A DEADLY Riverland intersection and two other crash hot spots will soon be replaced with roundabouts, as the State and Federal Governments prepare to spend almost \$90 million upgrading the Sturt Highway.

At the May Renmark Paringa and Berri Barmera council meetings, project planners gave a deputation on the upgrades, which will include the Sturt Highway/Old Sturt Highway intersections at both ends of the Berri bypass and the Sturt Highway/Airport Road intersection near Renmark being turned into roundabouts.

Other upgrades along the highway include pavement works, new safety barriers, two new and three upgraded rest areas, four new overtaking

lanes and curve widening near Renmark, plus the previously announced Truro bypass.

A potential highway duplication between Berri and Renmark, currently not funded for design or construction, is also in the plans.

Renmark's new-look **Christmas for 2021**

A LIVE show from a longtime children's entertainer, plus a visit from Santa Claus, will highlight a Riverland council's new Christmas festival this year.

Renmark Paringa councillors passed a motion at last week's general meeting to endorse the delivery of a month-long Christmas on the Murray Festival format, budgeted to cost \$82,500.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Neil Martinson said the new structure would ensure a Christmas celebration could be held for the community.

"While we know the community look forward to a pageant each year, we feel that this new event in the

form of a festival will provide so many more opportunities for our community to come together and reduces the risk of a one-time event being cancelled for reasons which are beyond council's control," Mr Martinson said.

A lighting of the town's Christmas tree - including late night shopping and food options - at the Taylor Riverfront Precinct will begin the festival, which is also set to include a teddy bears Christmas picnic, Renmark's Carols in the Garden, and a live performance by Peter Coombe at the Chaffey Theatre, on December 18.

Councillors voted to allo-

cate \$40,500 from the cancelled 2020 Christmas on the Murray - along with \$42,000 from the 2021/22 budget – toward the event.

Renmark Paringa Council's planned Christmas on the Murray events were cancelled in 2019 due to extreme hot weather, and in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Famous Riverland festival re-badged...

A rose by any other name

AN iconic Riverland festival known for its flowers and open gardens has been renamed to honour and reflect its growth.

The Renmark Riverland Rose Festival will now be known as the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival, to "embrace all Riverland towns".

Riverland Rose and Garden Festival president Sheree Chappel welcomed the new

"Over its 26-year history, the festival has grown to a point where it now embraces all Riverland towns with nearly half of open gardens last year being outside of Renmark," Mrs Chappel said.

"While roses will always be a key focus of the festival, the growth in the number of open gardens and other related attractions has seen it grow into possibly the largest event of its type in Australia."

Mrs Chappel said the decision to change the festival's name was "not taken lightly".

"The decision has been evolving from a strategic planning workshop in June 2020, followed up with a public meeting in April, 2021," she said.

"Both came to the same conclusion that in order to survive, the festival must grow to

"The magnificent army of volunteers who have supported the festival for 26 years have either passed away, retired, or are fatigued out, which is quite understandable.

We now have an active committee and friends of 14 members representing Renmark, Paringa, Lyrup, Berri, Barmera, Loxton and Waikerie.

"With the involvement of all Riverland towns, in 2021 we are planning a bigger and better festival as a stepping-stone for the big year in 2022.'

Mrs Chappel said she looks forward to what's to come.

"In October, 2022, Adelaide will host the 19th World Federation of Rose Societies Convention," she said.

"The committee is working hard for the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival to be front and centre in the lead-up to this international event.

"World Federation of Rose Societies president Henriann de Briey has recently confirmed her acceptance to open our festival on Saturday, October 15, 2022, and will also spend a couple of days with us visiting place of special interest to her."

Rivafest 2021 now officially off the table

THE difficulties associated with a COVID Management Plan has seen a Riverland council officially cancel an annual wine and food festival.

Renmark Paringa councillors passed a motion at last week's general meeting to cancel the 2021 Rivafest, with "the intent of the event returning in 2022".

Renmark Paringa director of corporate and community services, Tim Pfeiffer, said attempts were made to change the date – and format – of the event.

"The event usually occurs in January each year and takes many months to plan," Mr Pfeiffer said

"In August last year it was postponed by council due to the challenges associated with COVID-19 and since then staff have investigated whether the event could be held in the regular format at a later date, or in an entirely different format.

"No obvious opportunities have presented and so council has cancelled the event that should have occurred in January 2021.'

Renmark Paringa councillors voted at the August 2020 general meeting to postpone the Rivafest event.

Mr Pfeiffer said costs of implementing and maintaining a COVID-management plan would have added extra expense for council.

"Rivafest is run on a costneutral basis in order to limit the cost to ratepayers," he

"The income from ticket sales, stallholders and sponsors nets off the expenses for shelter, furniture, marketing and entertainment.

"This means that the event needs to attract a comparatively large crowd in order to be viable.

"However, events with crowds over 999 people require a COVIDmanagement plan, which therefore requires a higher planning cost, additional infrastructure and enhanced compliance on the night."

COVID means Renmark unable to seize the day

TRAVEL issues caused by Victoria's latest COVID-19 lockdown have seen an upcoming stage play cancelled in a Riverland town.

Renmark Paringa Council yesterday announced the upcoming performance of Carpe Diem – set to be held at the Renmark Bowling Club on Friday, June 11 – had been cancelled due to current border restrictions between South Australia and Victoria.

Stars John Voce and John Wood – both based in Melbourne - had been unable to confirm their attendance for the show, after Victoria entered a seven-day lockdown period due to a COVID-19 outbreak.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Neil Martinson said "council is very disappointed that we have had to cancel the performance, but the situation is out of our control".

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Berri cyclists get their wish

BERRI cyclists will soon have a place to pump up their tyres and fix their bikes, with a new cycling station set to be installed along the town's river front.

At their most recent meeting, Berri Barmera Council elected members approved the installation of a cycling stand near the Berri Marina and Berri Riverside Holiday Park, at a total cost of \$6454 including installation.

The decision follows the installation of a similar station in Barmera, with funding from SA Carp Frenzy in conjunction with Barmera Central, in 2019.

"The idea for the station originated from the Berri Bike Boys who approached the

Committee," said Karyn Burton, Berri Barmera Council CEO.

"It will be going in near the boat landing, which will make it easily available to people coming from the caravan park or the hotel.

"Gopher riders can also easily access it for their tyres.

"People have made comment to council in the past about difficulty accessing the OTR petrol station on Old Sturt Highway, which is where they currently go to pump up their tyres, so this stand will help with that."

The installation of the stand is likely to occur in July, with a small allocation of ratepayer money to be included in the council's upcoming annual business plan.

Berri **Barmera** councillors voice traffic concerns

BERRI Barmera councillors raised several traffic issues with Sturt Highway upgrade planners during council's most recent monthly meet-

Cr Trevor Scott expressed concerns that the upgrades would be ineffective at improving safety.

"Why don't you just do a dual highway all the way through?" he asked the plan-

"Spend the money, save the lives and solve the problem."

Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) senior project manager Ross Papillo said the business case for the upgrades had been completed previously.

"We're not the planning group, we're the project delivery group," he said.

Cr Margaret Evans said she believed the Sturt Highway/Madison Road intersection in Monash should also be upgraded and that the "local people feel that is still going to be a dangerous intersection".

Mr Papillo said there were separate safety studies being undertaken, but was unable to discuss them.

Cr Evans also raised a complaint about the uneven surface along the Old Sturt Highway between Berri and Barmera, which Mr Papillo said he would take back to his department.

"From the feedback we got last time we were up here, that was one thing that was brought up," he said.

"Running through that stretch myself I would have






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A roundabout way



Governments join forces and pledge \$90 million for Sturt Highway safety solutions

A DEADLY Riverland intersection and two other crash hot spots will soon be replaced with roundabouts, as the State and Federal Governments prepare to spend almost \$90 million upgrading the Sturt Highway.

At the May Renmark Paringa and Berri Barmera council meetings, project planners gave a deputation on the upgrades, which will include the Sturt Highway/Old Sturt Highway intersections at both ends of the Berri bypass and the Sturt Highway/Airport Road intersection near Renmark being turned into roundabouts.

Other upgrades along the highway include pavement works, new safety barriers, two new and three upgraded rest areas, four new overtaking lanes and curve widening near Renmark, plus the previously announced Truro bypass.

A potential highway duplication between Berri and Renmark, currently not funded for design or construction, is also in the plans.

The upgrades prioritise improving safety and freight efficiency, with upgrades aimed at accommodating trucks up to 36.5m in length

along the highway, and if approved will begin as soon as early 2022.

Eighty per cent of funding for the upgrades will be provided by the Federal Government, while the State Government will fund the other 20 per cent.

The Jury Road/Fuller Road/Old Sturt Highway intersection in Berri, west of the Berri Club, will also be upgraded to be suitable for B-double trucks as part of the upgrades.

Local truck driver Barry Fletcher said the proposed upgrades were a win for motorists across the region.

"The roundabout is the best option for those junctions," he said.

"It'll slow down the traffic, it will make people more aware of other traffic as they enter the intersection and it'll be miles safer. You won't be heading into the intersection wondering if other drivers are going to stop or not.

"It's been a long time coming..."

At the Berri Barmera Council meeting, Wallbridge Gilbert Aztec civil and traffic engineer Heath Blacker said the western Sturt Highway/Old Sturt Highway intersection near Barmera, which has been the site of multiple fatalities

in the past decade, was the highest priority site.

"The left turn as you head towards Monash and Renmark will remain as is. The roundabout is really trying to manage that right turn as you come off the Sturt Highway and that conflict as you go from Barmera to Berri on the Old Sturt Highway," he said,

"It's trying to get those at a lower speed from a safety aspect and changing the angle of impact.

"The proposal is to leave a free flow of traffic from Berri through to Barmera – you'll just drive through you won't enter the roundabout and you'll merge back as you do now.

"It's really about trying to manage and slow the conflict points."

Mr Blacker said a similar philosophy was being used at the eastern junction – a hotspot for truck rollovers – with the length of the left turn from Barmera to Renmark set to be increased to allow for greater speeds.

"One of the issues with the junction is the left-hand turn is slow and then you have fast-moving traffic coming from Berri, so we want to make the turn faster," he said.

"The through movement from Berri to Renmark goes through the roundabout and will be slowed by that process and the merge will be at a similar speed...

"Again, we're looking to have the free flow from Renmark to Berri because this is a heavily used movement. "Because the right-hand turn

traffic (from Barmera to Berri) is so low, they'll merge with the through traffic going from Renmark to Berri."

With the proposed Airport Road junction, all traffic will travel through the roundabout.

Renmark Paringa Council CEO Tony Siviour said all Riverland councils supported the "safe passage of vehicles on the Sturt Highway" and that the works were a "step forward towards achieving a dual-lane highway from Nuriootpa to Renmark".

"The provision of safer passage onto the Sturt Highway from the Airport Road intersection is something council has lobbied to have considered for several years," he said.

"This will build on council's work over the last two financial years in transforming Government

Road into a strategic freight route."

Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) senior project manager Ross Papillo told the Berri Barmera Council the long-term plan for the highway was to accommodate trucks up to 53.5m in length.

Responding to a question from Cr Andrew Kassebaum about how trucks of that length would cross the Paringa Bridge, Mr Papillo said different strategies were being planned.

"There are different planning studies going on about the PBS level 4A network across the state," he said.

"The first part is getting that up to level 3A now. We're hopeful that should be in place by the end of the year. Some widening work is being done there now by McMahon (Services)."

The upgrades along the highway are still subject to Public Works Committee requirements and funding approvals.

DIT refused to provide the Murray Pioneer with diagrams shown at the public council meetings, stating that the projects were early in their design phase and subject to change.

Roadworks will be a nightmare

THE final plans are a long way off, but the construction of three roundabouts - in whatever format they are delivered – is certain to improve safety at key traffic points in the Riverland.

Opinion will vary and some will suggest other options make more sense, but once completed, it will be a safer stretch of road for all users.

In truth, the roads are already safe. Unless infrastructure is literally crumbling, driver error is generally what makes roads unsafe.

But reducing the chances of driver error certainly contributes to less likelihood of accidents, hence the roundabout plan.

Before then, Riverland road users and those passing through the region are likely to endure a seemingly never-ending nightmare period of roadworks.

Only recently the extensive works to the Bookmark Bridge, just outside Renmark, seemed to drag on and on – certainly for daily commuters.

Given the extent of this new roadworks project, expect significant and lengthy disruptions at all sites. Anyone driving from, say, Barmera to Renmark daily would be hoping the projects are completed individually, rather than together, as the combined delays would be substantial.

Fortunately, projects such as this elicit a degree of understanding from motorists, who adopt the 'it'll be worth it when it's finished' attitude.

But that only lasts for so long, before frustration creeps in.

Nobody condones road rage, and often motorists get agitated over relatively minor delays. What's 10 minutes in the overall scheme of things? And what about people who sit through traffic jams in big cities?

But roadworkers often do themselves no favours, most notably with their haphazard and careless placement of speed-restriction

The speed restrictions are often set up way too early, meaning motorists are unnecessarily crawling along while wondering where the roadworks actually start. Priority must be given to keeping roadside workers safe, but in many cases, the placement of restriction signs leaves a lot to be desired.

And nothing infuriates motorists more than speed restriction signs being inexplicably left out after roadworks have finished - either temporarily or permanently – and workers have moved on.

Or when signs proclaiming a return to regular speed limits are forgotten altogether:

"Am I still meant to be doing 40km/h, or is it back to 110km/h?"

Ironically, indiscriminate and commonsense-free placement of restriction signs is actually counter-productive to the overall goal of making these work sites safer.

If a motorist becomes accustomed to speed restrictions being imposed too far away from work sites, they are less likely to respect the signs and instead impose their own judgments on the situation. The driver knows that – for some distance at least - the road is safe to travel at above the signed speed limit. So that's what they do.

But if the signs were placed more judiciously, and penalties applied to those who routinely flout the lower limits, speedrestriction signs might carry more weight, and keep us all a little safer.

Time to crackdown on council behaviour

50th anniversary of Operation Overlord

ON June 7 we commemorate the 50th anniversary of Operation Overlord, including the Battle of Long Khanh, in the Vietnam War.

Named after the World War II Allied invasion of Normandy, Operation Overlord was launched after intelligence suggested the North Vietnamese Army was using a buffer zone between Phuoc Tuy and Long Khanh provinces to train and equip troops.

Australian and New Zealand troops began deploying on June 5, 1971 to prevent the enemy from gaining a foothold into Phuoc Tuy province.

On June 7, the Australians were engaged in more than eight hours of intense fighting before the enemy withdrew. This became known as the Battle of Long Khanh and tragically three Australians died during the battle, with a further seven Australians killed in an ambush

five days later.

The anniversary of the Battle of Long Khanh is an opportunity for us all to pause and remember the service and sacrifice of those Australians who served in this engagement, on Operation Overlord and all those Australians who served in the Vietnam War - the longest 20th century conflict in which Australians participated.

Almost 60,000 Australian Defence Force personnel served in the Vietnam War, with some 3000 wounded and 521 tragically killed.

A national commemorative service will be held at the Australian Vietnam Forces National Memorial in Canberra on June 7 to recognise the anniversary Operation Overlord including the Battle of Long Khanh, and pay tribute to those who served, and those who died during this operation.

Lest we forget.

Barmera Primary goes back in time

ALMOST 150 people gathered on Barmera Primary School's oval last weekend for the opening of a time capsule buried in the '80s.

The school community welcomed past staff, students, locals and Governor Hieu Van Le to the opening of the time capsule, which was buried in 1982, last Saturday morning.

Barmera Primary School centenary and events co-ordinator Glenys Matthews said the event was a success.

"Quite a few former staff and students joined us at 11am before opening the time capsule at midday," she said.

day," she said.
"People viewed the display of photographs and memorabilia in the hall and caught up with each other.

"The governor arrived at 12 noon for the official opening of the time capsule and Marie Thornhill, a former Aboriginal education worker at the school and elder, did the welcome to country.

"The school choir sang the national anthem and our principal Jayne Foulds welcomed everyone.

"The student leaders spoke about the history of the school over the past 100 years and the governor then spoke of his love for the region as it was where he began his life in Australia after arriving as a refugee."

Mrs Matthews said the time capsule contained a range of items.

"Inside the time capsule were plans of the school, a program of the school's opening, financial records, exercise books, stationary, readers, report cards, blackboard duster and chalk, electricity trust regional summary, the Advertiser and Murray Pioneer dated in 1982," she said.

"Front page of the newspaper at the time was the well-known Australian mystery of Azaria Chamberlain's death.

"Students had placed things in the time capsule also such as letters they'd written to their future self, parents, grandparents and children, and stories and artwork made by students.

"Unfortunately, there was some water inside the time capsule and some items were damaged but what we could salvage we repackaged and put them back in the time capsule.

"Because of the condition of the personal material it was hard for people to recognise anything, however one lady was able to recognise the envelope she had placed a letter to her husband in and some people recognised an address and knew who had lived there at the time.

"All contents will be stored and some of it will be put into a new time capsule, which will be organised later in the year."

Residents urged to follow hard rubbish rules

A LOCAL council is asking local residents to stick to the rules as it undertakes an e-waste and mattress collection around the district.

Berri Barmera Council picked up a large amount of rubbish during a collection in Berri last week, and is currently midway through a collection in Barmera before focusing on the minor towns in the district next week.

Council CEO Karyn Burton said residents should consult brochures sent out by council before putting out rubbish.

"What happens now is that if our compliance officer has to go around and tell people to take rubbish back again, the cost of that work goes back to the ratepayers," she said.

"It is an added expense because people aren't doing the right thing."

Following the success of the project, Ms Burton said council was proposing to hold hard waste collections around the district on a rolling basis.

"We have had budget discussions about having another hard waste collection in Berri again next year, so if people want to hold on to their hard rubbish until then, we have proposed to do another one in the next financial year," she said.

"There have been a lot of mattresses and e-waste picked up, so this has definitely been a worthwhile exercise."

Safety concerns shut jetty

THE Barmera jetty has been closed temporarily due to stability concerns, while the local council looks at options for the site's future use.

Berri Barmera Council fenced off access to the jetty last week, with the area to remain closed until staff can engage maritime contractors to prop up and stabilise the structure.

The jetty was closed in April 2020, after one of the wooden posts supporting the structure

broke during stormy weather, but was reopened after council braced the post.

Council CEO Karyn Burton said the propping solution would allow council to undertake public consultation and prepare funding applications for future works on the jetty.

"I'm sure the public will want to have some say as to whether they want a whole new structure, bring back the old style of jetty, or whatever it might be," she "That will be a costly exercise in the long run, so this propping solution is a temporary solution to make sure the jetty is safe for people to access.

"Until we have those props in place we have done a risk analysis and decided we need to close off access.

"Hopefully it won't be long until that is done."

Ms Burton said the community would be heavily involved in the planning process for the jetty.

"It will be an emotive topic in

Barmera as it is an iconic structure for the town," she said.

"We often get people say they love the old jetty... I believe that would be quite an expensive exercise so unless we get grant funding for something like that it may be out of council's reach but we will go down that planning process with the community onboard."

Council confidentially discussed potential options for the Barmera jetty at its May monthly meeting last week.



Berri Barmera caps rate rise, but increases service charges

A RIVERLAND council is proposing to from \$700 to \$724.60 for each vacant land freeze its rate in the dollar for the upcoming financial year, but will increase wastewater and waste management charges - and benefit from increased valuations.

In a proposed 2021-22 budget, which was set to be endorsed by elected members at a special meeting last night, Berri Barmera Council will hold the rate in the dollar for all land at the same values as the 2020-21 financial year.

Council will also cap rate rises due to valuation increases at 1.5 per cent for all residential properties, while rate increases on primary production, commercial, industrial and vacant land will be capped at 12 per cent.

However, the community wastewater management charge are set to increase 3.5 per cent property and from \$734.50 to \$760 for each occupied property.

Under the proposal, council's waste management service charge will increase 2.5 per cent on 2020-21 charges to \$234 for three-bin collection and \$198 for two-bin collection.

Overall, a residential property valued at \$200,000 with three bins in the Berri Barmera district will pay \$2314 in rates and service charges in 2021-22. This compares to \$2292.80 in 2020-21 for the same value property.

Property owners with an additional red bin will be charged \$215, up from \$210 for the 2020-21 financial year. The draft annual business plan and budget will now be put out for community consultation.

Funding for Paringa silo

LIGHTING and sheds for shelter will be installed at the Paringa Silo Art project, thanks to a funding boost.

The project has been allocated \$36,645 via the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal's award-winning Tackling Tough Times Together program.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said enhancing the silo art display would "strengthen the capabilities, connections and wellbeing" of the local community.

"The impacts of the extended dry periods and prolonged rainfall shortages are still prevalent and problematic. This funding will inject much needed support into local communities and contribute to their ongoing economic recovery from drought.

The Paringa Silo Art display was completed earlier this year by Adelaide artist Jack Fran.

Through the program the Cadell Community and Tourist Association will also be allocated \$11,000 to install running water and an on-site toilet at the Cadell Op-Shop Amenities Block.

Local charged with attempted murder

A LOCAL has been charged with attempted murder, with another man needing to be flown to the Royal Adelaide Hospital, after a stabbing in a Riverland town last week.

Police and paramedics were called to a Blanchetown address just after 12.30am on Saturday, May 29, following reports of a serious assault.

Upon their arrival a 47-year-old man had sustained a stab wound to the abdomen, and was treated at the scene before being airlifted to the Royal Adelaide Hospital to undergo

Berri CIB detectives and crime scene investigators attended the scene, with a 36-year-old local man arrested and charged with attempted murder.

It is understood the man was refused police bail and appeared in the Berri Magistrates Court on Monday, while the victim is in a serious but stable condition.

A SAPOL spokesperson said "this was not a random incident and the two men involved are known to each other".

Book brings Barmera's past to life

DECADES of Barmera history, as told by people who lived through it, has been captured in a new book released recently.

Voices of Barmera, a collection of oral histories from early Barmera residents, was launched at an event at the Barmera Soldiers Memorial Hall late last month.

The book was produced by the Barmera Library, with local women Glenys Badger and Sue Crossing volunteering as compiler and transcriber respectively.

More than 25 locals were interviewed for the book, which includes details about life on the land, the social scene and family life in the young town.

Berri Barmera Council library manager Peter Ison said the book's release was the culmination of several years of work.

"For the Berri centenary in 2011 we did some oral histories... and then we thought afterwards that we couldn't leave Barmera out," he said.

"We put some money in our budget and professional historian Rob Lynn did about 16 interviews for us over a few years.

"For Barmera we decided to pull snippets out of the interviews and create this book.

Mr Ison said the book also included sections from interviews conducted more than three decades ago.

"We realised there were some 1980s interviews done by former Barmera librarian Di Tillett," he said. "They're on cassette and are very hard to hear, but we have used snippets of those in the book... and that gave us some older history as well."

Mr Ison said the library would look at making the interviews available online, or producing further oral history books for other towns.

"With the Barmera, Monash and Glossop centenaries happening this year, I know there's already a group getting into doing some oral histories, and we have the Berri oral histories that we have transcribed but haven't done anything with," he said.

"Now we've made a book once it will probably be more achievable if we do it again...'

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

Forum highlights Riverland skills shortage

AN industry education and partnership forum at Waikerie has heard there is a major



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shortage of skilled staff and apprentices in the Riverland.

More than 20 people attended the forum at the Waikerie Football Club last week.

The event was organised by Waikerie High School and attracted representatives from the retail, horticulture and agriculture sectors.

The forum's aim was to inform businesses about how they could create jobs and apprenticeships for Waikerie High School students and help them develop skills for the

The Department for Education's vocational pathways adviser for the Riverland and Murraylands, Chris Marks, told the forum that schools in the Riverland, like Waikerie High School, were open for business.

He said Waikerie High School was already demonstrating the benefits of the new Vocational Education and Training (VET) for secondary schools policy could work

Riverland apprenticeship broker, Andrew Gower, from Renmark-based Mas Experience told the forum that Riverland businesses and industries were struggling to find staff.

"Not only is there not enough tradesman, there is not enough applicants to go into these trades," he said.

"We are finding this right across the state, it is really hard to find a first-year apprentice.

"I have my theories and coming out of COVID-19, I think there is a lot of positivity

"People may be thinking we have dodged that and let's just go for it."

Mr Gower said he had been recruiting apprentices for 30 years and this was the busiest he has been.

"In the last four months in the Riverland, I have put 300 apprentices on and that is unprecedented," he said.

Mr Gower told the forum there were probably about 400 different trades, where apprenticeships were available in a range of industries including agriculture, clerical, horticulture, trades and motor trades.

"There is also a staffing shortage and school-based apprenticeships are a good way of alleviating a skills shortage," he said.

Waikerie Punt exhibition a draw card

AN exhibition celebrating the history of the Waikerie punt has created a lot of nostalgia in the town.

Waikerie Library information co-ordinator, Katrina Webber, said 150 people viewed the display during the SA History Festival in May.

She said when she first started collecting photos and information about the ferry's history little information was available.

We basically started with no information on the history of the Waikerie punt," Ms Webber said.

But after a couple months of research, and reaching out to the community, I ended up with a lot more than I thought was possible.

"The display has been really popular and has created a lot of interest and brought back a lot of memories."

Local's euthanasia support 'significant'

A RIVERLAND woman praised for her support of a euthanasia Bill says she was "inspired" to be among the 500-plus crowd backing the cause at a Parliament House rally in Adelaide last week.

Held last Wednesday night, the rally coincided with South Australian MPs voting 33-5 to send the Bill - which would sign voluntary assisted dying (VAD) into state law - to a final vote and likely passage on June 9.

As the Riverland's official VAD advocate, Jan Kemble flanked organiser Angie Miller and high-profile euthanasia supporter Andrew Denton during their speech-

"What a great event," said Mrs Kemble, of Waikerie.

"I was privileged to meet Andrew Denton - what a humble and committed man.

"The support speakers were all so inspiring.

Adelaide-based Ms Miller said the dedication to the cause displayed by Mrs Kemble and other Riverland VAD backers had made a

"Overall, Jan's advocacy in the Riverland has had a significant impact on the whole campaign statewide," she said.

actions have "Her



(helped) people not only in the Riverland but across the state to do their bit to help get this legislation across the

"Jan played a central role in the evening's proceedings and stood beside me while I gave my speech. This was so important as Parliament House represents all of South Australia."

Ms Miller said all those who made a special effort to attend - like Mrs Kemble – were driven by a common motivation.

"Speaking from first-hand

experience I know that this commitment is an expression of grief after watching a loved ones suffer at the end of their life," she said.

"It is also them wanting to show their support to ensure that others do not have to have the same traumatic ending.

"It was simply incredible to see Riverlanders such as Jan show their commitment to the Bill by attending the vigil...

Mrs Kemble said she was particularly moved by three speakers at the rally.

"The most humbling of all were the imploring speeches made by three South Australian advocates: Jane Qualman, Ceara Rickard and Kym Watson," she said.

"This trio are all in the late stages of terminal illnesses. For them, when the Bill passes it will be too late.

"Their courage to tell their story was awesome to witness.'

The "second reading" in parliament last week allowed MPs to speak about the Bill's general purposes, with each subsequently indi-

cating whether they intended to support or oppose on June

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, who voted against a similar Bill in 2016, voted in favour of progressing the Bill.

Newscorp reported that several of the 33 MPs who supported the Bill did so on a "conditional" basis, allowing them to reserve their final decision until after they view any proposed amendments to the law.

Is the rose bush 'fence' enough?

THE need for an additional fence at a local playground – or whether thorny rose bushes are adequate deterrent – will again be investigated following safety

The Loxton Pioneer Playground is fenced on all boundaries but one, where there is a path, plus rose garden beds.

At a recent Loxton Waikerie council meeting, elected members agreed to have the fencing request - submitted by a community member – put into the playground audit.

Councillor Deb Thiele said a playground safety audit would determine if an additional fence was necessary.

"The original thinking was indeed that... (the roses) are very nasty to try and run through," she said.

"Bring people in for a sec-



ond look at these things (since the playground has) been operational for a while."

However, Cr Thiele said it was the responsibility of parents, grandparents or caregivers to ensure children stay within the playground.

Mayor Leon Stasinowsky

"The problem is that certain people go there with their kids, let them go, they have their picnic and stuff over there and go, 'Where is little Johnny?'," Mr Stasinowsky said.

"And he's over by the Cross of Sacrifice because they haven't been watching."

At the meeting, councillors agreed to the installation of 'children crossing' and speed restriction signage between Mary Thiele Park and the Loxton Pioneer Playground in a bid to improve the safety of

New Riverland hope to bring back the rare spiny daisy

BERRI Barmera Landcare has been busy propagating the rare spiny daisy (acanthocladium dockeri), a plant that was believed to be extinct for a long

The species was discovered in 1860 by the Burke and Wills expedition near the Darling River, NSW.

It was last seen locally in 1910 at Overland Corner and by 1992 it was believed to be died

However, in 1999 a farmer discovered small numbers of the plant at Laura in South Australia's Mid-North and a recovery team was established. Translocations sites were set up to reduce the risk of disease or fire, and in 2015 Wilabalangaloo, near Berri, became one of these.

Berri Barmera Landcare staff and volunteers look after the plants by weeding, monitoring and occasionally watering them.

"Initially the plants did really well, being mollycoddled with regular watering," said Berri Barmera Landcare project officer Helga Kieskamp.

"After a year they had to look after themselves a bit more and as a result we lost around half the plants.

Now, six years on, the surviving plants are doing well, with lots of tiny flowers every spring.

"Around 20 plants even had 'babies' by putting out a sucker to form a new plant."

Berri Barmera Landcare recently undertook propagation trials, trying to grow the daisies from cuttings as well as from seed. In trials done by others in the past, the seed generally has failed to germinate, and here it was no different.

"It's interesting – the plant makes seed, but it doesn't seem to be viable," Ms Kieskamp said.

"It seems to prefer to sucker

and does so readily. Maybe it changed strategies in its evolution, and changed from seed to suckering, but hasn't lost the seed production yet.

"Unlike the seed, the propagated cuttings did very well and will be planted out shortly. If you would like to see the spiny

daisies for yourself, you can find an information sign and the plants at Wilabalangaloo in the enclosure to the left of the car-

The project is supported by the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board through funding from landscape levies.

FRUIT FLY CONTROL EXPERT SHARES KNOWLEDGE

WITH fruit-fly control and management remaining a key focus of Citrus SA's activities, executive officer Frances Asher, chair Mark Doecke with Graham Hardwick from Agnova helped facilitate a meeting with a tropical fly expert, Professor Emeritus Richard Drew AM FTSE and Riverland fruit fly co-ordinator Brett Kennedy. Professor Drew was brought to South Australia by Agnova with the aim of meeting with Primary Industries and Resources staff to share his latest research in the most effective fruit fly control methods. Control methods discussed included a combination of protein baits and fruition traps in conjunction with sterile insect technology

He has conducted research on tropical fruit flies throughout Asia, South-East Asia and the South Pacific Region for five decades. He also worked with Primary Industries in New Zealand on QFly for several years. His research has led to the definition of all major pest species and a sound knowledge of their ecology and pest management strategies. He has published over 140 research papers and three major books. He has also received an Order of Australia for outstanding contributions to fruit fly entomology.

It was suggested by Professor Drew that it would be useful for PIRSA staff to visit Queensland to analyse research data and visit field sites. Citrus SA understands that this may be the next course of action. Citrus SA thanks Professor Drew for sharing his knowledge and Agnova for its support.

KEEPING UP TO DATE WITH FRUIT FLY DEVELOPMENTS

Are you on top of the latest fruit fly news and how your property could be affected? PIRSA has a regular newsletter, Fruit Fly industry update which would be useful for all growers to subscribe to. You can also search the interactive fruit fly map, download market access map PDFs from the industry support webpage and find out more about SIT releases.

The May newsletter covered topics including:

Current situation: There are 16 fruit fly outbreaks in South Australia. Metropolitan Adelaide has 10 Mediterranean fruit fly outbreaks and one Queensland fruit fly outbreak. The Riverland has five Queensland fruit fly outbreaks.

SIT release – Riverland: The McCormick Centre in Renmark is being leased to PIRSA to use as a SIT facility to rear pupae into flies. Ground release of sterile flies in the Riverland is complete in Monash, while it continues in the Cooltong and Pike River outbreak areas. A suppression SIT release is occurring in other parts of the suspension areas including directly outside the Renmark West outbreak area. SIT release in Berri will begin soon. To date, 45 million sterile flies have been released in the

Riverland. PIRSA's fruit fly teams are active in all outbreak areas, undertaking hygiene and technical check activities.

Outbreak end dates: As of 25 May, the outbreak end dates for the Riverland were: Renmark West area - 20 December 2021, Cooltong area - 20 December 2021, Monash area - 5 December 2021, Berri area - 19 December 2021 and Pike River area - 11 December 2021. Remember, dates may change, so check the fruit fly website for the latest information.

Family and Business Support (FaBS) for fruit fly: Primary producers impacted by current fruit fly outbreaks have access to the free Family and Business Support program. Fruit fly impacted growers can have an informal, confidential and independent conversation with a local mentor by phone, or in person. Trained local mentors work closely with other service providers such as Rural Financial Counselling and local health networks, as needed.

FRESHCARE UPDATE

Citrus SA chair Mark Doecke has been in discussions with Freshcare CEO Jane Siebum and has raised a number of issues. The cost and excessive regulations of Freshcare for a non-edible peel fruit is of a major concern to Citrus SA. While food safety is of the utmost priority to growers – there are some aspects to the Freshcare protocols which are irrelevant to the citrus industry and we are hoping there can be amendments. Citrus SA plans to invite Ms Siebum to meet with the committee and we will keep growers informed of any developments

JUNE PRODUCTION TIPS

Early winter GA sprays: This spray can be considered on mid-season navels, tangelos and lemons (after size and colour picking).

Later winter GA spray: The main objective for this spray is to regulate flowering. This should be considered, particularly following a light fruit set.

Imperial GA spray: This spray can be considered on selected patches if you need to prolong your harvest window. Benefits of this application can also reduce puffiness and water marks, in particular if wet weather is encountered.

Winter foliar urea spray: This spray can assist in producing healthy bud initiation, especially following heavy crop set.

Frost control measures: It is important to identify frost prone areas and implement measures to prevent, detect and reduce frost risks.

Irrigation maintenance: With a reduced water demand this time of year, this is an ideal time to do irrigation maintenance and flushing of irrigation lines.

Crop estimates and size: It is important to regularly update your fruit size and yield estimates and communicate this with your packer. This will assist with marketing strategies in particularly the export markets.

Pruning of early maturing varieties: Now is the perfect time to beginning your pruning program once harvest on early maturing varieties has been completed.

Harvest and fruit management: Please ensure split fruit is not going into bins with sound fruit and all waste is mulched after picking.

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

We are commencing the time of the year where immediate demand generally begins to taper off, and often, there is an uptick towards the end of the year as carryover buyers enter the market. It remains to be seen whether this pattern will apply this year. At the start of the week, prices for temporary allocation had eased slightly. Primarily on the back of reduced usage and potential forecast rainfall. The early week rainfall was welcomed and provided some resource improvements, particularly to Hume, Eildon and Blowering storages.

However, as the week progressed, an increase in buyer enquiry for temporary allocation was evident, with market commentary suggesting that buyer demand is predominately for carryover/ parking for the 2021/22 season. Water users are exploring all options to ensure access to some of their water requirements at the commencement of the new season. As such, buyer enquiries relating to forward allocation for the forthcoming season continues, as does buying parking space.

High-Security water entitlement holders unable to carryover unused allocation are encouraged to call their local Ruralco Water Broker to discuss current opportunities before the ability to trade ceases. Likewise, water users with 'over-use requirements should also contact their local broker to arrange their buyback requirements.

Interest in the permanent entitlement market remains strong as buyers continue to seek water security through the acquisition of entitlements. An increase in customer enquiry for securing multi-season permanent entitlement leases for the forthcoming season has been noted.


The scene for next year will be set once late autumn/winter rains and inflows to storages begin. Storage levels held by the MDBA are currently at 49% of capacity, compared to 33% this time last year.

WANTING to live sustainably in the region, and illustrate the potential of environmentally friendly technology, has seen a Riverland couple purchase a new battery-powered car.

Paringa couple Elizabeth and Matt Warnock recently acquired a Tesla Model 3 electric vehicle, designed by American-based billionaire Elon Musk.

Mr Warnock said the couple first switched to an electric vehicle almost seven years ago – believed to be the first plug-in vehicle in the Riverland - due to a

desire to decrease their use of fossil fuels.

"It's the environmental impact for us, and wanting to go carbon free," Mr Warnock said.

"It was a bit of a learning curve for us, and we wanted to show people what was possible.

"The Mitsubishi i-MiEV had much less range. I was working out of Berri at the time and it was good for those sorts of trips, but didn't get us much further.

'This new one is a much bigger car, but because it's newer technology it uses a lot less electricity."



Mr Warnock said his Tesla vehicle already possessed a level of autonomous driving capabilities on the Sturt Highway.

"It's not just that it's electric, everything is pretty much software driven," he said.

"It's fully-equipped to be completely driverless, but that involves a software update and it's not legal yet.

"It does have self-steering at the moment on the Sturt Highway. I can drive from Renmark to (Paringa) basically without steering.

"When that fully comes to fruition, think of how it will help retired people, or people with disabilities and health conditions."

Mrs Warnock said using an electric vehicle had prompted the couple to explore other regional towns across Australia.

"Usually the chargers are close to the core of a town," she said.

"A lot of roadhouses are on the outskirts of town... but in this case you kind of have to walk around and explore a bit."

Mrs Warnock - whose house is also solar powered - said electric vehicles had both environmental and economic benefits for owners.

"If people are concerned about the negative impacts of climate change, we need to stop using fossil fuels and lower carbon emissions," she

"The other reason is purely economic. You save quite a lot of money on fuel, and you save a lot of money on costs like oil and servicing."

Mr Warnock said the Tesla 3's improved battery meant the couple had avoided any 'range anxiety' while driving.

"When we first drove it we needed to get familiar with the realistic range, but since then it's not been a problem," he said.

"I work out in Berri a lot and I can do six return trips before it needs charging, so it's not an issue.

"When we decided we wanted to upgrade, we needed to be able to do a comfortable three-hour trip on one charge."

200 years of Catholic education celebrated

STAFF and students from two Riverland Catholic schools joined in a simultaneous online mass last week to mark 200 years of Catholic education in Australia.

St Joseph's School Renmark and Berri's Our Lady of the River School, together with a number of Catholic schools nationwide, tuned into mass on Monday, May 24, at 10am.

St Joseph's School Renmark assistant principal religious identity and mission (APRIM) Michael Slagter described the mass as "grand".

"The mass was livestreamed from the cathedral on Wakefield Street in Adelaide and it was great to see," he said.

"A number of classes tuned in and it was good for them to see a big, important ceremony that celebrated our Catholic faith and history.

"The mass had a number of bishops and priests and there were talks from the Arch Bishop of Adelaide and the director of Catholic Education South Australia.

"It involved things any normal mass does – gospel and bible readings and communion – but the students got to look at the strong contribution Catholic education has had over the past 200 years."

Mr Slagter said the school commemorated 200 years of

Catholic education in its own way.

"We've been talking to the students all year about the beginnings of Catholic education and they were all well aware that this year marks 200 years in Australia," he said.

"A couple of weeks ago was Catholic Education Week and we commemorated 200 years then by holding a 'switch-off day', which involved the school switching off all power for 200 minutes."

Mr Slagter said it was important to celebrate the beginnings of Catholic education.

"I've been in Catholic education for 18 years and it's been great," he said.

"The first school nationwide was in Parramatta, Sydney, in 1820, and the first school in South Australia was 1844.

"St Jo's celebrated its 100year anniversary too recently, which was special.

"There are currently around 777,000 students in Catholic schools nationwide and that's a huge number... it's a big educator in Australia. Catholic schools give families a choice of where they want to send their kids and the values they'd like to be taught."

Pandemic causing bowel cancer crisis

COLONOSCOPY waitlists across the country have increased since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, according to a new report from Bowel Cancer Australia.

Research published in the Lancet medical journal found that without catch-up screening, a six-month disruption would result in 1961 additional deaths in Australia.

A Cancer Australia report showed between January and September 2020, the number of colonoscopies and sigmoidoscopies performed to diagnose bowel cancers fell by 15 per cent or 78,048 fewer procedures

The Bowel Cancer Australia report, titled COVID-19 and the Impending Bowel Cancer Crisis, highlighted examples of solutions that have been implemented to address delays in diagnosis due to colonoscopy backlogs.

Colorectal surgeon Graham Newstead said delays could lead to unnecessary deaths, and that COVID-19 was making the situation worse.

"Delayed screening leads to a delayed diagnosis. Delayed diagnosis leads to delayed treatment. Delayed treatment leads to poorer outcomes," he said.

"Planning for post-pandemic colonoscopy catch-up and increasing ongoing capacity is urgently required as bowel cancer must not be forgotten in the long shadow of COVID-19.

"Early diagnosis is a key predictor of surviving bowel cancer and positive test results and symptoms need to be investigated via timely colonoscopy.

"It is imperative we address the colonoscopy waitlists, otherwise we risk undoing the gains made over the past 20 years."

William and Hazel and their four children lived in the home until it was sold in 1954 to Jim

and Liz Kontouris.

Members of the Pennyfield and Kontouris families travelled from Canberra, Melbourne, Murray Bridge and Adelaide to the Riverland for the occasion.

When they bought the property Jim and Tina Efrosinis were keen to find out the history of the house and made contact with Joan, the daughter of William and Hazel.

This led to a long-time friendship with the extended Pennyfield family and when they opened their wine business the couple said it made sense to pay tribute to the original owners and call the brand Pennyfield Wines.

The Efrosinis family ran the wine business from the property for a number of years.

The family is currently in the process of selling, with a fifth family preparing to take ownership of the historic property.



THIS is the first novel in The Circle of Ceridwen series, which follows the life of young woman Ceridwen – the daughter of a Cerd - growing up in 9th century England during the migration period.


It was a time of war and terrific upheaval for almost all of England, as the Danes were sacking much of the countryside, slaughtering the Anglo Saxons.

On the death of her father and uncle. Ceridwen is taken in, raised and educated by local priests.

They also took charge of her property. At the age of 15 she is given the choice of becoming a nun or marrying someone of their choosing. She leaves the priory under the cloak of darkness and

At the beginning of her journey north she meets Aelfwyn, a young Anglo-Saxon maiden travelling with her entourage to marry a Dane as part of a tribute in a peace treaty. The two form a strong sisterly bond.

The two women, powerless and friendless amongst the warhungry Danish lords, strive to bring some semblance of gentility to their new lives. Aelfwyn seeks to win Yrling's favour by suggesting ways to increase



his wealth as well as easing the burdens of the local inhabitants. Two of the Danish lord's

nephews have designs on Ceridwen, one fearsome and dangerous, and one who becomes

The discovery of a gravely wounded young man in the cellar leads to Ceridwen risking a desperate escape to save his life, journeying across England to reach the safety of his people and homeland.

The author gives the reader a vivid sense of the terror and anxiety women endured during that era in England, as well as how voiceless they were in the matters of marriage and day-to-

The book covers the struggle between multiple religions; the old Saxon gods, the gods of the invading Vikings, plus the Trinity and attending saints of Christianity.
Randolph's research into the

background, customs, details and people of the time is very comprehensive with descriptive scenes of daily life during that time period. It is not a fast-paced read, nor does it dwell on the violence inflicted by invading

Down to a fine (street) art

WAIKERIE is becoming a popular street art destination, with the completion of two street-art pieces by Melbourne artist, Jimmy D'Vate.

Co-ordinator of the Waikerie Street Art Project, Donna Matthews said it took D'Vate 17 days to paint the Rain Moth life cycle and Murray cod murals, which were completed earlier this month.

"We really only had one drizzly day when the weather wasn't nice," she said.

"I saw him there working huddled in his jumper, he worked so hard from 8am until evening."

Ms Matthews said the popular artist had a number of jobs banked up around the country, as the COVID-19 pandemic had delayed these projects.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie provided \$10,000 worth of funding two years ago for three street art pieces and local groups and businesses matched it with a further \$10,000.

Ms Matthews said she was thankful the council enabled the funds to be held over until this year, for the project to continue.

Last year, Renmark artist, Jacqui Mason completed her painting of a yellow rosella in an interactive form in the White Street carpark.

Ms Matthews said the artwork has become a popular drawcard for the town, with visitors encouraged to stand in front of the wings and take a photo.

"It was an idea taken from the Angel Wings Project, which is a worldwide streetart movement seen on Instagram and almost every city in the world," she said.

She said the street-art theme has been kept to local indigenous creatures also including the rain moth and the Murray cod.

Waikerie is named after the indigenous name used for the rain moth, 'wei kari'.

"When you first introduce street art to the town it can be polarising," Ms Matthews said. "But when you are introducing something that means something to the people, hopefully you have a more positive reaction."

Ms Matthews said locals enjoyed watching D'Vate at work.

"Some people said they couldn't get a carpark at Foodland as there were people all watching Jimmy work," she said.

Ms Matthews thanked the DCLW, Big River Foodland, and the Strauss and McLelland families who allowed their buildings to be used for the murals.

She also wished to acknowledge the support provided by her husband Clive who was a "jack of all trades" and Riverland artist Liz Frankel for her input.

Effie's display gets back to nature

A NUMBER of vibrant paintings depicting the "natural world" will be on display at Waikerie's Rain Moth Gallery from early June to late July.

The exhibition – dubbed Sneak Peak by local woman Effie Theodoridis (pictured) – will open on June 6 and run until July 30.

Ms Theodoridis said she developed an appreciation for nature at an early age while admiring the endless variety of plant species and the colours, textures and shapes that exist.

AgTech entrepreneurs work with local growers

A NUMBER of AgTech entrepreneurs met with local growers in Loxton last week to work on technology gaps on-farm.

Growers from 12 different farms representing a cross-section of the Riverland farming community, including almond, citrus and grape growers, met with the entrepreneurs.

The growers were introduced to cutting edge technology in action at the Loxton AgTech demonstration farm and attended a workshop hosted by ThinkLab Loxton to collaborate on solutions to key challenges identified during farm visits.

Minister for Primary Industries David Basham said the AgTech road trip was an example of how the State Government supports initiatives to encourage the adoption of technology.

"The AgTech Strategic Plan identified networking and collaboration as a priority, so the road trip is about connecting farmers with AgTech entrepreneurs from a range of backgrounds," he said

"Reports have suggested increasing the uptake of technology on-farm could return up to \$2.6 billion per annum to the South Australian economy.

"The State Government believes that supporting innovation and advancement in the field of AgTech is essential to increase the productivity, growth and sustainability of the agriculture sector in South Australia.

"This is a mission to deliver AgTech expertise directly to farmers.

"We hope the participating farmers can work with those involved to understand where technology can improve their on-farm productivity and share this experience with others."

Member for Chaffey Tim Whetstone said AgTech is at the heart of every horticulture and agriculture business in the Riverland.

"It's about advancing those technologies to increase the competitive advantage with efficiencies and productivity gains," he said.

"That's why I set up the AgTech advisory committee: to allow the advancement of commercialisation with new technologies to keep South Australian farmers, in particular the Riverland food producers at the cutting

New funding to boost preschool attendance

LOCAL children approaching preschool will benefit from \$1340 as part of a Federal Government funding agreement to boost attendance.

The Commonwealth is offering new four-year agreements to state and territories, including \$114 million for South Australian schools from 2022 to 2025.

The funding will provide greater certainty for the preschool sector and benefit around 20,000 children attending preschool in South Australia next year.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said it was the first time a federal government had committed to ongoing funding for preschool and the reforms would benefit all children attending preschool.

"This is a significant reform that will mean children in Barker are better prepared for school, can get the most out of their early years of learning, and ultimately achieve more in the long-term," he said.

"Regardless of where a child gets their preschool education, they will benefit from the Federal Government's \$1340.

"I want local families in Barker to use the full 15 hours of quality preschool available each week to all children in the year before school. Children who fully engage in preschool and early education are generally better prepared to start school, and enjoy better educational outcomes.

"The Government's partnership with SA has seen continuous improvements to preschool enrolments, but enrolments alone do not produce outcomes – participation does."

The funding brings the Government's investment in early childhood education and care to \$3.3 billion in the 2021-2022 budget, including \$1.7 billion to improve affordability of childcare for families with multiple children aged five and under.



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HomeBuilder drives record construction

HOMEBUILDER is driving a record year of housing starts and continues to secure jobs in the construction sector.

This year is set to be the single biggest year for detached house commencements, with all states and territories seeing a boost with the support of HomeBuilder.

"This large volume of work will ensure that the industry remains very active through until at least the second half of 2022.

With this record volume of work under construction, HIA anticipates 121,000 starts in 2021/22, which would be the third strongest year on record.

Market conditions still favourable

A NEW financial comparison of buying and renting across Australia has revealed more than half of homes will be cheaper to buy than rent over the next 10 years.

"The result is that the majority of properties in Australia are cheaper to buy than rent at current prices.

"Investors are driven by the same comparison between prices and rents, so the finding that so many units in particular are cheaper to buy suggests there may be profitable investments currently available. On this basis, we expect investor activity in the housing market to increase through 2021."







Business welcomes write-off extension

A RIVERLAND business has welcomed news that the instant asset write-offs scheme has been extended by a year.

This extension – which includes temporary loss carrybacks – will enable businesses experiencing COVID-19-related supply disruptions, or considering investing in projects requiring longer planning times, to take advantage of the incentives.

Paul Santos, general manager of Riverland-based Santos Ready Mixed Concrete, said an increase in the instant asset write off limit as well as the 12 month extension had assisted his business to upgrade its truck fleet.

Olympians primed after Tour wins

ADELAIDE cyclist Annette Edmondson and Victorian-based Olympic hopeful Leigh Howard were the big winners from the 2021 Tour of the Riverland cycling weekend.

Edmondson is a step closer to her Tokyo Olympics dream after winning consecutive Tour of the Riverland (TOTR) women's 54km kermesse events on Sunday, while Howard won the major event, the Barry Skinner Classic, formerly known as the Tour of the Riverland.

Despite border closures earlier in the week, a field of 107 riders competed in Saturday's 97km race, taken out by scratch marker Leigh Howard, who crossed the line in a time of 1:55:22.

Runner up was fellow Olympic track cycling team member and 2019 TOTR champion Sam Welsford.

Local rider Clint Bambrick, riding off a 19:30 minute handicap, was the first Riverlander to cross the line, ahead of Lee Stevens and Steve Jaensch riding off 26:30 minutes.

A total of 32 riders were spread across the men's and women's races on Sunday and Edmondson, the 2019 winner, said local support made for a memorable send-off to the Games. "It had such a great community feel at the race, and at the dinner on Saturday," she said.

"To have the community get behind us and wish us good luck was really special. We know it won't just be our families and

Edmondson said the team had been training hard with limited rac-

"To head up to Berri and have a crack at the double weekend was pretty solid.

"It's done good for the confidence to get a win before heading away."

THE RFL's new by-law addressing its code of conduct takes a "no nonsense" approach to abuse and antisocial behaviour says president Mark Wright.

A written warning by the league was issued to a spectator, after an umpire made a report to a match-day official (MDO), at an A grade game at Loxton Oval recently.

Mr Wright said the league had been keeping a register of incidents this season.

'We're zero-tolerance on this," he said.
