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

Riverland weekend traffic offences

SEVEN drivers were reported in the Riverland during the past weekend for traffic offences related to drink driving, speeding and drug driving.

Pasin predicts troubled times during his fifth term... 'HUMBLED, WORRIED'

WATER buybacks will loom large on the second-term Albanese Government's agenda, the re-elected Liberal Member for Barker has

Tony Pasin was easily returned for a fifth stint in office on Saturday, despite suffering a 3 per cent two-party-preferred swing against him, and seeing his primary vote dip below 50 per cent.

Mr Pasin, whose downturn was much less severe than the overall 9 per cent swing against the Liberals in SA, predicted Labor's stunning victory was bad news for regional Australia, including the Riverland.

"I'm particularly worried about a government that has been re-elected so strongly against a background where they've spent little-to-no energy focused on regional Australia or regional issues, particularly those that are afflicting the wine industry in the Riverland," he said.

"I expect this government will now push on, at pace, with water buybacks, which I've always been concerned about, because of the fact they hollow out the economic activity in (Murray-Darling) Basin communities."

"I'm focused on Australians (because) it's never been harder to meet the cost-of-living challenges."

Mr Pasin said while the election result cast doubt over the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass project, which includes the proposed Truro bypass, he was "incredibly grateful for being given the great privilege of serving another term as the Member for Barker".

"I will not take this opportunity for granted," he said.

"I will continue to be Barker's voice in parliament and stand up for local communities without fear or favour as I have done now for over a decade."

He said the Coalition's election loss could be attributed to two main factors.

"At the end of the day this was a campaign where I think honesty ran a distant last," he said.

"But from our own perspective, it would be disingenuous if we didn't accept responsibility for a number of things we control. We had a lot of messages, but no clear message.

"Australians for 100 years have re-elected first-term governments... I didn't get a sense on election day that people were angry with the Liberal Party, I think it's one where they aren't necessarily convinced Australia is on the right track, but they were disappointed by the offering the Liberal Party presented.

"That's their prerogative... what we have to do now as a Liberal Party is reflect on the outcome, and work hard to be an effective and strong opposition.'

While attention now turns to the Coalition's decimated ranks, and who forms the shadow cabinet, Mr Pasin declined to

be drawn into any predictions for his own immediate future.

"I currently serve in the shadow executive, and I would love to be given the opportunity to serve in the shadow cabinet," he said.

"But that's not my choice, that's the choice for other people and we'll wait and see how all these things land."

Mr Pasin said he was "humbled" by the Barker results, but was naturally disappointed for the national result.

"I had close to 400 volunteers on the ground on election day, and I'm incredibly grateful to them...

"From a national perspective it was a very difficult night, and a very bad result.

"South Australia saw swings of around 9 per cent against the Liberal Party.

"To have pushed against the wind locally with a 3 per cent two party preferred swing against me I think is, in the circumstances, a very good result.

"But it doesn't make up for how disappointed I am for our national campaign, and how hurt I am that many of my good friends and colleagues - some of whom are exceptional members of parliament that work very hard and care about their communities have been defeated."

Meanwhile the Riverland-based Barker candidates had mixed results on Saturday.

Renmark woman and One Nation candidate Jenny Troeth secured a 1.47 per cent swing for her party and had 8.05 per cent of the vote, just edging out Greens' contender Major Sumner, who received 7.9 per cent of the vote and a 0.55 per cent swing.

Winkie man Ian Penno received 1.38 per cent of the vote, while fellow independent candidate Rosa Hillam – who ran for the Greens in 2022 - received 1.73 per cent of the vote.

Lochert Bros hit with \$129k fine

A RIVERLAND citrus processor has received a \$129,000 fine over an incident that saw a worker's arm caught in an unguarded machine.

Ramco-based Lochert Bros Pty Ltd was sentenced in the South Australian Employment Tribunal, on 24 April, following a SafeWork SA prosecution

The company was charged with a failure to ensure adequate guarding was in place on a pressure washer to eliminate, or minimise the risk a worker's hand, or arm, could become entangled in the machine, and failed to ensure the emergency stop control for the pressure washer complied with regulations.

An incident took place on 9 March 2023, when a young female grader operator attempted to clear a blockage in the pressure washer after oranges became stuck at the

The worker used a stick to dislodge most of the oranges while the pressure washer was still operating, and reached into the machine to dislodge the remaining fruit.

When doing so, the sleeve of her jacket became caught in the pinch point of the motorised chain and sprocket, and her left arm was pulled into the machine. The worker was unable to reach the emergency stop control and immediately yelled out for help.

Another worker - the injured worker's mother - ran to her aid from 40m away and shut off the machine. The worker's arm was trapped in the pressure washer until paramedics arrived.

Deputy president Lieschke who handed down the sentence said "this was a fundamental safety failure that had real consequences".

"A serious injury was readily

foreseeable and increasingly likely over time," Mr Lieschke said.

"I add that if no guarding or emergency stop control is fitted to plant, compliance with an employer's primary safety duty would be very unlikely.

"There was an emergency stop control in the form of a pull cord, and it appears to have been attached to a handrail on the upper level, however, it was not accessible."

It is understood the injured worker was initially taken to Waikerie Hospital for treatment, and was later airlifted to Adelaide for surgery. She has undergone three surgeries and a skin graft to repair the degloving injury, and has returned to work at Lochert Bros.

SafeWork SA inspectors visited the fruit packing plant and immediately issued the business with three statutory notices prohibiting the use of the pressure washer. Further compliance action at the workplace led to a further 38 improvement notices being issued, 18 of which related to guarding of machinery.

In June 2023, the company advised SafeWork SA it had spent more than \$12,000 on repairs and safety upgrades to the pressure washer since the incident.

All statutory notices had been complied with in October 2023, with the company advising it had spent more than \$250,000 on safety upgrades at the workplace.

SafeWork SA executive director Glenn Farrell said "it should not take an injury to a worker to trigger an employer's responsibilities and for them to take action".

"Installing physical barriers such as guards is a well-known safety solution to reduce the risk of harm from the hazardous moving parts of machinery and is often very simple to do," Mr Farrell said.

We continue to see far too many incidents resulting in serious injury or death as the result of guarding being non-existent or inadequate.

"This incident could easily have been avoided if the company had ensured the pressure washer was appropriately guarded and the emergency stop control within easy

"Businesses who utilise machinery in the workplace must have effective measures in place to prevent a person from coming into contact with moving parts. Those that don't are putting lives at risk and neglecting worker safety."

Lochert Bros representatives declined to comment on the situation when contacted by The Murray Pioneer.

A new era?

THE Riverland's State MP hopes a re-branding for the owners of the region's largest winery provides new certainty for local grape growers and wine producers.

The Australian Wine Holdco Limited consortium last week announced the establishment of Vinarchy, combining the assets of Accolade Wines with the Australian, New Zealand and Spanish wine businesses formerly owned by Pernod Ricard.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the announcement positioned the Riverland as an integral part of Australia's overall wine production.

"Vinarchy is a development for the global wine industry," Mr Whetstone said.

"With Berri Estates at the centre, the Riverland is right in the spotlight.

"It's great to see investment and ambition, but we need more than just a new name. Growers need certainty—about jobs, contracts, and the long-term future of our wine industry.

With global consumption down and facing many headwinds, it's vital the

as a production hub, but as a partner in the long-term plan. Our industry is at a crossroads and is looking for some certainty in the future."

With more than AU\$1.5 billion in annual net sales revenue, and 11 wineries in Australia – including Berri Estates - Vinarchy is now one of the world's largest specialist wine companies.

However, Mr Whetstone said ensuring production regions such as the Riverland remained sustainable was necessary to deal with wider wine industry difficulties.

"I'll be keeping a close eye to make sure our community gets the fair share it deserves," he said.

The future of wine must deliver fairness and sustainability for the communities that have built this industry from the ground up.'

Vinarchy will be led by executive chairman Ben Clarke, who held a similar role at Accolade Wines since September 2024.

Mr Clarke said Vinarchy would generate "scale and innovation" among global winemaking.

We believe Vinarchy can lead the future of the wine category, (and) we will

Riverland isn't treated just be a dedicated wine company, with scale, capability, reach, resources, talent, and an exceptional portfolio of leading brands," Mr Clarke

"The global wine industry faces serious structural challenges. Global wine consumption has been declining for years, driven by changing consumer preferences and a shift to lower-alcohol

"Vinarchy will be bold and imaginative in meeting these challenges. With our enhanced scale, brand investment program, innovation capability and industry-leading talent, we believe can meet many of the challenges that the industry faces.

"I'm excited to be joined at Vinarchy by more than 1600 colleagues around the globe. We will be an agile, high-performance organisation.

It is understood Accolade employees will transition to the new business from their current roles, with a significant majority of Pernod Ricard employees also joining. The Vinarchy board is in advanced stages of selecting a chief executive officer and expects to formalise an appointment shortly.

One Nation candidate's Renmark Paringa plan

A POSITIVE federal election result has One Nation's Barker candidate setting her sights on becoming a Renmark Paringa councillor.

Despite a crowded field of mainly nominally conservative candidates, Renmark woman Jenny Troeth achieved a swing of 1.44 per cent for her party and had around 8 per cent of first-preference votes - a whisker ahead of the Greens.

Mrs Troeth will now focus on the 2026 local government elections, building on her existing interactions with council via her role as founder of the Renmark Paringa Houseboat Collective.

The group was created to advocate for houseboat owners forced by council to move from their Ral Ral Creek moorings, but has more recently weighed into the merits of the council's Jane Eliza Estate expansion.

Mrs Troeth said she confirmed her intentions to run next year during a meeting with Renmark Paringa Council Mayor Peter Hunt and CEO Tony Siviour last week.

"I told them my ultimate goal was to run for council, but I was asked to run for One Nation and accepted the offer because I believe in One Nation's principles," she said.

"But running for Renmark Paringa was always my plan, because I've had so much involvement with the council and because I've been asked by a couple of people through the collective to run.

"And if I was fortunate enough to be elected, I wouldn't sit there and just pass stuff for the sake of it. I'd question proposals and recommendations and wouldn't just rubber stamp them.

"If ratepayers came to me with a problem, I'd do my best to sort it out and go into bat for them.'

Mrs Troeth said her federal election experience had her better placed to run for council, although if asked by One Nation to run for Chaffey at next year's state election, she would likely accept.

"Across the federal election journey, both on Saturday and across the whole five weeks, I've gained some experience, knowledge and confidence," she said.

"I've also met some wonderful people, and I know in my heart I gave it my best. So, although I didn't win the seat, how could I say I lost from all that?"

Like many other candidates nationwide, Mrs Troeth covered hundreds of kilometres on Saturday, criss-crossing the Riverland to check on her volunteers at various booths.

"I just wanted to thank them, and make sure they were okay," she said.

"I had some wonderful volunteers and support from the Riverland community, and without that support I wouldn't have achieved the results I did."

Mrs Troeth said she took encouragement from the "amazing efforts" of One Nation SA's upper house MP Sarah Game, who was



An election debrief

IT would be interesting to gain an insight into the mind of Peter Dutton at the moment of casting his vote last Saturday. Was he optimistic? Or wary of the eventual bloodbath the 2025 Federal Election turned into.

Closer to home for most Pioneer readers, the seat of Barker proved to be one small haven of comfort among the wider devastation across the country, with incumbent Liberal MP Tony Pasin retaining the seat after receiving 49 per cent of the first preferential vote, at the time of writing this editorial.

Mr Pasin's total of just over 63 per cent after preferences falls closely within predicted ranges, however a 3.1 per cent swing toward Labor shows that no blue seat was completely safe from recourse after the latest campaign.

The flaws of Mr Dutton's mentioned campaign have been quickly dissected and examined by many media observers, with a failure to effectively connect with either the Liberal Party's centre-leaning, or more far-right voter bases, potentially driving valuable votes away to alternative options like One Nation, or independent candidates.

First-time Labor contender James Rothe would have to be pleased with the outcomes of his efforts, as would Renmark-based candidate Jenny Troeth, who – again at the time of writing – has received narrowly more votes for One Nation, than Greens candidate Uncle Moogy Sumner.

Perhaps Barker's most outspoken candidate when it came to social media, the final vote tally for Ms Troeth will likely surprise some who have been following the debate that inevitably follows a post of hers on Riverland forum.

However, the question needs to be asked if this overall is a beneficial result for the Barker area?

The section of the public that gravitated so quickly to the One Nation candidate, amid seemingly increasing calls throughout the community that some disruption to the status quo was needed, would likely disagree.

Will we now see another three years similar to what we just experienced, where economic challenges in the Riverland wine industry were arguably overlooked, while Whyalla's steel industry was provided almost-immediate support?

Are we now likely, when the next Federal Election comes around, to see another first-time challenger put forward by the Labor party, who see little path to success through the electorate? These possibilities somewhat fail to inspire

Is it also the desirable outcome when looking through the lens of the potential for the Truro bypass? The Liberal proposal of an 80/20 funding split with the State Government appeared a lot more feasible – considering current economic climates – than the 50/50 split now required.

Our local MP will certainly have an uphill battle over the next three years to ensure the voice of Barker is heard on the same level as those seats that favoured the red side last weekend.

THE YEARS GO BY



Ruins at Elizabeth (Lizzie) Well, the former well-keeper's stone cottage, 1992. The ruin is roughly in the centre of the Northern Mallee, about 20km west of Hampton Well. Elizabeth Well and three other Mallee wells: Harry's, Knight's, and perhaps Cocking's, were dug by Harry Knight, sometime around the mid-1880s. Elizabeth was Harry's wife. Typical of others in the Mallee, Elizabeth Well was likely timber-lined for the upper-third of its depth with native pine or mallee timber to prevent the sandy walls collapsing. The well was 189ft deep (1ft equalling 0.3m) and 6ft-by-4ft wide. At the bottom, a drive (horizontal tunnel) 10ft-long by 10ft-wide, and 6ft-high, was dug to harness more underground (aquifer) water. Often located above these wells was a steam-engine with a vertical boiler (see one in the Loxton Historical Village). This was used to pump well water to a stone tank for both landowners and the stock they were droving to and from their leases and markets. The drovers used horse, bullock and/or sometimes camel teams to pull heavy wagons along the track. At Eastern Well, about 11km west, a variety of other 'town' buildings, such as two boarding houses, a church, school, store and cricket pitch, were constructed in expectation of the railway coming through. It never did. Like the well-keeper's cottage now, the hopes of the 'town developers' were then in ruins. PHOTO: Dennis Snodgrass

Food for a growing nation

HOW are we going to provide a surging population with clean, green Australian-grown food, if we continue with government policy that restricts our farmers growing food?

That is the question being asked by the Speak Up Campaign, amid increasing concern that city-based politicians lack an understanding of food security and how we need to promote food production, not impede it.

We have a population that is forecast to reach 40 million in just 20 years at current growth rates.

There is plenty of discussion around how we are going to house so many people, and other obvious infrastructure requirements.

But how are we going to securely feed them? How will we provide affordable, locally grown food if we keep strangling farmers with poor water policy?

Current water policy is the most-striking example of a failure by government to understand that the future needs of the nation rely on intelligent decisions today.

There is a huge tranche of evidence to show buybacks are the worst form of water recovery. They reduce water for food production, increase environmental water in dams which leads to unnecessary flood risk, are devastating for the socioeconomic health of regional communities, and will lead to excessive volumes of environmental water in storage, which cannot effectively be used in a timely manner for food production if required during droughts.

Additionally, instead of protecting our rivers we are wrecking them with over-watering. From a 'what's best for our nation?' perspective, water buybacks don't rate highly.

So why does Minister for Water Tanya Plibersek promote them above all other more sensible options?

It's because they have a powerful and influential appeal to her inner-city constituents, most of whom never venture west of the Blue Mountains. These voters are falsely told the buybacks are 'saving' the Murray-Darling Basin and believe the spin.

The stark reality is that every megalitre of water buyback is hurting a regional community, while at the same time forcing food price inflation on all Australians and reducing our nation's food security, especially during periods of sustained droughts.





RECOGNISING advocacy to make the arts more accessible to young people, especially those living with a disability, local artist, and Riverland Youth Theatre (RYT) artistic director, Sam Wannan has been nominated as a finalist in the 7NEWS Young Achiever Awards for South Australia.

Mr Wannan received a nomination for the Carclew Creative Achievement Award earlier this month, for his work with neurodivergent artists and organisations in regional areas, such as ActNow Theatre, Tutti Arts, and Carclew, naming him a young achiever who has used his creativity to make an impact in the arts field.

"It's very exciting and humbling," Mr Wannan said.

"I am just grateful and thankful I am able to work in the regional youth arts (scene).

"I have been involved in the space since 2017, and it's working with the young people that keeps me here — I was given the same encouragement, and environment, when I was young, so I just have always wanted to provide that for others.'

With illustration and filmmaking, Mr Wannan has taken the lead in numerous artistic projects over the past few years, while also using his lived experience of disability to empower others and shape a more inclusive art community, including:

□ 2022 Carclew Fellowship: Collaborating with smin Gurreeboo, Mr to support an AC Arts production, while also touring regional South Australia to create and film an upcoming documentary on Tourette syndrome.

☐ ActNow Theatre digital innovator: Exploring new ways to create interactive digital forum theatre, including an interactive film project.

☐ Tutti Arts: Leading the Tutti Pom Pom project to explore best practices for working with young neurodivergent and learning-disabled artists, leading to the development of resources to support the wider youth arts industry.

- ☐ Illuminart Constellations Project: Illustrating a visual story that was projected onto the Karoonda silo exploring the impact of climate change.
- ☐ D'Faces of Youth Arts Inc board member.
- Carclews Emerging Creative Producers program mentor.

Continuing his advocacy work with regional arts in the Riverland over the last year as artistic director of RYT, Mr Wannan said he had "loved being part of an organisation that provides such direct care to young people, and their mental health and wellbeing"

"Of course, the big projects and shows are super rewarding, however, the little day-to-day things, like being able to provide a space for local youth to be creative, is what it's really about," he said.

"We have a really relaxed and open environment (here Wannan animated art at RYT), and there is no (ryt.org.au).

pressure to produce (artistic) outcomes — it's just great to see people embrace being creative, and seeing what that means for them.

"With how under resourced (a lot of services and programs are) for the youth in regional areas, it's important to have a space like this and see what an arts organisation can do for a community.

"I can't wait to continue all the fantastic work that was set up by (RYT associate artist) Fleur (Kilpatrick)."

RYT youth members Axel Lochert and Zelda Edwards said Mr Wannan had been key in developing the local arts organisation "to something more just a theatre company"

"There is a wider focus on art which is great, because it allows us to expand on what we are able to do," Axel said.

"There was no real access to community or the arts in the Riverland before RYT.

"RYT also works really hard to make it accessible and accepting to young people in the Riverland.

"I love having RYT — it's great to have a space to be creative, without expectations, and where you can just be you."

Advocacy for disability in the Riverland remains

ADVOCACY for Disability Access and Inclusion (ADAI) is the Riverland's newest advocacy service, with the organisation now open to provide those with a disability, and their families and carers, with independent, confidential, and free advocacy.

With the closure of Disability Rights Advocacy Service (DRAS) in April, ADAI has agreed to the transition of grant activity under the National Disability Advocacy Program, NDIS Appeals program, and Information, Linkages, and Capacity Building Program, with the organisation now the region's sole advocacy service.

Located in Berri, ADAI local advocate for people with disability Mark Biram said "there was huge breadth of issues (the organisation) can provide local clients service in".

"The most common issues we see are those to do with the NDIS, or Centrelink payments," Mr Biram said.

"However, issues can also range in a dispute with a service provider — disability, or even a those that provide utilities.

"ADAI also provide support for those having issues with the education department, homelessness, or legal issues."

Mr Biram said it was "incredibly impor-

tant" to provide an advocacy service to those living with a disability, or their families and carers, as services such as ADAI "provide autonomy over their lives".

"It allows clients to have input into the decisions that affect them, which hasn't always been historically the case," he said.

"Advocacy is also an opportunity for improvement in the community — whether that be physical access, or barriers to services that many don't realise are there for those living with a disability.

"A lot of people don't know how to gain eligibility for things they are entitled to, so that's where we come in — we are often the bridge for those structural and situational barriers."

While ADAI is open for anyone with an issue definitely needing advocacy, Mr Biram said the service can "also provide information to those who don't know who to call, or where to go".

"If I can't help them, I will certainly be able to provide the information on who can,"



Transparency with new code tracking system

LIVE tracking of proposed changes to planning codes across South Australia including from Riverland-based projects - is now available online.

The State Government last month launched the Code Amendment Tracking System (CATS), aimed at improving transparency and efficiency in the planning sys-

Minister for Housing and Urban Development Nick Champion said the system provides industry and the community with a clear overview of all code amendments currently in the system, and "makes submitting and tracking proposed amendments easier, faster, and more transparent".

'South Australia's nation-leading planning system just got even better with the Code Amendment Tracking System now live," Mr Champion said.

This is something the industry has been calling for and we promised to deliver a tool which would provide accurate, near real-time information on rezoning applications.

"We're making the process of rezoning land even more efficient and importantly, more transparent."

CATS has two key parts:

- ☐ A publicly available register and dashboard which tracks all proposed changes to the State's Planning Code (known as code amendments) including proposals to rezone land for more housing options.
- ☐ A new central location where those submitting code amendments can more easily submit and track their proposed amend-

Life Membership honours at Loxton Show

TWO prominent community members were recognised for their decades of contribution to the Loxton Show and to their community through an important

Ian Cass and Adrian Nickolai received life membership from the LoxtonAgricultural and Horticultural Society, organisers of the Loxton Show, for their continuous involvement in the most important Riverland event.

After three years as president of the Loxton Show, Mr Cass decided to take a step back for what he calls 'a much-needed break'.

"My first involvement in the Loxton Show was as a young child attending the Show with my parents in the late 1960s and 1970s," Mr Cass said.

"I became involved at the Loxton Show after Robert Reimann (Sheep Section convenor) asked me if I could help out as a steward for the sheep section in the early 1980s. I accepted and never missed a show since.

"After a few years, in about 1989, Robert wanted to give away the job and I said yes to becoming the Sheep Section convenor, although I did need a break while being the president of the show in the last three years, as it is a full-time job.

"My earliest memories are of the old Show Hall before the Loxton Show and Recreation Centre was built, and we used to attend as a family each year. I remember many different events the show held, from the opening by Sir John Kerr (Governor General) who had dismissed Gough Whitlam, to Tug of War, sheep shearing competitions, Miss Loxton Show winners, the Grand Parade around the oval,

school exhibitions and all the many exhibits in the Show Hall and sideshow alley.

"In 1989, I became part of the Loxton Show Management Committee and got involved in big working bees," Mr Cass said.

'In 1992, after my first daughter was born, I resigned from the show committee, but continued on with the Sheep Section.

"I really enjoyed the friendships and fun we had over the years, working together to create and fix things for the show, yet the Loxton Show continues on and keeps changing as new people become involved with new

Mr Cass said he came back as part of the show management committee in 2018, and in 2019 he became junior vice-president.

"In 2020, the Show was cancelled due to the pandemic, being a hard decision, yet we had no choice at that moment," Mr Cass said.

"My wife Glenda joined the committee in 2019, and together we were determined to not miss the 2021 show. Glenda worked on a covid management plan and successfully realised the show that year.

"After a year off, and very few events happening, the Loxton Show had a massive crowd of younger families, and while they kept coming and leaving, we were able to keep our patrons to just below the 3000 limit.

In 2022, Mr Cass was elected president of the Loxton Show, being a great honour for him, with aims to improve the event.

'Much of our property was showing its age, so we started an improvement in 2018 with the 100th Show, as I wanted to rebuild and grow with the new families coming," Mr Cass said.

'In 2023, we held Howard

Hendrick's 100th birthday, which was a very special event for me. We had senior dignitaries from the RAAF with many local invitees and a fly over by historic planes.

"Being awarded life membership is a very special privilege and I am very proud to be a life member of the Loxton Agricultural and Horticultural Society Show, especially being able to continue on the tradition of running the show. This will be our 105th show in 2025.

"2025 was very special for me, with the Loxton Citizen of the Year award, and now this recognition.

"I plan to be involved in the Show for as long as I feel I can contribute, and while I say Loxton Show, the reality is that it's the Riverland Show.

"I see a wonderful future for the Loxton Show, as long as we can get the volunteers to help plan and run the event. We want to be able to provide an event which large numbers of people wish to attend."

Mr Nickolai started volunteering at the Loxton Show in 2013, after attending with his family for most of his childhood.

Mr Nickolai currently collaborates with the setting and dismantling of most of the exhibitions for the show.

"My earliest memories are of going to the Loxton Show after making pocket money cutting weeds for my father," Mr Nickolai said.

"Going to the show was a family affair, with our family driving over for the day from Victoria, we got a day off school, and we really looked forward to it every year.

"I have seen most of the shows in the last 60 years, and witnessed the evolution from a one-day show, to then becoming the two-day show that we currently know.

"Receiving the news that I had been nominated as a life member came as a complete surprise to me, as I thought I had not been involved in the Show for long enough.

"I enjoy my time volunteering at the Show. I've done a lot of hours and I have I have enjoyed every one of them."

Mr Nickolai said it was a great feeling to be recognised for his contributions to the Loxton

"I plan to continue with the work I have been doing to now, as I really enjoy helping in my community," Mr Nickolai said.

"I find it very rewarding to become involved in volunteering at the Loxton Show, and I can highly recommend it. I think the Loxton Show has a great future, but finding more younger volunteers will be a great challenge.

"My involvement started in 2013, when my wife Kaylene became the secretary of the show. I took four weeks off from work and helped out with fixing, repairing, painting and building any new equipment for the show with Paul Kaesler.

"Paul was the pavilion coordinator, and we would plan out what was needed each year and get it done before the show. The week of the show we were setting up, marking out the Loxton Show and Recreation Centre, then moving all the tables and screens and getting the show

"Saturday night and Sunday show day morning involved helping set up entries, fixing up problems and helping the public. Monday late afternoon, we started dismantling the whole show and getting it all back to storage and by Tuesday lunch, we were finished."

Riverlander to tackle Australia's most challenging off-road race

A LOCAL professional motorcycle rider is gearing up to tackle one of the toughest challenges of his career—a gruelling two-day desert race through some of the harshest terrains in Australia.

The Tatts Finke Desert Race is an off-road, multi-terrain race for bikes, cars and buggies through desert country, from Alice Springs to the small Aputula (Finke) community.

The race is held each year on the King's Birthday long weekend in June. 'Finke' as it is commonly known, is one of the biggest annual sporting events in the Northern Territory and has

the most difficult off-road courses, in one of the most remote places in the world.

Waikerie local Jack Colbert has been racing motorbikes all his life, and this years Finke Desert Race is set to test his physical limits.

"Finke has a mind of its own, conditions or the terrain change so often that they can be completely different to what you last experienced," Mr Colbert said.

"The logistics are insane. You need four set-up crews, one at the start, a crew about 80km down the track for your first fuel stop, a crew around 160km for your second fuel stop, and

the reputation of being one of a crew at Finke ready to set up camp and work on the bike for

"The race is constantly evolving, as the machines we are racing on, with modern technology advancing, they are so much better today.'

Mr Colbert says preparation for the race is a key element for success, and keeping fit, both physically and mentally, is the most important challenge.

"The hardest part is when you are on your own," Mr Colbert

"You find your gap between the bike in front and behind, and it's very easy to lose focus.

"You just focus on the next

checkpoint, and once I arrive, you've got to prepare and focus on the next one.'

Mr Colbert will participate on a 2024 Husqvarna FX450 and relies on the importance of team-

"Teamwork is paramount, and if you pit crew isn't ready for you at your fuel stop, crucial time can be lost and seconds do count," Mr Colbert said.

"I came 3rd in the 450-class last year (2024) by one second, after nearly four-and-a-half hours racing, and I got to think about all the hard work we put into this race, so I just want to finish and celebrate with my team."



Through the village's interactive exhibits, students gain an insight into how businesses operated before electricity, or get to see how butter is made.



Proud on the line

WITH two rounds of the Riverland Football League's 2025 season now in the books, all roads lead to Bookpurnong Road this weekend for a massive Proud Cup battle.

Loxton North welcomes Loxton to Panther Park, in a match that sees both sides desperate for victory.

Loxton currently holds the trophy at Tigerland, after a stirring final quarter last May gave the Tigers a 38-point win.

Reflecting on the 2024 contest, it was Loxton that burst out of the blocks with a four-goal-to-nil opening quarter, leaving North to play catch up throughout the afternoon.

Although the Panthers did claw their way back throughout the day, and at one stage took the lead, the Tigers quickly settled.

Loxton slammed on six goals unanswered, with a 39-0 final quarter aiding the home side to victory.

Harley Campbell was awarded the Proud Cup medal in a strong showing, while both Luke Harder and Bailey Boughen made their presences felt across the day.

Looking forward to this year's battle, both sides will enter with some form of confidence, despite shaky starts to the campaign.

For the visiting Tigers, the challenge will be to make a statement. and although they enjoyed a 10-point win over Berri last week, the wounds of a round one loss to Waikerie are yet to be fully healed.

Round one saw Loxton start poorly against the Magpies at the nest, and although a late comeback was forged, the Tigers ultimately ran out of time.

Last weekend, however, it was Loxton who got away to a strong start, holding a 21-point half time advantage, largely thanks to a fourgoal-to-one opening term.

Yet, there were shaky signs for the Tigers late on, failing to kick a goal in the final quarter, and allowing Berri several opportunities to snatch it.

There is little doubting that Loxton is still adjusting to life under new playing coach Nathan Brown, who himself is playing strong football, but this would be a definitive way to make a statement.

Loxton's potent forward line has been one of its greatest strengths so far in 2025, largely due to Harder's ability to spend more time inside attacking 50.

Harder, alongside Campbell, Talyn Eagle, Jesse Will, Brandan Tregeagle, have all proved genuine targets.

Through the midfield, Brayden De Prinse has picked up where he left 2024 with some strong performances in the ruck, working well in tandem with young tall Carter Wright.

Kaiden Evans, and Bailey Boughen, have been clear beneficiaries of the Loxton midfield prowess, with a lot of versatility involved in the Tigers' side.

On the flip side, Loxton North will enter this weekend's clash winless, but an improved performance in round two saw it fall by the narrowest of margins in Waikerie.

North started the season with a 79-point thumping from reign-

ing premier Renmark, however, there were still signs of positivity to be taken out of the match.

The Panthers started the game on fire, giving supporters of second-year coach Dave Higgins' side some positive glimpses into the future.

Last weekend, Loxton North came out firing, putting through the first three goals of the match, but a poor second term caused it to play catch-up for the remainder of the contest.

A late goal from new signing James Neale, with a little more than five minutes remaining, cut the margin to one point, but North were unable to snatch victory.

Veteran Panther Joel Worsfold has started season 2025 in strong fashion, named in his side's best players in both matches across the opening fortnight.

Masud Akaso picked up where he left off 2024 with another dominant game in the midfield, while Matt Hampel continues to give his major ball winners first use.

Down back, captain Codi Voumard remains as one of the toughest defenders in the competition, flying into contests at will, while Judd Tschirpig put together one of his best senior games last weekend.

With North posing a strong backline, and the Tigers showing various ways of hitting the scoreboard, one feels that is where this one is won and lost.

The Panthers will want to get the Proud Cup back to Loxton North, and more importantly pick up their first win of the 2025 campaign. Loxton, meanwhile, have to convince a few more people that it is a genuine contender in 2025, and there is no better way to do that than with a strong performance in the Cup match away from home.

Federal Election failure for the Murray River?

A NATIONAL group focused on protecting Murray River resources says Australian voters - including in the Riverland – were "left in the dark" regarding future water policy.

Murray - Darling Conservation Alliance national director Craig Wilkins said the 2025 Federal Election campaign failed to provide clarity on what would be done to ensure the Murray River's future health.

"Australians are fed up with bearing witness to massive fish kills, devastating floods and now a crippling drought in large parts strong commitments from governments. Voters need much greater clarity on how Australia's biggest river system will be managed," Mr Wilkins said.

"With the Murray-Darling Basin Plan up for review next year, the fate of our river and everything that depends on it is at stake, but we've mostly heard radio silence so far.

"When it comes to finishing the current Basin Plan, there is a clear point of difference. Labor worked with the Greens to pass legislation this term to recommence buying back water for the environment. The Coalition unfortunately have vowed to stop this if they win office.

'We recognise that Labor and the Greens have committed to completing the current Basin Plan, but this vital first step is not enough to secure the long-term future of the River Murray."

Mr Wilkins said the upcoming Basin Plan review meant co-operation between participating states was vital to reach positive outcomes.

"We need a new plan for the Murray-Darling that restores at least 30 per cent of rivers and wetlands by 2030, in line with international agreements, yet no party has stepped up and committed to this," he said.

"Voters are left guessing what will happen to South Australia's lifeblood after the 2026 Basin Plan review.

"We need more than silence or single line promises. We need a government that will fight for the river that keeps our wildlife, communities and industries alive."

"High blood pressure is the single-biggest modifiable risk factor for stroke and a key risk factor for heart disease, kidney disease, heart failure, atrial fibrillation and dementia.

"However, the good news is that it can be managed well through lifestyle changes or medication if detected.

"The only way to do this is through regular blood pressure checks, which is why we are call-

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

ON Wednesday 23 April, two Renmark locals, Xenofontis 'Andy' Georgantas and his niece, drove to Adelaide and flew to Sydney. Waiting for them in Sydney was Andy's oldest son, Tim Badger.

This is where it gets interesting, as despite Tim driving between Sydney and Adelaide countless times over the years, the pair only found out about each other in November 2024, and met for the first time a couple of weeks later.

Unbeknownst to Andy, Tim was born in August 1968, to a local Renmark girl. She never told Andy about Tim and when he was born, he was immediately taken away from his mother.

Tim remained within the confines of the Renmark hospital for three months, being looked after by the nurses at the nursing station. By Christmas of that year he was moved to Adelaide and became a ward of the state.

Approximately 18 months later Tim was adopted by a loving couple. His name was changed, as was his birth certificate, and thus began a wonderful childhood and upbringing. Tim was schooled at Hillcrest Primary School, and Strathmont High School, before joining the Australian Defence Force (Royal Australian Navy -RAN) in 1989.

Tim quickly rose through the ranks and before leaving, wore the very high rank of command warrant officer (CWO). This means there were only five people, noncommissioned, higher than him in the entire RAN.

Move on 50 years and Tim came over from Sydney to Adelaide for a family event. While at the party he was informed by a family member that he was adopted.

He was unable to believe the comment, so he approached his mother, where he posed the question. Tim's mum admitted that he had indeed been adopted, and she kept the secret as a dying wish to her husband. You can only imagine the emotions going through his mind at the time.

After returning to Sydney, Tim made contact with the South Australian Adoption Agency, filled in the appropriate paperwork, and eventually received his personal file. Contained within the file were the names of his birth mother, her address, and the names of his brother and sister.

He quickly made contact and enjoys a relationship with them all to this day.

On his mother's side, he found out he had German, Prussian, Russian and Scandinavian heritage.

He also found out his five greatgrandparents came to Adelaide in 1838 on a ship named Zebra. Passengers from this ship founded the German historical town Hahndorf, in the Adelaide Hills, in 1839. A fact he is very proud of.

What was missing was his father's side of the family. For six years he tried hard to find some kind of evidence as to who that person may be. The website MyHeritage failed to work, only matching family on his birth mother's side

In September 2024, he decided to do a DNA test with the website Ancestry.

Upon looking at the results, he found a new sister, and three first-cousins, who DNA matched. This time on his father's side.

He made contact via email immediately and by 7.30am the next day, one of his first-cousins had made contact. For hours they talked and eventually put the puzzle together. The rest is history.

Tim has filled the emptiness and has embraced the fact he is fristgeneration Greek on his father's side.

Xenofontis (Andy), comes from Lesvos in Greece. Even stranger is that Andy's father, Tim's grandfather, arrived in Australia on the Greek ship named Patris, in 1962. Andy and the rest of the family arrived in 1963.

Patris is the same ship Tim's wife's family arrived on after leaving Mauritius a few years later, in 1967. What a small world it is.

Rolling on four months later, Andy and one of his first-cousins decided to visit Tim, in Sydney.

To their surprise, Tim, who is a veteran and Penrith RSL Pipes and Drums president, invited them to the Sydney Opera House to see him perform at the Anzac Eve Harbour Sunset Tribute Service, on Thursday 24 April.

The Renmark pair got to spend all day at the Opera House, before rubbing shoulders in the evening with General Peter Cosgrove, NSW Premier Chris Minns, Gina Reinhart, previous Prime Ministers John Howard, Tony Abbott and Scott Morrison, and RSL NSW president Mick Bainbridge, to name a few.

This was an incredible event for all concerned. It was a special commemoration which provided deep, inspired moments to recognise our fallen, returned and current serving members. Andy attended further Anzac events on 25 April with Tim, including the Dawn Service at Penrith, and the Emu Plains Anzac Service later that morning. Andy returned to Renmark on Sunday 27 April.

Territories of Christmas and

Cocos (Keeling) Islands.
His posting history is as follows:



IF you're into thrillers that keep you on the edge of your seat, Close Your Eyes and Count to 10 by Lisa Unger is must-read. The story kicks off with Adele Crane, a mom trying to rebuild her life after her husband vanishes with a ton of embezzled cash. She ends up joining this wild reality show called Extreme Hide and Seek, where the last person found wins a million dollars. Sounds simple, right? Well, not quite.

The game takes place on this creepy, abandoned resort, on Falcão Island, which adds a whole new level of suspense. As the contestants hide, things start to go seriously wrong. The island itself feels like a character, with its eerie atmosphere and hidden dangers. Plus, there's a tropical storm that just ramps up the tension.

What makes this book so gripping is how it blends the real and virtual worlds. The reality show setting is perfect for exploring how far people will go for fame and money. And just when you think you have it all figured out, Unger throws in twists that keep you guessing.

The plot is packed with unexpected turns and a sense of impending doom that keeps you hooked. Unger masterfully builds

suspense, making you feel like you're right there on the island, experiencing fear and uncertainty alongside the characters. The pacing is spot-on, with just the right balance of action and quieter moments that allow you to catch your breath before the next big reveal.

One of the standout aspects of the story is how it delves into the darker side of human nature. The contestants' desperation to win the prize money leads them to make some morally questionable decisions, and it's fascinating to see how their true colors emerge under pressure. The island's isolation and the constant threat of danger create a claustrophobic atmosphere that heightens the tension and keeps you turning the pages.

Overall, Close Your Eyes and Count to 10 is a fast-paced, thrilling ride that dives into the lengths people will go to survive. It's a thought-provoking exploration of greed, fear, and the human instinct for self-preservation. If you love a good page-turner with plenty of twists and a chilling setting, this one's for you.

Wine industry opportunities highlighted to Waikerie students

ON 24 March, a group of year 11 Agriculture students from Waikerie High School had the exciting opportunity to visit Freestone Estate, at Waikerie.

This excursion offered a valuable insight into the viticulture and agriculture industries, including the many potential career pathways available.

The tour was led by Daryl Kreusler, who guided the students through the entire winemaking process.

He explained where the grapes are first tipped and tested after being picked, measuring key indicators like pH and baume levels.

After testing, the grapes move through the crushing and destemming stages, where they are again checked for pH, baume, and temperature.

The juice is then extracted using the booker bag press, which has the capacity to process around 50 tonnes of grapes. Fermentation follows in large holding tanks.

Some of these tanks are equipped with outer brine jackets, which help regulate the temperature by pumping in a -5C solution.

Daryl also explained how yeast is added – between 200L to 500L per tank - to kick-start fermentation, with the tanks themselves able to hold up to 20,000L.

Laboratory testing is a crucial part of the winemaking process, ensuring that all levels meet specific standards depending on the type of wine being produced.

Daryl also discussed the importance of stabilising and flavouring techniques, such as adding oak fines to the bottom of tanks to give the wine a woody character.

Different types of oak are used

depending on the desired flavour.

Throughout the tour, Daryl highlighted several potential career paths within the wine industry.

These included roles in the juice or wine labs, cellar hand positions, operating the crusher, level testing, fermentation monitoring, and working with the booker bag press.

There are also more hands-on roles, such as connecting hoses between tanks for wine transfer.

Gaining experience in a winery like Freestone Estate can open doors to further opportunities, not just locally, but also interstate and even overseas.

Freestone Estate provided a fantastic learning experience, offering students the chance to explore the machinery and processes involved in viticulture.

Daryl Kreusler gave an informative and engaging overview of how each part of the winery contributes to the broader wine industry.

The excursion was both educational and inspiring, giving students much to think about in terms of future career possibilities.

A big thank you to Daryl and the team at Freestone Estate for their hospitality and for making the day so memorable.



PUBLIC CONSULTATION Long Term Lease Agreement - Loxton District Children's Centre

Pursuant to s202(2) of the Local Government Act 1999.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie is seeking community feedback on a proposed 21-year ground lease and 21-year facilities lease with the Loxton District Children's Centre (LDCC) for the former NRM building and a portion of the land located at the corner of Coral Street and Kokoda Terrace, Loxton.

The Council has been working in partnership with LDCC to support the design and future construction of the new Childcare Centre. Following Council's adoption of a Community Land Management Plan to allow the site to be utilised for business purposes in April 2025, finalising a long-term lease agreement represents the final step in the LDCC's endeavours to establish a purpose-built facility to better serve the local community.

The proposal includes two separate leases—one for the building (facilities lease) and one for the land (ground lease), structured to align start and end dates over a 21-year term, with an option to renew for a further 21 years.

Section 202(2) of the Local Government Act requires Council to undertake public consultation before granting a lease or licence over community land. In addition, the business use of the lease and the proposed length of tenure require formal community engagement.

The proposed lease agreements will enable the Centre to expand its childcare services, and provide Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) for local families.



There is a lucky gate prize, so make sure to grab a ticket.



Pet name passwords a purr-fect target for crime

RIVERLANDERS have been urged to avoid using easy-to-remember names, such as those of their pets, as important passwords.


Telecommunications provider Vodafone recently warned Australians to rethink their passwords, as new research finds almost one-fifth of survey respondents use their pet names, making them targets for online fraudsters.

A Vodafone spokesperson said "our research shows a significant proportion of Aussies are using their pets' names as easy and convenient passwords for their accounts".

"Unfortunately, this also makes these passwords convenient for nackers to crack, the spokesperson said.

"Common and predictable passwords such as pet names and birthdays are easily cracked by cybercriminals. It is critical for Australians to create strong, unique passwords as well as enable technologies like two-factor authentication to protect themselves against online thieves."

In March this year, Australian small business owner Michael Williams suffered the financial and reputational consequenc-



es of having a predictable password and a lack of twofactor authentication, when the website for his cleaning business was hacked.

After getting through the weak password his daughter had set up, the hackers created 20,000 spam website pages, which cost Michael \$1500 and a week of time to resolve. To protect his website, Michael now has an encrypted password and two-factor authentication in place.

Additional password tips from Vodafone include:

☐ Update your password regularly: Avoid hackers successfully guessing your password by updating your password every

☐ Enable two-factor authentication: Even if a hacker correctly guesses your password, a two-step login process will prevent them gaining access to

your account. ☐ Take note of security breaches: Change your password immediately if you're alerted of a security breach by any service that you have a log in with.

☐ Use a Password Manager: Managing multiple complex passwords can be challenging. Using a password manager can help you securely store and generate complex pass-




