OPERATORS of the Berri Estates winery have overcome capacity challenges – caused by an earlier-than-normal vintage and hot temperatures – which temporarily halted the processing of red grapes.

CCW-contracted wine grape

growers were advised on Friday 14 March the processing of red wine grapes had stopped at the winery, due to a lack of fermentation capacity.

However, Berri Estates operations director Jim Godden said red grape processing had this week returned to normal capacity.

"The Berri Estates Winery has been running at full capacity since late January, as we continue to navigate an early and very hot vintage period which has accelerated the ripening process," Mr Godden said.

"We have also been utilising off-site storage where possible to help manage loads."

"Last week, we had to pause red grape crushing operations for two nights due to short-term capacity issues."

"White grape processing was unaffected. We are now back to normal winery operations and will continue to manage capacity closely for the rest of the vintage period."

Renmark Rocks On Committee member Lyn Leuders said more than 1000 attendees enjoyed the 2025 festival.

"We had the biggest numbers we've ever had on all nights, so that's the Thursday, Friday and Saturday night," Mrs Leuders said.

"Including the Sunday breakfast it was 1100 tickets, so that's massive."

Mrs Leuders said the performances from Melbourne-based band Memory Lane were a highlight of the weekend for many.

## Drivers caught during the weekend

FOUR Riverland drivers were caught driving under the influence during weekend traffic stops.

On Saturday 15 March, police detected a car speeding on the Sturt Highway, at Annadale, near Blanchetown.

A 32-year-old man, from Renmark, underwent a roadside screening test, returning a positive result for illicit drugs.

He received a three-month immediate loss of licence notice and may face further charges pending forensic analysis of the drug test.

On Saturday 15 March, police stopped a car on Lawrie Terrace, at Waikerie, and the driver underwent a breath test, returning a positive reading of 0.092.

The 26-year-old man, from Waikerie, was issued with a six-month immediate loss of licence notice and his car was impounded for 28 days. He will be summonsed to appear in Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Saturday 15 March, police stopped a car on Ramco Road, Sunlands, near Waikerie.

A 53-year-old local woman underwent a breath test and returned a positive reading of 0.095.

The woman also only had a learner's permit, failed to display any L plates, and was without a qualified supervising driver. She will be summonsed to appear in Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On the same day, police were called to Nookamka Terrace, at Barmera after reports of a car being driven erratically.

Police located the vehicle with the driver asleep behind the wheel.

The 19-year-old man, from Paringa, underwent a breath test and returned a positive reading of 0.177. He was reported for drink driving, issued with a 12-month immediate loss of licence notice and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

He will be summonsed to appear in Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

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# \$1.1m funding for active transport projects in Loxton and Waikerie

NEW funding will be allocated to the construction and maintenance of two off-road shared use paths, aiming to improve connectivity within the Loxton Waikerie region.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie were granted \$1.1m, as part of the Active Transport Fund, to support two active projects and enable the construction of an off-road shared-use path in the townships of Loxton, Waikerie, and Ramco.

The paths are set to create opportunities for residents to walk, cycle and actively move through the community.

In Ramco, the project will create a safe walking path to connect the local school with Hart Lagoon, while also linking the Waikerie Lutheran School to the high school.

In Loxton, the new path will extend from East Terrace to the new childcare centre, and continue on to connect to the Hollywood area.

The path will further link the childcare centre and Loxton High School, via the old railway line, providing a safer and more-accessible route for pedestrians and cyclists.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said "we are thrilled that DCLW has been chosen to benefit from this significant federal investment".

By improving access to key locations like schools and childcare centres, the new paths in Waikerie, Ramco and Loxton will provide safe and accessible routes for students, parents, and residents alike," Mr Norton said.

"We're excited for these valuable additions to our community's infrastructure and to see these projects come to life and benefit the region."

These are one of seven projects that will share in \$4.6m to build new or upgrade existing bicycle and walking paths across South Australia.

Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, Catherine King said "The Government is investing in active transport options right across South Australia to shape the way locals and visitors move around our great towns".

"Whether you're on a motor scooter, pushing a pram, walking or cycling, we're making it easier for people to get to school, work or local services, without having to jump in the car," Ms King said.

"This is about so much more than bike lanes and footpaths, it's about reshaping our cities and regional centres, connecting our everyday places, and making our towns better to live in and easier to visit."

SA Senator Don Farrell said "this project will deliver a fantastic opportunity for locals and tourists alike to get out and explore the townships of Loxton, Waikerie and Ramco".

"The regions of South Australia are a great place to explore and this funding for active transport is another way to support these local economies," Mr Farrell said.

The funding for Loxton Waikerie will enhance local connectivity, reduce reliance on cars, and promote active travel with construction expected to begin in the coming months.

## Works have started on the Loxton Oval pavilion

CONSTRUCTION of a new viewing pavilion at the Loxton Oval has commenced, with recent works preparing the site.

The Loxton Football and Sporting Club started bulk earthworks at the Loxton Oval with finished surface levels ready to construct the main shelter pad that will hold the new viewing pavilion.

Earth removal for paths and plumbing and electrical work is continuing, with more works being undertaken on site according to the

proposed schedule.

The proposed lease agreement, awarded in 2024, spans a 21-year term (with an additional 21-year renewal), that allows the club to erect the viewing pavilion, which will be utilised mainly for the sale of food and beverages during game time, as well as for fundraising activities in support of the Loxton football, netball, basketball and cricket clubs.

Loxton Waikerie Council CEO David Beaton said "ground works are under-

way for the future Loxton Oval Viewing Pavilion, as endorsed in the 2024/2025 Annual Business Plan".

"This marks an important step forward in improving local facilities," Mr Beaton said.

"The football club's responsibility for the subsequent above-ground works reflects a strong partnership, and we are proud to work alongside them to create a space that will enhance the experience for all who use and visit the Loxton Oval."

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## Third party works lead to Barmera Telstra 'switch off'

BARMERA residents who are Telstra customers have been advised to expect service interruptions throughout the rest of this week.

A number of Barmera Telstra customers last week received an SMS message advising "From 19 March for three days Telstra will be switching off the Barmera mobile site to allow another carrier to work safely on their equipment located on the tower. This will result in reduced Telstra mobile coverage.

However, a Telstra spokesperson said works by the third party were expected to be completed by Friday evening.

"Telstra has been advised that a third party will be performing works on its infrastructure on one of our mobile network towers at Barmera, which will result in mobile network disruption at different periods," the spokesperson said.

"We're required to switch off our infra-

structure for approximately four hours from 19 March 2025, until 21 March 2025. Works should be complete by 7pm on 21 March 2025."

It is understood Telstra mobile customers in the region should receive text messages advising them of the upcoming disruption. Landline and NBN internet services will not be affected.

Telstra customers can continue to make calls and send texts during the disruption to mobile services by switching on Wi-Fi calling. This is a free setting on most popular mobile phones that allows a mobile to make and receive calls connected to Wi-Fi.

Business owners in the area have also been encouraged to connect their EFTPOS terminals to their NBN or fixed Wi-Fi connection to prevent delays in processing transactions.

Any calls to triple zero from a Telstra mobile when the site is off air will automatically be diverted to any working mobile network for connection to emergency services.

# Warriors bring medieval glory to the Riverland

MORE than 30 armoured local and visiting warriors went to battle at the Mallee Dragons' newest Barmera 'Lair' last weekend.

Hosting 25 medieval fights between five Buhurt teams from around Australia, the Mallee Dragons have officially held their first rookie tournament, Mallee Mayhem, since establishing the sport in the Riverland less than a year ago.

Derived from the Old French term for 'wallop', Buhurt is a sport that allows players to dress in a suit of shining armour, champion a blunted weapon, and take part in a group fight in an arena, called a list.

"Buhurt was established in Australia close to eight years ago," Mallee Dragons president Paul Chandler said.

"Myself and two friends, now members, first saw Buhurt at a Viking Festival in 2023 and thought it looked amazing, and wished we were able to do something similar back home in the Riverland."

"After a while, we just thought, 'why not do it ourselves' if we loved the idea so much."

With the collaboration and support of the Adelaide team Warhound Armoured Combat, who held training sessions for Mallee Dragon members to attend each month, a local team was gradually established.

"We learned the ropes from the state team who have just been amazing to us," Mr Chandler said.

"By January last year we were running our own training sessions down at Glassey Park, in Berri, and by April we were entering

into tournaments as a team."

Through their own fundraising, hard work, and member support, the Mallee Dragons recently opened their own facility — named 'The Lair' — in Barmera.

Placing the finishing touches on the shed, which now provides them the arena space of a 'list' to train, early last week, Mr Chandler said the group has reached "their biggest achievement yet".

"The biggest thing so far is getting our own facility and hosting our first major event, Mallee Mayhem," he said.

"It is something that will be ongoing, and providing a space — especially as a new and growing team — for newer fighters (locally and) from around the country to compete, train, and continue to learn together."

"We are soon going to host a women's only training day to make sure we are opening the sport up and making it comfortable for other members to enjoy — we just can't wait to keep hosting events and build up our team."

"Though we still have a bit to go, it makes me really proud to see how far we have come in such a short amount of time."

Mr Chandler encouraged anyone interested in the sport to come along, and promised it is "not at all as dangerous as it might seem".

"So far we have close to 20 registered members, but we are really hoping more people come along and join our team and regularly attend training session," he said.

"The first session is free and, I guarantee, a lot of fun — the worst wound you might sustain is a bruise."

"All weapons are blunted, and we practice in (foam) kits as purchasing a set of armour

can be quite an investment (ranging from \$3000 onwards).

"Like any sport, there is always risk of injury, but we have a lot of safety training and respect amongst players."

"However, in Buhurt the moment you hit the ground, the fight is over, and before it starts, each player must be ready."

While an interest in armour, swords, and ancient combat are a great reason to come along to join the Mallee Dragons, Mr Chandler believes new members are sure to

stay given the "amazing culture of Buhurt".

"The thing that keeps people here is the community that is created," he said.

"The sport is not about the individual, it's all about the team and the camaraderie that is formed is really special."

"I have never met a more generous and kinder bunch of people."

## Deceased person found at Berri

POLICE were called to Berri Primary School after a deceased body was found by passing residents.

Just before 8:15am, on Wednesday 12 March, Riverland emergency crews responded to a call on Sultana Street, at Berri, where a man's body was found unconscious on the nearby oval.

According to SAPOL's media unit, the man was declared dead at the scene, there are no signs of foul play, and Riverland police will prepare a report for the coroner.

## Man arrested over Riverland bushfires

A LOCAL man has been arrested for potentially starting a number of fires on Katarapko Island last weekend.

At 11.15pm, Saturday 15 March, a fire was reported at Bookpurnong Road, while shortly after at 3.15am and 6.15am, on Sunday 16 March, another three fires were reported on Katarapko Island.

The Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) Department for Environment and Water, SA Police and SA State Emergency Services responded to the emergency, with approximately 26 trucks, supported by aircraft and boats, working together to extinguish the blazes.

PolAir assisted with the search and about 1.30pm, they located a man in the river, who



was subsequently arrested.

Smoke impacted communities through the afternoon and late Sunday night and visibility was reduced between towns.

Emergency services may be working on and around roads in the area, and motorists are advised to stay away. If you need to travel on roads in the area, please take care and drive to the local conditions.

Firefighters will remain on the fireground throughout the week to manage these fires,

and will be supported by aircraft and boats.

Fires do not currently pose a threat to the community, however, smoke will be visible for some distance.

The 48-year-old man, from Bookpurnong, was arrested on Sunday 16 March and is expected to be charged with cause bushfire.

He is undergoing a medical assessment, pending numerous ongoing investigations, and will appear in court with further charges expected.

## THE YEARS GO BY

### All eyes on wine

VINTAGE is always one of the most crucial periods on the Riverland's annual calendar.

The smell of crushed and fermenting grapes is in the air, and while there would be many a grower, and winery worker, across the region relieved that the 2025 vintage will be completed before Easter, there is still no shortage of challenges, both current and on the horizon, for those in the wine industry to contemplate.

The need for Accolade – operators of the Berri Estates winery – to temporarily halt crushing operations for red wine last week is a reflection of these issues that are continuing to combine and simmer.

While the effects of an earlier-than-normal vintage and hot temperatures – which we are all dealing with – have been pointed out, the more inquisitive among us would question if the same capacity issues would be faced if the national wine industry wasn't contending with such a large oversupply of red wine.

Efforts from operators of the winery to ensure interruptions to crushing processes were minimised should be highlighted, as speculation the issues could last for up to a week would certainly have sparked some anxiety among growers who still had shiraz grapes left on the vine.

Many local growers would also, probably understandably, also be feeling some anxiety regarding pricing and payments for this vintage, which are aspects of the industry that have also been examined, and debated, in detail across recent editions of The Murray Pioneer.

Recent recommendations relating to earlier announcements of pricing have been held up as a victory by some sections of the grower base.

Few would probably question why, as the financial pressure Riverland grape growers have been under for the past 18-to-24 months has been easy for those outside the industry to see, and has reverberated through the community, with less disposable income to be shared among the local economy.

However, these recommendations still remain just that, and have drawn some responses that could be classed as critical.

The Riverland's Federal MP is one who is of the thought that promising silver bullets can often lead to disappointment. Similarly, in today's edition of the Pioneer, a former senior wine industry member puts forward some key points regarding the entire global market.

We can find recent figures that show a staggering decrease in the amount of American-made wine being exported since 2023. Here too, in areas that are known around the globe for the quality of their wines, growers are being encouraged to pull vines out.

Do these differing perspectives mean a solution will be difficult to reach? Either way, one would think the sustainability of either the wine industry as a whole, or of South Australia's grape growers will be tested soon.

Nangari teenager Betty Brown (later Mrs Giff Proud) on horseback, about 1943. Now 97, Bett is one of few remaining with first-hand knowledge of the home-front during WWII, which ended 80-years ago. As a 12-year-old she moved with her family to the isolated Nangari farming district, east of Loxton. Six of her uncles enlisted in WWII. Three were posted to Europe, and three to the Pacific. Bett's grandmother, Pollard, had six other children and kept very busy making rich fruit cakes, wrapped in unbleached calico, and placing them in tins for dispatch to her sons wherever they were posted. All six servicemen returned, but news of those who didn't saddened the local community. 'One was my second cousin with whom I was very close. It was a terribly sad time for me,' Bett said. She also recalls 'I was 16 when an RAAF Avro Anson light-bomber on a night navigational training-flight crashed into a neighbour's farm at Noora, killing the five crew. I rode horseback to investigate. Nothing had been cleared, the wreckage was widespread.' Petrol rationing curtailed travel, so life was limited to the farm at Nangari. Occasional train trips to Adelaide 'would take eight to 12 hours.' Betty declared 'sport played a significant role in the rehabilitation of the returned soldiers. ### Let down by drought response

MUCH of South Australia is facing the worst drought on record, yet rural communities are being left behind. The SA Labor Government's response to the ongoing drought has in my view been weak.

Remember, you can't eat green steel, you can't eat iron ore, but our farmers put food on our table three meals a day. It's time for the Labor government to stop ignoring regional South Australia, take responsibility, and act now.


Overseas governments and central banks are pushing radical interventions to rescue cash as a vital payment option in perilous times, while our government and central bank do nothing.

## Water recovery to win city votes?

IN a clearly political move to win city votes at the expense of regional Australia, the Commonwealth has recently kicked off a second buyback tender in the southern Murray-

Darling Basin in 2024-25.

With an impending election the announcement is clearly intended to try to win city votes while throwing regional communities, farmers and even the environment under the bus.

We have learned the Government is full steam ahead to buy up to another 100 billion litres in 2025, on top of the 70 billion litres from its first tender last year.

The minister claims she considers social and economic impacts before approving buybacks. Considers maybe, but clearly ignores when ABARES says past and planned water recovery wipes \$602 million to \$914 million every year from what the farmgate value of irrigated agriculture would otherwise be.

The one-off \$300 million assistance package will not even touch the sides of what irrigation-dependent communities need when the government is stripping hundreds of millions of dollars in income from their economies every year.

We also know that while more than 3000GL recovered to date is delivering important, localised environmental benefits, more water will not deliver the Basin-wide step change needed to reverse declining native fish and static waterbird populations, and improve water quality.

For that, the government must stop spending billions of dollars on unnecessary water recovery and instead invest in

fixing degradation drivers such as lack of fishways and invasive species like European carp choking waterways and wrecking water quality and native species habitat.

The announcement also puts the lie to Commonwealth claims it is prioritising non-purchase options in the southern Murray-Darling Basin, and avoiding concentrated impacts.

It is a lie when non-purchase options remain tangled in red tape with no contracts yet signed. And it is a lie when this latest tender is seeking 20GL-plus parcels that could be concentrated in a community.

We know water buybacks hurt regional communities, because this has quite literally played out before our eyes already after the 2008-2012 buybacks.

Any form of water recovery must be done in a way that does not have negative social or economic impacts on regional communities.

The buyback tenders come on top of NSW proposing to hike rural water bills by up to 341 per cent by 2030, and concurrent NSW reviews on river connectivity and drought planning that could slash farmers' water access by more than 25 per cent even in average and wet years.

The cumulative impact of these federal and state moves is pushing farmers out of business and Aussie food off the shelves.

## Jungle trek with Grant

The Paringa branch of Women in Agriculture and Business had former Renmark Paringa 2024 Active Citizenship Award winner Grant Schwartzkopff as their first speaker of the year.

Grant, who lives in Paringa, was born in the flood year of 1956, to Bill and Ruth, and attended Renmark Infant, Primary and High Schools.

Immediately after completing high school he had the shortest of interviews with Gil Falland and found himself working the next 34 years for Falland's Dairy. When that business closed he was employed by Paul's Dairy, of Mildura, and this was followed by 14 years as a school support officer in Renmark.

Grant took up photography about 15 years ago with the purchase of a DSLR (digital single lens reflex) camera and has been on a permanent learning curve since then. He is well known in the Riverland as the roving photographer of all sports, whose photos are published in The Murray Pioneer.

The chance to take the trip of a lifetime in 2024 saw Grant travel to Uganda, a third world country with beautiful scenery and whose people he described as "happy, inviting and helpful". He saw very few bitumen roads and the dirt streets are lined with stalls selling fruit and vegetables and items as diverse as pigs, chooks, coffins and sugar cane. Outdoor cooking is also a normal street feature.

The highlight of his trip was a jungle trek to view the protected silverback gorillas (he had undertaken a fitness regime in Renmark in readiness for the arduous trek). He was a member of one of four groups of six — all had their pants tucked into socks to avoid leeches — and each group was accompanied by armed rangers and trackers. After only trekking for 45 minutes they came upon a silverback male, eight females and eight baby gorillas. Everyone took their photos and then just stopped to enjoy being in the presence of such magnificent animals and watched the young at play.

The next part of his adventure was a visit to Queen Elizabeth National Park, where one armed soldier per person was the rule and the party's tents were set up next to an army encampment. The nearby Congo River was a mass of hippos, which kept up noisy feeding and socialising throughout the night. On his safari Grant observed most African animals, with the exception of a leopard. Some special moments were seeing lions relaxing in trees and a view of the very-rare shoebill stork, which is 1.2m in height and has a 2.4m wingspan. Elephants were seen digging with their trunks in a dry creek bed until they found water, which they then splashed on their young.

An experience Grant is not keen to repeat was white water rafting down rapids, a frightening experience which included capsizing.

The Ugandan villages have no power, telephones or roadways, but the people are content to walk everywhere carrying their belongings. There are a few motorbikes that carry up to six people at the same time, and in contrast are the school children dressed in immaculate uniforms who walk several kilometres to school.

Grant took 20,000 photos and has planned his next trip to Africa this year, keen to capture its wildlife once again.

## Amazing Anja: Renmark polyglot's state honours

RENMARK High School year 12 student Anja Tassios has received state recognition for her talents and role-modelling in multilingualism at the 2025 Australia Day Citizen of the Year Awards.

Speaking five languages at just 16, Anja was awarded a commendation for the Leadership in Languages and Cultures award earlier this month, with the recognition celebrating individual achievements and a collective endeavour towards building a culturally rich and inclusive society.

"It was an amazing experience going to Adelaide to accept the award," Anja said.

"It was a big shock and I could not believe I had been recognised in this space."

"It felt very special — it was scary, but it felt nice to be recognised for all my hard work."

Speaking both Greek and French from a young age, Anja said she "does not remember a time when (she) was monolingual".

"I was spoken to in different languages from the moment I was born," she said.

"My dad is Greek, my grandparents are Greek, and my mum spoke Greek, and also studied French, Russian, and Spanish at University."

"By the time I was a toddler, I was already trilingual with Greek and French."

Anja said she began to self-teach herself a forth language, Arabic, when she became "fascinated by the language" and "flight experience" with Emirates to Greece, at six years old.

"Since then, I have discovered management and airline leadership roles that I would love to pursue" she said.

"That would also give me the chance to work at Emirates, which is based in Dubai, hence my motivation for learning Arabic."

"It's the most difficult, but I have really loved teaching it to myself."

Introduced to her "current favourite language" Spanish when she reached year 10, Anja is now currently completing the second year of study in the subject at Flinders University.

Throughout her high school years Anja has also shown leadership and role-modelled

multilingualism within school grounds and the wider Riverland community, from winning French poetry competitions, participating in the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad, to assisting in junior language classes and in her workplace.

"Learning a language feels like my destiny and I have so much encouragement at school and at home," she said.

"When you speak different languages, it opens up opportunities and the chance to interact with so many people."

"At my workplace, I am able to help and speak to customers and that is really empowering — I often find I am able to really make connections with people through speaking their language."

Anja's mother and Renmark High School French, Greek, and Spanish teacher Jasmine Sotiroulis said the "momentous recognition of Anja had made everyone extremely proud".

"From a Renmark High School perspective, it is with immense pride that we have supported a student to follow this pathway," she said.

"It's just fabulous to have a young person to be such a role model in the community around the importance of having knowledge about other people's cultures and languages."

Though looking to complete a Bachelor of Aviation Management in the future, Anja said learning and speaking language will remain a significant part of her day-to-day life.

"I do not think I have spoken one single language since the day I was born," she said.

"It's something special I will do and use for the rest of my life."

## Riverland roads are safer but upgrades are needed

THE Riverland's State MP says findings from a recent major road report illustrate further upgrades are needed on the Sturt Highway.

The RAA recently undertook an assessment of the road network in the Riverland, reviewing the safety and efficiency of transport infrastructure in the region, and found the \$87.5m upgrade of the Sturt Highway provided safety improvements that included new barriers and six additional overtaking lanes.

The total number of overtaking lanes between Greenock and the Victorian border is 27.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said "the previous Liberal Government committed \$87.5m to upgrade the Sturt Highway, significantly improving safety with additional new barriers and overtaking lanes".

"While some progress has been made, the duplication of the Sturt Highway is still a necessary long-term initiative to reduce fatalities and serious injuries in both the region and across the state, with the community presenting more than 12,000 signatures to the State Parliament," Mr Whetstone said.

"Concerns about road maintenance in the Riverland must be addressed, as key corridors like the Old Sturt Highway, Bookpurnong Road, and the Goyder Highway continue to suffer from cracking, ruts, and undulations, jeopardising road user safety."

"Despite the evidence and repeated calls for repairs on regional roads, the government continues to ignore the safety concerns of Riverland communities, leaving motorists at risk on deteriorating roads."

In its assessment, the RAA found that duplication of the Highway is still a long-term project that would reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries in the region.

RAA's report also welcomed the new roundabout, installed at the intersection of the Sturt Highway and Old Sturt Highway, in Barmera.

This intersection was previously one of SA's most dangerous regional junctions, with three fatal crashes occurring between 2014-2019.

Other findings of the new report include:

- The Old Sturt Highway needs further maintenance works and more consistent speed limits.
- The Waikerie rest area is highly dangerous for pedestrians, and requires safety improvements, including a reduced speed

limit.

- Key roads need major repair work, including Bookpurnong Road (cracking, undulations, ruts), Ramco Road (undulations), and parts of the Goyder Highway (undulations, ruts).
- The Sturt Highway should be duplicated in stages to improve safety, incorporating a Truro Bypass.

RAA senior traffic engineer Matt Vertudaches said the upgrades since RAA's last Riverland assessment in 2018 were welcome.

"Since our last detailed assessment of the road network in the Riverland there have been some welcome infrastructure improvements, especially along the Sturt Highway," Mr Vertudaches said.

"With 27 overtaking lanes at regular intervals before the Victorian border there are plenty of opportunities for drivers to pass slower vehicles safely."

"With vision of multiple near-misses on the corridor emerging in recent weeks due to unsafe overtaking manoeuvres, we're urging drivers to be patient and wait for these overtaking lanes, or only pass if you're certain it is safe to do so."

"Overtaking long vehicles with a lack of clear sight distance or clear road puts yourself and other road users at risk."

"Single vehicle run-off-road crashes are the most-common crash types on the Sturt Highway, and we welcome new barrier installations along the length of the highway which will reduce the severity of these crashes."

Mr Vertudaches said "In the long-term, however, duplicating this corridor will contribute significantly to improved road safety outcomes in the region, as it will separate the oncoming traffic completely, so we continue to call for this project to be funded into the future."

"We also heard from the community that maintenance on some key corridors is an ongoing issue."

"This is a common concern raised across the state given we have a \$2bn road maintenance backlog that needs to be addressed."

The RAA urged drivers to be patient and use these opportunities to overtake slower vehicles wherever possible – as more than 2km of clear road is often needed to safely overtake long vehicles at 110km/h.

Between 2019-2023, 20 lives were lost in road crashes on the Sturt Highway.

## Flood-hit local shack owners still rebuilding

SHACKOWNERS impacted by the River Murray flood at Blanchetown more than two years ago are gradually rebuilding, but some have been unable to renew their insurance policies.

Blanchetown Shack Owners' Association president Wayne Tredrea said after the flood, his insurance policy for his property in February 2023 increased from \$2000 a year, to \$12,000.

He said after he received money from his flood insurance claim, the company he had the policy with also refunded his \$12,000 premium and told him they would no longer insure his shack.

"At the moment we don't have any insurance for the shack at all," Mr Tredrea said.

"They won't insure you in a flood area. That is the case for us, anyway."

"You pay the policy for all the years prior and then you make one claim and they don't want to take the risk anymore."

"I don't believe too many people in my situation in Blanchetown have been able to get insurance."

"Although I have heard of some being able to get insurance, I am not sure how that works."

Mr Tredrea and his wife

are doing most of the repairs to their property themselves instead of having to use tradespeople.

"We did not receive quite enough insurance money, so we had to take our time doing things," he said.

"We have done a lot of the work and had help from friends."

The 2022/23 flood inundated the Tredreas' shack, right up to the top storey.

Mr Tredrea said repairs to the bottom of their shack were completed in time for summer last year.

"We live in the down-

stairs area when we go there now and the upstairs area is probably about four months away from being finished," he said.

"We were worn out and last year after we cleaned up and started rebuilding, we decided to pause and enjoy summer with the grandkids."

"We had them all up there and did activities that we love doing there including water-skiing."

Mr Tredrea said the repairs should be all done to the upstairs part of their shack by Christmas.

The couple also have a house in Adelaide, and Mr Tredrea works in Dry Creek three days a week, but they aim to spend most of their time in Blanchetown.

# Mayor's 'free entry' pool plan

A RIVELAND council says having free entry at its two public swimming pools would help address cost-of-living pressures on locals.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton's notion of motion received unanimous support from elected members at the council's February meeting.

"People across our council district are doing it tough and anything we can do to reduce cost-of-living pressures on families will help," Mayor Norton told The Murray Pioneer.

As a result of the vote, the council will consider waiving entry fees for the Loxton and Waikerie pools in its 2025/26 budget, ahead of the next swimming season.

Mayor Norton said requests for investment in both pools were backed up by feedback suggesting the facilities were well supported by locals.

"Swimming pools came in top of the list on our community survey last financial year, so encouraging greater use will justify the further investment requested," he said.

"(In addition) easier access will hopefully enhance and improve water safety skills and awareness."

In calling for "subsidiisation" of the pools, Mayor Norton told councillors that the facilities are "not merely amenities but essential public services that promote health, wellbeing, and safety".

"By increasing subsidies for our swimming pools, we will enhance accessibility for all age groups, particularly our active seniors and young people who lack access to private pools," he said.

"Inland river drowning remains a tragic and significant cause of loss of life across Australia. Increasing access to safe, supervised swimming facilities is a proven strategy to enhance water safety awareness and skills, thereby reducing

these preventable tragedies.

"By encouraging greater use through subsidisation, we can effectively reduce the cost per visit, making this initiative not only a moral imperative but a financially sound decision.

"This resolution is a commitment to safeguard our residents, foster community well-being, and ensure our pools are utilised to their fullest potential, justifying further investment in these valuable community assets."

# Loxton man jailed after trying to meet teen

A RIVERLAND father will spend more than three years behind bars after attempting to organise a meeting with a teenage girl.

Loxton man Nicholas Lawrence Moore, 57, was last week jailed for attempting to coerce a fictitious 14-year-old into sexual acts.

The Advertiser reported Judge Michelle Sutcliffe said Mr Moore had arranged a motel room in an attempt to meet the fictitious girl.

"You discussed marrying her and having a family," Judge Sutcliffe said.

"You told her that you would massage and kiss her, and that you would bring protection in case you had sex.

"You told her you had ordered a bubble bath and chocolate massage oil. You said you wanted to take her as a wife.

"When you were interviewed by police, you admitted communicating with a 14 and 10 year old, but denied saying anything inappropriate and denied intending to pick up a

14-year-old to take her to a motel room."

Following a 12-week investigation Mr Moore was arrested by police at the Bowden train station, where he had organised to pick the 14-year-old girl up from.

The Advertiser reported Judge Sutcliffe said Mr Moore had encouraged the fictitious girl to keep their relationship a secret.

"You sent a voice message to her saying that she was cute and you loved her," she said.

"You continued to chat with her – telling her you were thinking about touching her and wanted to make her feel good. You talked about tickling, hugging and kissing, and wanting her to be your girlfriend.

"You suggested that you could babysit her while her mum was at work so you could cuddle, and teach her how to kiss."

It is understood Mr Moore was sentenced to three-years-and-six-months imprisonment, with a non-parole period of two years that was backdated to his 2024 arrest.

He will be eligible for parole in May next year.

# Local father jailed for sex abuse

A RIVERLAND male will spend more than eight years in jail after pleading guilty to sexually abusing his intellectually disabled adult daughter.

A 67-year-old local man, who is unable to be named to avoid identifying his victim, appeared in the District Court on Tuesday for sentencing, after previously pleading guilty to two counts of incest.

The Advertiser reported Judge Joanne Tracey said the daughter was made to keep the relationship a secret, including measures such as being made to hide when visitors were at the man's house.

"You told the victim that you loved them and that they were more than just a daughter," Judge Tracey said.

"You said you loved them as a girlfriend. You told the victim that nothing would part you again and that you could not wait to have them in your bed and make them know how much you love them.

"You described the victim as your girlfriend with

you being their boyfriend and said that when you were apart from each other you were their dad.

"Your offending was extremely serious, committed for your own sexual gratification. It was committed against your child who has an intellectual disability who was vulnerable to your expressions of love and interest in their life; you paid them money as a bribe; you insisted on their silence, and came against a background of having offended against them in the most heinous way when they were a very young child."

The man was jailed for 14 years in 2010 after pleading guilty to seven sex offences against five different children – one being his daughter – along with his three nieces and a daughter of a family friend.

The court heard the offending began again in 2023, after the man ran into his daughter at a shop without their disability support worker.

The Advertiser reported Judge Tracey said the man

betrayed his daughter's trust "in the most despicable way".

"They assumed you were allowed to see them and they now have to live their life knowing that their father did not want a relationship with them other than one that was sexual," she said.

"Any suggestion that you are remorseful for your actions needs to be tempered against the strength of the evidence and that you actively pursued the victim.

"You preyed on the vulnerability of your intellectually disabled child, and as an adult.

"As their father you should have been there to protect them and instead betrayed their trust in the most despicable way for your own sexual gratification."

It is understood the man was sentenced to eight years and four months jail, with a non-parole period of six years and eight months. He will be eligible for parole in 2031.

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# Murray Mallee man arrested over child exploitation

A RIVERLAND man was arrested after detectives from the SA Joint Anti Child Exploitation Team (SA JACET) undertook investigations into child exploitation within the region.

Through a partnership between SAPOL's Public Protection Branch and the Australian Federal Police, a 32-year-old man from the Murray Mallee was arrested, on Sunday 9 March and charged with two counts of communicating to make a child amenable to sexual activity, and one count of possession of child exploitation material.

SA JACET sergeant Graham Tomkins said "SA Police are dedicated to the pursuit of individuals who cause harm to children and remain ever vigilant to bring those individuals to account".

The Murray Mallee man failed to apply for bail and appeared in court the same day.

# Truro Bypass and overtaking lanes a priority, says Tony

A SENIOR Riverland politician is continuing to advocate for more upgrades to the Riverland road network and the eventual funding for a "much-needed" bypass project.

A recent RAA report highlighted upgrades done to the Sturt Highway and the addition of several overtaking lanes.

However, Barker MP Tony Pasin is concerned about the daily challenges faced by truck and vehicle drivers, particularly when passing through Truro.

"The actual upgrades were an initiative of the previous Liberal Government, under the Roads of Strategic Importance program and they were a valuable addition to the Sturt Highway corridor," Mr Pasin said.

"In the long-term, the corridor needs to be duplicated and the very-first element within that upgrade is the Truro bypass, which if it hadn't been cancelled by the current government, it would have been completed this year."

In November 2023, the Australian Government

announced the outcomes of its Infrastructure Investment Program Review, with the funding for the Truro Bypass project being withdrawn.

The Truro Bypass project is potentially being incorporated into a Strategic Business Case for a High Productivity Vehicle Network, so it can be considered for future federal funding, according to the South Australia Department for Infrastructure and Transport website.

Mr Pasin said the Truro Bypass has been designed to benefit the Truro community and enhance the safety of residents within the main street.

"I look at the townspeople of Truro who, don't want to have a few hundred trucks a day passing through their little town," Mr Pasin said.

"Trucks can be up to 36m long and can weigh up to 100 tonne, so if we can create a designated bypass where trucks can safely travel at their designated speed, away from pedestrian traffic, that will enhance Truro's security and create safer roads.

"Ultimately, we want to do

everything we can to drive down the number of people who die on our roads.

"The community of Truro is desperate to remove heavy vehicles from their community and their main street."

Mr Pasin said current overtaking lanes need to be longer in order to allow traffic to flow in a safely manner.

"If you are building overtaking lanes, they need to be long enough so the car traveling at 110km/h can comfortably overtake a truck traveling at a 100kp/h, or a road train which is longer and is travelling at 90km/h," he said.

"If these lanes are not long enough, they are only an overtaking lane in name, and their purpose is to allow overtakes without going into oncoming traffic, which is one of the most dangerous manoeuvres on the road."

Mr Pasin said "everyone from the transport industry, to the government, to advocacy groups like the RAA knows that the Sturt Highway, together with the Augusta Highway and the Dukes Highway, have to be duplicated.

"You need the funding to do this and you need to get other priorities sorted, which currently are the completion of the North South Corridor, then the Truro Bypass," Mr Pasin said.

Loxton-based Wishart Contractors owner Max Wishart said "we need more and better overtaking lanes, particularly in the road between Walerie and Blanchetown, since it's quite difficult because of the small rises, which caused a lot of fatalities in the area".

"It needs to have a three-or-four lane highway there to eliminate that possibility, or better overtaking lanes," Mr Wishart said.

"Infrastructure needs to be built so that people can safely overtake us while not putting us truckies in danger."

"Our concern is that other road users don't understand the limitations of the truck, how long it takes to stop and how hard it is to stop."

"The bypass would definitely help truck drivers save time and money when delivering goods to the region."

Figure 1: Global per capita consumption – still wine vs other alcoholic beverages (litres per person)





Figure 2: Global wine consumption by price segment (billion cases)



## Looking at the bigger wine industry issues?

I WRITE in response to the commentary about the recent Senate Committee hearing, and the impact that a mandatory code for winegrape purchases will have on the Riverland wine sector.

It is not surprising there is a strong voice among growers calling for a mandatory code. Since the inception of the Voluntary Code of Conduct the uptake by many wine grape buyers has been sluggish, despite the strong support by some wine companies. The sale and purchase of wine grapes should be subject to sound and fair commercial practices, and this should be consistent across the wine sector.

However, it is misleading to suggest that installing a mandatory code of conduct will be the answer to all problems, nor is it guaranteed to only have positive impacts. I have read commentary in these pages to that effect, which infers that wine companies are greedily sitting on massive profits while holding out on growers. This view ignores the facts about the current state of the global wine sector. Anyone in touch with news about the wine industry would have read about staff redundancies, mergers, wine companies going into receivership, and wine companies selling off stock at a loss to generate cashflow.

Sales of all alcoholic beverages have been declining since 2013. More relevant is that wine sales are declining faster and losing market share to other alcoholic beverages.

Of greater relevance to the Riverland and other inland wine regions is the decline in consumption of commercial wine, the product segment where almost all Riverland wine fits, which is declining in consumption relative to premium wine.

Domestic consumption of wine in Australia sees an even more stark trend, with commercial wine falling from annual sales of around 46 million cases in 2013, to around 35 million cases at present, or a reduction of 24 per cent. Premium wine sales have increased slightly over the same period by around 0.5 million cases. The large contraction in commercial sales cannot be offset by the relatively small volume increase in premium sales.

This global trend is why significant vineyard area is being removed in wine regions around the world. The contributing factors are addressed in the report by Professor Kym Anderson that was referenced by the Senate Committee, 'Australia's Wine Industry Crisis and Ways Forward: An Independent Review'.

As an overarching position, growers should be paid a return that reflects the value of the wine that can be made from that fruit. If a grower produces fruit that can be used to make a higher value wine, they should receive commensurate reward, or in other words, receive a fair market price. This should be a self-evident principle to under-

pin fair trading that will best suit both parties. However, some of the suggestions being discussed for the mandatory code may have unintended consequences.

The first is a requirement for indicative prices on 30 September, and for all dispute resolution to be completed by 3 October. There is value in providing an early indication to growers about the grape price, but there is likely to be a downside. The earlier a grape buyer must issue a price, the less certain that price can be, and the greater likelihood it will be conservative. If an early price notification must be binding, it will be a very conservative price to avoid the buyer suffering a loss. If it is not binding, the value of that offer to growers is questionable.

The suggestions that price disputes must be concluded by 31 October means that the price must be finalised before grapes have even been formed on the vine. How can a grower be accurately rewarded for the value of their fruit before the fruit quality is known?

The result is likely to be a 'commoditisation' of wine grapes, where price is issued based on the variety, and with little if any regard for quality attributes of that fruit. Such a system may be workable for growers under long-term contractual arrangements, but might have the potential to remove the potential to encourage or reward the production of higher-value wine grapes.

The likely outcome if such measures are implemented is to see less fruit being purchased under the security of a multi-year contract, greater emphasis on the purchase of fruit on the annual or 'spot' market, and wine grapes being treated more like a homogeneous commodity. With sales of commercial fruit declining, in a high-cost country such as Australia, our wine industry should be moving toward increasing value, rather than imposing measures that may limit value or reducing contractual security for grape growers.

I have read some very inaccurate and unfair comments about grape grower representation. As someone who has served at regional and national level representing grape growers, I have experienced first hand the time and commitment that this entails, without being paid for the time that it takes. Those being critical of the people who are spending their time and effort on peak bodies should be asked the question: "what have you done to represent growers?" Have these people offered input to the representative bodies so that their voice is heard? Have they offered to serve on grower committees? Have they removed unprofitable vineyards, or are they waiting for other growers to do so? Do they pay industry levies to the operation of their representative organisations before criticising them? Do they take on the responsibility of monitoring the wine grape

and bulk wine market to guide their business decisions? Or are they just complaining and asking others to solve their problems for them?

Ultimately the value paid for wine grapes is going to be set by the market. There is no argument that commercial trades should be underpinned by legal protection if needed to ensure fair trading terms.

There are growers and winemakers who are showing that it is not only possible, but economical to produce good-quality grapes and wine. The challenge is to transition the Riverland wine industry to transition to a lower volume, higher-value model so that all

stakeholders are sustainable in every sense.

However, it is unlikely that bringing in a mandatory code of conduct will make a big enough difference to return profitability to the sector. I agree with the comments made by Tony Pasin that claims that a mandatory code of conduct will on its own return the industry to profit risks giving people false hope and removes the recognition that difficult decisions need to be made and delay the change that could eventually benefit everyone. These are issues that demand informed and pragmatic decisions, not just emotive and divisive rhetoric.

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# SA electricity prices set to surge again?

A SENIOR Riverland politician says potential increases to local electricity bills will add to cost-of-living pressures on families.

The Australian Energy Regulator (AER) last week announced increases for the draft Default Market Offer (DMO) electricity values, going from 2.5 per cent up to 8.9 per cent for 2025-26, representing a price hike for up to \$121 for households, and \$355 for small businesses.

The DMO is a price set by the Australian Energy Regulator as the minimum value electricity companies can charge customers.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the cost increase would add financial pressure for Riverlanders.

"Many people and families in our region are struggling with the increasing pressures of the cost of living and are facing the highest electricity prices in the country," Mr Whetstone said.

"These electricity prices are placing significant strain on households as well as on our horticultural and agricultural industries, which have high power demands."

"In some cases, the cost of electricity required to pump water has become so high that growers are no longer seeing any financial benefits from irrigation efficiencies."

"South Australians deserve to know how the Labor Government both State and Federal, will address the spiralling cost of power, which will help reduce our everyday cost of living."

Liberal Morphett MP Stephen Patterson said the decision will negatively affect South Australian households and businesses.

"It's a wait that's becoming all too painful, especially in light of the Australian Energy Regulator's announcement," Mr Patterson said.

"South Australians remain in the dark, waiting for a plan to ease the burden of soaring residential power prices."

"In simple terms, as of 1 July, South Australians will have to fork out more of their hard-earned dollars just to keep the lights on - pushing already struggling families and small businesses to the brink."

According to Mr Patterson, residential consumers can expect a "5 per cent rise to their power bills and small business owners a rise of 6.6 per cent on July 1".

"This comes at a time when relief is what people are desperately needing - yet all Labor is doing is sitting on their hands without a plan," he said.

"This is the fourth Default Market Offer report released by the Australian Energy Regulator under the current government and over this time power bills have gone up by as much as \$804, or 40 per cent."

"Under the previous government, power bills were reduced by nearly 19 per cent for residential consumers, and 18 per cent for small businesses."

"The Opposition has repeatedly called on the current government to reveal its plan to reduce power prices and ease the cost-of-living burden on South Australians."

Energy and Mining Minister Tom Koutsantonis said the energy regulator's draft DMO "sees South Australia shielded from higher price increases experienced in other jurisdictions".

"The State Government is disappointed

to see the significant gains of last year's final DMO wound back, and will continue to work with the AER to advocate for the best-possible offer when the regulator hands down its final determination later this year," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"The draft DMO is just that - a draft - but the proposed increase in SA compares to between 7.8 per cent and 8.9 per cent increases for residential customers across other states, where small business costs increase by up to 8.2 per cent."

"Given power prices are lower in jurisdictions that own their energy infrastructure, it is clear South Australians have been let down as successive Liberal governments have sold off our state-owned generation, making South Australians susceptible to Australia-wide price increases."

"The best way to ensure lower energy prices is policy certainty at a national level, which would encourage private investment and ensure greater competition in the market, particularly for low-cost renewables and firming gas."

Mr Koutsantonis mentioned the cost of gas as a firming agent remains high, and is driving up costs generally.

"The State Government has introduced a Firm Energy Reliability Mechanism (FERM), whereby long-duration firm capacity generators annually tender for contracts that underwrite a portion of their revenue," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"This framework will support sufficient long-duration firm capacity to ensure secure, reliable and resilient electricity supply for South Australia, at least-cost to consumers."



## Environmental focus for new community grants

Conducted by Share the Dignity in 2024, The Bloody Big Survey has highlighted the hardships faced by everyday Australians, quantified in alarming statistics, finding 64 per cent of respondents have had difficulty purchasing period products due to cost.

"Our mission has always been to ensure that no one has to go without period products, but the reality is that demand is growing faster than we can meet it," Share the Dignity founder and managing director Rochelle Courtney said.

"No woman, girl or person who menstruates should have to experience the indignity of having to substitute period products."

SA volunteer Bridy Bartsch said "all products donated in the Riverland will often stay in the region".

"Share the Dignity partner with local organisations and charities already operating in the area, and deliver the donated products to be given to their clients," she said.

Ms Bartsch encouraged Riverlanders to donate to the cause, and consider volunteering their time to Share the Dignity.

"Currently, the Riverland only has three active volunteers," she said.

"The more people talking about the cause, donating, and able to service the donation boxes (means) the more people we can help."

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

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## New state knife laws successfully pass

**The safety of the community is a top priority...**

NEW state-wide knife reforms have been passed in South Australia, covering the Riverland, expanding police search powers, banning the sale of knives to minors and establishing strict requirements regarding knife storage.

State Parliament recently passed the new knife laws, with additional statistics confirming South Australia has the lowest youth crime rate in the nation.

Developed after extensive consultation with SAPOL and the general public, the reforms, allow:

- Police to carry out wand searches at declared shopping centres, declared public transport hubs and on public transport.
- Police to have the power to conduct wand searches at any time at all licenced premises.
- Police to carry out wand searches for up to six hours at any public place where there are reasonable grounds to believe an incident of violence or disorder may take place in the area, and that the exercise of powers is reasonably necessary to prevent the incident.
- Police to carry out wand searches in public places of any person who was a member of a criminal organisation within the previous five years or who has been found guilty of certain offences in the previous five year.
- The sale of knives to all minors to be banned.
- Police to prosecute those who supply knives to minors, where the supplier either knew or ought to have known the knife would be used in an offence.
- Sellers of certain types of knives to be required to ensure they are securely locked up or tethered and all sellers of all knives to be required to display notices prohibiting the sale of knives to minors.

Attorney-General Kyam Maher said "these are comprehensive law reforms that will help authorities better tackle knife crime and maintain community safety for all South Australians".

"The safety of the community is a top priority for this government, and we are committed to ensuring our state has strong and effective laws," Mr Maher said.

"That is demonstrated with a falling offender rate, and a 17 per cent drop in youth offending, with our rate lower than any other

state in the nation."

Offences that involve carrying and using knives at schools and public places were expanded and now includes childcare centres, kindergartens, preschools, universities, TAFE Campuses and places of worship.

Statistics gathered by the Recorded Crime-Offenders show a drop in the young offender's rate and the number of overall offenders in South Australia.

These statistics confirm a 17 per cent decrease compared to the 2023-24 numbers, with 1812 youth offenders aged between 10 and 17 years old.

South Australia has 1028 youth offenders per 100,000 people aged between 10 and 17 years, significantly lower than the national average of 1764 youth offenders per 100,000 people aged between 10 and 17 years.

The young offender rate is now half of what it was under the Marshall Liberal Government when it was 2072 in 2018-19.

The ABS figures confirm a 4 per cent drop in the overall number of offenders in South Australia, with the overall offender rate falling from 1575 to 1487 offenders per 100,000 people.

One of the bikes was a black Avoca Quake Neon pushbike, and the other had a black frame with a white and red Cyclops logo and a white seat.

## Tougher laws introduced for South Australian repeat offenders

REPEATING young criminal offenders, including those in the Riverland, will get tougher bail and sentencing laws under a new plan aiming to help break the cycle of re-offending across the state.

The State Government recently announced a new Young Offenders Plan, with measures set to ensure the recidivist young offender scheme is fit for purpose when it comes to serious repeat offenders.

Key elements of the plan include:

- Toughening bail laws for serious repeat young offenders.
- Strengthening penalties for young offenders with extensive criminal histories.
- Cracking down on youth street gangs by giving police greater powers similar to what they have for Outlaw Motor Cycle Gangs.
- A \$3m investment in programs to support young offenders to break the cycle of re-offending.

A \$3m investment in intervention programs targeting young people in this cohort will be made to offer a last-resort chance for offenders at risk of entering the adult justice system.

Attorney-General Kyam Maher said "in South Australia, we are fortunate to have one of the lowest rates of youth offenders in the nation, behind only the ACT".

"South Australia police have made clear there's a small cohort of young people who are responsible for a greater proportion of youth offending in SA," Mr Maher said.

"This is why action is needed to ensure we are dealing with this issue."

"An increased investment in rehabilita-

tion and intervention will help ensure we can break the cycle of offending where possible, while tougher penalties will send a clear message to those unwilling to engage that there will be serious consequences if they continue down this path."

Mr Maher will convene a roundtable with stakeholders to discuss appropriate responses and interventions for serious repeat young offenders who fail to respond to more general interventions and sentencing outcomes.

Over the past financial year, just 20 young

people were responsible for roughly 11 per cent of all matters before the Youth Court, with advice from South Australia Police indicating that a small cohort of repeat offenders are responsible for a disproportionate rate of offending.

A review of the Bail Act will also be referred to the South Australian Law Reform Institute to assess its practical operation and role in the criminal justice system, and to see if it is balancing the rights of an accused with the safety of the community.



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# A rural doctor's advice for keeping healthy while travelling

RURAL doctors have recently collaborated to share tips for elderly Riverlanders, detailing how to stay safe while travelling.

"Summer is coming to an end and the annual migration of 'Grey Nomads' (over 55-year-old travellers) north is well underway," Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) president Dr Raymond Lewandowski said.

"With tens of thousands making their way across the country at any one time it's vital that they understand the potential limitations of amenities and availability in rural and remote areas."

"Particularly if this is someone's first time, the lack of phone reception, after-hours health and pharmacy services, and access to fuel, food and water retailers can come as a shock."

"Many Grey Nomad has had to present to Emergency at a rural hospital because they have run out of an important medication. Many are also brought in to hospitals by ambulances after a medical incident, a vehicle accident or a slip and fall."

Tips before 'heading out', include:

Have a thorough health check with your doctor and bring a copy of your notes if you have any conditions that other doctors

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may need to know about.

- Fill the prescriptions you require before you go and have a plan in place for refilling them. Many remote towns are without immediate access to full-service pharmacies.
  - Check any medication you have for storage instructions. The outback heat can be intense and the temperature inside a van or car may rise beyond the recommended levels for safe storage.
  - Have a dental and optical check.
  - Take a first aid course and pack a fully equipped first-aid kit.
  - Take out Ambulance Cover. Medicare does not cover many emergency medical transport costs, so ambulance cover is needed to protect from unexpected costs.
  - Keep track of where the nearest emergency doctor or pharmacy is located.
- Tips for when travelling, include:
- Stay connected: mobile phone coverage can be limited. A portable satellite internet or phone service can save lives.
  - Prepare and plan your trip: it is extremely common for people to misjudge the fuel availability and opening hours in remote areas. Running out of fuel can leave you trapped on the side of the road for many hours. Make sure you have additional fuel and water with you at all times.
  - Stay safe around your van: install a reversing camera and keep the maintenance up to date, carry an extra spare tyre, and install appropriate breakaway and stability systems.
  - Driver training: make sure both of you can drive your vehicle/trailer. If something happens to the lone driver, it can be very expensive to ship your RV home.
  - If you are having a big driving day, ensure you stop every two hours to take a break from driving and to get the circulation going in your legs.
- "It is fantastic that so many retirees are enjoying exploring this great country of ours, we just want to see them as safe and healthy as possible while they are doing it," Dr Lewandowski said.
- "If you need health care, our doctors are highly skilled and ready to assist, but we don't really want you to have to get to know us in an emergency department. So plan well and make good choices to stay as safe as you can on the road."



## Will more money for Medicare bulk billing work in the Riverland?

THE Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) said the Federal Government's announced investment in Medicare and GP training will assist more Riverland patients to access affordable care.

RDAA president Raymond Lewandowski said any investment in health was welcome, especially investment in primary care, and he hoped to see an increase in the number of rural patients able to be bulk billed after November.

"All rural doctors want to provide affordable health care to our patients" Dr Lewandowski said.

"Unfortunately, the reality of providing the complex care needed to patients in rural and remote communities, who simply do not have easy or affordable access to other health care professionals, means that rural GPs have to provide advanced and complex care that is outside the scope of most urban GP practices.

"Longer consultations and increased services (such as surgical and mental health care) adds significant cost to the running of a rural GP practice. These practices are more often than not small, family-owned businesses, that already bulk bill as many disadvantaged patients as they possibly can."

"The expansion of the bulk billing incentive to include all patients, not just children under 16 and concession card holders, means that for some practices bulk billing will be able to be extended to more patients in need."

"It will be particularly helpful for doctors who already bulk bill patients who do not qualify for the

incentive but are struggling to afford appointments, with the gap being subsidised by the GP practice. Additional funding for these patients will be extremely welcome for the doctors who otherwise provide this care at a reduced rate."

Dr Lewandowski said "there have been many reviews and reform recommendations that are sitting with the Federal Department of Health to put forward to Government".

"To really address the issues plaguing our health system, particularly in rural and remote areas, practices need to have other models of funding available to them – not just fee-for-service," he said

"The changes to bulk billing are a continuation of the same funding framework that we know is no longer fit for purpose. We worry that the current suite of reform recommendations already on the table will be overshadowed by the bulk billing changes and will result in a missed opportunity for longer lasting and more-effective reform."

"With the Coalition matching the Medicare announcement, the new policy will come into effect in November regardless of which party wins government at the next election."

"We are having active discussions with Rural Doctors Association members across a range of rural and remote medical practices to better understand how this incentive could be applied, and in what settings it may or may not be financially beneficial."

"For practices that do bulk bill or have a significantly high rate of bulk billing, these changes will present welcome additional investment into the prima-

ry care services they provide. Aboriginal Medical Services in particular will benefit due to the exclusive bulk billing model they have adopted, and that is a much-needed uplift in funding support."

Dr Lewandowski said "there have been many reviews and reform recommendations that are sitting with the Federal Department of Health to put forward to Government".

"To really address the issues plaguing our health system, particularly in rural and remote areas, practices need to have other models of funding available to them – not just fee-for-service," he said

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# NAPLAN underway for students

RIVERLAND students began the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) testing last week.

NAPLAN is held in schools across Australia each year, including 715 sites in South Australia in 2025, with students in years 3, 5, 7 and 9 taking part in online testing.

NAPLAN helps evaluate whether young people are reaching important numeracy and literacy goals and is tailored to each year level, to assess skills in writing, reading, spelling, grammar, punctuation and numeracy.

This year the NAPLAN testing period will end on 24 March.

It is the third year the test will be held in term 1, after it was moved from May to March, in 2023.

The move ensures NAPLAN results are made available earlier in the year to better inform teaching and learning programs, and helps

teachers assess what support students may need in the coming year.

Preliminary results in all domains except writing will be provided to schools about four weeks after the test period ends.

Tips to help students manage anxiety during the testing include:

- Encouraging children to take their time and read each question carefully.
- Ensuring they have a good sleep the night before.
- Having a healthy breakfast in the morning.

“NAPLAN is an important measure for teachers and parents to see how students are progressing,” Minister for Education, Training, and Skills Blair Boyer said.

“It’s a way where we can identify if any extra supports need to put in place, or if students need to be extended in certain areas.

“NAPLAN can seem daunting to our year 3, 5, 7, and 9 students, but all we

ask, is they try their best.

“NAPLAN results have remained fairly consistent year on year, with some promising trends starting to emerge from our numeracy focus.

“In the past, it’s not been possible for NAPLAN results to be used in the same school year as a way to help shape a student’s education moving forward.

“By moving the test earlier in the year, schools can identify what supports students might need and put them in place during that same school year.

To support our students and teachers, we are introducing a comprehensive plan to improve our schools, including implementing the Mathematics Improvement Strategy, as well as investing \$50m into mental health and wellbeing, which is important to seeing every South Australian student achieve their academic potential.”

## State leads the way in heartfelt care

A SOUTH Australian pilot program for families impacted by congenital or childhood onset heart disease (CoHD) will be available to Riverlanders as an online initiative in partnership with children's heart charity, HeartKids.

With a \$1m State Government investment, HeartKids has been able to significantly expand vital services for families impacted by CoHD in South Australia, including the Better Beginnings pilot program, comprehensive mental health support, enhanced regional support services, and targeted early childhood intervention programs.

The HeartKids' Better Beginnings pilot program provides early intervention for children from birth to four-years-old with CoHD, or at risk of neurodevelopmental delays, supporting the child's developmental journey and empowering parents with the tools and knowledge to foster growth at home.

Due to the success of the pilot program in SA, Better Beginnings is rolling out nationally as an online program across the next 12 months, and will reach more than 1500 families impacted by CoHD in Australia.

The SA Government's investment means that South Australian families are also able to

utilise face-to-face care including visits with occupational therapists and play therapy as part of Better Beginnings.

Around 50 families in South Australia are currently involved in the Better Beginnings program, with this to grow to around 200 families as the program expands in SA.

The national program will include monthly online educational workshops and local playgroups led by mentors with lived experience, reducing the isolation often felt by families managing complex medical needs and creating safe spaces for children to develop social skills.

“This funding has set the groundwork to improve vital services for these kids and their families,” Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

“Once again, South Australia is leading the way in innovative care that provides parents and children with the foundation and support they need.

“Thanks to our government funding and the incredible work of HeartKids, children and families across the nation will now have access to the same level of family-centred support being offered right here in SA.”

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# A longer-term investment in training needed

The Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) said training an extra 200 rural doctors per year is needed to start addressing the shortage of doctors in rural and remote communities like the Riverland.

RDAA president Raymond Lewandowski said additional rural generalist (RG) training places were a key election ask for the association.

"There have been some great developments and investment in rural generalist training which has generated a growing interest in rural generalism as a medical career," Dr Lewandowski said.

"Over the past two years the number of RG training positions funded by the Commonwealth has actually been oversubscribed and the colleges providing the training have been permitted to fund additional positions on a temporary basis.

"To build on this momentum we need to lock in these training places with secure funding over the next three years to ensure the security and sustainability of these training numbers.

"RDAA is calling for an additional 200 RG training places. This would go a long way toward developing the future medical workforce to meet the health service needs of Australian rural and remote communities, fill the gap created by the ageing rural medical workforce, and accommodate the growing need for more flexibility in working hours and on-call obligations.

"At a cost of \$60m over three years, this investment would pay dividends to Australia for decades to come

"Both of the GP training Colleges, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) and the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM), are also asking for additional positions. Security of this funding would enable the colleges to develop and sustain their training capacity at the required level, as well as give junior doctors and medical students confidence in their future training and career ambitions."

Dr Lewandowski said "additional training positions also requires additional supervision from within the existing GP and RG workforce, so an increase in funding for these supervisors is also needed".

"Training a doctor is like an appren-

ticeship," he said.

"Much of the training is provided on the job by senior doctors who take junior doctors into their practice to train and mentor. As we increase the number of trainees, the demands on the time of their supervisors also increases, so RDAA is calling for an additional \$40m to be invested in supervisor support.

"Rural general practices are essential to the delivery of health care to rural and remote Australians, in both the community and hospital settings.

"They are also mostly small businesses, owned and run by the senior doctors who work in them. We need to ensure that the senior doctors who also supervise are well supported to facilitate training and that increasing their training load does not undermine the viability of their business.

"Flexible supervision models are needed and the GPs providing supervision must be fairly remunerated so that quality and supportive training experiences can be provided in a financially sustainable way.

"The allocation of new and existing funding for training positions to the colleges or into programs should not be solely based on process but also be directed in response to measured success in delivering doctors with the right skills beyond the training years into real rural locations.

"Additional support should be available for senior doctors who are actually training registrars and junior doctors in real rural and remote locations. The Department of Health needs to be measuring the success of programs and investing funds accordingly.

"RDAA flagged all of these points in our recent meetings with Minister for Health Mark Butler, Assistant Minister for Rural Health Emma McBride, Opposition Leader Peter Dutton and Shadow Minister for Health Anne Ruston. We hope they recognise that these proposals will deliver doctors to the areas that need them most, and that we see commitments in line with our proposals made by both sides of government in the leadup to the election.

"RDAA has developed a five-point plan for better health care for rural Australians, and we are going to keep making sure it is front and centre over the coming months."



## Urgent warning about button batteries

AN urgent warning is being issued to Riverland parents about the dangers of button batteries following a spike in seriously injured children treated at the Women's and Children's Hospital.

Two children have so far this year been taken to the hospital requiring emergency oesophageal surgery and multiple follow-up surgeries to treat complications from swallowing button batteries.

That compares to two children in total for the whole of 2023, and three children for all of last year.

Across Australia, 20 children will go to hospital every week with a suspected button battery ingestion, with cases more common during gift-giving periods such as Christmas and Easter.

Button batteries are extremely dangerous for children, causing quick, serious and life-threatening burns if swallowed or inserted into the body. Experts warn that once swallowed, a battery can burn through a child's oesophagus in less than two hours.

Children can also develop life-threatening bleeding, as well as infections, sepsis and injuries to critical parts of their chest.

Some children require admission into the paediatric intensive care unit and may even be placed on life support to help treat complications. Long term, injuries from button battery ingestions can prevent some children from eating normally ever again.

Children under the age of

four are at the highest risk of death, while the peak age for ingestion is children between the ages of one and two.

Parents and carers are reminded to stay vigilant and keep all batteries out of reach of children.

Doctors warn that ingestions are sometimes unwitnessed and symptoms often appear vague, delaying diagnosis and treatment.

Parents should look out for symptoms like chest pain, coughing, vomiting, trouble swallowing, food refusal and abdominal pain.

However, experts warn sometimes there may be no symptoms at all. Importantly, parents avoid waiting for symptoms to develop before seeking help.

"Button batteries are small, but they are a huge danger to young children," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"Already this year we've seen two kids with serious injuries from swallowing button batteries, requiring major surgeries at the Women's and Children's Hospital.

"It's incredibly important that we educate South Australians about the damage these batteries can do. Children are attending our hospitals with significant injuries to the oesophagus, chest, and stomach.

"Button batteries can look appealing to young children, so we remind parents to stay vigilant and seek immediate help if their child has swallowed any battery."

Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels said "button batteries should be stored like any other poison – securely out of the reach of children."

"We are currently seeing a concerning rise in button battery ingestions, with clinicians having to perform incredibly invasive surgeries to save lives," she said.

"We don't want to see another death in Australia."

"If you suspect your child may have swallowed a battery, please don't wait – quick action is critical."

In the event of a suspected button battery ingestion, families should immediately call the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26. Children should not be given food or drink, and parents should not try to induce vomiting.

Parents are reminded that button batteries are still found in many household items, including watches, remotes, calculators, thermometers and musical cards. Items containing batteries should be kept out of reach of children and old batteries should be disposed of immediately and safely.

# Waikerie Probus hears from local Parkrunners

BEING mentally and physically active helps people enjoy life, experience fun and friendship. That was reinforced at the Waikerie and District Ladies Probus Club's February meeting, when guests Sandie Canney, Penny Moon and Jo Bevan visited.

Sandie explained how Parkrun, a worldwide, free community event, where participants of all ages walk, jog, run, volunteer, or spectate, started in England in 2004.

There are now approximately nine million registered participants, in around 2300 events, with 500 locations in Australia alone, including Waikerie.

People register once, get their own individual barcode, and can then participate at any Parkrun event. It is not competitive, though records are kept as some people record their personal bests.

There is a set 5km track. Waikerie's is at the wetlands, starting on Leonard Norman Drive, and finishing along Hart Lagoon.

Every Saturday has a 7.50am briefing, and 8am start. Sandie, Penny, and Jo regularly traverse the track to ensure everything is okay, and there is a tail walker each time to ensure everyone has finished.

Support from the Loxton Waikerie council and Men's Shed has been invaluable, with track maintenance and upgrades, start-up costs and a defibrillator. Future plans include a storage shed and shelter.

Participants go out for a coffee and chat at the various local cafes after. Both the official Parkrun and Waikerie websites are very informative if anyone wants to know more.

After morning tea, Dr Kellis Mibus spoke about fall prevention and bone density. She reminded members that all age groups are at risk of falls, so avoiding or preventing haz-

ards, like wet or slippery floors, uneven surfaces, clutter in and around homes, including children's toys, electrical cords along floors, rugs or mats that don't lie flat or still, and poor lighting, makes sense.

Health impacts the severity and time needed for recovery. People with heart problems, fever, vertigo, poor balance, diabetes, various sensory issues, limited muscle strength or mobility suffer the most, while losing independence and mobility negatively impacts mental health.

Building muscular strength, wearing sturdy shoes, having eyesight and medical conditions checked regularly, using handrails or walking aids, wearing an alert device, being aware of conditions around you, and fixing conditions mentioned above are advisable, as is checking in on vulnerable people.

Bone tissue becoming weak and brittle, as both women and men age, can lead to osteoporosis.

Symptoms are uncommon until a bone is broken, and factors that contribute to the problem include: having a history of falls, liver or kidney disease, early menopause, reduced body weight, vitamin D deficiency, smoking, steroid use, consuming more than two standard alcoholic drinks a day, parental bone breaking history, breast cancer medication, and reduced physical activity.

Prevention includes having bone density scans, doing weight-bearing exercises, walking, jogging, climbing stairs, swimming, playing tennis, dancing, or joining Parkrun.

Eating protein-rich food, taking Vitamin D daily (one with calcium is good), getting outside for 5 to 10 minutes in summer, and a bit longer in winter, all help. Physiotherapists can assist with exercise programs and no

referral is needed. A doctor's referral is needed for a bone density scan, which can be done via the mobile van or radiologist services.

In severe cases, Prolia injections may be necessary, requiring strict medical supervision and are best started after any required dental work is complete.

The club's next activity will be the Riverland Probus Bowls Day, in Waikerie,

on 20 March.

The next meeting will be the club's AGM, followed by guest speaker, ex-policeman, Dave Miller, regarding life and work experiences.

This will be held on Tuesday 25 March, at 10am, at the Waikerie Bowling Club. Visitors are welcome, and a \$2 donation for morning tea is requested.

## Report reveals child protection challenges

A GREATER focus on support is needed to help decrease the number of young South Australians – including those in the Riverland – from entering out-of-home care, according to a new major report.

The SA Guardian for Children and Young People last month published its 2025 Child Protection in South Australia report, providing a critical analysis of the state's child protection system.

The total number of children in care increased by 0.7 per cent in 2023-24. Analysis found significant concerns remain regarding children's placement stability, with 13.3 per cent of children who were in care for two or more years and exited in 2023-24 experiencing more than 10 placements, up from the previous year's figure of 12 per cent.

Guardian Shona Reid said the figure "reflected how tumultuous many years in care can be for a child".

"At times, I see a child's care journey interrupted so often by poor placement matching, inconsistent service responses or inability to access desperately needed services, that I wonder if we are truly acting in their best interests, or are we just adding to the list of people who let them down?" Ms Reid said.

"I truly look forward to the time where we shift away from reactive interven-

tion and meaningfully move towards greater focus on preventative supports and in investing in growing children well when they do enter care.

"The government must act now to ensure that children and young people grow up where it is best for them to do so, where they are loved, cherished and become all they can be."

"This is something every parent wants for their child, and it should be no different for children who are in out-of-home care. It's their right and they deserve it."

Data also showed there was a 3.7 per cent increase in the number of children being placed in residential care between 2023 and 2024.

Other areas of concern identified by The Guardian include:

□ A stark difference in NAPLAN results for children in care compared to their peers, with 21.5 per cent of children in care achieving 'strong' or 'exceeding' numeracy proficiency, compared to 61.8 per cent of all children.

□ The total number of children in care grew from 4882 to 4915 – a 0.7 per cent rise. While the growth rate has slowed,

South Australia remains out of step with the national trend, which saw a decrease in care numbers.

□ The growing use of third-party orders to transfer guardianship away from the state raises concerns over reduced oversight and the long-term outcomes for affected children.

□ A \$3.2m decrease in Protective Intervention Service funding to assess, investigate and respond to suspect child abuse and neglect.

The proportion of Aboriginal children in out-of-home care also remains disproportionately high, with one-in-11 Aboriginal children in South Australia currently in care.

Ms Reid said this data failed to reflect a system that is fundamentally improving outcomes for children and young people in the out-of-home care system.

# U3A Riverland marks 10 years of learning

A MILESTONE was celebrated at the well-attended AGM of U3A (University of the Third Age) Riverland on 7 March 2025.

The meeting was held in the Len Mahoney room of the Berri Barmera Council, the venue used for the 20 November 2014 public meeting held to gauge interest in the formation of a branch of U3A in the Riverland.

Founding member Diana March recalled the nervous anticipation of the steering committee, who won-

dered if people would support such an organisation.

"We hesitantly put out 30 chairs believing that we would be lucky to attract that much interest," Ms March said.

"We hastily added more and more, feeling really overwhelmed when more than 100 people attended to hear about what a U3A branch might offer."

U3A is an international adult education movement catering to semi-retired and retired members

of the community.

First established in Toulouse, France in 1972, this volunteer-run organisation, with a motto of "Staying active: mentally, physically and socially", spread quickly.

The steering committee of the Riverland branch worked closely with U3A SA to become incorporated and be ready to deliver learning activities in February 2015.

Five activities were offered in the first term. Ten years on and more than 70 activities have been scheduled, ranging from art and artificial intelligence to croquet, family history, languages, and yoga, with everything in between.

With 154 current members and new activities being scheduled each term, the community has certainly embraced life-long learning in a fun and relaxed environment. When asked what people found most valuable about their involvement with U3A, many commented on making new friendships and engaging with people they would never ordinarily have met.

Being a whole-of-Riverland organisation, activities are held in the various towns, but the headquarters are based centrally on Strawbridge Street, in Berri.

The longest-running activity, and the first cab off the rank in

February 2015, is art. With registered interest from over 40 people, this group has held a number of high-quality exhibitions showcasing attendees' works. The most recent, held during Rose Festival in October 2024, was very successful with a number of artists selling their art.

Tai Chi has run for a number of years, as has German conversation, Mahjong, Bridge, book club and writing for pleasure. Some 'one-off' activities have included wine appreciation, astronomy, belly dancing and yeast cookery.

An award, in recognition of 10 years of continuous service on the committee, was presented to both Shirley Sims and Tony Guster, by Ms March. Shirley has been treasurer and looked after membership during this period, and Tony has sought funds through grants to enable the purchase of essential items, such as air conditioning and it equipment. He is currently the president of U3A Riverland, and ran a successful course in Family History.

Volunteer organisations rely on the generosity of members' time and the participants at the AGM acknowledged this commitment by the many tutors and committee members, over the past 10 years.

WELL, the first two months of the year are over and the local gardens have suffered from the heat.

No amount of water has stopped some of my plants from becoming burnt – I need to look at a few hardier ones – however the back garden looks good as it received some afternoon shade.

Don't be tempted to cut back damaged leaves, as we still have more hot weather to come. Cutting back will promote new growth, which will be too tender to cope with our extreme heat.

#### Early autumn

You can spend time staying cool and ordering your spring bulbs, but don't be tempted to plant them until early winter. Some bulbs such as daffodils, tulips and hyacinth can benefit from time in the fridge before planting.

Place in a paper bag and then into the crisper. Don't forget to label and date them for future reference.

#### Plantings

When we eventually get a cool change you can plant out anything you have nurtured in pots over summer into a garden bed.

I have some herbs awaiting a more permanent spot in my garden.

I have prepared the soil with compost, aged manure and a little fertiliser forked in and am

planning on using a seaweed solution to help the plants adjusting to the transplant shock.

#### Annuals

Winter and spring annuals can be planted at the same time, treating the soil as mentioned above.

Pansies and viola will give a long display over winter. If you grew them last year you may be lucky enough to get some self-sown plants.

Primula are easy to grow but need some shade.

Saint Patrick's Day, on 17 March, is the traditional date to plant sweet peas. Any time after that date can be successful.

Add a little lime when preparing the soil. Remember after planting the seed not to water again until the shoots appear.

It is a good time to prune

some plants, but as above wait until cooler weather is forecast.

Some plants that will benefit from an autumn prune are ivy pelargonium, fuchsia, salvias, plectranthus, and justicaria, as well as some woody shrubs like weigela, Amelia camellia and hydrangea, which can be potted up as they strike well.

A light prune and fertilise of roses will see an autumn flush. In our hot, dry area, roses have larger flowers with brighter colours in autumn if treated this way. I think the heat this year has bleached some colour from them.

Dahlias can be given a feed of high-phosphorus fertiliser to keep them blooming a bit longer, and canna can also benefit from this treatment.

#### Vegetables

Dig in lots of organic material where you had summer veggies.

your plants healthy using natural products:

- Give plants a dose of calcium by watering with cooled boiled egg water.
- Egg shells can be ground and sprinkled on the soil for the same result. Especially good for sweet peas.
- Coffee improves soil. Collect the grounds from your favourite shop and water in well.
- Use the water you cooked rice in to promote healthy roots, especially in pot plants. Remember to cool first.
- Banana peel is an excellent fertiliser. They can be soaked in water and applied as a liquid.

Until next time, remember to care for yourself as well as your garden.

Slip, slop, slap, protect your eyes and also wear gloves.

**Barmera-based grape grower JASON PERRIN has provided the following opinion piece regarding debate surrounding the potential for a MANDATORY CODE OF CONDUCT in the wine industry...**

# An honest conversation about grape industry issues

I COMMEND Barker MP Tony Pasin for his thoughts in last week's Murray Pioneer ('An honest conversation about wine', 12/5/25). As his heading was "An honest conversation...", I would make these comments.

It is great that he supports the need for a mandatory code of conduct.

He mentioned someone suggesting a mandatory code would be a silver bullet for the industry. He went on to say, "it is disingenuous, bordering on cruel to suggest that it will". 'Disingenuous' means not sincere, dishonest, deceitful, underhand, or pretending to know less than one really does for tricky purposes.

I agree with him. I hope he has educated those few misinformed people, and told them very clearly, that a mandatory code will ultimately benefit growers, depending what is in it, but is not a magic wand or cure-all. He could also point out some previous editions of The Murray Pioneer, in which I have submitted articles emphasising that a mandatory code will not be a magic wand. You could focus on a great thing to be built into the code. An Expert Determination, the decision of which becomes legally binding, and one possible way of achieving better prices in the future for a far wider spectrum of grape growers. The 'silver bullet' notion is a red herring.

Honesty. Mr Pasin quite rightly stated "the reality is, there is a role for government in helping growers through the necessary structural adjustment and governments at state and federal levels have failed to react in time to avoid the worst pain I've witnessed in the Riverland wine industry in my time as Barker MP". Yes, the Morrison government was the catalyst that caused the ulcer of the grape industry to finally burst at the seams, after what I would say was diplomatic incompetence that resulted in the China tariffs.

There has never been a suggestion that a mandatory code will cure all issues, so the global situation directly is not entirely relevant to many things that a mandatory code would /should cover. I and other growers would want to see factual basis for vine removal, and grower exits.

There need to be cold, hard facts at hand before numbers are quoted. That begins with a national vineyard register. I believe Mr Pasin also needs to state his policy on handling the issue of water with grower exits and the ramifications on the two irrigation trusts and water prices for everyone, households included. We saw unsupported notions put forward with around \$260,000 of state government money channelled in to the 10 Year Riverland Wine Blueprint. Remember it? The one that was supposedly based on wide consultation, spouted \$4000 per hectare for vine removal, and a vine removal of up to 7000 hectares, just in the Riverland. Ask genuine long-term growers their ideas, and gather factual data. In the last 25 years, did anyone call for a halt to plantings before we got to this convenient place for wineries with the oversupply?

Wineries don't bear the financial pain of grapes left on the vines, nor do politicians, growers do, with our resulting poverty. Mr Pasin, naturally, in your vine removal notion, you put corporate vineyards at the top of the list for large-scale removals, before the family farms that are, and always have been the backbone of our industry and its regions, with the biggest long-term investment tied up. Make sure that is on the Liberal agenda please. Failure to do so would be, in my opinion, disingenuous and unjust, and a toadying to big business. Canadian, American or British Super fund investments here don't support regional communities like our individual landowners do. Offshore shareholders don't vote for Australian politicians, including you.

Calls for vine removals and grower exits, whether or not to transition to alternative



crops, need to have accurate data to support them, and market research for the alternative crops. The last thing an agricultural industry needs is haphazard crops, possibly resulting in oversupply of crop X, and forcing some existing growers of that alternative crop, out of business. Your suggestions are great in principle, but let's see factual detail, especially how much money a Liberal Government would commit as a pre-election promise to the industry for these purposes. Can you please come up with some specifics for us?

I think anyone who dismisses the need for indicative prices to come out early isn't much of a business person. Grape growers are a business, or we would be, if we could earn an income. If indicative prices came out early this year, there are growers including myself, who would be better placed to know what money to spend, on what varieties. I believe early indicative prices being asked to come out in May, June or July are unreasonable to a winery. I have suggested 30 September, deliberately to be fairer to both wineries and growers. A suggestion that asking for early prices means wineries will put out low prices because they are pressured is little different from what they do now, without pressure. That is why my second interim measure of the Expert Determination, concluded a month later, must be linked to the indicative price announcement.

The global issue is true. But it is changing. The excuse of oversupply will not be able to be used by the industry as a price excuse to secure grapes for next to nothing for much longer, especially with massive vine removal overseas.

An inference by some people, politicians included, that winemakers can't pay anything extra because of their margins and market dictates here and overseas based on bulk wine prices is true to a point, but annoying when there are things like the following. I've heard a winery from outside the region purchased gordos for \$500 per tonne and paid the delivery freight. I receive \$300 per tonne from a local winery, and pay \$17.20 per tonne for a 6km trip to Glossop. Several other wineries are paying \$500 a tonne for shiraz and cabernet. I receive \$160 for shiraz and \$220 for cabernet. A couple of months ago, a grape buyer/agent who also makes wine, said that wineries should all be paying at least \$300 per tonne across the board. Affordable, and necessary to keep the industry stable. And how much would the freight be for tankers bringing grape juice from Western Australia to the Riverland, and the resulting final production cost of the wine made? There must be profit at bulk wine prices for that to happen.

These are some of the murky market things that growers hate. I'm glad you used the word 'disingenuous'. I think it really describes how growers are treated, and the political attention we have received by both major parties for years. I am pleased you want to help us.

Finally, a last concern.

On 6 March, Australian Grape and Wine Inc, the peak national body supposedly representing grape growers as well as winemakers, released this statement.

"Australian Grape and Wine welcomes the release of the report and is carefully considering its recommendations. We note that the Government is yet to respond and is unlikely to do so until the completion of the Grape and Wine Sector Regulatory Impact Analysis led by Dr Craig Emerson, which covers similar issues. This response is not expected before the federal election."

True, but muddying the waters. The Emerson report is not part of the Senate report. Fact check this with the Senate committee. It suggests that the Federal Government will wait for that report. Possibly because of this statement, Wine Grape Council SA (WGCSA), our peak grower body in SA funded by 0.2 per cent of all grapes delivered to any winery, read it and think that the government has to wait for the Emerson report, and then put everything together and decide what to do. It doesn't. But WGCSA will wait and do nothing in the meantime. This will give growers nothing. Doing nothing now is not acceptable. I think it's disingenuous to confuse any relationship of the two reports and their time frames to government. I was advised by two Senators that lobbying from now on is vital.

I think Tim Whetstone, as state member for Chaffey, needs to formally request WGCSA to commence lobbying for the Senate's recommendations as a priority now, not wait for growers to call you.

No politician should use this, or an election, as an excuse that they can't do anything yet. The government still has two months before the election. Everyone, get on with it and earn your money.

□ I call on you, Mr Pasin, to commence actively lobbying for the Senate's recom-

mendations, with the ultimate goal of a mandatory code, and organising a bipartisan working group/task force as soon as possible, before the Federal Election. In opposition, you are our federal representative in the 'alternative government' in our Westminster system, and it's your job to take up the baton as requested by our growers here, whose cause has been vindicated, and supported fully by the Senate of Australia. Being truly concerned about the 'worst pain' you have witnessed in the Riverland wine industry in your time as Barker MP, here's your chance to bring some definite changes.

□ I call on you also to actively lobby John Howard, CEO of the Regional Investment Corporation, to urgently review their criteria and interest rates for true low interest loans, not ones so close to commercial rates. Make it a Liberal agenda election promise to have the current RIC interest rate reduced from over 5 per cent, to maybe 2.5 per cent or less, preferably lobby for an interest-free 12 months, then to no more than 2.5 per cent as a true 'low interest loan'. The Morrison government did this with zero interest for a two-year term. The precedent is there, and it is a 'hand up', not a 'hand out', fitting Liberal philosophy.

□ State as a Liberal election pledge how much money will be allocated to grower exits, crop transitioning and vine removal. Some specifics please. Hollow statements are cruel politics.

□ How to deal with the water issue in a grower exit program, to protect our irrigation trusts.

Please take up these four requests fully on behalf of farmers and grape growers, so you have something concrete to offer us, leading up to the election.

# Councils unite on preventative health

A NEW preventive health partnership has been established to take a collaborative approach to improving the health and wellbeing of people across the Murraylands.

The Murraylands Preventive Health Partnership is a collaborative project involving Mid Murray Council, the District Council of Karoonda East Murray and the Rural City of Murray Bridge.

The councils have also partnered with the Murraylands and Riverland Local Government Association (MRLGA) and Preventive Health SA.

A new preventative health officer role has been created and will be key to delivering the program.

Applications for the role closed on 14 March.

The position will be hosted by Mid Murray Council, and based within its Community Services team at Mannum.

In a joint media release, the organisations involved with the initiative said the program will support the planning, implementation and evaluation of preventive health action and advocacy based on local needs.

The preventive health officer will drive co-ordinated efforts with partners, implementing and evaluating evidence-based preventive health actions to improve the physical, social and mental wellbeing of local communities.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey said the Murraylands Preventive Health Partnership was a shared commitment to creating healthier local communities.

"Council is excited to be part of the Murraylands Preventive Health Partnership, which will create more opportunities for the support of health and well-being across our region," she said.

"Preventive health programs play an important role in improving health outcomes and we believe this program will make a valuable contribution to enhancing the physical, social and mental wellbeing of our communities.

"Projects like this are often difficult for regional councils to achieve on their own, so we welcome the support of the State Government and our project partners.

"We're also looking forward to working with the Murraylands community to determine what areas of health and wellbeing they consider to be the most important for the project focus on."

The Murraylands Preventive Health Partnership builds on insights gained through nine Wellbeing Hubs developed in partnership between the State Government's Preventive Health SA and regional and metropolitan councils over the past four years.

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

# Helping our Riverland clubs get stronger

BUILDING capacity of club and group volunteers without leaving the Riverland is the order of the day for the inaugural Gamechanger event next month.

Held at St Francis of Assisi College in Renmark, on Saturday 5 April, the free event is bringing a wide variety of high-calibre presenters together to upskill volunteers in a one-stop shop for off-field education.

Focusing on topics such as grant writing, succession planning, child safeguarding and social media, the Gamechanger will give locals access to experts without leaving the Riverland and is deliberately placed between summer and winter sport seasons to maximise attendance.

While the event is sport focused, it will also benefit the wider volunteer community who are encouraged to attend.

The Gamechanger is the brainchild of Connected and Active Communities project officer Nick Dillon, who is employed by the three Riverland councils, and is a product of his role that focuses on fostering future leaders, club health checks, facility co-ordination, mental health in clubs, volunteerism,

sport and recreation inclusivity, performance pathways, increasing community events, and addressing barriers to participation.

"For something like this, you'd normally have to travel to Adelaide to get access to this level of speaker, but we've been able to coordinate it all to be held here in the Riverland," Mr Dillon said.

"Clubs and groups in the region are crying out for support when it comes to off-field assistance."

"Volunteers need to jump through so many hoops these days so taking away any barrier to them being involved is vital."

Gamechanger will be held at St Francis of Assisi College, in Renmark, as it is the Riverland's most suitable venue for such an event.

"The facility is world class in terms of its technology and design and provides an opportunity for members of the Riverland community to come see it for themselves" Mr Dillon said.

The event will be held in four areas at the college, with different speakers rotating throughout the day.

Participants have the option of attending the sessions that are relevant to them and do not have to stay the entire day.

They will also benefit from breakout rooms and areas where they can chat further and build relationships with guest speakers and share information with other clubs.

A highlight of the day will be the attendance of Australian winter Olympic speed skating gold medalist Steven Bradbury.

"I'm absolutely thrilled to have Steven at the Gamechanger to share his story of perseverance and inspire our crowd of volunteers," Mr Dillon said.

"His exploits at the 2002 Winter Olympics are well known, but his backstory of how he got there and the challenges he faced are largely unknown."

"Steven will also hang around for photos with participants with his gold medal."

Having been involved in sporting clubs his whole life, Mr Dillon is aware of the pressures placed on volunteers and has seen first hand what he believes to be best practice through his previous role with SANFL.

"Footy clubs do a lot of things right, but they also have more support than your average sporting club via their state and national bodies," he said.

"Some of the smaller sports just

don't have that support, so it's important in my role that I'm able to assist them to get them where they want to go."

Mr Dillon is excited about the event program and is looking forward to a couple of sessions in particular.

"We get constant questions from clubs about best practice when it comes to grant writing, so I'm rapt to be able to bring Andrew Hamilton from Red Tape Busters in Sydney to the Gamechanger," he said.

"I'm certain clubs will benefit from having access to Andrew's skillset and also the opportunity to build a relationship with him moving forward."

"I also field a lot of questions about using social media as a platform to promote clubs, so having the Riverland's own Emerson Fielke Creative to run sessions for beginners and intermediates will also be valuable."

A feature of the day will be a session on food preparation and safety, led by District Council of Loxton Waikerie's environmental health officer Michelle Jordan.

"With new national food safety standards recently rolled out across the country, it's so important that our clubs are up to date on the 'dos

and don'ts' of food preparation," Mr Dillon said.

"Any club with a canteen, kitchen or even those that run barbeques are encouraged to attend to ensure they are compliant."

The day will also feature a Level 1 Sports Trainers course run by the South Australian Sports Medicine Association (SASMA).

The course will be run at a discounted rate of just \$135, down from the usual \$299.

Clubs are encouraged to get as many people as possible enrolled in this course to ensure knowledge of managing sports injuries and concussions is widespread.

The Gamechanger is proudly brought to you by the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing's Connected and Active Communities project, the three Riverland councils, Nutrien Ag Solutions and St Francis of Assisi College.

Registration is essential and a free lunch will be provided for registered attendees.

# Three in a row for superstar Lakers

FOR the first time in club history, Barmera's division one women's basketball side made it three premierships on the trot on Friday night, against Loxton, at The Precinct.

In what was a rematch of the decider from the previous season, Barmera took home a 15-point win, following a difficult first half.

Barmera's last defeat came 457 days ago, and when Loxton had the jump on the Lakers, leading by seven points midway through the second quarter, an upset was brewing.

However, the Lakers rallied, trimming the margin to one-point by half time, before a 24 to seven-point third term had the visitors in full control.

Barmera head coach Martin Hill said the feeling of another premiership was held in high standard by his group, many of which are now multiple premiership players.

"We had a similar group to the previous season, and at the start

of the season we knew we didn't get many opportunities like this," he said.

"We worked really hard on the track and preparing, and we knew a lot of the other sides in the comp are young teams, so we thought we had the experience to pull it off."

"Pre-game we knew we were going to be challenged, so for us it was about going back to our core principals, and that's about defence."

"We knew if we defended well and controlled the rebounds we would always be in the game, and then our shots started falling."

Barmera won through to the grand final the previous week, defeating Berri in the qualifying final, with the Blazers bounced out on Tuesday night by the Supercats.

Hill said while Berri finished higher than Loxton, he was unsurprised to see the Supercats as his grand final opponent.

"We had Tahlia Dillon travelling back from Adelaide, so a few extra days helped us be refreshed, and just letting Berri and Loxton slug it

out," he said.

"Loxton are still a very good team lead by Bailey (Hahn) and Mackella (Hogan), so I was probably more worried about Loxton than Berri, because they have a few very good offensive players."

"We didn't put a lot of time into preparing for Loxton, because we knew if we did what we've been doing all season, they had to come up with a plan to beat us rather than the other way around."

"We knew if we played well and executed what we'd done all season, we'd be able to get over the line."

Barmera's Shaya Whitbourne finished with Best on Court honours, scoring 11 points, a bulk of which came in the third term when the game flipped on its head.

Dillon top-scored for the Lakers with 12, while youngster Meg Kassulke also scored 11 in an impressive showing.

For Loxton, Hahn fought hard with 13 points, doing everything she could to will her team over the line, while young gun Kiara

Harman finished with 12.

Barmera had three of its players (Whitbourne, Khaleisha Barnett, and Chelsea Wutke) make the all-star five, and Hill said his group is filled with selflessness.

"The good thing about the whole season was having a team where we didn't rely on any one or two players needing to step up to score 15-or-so points," he said.

"Everyone was able to string offensive points together which was a real bonus for us in attack."

"Off the court, they're a really close group, and we made a real focus around sociability with our Monday night dinners after training and other social activities."

"They're a really easy group to coach, and they all get along and have the same focus, and we hardly had any players missing training, so it was an easy job for me to steer that one home."

# Level playing field

**M**ARLEE Silva is a proud Gamaro-Dunghutti woman, sports commentator and self-confessed NRL "tragic".

In a new, intimate documentary, she is on a mission to decode how we can make our nation safer for women by using the power of sport – in particular rugby league – to drive positive social change.

"When I think about having 'skin in the game', it's not just my skin as an individual or my family, but who we are as a community," Silva says of the film's title.

"This is a passionate quest to break down stereotypes and turn the dial."

Marlee is the daughter of league great Rod "Rocket" Silva and has grown up living and breathing all things NRL. She believes rugby league can transform lives – and also highlight some ugly truths of modern society, especially when it comes to violence against women.

Silva talks to some of the game's biggest names – including master coach Phil Gould, superstar Nicho Hynes, NRL Chairman Peter V'landys and NRLW player Lavinia Gould – to work out what the sport she loves can do to be part of the solution.

Revealing the hidden history of women in the game, Silva undertakes a deeply personal

interrogation that reveals why we all have "skin in this game".

"Skin in the Game began as a daunting journey, but even more daunting is the future of our society if we ignore the current culture of violence against women in Australia," she warns.
