-time due to construction of a new sporting facility in Waikerie.

"It is a more of a concern how long construction may take and what happens if it goes into a second season," she said. While Weileric Nethell Club

While Waikerie Netball Club is currently without an A1 side, Ms Campbell said she hoped that would soon change.

"We hope to build the netball club back up to have an A1 and A2 team," she said.

District Council of Loxton Waikerie director of commercial and community services Andrew Waters said the public consultation was designed to draw out feedback – both positive and negative.

"We want feedback from the community, especially user groups," he said.

"If their opinion is that they want two courts, then we want to hear from them."

Mr Waters said user groups should stipulate the need for a two-court stadium in their submissions. "We want to hear why and how many members and if the clubs are growing," he said.

"From our point of view, that is why we are going to community consultation – to get feedback."

Mr Waters said once feedback is collated, a plan will be made "shovel-ready" for grant funding.

"This has been talked about for a number of years and if we don't go down this process, in five years' time, things will still be the same," he said.

"But, if we get the consultation process done, some engineering plans and scoping... from a grant writing point of view, we can say, 'Yep, here's our drawings, here's our plans and the exact costings'."

Legislation passes to establish inspector-general

THE creation of a new Federal Government monitoring role is aimed at providing "greater accountability and strengthened integrity" in the management of Riverland water resources

The Federal Government last month passed legislation to establish a new inspector-general of water compliance for Murray-Darling Basin irrigators.

Renmark Irrigation Trust general manager Rosalie Auricht said the legislation would provide greater transparency around the management of Riverland water resources.

"Irrigation communities within the Murray-Darling Basin who are doing the right thing by only using water that they are legally entitled to want reassurance that all water users in the Basin are doing the right thing," Ms Auricht said. "This legislation enables the

"This legislation enables the Commonwealth to review and compare the compliance arrangements in each state within the Murray Darling Basin.

"If water take is not measured well across the Basin, it places the health of the river system and the required outcomes of MDB Plan in jeopardy.

"The Murray-Darling Basin requires very careful management."

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the decision came from "many years of engagement" with local water users.

"The Basin's 2.2 million rural and regional water users will now have the assurance they deserve, through stronger compliance, greater accountability and strengthened integrity around Basin water management," Mr Pasin said.

"Communities will now have greater protection from water theft and water trading offences and all water users will be held to the same high bar through consistent guidelines and standards."


It is understood a statutory panel – independent of the Murray-Darling Basin Authority – would also provide advice to the inspector-general.

Federal Minister for Water Keith Pitt said continued monitoring of water resources was necessary for the success of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

"This new legislation delivers on the Australian Government's commitment to strengthen compliance and enforcement powers in the Murray–Darling Basin by creating new water theft and illegal water trading offences and penalties," Mr Pitt said.

"The stiff penalties and criminal and civil offences regulated will create real deterrents around water theft and illegal water trading offences, providing communities the assurances they need on water management in the Basin."

Renmark project awarded



A RIVERLAND town's redesigned riverfront space has received recognition for the environmental and economic benefits it has created for the surrounding community.

Renmark's Taylor Riverfront Precinct was last week announced as a winner of the SA Regional Achievement in Landscape Architecture Award at the 2021 South Australia Landscape Architecture Awards.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Neil Martinson said the redesign – including a new town fountain and barbecue facilities – encouraged locals, and visitors, to interact with the river front.

"The Taylor Riverfront Precinct has transformed an underutilised space along our river front into a much-loved community asset," Mr Martinson said.

"This project was successful in creating a hub for people to stay, play and relax in Renmark. It demonstrated how open space can foster public life, with the precinct delivering a valuable contribution to the Riverland community.

"The jury was impressed by how the revitalised precinct addressed and interacted with the river and provided the community and visitors the opportunity to walk out over the river, revealing views up and down stream.

"The revitalised precinct (is) delivering confidence in Renmark as a place to live, work and visit, which encourages civic pride and opportunities to engage with the mighty River Murray."

Renmark Paringa Council unveiled the completed river-front redesign in February, with the project supported by \$1.4 million coming from the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund and \$550,000 from the State Government's Places for People Program.

Mr Martinson said incorporating environmental sustainability at the area had been a priority for council.

"Council aims to ensure that crime prevention through environmental design principles are embedded in all new and renewed infrastructure," he said.

"Features such as the new native planting beds containing a mix of species to assist with bank stabilisation was important to us, along with the paving design to reference the





River Murray.

"This assists people in forming a relationship with the river who may not have access to boats.

"It's also worthy to note that the river deck is 24 metres long and is made from 100 per cent recycled products. An equivalent of 65,530 milk bottles were recycled to create (it)."

Mr Martinson said council's ongoing Urban Design Framework (UDF) project would draw new tourism and economic activity to Renmark.

"This will certainly boost Renmark's reputation of being a beautiful regional town with... an award-winning community space in the heart of the town centre," he said.

"This is great recognition of all the hard work put into this project by everyone involved.

"This is also the first step of delivering the transformational vision of council's (UDF) for the Renmark township and we look forward to the next stages to commence."

An unsatisfactory Precinct outcome

HOW did it come to this in Loxton? Neither tennis nor bowls – possibly the Riverland's second and third biggest 'summer' participation sports – will call the town's \$13 million sporting hub home.

The Murray Pioneer understands the Loxton Tennis Club wanted 12 courts at The Precinct, including six floodlit courts to cater for senior tennis matches being scheduled for Friday nights.

After many months of talks between the club and the Loxton Waikerie council, it has been decided to abandon plans to move the tennis club to The Precinct.

Instead ratepayer money will be spent on a mower – plus manpower – to maintain the grass courts at the club's existing facility.

Is this a wasted opportunity? Another one in fact, given the Loxton Bowling Club was also unable to reach an agreement to relocate to the hub.

Given the hub was conceived as "an entire sporting precinct", designed to bring together the town's sporting groups, plus the fact a fortune has been spent on the facility, the outcome can only be deemed unsatisfactory.

The tennis club wanted to move to The Precinct, but the sticking point has clearly been the number of courts it requested.

Boosted by a flourishing junior scene, Loxton boasts the biggest membership of all Riverland tennis clubs. It is understood the club wanted up to 12 courts to help cater for its junior program, and it wanted lights for its seniors.

Was it willing to be flexible on court numbers?

The existing outdoor netball courts at The Precinct could still be used for tennis, and any concerns over multiple line markings and less-than-ideal court conditions should be tempered by the reality that junior tennis is about participation, not playing for sheep stations. Plus healthy junior numbers now are no guarantee of same in the future.

But most importantly, did the council try hard enough to make this happen?

Surely ample room exists for enough tennis courts around The Precinct, provided sufficient creative thinking and pragmatism are deployed. Just look around the oval. For example, two cricket nets sit in isolation near the Bookpurnong Road side of the complex, among an open expanse crying out for development.

Bringing tennis on board was part of the sporting hub conversation since the project's genesis. A compromise and a subsequent solution needed to be found, one way or another.

Having tennis – and bowls – at The Precinct would help maximise use of the investment. The Murray Pioneer understands over 100

people frequent the tennis club's 12 grass-court facility some Saturday mornings. Those people could have – in future – been using the swish new canteen and catering facilities at The Precinct, including its mezzanine, part funded to the tune of \$1 million by ratepayers.

Such usage could only boost The Precinct's bottom line and the club's fortunes, not to mention attract more people closer to the town's CBD.


If The Precinct's fencing and/or entrances needed some reconfiguration to cater for the tennis courts, so be it. A \$13 million price tag demands solutions be found to such challenges, be they major or relatively minor.

Instead, the council has now committed to spending more money on the club's existing and ageing grass-courts – which are not actually available for public use year-round anyhow.

Grass courts require plenty of maintenance, often with volunteer labour, and this has been cited as among the reasons the club wanted to move to hard-court facilities at The Precinct. That plan is now dashed, it seems. Instead

ratepayers will help pick up the tab for the highmaintenance grass courts for years to come and the club's volunteers will be needed much more than if The Precinct option was taken up.

Even more broadly, the Loxton Tennis Club site is a prime location for development, situated on the main thoroughfare on the entrance to town. Another opportunity missed? Add it to the list?



Not the best option for Waikerie

THE announcement by District Council of Loxton Waikerie offering public consultation on a proposed upgrade to Waikerie Sports Centre has at least one significant omission.

If this plan goes ahead Waikerie will be without any access to an indoor facility suitable to be used for netball and basketball for 12 months.

And this time frame will only be 12 months providing work goes to schedule.

A response to the plan by our community is vital to alert council that this option is not to the community's benefit.

A NEW program developed by a Riverland community group aiming to help local seniors to become more active, healthy and connected will start in the coming months.

The Moorook Hall committee was recently given a \$9200 grant through the State Government's Grants for Seniors program to create a "happy healthy ageing project".

Committee member Rae Szulawa said the program, which will consist of four eight-week courses, would predominantly service Moorook, Kingston-On-Murray, New Residence and other small surrounding towns.

"All these courses will be free

for participants thanks to this grant," she said. "It is predominantly for over-50s, but, in these small towns, we don't mind if a few oth-

ers come along. "We've got a few really great, qualified teachers to deliver the courses as well, and there'll be a teacher and a facilitator in each group."

Ms Szulawa said each of the courses – Staying Active, Healthy and Fresh, Getting Connected and photography – would help improve an aspect of health and wellbeing.

"Many seniors have a fear of falling or injury and it decreases their confidence, so if they get good balance, flexibility and strength they can lessen that fear," she said. "We are setting up a Staying Active course for that, with outcomes of increased confidence, better ambulating and increased

general fitness and wellbeing. "In the Healthy and Fresh course, participants will gain a greater understanding of the nutritional values of fresh versus processed foods.

"A lot of older people don't bother cooking for themselves because it's just for one person, so we want to help them to read and understand things like additives, sugar, salt and preservatives, but also to make educated choices about what to eat for their age, health and wellbeing.



"For Getting Connected, participants will learn to navigate the pathways of the internet, the skills to enable them to maintain contact with people, access services and find entertainment using their phones, laptops and computers. The Moorook Hall committee will launch a new seniors program thanks to a State Government grant. PHOTO: Peta-Marie Philippou

"In the photography course, we want them to work towards creating a 2022 calendar for themselves or to give to somebody."

Ms Szulawa said the program would likely begin in late-July or early-August.

No club at Loxton's \$13m sports hub

To cater for the trend of the Riverland senior tennis competition being played at night, the club wanted six floodlit hard courts at The Precinct, among a total of 12 courts at the site.

Club president Phil Smith said members were eager to make The Precinct their home base, but were now committed to "working with council" on the new plan.

"There were lots of advantages to moving there," Mr Smith said.

"But it's obviously been decided that there's not room there for us, so we'll have to make the best of what we've got where we are.

"We've just got to move forward. We've been talking about where we're going to be for a long time, so at least we have some direction now, which we probably haven't had for a fair while."

Plans to relocate the Loxton District Bowling Club to The Precinct also fell through in early 2019, leaving two of the region's major summer sports missing from the hub.

Despite negotiations, Loxton District Bowling Club members voted to stay in their current Bookpurnong Terrace location after being unable to "reach a positive outcome" between council and the Loxton Club.

Loxton Waikerie council's early plans for the project – which was billed as "an entire sporting precinct" – included an outdoor "multi-use" area for netball, basketball and tennis courts, plus two undercover synthetic lawn bowling greens.

A "state-of-the-art" mezzanine was also included in that masterplan, however unlike the bowls and tennis plans, that \$1.5 million facility was completed recently.

It offers panoramic views of Loxton Oval and the basketball/netball courts, and can cater for up to 300 people via its bar

and commercial kitchen. Funding for the mezzanine was sourced from the Federal Government (\$500,000) and council's cash reserves (\$1 million).

In a council report, Loxton Waikerie council chief finance officer Stacey Portolesi said staff had been meeting with Loxton Tennis Club representatives to discuss future plans.

"With not enough area at The Precinct, the long-term (plan) for the club is to upgrade the facilities at the current location," he said.

"The longer-term need for the club is to

create lit, hard surface courts that require minimal maintenance.

"They require six lit, hard courts for senior competition, as the Riverland has moved to Friday night games, and 12 courts for junior development."

Mrs Portolesi said discussions highlighted the labour required for grass court maintenance and the effect it has on member volunteers, through time and cost.

"This identified (the) importance of a new mower and support to mow the courts in the medium-term and to apply for a grant for lights in the short-term on the main grass courts," she said. "It is recommended that council allocate a budget capital budget of \$50,000 for the purchase of a new mower.

"Council will retain ownership of the mower and carry out the mowing for the tennis club. As a result, an operating budget of \$15,000 should also be included for the mowing to be completed by council."

Council another step closer to McCormick centre sale?

A LACK of long-term plans for a community centre has seen a Riverland council proceed with plans to potentially sell the property.

Renmark Paringa councillors passed a motion at last month's general meeting to request approval from Minister for Planning and Local Government, Vickie Chapman, to remove the community land status for the McCormick Centre

Renmark Paringa director of corporate and community services Tim Pfeiffer said the property had "a comparatively high annual maintenance cost, therefore requiring a viable and long-term use to justify council's continued investment of our community's financial resources".

"Over the years, there have been two expression of interest processes to find a viable and long-term use of the McCormick Centre and 11 different options have been investigated," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"After the revocation process commenced, Council was pleased to lease the McCormick Centre to PIRSA on a short-term basis to assist in implementing the fruit fly management program."

It is understood no responses were received for council's public consultation process regarding the McCormick Centre's future.

A SENSE of community will be at the heart of a new Catholic college currently under construction in a Riverland town.

Ms Mardon said feedback from parents of potential students was integral to developing the school site and its curriculum.

"Because we engaged with families from the early stages, we know what they want," she said.

"We've got a once-in-alifetime opportunity really... hopefully it's responsive to what people have been saying."

RIVERLANDERS have been encouraged to enter their garden as part of this year's Riverland Rose and Garden Festival Open Garden program – and become part of a record-breaking effort.

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Clash over council's one-way proposal in Waikerie:

It's a Francis Street fracas

A WAIKERIE business operator says a council plan to make his road one-way would have a disastrous impact on his livelihood – and potentially cost up to seven local jobs.

The unusually configured Francis Street comprises a short one-way section and a longer two-way stretch, but the District Council of Loxton Waikerie wants the entire road to become one-way, in order to improve safety in the Waikerie Foodland loading zone.

Council contends that trucks could park, reverse and unload at the supermarket more safely on a one-way street – running from McCoy Street to Pflaum Terrace.

However, McKay's Auto owner Stuart McKay said his business would suffer a significant downturn in patronage under the proposed change, which he believes would also create a new traffic hazard and stifle traffic flow through the town's CBD.

Francis Street is currently accessible via both McCoy Street and Pflaum Terrace, with a short section of the McCoy Street-end – finishing at the entry to a carpark behind Waikerie Foodland – already one-way.

Mr McKay is strongly opposed to the one-way-only plan – currently up for public consultation – and said it would reduce both vehicle and foot traffic to his business, which fronts Francis Street.

"One-way streets are bad for business and we'll be at the 'dead end' of that street if it's one-way," he said.

"I've read material that shows that to be true; there's plenty of evidence.

"We employ seven people and if this (change) goes through it'll probably be the end of my business. That's seven jobs gone in the town, plus a ratepaying business."

Long trailers and caravans are regularly towed into the McKay's Auto premises from the Pflaum Terrace side of Francis Street and Mr McKay claims that particular right-hand turn into his property is wider and safer than attempting a left-hand turn via the McCoy Street end.

He said towing a caravan into his carpark from the McCoy Street end would be "a nightmare".

Council CEO David Beaton encouraged community members to express their views during the public consultation period, which ends on July 23.

Mr Beaton said the council had been working with a specialist traffic engineer on a design for the proposed changes to Francis Street.

"We have had the costing done and now





we are having a discussion about the design and how it will affect people in the area," he said.

"Obviously, we will listen to people when the consultation comes back..."

Mr Beaton also pointed out that the council had previously sold a Francis Street carpark to Mr McKay – adjacent to his business – to allow easier access to his premises.

"He can get into Francis Street via this land," Mr Beaton said.

"(Mr McKay) certainly has his views and council will certainly listen to ensure we can find a way forward that is safe to the community."

While acknowledging the need for a safe loading zone at Foodland, Mr McKay said his suggested solution of making the entire street two-way would satisfy all parties.

"A semi-trailer could load directly into the rear of Foodland and go forward, then turn left into the main street (McCoy Street)," he said.

"They go past the pub, turn left, and they're gone."

Mr McKay said having Francis Street



entirely one-way would make the town "harder to navigate around".

He also said that as the town's RAA operator – covering a 30,000 square kilometre expanse, stretching to Burra – it was important his business remained open, including for tourists.

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

Outspoken owner's council concerns

STUART McKay is unhappy that a proposal to make Francis Street one-way is already being circulated to the community.

The plan is out for public consultation, but the outspoken owner of McKay's Auto claims he has already raised concerns with council representatives, on numerous occasions.

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Three authentic Australian champions to celebrate

AUSTRALIANS love their sport. For some, their day-today existence ebbs and flows with the results.

Those that rise to the top, our champions, are adored. They are placed on metaphoric pedestals to be admired and sometimes worshipped.

Over the weekend past I read of one no longer with us, saw one reach a rare milestone, and watched another edged towards greatness. The first.

He left us 10 years ago, but for a period of 18 months more than 50 years ago, he was a great. He was a world champion whose story captured the nation, and his tale has endured.

Farewelled by a handful of family and friends, he left our shores in February 1968 to fight for the world bantamweight championship.

Over a quarter of a million people lined the streets of Melbourne to welcome him home the victor.

Instant celebrity followed, even an audience with the "King" (Elvis Presley), when he defended his title in the United States of America. Despite the adulation and later struggles in life, he always thought himself as just another Australian and was one who had time for everyone.

The next. This man has been plying his trade at the top level for two decades and at the weekend became the fifth player and possibly the last to reach a revered milestone reserved for

The fact that he plays Australia's game and has achieved so much, including four premierships and All-Australian status, is almost the veneer.

To be so good for so long is remarkable. To remain grounded and connected is what has made him so loved by teammates, opponents and fans.

The final one. From across the world and, eerily, 50 years since her idol and inspiration, Evonne Goolagong, captured the title, I watched another champion fashioning her own legacy in Australian sporting history.

Atop the rankings as world number one and already a winner of one grand slam (2019 French Open) she is going about her business attempting to claim the most prestigious title at the home of tennis, Wimbledon.

ing the pipe together was blown out. "This required the escape of water and obviously the pipe had to be fixed," he

said. Mr McMahon said once a pipe bursts, locating where the problem is can take some time.

Following the initial leak, a large hole subsequently developed in Strangman Road.

Mr McMahon said this was caused by the flooding and some of the excavation work being conducted by Central Irrigation Trust (CIT) crews.

He said the irrigation

in diameter, which meant substantial excavation was needed to access them.

The second leak was discovered on the weekend of June 26-27 and situated about three metres from the original leak.

Mr McMahon said to repair the pipes on the road, CIT had to obtain council approval and use traffic control equipment.

He said SA Water pipes and an NBN cable also had to be considered when repairing the CIT pipelines.

The water supply to some residents in the west of Waikerie had to be turned off intermittently while the repairs were done.

CIT sourced clamps from Mildura to repair the broken joins in the pipe.

Mr McMahon said irrigation pipes sometimes burst during a change in weather. "It is not an uncommon event," he said.

"As the weather changes in spring and autumn, we get a number of them and also in winter, when there is less use of the system.

"The pressure is always higher in the system, because there are less people using them."

Repairs to the irrigation pipelines have been completed and dirt placed back over the road.

Mr McMahon said the District Council of Loxton Waikerie would cover the area with a road base sometime this week.

He said council could delay bituminising the area until the weather was warmer, as winter conditions are unsuitable for this

Renmark doc's special honour

A RENMARK doctor who has spent almost 50 years serving the local community and advocating for rural healthcare was honoured at the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) Awards recently.

Dr David Rosenthal, who has worked at the Renmark Medical Clinic since 1974, said he was "overwhelmed" to receive the lifetime achievement award at the ceremony, held at the Renmark Club.

"You don't look for these things, that's not the way it should be, but I'm grateful for the recognition," he said.

After growing up in Renmark, Dr Rosenthal studied as an obstetrician-gynaecologist in Adelaide before he decided to return to his hometown as a GP.

"I knew rural general practice would be interesting but it was scary," he said.

"Up until that time I was used to being in teaching hospitals where there's lots of support, so coming out here I had to get used to it, and it took a while

of resources that we have now up here - we didn't have the regional hospital because it was just the Berri hospital, the same as the other towns.

"We had to be relatively self-sufficient."

Dr Rosenthal's contributions to healthcare in the Riverland also extend to his work in education, including his involvement in the Rural Health Channel and helping establish the Flinders University training program in Renmark.

"We're starting to see, particularly in this region, a very strong recognition that the best way to attract doctors to rural practices and hopefully seeing them stay is to grow your own," he said.

"We knew that there were people going through that student training pathway that really wanted to be in rural practice, but then they got lost when they went to Adelaide.

"I think it's important to fix that because if there is a pipeline that's not leaking and medical students and young doctors who want to get on a rural trajectory have the opportunity to do it by "We didn't have the array training for rural generalism, unteers.

it will benefit rural communities.

"The thing that's driven me is to see rural practice advanced and recognised for what it is.

"Of course, it's not just about the rural practice, it's what the community gets out of it."

Mr Rosenthal also served as the founding president of the Rural Doctors Association of South Australia and as national president of the Rural Doctors Association.

"It's amazing the amount of work you put in for what's very minimal change really, but I hope in this region there are people who want to continue carrying the banner because, in the end, it is the communities that will prosper," he said.

Development yes, mural no

PRIME real estate with frontage along the Sturt Highway in Berri may soon be developed once a decades-old community mural is removed from the location.

Two allotments in front of the Riverland Complex – the former site of the Berri cannery – are under contract to be sold, while another is under offer.

As part of the conditions of the sale, a large mural on one of the sites is expected to be removed or demolished, along with other fencing on the site.

The mural, standing 6m high and 50m wide, was completed in 1985 and was painted by community groups from the Berri area. Current owner Tony

Moro offered the mural to Berri Barmera Council at no cost, providing council fund the cost of removal and relocation, but elected members turned down the offer at council's most recent monthly meeting citing concerns over the condition of the artwork and the relocation costs.

"This was a huge community project," said Cr Rhonda Centofanti.

"It just brought the whole community and sporting groups together. "(Put) L don't this !

"(But) I don't think we

should keep it because it would be a huge cost."

Council CEO Karyn Burton said council had told Mr Moro in 2017 that it would like the option to relocate the artwork if it were ever to be removed.

"I still wanted to know if council had the will to keep it," Ms Burton said. "A couple of our Berri

Improvement Committee members suggested doing a photography display of the mural to get it preserved that way instead, which is what council ended up agreeing to.

"Council has chosen not to take ownership of it, however we are going to get onto taking some photos of it to preserve the history of it so it isn't lost, and we'll make a community project out of the artwork.

"We're very grateful that Mr Moro offered it to us and also offered to store the mural there as well."

Mr Moro said a decision on the mural would be deferred until building projects on the site were set to commence in a few months.

"(Removing the mural) will get some activity happening at the entry to Berri to complement the Bunnings site," he said.

"The remaining land closer to Bunnings is in negotiation to be sold to another developer with a great project in mind.

"That is not possible until some infrastructure such as filtered water is available, and we are working on a solution to that problem. "It is difficult to develop vacant land for housing or other projects with the lack of infrastructure such as potable water and sewage service.

"Hopefully those issues can be addressed soon, opening up opportunities."

Elected members voted to proceed with professional photography of the mural, so long as the cost was less than \$2000.

Ms Burton said images of the mural would likely be used in a future public arts display.

Nothing fishy about bony bream deaths

THE deaths of small bait fish at Barmera's Lake Bonney is due to stretches of cold weather, according to an experienced local fisherman.

Barmera resident and Riverland Carp Frenzy organiser Kym Manning said he believed low temperatures in late May, when the overnight minimum in the Riverland reached as low as -5C, had caused the fish kill.

"It's a natural occurrence from when there is a cold snap," he said.

"It doesn't happen every year but if we have a bitterly cold winter we might get a few, and if there is an extended snap of cold there will probably be quite a few."

A major fish kill event in July 2008, which resulted in up to 1500 dead bony bream washing up on the shores of Lake Bonney, was also attributed to cold weather.

Mr Manning said other extreme weather events had caused fish deaths in the lake.

"The other event I can remember where we had a big fish kill was when we had a really heavy downpour of rain and the creeks at the eastern side of Lake Bonney washed in a cloud of silt," he said. "We had tens of thousands of

bait fish that died. "It's not a good look, but it's not pollution and it's not because of water quality – it's just a natural thing that happens from time to time."

STUDENTS from St Joseph's School Renmark were treated to a visit from indigenous elder Uncle Barney last week, as part of celebrations for NAIDOC and Multicultural Week.

Uncle Barney said he wanted to impart the need for all people to show respect to each other.

He said the St Joseph's students were particularly interested in his didgeridoo - how was it made, where did it come from, how long had he been playing it – and

enjoyed a story he told with the instrument. "They were spellbound I think," Uncle Barney said.

"I told them about the different sounds I was making, the story of a dog chasing a kangaroo, a kookaburra laughing, whales diving down deep.

"At the end of the sounds I made, well I thought it was a lion, but they said it sounded like an elephant, so I said, 'okay, we will go with an elephant', so it was pretty good."

Uncle Barney said it was important for people of all ages, and from all walks of life, to learn the message of NAIDOC Week.

"It is all about reconciliation and that our country is unique," he said.

"As Aboriginals, it is fitting for people to acknowledge that we are the first people of this country, and show respect.

"Instead of just waiting for NAIDOC Week or Multicultural Week, there should be ongoing events to really appreciate this country and the culture and the people who were originally in this country.

'That is what people need."

Indigenous take on mental health care

A QUALIFIED facilitator of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander mental health first-aid training held a two-day workshop at a local fitness facility recently.

Local man Sam Mitchell ran six first-aid sessions at Loxton's **Riverland Boxing and Fitness Club** - three on Saturday and three on Sunday - to "create awareness and destigmatise mental health".

The courses, which were exclusive to coaches and members of both Renmark and Loxton boxing clubs, each ran for two hours and Mr Mitchell said he received a positive response from participants.

"The training is just like a firstaid course but it teaches people how to asses mental health, particularly with an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander focus," he said.

"I educate participants on all the misinformation and mistruths about mental health and how there's a higher suicide rate for indigenous people.

"I talk about anxiety, depression and the different risk factors around



social and historical contexts for indigenous people.'

Mr Mitchell said facilitating the course locally was important.

"Indigenous people have a lack of opportunities around education and health and it's vital I create awareness and help out," he said.

"The great thing about having a local trainer is more people have access to the education and I'm able to tell people where they can go in the community to get help and why."

Mr Mitchell encouraged local agencies and organisations to undergo the course.

"The course is aimed for adults -18 and above – and I would be more than happy to go to anyone's workplace for a chat," he said.

Country Press SA wants to commend Mr Troy Bell, Independent, Member for Mount Gambier for his motion in the House of Assembly regarding Government advertising in regional newspapers. Plus, all the Members (Liberal, Labor and Independent) for speaking in favour...

Mr Bell (Mount Gambier) Independent: That this house –

(a) recognises the importance of independent media platforms as both the voice for regional communities and a trusted information source;

(b) provides financial assistance to help support both new and established platforms to continue

(c) recognises that print is a vital information source for regional people; and

(d) commits to an annual spend for communication in regional communities.

He said among other things...

When a minister or senior politician comes down to regional areas, regional media show up, take photographs and attend press conferences, all of this without paid advertising going along with it—not that they are complaining about that service. It is a longstanding expectation and agreement between both sides because it is newsworthy. However, what I am calling for is a commitment to an annual spend for communication in regional communities to help underpin this very important industry.

Other MPs to speak in favour of this motion:

Mr McBride (MacKillop) Liberal: I understand and appreciate the importance of independent media, and in particular print media, in our communities.

Mr Piccolo (Light) Labor: Quoting from a report by Deakin University into regional media: I will quote from the report, and this quote covers very well what I think is the importance of country press: When practised well, country journalism informs, educates

and entertains a public that is often marginalised in favour of their big-city counterparts. It contributes to a functioning local democracy and public sphere, creates a shared sense of community, and fulfills a watchdog role by providing a check and balance on institutions such as local government, courts, churches, schools and police. The audience of this survey said. They overwhelmingly indicated that additional funding for local news should be directed to employ more local journalists to report news rather than to increase digital connectivity and digital innovations. In other words, people said they still had a strong preference for print media over digital media.

Mr Whetsone (Chaffey) Liberal: Regional communities deserve to have that balance. They deserve to have

that voice. Whether it is a voice on either side of the argument, it is critically important that our regional newspapers survive. I would like to think that all levels of government will continue to support and advertise in our regional newspapers and not use the digital age. Our regional newspapers are the fabric of a regional community.

Mr Hughes (Giles) Labor. It is incredibly important that we retain print media in regional communities because it is an important voice on current affairs. Social media is not an alternative. Some of the stuff I have seen locally on social media has been an absolute disgrace. There is no filter; there is no responsibility. Some of the stuff that is put out there is so factually inaccurate it is disturbing. In some ways, social media represents a long-term threat to a well-functioning democracy.

Mr Pederick (Hammond) Liberal: Regional papers give that absolute community coverage of things like community football, netball, bowling, lawn bowls, cricket whatever is going on—and it is magnificent coverage.

Ms Wortley (Torrens) Labor. If we do not advertise in our printed newspapers in regional South Australia, many people will miss out on the information that could be included... but newspapers, although printed on fewer days now in regional communities, are extremely important.

Mr Brock (Frome) Independent: It is becoming very disturbing that in lots of acts of parliament there is a tendency for the local council and other government departments to not have to place any communication in the newspaper but rather on social media or a

website, which takes revenue away from those who employ the journalists, and very importantly not everyone is glued to a computer, their mobile phone or other apps.

Mr Bignell (Mawson) Labor. I wholeheartedly agree that the government needs to be spending money advertising in these papers, but we can all take responsibility by not going onto Amazon and those types of sites and ordering shoes and clothes and all these products from other parts of the world. When the local shoe shop...dress shop or jeans shop in one of these country towns loses out on sale after sale from people going online and ordering their goods, it means that they have less money in their cash registers, which means the paper produces fewer pages of news and employs fewer journalists. Any move to cut government advertising in country newspapers would be a backwards step and I wholeheartedly support the member for Mount Gambier's move to make sure that the government is held accountable and that they do help prop up and support country newspapers in South Australia.

A RIVERLAND operator is rapt with outcomes of a statewide tourism-stimulus scheme.

Canoe Adventures-Riverland reported a surge in bookings thanks to Great State Voucher program, which aimed to provide an economic boost to the tourism sector during the quieter, cooler months.

The third round of the State Government-SA Tourism Commission initiative – which provides vouchers of varying values to be spent exclusively within South Australia – was conducted earlier this year and Canoe Adventures-Riverland owner Kym Werner is a strong advocate.

"We saw a great increase in bookings, with way more... than we've ever had in winter," Mr Werner said.

"We had about 40 bookings...which had to be taken between late May and the end of July, and we would normally have maybe three or four tours during that time." Mr Werner said the concept prompted South Australians to "think outside the box" about potential holiday destinations.

"It got lots of people... coming to the Riverland and doing things they've never thought of doing before in their own state, and one of those things was kayaking," he said.

"Our customers under the voucher system were a wide variety; younger and older, experienced and new to kayaking, some of whom had never been to the Riverland before, and all of whom would not have booked without the incentive of the vouchers.

"Customers often express their amazement at what we have here on our doorstep, not realising how easy it is to get into such lovely spots, so close to home." And the spike in tour bookings provided benefits beyond his own business, Mr Werner explained.

AGMOVE PAYING WORKERS' RELOCATION COSTS

If you're still looking to attract harvest labour, the Federal Government's AgMove could help with paying relocation costs for workers.

People relocating to take up short-term harvest work in a harvest, regional or remote area can receive up to \$6000 in relocation costs.

It's paid in two instalments – up to \$2000 after will be paid after the completion of 40 hours of work in at least two weeks. There's a further \$4000 of relocation costs after completing 120 hours of work in at least four weeks.

There's also up to \$2000 for temporary visa holders with general working rights like working holiday makers and some international students.

PRODUCTION HINTS FOR JULY:

Later winter GA spray: The main objective for this spray is to regulate flowering.

Winter foliar urea spray: This spray can assist in producing healthy bud initiation, especially following heavy crop set.

Frost control measures: It is important to identify frost prone areas and implement measures to prevent, detect and reduce frost risks (see above).

Irrigation Maintenance: This is an ideal time to do irrigation maintenance and flush irrigation lines.

Crop estimates and size: It is important to regularly update your fruit size and yield estimates and communicate this with your packer. This will assist with marketing strategies, in particularly the export markets.

Pruning of early maturing varieties: Your pruning program should commence once harvest on early maturing varieties has been completed.

Snail baiting: Areas to be controlled are centre sods/rows, under skirts, headlands and bin storage areas. Snails are a quarantinable pest for the USA markets.



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



AN increased demand for mental health services in the Riverland will be addressed via a \$134,000 grant to improve Berri's headspace facilities.

Renovations to the Riverview Drive premises will create additional consulting spaces and "refresh" existing spaces, making them more comfortable and welcoming for young people, their parents and carers.

Barker MP Tony Pasin has welcomed the Federal Government grant, which he says will ensure "young people can access mental health services where they need them and when they need them".

"(The) headspace Berri (facility) has been experiencing high demand for services and this funding will help them expand their services and improve access to high-quality, youth-friendly... mental health support," Mr Pasin.

"This grant will enable headspace Berri to complete minor renovations to increase clinical service rooms, upgrade bathrooms and upgrade waiting room."

Gemma Nickolai, headspace Berri centre manager, said locals had significant input in the funding target.

"Young people engaged with headspace Berri provided their ideas and suggestions for refreshing the centre, and we are excited for the opportunity this funding presents to bring some of these ideas to fruition," Ms

Forty headspaces services located in NSW, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and the Northern Territory will benefit from grants of up to \$1.8 million each.

The grants are part of the Government's

\$152 million investment in the headspace Demand Management and Enhancement Program, to reduce wait times and make capital improvements.

Minister for Health and Aged Care, Greg Hunt, said one in four young Australians are affected by a mental illness every year.

"Many young people have also been substantially affected by the Covid-19 pandemic," Mr Hunt said, "making it more important than ever to ensure access to youth mental health services."



Waikerie and District Ladies Probus Club June news:

WAIKERIE and District Ladies Probus Club members and guests were treated to two outstanding speakers at their last meeting on June 22

Sue Franke, winemaker for Growers Wine Group Waikerie, talked about her involvement in the winemaking business in South Australia, Victoria, NSW and even Romania.

While her time in Romania didn't teach her much about the wine industry it was great for developing self-knowledge and learning to overcome all sorts of challenges.

Sue compared her current job to being a bit like air traffic controllers, directing people to do whatever is necessary at the winery, which crushes between 50,000 and 60,000 tonnes of grapes annually to make approximately 45 million litres of bulk wine. This wine goes almost equally to the domestic market and overseas, to places like

Canada, Germany, Russia, France, New Zealand, Japan and even China.

Most of the wine is transported in 24,000-litre bladders that are cheaper and easier to handle than bottles. It also allows purchasers to blend and bottle the wine themselves, though the wine sent overseas is labelled as Australian wine.

Members enjoyed the stories and learning about the winemaking process. There was definite enthusiasm when Sue agreed - when asked - that arranging a wine-tasting session is possible. After morning tea, Kate Hartwig, Zoos SA

Board secretary and public officer, talked about Zoos SA. Kate has had a long career in not-forprofit organisations and charitable organisations in Adelaide, Sydney and Melbourne, and has strong family links with Waikerie.

Zoos SA is not government funded, and Covid has delayed development plans. Kate said that

Monarto will be rebranded as Monarto Safari Park-The Wild is Calling, with a new visitor centre that can be visited independently to the park, new roads and bus routes, a new range of safari experiences and glamping and luxury hotel stays. Adelaide will be promoted as a garden oasis in the centre of the city.





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

RIVERLAND pet owners are being reminded to pay their dog and cat registration fees for the new financial year.

Owners have until August 31 to renew their pet registration and pay their fees.

Cat registration around South Australia remains low, with just 68,200 cats registered compared to 317,400 dogs.

Dog and Cat Management Board chair David Parkin said because cat registration was a relatively new concept, the community was still learning that cats also need to be registered.

"That's concerning as registration helps reunite owners with pets if they go missing," he said.

"You can't assume your vet, breeder or previous owner has registered your pet's microchip to you.

"It's a two-step process - you need to complete the microchip record they created into your name yourself."

In South Australia, cats must be desexed, microchipped and registered in Dog and Cats Online: the statewide register for dogs, cats, breeders, microchip and desexing information.

To encourage owners to register their cat, the Dog and Cat Management Board is offering a prize draw of 20 cat pamper packs each month until November 30.

Owners who lack internet access to register their pets on Dogs and Cats Online can pay their registration fees to their local council. Information about cat registration and the prize draw can be found at www. dogandcatboard.com.au.





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

SIDELINED by injury and dropped from the state team, Berri cricketer Abbie Cawse has fought her way back to head Sturt's A1 women's bowling attack in its recent T20 and 50-over grand final wins.

At just 16, Abbie has tackled setbacks that would normally derail players many years her senior.

Through sheer grit and determination, Abbie said she was going to make the most of her opportunity to rejoin Sturt's bowling line-up alongside Australian women's team bowler Megan Schutt.

"I had a few back issues with stress fractures," she said.

"I missed three games in the minor round of the 50-over season. "I was pretty eager to get back

out there and they (Sturt) asked me to play in the semi-final because we missed our state players.

"I was still determined. I want to bowl well and make the most of it." Abbie played a pivotal part in both Sturt's T20 and 50-over winning team this season as its go-to medium-pace bowler. "My role is to bowl at the front

and tie down an end for someone to attack at the other end," Abbie said. "I'll take a few wickets where I can."

Sturt came from fourth in the T20 competition to play in the final against Northern Districts, which included state player Tegan McPharlin and Australian under 19 Darcie Brown, in December last vear.

In the final, Abbie smashed through the Jets' top order with figures of 2/26 in Sturt's 35-run win.

It would be nearly two months until Abbie got the call up to head Sturt's bowling attack for its 50 over semi-final against the Jets, her three wickets helped put Sturt into the grand final.



Saville's ticket to Tokyo

RIVERLAND tennis star Luke Saville knew "if I kept my head down and continued to have some good results" he would have a chance to realise his Olympic dream.

That dream came true last week when Saville was named in Australia's 11-strong tennis team for Tokyo, where he will make his Olympic debut.

Saville will line up with doubles partner John Millman in Australia's star-studded team, its biggest in Olympic Games history that includes world number one Ash Barty.

Saville's Wimbledon doubles campaign with Max Purcell came to an end yesterday after their third-round loss to third-seeds Juan Sebastian Cabal and Robert Farah (6-3 6-4 2-6 6-4).

It was a good result for the number 16-seeded combination, who had never previously won a match at the All England Club.

"Winning some matches here, as well as making the third round at the French Open too, holds me in good stead," Saville said.

But Saville said representing Australia in its Olympic Games team "brings a different kind of pressure and honour".

The 27-year-old was no stranger to wearing the green and gold in his junior days, representing Australia in world juniors (under 14) and Junior Davis Cup (under 16).

The 2020 Australian Open doubles finalist said to be part of a team environment would be a far cry from the at times lonely world of professional tennis.

"I can't wait to get to Tokyo and wear the Australian colours with pride and make our country proud of my performances," he said.

With the hopes of a nation on his shoulders Saville believes his country upbringing has kept him "humble and grounded" throughout his professional career.

"My parents Mick and Judy, brother Troy and sister Katie, have been so incredibly supportive throughout my career from when I started hitting balls at the age of five, until now," he said.

"I wouldn't be where I am, or have this opportunity to represent my country at the Olympics, without them."

Saville said as a professional tennis player it was important to keep things in perspective.

"Travelling the world and playing tennis at the highest level, I try to remind myself how fortunate I am to be in this position, playing the game I love as my job," he said.

"I believe strongly in being polite to everyone working at tennis tournaments." Saville said he was looking forward to

teaming up with Millman. "John and I are great friends and I very much look up to him for everything that he has achieved at slams and playing for Australia in the past," he said.

"We both bring great energy and excitement to the court, so we should have a lot of fun out there."

The Tokyo Olympic Games begin on July 23.

LOXTON North product Jesse Thackeray is knocking on the door of state under 19 selection, after strong performances in West Adelaide's under 18 side this season.

A part of Loxton North's 2020 under 18 premiership team, Thackeray was selected in the phase one 52-player SA squad, which will be trimmed to 35 after an internal trial match to be played at Thebarton Oval on July 16.

Thackeray said his achievement came as a bit of a shock, but that he was keen for his first meeting with the squad. "It will be good to meet the

boys and get their perspective and the coach's perspective of how they want to play the game," he said.

The 18-year-old will be up against players at the older end of the age bracket, but he said feedback from both West Adelaide and state coach Tim Bamford had been positive.

"My Westies coach Paul Streatfield... identified that the state coach was pretty happy with my clean possession out of clearance at stoppages," he said.

"I'll try to make that one of the areas I'll try and exploit... and show them everything I can do hopefully." Described as a "ball magnet" by Riverland academy co-ordinator Tim Jackson, the midfielder has seen plenty of it this season, playing on a midfield and forward rotation with the Bloods.

Thackeray said the support of West Adelaide for its contingent of 11 Riverland-based under 18 players has helped him get to where he wants to be.

"I know all the other Riverland boys will agree that our families are really thankful with the opportunity they give us – training on Tuesday (in Adelaide) then being able to come and train with our local clubs on the Thursday," he said.

"It's good we're able to go down there and train and get the same recognition as the metro boys."

On Monday, the SA squad had it first familiarisation training run ahead of its intensive program of three training session before the internal trial match.
