Channel 7-AFL Riverland free-to-air bombshell...

WIN and Channel 7 will be urged to reconsider a decision that – from July 1 – will rob **Riverland free-to-air TV viewers** from seeing AFL, cricket and a raft of other popular programs.

In a bombshell announcement this week, WIN said it would cease broadcasting Channel 7 signals into the regional SA markets of Loxton and Mount Gambier, plus Griffith (NSW).

Riverland residents will need to watch Seven's AFL coverage via the network's streaming platform, 7plus, which requires Wi-Fi or internet data.

The decision also means all programs from 7, 7mate and 7two will no longer be delivered locally on free-to-air TV.

WIN said Seven refused to renew a commercial deal, however Seven has also made statements that it was "disappointed" a deal was unable to be struck.

Chaffey Liberal MP Tim Whetstone yesterday urged both parties to return to the negotiating table to "find a way to continue this service".

"I will be advocating strongly to both networks and to relevant ministers to ensure the voice of regional South Australians is heard when it comes to national broadcasting decisions," Mr Whetstone told The Murray Pioneer.

"This decision is a blow for our regional communities and a step backwards in media access."

Barker Liberal MP Tony Pasin said pointing Riverland residents to streaming services was no substitute for free-toair TV and not in the spirit of national anti-siphoning laws, which require major sporting events - like the Olympics, the Melbourne Cup, AFL, soccer, cricket, tennis and rugby - to be available nationwide.

"The requirements for sporting events of national importance and cultural significance to be available to all Australians free to air exists in legislation for a reason," Mr Pasin said.

"To now suggest that streaming services are equivalent to free to air is nonsense."

In addition to sporting events, Seven's free-to-air channels carry a long list of popular news and entertainment shows, including the high-rating 7News and The Chase.

Mr Pasin said the decision was another hit to locals already battling with cost-ofliving pressures.

"I know there are many in our community struggling with the cost of living and watching the footy or cricket is the highlight of their week," he said.

"To take this away from them would be devastating. I hope that an agreement between Seven and WIN can be reached to continue this important service.'

SA Independent MLC Sarah Game, who previously advocated for WIN to restore its Sky News service, described the loss of the Seven suite of channels as a "bitter blow" to the **Riverland.**

WIN ceased broadcasting Sky News on July 1 last year.

Country Arts SA early last year to fund the training to create, write, audition, cast, rehearse, and then perform a circus show full of tricks and talent, Ms Larsson said the local troupe has been "working hard since January to bring the act to a professional standard".

"There has been a lot of learning of new skills and tricks — so much of our cast have had to learn to get over fears, and now they are just thriving,' she said.

Ms Larsson brought circus arts to the Riverland when she moved to the region from the United States in 2021. Since becoming a local, Ms Larsson has been sharing her decades of circus experience and education in performing arts and exercise science with weekly classes of more than 80 students, held at the Our Lady of the River (OLOR) School's gymnasium.

"It's been a great opportunity for (my students) to see how big it is to do a full mainstage production," she said.

"However, in this show, sometimes people have up to five acts or more — it's a big difference and challenge, not only physically, but to just remember everything."

Ms Larsson said a major part of helping the 'Flying Through Fairy Tale' production come together has been using "local community expertise and resources".

"I brought Fleur Kilpatrick, from Riverland Youth Theatre, to teach a workshop, Rosie Clark Dance Studio has helped with choreography, and Berri Regional Secondary College alumni Melody Baldock will be filming the production as well,

she said. "It's been amazing to utilise local talent in this way.

"I just encourage the community to come along and enjoy the per-

formance. "So much effort has

gone into it by local people — it's going to be great."

Ending the Banrock Station legacy

AN iconic Riverland cellar door is set to close its doors to local patrons at the end of the month.

Though wetland management and operations are set to continue as normal, access to the wetlands and cellar door will be stopped after a recent decision to close the Kingston-on-Murray site.

Purchased in 1993, Banrock Station became formally recognised as a Ramsar Wetland of International Importance in 2022, supporting a wide range of native species across 250 hectares of lagoons, and 1000 hectares of natural habitat.

"We'd like to thank our many visitors, staff and local supporters who have been part of Banrock Station's story over the years," Vinarchy chief marketing officer Sandy Mayo said.

"While the cellar door is closing, Banrock Station's work continues. "The vineyard remains in operation, our wines are still an important part of the portfolio, and our team will continue to care for the wetlands in line with Ramsar obligations, including ongoing environmental management and collaboration with conservation partners."

"We are also continuing to explore potential partnerships with environmental tourism organisations to enable visitors to experience the wetlands into the future."

Banrock Station been recognised through a number of awards over the years, including a TripAdvisor Travellers' Choice Award (2021), Silver at the South Australian Tourism Awards (2022) and honours in the Great Wine Capitals Best of Wine Tourism Awards for both Innovative Wine Tourism Experiences (2017) and Sustainable Wine Tourism Practices (2022).

LOSING Channel 7 is an "awful" prospect for many Riverlanders, including Paringa couple Brad and Lorna Taylor.

In the wake of this week's shock news that WIN and Seven had been unable to reach a deal to allow WIN to continue carrying Seven's existing three free-to-air channels beyond July 1, many locals are considering how to watch AFL – and other Seven programs.

"Every night we watch (Channel 7), especially shows like The Chase, the midday movies (and) their main Sunday night shows," Mr Taylor said.

"We always put on Channel 7 news and... the football.

"But it won't be just us; I think the whole Riverland is going to be unhappy if they can't watch the football or cricket."

While owning a smart TV will ensure the Taylors have access to Seven's streaming service, Mrs Taylor said not everyone has that privilege.

"We will need our kids to set it up for us," she said. "It's going to be a challenge for us to use it."

Black spots barrier to streaming

RIVERLANDERS living in mobile phone black spots internet black spots will struggle to view AFL and other Seven shows, locals have been warned.

News that Channel 7 will be unavailable in the Riverland from July 1 has locals scrambling to ensure they can view programs on the 7Now streaming service, however the region's notorious black spots will be problematic.

"Not only is internet unreliable in many regional areas of Australia but it also comes at a cost, a cost that some simply can't justify when keeping warm and putting food on the table is the prior-

THE AFL needs to act to ensure its matches continue to be available on free-to-air TV in the Riverland, an SA MP says.

Following news that WIN and the Seven Network were unable to strike a deal to keep Channel 7 programs on local free-to-air screens, Independent MLC Sarah Game said the AFL "might need to step in" to break the stalemate.

"We know that connectivity issues in the Riverland, plus the fact not everyone has access to a smart TV, nor streaming services, means some locals won't be able to watch the football, the cricket, and their other favourite Channel 7 shows from July 1," Dr Game said.

"That's just unfair and discriminatory against rural residents. It's unacceptable and locals deserve better.

"So, I'm calling on the AFL to show some leadership, weigh into this debacle, and right this wrong.

"I'll be contacting the AFL this week with my request – it seems a very well-resourced organisation and more than capable of sorting out this mess."

Last year Dr Game advocated for WIN Television to reverse its decision to cease providing Sky News Regional to the Riverland and the South-East.

"But this is even worse," Dr Game said. "Hopefully the two parties can still reach a deal, and if not, the AFL – as I mentioned – and Cricket Australia should step in."

This week it was revealed that WIN and the Seven Network were unable to reach an agreement to continue their commercial deal for the Riverland and South-East, plus the NSW centre of Griffith.

Conservation project trials nesting boxes for Murray cod

A NEW research project being carried out in Bonney Lake, at Barmera, aims to introduce new habitat structures in an effort to boost native fish populations in the Murray River.

Designed specifically for the Murray cod, the nesting box is being trialled as part of a broader effort to support the recovery of the species in Australia's inland waterways.

The artificial structures aim to replicate natural breeding habitats that have been lost due to river regulation, habitat degradation, and flow changes, which have contributed to significant population declines in recent decades.

Recfish SA project officer Joshua Bland spoke about the technology used and the future benefits of these artificial structures.

"The miniature research rig, built by Ozark Technologies, a start-up technology company for research and community focused citizen science initiatives, and designed by us, is a nesting box for Murray cod, which uses hollow structures in its natural habitat," Mr Bland said.

"Current studies show that they prefer hollows with a singular opening, which is why we've picked a pickle barrel for this, so they can feel secure and create a nest.

"In nature, you'd find them in the cliff walls and under timber, so that's what we are trying to replicate, with a floating pontoon fitted with solar panels, a battery, and an internet router in the top of the mast. The router allows us to livestream footage from the camera housed at the bottom of the structure.

Mr Bland also said the technology has been used in other reservoirs, successfully recording breeding behaviours.

"This is probably the best chance of getting an idea of the Murray cod behaviour inside these structures, specially in Lake Bonney," Mr Bland said.

"This allows us to study whether it is a viable option for breeding and if we can use them in other parts of the river.

"The battery uses solar power to charge itself, and once it has enough voltage, we can start receiving live images of the habitat.

"From that point, it all depends on the Murray cod and their adaptation process. Usually, the fish start looking for breeding sites between April and May, and as the water gets cold, their behaviour switches from feeding to breeding.

"Male fish are the ones in charge of finding, securing and defending breeding sites, and we have witnessed breeding seasons from August to September, even October.

Mr Bland said the conditions of Lake Bonney may provide a different environment for Murray cod, but "usually the mid part of the year is when we expect to see most of the activity. Once that has been documented, we want to observe the process of laying eggs and their protection.'

"It is important to acknowledge that this research is focused on the natural population on Murray cod and not on farm fish.

"We hope this research helps to understand how they find nesting and breeding sites along the River, so that we can provide man-made structures that will help the population numbers rise."

The two organisations told Mr Waters about their vision for the building and outlined some of their needs.

staff would continue to work with the stakeholders and regular users of the Waikerie Institute to make improvements on the usability and functionality of the building, such as green room upgrades and electrical/lighting/heating/cooling works.

"It is a important community asset which will always require repair/maintenance and any future improvements will be a decision of the council," he said.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie allocated \$200,000 to upgrade the institute in its 2024/25

Work recently began on green room upgrades, including plaster and flooring repair, sanding, painting, minor electrical work, and mirrors/infrastructure.

A local plumber and a wastewater engineer are investigating the installation of mains water to the building and identifying methods to capture, contain, and correctly dispose of wastewater that is compliant and sanitary

The plumber and engineer are awaiting further advice from SA Health on their proposed options.

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ALL THAT JAZZ: Poppi's singing success

A RIVERLAND jazz singer swept the competition at her first eisteddfod appearance last weekend.

14-year-old Poppi Dowling — of Renmark — took stage at the Mildura Eisteddfod last Thursday, with the young vocalist named first place in the competition's 16 and under jazz solo category, after scoring a rare and difficult 96 out of a 100.

"It was unbelievable (to be awarded)," Poppi said.

"When I finished my performance, I thought I had actually done really badly.

"So, when I was announced first place, it was a real surprise — my singing teacher was screaming and so happy for me. "It was so exciting."

Though having a love for singing and her mum's old jazz records since she was young, it has only been in the last year that Poppi enrolled in the Mildura Academy of Music and Performance, where she and her mum now make the 140km drive to attend two classes a week.

"(My love for singing) started with picking up tunes," Poppi said.

"Now I love to turn (mod-

ern songs) into jazz and make them my own — some of my recent favourite music artists to do this to are Jack Johnson and Billie Eilish.

"You have to learn the pitch and range of a jazz singer, and actually, just learn to go with the flow.

"You have to often do a lot of low parts, and it can be very expressive."

Poppi's mother, Wendy, said singing teacher Georgia Mahoney had been "instrumental in building (her daughter's) confidence to achieve".

"When Georgia met Poppi she told us 'this is a voice that needs to be heard' and now she has just pushed Poppi to do so many fantastic things," Mrs Dowling said.

"I am just so proud, and it's all come from Poppi doing the work — the award is verymuch deserved."

Though only at the start of her musical career and experience, Poppi and her four-range octave hope to continue to sing jazz and keep performing.

"I would really love to keep entering into more competitions," she said.

"(This eisteddfod experience) has made me just want to sing as much jazz as I can".

EDITORIAL Confusion and the TV

IT was once common parlance that the heart of a home was to be found in the kitchen.

This may have been true for families pre-industrial revolution, however in the modern society it would be hard to argue against the television as being the stabilising force in western-cultured households.

For decades an enduring portrait of the classic Australian family has been parents with children, sitting around the TV and enjoying the AFL.

Whether you're a Crows, Port Power, or - maybe unfortunately - a Carlton fan, few family memories become as enduring as a Friday night spent debating umpire decisions, or arguing whose favourite player is the best in the competition.

Which is just one of the reasons the news that Channel 7 would cease being broadcast on our free-to-air screens from July 1, made on Monday, seemed to catch many off guard.

Many Riverlanders will have grown up while watching sports, news, and even Home and Away regularly on Channel 7.

Criticism of the decision has been widely voiced across the Riverland community in the time since the decision, with many important points – or potentially even flaws – rightly identified.

Also, while the 7plus app may not carry the – seemingly regularly increasing – monthly subscription fees as Netflix, or Amazon Prime, the necessity of having an internet connection, either through Wi-Fi or tethering from a phone service, means it isn't exactly 'free to use'.

This point also leads to what seems to be another oversight in this move, and somewhat of a disparity in the thinking between regional and metropolitan areas.

While high-speed internet services are now largely a necessity in the modern home and business environment, in rural communities such as the Riverland, where service disruptions are far from uncommon – we see too often the risks in taking this for granted.

That's not just mentioning the frustration when a favourite show is unable to be watched, it means potentially being unable to contact help in an emergency health situation, or translates into lost revenue when businesses are unable to operate.

There are some sacrifices that come along with living in a regional community. We may be without streets full of night clubs, may live away from friends or family, and have to travel long distances for important medical appointments.

However, in this day and age, surely access to vital daily information, and some of our favourite sports coverage, can be maintained despite not living in the metropolitan centre.



THE YEARS GO BY

Returned-soldier Wally Miller, unloading dip-tins prior to picking grapes, 1966. After WWII, Wally was allocated a fruit-block at Loxton North. Later, he and wife Pat were issued with a Nissen hut, but they had to wait for power, water, and the telephone. 'We had no money', recalls Wally. 'After buying basic equipment, I had just £4 in the bank. Everyone was in the same boat.' Wally worked hard, helping a local painter before planting his own block. He then '...bought a post-hole digger for his Ferguson tractor and dug thousands of trellis-and-post-holes for Cliff Thiele, who had a contract for settlement fencing'. Wally did '...everything and anything to earn extra money.' He put-in cover crops, grew peas and tomatoes, and contract-sprayed citrus and other crops. Wally's fruit-salad block grew many fruits including peaches, apricots, citrus, and grapes but this array '...was not a good idea.' It required constant work through good and bad seasons, rain, downy mildew, and frosts. But, Wally emphasised, '...the settlement was a good investment for the government'. Wally was much involved in this success, being on the boards of Murray Citrus Growers, the Loxton Co-op, and the Loxton Advisory Service, and was Secretary of the Ag Bureau, He was President of the tennis club and heavily involved in the golf club. Retiring in1985, he enjoyed time with family and community. He played golf, was an inaugural member of Probus, and assisted Neighbourhood Watch, Meals-on-Wheels, and travelled Australia and overseas. Where is the accountability?

READING page four of the 4/6/25 edition of The Murray Pioneer, I was incredibly disappointed to see that Barker MP Tony Pasin has been demoted as the opposition spokesperson for road safety.

For too long rural and regional areas like ours have shouldered a high number of road trauma, but it feels as though our concerns are being put to one side.

At the time of writing this letter, South Australia has had 36 road fatalities this year, and 358 serious injuries on the road.

While that is a drop off from previous years, it simply isn't good enough, because while that number is lowering we're still on par for more than 70 fatalities this year, and it feels as though we are losing our resources at a time when the region requires it the most.

The removal of a dedicated road safety spokesperson in Parliament removes a vital link between our community's concerns, and those making the decisions at head office. What isn't being realised is the consequences of this shake up, because it impacts funding, and lifesaving initiatives on our roads.

You only have to take one look at Facebook's Riverland Forum for new dashcam footage each day, or better yet, drive between towns on a daily commute to see that the roads are not up to standard, and there is always room for education.

The fact is that almost everyone has either been through road trauma themselves, or knows someone that has, and now we're opening up for further heartache.

What is more frustrating is that they're happy to get up on the TV, and on radio, and tell us that country people are dying on country roads, but then remove our resources?

Further yet, just 18 pages later, there is a story that the RAP (Road Awareness Program) will be heading to Riverland schools. I absolutely agree that education is the best form of training the next generation of drivers, and it should be done more than once a year, but what use is it if we're just losing our voice in Parliament in the long run?

Whether Mr Pasin is the right man for the job is subjective, and honestly irrelevant, because we need someone, or we will continue to be pushed to one side, even though this is one of the biggest issues in our state?

Start showing some accountability, appoint someone in a road safety role, and help the next generation of drivers, and current drivers be as safe on the streets as possible.

Calls for increased health investment

THE National Rural Health Alliance (NRHA) is calling for increased investment in rural medical, nursing and allied health training, following the latest release of the Medical Schools Outcomes Database (MSOD) 2025 National Data Report.

New data from Medical Deans Australia and New Zealand confirms that a majority of students from rural backgrounds remain committed to rural practice. In their survey, 62 per cent expressed a preference to work in regional centres, rural towns, or remote areas.

Students who undertook rural placements longer than one year were 10 times more likely to prefer rural practice than those without such experience. Membership in a Rural Health Club was also associated with a six-fold increase in rural career preference.

The data is clear, if we wish rural communities to have doctors, nurses and allied health professionals, we need to train them where they are needed.

Supporting rural medical, nursing and allied health students in their studies and building up capacity to train rurally would help address the ongoing health workforce crisis in rural, regional and remote areas.

Stronger investment includes support for both tertiary and secondary education, ensuring students are exposed to the rural healthcare sector early and can envision a future in rural health. Rural secondary and tertiary education institutions must be properly resourced to inspire students to pursue health careers.

Rural students wish to serve their communities, especially those of Aboriginal background, where cultural relevance to Indigenous communities is particularly important in areas with a high Indigenous population. We need to back them with the right training, support and funding. Many rural Australians are already going without access, due to the shortage of health professionals, particularly in areas with a population between 2000 and 16,000. Unless we act now, this situation will only worsen.

The NRHA also notes the significant investments the government has made to promote rural generalism as a solution to the chronic shortage of doctors and health services in rural and remote areas. The cornerstone of this effort is the National Rural Generalist Pathway, and the progression towards the formal recognition of rural generalism as a specialty within general practice.

We encourage the government to also address broader issues such as infrastructure, housing, and community support to retain the health workforce in rural areas.

Being a rural generalist health or medical professional provides clinical courage and the opportunity to use the full breadth of training and skills, with no two days ever being the same.

This is about more than health — it's about opportunity to increase the vibrancy of Australia, indeed its productivity. If we invest in rural education, we don't just grow the workforce – we build stronger, healthier communities from the ground up.

'No time' is no excuse

WHEN it comes to looking after your health, the often heard remark "I've got no time" is no excuse.

Be proactive and catch-up regularly with your GP to get your health checked – and if you suspect something is not quite right, book in to see your GP as soon as possible, the Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) has urged rural and remote men during Men's Health Week 2025.

Far too many times, men come to our practices or hospitals after sitting on a significant health issue for way too long, with many never having come in for a preventive health check either.

Rather than coming to see us, they've pretended their health issue doesn't exist, or they've asked their mates or family members about it, or they've consulted Dr Google...but in many cases we could have provided the care they needed much earlier.

Sadly, delaying their visit to the GP sometimes does mean the difference between life and death for some men... but in most cases, grasping the bull by the horns and booking in that early appointment has got them much better much sooner.

We know rural men are busy, and for those living on remote farms or in towns without doctors it can be a day's project to get to an appointment with your GP – but it is so important that you make the time to do that.

As is often said, your health must come first.

Please don't use the excuse of 'no time' to put off seeing your doctor for what could be a lifesaving consultation – whether that is for something urgent, or importantly a regular check-up that finds a health issue developing before it becomes a bigger problem.

You can also be proactive about your health at home, by doing things like regularly monitoring your own blood pressure, eating well, laying off the alcohol and exercising regularly.

But a key part of staying healthy means visiting your GP regularly, so this Men's Health Week we are urging all rural and remote men to take the time to make an appointment for a general check-up, or to talk with their doc about that health issue they know deep down needs to be assessed.

Even if you can't get in to see your GP this week, make an appointment for the next available spot. Trust me, you'll be glad you got things checked out

Disappointed at State Budget

COTA SA, THE peak body for more than 700,000 South Australians aged 50+, says that older South Australians are likely to be disappointed by the 2025-26 State Budget, but that the projected surplus, in an election year, gives hope there will be more to come.

Older South Australians consistently tell us that cost of living is their main concern, and we would have liked to see more specific measures in the budget to address this for older people.

We are encouraged by the Treasurer's statement that a surplus means government has capacity to respond to community needs, such as cost-of-living support, which is very needed for older South Australians.

We are disappointed that, once again, the State Government has overlooked the chance to bring South Australia in line with the rest of the country by providing free ambulance services for older people on the full Age Pension.

Many older South Australians are having to make an impossible choice – weighing up the cost of calling an ambulance against the urgency of their medical needs. This is a serious problem, and we will continue to advocate until ambulance services are free for those on a full Aged Pension.

An important funding reform missed for regional South Australians was expansion of the Patient Assistance Transport Scheme (PATS).

We see the development of the new State Ageing Plan and the upcoming state election as our next opportunities to advocate on behalf of older South Australians, and we look forward to sharing our insights and recommendations with government so that the needs of older South Australians are addressed.

Riverland property market shows strength

A RIVERLAND property industry expert says growth in the region is promoting local investment and good value for buyers.

According to a recent study by Real Estate Ray White, Australia's housing market acceleration, which began in January 2025 after just two months of price declines, exceeded expectations and is now pointing toward changing the regional property landscape by the end of 2026.

Current trajectories suggest South Australia will continue a growing trend, with regional South Australia achieving an average 10 per cent increase.

Senior sales executive, and founding member of Ray White Riverland, Greg Cram said "the Riverland property market has maintained its strong performance into 2025, with notable growth across key towns including Berri, Barmera, Loxton, Waikerie, and Renmark".

"Despite national market fluctuations, the local market has demonstrated resilience, underpinned by steady demand, lifestyle appeal, and regional affordability", Mr Cram said.

Mr Cram also said Riverland figures are outperforming wider trends and are expected to stay strong.

"Berri has seen a sharp acceleration in property values, with the median house price rising from \$340,000 in 2024 to \$381,875 in 2025 — a notable 12.3 per cent growth," Mr

Cram said.

"This is nearly triple last year's growth rate of 4.4 per cent, signalling renewed buyer interest, and while sales numbers are currently at 30 year-to-date (compared to 60 in 2024), the pace suggests a stable, consistent turnover as we approach the second half of the year."

Mr Cram said Barmera's market has stabilised over 2024 and expects to continue stable for 2025.

"After an exceptional 32.9 per cent growth in 2024, Barmera's market has moderated with a more sustainable 3.3 per cent growth in 2025, bringing the median price to \$392,500," Mr Cram said.

"Although current sales sit at just 16 compared to 52 last year, this reflects a market that's stabilising following rapid price acceleration, and buyers and sellers alike are adjusting to the new price levels."

Mr Cram also said Loxton has continued a stable housing market, with a moderate increase in house prices over last year.

"Loxton continues to impress, with the median price climbing from \$377,500 in 2024, to \$427,500 in 2025 — an increase of 13.2 per cent, following an 11 per cent growth over the previous year," Mr Cram said.

"With 38 sales already recorded this year (on pace to match or exceed 2024's 71), Loxton remains one of the most active and consistently performing markets in the Riverland region."

Mr Cram highlighted Waikerie's housing market as a quiet, but growing performer.

"Waikerie is quietly emerging as a standout performer, with median house prices surging by 17.3 per cent so far in 2025, following an already strong 15.7 per cent increase in 2024," Mr Cram said.

"The median now sits at \$410,500, up from \$350,000 last year, and although sales are currently at 18 (compared to 36 in 2024), buyer interest remains high, particularly for lifestyle and investment properties."

Mr Cram also said Renmark has sustained a consistent demand for houses and units.

"Renmark continues its growth trajectory with a 12 per increase in median price, reaching \$460,000 in 2025, following a substantial 20.8 per cent rise in 2024," Mr Cram said.

"With 29 properties sold year-to-date (against 80 last year), demand remains steady, with Renmark's blend of amenities, riverfront appeal, and infrastructure investment continuing to attract both families and investors."

According to the study, persistent construction challenges continue limiting new housing supply, providing fundamental support for existing property values.

The construction industry's ongoing struggles with labour shortages and material costs create supply bottlenecks, and land prices lack support for lower rates.

Darryle awarded for excellence in Riverland health care

A RIVERLAND Aboriginal clinician has been named in the 2025 Nursing and Midwifery Excellence Awards.

Proud Barkindji man, and team leader and nurse unit manager of the Riverland's sole Aboriginal Health Clinic, Darryle Barnes, was recognised for excellence in practice with the Mary Buckskin Award last month for his exceptional care, innovation and leadership that has improved the health of the local community.

"Though I have received other awards during my career, the Mary Buckskin Award has meant the most," Mr Barnes said.

"When I first began nursing, Mary was working for the Aboriginal Health Council, meaning she was always there to support us and help us — though she passed (recently), it feels like Mary is still here helping and supporting me.'

A registered nurse for 18 years, and now at the helm of the Aboriginal Health Wellbeing Centre for more than two years, Mr Barnes said his move to the Barmera clinic was inspired by a desire "to build a service that was culturally appropriate" for the local indigenous community.

"I was working at FocusOne Health previously, and my community kept telling me 'wherever you go, we will follow'," he said.

"A lot of my community don't engage with mainstream services because when people have experienced negative experiences, it has then run like wildfire through the community.

"This has led to health care not being accessed by the community.

"So, a culturally safe and culturally inclusive environment, where everyone feels comfortable and looked after, I could see was needed — and that's what we have worked to establish here

in Barmera.

"They know we are here to support them and help them through the journey — we all have each other's backs."

Expanding services and access by listening directly to the community, Mr Barnes said health services at the clinic now operate like a "takeaway menu", in which locals can come in and select whatever they need, ranging from an optometry, podiatry, general practice, diabetes, and hearing clinic, to physiotherapy, social work, rehabilitation, maternal and infant support, and Aged Care Assessments.

When I first got here, one of the first things we did was establish an Elders group, and now

they guide us as a service and what the community needs," he said.

'I basically act as a translator for those needs — essentially we are a community-controlled service.

"In the state, there is no other place like us.'

While Mr Barnes said he was "extremely grateful" for the positive response to his work, he is still working hard towards a "two-year plan" to provide more local services.

"I feel we are on the right path, but we're not quite where we need to be yet," he said.

"We are now trying to work towards establishing an Aboriginal focused mental

health service and a paediatrician. "But I am confident it will

all happen, as my team has just been amazing for (the past two years), and it has been so rewarding getting so much praise from the community.

"Though I am very grateful for the (Nursing and Midwifery Excellence Award), the best thing I can hear is my community telling me I am doing a good job — that's all I need.

"I think we have an amazing Aboriginal community here, and I think our community need to be recognised for the great things they do, and to let people know there are people here to help them."

Conservation measures lead to pines removal

NUMEROUS unwell and structurally unsound pines have been carefully removed from The Pines Historic House and Garden in Loxton, as part of ongoing efforts to preserve the integrity and safety of the heritage-listed site.

The decision follows expert assessments that identified the trees as posing a risk to the historic structures and visitors, with restoration works now underway to maintain the garden's long-term historical value.

The Pines - Loxton's Historic House and Garden committee member and community co-ordinator Marian Woodberry said the decision was made to preserve the remaining vegetation.

"About five years ago, we could see that the pines weren't looking too good, and our initial assessment led towards possums causing the damage, but in the end, it was just age and deterioration, I mean, they pines are more than a hundred years old," Ms Woodberry said.

"When the gardeners came in, they explained that

with these types of trees, when a limb gets broken or someone cuts off a part of it, it doesn't regenerate like other species. "In order to preserve the

others, a decision had to be made."

The pines at Loxton's Historic House and Garden were planted more than a 100 years ago, and due to current weather conditions in the Riverland, their ageing and deterioration process has accelerated.

A c c o r d i n g t o M s Woodberry, the remaining pines will be looked after, hoping to preserve them for another hundred years.

Composting: Simple, Sustainable, and Rewarding

Do you compost? If not, it might be time to start. Composting is a fantastic way to reduce food waste, enrich your garden, and support a healthier planet. While it may seem messy or complicated, composting is surprisingly simple and manageable.

Why Compost?

Organic waste in landfills produces methane-a powerful greenhouse gas. Composting diverts this waste, cutting emissions and helping the environment. Even better, compost captures harmful volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and aids in carbon sequestration. This creates a nutrient-rich, natural fertilizer that boosts soil health and replaces chemical alternatives.

Getting Started

Add twigs at the bottom for drainage and aeration. Turn the pile weekly to speed up decomposition. In 4-6 months, you'll have dark, crumbly compost with an earthy smell ready to use in your garden.

What to Avoid

Avoid animal products like meat, dairy, butter, and fats as they attract pests and slow decomposition.

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Chamber of commerce to finish operations

THE Riverland West Chamber of Commerce (RWCC) will be wound up and deregistered following a unanimous vote by its members.

Voting was conducted at a meeting on Friday night, or by postal vote, which closed on June 12.

Outgoing RWCC chairperson Angela Lukacs said about 40 people, consisting of members, their partners and former chairs and executive committee members, attended the meeting at Maggies River View Bistro, at the Waikerie Riverfront Community Hub.


She said the management committee recommended the organisation be wound up and deregistered after Loxton Waikerie District Council decided to support the establishment of a business alliance to support the Waikerie CBD instead.

"The chamber lost its funding with the council deciding to focus its efforts on the new Waikerie business alliance, which has Waikerie's CBD at its heart," Ms Lukacs said. She said council made the

decision after a consultant conducted a survey of businesses in the CBD. "Because we no longer have

the funding and we don't want to compete with the other group, we will close down," Ms Lukacs said. The chamber's executive com-

mittee needed at least 75 per cent



Ms Lukacs said the new organisation may be exciting for Waikerie businesses, but for those in areas such as Cadell and Morgan, which had been represented under the Riverland West banner, it was "a bit disappointing".

She said Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey has indicated her council will be endeavouring to support these through local progress associations.

Ms Lukacs said the executive committee will be notifying the relevant regulatory authority of the decision to deregister, finalising its financial obligations and distributing its remaining assets in accordance with its constitution and applicable laws.

She said the Rotary Club of Waikerie would be taking over the administration of the Waikerie Show and Shine and the annual Christmas Pageant.

"We are pleased that Rotary will be taking over these events in the future," Ms Lukacs said.

"But we had some plans that we are upset are not going to come to fruition."

A dinner was held as part of the meeting on Friday to celebrate the achievements of the RWCC, which has been operating for about 20 years.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton and Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey also attended.

Riverland businesses overlooked in recent State Budget announcement

A LOCAL MP has raised concerns over the future of Riverland small businesses, after the recent State Budget lacked relief for current economic challenges.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said tough circumstances faced by small businesses must be highlighted,

"Local businesses are the backbone of our towns, creating jobs and sponsoring community events and services," Mr Whetstone said.

"Regional businesses encounter unique challenges, yet the State Budget has done little to address these pressures.'

"However, they are finding it increasingly challenging as they face rising costs for electricity, water, insurance, and rent, along with an outdated payroll tax threshold.

"In the Riverland, many business owners are telling me they are struggling just to keep the lights on. Unfortunately, without a meaningful budget, more regional businesses may be forced to close their doors.

"Our businesses need practical, immediate relief because thriving small businesses are essential for thriving regional communities."

State Opposition leader Vincent Tarzia said that current conditions mean many South Australian small businesses are now operating with decreased margins and have been left with no choice but to cut spending, including opening on public holidays.

"For many business owners, keeping their doors open, especially on public holidays, is a real challenge due to rising costs across the board," Mr Tarzia said.

"It was disappointing to see such little relief in the State Budget for small businesses especially given the number of permanent closures recently, especially in the hospitality sector.

"We need to be making it easier, not harder, for small businesses to thrive here in South Australia and that's why we've called on the government to cut red tape, introduce measures to lower electricity prices and increase the payroll tax threshold from \$1.5m to \$2.1m.

Opposition spokesperson for cost-of-living Heidi Girolamo said recent increases to the minimum wage pushed many small businesses above the current payroll tax threshold.

"We welcome increases to the minimum wage, but the payroll tax threshold needs to be adjusted accordingly at a minimum to ensure that there aren't added pressures on our small businesses here in South Australia," Ms Girolamo said.

"Any increase in operating costs makes it harder for businesses to develop, hire new staff, or invest in growth which is the opposite of what we want for our state.

"State Budget papers also revealed that the Government will collect a record \$2.4bn by 2028-29 in payroll tax revenue while many businesses around the state struggle to make ends meet.

"We want to see this revenue go back into the pockets of hardworking South Australian business owners, not the government's coffers.

"Increasing the payroll tax threshold is just one commonsense measure that would provide meaningful relief for small businesses now."

Freezing success for Renmark North

A RIVERLAND school has now raised more than \$12,000 for Motor Neurone Disease (MND), with students ensuring their teachers brace the cold for the cause.

Renmark North Primary School held its second Fight MND Big Freeze event last week, with this most recent effort collecting almost \$6000 (and counting) to improve care for people living with MND, funding research for treatment, and finding a cure.

"Our wellbeing for learning leader Jack Rucioch is the organiser of this event, and the cause is close to his heart," Renmark North Primary School principal Mary Shannon said.

"It was just such a wonderful day — we had so many grandparents and parents come along to see the Big Freeze, and we had a lot of ice and water our student leaders enjoyed dunking on our staff."

For the past couple weeks, Ms Shannon said she had seen "fantastic support from students and the broader Riverland community", who placed their donations on nominated staff members set to experience an ice water bucket.

"This year we had 12 staff members sign up for the challenge, which was just amazing," Ms Shannon said.

"It's also been a very big effort to raise the money.

"While students have had the opportunity to come in and purchase Big Freeze beanies, socks, or cupcakes, and then use a token to pick which staff member to donate their money to, a lot of our fundraising has been (shared across social media) and received a lot of community support.

"We actually had a very generous anonymous donator who gave more than \$1000 to the cause, and so we could donate some Big Freeze beanies to our students."

While each nominated teacher was required to dress up and dance along to a song before facing the ice challenge, Mr Rucioch and Ms Shannon — who were the top two fundraisers — finished out the event by sitting in an ice bucket for up to a minute.

"We have had many people comment on how lovely it was to hear the children laughing and having fun." she said.

ing fun," she said. "MND is such a terrible disease, but it was great to be able to give back (and create) such fun and laugher — we're absolutely thrilled by the outpouring of generosity and empathy shown."

Looking to the future, Ms Shannon said Renmark North is already planning for "a bigger and better Freeze next year".

"We will definitely be doing this great event for 2026 — it's become our tradition," she said

A LOCAL council has responded to a long-term state plan for the region through to 2051, outlining key issues within the proposal that are set to limit the Riverland's "ability to grow and thrive".

Found within the council's May agenda, a formal response made by the Berri Barmera administration has been submitted to the Draft Murray Mallee Regional Plan, highlighting key issues including the need for co-ordinated infrastructure investment, recognition of the current district's Growth Strategy, and concerns regarding underestimated population and housing forecasts.

On March 25 2025, the State Planning Commission released the Draft Murray Mallee Regional Plan for consultation via the YourSay platform, with the plan setting out a regional vision to 2051.

With the Planning, Development, and Infrastructure Act 2016 requiring that the council's Strategic Plan and land use directions ultimately align with the final Murray Mallee Regional Plan, a report on the matter report reads "given the strategic significance... and long-term implications... it is critical council's voice is reflected in the final version (of the Plan)".

Throughout the submission 14 key issues are raised, all with recommendation for consideration in the finalisation of the Plan, including:

□ Regional Boundary Delineation and Data Accuracy: the council urges a reconsideration of the regional boundary framework to ensure the final Plan equitably reflects local conditions, planning work already undertaken, and full range of opportunities across the entire region.

"The current structure, which includes the Rural City of Murray Bridge within both the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan, and the Draft Murray Mallee Regional Plan, significantly skews growth data and distorts the distribution of regional properties," Berri Barmera Council's submission read.

"This approach risks overlooking emerging growth areas... and may lead to underinvestment in infrastructure, housing, and services where they are most needed within the region."

□ Alignment with Berri Barmera Council's Growth Strategy: the council requests the Growth Strategy and its growth targets be explicitly recognised and integrated within the Regional Vision and Implementation Plan.

"The (Murray Mallee Regional Plan) Draft document appears to contain limited or no reference to the (directions and recommendations outlined in the Berri Barmera) Growth Strategy," the submission read.

□ Infrastructure constraints and the realities of regional growth: while the council supports the Plan's recommendation concerning regional infrastructure and transport planning investigations, council suggest efforts must build on work already undertaken at a local level and outlined in the Growth Strategy.

"Acknowledging this work will avoid supplication, reduce delays, and help ensure that new investigations are well targeted and efficient," the submission read.

Population and housing forecasts underestimate local growth realities: council is concerned that both the Draft and Local Area Population Projections for South Australia (2021-2041) significantly underestimate population and housing growth potential of the Berri Barmera district.

"The high growth scenario forecast...projects an increase of only 251 houses by 2041 (in the district)," the submission read.

"This projection fails to reflect the current momentum and realworld development activity already underway across the district... such a low projection has serious implications for infrastructure planning and funding."

Regional migration rends and growth forecast assumptions: council urges a reassessment in light of recent development activity and strategic planning undertaken by council, for an accurate forecasting to inform planning policy, infrastructure delivery, and service provision.

"Council is concerned the draft Plan's population growth assumptions appear to rely heavily on historical trends, with insufficient consideration of the major demographic shifts observed since Covid-19 pandemic," the submission read.

Structural challenges for regional councils and the role of growth: council would like the plan to acknowledge structural challenges — a small ratepayer base, delivering infrastructure and services across dispersed communities, and limited resources — and support regional councils in pursuing sustainable growth models.

"Without such recognition and assistance, the long-term viability of critical services in regional towns will be increasingly difficult to maintain," the submission read. Vision 2051 — recognition

of regional identity and risks: council urges the draft to more clearly acknowledge the defining environmental and economic assets of the Murray Mallee, particularly the significance of the Murray River and the region's horticulture and agriculture production.

"Vision 2051 should not only celebrate the strengths of the Murray Mallee, but acknowledge vulnerabilities (to) set a pathway to support greater diversification, adaptation, and sustainability," the submission read.

Misrepresentation of regional service centres: council recommends that the final plan be amended to accurately reflect Berri's role as the principal service centre in the Riverland, and ensure that future infrastructure and planning priorities are aligned with this reality

"The draft Plan reflects a limited understanding of the functional role and settle hierarchy within the region, particularly in its reference to Barmera as a major service centre," the submission read.

"The omission of Berri in this context is a critical oversight and undermines the strategic importance of the town within both the local and broader regional framework."

□ Housing constraints and impact on regional service delivery: council requires urgent support through Renewal SA and the Office of Regional Housing and/or other State Government investment to deliver purposebuilt worker accommodation in Berri for government and essential service workers.

"Without targeted intervention to unlock housing supply, Berri's ability to function as a regional service centre is at serious risk," the submission read.

"Addressing this constraint is critical to meeting current service demands and supporting population growth and economic resilience across the Riverland."

horticulture zones: council encourages the plan to address the ongoing tension between the need to preserve productive horticultural land, and the increasing pressure from landowners seeking to subdivide for rural living.

"Greater clarity and policy guidance are required to help determine which areas should be retained for long-term production, and which could be transitioned to support alternative investment, or growth options," the submission read.

□ Implementation plan: not reflecting the recommendations and rezoning intentions supported in the council's Growth Strategy, the plan prevents a streamlined approached to rezoning and developments.

"Many of the recommendations within the draft plan appear generic and do not sufficiently build upon the detailed panning work already undertaken by council," the submission read.

□ Support for green infrastructure and tree planting initiatives: council supports the inclusion of greening objectives within the regional planning framework. However, to ensure these aspirations are effectively realised on the group, they need to be much further embedded within the planning and design code.

"Stronger policy provisions and clear requirements around green infrastructure delivery will provide the consistency and certainly needed to support councils and develops in aching meaningful environmental outcomes," the submission read.

□ Tourism growth strategic investment in the Riverland: council recommends strategic investment, including funding for infrastructure upgrades, support for local tourism operators, and initiatives that promote the region's offerings.

"By aligning with the South Australian Visitor Economy Sector Plan 2030, which aims to grow the state's visor economy to \$12.8b, targeted support for the Riverland can contribute significantly to this goal," the submission read.

Recognition of Aboriginal and cultural heritage and engagement: council recommends the draft Plan explicitly recognise Aboriginal land rights, cultural landscapes, and the importance of Traditional Owner partnerships in all aspects of land use planning, infrastructure development, and a natural resource management.


"Council is deeply concerned by the apparent lack of consultation with the River Murray and Mallee Aboriginal Corporation (RMMAC) in preparation of the draft Plan," the submission read.

"The absence of engagement with RMMAC undermines the integrity of the planning process (and) risks overlooking important cultural heritage values, land management practices, and Aboriginalled development aspirations."

Accessibility and inability of growth data and mapping tools: council recommends the consolidation of key population and housing data, a simplified userfriendly presentation of growth projections, and broader training opportunities, including faceto-face demonstrations of mapping tools to support community engagement.

"There are significant concerns regarding the accessibility of growth-related data, and the functionality of the web-based mapping interface," the submission read.

"Improved clarity and usability are essential to ensure stakeholders, including residents, landowners, and local councils can engage with the Regional Plan."

MID Murray Council is concerned about an increase it is seeing in illegal dumping of rubbish within the district.

The council said it costs a significant amount to attend to this problem, which also impacts on ratepayers.

It is appealing to the public to assist council in identifying and reporting the offenders.

"Illegal dumping can have a negative impact on the environment and animals, cause accidents, pollute water, and create a fire risk," the council said. "People or businesses caught illegally dumping can receive significant penalties and even be imprisoned for serious offences.

"This can be much more expensive than taking general waste items to our Waste Transfer Stations."

Members of the public are being asked to report any sightings of dumped rubbish, or someone dumping it, to Mid Murray Council.

The council said it will investigate to see if the offenders can be identified, and either fined or prosecuted. It is seeking details on whether the illegal dumping of rubbish presents a hazard to road users or pedestrians, where it happened (the nearest crossroad) and when the incident occurred.

The council said it would also be helpful to have the description of the person/ people involved, details about the vehicle and its registration number, and the amount and type of waste.

Strengthen your cybersecurity habits to stay safe this tax time

THE Australian Taxation Office (ATO) has reported more than a 300 per cent increase in email impersonation scams in the last year.

ATO impersonation scams are generally at their peak at tax time. Scammers know Australians are focused on lodging their tax return, updating their personal information and may be anticipating refunds.

There are things you can do

to protect yourself:

- Download the ATO app to securely, quickly, and easily manage your tax and super on the go.
- Always access ATO online services directly via (ato. gov.au), (my.gov.au) or the ATO app. Do not click on links or attachments.
- Use myID and set to the highest identity strength you can achieve. It's the most secure and flexible way to

access ATO online services. Follow these three steps to protect yourself from scams this tax time:

- Stop: Never share your myGov sign in details. Only share personal information if you trust the person and they genuinely require it. If in doubt, don't disclose anything.
- Check: Take a second to check. Ask yourself if it could be fake. Is it really the

ATO? If a link or QR code is directing you to provide information or to log into an online portal, don't click on it.

• Protect: Act quickly. If an interaction doesn't feel right, don't engage with it. Visit the ATO website or phone the ATO on 1800 008 540 to check.

Deductible donations

DID you support your favourite charity this year? Consider the following points to see if you may be able to claim it in your tax return:

- Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status: You can only claim a tax deduction for a gift or donation to an organisation that has the status of a DGR.
- Type of gift or donation: It must be money, property, or financial assets such as shares.
- A true gift or donation: You can only claim a gift or donation if you voluntarily transferred money or property without receiving, or expecting to receive, any material benefit or advantage in return.
- Check the conditions: Your donation must comply with any relevant gift conditions. For some DGRs, the income tax law adds conditions affecting the types of deductible gifts they can receive.
- Records: To claim a deduction, you must have a record of your donation, such as a receipt.

If you meet all of the conditions above, you can claim a deduction. Visit the website (ato.gov.au/giftsdonations).

Remember, to claim a deduction for any work expense:

- you must have spent the money yourself and you
- weren't reimbursed. the expense must direct-
- ly relate to earning your income.
- you must have records.

In most cases, your records need to include written evidence from a supplier - like a receipt that shows the cost, name of the supplier, date it was purchased, nature of the expense, and date the document was produced. You may also need other specific records, for example, a logbook for car expenses. A bank or credit card

statement (on its own) usually isn't enough evidence to support your claim.

The myDeductions tool in the ATO app is the perfect way to keep track of all your receipts and records in one place. It's easy to use, and for more information on keeping the right records for tax time, visit the website (ato.gov.au/ keepingrecords).

Bonjour, Loxton: Exchange students spark culture swap

TWO exchange students have swapped France's wine region for the Riverland's landscapes, after they joined Loxton High School through an international program.

Charlotte and Sophie recently arrived in the region, as part of Loxton High School's accredited International Student Program, which has seen students from Germany, Brazil and France stay for up to six months to complete their year 10.

Year 10 student Charlotte is originally from Bordeaux and chose Australia for cultural reasons.

"I wanted to do an exchange and learn to speak English, so I had two choices, Australia or New Zealand," she said.

"I chose Australia because I think it's really nice and from the images I saw in the media, I really wanted to see it. "The experience is different but good, especially for me to learn a new culture, and a new lifestyle, which is very useful for my future.

"One thing that is different, is that in my hometown I used to take the regular bus to school, with other parents and people going to their work, while here in Loxton, it's a dedicated school bus with other students, which I enjoy."

Sophie is also from Bordeaux and even went to the same school as Charlote, but they only met when both started studying year 10 at Loxton High School.

"I always wanted to do an exchange and travel to a big destination, so the organisation chose Australia, but I didn't know where I was going to live," she said.

"In the beginning thought I was going to be in a city, but after a year I like Loxton a lot. Most people told me that a lot of Australians live in small towns like Loxton.

"I used to walk to school since

"The experience is different but I lived in the city centre, and the od, especially for me to learn a change to a school bus is nice."

Both students agreed that one of the biggest changes was the size of backyards in Riverland houses, since in France, most backyards were small patches in two or threestory townhouses.

Within the exchange student program, host families are an important part of the equation, and Riverland families have opened up to these experiences in recent years.

The host family of year 11 student Taya is one of many in the area and decided to use a spare room to accommodate international students.

"My dad is on the school board, so he heard about the program through board members," Taya said.

"Last year, we were a backup host family for the Brazil students and when their family went away for a week, we received him during

that period.

"We loved the experience, so we decided to open our home to having another exchange student, and since my brother went to university, we had a spare room to accommodate.

"I am loving the experience. We went to Sydney and travelled a bit together."

Loxton High School international exchange co-ordinator Sarah Edwards said "the school is an accredited International Student Program school and so far, we have hosted a number of students from Germany, Brazil and France.".

"Students have stayed for a term or a semester and are usually in year 10 (15 to 17 years old)," Ms Edwards said.

"Students are usually hosted by families connected to our school, but anyone may nominate to host a student.

"The exchange program at Loxton enables our students to

connect to the world around them by meeting new people who share different experiences, cultures, languages, customs and traditions.

"Sometimes it's even an opportunity to rediscover our country and region by exploring with their international student.

"Host families and students are well supported by not only Loxton High School but the International Student Program and it is expected that our international students fully integrate into school and community life here in Loxton.

"Students participate in the usual curriculum but also can participate in our extra-curricular programs such as volleyball and music."

Berri domestic abuse arrest in recent SAPOL operation

A MAJOR state-wide operation, including the Riverland, delivered important results in the fight against domestic and family violence.

South Australia Police (SAPOL) Operation Storm's fourth dedicated antidomestic abuse operation ran from April 28, to May 12, with 331 police officers targeting 411 offenders, and attending 408 addresses throughout the state to locate high-risk domestic abuse offenders, issue intervention orders and ensure offender's bail conditions were met.

Deputy commissioner of Police Linda Williams said "overall, Operation Storm has improved the safety of hundreds of victims and children in South Australia".

"The recent days of action demonstrate we will continue to check on high-risk individuals, we will take action against offending, we will monitor compliance of bail and intervention order condition to help protect victims and prevent future domestic and family violence offending," Ms Williams said.

Operation Storm has resulted in the arrest of 311 domestic abuse offenders and the issue of 98 intervention orders since its commencement in July 2024.

Within the eight weeks of Operation Storm in the 2024/2025 period, SAPOL has utilised 1175 police members to investigate 1423 domestic violence offenders in South Australia, seeing 1636 addresses attended and 516 support referrals for offenders to access rehabilitation services.

"I commend the hundreds of dedicated officers across the state for their commitment to deterring domestic abuse and referring offenders to behaviour change programs," Ms Williams said.

"This operation sends a strong message that domestic and family violence will not be tolerated, and those who commit serious criminal offences will be held accountable and can expect to come to the attention of man was remanded in custody. SAPOL."

The conclusion of the first 12 months of Operation Storm has seen the following outcomes:

□ 311 arrests and 73 reports.

□ 71 warrants cleared, and 657 offences charged.

□ 239 bail compliance checks and 98 intervention orders issued.

□ 516 support referral provided and 26 firearm prohibition order searches.

□ 17 Stalking cautions issued. In a Riverland case, a 44-year-old man

from Berri, who is recorded as a high-risk domestic abuse offender, was arrested for five counts of aggravated assault and causeharm, including several strangulation offenc-

The man was taken into custody, and a full non-contact police intervention was issued at the Berri Magistrates Court. The

"All members of our community have a right to be safe, and we encourage anyone experiencing family and domestic violence to contact police," Ms Williams added.

"If you're not confident or comfortable in talking to a police officer, go to a family violence service provider and they will assist you and contact police if necessary.

"We continue to monitor and assess risk, while sharing the information with other services as part of a multi-agency response."

Operation Storm has also strengthened accountability for people who choose to use violence with specific and measurable targets, as outlined it the National Plan to End Violence Against Women and Children 2022-2032.

RIT's history events continued success

THE third-annual Renmark Irrigation Trust (RIT) History Festival event, held at the Renmark Paringa Library on May 21, attracted a capacity crowd, with over 100 attendees keen to know about a pivotal episode in South Australia's environmental history — the proposed Chowilla Dam.

Planned for construction 60km upstream of Renmark, the dam was to span a 5km-wide floodplain. Its ambitious design featured a 5.5km long earth embankment, reinforced with rock, intended to hold water at a depth of 10–11m above the floodplain.

The project also included

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a 250m concrete spillway and a 17-by-53m lock on its eastern side.

Conceived in the 1960s as a response to South Australia's water security concerns, the Chowilla Dam quickly became a focal point for political, scientific, and interstate debate. Mounting concerns — including salinity, escalating construction costs, and disputes among state governments — ultimately led to the project's abandonment in favour of the Dartmouth Dam. The Chowilla Dam was never built, but the controversy left a lasting impact on Australian water policy.

The event featured a panel of speakers:

- Ray Najar, a former Engineering & Water Supply department trainee draftsman, and ex-RIT staff member, worked at the Chowilla site from 1964 to 1967.
- Mark Stoeckel, whose family owned part of the land earmarked for the dam.
- Amanda Wells, a PhD candidate researching the environmental history of citrus growing in the Riverland from 1948 to 1970.

Amanda opened the session with an overview of the politically fraught history of the Chowilla proposal, tracing its evolution from Premier Tom Playford's bold vision in 1960, to its cancellation by Premier Don Dunstan in 1971. She highlighted the project's key challenges, including spiralling costs and environmental threats such as salinity and evaporation.

Ray followed with personal reflections on the excitement of contributing to what was then Australia's largest dam project. Using maps and charts, he illustrated fundamental design issues and offered an insight into the impact on SA, Victoria and NSW, had the dam been built.

Mark brought a personal perspective, sharing anecdotes about the impact on his family and their property. He recalled the work of construction crews and visiting politicians, noting that Mr Dunstan had a particular fondness for his mother's scones.

The event concluded with a question and answer session, during which audience members, many of whom had lived through the era, shared their own memories.

Landscape levy increase disadvantaging rural areas?

MID Murray Mayor Simone Bailey says a 9.36 per cent increase in the landscape levy in her district will cause further financial strain to ratepayers already struggling with drought and cost-of-living pressures.

The levy that Mid Murray Council collects, on behalf of the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board, has risen from \$618,709 in 2024/2025, to \$676,639 next financial year.

Ms Bailey said ratepayers in the Mid Murray district should have no requirement to pay such a large amount for the levy.

She said it was unfair rural property owners were having to pay about eight-times more for their landscape board levy than city counterparts.

"It is inequitable, last year if you owned a \$700,000 apartment in the City of Adelaide, your landscape levy would have been about \$13," she said.

"But if you sold that apartment and bought a \$700,000 home in the Mid Murray, your landscape levy would have jumped to \$103.

"It is just a massive disparity for the same property value, which would not happen with the state government's emergency services levy."

Ms Bailey has raised her concerns with the deputy premier, and Minister for Climate, Environment and Water, Susan Close.


"I just feel that councils are being squeezed from all directions, we have got rising costs, declining external funding and increasing expectations from our community," she said.

"It is just hard to stand by while state government levies rise for our community by a quarter of CPI.

"Councils face the burden of collecting these levies, but have no say in setting them.

"Our ratepayers think it is another council charge, and we cop their frustrations when it rises."

Ms Bailey said the landscape board levy should be collected by the State Government in the same way as the emergency levy.



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Landscape levy increase linked to rise in local property values

THE Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board says the 'The Landscape South Australia Act 2019' stipulates the landscape levy cannot increase above the percentage change in the CPI each year, unless exceptional circumstances are met.

A spokesperson for the board said recognition of such exceptional circumstances have to be as outlined in the act, or with approval sought from the Minister for Climate, Environment and Water.

"The total levy collected by the landscape board has only increased by CPI, which is 3.2 per cent," the spokesperson said.

"This is in accordance with the act. In 2024-25 the total levy collected was \$3,441,917, and in 2025-26 it is calculated that \$3,552,059 will be collected."

The landscape levy is determined by the capital value of each rateable property, and capital values are set by the Valuer-General.

The Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board spokesperson said it has no influence over this process. "The portion of the landscape levy that a council is required to collect is worked out using the total capital value of all the properties within its council area," the spokesperson said.

"The reason why the Mid Murray Council's portion of the total levy has increased is because the total capital value of the properties within its council area has increased.

"For example, in 2024-25 the Mid Murray Council's total capital value, according to the SAILIS land validation data, was \$3,310,958,274, and for 2025-26 the total capital value is \$4,119,383,808 - the second-largest capital value increase per council area in our region.

"This meant that in 2024-25, Mid Murray Council collected \$619,709, and for 2025-26 it is calculated to collect \$676,638."

The Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board spokesperson said how the levy is applied has seen no change, but the value of the properties across all seven councils influences how the levy is divided between them. "Under the Act, the land-

scape board is allowed to increase the landscape levy in line with first quarter CPI, annually," the spokesperson said.

"This helps the landscape board to sustain increased costs and demands on the organisation."

The spokesperson said landscape levies support practical advice and onground support for landholders managing weeds, pests, sustainable farming, and water resources.

"Landscape levies fund a wide range of initiatives across the Murraylands and Riverland including support for volunteers, Grassroots Grants program, environmental education in schools and programs that help communities adapt to environmental change," the spokesperson said.

"The landscape board is actively seeking additional external government funds to help landholders and communities manage landscapes more sustainably."



Probus Ladies get insight at Pioneer Museum

For their latest meeting, Waikerie Probus Ladies visited the National Trust Pioneer Museum, at the Doris Odgers Reserve, at Ramco.

Looking around, it was very noticeable how much has changed since settlement in 1894, and how much easier life is today, though there are still things in common.

Mike Perry, from the National Trust group, outlined the Odgers' family history and development of the property.

The first settlers arrived at Waikerie during South Australia's 1890s economic depression, with the hope of improving their lives.

They quickly got to work clearing land, planting fruit trees and crops, installing a pump, and building homes. Things didn't always go

smoothly, with the single and married men disagreeing about rations, leading to the single men moving to Ramco.

Doris Odgers' family settled in Ramco, and she was born in 1900.

She made the most of her life, living until 1984, and despite various personal losses became a marvellous seamstress, making clothes and doing repairs for many others in the community. She also ran the family's fruit block after her father died.

She was a great hoarder, which proved invaluable to the local National Trust group, as she bequeathed the property to them.

This insight into the past has indoor and outdoor displays, including Doris' cottage, a railway fettler's hut from the Alice Springs rail

line, a reconstruction of the interior of David Kirby's electrical shop from the 1970s, a blacksmith display, old carts, agricultural and household machinery, and more.

Various members of the National Trust group elaborated on things in the various buildings as members explored the property, then provided a tasty two-course lunch.

Club members will next meet back at the Waikerie Bowling Club on June 24, and will learn about the local Intercare shop, before morning tea then enjoy a fashion parade arranged by Tanya Starling. 
The variety and range of species always varies from year to year, depending on which have produced well during the previous breeding season, what the trends are, or availability for supply and demand.

Tech neck a growing health concern

NEW research has revealed Riverland women are at risk of to developing Tension Neck Syndrome, due to the overuse or misuse of technology.

Released by the Australian Chiropractors Association (ACA), new data on Tension Neck Syndrome, commonly known as 'tech neck' or 'text neck', has revealed women are the primary sufferers of neck pain in every age bracket, except 51 to 60.

"Women aged 31 to 40 (73 per cent) are the most affected, reflecting a life-long, daily exposure to tech," ACA president Billy Chow said.

"The survey also revealed that women were more affected by device-related neck pain across all types of devices including smartphones, tablets, laptops, desktop computers and game consoles, and are experiencing a higher prevalence of neck pain than men for each length of timeframe used.

"Women consistently reported higher neck pain rates across all devices and settings (home and workplace), and were significantly more affected by chronic pain, mental health impacts, and productivity loss," he said.

The survey found that women using laptops were 23 per cent more likely than men to sit at non-ergonomic desks at work, which was associated with a 16 per cent higher incidence of neck pain than in women who used an ergonomic workspace.

Additionally, women were 31 per cent more likely to slouch while using laptops than men, with 86 per cent of female 'slouchers' experiencing neck pain compared 75 per cent of slouching men.

Women were 30 per cent more likely than men to experience neck pain when using a tablet at work while seated at a desk without ergonomics; and at home, female tablet users seated on the floor reported a 79 per cent higher prevalence of neck pain than men.

Overall, 64 percent of Australians reported experiencing neck pain (68 per cent of women versus 60 per cent of men) – much higher than the official statistic of 1-in-5 with 70 per cent of neck pain sufferers reporting neck pain impeded their movement or dayto-day activities.

"What the data tells us is that neck pain is a widespread, increasingly gendered issue in Australia, with 68 per cent of women and 60 per cent of men reporting symptoms, most linked to poor posture, extended screen time, and non-ergonomic device use," Dr Chow said.

"With only 36 per cent of neck pain sufferers being aware that their neck pain was linked to device use, to help prevent users developing tech neck it's imperative we adjust our thinking on how we use technology, how often we use it and the way we use it.

"Of concern, 38 per cent of neck pain sufferers did not consult a healthcare practitioner, and only 29 percent sought a formal diagnosis.

"Instead, 78 per cent of neck pain sufferers used over-the-counter pain relief and 47 per cent relied on prescription medication. While more men preferred taking tablets, women used them more frequently with men 26 per cent more likely to use prescription medication for their neck pain."

While medications may offer temporary relief from neck pain, academic studies, show opioids do not benefit people with acute neck or back pain, and have no positive role in treatment. Comparatively, studies have shown that commencing treatment for tech neck promptly is crucial in preventing further functional decline and progression to a chronic condition.

Tech neck isn't only affecting Australians' physical health, sufferers are reporting that their mental health and productivity is impacted with 24 per cent experiencing higher irritability, 20 per cent noticing poorer concentration, and 23 per cent had sleep disruption.

The survey revealed that proper posture, regular breaks, and correct ergonomics significantly reduced neck pain prevalence.

Smartphone users who took regular breaks reported 33 per cent less neck pain, while 85 per cent of women device users who never took breaks experienced neck pain.

Studies have shown smartphone and computer use can have a significant impact on pain severity among tech neck sufferers with the most prevalent symptoms of neck and back pain linked to the length of time spent using a device and the degree of discomfort experienced.

"With technology a vital part of our modern lives, not only must we monitor the length of time we use our devices, but we must be cognisant that overuse and the way we use them can negatively impact our spinal health as well as our mental health," Dr Chow said.

"The ACA recommends limiting recreational screen time to two hours per day, holding devices at eye level to prevent bending the neck forward, changing posture and taking regular breaks every ten minutes to look away from the device and move the neck from side-to-side."

Incorrect and non-ergonomic use of computers is also a primary cause of tech neck.

Although most common among office workers, with 75.5 per cent of Australians aged 16 to 64 using computers daily, incorrect use and non-ergonomic workspaces can lead to a range of musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs).

"With MSDs, including tech neck, costing the Australian economy over \$55b annually through direct health costs, lost productivity and reduced quality of life, the burden on Australians and our economy is significant," Dr Chow said.

"Whether using a laptop or a desktop at home, for study or work, it's essential to take regular postural breaks every 30 minutes for movement and stretching and ensure workstations are set up ergonomically correct to help prevent tech neck, increase productivity and maintain overall spinal health and wellbeing."

Cash boost for Riverland farmers

FARMERS battling through financial hardship due to current droughts within the region can now apply for a state cash allowance, aiming to ease economic pressures and other difficulties.

Services Australia has made the Farm Household Allowance available for eligible applicants who can provide evidence of financial hardship and periodic updates on current farm's economic position throughout the year.

Eligible applicants may receive:

- □ A payment between \$715 and \$1011 per fortnight, for up to four years in a 10-year period (amount will depend on circumstances).
- □ A professional financial assessment of recent performance from a person you choose.
- □ An activity supplement of up to \$10,000 to pay for professional advice, training,

study, or mental health support to help improve your financial position.A Farm Household case officer to work

with you to help improve financial circumstances.

The officer will set up a Financial Improvement Agreement (FIA), a plan to help improve current financial positions, and setting out activities to do while receiving the allowance.

The \$10,000 activity supplement can be used towards a diverse range of activities such as business courses, regenerative agriculture training, drone and pilot's licenses, teaching credentials, diversifying, and establishing a farm stay business.

EXTRA doses of the Measles Mumps Rubella (MMR) vaccine are being made available free for eligible and at-risk Riverlanders as part of a new state-funded Measles Vaccination Program.

As part of a phased introduction of the program, a free dose of the MMR vaccine will be available for individuals in the following categories who are travelling overseas:

□ Adults born during or after 1966 who have yet to receive two doses,

□ Children aged 6 months to less than 12 months.

The program will be expanded to non-travellers in subsequent months.

These extra doses will be available through GPs and selected pharmacies from July 1.

With measles cases on the rise nationally, the new program will ensure more at-risk South Australians can become fully vaccinated, minimising their risk of getting measles.

Measles is highly infectious and spreads when an infected person talks, breathes, coughs or sneezes tiny particles containing infectious agents into the air.

Measles starts with fever, hacking cough, runny nose, and sore red eyes, followed by a blotchy rash that usually begins on the head, spreading rapidly down the body.

Complications are severe, including pneumonia, encephalitis and, sadly, even death. It can also cause a progressive neurological disorder years after the initial infection.

South Australia has recorded three cases of measles already this year. Nationally, there have been 77 cases of measles reported, compared with 57 cases for the whole of 2024.

Two doses of measlescontaining vaccine are required to maximise immune response and protection against this deadly disease.

With two doses, 99 per cent of people are immune to measles illness. The vast majority of South Australians born before 1966 likely have immunity to measles through having had a measles infection. People born from 1966 until 1989 are at risk because they likely only have had one dose of the MMR vaccine, as there was a onedose program at this time in Australia, and are much less likely to have had measles.

To be fully protected and minimise the risk of serious illness, MMR vaccine is being made available under this state-funded program and in the initial stages will be made available to adults in this age group who are travelling overseas.

There are international supply constraints with the MMR vaccine,

but the Commonwealth Government has provided additional doses from the Commonwealth stockpile.

In line with public health advice, people at highest risk of contracting measles due to international travel have been prioritised.

Infants aged 6 to less than 12 months travelling overseas are also at a higher risk of severe measles disease.

Under this state-funded program, these infants will be able to receive a funded MMR vaccine prior to international travel, noting they will still need two subsequent doses as recommended under the National Immunisation Program to ensure full immunity.

The program has been phased to allow those at greatest risk to be able to get vaccinated as soon as possible.

Ideally people should seek vaccination six weeks prior to travel if possible.

National Τhe Immunisation Program for children aged 12 months and 18 months ensures that all our little ones are protected with two doses of MMR, but now all South Australians born in 1966 or later are encouraged to check their MMR vaccination history to ensure they have received the recommended two doses.

TAFE SA to provide free period products for students

TAFE SA is acting to address disadvantage by providing free period products to all Riverland TAFE students.

Launching the period initiative Equity for all, last month, the \$300,000-a-year commitment will see more than 140 dispensers providing free pads and tampons installed in all TAFE SA female, unisex, and disabled bathrooms on campuses across the state.

The Bloody Big Survey 2024, conducted by Share the Dignity, gathered responses from more than 150,000 people across the country and found nearly 70 per cent of TAFE and university students in South Australia have struggled to afford period products in the past year.

The installation of the dispensers will occur in three phases.

"It is important that we do whatever we can to address barriers to learning, and it's concerning that so many TAFE and university students struggle to afford these essential items," Minister for Education, Training, and Skills Blair Bover said.

"This initiative will help address cost-ofliving issues, strengthen an inclusive culture and ultimately support access to high-quality education and training.

"With TAFE as the public provider of vocational education and training, it's important that all members of our community can access classes and have a positive education experience.

"That's why we are funding period products in TAFE campuses - so that their cost never results in missed classes, time away from campus or disadvantage in any aspect of learning or life."

Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic, Family, and Sexual Violence Katrine Hildyard said "girls and women should always be empowered to equally and actively participate in every aspect of community life".

"The cost of having your period should never be a barrier to that full and active participation – in education, sport, work or any other pursuit," she said.

"When people are forced to choose between purchasing period products or meeting other basic needs, they are placed in a position of systemic disadvantage."

Helen shares her Renmark journey with local WAB members **HEATHER EVERINGHAM**

FORMER Renmark pharmacist Helen Hall was the recent guest speaker of the Paringa branch of Women in Agriculture and Business (WAB). Helen was the eldest of two children of Norm and Julie Cox. and grew up in Myrtle Bank, where she attended Glen Osmond Primary School and Presbyterian Girls College.

In year 6, aged 10, Helen decided she wanted to be a chemist - because she liked the smell of chemist shops and as she enjoyed maths and science it seemed a workable goal.

Helen topped her first two years of pharmacy at uni and came second in her final year; she had met an older pharmacy student, Roly Hall, and his Alfa Romeo, and became slightly distracted. Roly and Helen married in 1971, and after saving they had six months of travelling in Europe and USA in 1973.

Roly had always wanted to be a rural pharmacist. His grandfather had been one of Renmark's early silent movie operators in the Lyric Theatre, today the building is occupied by Dave's Work and Safety business.

In 1974 they went into a partnership in Mildura, before purchasing Turner's pharmacy in 1975 in Renmark, where they were welcomed wholeheartedly into the community.

included the couple in her family's river activities and they entered into the spirit of fundraising for community good causes. That first year Roly was elected secretary/treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce and planning/making floats for the Christmas Pageant took place from the pharmacy for many years. Roly was also a member of the Renmark Hospital board and Renmark Hotel board, finishing up as chairman.

Carolyn was born in 1978, followed in 1980 by Miranda. In 1981 the family moved into their dream home on Arumpo Street. The pharmacy on Ral Ral Avenue thrived, along with its sideline of stocking cameras, and later providing a photolab.

In June 1989, Roly was diagnosed with a rare form of slow-growing liver cancer. Operations followed and also a family trip to the USA. Roly and Helen attended a cancer patients' retreat in the Yarra Valley, in Victoria, where the focus was on meditation, diet and positive thinking. After their return Roly started a meditation class in Renmark.

After 22 years of rewarding work the couple sold their Renmark pharmacy in 1997. In 1998 Roly started a project restoring a 1951 Ford custom 'twin spinner' vehicle. This consumed the last years of his life and Helen finished the restoration after Roly passed, on June 16 2000, at the age of 54.

Ballroom dancing had been part of the couple's lives since 1995, attending lessons and dances three times weekly. Today Helen and partner Lester Creed, a retired grape grower from Moorook, live on the river in the Jane Eliza Estate. Helen concluded her talk saying having a business in the main street was a great way to meet people and to be "in touch with the pulse of the town".

> RIVERLAND dog and cat owners are being urged to ensure their beloved pet's details are up to date in the statewide register ahead of annual registration renewals.

In July renewal notices will begin to be sent to dog and cat owners across the state and, to ensure a renewal notice is received, the Dog and Cat Management Board is calling on pet owners to update or register their information in Dogs and Cats Online.

In South Australia, all dogs and cats must be desexed, microchipped and registered in Dogs and Cats Online within 14 days of taking ownership if the pet is older than three months, or by three months of age if you acquire it at that age or younger.

Dog and Cat Management board chair David Parkin said it was vital that owners took the time to update details and to register their pets as soon as possible.

"If your pet happens to escape, the details on their microchip can be the difference of whether or not they can be returned to you," Mr

Parkin said. "For cats specifically, shelters have reported that 97 per cent of cats can't be returned because owners have not registered a microchip in Dogs and Cats Online and kept the information up to date.

"It is also important to note that, just because your pet is microchipped, it doesn't automatically mean they are registered in Dogs and Cats Online.

'Microchip details might be listed on other databases, but in SA it is a requirement for them to be included in Dogs and Cats Online.

"We strongly recommend that all pet owners head to Dogs and Cats Online to ensure their pets are registered on the site and that their details are up to date."

Owners will have until August 31 to complete their renewals in Dogs and Cats Online, and pay any associated fees, or risk possible late fees.

If you require assistance to register your dog or cat, contact your local council.



"She would love to have it that even though he's not here, his presence and spirit is here, and we'd love to do what he would love to do, and that's make a bit of money for the cause."

Mr Ebert said he would like to see the match return to the region in the future, whether that be in Loxton, or Waikerie, noting it would be something Russell would have loved.

A strong crowd of 1736 flooded the Waikerie Oval gates in April of 2024 for the annual match, the first one held in the town, following the first two fixtures held in Loxton.

"It was an event that everyone was always really looking forward to people wise, and I know Russell would really love to keep it that way," he said.

"It all depends on the powers at be, but we'd love to see it back in the Riverland in the future, and it just brings back those good memories."

Pizza Pockets



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 can (400g) chopped tomatoes
- 2 packs pre-rolled pizza dough
- or puff pastry (about 400g each)
 150g grated cheese (mozzarella + cheddar mix)
- 1 egg, beaten (for brushing)
- Chosen filling eg. pineapple, ham, ect.

METHOD:

- Heat oil in a pan over medium heat. Add garlic and oregano; cook for 30 seconds. Add tomatoes and simmer for 10–15 minutes until thickened. Let cool.
- 2. Unroll the dough and cut each sheet into 4 pieces (8 in total).
- 3. Spoon tomato sauce onto one half of each piece. Add your chosen filling and some cheese.
- Brush the edges with beaten egg, fold over, and press with a fork to seal.
 - 5. Chill in the fridge for 30 minutes.
 - Preheat oven to 200°C (180°C fan) and bake for 20 minutes until golden and puffed.
 - 7. Let cool for 5 minutes before serving.


