High school takes cautious approach to rise in positive cases...

## Covid classroom closures

A RIVERLAND high school has closed year 11 and 12 classes for three days following a "significant" rise in Covid-positive cases among students and staff.

In a statement released on Monday night, Berri Regional

Secondary College principal Emily Griggs informed parents and caregivers of ongoing positive cases and the consequent need for a short "circuit breaker" from Tuesday to Thursday this week.

"Monday morning, I was presented with the information that we had a significant number of cases that came through positive from the weekend," Mrs Griggs said.

"Considering the local contextual information about the number of large community events that happened over the weekend, I was in conversation with the Department for Education and SA Health, and we made the decision together to

put this circuit breaker in place."

The decision for students to return to school this Friday, rather than take the rest of the week off and return Monday, March 28, was directed by the Department and SA Health.

"We don't want to interrupt learning any more than what we need to, and they felt three days was appropriate," Mrs Griggs said.

Explicit teaching will not be provided during the circuit breaker, however Mrs Griggs said year 11 and 12 students were being encouraged to continue with school work at home.

## **Loxton Waikerie council to** 'consider' two-court stadium

A LOCAL council will consider a two-court stadium in Waikerie following a meeting last week.

The Waikerie Sports Centre Working Group presented the two-court option, which Loxton Waikerie council will consider including into the Waikerie Sports Centre Masterplan.

Council will also obtain costs for the two-court design.

However, the original recommendation put forward to council was amended by councillors at Friday's meeting and will now include further investigations.

Council agreed to investigate and cost extending the existing indoor court in the Waikerie Community Sports Centre to meet updated court requirements.

Council also resolved to investigate and cost reroofing the current Waikerie Community Sports Centre for inclusion in the 2022/23 budget.

## Pauline's patch: Sab surprise packet

ONE Nation candidate Sab Feleppa was the surprise packet of the 2022 Chaffey election.

As of yesterday, Mr Feleppa had polled 10.6 per cent of first-preference votes to finish third behind re-elected Liberal Tim Whetstone and Labor's Jo Sutton, despite coming from a standing start, with his party failing to field a local candidate in 2018.

Statewide, Pauline Hanson's party polled just 2.7 per cent of lower house votes, however it only fielded candidates in a selected number of electorates and last fielded a Chaffey candidate in 2002.

Mr Feleppa said he had preelection inkling that he would be strongly supported.

"Everywhere I went I had great backing in Chaffey and across the Riverland," he said.

"I knew I was up against one of the safest seats around the place, but as a learning exercise I think it was a marvellous.

'Thanks to all those people who voted for me and to those who helped out on Saturday."

A regular Riverland visitor for many years via his occupation as a workplace safety expert, Mr Feleppa spent the past fortnight in the region, after recovering from Covid-19. He pledged to

continue his association with One Nation.

"I'm a firm believer in One Nation's policies and have been for many years," he said.

"I've never really been politically minded, but I've had an interest.

"Now that I've seen the twoparty system firsthand, up close, it's more farcical than I thought it was."

Mr Feleppa predicted the upcoming federal election would fall the same way as the SA elec-

"The Liberals have lost their conservative base and they punished (Steven) Marshall in a big way," he said.

"Scott Morrison is of the same ilk and I think he's going to get punished just as badly."

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## Council votes to move forward on Jane Eliza Estate development proposals...

## 'Premium' spots

A RIVERLAND council has moved a step closer to selecting a developer for a large-scale project aimed at constructing "premium" housing, plus new commercial and entertainment outlets.

Renmark Paringa Councillors - at a special meeting held on March 10 – passed a motion to request detailed proposals from selected developers for the Jane Eliza Estate development in Renmark.

A Renmark Paringa spokesperson said the opportunity council is bringing to market would ideally include "780 premium residential allotments, a nationally significant and enlarged marina – with aligned industries – and a new commercial and entertainment precinct".

Council's stated vision for the site is to:

☐ Provide a high-quality mixed-use master planned estate and address current housing supply constraints.

□ Support the long-term population and economic growth opportunities of Renmark, including driving further demand from new residents to relocate to the region.

☐ Facilitate investment in a nationally significant mixed-use marina and marine precinct as a key tourism infrastructure asset.

☐ Deliver a superior level of amenity for the township and surrounding region including high-quality public realm and diverse recreational attractions for both locals and tourists.

☐ Place Renmark Paringa Council in a strong commercial position to further invest in the region's future growth.

It is understood developers have been given approximately 10 weeks to prepare detailed proposals for the project, with council to then consider the proposals over a four-week period.

## **RPC** says trees have to leave

A RIVERLAND council is set to remove numerous trees from a main street due to safety risks posed to the local community.

Renmark Paringa councillors passed a motion at last month's general meeting to remove two olive trees overhanging a walkway over Ral Ral Avenue – between Cowra Street and Murtho Street - in order to minimise a risk of tripping in the area.

A council report on the matter said olives from the trees - which had previously been harvested by locals – were falling onto the

"Council staff have raised concerns with 10 olive trees located on Ral Ral Avenue, Renmark that are emitting bad odours from the dropped olives when they are mowed over and causing a slipping hazard on the walkway connecting footpaths on Ral Ral Avenue," the report said.

"In previous years the olives were harvested by a couple of volunteers on a gentleman's agreement with council. In recent years this has not been occurring.

"As the olive trees are no longer being harvested and causing hazards and odours, council staff recommend that two of the olive trees be removed.

"Staff will monitor smells from mowing

over olives on the ground from the remaining trees and re-evaluate in due course."

As part of the motion, a eucalyptus tree located at 20197 Renmark Avenue will remain in place, while five eucalyptus spathulata trees along Ral Ral Avenue - between Cowra Street and Thurk Street will be replaced.

The council report said damaged caused to the footpath by tree roots had created a safety hazard.

"Council staff can repair the footpath though this will cause significant damage to the five eucalyptus spathulata trees in this area," the report said.

"Council staff recommend the removal of five eucalyptus spathulata trees, repairing the footpath and planting a more suitable variety, geijera parviflora, which will also create uni-

formity in the vicinity."

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## Nicola's back for eight more years

SAFELY ensconced in the state's upper house until 2030, Riverlander Nicola Centofanti says she will focus on regional health, agriculture and horticulture in her new term as Liberal MLC.

As expected, the Liberals won four Legislative Council seats at Saturday's 2022 State Election, meaning Ms Centofanti earned two terms in the upper house, after being placed third on the Liberal Party ticket.

Despite describing her party's election defeat as "extremely disappointing", Ms Centofanti said she remained proud of the Marshall government's achievements and determined to continue working for SA regions.

"I think that as a government we achieved a great deal in four years for the state that we can be proud of," she

"Things like massive upgrades to regional roads and infrastructure, upgrades to a significant number of hospitals and emergency departments, reaching a well-overdue agreement with country GPs to provide better pay and conditions, and abolition of the small business payroll tax to name just a few.

"But the people of SA have spoken and I respect that.

"I'm keen to advocate for regional issues going forward. Agriculture and horticulture are certainly some of my key focus areas, and regional health."

Ms Centofanti ascended to the Legislative Council in April 2020, filling a casual vacancy caused by the resignation of Andrew McLachlan.

The former local vet said she spent election night with her children "sitting around the TV". Ms Centofanti campaigned in the Elder, Waite and Kavel seats over the past weeks.

## 'Why did Labor go missing on Saturday?'

LABOR'S lack of presence across Chaffey during the State Election campaign and again on election day is cause for concern, re-elected MLC Nicola Centofanti says.

Labor's Chaffey candidate Jo Sutton failed to appear in the electorate during the campaign, while Labor helpers were scarce across Chaffey polling booths last Saturday, sparking suggestions the party – which swept to government on the back of a massive, near-statewide swing - ignored locals.

"I started my stint on election day at the Berri polling booth and we didn't see the Labor candidate, nor did we see any Labor volunteers," Ms Centofanti said.

"There weren't actually any Labor how-to-vote cards there.

"Again I think that's indicative of what we've come to expect with Labor, particularly in a number of

"They knew Chaffey wasn't a seat they would pick up, and because of that we didn't see a whole lot of promises in our area. Again that's pretty disappointing, but certainly we've got an excellent member in Tim Whetstone who will continue to do his best to advocate for our region.

"I will certainly be doing that from the upper house."

## Pasin tees off at SA Libs

TONY Pasin has weighed into the SA Liberals' State Election loss, saying decisions made over the past four years were "at odds" with the party's ideology.

Mr Pasin, the federal Member for Barker, was critical of his party's performance in SA, and outlined to the ABC a list of decisions that he believed proved costly, including retaining the Covid-19 state of emergency declaration for too long, land

tax changes, cancelling t h e Adelaide 500 V8 Supercars race, and decriminalising abortion.

Mr Pasin also told the ABC that the party's decision to deny some membership applications from Pentecostal Christian in 2021 was another misstep.

"They were decisions that were at odds with the ideology of the Liberal Party but they were symptoms of a

deeper cause and that deeper cause was the failure to ensure balance in our party," he said.

"There are some people who were elected on the weekend who, I think, will need to consider whether they are likely to be part of the team in four years' time and the years after that and, if they're not, they might need to consider what's in the best interests of the Liberal Party.'

## Tim's attention turns to 'Mali'

PRESSURING new SA Premier Peter Malinauskas to spend money already pledged to the Riverland has suddenly become Tim Whetstone's main mission.

Shrugging off a bittersweet 2022 State Election that saw him comfortably returned to office, but his party dumped after a single term in power, the Chaffey Liberal MP has immediately refocused his energy towards ensuring Labor fulfils funding commitments made during the previous government's term.

Mr Whetstone admitted his was fearful of what an SA Labor government could mean for the state's regions, but said he was prepared to give the Malinauskasled team a chance.

"If they are true to form, the regions will be almost cut off," he said. "But the only way we'll get favourable outcomes is if I have a considered approach and a working relationship with not only Peter Malinauskas, but his government.

"My call to him first and foremost is to honour the recurrent spending that was committed to Chaffey.

"I have a reasonable relationship with Peter Malinauskas and I'll continue to work on that."

Mr Whetstone said programs announced during the Marshall government's term in office were important for the Riverland and needed to be retained.

"There were programs like retaining and training doctors, and particularly the road funding that directly impacts people in Chaffey, like Sturt Highway safety upgrades, as well as the Truro bypass," he said.

"We need to have a commitment from the incoming government that they are going to fix and maintain our roads, not just reduce speed limits, as they previously did.'

For the second time in a week, Mr Whetstone also referenced a pre-election comment about the Riverland made by Mr Malinauskas, using it to highlight his concerns.

"(Mr) Malinauskas suggested the Riverland regularly relied on those in Adelaide for economic support," Mr Whetstone said.

"That's fair enough, but what he forgot to say is that Adelaide needs us. We put food on their tables, as a community we are a tourism destination, and we are an economic powerhouse of South Australia.

"And the Riverland's brand is part of SA's iconic 'clean green' food label that goes onto international tables.

"Mr Malinauskas needs to be focused on programs that will help drive people into the regions for employment, so that we can continue to grow, harvest and market the food.'

Mr Whetstone said the Covid-19 pandemic had played a role in his party's heavy defeat.

"We potentially tried to fix everything up in the first term, as well as dealing with the pandemic," he said.

"And we had to fix up a lot of Labor's

### **Deputy option?**

A SHOT at the role of deputy leader of the State Opposition could be on the cards for Tim Whetstone, but a spot on the shadow cabinet remains his

Former premier Steven Marshall stepped down as SA Liberal Party leader this week, after his party's resounding defeat at Saturday's State

Re-elected for a fourth term as Chaffey MP, Mr Whetstone ruled out a run at the top iob, but said the second-incommand position held some

"I'm not inclined to be a leader of an opposition," he said. "I'm much more of a team player, whether it's sport, politics or business - so a deputy leader potentially, but I'll let that pan out.

"Deputy is more about helping and protecting the leader, but shadow cabinet is my main focus."

### **Chaffey rare bright spot for Libs**

TIM Whetstone's showing at last Saturday's 2022 State Election was a rare bright spot for the SA Liberals.

On a dismal day for the outgoing Steven Marshall-led Liberal government, Mr Whetstone's first-preference count in Chaffey was up 6.7 per cent on his 2018 numbers, while the crucial two-candidate preferred count saw him drop just 1.2 per cent, well below the statewide 7.6 per cent swing against the Liberals.

With 64 per cent of the vote counted, Mr Whetstone led Labor's Jo Sutton 66.4 per cent to 33.6 per cent.

It was the fourth straight election win for Mr Whetstone, who entered parliament in 2010 after unseating former Nationals member-turned Labor minister Karlene Maywald.

The surprise packet of the 2022 Chaffey count was One Nation candidate Sab Feleppa, who polled over 10 per cent of first-preference votes, believed to be the second highest figure in the state for the Pauline Hanson-founded party.

Mr Whetstone's strong showing bucked the statewide trend, which saw Labor swept to power after just four years in opposition.

"I think Chaffey voters saw what a

## Rating our six local candidates

SATURDAY'S 2022 State Election rates as a good day personally for re-elected Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, but a terrible day for his party, again cast into political exile after just one term in power.

Mr Whetstone's vote remained rock solid and many would see it as reward for his steady-as-she-goes approach, notwithstanding a mid-term mishap that brought about his demotion from ministry.

Now back in opposition, it is not unreasonable to expect the Liberals and whoever leads them to elevate Mr Whetstone to a prominent role within the party. The agriculture and water portfolios spring to mind, and even the position of deputy leader.

As a contest, it was a mostly uninspiring Chaffey campaign, mainly because of the lack of a visible, viable Labor alternative.

One Nation provided the only real surprise packet, harvesting over 10 per cent of the local

Mr Whetstone has suggested, more than once, that a good portion of One Nation's vote leaked from Labor, but given Labor's vote actually increased, albeit slightly, even though the party essentially ran dead in Chaffey, not everyone would agree with that viewpoint.

One Nation candidate Sab Feleppa evidently knows lots of people in the Riverland, and that surely accounted for some of the 10 per cent of the first-preference votes he landed.

On a state level, One Nation looks a real chance of grabbing an upper house seat, which would be a remarkable achievement from this polarising party. It again suggests a splintered conservative vote.

Nationals Chaffey candidate Damien Buijs would be disappointed with his relatively poor showing at the polls. His 5.6 per cent of firstpreference votes failed to reflect his campaign effort, particularly his availability to the media.

Unfortunately, unfairly or otherwise, the Nationals brand is on the nose in SA, and running against the Liberals defies logic, given the two form a national coalition. One gets the feeling the SA Liberals would be pleased if the Nationals faded back into obscurity in our

The Greens also polled poorly in Chaffey, well below the party's state figure.

Good on Trevor Schloithe for having a go, and at the very least he was a truly local candidate – as pointed out by Mr Whetstone during

Mr Schloithe would be the first to admit he strides the spotlight uncomfortably, but he will be better prepared next time around, should he again step forward.

We didn't see the Family First candidate, which was a shame, but at least upper house candidate and former state Labor MP Tom Kenyon made an appearance at the Australian Christian Lobby forum in Loxton.

And finally to Labor and its Chaffey candidate Jo Sutton.

Probably the best that can be said about her candidacy is at least it existed, giving diehard Labor voters somewhere to park their vote.

However, we trust her non-appearance is anything but a portent to what lays ahead for Chaffey under Labor in the coming four years.

New SA Premier Peter Malinauskas is an impressive individual, who campaigned strongly and enters his premiership carrying few battle scars and even less questions hanging over his character.

We hope, for the state's sake, he is a fair and wise premier, who has Chaffey well and truly on his radar at all times.

From Mr Whetstone's viewpoint, getting outcomes from outside government may be harder, but it is familiar territory, having spent his first two terms in opposition.

#### **Secure Westpac site** against future plans

THE decision of the elected members regarding the Westpac site in Renmark is to be applauded.

They have remained steadfast in their process, were not excited by proposals, and honoured the original intent to open the river front, against some strong pressure from sectional interests.

Well done for their resolve to

represent the broader community

It is a pity that this proposal reduced to a discussion about a large-scale accommodation facility.

It is agreed by both sides of the debate that development of high-end, river-front accommodation is sorely needed. This debate is about the suitability of the Westpac site in particular for this, as the place with the very highest social value to the residents of Renmark.

There are several challenges remaining, however.

The first is to deploy the site to achieve the goal of attracting and holding people in the centre of our town, perhaps with the target demographic being complementary to that for the Taylor Park, young families, so extending the appeal of both sites.

This can be much more than "lawn", as described by Tim Whetstone (Murray Pioneer 19/2/22), without losing the views of our river front.

It would be fantastic if the venue could be lowered into the landscape so the view of the river is not impeded by any development. This also needs to be done collaboratively with the Renmark Club.

Imagine an outdoor eatery at water level or a promenade deck below the eyeline, with online app of food ordering from all hospitality venues in Renmark, similar to those that line many waterways around the world.

There are many possibilities, but we are presented with a great opportunity for Renmark.

The second is to identify afternative sites for accommodation development, with parameters of river views and being close to the centre of town.

The idea of developing the south side of Murray Avenue has appeal. The model of the Renmark Hotel works well, with both residents and tourists able to enjoy our great river front.

There are many other potential sites - reclaimed land between Patey Drive and the Sturt Highway, shop redevelopment on Murray Avenue, the Jane Eliza are some – with walking corridors into the centre of the

town and hospitality venues. The third is for Renmark

Paringa Council to develop a river-front development policy that seeks at every opportunity to secure river-front property for the community and considers the river front holistically rather than in a site-by-site way.

This avoids the current pattern of repeated divisive argument. Ideally, this would be a longterm policy of 100-plus years that covers Goolwa Street to 28th Street or more, transcending the Urban Design Framework.

The model where development is set back from the river's edge, as in the Jane Eliza Estate, is one I strongly support because all stakeholder groups can enjoy the benefits arising from the river – a repeating theme.

There does not need to be competition for these sites between public amenity advocates and developers, not either/ or but both. With strategic planning, all interest groups can continue to enjoy the amenity of the river and enjoy the benefits of economic development.

In this regard, it is a great pity that there was not the foresight to acquire the Angove land, retain the beautiful river-front portion, and release the rest to either residential or tourism development or both, in a similar model to the Jane Eliza. This would secure a river-front walk from the caravan parks to the centre of town and beyond, and it further highlights the need for a river-front policy.

Lastly, we, the community, need to secure the Westpac site against future proposals for map propriate development: large scale, intrusive on the landscape, exclusive of the local commu-

I urge the council to return the site to the Community Land Register. With the site being used as open space, it will become unimaginable to future Renmarkians that the site be developed.

This is certainly true for the other three sites secured by previous councils and other open river-front parks, namely the RFGC building (now Taylor Park) the bowling greens

between the Renmark Club and Visitor Information Centre, and other open river-front, such as Jarrett Memorial Gardens and

We have had great benefit from these spaces since they were acquired and there is little doubt we, residents and tourists, will be looking back in future and repeating this appreciation for the Westpac site. However, there is a security in knowing that future councils must consult with ratepayers before this land can be sold/developed, because we do not know how future councils may view this argu-

The community must be vigilant too, about the possibility of a "stacking" of council from powerful sectional interests at upcoming local government elections and exert pressure on the Renmark Club to maintain a pro-community approach and seek developments that are compatible with community opinion.

This goes beyond a desire to develop accommodation on the carpark site, perhaps by including a second story on the existing footprint.

Now that the decision has been made it is time to think about the possibilities for this asset, for all to enjoy.

"The year 11 and 12s have a range of different skills around independent study, and by (not providing explicit teaching) we also provide opportunity for teachers to take on the reliefs that are needed within the school," she said.

"Students have plenty of work they can continue on with and they have been provided with that information through our learning management system."

The circuit-breaker process could be used again in the future if the classroom closure proves successful in reducing the spread of Covid-19.

"That (will be) at the discretion of individual local information and communication that I have with the Department and SA Health," Mrs Griggs said.

"We just look to work together with what we think is best to mitigate the risk for our schooling community, but also the wider community."

The school has received a level of "generalised feedback" about the implementation of the circuit breaker from parents.

"I'm encouraging any parent or student that needs specific help to reach out to us as a school individually and we'll be able to help each individual person that comes through," Mrs Griggs said.

All Berri Regional Secondary College students are strongly encouraged to monitor for symptoms and if symptoms develop, obtain a PCR test as soon as possible.

Meanwhile all year 7, 8, 9 and 10 students are free to attend classes if they do not exhibit symptoms, with the school continuing to monitor the situation.

## **Berri Barmera keeping** 'strong financial position'

A RIVERLAND council has the financial capacity to take on more new projects, according to the chair of its audit committee.

Berri Barmera Council Audit Committee chair Tim Muhlhausler gave a deputation to elected members last month to provide an update on council's financial sustainability.

Berri Barmera acting CEO Peter Bond said council had asked Mr Muhlhausler to speak about where he saw its financial position.

"He's got a reputation right through South Australia as a great advisor and being very knowledgeable about financial management," Mr Bond said.

"We're in a strong financial position and able to deliver our services to the

Mr Muhlhauser told elect-

ed members that council's long-term financial plan showed it was both financially sustainable and could "afford to maintain existing service levels".

He also said council had "some financial capacity for new projects in the future", but that these projects "must be strategic projects supporting (the) Strategic Community Plan".

Mr Muhlhauser found council's financial sustainability ratios were "mostly strong", though he hoped to see "sustained improvement" in council's asset renewal funding ratio - which indicates whether council has the capacity to fund asset renewals when required.

About 77 per cent of council's revenue comes from its own sources - Mr Muhlhauser said 80 per cent was "considered strong" while a further 15 per cent of income comes from financial assistance grants.

Council's cash and cash equivalents are projected to remain positive through the end of the 2030-31 financial year, increasing in the later years.

Meanwhile, council held its first meeting for discussions about the 2022-23 budget last Tuesday night.

Elected members had their first deliberations about \$9.6m of capital projects presented by council staff as budget bids.

Council will hold its next budget meeting on March 29, with draft financial statements and rating models to be presented.

A possible return to council's normal 12 per cent cap on rate increases for residential properties will also be discussed, after council lowered the cap to 1.5 per cent for 2021-22.

## **Excitement surrounds** return of Field Days

ORGANISERS of the Riverland's biggest agricultural showcase are "full of energy" for the event to return in September, following a twoyear hiatus.

Preparations have begun for the 2022 Riverland Field Days, after Covid-19 restrictions forced the event's cancellation for the past two

Riverland Field Days chairman Anthony Fulwood said committee members were confident eased restrictions on travel and social events would allow the event - which attracts between 8000 to 10,000 patrons – to be held this year.

"We're six months away still from holding the event, and hopefully in six months' time we should just about be back to normal," Mr Fulwood said.

"The borders being closed was a big issue last year, because we couldn't get a lot of the exhibitors and the public to come into the state.

"(But) I think Australia is in a situation now where we won't have any more closures.'

Riverland Field Days executive manager Tim Grieger said plans for last year's event had been adapted for 2022.

"The committee is really enthusiastic about putting on a great event," Mr Grieger said.

We had the whole event pretty much planned and ready to go last year, then we unfortunately had to cancel at the last minute.

We've taken all that work and planning we did last year, and the



arrangements put in place, and we've brought that forward to this year.

"We'll be communicating with all the exhibitors that rolled forward... it's been a great start for this year, and we've never had so many exhibitor applications in so early.'

Mr Grieger said the work of volunteers had been crucial to maintaining, and improving, the Riverland Field Days site, just outside Barmera.

"The volunteer team is what makes it all happen, and they've really missed the opportunity to do what they want for the last two years," he

"Their focus is on giving to the community, and presenting the event.

"We're quite confident and we're looking forward. We're full of energy and focusing on September now."

Mr Fulwood said the Field Days provided an opportunity for local and interstate agricultural businesses to directly communicate with potential customers.

"The event brings a lot of outside exhibitors to the region, who are going to stay here for at least two nights," he said.

## School's focus on wellbeing

STUDENTS at a Loxton primary school have shared their appreciation for a wellbeing program that teaches them about positive mental health strategies.

As part of the wellbeing focus at St Albert's School Loxton, The Resilience Project teaches students about gratitude, empathy and mindfulness, and emotional literacy

St Albert's Resilience Project co-ordinator Alison Uren said the school was looking at a wellbeing program last year to use for students in reception to year 6.

"The Resilience Project has been something we've seen a lot of in the media over the past couple of years," Ms Uren said.

"The resources have been amazing, they're so easy to use and the students have responded really well.

'The program really encourages students... to pay attention to the things that we have and to just always be grateful.

"Empathy teaches them to understand how other people feel in certain situations... and what their body language is telling them."

Ms Uren said an increase of students visiting the counsellor, or talking to other staff, had resulted, with students feeling more comfortable since starting The Resilience Project.

"They talk about how they recognise at times they do feel quite anxious, and have realised that they're not the only ones," she said.



with their Resilience Project posters, with quotes about positive mindsets, gratitude and empathy.

"Now they've become more aware that there's a lot of people who are feeling anxious at certain times.'

Weekly homework tasks are set for students to take what they learn during the lesson each Tuesday and see how they can put them into practice outside of the classroom.

"In one of the first weeks, the students had to look at how they can do kind things for others and what kind acts people might show them," Ms Uren said.

"They were very aware of all the kind things that their parents do for them, but they weren't so aware of the things that they could do for their parents.

"So that became their homework task for the week: to do some random acts of kindness for their parents and to see if their parents noticed."

St Albert's students shared what they enjoyed learning about most throughout the

first seven weeks of The Resilience Project.

"I've enjoyed learning about kindness, and I've tried to show that at home by helping Mum with the laundry,' said year 6 student Piper.

Learning about mindfulness helps to reduce stress, tension and anxiety, according to year 6 student Nyah.

'We do breathing exercises," she said, "with deep breaths and scanning our body to find tensions. We do it in class at the start of the lesson."

Year 6 student Thomas said he was enjoying learning about gratitude.

"I've been thinking about things that I'm grateful for," he said. "We have a gratitude box. At the end of the day we get a sticky note and write one thing we're grateful for. It helps.'

## Japanese encephalitis virus cases double

RIVERLANDERS and visitors are again being asked to "fight the bite" after the number of cases of a rare mosquito-borne virus in the state doubled to eight, including six cases which contracted the illness locally.

Four more cases of Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV) were confirmed last week, after the first cases ever-recorded in South Australia were announced earlier this month.

Six of the cases contracted the virus in the Riverland and Murray Mallee regions, according to The Advertiser.

The Department for Health and Wellbeing's Dr Chris Lease said people planning activities around the River Murray should be "especially vigilant, particularly between dusk and dawn when mosquitos are most active".

"We can confirm that one of the additional cases includes the person who we previously reported had sadly passed away earlier this month," Dr Lease said.

"Of our eight total JEV cases in SA, five remain in hospital and two have since been discharged.

"Two people in hospital with encephalitis remain under investigation.

"It is crucial that we all continue to take extra precautions against mosquitoes and continue to 'fight the bite'."

Dr Lease recommended applying insect repellent, wearing long, loose-fitting and light-coloured clothing,

using insect sprays to reduce the risk of mosquito bites.

The normal lifecycle of JEV is between waterbirds and mosquitoes, which may then accidently spill over to pigs and horses, with owners reminded to remain vigilant.

## Fruit fly battle to rage into **November**

A NEW detection of fruit fly in a Riverland backyard means local growers will be dealing with the pest into summer 2022/23.

PIRSA last Friday announced fruit fly restriction dates at Pike River and Renmark West had been extended until November 22.

PIRSA fruit fly response general manager, Nick Secomb, said fruit fly maggots had been detected in backyard fruit at a Pike River West property.

"Our teams in orange overalls have been working directly with the property in the new red outbreak area to apply insecticide at the detection site, deploy further traps and check fruit for signs of fruit fly," Mr Secomb said.

"This is a good reminder to all residents living around Pike River and Renmark West to promptly pick any ripe home-grown fruit and vegetables that are at risk from fruit fly – for example apples, pears, limes, strawberries, and

"Collect any fallen fruit and put it in your green bin - do not compost it. Clearing up fruit this way is critical to break the fruit fly life cycle, because any maggots in fallen fruit will dig into the ground to transform into flies.

"Keep fruit and vegetables on your property and don't share, sell or give them away. Check on the fruit fly website to learn what fruit and vegetables are at risk.'

Local primary producers who have been negatively impacted by fruit fly outbreaks are encouraged to contact Family and Business Support by phone on 1800 931 314, or by visiting the website (www.pir.sa.gov.au/fabs).

Outbreak restrictions will remain in Pike River and Renmark West until November 16 without any further detections.

A LOCAL school is thriving, with its enrolment numbers significantly increasing in recent years.

The Loxton Lutheran School is about to undergo renovations to accommodate the significant increase of students.

School principal Brad Williams said enrolment numbers had increased from 143 students in 2018 to 201 this year, without year 7s for the first time.

"We're in a nice position where we're not



experiencing a downturn in numbers," he

"Part of the growth has come through word of mouth."

Mr Williams said he believes the way the

school teaches literacy is "on par with any school across the state".

"We have a very consistent approach to the way in which we teach literacy here," he

"I think a lot of parents within the Riverland still value that."

Smaller class sizes and additional support are other key factors, according to Mr Williams.

"Our biggest class is 26 and most of our junior primary classes are between 18 and 23, so they are good class sizes," he said.

"For the first time this year we gave all reception parents the option of participating in occupational therapy screening for their children and later this term we have speech (therapy) that we are paying for if parents want to take it up.

"The earlier we start identifying red flags, the better positioned we are to help support and meet the needs of the children and there-

The school has two buses, which service a

large portion of the Riverland.

"We have one that goes through Moorook, Barmera, Glossop and Berri," Mr Williams

"The other one services Lyrup, Loxton North and maybe Loxton east area a little

Mr Williams said while the school is based on Lutheran values, students from all backgrounds are welcomed.

"For those families who aren't (Lutheran), they still really like our end product because... spiritual education helps develop the whole child," he said.

"The values we live out and try to model in all our interactions with children really resonate strongly with families and they like that about our school."

The school's early learning centre is also at capacity, with a waiting list for next year.

Mr Williams attributed the success to the school's staff, "supportive" board and parenting body.



BIGGER, noisier safety ripples popping up on Riverland roads are potential life savers, and have little impact on a vehicle's stability, locals have been reassured.

Audio-tactile line marking – or ATLM – aims to reduce rural road crashes by providing a noise and vibratory warning to road users who may stray due to fatigue, poor visibility or inattention.

They have recently been installed along various stretches of Riverland roads and the RAA says they are effective in reducing the likelihood of head-on and run-off road crashes.

"(They) can reduce crashes by as much as 15 to 25 per cent, which is substantial given the very low cost compared to other safety treatments," an RAA spokesperson told The Murray Pioneer.

"Between 2016 and 2020,

70 per cent of crashes resulting in serious injury/death on high-speed regional roads – speed greater than 80km/h – were single-vehicle run-off road crashes."

The spokesperson dismissed suggestions the ripples could impact the onroad stability of motorbikes, but nonetheless urged motorists to avoid running over them.

"Studies have found that ATLM is not particularly detrimental to a motorcycle's stability," the spokesperson said.

"However, all motorists should treat them as they would other line marking and avoid intentionally running over them."

The spokesperson said small cars would also be unaffected.

Earlier this year, Murray Pioneer readers debated the merits of road safety barriers recently installed on Riverland roads, with some questioning their placement. Some readers suggested the barriers were at seemingly random locations, however placement of ATLM ripples is deliberate, according to the SA government's Department for Infrastructure and Transport.

"The department's current policy is to install ATLM abutting edge lines on key high-speed arterial roads," the department says on its website.

"This is based on the predominance of single-vehicle, loss-of-control/run off road crashes on rural roads."

The department said ATLM ripples are considered "a highly effective countermeasure, with a high benefit/cost ratio in most cases".

"ATLM provides superior wet weather delineation," the department says.

"Drivers tend to focus on the edge line for guidance when traffic is approaching at night to avoid being dazzled by headlights."

### Healthy Rivers funding finally dries up

A GRANT program – aimed at improved management of the River Murray system – that funded six Riverland-based projects has ended.

The federal government on Monday announced the \$20m Healthy Rivers Program had been fully expended.

Minister for Water Keith Pitt said Riverland-based projects would receive over \$1.7m from round 2 of the program.

"The last tranche of projects is worth a combined \$6m and supports individuals and groups to protect and promote native species by improving habitats – whether that's making farm dams more attractive to native birds or re-snagging large stretches of river," Mr Pitt said.

"In total Healthy Rivers is collectively funding activities to plant about 300,000 native plants, install 230km of fencing to protect 2000 hectares of riverbanks and undertake weed control on about 30,000 hectares.

"All these activities contribute to good

river health outcomes – although they don't directly contribute to increasing flows."

Mid Murray Landcare and the Australian Landscape Trust – which manages Calperum Station – received funding under both rounds of the initiative.

Mr Pitt said the funding had been targeted at projects that would generate environmental and economic benefits for the region.

"These grants put money into local businesses, creating jobs and strengthening recreational amenities and tourism offerings." he said.

"These sort of community-driven activities have a real impact on river health – and just as importantly – a real impact on regional economies."

## \$100k grant to reduce river salinity

A LOCAL project to reduce salinity in the River Murray has been awarded almost \$100,000 in funding.

Barker MP Tony Pasin and Minister for Resources and Water Keith Pitt announced on Monday that Flinders University's Bookpurnong project would be funded through the \$20 million Murray-Darling Healthy Rivers Program.

The project will use a solar-powered enhanced evaporation pond system for in-situ salt extraction.

Mr Pasin welcomed the funding and said it would allow locals to use their knowledge to care for the environment across the Riverland.

"This grant puts money into local businesses, providing employment and strengthening recreational amenities and tourism offerings," Mr Pasin said.

"Flinders University will use its \$99,984 to design and install a new salt extraction system to reduce the salinity of water entering the River Murray from Bookpurnong Floodplain.

"The solar-powered system will remove an estimated six tonnes of salt from the river each year, improving water

and soil quality nearby and downstream.

"Importantly these Healthy Rivers grants support Basin economies, with successful applicants committing to buying local.

"These Healthy Rivers projects bring people and organisations together to work on practical, on-ground projects that protect the Murray-Darling Basin's vital waterways.

"The Healthy Rivers Program forms a key part of the Australian Government's Murray-Darling Communities Investment Package, which is putting communities back at the heart of the Basin Plan." Mr Pitt said the grants were designed to help communities deliver on-ground projects to improve the health of local rivers and wetlands.

"Across the Basin, the Healthy Rivers Program is funding activities to plant about 300,000 native plants, install 230 kilometres of fencing to protect 2000 hectares of riverbanks, and undertake weed control on about 30,000 hectares," Mr Pitt said.

"That's making a real difference to river health and regional economies."

Under all rounds of the program, Barker has received \$2.55 million in funding.

## Drug dealer, 22, gets prison term

A 22-YEAR-old Riverlander described as "a very busy, persistent, wellorganised" drug dealer is set to spend almost five years in prison.

Berri man Jak Bailey Noack was earlier this month sentenced to four years and three months in jail after pleading guilty to five counts of drug trafficking and possessing prohibited weapons.

Police searched Mr Noack's home on February 15, and located 100g of loose cannabis, cannabis seeds, equipment involved in the sale of illegal drugs, \$1900 in cash, and prohibited weapons including numerous knives and a crossbow.

Judge Simon Stretton said Snapchat messages found on Mr Noack's phone indicated he had sold cannabis, MDMA, cocaine, psilocybin, LSD, Xanax, Valium, Oxycodone, Seroquel and dextroamphetamine.

"You made 294 posts in the group over that eightmonth period, including images of controlled drugs, videos of controlled drugs being advertised for sale and photographs of cash," Mr Stretton said.

"As of 15 February, 2021, 85 persons with individual Snapchat accounts were members of your private group.

"You sent and received messages from more than 60 individual accounts organising the sale of a range of controlled and prescription drugs.

"You published price lists for a range of drugs in a range of quantities. You were operating a very considerable business."

Mr Stretton said Mr and six months.

Noack – whose parents had separated when he was seven – was exposed to drug and alcohol use from a young age

"You regard your child-hood as being average but possibly worse than that experienced by other children," he said.

"You described your relationship with your father as good, although he himself has a history of issues with drugs and alcohol.

"Your stepfather was a heavy drinker."

Mr Stretton said Mr Noack had no previous history of offending.

"You also say that the birth of your son last year has made you realise the wrongfulness of your actions," he said.

"You have a limited history of employment... you have not worked for a period of time until very recently when you secured vineyard work.

"You and your partner together financially support each other and your child. If your income were lost, your partner would be unable to meet the financial obligations by herself."

However, Mr Stretton said Mr Noack's ongoing use of cannabis posed a risk, and required him to be sentenced as a serious repeat offender.

"While ordinarily your circumstances, age and antecedents would justify a merciful non-parole period, and I would otherwise impose one, unfortunately... your offending is far too serious for there to be good reason to suspend it," he said.

Mr Noack will be eligible for parole in three years and six months.

## Council paths divide opinion

MORGAN'S CBD and certain residential areas lack proper footpaths, it has been claimed.

Morgan resident Jakob Gamertsfelder, who was defeated in the recent Mid Murray Council's Eyre ward supplementary election, said it was unacceptable to be without sidewalks in the main street. Mr Gamertsfelder said most of the businesses in Morgan's central business district had dirt paths.

"The best sidewalk in that street is coincidently just outside the council office," he said.

"That is concrete, but they upgraded it three times to get it just perfect, they wanted a better shade of colour.

"They weren't happy with the first one.

"It is in the main street and you can see the split between council people getting their own sidewalk and the residents getting nothing."

Mid Murray Council chief executive officer Ben Scales said if any resident or ratepayer had safety concerns about footpaths in Morgan, they should raise their concerns with council.

"That will then be considered in line with our footpath plan," he said.

Mr Gamertsfelder said outside the community craft shop, Something Different In Morgan, the dirt had simply been flattened. He said the community-run business paid its rates and deserved a "proper" footpath.

Mr Gamertsfelder said in a town where tourists regularly visit, concrete or paved footpaths should be essential. He said the lack of solid footpaths was also causing safety concerns, especially for the town's elderly residents.

Morgan resident Olive Wilksch, 92, who is legally blind and can only distinguish the shapes of people in front of her, said she walks on the road because the dirt pathways in her area are littered with sizeable stones.

Ms Wilksch said council placed crushed gravel on the path where she puts out her rubbish bin after one of her carers contacted it several years ago.

But Mrs Wilksch believes the path is still unsafe and said her rubbish bin has to be placed on a slant.

She said she has repeatedly raised

her concerns about the lack of proper footpaths in Morgan, but little action has been taken.

"Whether the people that work here at council pass it on, I don't know," Mrs Wilksch said.

Mr Scales said Mid Murray Council had a long-term financial plan and its aim was to ensure that every town in the district was provided with the same resourcing in line with council's asset management plans.

He said due to financial constraints the council was unable to place concrete footpaths in all areas of Morgan.

"We have thousands of kilometres of road verge throughout the district, and we would love to have footpaths in all areas," Mr Scales said.

"But council needs to focus having concrete footpaths in key areas of townships.

"Concrete footpaths in Morgan are in key precincts around 8th St and 4th St."

Mr Scales said the council was also considering using other materials such as bitumen, rubble or paving to construct more footpaths around Morgan.

## Cutting the fuel excise won't be much help for price pain at the bowser

I TOOK another step forward last week, when after six weeks of recovery I got my driver's licence returned.

But the joy quickly became a harsh reality when I pulled up at the bowser to fill up with diesel.

In my short time off the road, prices have jumped to \$2.20 per litre, about 25 to 30 cents higher.

No wonder there is a conga line of state MPs calling for the federal government to act; mostly to temporarily reduce the fuel

Before embarking on some explanation and history of this tax it is most important to point out that the government does not control fuel prices. We live in a market-driven economy where prices are set by this market, dictated by supply and demand.



The fuel excise is a flat sales tax levied by the Australian government at the pump.

It is currently 44.2 cents per litre and revenues collected are used to pay for the construction and maintenance of roads across the nation

This excise has not increased with the recent price hikes, only the GST has increased.

A GST increase on 30 cents is less than

three cents – without this, the price of my diesel would still be \$2.17 per litre.

History tells us that this tax was adjusted by Prime Minister Howard facing an election in 2001, when he decided to freeze CPI increase on the excise but did not reduce it.

The proposed increase at the time was only about half a cent but it is important to note that less than a year earlier he had added a 10 per cent GST.

The excise at this time was around 36 cents and GST was 9 cents as the fuel price hovered around a dollar per litre.

The government's take then was 45 per cent of every litre, compared to today's 30 per cent on \$2.20 per litre retail price.

The New Zealand government has just reduced its fuel excise by 25 cents a litre for the next three months to alleviate retail fuel

prices of three dollars per litre.

Our cross-the-ditch neighbours will still pay excise of 55 cents, GST of 30 cents and an additional 15 cents for an emissions trading scheme for every litre – hence the reason for some tax relief.

With a federal budget due next week, an election soon after and a prime minister behind in the polls, perhaps even moribund, all panic buttons will be glowing red.

A one-off cost-of-living payment to everyone, similar to those in the Global Financial Crisis or more recently during Covid-19 times, may be a more universal measure, and less complicated or difficult to unwind.

## **Waikerie Lions** clearance sale

THE Waikerie Lions Club auctioned off some of its key items on Saturday in preparation for its relocation from a historic building on the river front to the former Apex Club shed at Penaluna Drive.

In December last year, Loxton Waikerie council agreed to evoke the Riverland West service club's lease of the former Bond Store with a view to seeking expressions of interest for commercial development of the site.

The council has indicated it would prefer a tourism and hospitality focus for the building, which for the past 30 years has been known as "The Lions Den".

Waikerie Lions Club president Pam Stendara said the club had no choice but to relocate to the former Apex Club shed by April 19 as per council's request.

She said the March auction, which attracted a good number of bidders, was delayed by a week to enable the service club to sort through its items and decide what it should sell.

The items up for grabs included a bain marie, grill, roll warmer, two kitchen tables, crockery, kitchen utensils, and glassware.

Mrs Stendara said the 50-year-old club still wanted to keep a lot of its belongings.

"We are trying to keep as much as we can of what is useful," she said.

"We have all our old photo items and historical things as the Lions have been in that building for 30 years.'

She said having to vacate their den was a sad way to celebrate the service club's half a century milestone.

More items from the riverfront building will be on auction on April 9.

Mrs Stendara said council has indicated a second shed across from the former Apex Club headquarters could be used to house the Waikerie Lions Club's food van.

She said for the time being council has given members permission to park their food van outside the former Apex Club shed, which is too small

Mrs Stendara said the Waikerie Lions Club would miss the convenience of having its headquarters on the river front.

"We could just pull out the food van from the den for the auction and push it back inside afterwards," she Mrs Stendara said the

service club would possibly have to reduce its use of the food van after it moves to the former Apex Shed. "We used to get permis-

sion from council to sell fish and chips on the river front,' she said. "I don't think we will be doing this as often."

Mrs Stendara said the Lions Den was the group's regular gathering place and after moving next month, the club would have to book the Waikerie Community Meeting room near the Waikerie Men's Shed.

She said the members would miss the opportunity of meeting and hosting a dinner whenever they

### Henry Mortimer: True Waikerie servant

HENRY Mortimer served the Waikerie community tirelessly and is missed by those who loved him, and had the opportunity to volunteer or play bowls alongside of him.

He lived and breathed Waikerie and there was no other place he wanted to be.

Mr Mortimer was farewelled with a celebration of his life at the Waikerie Lions Park at Waikerie on December 10, 2021 after passing away peacefully in his sleep on December 3, 2021 at Pioneer Haven.

The 2017 Riverland Citizen of the Year and 2016-2017 Waikerie Citizen of the Year was born at the Waikerie Hospital on December 26, 1938.

He was the third of seven children born to Lucy and Harry Mortimer.

Mr Mortimer started school at Holder, requiring him and his two sisters and neighbouring children to walk across the river flat, then row across the river to school.

He always said the communication was good back then, because if any of the children did anything wrong at school, the news would always reach home before they did.

Mr Mortimer preferred

helping his father with the farm work instead of attending school and especially enjoyed riding horses and working with sheep.

He left school to work on the family's wheat and sheep property on the Northshore in Taylorville.

Mr Mortimer married Cheryl in 1970. The couple raised three daughters: Jacqui and Nicole, who live in Adelaide, and Julieanne, who lives in Melbourne.

In 1997, he retired from dryland farming after 40 years and moved with Cheryl into Waikerie, where he became busier with community work.

Mr Mortimer was a Waikerie councillor from 1978 to 1982 and Waikerie Health Services chairman for six years.

He was a member of the Waikerie Lions Club for 36 years, serving twice as president and six times as vicepresident.

Mr Mortimer was a zone president of the Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) for at least five consecutive years, and recipient of the prestigious Melvin Jones Fellowship Award presented by the LCIF.

After becoming a "towny" he decided to follow his younger brothers John and Robert and take up lawn bowls.

His pastime of being a penciller for a bookmaker prepared him well for taking on the role of Waikerie Bowling Club's bar manager.

With Mr Mortimer behind the bar, there was never a dull moment and everyone who visited received a sincere welcome.

His bowling days came to an abrupt halt after he suffered a stroke in 2016.

But he was a regular visitor to the club and enjoyed travelling there on his gopher. In 2019, he was awarded life membership to the Waikerie Bowling Club.

Mr Mortimer was chairman of the Waikerie Meals on Wheels board for four years and a volunteer with the organisation for many years.

He also donated his time to drive Waikerie's community car and bus and volunteered for the Australian Red Cross, and the Waikerie High School Breakfast Club.

In 2005, when his sister and brother-in-law's property at Wanilla on the Eyre Peninsula was burnt out by the bushfires, he spent two weeks helping them mop up and rebuild fences.

He is missed by his wife Cheryl, his three daughters and their husbands, his six grandchildren and his siblings and extended family.

## **Program to connect people and overcome social isolation**

NEW opportunities will be provided to help isolated country people connect and build positive relationships in the Riverland through ac.care's Community Connections program.

"It is estimated one in 10 people experience social isolation and that figure is likely to have grown significantly as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic," ac.care Community Connections manager Sue Watt said.

"It is well-known social isolation has a negative impact on people's mental and physical health, along with their ability to participate in the community.

"We want to help connect the disconnected by providing opportunities to bring people together in positive ways."

Community Connections will be delivered by ac.care as a community partner in the Riverland, Limestone Coast and Murraylands, replacing the former Home and Community Care Program.

"Community Connections is all about supporting people to increase their independence in the home and build stronger social and community connections," Ms Watt said.

Support may include facilitating opportunities for people to become involved in local community activities, find new support groups, meet neighbours or benefit from extra help at home.

South Australians aged 18 to 64 who are not eligible for Federal Government programs such as the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) and My Aged Care may qualify for the program.

Priority will be provided to Aboriginal people aged 18 to 49, people from linguistically diverse cultures, unpaid carers, individuals who are financially disadvantaged and those living in disadvantaged locations and communities.



**GROWSMART Training is working with** local industry, government, and other key service providers to develop career pathways to recruit and develop people wanting to work in local primary production industries within the Riverland.

VET in schools has a renewed focus in the past 12 months and GrowSmart is offering Certificate II in Horticulture at the Renmark Farm Centre as a career pathway into jobs in production horticulture industries including almonds, citrus, stonefruit, avocados, wine grapes, potatoes and other irrigated crops.

This program also can lead onto jobs in horticulture with councils, grounds and amenities curators and golf course superintendents.

Certificate II in Conservation and Ecosystem Management (CEM) is also offered for school VET student in partnership between GrowSmart and

## Prescribed burns fire up for autumn

IMPROVING management of native vegetation and protecting Riverland biodiversity are the goals for upcoming prescribed burns in the region.

National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) will conduct 43 prescribed burns across South Australia during autumn.

NPWS director of fire management, Fiona Gill, said the burns would only be started during "safe and practical" weather condi-

"The number of prescribed burns that can be safely and effectively completed in any season is always subject to a window of prescribed weather conditions and we will never burn unless we can achieve a safe outcome," Ms Gill

"The program of burns are part of a rolling threeyear program and extra burns are planned which gives us flexibility to move burns to another season or year according to the condi-

"Autumn is a time when larger, unbounded burns in more remote parks will go ahead as the cooler overnight temperatures and increasing relative humidity help suppress the fire.

'By creating strategic, low bushfire-hazard areas in the landscape, on our reserves and some strategically chosen private land, our autumn program helps manage the intensity and extent of future bushfires, and provides safer access for firefighters.

A total of 47 burns were completed during spring

Ms Gill said the fire management team would work with local industry representatives - such as grape growers and winemakers to ensure the current harvest was unaffected by prescribed burns.

"As with last year, the mild summer has led to an overlap with wine grapes not yet harvested and suitable conditions to conduct prescribed burning," she

"NPWS continues to work with industry groups to address any concerns and plan burns appropriately.

"NPWS takes opportunities to burn as soon as it is safe and practical to do so."

## **Thoughts wanted on new** carryover improvements

RIVERLAND irrigators have been encouraged to attend an information session tomorrow surrounding potential changes to key water allocation regulations.

The Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) will hold a public consultation meeting - at the Berri Bowling Club regarding its updated Draft Water Allocation Plan and proposed changes to the private carryover policy.

An MRLB spokesperson said the changes would "remove rollover and forfeiture of carryover volumes and will allow carryover to be used in the year that it is granted".

"Consultation is now under way and the MRLB would like to hear your views on the proposed changes to the carryover policy," the spokesperson said.

The Berri drop-in session will run from 3pm to 6pm, with presentations at 3.30pm and 4.30pm.

#### WHO is an unpaid Carer?

An unpaid Carer is a family member or friend who looks after someone with:

- A disability
- A mental illness
- Dementia
- A long-term health condition
- An illness that is terminal
- An alcohol or drug-related problem; or
- Someone who is frail due to age

People become Carers in different ways. Sometimes they start helping someone out bit by bit. Sometimes it happens suddenly, because of an accident or

Carers can be any age. Parents, grandparents, partners, siblings, friends and neighbours may all take on a caring role at some point in their life. There are more than 245,000 Carers in South Australia.

#### What is the Carer Gateway?

The Carer Gateway is an Australian Government initiative which provides services and support to unpaid Carers across Australia. Carers SA is the local Carer Gateway provider in South Australia for the provision of these services. Carer Gateway services are focused on supporting Carers and they complement the existing services that may be available through other supports such as My Aged Care or NDIS.



#### **Can Carers who receive Centrelink Carer Payments** access services through Carers

Yes. In fact Carers who do and do not receive Centrelink Carer Payments are both eligible to access services from Carers SA. The services are not income tested.

#### Does a carer need to live with the person/s they care for to be eligible for services through **Carers SA?**

No. Carers may or may not live with the person/s they care for and can still access support.

#### Is there a cost to register with **Carers SA?**

No. Carers SA offers a variety of free services to support Carers in their caring role.

#### I live in country South Australia can I connect with Carers SA?

Yes. Carers SA is a statewide organisation, with skilled and professional staff working across country and metropolitan South Australia.

#### We are waiting on an assessment, will you still help me if there is no diagnosis of the person I am caring for?

Yes we can. Carers SA does not require proof of diagnosis regarding the condition of the person you care for.

RIVERLAND students boarding in Adelaide are now subject to less severe Covid-19 close contact rules, following significant backlash from SA parents including locals – earlier this

SA Health advised the education sector earlier this month of new "test-to-stay" measures to allow boarders to attend school despite having Covid-19 positive students living in their boarding house.

Previously, boarders would have to isolate in their rooms or return home a six-hour return trip for Riverland parents - when they were determined to be close contacts.

An SA Health spokesperson said the changes were made "following consultation with the Department for Education, Association for Independent Schools SA, and Catholic Education SA".

"To support schools in minimising disruption to students, boarding schools can implement 'test-to-stay' for close contacts, where boarders must complete a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) at the start each day for seven days since their last contact with a positive case," the spokesperson said.

### 'Unworkable and unfair'

"If the RAT is negative, boarders can continue to attend school.

"If the exposure occurred from shared sleeping quarters, boarders can participate in onsite activities at the school but not extracurricular activities offsite.

"If exposure occurred in a different setting (not shared sleeping quarters), boarders can participate in onsite activities at the school and extracurricular activities off-

"The earlier requirements were necessary to allow SA Health to assess the impacts of Covid-19 cases in boarding school settings and while rates of vaccination were increasing, especially third doses and childhood vaccines.'

Renmark mum Merridy Crook told The Murray Pioneer last month she had made four trips to Adelaide to collect her Covid-free daughter in less than three

"My personal issue... is that the school doesn't want students there who are unwell to stay within the boarding house," she said.

"Pre-Covid, students would be managed as they would at home: see the doctor, get treated and rest in their rooms.

"I have driven to Adelaide four times in less than three weeks for minor illnesses, not Covid-related.

"I have told the boarding home staff that I cannot keep doing this.

"It is ridiculous."

Barker MP Tony Pasin also wrote to SA Education Minister John Gardener calling for changes to the close contact protocols for boarders, describing the former rules "unworkable".

SA Health advice regarding isolation of cases is unchanged at this time.

# U3A looking cool with its new grant

UPGRADING the headquarters of a Riverland community group, through an ongoing funding initiative, will ensure the organisation remains "vibrant and sustainable into the future".

The federal government earlier this month announced U3A Riverland would receive an \$8250 grant – through round 7 of the Stronger Communities Program – for the installation of a new air-conditioner at its building on Strawbridge Street, in Berri.

U3A Riverland grant officer Tony Guster said replacement of the building's heating and cooling systems would ensure members could use the facilities throughout summer and winter.

"The grant will enable U3A Riverland to install modern, efficient heating and cooling appliances in our building in Strawbridge Street, Berri," Mr Guster said.

"These air-conditioners will be very supportive of our purpose. Uncomfortable con-

ditions currently experienced in both winter and summer are not conducive to maintaining the health and wellbeing of our members and adversely affect their involvement in the activities we offer.

"The modern appliances are many times more efficient and technologically advanced than the older ones and can be used strategically to make the rooms comfortable for our use and reduce our power bills."

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the work of U3A volunteers resulted in social and economic benefits for the Riverland.

"Local organisations such as U3A Riverland are so important to the fabric of regional communities," Mr Pasin said.

"This grant enables U3A to replace the existing old and unsuitable heating and cooling with energy efficient airconditioning that will allow year-round accessibility in two activity rooms of the U3A building.

### Former Renmark identity with Pioneer history

LONG-SERVING former Murray Pioneer employee and well-known Renmark man Ron Rosenberg died last month, aged 101.

Mr Rosenberg spent 34 years working as secretary for the Taylor family's local newspapers, including The Pioneer, The River News and The Loxton News, plus JC Irving printers.

He was born in Orroroo and grew up in several rural SA areas, before enlisting in the Army in 1940 and spending three years in Darwin.

After moving to Renmark, where his parents lived, in 1946, he worked for engineering firm Dix and Son. He married Dorothy Brocksopp in 1949, before accepting the position at The Murray Pioneer.

Mr Rosenberg lived in

Renmark for 58 years, and was a keen sportsman, particularly enjoying bowls and golf, and in the early years, tennis and cricket. He was also an enthusiastic fisherman and had a great love of the river.

He was a communityminded citizen, and was involved in many committees, including being secretary of the Renmark and District Ambulance group, eventually being awarded life membership.

Dorothy died in 1996 after a long illness, ending 47 years of marriage.

Mr Rosenberg left the Riverland in 2004 to live in a retirement village at Hove, in Adelaide.

At his recent memorial service he was described as having "integrity".

"He was a most remarkable man and true gentleman who loved being organised, to the nth degree, firm but fair, but very dignified and brave up to his final days."

Mr Rosenberg is survived by his daughter Ann, stepson John, four grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

"Glen was an active member of the Barmera Book Club from 2004," Mrs Frost said.

"So, the Art and Craft Gallery members, plus the people whose lives she touched, will miss her talents, sense of humour, and enquiring mind, which we all enjoyed when she was an active member."

Mrs Eshman passed away in January, aged 96.





# **Swan Reach** river front revitalisation

THE construction of a new playground, enhanced river-bank area and new connecting paths are all part of plans by Mid Murray Council to improve Swan Reach's Len White Reserve.

A tender for the project is set to go out soon

The improvements to the reserve are part of the council's Swan Reach River Front and Len White Reserve Masterplan, which was developed following extensive community consultation.

Designs for the river-bank reclamation and jetty removal have received development approval and are included in the tender, along with both stage one and two of the new playground and access paths to

Nildottie Road. The project will be part-funded by a grant of \$224,970 from the federal government's Building Better Regions Fund's infrastructure projects stream and \$44,310 from the state government's Open Space and Places for People Grants program.

The new pathways are being provided as links to the Murray Coorong Trail under the Murray Darling Basin Economic Development Fund.

The replacement of the existing public toilets at Len White Reserve has been allocated an extra \$110,000 through phase two of the Federal Government's Local Roads

and Community Infrastructure program. The replacement toilet works have already been tendered, and onsite works are expected to begin mid-year, with the project to be complete by the end of August.

The new facilities include three cubicles, with one to be a disability access compli-

ant cubicle. Mid Murray Mayor Dave Burgess said

it was exciting to see the project progress.

"Council staff have been working with the Swan Reach community throughout this project to ensure they remain updated and have input as the plans progress," Mr Burgess said.

"Now that we've reached this stage after a few years of talking and planning, it's exciting for the community to have these projects to look forward to this year," he

A concept outlined in the Swan Reach Riverfront and Len White Reserve Masterplan for a new pedestrian bridge near the River Reserve Road traffic bridge has been shelved due to its significantly above estimated cost.

Mid Murray Council will instead investigate what other minor investments can be made to create a safe shared space for pedestrians and vehicles in the area.

The council said funding set aside in the plan for the pedestrian bridge would be invested into other aspects of the masterplan such as completing the playground in full (rather than in stages) and a proposal to replace barbecue shelters in the reserve.



RC Ones couldn't com-





BARMERA defeated Loxton to take home the Riverland men's division one basketball crown last Friday night in Berri.

The Lakers were defensively sound, keeping renowned shooter and Riverland men's MVP Jesse Will to just three points for the night.

First-year coach Matt Sullivan was "very impressed" with his team and said that the defensive effort is something they had been working on as a group for a long time.

"At the start of the season we were very focused on our defence and our main goal was to be the number one defensive team in the competition," Sullivan said.

"(Liam) Phillips coming into our side from Loxton has added so much defence to our team and I'm pretty certain we got that status as the best defensive team and proved it several times.

"Before the semi-final Loxton gave us an absolute bath and beat us by quite a lot because defensively we weren't there and they took advantage of that, so it's definitely the key.'

"Going into the game we knew Loxton was a bit tired after playing Renmark on Wednesday night, so we knew the boys would just have to try and run them off their legs basically," he said.

'We got 28 points up on them in the semi and then they came alive in the last quarter. They threw everything at us so we sort of knew what they had.

"It was good to go straight through because we knew either Waikerie or Renmark were going to be really tough, which they were against Loxton.

"We've got players that have been around for a while so that week's rest was really good and it meant we didn't have any disruptions with availability."

Dillon Millard, with last Friday's win bringing his Riverland championship tally into double digits.

Sullivan said that Millard brings plenty to the team and had been "a fantastic help" for him in his first year of coaching. "Dillon was quite emotional

after the game because that's his 10th grand final win (and) I knew how important it was to him," Sullivan said.

"On and off the court he impacts and drives everything and he was our X-factor in the end.

"Having me doing the subs and calling time-outs at certain times, it's something that Dillon hasn't had in the past and he wanted someone there to be able to do that.

"I've learnt a lot in my first year Barmera's star was veteran and I think it was a pretty good time for me to jump in and do it.'

Sullivan's son Jack was another standout, with the youngster equalling Dillon's tally of 16 points in the grand final.

"It was very special for me because he's chosen the basketball path," Matt Sullivan said.

"He's moved to Mount Barker now for school and he's training with NBL1 as well and his intentions are to move across for college. So, to get that year with him was so special for me."

In the men's second division, Allstars completed an undefeated season by taking down Berri in the grand final by just three points.



The side recently competed in the Riverland Turf Cricket Association season, as it has done for many years, and despite up and down numbers due to Covid-19, the club is still going from strength to strength.

Gerard entered the SA Aboriginal Cricket Carnival a fortnight ago and respected club and community member Sam Mitchell said such opportunities are vital for helping the game grow in regional indigenous communities.

"With the carnival, we're playing to win and have fun but it's different when we're playing against our cousins and brother boys – you don't want to get out for a duck because they'll hang it on you," he laughed.

"It's really competitive and serious because you want the bragging rights but it's also a good chance to meet up with family and people you haven't seen for a while.

"The idea of the carnival is to try and find that next Jason Gillespie and to create those pathways, especially for the country kids who don't have as many opportunities..."

After a successful carnival, the greatest victory from Mitchell's point of view was the smile on the face of young Eugene Singh-Abdulla, who picked up his first cricket wicket down in Adelaide.

"He's 16 and he came out for his first year and he was pretty unsure about cricket," Mitchell said.

"But he's grown and developed over the year.

"When he first bowled he bowled a few wides and a couple off the pitch so when we gave him the ball in Adelaide he said, 'Remember what happened last time?', but then he got this wicket and you could not get the grin off of his face.

"He batted well too in the last game so he's keen for next year."

The club is now approaching its half-century and Mitchell has big plans in store for

An enhanced focus on bringing Aboriginal youth into the sport is high on the agenda, as is recognising those that formed the club back in the 1970s.

"Growing and developing those young people is important and our club is about having a place for us to go that's ours," he

"We're one of the state's only predominantly Aboriginal clubs and when it was started in the '70s, prior to that we weren't considered human beings, so our uncles created that place for us to go.

"Sometimes we meet for funerals which is obviously a sad time but this is something positive. We try and be positive while we're there and have fun. It's about other young people seeing Eugene and thinking that they can do it too.

"We're hoping to gather a whole lot of old photos and host a dinner to honour the original team and learn from their stories as well so the younger ones can learn about the older generation."

The club wore playing tops designed by one of their own, Josh Abdulla, with 16 black U-shapes on the front representing the 16 original members of the Gerard Cricket Club
