A 'MODEST' 2.5% RISE?

LOXTON Waikerie residents can expect an average rates increase of 2.5 per cent this year – plus other increases to Kerbside Waste Management and CWMS service charges - after council adopted its draft budget.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie recently released its Draft Annual Business Plan 2025-26 for public feedback.

The average Loxton Waikerie residential ratepayer can expect a \$31 rates increase, due in part to land valuation increases, while council's fixed and service charges will also increase.

General rates raised in 2025-26 will be \$12.14m, equating to 45.18 per cent of council's operating revenue.

Loxton Waikerie CEO David

Beaton said "the challenges facing our region remain significant, with rising living costs, ongoing economic uncertainty, and the continued impact of drought on our agricultural sector".

"These pressures are compounded by persistently low wine grape prices, which are placing strain on one of our most vital local industries. In response, council has adopted a considered and community-focused approach to its 2025-26 Annual Business Plan," Mr Beaton said. "This year's rate rise has been lim-

ited to 2.5 per cent, a modest increase that reflects our commitment to maintaining essential services and infrastructure, while recognising the financial strain many households and businesses are experiencing.



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

Weather causes highway closures

EXTREME dust storms earlier this week caused major disruptions to numerous roads within the Riverland, prompting police to issue traffic warnings.

Severe weather and winds caused dust storms that significantly red-uced visibility on numerous roads throughout the region, with roads such as the Sturt Highway, between Blanchetown and Truro, closed to

traffic during Monday afternoon. Police also advised drivers in regional and country areas to exercise and drive to the conditions.

If drivers feel it is unsafe to drive, pull to the side of the road, activate hazard lights and wait for the storm to pass.

Truck driver smashes into cars during dust storm

A COLLISION involving a truck and another vehicle near Blanchetown during Monday's dust storm has led to a driver's suspension, after the incident

was captured on video. Footage obtained by 7NEWS shows cars pulled over on the Sturt Highway between Truro and Blanchetown, when a truck, appearing to overtake the stopped traffic, sideswiped a Volkswagen Amarok caught in the congestion.

Transport company Collins Transport confirmed the driver has been suspended pending an internal investigation, stating the incident would be "completely unacceptable if safety standards and driver expectations were not met".

"Our plan prioritises responsible spending, operational efficiency, and transparent governance to ensure we meet community needs without adding undue burden."

Capital values across the Loxton Waikerie district increased significantly across all land-use categories, with residential land valuations increasing by 9.1 per cent, or \$151,326.

The average valuation for a residential property within a township is \$330,428.

Mayor Trevor Norton said "in this challenging economic environment, we remain determined to manage our resources prudently while continuing to invest in the infrastructure, services, and local projects that matter most to our residents".

"This plan reflects our efforts to strike that balance – delivering value, maintaining community assets, and supporting growth where it's needed most," Mr Norton said.

"Council remains committed to financial sustainability, and the Draft Annual Business Plan outlines an operating surplus of \$30,000, reflecting a balanced budget while delivering a capital works program valued at \$15.734m.

"Council's key financial performance indicators demonstrate that it is operating within or exceeding the established parameters."

Some of the key budget focuses for the coming year include:

- □ Finalisation of flood recovery projects.
- □ Road works including resheeting and re-seals. Loxton and Waikerie waste-
- water treatment plant upgrades.
- □ Significant increase in footpath, kerbing and walking trail projects.
- Community event and project support.

As part of setting the rates, a review of council's service charges was conducted, result-

ing in an increase of 2.5 per cent for council's kerbside waste management service charge, while the Community Waste Management System (CWMS) will increase by 6 per cent.

CWMS service charges will be \$590 for occupied connections within the Loxton and Waikerie townships, and \$519 for occupied connections within the Moorook and Kingston-on-Murray townships.

To cover collection and disposal of kerbside waste, \$337 - up from \$329 – is proposed for a three-bin collection, while a two-bin is \$265 – up from \$259.


Feedback on the draft plan closes on Wednesday June 4, at 5pm. Copies of the plan are available through the council's website (www.engagement.lwdc.sa.gov.au), by email (council@lwdc.sa.gov.au), Loxton Waikerie council office (35 Bookpurnong Terrace, Loxton), Waikerie Civic Centre (Strangman Road, Waikerie) and at the Loxton Library and Visitor Centre (East Terrace Loxton).

A public meeting will be held at 7pm tomorrow, providing the opportunity to hear directly from the council and its staff about the plan, ask any questions and share feedback.

The meeting will take place at The Precinct in Loxton, and online via Zoom (with the link to be published on council's website and social media). The Waikerie council chamber will also be set up to accommodate any community members without internet access.

Council invites community members to submit their feedback by using the online form available through its website (www.engagement.lwdc.sa.gov. au) or by submitting written feedback by email, post or in person.

A report containing all submissions on the Draft Annual Business Plan 2025-26 will be presented to the public council meeting held Wednesday, June 18.



Risks in record China wine exports?

THE Riverland's State MP says returning to an "over-reliance" on exports to China is creating further risks for the local wine industry.

Recent ABS trade data revealed South Australia exported \$855 million of wine to China in the year to March 2025 – a 200-fold increase on the previous year.

However, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said support to facilitate necessary changes within the state's wine industry was still lacking.

"This really is an inadequate response for an industry that is still struggling," Mr Whetstone said.

"While the Malinauskas Government is quick to claim credit for the rebound in wine exports to China, we are not hearing the full story.

"We are navigating a fragile recovery that continues to be hampered by government inaction, an over-reliance on a single market, and a lack of long-term strategy.

"We have seen no new policy put on the

table and these numbers simply reflect a return to where we were in 2020.

"The government need to facilitate for structural adjustments into emerging opportunities."

Mr Whetstone said economic challenges in the wine industry continued to put pressure on Riverland wine grape growers.

"The government's \$1.85 million attempt to fix the problem is a drop in the ocean for an industry that was decimated by years of trade disruption and our local growers and producers have borne the brunt of uncertainty," he said.

"The opposition will continue to work with our producers to ensure that our wine industry is not only the largest exporter, but also resilient and innovative.

"I would remind both (Minister for Trade and Investment Joe) Szakacs and the SA Wine Industry Association that the Riverland's commercial wine sector has historically been the industry's engine room nationally and is now experiencing decimation with very low-value sales that fall well below the cost of production. "Our growers are facing another vintage with an uncertain future ahead."

South Australian Wine Industry Association chief executive Inca Lee said "continued investment to grow demand in China and other markets (is) needed to ensure the industry's long-term success".

"South Australia's premium wines are once again capturing the attention of Chinese consumers, solidifying the state's reputation for world-class winemaking excellence," Ms Lee said.

"The results are strong.

"At a time when we are seeing a global decline in wine consumption and an unpredictable trading landscape, we acknowledge the Malinauskas Government's commitment to rebuilding our exports into China, and supporting diversification efforts into other key export markets."

Mr Szakacs said federal government efforts to "repair our trading relationships with China" had benefited South Australia.

"The rapid recovery of South Australia's wine export industry has exceeded even the most optimistic predictions of a year ago when tariffs were removed," Mr Szakacs said.

"The \$855m in wine exports in the past year is an exceptional result. It's just reward for the patience and resilience that producers demonstrated through a very challenging and uncertain period of trade disruption.

"South Australia has done the heavy lifting for Australian wine, increasing both our size and market share of exports. The Malinauskas Government has stood with local wine producers, and the thousands of people that they employ, during the tough times.

"We are backing efforts to diversify, and ensure that renewed opportunities in China are seized. Thanks to these efforts, South Australia has recovered 90 per cent of the all-time peak wine exports to China, in just one year."

Mr Szakacs said "our government recognises that uncertainty in global markets remains, and remains ready to act to protect local jobs".

Councils free to pay CEOs more...or less

TWO Riverland councils are now free to pay their CEOs substantially more.

Following an SA Remuneration Tribunal ruling, the maximum Berri Barmera and Loxton Waikerie can now pay their respective CEOs has increased from \$265,200 to \$294,103 per annum.

However, both councils are also free to pay their CEOs less: a minimum of \$226,400, down from the previous \$235,040 figure.

The Tribunal has announced a revamp of remuneration "bands", which are the groupings all 68 South Australian councils fit under.

From 2023, Renmark Paringa and Mid Murray councils were both in Band 6, which had a minimum of \$272,480 and a maximum of \$292,240, while the other two Riverland councils were in Band 7, which has lower payment figures.

However, following the latest shake-up, all four councils will soon be in Band 5, meaning Renmark Paringa could potentially pay its CEO around \$45,000 less than previously.

The Tribunal's determination takes effect from July 1, however councils have until the end of 2027 to comply with the minimum and maximum amounts.

In its determination, the Tribunal noted that mobile telephones and portable computing equipment, "fundamentally for work purposes, professional development costs directly related to the performance of CEO duties, membership of professional associations and relocation expenses are not included in the total remuneration package".

"It is always fun throwing a party, especially one when you can involve the community and your loyal customers," Harvey Norman Renmark proprietor Nestor Beale said.


"On the day we gave away over \$2000 worth of prices.

Riverland SES volunteers recognised

RIVERLAND State Emergency Service (SES) volunteers have been celebrated during the annual Wear Orange Wednesday (WOW Day) this month, with locals donning their brightest colours to acknowledge those who respond to people and communities in need.

Held last Wednesday, WOW Day is a national initiative held on May 2, recognising and thanking SES personnel in orange uniforms.

In South Australia more than 1700 SES volunteers from 67 Units across the state have responded to more than 2600 requests for assistance from the public so far this year.

SES SA chief officer Chris Beattie said the commitment shown by volunteers to respond to people in need, and committing to undertaking thousands of hours of skills training every year, was something we should all be thankful for.

"The work SES volunteers undertake in

our community can sometimes fly under the radar," he said.

"Over the past 50 days our volunteers have been supporting the township of Innamincka and surrounding communities in rural South Australia as they struggle with incredible amounts of floodwater entering our state from Queensland.

"It is always challenging to be away from your family and work, and we should never take their dedication, and their importance to our communities, for granted.

"Wear Orange Wednesday is a great opportunity to show our appreciation for the hard work and dedication of SES volunteers.

"As an organisation we are also committed to helping build safer and more resilient communities through engagement and education, to assist in minimising the impact of extreme weather events such as severe floods and damaging storms."

Unlocked for repairs

RIVERLANDERS are being treated to the rare sight of an emptied lock in the region, with maintenance and repair work being done on the major water infrastructure.

Lock 3, near Overland Corner, was drained earlier this month and is undergoing essential maintenance works, allowing SA Water crews to undertake a detailed inspection and necessary repairs to structural and mechanical components.

Completed in 1925, Lock 3 controls 85km of the Murray River and contains the most diverse range of flow conditions of all the South Australian River weir pools.

SA Water senior manager of River Murray Operations Garry Fyfe said "as part of our maintenance schedule, every decade we have a real strong aim to get into the bottom of the chamber, so we can actually look at the bits and pieces below water".

"What we found is that corrosion rates are quite high in some locations, leaving us with a loss of metal in the structure, paint disappearing and loss of concrete materials and rubber seals at the bottom of the gates and the valves," Mr Fyfe said.

"Over time, those components start to shred away with water pressure, so the process we've got is to put large coffer dams in place, which block off the upstream and downstream water and seal the chamber.

"We then pump the water out of the chamber and remove all debris from the bottom."

Mr Fyfe said once the chamber - which allows vessels to travel through the lock - is free of water, the removal process can take between one or two days, before the engineers can really assess the necessary repairs.

"We take some assessments based on what we know," Mr Fyfe said.

"This time, we knew we had to replace all the valves that actually allow water in and out, so they've already been purchased and procured

"From previous assessments, we expected a lot of damage to our valve and gate rubbers from the previous floods. That turned out to be true, which is approximately 700m of valve rubber we need to replace.

"We are now in the process of getting subcontractors and specialists, alongside the concrete company which is already onsite. The concrete has eroded faster than expected due to the damage on the rubber seals."

The maintenance and refurbishing process of the chamber and its locks can take between 14 to 16 weeks, depending on the weather and other unforeseen circumstances, but according to SA Water, the

chamber should be ready in mid-October.

"There is a lot of work going on in a short space of time, because once the works are finished, we have to test the chamber, locks, seals and make sure everything has been done correct-

ly," Mr Fyfe said. "We will re-water the chamber by pumping water back in and if it's all good, we'll then remove the coffer dams and away we go from there.

"The weather can slow the process, depending if we get more rain during these months. There is a lot of hydraulics that have to be reconnected, so you want to make sure that the right gate opens when you push the button."

SA Water authorities advise that river traffic in the area may be impacted during the closure, which is expected to last several weeks.

The centre, located at 5 Kealley Street, also remains home to all of ac.care's Riverland services, including foster care, homelessness, emergency relief, financial counselling, Aboriginal services, family and youth support, and more.

ac.care Berri Community Centre co-ordinator Sue Dayman said the organisation was successful in its funding application after demonstrating a strong connection to the local community, as well as a proven capacity to deliver appropriate and quality services.

"People from all walks of life visit the centre each day and interact with the services and opportunities differently based on their circumstances," Ms Dayman said.

"One of the newer, popular aspects has been the weekly interactive, fun activities that connect people through conversation, art, music, gardening, games and more.

"We know the negative effects of loneliness and social isolation on people's health can be significant so these groups bring together a broad range of people to connect, have fun and learn new skills.

Ms Dayman said ongoing improvements to the centre's rear yard, supported by the Department for Human Services, Community Connections and Skylight Mental Health, had created a vibrant, welcoming space, complete with community garden, shelter and a new outdoor kitchen.

She encouraged the Riverland community to attend next Wednesday and explore the opportunities available locally.


"We would love to see the community embrace and explore the Berri Community Centre on June 4 or another time by visiting us at Kealley Street and even jumping into a group activity," she said.

EDITORIAL An important milestone

WITH a carpark crammed full of farm animals, kids going wild for pass the parcel, and a sausage sizzle, Renmark's Harvey Norman had potentially the ultimate birthday party last weekend.

After many years of rumours, the excitement was high among Renmark residents when the announcement was made that a Harvey Norman would occupy the former Woolworths building on Fifteenth Street.

However, even in those early days there was a section of the community that had their doubts about the business' potential success.

Would the Riverland's local clientele be enough to support such a large company? Would such a large brand be accepted to the region?

Even now there remains those with the rare opinion that expect the store to shut inside the next six months.

Therefore, it is probably a testament to the store's leadership, and the service provided by employees, that the two-year anniversary has been crossed during a time when cost-of-living pressures are causing the majority of households to watch their budgets, particularly in agricultural-based communities like the Riverland.

Fears that the presence of Harvey Norman in the Riverland would take potential sales away from our smaller, family-run businesses have probably largely been put to rest as well, with all other providers of furniture and electrical goods continuing to operate.

Community growth is something difficult to put into perspective in real time. We can see houses being built, or a new business opening, but it can take years to see the full benefits.

In Renmark's case, having Harvey Norman in town was likely a large factor in attracting the nearby BCF, and having both large stores nearby would also have potentially given the operator of the adjacent Foodland the confidence to renovate and expand its offerings.

It also seems like the best business days for Harvey Norman could still be yet to come. With improving housing availability a priority at both state and federal government levels, and a large appetite for many to relocate to regional areas still ongoing since Covid, it seems safe to say the Riverland is going to see a lot more new homes created in the coming years.

No doubt operators of the store would be keeping an eye out for updates regarding Renmark's proposed Jane Eliza development for just this reason.

While it may not have been a sprint to success out of the starting line, it appears as though Renmark's Harvey Norman has the necessary endurance to become a long-term Riverland business.

In an interview with young cousin Cameron Williams, Joan recalled that in 1919, when she was four, her family moved to virgin country north of the river at Devlin's Pound. This was on the cliff-top across the river from Woolpunda. Joan's dad employed men to cut the Mallee into lengths and cart it down to the river for the paddle steamers. The only communication with the outside world was the riverboats, which Joan recognised by their whistle and the beat of the engine. Several were store boats and '...you could buy anything from a bag of sugar, a bag of flour or even pretty hats for the ladies and these were the only shops, ... everything came by river'. In 1923 they opened a school at Woolpunda. Joan said that 'one day my mother rowed my sister and me over the river, to quit school and collect our books. The school inspector was there, and he persuaded mother to take the school on as teacher. My father wasn't happy. It didn't matter how much work they did on the farm; the wives did not go to work. After 12 months my mother resigned, and we didn't go to school anymore, but were among the first children to get correspondence lessons from Adelaide'. 'I loved it', said Joan. PHOTO: Janet Byrne.

Homeless crisis and wellbeing crisis

HOMELESSNESS Australia is urging federal and state governments to act on the latest findings from the National Housing Supply and Affordability State of the Housing System 2025 report, released last week.

The 2025 report revealed households are under growing pressure, with increasing rental stress, and a sharp rise in people stuck in rental stress for over two years, and social housing as a proportion of all housing continuing to decline.

New data in the report reveals the direct impact of this crisis on people's wellbeing, with renters in rental stress experiencing worsening mental health over the past decade.

New data also reveals that rental stress is increasing risk factors for homelessness, with one-in-four stressed renters not having savings to manage an

Communities can help cut power bills

REWIRING Australia says communities will play an important role in protecting households from price hikes, after the Australian Energy Market Operator warned of a surge in electricity infrastructure costs.

AEMO's Draft 2025 **Electricity Network Options** Report has revealed transmission line costs have risen by up to 55 per cent because of skills and material shortages. It expects the costs to be passed onto the consumer.

This isn't a doom and gloom scenario. We know harnessing the power of solar and battery storages can make individual homes, and their communities more resilient if they can also feed excess power back into the grid.

By using more of our local grid capacity with neighbourhood battery storage and smart EV charging, we can capitalise on the huge amount of potential rooftop solar we have space for.

We have local infrastructure. If we re-think where we invest, and target upgrading gridsharing technology, we can help communities access cheaper and cleaner energy without expensive new poles and wires.

This isn't a novel idea either. AEMO recommends this sort of local level consumer network distribution in its report, and in some communities, this sort of model is already operating.

The AEMO report proposes a re-evaluation of some largescale transmission projects, flagging the increasing role of consumer energy resources that includes rooftop solar and household and community batteries.

It comes as the NSW Government launches its first urban renewable energy zone, which will focus on local solar,

Energy reform must be made

TODAY'S final determination of the Default Market Offer (DMO) for 2025-26 by the Australian Energy Regulator further highlights how the DMO is failing to protect energy consumers - particularly those on lower incomes - from paying unreasonably high prices.

South Australian households will pay up to 3.2 per cent more under the DMO in 2025-26, after a massive 24 per cent increase in 2023-24 was followed by a small 2.2 per cent decrease in 2024-25.

Even though today's DMO determination means the increase for SA households is less than other jurisdictions, it's still going to add to the hardship challenges faced by low-income and high-usage households with energy prices remaining at very high levels.

Misleading ads during election

A NEW poll conducted for The Australia Institute has found that 72 per cent of voters saw misleading political



advertisements during the recent election campaign, with well over half of those exposed to misleading ads every day.

While Australia's electoral institutions are among the best in the world - like an independent electoral commission, Saturday voting, full preferential voting and compulsory voting – they are not perfect.

Lies in advertising and text spamming are among six key problems identified by The Australia Institute from the campaign, which suggests reforms to fix these areas of concern to safeguard Australia's democracy.

A poll of 1500 voters was conducted by YouGov in the final week of the election campaign, asking Australians whether they'd seen misleading advertisements.

- The key findings show: □ New polling research from the Australia Institute shows that seven-in-10 voters (72 per cent) came across political ads they knew to be misleading during the election campaign, while only 4 per cent said they did not.
- Two in five (42 per cent) saw misleading ads daily during the election campaign.
- □ A further one in four (24 per cent) didn't know how often they came across misleading political ads.
- This year's federal election was marred by lies in political advertising, political parties inserting themselves in the postal vote process, mass

Disturbingly, most Australians report that they came across misleading political advertising during the election campaign, including 42 per cent who came across such content daily.

The election was marred by

misleading political advertising, political parties inserting themselves in the postal vote process and spam messages on an industrial scale – but solutions exist.

Truth in political advertising laws have worked for 40 years in South Australia, a multi-party committee has proposed getting parties out of the postal vote process, and it would be simple to make privacy and spam laws apply to political parties as they do everyone else.

HOPING to reduce period poverty in region, Berri Regional Secondary alumni Nikki Pfitzner has been awarded a grant to help supply local students in need of vital personal products with dignity.

Awarded the EdStart Social Impact grant of \$1500 last year, Ms Pfitzner has used the funds to install a dignity vending machine that dispense free period products — in the Berri Regional Secondary girls' bathroom.

Delivering the fully stocked dispensers for students from 2025 and beyond, Nikki said her grant application was inspired by a passion to "help end period poverty"

"(As of 2024), 64 per cent of Australian (menstruators) find it difficult to buy period products due to cost," she said.

"So, when I saw a (period product dispenser) in Adelaide, it just seemed liked such a good idea and I applied for the Social Impact grant because we had a lot of good projects happening around the school, but nothing really on this topic.

'There is still a lot of stigma around asking for period products, so this is a great way, given the cost of living, or even if someone has just forgotten a product, to access them.'



THE Riverland community is bidding farewell to Waikerie Hotel Motel manager Andrew Tyson, who will officially retire on June 30.

He has been at the helm for almost 14 years as a respected leader, and leaves a lasting legacy of rebuilding and transforming the venue into one of the region's top hotels after a devastating fire in 2011.

Mr Tyson, who had spent just 14 days in the role and had yet to find permanent accommodation, was staying at the hotel when an electrical fault caused the fire at 4.30am on Father's Day, September 4, 2011.

In his previous posting in Far North Queensland, he had been accustomed to preparing his staff and guests for cyclones, which was completely different to a sudden fire.

"With a cyclone you have warning, and you are able to put safety nets in, but with a

fire it is instantaneous," he said.

"You are just woken up to the fire alarm and you have to move straight onto it and gather everyone together at emergency evacuation points.'

The fire caused \$1.5m damage and destroyed the original Waikerie Hotel building where the cafe, bar and bottle shop were.

Mr Tyson said it cost \$3m to rebuild the damaged section of the hotel and refurbish it. "First we had to get what we had left of

the hotel up and operating," he said. Mr Tyson said they were able to get the

bottle shop operating again about three weeks after the fire, and the rest of the hotel took about three months to open.

He said the following three years after the fire were spent working with the banks, architects, and the hotel's insurance agency to rebuild and refurbish the premises.

The Waikerie Hotel Motel was able to obtain grants for the project.

This included \$1.35m funding from the Federal Government's tourism industry regional fund, the SA Government's Riverland Sustainable Future's Fund, and the South Australian Tourism Commission.

Mr Tyson said this enabled the hotel to be built onto one level, instead of being split level, and for the accommodation to be refurbished.

"We think it has become one of the best hotels in the Riverland and it has gone from strength to strength," he said.

"From being a struggling hotel back in 2011, it is now a hotel that is financially successful today."

"You could say it is like a phoenix rising from the ashes.'

Mr Tyson said he was happy that the Waikerie Hotel Motel was in a position to support the local community through sponsorships and in-kind donations.

"The hotel has to make a profit to return to the community," he said.

"We have been able to do that year after year, and it is not just the sporting clubs, but smaller clubs such as the Waikerie Horse and Pony Club and those involved in

the arts or literature."

Mr Tyson is in the process of handing over the reins to Brenton Franks, who will take over as the new manager of the Waikerie Hotel Motel.

Mr Franks has extensive experience in the hospitality industry and has spent many years in the Riverland.

Mr Tyson will continue to live in Waikerie following his retirement.

He is looking forward to travelling, spending more time with his family and brother in Adelaide, and fishing in his boat on the Murray River.



"We don't often get opportunities like this, so it's just great to see what is possible to achieve, especially as we are on the right track with a great coach, equipment, and dedication in our rowers.

"It takes time, but for us, we feel like we will definitely begin to see the rewards of our efforts over the next couple of years."

Heading back home last week to compete in the Italian championships, Mr Rocek, with his Murray River training, is once again hoping to score gold.

"I just want to thank everyone at the Renmark Rowing Club, the Berri Rowing Club, and the family of (Riverland Olympian Rower) Alex Hill who I have been staying with," he said.

"I was welcomed so well by everyone, so it has been absolutely great."

Monash Primary School and Preschool students also performed a day-long set of singing, ukulele, and dancing for the whole Riverland to enjoy.


"It was so lovely to have such big and great audiences for the kids to perform to," Ms Wainwright said.

Council focus on enhancing 'community liveability'

MID Murray Council's draft business plan and budget for the next financial year will focus on enhancing community liveability, prosperity, and sustainability.

The document has been released for public comment, along with the council's draft long-term financial plan for 2025-26 to 2034-35.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey said council had worked hard to find a balance between continuing to deliver essential services and projects, while also keeping rates as low as possible during challenging economic times.

"This year's draft budget is about building on the strong financial foundations we've created over the past couple of years, while ensuring that we're supporting our community and delivering the services, programs, infrastructure and opportunities they need most, she said.

"In planning for the year ahead, we've had to balance our community's needs with the financial impacts we're still experiencing from the Murray River flood.

"We're mindful, too, that many in our community are currently struggling with cost-of-living pressures, compounded by the current drought conditions.

"This has also been front of mind in our planning, as has our need to be as efficient and prudent as possible to avoid shifting any financial burden onto future ratepayers."

The council is proposing an average rate increase in the draft budget of 4.94 per cent, consisting of a forecast CPI increase of 3.2 per cent and a sustainability increase of 1.74 per cent.

It is also expecting a further 0.5 per cent increase in rate revenue from new development.

The council said this equated to an average increase of \$70 for the year for existing property owners – noting that the exact figure was dependent on individual property valuations.

It said, overall, the proposed rate increase was lower than expected in previous longterm planning for 2025-26, as a result of council's significant cost reduction effort, sustainability measures, and additional recovery of costs through service charges.

In its proposal, council said "pleasingly, there had also been a 3.3 per cent reduction in the residential rate in the dollar (RID) (0.3815 cents in the dollar compared to 0.3944 cents in the dollar in 2024/25), which was a 3.3 per cent reduction".

Primary production land in the Mid Murray district will continue to receive a 10 per cent reduction (0.3434 cents in the dollar compared to 0.355 cents in the dollar in 2024/25) compared to the base RID.

"Council also has a hardship policy in place for ratepayers experiencing financial difficulties, and State Seniors Card holders may be eligible to have their rates postponed on a long-term basis," Ms Bailey said.

"Council has made more than \$1.12m in savings since November 2024 through Stage 1 of our sustainability measures," she said.

"These include \$546,000 in one-off savings, \$462,000 in recurring savings and \$115,000 in efficiency gains. This has helped us keep the proposed general rate increase lower than initially expected."

Mid Murray Council is proposing an adjusted budget deficit of \$402,000, including capital expenditure of \$11.645m.

It plans to spend most of that (\$10.1m) on renewing existing assets, including \$924,542 in upgrades to the Mannum Oval Complex, supported by a Federal Government Play Our Way program grant.

A further \$1m is being proposed to be spent on renewing existing sealed roads, and more than \$1.8m on maintaining unsealed roads.

The council's forecast borrowings for 2025/26 are \$8.9m, down substantially from the previously forecast figure of \$13.6m.

It said looking ahead, council's net financial liabilities ratio was expected to reduce in the longer term from 30 per cent (\$9.3m loans) in 2026/27, to 2 per cent (\$47,000) in 2034/35.

Ms Bailey said council would continue its advocacy efforts for equity in the Federal Government's Financial Assistance Grants, so that councils with smaller populations and higher needs for assistance were not disadvantaged by the current funding model.

Consultation on both the draft annual business plan and budget and draft long term financial plan 2025-26 to 2034-35 opened on May 21, and closes at 12pm, on June 11.



Who will reel in the Fisher Cup?

ARGUABLY the biggest rivalry in the Riverland Football League will resume for the 23rd time this weekend in Berri.

The first edition of the Fisher Cup was in 2002, making it the oldest cup clash in the competition, and Berri narrowly leads the head-to-head battle at 12-10, largely thanks to taking out the first four editions.

Despite a recent period of success in the modern era for Barmera-Monash, the Demons currently hold the cup after a shock win at the Lakeside Oval last July.

Added to that, Berri has won three of the last four contests, with the Roos' only win in that time coming in 2023, the year they tasted the ultimate glory. Looking back at round

one, it was Barmera-Monash under the lights that secured a 60-point win on home turf in a comprehensive display.

A second quarter run of five goals to one had the Roos in control by 38 points at the major break, and it proved a bridge too far for the visiting side.

Despite getting some momentum in the third quarter, Barmera-Monash again piled on five goals to one in the final term, helping notch up the big win.

Berri took until round 12 last season to win its first game of the year, and although it secured back-toback wins, those were the only ones for the campaign.

However, things are turning at Demonland under new coach Henry Labastida, and confidence is sky-high following a two-goal win in Waikerie, last Saturday.

It was Berri's first win at Waikerie in a decade, and all of a sudden, it has the Demons in finals calculations, sitting in third spot with five weeks in the books.

FISHER CUP

One of the key reasons behind Berri's sudden rise up the ladder is key forward Darcy Minchella, who is providing a presence inside attacking 50, and also converting his opportunities, with the likes of ex-SANFL player Tyson Lindsay also giving opposition coaches headaches.

But perhaps Berri's biggest asset is the way its back six is working, utilising experience to stop opposition scores.

The Demons recently held Loxton North to just two majors, and last weekend, the Pies managed just six goals.

Brad Rosenzweig, Peter Safralidis, and Adam Langford are all combining well with the youth of Archie Holtham to drive Berri into attack, and limit opposition scores.

Defence has become a formula of success in the RFL across recent seasons, highlighted by Renmark and Barmera-Monash's recent premiership glory.

It's clear Labastida has a plan for his side to spring out of the RFL's doldrums, but it faces a significant test this weekend.

On the other side of the highway, the visiting Barmera-Monash is on a rare two-game losing streak, having suffered defeats against both Loxton and Loxton North.

Missing spearhead Jono Beech, the Roos have been forced to find alternative avenues to goal, and as a result, scoring has dried up.

Beech's absence has given the likes of Mitch Wellington opportunities to flourish under a new system, and young forward Lucas Warnett has been one of the biggest surprises of the year so far.

Barmera-Monash have turned to youth to guide it through the early portion of the 2025 campaign, and the likes of Jameson Whitbourne, Rory Moore, and Warnett have all been shining lights.

Despite the two-game slide, the Roos are hardly in crisis mode, still sitting second on the ladder, and hoping to time their run into the finals.

Berri's Dion Brauer won the medal in last year's contest, but he has since departed the club, so a new player will etch their name into the history of the battle this Saturday.

The Demons will enter in better form, and will be confident on home deck, but the juggernaut of Barmera-Monash will be hoping to get the trophy back to the Lakeside.

The first bounce will occur at 2.40pm, and the game will be commentated live by 5RM radio for those looking to tune in remotely.

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Local looking for Low Bank School history

A PROVISIONAL school, called Holder School, was opened in a building next to the Lowbank Lutheran Church at the beginning of the 1913 school year.

The teacher was William R Pattrick. Soon after opening, the name of the school was changed to Low Bank School.

The building, constructed of galvanised iron and lined with boards, was owned by Gottlieb Schmidt, and was leased by the education department.

In 1918, a new stone building was completed. It was a one-classroom school, with one teacher responsible for children from grades 1 to 7.

The school ground was very bare and windswept, and a brush shed provided the only shade for students to have their lunch, and shelter on hot or wet days.

The school had a little lean-to porch on the northern side. There was a garden that had been fenced in, and some flowers and plants from seeds the children brought along were grown. The garden mainly only grew in winter.

There was a tin whistle band and they always whistled themselves into school early in the morning, and again at dinnertime.

The school provided an education for students of the surrounding farming district. Children travelled up to 7 miles to attend, with some crossing the river.

For most of the children who attended, schooling was not compulsory due to the distance they lived from the school.

However, they still attended on a regular and punctual basis in order to receive an education.

Numbers fluctuated, beginning at 14 students in 1913, and reaching up to 27 students.

In 1941 student numbers dropped to five, and in April 1942 the school was closed due to the low number of students.

The school building was

later given to the Lowbank Lutheran Church, who enlarged it and use it as their church hall.

The school had 21 teachers over its short life, and provided an education for at least 119 students.

Some students received their full education at the school, while some were only there for a short time.

Unfortunately, the whereabouts of the school admission book is unknown, so the exact number of students who attended the school is unconfirmed.

A list of students known to have attended the school has been compiled, but is not complete.

A national tragedy we can no longer ignore

One woman is killed by her current or former partner every 11 days. It is a national tragedy.

It's important to note however, that not every case of domestic violence is physical.

Domestic and family violence is any act used to exert power and control. It includes sexual, psychological, physical, spiritual, financial and social abuse against another person.

Every Australian has a right to live free from harm, violence, abuse, neglect or exploitation.

Everyone should be respected in their homes, their workplaces, their community, at school and online. It's incredibly upsetting that in 2025, women and children are still enduring or being exposed to violence and trauma at the hands of those close to them.

In fact, reported incidents of domestic and family violence continue to rise in Australia.

Recorded sexual assaults reached a three-decade high in 2024 and 45,000 children remain in out-of-home care. Women are calling helplines every four minutes, with police responding to a domestic violence incident every six minutes.

Everyone has a role to play in calling out family and domestic violence, remembering that it's not always physical and other signs may be present. The cornerstone of domestic violence is power and control. While it's harder to spot, coercive control and emotional abuse can often be the most difficult aspect of abuse to escape and recover from.

Raising awareness in community of all types of abuse is important to enable more people to assist in recognising, advocating and addressing the factors that lead to the increasing incidence of domestic violence.


In addition to awareness-raising, the month is also a time to spotlight the services and organisations working tirelessly to support victims and hold perpetrators account-

We see it on the news far too often another case of domestic violence, another life cut short, another family devastated. It's no longer happening "somewhere else." It's happening in our suburbs, our towns, our communities. Chances are, someone you know has been affected.

In October 2022, all levels of government in Australia came together to launch the National Plan to End Violence against Women and Children 2022–2032. It was a necessary step. A roadmap to drive real change over the next decade.

While people of all genders can both perpetrate and experience family, domestic and sexual violence, most perpetrators are men and victims are women and children. The Australian Institute of Criminology (AIC) report that in 2023–24, 43 women were victims of intimate partner homicide, compared with 34 in 2022–23. In this year already, 14 women have been killed as a result of domestic violence.

It seems we are not just falling short. We are failing.

These are not just statistics. Behind every number is a life that mattered, and a family left shattered. And these numbers also don't reflect those who suffer in silence; people living with emotional, psychological, financial, or sexual abuse, too afraid or unable to speak out. They don't count those who have taken their own lives as a result of prolonged harm behind closed doors.

We need to confront this issue not just with words, but with action. That means stronger funding for support services, better protection for victims, and earlier intervention before abuse escalates. It also means challenging the cultural attitudes that allows this violence to persist in silence.

Every one of us has a role to play. Whether it's calling out sexist jokes in a group chat, checking in on a friend, standing with survivors, or supporting reforms that hold perpetrators accountable, this isn't about pointing fingers. It's about everyone taking responsibility.

This is a moment for all of us—governments, communities, individuals—to say: enough is enough.

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

RIVERLANDERS have been urged to participate in the upcoming Smoke Alarm Action Day by checking their home smoke alarms ahead of winter.

Smoke Alarm Action Day, being held on Saturday, June 1, is an annual initiative aimed at raising awareness about the critical role of smoke alarms in home fire safety.

In South Australia, smoke alarms play a crucial role in enhancing home fire safety. Recent statistics show:

□ Approximately one-infive South Australian homes are not compliant with smoke alarm regula-

tions, either lacking them entirely or having nonfunctional units.

□ In 2023, nearly half of all significant house fires in South Australia occurred in homes with disabled, flat, or absent smoke alarms.

The Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) emphasizes the importance of having interconnected smoke alarms. In the event of a fire, interconnected alarms activate simultaneously, providing early warning to all occupants, regardless of their location within the home. This interconnected system is particularly crucial in

larger homes or multi-level dwellings.

To support residents, the MFS provides resources such as the "Smoke Alarm Quick Guide," which offers information on the types of smoke alarms suitable for different home layouts and guidance on their proper installation.

By participating in Smoke Alarm Action Day, South Australians are reminded of the simple yet vital step of checking their smoke alarms. This proactive measure can significantly enhance home safety and potentially save lives in the event of a fire.

Riverlanders asked to report dying trees

FLINDERS University is encouraging Riverlanders to assist with providing data on local tree dieback to assess the recent environmental strain on native vegetation and streetscapes.

With South Australia experiencing record-breaking high temperatures and low rainfall in the past year, Flinders is encouraging the general public to help in their assessment of the progressive decline in tree health, and mortality.

Residents can now lodge a photo and details on a survey page to help the environment and prepare for further climate extremes in future.

"With climate change upon us, and local

water supplies running low, we will need to closely monitor current conditions and be better prepared in the future to protect our trees," Flinders University environmental science and hydrology Professor Huade Guan said.

"Knowledge of which trees, where, and why, do not cope with droughts would be useful for informed urban forest management to keep our city greener and cooler.

"The drought over the past summer, with only one-third of average rainfall, provided an opportunity to obtain such knowledge."

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Caring a 'rewarding and humbling' experience for SA volunteer Bili

VOLUNTEER Biljana 'Bili' Vitor says premature baby *Lucy just melted into her arms when she began nursing the newborn being cared for through the child protection and family support system.

Bili is among about 180 volunteers whose duties include assisting children by driving them to school, co-ordinating visits with family members, supporting them with homework and attendance at community events.

Along with two colleagues, Bili visited Lucy's crib for more than two months, providing the baby with love, care and cuddles.

Lucy was in need of some special attention, and Bili had the joy of visiting up to four times a week, spending a couple of hours cuddling the infant and reading stories.

Bili's usual role with the department's volunteer team involves driving children to school and appointments, as well as helping with visits with family members.

The 37-year-old governance, risk and compliance management worker is currently studying a Diploma of Counselling, and she has a particular interest in trauma-informed care in early childhood and child protection reform.

Baby Lucy now lives in kinship care with family members, and Bili says she feels lucky to have played such an important role in the first part of her life.

She encourages anyone interested in volunteering, to take the next step. Bili says volunteering is an incredibly rewarding experience, providing support not only to the children but also to the frontline workers who tirelessly work around the clock to support and protect the most vulnerable in our communities.

Ms Vitor said "knowing I was able to assist this young child in some way at the most vulnerable time of her life was one of the most rewarding and humbling experiences I've had".

"It was just an instinct to pick her up and cuddle her and care for her. It felt as if she just melted into my arms – she was so calm and comfortable and would just snuggle and

sleep," she said.

"When I would walk toward her crib and call her name, she almost seemed to recognise my voice and she would make little noises - it was really cute.

"In terms of the future direction of the volunteer program, I do hope to see an increase in sports and recreational activities for the children, supported by our efforts. We are currently discussing how we can further assist the children and their families in this space.

Minister for Child Protection Katrine Hildyard said "volunteers like Bili provide an extra layer of love and care to children who most need support, and they are an essential part of our child protection and family support system".

'Volunteer Week gives us an opportunity to acknowledge and thank the really generous people who give their time and energy to help others," Ms Hildyard said.

"It's an opportunity to reflect on volunteering and the vital role it plays in our community and to encourage those who have been thinking about lending a hand to find out more.

"Supporting children and young people to be safe, loved and nurtured is up to everyone. The almost 200 volunteers helping children in care offer extraordinary support and compassion.

"I thank them on behalf of the Government and all South Australians for stepping up and playing their part. Their efforts are deeply appreciated.

"For anybody considering volunteering to support children and young people who've gone through some pretty difficult circumstances, please reach out – it may be one of the most rewarding things you ever do and it will absolutely make a difference.'

Helping Riverland travel safely

KIDSAFE SA is providing access to free child restraint fitting services for Riverland families next week.

In partnership with the charitable foundation Cops for Kids, Kidsafe SA will be hosting free child car restraint fittings and checks at the Berri Community Preschool on Wednesday June 4, from 1pm to 4:30pm, and Thursday June 5, from 9am to 1pm.

Each fitting day offers invaluable opportunities for families to receive hands-on demonstrations, personalised guidance, and safety education.

Kidsafe SA data consistently shows that 70 to 80 per cent of children are travelling while incorrectly restrained in vehicles. Children who are improperly restrained are up to seven-times more likely to be injured in the event of a crash.

During recent fitting days, Kidsafe SA observed 75 per cent of restraints had at least one issue with installation or use. Regional families often displayed less awareness of the risks of improper restraint use, and greater confidence in self-installation, with the most common issues including:

SA's first Biodiversity Act introduced to State Parliament

IMPROVING protections for native A new process for listing threatened spe-Riverland animals and plants, and building resilience to the effects of climate change, are among targets of new major South Australian legislation.

The State Government earlier this month introduced the Biodiversity Act into Parliament.

Minister for Environment, and deputy premier, Susan Close said the legislation improves recognition for threatened species and provides opportunities for investment in restoring nature.

"We not only have to stop harming nature, but we also have to restore nature to create a stronger collective future for all South Australians," Dr Close said.

'The new Biodiversity Act will establish the framework to deliver environmental wins by safeguarding threatened animals and plants, restoring valuable habitat and ecosystems, while supporting billions of dollars in economic activity.

"The act aims to better balance environmental protection and restoration with economic growth.'

The Biodiversity Act includes:

- □ A new general duty ensuring all South Australians play a role in protecting biodiversity.
- □ Stronger native plant laws providing clearer regulations to safeguard native vegetation.
- □ Tougher penalties to create stronger deterrence against environmental harm.
- □ Critical habitat protections by introducing a new process to identify and safeguard habitats vital for the survival of threatened species.

- cies and threatened ecological communities, which aligns with other Australian jurisdictions and receives expert input from the scientific committee.
- $\hfill\square$ A nationally consistent process to assess and recognise threatened native species and ecological communities.

Penalties for people that harm or traffic native animals or illegally clear native habitat will also be increased to a maximum \$500,000 for businesses.

The new act would include a maximum \$250,000 fine or five years' jail for individuals convicted of illegally killing, catching, restraining, injuring, keeping or interfering with a protected animal.

Biodiversity Act ambassador Tim Jarvis said biodiversity loss and ecosystem collapse had been identified as the second-highest long-term risk facing the globe - after extreme weather events.

"Creating the state's first Biodiversity Act is a wonderful initiative and an example of South Australia again taking leadership on a critical environmental issue,'

"The state's focus on renewable energy shows that, by taking action, we're not contributing to issues like climate change, but we also need to restore nature to look after us and physically remove excess carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

"It's about thinking differently and focusing on regeneration, rather than just sustainability. It's also about showing that South Australia is a great place to do business if you are concerned about the environment and businesses and our trading partners will regard that as a positive step.

LOW water levels in the Murray River have meant that the PS Murray Princess has been unable to reach Morgan so far this month.

Sealink Marine & Tourism, which operates the boat said its cruise from May 9 to May 16, was modified due to the low water levels.

"In place of upstream travel, guests have enjoyed a complimentary tour to Monarto Safari Park, as well as coach visits to Waikerie, Banrock Station, and Burk Salter Wines at Blanchetown," a spokesperson for the company said.

"The Murray River is a dynamic water system that requires ongoing monitoring by our crew," she said.

"Where itineraries need to be adjusted, alternative arrangements are made to ensure guests continue to enjoy key land-based experiences.

"The safety of our guests, crew, and the vessel remains our highest priority, as well as ensuring our guests can experience the beauty of the region."

Sealink Marine & Tourism said the Murray Princess continued to cruise the Murray River, but was currently unable to reach Morgan due to river levels.

"We hope to resume our normal itinerary soon, when the rain arrives," the spokesperson said.

"The safety of our passengers, crew, and the vessel remains our top priority and guides all operational decisions."

The SA Department for Infrastructure and Transport said the safety of river users was paramount, and it continues to mark any reported or discovered hazards that cause a risk to navigation. "Floating trees, branches and other debris can be brought into waterways by increased flows or after heavy rain and flooding," a spokesperson for the department said.

"While all priority channels and hazards such as sandbars are currently marked, conditions can change quickly," she said. "Some hazards may not be marked immediately after they appear and removing them is not always feasible.

"Signage is currently in place at the Berri boat ramp alerting boaties to low water levels.

"Mariners should travel with caution on the river, maintain a safe speed, and take care when passing obstructions such as ferry cables and water intake pipes.

"Under the Harbors and Navigation Act, the department is responsible for the safety of vessels in South Australian waters.

"Mariners are encouraged to report any safety issues to Marine Safety SA."

AUSTRALIAN experts are urging greater RSV (respiratory syncytial virus) vigilance and awareness among older Riverlanders ahead of the winter season.

While RSV is recognised for its seriousness in young babies, the virus can also cause significant health issues in older adults, including pneumonia and hospitalisations.

"We know older adults are familiar with influenza – but less aware of RSV and the serious health challenges this infectious respiratory virus can cause," Lung Foundation chair, Sydney Respiratory physician Lucy Morgan said.

"We really want older Australians, particularly those caring for grandchildren, to become much more informed and aware of RSV.

"They need to know about their risk and

from the virus are four times higher.

Following hospital stays for RSV, older adults may experience long-term health complications, need increased care, and feel a loss of independence.

"The impact of RSV can be very serious for older Australians who may struggle to regain their health and conditioning after the virus has cleared," Associate Professor, and senior geriatrician, Michael Woodward said.

"Unfortunately, some may have significant delays in regaining their former health and independence after RSV."

Asthma Australia consultant respiratory physician, and medical advisor, John Blakey said "older adults with existing heart or lung disease are at higher risk of being admitted with RSV — they are five to 10 times more likely to end up in hospital".

"People with conditions like asthma therefore need to be particularly aware of RSV and how to minimise their risk," he said.

RSV generally starts with mild symptoms, similar to other respiratory viruses such as influenza and Covid-19, including cough, headache, tiredness, runny nose and congestion.

RSV can survive on hard surfaces for up to six hours and is easily spread, including between family members of all ages.

Australia commenced recording RSV cases under the Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System in 2021. The tracking is beginning to build a picture of the real numbers and impact of the virus. For older Australians, last year's reported RSV cases were 32,156, compared with 56,561 influenza cases.

Older Australians are being urged to become more informed and alert to RSV ahead of winter, especially when caring for young grandchildren, and talk to their doctor or pharmacist about RSV and prevention options.

Raising the bat for 750 games

AS sporting milestones come and go, notching up 750 games is effectively

notching up 750 games is effectively in the realms of untouchable, yet back in round three of the 2025 RFL season, veteran umpire Tony Florance marked that achievement.

Reflecting on an umpire career which has spanned three-decades, Mr Florance first took up umpiring in the RFL after an injury brought somewhat of a sudden end to his playing days.

"I broke my hand playing football, and then work commitments took over so I pulled the pin on playing," he said.

"I was playing tennis with Neil Martinson, and he said to come out and have a run, and that was back in around 1991.

"He just said to come out and have a go... and it's just something that I've stuck with ever since."

In a world of umpiring that has new interpretations, and new rules almost every single week, Mr Florance has to stay on top of what's occurring around him.

He said keeping things simple is what helps Riverland football flourish, and watchable for fans of the competition.

"We keep it basic out here in the country, which is a good thing, rather than trying to run with the AFL stuff that people see on TV," he said.

"Us as country footballers, and country umpires keep it basic, and don't try to overumpire and that's so important.

"It's certainly not a popular job, but when I started myself and Todd Charlton were unable to get a gig in the under 13s or under 15s, so our numbers have dropped off."

Mr Florance said the camaraderie between the officials in fluoro green keeps him coming back.

He said he recommends umpiring to anyone wanting to get involved, mentioning anyone is welcome.

"We have good programs in place, it's a great social thing, and I think a lot of the young umpires don't realise how welcome they'd feel," he said.

"We help them if they would like to go a little bit further, and if they have any questions, we're there to support them to keep the umpiring fraternity in the country going.

"We've got some good young kids in there, and hopefully we might get a few more out to the middle, so they can phase the older ones like myself out.

"I'm a mentor to them, and I try my best, but it is getting harder every year as you keep getting older."

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Panthers get season back on track

A STIRRING final quarter from Loxton North on Saturday afternoon saw the Panthers take home a thrilling four-point win against Barmera-Monash in RFL A grade action.

Both sides headed to Panther Park hoping to bounce back from losses to Berri and Loxton, respectively, the week prior.

In a slow start to the game, both sides failed to kick a goal in the opening term, leaving the Roos ahead by two points at the first change.

late for Barmera-Monash, but it proved to be too little, too late, and the Roos ultimately fell short.

Higgins said he was pleased with the way his side fought out the final term, in what was an important win for Loxton North.

"The idea was to come out and hit it pretty hard at the start of that last quarter, and put ourselves in as good of a position as we can, and then try and hold on, knowing that we were up against a really good opposition," he said.

"Every week is really important with how close the competition is, and the fact we're bottom, but only one win from second, just shows how tight it is, and how important every win is.

"So much has changed from last year within our squad, and from team to team, so we're rolling out the old cliché of one week at a time."

Kye Fielke found form in attack for North's side in a three-goal showing, while Tyler Wagner also continues to impress.

Codi Voumard starred across half-back, showing the competition how consistent he can be, while experienced midfielders Joel Worsfold and Scott Lewis also shone in the win.

Barmera-Monash took a depleted side to Panther Park, including missing playing coach Fraser Sampson, and key forward Jono Beech.

However, Mitch Wellington again stood tall in Beech's absence,

Cook serves up game 360

IT is rare in country footy that game records are broken, but that is exactly what occurred at Panther Park last Saturday.

Loxton North legend Anton Cook etched himself further into the history of the Panthers, crossing the white line for the 360th time, now a club record.

A key cog at full back for North in the glory years of the club, Cook surpassed previous games-record holder Phil Saint in the B grade clash with Barmera-Monash.

Having been at the club for 32 years, Cook said crossing the record was a good feeling, but he knows it's unlikely that the record will last forever.

"It's been a long time coming, and I guess you don't think about that when you first start playing footy, but to finally get there and do it was awesome," he said.

"We had a win which was good on a milestone as well, but a record is never broken, and there's always someone who could beat it, but it's good to finally get there.

"I got to 350 games last year, and we asked about it then, and we were trying to work out what the actual figure was, and they told us 359 was the record at the start of this year."

Cook said the thing that makes Loxton North such a special place is the family aspect of the club, noting the important people involved at the Panthers.

The club produced a video on Saturday morning of tributes for the now gamesrecord holder, featuring messages from those involved in the club.

"I guess it's just the people that have been in and out of the club, we all get on really well, and it's very family orientated," he said.

"You can talk to anyone at the footy club no matter who you are, and everyone makes you feel welcome and part of it.

"We have fun on the field, and even better fun off the field, so I guess that's what has kept me there for so long.

"There were a few things in there that make you think back and they hit the spot, and my wife (Kelly), and Tracy Proud were part of making that video come together. "But it was a bit of a weird week, I didn't

really know what to think, it was just about getting through and playing the game.

"I have to speak to a lot more people and thank them for the messages that they sent, but it was good to hear, and a pretty cool idea."

Loxton North tasted the ultimate success three times in six years between 2011 and 2015, and Cook said they were some of the fondest memories of his career, along with an under 18s premiership.

Now a staple of the B grade side, Cook said helping the youngest generation of

Panthers is something he sees as an important role at the club.

"I've had some good coaches through that time, obviously with Craig Wooldridge being the coach during 2011, 2013, and 2015," he said.

"My first year of under 18s in 1999 was a premiership win, and we won by one point, so that was a pretty good one to remember too.

"I've had some pretty good coaches that guided me in the right direction, so that's the main thing.

"The older ones can't hang on forever, but in B grade footy it's good to have some speed, and some kids that haven't played a lot of footy together.

"It's just about trying to teach those kids the basics of footy, and make it fun, and making sure they want to rock up every week and play the game."

Set to turn 42 this year, the dreaded 'R' word of retirement is hanging around for Cook now, but he insists that his body is currently feeling at a manageable level.

"For me, I'll just keep playing until I can't and this is my second year of B grade footy and I feel okay," he said.

"Some weeks I'll go out and play Superdogs footy on a Sunday at Lyrup, but at the moment I'm going fine, so I'll just keep playing until everything let's go I guess."






