Traffic offences in the Riverland

MURRAY Mallee Police charged two drivers with traffic offences in the Riverland over the weekend.

On Friday, May 9, Blanchetown Police stopped over a 53-year-old Morgan woman on Cemetery Road, at Morgan, for a mobile driver test.

The woman recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.128, was issued with a six-month instant loss of licence and will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Saturday, May 10, Barmera Police reported a 75-year-old Sunlands man after he was pulled over while driving on the Sturt Highway, at Barmera.

Police checks revealed the driver was disqualified from driving and he will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Slow down for roadside workers

MOTORISTS across the Riverland will soon be required to slow down when passing stationary service vehicles under new road safety laws set to take effect next week, aiming to protect roadside workers while reducing accidents on vulnerable areas.

From May 19, motorists will need to reduce their speed to 25km/h when travelling past stationary tow trucks, vans and other breakdown services vehicles stopped at the roadside and displaying flashing amber lights.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said “the roadside can be a dangerous place for breakdown services workers who face high-risk situations every day by simply doing their job and helping others”.

“If you see flashing amber lights on a vehicle up ahead, take your foot off the accelerator and reduce your speed to 25km/h,” Mr Koutsantonis said.



















“Pay attention, slow down and stick to the limit to protect the people who answer the call when car troubles strike.”

The 25km/h speed limit will not apply to drivers if the stationary breakdown services vehicle is on the opposite side of the road they are travelling.

The reduced speed limit will also apply when passing bollards or cones that have been set up around a vehicle by a breakdown services worker.

Breakdown services workers are particularly vulnerable on high-speed arterial roads, with poor visibility, weather and ground conditions also posing a risk.

The new law is an extension of the existing 25km/h speed limit in place to protect stationary school buses that have stopped to set down or pick up children, and frontline volunteers and emergency services workers with vehicles displaying flashing blue or red lights as they respond to incidents roadside.

Mr Dowd said construction of a dual-lane bypass would generate the highest safety and efficiency benefits for Riverland motorists travelling to Adelaide.

SA Minister for Transport Tom Koutsantonis said the State Government would “continue to work collaboratively with the re-elected Albanese Government to ensure the best outcome” regarding the project.

“The former Coalition Federal government and Marshall State Liberal government dramatically underscoped and underfunded previous plans for a Truro bypass, and then complained when they got into Opposition

that it was only a single-lane bypass.”

“It was the Malinauskas State Government that did the necessary proper planning work and sent detailed strategic business cases to Infrastructure Australia for a properly configured Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass – including a dual carriage-way Truro bypass.

“We have done the heavy lifting to get this project funded by the Commonwealth, with the Albanese Labor Government securing funding in the 2025-26 federal budget. Importantly, we have also had the foresight to secure the corridor to enable this dual carriageway to be built.

“The State Government has said we will, appropriately, consider funding arrangements for all federal partnerships as part of our normal budget process.”

“We also thank BMD Group who delivered this monumental project, along with the significant number of the local contractors who were utilised throughout the build,” he said.

“We appreciate the understanding and patience from St Francis of Assisi College, Angove Family Winemakers and surrounding landowners.”

Mr Hunter also thanked the Department of Environmental and Water for funding support through its Constraints Measures Program.

Our PIRSA field teams are out in our community – visiting properties, monitoring traps, and supplying Attract-and-Kill Devices (AKDs) in key locations. We also have special teams releasing sterile flies from aircraft to disrupt breeding. Plus,

our daily border checks and inspections continue to prevent infested fruit from slipping into the region.

But the truth is that the biggest difference isn’t made in labs, at borders, or from aircraft. It’s made in your backyard.

To guarantee your autumn fruit will be there to enjoy next year, start with a simple commitment today. Pick up fallen fruit. Prune your trees. Place unwanted produce in your red waste bin (not the compost).

These small steps break the fruit fly life cycle and protect the harvest – not just for commercial growers, but for every household with a fruit tree.

If you’re in Renmark or an outbreak area, your co-operation



with our field teams makes a huge difference. By welcoming our officers with a few minutes of access so they can pick, check and collect, you can be the reason your neighbourhood becomes fruit fly free.

Don’t assume someone else will do it. Fruit fly prevention is personal. It starts with what you

do after breakfast, out in the garden, or when packing for a trip.

This season is a test, but of what? Of our awareness, our responsibility, and our decision to protect the Riverland for the next generation of growers and gardeners.

The future of our produce depends on the choices we make today. Choose to act.

Riverland councils rank among South Australia’s top property markets... LOCAL HOTSPOTS

RIVERLAND property values are considered to be in one of the best value areas within regional South Australia, according to a recent property analysis.

Fresh data released by PRD Real Estate, in its Smart Moves - Regional Edition 2025 report, has highlighted Renmark Paringa and Loxton Waikerie as two Riverland councils with median prices lower than those in the capital cities, consistent positive growth in houses and units, land, stronger rental yields and lower-vacancy rates compared to their capital city counterparts.

The two councils are seen to have a solid pipeline of residential construction set for this year, all paired with an unemployment rate below the national average of 4.1 per cent.

Renmark Paringa, with a median house price of \$380,000, had a 10.1 per cent price growth over the past 12 months.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said “the demand for housing and rental properties in the Renmark Paringa area has continued to grow and Renmark Paringa Council is working hard to support the need for more housing opportunities”.

“Council will soon be endorsing its Renmark Paringa Growth Strategy, which identifies ways to remove blockers to significantly grow our area and support the demand,” Mr Hunter said.

“Two major priorities identified in the strategy are the Jane Eliza Development, and Riverview Drive, in Paringa.

“Both these locations will go a long way to helping meet the growing number of people wanting to live in our beautiful towns.

“It has been pleasing to hear the data and numbers of homebuyers looking to live and build in Renmark Paringa, because it confirms to us that our efforts to support the housing market are much needed.”

Loxton Waikerie, which has a median house price of \$357,500, had 11.7 per cent price growth over the past 12 months.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said “apart from experiencing the residential price growth in the past year, Loxton was also identified as the fastest-growing Riverland town in the most recently completed Census”.

“The DCLW began developing a Growth Strategy in the previous term of council and this has been consulted on and adopted this term,” Mr Norton said.

“Almost \$20m of grants have been received, to increase childcare and aged care facilities in Loxton, with construction on the new Woodleigh Centre on Kokoda Terrace, already started.

“Council has entered an agreement with Cornerstone Housing Ltd to build up to 15 new residences on Anzac Crescent, Loxton, for essential workers moving to the district.

“We have also been planning for and working on increases to our storm water and wastewater service capacity to accommodate further development by private partners in Loxton and our other towns across the district.

“The Riverland is a great place to live and access to good childcare, schools, and reliable healthcare, works hand in hand with the economic drivers of employment and accommodation to grow our communities.

“Housing is a challenge in the Riverland, across Australia and around the world, and every day we are working to meet these needs.”

PRD Real Estate chief economist, and report author, Diawasti Mardiasmo said “these areas should experience continued value growth”.

“These council areas have quite strong economic bases, and it means that if you choose to move into these areas, your likelihood of getting a job is higher,” she said.

“These areas have had double digit growth, which is positive.

“This period right now where we are dealing with higher interest rates – there is the possibility we will experience continued, albeit tempered value growth, but if we get three or four cash rates, that’s where you’ll see a stronger uptick in growth.”

New water tanks secure Taplan’s water supply

MORE than 690,000L of drinking water can now be stored in newly-constructed tanks at Taplan, aiming to improve water supply and reliability for the Riverland town.

SA Water has recently completed a \$10m renovation on new water storage tanks located on Taplan Road, increasing storage capacity up to five-times compared to the previous structures, built more than 40 years ago.

The increased capacity will provide a buffer during drier conditions and improve the ability to provide water to the community during times of peak demand, benefiting more than 700 homes and local businesses.

SA Water acting general manager of sustainable infrastructure Peter Seltikas said “this important project has ensured a continued and secure supply of drinking water for the community now and into the future”.

“There are around 700 homes and businesses in the Taplan and surrounding area which are supplied by these tanks for their water needs, and we’re excited to see this new infrastructure up and running which has future-proofed the local water network for many years to come,” Mr Seltikas said.

“The elevated steel tank, which sits 15.5m high, can store 136,000L of water and is supplied by an above ground tank with a capacity of 560,000L.

“Water is pumped into the above-ground tank before being transferred into the elevated tank as needed, with this elevation harnessing gravity to provide reliable pressure into the network, enabling water to flow through an underground pipeline and into our customers’ properties for everyday use.

“The old structure, built around 40 years ago, was decommissioned and demolished after reaching the end of its useful life, and through construction of the new tanks, we maintained an uninterrupted water supply to the local area using temporary bypass tanks and pumps.

“This has been a significant project for Taplan’s water network, with approximately 60 people involved in the work, and we’re grateful for the positive engagement and support from neighbouring landholders.

“We look forward to delivering lasting benefits through this new infrastructure as the project is one of many investments we are making in our regional networks across South Australia through our four-year, \$3.3bn capital program to deliver reliable services for our customers into the future.”

THE YEARS GO BY

A token gesture?

AN attempt to win some public favour saw supermarket giant Woolworths on Monday announce it would drop shelf prices on hundreds of products by 10 per cent.

Public reaction to the announcement across social media is probably a few levels lower than the positivity Woolworths would have hoped for, and could people really be blamed for having some suspicions?

For many local families and individuals, the supermarket aisles are becoming an increasingly bleak place to spend time. Over the past 12 to 18 months we’ve seen prices on everything – from daily essentials to those rare luxury treats – increasing to levels that push bank accounts to the brink.

Anecdotally, there would likely be many of us across the Riverland community who, considering the prices at the two major supermarket chains, find the quality of some items, particularly fresh fruit and vegetables, to be lacking in regional areas.

How many times have you brought home an onion to find brown layers in the middle, or to see expensive fresh herbs wilting seemingly within hours of purchase?

So overall, how realistic an idea is it to expect these 10 per cent reductions to help the current cost-of-living crisis?

Firstly, there would be no shortage of supermarket customers willing to argue that prices, even within the past six to 12 months, have increased far more than 10 per cent.

Take the – previously humble – block of chocolate made by any major confectioner as an example. Prices of \$4, or \$4.50 seem like a not-too distant memory still, however, current prices would be around the \$8 mark.

It would seem hard to believe an 80c difference is going to stem the flow of tears from little Jimmy’s eyes when his mum is unable to afford even Woolworths’ attempt at chocolate, let alone Cadbury.

Chocolate, alongside everyone’s favourite potato-based savory snacks, are also an example of an area where little method is being applied to the madness of current pricing.

A standard 180g bar of – desirable – chocolate sits around that \$8 mark, and around \$5 for the equivalent-size bag of potato chips. These monetary figures are just droppings enough, however ‘value packs’ of the same items, which are at least 50 per cent larger in size, seem to only be between 50c to \$1 more expensive.

Are so many fewer of these value packs sold, that what could be a potential loss in profit becomes negligible?

Putting a tag of \$150 on a weekly family shop even seems like a rose-tinted notion when looking at current prices. It would be interesting to see what the breakdown of that trolley looks like.

Saving a supposed \$15 each week of that total is also seemingly unlikely enough to make any major difference for struggling families, and is a rather transparent gesture while those at the top of the supermarket mountain continue to enjoy massive profit levels, and salaries.

Back to the drawing board, perhaps?



Barmera-boy, ‘Tom’ Simes, former Department for Agriculture horticultural advisor, spent his early school years at Barmera, Glossop and St Peter’s College before completing an Ag Diploma at Roseworthy. He then came back to the family fruit-block at Barmera. In the mid-1960s, after several years, he joined the department as horticultural advisor, in Berri. In 1969, he moved to Loxton as viticultural advisor, helping many newcomers into fruit-growing and instigating irrigators ordering their water when needed, rather than having water supplied on a rotational basis. This undergirded the now-standard practice of water on demand. He was a keen supporter of both the highly successful Ag Bureaux, as sources of information, and of the Riverland Field and Gadget Days, a forerunner of the Riverland Field Days. He assisted with the staging of this major event and thoroughly enjoyed judging the gadget entries. Tom served for many years as a member of many community groups and organisations, including being an inaugural member of Barmera Apex, of which he became a life member. He especially enjoyed singing and was involved for a long time with the Riverland Musical Society, as well as the Loxton Probus Club singing group. Tom was born on May 19, 1929 (96 years ago), and died March 14, 2004. Past advisors such as Tom are long gone, but their valuable contribution remains. PHOTO: Loxton News.

Bearing in mind at least 25 per cent of the population has some form of disability, and this percentage is growing day by day, with accidents in the home,

or on the road with recreational activities, diseases, or many other causes that makes a person disabled.

There are many people with a disability involved with the arts and show their worth in the form of art they can create. It is about time the arts started thinking about all people in the community and spend money on projects that involve all people.

In 2012, then Berri Barmera Mayor Peter Hunt was approached with reference to crossing the road at the Barmera Post Office.

One day we arranged to meet Peter at the front of the Bonney Theatre. Along with Peter was an entourage of his works manager, the media, and a few other necessary people.

Well, I rode down in Julie Anne’s spare electric wheelchair. To Peter’s surprise he was asked to cross to the Post Office in this wheelchair, and after a few mishaps which included negotiating with traffic at the roundabout, he finally reached the Post Office.

This was a practical demonstration that was to prove a point.

You now see the fruit of the well-executed exercise, with a very-safe place for all to cross the intersection safely.

I implore those in a position of power and decision making take this seriously and consider all of the community.

GRAIN Producers SA (GPSA) has congratulated Julie Collins on her reappointment as Federal Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, and has renewed calls for the minister to visit South Australia to witness firsthand the crippling impact of drought on the state’s grain producers.

GPSA has written to Minister Collins to congratulate her on the reappointment and again invited her to visit SA’s drought-affected grain producers and communities after the driest 16 months on record for the state.

The minister met with GPSA online during the caretaker period of government, but conditions on the ground have worsened since.

We congratulate Ms Collins on her reappointment and look forward to continuing a constructive working relationship.

However, the situation on the ground in South Australia is dire. Grain producers are still grappling with one of the most severe droughts in recent memory, with many regions recording their driest seasons in over a century. Worryingly, rain forecasts are predicting very little in the coming weeks.

This drought is not just impacting individual farming businesses — it is undermining entire regional economies and taking a significant toll on mental health across our communities.

GPSA had previously invited Ms Collins to South Australia and was renewing that invitation following the Federal Election.

We strongly believe the best way for decision makers to

Calls to meet the Freshwater Challenge

THE Murray-Darling Conservation Alliance has welcomed a budget commitment to meet Australia’s nature restoration goals, while urging the Albanese Government to announce additional targets and funding for inland rivers, wetlands and lakes to meet a global ‘Freshwater Challenge’.

The Freshwater Challenge is a global push to restore degraded rivers and wetlands by 2030, based on international agreements.

Australia recently joined almost 50 countries committing to this pledge, requiring the government to set specific targets for the area of river and wetlands to be restored.

Returning water to wetlands in the Murray-Darling Basin is a critical part of achieving Australia’s targets to protect and restore 30 per cent of land, marine and inland water areas by 2030.

The Albanese Government could complement this new commitment by announcing more specific targets and funding to restore rivers and wetlands in the Murray-Darling – as we’ve pledged to do under the new Freshwater Challenge.

Last year the Wentworth Group of Concerned Scientists released a comprehensive blueprint to repair Australia’s landscapes and the biggest investment is needed for degraded river systems – costed at \$2.9 billion annually over 30 years.

Today’s announcement of \$250 million represents vital momentum and an important down payment. We hope to see it significantly scaled up to meet the challenges of the future.

Equality needed in dental care

CONSUMERS Health Forum of Australia (CHF) is calling for the Albanese Government to take immediate action to fix the deepening divide in healthcare access, starting with dental care. Australians all across the country, from metropolitan areas to remote towns, should be able to receive dental and oral care whenever needed, and their postcode or bank balance shouldn’t be a deciding factor.

No one should have to travel thousands of kilometres away, or wait five-to-10 years just to have their teeth checked. That is not a system - that’s abandon-

ment.

Dental care is health care. It’s not cosmetic, it’s not optional, and it shouldn’t be out of reach because of where you live or how much you earn.

It’s time to bring all of dental into Medicare, while also closing the rural health divide. We need a system that serves everybody, from capital cities to the most remote towns. Access to dental care shouldn’t depend on your income or postcode. We must end the postcode lottery in dental health and make the system truly universal.

One-third of Australians live outside major cities, yet many face long waits, out-of-pocket costs and poorer health outcomes all because of where they live.

CHF is pushing for a package of reforms to make all dental care more affordable, timely and accessible.

There are calls for an expansion of Medicare to include dental care, closure of the healthcare gap for people living in rural and regional areas, and stronger Medicare incentives to attract and retain specialists in the regions.

Finding accessible and affordable dental care is harder when you’re outside the major cities. But simple and smart reforms can improve outcomes for regional and rural patients.

Dental health is a major blind spot in our universal health system. Over and over again, we are told consumers avoid essen-

tial ongoing treatment because they can’t afford it because of how expensive dental care is and the low Medicare and health insurance rebates.

Parents are living with guilt because they can’t afford to provide treatment such as braces for their children, which is an awful position for Australian parents to be in.

CHF is a proud member of the National Oral Health Alliance and supports the Alliance’s five point plan to give Australia the oral healthcare system it needs. The five points are:

❑ Expand Medicare to include dental care so all Australians can access affordable dental services no matter where they live.

❑ Enhance affordability and access in regional and rural areas by increasing bulk-billing incentives for GPs, specialists and dental services, particularly in areas with socio-economic disadvantage.

❑ A system to ensure automatic application of the PBS Safety Net pricing.

❑ Improve access to healthcare services through longer and more flexible specialist referrals so consumers don’t have to keep going back to their GP.

❑ More investment in consumer health peak bodies so the voices of rural and regional Australians are heard in healthcare policy and decision-making.

Community help close the gap on local disability services

A LOCAL community group has helped a Riverland NDIS support provider continue to empower and close the gap in services for rural people living with a disability. The Renmark Lions Club have recently donated a driving simulator to the recreational hub of local NDIS provider Support & Connect, adding to the many on-site activities at the Berri location, which also hosts a fully equipped commercial kitchen, gym, therapy space, and lounge area with games and crafting. Set up within the cabin sections of an old ute, the driving simula-

tor operates with graduated driving modules to aid a participant’s capacity to eventually achieve a driving licence. “We have had a brilliant response from clients,” Support & Connect managing director Dylan Blackley said. “Since it has been put in, the 10 available monthly slots have been booked out. “We would really love to extend our heartfelt thanks to the Renmark Lions Club for their generous financial support.” Renmark Lions president Paul Farr said the community group was “pleased to (provide Support & Connect) with the piece of equip-

ment for their recreational hub”. “Given that most of the clients using the hub may not have access to a motor vehicle to be taught how to drive, Dylan saw the need for a driving simulator to assist with this purpose,” he said. “We are pleased with the final result of Dylan’s efforts in building the simulator within the recreational hub, which is proving to be well received by the clients.” Creating Support & Connect 18 months ago, Mr Blackley said his goal was to “close the gap (he) saw (as a support worker) for young people on NDIS”. “I really saw the need for young people on the NDIS to have a

space, but also young mentors to support them,” he said. “Over the past 18 months, we have had massive successes with clients, just in improved wellbeing, looking to rent their own homes, and learning about finance. “This has all come about by lifting the barrier of providing the right mentor.” Providing the Berri recreational hub six later, Mr Blackley said his “passion to fill service voids for young people in the NDIS” was the drive to expand Support & Connect. “Something that was meant to be two years down the track, became something I was doing six

months into running Support & Connect,” he said. “Being down in the country, we’re starved of so many resources and facilities as it is, especially for our young individuals — they miss out the most. “As a kid, I went through some (difficult) things, so I have always had that passion to help where I can. “To me, it was so worth it, and it’s paid off — we have an amazing team, families, and clients, and we get fantastic results.” For more information, visit the website (supportandconnect.com.au).

Men’s Shed looking to build new legacy

THE Barmera Men’s Shed is opening its doors to new members, with the space available to locals of all ages to woodwork and find comradeship. Located at Barmera’s Bruce Oval, the local Men’s Shed is open bi-weekly, on Mondays and Thursdays, from 8.30am to 12.30pm, and is currently searching for new members to join the current crew of 24 men. Though a staple in the community for the past 14 years as a space for men to find community and learn new skills, chairman John Hughes said the shed has been struggling to gain new members due to some misconceptions. “People think they are either not old enough, or don’t have enough skills to learn,” he said. “But, we are open to men of all ages, and most of our members have had to learn how to use the machinery from scratch. “We have found that skills are shared between the members and passed down, which is why it would be fantastic to have some younger members — we could all learn so much from them.

“More members would also mean we could expand our opening times to the community. “I would like for anyone slightly interested to come along and give it a go — the only requirement is you need to wear safe (closed in) shoes for the workshop.” With a workshop full of tools and machinery, Mr Hughes said the group often create birdhouses, cutting boards, and salt and pepper shakers, alongside community requests for bigger projects. However, with the meetings always including a “delicious morning tea”, Mr Hughes said if future members were uninterested in using the workshop, they were still able to come along “to meet others and build friendships”. “Sometimes, the comradeship is just as important as having a challenging project or keeping busy,” he said. Joining three years ago after moving to the Riverland from Adelaide, workshop supervisor Aubrey Bastian encouraged local men of the area to come, as the Barmera shed “could not be more welcoming”. “I just love this place, it’s unreal,” Mr Bastian said. “The guys here are just amazing — I was straight-away embraced and spoken to like I had been here for years. “The workshop is also brilliant, we have some really great (machinery) and tools. “I would love to see more guys in here and there is plenty of space for them... Potential update to Berri Barmera hard waste collection

MADISON EASTMOND

A RIVERLAND council may be implementing a quarterly model for hard waste collection.

Berri Barmera councillors at last month’s general meeting voted to investigate a quarterly model for a hard waste collection service, which they have delivered since 2012 on a rotating annual schedule.

The new service would involve a quarterly rotating schedule between townships Berri and Barmera, supported by a capped-price booking system, with projected 2025–26

costs of \$77,490.

A report on the matter within council’s April general meeting agenda advised the annual service “has served the community well to date... there is a common community perception that the current rotating (annual) model creates inequity between townships”.

“Some residents feel they ‘miss out’ during off-years,” the report read.

“This can result in the accumulation of hard waste in areas waiting up to three years for the next collection, contributing to unsightly streetscapes and potential environmental risks.

“Notably, the 2024/25 budget for illegal dumping clean-ups is forecast to exceed allocations by approximately \$10,000.

“Given these concerns, there is merit in reviewing the program’s structure and exploring alternative service models that may provide a more equitable, flexible, and cost-effective solution for the community.”

The report suggested a possible transition to a quarterly collection hard waste model.

“This approach would see different areas serviced in a staggered manner throughout the year, potentially improving convenience and responsiveness,” it read.

“One option for implementing this could involve allocating specific quarters to different townships and introducing a capped-price booking system.

“A further feasibility study is required, but it is suggested that this approach be trialled while remaining within the existing budget framework.

“The projected budget requirements for maintaining the service, as outlined earlier in this report, should guide the scope and design of any trial implementation.”

New RPC measures encouraging dog registration

A RIVERLAND council will offer its residents discounted registrations for new puppies, and wave the fee during June.

Renmark Paringa councillors at last month’s general meeting voted to set council’s 2025/26 animal management fees and charges.

A report on the matter within council’s April general meeting agenda advised new measures were aimed at increasing dog registration rates.

“Registration data shows that many puppy owners are delaying the registration of their puppy completely until they have been desexed to avoid the full registration fee of \$70,” the report read.

“This delay in registering the puppy is problematic and causes difficulties for staff in tracking owners and proper identification of the dogs if they were to be lost, stolen or have been harassing the public.

“To alleviate this, council staff recommend a discount of 50 per cent of the non-standard regis-

tration fee to apply to a new charge for all puppies under six months of age.

“By adding this fee it would encourage more responsible pet ownership, enabling puppies to be more frequently microchipped and registered at the legislated age of three months.”

The introduction of a free registration period for dogs during June was also expected to improve long-term compliance.

“To enable greater equity and compliance, staff propose the addition

of a fee-free period in June,” the report read.

“By providing this grace period for all new dog registrations between June 1 and 30, owners would have the opportunity to register their dog before renewals become due again on July 1.

“This provides an opportunity for responsible dog owners to register their dog in June and not have to pay the full year’s registration fee, only to pay another full year fee again in July.

“This is expected to promote improved long-term registration compliance and efficiency for Council Staff and Dogs and Cats Online (DACO) users.”

Council has also proposed the establishment of a part-year fee for new dog registrations after January, to be set at 50 per cent of the applicable full fee and is expected to improve compliance, along with an increase from \$200 to \$395 to surrender a dog, and from \$60 to \$150 to surrender a cat.

New animal management fees adjusted to cost of living

BERRI Barmera’s animal management fees will remain largely unchanged for the 2025-26 financial year, in a bid to ease cost-of-living pressures for residents.

Outside the fee to surrender a dog, Berri Barmera councillors at last month’s general April meeting have voted to keep the same animal management fees that have been in place for the past seven years.

A report on the matter within council’s April general meeting agenda advised the only adjustment, the to

surrender fee of a dog rising from \$150 to \$395, was to “better reflect the actual cost of service and maintain consistency across the region”.

“The cat surrender fee remains at \$150,” the report read.

“This recommendation (to raise the dog surrender fee) aligns with the fees already endorsed by District Council of Loxton Waikerie at their council meeting on April 16 2025, and the proposed increase by Renmark Paringa Council, helping to ensure a consistent approach across all three

Riverland councils.

“The recommended dog surrender fee also aligns with the surrender fee required to be paid should Council utilise the services of the Animal Welfare League.”

The report also advised that it “recommended the remaining fees stay unchanged” due to the current finical climate for residents in the townships.

“(It would) help ease the cost-of-living pressures on residents and because we are the most expensive within the Riverland region” the report read.

Council provides support for CFS operations

A RIVERLAND council will provide support towards the construction of new water tanks to help improve the region’s preparedness toward fires. Renmark Paringa Councillors at last month’s general meeting passed a motion to provide an in-kind contribution up to the value of \$15,000 toward the CFS, for site preparation and material to construct a rub-

ble pad supporting two 22,500L poly tanks, a 20ft shipping container, and the supply and installation of a 50m run of infeed water line. The infrastructure, to be located at the Renmark Aerodrome, will be used as a designated site for water and fuel reloading air operations during fire events. A council report on the matter - contained within the April general meeting agenda -

stated the tanks would be a benefit to the entire Riverland in a potential bushfire scenario. “The CFS have installed numerous reloading bases identical to this proposal located at airfields throughout the state to enhance the response times during a fire event,” the report read. “Aircraft would utilise the Renmark Aerodrome as a refilling base from the (proposed) water tanks and refuel when required via existing fuel bowsers. The proposed infill water line would assist in refilling the tanks

upon use between aircraft refills – noting the infill line is not required to refill the water tanks at the same speed as the extraction. “Currently the closest reloading base for CFS Air Operation aircrafts are located at Lameroo, and Murray Bridge, making the implementation of a designated reloading base within the Riverland region a potential opportunity to vastly improve the aerial response capabilities of the CFS and be of great benefit to Renmark and surrounding communities.”

Loxton shows History Sure Ain't Boring

AN audience of 120 attentive people were in luck for the 13th annual Loxton's History Sure Ain't Boring evening, held at the Loxton Precinct. Supported by the Loxton Waikerie District Council, the May 6 event was part of the South Australian History Festival.

A popular new format with an 'On the Couch' segment was introduced this year. Interviewed by former Murray Pioneer journalist Stephanie Thompson, past employees of Eudunda Farmers' Loxton store, Dianne, Graham and Wayne Boehm shared memories of the general store (now Koch's Foodland site) that sold everything from cars to carrots.

Then, home deliveries and booking-up purchases to the family account was the norm.

E u d u n d a F a r m e r s Co-operative, with 62 stores statewide, opened their Loxton store in 1910. Recollections of 'a little bit of mischief and romance', along with social gatherings by the river and staff holiday trips, were highlights, and prompted much laughter from the audience.

Next, Leon Stasinowsky's presentation revealed a hidden network of mallee wells built during the 1860s, at 15km intervals. This was the distance cattle and sheep could walk per day, as they were herded overland

through the dry mallee, towards the river and on to the Adelaide markets. Each watering hole owns stories of resilient characters who used, built or lived at the wells. No more than ruins today, the wells' prompted the establishment of farms in the mallee.

The final speaker was Loxton Public Library's history officer Emma Walter, who focussed on the SA History Festival's theme, 'Decisions'. Her presentation explained how to decide if an artefact is historically significant enough to keep, or whether to discard it. Ms Walter revealed criteria to guide listeners on how to preserve and manage

their own family mementos and unlock the stories they hold.

Organising committee member Margaret Wormald said "the audiences and their responses prove there are plenty of history enthusiasts in the community".

Attendees had the opportunity to provide feedback and suggest future topics.

Mrs Wormald said "we aim to keep the event evolving and responding to audience interests as we plan for the 2026 event. We encourage and welcome new members and their ideas to the committee."

Council to discuss standpipe project plans

MID Murray Council is expected to consider how it will invest the SA Government funding it has received for its community and regional standpipe water supply project.

The State Government has provided \$207,500 in funds to the council from Primary Industries and Regions South Australia's (PIRSA) Strengthening Industries Program grant.

Mid Murray Council will also benefit from the SA Government's allocation of \$1.4m to co-invest with councils in the upgrade of regional standpipes.

This money is part of the State Government's \$55m package of comprehensive assistance for drought-affected SA farmers and communities.

The council applied for \$415,000 from the PIRSA grant in November last year.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey told The Murray Pioneer council welcomed the financial support the State Government had provided for its standpipe water supply project.

"While full funding for the entire project would have been ideal, we're grateful for the support provided," she said.

"I'm confident that council will work proactively to explore solutions that ensure we can automate the majority of our region's standpipes and deliver a more reliable and efficient water supply system for our communities."

Mid Murray Council presently operates 14 standpipes supplied by SA Water, which provide community access to a common water supply source where there is no direct SA Water mains supply to individual properties.

These include standpipes at Blanchetown, Morgan and

Swan Reach.

Ms Bailey said decisions about the future operations of the standpipes in the district and those that should be automated would be discussed at its meeting next week.

She said automating the standpipes would provide the community with 24/7 access to water.

"It would improve efficiency, security, and accountability, and payments could be made instantly at the standpipe," Ms Bailey said.

Ms Bailey said it was unknown if some standpipes would be decommissioned.

"A decision should be made at the May council meeting," she said.

"At this stage, the State Government funding should cover automation of around seven of council's 12 standpipes.

"Staff and I are working with other stakeholders to try to get more funding to automate as many as council can."

Ms Bailey said it was important to note the provision of water was not a core function of local government and it was generally a state government responsibility.

"Since the 1990s, council has managed this essential infrastructure when SA

Water vested the infrastructure to council," she said.

"I'm not aware of any metropolitan councils expected to use ratepayer funds for this kind of service.

"That said, these standpipes provide critical access to water for primary producers, commercial businesses, and residents across our region, all of whom are experiencing the effects of drought.

"Many have been experiencing drought for much more than just this year."

Ms Bailey said standpipes were used for everything from livestock and irrigation, to domestic supply, and even firefighting.

"Water keeps our local economies going and communities functioning," she said.

"We know how important this infrastructure is to our communities and we also know how stressful this uncertainty has been."

Ms Bailey was hopeful council would be in a position to make a decision about its standpipe water supply project at its May meeting next week.

"This would provide some much-needed clarity and reassurance to our communities," she said.

Waikerie began the 2025 season with back-to-back wins on home turf over both Loxton and Loxton North.

Round one saw the Magpies shoot out of the blocks, flying away to a 38-point three-quarter time advantage.

Despite Loxton’s best efforts to come back into the match, Waikerie managed to hold its nerve in the final quarter for an 18-point victory.

Jake Spencely proved crucial to the Waikerie victory in his new role across half back, while the likes of Hilton and Tim Bevan found the ball with ease across the afternoon.

Up forward, Shaun King booted four goals for the Magpies on the day, while Ryan Turner finished the day with two.

The following week, a poor afternoon in front of goal left the home side scrambling against the Panthers, before ultimately hanging on.

From 19 scoring opportunities, the Magpies converted just six, but the ability to find a way to win was pleasing for new coach Jackson Sutton.

Ben Smith was strong in the middle of the ground, while Tristan Geehman and Ryan Shaw also provided a strong presence.

Meanwhile, it was a competitive performance from Waikerie against Barmera-Monash last weekend, particularly in the first half.



The Pies trailed by just two points at the major break, but it was seven goals to two in the second half from the Roos that overran Waikerie, recording its first loss of the season.

This weekend presents as a strong opportunity for Waikerie, hoping to atone from a 17-point loss in the preliminary final last season.

On the other side of the fence, Renmark began the season with a comprehensive 79-point win over Loxton North, at Panther Park.

Despite somewhat of a sluggish start, the Rovers quickly kicked into gear in

a huge effort, largely inspired by Nick Gillard.

Gillard finished the day with seven majors, while key forward Brody Rover booted six, and small forward Declan Johnson recorded five.

However, Renmark stumbled in round two against Barmera-Monash, failing to convert opportunities in the grand final rematch, ultimately falling by 18 points.

Woolford duo Tim and Dan fought valiantly with a strong performance, while Josh Vater also found a lot of the football.

Last week saw Renmark survive the ultimate scare, getting the better of Berri at RFL headquarters by just seven points.

It was a stirring performance from the undermanned Rovers in the final quarter, putting through four goals to one to steal the victory.

With Waikerie posing a threatening attacking six, and Renmark’s ability to defend the ground, an intriguing battle awaits.

The Rovers will be hoping to keep the Gill-Lehmann Cup at the Kennel, with the winner of the match also set to jump inside the top two.

The first bounce of the Gill-Lehmann Cup will be at 2.40pm, at Renmark Oval, with the game set to be called live by 5RM, from 2.30pm, following The Sideline View earlier in the day.

Winter fruit fly tactics set within the Riverland

A RANGE of important measures are being set as part of the fruit fly response pest response plan, aiming to protect growers and the Riverland’s delicate horticulture sector.

Department for Primary Industries (PIRSA) acting general manager Jason Size said community support is vital to tackle outbreaks.

“We have a strong prevention program in place that’s shaped by the commitment of local communities, strengthened by the support of our growers, and backed by the tireless work of our teams on the ground,” he said.

“This includes travel restrictions, monitoring and detection, as well as our recurring sterile fly releases to combat wild fruit flies.”

The Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) program has been an effective measure against fruit fly, with more than three billion sterile fruit flies released over the Riverland outbreak areas, since the program started in

December 2020.

These sterile flies breed with wild flies, disrupting the breeding cycle and ultimately aiding the suppression of the wild populations.

Mr Size said, in addition to the SIT program, a range of teams are out every day as part of the broader response, to ensure the Riverland region is protected, including border and outbreak area inspections.

“We urge local communities, especially Renmark, where detections have been more prevalent, to support staff making on-site property visits, to look for signs of fruit fly and put control measures in place,” he said

“Our boots-on-the-ground monitoring work is critical to early detection and rapid response.

“Fruit fly officers conduct regular trap inspections, visit homes and businesses, check for signs of fruit fly activity, and provide Attract-and-Kill Devices (AKDs) to property owners to optimise outbreak coverage.

“They also manage baiting programs that target adult fruit flies and help residents with good fruit hygiene, such as removing fallen fruit and pruning trees, to reduce the appeal of potential breeding sites.

“However, fighting fruit fly requires everyone working together. It’s only with the support of the community that our strong program can protect the Riverland and our horticulture industry.”

Riverland wines showcased to potential new importers

A STATE government initiative has given Riverland wineries a chance to showcase their wines to more than 100 “influential” importers who visited South Australia.

Riverland wine producers were among those exhibiting at a recent event, held at the National Wine Centre, featuring importers from the South Australian Wine Ambassadors Club (SAWAC).

Minister for Trade and Investment Joe Szakacs said importers from Hong Kong, Japan, South Korea, Vietnam and Thailand participated in the “intensive four-day program”, which included

visits to the Adelaide Hills, Barossa, Clare Valley and McLaren Vale regions.

“This program is making sure South Australia’s globally recognised wine is reaching new audiences and capitalising on new opportunities,”

“While South Australia’s premium wine exports to China have skyrocketed in the last 12 months - a tremendous result - this government also recognises that diversification builds a stronger and more resilient industry.

“The South Australian Wine Ambassadors Club is an important diversification tool for our state’s

wine industry, particularly as global tariffs have again reared their ugly head.

“This program plays a critical role in drawing attention to the quality of our state’s premium wine in emerging markets like Vietnam, Hong Kong, South Korea, India and Thailand.”

SAWAC members are required to import at least one new-to-market brand in the first year of membership, and participate in promotional events.

Since its inauguration, the program has helped 75 additional brands break into six new markets and has delivered \$2.14 million in first export orders.

Communities to apply for standpipe upgrade funds

RIVERLAND councils are invited to apply for new drought-support funding, aimed at upgrading current standpipe infrastructure and improving security of access to water for rural residents, primary producers and livestock.

The new Publicly Accessible Standpipe Upgrade Fund will allocate \$1.4m to drought-affected regions in a bid to assist councils upgrading their current standpipes, many of which were transferred from SA Water to councils in the 1990s.

Under the program, local governments with management responsibility for publicly accessible standpipes can apply for \$17,250 per eligible standpipe in their council area to invest to upgrade their infrastructure.

The local government can decide what upgrades they make and to how many standpipes.

Automation of standpipes is one of the upgrade options, as it allows councils to have the water paid for as it is taken, and can provide 24-hour access for residents.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said “this grant program forms part of our \$73m

support package to assist communities experiencing some of the driest conditions on record”.

“Standpipes play a critical role in delivering potable and domestic water to those who aren’t connected to mains water, or have run out of stored supply,” Ms Scriven said.

“This grant program recognises the importance of this infrastructure, and the pressures councils face in maintaining it.

“The funding provides flexibility in upgrades to provide continued water access to drought-affected communities.”

Currently, standpipes in a number of councils involve residents obtaining a key for access during business hours and then receiving an invoice from council. This is time-consuming, costly for councils, and less convenient for residents. This grant is part of the Government’s \$73m Drought Support Package, and has been designed in direct consultation with primary producers, including roundtables with farmers and key industry bodies. Riverlanders able to provide feedback on SA disability inclusion plan

The State Government has

opened public consultation for the plan to ensure varied voices of the disability community are heard.

Though progress has been made since the launch of the first State Disability Inclusion Plan in 2019, feedback from consultation with community has highlighted

there is still work to be done to break down the barriers people with disability continue to face.

Access, Opportunity, Support, Wellbeing, and Justice — these five themes, shaped by community feedback, will drive the State Plan for the next four years.

There are also seven priority groups of people with disability: Aboriginal people, culturally and linguistically diverse people (CALD), children, women, LGBTIQ+, and people with significant intellectual disability, or who have high levels of vulnerability due to disability.

“The State Disability Inclusion Plan 2025-2029 sets out an important pathway forward in South Australia to a society that enables everyone to be able to participate equally and feel connected to their

communities,” Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said,

“The only way we can truly achieve this is by listening to as many people in the disability community as possible.

“The contributions of those with lived experience of disability, family members, carers and providers are crucial to creating meaningful changes that improve people’s lives.”

The State Disability Inclusion Plan has been developed in alignment with Australia’s Disability

Strategy 2021-2031, and will also work alongside and interact with the SA Autism Strategy 2024-2029.

Those who wish to have their say can download the draft plan online and complete the survey, or make a visual, audio or written submission to the Department of Human Services via email.

Public consultation closes tomorrow.

Building homes faster through improved apprenticeships

A NEW apprenticeship program will be introduced next year, open to students in the Riverland, to create a streamlined pipeline of skilled workers, aiming to support South Australia’s major infrastructure projects.

Launching in 2026, the Industry Accelerated Apprenticeship Pilot (IAAP) is an Australian-first and will support up to 1000 new apprenticeships, by fast-tracking spots in key trades, across seven critical trade pathways.

The state’s construction sector is facing significant workforce shortages, particularly in trades such as carpentry, civil construction, and plastering, with data from the Department of State Development showing South Australia will need an estimated 78,000 additional vocational qualifications over the next five years to meet forecasted demand.

The pilot program has been designed to meet the demands from projects including the Torrens to Darlington, the new Women’s and Children’s Hospital, new housing, and defence initiatives such as AUKUS.

The program focuses on seven high-demand trades: carpentry, cookery, painting, civil construction, plant operations, mechanical engineering, and fabrication engineering.

Building on South Australia’s existing flexible apprenticeship framework, which already allows early completion in some trades, training will be tailored to real-world job requirements, with intensive on-the-job learning and quality assurance from Group Training Organisations (GTOs).

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said “South Australia is entering a once-in-a-generation infrastructure boom”.

“To deliver on our ambitions, we need a skilled workforce ready to hit the ground running,” Mr Boyer said.

“The fast-track pilot is a proactive solution that accelerates apprentices into areas of critical demand, while maintaining training quality and apprentice wellbeing. It’s about meeting the needs of industry and creating strong career pathways for South Australians.

“These accelerated apprenticeships will give South Australians a faster pathway to secure, well-paid jobs, while ensuring our major projects stay on track.”

The following pathways will be shortened:

- ❑ Certificate III in Carpentry, which includes roles such as joiners and carpenters, will go from 48 to 36 months reduction time.
- ❑ Certificate III in Commercial Cookery, which includes roles such as sous and pastry chefs, will go from 48 to 30 months.
- ❑ Certificate III in Painting and Decorating, will go from 48 to 36 months.
- ❑ Certificate III in Civil Construction, which includes road and tunnel construction, will go from 36 to 18 months.
- ❑ Certificate III in Civil Construction Plant Operations, which includes roles like mobile plant operators, road construction workers and civil construction plant operators, will go from 36 to 18 months.
- ❑ Certificate III in Engineering – Fabrication Trade, which includes roles like fitters and turners, mechanical fitters, toolmaking and welding, will go from 48 to 36 months
- ❑ Certificate III in Engineering – Mechanical Trade, which includes roles like technical fitters and machinists, will go from 48 to 36 months.

The South Australian Skills Commission will undertake stakeholder engagement across industry, unions, employers, and training providers to ensure the pilot is responsive to workforce demand and project timeframes.

Grants available to wildlife carers

GRANTS of up to \$5000 are now available under the second round of the South Australian Wildlife Rehabilitation Grants pilot program to Riverland wildlife carers.

A new pool of \$50,000 — funded through the sale of Koala State number plates — will help licensed not-for-profit and volunteer groups better care for sick and injured native animals by covering the cost of new supplies, equipment, training or veterinary fees.

Applications are now open and can be made for:

- ❑ Food for rescued native wildlife.
- ❑ Vaccinations for rescued animals.

- ❑ Wildlife rehabilitation courses and first-aid training.

- ❑ Animal enclosures, incubators, shelters and portable cages.

- ❑ Personal protective equipment for wildlife carers.

“Wildlife carers give so much of their time and their own resources to look after our sick and injured animals,” Deputy Premier, and Minister for Climate, Environment, and Water, Susan Close said.

“This grant program is a great opportunity for selfless volunteers and rescue groups to get some much-needed help to better care for wildlife through improved facili-

ties, food supply or health care,” Dr Close said.

“A big thanks to the South Australians who continue to support our wildlife carers through the purchase of the Koala State number plates.”

Applicants must hold a current permit to rescue, rehabilitate and release wildlife in accordance with the National Parks and Wildlife Act.

Licensed individuals can also apply for funds.

Grant applications close on May 19.

Jo-Anne’s insights valuable for Waikerie probus ladies

COMMUNITY involvement is a sign of healthy communities, and that was particularly obvious at the Waikerie and District Ladies Probus Club’s meeting in April.

The Cobweb, a not-for-profit art, craft, and home-made food items store, officially opened in October 1974, and has continued to serve locals and visitors since.

Elaine Wilkinson, with 37 years of service, spoke about its history, how it gave people an outlet for their spinning, pottery, crochet and baking, while building a social network.

Covid resulted in them closing and donating food items to Foodbank, and flooding made it necessary to move into the institute building for a while.

The Waikerie Hotel fire gave them a scare and they are very grateful to the CFS for keeping it safe. Complying with SA Health food handling regulations has meant everyone gaining certification.

Word has spread about them, with people stopping off to stock up, and one man was even sent shopping by his brother in Tasmania.

After morning tea, local Jo-Anne Cain talked about her background and Soul Essence Counselling service, based in White Street.

She has been interested in helping people from a young age. Jo enjoyed working in Waikerie, Ramco and Cadell Primary Schools with special needs students, and acquired a Diploma in

Community Welfare, specialising in counselling along with Mental Health First Aid and Alert Suicide Prevention training while working at the high school, which she successfully utilised.

Being a case worker for Anglican Community Care followed, supporting people bereaved by suicide and preventing follow-up suicides. Next came a social work degree and, wanting to extend her skills further into therapeutic work, she enrolled in a Neuro Linguistic Programming Course, at Yorketown.

That was a major commitment and challenge, including financially, however the course organiser allowed her to spread the payments over 18 months.

Studying human behaviour and why we do what we do, while learning a range of therapy tools to enable healing of old emotional baggage that limits people’s lives was intense, as well as fascinating.

Jo helps people to stop retaining negative emotions and trauma and heal instead, concentrating on the positive things we can learn from difficult times, like strength, bravery, courage, love, empathy, and kindness.

Being the best version of herself, to help her clients get the best possible experience and results, involves regular practicing on herself and new learnings.

She launched her business full time in 2020, just before Covid hit. Luckily, Maggie Wylde, a successful hypnotherapist and author, gave free training to people on

how to move their businesses online, plus hypnotherapy strategies. Jo now specialises in stress, anxiety and depression, grief and loss, trauma, and PTSD, in person and on-line.

For those interested in working with her, the first 45-minute Discovery Session is free with

no obligation, giving people the chance to meet her and decide if she is the right person for them.

Being aware of financial issues, and the importance of mental health, Jo also provides free services through her website Soul Essence, an alternative to traditional counselling, her Facebook

page and group, a blog on social media, and tips to the Waikerie Community page.

May’s meeting will be a bit different as members will be visiting the National Trust Museum/Doris Odgers reserve, and having lunch there too.

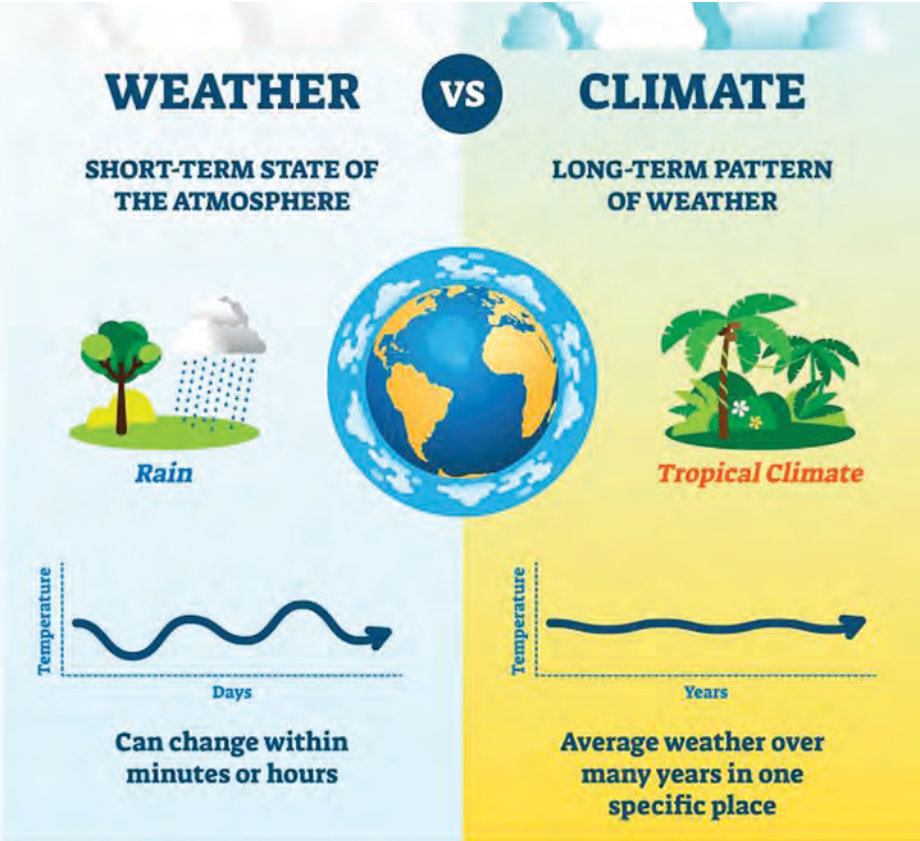

Changing local climate: importance of mitigation and adaptation

THE Murraylands and Riverland region is predicted to have the greatest decline in annual rainfall across the state, combined with an increased time spent in drought.

These are significant challenges acknowledged in the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board’s Regional Landscape Plan, and the group is working to address these through delivering climate-positive projects across five priority areas.

What is the difference between climate change and weather?

Weather refers to the daily or short-term changes in the atmosphere at a particular moment in time, such as the daily changes in temperature, rain or wind. Weather conditions can vary across different locations and regions

Climate refers to the long-term shifts in temperature and weather patterns for locations and regions over longer time periods, typically many years, decades and centuries.

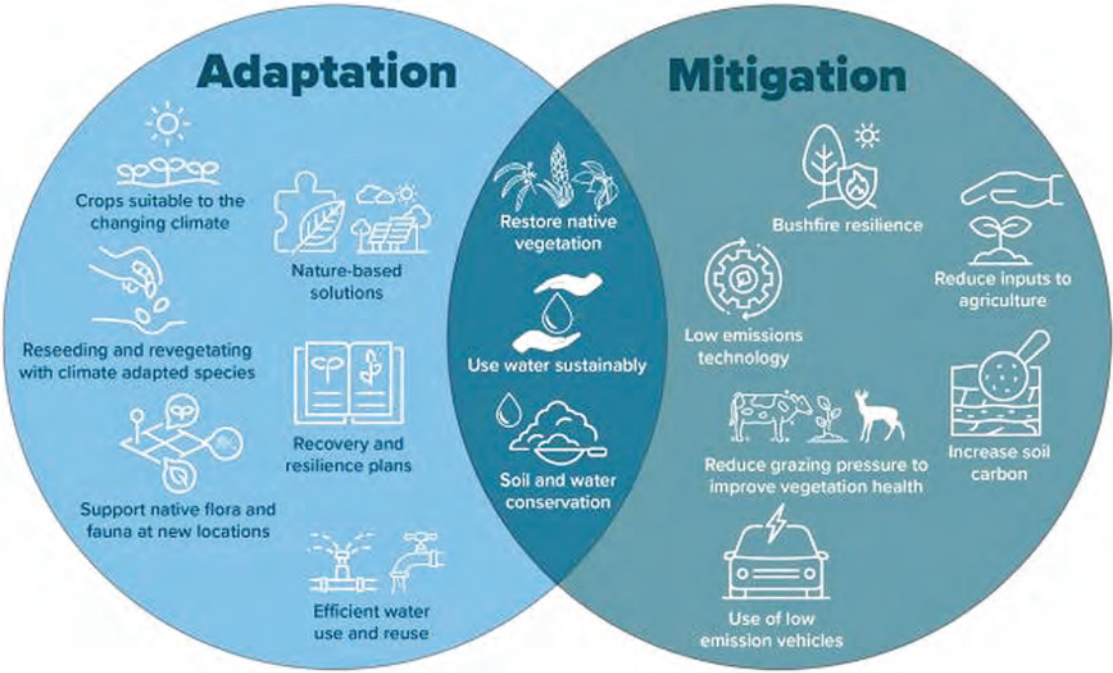
- asset protection and to regenerate areas of native vegetation.
- ❑ Some native species that were common have become rare, or threatened due to climate-induced changes to habitat and living conditions. Other species, native and non-native, have increased in number and spread in the changing conditions.
 - ❑ The period of favourable growing conditions for establishing revegetation is reducing and becoming more unreliable, according to volunteers working in habitat conservation.
 - ❑ Extreme or prolonged weather events like floods and drought, hailstorms, thunderstorms and heavy frosts are causing greater damage across the region.
 - ❑ Extreme weather events, more or new pests and weeds, and fluctuations in water availability are some of the changes that regional communities and businesses have already noticed.

Mitigation vs adaptation

Responding to climate change requires mitigation and adaptation. Mitigation activities seek to limit the amount of greenhouse gas emissions or enhance carbon sinks or sequestration. Adaptation is about adjusting to the effects of climate change on our landscapes to plan for or reduce impacts.

Adapting to climate change

The landscape board aims to

help communities to improve the resilience of natural and agricultural landscapes so they have the capacity to withstand or recover from, and adapt to, the effects of climate change.

Mitigating climate change

The landscape board supports many projects in the region to mitigate or reduce the impacts of greenhouse gases. Encouraging

no-till cropping, soil improvements and modification of current growing practices can reduce the amount of carbon released to the atmosphere. Managing the impacts of pest plants and animals supports healthy vegetation by capturing more carbon through increased vigour, growth and resilience.

The landscape board promotes and supports revegetation and planting projects, including carbon

offsetting, and works to ensure that the organisation internally strives towards carbon neutrality.

Get the best bang for your puff

RURAL doctors are urging Riverland patients to review their asthma inhaler usage, saying many are failing to receive the correct dosage due to poor inhaler technique.

Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) president Raymond Lewandowski said the incorrect usage of inhalers is impacting asthma sufferers right across the country.

“Asthma is hugely common in Australia, affecting more than 10 per cent of the population, or about 2.8 million people” Dr Lewandowski said.

“Of that 2.8 million, only about 1 million actually have an asthma plan but, quite shockingly, research shows that for some types of inhalers, a whopping 94 per cent of asthmatics are using their them incorrectly.

“Incorrect usage of these inhalers can reduce the delivery of the active ingredient, meaning that not enough of the drug gets into the lung, and the effectiveness of the inhaler can be significantly reduced, and the risk of severe flare-ups and hospitalisation increased.

“Incorrect use of inhaled corticosteroids can also increase the risk of side-effects like a hoarse, raspy throat, or oral thrush.

“Concerningly, quite a number (25 per cent) of patients have never been shown the correct way to use their inhalers, or have not received enough instruction or checks on how they are going with them.

“There are excellent combinations of preventers and relievers available in Australia, so the majority of asthmatics should be able to keep their asthma from affecting them the majority of the time.”



SA Premier’s Business and Export Awards back for 2025

Dr Lewandowski said if someone is struggling to manage asthma with their current medication, there are two things that are important to do.

“First, check your inhaler usage,” he said.

“There are some great ‘How To’ resources available from the National Asthma Council that can help you out with making sure you are getting the most out of your current medications.

“But, if you are still having trouble keeping your asthma under control, make an appointment with your rural doctor to update your asthma plan.”

An Asthma Action Plan aims to help prevent and control asthma symptoms, including:

- ❑ How to look after your asthma daily.
- ❑ What to do if your asthma starts to flare-up.
- ❑ What to do if your asthma flare-up is severe.
- ❑ What to do in an asthma emergency.

“While ideally these plans should be reviewed every 12 months, we know that people are busy and, particularly in rural areas it is often hard to see a doctor,” Dr Lewandowski said.

“So, if things are fine, just keep rolling with them, but if you find that you are needing to use your reliever more often than you should be then that is a good indication that your plan needs reviewing.”

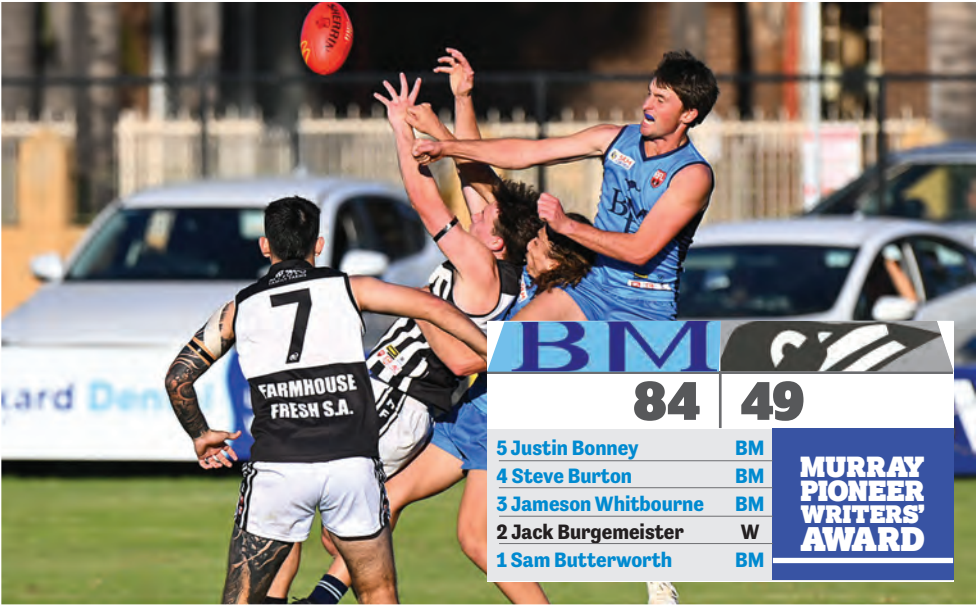
