

CASH SPLASH: More than \$4.3m of funding coming to local councils...

PROJECTS to create new, and upgrade existing, roads and public infrastructure in the Riverland will benefit from a \$4.3 million funding boost under the latest round of an ongoing grant program.

The Federal Government last week announced the three Riverland councils – and Mid Murray Council – would share more than \$4.3 million in funding under phase 3 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program.

Renmark Paringa CEO Tony Siviour said the surrounding community would directly benefit from improvements to local roads and infrastructure.

"With the support of our local Member for Barker, Tony Pasin, council has been advised of a two-year extension to the supplementary roads funding for South Australian councils, as well as a future round of the (LRCI) program," Mr Siviour said.

"This is direct investment from the Federal Government into local roads and infrastructure projects which clearly they have seen the value in supporting, for which we are grateful."

Berri Barmera CEO Karyn Burton said her council was also "grateful" for additional funding to assist with bigger capital projects.

Truck rollover a case of 'bad luck'

EMERGENCY services were called to the scene of a truck rollover on the corner of the Sturt Highway and Old Sturt Highway, near the Big Orange, at around 10am last Thursday morning.

A police spokesperson said the driver was turning the roadtrain right, heading towards Monash, when the front tyre gave way, causing the truck to roll on its side.

"The driver was travelling slowly..." the spokesperson said.

"It was just bad luck.

"Luckily no one was hurt and the driver walked away with minor injuries."

The truck remained on the road for four hours before a tow truck and other equipment arrived and was guarded by policemen and CFS volunteers.

Speed restrictions were also in place for several hours, until the truck was cleared from the site.

THE District Council of Loxton Waikerie (DCLW) began removing eight Athel pines from the Waikerie river front yesterday.

Leonard Norman Drive was closed while the trees were taken out.

Although not speaking for his council, Loxton Waikerie elected member Clive Matthews said they were being removed because they were an obnoxious pest.

pest.
"The decision was made in the public interest to remove trees," he said.

DCLW first announced its intention to get rid of the trees in September last year.

This initial decision caused an outcry from the Waikerie and District's Residents and Ratepayers' Association, (WDRRA), which called for community consultation prior to the trees' removal.

The association claimed Loxton Waikerie CEO David Beaton had abandoned council's community consultation policy.

In response, consultant Kelledy Jones Lawyers engaged to conduct an independent review of the decision.

Kelledy Jones released its recommendations in November last year.

The report said the CEO's decision was not unreasonable nor unsupportable in the circumstances and there was no requirement or obligation to undertake public consultation, noting the environmental imperatives that existed.

Kelledy Jones also found the decision was made in the public interest and not based on a flawed process.

Cr Matthews said removing the Athel pines would help beautify the river front.

"The trees were planted in good intent, but are prohibited from being within 100 metres of a watercourse," he said.

Mr Matthews said new trees would be planted along the river front.

"The upgrades to our local river front have been outstanding (and) we have expanded the river-front area," he said.

"We have new shelters, a mountain bike pump track will be installed, a walking path all the way from the ferry to meet with the

existing walking path is also going to be put in, and an amphitheatre is also being planned.

"At the end of the day, the trees are a pest and they need to be removed. Small things have to be done in order to move forward. "Most people in Waikerie are so pleased with the beautification of Peake Terrace and the river front

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Ombudsman appeal to keep pines unsuccessful

WAIKERIE resident John Pick is among locals opposing the removal of the Athel pines, which were planted along the river front following the 1956 flood.

Mr Pick said it was disappointing they were being removed this week.

"At least they remained there in summer, when people needed the shade," he said.

"I understand they were plant-

ed to help hold the soil together in the area during a flood, reduce subsoil moisture, and protect the old Bond Store building from high rivers and floods."

Mr Pick wrote to the DCLW CEO in September last year, questioning whether Mr Beaton had the unilateral right to make the decision to remove the trees without council approval.

He also appealed to the Ombudsman, after the finding

by lawyers for council, Kelledy Jones, in November last year, ruled in Mr Beaton's favour, despite an independent arborist's report stating the trees could be controlled or removed.

That appeal was unsuccessful. "There's not much we can do about it at this stage, but it is disappointing," Mr Pick said.

"There was no prior public consultation on the move to remove the trees to make way

for a walking path.

"The walking path, which instead of being on the river side of Leonard Norman Drive, is understood will take up a few metres of the existing roadway."

Mr Pick said he failed to understand why several other Athel pines, which are also within 100 metres of the river, are being left untouched, plus others near the Lions Den.

Ex-Riverland chiro jailed for '80s rape

A FORMER Berri chiropractor who practiced for more than a decade will spend up to five years in prison after being found guilty of raping a teenage patient in the 1980s.

At a trial in the District Court, a jury found that long-time Riverland resident Robert Frank Linke, now 74, raped a 16-year-old client at his clinic in 1988.

Judge Patrick O'Sullivan said despite Linke's age and lack of appreciable risk to the community, his offending was so serious that it warranted a non-parole period of two years and nine months.

"A young patient present herself to you seeking chiropractic treatment. You abused your power and raped her," Judge O'Sullivan said

in his sentencing remarks earlier this month.

"She says that the day you raped her is forever etched in her mind, with her thinking about it every day... She is haunted by the visions of what you did to her..."

The victim, a ballerina who was seeking treatment for mild scoliosis, first reported the matter to Berri Police in March 2016.

Linke, a father of six and grandfather of 13, grew up in Ramco before beginning working as a chiropractor in 1976.

He closed his practice in 1991 following multiple car accidents. He was living in a caravan on a property in Monash prior to his arrest.

Judge O'Sullivan noted that Linke had experienced being sexually assaulted as a child and showed symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder, but said this failed to excuse his behaviour.

He also said Linke had "continually sought to justify and minimise" his offending during psychological assessments. Linke was taken into custody in December 2020, and will be eligible for parole in September 2023.

QR codes: Don't punish businesses

A LOXTON trader has called for more COVID check-in responsibility on customers and less on businesses.

Last week, SA Police launched Operation Trace in a bid to reduce check-in complacency, with fines of \$1060 and \$5060 for non-complying individuals and businesses respectively.

The Country Bakehouse owner Tim Vivian said he supports the check-in process, but said more onus should be placed on indi-

"A butcher shop got fined \$5000 because they didn't ask a customer if they checked in," he said.

"If a customer doesn't check-in, it should be on them.

"As businesses, we have an obligation to provide everything we can and if you are not providing what you can, then sure, I think you should be fined."

Mr Vivian said his East Terrace business has a paper sign-in sheet and three QR codes before customers reach the counter.

Mr Vivian said he grapples with the concept that he could still be fined if a customer chooses not to check-in.

"My understanding is, that as a business owner, I have done everything in my power possible to allow that person to check in," he said.

"Businesses have enough to worry about and staff have enough to worry about without asking every single customer, 'Have you checked in?'.

"For me to employ someone to stand at the door to make sure people have checked in... we can't afford that.


"It's not viable."

In this week's Sunday Mail, it was reported that at least three eastern Adelaide businesses had been fined due to QR code checkin breaches.

Police Commissioner and state co-ordinator Grant Stevens said failing to checkin may have an adverse impact on South Australia's ability to respond to an outbreak.

"We are seeing a level of complacency regarding COVID-19 check-ins and now is not the time to stop using QR codes," he

"As we start to see more large-scale community events, and with an increase in inter-

state and New Zealand travel, we need to remember the risk that COVID-19 poses to our community."

Operation Trace will include the use of plain clothes police officers to ensure people are checking in and providing their contact details when they enter a business or attend a public activity.

More good news for Riverland irrigators

94 per cent and heading to 100

A SENIOR industry figure says only a "worst-case scenario" would prevent Riverland growers and irrigators from reaching full water allocations in 2021/22.

The Department of Environment and Water (DEW) this week released an updated minimum water allocation of 94 per cent for SA River Murray irrigators, improving upon the 84 per cent opening figure provided last month.

DEW manager of water delivery Chrissie Bloss said the minimum amount of water delivered to South Australia in 2021/22 would be 1460 GL.

"Projections show that in every scenario other than the worst-case, the opening allocation on 1 July 2021 is likely to be 100 per cent," Ms Bloss said.

"As mentioned last month, given this strong starting position and the forecast climate outlook, there is a very high likelihood allocations will reach 100 per cent by the start of the 2021-22 water year.

"It is important to remember that as the minimum opening allocation announced on 15 April 2021 was greater than 50 per cent, the carryover trigger for 2021-22 has not been met

"This means that any water volumes rolled over from a previous year will no longer be available as outlined in the Water Allocation Plan for the River Murray prescribed watercourse."

Minimum water allocations for SA River Murray irrigators stood at 8 per cent at this time last year. Further information regarding SA water allocations can be found by visiting the DEW website (www.environment.sa.gov. au/topics/river-murray/water-allocation).

Sobering black markers aiming to save local lives

A SOBERING and striking display along the Renmark river front aims to prompt locals to consider their driving habits.

The black 'fatality' roadside markers have been erected for National Road Safety Week (May 16-23) as part of an RAA campaign to highlight the 576 lives lost on country roads over the past decade.

The initiative aims to underline the impact of road trauma and ultimately reduce the number of crashes due to unsafe roads and driving.

Paringa man Robert Johnstone backed any scheme to improve driver behaviour in the Riverland.

"Sometimes I think it's easier to drive in Adelaide than Renmark, because we're too relaxed here, we're all in holiday mode," Mr Johnstone said.

"On average it seems a

A SOBERING and striking lot safer down there than up

Over a recent three-year period, Mr Johnstone regularly drove to Adelaide and said driver behaviour along the Sturt Highway remains problematic.

"There's always someone hooning and trying to cut in," he said.

"It happens frequently on that highway. It's not uncommon to see someone flashing or tooting their horn.

"And people are always in a hurry, rushing up behind you, rather than being patient and waiting for a passing lane.

"They put everyone at risk for what, 30 seconds of their time?"

State Road Safety Minister, Vincent Tarzia, bemoaned South Australia's 2021 road toll, which at the time of writing stood at 43.

"That's 43 chairs left

empty at family dinners and catch-ups with mates," Mr Tarzia said.

Mr Tarzia said the State Government was determined to improve road safety and raise awareness, and was investing heavily in road safety campaigns and improved road infrastructure, as well as introducing tough new laws to crack down on dangerous drivers.

"It is, however, crucial that every road user obeys the road rules and ensures they're in the right frame of mind when they get behind the wheel of a motor vehicle," he said.

South Australia Police Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott said road trauma is "overwhelmingly caused by road users taking unnecessary risks"

Meanwhile the 15th annual Fatality Free Friday initiative will be held on Friday, May 28.

QR crackdown is unfair on business

IF we must have this QR-code crackdown in South Australia – and that is both questionable and debatable – then the compliance responsibility must lay with individuals, not

As outlined in today's Murray Pioneer by Loxton baker Tim Vivian, many small businesses simply cannot afford the extra resources needed to ensure every single customer checks in.

Over the past week reports have emerged of businesses in Adelaide's eastern suburbs copping sizeable fines – expected to be \$5060 for failing to encourage customers to check in, either with a smartphone app or by pen and

In recent days, anecdotal stories have also emerged of police checking up on people in Riverland business houses. A number of individuals statewide have allegedly been fined \$1060, with full details expected to be revealed by SAPOL this Friday, when Operation Trace is scheduled to end.

When the operation was first announced, SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens advised that SAPOL officers would initially take an "educational" approach to checking in, but then somewhat more ominously spoke about complacency creeping across the state.

Months ago, barely an eyebrow was raised when another unelected public servant, SA's Chief Public Health Officer Nicola Spurrier, mused that she wouldn't mind QR-codes becoming a more permanent fixture of everyday life than we first anticipated.

The complacency Mr Stevens referred to exists for a reason: because South Australians out shopping have virtually zero chance of contracting COVID-19.

Yes, checking-in aims to assist contract tracing, not provide protection against COVID-19, but human nature is such that the compulsion to do something largely pointless - even if it takes only a few seconds - will gradually subside.

Given our State Government has ordered this crackdown – or who would know if it's Mr Stevens acting autonomously – hopefully common sense has prevailed, and businesses that have done everything in their power to encourage their customers to sign in will avoid fines.

If the check-in area is prominent and easy to access, their job should be over. See what Riverland pubs have done. Customers allbut run into the check-in facilities at some entrances – and who can blame the hoteliers for setting up like this?

After those measures are taken, the responsibility should then fall solely to the customer.

Expecting businesses to shoulder any extra burden just adds to the suspicion that the public servants making these decisions have little understanding of how small businesses work and how tight their margins can be.

Why not make things as easy as possible for businesses, which have been through hell over the past 14 months? In low-risk areas like the Riverland, and for example the Renmark Square shopping centre, if people must check in, allow them to do so at the entrance to the entire complex, rather than individual stores. One check-in only required, regardless of how many shops you enter.

"Anything to avoid another lockdown" is an understandable attitude, given the heavyhanded actions of some of our politicians during the COVID crisis.

But is it too much to ask for some compassion, not to mention common-sense, when dealing with small businesses?





Tina Ziersch, Myrla, 1910: Wilhelmine Dorothea Ernstine (Tina) Ziersch was born in May 1884 at Point Pass, 11km north of Eudunda. Daughter of Ferdinand and Anna Gerlach, she married Gustav Reinhold Ziersch in 1906. Rhein was born at Emmaus, just 5km north of Eudunda, in 1881. Son of farmers Gustav Hermann Ziersch and Ottilie Ida (née Schier), Rhein came to Loxton in 1897 when just 16 as the district's first teacher. Sometime between 1910-1911, Tina and Rein moved with their then, three young children, to farm at Myrla. There the couple had seven more children. The four eldest schooled at New Residence, walking 10km each way from home until 1920, when a one-room weatherboard school was built in the scrub nearer their farm at Myrla. Despite hard times, about every six weeks Rein and Tina rode their buggy to shop in Loxton and buy peanuts and lollies for the children. The family also enjoyed occasional picnics by the river's edge and on Sunday afternoons having afternoon tea and playing tennis on two courts at their home. For ac.care, the new agreement secures the future of our staff in the homelessness sector and the vital programs they deliver to help people stay in their homes or secure accommodation and work through issues that put their tenancies at risk.

We are proud of our existing co-operation with Aboriginalcontrolled organisations and other agencies and welcome this opportunity to work more closely together under the new alliance arrangement in a mutuallysupportive way to provide the best possible service to clients.

Ambassador's visit a major success

I WOULD like to express my appreciation to Mayor Peter Hunt, his councillors and staff for the success of the recent visit by the Japanese Ambassador and his wife, and the Consul General and their party, to tour the former Loveday Internment Camp

During the war Japanese civilians living in Australia and throughout the Pacific were taken into custody and incarcerated at the Loveday Internment Camp until the end of hostilities.

They were housed in two separate compounds, 14 B and C, while German and Italian civilians from the United Kingdom, Persia and the Middle East, and from all around Australia, were housed in 14 A and D, after Camps 9 and 10 were closed.

Reconciliation between Japan and Cowra, where the mass escape by Japanese POWs occurred during the war, came about after peace was declared. A group of returned servicemen took it upon themselves to honour the Japanese POWs who died in their escape bid, because they recognised them for their bravery, and dedication to their emperor and their nation, and decided to tend their graves.

This was rewarded with the building of the magnificent Japanese gardens at Cowra, with donations from families and companies in Japan.

Cowra is now one of the most frequented place by Japanese tourists who visit Australia and Japanese festivals are held there regularly.

When Ambassador Yamagami arrived in Australia, Cowra was

the first place he visited in his official capacity. He was there again last week hosting an autumn festival, after the annual Cherry Festival was cancelled last year because of COVID.

His Excellency's visit to Loveday was the first by any ambassador, and the warm welcome he was given by Mayor Hunt and his councillors was graciously accepted. He also expressed a keen interest in returning early next year for the 80th anniversary of the arrival of the Japanese internees.

I would also like to thank the Barmera District War Memorial Community Centre for allowing the Loveday Internment Camp Collection to be displayed at the Barmera Visitor Information Centre and to the staff and volunteers who man it seven days a week.

Other people who I would like to recognise are the Loveday Internment Camp Committee, and Berri Barmera councillor Rhonda Centofanti in particular for all the support she has provided me over the years. Thanks also to Major General Peter Phillips in Canberra for being our patron and for suggesting to Ambassador Yamagami that he make an official visit to Loveday.

Since the display on Loveday has been open to the public it has drawn a lot of tourists and locals to visit it. It is the hope of the committee and the Berri Barmera Council that in the near future it will bring Japanese tourists to our region.

Loxton Waikerie average rates notices to increase by \$27 a year

LOXTON Waikerie ratepayers will see an increase in their rates for the first time in two years under the proposed budget.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie 2021/22 draft Annual Business Plan includes a 1 per cent rate increase and is expected to be adopted for public consultation at this Friday's meeting.

Council CEO David Beaton said on average, in-town residential ratepayers will notice an increase of 37c a week – or \$19 over the year in general rates.

However, additional increases will be seen due to 1 per cent increases to both bin collection and Community Wastewater Management System fees.

The additional fees will see an average total rates notice increase of \$27 a year for township ratepayers with three bins and connected to the wastewater system.

"Once again we are trying to be conservative," Mr Beaton said.

"Council has been able to use

its healthy balance sheet to support local economic stimulus in partnership with the other two tiers of government, in projects that will have long-term benefit to the community.'

However, Mr Beaton said he expects there to be "winners and losers" within this year's budget.

"There's been some big increases in property valuations from changes of land issue due to almonds and things like that," he said. "Proposed capital values across the whole district for 2021/22 have increased by \$215.89 million (10.28 per cent) from last year," Mr Beaton said.

"There has been a significant increase in residential and primary production."

The draft budget proposes an operating surplus of \$52,000.

Key projects in the draft budget include a new toilet block at Packard's Bend, Waikerie river-front bank stabilisation, Loxton river-front walking trail and bike tracks at both towns.

"We haven't yet put our minds to what of our projects from next year we will use it for, but council will discuss this in coming weeks," she said.

"Having longer planning and delivery timeframes - compared to previous funding phases - are appreciated, as councils have really struggled to meet deadlines with the various stimulus programs with contractors

and suppliers being so busy."

Mr Pasin said the funding would support Riverland councils in delivering projects that boosted local employment.

"This Budget injection for local councils means even more funding for upgrades to local roads, bike paths, community halls, playgrounds, parks and sports facilities, as well as improved accessibility to public facilities," Mr Pasin said.

"Providing more time for planning and construction will enable local governments to consider a broader range of priority projects and potentially undertake larger, more complex developments to deliver even great benefits for their communities.

'This is all about supporting the resilience of local economies by delivering even more jobs to help communities bounce back from COVID-19, with the additional funding and a longer delivery window to provide greater flexibility for communities to address local priorities.

"Local governments play a critical role in delivering vital local services for communi-

The Gerard Reserve Council is also set to receive \$204,874 through phase 3 of the initiative.

Ms Burton said Berri Barmera Council would work with the Gerard community to identify and assist with delivering a project using the additional funding.

Councils will be able to access funding through phase 3 of the LRCI from January 1, 2022, with projects needing to be completed by June 30, 2023.

others in the community also prepared to financially contribute, there is obviously a significant amount remaining to find."

The proposal, which will be put to councillors on Friday, is for council to help source remaining funds.

"This may be through internal revenue and/or through funding sources such as arts grants, federal and state community event and tourism grants - and potentially funds available for drought affected areas," Mr Gladigau said.

"As this is a very large project – with significant tourism and community implications - for it to progress it will need support, especially in the sourcing of funds."

Ambassador's goodwill tour

LOCAL historian Rosemary Gower's 35-plus years of research into the little-known history of the Loveday Internment Camp paid off with last week's visit by the Japanese Ambassador, Shingo Yamagami.

Mr Yamagami accepted an invitation from the Berri Barmera Council on behalf of Ms Gower and the visit ran in conjunction with his first official visit to the Governor of South Australia.

Accompanied by a party that included his wife, Kaoru, and the Consul General, Junji Shamada, Mr Yamagami's busy two days in the region were highlighted by a trip to the camp site.

The invitation was first mooted by former RSL president and Loveday Internment Camp patron, Major General Peter Phillips, who suggested the ambassador visit the Loveday site where Japanese civilians from around Australia and the Pacific Island were held in custody during wartime.

Mr Yamagami's visit was launched on Thursday night at a Berri Barmera Council reception aboard the ps Julie

"Since Japan is now one of Australia's closest allies in the Pacific and an important trade partner, it was a great opportunity to forge deep bonds between Japan and Australia, and in particular with the Riverland," Ms Gower said.

"Attracting Japanese tourists to the Riverland was discussed, along with the possibility of the official party returning early next year to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the first Japanese civilians to be taken into custody and incarcerated at Loveday.

"Both the Ambassador and the Consul General expressed a desire to come back to visit the region

ing the Japanese party and Berri Barmera Council elected members visited the Barmera Visitor Information Centre to view the Loveday Internment Camp display and to watch a DVD about the camp.

Ms Gower presented the Ambassador with a copy of the DVD and told him she would like to have it translated into Japanese, for the descendants of the Japanese men who were held at Loveday.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone joined the party for morning tea and spoke to Mr Yamagami about his many trade mission visits to Japan, while Riverlandbased Liberal Legislative Council Member Nicola Centofanti also attended.

"Her husband David's grandfather was interned at Loveday during the war," Ms Gower said.

"He loved the area so much that he sent for his wife after the war and all of their family members still live in the Riverland today."

After a tour of the former internment camp the official party visited the Upper Murray Garden of Memory before travelling back to Adelaide to fly out.

"Everyone who was for-

tunate enough to meet the Ambassador and his wife, and the rest of their party, was thrilled with the warm reception they received, and the promise of more exciting things to happen in the future," Ms Gower said.

"They were really lovely and very friendly and interested in everything they saw and heard.

"Their visit was the highlight of my long involvement with researching material and collecting artefacts for a permanent display to be held in trust for future generations.'

The collection is on display at the Barmera Visitor Invitation Centre which is open seven days a week.

As part of the SA History Festival, Ms Gower will speak about the Loveday Internment Camp at the Waikerie Library tomorrow from 10.30am and at Loxton Library from 1.30pm.

She will also address an audience at the Berri Library on Tuesday, May 25, from 11am.

Ms Gower said she was willing to address Riverland school students about "this important part of local history" and encouraged schools to get in touch with

Transparency and regulation needed in water market, says RIT

A RECENTLY released report into the temporary water market has shown improved transparency and regulations are needed for Riverland growers and irrigators, according to a local trust.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) last month held an information session regarding its Murray-Darling Basin water markets inquiry report. Renmark Irrigation Trust general manager Rosalie Auricht said discussions at the session - held at the Renmark Club - highlighted concerns surrounding imbalances in the water market.

"Greater transparency on water market information is key, as is having this information readily accessible," Ms Auricht said.

"For example, it is clear how South Australia allocates its share of the state's Murray-Darling Basin water within the State, however, there is limited transparency around the initial annual water allocation the Murray-Darling Basin

Authority makes to South Australia.'

Ms Auricht said further regulation on the trading of temporary water was needed to protect local growers and irrigators.

"It would be good to ensure that all brokers who deal with irrigators do have a solid understanding of the water market and act in the best interests of the seller or buyer of water," she said.

"The main brokers certainly do have a very good understanding of the market, however anyone can currently act as a water broker.

"The trust will also be seeking that any new regulatory authorities or regulations do not add costs for our members."

Morgan's mural project complete

A RECENTLY completed mural project in a Riverland town – which was started in 2015 – "will be treasured by the community for generations to come" says a local mayor.

The final piece of artwork for Morgan's Windows of Time exhibit was unveiled earlier this month at a ceremony attended by Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone.

Mural creator Rose Craig said she worked with fellow locals Kerry Thomson and Diana Angel over six years to design and sew the artworks.

"The concept was to create a colourful and fun history mural, including local flora and fauna, to fit a large wall area in the lovely big old warehouse," Ms Craig said.

"So with a cupboard full of fabric and a head full of ideas, the six-year commitment began. The three of us have worked together for those six years without an argument or cross word.

"I could never guess how many different fabrics were used or how many miles of thread were stitched. The number of hours to produce one panel was approximately 650 hours – so the total for five panels is 3250 hours.

"This last panel – number five – completes the set.

"It is our honour to create this living memory."

Mr Whetstone said the mural – located at the Landseer

Morgan Museum – showcased "the area's stunning natural environment and significant connection to the Murray River".

Strong local support for voluntary assisted dying

RIVERLANDERS are overwhelmingly supportive of voluntary assisted dying laws, according to new data released by Voluntary Assisted Dying South Australia.

Across the Chaffey electorate, 80 per cent of respondents to the 2019 ABC Vote Compass survey believe terminally ill patients should be able to end their own lives with medical assistance.

Voluntary Assisted Dying South Australia spokesperson Lainie Anderson said the survey results were "heartening".

Our state MPs are now debating the 17th Bill on this issue to come before parliament in 26 years," she said.

"We want this Bill to succeed so the people of South Australia finally get access to choice and compassion at end of life."

Voluntary assisted dying advocate Angie Miller said it would be "wonderful" for terminally ill South Australians to have the same choice at end of life as Australians in an increasing number of states.

"In the absence of legislation, some people with a terminal illness feel they have no option but to take their own lives, and that is absolutely heartbreaking," she said.

"SA Police has for the first time backed voluntary assisted dying legislation under strict circumstances and that's a significant step forward."

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



AIRBORNE GEOPHYSICAL SURVEY

Geoscience Australia in collaboration with South Australia, Victoria and NSW, is conducting an airborne geophysical survey over a large area of eastern Australia in 2021, as seen in the map below.

The survey will be carried out by a fixed-wing aircraft fitted with specialist geophysical equipment flying on 20 km - spaced lines. The aircraft and the equipment that it tows will be flying at approximately 100 metres above the ground. There will be no ground contact within the survey area.

Whilst flyovers will not present any known COVID 19 risk to the population, all appropriate preventative actions will be undertaken by ground staff and flight crew

DOZENS of Riverlanders sought solutions to their mobile coverage woes when a Telstra roadshow visited the region last week.

Network engineers from the telco giant assisted customers in Loxton, Berri, Barmera and Renmark following complaints about poor coverage from residents across the region.

Telstra SA regional general manager Mark Bolton said the roadshow visited towns with particular coverage problems,

"In the Riverland, there are areas between the major towns where we've got mobile sites and good mobile coverage, but in between customers have an indifferent experience — particularly if they're in buildings, places of business or their homes," Mr Bolton said.

"There is technology nowadays to assist with that, but usually people are not aware of it or they don't understand it.

"We know we had a few issues in Loxton North... and it's always about coverage.

"Some are even still on 3G, because there are network coverage extension devices in the area that we know are incorrectly set to 3G.

"We know there's a lot of customers out there who are not having a good experience because of that.

"There's certainly coverage issues too, there's no doubt about that...

"We can't provide coverage everywhere although we are working on it.

"We know there's still areas we haven't got the coverage we like, and that's where we can actually find these customers the

Over the years Elizabeth volunteered at Adelaide Children's Hospital (SA Genetics), The Paraplegic and Quadriplegic Association of SA, Enhanced Lifestyles, Helping Hand (Ingle Farm), Hampstead Rehabilitation Centre and the Royal Adelaide Hospital.

She says volunteering meant the world to her and allowed her to meet so many fantastic people along the way.

"I saw my disability as the beginning of a whole new experience," Elizabeth explains.

"There's so many things you can do, and volunteering really filled that void for me.

Dying without dignity is no way to go

EIGHT out of every 10 South Australians support the adoption of voluntary assisted dying laws.

Such law exists in Victoria, Tasmania's House of Assembly voted in favour of a similar law in March, and legislation allowing the process comes into effect on July 1 in Western Australia.

The Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill 2020 introduced into the South Australian Upper House was supported 14 votes to seven and now waits on the Lower House for a final vote.

Premier Steven Marshall has indicated his support, while Health Minister, Stephen Wade, who sits in the Upper House has voted in favour, citing the value of national consistency of legislation in Australia.

The legislation – which includes seventy safeguards and requires sign-off from two separate doctors - would apply to adults over the age of 18 who have been diagnosed with an incurable illness, disease or medical condition. It has been modelled on the Victorian legislation which has been proclaimed as safe and conservative



and has become a de facto national standard.

It is interesting to note that Victorian Premier and practicing Catholic Daniel Andrews changed his mind from nay to aye. Unfortunately, this did not happen until he experienced the loss of his father to can-

Like him, I have some first-hand experience and others will too; my parents both suffered incurable afflictions, albeit almost 40 years apart.

As a 20-year-old I watched the ravages of cancer consume my father for three years. His dying was smoothed by a compassionate physician who administered increasing doses of morphine, eventually inducing a coma until his heart stopped beating.

This practice is legal as it was to alleviate pain and was no doubt employed to expedite his needlessly suffering.

Almost three years ago, it was my dear mother who

died in circumstances she dreaded constantly and throughout her life expressed a wish to avoid. She suffered dementia, and her final two years she was left in a state of suspended animation.

Despite excellent aged care, she died without a shred of dignity.

Our politicians are our lawmakers and it is their responsibility to introduce and enact laws. No law is perfect, but that is no excuse to not develop or adopt them.

For their sake and those of their loved ones, I hope our elected representatives do not have to endure similar tragic circumstances to inform their vote.

When 80 per cent of your constituency is in favour of a proposal it is incumbent on any lawmaker to listen and act accordingly. Personal beliefs and philosophies must be put aside.

Becoming conduct is to consider the detail and veracity of the law.

A RIVERLAND town is ready to kick off its centenary celebrations later this month with a photo exhibition displaying a century of

The Monash Hidden Secrets... Exposed exhibition will be held at the town's Memorial Hall from Friday, May 28, with its final day coinciding with the return of the Mammoth Monash Market on Sunday, May 30.

Exhibition co-ordinator Alison Halupka said the event would include hundreds of photos dating back to the 1920s.

"We have focused particularly on the World War I soldier settlers and their lives in Monash and the hardships they faced with setting up a town, including creating schools for children, sporting clubs, halls and all sorts of things,' she said.

"The settlers who had comradeship from their war years also got together and got things done in the community.

"They had a really strong community bond that a lot of people say Monash still has.

"There will also be a bit of stuff about the Monash playground... mostly concentrating on the old playground.

"There are really interesting photos, especially when you stop and look for a while."

Mrs Halupka said the exhibition has built on the work done for a similarly named event held a dec-

"We did an event like this that we called Monash Hidden Secrets 10 years ago, by coincidence, so we've been able to use those photos and build on it because our researchers have been out and about finding more information and photos.

"It's amazing to hear from grandchildren and great-grandchildren of soldier settlers who are contacting us to see if we've got information about their relatives that they didn't have.

"This is our first big event... and we've been working on the centenary for two years so it's pretty amazing.

"Later in the year we will have a military event that seems to be getting bigger and bigger all the time."


Mrs Halupka said she hoped people from around the Riverland and former Monash residents would visit the town to attend the exhibition.

A century of history on display at Barmera hall

THE Berri Barmera library service is hosting an exhibition celebrating the history of the district with more than 100 photos and artefacts on display.

The 100 years of Barmera, Glossop and Monash exhibit is currently running at the Soldiers Memorial Hall in Barmera as part of South Australia's History Festival, and will continue until the end of the month.

Berri Barmera Council library manager Peter Ison said the display had proved popular, with at least 20 people visiting the exhibit each



"There's about 120 photos about the history of the Barmera, Glossop and Monash areas, and they're all on display boards," he

"There's also some information about Overland Corner from the Barmera National Trust, which includes a bit on the history of Overland Corner and all the stuff from the time capsule they pulled up back in 2019.

"Plus, there's some headshots of all the Barmera soldier settlers and a re-creation of the Glossop anchor, which is part of the town's centenary celebrations, with a bit of information on Commander John Glossop."

Next door to the exhibition, a replica of the Bonney Theatre, created by Barmera woman Joy Engleson over almost 700 hours, is also on display.

The exhibition is open Monday to Friday from 9am to 1pm throughout May, and will also open on Sunday, May 30, from 10am to 4pm.

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Warm milk, reading with Dick and Dora, and the continental

WAY back in grade 1 at primary school, the Dick and Dora, Nip and Fluff readers little-by-little introduced our small brains to the precious gift of reading.

"Here is Fluff. Here is Nip. Nip is a dog. See Fluff run. Run, Fluff, run."

Then came the more complex sentences: "Dora sat on the log. See Nip run to the log. Jump Nip, jump."

Simple, repetitive words in company with eye-catching illustrations. Though they were white and blonde and had pets, we never really got to know much else about Dick and Dora.

In grade 1, the Renmark North School kids found themselves under the exquisite tutelage of Mrs Seekamp. Well into her 90s now, that neatly rolled chignon still sits elegantly at the back of her head, just as it did 60 years ago.

Calm and self-contained, I wonder if Helen Seekamp knows the celebrated status she has among the generations of her past students.

Lots of our early learning happened by rote: classes reciting over and over the alphabet or times tables in sing-along togetherness. It's all rather unfashionable now, but every one of those times-tables





have stuck like glue, right up to twelvetwelves.

By morning recess, young bodies needed to run. However, not so fast. Every good milkman ensures deliveries are made early, but on days when it was 90 degrees (F) by mid-morning, the milk had already sat in the sun for two to three hours.

Before dismissal for recess, that warm milk had to be consumed, an intolerable experience for many, but out of necessity comes innovation and someone discovered a teaspoon of pink Quik made it cautiously palatable.

Play-time fads came and went. The arrival of the Coca Cola yoyos swept across the nation. Yoyo experts travelled to schools teaching how to "rock the baby", "walk the dog" and "loop the loop".

Despite the considerable cost to families such as ours, there was an insatiable appetite for yoyos.

But that obsession receded, replaced again with the traditional games of brandy, dodge-ball and red-rover-all-over. Brandy and dodge-ball inevitably encompassed pain when that wet ball hit bare legs at bullet-like speed.

While girls took to the new "elastics" game, where you could jump in and produce deft tricks with feet entwined with the elastic, boys played marbles with 'tom bowlers', 'cat's eyes' and 'aggies', carried guardedly around in small bags.

We enjoyed it whenever yard duty teachers would stop in and watch for a while.

But the highlight of that time was surely the annual school continental, where the community prepared assiduously for weeks building stalls, sideshows, rides, a makeshift stage, sound systems, and preparing plays, dances, decorations and food.

Weeks of excitement would build amongst the kids. Teachers maintained some classroom focus by helping prepare our work books for display on the evening. And each class spent weeks practising every tiny aspect of their performances.

The most memorable play of my seven years was the year 3 grand production of Cinderella. The ball dresses were beautiful, made to gracefully flounce by the rope petticoats underneath.

But there was one issue. Two girls had to be identified as the ugly sisters and you guessed it, I was selected as one. Oh, and thank you for asking – yes, I still bear the emotional scar.



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

Industry welcomes property focus in budget

THE Real Estate Institute of Australia (REIA) had many of its priorities addressed in the 2021 Federal Budget confirming a positive outlook for buyers, sellers, investors and tenants, and small business as Australia passes another pandemic economic milestone.

REIA president Adrian Kelly said measures for people, property and small business - including expansion of the First Home Super Saver and the First Home Loan Deposit - were welcomed.

"REIA welcomes the Budget 2021 which is aimed at helping women and first home buyers and continues to provide taxation benefits for the small business sector," Mr Kelly said.

"Employment growth and jobs creation enabled by personal income and business tax deductions, infrastructure spending and investment in childcare paint an optimistic future with unemployment falling to 5 per cent in 2021/2022 and under 5 per cent by 2022/2023.

"As part of this, the extension of full expensing and loss carry back provisions is welcome by agencies for small business as is the expansion of the Boosting Apprenticeships Program which many agencies have utilised."

Mr Kelly said that while the Budget contains measures to assist first-home buyers, REIA had hoped that interest rates for first-home buyers would be tax deductible and that the deregulation agenda would be clearer.

"We will continue to advocate for firsthome buyers to have the ability to claim interest payments as a tax deduction which will be crucial in years to come when interest rates start to rise," he said.

Mr Kelly hoped the Deregulation Agenda - funded to the tune of \$134 million - will reduce compliance outcomes by holding regulators accountable and deliver back to small businesses like agencies.

According to Mr Kelly, the Budget 2021 Housing Package is commendable, with First Home Loan Deposit Scheme being a good outcome with the scheme allowing for a new 10,000 places for

homes built since January 2020.

"The First Home Super Saver has been lifted from \$30,000 to \$50,000 and will greatly assist in easing the difficulties this group faces in obtaining a home. Expansion of this scheme has been a long standing REIA priority since it was first introduced and is a good taxation incentive which will help more first home buyers enter the market," Mr Kelly said.

"Superannuation incentives for Australians aged 60 and over to sell the family home of up to \$600,000 for couples and moving to housing that better suits their lifestyles should encourage turnover in a tightly held market.

"REIA has strongly advocated for more climate mitigation measures to better protect Australians' homes as we know that severe weather events like cyclones, floods and fires will continue.

"So the \$10 billion underwriting guarantee on the reinsurance pool will reduce insurance premiums by around \$1.5 billion for 500,000 policy holders thereby making their properties more saleable."

Mr Kelly said the focus on women's safety as well as social housing has wider benefits for the overall housing spectrum.

"Additional investment in social and affordable housing of nearly \$125 million for states and territories - as we know this is much needed with the private sector, particularly mum-and-dad investors, playing a major role in keeping tenants housed over the pandemic," he said.

"Finally, there has been the allocation of a critically important \$164.8 million over three years to support women and children fleeing domestic and sexual violence which includes the payment of rental bonds.

"Overall Budget 2021 is a strong budget should jobs creation promises become a reality; where we expect property to continue to be a driver of economic activity throughout the pandemic for the near future on the back of incentives announced and the backlog of homebuilder commitments."

With travelling becoming more difficult with age, it was sadly concluded it was most likely the last reunion.



STAFF shortages, migration and concerns over grape prices were among the issues raised by local Riverland women when the Women in Business Regional Network staged its latest dinner at

The guest speakers were Lorena Lyon and Tish Reynolds from Regional Development Australia Murraylands and Riverland.

Their presentation not only outlined the role of the RDA, but also a number of new programs that could assist businesses locally.

Boost for netball's next crop

A NEW junior development scholarship spearheaded by the Loxton North Netball Club has given financial relief to families of Riverland junior netballers.

Recently, the club was the beneficiary of a bequeathed \$2500 from the closure of the Loxton Junior Netball Club.

Loxton North Netball Club spokesperson Ilze Braddock said the money went towards setting up the scholarship.

"The stipulation was to use the money for junior development," she said.

The scholarship will be made available as separate \$100 vouchers to cover the cost of player subs, uniforms, and sporting goods.

This year's inaugural scholarship went to a Loxton-based junior who is to remain anonymous. Applicants were asked to provide a 250-word summary, which the club assessed on a needs basis.

"The particular girl who won was rapt. It was one of those bucket-filling moments,"

Ms Braddock said.

"It's going to go a long way to help her stay in the game and be part of the club."

The junior netballer told the club in her submission that "at every difficult point in my life, netball has always been there for me to help me have an outlet and a positive focus"

Ms Braddock said the scholarship will help to alleviate the costs of new juniors coming to the club.

"The cost of playing is a bit prohibitive for some families," she said.

"This is a way we hope to alleviate cost and pressure because it's not just about buying a uniform. There is the warm-up jumper and the bag, the list can go on and on.'

The scholarship comes with the addition of under 11 grades to the Riverland Netball Association next year.

"This is our way to attract new people to the game and help families who might be feeling the pinch (of costs)," Ms Braddock
