

Semi-trailer on fire at **Kingston-on-Murray**

EMERGENCY services were called to the Sturt Highway, at Kingston-on-Murray, after numerous reports of a collision between two vehicles, which caused one of the automobiles to burst into

Crews arrived after 7.10pm, on Sunday June 1, at the intersection of Kingston Road, on the Sturt Highway, after a Mercedes Benz van and a semi-trailer collided, leaving four people injured.

Patrols arrived to find the truck on fire, with crews working for some time to control the blaze that fully destroyed the vehicle.

A 44-year-old man, and his 45-year-old passenger, both from Victoria, escaped the accident with minor injuries. An 80-year-old man, and 73-year-old woman, from Osborne, were the driver and passenger of the van, and were taken to hospital

for further medical assessment.

Emergency services closed the Sturt Highway for several hours, but it was opened later in the night.

South Australia Police (SAPOL) said an investigation has been opened and further details will be released at a later date.

Police are asking anyone who witnessed the crash, or who has dashcam footage to contact police through Crime Stoppers online (www. crimestopperssa.gov.au), or call 1800 333 000.

High speed police pursuit ended in the Riverland

A MAN was arrested for numerous offences following a police pursuit through the state and ended in the Riverland.

A 31-year-old man from Victoria was arrested in Paruna, hours after police was advised the man was spotted driving a white BMW in Adelaide's CBD at about 2.30am. Police attempted to stop the car travelling north on Churchill Road, at Killburn.

About an hour later the vehicle was detected driving on the Sturt Highway, in Nuriootpa, at 129km/h, in an 80km/h zone.

Riverland Police, with the assistance of PolAir, attended West Boundary Road, at

The vehicle took off at speed away from patrols, however PolAir quickly picked it up and tracked it reaching speeds of 170km/h.

The man was seen dumping the car and entering a property in Wunkar, where he confronted the occupants and took their Toyota Hilux.

The man continued driving dangerously at high speeds through back roads, when he approached the intersection of the Cameron Highway and Brown Wells Highway, at Paruna, failed to negotiate the intersection losing control and rolling. The man ran from the vehicle, but was located a short time later and he was arrested.

The 31-year-old Victorian man was charged with dangerous driving to escape a police pursuit, illegal use of a motor vehicle, serious criminal trespass, theft, driving at a speed dangerous and other driving offences. He was refused police bail and appeared in Berri Magistrates Court last Friday.

A RIVERLAND man has been fined almost \$2000, and lost his licence, after being caught driving more than 70km over the speed limit.

On Friday, May 23, police reported a 24-year-old man, from Cooltong, after he was detected driving at 185km/h in a 110km/h zone along the Sturt Highway, at Stockyard Plains.

The driver received a fine of \$1997 and nine demerit points. He was issued with a six-month loss of licence notice and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

On Saturday, May 24, Police reported a 36-year-old man, from Berri, after he was stopped driving a vehicle on Riverview Drive, at Berri.

Checks on his licence revealed he was currently disqualified from driving. He will be summonsed to appear in Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On the same day police reported a 31-year-old man, from Loxton, for driving while disqualified, after being stopped

driving on Tobruk Terrace, at Loxton. He will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Also on Saturday, police reported a 39-year-old man, from Loxton, after he was stopped driving on Bookpurnong Terrace, at Loxton, and he returned a positive result for illicit drugs.

He was issued with a threemonth loss of licence and may be summonsed to the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date, pending forensic analysis of his drug sample.

Police then reported a 33-year-old man, from Berri, after being stopped driving a motor vehicle on Hepworth Street, at Berri.

Further tests returned a positive alcohol result of 0.167. He was issued with a 12-month instant loss of licence notice and will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Later on the same day, police

reported a 53-year-old man, from Banksia Park, after he was stopped driving a vehicle on Philip Avenue, at Swan Reach.

The driver returned a positive breath test result of 0.112. He was issued with a six-month instant loss of licence notice and will be summonsed to the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Sunday, May 25, police arrested a 37-year-old woman, from Renmark, after she was stopped driving on Sturt Highway, at Berri.

A roadside drug test returned a positive result to illicit substances and the woman was arrested. Her vehicle was impounded for 28 days, she received bail and will appear in Berri Magistrates Court on July

Also on Sunday, Police arrested a 47-year-old man, from Renmark South, after he was stopped driving a vehicle on Twentyseventh Street, at Renmark South. Further checks revealed that he was disqualified from driving.


The man was arrested and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days. He was refused bail and will appear in Berri Magistrates Court later today.

Renmark Paringa snags \$4.1m more from government constraints program...

THE "financial burden" on Renmark Paringa ratepayers from major local infrastructure projects will be reduced after new funding was obtained from the State Government.

Renmark Paringa councillors at last month's general meeting passed a motion to accept a \$4.1m funding offer from the Department of Environment and Water, through the Constraints Measures Program, which will be put towards the recently completed Twentyfirst Street bridge construction, and the Lock 5 Moorings Bank Stabilisation.

Renmark Paringa chief executive officer Tony Siviour said securing extra funding for the projects would soften the financial impacts on council's budget.

"Renmark Paringa Council is pleased to accept the \$4.1m funding offer from the Department of Environment and Water through the Constraints Measures Program," Mr Siviour said.

"By securing this additional

funding, we're reducing the financial burden on our ratepayers while ensuring the delivery of high-priority infrastructure.

"This is a win for our local residents and a reflection of council's commitment to long-term planning and strong advocacy."

Mr Siviour said successful community outcomes for Renmark Paringa had been generated through the Constraints Measures Program.

"This investment will directly support critical local infrastructure projects, including the recently completed Twentyfirst Street bridge project, and the riverbank stabilisation at the Lock 5 moorings," he said.

"Our ongoing partnership with the Constraints Measures Program has delivered real results for our community. We have so far received \$8.6m from the funding stream without having to match the

ience of our river-based infrastructure and improving how we live with and manage our river systems"

Mr Siviour said high demand for houseboat moorings in the area meant riverbank stabilisation at Lock 5 was a necessity. "The design for the Lock 5 Moorings Bank Stabilisation is nearing completion," he said.

"Council will trial a solution at Lock 5 over the next few months and once finalised and costed, a detailed report will be presented to council to determine the most effective construction path forward.

"This funding is very timely given the lack of properly constructed houseboat moorings in our council area and the oversubscribed demand we have for these facilities"

Riverland Reflections: students journey through Spanish culture

A COHORT of Riverland students have returned from a study tour of Spain last month, with the three-weeks abroad considered by all as a "trip of a lifetime".

Organised through the Department of Education's School of Languages, 11 Spanish language students from Renmark High School and Berri Regional Secondary College, left Australian soil in April and joined four other schools on a study tour of Spain.

Though all returned "not too badly jetlagged" in May, each of the students said it was "bittersweet to be home".

"It's nice being back in Australia, but I think we all just really miss the culture," Renmark High School student Anja said.

Completing more than 22,000 steps a day, the three-week study tour was organised with students studying in Salamanca and Granada, and travelling to the ancient cities of Segovia and Ronda for weekend tours.

Renmark High School student Madison said her highlights were experiencing Holy Week and the famous Salamanca Easter parades. Generally starting on Palm Sunday and finishing on Easter Sunday, many cities throughout Spain host processions re-enact different episodes of the resurrection of Christ.

"It was amazing to go during the Easter (period)," she said.

"There were so many parades and processions — it was really beautiful."

Renmark High School student Kayleigh said the things she "was most surprised about" was having "to pay to use the bathroom and a lack of free water".

"Everyone was really friendly, but those things were bit of a culture shock," she said.

"Also, when we came home back to Australia everything (like a bathroom and house) seemed so much bigger, because everything was so small."

Students also attended Spanish language schools in both cities until 12 midday most days, while being able to enjoy an array of cultural activities and sightseeing in the afternoons.

"Before going on the trip, I really loved

learning Spanish," Kayleigh said.

"But now after coming home, I really, really am excited to come to class and I love doing my homework."

Renmark High School students Fletcher and Anja said they had also noticed a drastic shift in their ability to speak Spanish.

"If we were there for a few more weeks, I feel nearly all of us would be fluent," Anja said.

Staying with Spanish families for the entirety of the trip, granting them the experience of having to speak entirely in Spanish and partake in traditional cuisine and customs, a number of students said they were still in close contact with their host mum and dad.

"It was great sitting with my Salamanca host family every night, and just communicating with each other," Berri Regional Secondary College student Layla said.

"We had so many laughs together, it made the experience very special."

Though each stressed a love for their time in Spain, all of the Riverland students said their "ultimate highlight" was developing strong friendships with each other on the long bus rides between destinations by "singing karaoke, having deep conversations, and laughing a lot".

"Many of the new people I met, I would now consider my close friends," Anja said.

"It was just such an amazing time — we wouldn't take it back for the world."

Renmark High School and Berri Regional Secondary College language teachers Jasmine Sotiroulis and Tamara Gilgen said they looked forward to continuing to offer the study tour to Spanish language students in the future and continue to develop strong ties between the two Riverland schools and Adelaide's School of Languages.

"It was really wonderful to see the shared connections between the kids and see them have amazing experiences in another country," Ms Sotiroulis said.

"Many of them have already told me they would be able to travel to Spain again on their own, and I think that has been one of the great outcomes — not just the language aspect but having to navigate huge cultural differences."

Tony demoted, Anne promoted

Barker MP Tony Pasin has effectively been demoted within the Federal Opposition, despite being comfortably re-elected on May 3 amid a disastrous Coalition showing nationally.

Mr Pasin won a fifth term for the Liberals, but under new Coalition Leader Sussan Ley was stripped of his role as spokesperson for roads and road safety, and infrastructure and transport.

The decision to omit Mr Pasin from the new shadow ministry was made despite Barker remaining a safe Liberal seat.

Mr Pasin suffered a 3.64 per cent swing away from him under the two-candidate preferred system, but retained a healthy 66.62 per cent to 33.38 per cent advantage. His first-preference vote dipped below 50 per cent this election, to 48.26 per cent, mirroring a nationwide swing against the Liberals.

In a statement, Mr Pasin said the reshuffle would allow him to focus on the Barker electorate.

"As a member of the Opposition backbench I will continue to be a frank and fearless advocate for communities across Barker," he said.

"And as an experienced member of the Liberal and Coalition party rooms I look forward to pursuing important policy objectives consistent with true Liberal values."

Mr Pasin said he was proud of the Coalition's road safety policy developed and put to the Australian people at the federal election.

Mr Pasin's Liberal colleague, Riverland-based Senator Anne Ruston, faired much better under Ms Ley's portfolio distribution.

Senator Ruston retained the health, aged care and sport portfolios, while also being allocated the crucial disability and NDIS shadow roles.

"I have been incredibly grateful for the opportunity over the last three years to work closely with the incredible stakeholders and advocates in the health, aged care and sport sectors, and to hold the Albanese Labor Government to account on these important areas of social policy," Senator Ruston said.

"Australia's care systems are worldleading, but there is no doubt that they face significant and unaddressed challenges

"I look forward to adding the portfolio of disability and the NDIS to my responsibilities, and to working closely with all of the stakeholders across our care systems on solutions to address these challenges together...

"I also look forward to working closely with Senator James McGrath as shadow minister for Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games to ensure Australia seizures on the legacy opportunities provided by this important event for our country."

Senator Ruston was also re-elected at May 10 election, despite being shunted to number two on the Liberal ticket in SA, behind the party's conservative powerbroker Alex Antic, a close ally of Mr Pasin.

Jenny proud of 2025 Barker election success

A RIVERLANDER says support from the regions volunteers and voters was key to her achievements at the May 3 Federal Election.

Renmark woman Jenny Troeth was the third most successful South Australian One Nation candidate at the recent Federal Election, receiving a total of 8913

Ms Troeth – who finished the Barker tally in third behind incumbent Liberal MP Tony Pasin and Labor contender James Rothe – said her first experience as a political candidate was eye-opening.

"I had no idea, I really didn't," Ms Troeth said.

"I was chucked head-first into the deep end and was new to the system... and I didn't really have a concept in my mind as to how it would play out.

"However, I couldn't have wished for better support than

what I received from my One Nation colleagues throughout the whole campaign.

"It wasn't until everything started to roll that I got an idea of how it would go. I wasn't confident at the start because I flew In by the seat of my pants.

"I had massive support."

Ms Troeth said results from the election illustrated an increasing shift toward thirdparty candidates in regional areas.

"All the figures demonstrate there's a huge swing away from the two major parties," she said,

"I had people say to me they had lost faith in the major parties.

"I'll never go out promising stuff if there's a shadow over whether or not it can be delivered.

"It's proven that people don't like that."

Ms Troeth said the efforts of volunteers during her campaign, and on election day,

"I can't claim all the success for those figures," she said

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River flow assessment 'far from reality'?

SENIOR Riverland politicians say a recent assessment praising the impacts of environmental watering fails to acknowledge economic challenges faced by local primary producers.

A recent comprehensive assessment of environmental outcomes in South Australia, conducted by the State Government under the Murray Darling Basin Plan, states environmental water is having a positive impact on ecosystems, biodiversity and habitat quality.

Increased freshwater flows through the barrages has improved the resilience of fish species including black bream, greenback flounder and small-mouthed hardyhead, while increased connectivity of wetlands and floodplains has benefitted native vegetation and waterbird species.

However, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the assessment was a convenient head-line that hid a deeper reality occurring inside the region.

"While we welcome genuine improvements to the river's health, this government fails to address the critical challenges faced by upstream communities whose livelihoods are affected by decisions made in Adelaide and Canberra," Mr Whetstone said.

"Riverland irrigators, growers and local businesses are being asked to carry the burden of water recovery, with little regard for the social and economic consequences that come with it.

"Environmental outcomes are important, however, they cannot come at the cost of

regional sustainability. I urge both state and federal governments to prioritise transparent decision-making, honest dialogue with stakeholders, and practical, community-led solutions

"Our river communities deserve a seat at the table, not just another directive handed down from the top. While I'll advocate for a healthy working river, I will never stop advocating for a healthy working river community."

Opposition Minister for Water Resources and the River Murray Nicola Centofanti said that local residents care deeply about the health of the Murray River, however "they also care about the future of their communities and right now, many are questioning where that balance lies".

"The Minister's media release about her own state government's review paints a glowing picture of environmental outcomes, yet fails to address the urgent concerns being raised by irrigators and regional communities," Ms Centofanti said.

"Our producers are already among the most water-efficient in the nation. They've done the heavy lifting by investing in drip irrigation, soil moisture monitoring, and enclosed delivery systems. But now, with the state and federal governments pursuing an aggressive water recovery agenda, those very communities are at risk of being left behind.

"We need leadership that ensures environmental water delivery does not come at the expense of regional jobs, food security, or the long-term viability of our Riverland and Murray-based producers. "The River Murray Communities Transition Program is a case in point. This is a federally funded initiative meant to help river communities adapt, but there's been little urgency or transparency from the State Government in rolling it out. There's a real risk that these funds, intended to future-proof our regions, will go unspent due to bureaucratic delay or inaction."

The report emphasised the need to recover 450GL of environmental water as soon as possible, to maximise environmental outcomes across the system, including increasing resilience to climate change.

Ms Centofanti said further investigation regarding the potential economic impacts of water buybacks were needed.

"It's one thing to promise a healthy river, it's another to deliver practical outcomes for the people who live and work along it," Ms Centofanti said.

"Ultimately, we don't have to choose between environmental outcomes and thriving river towns. We can achieve both, but only if the planning is proactive, the funding is timely, and the leadership is strong."

The report mentioned the Murray River and its wetlands and tributaries are in better shape, despite drought conditions throughout parts of South Australia.

The assessment also found:

- ☐ Water for the environment is essential for ecosystems to thrive and its co-ordinated delivery along the entire length of the Murray River has contributed to improved environmental outcomes in SA.
- ☐ The operation of infrastructure, including floodplain and wetland regulators, has expanded water delivery areas, increasing connectivity and improving outcomes for native fish, vegetation and waterbird

species

- ☐ The Basin Plan has provided improved environmental outcomes during low-flow periods, likely preventing similar outcomes to those during the Millennium Drought, but more is needed to ensure ongoing recovery and health.
- ☐ Despite improvements, challenges remain and sustained actions, operations and additional investment are required to secure long-term environmental outcomes.

Minister for Environment, and deputy premier, Susan Close said the State Government would "continue to advocate for a healthy river system as we approach a critical time for implementation of the (Basin) Plan, ahead of a review in 2026".

"This evaluation has reinforced the importance of delivering the Basin Plan in full, including final 450GL of environmental water and addressing water delivery constraints, to ensure the health of the River Murray and protect our unique ecosystems," Dr Close said.

"Through this prolonged dry spell, that water has become even more important for the river's ecology to ensure we maintain a healthy aquatic environment, which supports water supply, irrigation, recreation and tourism.

"The Albanese Government, including former Federal Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek, have delivered on their commitment to provide South Australia it's fair share and to get the Plan back on track, and these results further highlight this."

Sheep dog trials are baaa-ck in Barmera

A MUCH-loved June long weekend tradition is back for 2025, and will host its highest number of participants so far.

Kicking off at 8am this morning due to an unprecedented number of entries, the annual SA Sheep Dog Trials have returned to the Barmera Oval this week, with action continuing through to Sunday afternoon.

"This year we have record entries — we might have to be working under lights for some of it," SA Sheepdog Trials organiser Bob Clark said

"This year we have 26 competitors, but it wasn't that long ago we were only looking at 10 or 11 entries.

"A lot of our competitors tell us (Barmera) is the best trials they go to — with the town, the lake, and the extra entertainment we put on.

"You just don't get that anywhere else."

With one Loxton local competing against dogs from South Australia, and interstate Victoria and Tasmania, the event will host open, novice, and improver classes, before a Trans-Tasman event on Friday, and then resume the open class competition over the weekend.

"A lot of practice goes into (working a dog) to this standard and keeping the sheep together," Mr Clark said.

"The Barmera Oval will have yellow lines marked for the competitors, and they have to keep the sheep in the 9m corridor all the way round, and if they stray outside of those marks, points are lost.

"It's an interesting sport, because you start out with 100 points and risk losing them, not gaining them.

"There is also no prize for finishing quick — you just have to get all the sheep in the pen and the gate shut in 15 minutes."

Mr Clark said the Riverlanders will

also be able to enjoy the iconic running of the sheep down the Barmera main street, held on Saturday morning, at 9.30am, before four skydivers take flight with the flags to commemorate now-passed trial participants and supporters.

With Mantung's Leon Stasinowsky and family providing 500 sheep for the running, Mr Clark said it was often the event "spectators looked forward to most of all".

"However, it's just a lovely community event all together with so much on offer, so we hope we get a strong crowd," he said.

"The finals on Sunday are always good fun — we host a parade and have the top six walk to Simply the Best by Tina Turner.

"People and families can come down for a look to see how the dogs are working and interact with the competitors, and it doesn't cost them a cent."

Volunteer crossroads

THE efforts of local volunteers have – deservedly – received large amounts of space in recent editions of The Murray Pioneer, following last month's National Volunteer Week celebrations that were held across the region.

The sheer number of names highlighted at Renmark Paringa Council's event to mark the week made it clear that from schools, to sporting clubs, or health and emergency services, life in the Riverland would look very different without the dedication of volunteers.

Instead, it would probably be a lot more challenging, and inside today's edition we see where potential cracks are starting to form.

Neil Martinson has for many years given up large volumes of his time to give back to the surrounding Renmark Paringa district, however, is this level of dedication becoming over-relied upon?

There are an unfortunate few – the number of which could likely be counted on one hand – who are currently volunteering to drive the Red Cross bus, however it is a service that would make a large difference to those who travel on it.

The volunteers themselves are committed – leaving in the early morning to ensure appointment times in Adelaide are met and a safe return journey is made all in the same day.

For those of whom transport costs can become a barrier toward visiting Adelaide – whether by car or bus – this volunteer-run service means important medical appointments can still be met.

For readers of The Border Times newspaper – also produced by Taylor Group Media – this week's front page story of the Murrayville SES unit desperately calling out for new members paints a similar picture.

So, thinking in more broader terms about potential solutions, is some form of incentive now needed to attract younger people into the ranks of volunteering?

Depending on eligibility, incentives exist that take the place of some jobseeker requirements that are needed to be met each fortnight.

For the surrounding community, it would seem that contributing even a few hours as a volunteer would generate more benefit than a dozen job applications that are sent largely for the sake of it.

Readers only need to look towards the example set by Berri's Jessica Owen – also covered in last week's Pioneer – for an example of the benefits that volunteering brings both personally, and to one's surrounding community.

Taking over the organisation of a Biggest Morning Tea event from the iconic Nancy Murdock would probably have seemed like a daunting task in the beginning, however those who have spoken with Ms Owen in the time since can see the satisfaction she's gained after raising close to \$1000.

The choice is therefore clear, and while volunteering requires the sacrifice of some personal time, it also means that as a whole, we can keep Riverland communities functioning in relatively the same manner we're used to.

As a youth in the 1920s, Joan Wachtel (pictured with her horses) lived with her family on an isolated farm at Devlin's Pound, across the river from Woolpunda. There were few visitors, no school, and no telephone. 'As I grew older, I was a jillaroo on the property, spending most days on horseback, checking fences, minding ewes and lambs from eagles and foxes, setting rabbit traps, and tailing lambs. On many occasions, the workman had to send for me when unable to catch a flighty horse. At harvest time, I caught 12 (work) horses in the yard, put winkers on them, then collars and hames. Six would be coupled together in the front row and the other six lined up behind them. Reins were attached to the four outside horses and taken back to my saddle horse, either Tipperary or Pistollette (which I rode). I would then drive these flighty horses out three miles to where the strippers were working. The horses would change places with the tired ones at midday (and



they) would walk home with their harnesses on, in single file. They then queued up to be unharnessed before going to the river for a drink and a roll. By that time, I would have their manger in the stables, full with feed'. Joan quipped, 'I wonder now where my nerves of steel have gone'.

A win for houseboats

THE members of the Lock 5 division of the Renmark/Paringa Houseboat Collective welcome the announcement by Renmark Paringa Council that they have received significant funding to commence work on the bank infrastructure of the Lock 5 Marina.

This has been of considerable concern to many boat owners in recent years.

After a substantial rise in mooring fees, the Renmark/ Paringa Houseboat Collective was founded, as the reason for the increase was cited as 'ongoing bank and bank infrastructure maintenance'.

The concerns for mooring holders has been one of safety issues, with bank erosion creating severe undercuts in the banks. The contributing factors of this are in part the consistent use of large recreational vessels and their wake impact that they have on the banks, this was exacerbated by the flood experience that occurred.

One boat owner, John Herbert, has been working with council to find an adequate solution to the safety issues he experiences with having a hire boat that caters for the disabled.

His fear of having a ramp collapse under the weight of a disabled wheelchair-bound client has been of major concern to him. As other members have concerns for their safety stepping onto the banks.

While it should be noted that the council has expressed at this stage the works will be in a 'trial phase', they are confident that with the right construction, the method that will be adopted should prove to be a successful outcome for safety concerns, the environment and mooring holders along Lock 5 Marina going into the future.

We commend the council for their efforts in securing this funding and for their research into a solution for these long awaited works to commence.

While council has not ruled out a rise in mooring fees, we

believe that we as mooring holders have already contributed to these costs over the past years and would suggest to council that this be taken into consideration, as additional funding is now available.

I WRITE on behalf of the not-for-profit Mental Illness Fellowship of Australia that helps people across the nation.

We have now set up a key network which has become a growing community on the internet that – put simply – links people with mental health issues with others in a similar situation.

It is all about sharing experiences and it is a very powerful tool. We ask readers, if you know somebody impacted by mental health issues, just go to the website (www.findingnorth.org.au).

Our latest campaign highlights to all politicians in all states and territories that time is well and truly up when it comes to the clear neglect of people facing severe mental health challenges. What deeply concerns me is people with severe mental health issues are not getting access to community supports. These supports help them with daily living skills, housing support, employment opportunities and more. It's exactly the same situation for family carers. Frankly, it is not good enough.

We estimate a massive 230,500 Australians with highneed mental health challenges are getting no access to community supports. When you factor in the carers, we are talking about a million people. It is on a huge scale.

Politicians need to do more. People affected by schizophrenia have a massive 19-year gap in life expectancy compared to others. They experience significant physical ill health, time in hospital and they are at risk of homelessness and poverty.

Health Ministers need to deliver a co-funding arrangement, with more community supports for individuals and families and a commitment to close the community supports gap by 2030.

It is alarming to know that three years into the National Mental Health Agreement, parties have not even agreed on a funding split. There have been numerous agreements but, in essence, a total lack of action.

May I finally highlight, if any readers are affected by mental health issues, far and away the best thing to do initially is to sit down with your GP and plan a course of action. We know at the Mental Illness Fellowship of Australia, many people have turned their lives around by asking for help.

LIKE others, we've solved our household-level energy crisis with solar panels on the roof and a home battery, plus heat pump. Achieving energy resilience at local, state and national levels, though more complicated, relies on a similar path of lots more solar, coupled with pumped hydro and battery.

A total of 99 per cent of new generation capacity in Australia, installed since 2015 by the private sector, is solar and wind.

That tells us who is winning the race. It's not nuclear.

Nor is it interruptible or costprohibitive fossil fuel supply.

We are not remotely selfsufficient with oil and therefore are at the mercy of others amid global instability.

Meanwhile, thanks to decisions of myopic governments of the past, existing gas export contracts leave us with insurmountable problems in terms of improving domestic gas supply and affordability. Luckily though we are blessed with sun and wind and the technology to harness them.

Visit welcome, but support needed

GRAIN Producers SA (GPSA) welcomed Prime Minister Anthony Albanese's visit to a grain and livestock producer on the Adelaide Plains on Monday as a sign the Federal Government acknowledges and understands the severe impact of South Australia's worst drought in living memory, but warned that immediate support must

The Prime Minister, South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas, Federal Agriculture Minister Julie Collins, SA Primary Industries Minister Clare Scriven and other senior politicians visited the Fischer's farm at Wasleys,



along with representatives from the National Farmers Federation and Primary Producers SA.

During the visit, it was announced that further funding would be available to the Rural Financial Counselling Service (RFCS) and the National Drought Forum will be moved from Victoria to Gawler.

While the additional funding contingency for RFCS is important as demand continues to rise, immediate financial support for farmers needs to follow the visit, addressing the scale and urgency of the drought gripping the state.

While the measures announced today are welcome, the reality on the ground for South Australian grain producers is that we need significantly more immediate and practical support.

GPSA successfully advocated for the Federal Agriculture Minister to visit South Australia last week, where we hosted her on a farm tour and took part in an industry roundtable to present practical support options on behalf of grain producers.

The Prime Minister's visit is a strong signal that the Federal Government recognises the severity of the challenges facing South Australia's grain sector — but that recognition must now be matched with immediate, on-the-ground support for impacted farming families

This drought is not a distant threat — it's happening right now. Many farmers are experiencing severe cash flow constraints and are being forced to make incredibly difficult decisions about their future

The additional \$2 million in contingency funding to the RFCS will support more producers to access financial counselling and advice if they need it, but advice alone will not be enough.

Boosting financial counselling services will help some producers navigate tough decisions and the RFCS is a critical support mechanism to help farmers through this difficult time, but without tangible financial relief such as low, or nointerest loans, too many growers will be left without a viable path forward.

Support must include direct mechanisms that ease financial pressure — not just prepare producers for future challenges.

The decision to bring the National Drought Forum to South Australia is a positive gesture but gestures alone are not enough in responding to the current situation.

What's needed is urgent, coordinated action that delivers real relief to those feeling the effects of this drought season - not simply more long-term 'resilience' talk.

GPSA will continue to work with all levels of government to secure meaningful drought support measures for the state's grain producers.

In the immediate term, we are calling for more direct support to help producers manage household and business costs,

including quick and easy to access concessional or interestfree loan options, freight assistance, council rate rebates and further mental health support that reaches the farm gate.

In the longer term, we're also calling for a review of the outdated Farm Household Allowance asset threshold, and for a serious look at the Regional Investment Corporation's loan settings to ensure they're meeting the needs of the agriculture indus-

Backing for Berri estates

THE Riverland's largest winery will be a centrepiece for long-term industry growth under new plans from its global corporate owners.

Vinarchy yesterday announced the Berri Estates winery would become the company's primary commercial winemaking, packaging, and warehousing hub, to deliver "scale, efficiency, and world-class quality to support global demand for Australian wine".

The company also announced cellar door and restaurant operations at Banrock Station would cease, however vineyard and viticulture operations at the site will be unaffected, while a \$30m investment will be made into the Rowland Flat winery.

Vinarchy chief supply officer Joe Russo said establishing the two winemaking hubs would "realign and strengthen" the operational footprint in Australia.

"Adopting this twin-hub structure at Berri Estates and Rowland Flat allows us to consolidate our resources and expertise, strengthening the business and ensuring we remain competitive in the face of ongoing challenges in the global wine market," Mr Russo said.

"These important changes represent Vinarchy's commitment to building a stronger winemaking footprint in South Australia.

"Both St Hallett and Hardys are critical brands for Vinarchy and we recognise the rich local history they have in the Barossa and McLaren Vale. While our winemaking will move, our commitment to quality wines, local sourcing and premium cellar door experiences for these brands do not change.

"These wines will be made with the same grapes from the same regions, by the same winemakers, just at another winery."

Mr Russo said Vinarchy was aware the changes could create uncertainty for team members, but the company was committed to providing support over the next 12 months.

"We are deeply mindful of the impact these changes may have on our people," Mr Russo

"Where roles are affected, we are committed to supporting our teams through redeployment opportunities to other locations in many cases, or, where necessary, redundancy and outplacement support.

"We will continue to consult closely with our teams over the coming months as we make this transition.'

A company statement on the matter said Vinarchy remained "committed to its longstanding partnerships with regional suppliers and premium grape growers across the Riverland... which will remain unchanged and continue to be vital"

With three-to-four available cars, and a wheelchair-accessible vehicle providing transport options to medical and dental appointments, as well as social events, shopping, or to the hairdresser, Mr Martinson said the service was "invaluable in a rural area".

"It's very important to have a service like this," he said.

"As a door-to-door service, it can be a lot more (financially accessible) and easier compared to a (public) bus or a taxi.

"We also provide a bus service that goes to Adelaide on a regular basis, except Tuesdays, as we currently don't have enough drivers — it can be very difficult to ask people to drive that distance multiple times a week.

"We just need to boost our numbers so we can keep offering these great services — the hardest part is that sometimes you can't offer the service because of a lack of drivers."

Kimberley Jenkins said it was "very simple" to sign up to be a volunteer driver.


"All (a volunteer) needs is a driver's licence, as well as a police and children's check which is paid by the Australian Red Cross," she said.

Pasin calls for bypass clarity

THE Riverland's Federal MP says assurance is needed from the State Government that funding will be allocated to build the Truro bypass.

The State Government would be required to contribute 50 per cent of costs for the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass, following Labor's win in the recent Federal Election.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said clarity surrounding any potential changes to the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass plan was needed.

"Under elected State and Federal Liberal Governments this project would be fully funded in an 80:20 funding agreement, with the Truro Bypass as our first priority," Mr Pasin said.

"As the first step towards a duplicated Sturt Highway, the

Truro Bypass is a critical piece of infrastructure for a heavy freight corridor that bypasses every other town in South

"The Malinauskas Government needs to come clean with South Australian's about whether it will fund the over half a billion dollars needed to complete the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass, given the Federal Labor has only committed to 50 per cent, and if not, what part of the plan will be scrapped to accommodate the smaller funding envelope?

"Labor needs to stop treating regional communities like second class citizens and come clean about their plan.'

SA Liberal leader Vincent Tarzia said the State Government was "scrambling to fill" the gap in funding for the project.

"We know that the Federal Labor Government has scrapped this project once already, who's to say that history won't repeat itself again," Mr Tarzia said.

"The need for safer, more efficient freight movement is critical - with locals in fear that there will be another incident.

"The State Government needs to stop stalling, start listening and commit to this project in the upcoming State Budget.'

Minister for Transport Tom Koutsantonis said "funding arrangements for all federal partnerships" would be considered as part of the State Budget pro-

"The former Coalition Federal government and Marshall State Liberal government dramatically underscoped and underfunded previous plans for a Truro bypass, and then complained when they got into opposition that it was only a single lane bypass," Mr Koutsantonis said.

'It was the Malinauskas State Government that did the necessary proper planning work and sent detailed strategic business cases to Infrastructure Australia for a properly configured Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass - including a dual carriageway Truro bypass.

'We have done the heavy lifting to get this project funded by the Commonwealth, with the Albanese Labor Government securing funding in the 2025-26 federal budget. Importantly, we have also had the foresight to secure the corridor to enable this dual carriageway to be built.

'We will continue to work collaboratively with the reelected Albanese Government to ensure the best outcome.



"There were 13 raffle prizes and multiple spinning wheel prizes," she said.


"A number of prizes were also donated by individuals who preferred to remain anonymous.'

Ms Andrew said the support group committee was grateful to the contributions made in organising the event by MC Darrin Trandafil, and Loxton Waikerie councillor and community volunteer Ian Light.

"They helped create a very pleasant atmosphere," she said.

Ms Andrew also thanked the Waikerie Bowling Club for doing the catering for the event and allowing their facilities to be used at a minimal charge.

She said Judy Maskell of Waikerie had a major part in the success of the morning by selling tickets, arranging prizes, and masterminding the decorations.





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Council commitment to the community

IT has now been more than 900 days since the current Mid Murray Council was sworn in, and in the beginning I doubt any of us truly knew what lay ahead.

Within weeks, we were faced with a once-in-50year flood. Just three months into our term, Mid Murray Council was classified as "potentially unsustainable" by ESCOSA. Since then, council has navigated the resignation of two elected members, welcomed two new ones, endured a prolonged drought, and balanced rising community expectations amid increasingly difficult financial con-

It's been anything but smooth sailing. Yet through it all, Mid Murray's elected members have stood strong. I want to acknowledge and thank each of them for their commitment, courage, and willingness to make difficult decisions, often going against the grain, and at times, against staff recommendations. Many of those decisions are now delivering real and tangible benefits for

A notable example was the very difficult decision not to fund new lights at Mannum Oval. It was a tough call, but through determination, community support, and strong external partnerships, the project is now being delivered at no cost to ratepayers. The same approach is driving the impending standpipe automation project. Many standpipes will now be automated thanks to state government funding and stakeholder contributions, outcomes that came because elected members insisted on seeking external support rather than burdening ratepayers.

Council also adopted full cost attribution this term, a long-overdue reform initiated by elected members. This change is expected to save the general ratepayer around

\$300,000 annually, and has greatly improved the accuracy of our financial reporting.

Another practical step was relocating council meetings to our principal office, a move that is saving staff time and council resources. Many elected members have also quietly absorbed travel costs or chosen to carpool, opting not to claim reimbursements despite the personal time and expense involved. In fact, this group has been among the most cost-efficient in a decade, with only one year in the past 10 recording lower elected member expenses (2015/16).

Council has now released the draft Annual Business Plan and Budget. Encouragingly, for the first time in many years, the proposed rate increase is only slightly above CPI. Our loan levels are also well below what was forecast three years ago, the result of deliberate, strategic decision-

What often goes unseen is the commitment from elected members and staff to continually look for efficiencies and improvements. These decisions aren't just about short-term wins, they're about building long-term value for the Mid Murray community.

Of course, public service inevitably invites scrutiny

and not all of it is constructive. Across the state I see elected members facing rising levels of abuse and bullying, often simply for doing their jobs. While scrutiny and accountability are vital in a democracy, it's important to remember that civil discourse and mutual respect are equally essential. We may not always agree at the council table, and that's a strength, respectful debate and diverse viewpoints help shape better decisions.

I'm incredibly grateful to the many community members who continue to support us, those who offer constructive feedback, who understand the complexity of our decisions, and who walk alongside us with patience and goodwill. Your encouragement matters more than you might realise. Leadership isn't about popularity. It's about good governance, long-term thinking, and keeping the bigger picture in view. I'm immensely proud of what this council has achieved so far. Through challenge and change, they've demonstrated integrity and dedication to the people they serve.

Here's to seeing out our term and to continuing to make the next right decision as we build a stronger, more sustainable Mid Murray.

THE Riverland volunteer wildlife rescue and viability for these wildlife rescue carers with significant funding over the next four years, treasurer Stephen Mulligan said.

"These services are often run by selfless volunteers who dedicate an incredible amount of time caring for sick and injured native animals."

Deputy Premier, and Minster for Climate, Environment and Water, Susan Close said "the (State) Government has listened to the sector and heard their calls for help".

"I'm really pleased to be announcing such a significant funding package," she said.

"Like the RSPCA, which has received a 350 per cent increase in funding under the (State) Government, the wildlife rescue sector was under resourced for many years and this Budget helps to address this.'

Salvos offering a helping hand

COST-of-living pressures and a lack of food security for some in the Riverland West area have led to a charity organisation offering free produce and bakery items once a fortnight, at the Waikerie Football oval.

The Salvation Army Riverland identified a need for the service, run every second Wednesday, from 10am.

It supplies the produce on the alternate weeks when Foodbank's Mobile Food Hub Corps is absent from Waikerie.

The Salvation Army Riverland's Corps leader Helen Palena-Adamczyk said her organisation became aware that welfare support was lacking in the Waikerie area.

"We decided to step in and fill that gap and bring with us fruit, vegetables, and bakery goods, once a fortnight," she.said.

The food items are provided to The Salvation Army Riverland through SecondBite and Coles Berri.

Mrs Palena-Adamczyk said both The Salvation Army and Foodbank were working in partnership to provide the service at Waikerie.

"It offers a little bit more food security for the people who need more support," she.said.

Foodbank volunteers are also helping with The Salvation Army's fortnightly sessions at Waikerie, which began on May

Mrs Palena-Adamczyk said about 20 people attended the first produce and bakery service last month, with Waikerie High School's youth worker Trish Mitchell also picking up some items for students who also may be in need.

"It was great to make that connection and also support the school in providing a few products that may be needed, such as Milo," she said.

"We are looking forward to partnering with them."

Any left-over produce from The Salvation Army Riverland's service is also taken to Blanchetown by its Foodbank volunteer and distributed to about 20 people who need assistance in that town.

"It is a fantastic opportunity for us to make connections," Mrs Palena-Adamczyk said. The Salvation Army Riverland aims to help anyone who needs assistance with food security.

"We have an open house policy, if you think you are in need, come and pay us a visit," Mrs Palena-Adamczyk said.

"(The) organisation is also endeavouring to assist people that may have work commitments during the day, and who also may need help with food security.

"We really want to go into the community and establish the need not just for food security, but for also making those human connections."

School welcomes free food support

WAIKERIE High School has welcomed the decision by The Salvation Army Riverland to provide free produce and bakery items fortnightly to those who need it in the town.

The school's youth worker Trish Mitchell said it helps with catering for the needs of students at Breakfast Club sessions, or during recess and lunch.

"We have about 310 students and the food we are able to obtain from Foodbank does not necessarily last until its next fortnightly visit," she said.

"Having the Salvos come to Waikerie on the weeks that Foodbank doesn't is fabulous."

Woolworths also donates bread and fruit to the Waikerie High School each Monday. Ms Mitchell said breakfast is offered at the school for those who need it each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, from 8.30am, when the first students start arriving.

She said some of the students who travel to school on the bus from areas such as Morgan, may be without time to have breakfast.

"A lot of these kids are also teenagers who are growing and will eat constantly," she said.

"They may have had breakfast at home already, but will also have a second one with me, and that is fine."

Bacon and eggs are on offer each Wednesday morning, with the eggs provided by the chooks tended to by the school's Agriculture classes, and the bacon bought by the school.

Ms Mitchell said due to financial pressures, some families may be finding it hard to afford lunch or breakfast for their children.

"We always have plenty on hand and also some students may have forgotten their lunch," she said.

"I can buy ham and cheese and can also make toasted sandwiches for any student that doesn't have food, I can also provide them with lunch."

The Riverland Combined Churches Group through Waikerie High School also offers frozen meals to students' families in need, including to those who may have had a parent who is unwell or just returned home from hospital.

Mobile coverage overstated in the Riverland?

A SENIOR local politician has voiced concern about mobile network coverage within the region, stating that a telecommunications operator is overstating its services.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said newly created mobile blackspots in Barker are still yet to be addressed, more than six months since the 3G switch off.

Mr Pasin said "suggestions made in the media recently that a predominant mobile network operator has been overstating their mobile coverage comes as no surprise".

"Since 3G was switched off in October last year we have had multiple reports of dimished service in areas of Barker," Mr Pasin said

"Poor mobile service is one of the main enquiries to my office and I have been reporting these locations to mobile network operators for months to no avail.

"In fact, in a response to one of my letters to Telstra CEO Vicki Brady, I was told that our

network key performance indicators confirm that there are no inequivalence issues or significant reduction in customer experience within Barker following the 3G closure.

"The over 2500 constituents in Barker who have reported exactly that can't all be wrong.

"The telco's cant gaslight their way out of this, and the Labor Government who have overseen this switch off should be doing more to stand up for our Australian consumers instead of allowing the big corporates to put profits first."

Mr Pasin said as a result of his continued advocacy Telstra had agreed to undertake a regional visit to Barker to conduct a series of community visits and meet with customers.

Mr Pasin encouraged Telstra customers experiencing coverage issues to take this opportunity to raise concerns directly with network operators.

The magic of music

THERE was no black dress in my wardrobe, but I still loved that song, 'Long Cool Woman in a Black Dress'.

At the Renmark Institute a couple hundred teenagers are dancing slowly to the wound-back sounds of The Hollies, Creedance and The Beatles, steamily entangled in each other's arms, even under the exacting gaze of roaming teachers.

Changing the pace, to the relief of those teachers, Patch of Blue now renders rocking songs from The Rolling Stones and that master, Elton John, and now couples separate and are putting in some cool moves.

Patch of Blue is the Riverland's preeminent band, in demand for all the major discos. The streamers, balloons and coloured lights are the earlier work of year 12 girls. In the far corner near the stage, the soft drink stall is doing a great trade.

Teachers stand guard at all exits and interrogate anyone who expresses a need for the outside toilet.

School discos, or socials, are challenging for girls who must wait to be asked, even if they'd love to dance. So, we sit on the seats lining the walls, hoping to be noticed while semi-dying inside.

Cars start to arrive outside just before 11pm, the night is cold, and the condensation blurs the windows as parents wait patiently.

It was an impressionable time of our lives, discovering new friendships, finding romance, and exploring limits.

And though most country teenagers felt cocooned from the marijuana-fuelled free love of the 60s and war protests of the 70s, music still held centre stage – on the record player, on 5RM on Saturday nights, car cassette players, and watching Countdown on Sunday nights.

Teenagers sat for hours in loungerooms, studying the album covers on our laps, delicately shifting the needle to our favourite songs over and over and singing along. The lyrics would soon become automatic.

I was introduced to David Bowie by a male friend who had music tastes beyond my unsophisticated preferences. I couldn't come at Jean Genie but favoured the spunk in Rebel Rebel.

We knew every word to Carly Simon's You're So Vain. Folklore said that the song was written to skewer a former lover. 'You probably think this song is about you' was such a genius line.

Then out of nowhere came Australia's Auntie Jack.

Farewell, Aunty Jack, we know you'll be back

Though you're 10 feet tall, you don't scare us at all





You're big, bold and tough, but you're not so rough

And there's a scream as you plummet away.

Then there was something about 'coming round to your house and rip your bloody arms off'. We didn't understand but adored it anyway.

Bohemian Rhapsody, from Freddie Mercury and Queen, broke all music conventions with their six-minute production that many people today adjudge as the greatest song ever made.

But 'Scaramouche, scaramouche, will you do the fandango?' leaves most of us bewildered still. Music was intoxicating, experimental and surprising.

A few years later and in a different genre altogether, everyone including the artist herself was amazed when Sister Janet Mead released a boppy version of The Lord's Prayer, which reached high on the Australian charts.

But it was back in the 1950s when George Beverley Shea recorded the stunning hymn 'How Great Thou Art', later released by Elvis Presley and then a beautiful version by Carrie Underwood. Christian or not, these lyrics and music still penetratingly stir the soul.

From Kate Bush to Bob Dylan and Bob Marley this could go on, but I'm thankful our generation was along for the ride when some of the world's best music was created.

Funding support for sporting clubs extended

RIVERLAND sport and recreation clubs have been given more time to apply for a relief grant aimed to help communities stay active and tackle current drought impacts.

The current Regional Drought Relief Round has been extended to June 12, enabling more clubs to access up to \$5,000 in targeted relief.

The initiative, a new and additional round of the Active Club Program, is part of the State Government's \$73m package to support communities impacted by drought across the state.

Funding can go towards water-saving and drought-resilient measures like rain-water tanks, smart irrigation controllers and new or upgraded irrigation infrastructure, along with utility bill relief and energy efficiency initiatives.

Essential costs such as equipment, uniforms and program delivery are also covered, helping to reduce barriers to participation and promote physical activity.

The initiative was expanded to include thoroughbred and harness racing clubs facing watering and maintenance pressures, which impact clubs' ability to deliver programs and services in regional communities.



Mr Hobby commenced a Bachelor of Accounting and Finance at Flinders University this year and was officially presented with his award during a recent visit to

A cut above: winter pruning can stop fruit fly before it starts

AS the Riverland settles into its winter rhythm, fruit trees begin to slow – but for gardeners, this season is far from idle. It's the best time to fight fruit fly.

Now's the moment to grab your secateurs and take a good look at your backyard.

That overgrown tree, that leftover fruit, those hard-to-reach branches? They're more than just untidy – they're a silent invitation for fruit fly to settle in.

Winter pruning is a simple act with powerful results. Cutting your fruit trees back to a manageable height helps reduce hiding spots and makes it easier to harvest fruit before it falls. If you can't reach it, neither can we – and fallen or forgotten fruit can become breeding grounds.

Our teams at PIRSA continue their work year-round: monitoring traps, inspecting properties, applying organic bait, and releasing sterile flies to interrupt the breeding cycle. But the fight against fruit fly starts at home

Every Riverland resident can make a difference this winter. Take an hour, prune that

overgrown tree, clear out any old fruit, and help us stop the cycle before spring arrives.



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Riverlanders called to support Zim's Legacy

MADISON EASTMOND

A RIVERLAND charity is searching for local support to help extend their therapy services to those most in

Hoping to make lasting change for those struggling with mental health and disability, Miracle Park Stables have launched a pay-it-forward funding pool to provide free and subsidised equineassisted therapy sessions.

With the initiative named to honour a miniature pony that made a profound impact on local clients, owner Mel Sargent said "Zim's Legacy seeks to ensure that financial barriers do not prevent individuals from experiencing the therapeutic benefits of equine assisted-therapy".

"Through this funding pool, we will provide support for families, children, veterans, survivors of domestic violence, individuals with disabilities, and those facing mental health challenges, allowing them to be blessed with healing through the unique connection between humans and horses," she said.

"Zim was an amazing pony that transformed people's lives and had the most remarkable impact on clients because he was so calm and

"When we lost him last year, it was devastating and it felt like we had a big hole in our therapy team, but his legacy lives on in the ponies we have now.

"So, Zim's Legacy is a movement dedicated to healing and transformation through the power of horses — we want to continue to give as much as what he has given to so many people already.'

With experience as a registered nurse, Ms Sargent and her husband began Miracle Park Stables in 2021, with the Berri charity now a team that helps build self-esteem, resilience, and emotional regulation skills for those struggling with their mental health and/or have a disability, with trauma-informed equine facilitated therapy, equineassisted learning, and horsemanship coaching.

"Horses have a really similar social structure to people — they experience the same emotions as people," Ms Sargent said.

"They are amazing mirrors... and will reflect back what the person is feeling. Even if someone is saying they're calm, if they're in the herd and dysregulated, the horses will be very wary because they can feel that incongruence.

"So, when we do breath and grounding work the horses will come back because you become a safe space ultimately you learn to selfregulate, because if you want the horses near you, you have to do the work.

"(Also), while of course being around the horses can help the person regulate, healing can also come from

the interaction with the horse and the connection that can be built.'

"Operating in the present, responding immediately and honestly to what is happening in the moment", Ms Sargent said horses are able to read non-verbal signals and body language, making them the perfect assistant to therapeutic programs.

"(The therapy services) enables a deepening in awareness of self and can encourage confidence, and improve personal strengths," she said.

"It gets to the core of someone's distress.

"It asks (and answers) how can we make you feel safe? Because the traumainformed care we provide here is about safety, stabilisation, trust, choice, collaboration, and empowerment.

"It's creating that longterm healing by allowing people to regulate their nervous system, as it can change their worldview (and learn to trust)."

Ms Sargent said donations could either be flexible, or take the form of yearly/ once-off sponsorships that will alleviate financial pressures and allow the charity to expand their services,

including:

- ☐ Platinum Sponsor: \$5200 or more (\$100 per week), major project contribution, or provides a full sponsorship of two horses
- ☐ Gold Sponsor: \$2600 (\$50 per week), provides a full sponsorship of one horse for a year.
- ☐ Silver Sponsor: \$1300 (\$25 per week), provides feed for one horse for a year.
- ☐ Bronze Sponsor: \$520 (\$10 per week), provides hoof trimming for one horse for a year.

"In addition to monetary support, we welcome in-kind sponsorships," she said.

"For example, a Platinum sponsorship could be fulfilled through \$5200 worth of feed products, materials, fencing services, or other essential contributions.

"However, we would be grateful to any support.

"We just want to fill the (donation) pot as much as we can, so we provide as much help and support to the community as possible.'

- \square Penalty for late registration \$20.
- ☐ Business registration (per dog and must comply with section 35 of the Act) \$15.
- ☐ Impounding fee initial seizure \$60.
- ☐ Impounding fee each 24 hours or part 24 hours \$30.
- ☐ Dog surrender fee for disposal \$395.
- ☐ Cat surrender \$150. ☐ Cat trap hire (bond) – \$50.

RAP coming to Riverland's schools

A SAFETY program will be visiting local schools during the second week of June, aiming to motivate young Riverlanders onto safer practices behind the wheel.

The Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) is delivering its Road Awareness Program (RAP) across schools in the region, starting June 10.

The program is run by a fulltime firefighter, who will deliver information designed to motivate people to be safer road users by showing participants the consequences of taking risks on our roads.

The program will discuss:

- Positive attitudes, smart decision-making, and safe behaviours
- ☐ The dangers of excessive speed, distractions, and driving under the influence.
- Responsible behaviour as a passenger and pedestrian.
- Becoming a responsible driver.
 First-hand accounts of the trauma experienced by individuals involved in both fatal and non-

fatal road crashes.

A key feature of the program is a talk by a real-life road crash survivor, Eli Murn, who will share their experience and urge participants to learn from their story. Participants may also be included in a recreated scenario to help them understand the emotional impact of their actions and how the aftermath could affect their future.

Mr Murn is a road crash survivor who currently lives with a brain injury, acquired form an accident, in which he was driving recklessly, showing off to his girlfriend at the time, on a wet night on a regional road. Murn tells his story in the hope that people will learn from his mistake.

The program also covers the long-term trauma resulting from injuries and fatalities, including the ongoing impacts of loss and disability on victims and their families.

Designed to provide a hard-hitting, realistic view of road trauma, the presentation includes footage of real crashes and recreations. While the footage is edited for adult audiences, it is unsuitable for

those under 15 years old and may be upsetting, especially for those with personal experiences of road trauma. Participants are warned before viewing any graphic content Past participants have described the program as "confronting" and "hard-hitting," with many reporting a significant positive impact on their approach to road use and their attitude as members of society.

MFS representatives said "by completing the RAP, participants gain a deeper understanding of how their choices affect others and how they can support one another in making better decisions".

Advancing agriculture by empowering changemakers

Every minute counts when spotting early blood cancer symptoms

RIVERLANDERS are being encouraged to learn the signs and symptoms of blood cancer, with the disease set to increase in both diagnosis, and mortality by 2035.

Blood cancer cannot be screened for, prevented, or predicted, with early detection increasing the chance of survival by up to 40 per cent.

"For many Australians diagnosed with blood cancer, including leukaemia, lymphoma, or myeloma, the timing of their diagnosis is everything," Leukaemia Foundation CEO Chris Tanti said.

"Early detection often determines whether potentially life-saving treatment options are available, and how effective those treatments

"We also know that survival rates can

increase significantly the sooner a blood cancer diagnosis occurs – in fact, as much as 40 per cent – serving as a powerful reminder of how urgent timely action is."

When caught early, blood cancer is more likely to be treatable and less life threatening with the benefits profound and wide-reaching, including:

- ☐ More treatment options, including curative treatments like stem cell transplants.
- ☐ Less aggressive and shorter treatment regimens.
- ☐ A better quality of life for patients, with fewer complications and side effects.
- ☐ Lower financial and emotional toll on patients and the healthcare system, including fewer hospital admissions.
- ☐ Greater emotional wellbeing and a quick-

er return to daily life and normality.

In contrast, when blood cancer is diagnosed at an advanced stage, patients often face longer, more intensive treatments, poorer health outcomes, and significantly higher psychological and financial burdens.

"For patients with lymphoma, for example, delays in diagnosis can more than double the length and intensity of treatment required," Mr Tanti said.

'However, when caught early, patients may be eligible for less aggressive, shorterduration therapies, which can reduce hospital time, ease emotional distress, and improve both survival and recovery.'

The Leukaemia Foundation is calling on all Australians to be aware of the five key symptoms of blood cancer and act promptly:

- ☐ Fatigue that fails to go away.
- ☐ Frequent or recurrent infections. ☐ Unexplained bruising or bleeding.
- ☐ Unexplained weight loss.
- ☐ Swollen lymph nodes (usually painless).

"Blood cancer is often called Australia's hidden cancer crisis, but what's really hidden is the life-saving impact that an earlier diagnosis can have," Mr Tanti said.

"Understanding the five key symptoms of blood cancer could help you, or someone you love, get diagnosed earlier when treatment is more effective and less intense.

"We're talking about someone's partner, child, parent, or best friend getting their life back and going on to thrive following blood







"I find it a limitation when I'm coaching and playing, because I rely heavily on my assistants, so sometimes my feedback is a bit more generic.

time I hated not playing, so it was certainly a balance."

"It's nice going into games knowing we have to be on, so hopefully that can continue to be the case in the next part of the season."

Following this weekend's Interleague bye, the Rovers will travel to the Lakeside for a battle with Barmera-Monash, while Loxton North return home to tackle Waikerie.



- 3 cups self-raising flour
- 3 tbs caster sugar
- 80g butter, chopped
- 1 cup (250mL) buttermilk

METHOD:

- 1. Preheat oven to 220°C. Sift flour into a large bowl, stir in sugar, then rub in butter until crumbly.
- Add buttermilk and mix with a flat-bladed knife until the mixture is starting to come together.

 Space less than a centimetre apart and brush the tops with extra buttermilk.


