\$2.29m EXTRA: Renmark Paringa looks at 'cost-cutting' budget as rate rise goes...

RATES for Renmark Paringa residents are set to rise by 11.25 per cent next financial year and wastewater charges will increase by 43 per cent – as council collects an extra \$2.29m from its ratepayers.

Renmark Paringa Council this week released its 2025/26 Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget for public feedback, outlining a \$29.3m investment in essential services and

infrastructure in response to what it described as the pressures of inflation, and ongoing financial impacts of the 2022 Murray River flood.

Council's anticipated \$2.29m extra in general rates in 2025/26 includes

an average rates increase of \$147 per household, based on an average residential property capital valuation of

Snapchat warning for local students

MADISON EASTMOND

A RIVERLAND school is taking a proactive approach to providing "a safe and supportive environment" after students have faced scrutiny for their online activity.

A letter sent by staff at St Francis of Assisi College, Renmark — reported in last Sunday's edition of The Advertiser — is said to have warned local parents about "some of the images being shared" through a Snapchat group of year 8 boys, which "could be classified as inappropriate and may be used to extort

or exploit a young person".

'Please speak with your child if they are active on Snapchat and other social media applications and, if they are part of large group chats," the letter is reported to have read.

"Our advice is you instruct your child to exit these groups."

St Francis of Assisi College principal Nathan Hayes said he could "confirm that (the school) sent a letter to parents of (the) year 8 students in the first week of Term 1, as part of (a) proactive approach to providing information about appropriate use of social media".

"The letter was not in

response to specific messages or content," Mr Hayes said in a shared statement to The Murray Pioneer.

'The letter was intended to outline to parents what can happen, and what to be aware of when holding conversations with their children.

"We are committed to supporting our young people as they learn to navigate the digital world safely and provide students with ongoing social media education.

"Our College is committed to providing a safe and supportive environment for all (and) our highest priority is the pastoral care and wellbeing of our school community.'

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said although the incident was "concerning,", it must be recognised that "this isn't an isolated issue for Renmark".

"Sadly, these incidents reflect nation-wide challenges with image-based abuse and misuse among teens," Mr Whetstone

"It is a stark reminder of the evolving digital landscape our teenagers navigate, and I commend the proactive steps taken by Principal Nathan Hayes and the College leadership."

Berri Barmera's future-proofing 7.9% rate rise to net... Community asked to help define path forward

AN extra \$1.266m is set to be collected from Berri Barmera ratepayers in 2025/26, after the local council unveiled an average rate increase of 7.9 per cent — and forecast more above-CPI hikes in the years

Berri Barmera Council councillors at a special meeting held on Thursday night voted to adopt council's draft 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget for the purposes of community consultation.

The council said the increases were necessary to ensure it remained sustainable, able to renew its infrastructure, and capable of unlocking "future residential growth".

CEO Tim Pfeiffer told The Murray Pioneer the proposed 7.9 per cent rate rise comes as "(the) council is currently addressing a number of legacy issues".

"Within our Long-Term Financial Plan, there will be rate rises that will be in excess of CPI in the coming years," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"However, in the current budget, council has already made \$1.1m worth of savings.

"In addition, Council is prioritising work to find further savings and different income streams, both next financial year and in the years beyond."

Mr Pfeiffer declined to reveal

whether any councillors had protested the rate rise, but said the plan had been "very closely scrutinised by all elected members".

"Berri Barmera Council has taken the time to carefully consider all aspects of our Annual Business Plan and Budget, Long-Term Financial Plan, Strategic Plan and our Asset Management Plans," he said.

"Council has an obligation to the community here and now, but also to future generations of the Riverland community to ensure that Council has a good opportunity to be economically sustainable with a strong future."

A \$1.653m operating deficit has been projected in the draft

Hikes in service charges are also part of the budget.

The Waste Management Service Charge is set to increase by 7 per cent, rising to \$274 for three-bin collection, and \$232 for two-bin collection.

The charge for any additional red bins will rise to \$251 for property owners.

"In recent years, Berri Barmera Council's waste management and wastewater costs have not been at full cost recovery, meaning they have effectively been subsidised by the remaining ratepaying community," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"The increases are aimed to get these services back to a full

cost recovery basis so that the income equals the expenditure for the provision of those ser-

In May, Loxton Waikerie council also adopted a rate rise - at 2.5 per cent — with both councils now linking aspects of the increase to the current challenges of cost-of-living, the drought, and economic uncertainty facing the region.

"Council understands there are economic challenges within the Riverland community at present," Mr Pfeiffer said.

'These effects individuals, businesses, farming enterprises - and council as well.

"Council has already tightened its belt and will be continuing to tighten its belt over the coming year and beyond."

A Special Council Meeting will be held on Monday, July 7, at 5pm to hear feedback from the community.

Community consultation on council's Draft Annual Business Plan closes at on Wednesday, July 16.

THE Berri Barmera community is invited to have its say as council shapes the long-term financial position of the district.

A Draft Annual Business Plan for 2025/26 and a draft Long-Term Financial Plan have been released, outlining a strategy to restore financial stability and continue delivering essential services.

Council CEO Tim Pfeiffer said the plans "reflect a realistic view" of council's financial position and a commitment to moving forward.

"We're positioning ourselves to better serve the community, not just today, but for the long term," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"We've worked hard to balance essential services and infrastructure, while addressing legacy issues in depreciation and rating.'

Council is proposing a 7.9 per cent residential rate increase that would, on average, result in an additional \$148 per

Mr Pfeiffer said the adjustment is needed to meet rising costs and maintain essential community services such as roads, stormwater, waste, and community facilities.

"This is about building a sustainable future for generations to come," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"We're being transparent about the work needed and taking steps to improve our foundation.

"Council is shifting away from prioritising the development of brand-new assets in favour of maintaining and renewing existing community infrastructure.

'Taking this approach both now and into the future will ensure that roads, footpaths, stormwater, wastewater and community facilities remain safe, reliable and functional for current and future generations.'

Major projects in 2025/26 include the Bruno Bay boat ramp renewal, Lyrup Road reconstruction and works at Lake Bonney - all funded either entirely or significantly through external grants.

"Berri Barmera Council is proactively chasing external funding to alleviate pressure for the renewal and replacement of community infrastructure," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"We've already attracted over \$4m for 2025/26 for the renewal of council infrastructure."

Mr Pfeiffer said council has already made \$1.1m worth of savings out of the draft 2025/26 Annual Business Plan.

"This shows council's commitment to tightening its own belt, so the full effect of returning to financial sustainability is not borne by the ratepayers," he said.

"We will continue working hard over the coming financial year to make further savings by reviewing service levels and property assets to ensure we are delivering what our community actually needs."

The plan also encourages development of vacant land to support housing growth and a stronger local economy.

"Residential growth means more families in our towns, more support for local businesses, and a more vibrant, resilient community," Mr Pfeiffer said.

Opposition leader? Tim deflects poll results

TIM Whetstone could be the state opposition leader this time next year – but the veteran Chaffey MP has rejected results from a poll published on the weekend showing the Liberals heading for an election wipe-out in March 2026.

The YouGov poll – published in The Advertiser – shows Labor holding a record 67/33 lead on two-party preferred stakes.

If those numbers held true on election day, Mr Whetstone would be one of just two remaining Liberal MPs to hold their seat – alongside Eyre Peninsulabased Member for Flinders, Sam Telfer.

As such, Mr Whetstone would be the logical choice as leader, as a former government minister and senior MP in the party.

However, this week he refused to buy into the doom-and-gloom scenario for the Liberals, who have pitted Vincent Tarzia against popular Premier Peter Malinauskas, following the departure of disgraced former opposition leader David Speirs.

"The poll is simply a

snapshot and while it highlights the challenges ahead, it doesn't reflect what I'm hearing on the ground in Chaffey and across regional South Australia," Mr Whetstone told The Murray Pioneer.

"Country people are increasingly frustrated with the government that simply doesn't care about them."

Mr Whetstone also declined to comment specifically on the chances of being elevated – albeit in

Steven Bradbury style – to the position of opposition leader.

"My focus remains on representing the people of Chaffey, fighting for our fair share and holding this government to account," he said.

The disastrous prediction for the SA Liberals resembles the 2021 WA State Election, when Mark McGowan-led Labor won 29.7 per cent of the two-party preferred vote.



Allocations straight to 100

RIVERLAND irrigators will be able to access 100 per cent allocations for the new water year from next week.

Renmark Irrigation Trust chief executive officer Rosalie Auricht said allocation security was beneficial during current low-rainfall conditions

"Farmers relying on SA Murray high security entitlement are appreciative of the 100 per cent allocation for the 2025/26 season," Ms Auricht said.

"The ongoing extreme dry conditions have been challenging for all farming communities in South Australia, especially those who do not have access to any SA Water supply.

"A good soaking rain to replenish soil moisture and refill tanks and storage within the state, and in the Southern Murray-Darling Basin, is top of the wish list."

Minister for Water, and deputy premier, Susan Close said measures undertaken through the Murray-Darling Basin Plan were having a "positive impact on ecosystems, biodiversity and habitat quality". "Despite record low rainfall in some parts of South Australia, Murray River irrigators can go into another water year with the confidence of having full allocations available to them

"The full opening of allocations is good news for river communities including those who rely on the river to make a living.

"The river is finally being properly managed for the benefit of irrigators, communities and the environment."

In line with the Water Allocation Plan for the River Murray Prescribed Watercourse, irrigators will be unable to carryover unused water from the previous year, as the projected minimum opening allocation, announced on April 15, 2025, was greater than 50 per

PIRSA reminds travellers of fruit restrictions

RIVERLAND travellers are being reminded, that protecting our world-class horticulture industry starts with every traveller doing the right thing, whether it's a quick road trip, a visit to the Riverland, or a return from interstate, holidaymakers are urged to check their bags and eskies for restricted fruit and vegetables before setting off.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) General Manager of the Fruit Fly Response Program Jason Size, said that school holiday travel means an increased risk of inadvertently spreading fruit fly into or across South Australia.

"School holidays mean more cars on the road – and more movement between regions," Mr Size said. "Whether you're heading into the Riverland, returning from interstate, or roadtripping around the state, remember to eat it or bin it."

Random roadblocks and roadside checks will be in operation across key travel routes, with on-the-spot fines issued for anyone caught carrying restricted produce through quarantine zones.

Quarantine bins are clearly marked at major entry points, regional boundaries, airports, and transport hubs. Importantly, produce should be placed inside the bin, not beside it.

"When we see bins overflowing, it's usually because people have left fruit beside the bin – not because the bin is full." Mr Size said.

"These bins are built to handle large volumes so if you're disposing of fruit, make sure it goes inside."

Restricted items include common favourites such as apples, bananas, citrus, tomatoes, and capsicums – all of which can carry fruit fly larvae or eggs.

Travellers looking for safer snack options can enjoy unrestricted produce like pineapple, watermelon, honeydew, and rockmelon.

"Disposing of restricted produce before travelling is a small action that makes a big difference," Mr Size said.

"The more vigilant we are, the better protected our growers, communities, and economy will be."

RATES for Renmark Paringa residents are set to rise by 11.25 per cent next financial year and wastewater charges will increase by 43 per cent – as council collects an extra \$2.29m from its ratepayers.

Renmark Paringa Council this week released its 2025/26 Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget for public feedback, outlining a \$29.3m investment in essential services and infrastructure in response to what it described as the pressures of inflation, and ongoing financial impacts of the 2022/23 River Murray flood.

Council's anticipated \$2.29m extra in general rates in 2025/26 includes an average rates increase of \$147 per household, based on an average residential property capital valuation of \$393,000.

The 2025/26 plan also proposes an updated Community Wastewater Management System (CWMS) charge of \$793 – a 43.14 per cent increase on the previous year's cost of \$554 – per property unit

Renmark Paringa chief executive officer Tony Siviour said the current economic environment had placed considerable strain on local government operations and budgets, which has required council to respond with a "disciplined, strategic approach to planning".

"Like many households and businesses, council is not immune to rising costs," he

"The impacts of high inflation, and escalating prices for construction, materials and utilities have significantly shaped our thinking. At the same time, the recovery from the Murray River flood has had an impact on our financial position.

"Prior to the 2022/23 flood, council was debt free. We estimate that we will commence the 2025/26 financial year with a minimum of \$1.8m in debt.

"This is a financially

responsible plan that takes seriously our duty to the community – both now and into the future."

The draft budget allocates \$21.4m to the delivery of day-to-day services, including waste collection, libraries, parks, community development and regulatory services.

Proposed Waste Management Service Charges for 2025/26 – based on the provision of a three-bin system – are \$380 for 'town residential', and \$285 for 'rural residential'.

A further \$7.85m is allocated to renewing and upgrading essential infrastructure and progressing key initiatives that support organisational efficiency and community outcomes

Mr Siviour said the draft plan reflected goals of the community, the financial realities of the current economic climate, and the need to maintain long-term sustainability.

A comprehensive review of current year projects was undertaken in development of the draft, resulting in a "significant" reduction in planned capital expenditure, totalling \$5.7m, deferred to future

Council also achieved a 6 per cent reduction in its materials and contracts budget compared to the previous financial year, while launching reviews into fees, service standards and staffing structures.

Cost-cutting measures have included a freeze on community grant funding and a reduction in community events, to be reviewed in 12 months' time.

Council is also exploring the sale of a number of building and land assets, including the McCormick Centre for the Environment in Renmark.

Mr Siviour noted Renmark Paringa was the second-lowest rating council in the Riverland and Murraylands region for the 2024/25 financial year.

"This means our ratepayers already enjoy comparatively low rates compared to likesized councils," he said. "Despite the increase, we are committed to ensuring that rates remain as affordable as possible while still allowing us to deliver high-quality services and maintain infrastructure"

Mr Siviour said development of the plan addressed recent ESCOSA advice – released in February – regarding council's position of being "potentially unsustainable".

Council expects the CWMS charge to raise approximately \$2.9m in revenue, fully recovering the cost-of-service provision and ensuring long-term financial sustainability for the system.

Increases to CWMS pricing follows a comprehensive external review in 2024/25, and aligns with ESCOSA's 2018 pricing guidance, and the National Water Initiative Pricing Principles.

Loxton Waikerie council in May announced a proposed 2025/26 rate increase of 2.5 per cent, while Berri Barmera councillors last week endorsed a 7.9 per cent rise.

The monthly CPI indicator rose by 2.4 per cent in the 12 months to April 2025.

Public consultation on the draft plan, as well as the Long Term Financial Plan 2026-35 and Infrastructure and Asset Management Plan, is open until July 16, 2025.

THE Riverland's major theatre is set to share in \$3.9m of grant funding, ensuring upgrades can be undertaken to the cinema projector and for the safety of workers.

Receiving the recently announced funding alongside art centres in Whyalla, Port Pirie, and Mount Gambier, Renmark's Chaffey Theatre is part of a three-year process aimed to replace ageing equipment and improve employee safety.

Looking forward to working with local contractors and trades to deliver upcoming projects, Chief executive Anthony Peluso said Renmark's Chaffey Theatre is set to receive upgrades to security, and the cinema projectors.

"Since the projectors are coming close to the end of their lives, this funding has allowed us to ensure we continue screening cinema (in the Riverland) going forward," Mr Peluso said.

"(Also, by providing) security at the centre, it also means the (Chaffey Theatre) will be a safer environment for both our audience and our staff, who often work long hours in the night."

Mr Peluso said the funding was "an important investment" to the regional spaces, which were "not just performance spaces", but "cultural hubs that support local artists, bring people together to celebrate, and contribute significantly to the social and economic fabric of regional South Australia".

"Going to the Chaffey Theatre is important for a multitude of reasons," Mr Peluso said.

"It can be to tune-out from difficulties of cost-of-living, drought conditions, and the remnants of Covid — people can come together to enjoy something amazing, whether it's on the screen, or the stage.

"You can't replicate that in any other way, as these centres are really about community.

"This investment is a powerful statement about the importance of arts in every corner of the state and it will ensure communities in Renmark and surrounds can continue to enjoy high-quality performances and creative opportunities for years to come."

Minister for Arts Andrea Michaels said "the (State) Government is committed to supporting arts and culture to thrive in our regions."

"No matter where we are, we all look to the arts for inspiration, connection and entertainment," Ms Michaels said.

"Our government is committed to ensuring all South Australians can enjoy arts and cultural experiences right across the state.

"These four art centres are hugely important in their local communities and these upgrades will ensure they continue to provide locals with world-class cultural experiences for a long time to come."

Mr Peluso said Country Arts SA "was absolutely thrilled with this investment from the State Government, which recognises the immense value regional arts centres offer their communities".

"This funding will allow us to make critical upgrades to ensure our local staff can continue their work in a safe environment with reliable, modern equipment," Mr Peluso said.

Rising rates and tensions

THERE was once a vision of the future human society where everything was easy.

Science fiction classics from authors such as HG Wells and Arthur C Clarke imagined a utopian living for humans, where technological advancement – such as the utilisation of artificial intelligence would result in readily accessible wealth for all, the elimination of menial tasks for employment and around the household, and easy travel across space.

However, in the time since the release of the film Blade Runner in 1982 – with a story set in 2019 – these expectations seem to have slowly been tempered, due to pandemics, ongoing international conflicts, and ever-rising cost-of-livingexpenses.

Homeowners across the Riverland must be feeling those proverbial tides rising to uncomfortable levels, and that's not just simply speaking of the costs of eggs, with our three local councils now having all put their proposed rate rise figures for 2025/26 into the public sphere.

Although Loxton Waikerie's proposed rise of 2.5 per cent will undoubtedly be seen as relatively cheap compared to the 7.9 per cent announced by Berri Barmera, and Renmark Paringa's proposed 11.25 per cent increase, all the numbers represent a bigger hit to the wallets and purses of Riverland homeowners, at arguably a time that is least-affordable.

With two of those increased numbers being – rather highly – above the increases seen to CPI, property owners will need to judge if there will be an increase in the services offered by their respective council to justify the rising costs.

It seems like uncertainty also surrounds the potential timeframe these tough conditions could last for. Some impact on the financial standing of these councils has been attributed and a lack of fair funding from higher up the political ladder, and it's quite difficult to tell when that situation might be balanced out.

However, events of the past seven days have shown that it is not just local circumstances that can have major impacts on our lives.

Although political circumstances between Iran and Israel had deteriorated past a serious point some time ago, few would have expected to wake up on Saturday morning to the news the United States had made a strike against Iran.

Events that followed, such as retaliation from Iran in the form of strikes against US air bases in Qatar, are causing global nerves, and costs for necessities like fuel, to rise.

Although most Australians are a rather jovial bunch who can often get through tough circumstances with the crack of a joke, that sense of unease and growing uncertainty is also increasingly appearing in conversations with friends and families.

At times like these, it becomes evident that communities like ours in the Riverland need to support each other as much as possible.

Wage rises and business costs

AS predictable as the sun rising in the east, as soon as there is a wage rise for the lowest paid, the representatives of the highest paid start crying 'the sky is falling'. ('Wage decision a business blow', letters, 11/6/25).

Surely anyone going into business knows that wages will be a cost, just as are "costs relating to gas, electricity, insurance, rent". However, while the letter acknowledges costs other than wages have risen, the letter writer fails to lay the blame for those cost increases where it belongs, which is in my view with members of the SA Business Chamber and similar business groups around the nation. Those rising costs, imposed by businesses, also affect consumers and have the harshest effect on the lowest

The SA Business Chamber and its ilk will argue that businesses need to make a profit, and I don't deny that, but business profits are rising faster and higher than wages.

In June 1982 wages as a share of GDP were 54.16 per cent, while gross operating sur-

plus sat at 16.77 per cent. Now, 40 years later, the wages share of GDP has declined by 20 per cent to just 44.09 per cent, while gross operating surplus had almost doubled to 29.92 per cent. This latest wage rise, which applies only to the lowest paid, will not shift the needle on that disparity.

Articles in The Murray Pioneer over the last few weeks have highlighted the work of Foodbank and the Salvos in providing food for the needy.

The growing necessity for these charitable services is an indication that wages are still too low.

No person in employment should have to rely on charity to feed their family, their wages should be sufficient to meet daily living needs and to put a little aside, without resorting to charities.

Meanwhile, business leaders and their supporters deride the poor for spending money on

'frivolities', while applauding the businesses who make excessive profits from necessities.

There is a need for re-engineering the power network to now handle a diffuse source of power generation. The characteristic of solar power generation is that in the middle of the day the flow of power is often in the other direction.

Ah, but batteries can solve this problem by storing the excess power to be used at night. Are the batteries manufactured with renewable energy?

Solar panels, wind turbines and batteries have a finite life and need to be replaced. But has Australia a recyclable scheme in place? Currently, the Federal and State Governments don't seem to recognise the need to do so.

What happens when the sun doesn't shine, and the wind don't blow? There needs to be base-load generation from coal and gas and as many countries have recognised nuclear is a zero-carbon emitter to fill that

But, nuclear has a disposal issue. Australia having a zerocarbon policy is expensive tokenism as Australia generates about 1 per cent of carbon emissions. Money spent in going down the zero-carbon path may be better spent on adapting to climate change as Bjørn Lomborg, the Danish scientist, has been advocating for a long

So, there are many matters to be addressed and practical solutions to evolve. Don't get me wrong, from a home-owner's perspective, solar panels are a good investment, as I am about to upgrade my current solar panels and, also, install batter-

Support for ban on gambling ads

IN a major win for public health and community wellbeing, the Malinauskas Government has agreed to ban gambling advertisements across public transport spaces.

The Legislative Council passed the motion last night with unanimous, multi-partisan support, in a rare but powerful show of agreement on the urgent need to reduce gambling harm.

The decision follows a motion brought earlier this year, urging the government to treat gambling harm with the same seriousness as alcohol, tobacco, and junk food advertising.

The upcoming ban will apply to all public transport advertising – including on buses, trains,

trams, and associated infrastructure – bringing South Australia into line with New South Wales and Victoria, which introduced similar bans in 2024 and 2017 respectively.

The move is a long-overdue, but crucial step in reducing harm and protecting children and vulnerable people from the constant and normalising presence of gambling promotion.

Research shows that gambling advertising desensitises young people and contributes to risky behaviours. In Australia, one-in-three teenagers, and nearly half of those aged 18 to 19, are already gambling.

At the same time, the state reaps more than \$670 million annually from gambling, including \$460 million from poker machines, a profit that comes at the expense of community wellbeing.

This is a win for children, families and commuters.

But it's only the beginning. If we're serious about reducing gambling harm, we need systemic reform.

Our kids are being bombarded with ads that normalise gambling on their way to school. Our public transport should be safe, supportive spaces, not rolling billboards that promote addictive behaviour. That ends

The government has been profiting from pain - cashing in while vulnerable South Australians are targeted by a relentless cycle of advertising that normalises gambling. This ban is a vital step forward.

We don't need gambling ads wrapped around trams rolling down North Terrace. We have better things to advertise than the products of an industry built on loss.

SA-BEST has long advocated for strong, sensible reform to reduce gambling harm — this is a meaningful step forward.

Mrs Salter's passing, after what should have been routine gall bladder surgery, underscores a glaring gap in our regional health system-access to critical diagnostic tools.

Deputy state coroner Naomi Kereru's recommendation that CT cholangiograms be made available at all regional hospitals where elective gall bladder surgeries occur is both sensible and urgent.

This is not simply about technology, it is about equity. People living in regional communities deserve access to the same standard of healthcare as those in metropolitan areas.

Too often, regional hospitals operate without the tools that could save lives and prevent avoidable harm. In 2025, this disparity is unacceptable and the coronial findings are a wake-up call for the State Government.

I urge the Health Minister to act swiftly on the coroner's recommendation and equip our regional hospitals with the diagnostic technology they need, starting with CT cholangiograms to ensure that no more families endure such a devastating loss.

Rural Australians still suffering

THE latest release of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) data tables on Potentially preventable hospitalisations (PPH) in Australia by small geographic areas endorses the National Rural Health Alliance (NRHA) evidence showing rural communities are hospitalised at higher rates for preventable illness compared to people living in major cities.

According to the AIHW, rates of PPH were consistently higher for people living in remote and very remote areas, than those living in other areas. People living in remote and very remote areas had around twice the rate of PPH than people living in major cities.

When you live hundreds of kilometres from the nearest GP or primary care facility, you often have few options. These figures show how distance, combined with workforce shortages and limited flexibility of services, leads to unnecessary hospitalisations.

It's a clear signal that the health system is failing to meet the needs of rural Australians. The re-elected federal government now has the opportunity to step up and implement the

We can no longer ignore this discrepancy in access.

The figures endorse the NRHA's evidence base for additional investment in rural health in Australia report, showing residents in remote and very remote communities were hospitalised for potentially avoidable conditions at approximately twice the rate of those in major cities.

AIHW data shows that this gap has remained consistent over recent years, with the rate ranging from 2.0 times higher in 2017-2018, to 2.2 times higher in 2021-22.

AIHW also shows people living in regional Primary Health Network areas have experienced persistently higher rates of potentially preventable hospitalisations compared to their metropolitan counterparts since 2017-2018

This is particularly so in the Northern Territory (5600 hospitalisations per 100,000 population) and Western Queensland (5300 hospitalisations per 100,000 population).

The NRHA's evidence base for additional rural health investment echoes these findings. It recognises that where primary care access is low. more patients access emergency departments.

The report also highlights that MBS utilisation, for example from GP consults, drops as areas become more remote, with an associated rise in emergency department attendances. In these regions, there are often no clinicians of any kind.

We now have years of evidence showing that lower access to Medicare-funded services and higher emergency presentations are closely linked. The AIHW figures back this up — now we need the funding to follow from the re-elected government.

Urging for free RSV vaccine

ON Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) Awareness Week, and as Australia passes 60,000 RSV cases this year so far, GPs are urging federal, state, and territory governments to make the RSV vaccination free for at-risk groups and protect our most vulnerable.

RSV hits our communities hard every year, with serious and sometimes life-threatening consequences for babies, young children, older people, and people with chronic health condi-

The Federal Government provides free vaccines for pregnant women to protect them and their babies, and state and territory governments have funded immunisation across the country for babies who do not already have protection from RSV through the mother's vaccination.

At this stage free vaccines for other at-risk groups are not funded nationally, and they vary from state to state.

The Australian Immunisation Handbook recommends RSV vaccination for pregnant women, all people over 75 years of age, and anyone over 60 who is Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, or who has medical risk factors for severe RSV disease.

With more than half of reported cases occurring in babies and children aged under four and almost 20 per cent occurring among over 60s, protecting these populations is crucial.

The Federal and State Governments must co-operate to ensure all vulnerable groups can access the vaccine for free to keep them safe and reduce the spread of the disease.

For those wanting to protect themselves from RSV and other vaccine-preventable illnesses this season, your family GP will be able to guide you in which vaccines are recommended and how to look after your health and wellbeing through winter.

There is no substitute for the quality care you get from a specialist GP who knows you and your history. Together we can





Suicide and mental health of SA veterinarians... Riverland trip's crucial input

THE mental health scourge faced by veterinarians and their staff – including the shocking suicide rate – will be explored when a group of visiting SA politicians descends on the Riverland early next month.

SA Parliament's Joint Committee on the Mental Health and Wellbeing of Veterinarians in South Australia will visit the Riverland on July 3 to meet with local veterinarians and practice staff to learn about the issues faced by regional vet practices.

Committee chair Sarah Game MLC – a former veterinarian before being elected in 2022 – will be among the touring group and said the industry desperately needed information and solutions.

"There is something very concerning going on with the veterinary industry," Dr Game said.

"We have highly resilient, highly capable people, yet they are taking their own lives and leaving the profession.

"I hope this inquiry will bring about real change to the extraordinary financial hardship, the very long hours and the incredibly high-pressure environment these people work in."

Established by Dr Game, the committee is receiving evidence concerning:

- ☐ The causes behind veterinarian burnout, mental health, and suicide.
- ☐ Identifying preventative measures and initiatives to improve working conditions.
- ☐ The role of education in workplace preparation.
- ☐ Identifying the industry's social and economic benefits.

Fellow upper house member and ex-veterinarian, Riverland-based Liberal MLC Nicola Centofanti, will also be part of the group, which will make various stopovers during the trip.

"The mental health and wellbeing of our veterinarians, particularly in regional South Australia, must be taken seriously," said Dr Centofanti, who is the State Opposition spokesperson for primary industries and regional SA.

"These professionals play a vital role in our agricultural communities, yet they are facing extraordinary stress,

burnout, and in some tragic cases, suicide.
"I am delighted that the

committee have chosen to head to where I practiced as a veterinarian.

"This fact-finding visit is an important opportunity to listen directly to those on the front lines.


"Vets in regional practices are dealing with unique pressures: long hours, professional isolation, financial strain, and an emotionally demanding workload.

"It's essential that their lived experiences inform practical reforms, whether that be through workplace support, education, or broader workforce planning."

Dr Centofanti said the regional veterinary sector was under "immense pressure".

"And without urgent action, we risk losing more of these highly skilled professionals," she said.

The committee is scheduled to visit the Riverland on Thursday, July 3, and will also spend another day in Murray Bridge.

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Cemetery fees for babies and children waived

A RIVERLAND council has approved the waiver of cemetery fees for stillborn babies and children, aiming to allow grieving families to farewell loved ones at decreased,

Loxton Waikerie councillors at last week's general meeting voted to approve a proposed cemetery fee waiver for babies and children up to 10 years of age.

According to a letter from presiding Newland MP Olivia Savvas on behalf of stillbirth into South Australia, sent to Mayor Trevor Norton, said "the committee would like to encourage the Loxton Waikerie District Council to implement a similar policy to waive these fees in your local area to show compassion and support for grieving families, to provide the opportunity to farewell their loved ones at little-to-no cost during this difficult time".

"In February of this year, the Berri

Barmera Council waived cemetery fees for babies and children and the City of Salisbury has followed suit by adopting that these fees will also not be charged in this local council area," the letter said.

Councillors approved the request, with the agenda stating "this initiative aims to demonstrate compassion and support for grieving families by allowing them to farewell their loved ones at little to no cost during such a difficult time".

"In the draft 2025–26 Fees and Charges, the cost for a stillborn or child burial is listed as \$401.00," the agenda said.

"Over the past 25 years, there have been 10 instances of children being laid to rest in council cemeteries, with only one occurring in the last five years. Therefore, the financial impact of implementing this waiver would be

Waikerie retirement village will not have rate rebates

has declined a rate rebate application from a senior citizens not-for profit organisation that runs a retirement village.

Loxton Waikerie councillors at last week's general meeting, voted to decline a proposed rate rebate application from Waikerie Community Senior Citizens Home Inc.

The incorporated body had requested a 25 per cent discretionary rebate for 78

A RIVERLAND council individual tenancies located at the Warrawee Lodge retirement village, stating on their rate rebate application from the village is "operated by a not-for-profit organisation which provides affordable independent housing to retirees and aged pensioners in the area".

The application also said "the organisation is not in receipt of any government funding, and the rebate would allow to keep fees affordable to residents'

Loxton Waikerie council meeting agenda, under section 14.1.2 mentioned "If council were to approve the current application, a discretionary rebate of approximately \$13,060 would

apply".
"It is anticipated that approval of this rebate may result in similar applications from other retirement villages across the district, with an estimated further rebate impact of approximately \$29,599," the agenda said.

Finance access dries up for regional producers

A LOCAL finance expert says droughtinduced debt, combined with tightening lender risk appetites, are making it increasingly difficult for growers to access the finance needed to keep their businesses running.

Completed by more than 130 producers, a recent Grain Producers SA (GPSA) survey revealed that one-in-two South Australian grain producers are currently facing difficulties accessing finance or credit during the drought.

GPSA chief executive officer Brad Perry said the results paint a troubling picture of grain producers being pushed to the brink in the second-consecutive year of a state-wide drought.

"This survey confirms what we are hearing right across the state – grain producers are being met with more hoops, stricter conditions, and slower processes to secure critical finance to get them through this season and beyond," Mr Perry said.

"The survey shows examples of grain producers being told they don't qualify for support due to the drought-impacted seasons, even if they've met their financial obligations previously. It's a precarious situation for grain producers across South Australia."

Riverland Lending Services senior manager Jeff McDonald said the current scenario is what most farmers have experienced with their banks.

"After the Royal Commission into Banking, new laws were introduced into business finance under the headline of 'Responsible Lending," Mr McDonald said.

"Similar laws have been in place when it comes to consumer lending (home loans) for over 20 years, designed to protect borrowers from banks lending to them when they don't have the financial support."

"This has been our life for the last 6 to 12 months – processing loan applications for our

farming clients after some very disappointing weather events, and the major proportion of our client base is across SA.

"The biggest change in these laws is the heavy emphasis on repayment ability ahead of security/equity. It is now a requirement of all banks (audited by government bodies), that borrowers can demonstrate the ability to repay their loans from cash-flow/profits over a reasonable loan term."

According to the survey:

- ☐ Nearly 60 per cent cited issues with bank lending, followed by commercial lending (13 per cent), with key concerns raised about overdraft extension challenges.
- ☐ The most common challenges experienced by grain producers when seeking finance were a lack of cashflow (29 per cent), approval processes (24 per cent), increased interest rates (17 per cent) and stricter lending criteria (9 per cent).
- ☐ Almost 10 per cent said their bank required a formal drought declaration before assistance would be considered.
- ☐ Nearly 70 per cent of respondents said they have a dedicated bank manager, with 18 per cent stating they used to but no longer do, and 10 per cent do not have one.
- ☐ The overall average experience rating for grain producers dealing with their bank or financial institution during drought is five out of 10.
- ☐ Only 15 per cent of grain producers surveyed said their banks proactively offered drought related support options.

Mr Perry said a lack of consistent drought relief options through financiers was compounding financial stress.

"It is concerning that the survey found there are still financiers telling some grain producers they'll only consider hardship support if there's a formal drought declaration, while comments in the survey suggest others aren't even aware of the pressures growers are under," he said. Mr McDonald highlighted the financial importance of income stability.

"This has always been the case in home loans, where someone's employment income is paramount to gaining approval, with the deposit/equity a secondary consideration," Mr McDonald said.

"In other words, someone who only wants to borrow say \$100,000 on a \$1m house, and has the rest in cash, cannot get a loan if they don't have any income to repay the \$100k loan.

"The responsible lending laws in business now reflect a similar approach, with a borrower needing to demonstrate repayment ability, and not simply rely on their equity as they have always done so in the past.

"With some good seasons for most rural areas through the 2020–2023 period, these changes haven't been noticed by farmers as most haven't had to lean on their bank during the good times."

The survey also found:

- ☐ Just 33 per cent of respondents had used Farm Management Deposits (FMDs), with many citing they never had the sufficient surplus required to do so.
- ☐ Only 28 per cent had applied for concessional loans through the Regional Investment Corporation (RIC), with several noting the complexity or unsuitability of the criteria.
- ☐ A growing number of grain producers are relying on finance brokers, not banks, due to long delays and lack of agricultural expertise within financial institutions.
- ☐ Almost 20 per cent had used the Rural Financial Counselling Service in the past 12 months with only 2 per cent engaged in Farm Debt Mediation.

Mr Perry said GPSA will be providing the results of the survey to the State and Federal Government and writing to banks and financiers highlighting the feedback and concerns from grain producers.

"We need to ensure grain producers don't just survive this drought but are set up to recover when seasonal conditions improve. Access to finance is a critical part of that equation and these survey results demonstrate that much more needs to be done," Mr Perry said

Mr McDonald said "many farmers purchased land in recent/good years at recordhigh values, at what were historically low interest rates (some around 2 per cent)," Mr McDonald said.

"The cost to service these debts has risen dramatically in the last few years as rates are sitting around 6-7 per cent now, a three-fold increase in interest costs.

"The cost of most inputs (fertiliser, chemical, fuel, power, rates, wages etc) have risen sharply in recent years, putting significant pressure on viability when commodities (wheat, barley etc) haven't increased in value."

Mr McDonald said farmers were struggling to demonstrate an ability to repay their debts.

"We (RLS Agribusiness) have seen many cases where a farmer is struggling to gain finance support from their bank," Mr McDonald said.

"A recent case saw a valuation of \$22m on a farm with \$3m debt, yet they couldn't access more money to cover their losses from the 2024 drought. The reason, despite all that equity, they cannot show they can repay the loan.

"This is the law and we need to work within the rules to get what we want.

"We at RLS Agribusiness see this as an opportunity to assist our clients to 'step up' a little with their business decisions, considering that no-one chooses to lose money and for most, they won't lose money in the long term against at least average seasons.

"It's about becoming more business focused and proving to banks that there is long-term viability in their operations."

Riverlanders warned to not eat wild mushrooms

POTENTIALLY deadly wild mushrooms are starting to pop up in parts of the state, prompting a warning to Riverlanders about the risks of picking and eating unknown fungi.

Poisonous wild mushrooms can usually be found across much of the state from late summer to early winter when the earth is still warm, and particularly after rain.

Despite the low rainfall this year, cooler weather and recent rainfall has triggered the start of the fungi season in parts of the Adelaide Hills.

Poisoning from several varieties may have a delayed onset of symptoms - up to 24 hours - and can cause life-threatening liver damage.

Early treatment can be lifesaving, act quickly if you think you have ingested wild mushrooms.

The death cap mushrooms, or amanita phalloides, have been found recently at a few locations in the Adelaide Hills. They are extremely poisonous even if only tiny

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amounts are ingested.

Death caps can be difficult to distinguish from other wild mushrooms and can resemble some edible species, so it is important to keep an eye on children and pets when outside.

Even the experts can have difficulty in identifying some species, so you should only ever eat mushrooms that have been purchased from a reliable green-grocer or supermarket.

Around 46 per cent of the calls made to the Poisons Information Centre last year about mushroom poisoning involved children under the age of five.

Symptoms of mushroom poisoning include severe stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea, which can take several hours to appear. This can progress to life-threatening liver failure, depending on the species.

"There is no reliable way of telling if a wild mushroom is safe to eat, and you can't tell if a mushroom is poisonous by its taste or if an animal has eaten it," Chief Public Health Officer Nicola Spurrier said.

"I can't be clearer – don't eat wild mush-rooms.

"Don't risk your life or the life of your loved ones - only eat mushrooms from a reliable grower, greengrocer or supermarket.

"Wild fungi may look beautiful to look at and by all means, take a photo, but don't touch or eat them. People born overseas should be aware that these highly toxic mushrooms can look like edible mushrooms that they may have gathered in their home countries.

"If you or someone you know has eaten a wild mushroom, don't wait for symptoms to appear. Seek immediate medical advice in case the mushroom is toxic.

"You can contact the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26 for advice, or call 000 in an emergency."

The lost digger arrives in Renmark

AN AUSTRALIAN veteran recently arrived in the Riverland to raise awareness for mental health.

Walking from Perth's Cottesloe Beach to Sydney's Bondi Beach, Victorian veteran, Bruce Bolger, reached Renmark earlier this month on his journey to raise awareness for The Black Dog Institute.

"I was in the army for 25 years — serving throughout Australia and overseas in East Timor, Iraq, and the Sinai Peninsula, between Egypt and Israel — and in 2023 I was medically discharged from defence," Mr Bolger said.

"Within those last three years of being in the army, 13 people up until now have died by suicide — all friends of mine.

"So, I decided to sell everything I had, and walk from

Cottesloe Beach to Bondi to raise awareness for the Black Dog (Institute) and mental health."

With only a cart holding a few possessions, water, and a tent, Mr Bolger reached Renmark on day 72 of his cross-country journey, before setting off to Mildura the following day in hopes of reaching his destination before July 20.

"I have had some problems with my feet, and currently on my third pair of shoes, and getting used to the cold has been a challenge," he said.

"Normally, when I am finished walking for the day, I pull off to the side and set up my tent and try to rinse and repeat — it's been one foot in front of the other.

"The journey has also been very lonely, but has been made up by all the people I have met

along the way".

Receiving a dinner from the Renmark RSL and a free night of accommodation from Hotel Renmark, Mr Bolger said he has been "blown away" by the constant generosity of each community he has visited.

"I am funding everything on my own, but people have been so generous," he said.

"Organisations like the (Renmark) RSL and places like Hotel Renmark have been amazing.

"Even the truckies who give me care packages, or those in cars who stop for a chat — it's all been so great."

Mr Bolger said "the daily reset" that has allowed him to get this far in his journey, is the message he wants to pass on to anyone who may be struggling.

"One thing I want to stress is resetting," he said.

"I wouldn't be able to do this walk if I didn't reset here in Renmark, and then again in Mildura, and so on.

"If people are finding their mental health difficult, they should stop, think about what they're doing, relax, and take the time for themselves to change their lifestyle and what they're doing."

Next year Mr Bolger said he is walking from Adelaide to Melbourne, via Hobart, and hopes more people join him when he reaches the Great Ocean Road for a 110km challenge, or a Tasmanian trek from Devonport to Hobart.


"I am inviting anyone who has never camped or doesn't want to walk by themselves," he said.



Strengthening local government — why it matters now more than ever

I DON'T use the word 'crisis' lightly, but it's hard to ignore the warning signs.

Across South Australia, local government is under increasing pressure, from financial strain and political tension, to cultural challenges within the sector itself.

Yet amidst all this, it is important to remember: local government remains one of the most trusted, community-connected, and essential tiers of government we have.

At Mid Murray, I believe we're bucking the trend. Our council has a strong team of elected members, a clear direction, and we're making real progress toward long-term financial sustainability.

That doesn't mean the road has been easy, it hasn't, but we are heading in the right direction. Still, when I look across the state, I see a sector under stress.

ESCOSA has so far assessed 49 councils in South Australia. Just 24 have been deemed financially "sustainable."

That statistic should be sounding alarm bells across every level of government.

We await the results for the final group of councils early next year, but in the meantime, can anyone point to a co-ordinated, state-wide strategy to respond? Where is the action plan to help councils navigate these challenges?

And yet, despite these financial headwinds, councils continue to deliver. From maintaining local roads and parks to running libraries, supporting community events, collecting waste, and providing essential water and sewerage services, every day, councils step up where others step back.

This is the strength of local government: practical, people-focused, and place-based. But we can't keep doing more with less.

Meanwhile, we've seen three mayors resign in just a few months, and countless councillors walk away across South Australia

That's deeply concerning, it sends a clear message to anyone considering public service, it is simply not worth the stress, scrutiny, or strain.

To some, the pay reflects that sentiment. Councillors in SA receive an annual allowance between \$8000 and \$30,000, with no superannuation (based on population).

Mid Murray sits somewhere in the middle of that scale. It is scant recognition for what is, in reality, a demanding and highly visible role

While mayors earn more, still with no superannuation, the hours, responsibilities, and public exposure seem to exceed the compensation.

The vast majority of elected members are community-minded people doing their best with limited resources and rising expectations, but when a council makes headlines for the wrong reasons, it undermines the whole sector, and we risk losing good people

Rather than genuine partnerships, what we too often see from the other levels of government is finger-pointing and political convenience.

Whether it is making inflammatory claims about a council selling disability housing (which is not a Council core role), or sparking outrage over playground closures, the narrative is often unhelpful and incomplete.

Add to this a recent expectation that councils bury some community members for free, or fund major roads we simply can't afford, or deliver critical infrastructure without being able to collect rates on power-generating developments, it all feels like a growing burden without shared accountability.

Then there are the hidden costs. Councils collect the state's Landscape Levy, a tax we don't control but must administer, and each council charges differently, adding confusion and inequity for ratepayers.

In Mid Murray, we even fill community fire tanks at council cost. That is a double hit, because residents already pay the Emergency Services Levy and so does coun-

cil, for every property we own.

Despite all of this, I truly believe in the power of local government. I've seen first-hand how it transforms lives, supports community, backs small business, and responds when no one else does.

Whether it is disaster recovery, community programs, or simply beautifying our streets and towns, it is often councils that quietly make it happen.

So while I may not have a clever closing line, I do have a challenge and a call to action. We need a genuine, collaborative partnership between local, state, and federal governments, one grounded in respect, shared responsibility, and long-term thinking.

It is time to invest in the leadership and governance of local councils. Better support for elected members, consistent and enforceable behavioural standards, and reforms that build capacity, not just enforce compliance.

The clock is ticking. With local government elections around 16-months away, we risk losing dedicated representatives unless meaningful change begins now. We cannot afford another cycle of patchwork fixes and avoidable conflict.

To restore trust, attract capable candidates, and strengthen our communities, we must show that local government is something worth believing in, and I truly believe it is.

I'll keep advocating, keep asking the hard questions, and keep calling it out when I see something that isn't right because local government matters. Our communities deserve more than crisis, they deserve commitment, courage, and collaboration.

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Car club grants applications now open

MOTORSPORT and classic car clubs, including those in the Riverland, can now apply for government grants aiming to accelerate regional, female and young driver participation, and boosting safety on and offroad.

Applications for the final round of the South Australian Car Club grants are now open, providing clubs with funding to build capacity, improve infrastructure and upgrade equipment, including purchasing life-saving defibrillators, rejuvenate clubrooms, and improve operations and driver participation in motorsport through popular events.

It comes as a record 75 initiatives across 64 clubs share in \$500,000 under the most recent funding round, adding to the \$2m, four-year program which began in 2023 with eligible grassroots car and motorcycle clubs since sharing in \$1.5m through more than 200 initiatives.

Powered by a \$5000 grant, the Veteran Car Club of South Australia will lead 150 pre-1919 vehicles on a six-day rally across the Murraylands in October, with a Triumph Stag rally through the Riverland also drawing interstate visitors to communities impacted by the 2022-2023 River Murray Flood Event.

A \$23,000 grant will help Southern Districts Car Club build a new all-weather training space for young drivers at Cambrai, while Morgan Classic and Custom Vehicles Club receives \$25,000 for vital clubroom repairs.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said "the South Australian Car Club Program is fuelling the growth of grassroots participation in motorsport by enabling car and motorcycle clubs to build on their proud history".

"As clubs get set to rev up projects awarded in round three, we are excited to announce the fourth and final round of grants to drive their ambitions into the future," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"Our state is a premier destination for motoring enthusiasts, and we are proud to be supporting their continued success - on and off road."

There are more than 200 recognised motoring clubs across South Australia, with more than 46,000 vehicles registered under the conditional registration scheme, comprising a mix of historic, individually constructed, left-hand drive and street rod vehicles.

Eligible clubs must be a not-for-profit organisation operating for 12 months or longer, and applications close on August 25.

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



GPs to diagnose and treat ADHD

THE State Government is introducing reforms to make it more accessible and cheaper for Riverlanders to receive a diagnosis and treatment for attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD).

Backed by the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, the reforms will allow GPs to diagnose and treat ADHD in children and adults, significantly reducing costs and lengthy wait times associated with having to go through a paediatrician or psychiatrist.

From 2026, additional training will be made available to South Australian GPs, enabling them to diagnose ADHD, provide support to patients and families and prescribe medication to assist with learning, development and workplace challenges without the need for specialist appointments.

The new approach will ensure South Australians receive faster personalised holistic care, with shorter diagnosis wait times and cheaper overall treatment.

It will also allow greater access to this important health care in regional areas.

Currently, adults seeking a diagnosis in South Australia must first see a psychiatrist for assessment and children must see a paediatrician.

Specialist appointments are often expensive, with many patients paying upwards of \$2000 and waiting months or years to receive a diagnosis for the complex condition.

It is estimated that one in 20 Australians has ADHD, with the condition affecting an individual's thinking, communication and behaviour. Symptoms include difficulty paying attention, impulsiveness, and restlessness.

In recent years, greater understanding of the condition has led to increased demand for ADHD assessments across Australia.

Importantly, the reforms will allow specialist GPs to provide holistic care for their patients with ADHD. This includes addressing other key aspects of care, such as sleep hygiene and screen time, co-ordinating referrals to educational and behavioural management programs, counselling and support groups.

Accredited training will be provided through the Royal Australian College of General

Practitioners, with additional ongoing support to be provided post-training.

"We are making it cheaper and easier for South Australians to access life-changing treatment for ADHD, by allowing GPs to treat and diagnose the condition," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"We know many South Australians currently face lengthy wait times and huge costs to access a diagnosis and treatment.

"Children can struggle academically and socially as a result of ADHD and we want to reduce any delays in them receiving help.

"These game-changing reforms will improve the lives of children and adults across the state.

"People's access to this important health care should not be determined by their post-code or their bank balance.

"And likewise, we should allow our specialist GPs to practise at the top of their scope of practice."

Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) SA chair Siân Goodson said "an ADHD assessment and diagnosis can cost thousands of dollars and months of waiting".


"Health data shows families in more rural and lower socioeconomic status areas are missing out on this care at significantly higher rates," Dr Goodson said.

"As specialist GPs, we care for our patients throughout their lives and are the most accessible medical practitioners.

"GPs with an interest in ADHD are supported by appropriate clinical guidelines and well-placed to provide an assessment, diagnosis, and ongoing care.

"Early intervention for children with ADHD sets children up for success at school and throughout their lives.

"For adults, a diagnosis and access to treatment by a GP who knows you can be life-changing."







Insights reveal breathing techniques could help counter stress epidemic

A FORMER world-ranked athlete is spotlighting a potential solution to rising global stress levels, one that costs nothing and is accessible to all Riverlanders, proper breathing.

As stress-related health issues escalate worldwide, researchers and coaches are turning attention to how breathing influences the body's nervous system. Studies show that dysfunctional breathing habits, such as mouth breathing or rapid, shallow breaths, can keep the body in a heightened state of stress by overactivating the sympathetic nervous system.

Alexia Clonda, a certified Buteyko breathing and mindset coach, and former world-ranked squash player, is calling for greater public awareness around breathing as a tool for managing stress.

"Most people don't realize that the way they breathe can either amplify or relieve their stress response," Clonda said.

Scientific findings support this approach. A study involving 400 participants demonstrated that 10 minutes of coherent breathing daily over four weeks reduced cortisol levels by up to 20 per cent. The vagus nerve, which regulates critical functions including heart rate, digestion, and emotional balance, responds directly to the way one

"Breathing through the nose and engaging the diaphragm has a calming effect on


"It increases oxygen efficiency, slows the heart rate, and can activate the parasympathetic system — shifting the body into a state of calm."

According to Clonda, techniques such as Box Breathing, 4-7-8 Breathing, and Physiological Sighs have been used successfully in both athletic and clinical settings. She now advocates for their use in workplaces, schools, and mental health interventions as part of a broader public health conversation.

The renewed interest in breathwork is emerging alongside a wider recognition of the vagus nerve's role in chronic stress, anxiety, and burnout. When properly stimulated through techniques like diaphragmatic breathing and nasal inhalation, the vagus nerve may help restore physiological balance and reduce the duration of the "fight-or-flight" response.

Clonda says these five simple breathing techniques help to support nervous system recovery:

- 5-5 Paced Breathing Inhale for five seconds, exhale for five seconds
- Box Breathing (4-4-4-4) Inhale, hold, exhale, hold for 4 seconds each
- 4-7-8 Breathing Used to aid sleep and anxiety reduction
- Physiological Sigh Two short nasal inhales followed by a slow exhale
- Humming Exhale Nasal exhale with

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Puppy farms banned, dog attack penalties toughened

IMPORTANT reforms to dog and cat laws, including for Riverland owners, banning puppy farms, expanding feral cat eradication and increased penalties for dog owners that attack people and other animals, have passed State Parliament.

Dog owners can now face a maximum fine of \$25,000 if their pet attacks a person or animal causing serious injury or death. This fine will be up to \$50,000 if the attacking dog was already the subject of a dangerous dog order.

In extreme cases, when a dog owner deliberately encourages their pet to attack or harass a person or animal, the owner could be fined up to \$100,000, or be jailed for four years.

In South Australia 503 people presented at a public hospital in 2024 after being attacked by a dog, while another 1200 dog attacks were reported to SA councils.

Dog control orders placed on pet owners who move to South Australia from interstate, such as a dangerous dog order or a prohibition order, will also be better recognised and enforced under South Australian law.

Minister for Climate, Environment and Water Susan Close said "these important updates to the Dog and Cat Management Act will prevent puppy factories from being set up in South Australia".

"Everyone deserves to know that their new family puppy has come from a responsible breeder who cares for their animals and keeps them in good living conditions," Dr Close said.

"We have also introduced heavier penalties to help prevent violent dog attacks and increase the safety of all South Australians and their pets."

Local councils will also have increased powers to manage nuisance barking and dogs that persistently wander in their districts, including the ability to issue control orders on dogs that continually wander at large, with penalties of up to \$2500 each time a dog with a control order is caught wandering.

Large-scale puppy farms are now banned in South Australia, outlawing inhumane breeding programs that increase the risk of animal cruelty.

A new breeder licensing scheme has also been introduced under the reforms to the state's Dog and Cat Management Act.

The scheme also includes:

- ☐ A rigorous assessment process for breeders, including criminal background checks on applicants.
- ☐ The ability to suspend and cancel breeder licences and fines of up to \$10,000 for breeding animals without a licence.
- ☐ New limits, to be determined via further public

consultation, to both the number of female animals per breeding program and the number of litters they can have.

Dr Close added "the increased punishments for dog attacks will act as a strong deterrent and ensure that owners do all they can to control their dogs".

"Feral cats are one of the biggest threats to native animals, killing more than 1.5 billion mammals, birds, reptiles and frogs, and 1.1 billion invertebrates each year," Dr Close said.

These limits will be able to be changed to set, or align with, national best practice, including mandatory reporting of each litter and increases to all penalties for dog owners whose pet attacks people, dogs and other animals.

In addition to the breeder reforms, all property owners more than 1km from another residence are now permitted to undertake humane lethal cat controls on their prop-

The update is aimed to allow landholders in regional areas to deal with feral cats on their properties. The legislation allows for this distance to be reduced if required.

Feral cats can already be managed using lethal methods by landholders and government agencies, such as councils or regional Landscape Boards.



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

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The following account has been provided by Riverland traveller NEIL HOCKING, regarding his time spent with local iconic bush figure POSSUM...

Learning from the Possum

I WAS 11 years old and I was at Mannum, where we had a shack during the 1974 flood. We came from Broken Hill.

One day I saw this gentleman hanging out behind a tree and I busted him. He said hello to me and said name was David James, but they called him Possum. I told him my name was Neil Hocking.

Many years later, at the end of 1982, I was at Lock 5, having just got off the highway, and I was at this stump I always sat on in the morning. It was in the most unusual place, in a bush. I was eating chicken and this bloke comes charging through the bloody bush.

He said hello, and again told me they called him Possum. I told him that I knew him, and had met him in Mannum when he was behind the tree.

I stayed with Possum for a while in a tin hut, and he would pass on knowledge and skills of the bush that I hadn't seen.

We would travel around farmers' properties. One day we were picking flannel weed around Lake Victoria. I asked Possum, what are we doing this for?

His reply was 'what else is there to do?'. I remember that one day Max Jones, who I used to call Uncle Max, was out looking for Possum in the bush. He was calling his name

out, and we were right there in a burnt-out stump maybe 11 feet below him. I was about to burst out laughing.

I went away to Queensland for a while, but I came back and we were doing the same old thing, but we went to Lock 8. This is where he would sleep, and that's where I found him sick. I left my swag and bag with him and I had to go back to Renmark.

I got into the police station, and Max Jones – who had just retired from his duties – was there. I said we needed to save the life of David James, who they called Possum. His eyes went wide.

Uncle Max asked Possum if he wanted to go to hospital, so we took him, and then I went back up to Queensland. When I came back again I heard Possum had passed away.

Some time after all that, while in Adelaide, I heard on the news by chance that Possum's daughter was coming to Australia to pick up her father's diaries. When coming back from Adelaide, where I had been to see my mum, and a Toyota Landcruiser stops and picks me up. I began talking to the woman who was driving about my time with Possum, and she suddenly pulled off the road and stopped.

She told me she was Possum's daughter. I told her I had to get something from my bag in the back, and I knew exactly what to do. I had Possum's diary for at least four years, because he had told me to get it out of his tree stump, and I gave it to her.

I met him when I was 11, unknowingly, and he remembered for so long. I recently felt his presence when I was at Lock 5. I miss him.

I've never told anyone because I didn't think it mattered, and maybe it doesn't matter, but I feel robbed because I knew him..



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Parents urged to protect kids against flu

RIVERLAND parents are being urged to vaccinate their children against the flu as cases this year continue to rise across the state.

Currently, less than onein-five SA children under the age of five have had a flu vaccine

So far this year, 781 children under the age of five have been diagnosed with the flu in South Australia, with 87 of those diagnosed resulting in hospitalisation.

Across the state there have been 6754 flu cases reported so far this year, compared to 4267 cases at the same time last year.

The flu vaccine is free for at-risk groups including children under five years, people aged more than 65 years, pregnant women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and those aged more than six months with certain health conditions.

"Protecting young chil-

dren from the severe impacts of the flu is so important, which is why we are urging all South Australian parents to get their kids vaccinated this winter," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"Young children are especially vulnerable to the serious impacts of flu and more likely to end up in hospital.

"We're listening to the health experts by providing an excellent program that provides free flu vaccines to around 600,000 South Australians including children under five, people over 65, pregnant women, all Aboriginal people over six months of age, and those with underlying health conditions. South Australians have a strong record for rolling up their sleeves

ing up their sleeves.

"Overall, our flu vaccine uptake is higher than the national average and better than any mainland state – we

just need more parents to get their young kids vaccinated."

Chief Public Health Officer Nicola Spurrier said "with the onset of colder weather, think about prioritising the health of your family."

"Getting a flu vaccine and ensuring your little ones are vaccinated is one simple measure to give you peace of mind as coughs and colds set in," Prof Spurrier said.

"Respiratory infections such as flu spread quickly in childcare and kindy particularly over the colder months when kids spend more time indoors.

"Prioritising a free flu vaccine for your child will ensure your child is not the one that ends up in hospital."







Aged care staffing on the rise, but is the South Australian quality of care?

EFFORTS to increase direct care staffing levels in aged care homes, in areas like the Riverland, are working, but a new study from Flinders University has questioned if it is enough to improve quality of care for older

Led by Flinders University, researchers from the Registry of Senior Australians (ROSA) Research Centre analysed data from over 2000 aged care homes across Australia, looking at how well care staffing targets were being met, and whether this impacted residents' experiences and quality measures.

"Since October 2022, Australia has set individual targets for total care and registered nurse minutes for aged care homes, based on the assessed care needs of their residents,' Flinders Caring Futures Institute and South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI) lead author associate Stephanie Harrison said.

"These targets are a positive step, but these are the minimum levels of care that homes should be providing, and it remains unclear whether they are sufficient to drive meaningful improvements in care quality

Looking at data from January 2023 to March 2024, the study found that the proportion of aged care homes meeting or exceeding their total care minutes target rose from 41 per cent to 53 per cent.

Government-run facilities were more likely to meet their targets, compared to for-profit and not-for-profit facilities, with metropolitan and smaller facilities also performing better.

"The data suggests that location and facility size play a crucial role in the ability of an aged care home to provide adequate staffing levels," Professor Harrison said.

"Government-run facilities were also more successful in meeting and exceeding care minute targets.

"As smaller, government-run facilities are replaced by larger, for-profit services, this is an important area to monitor."

Despite the rise in care staffing levels, the authors found no association between care minutes and residents' experiences or quality measures.

"This challenges the assumption that simply increasing staffing will automatically improve care quality," Professor Harrison

The researchers emphasise that highquality care depends on more than just staff numbers, as it requires a skilled, well-supported workforce with strong clinical leadership.

The findings highlight the complexity of aged care reform and the need for further research to understand the right balance of care minutes, skill mix and models of care to enhance care quality and resident safety.


"A holistic view to care quality is needed, beyond just meeting staffing targets," Professor Harrison said.

"Adequate training, staff retention strategies, and tailored models of care that meet individual resident needs are all important for policymakers to consider.

"Improving care means investing in workforce development, especially in rural and remote communities where staffing challenges are more pronounced.

"Recent initiatives to support the provision of aged care staff in rural and remote areas should be monitored to see if this helps to improve equitable access to care in these

"Monitoring staffing levels in aged care homes remains essential, it provides vital data, but to truly improve the quality of aged care, we must also strengthen the evidence base and address the ongoing challenges facing the sector."

Trials triumph for racing club

A DOUBLE dose of good news has been delivered to the Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club (MHRC) ahead of its annual September

For the first time in its 109-year history, the volunteer-run club will stage official barrier trials at its Halidon racecourse, bringing industry additional participants, potential upgrades and other benefits to the club.

After working with local officials on the proposal, the sport's state governing body, Racing SA, has announced the trials for Monday, September 29 – just over two weeks after the 2025 Mindarie-Halidon Cup meeting.

In addition, Racing SA has confirmed this year's meeting will see the club stage three 1200m events, utilising a renovated chute that allows bigger fields than the existing 1000m 'on-track' start.

Using Halidon for barrier trials - conducted under race-like conditions to prepare thoroughbreds for race starts – acknowledges the club's ongoing pursuit of facility improvements, according to Racing SA.

"Racing SA recognises the efforts of the MHRC to present an excellent alternative to the metropolitan and provincial tracks to stage barrier trials in the early part of spring, alleviating the pressure on other tracks following winter," said Racing SA's racing operations manager, Greg Rudolph.

"Racing SA will assist MHRC in the provision of resources to stage barrier trials and ensure the track surface is well prepared fol-

lowing the cup meeting.

"Racing SA recognises the importance of utilising MHRC as an alternative trial venue given its proximity to Murray Bridge and these trials will serve as an opportunity to assess whether further trials may be scheduled in the 2025/26 racing season.

"Racing SA welcomes and is appreciative of the club's co-operation in making MHRC an alternative venue for barrier trials, leading into important spring carnival preparations for SA horses."

MHRC president Geoff Redden said the committee was "pumped" to secure barrier trials shortly after its cup meeting.

"We've been working towards this for a while now, and we're rapt to be able to make this joint announcement with Racing SA," Mr Redden said.

"These trials on September 29 will give further exposure to our track and they'll also indicate that we're 'open for business' to industry participants.

"Importantly, Racing SA has indicated it will provide all the resources we require to stage these trials. It means it won't cost the club a cent, and it could well mean further on-site improvements in future.

"Club committee members and volunteers will naturally be on site on the day.'

Mr Redden said track would still be in 'prime racing condition" for the trials after its 2025 meeting, set down for Sunday, September 14.

Mr Redden also said the club was pleased its "hard work" upgrading the 1200m chute start would see six-furlong races return to the cup day program for the first time in recent history, in place of 1000m races.

Using the 1200m chute start - which adjoins the course's main circuit allows more width for both the barriers and the compulsory ambulance that follows horses around each race. This in turn will allow more horses to race over the sprint distance, with Mr Rudolph confirming that three 1200m events would be staged on this year's Cup day program.

Mr Redden said the change would be welcomed by trainers and jockeys, while the potential for larger field sizes was better for wagering turnover and the subsequent trickle down to the industry and club.

Racing SA officials travelled to the Halidon racecourse last Friday to inspect the facilities as the club steps up preparations for the September meeting.


"The progress report was good, and it's all systems go now for September 14," Mr Redden said.

"We're having regular meetings, planning, working bees and upgrades, and the track is already looking in good condition."

Tickets for the 2025 Mindarie-Halidon Cup meeting will go on sale from July 7.

An oar-inspiring weekend on the water

A COLD Saturday morning failed to dampen the spirits of more than 200 rowers in 44 crews who hit the water for the annual Renmark Rowing Club's Wharf to Woolshed Long Row.

Completing its eighth year, following the first event in 2017, the Long Row had competitors from all over Australia take on the 36km journey.

With two stops along the way, the event is particularly popular among masters rowers, and Long Row co-ordinator Anna Petersen said a June timeframe works.

"It's really appealing to masters" rowers, because the regatta season is from October to April, so that's when you have all of that racing as your focus," she said.

"This is an opportunity for people to keep their training up, and it's a social event, so I think people enjoy that aspect of it.

'We had people on the weekend who were teenagers, right through to people in their 80s, so it combines a huge age bracket.

"For the first time we had rowers participate from St Francis of Assisi College, and they had their

coach Stephanie Turnbull rowing with them which was nice, and they loved it.

"We had some clubs we haven't

had before, including an Australian Defence Force crew, and they came for the first time. "Participants hit the water from

New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, and the ACT, so they came from everywhere.'

Planning for the Long Row kicks off in the early stages of each year, with approximately four months' worth of work going into making the event happen.

Ms Petersen said it's an 'enor-

mous' amount of planning, but members at the club band together to make it happen.

'Generally, we'll start planning in February, and then entries open in March, and there's about a sixweek window for people to get them in," she said.

"Running the event itself requires an enormous number of volunteers, and we had 12 support boats on the water on Saturday, including a local doctor who donates his time to be available on the day.


"We had people manning the morning tea stops, and providing baked goods, and people helping the support boats, so we couldn't do it without them."

In what was a special moment, the St Francis of Assisi College's rowing program has been in effect for several years, and now has rowers competing a 36km journey in partnership with the Renmark Rowing Club.

In another local highlight, the recently renovated rowing dock was also in use for the first time, with the club launching all 44 crews from the one location within an hour, which was a significant positive.
