

Houseboat owners told to make way for council development

NO MOOR TIME LEFT

RENMARK Paringa Council has pledged to assist a group of houseboat dwellers find new mooring spots as it moves to the next stage of its plan to develop land at the Jane Eliza Estate.

After being issued with two previous alerts last year, approximately 25 mooring permit holders have now been given three months to find alternative locations, as council moves closer to securing a development partner for its project.

The plan will see 115ha of land developed, aiming to straints and "future proof" the town's long-term population growth and economic development opportunities.

A group of affected houseboat owners have voiced their concerns to council, after last week receiving a letter stating they would be unable to renew their mooring permits next financial year.

The letter stated council was "actively engaging with private landholders and the Department for Environment and Water in order to seek alternative mooring options", despite having "no contractual obligation to assist you to make alternate arrangements".

RESIDENTS of a Riverland council have been warned against leaving hard rubbish on the footpath, after a local pensioner was recently fined \$1375.

Berri man Timothy Kotz – and his partner Darlene Roberts – were last month fined for failing to dispose of hard rubbish outside their Zante Road property.

Mr Kotz said he believed regular hard rubbish collections were conducted in Berri.

"We put two items out on the curb to be picked up, and the council came along and gave us a \$1000 fine without any warning," Mr Kotz said.

"I didn't know any fines existed for this. Once a year we have a collection here, and a lot of people put stuff out.

"We pay our rates, and do the right thing by everyone. We're only on a pension and we can't afford to be paying this fine for no reason.

"I wasn't aware it was an offence to do this."

A hard rubbish collection had been run in Berri and Barmera during June 2021, with former Berri Barmera chief executive officer Karyn Burton previously telling The Murray Pioneer council "had budget discussions about having another hard waste collection in Berri again next year.

"So if people want to hold on to their hard rubbish until then, we have proposed to do another one in the next financial year," she said.

However, current acting Berri Barmera chief executive officer Peter Bond said no formal policies regarding hard rubbish collection had been introduced.

"There is no hard rubbish policy as such," Mr Bond said.

"It's a case where council has got a practice of doing hard waste collection, but basically it will be rotated through the district.

"The one coming up will be in Berri only, and the other areas may be later in the year, or next year, depending on what council gets through its budget.

"Where we've got a defined advertising program that's okay, but when it's not advertised that's seen as litter. There will be warnings and explaint that go along with that, so we've just got to be cautious with how we approach that."

A Berri Barmera Council officer issued the fine on February 15, with Mr Kotz claiming the items – including a

shower chair and water cooler – had only been put out the day prior.

Mr Kotz wanted fellow Berri Barmera Council residents to know about the potential fines.

"It's totally unfair, and I just want to warn everyone else around that's what is going to happen," Mr Kotz said.

"I've contacted (council), and spoken to the mayor about it. I was going to go to the ombudsman as well.

"It's good for everyone to know this, because if they are going to do it to us, how many other people are going to be fined?

"There was no warning given. If they had at least written a letter saying, 'you have a certain number of days to get rid of it, or you'll be fined', that's fair enough."

It is understood Mr Kotz has since donated the items to the Salvation Army.


"I grew up in Waikerie, my family owned vineyards, and I had been in Adelaide since I was 17," Adriana said.

FOR the second time in three years, Covid concerns have forced the cancellation of the Riverland interschool athletics competition.

Parents and caregivers were notified of the event's cancellation via a statement released by the Riverland Secondary Schools Alliance (RSSA) this week.

Involving all four Riverland senior schools, the annual Interschool Sports Day was due to be held at Loxton High School on Tuesday, April 5.

Despite community sporting events continuing, an increasing number of Covid-positive staff, students and school leaders across the Riverland, plus the need to avoid the spread of Covid-19, were the main reasons given for the cancellation.

"We have received advice from our department that, for the

remainder of this term, work can be paused that takes us and our staff away from teaching, supporting students and children, addressing urgent parent/caregiver matters, or staff wellbeing," the RSSA statement read. "In consultation with our educa-

"In consultation with our education directors we have made the decision to cancel the forthcoming Riverland interschool athletics competition. "The main consideration in arriving at this decision was the health and safety of our students and staff.

"We regret this decision as we understand that our school communities look forward to the Riverland interschool athletics competition. However, as it would bring hundreds of students, staff and parents together from across our region, it is deemed to be a high-risk activity. "Keeping our schools open and maintaining continuity of learning is seen as being our highest priority."

The event was last cancelled in 2020 when the Covid-19 pandemic began, but was successfully held last year at Waikerie High School, where Loxton took out its 41st consecutive championship shield win.

This year's event has not been rescheduled.

Riverland councils agree to help fund union battle

RATEPAYERS across two local government areas will pay almost \$6000 to assist two metropolitan councils with legal fees for a case that could ultimately have farreaching impacts for all SA councils.

The cities of Mitcham and Unley made a joint application for assistance – via the Local Government Association (LGA) – to defend an industrial dispute with the Construction Forestry Maritime Mining Energy Union (CFMMEU), with the Australian Workers' Union also a party to the proceedings.

Both Loxton Waikerie and Berri

Barmera councils agreed to assist

In a report to councillors, Loxton Waikerie CEO David Beaton said the CFMMEU is seeking to establish its right to represent outdoor employees of the two metropolitan councils in enterprise bargaining negotiations.

"The CFMMEU is also seeking that the councils recognise it as a party to enterprise negotiations in respect to its proposed agreement applying to employees covered by the Local Government Employees Award," he explained.

"If the matter is found in the CFMMEU's favour, this would mean that the union would be entitled to have rights with regards to enterprise bargaining, rights of entry to any council, and to influence and dictate changes to the affected industrial awards.

"The cities of Mitcham and Unley contend that freedom of association is a core principle of the South Australian industrial relations system, pursuant to the Fair Work Act 1994 (SA)."

Mr Beaton said if the CFMMEU was found to be entitled to represent outdoor workers in local government, all councils would be required to consult with the union for various disciplinary, work health and safety, policy and procedure reviews, plus workplace change matters.

"It is posited that this will likely result in an increase in industrial disputation and the costs associated with employment of the outdoor workforce within the sector," he said.

In a letter to both councils, LGA

CEO Clinton Jury said the invitation for "voluntary contributions" was due to potential impact for all councils and to ensure the matter is "appropriately defended".

Loxton Waikerie council was asked to consider a contribution of \$3008, while Berri Barmera was \$2636.

At Loxton Waikerie, the motion to support the application was carried, while at Berri Barmera, the vote among councillors was tied.

It then went to a mayoral vote, with Mayor Peter Hunt voting in favour of supporting the application.

Meanwhile, Renmark Paringa Council is yet to discuss the matter.

LOCAL wineries have been encouraged to apply for a new industry program set to boost the profile of the Riverland wine region.

Riverland Wine – in partnership with the South Australian Wine Association - has encouraged applications for a \$63,000 program targeted at increasing the demand for, and sales of, Riverland wine.

A Riverland Wine spokesperson said the program - which involves media training, workshops, and a scholarship to May's ProWein fair in Dusseldorf, Germany – was aimed at "wineries and grape-growing businesses who are ambitious about growing their market outside of South Australia".

Expressions of interest for the program are now open, with details to be finalised by Friday, April 8.



IT was a double delight when two young Riverlanders were named joint winners of a prestigious vocational award on Friday night.

Riley Thomson and Kelsey Wade shared the 2021 Apprentice of the Year title at the Riverland and Mallee Vocational Awards, presented at the Berri Hotel.

Mr Thomson, an electrician with LecLogix in Loxton, said he was "very surprised" to win the award, despite earlier in the evening being announced the Electrotech/Engineering/Air Conditioning Industry Award winner.

"I've spoken to people who have been in the awards before, and they made mention that if you do happen to win your category there is a good chance to win the big one," he said.

"So, once my name was called out for the category, I was definitely eager to see what happened at the end."

Mr Thomson was prompted to say a few words after being named the first of the joint Apprentice of the Year award winners, and thanked his employer and family.

The 22-year-old finished his apprenticeship capstone at TAFE SA in Adelaide on Friday, before making his way to the awards in the evening. He expects to receive his qualification by the middle of this year.

Mr Thomson said winning the awards was

Different outcome from Jane dispute

AMBIENCE, the preservation of open spaces, river views, the value of sticking to a pledge made 20 years ago.

Renmark Paringa councillors' decision to demolish the old Westpac building was essentially 'pro' all these things, and residents will assign a certain amount of value to each of them.

But most would agree the decision was, by definition, anti-development.

The chance of developing that building and/ or that chunk of real estate has been dashed. The elected members have spoken, seemingly

backed by public sentiment. Those championing development at the council now face a battle on another front, in the form of househost summer told to leave the

council now face a battle on another front, in the form of houseboat owners told to leave their moorings within three months, to allow for further development of Jane Eliza Estate.

Many casual observers will again see both sides of the issue. Indeed, the houseboat owner who spoke to The Murray Pioneer was sufficiently balanced to concede the council was compelled to develop its district.

Most would acknowledge that housing is in short supply in Renmark, like the rest of the Riverland, and that Jane Eliza represents an opportunity to address that issue and generate substantial funds, immediate and ongoing, for the council's coffers. Nothing wrong with that aspiration.

Likewise, few would argue that essentially being evicted – albeit from the river front – is a tough pill to swallow, particularly for long-term residents. Some of these river-side dwellers have invested their own money to set up a lowcost, simple and quiet lifestyle, and would have been happy to stay there indefinitely.

While the Westpac decision is done, the pro-development arm of council knows it must – and surely will – succeed in getting the Jane Eliza plan completed.

In forming their opinions on the matter, other Renmark Paringa residents and ratepayers may well balance what the group of houseboat owners broadly bring to the town against the bigger picture of what this major development could mean for Renmark and its future.

On that score, the houseboat owners may find the public response supporting their cause somewhat less vocal than the enthusiastic backing of the Westpac building decision.

Barker challenger raises questions

THE symbolism of the first confirmed Barker opponent to sitting Liberal MP Tony Pasin being from a conservative party may only become apparent after the May federal election.

David Swiggs represents billionaire Clive Palmer's United Australia Party and conservative parties with some degree of profile are popping up all over the place.

One Nation's SA Election results in gaining an upper house member for the first time surprised most, while the party's Chaffey candidate Sab Feleppa gained the third-highest number of first-preference votes in the March 19 ballot.

The Liberal Democrats are also increasing their profile, although whether that equates to any additional electoral success remains to be seen.

However, one of the many fascinating factors of the upcoming federal poll will be the impact these conservative parties have on the Coalition's vote. Some argue the Liberal Party has never been further away from its conservative roots and if enough people feel that way, its primary vote could experience a similar slide as the SA Liberals witnessed.

Ironically, Mr Pasin is a conservative and might find himself nodding along – albeit privately – with some of the motherhood statements made by Mr Swiggs and others of his ilk.



Thiele's first motor vehicle in Loxton? When Skipper Thiele or his son, Fred, bought a 'horseless carriage' in 1910, it seems it became the district's first. The vehicle was an International 18/20 Motor Buggy. A caption declared this was "Fred driving ...the first motor buggy in Loxton". It had registration #933. Interestingly, two Pyap residents of similar age as Fred bought motor buggies at a similar time: JTW Milich's buggy had registration #932 and Fred's brother-in-law TH Zeppel's was #1009. So, the Milichs' vehicle was technically the first in the district, but the Thieles' the first in Loxton. It was said that driving these vehicles was hazardous. "These vehicles ran along quite smoothly (though a) stiff pinch of sand would hold them up. Then the passengers would get out and with spades and ropes (part of the equipment), set to work to extricate the 'bus'. The engine was noisy, which was an advantage for those driving in (horse-drawn) buggies. They could hear the motorists a long way off and prepare their horses for the moment of passing. They generally managed to get well off the track, right into the mallees, with the horses' heads turned in." PHOTO: Rosemary French

Dissecting Chaffey's election numbers

NUMBERS regarding the Chaffey Electorate result at the 2022 State Election have been reported as a strong result for the Liberal Party's Tim Whetstone.

Here is a candidate standing for his fourth term. He should have runs on the board, particularly considering his party was in control for the past four years.

First. Didn't campaign. The informal vote was five per cent. Added to the above group of five candidates it comes to 49

per cent of the total vote. Is this a protest to how the Chaffey electorate has been treated and a poor performance by a certainty?

But Chaffey was not brave enough to show a real protest, and a protest does not mean we had to vote Labor.

We were always going to be an electorate in opposition. Are we frightened of change after being bitten on the bum by National-turned Labor minister Karlene Maywald?

Mr Whetstone now can put in an exceptional effort, with no concern at upsetting his Liberal hierarchy, because they have gone.

I am sure he will have strong support from Liberal MLC Nicola Centofanti and One Nation's Jennifer Game, who is a strong advocate for the rural areas.

Premier Peter Malinauskas spoke at a forum prior to the election and stated that he was going to build five new technical colleges around the state. Two areas had been earmarked and a further three were to be decided.

Here is a challenge to Mr Whetstone: Get one in the Chaffey area, with a curriculum based on primary production and associated industries/vocations. There is a campus currently vacant ideal for such a facility.

RENMARK Paringa Council has pledged to assist a group of houseboat dwellers find new mooring spots as it moves to the next stage of its plan to develop land at the Jane Eliza Estate.

After being issued with two previous alerts last year, approximately 25 mooring permit holders have now been given three months to find alternative locations, as council moves closer to securing a development partner for its project.

The plan will see 115ha of land developed, aiming to address housing supply constraints and "future proof" the town's long-term population growth and economic development opportunities.

A group of affected houseboat owners have voiced their concerns to council, after last week receiving a letter stating they would be unable to renew their mooring permits next financial year.

The letter stated council was "actively engaging with private landholders and the Department for Environment and Water in order to seek alternative mooring options", despite having "no contractual obligation to assist you to make alternate arrangements".

Renmark Paringa chief executive officer Tony Siviour said alleviating pressure on housing availability, and attracting new commercial opportunities for the community, continued to be a priority for council.

"Council endorsed a houseboat management plan in 2019 following consultation with the commercial houseboat industry, government departments, the general public and houseboat owners," Mr Siviour said

"The management plan identified council's intentions to relocate Houseboats from Ral Ral Creek as well as to pursue attracting a development partner for future stages of the Jane Eliza.

"With net zero rental availability, and housing and land supply continuing to be tightly held, coupled with the genuine interest received throughout the expression of interest process of securing a developer for the Jane Eliza, nothing has changed.

"We have engaged with Ral Ral Creek mooring holders, wrote to them in September and December 2021 and again in March 2022 outlining our intentions to not renew their 12-month mooring permit."

However, Renmark Paringa Houseboat Collective spokesperson Jenny Troeth – speaking to the Murray Pioneer on behalf of Ral Ral Creek mooring holders – said local and visiting houseboat users generated substantial economic benefits for the Riverland.

'There are people down there who have put their life savings into those boats, and that's their home," Mrs Troeth said.

"They don't own residential property, and a lot of them are on limited incomes. They are using their super,

or their pensions, to live within their means on those boats.

"They have used their retirement plans to fund these houseboats, so they would be able to comfortably enjoy their retirement years.

"There are boats down there that are purely recreational, and a lot of them are from out of town. So those boats are bringing large amounts of money into the town."

Mrs Troeth said fears were growing among numerous owners that no alternative mooring options would be provided.

"You're going to have boats with nowhere to go (and) displaced people, because you can only stay on crown land for 21 days," she said.

"There may not be a written obligation, but I believe as a council they have a moral obligation. They've collected mooring fees from those people for years."

The cost of a Ral Ral Creek mooring spot rose to \$2700 last year.

Mrs Troeth said council should avoid prioritising potential highvalue residential properties at Jane Eliza.

"I don't think there's anyone out there that's opposed to development from a residential perspective," she said.

"I applaud them for it... but all they can see with that development is the dollars in rates down the track.

"I applaud their foresight for the future development of the town, but it should not come at the cost of an integral part of the community.'

Fighting the mooring battle

A RIVERLAND council's intention to relocate approximately 25 mooring spots overlooks the economic contributions made to the area by houseboat users, says the representative of a local group of concerned owners.

Adelaide woman Jenny Troeth last year helped to establish the Renmark Paringa Houseboat Collective, following concerns surrounding Renmark Paringa Council's plan to relocate Ral Ral Creek mooring spot owners due to the upcoming Jane Eliza Estate Development.

Mrs Troeth – who travels to Renmark numerous times each year with her husband – said both local and visiting houseboat owners continually supported small businesses. "We as boat owners bring a

lot into the town as well," she said.

"We've spent over \$1000, or more, staying in the Riverland (last) week.

"Every time we come to the Riverland we leave \$500 or more behind, and we're doing that all year. We've had three vehicles at JVS Bodyworks before.

"The houseboat industry, and the presence of houseboats in Renmark, are an integral part of the community and tourism in the area.

"So it's got to work both ways.'

Fruit fly begins spreading again?

FRUIT fly quarantine restrictions have been imposed on another Riverland town, after the detection of larvae in backyard fruit caused a new outbreak to be declared.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) last week declared an outbreak of Queensland fruit fly at Loxton.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said quarantine requirements would have economic impacts on local growers throughout winter.

"These detections are disappointing as we know that fruit fly is one of the world's most destructive pests and the Riverland horticulture industry has spent decades working to achieve and maintain a fruit fly free status," Mr Whetstone said.

"The fruit fly detections trigger suspension zones and growers in these suspension zones cannot get their fruit to market without expensive treatment.

"I cannot stress enough the importance of the community's cooperation in preventing the further spread of fruit fly, and I encourage everyone to visit the PIRSA website for suspension zone information and what your responsibilities are during this outbreak.

"I urge the incoming (state) government to continue to support this fight against fruit fly. The economy of a premier food bowl region like the Riverland relies on the fruit fly-free status and the government must maintain this status.'

Fruit fly outbreaks are also ongoing at Renmark West and Pike River.

PIRSA fruit fly response general manager Nick Secomb said it was vital all members of the community followed restriction guidelines.

"Our teams in orange overalls are contacting residents with information about what to do now they are in a red outbreak area, and will be regularly applying organic bait to suitable foliage in properties, as well as checking fruit for signs of

"If you are in a red outbreak area, please keep your fruit and vegetables on your property and don't share, sell or give them away. Search your address on the map on the fruit fly website to check if you're in a red outbreak area.

"I urge everyone in the region to keep gardens and properties tidy. Collect fallen fruit and don't let fruit rot on the ground – this is essential in fruit fly prevention to stop the lifecycle.

"These actions are an essential tactic, in combination with the work of our field teams, to protect South Australia's \$1.3 billion horticulture industry at risk from fruit fly and the tens of thousands of jobs it represents."

Berri roads holding up despite student surge

TRAFFIC near a Riverland high school appears to be flowing without complaint, despite significant concerns previously aired by the local council.

Berri Barmera Council's acting CEO Peter

Bond said council "haven't had a lot of feedback" about traffic around the new Berri Regional Secondary College, even though the number of students at the campus had increased significantly.

"We were concerned that with the escalation in traffic numbers down the adjacent roads that we'd have some major problems, but my compliance officers haven't pointed to anything in particular at this stage," Mr Bond said.

"Obviously it's only early days ... so we'll continue to monitor that."

Under previous CEO Karyn Burton, council began lobbying the state government to address its concerns for the Kay Avenue/ Fenwick Road and Fenwick Road/Burgess Drive intersections surrounding the school in 2019.

'We were probably disappointed there wasn't more attention shown by the state government in that precinct, but that's the nature of how they approach things - they do look a bit internally," Mr Bond said.

We've probably moved on from that now and are just trying to do a master planning exercise around that and tie it in with our Glassey Park development as well."


Elected members attended a confidential briefing session last Tuesday to discuss the Glassey Park master plan and the districtwide growth strategy, plus regional waste.

Mr Bond said both plans were expected to be released for public feedback soon.

"Members are comfortable with the Glassey Park plan, which will be coming out for community consultation shortly I would imagine," he said.

"The broader Berri Barmera growth strategy is in the final stage and just getting that right for consultation as well.

"Obviously all the council were involved in providing feedback to the consultants to get those right before they go out for community consultation.'



Once purchased or picked from the garden, some fruit and vegetables cannot move from your property within the outbreak area.

Special arrangements need to be put in place for the movement of commercial produce. Call the industry hotline on 1800 255 556.

An eradication program has begun to keep your area fruit fly free and help protect our state's important horticultural industries. PIRSA staff wearing orange overalls and carrying ID will apply organic fruit fly bait and check fruit in the area.



What you need to do:

- Allow easy access to your property so PIRSA staff can do their work guickly and efficiently.
- · Pick up all fallen and over-ripe fruit in your garden as well as remove any remaining fruit from fruit trees. Seal the fruit in a plastic bag and call the Fruit Fly Hotline on 1300 666 010 to arrange collection.
- Don't move fresh fruit, fruiting vegetables or garden waste from your property.
- Check your fruit regularly and if you find a maggot or suspect fruit fly, seal it in a plastic bag and contact the Fruit Fly Hotline on 1300 666 010 to arrange collection.

Encephalitis spreads to local piggery

THREE more South Australian piggeries, including one in the Riverland, have detected mosquitoborne Japanese encephalitis (JE), the state government announced last week.

The detections were recorded in the Loxton Waikerie, Murray Bridge and Coorong local government areas and brought the number of SA piggeries where JE has been detected to four.

South Australia's Chief Veterinary Officer Dr Mary Carr said JE in pigs and horses could be prevented by controlling mosquitoes and protecting animals from mosquito bites. "PIRSA (Department of Primary Industries and Regions) urges all pig and horse owners to reduce the risk by controlling mosquitoes on your property, through eliminating breeding areas and using chemicals responsibly," she said.

"Prevent mosquitoes biting pigs and horses and protect yourself, your staff and your family."

Chair of Pork SA Andrew Johnson said that industry was working closely with PIRSA and SA Health and welcomed the government's "prompt response".

"There are staff on the ground conducting mosquito and disease surveillance, including further test-

ing and providing information and advice to farmers," he said.

"There are no food safety issues associated with eating pork meat or pork products due to this disease. "Shoppers are encouraged to

support local farmers by continuing to buy Australian pork.

Valuable information on mos-

quito control for piggeries has been developed by the Japanese Encephalitis Vector Management Group, and this can be found on the PIRSA website."

Japanese encephalitis is a notifiable disease, and any suspect cases must be reported.

PIRSA urged animal owners to report any cases of unexplained pig deaths, especially piglets, or unexplained horse illnesses, to a vet or the Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotline on 1800 675 888.

PIRSA and SA Health are working together, alongside industry and with interstate counterparts to understand the implications, and to communicate to farmers how they can reduce the risk of human exposure.

PIRSA is also urging anyone who owns more than one pig or horse to register for a Property Identification Code (PIC).

"Having a PIC ensures PIRSA can contact you if there is an animal health event such as JE or another livestock disease outbreak, or bushfire or flood," Dr Carr said.

Eight human cases have also been detected in South Australia, including one fatal case.

"We know Minister Brock understands the central role that councils play in regional communities, and we think that's a great perspective to bring to the portfolio," she said.

RIVERLANDERS are expected to spend less time in isolation due to Covid-19 following the significant easing of Covid-19 rules announced by the state government last week.

Household close contacts will only have to quarantine for seven days instead of 14, people who have had Covid-19 will not be considered close contacts until 12 weeks after the end of their isolation, and people will only be considered close contacts after spending a cumulative four hours with a confirmed case during their infectious period instead of 15 minutes.

The newly formed Emergency Management Council also

resolved to work towards removing mask mandates in public places from Thursday, April 14, with the exception of high-risk settings

The state's Emergency Management Declaration is also expected to be removed on or before June 30, unless there is "a substantial change of circumstance".

At a press conference on Friday, Premier Peter Malinauskas said the council had made changes to "help bring our state into line with the rest of the nation".

"These changes have been supported by chief public health officer Professor Nicola

"Strict isolation requirements have placed significant strain on workplaces across the state.

Peter

"Easing these rules will help ensure more people can return to work, while also easing pressure on our schools.

"South Australians have overwhelmingly followed the rules throughout the Covid-19 pan-

demic and this further easing of restrictions is further reward for everyone's efforts.'

The Emergency Management Council also received a briefing regarding "urgent work" currently under way to increase hospital capacity and testing capacity, and plans for a campaign to increase vaccination rates, particularly third dose rates.

Work has also begun to prepare for the rollout of a fourth dose of the Covid-19 vaccination for high risk groups from Monday, April 4.

With the new SA government lacking "horticultural experience", local government needs to step up its advocacy of fruit fly measures, Trevor Norton says.



Sending fruit fly message to new SA government

QUEENSLAND fruit fly continues to scourge Riverland horticulturalists and residents.

Last week another outbreak of the devastating pest was declared at Loxton, in addition to those recently declared at Renmark West, Pike River and Pike River West.

These outbreak areas and surrounding growing districts will be affected by restrictions until mid to late November this year.

Similar outbreaks throughout the Riverland last year make the latest restrictions no surprise. Once again, we are in the midst of the investigation and control procedures becoming all too familiar.

The fruit fly prevention and control program has been well supported by our state government over recent years at a cost of tens of millions of dollars.

Our local MP, Tim Whetstone, has always been very active in this space; even more so in his stint as the minister responsible.

His zero tolerance of host fruit at road block entries into South Australia was a serious step in the right direction, even if unpopular with those fined for transgressing it.

More recently his former government imposed a complete prohibition on the transport of any host fruit, home grown or retail purchased, into the Riverland pest free area (PFA).

Both of these measures have been best practice in controlling the pest and very important to maintaining access for our produce to overseas markets.

This latest series of outbreaks has again prompted local grower groups to seek more effective measures of fruit fly prevention.

From their perspective, too much restriction would not be enough and most have called for more involvement by Riverland local government.

However, not many have come with workable suggestions - most for restrictions which cannot be achieved under current legislation and with no budget consideration.

The control and eradication of fruit fly in the Riverland is, to me, the single most important local issue. A \$2bn horticultural industry and treatment-free way of life makes this emphatic.

A new government is only a week old and needs to be made aware of this, if it is not already appreciated.

Something that has not been suggested by anyone to me, but must become the starting point is this: We cannot afford to have anything less than present and we do not need to expend more effort justifying it or on alternate ways to fund it.

Without much horticultural experience evident in the newly elected government, it is advocacy that local government is in place to do unequivocally.

HE talks to Clive Palmer, champions freedom of choice and intends to spend the coming weeks campaigning against vaccine mandates.

Meet Barker candidate David Swiggs.

Mr Swiggs is standing for the United Australia Party at the 2022 Federal Election and signed up a couple of Riverland members during a recent trip to Waikerie, where he met around a dozen locals.

The Mount Gambierbased "conservative at heart" admits having the financial backing of the party's billionaire founder makes it easier for UAP contenders like him to spread their largely libertarian views.

"Clive's initial sizeable investment in our campaigns will go a long way to making voters aware there is a third, viable option when it comes time to vote," he said.

"People living in this country should be able to freely go about their business of supporting and nurturing their families, and not be impeded by government overreach and control.

"I stand for bodily autonomy and the right to choose. The UAP is all about abolishing unjust, and immoral mandates, and restoring our democratic freedoms, recently lost to poor leadership and unelected bureaucrats."

Mr Swiggs is passionately opposed to Covid-related lockdowns and any form of vaccine mandates.

"Over two years into mandates and lockdowns, the hard-working people of Australia are still losing their jobs, families and relationships, and enduring extreme hardship because of these draconian measures," he said.

"Big business, corporates and other large organisations are running roughshod over everyday Australians and placing them in financial hardship and worse."

The one-time share farmer and former furniture retailer has most recently worked in the banking industry, spe-

cialising in retail, commercial and agribusiness banking.

He said the introduction of Covid-19 restrictions brought about a realisation that his "core values" align with the UAP, ultimately sparking his decision to stand for Barker at the upcoming poll.

"I believe in the inalienable rights and freedoms of all people and maintaining full democracy as our preferred method of governance," he said.

"I have lived and worked in the Barker electorate all my life and have deep connections with country South Australia.

"I am a strong representative and advocate for regional communities and the Australian way of life.

"Last year, I witnessed a crisis unfolding in our local communities with the introduction of mandates and lockdowns. I started to wonder to myself, 'What can I do to change this?'...'

Mr Swiggs described his party's often-controversial founder as a "highly credentialled, successful businessman" and argued Mr Palmer's leadership is "urgently needed".

"I have spoken to him a few times," he said.

'We both believe the mandates are so destructive to jobs, communities and relationships, and they need to go, not just in some areas, across the board."

Mr Swiggs, 51, said he plans to be a regular Riverland visitor during the remaining weeks before the 2022 Federal Election tipped for mid-May – and



is in the area today and tomorrow.

"The response from Riverlanders so far has been one of overwhelming support for change," he said.

"With water security, cost-of-living pressures, rent affordability and mandate madness just a few of the main concerns people have, I will be back in the Riverland in a couple of weeks to discuss the United Australia Party's vision for our country.'

Mr Swiggs recently met the UAP's leader Craig Kelly, and said the former Liberal and independent MP had an "honest, down-toearth approach of where our country is headed and what needs to be done to save it".

Mr Swiggs also said a taxation plan that would see regionally-based Australians pay 20 per cent less tax than their metropolitan counterparts was among the UAP's key policies, along with advocating for the manufacturing industry and small business.

Mr Swiggs joins sitting Liberal Barker MP Tony Pasin as confirmed candidates for the local seat.

Our better drive to Adelaide

RIVERLANDERS who travel to Adelaide via Karoonda will ultimately benefit from recently announced major road upgrades, jointly funded by the state and federal governments.

Karoonda Highway will receive \$10m comprising \$8m from the federal government and \$2m from the SA government – to complete a raft of upgrades.

These include pavement treatment to fix wheel rutting and skid resistance, shoulder sealing and full width road sealing to achieve 3.3m lanes, and installation of auto tactile line marking on edge and centreline.

Meanwhile more SA road funding was announced in yesterday's 2022-23 Federal Budget.

Key rural SA projects funded through the Budget include:

An additional \$10m for the Rural Roads Package-Safety Package, bringing the total federal government commitment to \$124.4m.

□ \$60m for the South Eastern Freeway.

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Declared pest weed's Riverland summer love

WET summer weather across the Riverland provided the "perfect" growing conditions for a declared weed, according to the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB).

Activities to control African lovegrass along roadsides and highway verges in the region continued throughout the summer months.

The pest grass germinates easily on road sides, where it benefits from water runoff, and threatens grazing properties as it prevents native grasses from growing

MRLB district officer Jamie Courtney said African lovegrass infestations are continually monitored and inspected in the Riverland.

"The recent weather conditions have been perfect for this summer growing high seed-producing grass. We are now seeing a high increase in germination and growth," Mr Courtney said.

"Dense unrecorded infestations have been found while undertaking control work along the Sturt Highway between Paringa and the Victorian Border, Ral Ral Avenue in Renmark, and along the Goyder

Highway near Barmera, Taylorville and the western side of Morgan.

"While weather conditions have been favourable for weed growth, they have been unfavourable for weed control, which means that suitable spot spraying days have been limited.

"Spraying with the right weather conditions is vital to increase the target weeds' ability to absorb the herbicide. It also eliminates the risk of spray drift on nontarget species.

"We would like to thank our community members who have already contacted Berri by calling 8580 1800.

us requesting assistance. We have helped identify the declared weed and suggested suitable control options available for their circumstances.

"I would encourage landholders to get in touch with their local district officer so we can work together to monitor and control African lovegrass."

Control site signs are installed in areas of high density to help people identify the pest grass.

Sightings of African lovegrass are to be reported to the Riverland district team in

Too cold for a dip, say locals

COLD temperatures at a Riverland swimming pool are dissuading locals from using the facility, despite the recent addition of heating equipment, it has been claimed.

A number of Renmark residents have recently raised concerns regarding use of the thermal heating blanket for the main pool at the Renmark Swimming Centre.

A local woman - speaking on the condition of anonymity - said low water temperatures in the pool had discouraged some from using the facility.

"There's been a couple of times when it's quite cool," the woman said.

"It's too cold for most of the recreational swimmers. I would usually take my grandkids every weekend, but they didn't want to go in for the last month.

"If you're swimming flat out it's okay, but otherwise it's cold... I changed from swimming in the morning to the afternoon."

Council installed the thermal blanket as part of the Renmark Swimming Centre project, which was supported by \$500,000 in funding through the federal government's Community Sport Aus Program.

Renmark Paringa director of corporate and community services, Tim Pfeiffer, said weather conditions, and staff shortages caused by Covid-19 could impact use of the thermal blanket.

"The pool blanket is usually used on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and weekend nights," Mr Pfeiffer said.

"Situations when the pool blanket is sometimes not used include: on very hot summer nights, as the water can become too warm for the swim clubs; when the wind is above 25km/h, in line with manufacturer specifications; (or) when there are staff shortages due to Covid-19, as a minimum of two staff are required to operate the equipment."

Potential upgrade for tourist toilet

A WAIKERIE service club and a local council will combine funds – subject to ongoing costs – to upgrade a toilet stop for tourists.



More commonly used in the theatre and stage musicals, why on earth would a song be a number?



CELEBRATIONS planned for April 1 to mark the centenaries of the Waikerie Hospital and the Waikerie Hospital Guild have been postponed until November due to uncertainty created by Covid-19.

Mrs Mortimer said she was researching the history of the hospital, its doctors, nurses and other staff.

The Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) in a statement said it has had discussions with the Waikerie



Hospital Guild to organise the Waikerie Health Service's 100th anniversary in late November.

It said planning was under way for the event, including involving community groups and service clubs as part of the celebration.

"We will keep the community updated once details are finalised," the statement said.

The RMCLHN said a lot had changed since the Waikerie Health Service officially opened its doors on April 1, 1922.

But it said "the same warm, welcoming, and caring approach still shone through its staff".

"In these unprecedented times, the work of our clinical staff has played a vital role in the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, and we thank them for their continued commitment and dedication to protecting our community," the RMCLHN said.

"We are proud of the important role that the Waikerie Health Service has and will continue to play in our local community and we look forward to the next generation continuing this commitment into the future."

The Waikerie and Districts Health Advisory Council's presiding member Justin Loffler said it was important to have the centenary celebrations at a time when schools and local service clubs could be involved in the celebrations.

"It will ensure the community itself is able to have a look at displays to see what the hospital was like 100 years ago," Mr Loffler said.

"This will enable them to recognise how things have changed over the years and we believe it has changed a lot for the better."

"It's much better to have these events here in the Riverland than travelling or attending a webinar.

"Our local businesses do not have to feel like they are on their own anymore. Renmark Paringa Network and Business SA have filled those gaps for the (small and medium-sized enterprise) business owner."

Renmark-based Riverfun Houseboats owner Kym Seymour said the session had inspired attendees to "keep working to improve our business and utilise the toolkits Business SA and the Renmark Paringa Network have to offer".

Business SA executive director David Slama said business strategies to increase sales plus information regarding payroll taxes were aired at the session.

"We shared the latest in industrial relations requirements, including wages and contracts," Mr Slama said.

"Employers need to get this right so we're pleased that we can give them the latest information and make it easier to be compliant.

"We've also talked about increasing your sales using social

media, and improving the wellbeing of your workplace. These are important for business owners and employers.

"We advocate strongly for our regional members and the broader regional business community.

"One important issue is regional payroll tax and the impact this has, particularly on businesses close to the borders like those here in the Riverland.

"Being present is key to understanding local challenges and helps us determine which support tools and services are needed, here, now and in the future.

"That is why we came up to the Riverland and continue building our relationship with the RPN and with their local businesses."

Fresh round of airport funding

IMPROVING the operational capacity of Riverland airports is the goal of an ongoing federal government funding program. Applications opened last week for round 3 of the government's \$29m Regional Airports Program (RAP).

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the funding would be targeted at "vital safety and accessibility upgrades".

"This \$29 million funding injection will deliver vital upgrades and improvements to keep regional airports and aerodromes operating at their full capacity," Mr Pasin said.

"I am proud to see we are delivering more funding through an additional round to ensure our regions are better and more safely connected.

"I encourage airports and aerodromes in Barker to consider applying for funding that will make a real difference for their operations, their workers and our communities."

Under the program, grants of between \$20,000 and \$5m are available to cover up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs.

Upgrades to the Renmark Airport, and sealing of the Loxton airfield runway, were funded through the RAP in 2021.

Applications for round 3 of the RAP will remain open until May 17.

In addition to the parade on Saturday, Ms Adamson will attend and speak at the Loxton Mardi Gras 'appreciation service' on




Sunday, April 10. "We thought we'd get the governor to talk about

Paringa WAB celebrates with WAB Yurgo branch

THE foundation members of WAB (Women in Agriculture and Business) Yurgo branch always held their monthly meetings on nights with a full moon.

Narelle Scott, WAB state president, told this story recently at the branch's 90th birthday and said "there was nothing 'witchy' about it", but was common-sense when most had arrived by horse and sulky, and faced a safer journey home in moonlight instead of darkness.

Members of the Paringa branch of WAB travelled to Karoonda Institute to celebrate with the Yurgo branch at a luncheon, where many interesting stories were shared and past members recalled.

Yurgo branch was formed on March 7, 1932 when the movement's early ethos was to support rural wives and mothers in isolation; to share skills, offer advice and make lifelong friendships.

After the formal acknowledgement of the Ngarkat people, speeches of welcome were made by president of the Yurgo branch Johanna Siecker, Karoonda East Murray Mayor Caroline Phillips (former general manager of Destination Riverland for five years) and CEO of the District Council of Karoonda East Murray Martin Borgas.

Yurgo was established as a railway station after World War I on the Karoonda to Peebinga line which had opened in 1914.

A school built in 1926 was closed in 1946 and the post office, also opened in 1926, was closed in 1969. Today the Yurgo platform and railway remnants can be seen in the Karoonda Pioneer Park, while a rock with plaque denotes the former railway site. WAB members chose to retain the name and hold their meetings in nearby Karoonda.

Yurgo member Beryl Clothier, in her 90th year, joined WAB in 1970 and has lived in the Mallee her entire life, running the family farm with her son during the long illness of her husband. Beryl received a 50 year award - 36 years served as secretary to the present day - from state president Narelle and had the honour of cutting the birthday cake. Beryl missed just one meeting in 10 years, and that was due to a hospital stay.

The afternoon concluded with the state president informing guests that this year's WAB state conference would be held in Mannum in August with the promise of interesting speakers and a trip on the ps Marion.


'Acknowledgment of country' introduced by local council

AN 'acknowledgement of country' will now feature as a permanent part of every District Council of Loxton Waikerie ordinary meeting.

The now-common custom acknowledges the traditional indigenous owners of a piece of land, and is usually delivered as part of a welcome and housekeeping at meetings and events. Loxton Waikerie council has introduced an acknowledgement of country at the beginning of each monthly meeting, and also on the council's website.

The motion to introduce the custom was moved by councillor Tracy Altschwager and seconded by councillor Trevor Norton at this month's meeting, and subsequently carried.

An acknowledgement of country is carried out when a welcome to country – which must be carried out by an indigenous person – cannot be done. There are no set protocols or wording.





A little more on the history of the Golden Guitars



THE following is about four Golden Guitar pioneers who each played an important role in starting the awards that are celebrating 50 years in 2022.

The Australasian Country Music Awards – as they were known as in 1973, now known as the Golden Guitar Awards – event was the original core event around which Radio 2TM built the festival in later years. The four pioneers were:

As **Mr Hoedown** on Radio 2TM, **John Minson** was the voice of Country Music Capital until he retired in 1988. In 1973 he played a key role in planning and promoting those first Awards. John and wife **Ann** later relocated to Coffs Harbour, but made a nostalgic trip back to Tamworth for the 30th anniversary event, with Ann having recently moved back to Tamworth to be closer to family.

Kevin Knapp, a broadcaster and promotions man, ended up as the compere of the event and he stayed in that role. He hosted the presentations until 1988. Kevin lived in Tamworth, retaining an involvement in the Australian Country Music Foundation for many years.

As group general manager of the New England Network in the 1970s, **Warwick Higginbotham** gave the go ahead for the station's ambitious country music projects and maintained a hands-on involvement with the Awards for many years.

As station manager of 2TM and chief executive of the Awards in 1973, **Max Ellis** was the organising and marketing mind and driving force behind the event. Max left 2TM in 1984 to set up his own marketing consultancy, but took over the organising of the Awards again in 1992 as secretary of the newly formed Country Music Association of Australia. He remained heavily involved as CEO, Awards chief executive and vice president of that organisation until 2003. (Unfortunately Max is the only one of the four still alive, and is still involved in the festival to this day.)

Working with 2TM staff members, including radio announcers George Arklay, Bill Gleeson, Bob Lipman, Del Foote, Eric Scott and junior announcer Mark Collier, the above quartet spearheaded the foundation of an event which is now firmly ingrained in the Australian consciousness.

The Golden Guitar Awards grew out of a push by Radio 2TM to establish Tamworth as Australia's country music capital in the late 1960s. This followed the success of *Hoedown* on 2TM and a number of live shows promoted by the station in the now famous Tamworth Town Hall. Today's country music festival was originally

developed over many years by 2TM (through its subsidiary BAL Marketing) around the highly successful Australasian Country Music Awards.

As with most things, the awards venue has changed over the years. Venues have included the historic Tamworth Town Hall, a big top on the No 2 Oval, the Jakab Ambulance works, Tamworth Workers Club, Tamworth High School, Calrossy Hall, the Show Ground Rodeo Arena, and then finally into the newly constructed TREC (Tamworth Regional Entertainment Centre), now known as TRECC (Tamworth Regional Entertainment and Conference Centre). After a campaign of 20-plus years, the move

After a campaign of 20-plus years, the move into the TREC happened in 1998. I have only been to shows in six of those ven-

ues, but have attended the Golden Guitar Awards at four of them: the high school, Calrossy, Rodeo

Arena, and the TREC/TRECC.

Even though the powers that be in the entertainment industry of the day thought the awards should be staged in Sydney, these four pioneers of the festival stood their ground.

I am eagerly awaiting my copy of the **Max** Ellis-compiled book, Stars, Hurrays and Golden Guitars 2.0: The Story of Country Music Capital, which is an updated version of the original 2012 publication.

You can order this book through the Tamworth Country Music Festival website, or if going to the April festival it will be available at Collins Book Store, the Australian Country Music Hall of Fame, and the Tamworth Regional Gallery. While I'm on the subject of books, don't forget that the Smoky Dawson book, Smoky Dawson: A Life, updated edition, with the extra info added by Glenn T. 





LOXTON proved too strong for Renmark North in the Riverland A grade cricket grand final last Saturday, with the Tigers clinching the win in the dying overs of the game.

The Bluetongues got things under way with bat in hand at Loxton Oval and began well, with openers Liam Jackson and Ben Files proving to be difficult to remove for the Loxton bowlers.

The duo defended well and ensured Renmark North remained none down at the drinks break, but the travelling side had scored iust 44 runs in the opening session.

Still, the Bluetongues were happy with how things were going and with wickets in the sheds they were able to accelerate in the second half of the innings.

Files eventually fell to Jake Albrecht in the 27th over, but Jackson continued to pile on the runs.

It had been an up and down year with the bat for the Renmark North skipper, but he was able to cash in on the biggest stage, hitting his way to 83 before finally falling to Albrecht, who picked up his second wicket.

Tarque Williamson provided some middleorder hitting and Renmark North found its way to just shy of 150 in its 40 overs.

Runs are a valuable commodity in finals cricket so the Bluetongues were happy with the total, but it was now up to their bowlers to try and restrict a very deep Loxton batting order.

Loxton started swiftly, with Jake Albrecht taking 11 runs from Bradley Grant's first over, but he fell soon after to Williamson.

His opening partner, Tyler Hobby, was joined by the mercurial Josh Deren and the two began to get to work, Deren in particular striking the ball well.

Hobby held up an end while Deren punished the Renmark North attack before falling for 37 but at 2/85, Loxton was on top.

Liam Jackson gave his side a chance with his off-spin picking up wickets in the middle overs, but the damage was already done.

Hobby eventually fell for a match-winning 40 and Will Gutsche was able to finish the job, seeing Loxton over the line in the 39th over.

Renmark North's B grade side also fell at the final hurdle on the opposite oval against Wunkar.

The two teams played off in the semi-final a fortnight ago and it was Wunkar that won well, dismissing the Bluetongues for a low score

History repeated itself last Saturday as Renmark North was sent in to bat and failed to fire, with no batsman able to reach double digits in the scorebook.

Times are changing

TWO key changes to the Riverland football landscape took place last week, with the RFL announcing new Covid-19 protocols and the SANFL officially separating the Independent competition from the RFL banner as of 2023.

The RFL and Independent competitions will now be required to follow new bylaws, introduced by the SANFL for the 2022 season and beyond, that related to Covid management.

The bylaws stipulate that if a team is affected by Covid and is missing players, the game will be able to be played with both sides having less people on the field than usual, with 16 being the lowest it can go.

If one club has been severely affected and cannot play the game then the two teams will get a share of the points and percentage.

The move has been made to ensure that as many games as possible go ahead and SANFL Riverland co-ordinator Shane Uren believes it will benefit those involved in local footy.

"The stress that has been put on league and club volunteers as well as players and families due to not knowing if they're playing week to week has been huge," he said.

"For juniors, they'll be able

to share players as well so we get as many kids playing football as we can."

Fielding A grade sides will remain a priority, with clubs required to fill an A grade side first, using regulars from lower grades if necessary.

Meanwhile, the RFL's push to remove its responsibilities for the Independent competition was given the green light by the SANFL last Friday.

From 2023 onwards, the Independent competition will have its own identity, with office bearers of each of the six Independent clubs sitting for a meeting last night to discuss the direction of the competition.

"We all thought that it had stopped just short of the hole as we didn't have a clear view from the tee.


"As we approached the green the ball had disappeared - it had fallen into the front of the hole.



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
