Riverland avoids Channel 7 disaster

RIVERLANDERS missed two Home and Away episodes, but no AFL games, after the dispute between WIN TV and Network Seven was resolved last week.

Seven's channels were off air Tuesday and Wednesday, as WIN temporarily made good on its pledge to withdraw the Seven Network's free-to-air broadcasts – due to the two parties being unable to reach a deal.

The impasse threatened to have disastrous consequences for locals unable to stream the 7plus service

However, WIN and Network Seven made a joint announcement on Thursday, just hours before the AFL match between North Melbourne and the Western Bulldogs was beamed into local homes on free-to-air

The about-face was a victory for people power, according to Federal Barker MP Tony Pasin, who gathered more than 2500 signatures on a petition calling for WIN and Seven to find a solution and restore the service to the Loxton and Mount Gambier facilities.

Mr Pasin described the temporary blackout as "a flagrant breach of the conditions of (WIN's) commercial television licence".

"Let's be clear, it should never have come to this," Mr Pasin said.

"I am livid that communities across the Limestone Coast and the Riverland were used as pawns

in a commercial negotiation and I have made my disappointment clear to the chief executive Officers of both organisations."

Mr Pasin said WIN is required

to meet certain obligations under the Commercial Broadcasting Licence issue to it pursuant to the Broadcasting Services Act 1992 and Seven is contractually obligated under agreement with the AFL and Cricket Australia "to name just two".

"Both parties in my assessment were in breach and it was these breaches that provided the leverage the community needed to ensure this matter was resolved expeditiously," he said.

In their joint statement, Seven and WIN said they "acknowledge the significant impact of free-to-air television in regional communities and the importance of providing news, sport, entertainment, and a voice to regional Australians".

AFL 'role' praised

THE return of Channel 7 programming to free-to-air screens in the Riverland last week represents justice – and is potentially a nod to the power of the AFL.

That's the view of Independent MLC Sarah Game, who wrote to AFL CEO Andrew Dillon on June 19, asking the league to step in and facilitate a solution to the stand-off that saw Channel 7 programs withdrawn – ultimately temporarily – from local free-to-air TVs on July 1.

"I've seen it suggested that the AFL might have been a major player in getting this deal done," said Dr Game.

"If that's the case, and I played a small part in that via my letter – which I made public – to the AFL last month then that's fantastic.

"But even if not, I'm still rapt for the people of the... Riverland.

"I've heard accounts of how distressing this has been for some elderly folk, and others, who – for various reasons – were going to miss out on AFL coverage, and everything else that Network Seven brings.

"Too often rural and regional South Australians are treated as an after-thought.

"I know commercial media needs to make money, because it can't rely on government funding, but nonetheless this is a victory for people power and common-sense."

A DRIVER will face court after blowing nearly four times over the legal alcohol limit, at Blanchetown, last week.

Double-booked

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"Unfortunately, the Riverland Field Days were later confirmed to fall on the same weekend. This overlap was not identified during our fixture planning and wasn't raised by clubs or the commission at the time."

The two events last clashed in 2019, when both were held on Saturday, September 14.

Riverland Field Days executive manager Emma Gwiazda estimated 60 per cent of last year's attendance for the event was on the Saturday.

"It is disappointing that they have chosen this weekend, where the biggest event on our Riverland Events Calendar is on, however we understand that this may not be in their control," Ms Gwiazda said.

"The Riverland Field Days is pretty reliably on the second weekend in September every year, but we do need to watch what the Royal Adelaide Show dates are doing in case they run a little later. Our marquee companies struggle to do both events if we are too close together.

"Over the entire event last year we had approximately 10,000 people come through the gates, with the Saturday being the busiest of the two days. I would estimate that we had approximately 6000 on the Saturday.

"We are hopeful that the grand final won't affect our numbers too greatly, as not all locals attend either the grand final or the Field Days.

"(But) it would be great in future years if pre-existing events could be thought of in the planning of our local sports so that we can be supporting both events in our region."

Mr Gehling said efforts would be made to avoid the grand final clashing with the field days in future years.

"We acknowledge both events are significant for the region and appreciate the potential strain this may place on attendees, volunteers and local resources," he said

"The RFL will be working closely with our clubs and partners to ensure a strong turnout and atmosphere at our grand final at Renmark Oval.

"We are confident the Riverland community and hopefully visitors to the region will support both major events.

"Looking ahead, we will be liaising with Field Days organisers to better co-ordinate future calendars and avoid similar clashes."

Reforms mean RIT unable to trade?

ONE of the Riverland's major irrigation trusts has been left unable to make water trades due to new market reforms.

Renmark Irrigation Trust (RIT) has advised new regulations under the Federal Government's water market reform would restrict it from facilitating any water trades of allocation or entitlement between customers for now.

"Renmark Irrigation Trust is disappointed to advise cus-

tomers that from July 1, 2025, it is unable to provide services that could be regarded as a water market intermediary service under the new laws," a public notice on the matter read

RIT CEO Rosalie Auricht said requests to delay implementation of the new requirements were denied.

"Throughout the extended consultation on this reform, (RIT) strongly advocated to retain its ability to provide

cost-effective water trade services for its customers," Ms Auricht said.

"However, the final regulatory framework treats irrigation infrastructure operators (IIOs), like the Trust, as equivalent to commercial water market intermediaries, though some requested practical concessions for IIOs were accepted.

"The framework introduces some technical obligations that the Trust cannot meet by the regulated implementation date.

"The Trust is determining a pathway for these important customer services to continue, though remains extremely concerned about the level of financial risk imbedded in the regulations for entities like the Trust."

It is understood transfers of water between accounts, or on/off licence, where the Trust is an approval authority only, may still occur.

Loxton Squash Club gets \$100k to boost facilities

A LOCAL squash club has been awarded a significant grant to upgrade its facilities, aiming to ensure it remains a sporting hub for the local community.

The grant, announced through the Community Recreation and Sport Facilities Program (CRSFP) and Active State Collaboration Program (ASCP), will be used for essential improvements to the Loxton Squash club's infrastructure, including the installation of a new roof and a new modern central air conditioning system.

The funding is part of a statewide initiative to support grassroots sports and encourage active lifestyles in regional communities.

Club president Craig Todd said "this grant will certainly benefit all club members"

"Not only will it help us provide better playing conditions for our members, but it will also attract more people to the sport" Mr Todd

"The new roof is something we've needed for a long time, because when the wind picks up, the tiles would shift and it would get really cold during winter.

"When that happened, we had to manually shift them back to place, which was a safety concern.

"We have club member Mark Cash, who is experienced in project management, so hopefully he can co-ordinate everything.

Mr Todd said securing the grant was difficult, however the club had help from the Loxton Waikerie Council.

"The District Council of Loxton

Waikerie have been incredibly supportive in providing guidance, financial assistance and access to their grant writer Jenny Fleming."

"The Riverland community has been supportive, including letters of support from local schools, businesses, and individuals who have used the facility in the past.

"It really shows how much people care about the club and its

"Together we worked really well to get the grant in. We were successful in securing most of the money needed, which is fantastic for the club.

"It's not all covered by the grant. The total cost of the work will be around \$140,000, so we'll need to come up with some additional funds ourselves, but we're confident we'll be able to manage it."

Mr Todd said the wider impact of the grant for the club, and the community, would be very posi-

"This grant will allow us to improve the facilities significantly, and it's especially important for the schools that use our squash programs," he said.

"With air conditioning and a new insulated roof, we'll be able to make the facility more comfortable year-round – keeping it cooler in summer and warmer in winter, definitely making a big difference to how people experience the club.

"This will also pave the future for the club, with the upgrades being just the beginning.

"The building has a solid foundation, but it does need a bit of

tidying up. We plan to update the signage, do some painting, and keep things looking fresh.

"Our club members are really hands on, like Paddy Reynolds, who helps maintain the courts and paints them, and we'll continue upgrading bit by bit."

Mr Todd said with these upgrades, the club can focus on the resurgence of squash and it's role in the community:

"Squash had fallen out of favour for a while, but we're starting to see a resurgence, especially with the sport becoming part of the Olympics," Mr Todd said.

"It's exciting for us because we cater to all levels of players - from beginners to experienced athletes. Whether you're just picking up a racket for the first time or you've been playing for years, there's something for everyone here.

"The courts are available for anyone in the community to hire, and they can contact us through Facebook. "We would be happy to accommodate other sporting clubs looking for some cross training, either as part of our normal competition, or facilitating their own internal competitions."

The upgrade is expected to begin later this year, with the aim of completing the work in time for next season's opening.

The Loxton Squash Club is the only remaining club in the Riverland, and plays all year round, with breaks over the school holidays.

Prison sentence for former Loxton disability worker

A FORMER Riverland support worker was sentenced after being convicted for stealing more than \$9000 from clients at a Loxton residential care facility.

Previous Loxton Orana worker, 38-yearold Jasmine Kyly Hudson, was convicted of 22 counts of aggravated theft, after it was found she used the bank cards of six clients, between September and December 2022, to make unauthorised purchases, including supermarket items, online accommodation bookings, and Uber trips.

The thefts were discovered when a client expressed concerns to her family, leading to an investigation.

Ms Hudson, who had worked at Orana for 10 months, pleaded guilty to the charges. and was handed 11 months and 10 days in jail, with five months backdated to April 29,

2025, when she was remanded in custody for breaching bail conditions.

The remaining six months and 10 days are subject to a two-year good-behaviour bond. Hudson was also ordered to pay full restitution to the victims.

Orana executive manager branding and customer experience Vicki Cotis said "Orana is unable to provide details or make comment on individual cases or specific matters due to confidentiality obligations".

"Orana is firmly committed to upholding the highest standards in safeguarding the safety, privacy, and wellbeing of our clients," she said.

"We maintain a robust quality and safeguarding policy framework that undergoes regular review and updates to reflect best practices and evolving standards. This ongoing commitment to excellence ensures our policies remain current, effective, and aligned with our clients' needs.

"Our dedication to maintaining the highest standards is evidenced through our regular NDIS audits, where we consistently exceed the strict requirements mandated by the National Disability Insurance Scheme.

"These audits demonstrate our commitment to quality service delivery and client protection.

"We take policy compliance seriously across all levels of our organisation and staff members are provided with comprehensive training on our policies and procedures, and there are clear consequences for any team member who fails to adhere to these standards, including our Code of Conduct.

"This accountability framework ensures

consistent application of our protective measures.'

Ms Cotis said Orana remains committed to transparency and continuous improvement, ensuring every client's rights, privacy, and wellbeing are fully protected at all times.

The court heard that the clients had varying disabilities, including intellectual disabilities, autism, and cerebral palsy, with some being non-verbal.

Magistrate Jay Pandya described Ms Hudson's actions as a "betrayal without decency," highlighting the breach of trust placed in her by vulnerable individuals.

In response to the thefts, Orana has implemented changes to its policies to prevent similar incidents in the future.

Glossop's got mail (again)

A RIVERLAND town has regained its post office after almost 12 months without the service.

Since opening KB'z Coffee recently, Kylee Bradford has brought back Glossop's mail service, with the drive-through-café now already home to 300 (and counting) postal boxes.

Open five days a week, from 6am to 2pm, Ms Bradford said the local community support and interest had "been amazing so far".

"I used to own the Glossop BP — which also included the post office — before it was sold again, and then unfortunately closed," Ms Bradford said.

"The feedback has just been brilliant from

the local community, and because I owned the post office previously, I already know a lot of our regulars.

"I loved offering the service to the community before, and I'm so happy I am able to bring the postal service back to Glossop with the drive-through-café as well — I feel just so passionate about both."

Previously operated for seven years by a local couple on a short-term licence, the Glossop post office closed last September when the agreement expired and Australia Post required it be placed up for tender.

Since the closure, residents of Glossop and Winkie areas have had to make the trip into Berri to receive their post.

Though currently operating as a community postal agent, Ms Bradford said immediate demand from locals has her consid-

ering licencing the local post office in the

"Because there hasn't been a service here for a while, I didn't think many people would so quickly be signing up for a Glossop box," she said.

"To not have a post office locally was a huge inconvenience for a lot of people — so there is definitely a call to licence."

Glossop local Harry Huntley said it has been "so much easier" to access his mail since Ms Bradford opened KB'z coffee.

"It's been so great to have (the service) back in Glossop — I can walk to get my mail now," Mr Huntley said.

"Before I was having to run into Berri every couple of days, which was such a pain because I receive parcels regularly.

"It's great what Kylie has done (for the community)."

KB'z Coffee is located on 27 Anderson Terrace, Glossop.

The broadcast is back

A COMMONLY-used phrase may need to be slightly adjusted following the events of the past week, to now state 'hell hath no fury like a regional community about to lose its footy on

Although the risk of Channel 7 being shut off Riverland screens had been made clear weeks prior, it seemed that it was last Tuesday morning, when people waking up and attempting to watch Channel 7 were met with a red screen informing them the programming was no longer available, that the reality of the situation really hit home.

Local radio stations were flooded with calls from perplexed community members, seeking to know which party was responsible, and what actions were being taken to restore the broadcast.

Thursday then came, and with it the deadline of the week's first AFL game. Tensions were high as the possibility countless Riverland households would miss seeing North Melbourne's clash with the Bulldogs became more and more likely.

But, just as the situation was looking its most dire, and with almost little warning ahead of time, those in the decision-making positions on both the Seven and WIN sides were able to come to an agreement, saving the weekend for the many AFL diehards in the Riverland who would be without a smart TV, or a knowledge of how to work the 7Plus streaming app.

It's difficult to know exactly what the deciding factor was in bringing WIN back to the table, however, we saw a number of politicians – including our local Federal and State MPs – loudly voice their criticism on

It seems a high possibility that the potential loss in viewership figures would have ruffled some feathers along the AFL's chain of command as well, resulting in pressure being put on the restore the broadcasts.

However, while the favourable outcome for our community may have been reached this time, the reversal of one decision is hardly going to halt the increasing – almost seemingly inevitable – preference toward streaming television.

Channel 10's ongoing absence from household screens in nearby Mildura is proof that the risk is far from gone at this stage.

While we should be thankful the voices of local politicians and community members helped reach the desired outcomes, these events also show us that in regional communities, even access to free-to-air television can no longer be taken for granted.

That's got to say something about the direction 'modern progress' is heading.



The community spirit of the Loxton township and outlying villages was given a boost when, in 1925, the district's first local newspaper, The Loxton Clarion, was established. For 12 years, the news had been ably reported by The Murray Pioneer, but the advent of a 'local' newspaper made possible a more detailed and well-timed news service for the district. This news plays a role in helping a community grow in its business capacity, and its considerable interests in sport, recreation, local church, agricultural show and picture theatre matters. The Clarion published news specific to localities, under banners such as Taplan Topics, Meribah Matters, Sandalwood Items, and Paruna Paragraphs. In 10-12 un-numbered pages, the Clarion presented an advertisement for a hand-wound record player (gramophone, pictured) with associated text: 'LOXTON is undoubtedly advancing. There are evidences everywhere of its splendid progress, and NEUEN'S up-to-date COMMERCIAL STORES are keeping well abreast of the times. In every department greatest care is taken to supply goods of the RIGHT KIND, at the RIGHT TIME, and at the RIGHT PRICE. GROCERY, DRAPERY, MILLINERY, HARDWARE, BOOTS AND SHOES AND MENSWEAR. Children's frocks a speciality. A recent edition to the stock is the sweet toned MODERNOLD, a musical instrument of the utmost charm and beauty. Ask to hear a few records played next time you visit the stores. Models of various kinds can be procured at a price never before known in the musical market.' PHOTO: PA Magarey

Councils: efficient or over-capitalised?

ONCE again ratepayers are being asked to give feedback on councils' annual business plans with the media promoting discussion by using the flawed rate percentage increase

Percentage increases are subject to the starting figure.

An 8 per cent increase for one council could be a 15 per cent increase in another area.

Councils are bound by the Act to do public consultation, but is it worth the effort for ratepayers to comment?

The following comments and figures are not a criticism of council and without any real in-depth knowledge of council's budget are just what I can glean for clarification.

I've been told, that councils know their figures and have spent hours developing their ABP and I don't have all the

In 2023/24, Berri Barmera Council presented a budget for feedback showing a \$289,000 operating deficit, audited result \$7.539 million deficit.

The 2024/24 ABP presented a \$21,700 surplus which now is a \$4.226 million deficit.

The following are figures from the Berri Barmera Council's Long Term Financial Plan and ABP that will "ensure council has a good opportunity to be economically sustainable with a strong future

I wonder if ratepayers have that assurance for their own finances?

- ☐ Vacant land rates going up by 104.7 per cent.
- ☐ Rates to increase by 48 per cent over the next five years.
- ☐ Operating losses totaling \$17.556 million over the next five years.

cils are showing is difficult to understand and I struggle to get answers on how it works.

The president of the LGA, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross, has said that debt is good for councils as they can afford and build assets now, then have the ratepayers that use them pay them back.

Councils often only build an asset if they receive a government grant, normally 50 per

Am I then paying off half the cost, plus interest, then having the whole amount being deducted from my rates, depreciation, to replace that facility?

The recreation centre in Berri cost nearly \$10 million. I assume rates are being set aside to replace this? The user groups pay council \$1 a year.

Councils build roads, some funding comes from the fuel tax I pay, and they become an asset which council depreciate. Are my rates being set aside to replace that asset at the same time I'm paying fuel tax to replace the roads?

Why do councils have assets that have been built on their land, but entirely paid for by a sporting club, listed as their asset they have to maintain and replace?

It's more than obvious that there are problems with councils. Connie Bonaros MLC has asked for an independent inquiry into the toxic culture plaguing our councils to try to stop harassment and bullying in councils.

The Premier has just stopped the Adelaide City Council having a say on the new golf course presumably because if council had a say it would never get built on time.

Is it time to look at more than annual business plans and figures with councils?

Are councils over capitalised? Are they efficient? Could they amalgamate services? Do their costs reflect normal business practices?

In Berri Barmera Council, 10 staff have cars as part of their salary packages.

Bingo clubs lament lack of support

DO you go to bingo to help raise money for a group, team and organisation?

Do you then support the bingo club in return for the opportunity to raise money?

Here are a few home truths about bingo clubs.

Bingo clubs are run by volunteers who give their time so others can raise money (fund-

Bingo clubs do not get anything out of your bingo event.

Bingo clubs purchase all the tickets, markers (dobbers and pens), some pay rent on the premises, some supply the raffle tickets etc. This all costs money, so they run bingo events for themselves regularly and they need others to attend so that the bingo club can purchase the materials you need to play bingo.

There are regulars who come almost every week to play and support whoever is hosting the

How does bingo work? The tickets are purchased by

the players. The money raised is split, with approximately 50 per cent going to prize money and the other 50 per cent to the group, team or organisation hosting the bingo. Supper and raffles are supplied by the group, team or organisation and they get all the proceeds.

No money goes to the bingo

The group, team or organisation hosting the bingo is asked to support the bingo club and the regulars by having two representatives attend the bingos hosted by the bingo club.

A representative collects the money raised and proceeds to thank the club, regulars and their supporters, and indicate that someone will attend all or some of the bingo for the bingo

At the end of the year bingo clubs give excess money to different groups; they keep enough capital to ensure they can continue the next year.

The reality?

All of the above happens except all the group, team or organisation forget to support the bingo club.

Bingo clubs are struggling and some may soon have to stop because of the lack of support.

The lack of support is an insult to the bingo clubs and the regulars that support you.

Some clubs are considering giving funds to those clubs that support them. In the case of one of the largest bingo clubs they will probably will not give anything away because they have had no support for the past four or five bingos they have hosted for themselves.

Now the question is: Do you want this fundraising avenue to continue or is there an easier, better paying means to support your group, team or organisation?

I doubt that there is an easier way of raising a substantial amount of money for any group, team or organisation.

So, please support your bingo club.

All we ask is for two people from your group, team and organisation to attend the bingo

Up the creek without a paddle

IT seems common sense is being thrown out with the bathwater following the latest NDIS price changes as regional service funding is cut.

But perhaps it is because a bigger plan is at hand at state levels. The problem is we just don't know, because co-design now seems to be as elusive as trying to catch smoke with a fishing net.

The Australian Physiotherapy Association, Dietitians Australia, Australian Podiatry Association, Speech Pathology Australia, Occupational Therapy Australia, the Australian Psychological Society, Exercise & Sports Science Australia and Osteopathy Australia are calling on the Federal Government and the National Disability Insurance Agency to immediately halt and review the NDIS pricing decision, which poses a direct threat to essential supports and choice for people with disability.

Early intervention is crucial for children, and we want them to access this at some level in regional areas so that children can grow, develop, and become

more independent, faster and with greater capacity. Instead of simply cutting funding, let's take the approach of saying, "we are cutting one thing because our plan is to...". That last piece is what is sadly miss-

We are wasting NDIS funds on report writing for the NDIS — reports that, according to their own CEO, are often not even read. At the same time, we are cutting funding for those very services. We are also cutting travel allowances and reducing access to these services, and like many in regional Australia, we are left without a plan.

It's like being sent up the proverbial creek without a paddle.

When participants are not living in cities or major residential areas, their funding is wasted and used up quickly because the hours available to fund allied health and other services are disproportionately absorbed by travel costs rather than direct service delivery.

We don't fund regional disability services to operate remotely, so children and adults living with disability experience significant inequity just to receive any type of support or service — and now our federal agency has cut that funding even further.

The reason we fight so hard for allied health and capacitybuilding services in rural areas is that these services foster independence and lasting change in a person's life. This

has the potential to reduce longterm reliance on services in the future.

What I hope from the recent announcement is that this will act as a precursor to the State system announcing proper service planning for foundational supports instead.

We have seen discussions about bringing NDIS fees for allied health services in line with other settings, but what people don't seem to understand is that, in other settings, health services have the capacity to charge gap fees on top of what Medicare funds. This isn't possible right now for NDISfunded professionals.

Our allied health staff are at breaking point. There are major wait times and a lack of capacity across health services. The NDIS is requiring reports from these professionals as evidence to fund, and more recently, to defend people from using removed from the NDIS.

My fear is that we are setting up a health system — already beyond capacity - for a huge fall, and not co-ordinating a good system or response, so it is on the verge of collapse.

We must connect the dots and co-ordinate between departments, state and federal, and devise a solution that is costeffective because it is efficient and flexible. Proactive policy results in long-term cost savings.


"Paige had great comedic timing and Isaac had emotional sensitivity — they were a great duo moving the show through the ocean.

THE Renmark RSL Sub Branch has welcomed local man Peter Amos as its new military advocate, bringing essential support services back to the region's veterans and their families.

Peter Amos, a longtime RSL member of over 20 years, will now assist both current and former serving military personnel, as well as partners and widows, to access Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) entitlements and services.

"The RSL had been without one here for 12 vears, due to the DVA changing the legislation," Peter Amos said.

"Everyone who's got a Department of Veterans' Affairs card can access RSL services.

"That card is also hand-

ed down to the widow if eligible, continuing their entitlement to our support."

Now based at the Renmark RSL, Peter Amos offers a free service available to all veterans and their families, regardless of RSL membership sta-

Advocates help veterans and their families navigate the complex DVA claims system, including areas such as compensation, mental health, medical and injury assistance, and household support.

"Compensation is provided if they've been injured while in service, it's an entitlement, and they can access it as long as they're eligible," Peter Amos said.

'There's a lot more there that people don't even know about.

Peter Amos was inspired to take on the role after assisting a close friend with paperwork during a cancer diagnosis.

"He asked me to do all the paperwork," he said.

'There was a lot of it, and since everything is going online now, a lot of veterans don't want to use a computer, or don't know how. That's something I can help them with."

Peter Amos emphasised the RSL's mission extends beyond advocacy to include commemoration, education, and mateship. "The advocate connects people to the RSL mission and its services," he said.

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Jenny's meeting to discuss council rates

'ATTEND the council meeting, then come to mine'.

That's the message from a Riverland-based 2025 Federal Election candidate ahead of next week's Renmark Paringa Council public consultation session on its 2025/26 budget.

The council is asking for public feedback on its Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget, which includes a "\$29.3 million investment in essential services and

infrastructure", plus an average rate rise of 11.25 per cent – reaping an extra \$2.29 million from ratepayers.

To receive community feedback on the plan, the council is staging a public meeting at the Renmark Club next Thursday, July 17, from 5pm to 7pm.

Renmark woman Jenny Troeth, who contested the seat of Barker for One Nation in May, said she was "unhappy" with the planned rate rise and was planning her own public meeting in response.

"But I really encourage people to head along to the council's event first, to listen to what the council representatives have to say, and how they justify this rate rise," Mrs Troeth said.

Mrs Troeth said she was concerned about the possible impact of increased rates on locals already struggling from the cost-of-living and housing crises.

"This rise will hit residents, businesses and landlords, but also people who rent," she said.

"Because rate rises will need to be passed on.

"I think it's time for the council to tighten its belt, like everybody else has been forced to do. You can't just cry poor, then keep spending like you have always done."

Mrs Troeth – who finished third on first-preference votes at the

2025 election, securing a 1.6 per cent swing for her party – founded the Renmark Paringa Houseboat Collective, aimed at lobbying council around issues affecting local houseboat owners. She said the group would be rebadged to include ratepayers.

Mrs Troeth's own "public forum" on council matters will be held at the Renmark Club on Sunday, July 20, from 2pm to 3.30pm.

Regional news is the canary in the coal mine

I STEP up as president of Country Press Australia (CPA), ostensibly to represent the best interests of independent regional newspaper publishers. But the responsibility is far greater than that.

The future of regional news publishing is inextricably linked to whether regional communities will continue to have a say in shaping the future of regional Australia.

In fact, regional newspapers are the metaphorical canary in the coal mine – their health signals the health of the voice of the communities they serve.

And both are under threat. The toxic combination of ever-expanding corporations and surging city populations dominating our politics is reducing regional communities to branch office status, with their futures determined

by powerful elites in our CBDs.

With every small business that's bought out and 'rolled up' into a corporate machine – or shut down to make way for a big-box competitor – a local business owner is replaced by a corporate manager. The profits are siphoned off in the first electronic transfer back to the city, and a small part of the soul of our communities dies

As our capital cities grow, the weight of our democracy and decision-making drifts further away from the regions – away from where much of our nation's wealth is generated, by the way.

Even local government is losing its voice.

Many locally elected councillors now fear speaking out on behalf of their communities, worried they'll be reported by bureaucratic staff to increasingly powerful, city-based governance bodies. When this happens, our democracy is weakened.

Regional news publishers are among the last lines of defence against these forces.

At our best, we rally and amplify the collective voice of our communities. We stand up to power and fight for a fair go

for a fair go.

There's a saying that the squeaky wheel gets the grease – but in regional Australia, it's mostly the silent, hard-working wheels

that keep the whole country moving.

That's why regional newspapers promote local communities and give those doing the heavy lifting a voice

We unapologetically champion independent regional businesses – the ones who make, grow, and fix things. The ones who only sell what they believe in and are proud of.

We're also here for the bush cops and single-teacher schools, the nurses and doctors who are always on duty, and the junior sports coaches who drive the bus three hours each way so kids can get a game on the weekend.

We're up for the fight. But it's getting harder.

A decade ago, regional newspapers were thriving. Classifieds, display ads, and community notices funded large local newsrooms filled with trained journalists.

But the landscape has changed.

When news went online – and we're online too – global tech giants like Facebook quickly came to dominate the advertising market, using their monopolistic power to take an overwhelming share of digital ad revenue.

Yet these platforms don't produce news.

They don't employ journalists.

And they certainly don't hire anyone in regional communities where they glean enormous profits from the attention of local people, while contributing nothing

back to local newsrooms or communities.

In fact, they profit from our content, created by local journalists, without paying fairly for it – undermining the very business model that sustains local news.

And big box retail corporations making huge profits from our regional communities are now choosing to advertise with these global tech giants, not with local publishers.

Like frogs in warming water, too many Australians are unaware of the growing danger of letting corporatism control our communities – and the new media platforms and AI systems that (mis) inform them.

My top priority as president of CPA is to fight for the publishers who, in turn, are fighting for their communities.

We'll be wearing out the boot leather lobbying governments to protect our people from exploitation by tech platforms that profit from harmful content and put our children and democracy at

We'll push back against bureaucracy that strips power from local leaders.

We'll shine a light on the creeping reach of corporatism.

We're proud to take on these battles.

All we ask in return is that you keep buying your local paper — or subscribe online — and support the local businesses that advertise with us.

Is the Riverland ready for new e-scooter regulations?

A RIVERLAND politician has warned the State Government about a lack of road infrastructure for the new e-scooter regulations in South Australia, which come into effect from Sunday.

Residents aged 16 and over will be allowed to use e-scooters, e-skateboards and e-solo-wheels on footpaths, bike paths, and many roads across the Riverland, provided they meet regulated safety standards.

The new laws bring the region in line with other parts of South Australia, following successful e-scooter trials and consultations with road safety experts.

While the new rules open up personal mobility in the Riverland, Chaffe MP Tim Whetstone said regional areas face unique challenges that must be considered by the State Government.

"While I fully support the need for sustainable transport options, the use of e-scooters in regional areas can be limited," Mr Whetstone said.

"Unlike Adelaide, our region has fewer and narrower footpaths, unsealed roads, no designated bike lanes, and limited enforcement resources.

"We need to consider older residents and people living with disabilities who rely on safe pedestrian spaces.

"It's vital that the State Government's public education campaign is highly visible in regional South Australia, not just Adelaide. Additionally, the 12-month review must include real consultation with

regional communities.

"Our regional towns deserve well thought-out, tailored solutions rather than a one-size-fits-all approach."

Riverland councils will also play a role in managing parking and storage of shared e-scooters, should commercial operators expand their services to the region in future.

As with bicycles, riders must wear a helmet and use a flashing light when riding at night or in poor visibility. No licence or registration is required, but strict speed and safety rules will apply.

On local footpaths and shared-use trails, such as those along the Murray River or through Renmark's riverfront precinct, riders must keep speeds below 10km/h.

E-scooters will be allowed on roads with a speed limit of 60km/h, but only in bike lanes and at no more than 25km/h. Other devices must stick to roads with a 50km/h limit or less.

Riders are banned from using handheld mobile phones, carrying passengers, or riding under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Mounted phones for GPS are permitted on devices with handlebars.

Penalties, including fines and potential demerit points, will apply to those caught breaking the rules.

A public awareness campaign will roll out in the coming weeks to ensure all South Australians understand their responsibilities. The government plans to review the regulations in July 2026 to ensure the system remains safe and practical for all road users

Rural mental health grants on offer

FOUNDATION for Rural Regional Renewal's (FRRR)) In a Good Place (IAGP) program is inviting Riverland community groups and not-for-profits (NFPs) to apply for grants of up to \$20,000 for projects that support the mental health and wellbeing of farmers, farming communities, and people living in regional areas.

The IAGP program has \$240,000 in funding available in this round.

The grants can support community-led initiatives that improve mental health education to increase knowledge and reduce stigma, build community connections to lessen isolation and increase wellbeing, and assist local non-clinical services.

FRRR head of granting Jill Karena said that though "country people are resilient, that doesn't mean they don't need support".

"Resilience is about

using what you have in your toolbox to tackle a challenge, it doesn't mean you have to battle things on your own," Ms Karena said.

"These grants are for local organisations to help their community build up the knowledge, skills and networks to support their mental health and wellbeing, and to make sure locals know they don't need to go it alone.

"Community groups and NFPs are on the ground, speaking with local people, so they are best placed to understand the kind of pressures that the community is dealing with and what kind of support is needed.

"This might be through a mental health first aid course, hosting a community event to help locals feel connected and less isolated, inviting a guest speaker to share their mental health journey, or providing locals with a safe space to speak up about their own mental

health."

Community groups, and NFPs can apply for grants through two streams of funding:

- ☐ Community wellbeing:
 for projects that focus on
 strengthening the general mental health and
 wellbeing of people in
 remote, rural and regional communities.
- ☐ Farmers and farming communities: for projects specifically supporting the mental health and wellbeing of farmers and the communities they live in.

"The National Farmers Federation's 2023 National Farmer Wellbeing Report reinforced why it's so important to offer funding to local NFPs in farming regions and offering the second stream of funding," Ms Karena said.

"We've been inspired by the passion and dedication for the wellbeing of farmers and their towns."

Member for Barker, TONY PASIN, has provided the following opinion piece on WIN TV reversing its decision to cut NETWORK SEVEN programming to the Riverland and South-East regions...

It's a WIN for common-sense

If you had told me in 2013, when I was first elected to the Federal Parliament, that as the member for Barker I would one day be called upon to fight for the right of my constituents to watch Home and Away, I might have laughed and asked you what you had been smoking.

But that is exactly what I was required to do over the last fortnight. Not Home and Away specifically but Channel Seven programming more generally including of course AFL football broadcasts.

Thankfully as a result of immense community pressure, including more than 2500 people signing my petition, Channel 7 and WIN TV have now come to an agreement meaning that WIN has returned to broadcasting the full suite of Channel 7 programs.

Let's be clear: It should never have come to this

I am livid that communities across the Limestone Coast and the Riverland were used as pawns in a commercial negotiation and I have made my disappointment clear to the chief executive officers of both organisations

As I made clear during the course of this dispute, the actions of WIN and Seven were not just unconscionable they were unlawful.

WIN is required to meet certain obligations under the Commercial Broadcasting Licence issue to it pursuant to the Broadcasting Services Act 1992 and Seven is contractually obligated under agreement with the AFL and Cricket Australia to name just two.

Both parties in my assessment were in breach and it was these breaches that provided the leverage the community needed to ensure this matter was resolved expeditiously.

However, it occurred whether it was my correspondence to the Australian Communications and Media Authority calling on that Authority to cancel WIN's broadcasting licence, my engagement with the AFL and Cricket Australia calling on them to force Seven to meet their contractual obligations, the countless discussions with the CEO's of WIN and Seven, or the upwelling of community sentiment as evidenced by the petition, the good news is Channel 7 programs have been switched back on.

Ultimately a win is a win, and as a community we should be so proud of how we pulled together and achieved an outcome that many thought impossible or at least improbable.

Reluctant reader becomes **local leader: Katrina's 35** years at the Waikerie Library

After eight years of fulltime work, she transitioned to part-time following the birth of her children and was able to take on extra roles across the Waikerie and Loxton offices, the Loxton Library, and the Waikerie

In 2017, she stepped into a leadership role as the District Council of Loxton Waikerie's Waikerie library information co-ordinator.

Her responsibilities expanded further in 2019 to include the Visitor Information Centre, and again in 2023 when she took on the council's customer service, at Waikerie.

Loxton Hub connects researchers, industry, and community to address water-related challenges

ONE Basin Cooperative Research Centre's (CRC) Loxton Hub is playing a key role in fostering collaboration to solve key water challenges in the Murray-Darling Basin (Basin).

One Basin CRC is a research-based, industry-led partnership established with the vision to support Australia's irrigation regions to become the most productive, resilient, and sustainable in the world.

CEO, Professor Mike Stewardson, said our 85 partners are working together across the CRC to build capability to develop real-world solutions for problems the Basin is facing now, and into the future".

The Loxton Hub, located in the Department of Primary Industries and Regions' Loxton Research Centre, facilitates regional industries, businesses, First Nations communities, and government to work with researchers from Australia's leading universities to ensure solutions are fit-for-purpose, and directly relevant to the region.

The Hub acts as a home base for PhD and Post-Doc researchers recruited to the region, as well as facilitating the Regional Advisory Committee (RAC). The RAC is comprised of CRC-appointed representatives who provide local insights

and expertise on water, the regional industry needs, and the associated issues and impacts, to guide CRC work in the region.

"The Regional Advisory Committee has led the development of a Strategic Plan centred around local priorities that require a research-based solution,", One Basin CRC Loxton Hub manager Kym Walton said.

"Located in one of South Australia's most productive and ecologically diverse regions, harnessing local knowledge is key to achieving impact when directing innovation in agriculture and climate adaptation."

Loxton Hub has several projects underway, covering a range of challenges including projects that investigate groundwater as an alternative water source to the Murray River through water banking and sourcing and treating brackish groundwater. Through the hubs, local communities will learn how to apply One Basin CRC research outputs to manage, prepare for and adapt to changing climates and market conditions.

as Filipinos, though we live in Australia we are able to remember our freedom, and be patriotic for our country."


Attending the event, Berri Barmera Mayor Ella Winnall said "the Filipino community were a vibrant and valued part of the region".

Property owners face homelessness

THE owners of a Mount Mary property, who were told by Mid Murray Council they were breaking the law by living on their vacant land in a motorhome and bus, have left the area in frustration.

Jason King and a female friend, who wished to remain unnamed, purchased the property in an area zoned rural residential, south west of Morgan, in April.

Mr King was living in a bus on the property and his friend was living in her motorhome, and both vehicles were reg-

He said they had planned to put a transportable home on their land in the future.

But Mr King said he was shocked when two council employees came to their property and told him they were living on their property illegally, and they could be fined up to \$120,000 if they did not leave by June 11.

He says the council staff failed to identify themselves properly.

Mr King said he felt intimidated by the two council staff in the way they approached him, and the way the male staff member spoke to him, while "waving a chart", at him with details about regulations.

Mr King said he suffers from posttraumatic stress.

Mid Murray Council said its staff have spoken with Mr King to discuss his concerns regarding alleged staff intimidation.

"The matter was investigated, and the staff members involved were spoken to as part of that process," a council spokesperson said.

"Council is satisfied that staff acted appropriately in dealing with the matter.

"Mr King was advised that if he was not satisfied with this outcome, he is encouraged to lodge a formal complaint with the Ombudsman."

Mr King believes he and his friend have a right to live on the property in their registered bus and motorhome.

He has a portable toilet and was disposing of the sewerage waste at the dump, at Morgan, which he said has facilities for this.

A Mid Murray Council spokesperson said this posed "a health risk to the occupants and the environment due to untreated wastewater being run on the ground and no shower/washing facilities"

Mr King said he was using the greywater to develop some lawn, which was helping improve the look of the property.

'We were doing everything right, we use all organic stuff for the greywater anyway, which is only for the shower," he said.

"My bus is nothing fancy, it is just a Toyota Coaster bus.

"I live on the pension, I don't have a lot of money, but I live comfortably, it isn't that warm at night, but it keeps a roof over my head."

Mr King said he believed under Commonwealth Law he and his friend were entitled to live on the property they owned outright.

But he said he was without the financial ability to challenge state legislation, and he was told by the Ombudsman state laws superseded Commonwealth Law.

"Australia does not have a bill of rights and even though I am entitled under the Australian constitution to live peacefully without threat upon my land, state law has tried to overwrite our constitution," Mr King said.

Mr King and his friend left their property in Mount Mary about a fortnight ago, and are planning to sell the land in two years.

Lack of compliant wastewater system posed a health risk says council

MID Murray Council said it was concerned for the health and safety of two landowners who were living on their Mount Mary property with no approved wastewater system in

place. Jason King and a female friend lived for about three months in a bus and a motorhome on the property they bought in April.

They vacated their land in late June after being told that local government legislation prevented them from living in these vehicles on the property.

was a contravention of both the Local Government Act 1999 (the Act) and the Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016 (the PDI Act).

A council spokesperson said council has the powers to order a person to cease using a caravan or vehicle, as a place of human habitation where there is a risk to the health or safety of the occupants, or where it detracts significantly from the amenity of the

"In this instance, without hav-Mid Murray Council said this ing an approved wastewater system in place, there is a health risk to the occupants and the environment due to untreated wastewater being run on the ground and no shower/ washing facilities," the council spokesperson said.

"Additionally, as it is vacant land, it is a change of land use without Development Approval in accordance with PDI Act.

Mid Murray Council said human habitation of vehicles on vacant land was an exclusion from the definition of development under the legislation, as there was no approved dwelling situated on the land, and no approved wastewater system installed.

"Habitation of any caravan, motorhome, or similar would be considered as a residential land use under the Planning and Design Code," the council spokesperson

"A motorhome or caravan would not meet the legislation due to engineering and design require-

The Mid Murray Council spokesperson said non-compliance with the Section 213 notice could result in a \$750 expiation notice being issued or council initiating enforcement action, however this would be considered as part of the ongoing discussions with the property owner.

Mr King and his female friend were given until June 11 to vacate the property.

The spokesperson said that if they were still using the land for human habitation in the vehicles after this date, they would be in breach of the notice and subject to enforcement action.

ACRRM president Rod Martin said the diversity of the rural generalist role is what makes it one of the most "rewarding and urgently needed" medical careers in the country.

"Every day is different, one day you're providing emergency care, the next you're supporting mental health or delivering long-term care to a family you've known for years," Dr Martin said.

"Rural generalists do more than general practice - and that's exactly what rural, remote, and First Nations communities need."

As Australia faces critical rural workforce shortages, Dr Martin says training more Rural Generalists is essential to maintaining access to care.

"There are towns where a single well-

trained doctor can mean the difference between no healthcare and a fully functioning clinic or hospital," Dr Martin said.

"We need doctors who are adaptable, capable, and committed, and that's who the ACRRM rural generalist Fellowship program is designed to support."

The ACRRM Fellowship is the only national training program built specifically for doctors who want to practise medicine in rural, remote, and First Nations communities across australia.

Registrars train in rural and remote locations and are equipped with the broad skills required to meet complex and varied community needs.

The program includes advanced training in emergency care, obstetrics, anaesthetics, Indigenous health, and mental health, and is underpinned by strong mentorship and regional support networks.

Dr Martin said the program is ideal for doctors seeking a career that challenges them professionally while allowing them to make a meaningful difference.





Mrs Yandell expressed her pride


in the students and alumni, saying "it was an incredible experience for our students to engage with mentors who were once in their shoes".

Local leader joins National Changemaker Gathering

RIVERLAND changemaker Mandy Tennant has returned from Cairns after taking part in the Australian Rural Leadership Foundation's (ARLF) first National Changemaker Gathering, bringing home renewed clarity, strengthened confidence, and deeper purpose in her leadership work across the Murraylands and Riverland.

Held over three days, the gathering brought together 50 community leaders from across rural, regional and remote Australia. It marked the culmination of a nationwide series of Changemaker Workshops, supported by the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund, and was designed to build resilient, connected leadership in the face of ongoing regional challenges.

Representing Regional Development Australia Murraylands and Riverland (RDAMR), Ms Tennant described the gathering as "transformative" and a powerful reminder of the importance of storytelling in leadership.

"We were reminded that as changemakers, we are not just problem solvers - we are bringers, receivers and holders of stories," she said.

"Listening deeply to the experiences of others across the country reminded me that change often begins in quiet conversations - not in policy, but in people.'

As a key driver of the Regional Leadership Development Program (RLDP), a program delivered by RDAMR and fund-

ed through the Department of Primary Industries and Regions, Ms Tennant said the gathering reaffirmed the impact of local leadership initiatives already underway in the region.

"It deepened my belief in what we're building through the RLDP, we're giving participants the confidence and tools to create disruption where it's needed, and to lead change with courage in their own communities,' she said.

Participants at the gathering were encouraged to consider how best to influence change at the system level that makes the most sense for their context, a concept Ms Tennant said will continue to shape her leadership and regional development

"It's not always about taking on the whole mountain, sometimes the most effective change happens by influencing the system you're already in and supporting others to lead alongside you," she said.

Ms Tennant also highlighted the role of Tanya Lehmann, of Aurora Meliora, one of the gathering's facilitators, who brought insight, warmth, and inspiration to the group.

"Tanya's ability to hold space and guide us through both personal reflection and collective exploration was truly powerful," she said.

"Her presence and approach helped us go deeper and connect more honestly with ourselves and each other."

The event also provided a rare opportunity for shared learning and support among changemakers, with leaders from vastly different communities coming together to explore how to navigate complexity, build resilience, and stand with one another through adversity.

"It was inspiring to be in a room of people who are walking similar paths, juggling community leadership, work, volunteering, and caring deeply about their places," Ms Tennant said.

"I came home reminded that leadership is not a title, it's a practice. It's showing up, staying curious, and making space for others."

The Australian Rural Leadership Foundation has delivered more than 80 Changemaker Workshops across Australia, engaging over 2000 regional leaders (150 being from the Murraylands and Riverland Region). The National Changemaker Gathering is the next step in strengthening a national movement of community-led resilience, connection, and leadership.

Humanities teacher, and cancer survivor, Kardinia Caputo hosted a Biggest Morning Tea for Renmark High School staff last month, with the mid-morning feast a supportive celebration raising \$766.55 for a cause close to her heart.

"Raising money (for the Cancer Council SA) is something I am really passionate about and special to me," she

"I am so lucky to be part of a community and work for a school that is so supportive of this cause."

A born-and-raised Riverlander and a Renmark High School alumna, Ms Caputo was diagnosed with osteosarcoma — a bone cancer — when she was 10 years old.

"It started as a limp, before developing as a mass on my right knee cap," she

"Everyone thought it was just a sports injury.

"However, one night I woke-up screaming in pain... over the course of a weekend I was diagnosed, and then began chemotherapy the following Monday."

Undertaking 40 weeks of chemotherapy before returning home, throughout her senior year at Renmark High, Ms Caputo said her education was disrupted with acquiring a prosthetic.

"As a young person, I was in a complete place of denial and very scared," she said.

"I was also sporadically taken out of school, particularly during the last two years — a period of time where my focus should be entirely on my study.

"However, I was blessed with educators that moved mountains for me."

Supported by teachers to excel no matter the situation, Ms Caputo said her experience as a teenager shaped her future and has come "full circle" since returning as a teacher to Renmark High in 2022.

"Whenever I was out of school, teachers would modify my assessments for me, contact me through platforms like zoom, and film and post lessons so I could watch them from anywhere,' she said.

"This was hours and hours of extra work they did not need to do, but they did because they wanted me to reach my full potential.

"I always knew I wanted to be a teacher, but this experience shaped and fostered my mentality going into university, and everyday doing this job.

"I know how a dedicated educator can be life-changing and now I always try to be that for my students. Now I am back in the same four walls, but just on the other side of the desk — it's amaz-

ing.
"Renmark High is so focused on community, a

South Australian youngsters to access preschool in 2026

RIVERLAND long day care services will be among those partnering with the State Government to deliver threeyear-old preschool from next year, as part of the first stage of the landmark early childhood

The services, located across metropolitan, regional, and rural South Australia, will be joined by 45 government preschools in regional and remote communities, along with three government metro demonstration sites.

This will support more than 6000 three year olds to access a teacher-led, play-based learning program in the first year of the rollout alone.

Research has shown that two years of quality preschool supports children to ensure they are ready to learn on their first day of school.

Long day care services partnering in 2026 have been prioritised based on their quality, including their National Quality standards rating and ability to deliver a teacher-led program, and their location, to ensure a broad geographic spread, with a focus on reaching communities where children are likely to benefit most from access to threeyear-old preschool programs in the early years of the rollout.

In the 2025-26 State Budget, the State Government is delivering a further \$27.7m investment to accelerate the rollout of threeyear-old preschool in a long day

The funding will provide over 2000 additional places from 2026 and bring forward the long day care rollout by 12 months.

The rollout will expand each year, with additional services joining annually until universal access is achieved by 2032.

The standard offering for three-year-old preschool will be for 15 hours per week, or up to 600 hours per year.

Families can now visit (www. flyingstart.sa.gov.au) to learn more about the rollout of threeyear-old preschool, explore partnering services in their community, and check when their child will be eligible to participate.

"Three-year-old preschool sets children up with the skills and confidence they need to ensure they are ready to learn as soon as they head to school,' Premier Peter Malinauskas said.

"There is no bigger reform in improving the long-term trajectory of our state, socially and economically.

"This is a reform grounded in research and follows the recommendations provided by the Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care - led by former Prime Minister

"We know that two years of quality preschool are better than one, particularly for those children in disadvantaged and low socio-economic areas.

"We have been unapologetic in our ambitious goal to reduce the rate of South Australian children entering school developmentally vulnerable.'

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said "the very first recommendation of the Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care was to reduce the rate of South Australian children entering school developmentally vulnerable from 23.8 per cent to 15 per cent within 20 years – well below the national average of 22 per cent".

"Three-year-old preschool is the most effective way, we as a state, can achieve that ambitious goal. These outcomes will be significant for decades to come," he said.

"The response from providers has been overwhelmingly positive, with hundreds of services stepping forward to express their interest in partnering with us to deliver quality threeyear-old preschool to South Australia's children.

"Today's announcement reflects the sector's commitment to quality early childhood education and their readiness to deliver for children and fami-

New AEDC data reinforces urgent need to invest in community playgroups

PLAYGROUP SA is calling for State Government support to strengthen early childhood development outcomes across the Riverland, with recent data suggesting many South Australian children continue to start school developmentally vulnerable.

After the release of the 2024 Australian Early Development Census (AEDC), Playgroup SA is calling for urgent investment in playgroup infrastructure to ensure families have access to critical support during the first 1000 days of a child's life.

Recent research from the University of South Australia, commissioned by Playgroup Australia, found that children who attend playgroups are 40 per cent more likely to be developmentally on track by the time they start school.

When combined with preschool attendance, this increases to 70 percent a stronger impact than long day care

Children who are developmentally vulnerable are at high risk of falling further behind in their schooling with reduced outcomes throughout their education.

Despite the strength of this evidence, Playgroup SA currently receives no state government funding for the co-ordination or delivery of community or supported playgroups across South Australia.

Existing investment is limited to developmental checks delivered through the Ready Set Progress initiative, without broader support for local infrastructure, facilitation, or outreach.

"Playgroups are one of the most effective, low-cost ways to support child development, strengthen parenting confidence, and build social capital," Playgroup SA CEO Craig Bradbrook said.

"Without investment in the co-ordination and sustainability of the playgroup network, South Australia risks missing a proven, community-based solution to reduce developmental vulnerability."

As the Federal and State Governments renegotiate national funding agreements and access to the NDIS narrows, fewer families are able to access timely foundational supports.

In this context, playgroups provide a universal, low-barrier platform for early help - linking families to information, services, and peer connection.

Playgroup SA is calling on the South Australian Government to:

- ☐ Recognise playgroups as essential infrastructure in the early years sys-
- ☐ Invest in state-wide co-ordination and backbone support for community playgroups.
- ☐ Embed playgroups in early years strategies aimed at reducing developmental vulnerability.

"The AEDC data tells us where the gaps are," Mr Bradbrook said.

"Playgroups are part of the answer. They are where development, connection, and community begin."



Short stays for carers and those living with dementia

AN initiative promoting increased wellbeing for those living with dementia is set to run in the Riverland.

Even as a teenager, Resthaven project officer Sarah Stamoulis felt a pull to support older people living with dementia.

At 14, she was a volunteer of Resthaven Mitcham and after school she would provide company and assistance to residents who were living in the dementia-specific area. Fast forward to today, and Sarah has completed her Bachelor of Dementia Care and is jointly leading Resthaven's Staying at Home in Regional South Australia (SAHRSA) Program, alongside fellow project officer Stephanie Karagiannis.

Similarly, Ms Karagiannis also has experience volunteering, with Baptist Care, and has completed her Master of Social Work study. Together, they promote, organise and implement Resthaven's SAHRSA retreats – a chance for people living with dementia and their caregivers to enjoy a few days of respite, while also embracing wellbeing and education. The retreats are usually three days and two nights, and are person-centred and goal specific to suit the individual circumstances of each participant.

Over the course of the retreat, the person living with dementia has access to tailored, fun, meaningful, and individualised support from dedicated Resthaven engagement staff, while caregivers receive education sessions on dementia-related topics.

"The retreats are really aimed at supporting carers to enable them to keep their loved one at home for as long as possible," Ms Stamoulis said.

"Getting that support early and knowing what is available is the most useful thing in preventing carer stress and burn-out.

"We often hear from people that they can 'cope on my own'. However, rather than waiting until the last possible moment to seek support, it is always more beneficial to know what help is available before it is needed."

Ms Karagiannis said the retreats offer carers information through a variety of providers, including Carers SA and Dementia

"But, the bigger benefit, which we see time and again, is the connections people make with each other," Ms Karagiannis said.

"It's carers finding support from other car-

as well as people living with dementia finding people who accept and understand what they are going through also."

Previous groups of retreat guests have continued to catch up long after the gathering

"It's a safe space for people to talk openly," Ms Karagiannis said.

"What we hear from people is that often, because they are with 'strangers', they feel able to open up about how they are truly feeling, without judgement or the weight of responsibility which might come from people closer to them."

Along with Ms Stamoulis and Ms Karagiannis, a team of Resthaven staff attend the retreats to engage with the person living with dementia, and ensure everything runs

"Staff stay onsite for the entire retreat, so it's also an opportunity for Resthaven staff to work in different areas of care and support," Ms Stamoulis said.

"We have met so many special people on these retreats. At the end of the three days, we feel like we've known each other for ages such connections are made."

Retreat clients are supported over a sixmonth period that includes the retreat and a follow-up consultation. There is no need to be a Resthaven client, and there is no need to be under My Aged Care.

"The retreats are an excellent way to promote different services available to carers," Ms Stamoulis said.

"It also helps carers to see that their selfcare is important too. Yes, the health and wellbeing of the person living with dementia is important, but it is not more important than the health and wellbeing of the carer.

"It should be equal."

The Staying at Home in Regional South Australia program is fully-funded by the Australian Government. An upcoming retreat will be held in the Riverland from July 15 to

Three-year high of trainee doctors in regional workforce as model expands

THE number of doctors undertaking GP training in regional areas of South Australia, such as the Riverland, is at a three-year high and will be supported by the major expansion of a new employment model.

A total of 196 second, third, and fourth-year registrars are undertaking their general practice and rural generalist training with SA Health and private employers in regional SA this year.

This compares with 123 in 2023. This is in addition to 41 regional interns (firstyear trainees) employed by Local Health Networks (LHNs) this year as part of a record state-wide intake.

This is a 242 per cent increase since 2020, when there were just 12 regional interns between only two

Regional GPs and generalists play a vital role in the regional health system, providing not only primary care, aged care, emergency care and acute care in rural hospitals.

To attract and support trainee GPs, this year the Federal and State Governments are supporting them further by expanding the Single Employer Model (SEM), which provides certainty around where they work, their income and employment conditions like work hours, on-call obligations and leave entitlements.

It also provides patients with more consistent access to primary care.

A trial of SEM run by the Riverland Academy of Clinical Excellence in the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) has operated since 2023, with up to 20 generalist trainees at a time. It has received positive feedback from general practices and trainee GPs.

A new four-year trial of SEM is underway at all regional Local Health Networks and will be able to support up to 60 GP and rural generalist trainees.

So far, 57 GP practices have been approved to take part in the new SEM trial across the five regional LHNs, with 11 trainee doctors having joined the trial this year and another two due to join by the end of August.

It is hoped the expansion to other areas in the state will result in more trainees remaining in regional areas, leading to better medical support for those communities, and improved patient

Doctors completing their GP training usually must change private employers for each required training placement, which affects their leave entitlements and other conditions that can't be transferred from one employer to the other.

The SEM allows them to be employed by SA Health for up to four years as they finish their rural generalist and general practice training, moving between private and public placements as needed.

"The Single Employer Model will help to address one of the biggest health workforce issues in regional and remote areas recruiting and retain-ing doctors," Minister for ing doctors, Health and Wellbeing Mark Butler said.

'We have seen how successful the Single Employer Model has been in the



Riverland for the past two years, increasing the medical workforce by more than 25 per cent in the region.

Bringing in more doctors to regional South Australia continues our recruiting drive to boost the state's health system, where we have hired nearly 2800 extra health workers since 2022.

Federal Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler said "the extension of the Riverland Single Employer Model is a positive step towards addressing the workforce challenges facing rural and remote communities in South Australia"

"By allowing registrars to remain within the SA Health system throughout their training, they have the opportunity to not only gain valuable experience, but also establish long-term connections with the communities they serve," Mr Butler said.

"This model is a win-win for registrars and rural and remote communities, ultimately ensuring a more sustainable, committed rural healthcare workforce."

Applications are now open for next year's intake of SEM trial participants.

Watch out for house fire dangers during winter

A MAJOR insurance company has warned Riverland homeowners to avoid the risks of heating devices sparking a fire.

Insurer AAMI has urged homeowners to be vigilant about the dangers of house fires and the use of heating devices during the upcoming school holidays, with more than 250 fire-related claims received so far in 2025.

The leading cause of house fires for the insurer includes lithium-ion batteries in e-scooters and e-bikes, heating appliances, and faulty power outlets.

AAMI's head of assessing and supply chain Steven Hussey warned of the link between school holidays and house fires.

"Throughout the year, we've seen school holidays spark a higher-than-normal number of claims for house fires, but winter will bring its own unique challenges," Mr Hussey said.

"We usually see a concerning rise in house fires caused by electrical appliances being placed in dangerous locations - think about a heater too close to curtains, or worn-out electric blankets being used. Even something as simple as leaving your heater on when you've just ducked out to the shops can cause a spark.

"With winter keeping people inside, we don't want to see this danger continue, especially as people depend more on their electricals appliances to keep warm."

Recommendations surrounding heating devices include:

- ☐ Inspect heating appliances for damaged plugs, frayed cords, or signs of overheating. It is recommended to have appliances tested and tagged by a qualified electrician to ensure they are in working order.
- ☐ Keep appliances 1m away from anything flammable, such as curtains, furniture, bedding, or drying laundry.
- ☐ Avoid overloading power outlets by only plugging one heat-producing appliance into a single power outlet at a time. Overloading can cause circuits to overheat and spark fires.
- ☐ Test smoke alarms monthly to ensure they are working correctly, have fresh batteries, and are located on every level of your home, including bedrooms and hallways.
- ☐ Check electric blankets for scorch marks, frayed cords, or damaged elements before use.
- Only use manufacturer or recommended charging cables for all electrical appliances including phones, especially e-scooters and e-bikes.

FIELKE FAMILY HISTORY: This water-filled pipe, so the story goes, came into the Fielke family way back in the mid-1850s in Prussia, or maybe even earlier. The inscription on the back of the framed pipe shows that its custodians over the now-five generations of Fielke family include Gottlieb Fielke, who held the pipe from 1856 to 1867. The Fielke family came to Australia during this time and settled on a farm at Dutton, SA. The pipe was then passed onto his son, August Fielke, in 1867, who then handed it on to his second son Otto Fielke, the third-generation Fielke in Australia, who was custodian of the pipe from 1941, until his death in 1977. Otto only had two daughters, so the pipe was passed on to second daughter Margaret Ames, in 1977. However Margaret did not have any children, so in

However Margaret did not have any children, so in 2015 she chose younger cousin Rex Fielke's son, Rowan Fielke, a fifth-generation Fielke, to be the custodian so it stayed in the Fielke family name. New ad campaign to tackle obesity

NEW advertisements showing the damaging impact of toxic fat on the body will spearhead a new campaign to address obesity across SA, including in the Riverland, following successful adoption in other states.

Obesity puts people at the greater risk of health problems and diseases such as cancer, heart disease, and type 2 diabetes. South Australia currently has the nation's highest rate of diabetes.

The LiveLighter campaign comes as the latest data from Preventive Health SA reveals 66 per cent of South Australian adults, and 37.1 per cent of children, are overweight or living with obesity.

The LiveLighter campaign is a part of a collaboration on obesity prevention that includes Prevention Health SA, Cancer SA, and the South Australia Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI).

The ads will run on radio, TV, billboards and social media, aiming to increase awareness of the impact of toxic fat and also encourage South Australians to eat well and increase physical activity to improve their health.

The strategy adopts parts of the proven evidence-based LiveLighter public health campaign that has been successfully running in Western Australia for more than a decade, and has also run in ACT, and Victoria.

The toxic fat ads will direct Riverlanders to the LiveLighter website, containing information and tools

to support eating healthily and being more active, including healthy recipes, workout builders, and meal planners.

"The toxic fat ads are confronting – and that's intentional – graphic campaigns like this have been proven to change behaviour.

"Just like with smoking and drink driving, we need strong, clear messages to shift public perception and spark positive action." SAHMRI health policy centre director, Professor Caroline Miller, said.

Minister for health Chris Picton said "obesity has overtaken smoking as the leading risk factor in preventable health conditions for South Australians, which is why we are taking action."

"Two-thirds of adults and more than one-in-three kids in SA are overweight. Unless we change this too many kids will face reduced life expectancy and a lifetime struggling with chronic disease

"Overweight and obesity has become our most urgent public health challenge, putting growing pressure on the health system and our soci-

Health SA chief executive, Marina Bowshall said "the results of this campaign are proven, after years running interstate.

"We know that people who see the ads are more aware of the serious health consequences of obesity," Ms Bowshall said.

Cancer Council SA senior manager prevention Christine Morris said. "we support all initiatives that are working to increase healthy eating and physical activity as we know that action on these can reduce the rate and impact of cancer."

New tool to support dementia care workforce

A NEW app-based tool available from Dementia Australia will help Riverlanders working in health, disability and aged care to provide support for people living with dementia.

Dementia Australia executive director of services Kaele Stokes said the tool – called Tell TiNA – will help workers and providers to assess the skills they need to embed in order to better support people living with dementia and meet the Strengthened Aged Care Quality Standards that commence from November 1.

"People living with dementia have specific care and support requirements that cannot be delivered without appropriate education and training of the workforce," Dr Stokes said.

"This tool will support providers to take a continuous improvement approach to the care they deliver, as well as assess the strengths and areas of development within their workforce to build a comprehensive dementia care training strategy.

"Dementia education must not be a once off. It needs to include a regular process of formalised continuing professional development that benefits people receiving care, as well as staff themselves."

Deakin University Professor Kon Mouzakis said that by bringing experts in dementia and technology togethor, more effective workforce training and support can be provided when and where a worker needs it.

"Our team is proud to work with Dementia Australia to develop technologies like Tell TiNA, which provides resources for care workers to best support people living with dementia," Prof Mouzakis said.

Riverland Enduro **2025** – know the fruit fly risks

AS thousands of motorsport fans prepare for the ARB Waikerie Hotel Riverland Enduro, from July 11 to 13, Primary Industries and Regions SA (PIRSA) is urging all visitors and local competitors to help protect the region by leaving fresh fruit and fruiting vegetables behind.

Waikerie and surrounding areas remain under fruit fly quarantine restrictions due to ongoing Queensland fruit fly outbreaks, and increased travel into the region raises the risk of the pest spreading further.

"Events like the Riverland Enduro bring great energy to the region, which we are really pleased to see," general manager of the fruit fly response program Jason Size said.

"But more movement means more opportunity for fruit fly to hitch a ride especially when people unknowingly bring in restricted produce.'

Mr Size thanked Riverland residents in affected areas for their continued cooperation, as PIRSA teams carry out baiting, trap checks, fruit removal and property inspections across the region.

"Please do the right thing – whether you're a local competitor, or travelling from interstate in a campervan, trailer or pop-up," Mr Size said.

"Leave your fruit at home, check your vehicle and food supplies, and use the quarantine bins provided at entry points. Keeping the Riverland fruit fly free is a team effort and every action counts, no matter how small.'

The event, at New Well Centre Road and Meissner Road, New Well, is in a green area, but is bounded by Swan Reach, Waikerie, Loxton and Renmark red outbreak areas and yellow suspension areas.

If you live in a red outbreak or yellow suspension area, don't bring home-grown produce to the event, even if it's just a short drive. Produce must be treated or processed appropriately.

Bringing home-grown restricted produce into the Riverland is restricted. These must be surrendered at quarantine stations or disposed of before entering the region. For fresh produce, please buy from local

"It only takes one piece of infested fruit to trigger a new outbreak," Mr Size said. 'Following the rules protects growers, local jobs, and our export markets.

Know before you tow:

- ☐ Leave fruit and fruiting vegetables behind.
- ☐ Check your vehicle, camper trailer, esky, and food storage. ☐ Use the quarantine bins at regional entry
- points. ☐ Tell your crew and travel mates.
- Fruit fly detections April 6 to June ☐ No flies were detected in 22 of the 56
- Riverland outbreak areas. ☐ Flies were detected in 34 of the 56 Riverland outbreak areas.



"Through high school in Adelaide I got talent-tested through SASI, and I got into rowing through that process, and I did it competitively for seven or eight years.

"When I stopped racing and had a bit of a break due to injury, I coached at a college in Adelaide for a season, which was great, and I had a wonderful mentor, but then I stepped away and followed a different career path.

"It was really since I moved to the Riverland just over nine years ago, I reconnected to the sport through the Renmark Rowing Club, and I started doing volun-

teer coaching, and connecting with other Riverland clubs, and it was just a natural progression from there.

"When St Francis was opening, there was an idea floated about rowing, and I guess you can say the rest is history.

Students involved in the SFAC rowing program continually work hard to make sure they are achieving their goals, with the values of the school driven hard.

The school's mission for the rowing program is to provide students with the opportunity to learn the skills required to row, and to develop strong life skills such as commitment, hard work, teamwork, resilience, and respect.

Ms Turnbull said seeing the students rewarded for their hard work is one of the best parts of the job, highlighted by recent successes in the Wharf to Woolshed Long Row, and last December's Riverland Regatta.

"At the Riverland Regatta, we get a lot of people coming from Adelaide, and there was a lot of positive feedback from the broader community, and the other large colleges about how well the kids are going which was

"I think what I've really enjoyed is seeing the kids who aren't as sporty become involved, because rowing can really appeal to those kids," she said.

"We live in a beautiful place, and it's quite

surprising how many of them don't use the river, so being able to get them out in fresh air, and on our beautiful river, is awesome.

"But for those who have continued and are now competing... seeing their passion and how they grow as people, as well as learning to push themselves and work as a team is an aspect I love.

"For the ones in our senior squad, a few have part-time jobs, so they're learning time management skills, and even though they might have had a tough day at school, they can get out and clear their mind from a wellbeing perspective."

With the school just over three years old, Ms Turnbull started the rowing program from scratch, something she said was a 'challenge".

However, she said she was able to lean on support networks from her time in Adelaide, as well as people at the Renmark Rowing Club when needed.

"I didn't really know what I was getting myself into, and it was a lot of work, but I'm fortunate to have some great connections and networks in the broader rowing community who I was able to lean on," she said.

"I think within the first six months I really realised that we were in a fortunate position with very little resources.

"The fact we were brand new allowed us to pave our own way, so I think that's been really exciting to not be bound to how other colleges do it, because we're not set up like

"(It's) working with Rowing SA and the Renmark Rowing Club with what's within our parameters, and stepping back and remembering why we're doing this.

'The college principal Nathan Hayes has been incredible in supporting it along the way, because they've been learning as much as I've been learning.

"I think that's where I'm the proudest of this achievement, because it hasn't been an easy start since the school opened, so it's nice knowing they're on the right path."

Upgrades to the Renmark Wharf were recently completed, and Ms Turnbull said the support of the Renmark Rowing Club had been 'immense' from day one.

"It's something we wouldn't be able to do without the support of that club, and I've been on the committee for a number of years now, so I already had really strong relationships with the group," she said.

"We use their facilities and their equipment, so it's a real joint-venture, and our older members at the club are really enjoying seeing the students come through and fall in love with the sport, so I think it's been great for the community.

"I've got a great core group of students that have trusted the process, and been with me every step of the way, so it's very much a collective award.'




