



Government downplays blue-green algae risk

A BLUE-green algae sludge making its way downstream from NSW poses little health risk to SA River Murray communities, the State Government says.

Last week Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone and Riverland-based MLC Dr Nicola Centofanti were scathing in their criticism of the government over the issue, claiming the health of people and livestock had been put at risk.

The Liberal duo targeted SA Environment and Water Minister Dr Susan Close, accusing her of deliberately keeping South Australians in the dark over an agreement with NSW that saw environmental water released from Menindee Lakes from last Saturday onwards.

However, a government spokesperson this week described the water as "mainly

ings, in line with established protocols.

"The Department for Environment and Water (DEW) officers are working with the MDBA, environmental water holders and other government agencies on mitigation strategies to minimise water quality impacts in South Australia."

"This includes mixing and diluting with water released from other storages, varying weir pool levels, and diverting a portion to Lake Victoria."

In a blistering attack in parliament last week, Mr Whetstone accused Dr Close – the Deputy Premier – of "making light of an issue that is of paramount importance to every South Australian".

Mr Whetstone said Dr Close made a "snide remark" when questioned about the environmental flush, and that government members laughed along.

Extraordinary Alan earns an OAM

A RENMARK local has received one of the nation's highest honours for his decades of work toward community health and fitness.

Renmark man Alan Coulter, 79, was on Sunday named as an Order of Australia medal recipient in the 2024 King's Birthday Honours list.

Mr Coulter said being told he would receive the award was surprising news.

"When I found out about the nomination, I was in disbelief," he said.

"I was honoured and humbled at the same time."

"I was completely caught off guard. I had no idea that I had been recommended."

"I feel there would be a con-

Mr Coulter said seeing positive change in those he works with was personally rewarding.

"My motivation comes from seeing young athletes breaking their personal records, teams winning premierships, major post-operative knee and hip replacement clients improving their range of

Mr Coulter was manager of the Renmark Recreation Centre from 1984 to 2016, overseeing the ongoing development and improvement of the facility.

Mr Coulter is current coach for the Vitor Renmark Amateur Swimming Club, and a lecturer

for the South Australian Sports Medicine Association.

He has previously also been involved with the Renmark Rovers, Renmark Netball Club, Renmark Marathon Rowing Team, and a clinical educator at TAFE SA.

A statement regarding Mr Coulter's award states he "will leave a lasting legacy to his local community, in more ways than one".

Riverland's fruit fly outbreak tally remains at 51 total

NO new Queensland fruit fly outbreaks were declared between 21 May to 3 June, with the total number of outbreaks remaining at 51.

Of these outbreaks, 20 have not recorded a fruit fly detection within the last 12 weeks and some have been without a detection for more than a year.

New extensions apply in the existing Glossop outbreak area.

As the winter season sets in, the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) will briefly pause its sterile fruit

fly releases in the Riverland and will recommence them later in the year.

PIRSA's fruit fly emergency response incident controller Jason Size said that "Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) works when sterile flies breed with wild flies to break the life cycle, but that cooler weather reduces wild fly presence – as well as the impact of SIT".

"SIT is one of our best tools to stop wild fruit fly breeding more generations," Mr Size said.

"We have released more than

1.5 billion sterile flies into the Riverland to break the chain of those wild populations and they've been out there doing their job to disrupt the breeding cycle."

Mr Size explained that during winter, Queensland fruit fly adjusts its life cycle to remain underground as pupae for a longer period than it does in warmer weather.

"Cooler weather means sterile flies will have a lower chance of finding wild flies to breed with, and also a lower chance

of reducing their breeding numbers," he said.

"We'll continue releasing SIT flies at Renmark until the week of 17 June."

The end date for all Riverland outbreaks is currently 23 December 2024 but this may change if more fruit flies are detected.

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Telstra outage wipes out all three local councils...

'It's just not good enough'

TELSTRA is "sincerely sorry" for the impact of a cloud service crash last week that continues to "cripple" all three local councils.

The outage is continuing to impact Loxton Waikerie, Berri Barmera and Renmark Paringa councils, rendering them unable to complete almost all core functions.

District Council of Loxton Waikerie CEO David Beaton said the cloud service outage was "just not good enough".

"To be out for six business days is an extraordinary long period of time," he said.

"We haven't had access to phones, people haven't been able to ring the council, and people haven't been able to get online to pay their rates."

"It's a week when rates are due."

"It's frustrating all around."

All three councils use a Telstra cloud service, hosted from a data centre in Victoria.

A Telstra spokesperson said it was a "highly complex issue" to resolve.

"Our teams, together with our partners, have been working around the clock to bring it back online," the spokesperson said.

"While we've done this work, we've also been working with our impacted customers to find alternative solutions with over 80 per-

cent of all impacted customers now fully or partially restored."

The Telstra spokesperson said cloud service access restoration was under way.

"Renmark Paringa, Loxton Waikerie and Berri Barmera councils have been working with us and our partner on a transition to a Microsoft cloud platform and we expect the first of their services to be restored today (Monday)," the spokesperson said.

"This transition was planned prior to this issue as we will be closing the service that experienced the outage later this year, however, we've accelerated their move given the issue."

"We're sincerely sorry for the impact this issue has had on our customers and their residents."

As part of the outage, councils are without

access to data and various phone, email and electronic systems.

"The staff are going back and doing manual tasks because they can't get onto the system because it's all in the cloud," Mr Beaton said.

In a media release last Friday, Berri Barmera CEO Tim Pfeiffer said the outage was having "profound" effects on the Riverland community.

"It is astonishing in this day and age for an outage to last so long," he said.

"We are currently at day six of this Telstra CSX outage, despite having a service level agreement that allows outages of no more than two hours."

"The three Riverland councils do not currently know when or even if Telstra will be able to restore our cloud services."

Meanwhile, Telstra mobile users in Barmera may have temporary disruptions over the next week.

A Telstra spokesperson said third party works are being carried out at Barmera's mobile base station.

"While Optus undertakes some upgrade works at the site, Telstra has been asked to shut down its mobile base station in Barmera during the hours of 7am to 5pm between Tuesday 11 June to Tuesday 18 June," the spokesperson said.

"Telstra mobile customers will receive text messages advising them of the upcoming works."

"Landline services and NBN internet services will not be impacted."

"The site will be online at the end of each work day."

Applications open for reconciliation grants

RIVERLAND community groups seeking to promote reconciliation outcomes are encouraged to apply for an annual funding program.

SA Water last month opened applications for its 2024-25 Reconciliation Partnerships Program, also known as Pirku-Itya.

SA Water manager of brand and community connection, Kellie McDonald, said promoting "stronger communities through reconciliation-based activities" was an ongoing goal of the initiative.

"Since 2020, we have worked together with 22 organisations

across regional and metropolitan areas through Pirku-Itya," Ms McDonald said.

"As we enter the fourth year of the program, we're excited to continue our support for organisations committed to creating positive change within their communities."

"We're looking for groups who are working towards positive reconciliation goals while also promoting the health and wellbeing of active, thriving communities through a cooler or greener environment, or are showcasing proactive environmental leadership."

"We recognise the important role that communities play in encouraging reconciliation within communities as well as caring for land and water, and we want to work collaboratively with these groups to achieve our shared vision of a sustainable future."

The program provides grants of up to \$10,000

Budget of many sides

WAS the Riverland a state budget winner?

Last week's release of the budget, while containing relatively few direct references to the Riverland, will still impact the area in a number of ways.

To first look at the big local win, the announcement of more than \$40 million in extra funding for fruit fly will undoubtedly be of benefit.

Most of that funding has been earmarked for 'the regions', likely meaning the Riverland, and if directed correctly could expand upon the measures that are proving successful in the battle to eradicate the pest, at a crucial time when the tide appears to be turning in PIRSA's favour.

This could mean further increasing the number of sterile flies being released around the Riverland, expanding baiting and trapping, or even increasing the monitoring of backyard fruit trees.

Ideally, the funding would also help create a foundation to ensure that after the current target of eradication is achieved, the Riverland's protections against any new incursions of fruit fly are strengthened, perhaps with an increased presence at Blanchetown or Yamba, to keep highlighting the message that outside produce being brought into the region is a risk.

Somewhere in the middle of the Riverland budget scorecard lies the announcements surrounding the River Murray. A section of the local public will label investment into the health of the river, and its wildlife, as a wise directive.

There is logic behind this, as we all need the river ecosystem to be sustainable in the long-term.

However, an opposite side of the public will view that approach with scepticism, and weariness that initiatives to benefit the environment are being prioritised over the water resource needs for Riverland irrigation and primary production.

Finally, we get to the area where perhaps the Riverland fared less favourably in the budget. It might have been a little unsurprising, but the lack of economic support for local wine grape growers – outside of funding for the Family and Business Support Program – will be taken as a stark omission by some.

Although it seemed as though any support initiatives would need to be co-ordinated at both a federal and state level, the State Government will now have to stick behind its industry blueprint plan and, like many of the region's growers, see what outcomes global market forces draw us toward.

More widely, we also saw funding announced for housing and agriculture, yet nothing to improve safety on the Sturt Highway.

It then seems answering the opening question is a bit dependent on personal perspectives, but there will be some key indicators down the track of whether or not these were successful investments.

Gottfried came to Bookpurnong as a 20-year-old cereal farmer in 1896. He was the first of four of his family to come from farms near Mannum, to farms near Loxton's Hut. The others were Paul (Bookpurnong, 1902), Minnie (Mrs AWR Drabsch, Loxton, 1902), and Charlie (Taplan Road, 1910). Gottfried, on his journey to Bookpurnong with a wagonload of equipment and supplies, became lost for a while, as so dense was the mallee scrub. Years later, he recalled the old Loxton Hut (which stood by the pepper-tree adjacent to the present-day Historical Village) was 'practically in ruins', while the tree 'was flourishing' and the township of Loxton was 'a windswept hillside with a few pines, and bushes'. Gottfried and older brother Paul worked well together and endured some tough, droughted seasons. Gottfried's house later became 'Rivergum Holiday Home'. Response to latest leadership summit

THE Murray–Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) remains steadfast in the commitment to transparency and engagement as preparations continue for the 2026 Basin Plan Review.

Following the two-day Basin Leadership Summit in Sydney, on 16 and 17 April, the MDBA has released a report summarising discussions of approximately 100 participants with diverse views on the environmental, cultural, economic, and social outcomes for the basin.

The summit assembled more than 2400 years of collective experience in Basin water management to gather diverse perspectives to inform preparations for the 2026 Basin Plan Review.

The Basin Leadership Summit – Output Report reflects the variety of perspectives and aspirations for a healthy Basin as expressed by summit participants, which included Authority members, Basin Community Committee members, basin governments, First Nations peoples, representatives from the environment, industry, science, natural resource management

and tourism sectors, and local governments.

In consideration of the Output Report, the Authority report to the Basin Leadership Summit responds to the reflections, suggestions and tangible ideas offered during the Summit.

The Authority recognises the significant opportunity afforded through the Basin Plan Review to build confidence in basin management by focusing on outcomes.

Significant goodwill was demonstrated by all parties during the summit to listen, hear, and accommodate different perspectives on future basin management.

While there are natural tensions in the outcomes sought at a local and basin scale, people are united in their passion for their communities and the basin, and acknowledge the value of an overarching, basin management framework.

The observations made regarding current progress and obstacles for Basin Plan implementation provide the Authority with a clear view of the challenges and the opportunities, both through the extended implementation of the Basin Plan and those to consider via the review.

The summit attendees identified a range of ideas to consider and areas of common ground that may be further pursued through collaborative efforts and will inform the Authority's early insights to be shared at River Reflections this June.

The Authority will seek to incorporate as many of these proposals within the work supporting the Basin Plan Review, but note many ideas for co-operation, for example carp control or land use planning, extend beyond the remit and scope of the MDBA's responsibilities.

The Basin Plan Review provides the opportunity to consider how we take an outcomes-based approach, including suggestions from the Summit to:

□ Be clear on the assumptions that underpin our recommendations, as we include new information and knowledge

□ Move beyond a singular focus on water recovery and water volumes to achieve environmental improvement and sustainable communities

□ Consider a more integrated approach to improve basin health.

The Basin Leadership Summit marked the key step in establishing open lines of conversation among diverse stakeholders.

The Authority intends to hold two or three similar events to continue informing the 2026 Basin Plan Review and welcomes contributions from summit participants on how best to achieve this.

As Chair of the Authority, I thank all involved for their courage and collaboration offered through the summit. I acknowledge the passion and commitment with which everyone engaged on matters affecting the basin and encourage that same passion to endure as we continue discussions informing the Basin Plan Review.

I welcome basin communities to join us at the River Reflections conference in June to hear our early insights on the Basin Plan Review, workshop ideas for future basin management and the opportunity to continue discussions initiated at the Summit.

Kneecapping future of agriculture?

THE Federal Budget is out and the Federal Government is pedalling a \$22.7bn Future Made in Australia package, which is rather ironic, when on the other hand they are stripping the guts out of one of their key economic drivers for rural communities and our country – irrigated agriculture.

The Federal Government and Minister for Water Tanya Plibersek are determined to plunder another 700GL away from productive agriculture via their restoring our rivers bill and other basin plan program shortfalls.

Albo's government can't have it all. On one hand they want Australia to be an indispensable part of the global economy and yet they are taking water away from irrigation and our ability to produce staple food and generate wealth by wasting water out to sea at South Australia.

Labor need to change their colour from red to green. Irrigation underpins so many facets of our rural communities, from small local business and transport to major industry and manufacturing.

I can't see how Australia can become a huge player in the global economy when agriculture is continually kneecapped.

It is a well-known fact that every dollar generated by agriculture has a flow on effect of between \$4 to \$7 into the wider community, depending on the commodity.

I would like to know what the Albanese government is going to replace this major economic driver with, when they buy back the majority of productive water we have in our irrigation footprint.

More needed to ease pressure on elderly

THE State Budget has not gone far enough to ease the pressure on older South Australians amid a cost of living and housing crisis, according to COTA SA, the state's peak body for 700,000 South Australians aged over 50.

Older South Australians on low incomes will appreciate the additional \$243.90 cost-of-living payment this month. COTA SA is also pleased to see that renters and Commonwealth Senior Health Card holders will have their concession amount doubled to match that of homeowners.

This is particularly important for the growing population of older renters, who are among the most financially-disadvantaged as they juggle the increasing costs of housing, food, energy and fuel, often on low and fixed incomes.

While any relief is welcome, older people will be aware that in reality, this relief is at a similar level to what they received last year through state and federal budget measures.

While the relief level has barely increased, their energy bills and household expenses are continuing to skyrocket.

COTA SA's 2024-25 State Budget submission outlined three key priorities for investment to address the needs of older South Australians across health, housing and ageing well in regional South Australia.

We are glad to see the ambulance electronic patient management system is finally on its way. This is something that we have advocated for strongly and agree that will make a difference and improve patient safety and quality of care by transferring crucial information to first responders.

We were disappointed that our call for free ambulances for South Australians on the full age pension was overlooked, yet again. South Australia is one of the last states to provide free ambulance services to aged pensioners, who are among our most vulnerable health consumers.

With the highest ambulance call-out fees in Australia, cost is a real barrier that prevents older people from calling an ambulance, even when their condition is serious.

At a time when the State Government is reaping record levels of stamp duty from rising home values, this money is not finding its way into investment

in public housing stock, when it is so desperately needed.

We acknowledge the announcements about new housing developments, however the net increase in public housing stock is simply not sufficient to meet the demand. We join with SACOSS in calling for at least 1000 new public housing properties a year to have any chance of keeping up.

Given the growing risk of homelessness for older women, COTA SA was surprised to see this group were not named in either the housing or women's budget announcements.

We will continue to advocate for the State Government to invest in implementing the recommendations from the Improving Housing Security for Older Women report.

Older people living regionally will be left wondering what was in this Budget for them.

COTA SA will continue to advocate for much-needed investment in transport, health access and digital connectivity, so that South Australians can age well in the regional communities that they love.

Budget support for primary production

PRIMARY Producers SA (PPSA) has welcomed the State

Government's ongoing support of biosecurity measures to eradicate fruit fly in yesterday's State Budget, as well as renewed funding for rural financial counselling to support farming businesses.

While there are limited headlines for primary industries arising from the budget, PPSA has also welcomed a relatively stable operating budget and workforce for the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA).

PPSA was particularly pleased to see programs that focus on economic development, international trade and market access continue to be part of PIRSA's work program over the next 12 months.

We welcome the total package of \$686.4m of new measures that support regional SA in this year's budget. PPSA acknowledges the broader economic challenges facing the government in casting the budget, including the need to address cost-of-living pressures and persistent inflation impacting households.

With SA unemployment reaching the lowest level in five decades, the tight labour market remains a challenge to the agribusiness, food, and wine sector. PPSA will continue work with government to address workforce planning issues facing the sector, while the \$9m to support skills and training programs in regional areas will be of great

benefit.

To boost regional workforce participation, we want to ensure budget measures that focus on health services, public education, housing affordability, and reforming early childhood education also benefit rural communities.

Additional funding of \$17.5m over three years was a welcome step to address the chronic backlog of road maintenance in regional SA.

Agriculture plays a critical role in the state economic agenda to strengthen SA's green economic credentials, including the state's target to achieve net zero emissions by 2050.

To this end, we are pleased to see the ongoing commitment of \$24.4m over five years towards net zero agriculture. This funding aims to develop and deliver innovation and on-farm solutions, and to support the upskilling of the agricultural sector to reduce emissions through low emission intensity farming systems.

We look forward to seeing SARDI play a key role in helping the farm sector adapt to climate change and support carbon farming initiatives, by delivering research to inform a future low-emission intensity farming systems strategy.

Renmark Paringa Council recently completed the final stage of the Government Road Strategic Freight Route Upgrade.

The final stage of the project included realignment of intersections, improved drainage, undertaking a full pavement reconstruction including sealing shoulders, increasing the seal width and aligning the road to create

improved road geometry.

Renmark Paringa Council chief executive officer Tony Sivour said the completed upgrade would divert heavy vehicles away from Renmark's town centre.

"Council has been working on the Government Road heavy freight bypass project for the past five years," Mr Sivour said.

"The aim of the project is to reduce heavy freight traffic in the Renmark town centre by providing linkages from the National Highway to Ral Ral Avenue.

"This project has been made possible by securing \$5m in external funding from the Special Local Roads Program (SLRP).

"A significant improvement in the functionality of Government Road has been

achieved by increasing the sight distance for drivers and widening the road from 6.4m to 9m. We are currently conducting our final road safety audit, which includes reviewing the current speed limit of the road."

Concrete plan for bad Berri road

A RIVERLAND-first concrete road – that will require little or no maintenance – is being constructed at a Berri trouble spot.

A section of Hoskin Road, running between Bunnings and Foodbank, is undergoing a major upgrade from bitumen to concrete, after the local council grew tired of having to perform patch-ups.

Work began on the road late last month, and council said staff "repeatedly repairing" a section of the road

– situated at the entrance to the bulk fuel site behind Bunnings – prompted the decision to use concrete.

"It is more financially efficient for council to do the job properly and build this small road section from reinforced concrete than to be frequently repairing the bitumen," council CEO Tim Pfeiffer told The Murray Pioneer.

Contractors were engaged to start removing the damaged section of road and road base from the final week in May, with a comple-

tion date of 5 August.

During the redevelopment access along the impacted section of road is down to single-lane traffic and controlled via electronic stop/go traffic lights.

The section leading up to and beyond the building site is also under speed restrictions and the work zone itself is 25km/h for the duration of the project.

Berri Barmera Council said it apologises for any delay the restrictions may cause.

Planning approval for roundabout servo

PLANNING permission has been granted for the development of a new service station between two main Riverland towns.

The Riverland Regional Assessment Panel at its meeting held on 18 April passed a motion to grant planning consent for a retail fuel outlet and motor repair station, to be located just before the roundabout between Monash and Renmark, at 19128 Sturt Highway, Monash.

The development application was put forward by Adelaide-based company

Woolcock Construction.

Conditions placed upon the development included:

- Signage shall not contain any element of LED or LCD display, except for the fuel prices on the pylon signs. The fuel prices shall be white characters on a black background.
- Signage shall not flash, scroll, move or change, with the exception of the LED fuel price signs, which may change on an as-needs basis.
- Signage shall not be permitted to operate in such a manner that could result in impairing the ability of a road user by means of high levels of illumination or glare. Accordingly, all illuminated signs visible from the arterial road network shall be limited to a low level of illumination, except in the case of electronic signage, which shall be limited.
- Any floodlighting associated with the site shall be positioned and/or shielded so as to not produce glare or create a distraction for passing motorists on the abutting roads.

Riverland issues missing in budget, says Tim

IMPROVEMENTS for Riverland roads and health services were overlooked in the State Budget, according to a senior local politician.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the new state budget – released last week – failed to address issues on a number of major local roads.

"The \$20m funding for flood-affected Riverland roads is a four-year planning exercise with no commitment to upgrades and no real action," Mr Whetstone said.

"The Truro Freight Route, Wentworth Road, the Lyrup Causeway, Old Sturt Highway and others are all in need of urgent repair."

"I am committed to working

with the community and all levels of government to see these roads improved through to completion."

Mr Whetstone said resources were also needed to increase access to local health services.

"Healthcare in the Riverland and Mallee is an issue of ongoing concern that people speak to me about right across our region, and the State Budget has not delivered certainty for our regional health services, particularly mental health," he said.

"The government has spruiked \$2.5bn into the health system, prioritising metro Adelaide, yet there is little commitment for additional money to flow to our Riverland and

Mallee hospitals."

Mr Whetstone said a lack of direct support for Riverland grape growers "failed to recognise the enormous contribution made to the state's economy".

"I was hopeful we would see funding to support the Wine Industry and struggling grape growers, and I am disappointed this did not eventuate," he said.

"Agriculture is one of the biggest contributors to the economy, yet this government fails to invest in the future of one of the state's largest economic exports."

"This is another budget full of empty promises from the State Government. People in Chaffey should ask themselves, are they

better off under this Labor government?"

Mr Whetstone said more cost-of-living relief was required for Riverland families.

"While every household and family face a cost-of-living crisis, Labor is collecting more taxes," he said.

"Cost-of-living pressure will balloon through an increased Emergency Services Levy and government fees – levies expected to disproportionately impact regional ratepayers."

"My biggest concern is that while Labor racks up almost \$50bn in debt, it leaves our future generations to clean up their mess."

SA Budget 'short-changes' region

LAST week's State Budget has been described as "city-centric", leaving regions like the Riverland "short-changed".

Riverland-based Liberal MLC, Dr Nicola Centofanti, claimed the Malinauskas Government's third budget offers little for the regions.

"Peter Malinauskas and his Labor Government continue to turn their backs on our regions, who are the lifeblood of our state," Dr Centofanti said.

"The former Cross Border Commissioner left last year, leaving border communities in limbo. Labor's budget provides no certainty about the future of this important position, which is meant to serve as a voice to more than 140,000 people."

"SARDI's world-class research is vital in supporting our primary industries, particularly when it comes to managing risks such as pests and diseases, so it's concerning Labor's not investing more in this area."

"(In addition) agriculture is the backbone of South Australia's economy, yet we see the Agricultural Services sub-program in this budget slashed."

Dr Centofanti, the Opposition's spokesperson for regional SA and primary industries, said just \$60 million had been set aside the state's regional road network outside the \$250 million provided for highway upgrades between Mount Barker and the city.

Her Liberal Party upper house colleague Ben Hood also claimed a lack of new investment in regional health and education.

The Opposition duo said the budget provided "no relief" for struggling small businesses across SA regions.

"The Liberal Party has been calling for the payroll tax threshold to be increased to \$2.1 million from \$1.5 million, and is committed to payroll tax reform should it form government in 2026," they said in a joint media release.

Funding formula means disadvantaging our regional councils

THE disparity in funding between metropolitan and regional councils has reached a critical point, underscoring the urgent need for fairer distribution of resources.

For councils like Mid Murray, the issue is particularly stark.

This year alone, Mid Murray Council was shortfunded by \$7m, receiving only 36 per cent of the necessary untied Financial Assistance income.

This significant shortfall highlights the broader challenges faced by many regional councils across Australia.

Federal legislation mandates that 30 per cent of the Financial Assistance Grant be distributed on a per capita basis.

This formula benefits metropolitan councils, which often receive more than their assessed need, while regional councils like Mid Murray struggle with a fraction of the necessary funding.

Over the past decade, Mid Murray has experienced a cumulative shortfall of \$58m.

To put this into perspective, covering this deficit would require a 44 per cent increase in local rates, a burden that would be unsustainable for residents.

This funding gap forces councils to make difficult decisions, such as selling assets and reducing essential services.

However, this is not a long-term solution. Without resolving the underlying funding

disparity, regional councils will eventually have nothing left to cut.

The inequity in funding has far-reaching implications for regional communities.

While metropolitan areas continue to thrive, regional councils are left with limited resources to maintain infrastructure, provide essential services, and support community wellbeing.

This disparity contributes to a cycle of decline, making it harder for regional areas to attract and retain residents and businesses.

If income tax were based on where you live rather than what you earn, there would likely be a significant public uproar.

This analogy illustrates the current situation: regional residents pay higher rates (essentially higher local taxes) to their councils, but receive fewer services compared to their metropolitan counterparts.

This imbalance not only affects local governance but also exacerbates issues of regional inequity and social wellbeing.

Raising awareness of this funding disparity is crucial.

Policymakers must recognise the unique challenges faced by regional councils and advocate for a more equitable distribution of resources.

Ensuring that regional councils receive their fair share of funding will help sustain essential services, support community development, and promote overall regional stability and wellbeing.

The path forward requires collaboration and a commitment to fairer funding practices.



By addressing these disparities, we can ensure that all communities, regardless of their location, have the resources they need to thrive.

Impact of flood highlights mental health services gap

THE aftermath of the River Murray flood has highlighted the need for more mental health support services in the Mid Murray and Riverland.

Mid Murray Council's wellbeing officer Shelley Rose was appointed in April last year to assist residents impacted by the flood in the Murraylands and Riverland access the services they require.

Her role is funded by Wellbeing SA, the Department of Premier and Cabinet and local government.

She said recovering from the natural disaster would be a slow process, especially for those whose primary homes were inundated and were either underinsured, or without insurance.

"There were a lot of people that thought they had flood insurance and then found out afterwards that their policy did not include this," Ms Rose said.

"Then they found themselves in dire straits."

She said in Paisley many residents had still been unable to return to their homes.

"Seventeen months after

the flood, a lot of people I have been working with especially in Paisley have not been able to return back to their primary properties," Ms Rose said.

"These people are living in caravans or rental accommodation if they can afford it," she said.

Ms Rose said in the Mid Murray area about 3500 homes were affected by the flood.

She said in country areas, people were reluctant to ask for help and the older residents who had suffered flood damage to their homes were finding it hard to recover.

"Some who have lived in the area their whole lives have told me that if this had happened 20 years ago, they would have been in a better position to clean up themselves," Ms Rose said.

She said mental health services were limited between Mannum and Waikerie.

"Along this distance of 130km there are no services of this kind whatsoever," Ms Rose said.

"There is a once-a-fortnight service in Mannum and that has a four-month wait list and in Waikerie there is a once-a-fortnight service,"

she said.

Ms Rose said a high number of referrals were being received for mental health services from along this stretch of the River Murray.

She said it was hard to determine if this increase in demand for support services was related to the flood, or whether it was due to accumulative pressures experienced by residents in the area.

"We had Covid-19 and then we had the floods and people may have had other things happening in their lives as well," Ms Rose said.

"The Riverland is still dealing with a fruit fly outbreak and the difficulties experienced by the wine industry," she said.

"It is a layering affect that is starting to fatigue people."

Ms Rose said more local baseline wellbeing centres and psychosocial support services were required to make community access easier.

"We have minimal public transport in this area," she said.

Ms Rose said to attract more clinicians to the area, more locally based support services were needed.

Mid Murray Council's wellbeing officer Shelley Rose said Australian paint company Taubmans had donated four pallets of prep-coat mould blocker to help home owners repair their flood-affected primary homes.

She said the paint was offered to homeowners who were attempting to repair their homes and were underinsured or without insurance for flood damage.

"We had a small group of people that were unable to paint their homes themselves due

to not being able to physically do so, or who did not have time to do it," she said.

Ms Rose then worked with Disaster Relief Australia volunteers and home improvement retailer Bunnings to organise a recent working bee to help these home owners.

She said a clean up was also conducted around public areas in Paisley.

"The group of volunteers and community members all helped," Ms Rose said.

"A barbecue was then held in the evening and it was a great community event."

SA Health warning for wild mushrooms

RIVERLANDERS have been advised against foraging and eating wild mushrooms growing during winter.

SA Health earlier this month issued a warning regarding the risks associated with picking and eating potentially deadly wild mushrooms.

Chief Public Health Officer Nicola Spurrier said symptoms of mushroom poisoning included severe stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea.

"There is no reliable way of telling if a wild mushroom is safe to eat or not so my very clear advice is to not take the risk – don't eat wild mushrooms," Prof Spurrier said.

"Even experts have difficulty in identifying some species, so you should only eat mushrooms that have been purchased from a reliable grower, greengrocer or supermarket.

"If you or someone you know has eaten a wild mushroom, do not wait for symptoms to appear. It's important to seek immediate medical advice in case the ingested mushroom is toxic.

"If you suspect your pet has eaten wild mushrooms, seek veterinary attention immediately."

Symptoms of mushroom poisoning include severe stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea, which may take several hours to appear and can last up to three days.

Poisoning from several varieties, including Death Cap mushrooms, may have a delayed onset of symptoms – up to 24 hours – and can cause life-threatening liver damage.

Botanic Gardens and State Herbarium of South Australia senior botanist-mycologist, Teresa Lebel, said potentially fatal mushrooms were "difficult to distinguish from other wild mushrooms and can resemble edible species".

"It's very important to know that if you cannot reliably identify a mushroom, it's not safe to eat," Dr Lebel said.

"Wild mushrooms are fascinating, but some have a special toxic protection to ensure they flourish by not being eaten – including by humans.

"If you are seeking medical attention after coming in contact with a wild mushroom, you should take photos of the mushroom and the general location.

"You should also try to take one of the mushrooms with you, if possible, to help experts identify what species it is to determine the most appropriate treatment."

Fruit fly, financial counselling boosted in budget

INCREASING measures to eradicate fruit fly from the Riverland, and supporting primary producers, were focuses in the State Budget.

The State Government last week announced – as part of the State Budget – an extra \$43m in funding, with \$41.5m to be spent in the regions, to combat fruit fly.

The budget also included \$19.5m over four years to develop on-farm solutions and support the upskilling of the agricultural sec-

tor, to reduce emissions through low emission intensity farming systems, and \$4.4m for the Family and Business Support Program, including the family and business support mentors and rural financial counselling service

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said supporting primary producers and regional communities to be more prepared for managing the future impacts of adverse events and industry challenges was

an ongoing goal.

“South Australia’s regional communities and agribusinesses are central to the economic growth of our state,” Ms Scriven said.

“Our regions keep our state moving, and I’m delighted that this year’s budget will address key issues focussed on

cost of living, housing, health, and education.

“This budget continues to build on the significant investments we’ve made since coming into government.”

A total of \$30m will also be spent over three years for regional housing, enabling Renewal SA to partner with local governments and regional employers to unlock prioritised regional housing projects.

Treasurer Stephen Mullighan said support was being provided

in key areas to ensure regional growth.

“Our regions are critical to the prosperity of this state,” Mr Mullighan said.

“They contribute \$37.5bn to the SA economy – approximately 26 per cent of gross state product.

“This budget invests in health, housing, roads, primary industries, police and cost of living relief to build better regions for today and tomorrow.”

Budget investment in river sustainability

ENSURING long-term health of the River Murray – to benefit regional areas such as the Riverland – is a key state government goal.

Last week’s state budget announcement included \$26.3m over five years to support River Murray operations, maintenance and monitoring programs, aimed at sustaining “the ongoing health of the river system and surrounding environments”.

The measures include \$4.8m in funding on the state’s new water licensing system and register, mywater, which is a 24/7 online water management system and customer portal.

The system can assist growers, irrigators, water traders, brokers, financiers, bore drillers and dam builders manage water assets.

Treasurer Stephen Mullighan said “a strong, sustainable environment is vital for all South Australians”.

“We need to invest in and protect our resources today, so that future generations can enjoy and benefit from them in future,” Mr Mullighan said.

“These investments are also important for our economy, jobs and tourism.”

Another \$6.5m a year will be spent ensuring vulnerable biodiversity is protected when making planning decisions, rising to \$7.9m a year by 2027-28, targeting toward investments in conservation science, data collection and mapping capability to support decisions for the transition to renewable energy, fire and emergency management, economic development and conservation investment.

Minister for Environment Susan Close said increased preparation for climate challenges would benefit communities.

“Our investment in the River Murray... will ensure our bird and aquatic life continue to have the habitat they need, particularly as we face drier conditions and climate change,” Dr Close said.

“By improving the way we collect data, undertake mapping and capture imagery, we will be able to improve the environmental assessment process for industry and better understand where we direct conservation investment.”



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

"This plan forms an integral part of the (State) Government's commitment to reduce road trauma, which

too often devastates young people and their families."

"Education remains a key pillar – delivering programs that hit home and positively influence driver behaviour for the next generation on our roads.

"We know there's much more to be done, but the first annual report of the Road

Safety Action Plan 2023-25 marks an important step for the (State) Government to assess progress on its targets and inform future measures to help save lives."

A total of 117 lives were lost last year on South Australian roads, while 824 people were seriously injured.

"More than 1000 projects to strengthen telecommunications resilience have now been funded under the Program."

Projects across South Australia will support community safety by helping to mitigate the impacts of service outages during natural disasters and throughout the response and recovery phase.

"The MNHP is another example of the Albanese Government delivering on its commitment to improve connectivity for regional, rural, and remote Australians."

Men's Health Week focuses on not just physical health, but also men's mental health and emotional wellbeing. Riverlanders urged to prepare for winter weather

AS the winter season gets underway, the SES has launched a storm preparedness campaign, in partnership with NRMA Insurance, to raise awareness of severe weather risks and help Riverland residents get prepared.

It comes as new research from the insurer reveals the majority of South Australians are concerned about the increased frequency and severity of extreme weather, yet more than one in three (38 per cent) do not feel prepared to respond.

Over the past three years, SES volunteers have responded to more than 6600 requests for assistance from the public during the winter months.

According to NRMA Insurance data, last winter was the worst for wild weather damage in South Australia in the past six years, with 40 per cent of all home claims caused by extreme weather.

Despite the increased frequency and severity of extreme weather events, the organisation's research shows 31 per cent of South Australians do not know what steps to take to prepare.

SES chief officer Chris Beattie said the organisation is "committed to building resilient communities through ongoing engagement and education".

"This will be the largest, targeted public education campaign we have launched and we're hopeful that, in combination with our well-prepared volunteers, it will help to minimise the impacts of severe weather across our communities as we come into winter," he said.

"We encourage people to visit the SES

website to undertake some simple, proactive steps to help minimise potential damage to their homes and properties.

"We are also very aware of the record-breaking dry spell South Australia has experienced over the past three months.

"Prolonged dry spells can add to the stress on trees, increasing the likelihood of dropped branches and when followed by a sudden increase in rain, along with strong winds, will increase the instability of soil, increasing the likelihood of further stress on trees."

Minister for Emergency Services Dan Creagn said the new campaign would "highlight the need for South Australians to prepare themselves this winter and do their bit for volunteers".

"SES volunteers work tirelessly to respond to calls for help across the state, often in the most challenging of weather conditions," he said.

"This campaign shows how communities can be better prepared for storms and floods, allowing volunteers to prioritise where they are needed most."

To prepare for severe weather and storms the SES advises:

- Trimming any overhanging branches around your property
- Cleaning your gutters and downpipes of leaves and debris
- Checking and clearing drains on your property
- Tying down loose outdoor furniture
- Checking adequacy of insurance coverage

Riverlanders contributing to help frog observation initiative

RIVERLAND environmental enthusiasts were among those contributing to a state-wide census of frog populations.

The Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) – in partnership with Green Adelaide – last week conducted the winter FrogWatch SA Seasonal Census.

Green Adelaide board presiding member, Professor Chris Daniels, said data such as frog call recordings are crucial to monitoring local populations of the species.

"Frogs are a vital part of many of our ecosystems," he said.

"They're a natural pest controller by eating insects, and an important food source for their predators.

"They're also a great indicator of ecosystems. They're sensitive to pollution, so if we find their numbers decreasing in an area, it's a sign that the whole ecosystem is in trouble.

"Anyone with a smart phone or computer can record frog calls via the FrogSpotter smartphone app or FrogWatch SA website. You'll be helping us understand how frogs and their ecosystems are tracking."

Uploads to the FrogSpotter app or website are added to state and national databases to be used by scientists, ecologists and conservation experts. FrogWatch SA will share the amount of frog calls achieved and interesting findings they gain from the data.

Future rounds of the FrogWatch SA Seasonal Census will be run in the first week of every season.

The no-rules twice baked potato

INGREDIENTS

- 2 large baking potatoes
- 4 slices bacon
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 4 tablespoons butter
- salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 spring onion, chopped



METHOD

1. Bake potatoes in a preheated oven until tender, about 1 hour, depending on the size of the potatoes. Set aside until cool enough to handle.

2. Cook bacon over medium-high

heat until evenly brown. Drain, crumble, and set aside.

3. Slice potatoes in half lengthwise and scoop the flesh into a large bowl, saving the skins. Add sour cream, milk, butter, salt, pepper, 1/2 cup cheese, and 1/2 of the spring onions to the potato; mix with a hand mixer until well

blended and creamy.

4. Spoon the mixture into the potato skins; top each with remaining cheese, green onions, and bacon.

5. Return potatoes to the pre-heated oven and continue baking until the cheese is melted, about 15 minutes. Serve hot.



Sue's Fox-tastic netball contribution

IN the 75-year history of the Barmera Netball Club, few have had as big an influence as current club patroness Sue Fox.

Sue has been involved with the club for 52 years, amassing several roles including player, coach, mentor, and committee member throughout her time.

Currently, Sue undertakes the skills development coach for junior players, coaches the club's B1 and B2 sides, and supports the 15C coach.

"I joined the committee, and had roles such as president and treasurer, and they had challenges that have rewarding aspects

along the way too."

Sue was awarded life membership of the Barmera Netball Club in 2005, and has been the club's patroness since 2008.

"It was quite an honour, and I was initially surprised to receive it, but it's nice to have that recognition," she said.

"I just took it in my stride. You don't do it for accolades, and you do it because you love being involved."

"The thrill of seeing players go on and do great things with netball is the thrill of it all, and I love helping them achieve their goals."

"I'm coaching grandchildren of the first people I coached, and it's great seeing people in the future and know I've had an impact on them and they still remember you."

"I've always been an enthusiastic person, which is how I approach games and training, and I hope the sessions are really enjoyable."

Currently five teams compete in the Riverland Netball Association's A1 competition, and Sue said Riverland netball is in a strong position.

"It would be good if we could send an A grade team down to the SA country competition to see where we're at in comparison to other regions," she said.

"I would like to think we can get bigger and better, and sending a team would only make us better in the long run."

"We're on the right path, and I'm still seeing the talent come through so it's certainly a strong association."

Riverland hosts paddling marathon

MARATHON paddlers from around the nation converged on the Murray River last weekend for South Australia's premier long-distance event, the Riverland Paddling Marathon (RPM).

Run by the Marathon Canoe over the June long weekend each year, the RPM has become a staple of the marathon calendar since its inception in 1988.

The event attracts paddling enthusiasts in all types of craft including kayaks, canoes, surf skis, surf boats, dragon boats and stand-up paddle boards.

Martin Finn has been volunteering as the race director of the RPM for the last 25 years and is a major advocate for the event.

"The Riverland Paddling Marathon is the event of the year for us. It brings the marathon community together and is a fantastic celebration of paddling," Mr Finn said.

"We've had nearly 1500

paddlers nominate for the race over the past 36 years, and while most of our paddlers are from South Australia, we do get a large contingent from Melbourne and from Lane Cover River Kayakers in Sydney, as well as the occasional paddler from Queensland or Western Australia.

"The Murray 200 race is a

continuous paddle over three days and is the backbone of the original event, but we also have several other races people can take part in if they are not interested in the longer distance."

Held across three days, The RPM incorporates the Murray 200, the Murray 200 relay, the Murray 100, and the Riverland mini-marathon

which runs from Berri to Morgan.

Mr Finn said the community inspires his selfless service to the RPM.

"I have been running the event for 25 years and it's been fantastic to watch the event grow, and it's part of what keeps me coming back each year," he said.

"Numbers dropped away

during COVID, but we're seeing it grow back, and it's joyous to see the older paddlers come back every year and younger paddlers develop the love for paddling on the Murray.

"We're supported by the Amateur Radio Experimenters Group, which do communications, and also the Victor Harbor Goolwa Sea Rescue Squadron, which provide safety and rescue boats, so it's a real community effort."

With a long history in marathon and ultra-marathon paddling, Adelaide-based Bill Robinson took to the water over the weekend for a record-breaking 25th Murray 200.

Bill completed the event alongside grandson Archie, and said it was a special occasion.

"In my opinion the Riverland Paddling Marathon is one of the best marathons in the whole country," he said.

"I have paddled for a bulk of my adult life and still absolutely love it, and no matter where I go, something about the Murray River keeps me coming back.

"Martin has been volunteering for 25 years and is a wonderful person, and the Riverland Paddling Marathon and its paddles owe a lot to him.

"We have some serious paddlers turn up looking to break records, but we also have people who come along looking to paddle more socially.

"This year I'll be doing it with my 18-year-old grandson Archie which is very special, and it's going to be fun to be part of his first Murray 200.

"The Murray 200 takes you through some beautiful country, including spectacular cliffs near Waikerie, and each morning we go through a lock which are incredible things."

Let's play women's footy on Sundays...at Moorook

I CONGRATULATE every female Aussie rules player in the Riverland, but it's sad to see how far the local competition has slipped in recent years.

Only three teams left, and players having to line up against their own teammates because the opposing team doesn't have enough players.

It wasn't that many years ago that we had a relatively thriving local women's footy competition.

Sure, it wasn't perfect. It had its share of one-sided results, and wildly varying skill levels (the gap between the best players and novices was often enormous), but at least we had better numbers.

Enough numbers to run a proper competition.

I'm not going to play the 'what went wrong' game, because I know the organisers are trying everything to get the RFLW back where it belongs.

Instead, I am going to suggest some changes I think could turnaround the whole situation.

Firstly, I think we should make Moorook Oval the designated home base for women's footy right across

the Riverland.

Why Moorook?

Well firstly, have you been out there lately? I have, and the oval is still in amazing condition. It's always been one of the Riverland's best playing surfaces, and although it doesn't host sport anymore (how sad is that?), that fact remains.

Secondly, Moorook is relatively central, certainly when you include Waikerie in the picture.

Thirdly, as mentioned above, it's not being used. I'm sure the Loxton Waikerie council would love to see the oval being used again, given council rates are being used to maintain it.

Also, it would give the RFLW its own unique identity – like the Riverland Superdogs have with Lyrup Oval, their home base.

I know the scoreboard has gone (to where?) and the changerooms are being knocked down, but the oval itself is unreal, and the Moorook Club is still open for socialising after games.

And finally, let's play all women's footy on Sundays (at Moorook).

Let's make it a truly stan-

dalone competition.

RFL clubs probably support women's footy as much as they feel they can, but obviously it's not enough.

And before you ask, I've spoken with women involved in RFWL who totally embrace this Moorook idea.

They feel they're being pushed aside and agree that they are better off being in their own standalone comp. They don't want to play in a Mickey Mouse competition.

Ideally, we would have a junior competition – or matches at least – running immediately before the open women's games. That would make it easier for supporters and volunteers to get on board.

Because without those juniors coming through, women's football doesn't have a future anyway.

So, how about it: Sundays at Moorook.

Why not? What do you think?

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

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



Premiership defences don't get much better than what Barmera-Monash has given its supporters across the opening seven weekends.

Considering the statistics, storylines, and changes, Murray Pioneer sports editor Lachlan Dand has pieced together a mid-season report card for each club as we springboard into the second half of the season.



Berri

Disappointingly for Berri supporters, a coaching change is yet to bring about any victories in 2024, but there are positives nevertheless.

Berri finished season 2023 winless in the A grade, B grade, and under 18s competitions, but has broken the duck in the B grade and under 18s, sitting fourth and second respectively.

The Demons have been competitive in a bulk of their fixtures, despite their smallest losing margin being 38 points.

The club has been hampered by injuries in 2024, but as some players return to the side in the back half of the year, Berri will be hoping to snap the losing streak.

In positive signs, Regan Kruger has been somewhat of a lone hand

up forward, and has shone in the role, having booted 18 goals to this point, putting him in third spot on the RFL leading goal kickers list.

Currently holding the longest A grade premiership drought, Loxton supporters house a sense of optimism as the 2024 season heads into the second half, with the side currently sitting in third spot.

Two of Loxton's three defeats throughout the season came against Barmera-Monash, and while the defeat to Waikerie would have been seen as a winnable game, the Tigers squandered opportunities in front of goal.

However, following the loss to the Magpies, Loxton put together an impressive three-game winning streak, includ-

ing claiming scalps such as Renmark, and Loxton North in the Proud Cup.

The Tigers are arguably the most exciting team in the competition to watch when they get up and going, boasting weapons all over the ground.

Harder has booted 12 goals across the season to this

Loxton North

Following a busy off-season period, which included a coaching change in February, Loxton North started the season with back-to-back wins.

However, the Panthers quickly headed on a four-game slide, with each loss coming against the current top four.

The Panthers had eight players depart the club throughout the off-season period, but they have still found goal scoring options.

Zac Wooldridge has 17 goals for the season so far, putting him in fourth spot on the leading goal kickers list, while Caleb Koehne and Ryan Proud have all been consistent.

Alek Kudra started the season strongly for Loxton

North in the middle of the ground, but has missed the past three matches, while Joel Worsfold and Masud Akaso have stood tall in his absence.

It's no secret Dave Higgins wants his side to play an attacking brand of football, which will need to be shown more often, starting with this weekend's clash against Renmark.

Renmark

Coming off a grand final loss is never easy, but Renmark has responded particularly well under playing coach Josh Vater's guidance.

A round one win over the Roos in the grand final rematch was a confidence builder for the Rovers, and as it stands, they are the only team to achieve the feat so far in 2024.

Renmark possesses weapons all over the field, with the likes of Zach Gartery, Matt Woolford, Dan Woolford and Vater all spending time in the middle of the ground.

Along with this, the Rovers made one of the most impactful off-season signings with Nick Gillard joining the club,

while the decision to have Alex Haynes spend more time ahead of the ball has paid dividends.

Renmark started the season with four straight wins, and despite back-to-back losses against Loxton and Barmera-Monash, appear to have season 2024 back on track.

The Rovers' adoption of a defensive style of game has continued in 2024, limiting options ahead of the ball for opposition sides, while producing big scores themselves.

Questions remain over the kennel as to whether Renmark can overcome the might of Barmera-Monash and have enough to claim the 2024 RFL premiership, having split the

season fixtures to this point.

That being said, the Rovers are well placed to get back to the decider, and while it's still too early to predict a premiership winner, they're well and truly in the mix in the second spot position.



Waikerie

Of all RFL sides, Waikerie is the most difficult to get a genuine read on, and its win loss record is reflective of that fact.

The Magpies had a slow start to season 2024, and were winless after the opening two weekends, but Mick Kilsby's side announced itself to the competition with a gritty 30-point win over Loxton in round three.

Other than the win over Loxton, arguably Waikerie's best performances of the season came in round four against Barmera-Monash, where the Magpies took the reigning premiers to the brink.

One of the biggest stories coming out of the Magpies has been the positional switch of long-term defender Steven Braun to the forward line, providing a genuine presence in

Interleague side falls short

THE King's Birthday long weekend marked the annual return of interleague football, with a Riverland side defeated by 64 points against the best of the Barossa, Light & Gawler football association.

Although it only trailed by 21 points at the major break, the damage to the Riverland side was done in the third term, when the visiting side booted eight unanswered goals, extending its lead to 73 points at the final change.

Quality was littered all throughout the Riverland side with all six clubs represented, which coach Damian Stevens said was a key factor in the selection process.

"To be a true Riverland side you need to get guys from every club represented, but in saying that I wouldn't have picked someone if they weren't up to the level," said Stevens, a former Whillas medalist.

"Everyone on the team was selected for a reason, and we had full confidence everyone we picked was ready, and it worked out well that we had someone from every club."

"We wanted all of the communities and clubs to be 100 per cent on board with everything, and to do that you need to have good representation from everyone."

"One of the big things we noticed this year was that the group gelled very quickly."

The game was broken open in the third term on the back of a 55-2 quarter in favour of the Barossa, Light & Gawler side.

Stevens said he felt the experience of the Barossa, Light & Gawler side shone through, and ultimately proved too strong for the youthful Riverland side to handle.

"It was the first time a lot of these guys have played representative footy and came up against a lot of bigger bodies," he said.

"They found connecting to the play-

put the bigger, more experienced bodies around the ball towards the latter half of the second quarter which just shook us a bit and we went away from our structure.

"To our younger players credit they really stood up well on the day, particularly Bailey White and Kade Hilton."

"We reacted to doing what they wanted to do after they got it on their terms, and they've got a lot of good players who can do that to you."

"Those guys went into the middle and started to win more contested football and spread from the contest, and that was probably the telling tale in the end."

Stevens was supported in the coaching box by current players Josh Nelson (Loxton North), and Trevor Thorpe (Renmark), who he said he leaned on throughout the build-up to the clash.

"I found connecting to the players really easy because I still had a good relationship with a lot of the senior players in the league which came from my playing and coach-

ing days," he said.

"I like to spread around and make friends in different areas, and I've got a lot of contacts at the clubs, so it wasn't a challenge."

"I'd coached the under 18s a couple of times in the past. A lot of those guys are now the younger players in the senior side, so I'd already developed those relationships."

"Leadership was something I was looking for going into the game because we knew we were coming up against a tough opposition."

"We wanted to make sure we were bringing through a lot of youth, but to balance that out we had the seniors there which was really important."

"Having guys like Josh Vater, Fraser Sampson, Sam Butterworth, Tim Woolford, and Codi Voumard all out there who have spent time in the A grade gave me a good depth of experience on the day."

"I deliberately approached Trevor and Josh to be my assistant coaches, because they built rela-

tionships too, and that made life a lot easier."

Stevens said he feels as though interleague football is on the rise, following a change of mindset from the clubs, with more players keen to be involved.

"The league made a conscious effort this year to give us quality opposition and that brings our high-end talent to the core too," he said.

"We're starting to work back, and although we are still a touch short, the guys who played this year will go back to the clubs and talk to the teammates about the enjoyment they had and the quality of football on show."

"I'm hoping that's going to spread further into the future, and we'll continue to build even more so after this year."

The Riverland under 18s side was the only victorious side of the afternoon, winning by 71 points, largely thanks to Lucas White's three-goal effort.

Meanwhile, the under 15s and under 13s side suffered 13-point and 94-point losses respectively, with the likes of Archie Kent, Hugh Riedel, and Lucas Deren impressing.





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
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
