MURRAY Mallee Police at Barmera have investigated a spate of petrol drive offs from Riverland service stations, resulting in the arrest of one woman.

On Saturday 18 November, a 48-year-old woman, from Renmark, was arrested and charged with 15 counts of theft.

She has been bailed to attend the Berri Magistrates Court on 22 January 2024.

**Local drivers caught breaking road rules**

RIVERLAND police have had a busy couple of weeks on local roads with one local motorist reported for driving while more than double the legal alcohol limit.

On Friday 10 November, police reported a 26-year-old woman after she was stopped while driving a motor vehicle on Twentyseventh Street, Renmark South.

She underwent a breath test and returned a positive result of 0.119.

The driver was issued a six-month immediate loss of licence notice and will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Saturday 11 November, Riverland police stopped a motor vehicle on Renmark Avenue, at Renmark.

Checks revealed that the driver, a 28-year-old woman, from Berri, was disqualified from driving and was reported for driving while disqualified.

Her car was impounded for 28 days and the driver will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

Police then reported a 48-year-old woman, from Waikerie, on the same day for driving while disqualified.

It is alleged that she was stopped on the Sturt Highway, at Blanchetown, for the purpose of a random breath test, with checks revealing that she was currently disqualified from driving.

Her car was impounded for 28 days and she will be summonsed to appear in the Berri Magistrates Court a later date.

Flood work continues on major local road

ROADWORKS on a major road connecting two Riverland towns are expected to continue into December.


The Department of Infrastructure and Transport has been undertaking flood recovery works on Bookpurnong Road, between Gurra Road and Kemp Road.

The project involves fixing up the sides of the road and repairing the road surface, which was damaged in the River Murray flood.

A DIT statement estimates the works will be completed in early December.

“Traffic will be intermittently reduced to a single lane with temporary traffic signals in place to control the direction of traffic,” the statement read.

“Outside of working hours, the road will re-open to traffic in each direction with some

speed restrictions in place.”

A section of Bookpurnong Road was closed between December 2022 and February 2023, due to high water levels.

Funding to support wine blueprint

FOCUSING on "sustainable production levels" and adapting with market trends will be key to the Riverland wine industry's recovery from current challenges, according to a governing body's long-term plan.

The State Government yesterday announced a \$200,000 commitment – to be delivered over two years – towards support of the Riverland Wine Industry Blueprint, which was launched yesterday by Riverland Wine at the Riverland Wine Centre.

The 10-year blueprint defines a pathway to recovery following the challenges of recent years, including an oversupply of commercial red wine grapes, the loss of the China market, the Covid-19 pandemic, escalating input costs and extreme inflationary pressure on global shipping rates, and changing consumer preferences challenging the industry's sustainability.

The blueprint was developed with the support of Riverland wine, the State Government, Wine Australia and Wine Grape Council of SA.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven launched the blueprint at the Riverland Wine Centre, at Lyrup, along with Riverland Wine independent chair Dr Darren Oemcke and Riverland Wine representatives.

Riverland Wine executive officer Lyndall Rowe said ensuring the industry was profitable for local winemakers and grape growers was a priority.

"This blueprint will assist the Riverland wine industry as it continues to deal with ongoing challenging conditions and navigates its way through changes to improve productivity and ensure sustainability of the sector over the next decade," Ms Rowe said.

"By working together, industry and government have come up with this strategic plan to ensure a return to sustainable and

profitable grape and wine production in the region."

Five priorities outlined in the blueprint are:

- A rapid transition to more sustainable production levels
- Becoming an adaptable wine region responding to trends and filling market gaps
- Developing and promoting a meaningful regional identity
- Developing passionate leaders and a skilled workforce
- Supporting agile wine businesses that are sustainable and profitable

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the State Government funding would support the implementation of these priorities.

"Growers and producers in the Riverland wine region have been through what can only be described as one of the industry's toughest periods," Ms Scriven said.

"This investment will help support the region's grape growers and winemakers to get on the road to recovery.

"We are committed to working in collabora-

tion with the Riverland wine industry to help implement the recommendations identified in the blueprint as priorities, which is why I'm delighted to announce after initially funding the development of this blueprint we are now able to provide further funding for its application."

Ms Scriven said the \$200,000 commitment is "really about making sure Riverland Wine has the resources to progress to the next step".

"Collaboration is one of the key things that has been identified as being essential for the Blueprint to be fully realised," she said.

"The Blueprint is designed to set-up the industry for the next 10 years so we can continue to have a thriving industry, and a better and stronger development of the industry in the Riverland."

"It will provide the resources to continue that engagement with all of the parties involved in the industry here in the Riverland."

Special meeting to be called for the Queen

A LOCAL council is expected to call a special meeting in the coming weeks to decide if a prominent Riverland paddleboat will call Loxton home.

The Murray River Queen, which is currently moored at Renmark, is attempting to relocate to Loxton's riverfront following an ongoing process.



While the District Council of Loxton Waikerie (DCLW) has supported plans to move the vessel, it has requested more information regarding costs for permanent mooring facilities.

The construction of the Murray River Queen mooring facility is currently out for tender and will close at 4pm today.

Loxton Waikerie council CEO David Beaton said he expected to call a special meeting in the coming weeks.

"We'll get the tenders in and we'll have to do evaluations on them," he said.


In April 2021, DCLW elected members agreed in-principle for the Murray River Queen to relocate from Renmark to the Lions Park, Loxton, near the Tree of Knowledge.

At DCLW's September meeting, councillors agreed for Ms Neale to repay council's investment into the mooring facility over 15 years via the annual sub-licence fee, with higher fees in the middle years (two-10 years).

The Murray River Queen currently has a sub-licence agreement with Renmark Paringa Council, allowing it to stay moored at the Renmark riverfront until the end of January.



Water safety programs available this summer

AHEAD of National Water Safety Day, Surf Life Saving SA is encouraging Riverland youngsters to get involved with water safety programs in the area.

With VACSWIM programs kicking off over the summer school holidays at pools across the Riverland, the aim of the program is to not only teach young people how to swim but to also educate them on how to keep themselves safe in and around the water.

"We are delivering VACSWIM programs at seven locations within the Riverland in December and January, and excitingly we have two new locations with Lake Bonney and at the River Murray in Renmark," said Natasha Hudoba, Surf Life Saving SA community programs manager.

"For us it's to provide more children with the opportunity to learn how to be safe around different types of water."

"There are opportunities for the children to participate in potentially a pool for one block and then go to the river for the next block; they are learning similar skills on how to be safe but adapting those skills to be

relevant to the environment they are participating in.

"With summer being super-hot this year we are expecting more people to head down to the river."

"Given the flood last year and people not having the opportunity to use the river, we are really hoping we can educate kids, as well as their parents, to make sure they are using the water safely and hopefully prevent any drownings around the water."

As well as the VACSWIM program, Surf Life Saving SA will now offer the Rippers program, the Riverland's take on the iconic Nippers beach program.

"The Rippers program will occur over the weeks in the first school term next year and will follow on from VACSWIM," said Georgia Brazenall, Surf Life Saving SA member development manager.

"It's a river and lake adaptation of the traditional Nippers program we run at beaches in South Australia.

"Kids aged five to 12 will be able to learn water safety and rescue skills, and they will be able to compete in some surf sports that are adapted to the river environment, like swimming, board paddling and sprinting."

"They will be learning well-rounded skills to eventually become a lifesaver but in the environment they have grown-up in."

The Rippers program will be held at Lake Bonney and Renmark over February and March 2024.

Ms Brazenall said Surf Life SA saw a gap in open water safety training in the Riverland for children, which resulted in the creation of the Rippers program.

"At the beaches, children have the opportunity to see lifesavers wearing the red and yellow, and see the flags up and know they are going to be looked after," she said.

"We don't have those services as far extended across the state as we would like and that all starts with the Nipper program and educating children on how to be safe and eventually grow into the lifesavers that will watch the waterways and look after the community into the future."

Ms Brazenall and Ms Hudoba also visited schools in the Riverland last week, holding theory sessions with students on how to be safe around water in the lead up to summer.

Truro bypass call to impact local drivers

THE future safety of Riverlanders who travel the Sturt Highway to Adelaide will be compromised by a decision to scrap the planned Truro bypass, a local transport operation says.

Federal funding was last week officially withdrawn from a nationwide list of infrastructure projects, including the bypass, which was intended to deliver safety benefits by diverting heavy-vehicle traffic around Truro.

While the Albanese Government announcement has drawn criticism from the opposition at both state and federal levels, a local transport operation says the decision will have hyper-local impacts.

"This is a very disappointing outcome," said Justin Pickering, director and Renmark manager of Pickering Transport.

"The missed opportunity to create a dual-lane bypass, to keep pedestrians and motorists safe, can only be disastrous."

"There is a serious safety issue as Truro has outlived the volume of traffic that goes through there every day."

The withdrawal of funding equates to a failure to tackle an acknowledged road accident hot-spot, according to Riverland-based Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, who pointed to a strong response to a petition calling for the bypass.

Mr Whetstone also said the SA Labor Government had played a role in the Truro project's demise by failing to advocate for the project.

"This government is doing nothing to address the 40 horrific deaths that have occurred on one of South Australia's deadliest highways since 2018," Mr Whetstone said.

"Labor has failed the 4000 people who travel the Sturt Highway every day and the 12,436 community members who signed the petition in strong support of the Truro freight route."

Mr Whetstone called on the SA Government to step in and "deliver this critical piece of infrastructure in full".

"There are more heavy vehicles and commodities on the road than ever before since Labor closed rail in Loxton and Pinnaroo," Mr Whetstone said.

Federal boost to road funding

INCREASED road funding will improve road safety, while also lifting the burden on councils, the Federal Government says.

After announcing infrastructure funding cuts last week, attributed to cost blowouts, the government says Roads to Recovery funding will rise gradually from \$500 million to \$1 billion per year, while Black Spot funding will increase from \$110 million to \$150 million.

The government will also

merge the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program (HVSP) and the Bridges Renewal Program (BRP) into a new Safer Local Roads and Infrastructure Program.

"Regional road networks have been battered by severe weather events over the last few years," said Catherine King, Federal Minister for Infrastructure and Transport.

"This funding will help councils to fix and maintain our roads

"This investment will sup-

port regional communities, and help move freight to and from our rural production centres.

"We are doing this in a responsible way, to give councils the funding they need while also ensuring the increase doesn't put pressure on inflation."

The funding was yesterday welcomed by the GrainGrowers group, which said it was "great to see local roads getting the attention they deserve".

"I think there's always a worry that the history gets lost over time, so just hearing the children sing the Monash song and the traditional ringing of the bell, and sharing of where everything came from and what it is all about was a huge highlight."

"The students love looking at people who have been here over time and it just reminds them how special



the school is and how it has had an impact of lots of people throughout generations."

Mrs Wainwright said it was important for the Monash Primary and Preschool community to come together to celebrate the school's history.

"It all comes back to being part of the Monash community and people understanding how the school has evolved and the work of the returned soldiers," she said.

CEO's return confirmed

A RIVERLAND council CEO currently on leave has confirmed he will return to the role next year.

Renmark Paringa CEO Tony Sivior said he was "looking forward" to returning to council, after a planned break was delayed due to the recent Murray River flood.

"Last year I intended taking three-months leave, however this was not possible due to the 2022 Murray River floods," Mr Sivior said.

"After 32 years in local government across six local councils I have accumulated considerable leave, which I am entitled to take. I commenced in August 2023 (and) I have been using this time to get back to the things that are important in life which sometimes get pushed aside due to busy schedules."

"I am looking forward to returning to my position at council in the new year. While I have been enjoying lots of fishing and boating I have missed being involved in some of the exciting projects council is currently working on, as well as watching some of council's long-term staff continue to grow and move into management roles within the organisation."

Mr Sivior joined Renmark Paringa as CEO in 2011.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said he remained "incredibly thankful" for Mr Sivior's "leadership and guidance" through the flood event.

"I continue to be amazed by the workload and issues that were dealt with by the emergency response team here at Renmark Paringa Council," Mr Hunter said.

"There were challenges daily and they were met in a timely and efficient manner. Staff visited all 38km of levees and not only made ongoing changes to plans on a daily basis, but also provided individual support for hundreds of ratepayers and visitors to our region."

"There was no blueprint nor map for what should be done and many decisions had to be made before any funding was secured – we constantly pushed the boundaries to get ahead of the rising waters."

Mr Hunter said Mr Sivior's efforts would be vital in the ongoing flood recovery effort.

"Following the peak, we then had some 28 pages of recovery items to be worked through, and this was just the starting point for what has become a very-big agenda, likely to cost a further \$25m beyond the flood mitigation while trying to manage the loss of normal staff functions – from daily routines – for six months while we attended to the flood issues," Mr Hunter said.



Pulling the rug out

SOMETIMES even the best of ideas go unrealised.

Last week's announcement of outcomes from the Federal Government's review of national infrastructure projects – initially planned to last 90 days – may not have been the most surprising, but will still no doubt be a considerable blow to the local residents, businesses and members of government who were in support of constructing a Truro bypass.

Indeed, new stipulations for infrastructure projects to proceed – such as having an even funding split from State and Federal Governments – would seemingly make the project unfeasible in any form other than the most basic plan.

The project – formally known as the Truro Freight Route – is one of dozens across the country now cast into uncertainty, but the simple volume of planned infrastructure work fails to reflect the importance of these projects to their surrounding communities.

In today's Pioneer we see a wide range of perspectives on the decision, including from our region's MPs, a mayor, and the senior figure of a local transport company.

A similar message was echoed by all voices: that the Truro Freight Route was necessary to improving safety for those travelling between the Riverland and Adelaide.

Being able to commute such a long distance with a relatively comfortable journey – from Renmark to Adelaide for instance – when we have an appointment, or want a weekend away, is something risky to take for granted. As has been seen far too much this year, sometimes the journey can also take a tragic turn.

The combination and sheer volume of heavy vehicles and people travelling for holidays or work would seemingly make the need for safe major roads a priority, and makes the Federal Government's funding decision look quite puzzling.

Making this a one-two punch of sorts was an announcement that Federal Government funding to improve the conditions of roads – under the Roads to Recovery program – would gradually increase from \$500m to \$1bn each year, with Black Spot Funding also increasing from \$110m to \$150m.

While on face value this looks like a move to benefit all motorists, the more hardened sceptics among us would be expecting that extra funding to be spent largely on metropolitan roads, while fatal accidents continue to be experienced on our regional highways.

With its decision regarding infrastructure projects, the Federal Government decision-makers have appeared to value budgetary pragmatism over the safety of citizens.

Time, and South Australia's road toll, will be the ultimate judges of their success.

THE YEARS GO BY

Recycling sleepers, Wunkar, 2023. In late October a problem with the railway in the Loxton Historical Village led to an unanticipated act of recycling. During the Village's 'big cleanup' following the 2022-23 flood, a long-unused railway gangers' cart (section-cart) was dusted down and 'got going'. The cart used to carry the gangers when maintaining the local lines. Before running the cart on the Village railway, the timber sleepers were inspected. Many had rotted and needed replacement. But, where to find replacements? In 1912-13, the railway from Tailem Bend to Karoonda was laid with light rail (41lb/yard) on steel sleepers that surface-rusted but didn't rot. In 1925, the Karoonda line was replaced with stronger rail (60lb/yard) to accommodate heavier locomotives, while the original rails and sleepers were recycled in the new Wanbi to Yinkanie line. Forty-six years later, in 1971, this railway closed, and many sleepers were repurposed as strainer posts in fences, but some 200 were abandoned in a farm-stack at Wunkar. Recently, a team from the village retrieved those sleepers that had for 52 years awaited salvage or scrap. The salvaged sleepers are now ready for their next recycling – installed in the village's revamped railway. PHOTO: Richard Wood

Serious about local bridge solution

AS readers would be aware the Twentyfirst Street bridge, in Renmark, was deemed unsafe after the 2022 floods.

It has been closed since the end of 2022.

An article in The Murray Pioneer (,RPC moves to speed up bridge process; 15/11/23) state council "estimates construction for the new bridge – with the combined tender – to be complete in late 2025". That is another two years. By that point the bridge will have been out for three years.

The Riverland Mini Mart, on Twentyfirst Street, has struggled over the past 12 months due to a lack of traffic that would normally come into Renmark over the bridge. Another two years would be an unacceptable burden for this business alone.

It is also not a minor inconvenience for those living in the Renmark West area to either come into town via Ral Ral Avenue, or trying to get onto the Sturt Highway now from Twentyfifth or Twentysixth Street with the increased traffic.

Twentyfirst Street has been the main access to the Renmark Cemetery for funerals, to the Angove Family Winery for tourists and to the Waste Transfer station for many locals.

In the past I have attended a Renmark Paringa Council meeting and asked if they have considered a temporary bridge be installed, and provided Australian companies that supply these.

There are Australian companies such as Mabey Group that have temporary bridges for sale.

With the Federal Government cutting funding for approved projects such as the Truro bypass, in my view it would seem highly unlikely there is going to be funding or grants available for the Twentyfirst Street bridge in Renmark any-time soon.

Hence I believe it is now time for the Renmark Paringa Council to seriously look at a temporary solution for the Twentyfirst Street bridge.

Inconvenient facts about Paruna park

I WRITE in regards to the article in The Murray Pioneer headed "Council sticks to Paruna campfire rules" (1/11/23).

I do not know what rules the council has for campfires at the caravan park at Paruna, but I do know it is illegal to burn pine posts and other toxic waste.

Having fire buckets for campfires is not going to stop some campers from burning hazardous material at the caravan park.

My property does not border the caravan park, but I do get the hazardous smoke from these fires at my place.

I do not get as much of the smoke from these fires as Peter Davis or other people staying at the caravan park, but why do we have to put up with the smell and hazards from these fires, and in Mr Davis's case, be forced out of his own house to find a place to sleep?

What about other campers, what are they meant to do? Pack up and leave?

As stated by council CEO David Beaton, staff regularly visit the site to undertake maintenance and "have not observed the camp grounds in the conditions Mr Davis claims".

Mr Beaton also said "the council's volunteer manager also has not regularly observed such behaviour".

The reason they have not observed these conditions is because Mr Davis cleans up the unsightly mess from campfires when the campers leave.

As for "council's volunteer manager at the site liaises directly with the users of the site at the time of payment and cleans the facilities regularly", the manager only liaises with campers when they pay for camping fees and to collect the key for the shower.

The manager is not at the site, as claimed. Campers go to the manager's house to do this and are not given receipts.

I believe the facilities are not cleaned on a regular basis and that they are lucky to be cleaned once a month, the only time the manager spends at the caravan park, which is only about 20 minutes.

I understand the manager is not a volunteer and is paid.

I also understand that Paruna

Progress Association is supposed to be involved with the upkeep and help with maintenance of the caravan park.

If so, why is Mr Davis the only person that cleans up the unsightly mess from the campfires and planted shrubs that were supplied by council and waters them?

Should that be the job of the managers or Paruna Progress?

I can see most of the caravan park from my place and see Mr Davis doing some tidying up at the caravan park on a regular basis.

Paruna gets mail three days a week: Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

The mail shed is at the caravan park. I sort the mail and I am there from 2.30pm to 3.30pm on mail days.

I am asked on a regular basis if I can sweep and wash the floors, to get rid of spider webs, for some more toilet paper, paper hand towel, or to fill the liquid soap dispenser, or to clean the toilets so people can use them.

Quite a few people look at the state of the toilets and leave.

Finally, regarding the Paruna Progress Association president, Adrian Wright, writing to council in support for leasing of the golf club land for community activities.

It might be that Mr Wright and the very few Paruna Progress Association members support leasing the golf club, but not the rest of the community, I believe.

Reality of my Paruna camp experience

My entire back fence adjoins the RV park and Pocock Park. I am able to observe what goes on all day, every day, as I rarely leave my property.

No receipts are issued by the manager, making the claim of a

fantastical increase in vans and tents hard to verify, yet this is the reason for council's merger of the Eileen Pocock Park Lot 3 donated block with the RV park.

Let me assist Mr Beaton and Ms Flavel with some hardcore facts. From 1 October to 5 November, over a period of 36 days, 54 vans and/or tents, not even an average of two a night, were in the campground.

During this period both SA and Victoria school holidays were on, plus the Loxton Show and the Mindarie-Halidon Races were held. A cavalcade of caravans.

Luckily the donated Lot 3 Pocock Memorial Park and Playground was annexed.

I will be able to supply you with factual figures, as interestingly no receipts are issued to campers.

Jody apparently does not accept my account of campfire abuse and my sleeping in my car at the gravel pit as 'firm evidence'.

In future I will video such abuse. In the meantime Cr Flavel, for your evidence bag, the toxic coals and ash from the treated pine posts illegally burnt outside my back gate, with the resulting gases filling my home, were finally tracked down.

Historical links of Paruna

IT appears Jody Flavel ('Council sticks to Paruna camp fire rules', Murray Pioneer, 1/11/23) is confused over the Pocock Park's origins, claiming it never was a Pocock Memorial Park or playground, just a bit of land where some relatives put up a sign or two and planted some shrubs.

So here you are Jody, some historical facts, and let's get this quite clear.

Paruna from Scrub to Hub 1913-1983: Community Organizations Paruna Progress Association (pg 71):

"In 1965, this body accepted responsibility for the development and maintenance of the Pocock Memorial Playground. This is on land next to the Bowling Club, and was donated for a playground by Mrs E.E. Pocock".

In reply to Jody Flavel's claim of an historical link existing with fires on the grounds of Lot 6, where the Paruna Hall stood for 65 years and Lot 3, the donated land of the Pocock Memorial Park quietly merged with the campground mid-2023.

From 1965 and 1974 respectively, the Paruna Progress Association has been responsible for the maintenance and development of Lot 3 Pocock Park and Lot 6 the Hall.

Do Paruna Progress Association minutes contain a reference to the mid-year inclusion of Pocock Park into the Paruna Campground?

If Paruna Progress Association dealt with council on this matter and this was the outcome, why weren't Paruna residents informed beforehand of the handover?

When did Paruna Progress Association hand over the development of Lot 6 to council for a campground? Where are the minutes pertaining to these matters?

I understand the Progress Association books are being reviewed by a statutory authority.

For your information, Jody, fires are not an historical occurrence on Lots 3 or 6. In my view the campfire nuisance came to Paruna residents, not the other way around.

I doubt a court of law would uphold your 'historical' defence of campfires in a case of nuisance brought against councillors and the Loxton Waikerie council by Paruna residents.



two junction upgrades between Barmera and Renmark with roundabouts added, and rest areas at Kingston-On-Murray and other parts of the region.

But he said it was crucial that the Federal Government told Loxton Waikerie council and Riverland councils about its long-term plan for the duplication of the Sturt Highway.

"Our councils need to know so that our local planning and development and investment of ratepayers' money is in synchronicity with those plans," he said.

Waikerie man Vin Dowd in October presented a petition with about 12,500 signatures to Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone calling for a dual-lane Truro Bypass.

Over a period of about four months, he had achieved his goal of collecting more than 10,000 signatures to enable the petition to go to the bipartisan Legislative Review Committee.

Prior to the Commonwealth's scrapping of the funding for the Truro Freight Route last week, the Federal and State Governments had jointly committed \$202m to the project.

Their plan was to design and construct

a single-lane bypass to divert heavy traffic along the Sturt Highway and out of Truro's main street.

But Mr Dowd and the 12,000 people from Mildura, the Riverland, and northern suburbs of Adelaide who signed the petition were concerned these planned modifications would fail to improve the highway's safety.

He told The Murray Pioneer in July he regularly travelled from Waikerie to Adelaide for medical specialist appointments and believed a dual bypass was especially needed from Truro through the Accommodation Hill area.

Mr Norton said he believed Mr Dowd's petition could have also called for an overall duplication plan for the Sturt Highway, instead of just the Truro Bypass.

"One thing costs a lot of money," he said.

"What we have seen happen is that the money has been moved from the heavy vehicle route around Truro," he said.

"It doesn't mean that we can't have access to a plan that tells us if and when duplication is going to happen, where it is going to go and what the program is..."

Mental health boost for Renmark

RENMARK mental health services will receive a boost at the hands of Flinders University, which will roll out an innovative project aimed at expanding the reach of quality mental health services in underserviced regional, rural and remote areas.

Funded by more than \$3.8m from the federal Department of Health and Aged Care Pathways to Practice program, the initiative seeks to attract, train and retain a new generation of mental health professionals, including psychologists, occupational therapists, mental health nurses and social workers, to bolster the mental health sector.

Project leader pro vice-chancellor Chris Brebner said "the initiative is underpinned by collaborations across Flinders University, drawing on strengths across mental health disciplines".

"A 'hub and spoke' approach to mental health training will enhance the state's workforce capacity and increase opportunities for more students to take up training in these fields," he said.

"This approach aims to create a stronger pipeline of future mental health workers by training more students in non-acute mental health service settings, thereby encouraging them to enter the mental health sector upon

graduation."

Co-ordinator Natalie Papps will lead the Flinders University project after a career in occupational therapy and work on solving health workforce challenges in Victoria.

"The goal is to increase the number of mental health clinicians by enhancing numbers of student placements across South Australia, including areas like Renmark, while also contributing real support to clinicians working in those communities," Ms Papps said.

"This funding initiative provides key resources to further facilitate regional placements for students, enabling telehealth supervision and providing specialised supervisor training."

Recent engagement with student placements in rural and remote areas through the National Disability and Insurance Scheme supports the program.

The new pilot project fits into the wider 10-year National Mental Health Workforce Strategy aiming to fill the demand for mental health services that are outstripping supply.

Health workforce professionals are unevenly distributed across Australia, notably in rural and remote areas, and indigenous communities.

Feedback wanted on mental health paper

RIVERLANDERS who have previously experienced challenges associated with mental health are encouraged to provide feedback on potential legislation reforms.

A discussion paper was released earlier this month as part of an Office of the Chief Psychiatrist (OCP) response to an independent statutory review of the Mental Health Act 2009.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said feedback received would be used to inform the development of a draft bill to make amendments to the act.

"We need to get the balance right for our mental health laws – ensuring we prioritise wellbeing and rights of consumers, and protection and appropriate

treatment," Mr Picton said.

"Reforming this legislation will be the next step in making real change for people experiencing mental distress."

Through the release of the discussion paper, the OCP is seeking community feedback on a number of areas of the Act including:

- A greater focus on wellbeing and prevention strategies reflected in the Objects of the Act

- A focus on human rights – including how a person can be supported to make decisions wherever possible rather than have others make decisions for them

- Changed guiding principles written in a positive rights-based language
- Further safeguards for

children and young people who are subject to mental health treatment orders

- Promoting Aboriginal mental health, implementing culturally responsive and appropriate services and including a new Statement of Recognition of Aboriginal people that informs care

- Providing clearer frameworks, processes and roles, including a clearer structure for Community Treatment Orders.

Consultation via YourSAY will be open until 21 December.

account. The efforts of Petticoat Lane have been invaluable with helping Calvary St Catherine's and its residents."

Calvary SA director of mission Mark McCarthy said it was "clear to see the impact the auxiliary that started in 1965 has had, not only on life at St Catherine's, but the local community".

"It brought together groups that were probably quite separate and sometimes polarised, with all of the different church groups, the cultural groups and the Riverland as a whole joining to make the Petticoat Lane bazaars such a wonderful experience," he said.

"In a way, the by-product of that was the amazing fundraising for St Catherine's."

Mrs Heuzenroeder thanked the service clubs including Rotary, Lions and Apex for the support shown to Petticoat Lane over the 55 years.

"Thank you also to all those who have contributed in any way," she said.

"From serving on committees and holding positions, to organising events and stalls over the 55 years. Special thanks and acknowledgement to Shirley Ingerson for serving as president for 25 years, and to June Reece for many years before that."

Orange bins get scrapped

WAIKERIE'S iconic orange bins will soon be unusable, with a local council agreeing to turn them into street art instead.

At last Wednesday's District Council of Loxton Waikerie meeting, elected members agreed to replace the orange waste bins in Waikerie's main street with stainless steel and plastic bins, following a number of safety risks with the iconic bins.

In a report to councillors, infrastructure services director Greg Perry said the bins were identified as a "significant risk" due to sharp objects and needle stick injuries.

"The potential risk of injury is when emptying the waste bins, because it must be done by hand and the only thing that holds the deposited waste in the orange bin is a garbage bag," he said.

"The waste garbage bags are relatively weak and susceptible

to tearing from sharp objects and (the) shear weight of deposited waste."

At the meeting, councillors Gary Pfeiler and Sonia Fowler moved the recommendation for council to allocate \$52,000 to replace the orange waste bins in the Waikerie main street precinct.


The bins will be replaced with 10 stainless steel 'wei kari' moth-style bins, while the remainder will be plastic waste bins and stands.

In the report, it stated that the Waikerie Ramco Grounds Committee was conscious the orange bins are symbolic to the town.

"The idea to close the top and turn them into a sculpture piece was supported," the report said.

"The Rotary Club of Waikerie has agreed to modify six iconic orange bins that will remain as street art."

Horticulture representatives visit Canberra

REPRESENTATIVES from the Riverland's horticultural industries visited Parliament House in Canberra recently to highlight the vital role the Murray-Darling Basin plays in the production of food and fibre.

The Federal Government in August reached an agreement to deliver the Basin plan in full with the New South Wales, South Australia, Queensland, and Australian Capital Territory governments, but without Victoria.

The agreement includes extending the timeframe to deliver 450GL of water for the SA environment from 2024 to 2026, and the reintroduction of voluntary water buybacks.

The Water Amendment (Restoring Our Rivers) Bill 2023 to the Environment and Communications Legislation Committee was open for public submissions until 11 October.

The Senate Committee is expected to hand down its report this month.

The inaugural Taste of the Basin event, organised by the group of Basin-based Federal Coalition parliamentarians, showcased a variety of produce from the Basin including wine, dairy, rice, fruits, nuts and cotton, all of which are dependent on irrigation.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the event highlighted the importance of water to Australia's food security

and economy.

"Producers were able to tell policy makers firsthand how important our rivers are to food and fibre production, from Queensland to South Australia," Mr Pasin said.

"Unlimited water buybacks will impact our productivity and will make food prices in Australia more expensive."

"Everyone wants a healthy river, but they also want healthy industries and communities and to do that we need jobs across the supply chain," Mr Pasin said.

Mr Pasin said Barker producers were represented at the event with Nippy's, Almonds Australia, and Citrus SA showcasing their produce.

Riverland citrus industry promotes the Basin's productivity

THE Riverland citrus industry was among those promoting the variety and abundance of commodities produced along the Murray-Darling Basin.

Citrus SA chair Mark Doecke, his wife Louise, and Jeff and Tina Knispel from Riverland juice and flavoured milk producer Nippy's, were among those at Parliament House for the recent Taste of the Basin event.

Mr Knispel brought produce representing the citrus industry along to display during the deputation to Canberra.

Mr Doecke spoke to several politicians including SA Senator Alex Antic, Bowman MP Henry Pike, Federal Minister for Environment Tanya Plibersek's water advisor, Senator Anne Ruston, and National Irrigators Council chair Jeremy Morton.

"It was a very good opportunity to engage with the people who will develop the next steps in the Basin plan," he said.

Mr Doecke is opposed to the introduction of unlimited water buybacks in

the Basin.

"I think irrigators have already done their fair share for the Basin's health," he said.

"It is only irrigators and the infrastructure they use that has made the changes through the last round of buybacks and on-farm improvements to put

recovered water back in the river.

"I think we need to get some efficiencies from the environment to negate the need to take further water from growers."

Mr Doecke said SA growers had always been some of the most efficient growers in the country.

"We have had a cap on diversions for decades, if anything we should be rewarded with some seasonal allocation as other States have," Mr Doecke said.

"I don't think those who cry 'more water for the river' actually know what they are asking for."

"450GL of water taken from farmers equates to the districts of Renmark, Loxton, Berri, Barmera, and Waikerie all walking off their land and pumping no more."

"That's billions of dollars of export income and thousands of jobs gone for a river that, in South Australia's case, already uses (a lot) of its water for the environment."

"Think about the implications of the decisions to be made."

No new fruit fly outbreaks

NO new Queensland fruit fly outbreaks were declared, and no outbreak area boundaries were extended in the Riverland for the last fortnight.

The total number of outbreaks remains at 45 and restrictions remain in place for existing outbreaks and suspension areas.

Outbreak area boundary extensions also affect yellow suspension area boundaries.

The Fruit Fly Emergency Response Team has also welcomed a new incident controller, Con Poulos, who joined the team earlier this month.

A Riverland resident with a small horticultural property in Monash, Mr Poulos will be based at the Loxton Research Centre, providing local knowledge to the eradication program.

"I'm honoured to join the dedicated and determined emergency response team here at PIRSA, and taking on a new role in the fight against the fruit fly pest impacting the Riverland," Mr Poulos said.

"Our depth and breadth of experience in a range of fields the advantage we have over fruit fly, and I look forward to bringing new perspectives to the table as we work together in our goal of eradication."

The end date for all outbreaks is currently 8 February 2024, but this may change if more fruit flies are detected.

Restoration Bugle Hut

TELL people you are restoring a 106-year-old stone building and you will have them question your sanity.

That is exactly what is happening to locals Kiara and Jamie Fisher, who are in the process of preserving the Bugle Hut hall.

"People think we're crazy," Mrs Fisher said.

"People think we're absolute idiots for investing in something that is worthless."

The Bugle Hut hall, which is 25km northeast of Loxton, was built in 1917 and is in the history books as both an institute and school.

After moving to the area about 10 years ago, Mrs Fisher said she felt a sense of duty to preserve the building, which is on the corner of their farm.

"I contacted the previous owner a couple of times and they didn't want to sell it, and then I contacted them again and finally they agreed to sell it to me," she said.

"Over the last decade, I've seen the building go backwards, backwards and backwards.

"I just want to make sure it's not just another beautiful stone building that either gets demolished or nature takes over and does it for us."

Mrs Fisher said her main aim is for the building to give back to its local community.

"I didn't originally know what I wanted to do with it, but after some considerations, I wanted to do something that the community is going to be able to utilise," she said.

"We've never caught up with all of our neighbours.

"There's nowhere for everyone to do that unless it's somebody's home."

While once thriving communities, Bugle Hut and surrounding areas such as Nangari, Taldra and Taplan no longer have schools, halls or churches.

"The overall idea is for it to be a gather-

ing place for people from the 5311 area code I guess," Mrs Fisher said.

Last month, a working bee was held, with current and former farmers from the area chipping in.

Mrs Fisher said the restoration works would include a "very basic fit out".

"It's going to be a big empty space," she said.

"People from the area will be able to host birthdays and have end of harvest gatherings and shearing parties and just generally to celebrate things."

"Then further from there, if people from outside of the area want a cool venue, we will be hosting weddings and those sorts of things as well."

The project, which is expected to be completed in March, will fit about 120 people.

The electrical fit and new floor was recently completed, while a new roof will go on next month.

"We have taken the ceiling out and we are not replacing it," Mrs Fisher said.

"We are going to leave the rafters exposed and we have really nice lighting going in and a couple of ceiling fans."

"It is going to have a honed-cut concrete floor, so that will be nice and cool."

"To the church side of the building, we are basically doubling the footprint of the hall with an outdoor patio."

Aside from people thinking the couple are "crazy" for taking the project on, Mrs Fisher said people were supportive of the venture.

"Everyone is equally as excited and willing to put in the effort, which is amazing," she said.

"There's been heaps of people who have said, 'Wow, this is awesome. Thanks so much for essentially saving a piece of history'."

"I am really happy with the response, to be honest."



"We are having a sensory space at the pageant, located in Langdon Terrace, by the Anglican Church, where you can view the float parade without the noises," she said.

"We are hoping this works well so we can continue to improve on this in the future."

While the pageant is the biggest event for Barmera during December, Ms Hogan said the town "comes alive" throughout the month with several special additions to the main streets.

"The Shop Windows and Street Display group have been working hard to decorate the Bonney Theatre balcony and providing new displays in the shop windows down Barwell Avenue," she said.

"Santa's Cave will be open throughout December with new displays, and the Barmera Christmas Markets will be held on 3 December and joined by the Riverland Toy and Tucker Run."



Riverlanders called to protect against Covid-19

RIVERLAND residents have been encouraged to protect those in the community who are more at risk of the effects of COVID-19, with the state recording a nearly 50 per cent increase in reported cases in just a week, coinciding with the start of holiday festivities.

During this wave, susceptible groups such as older people, those with chronic illness, or who are immunocompromised can enhance their immunity and reduce their risk of severe illness by having Covid-19 vaccine booster.

Latest case numbers reported on Tuesday November 14 with 2496 weekly cases recorded.

This compares to 546 cases recorded in the last week of August.

An average of 30 people a week are admitted to hospital with Covid-19, but there is often up to a two-week lag in hospitalisations after case numbers increase.

"With South Australia experiencing a COVID-19 wave as we head into the festive season, we are asking people to take sensible steps to protect themselves, their loved ones and the community," Minister for Health Chris Picton said.

"This is especially important if you are older or live in aged care facility, and for those with medical conditions that increase the risk of severe disease."

"If you are eligible, please get a booster. Check in with your GP and plan so you can get antivirals quickly. It could save you a trip to hospital, or your life."

As a relatively new virus, waves of

Covid-19 can be expected approximately every three to six months as population level immunity naturally wanes over time.

Vaccine booster doses are readily available through GPs and pharmacies. Current vaccinations offer protection against all variants, reducing the likelihood of severe disease, hospitalisation and death.

In addition, people who are in higher-risk groups are encouraged to have a plan in place with their GP to receive antiviral treatments if they contract Covid-19.

The most common variant reported in South Australia at the moment is XBB, a recombinant Omicron variant.

Less than five per cent of currently circulating strains are BA.2.86, a relatively new Omicron variant that is commonly referred to as Pirola. The current wave does not appear to be driven by Pirola.

SA Health chief public health officer professor Nicola Spurrier said "as South Australians we have the tools to reduce the impact of this current wave, and to protect those we love from severe illness".

"I strongly recommend if you have a family member living in residential aged care, and they haven't had a vaccination or a Covid-19 infection in the last six months, to speak to their aged care provider and support them to have another booster dose," she said.

"Please take measures to protect others who are more susceptible to severe illness from Covid-19, including avoiding contact with them if you have symptoms and wearing a mask when necessary."

"I am really happy to be back in the community side of things," she said.

Only a few weeks into the role, Mrs Hand said she was quickly realising the "many" services Loxcare provides.

"We basically look after

the Loxton area, so the old Loxton council area," she said.

"Anyone in the Loxton area that is struggling, homeless, or in need, by all means come and see us."

Loxcare has about 65 members and Mrs Hand encouraged anyone interesting in supporting the organisation to get in touch.

"We are always looking for volunteers," she said.

Loxcare recently farewelled Bev Scarfe after four years in the co-ordinator role.

Efficient signing and witnessing process for rural SA

THE signing of statutory declarations and affidavits for South Australians in regional areas – including the Riverland – would be made easier under proposed State Government legislation reforms.

The State Government last month announced proposed changes to the state's Oaths Act, permanently allowing for the electronic signing of statutory declarations and affidavits.

Attorney-General Kyam Maher said regional residents had limited access to lawyers and trusted persons eligible to sign and witness statutory declarations and affidavits.

"It's often easier for South Australians living in metropolitan areas to find the legal practitioners or trusted persons needed to witness signings of affidavits or statutory declarations," Mr Maher said.

"However, for people in regional and remote areas it can be a time consuming and costly task."

"The proposed changes will make this process easier, with important safeguards in place, which will benefit businesses and individuals alike."

Consultation on the proposed changes is expected before the end of 2023.

Region opens to electric vehicles

THE RAA is continuing to open up the Riverland as a destination for electric vehicles with more charging stations coming online.

A rapid 150kW site was recently installed at the Morgan Riverfront Reserve Caravan Park and a fast 7kW station has been placed at the Loxton Courthouse.

The RAA's electric vehicle (EV) charging program director Andrew Howard said Renmark

would also soon have a fast 7kW site in the Fifteenth Street carpark.

"We're pleased to see the progress the RAA Charge network is making in the Riverland and expect demand for these sites to grow as EV ownership increases," he said.

"We've already installed a good mix of both rapid and fast chargers to cover different charging scenarios for drivers, and there are still a few more

sites to come online."

Mr Howard said the Morgan EV site had 16 sessions since it was launched last month.

"The Riverland is an important tourist region that we want to open up to EV drivers, so they can travel with confidence on their holidays and road trips to the area," he said.

The RAA has installed eight EV charging stations at Waikerie.

Six are at premises owned by

the Waikerie Hotel Motel, three of these are at its McCoy Street venue and the other three at its off-site motel on Ian Oliver Drive.

Two EV chargers have also been placed at Waikerie's Civic Centre, on Strangman Road.

One of these is yet to be operational and is expected to go live early next year, once SA Power Networks have completed the necessary works.

Fire season underway

RIVERLAND police have reminded the community that fire danger season has commenced after two separate incidents were reported on the same day.

At 3.10pm on Wednesday 1 November, CFS and police were called to a fire report at a Swan Reach property.

A 73-year old man was issued a \$572 fine after an accidental grass fire became out of control.

Later, at about 8.30pm, MFS and police attended a small burn off at a Renmark West property.

A SAPOL spokesperson said "now that fire danger season has commenced, it is a good time to prepare for the fire season, including knowing what you can and cannot do during the fire danger season and on total fire ban days".

Next move for commercial wine group

A REPRESENTATIVE group for the country's wine producers – including those in the Riverland – is seeking to become a formalised governing body.

Australian Commercial Wine Producers (ACWP) recently wrote to Federal Minister for Agriculture Forestry and Fisheries Murray Watt, seeking to be formally recognised as a declared representative body as provided for by the Wine Australia Act 2013.

ACWP chair Bill Moulardellis said the organisation was in the best position to represent the local wine industries needs.

"Our members account for over 60 per cent of Australian wine production and contribute a similar proportion of the mandatory levies," Mr Moulardellis said.

"We seek equitable status with Australian Grape and Wine (AGW), whose members contribute less than 25 per cent of the industry's total production and levy revenue."

"AGW no longer has the industry mandate to continue to exclusively represent the interests of all Australian producers and it certainly does not have the moral authority to convene the R&D and Marketing Advisory Committees which advise Wine Australia's strategic priorities."

"It is fair and just that members of ACWP have at least an equal formal voice in setting the directions and priorities of the industry..."

Morgan's festive mood

SPONSORSHIP from Riverland West businesses, and those outside the region, has enabled organisers of the Morgan Christmas Pageant, to be held on 9 December, to bring back fireworks if weather permits.

The event, run by the Morgan Lions Club, last had fireworks in 2019.

In 2020 and 2021, Covid-19 restrictions led to the cancellation of the annual pageant and last year a modified event was held due to the flood.

Ms Long said the 2022/2023 flood had impacted businesses in the town and hopefully this year's pageant would give the area a welcome financial boost.

She said in May, it did not appear possible to raise the \$8000 required to fund fireworks.

"Earlier in the year we did a drive for some sponsorship, but we did not get much of a response," Ms Long said.

However, after advising the community the fireworks would again be missed due to a lack of funds, donations started coming in.

"A few businesses individually contacted me and said if the fireworks could occur they would donate \$1000," she said.

"Then before I knew it we reached our \$8000 target and then some."

Mid Murray Council also provided a \$2000 grant towards the pageant.

Ms Long said an all-day food event run by the Morgan Lions Club last month raised \$800 for Santa bags filled with goodies to be handed out at Santa's Cave.

Hamburgers, hotdogs, a sausage sizzle, and sweet chilli chicken wraps were

among the items sold at the fundraiser.

The Morgan Christmas Pageant and Fair, on Saturday 9 December, begins at 3pm and will feature live music by The Chasers, and activities for children including a jumping castle, rock climbing wall, face painting, and lawn games.

A variety of food vans will be on offer and stalls on offer will include arts and craft, leather goods, jewellery, Christmas goods, and Barossa Motorcycles.

River Murray floods



SAPN gets guernsey for flood event efforts

A STATE utility provider was awarded for its efforts to prioritise safety and efficient service during the recent flood event.

SA Power Networks (SAPN) earlier this month received the Health and Safety Award for the energy sector at the Premier's Awards for Mining and Energy for its response to the River Murray flood.

SAPN CEO Andrew Bills said ensuring staff safety, while also efficiently maintaining and reconnecting supply of electricity to local homes was a priority.

"Apart from the emotional and economic impacts of the prolonged flood, electric shock due to flood inundation of electricity infrastructure was a key risk to the community, emergency services personnel and SA Power Networks employees," Mr Bills said.

"To ensure a safe response to the floods, SA Power Networks created a raft of new safety procedures for employees; adopted modern artificial intelligence (AI) and remote sensing LiDAR processing capabilities to help manage connection and recon-

nnection of power; and undertook extensive community and stakeholder engagement to manage risk, inform the community and support wellbeing.

"The safety outcome highlights the collaboration with emergency services, government and the community to ensure safety. Our focus had to be on avoiding the very significant potential for an electric shock or even electrocution."

"We knew having power disconnected was disruptive, so our use of modern AI technology meant we were able to reconnect power earlier because we had a very accurate understanding of where floodwaters were receding and where we could reconnect supply safely."

Approximately 4000 stobie poles and 400km of powerline were impacted by high water levels during the flood event.

SAPN's Flexible Exports option for solar also received the Innovation and Collaboration Award for the energy sector.





Increased demand for ac.care services

RIVERLANDERS impacted by increased cost-of-living pressures and ongoing effects of the flood have sought assistance from a local support service.

ac.care's recently released 2022/23 annual report showed increased demand for homelessness and emergency relief, and financial counselling services.

ac.care chief executive officer Shane Maddocks said numerous social challenges had increased demand for support.

"A housing crisis combined with increasing costs of living mean that safe homes are harder to keep and to find," Mr Maddocks said.

"Sadly though, there are many people we are unable to help find that longer term answer to their needs."

"We have seen increasing demand for our financial counselling and emergency relief programs with more and more people also collecting donated food to be able to feed their families."

"We also receive more and more requests to care for children and young people who are not able to safely continue living with their birth families."

Mr Maddocks said securing increased funding for ac.care's Berri community centre was a highlight of the year.

"We will continue to advocate for increased funding for prevention and early intervention support and will be adapting our services to increase this focus where we can in collaboration with our communities," he said.

"We cannot achieve significant change unless we all work together and this is why we will be working more closely with our communities to develop local responses and solutions."

The organisation also

recently launched its 10-year Weaving Stronger Futures Together strategy, aimed at "disrupting cycles of disadvantage and strengthening the fabric" of regional communities.

ac.care board convenor Rick Fisher said the strategy aimed to "weave communities together, break cycles of intergenerational disadvantage and increase aspirations, optimism, opportunity and hope for country people".

"We believe now is the right time to step up as leaders to affect transformative community change," Mr Fisher said.

"We see disturbing evidence that many children begin their education on 'the back foot', and that many do not recover or catch up with learning."

"We aim to make sure children start school prepared for learning on their first day and that all are supported to learn and to succeed, then to contribute fully to community life."

Meals on Wheels' valued community service

MEALS on Wheels volunteer Rozz Dyer was guest speaker at the recent monthly meeting of the Paringa branch of Women in Agriculture and Business. She commenced by giving the historical background to this long-established community service.

The original concept of delivering meals to those in need dates back to the London Blitz in WWII when large numbers of desperate families sought food and shelter and the Women's Volunteer Services delivered meals in prams. In 1953, Mrs E Watts, in Melbourne, delivered meals on a tricycle.

In SA wheelchair-bound Doris Taylor was at the forefront to establish the first constitutional body. Doris was an "amazing, switched-on" lady, who though paralysed, resisted being institutionalised. She believed people with disability should be able to stay in their own homes and that many illnesses have their core cause in malnutrition. She advocated that regularly provided nutritious meals improved lives.

She approached medical representatives and politicians seeking funds to establish the organisation and former SA Premier Don Dunstan was first president. In 1954 the first kitchen was set up in Port Adelaide, in a Nissen hut with 11 volunteers present.

Renmark's kitchen was established in 1964 – also servicing Berri district – and celebrates 60 years in 2024. The original Renmark service included home care, library, handyman services and these have long since been handed over to other organisations. Extension services do exist in Adelaide including cooking lessons, home visits and café connections to encourage social activity.

The state administration has seen many changes in the last 10 years in the area of menus and costs. A paid employee is now on every branch committee and all decisions are made in Adelaide. There are 80 kitchens in SA and Renmark is a fresh meal kitchen, while others serve meals prepared

in Adelaide and then re-heated, or deal with frozen prepared meals.

New regulations specify frozen ingredients over fresh, thus making a cost saving. Donations of seasonal vegetables and fruit are no longer accepted and the option for preserving fruit or making jam on site is disallowed. Menus are set in Adelaide, changed every 3 months and on any one day kitchens across the state are serving the same food.

The Renmark kitchen has 77 clients and also supplies to 15 clients at Resthaven, in Loxton. There are approximately 100 rostered volunteers with 60 involved with deliveries, and 30 rostered on kitchen duty to bring meals to Renmark, Paringa and Lyrup districts. Rozz received the Renmark Paringa Council Community Service Award in 2021 for volunteer service to the Scouting movement, Chaffey Theatre and Renmark Meals on Wheels.

The next WAB meeting will be held on Tuesday 28 November, at 7.30pm at the Paringa home of Heather Everingham, with Steve Everingham as guest speaker.

Feedback open on council election review

RIVERLANDERS have been encouraged to provide input towards a state review aimed at increasing participation with local government elections.

The State Government last week opened public feedback for the Local Government Participation and Elections Review.

A total of 93 positions were filled without an election being held at the 2022 local government elections, with 16 vacancies across 10 council areas also failing to receive enough nominations. This meant supplementary elections had to be held earlier this year.

Voter turnout also remained at approximately 33 per cent.

Minister for Local Government Geoff Brock said creating "a more inclusive, representative, and participatory local government system that truly reflects the voices and aspirations of South Australia's diverse communities" was a goal.

"Local democracy is often described as the sphere of government 'closest to the people', yet the people of South Australia are consistently choosing not to exercise their right to have a say when it comes to council elections," Mr Brock said.

"The discussion paper poses some bold ideas, that might be challenging or even controversial, but I firmly believe that it is time for us to take real action to better connect people to their councils, to get serious about tackling the persistently low voter turnout we see every four years at council election time."

"I want the ideas I have put forward to generate serious debate about the future of our local government.

"The input of community members, stakeholders and experts is invaluable as we embark on this vital process, and I urge everyone to take 15 minutes out of their day and provide their feedback. Your insights, suggestions, and concerns are crucial as we work towards strengthening our democratic foundations."

Ideas in the review include the introduction of compulsory voting, term limits for elected members, removal of council wards and possible boundary changes where councils are unable to receive enough nominations at election time.

LGA president – and Kimba Mayor – Dean Johnson said elected councillors play a vital role in representing and serving the interests of their community.

"Following last year's elections, we have been working closely with the State Government to undertake a review of the local democratic process and constructively look at ways to improve participation in local government," Mr Johnson said.

"For many years, we've seen voting in local government elections linger at around 33 per cent, which means a big portion of the community is unheard in the elections process.

"We will be engaging with all South Australian councils on this process and welcome the chance to listen to the community on their thoughts to boost voter turnout, encourage more people to stand for council and improve the elections process overall."

"As the most accessible level of government for South Australians, we want to hear different ideas and weigh up their merits – from compulsory voting, the timing of elections to the process for nominations, everyone's perspective matters."

A Select Committee of the Legislative Council has been established to inquire into support and mental health services for Police, with particular reference to:

- (a) Exploring whether the services provided by the Employee Assistance Program and other mental health services offered to police, former police, and their families are sufficient;
- (b) Determining whether an annual psychological review is sufficient for employees in roles where there is higher psychological demand;
- (c) Assessing the Early Intervention Program to ensure its suitability for psychological injury;
- (d) Determining whether additional mental health support for police officers and their families is required;
- (e) Exploring strategies of boosting police morale to make sure police have the support they need to perform their duties;
- (f) Exploring resourcing and recruitment within SAPOL;
- (g) the prevalence, cause and effect of post traumatic stress disorder among serving and retired police officers and prevention strategies to mitigate risk;
- (h) Consideration of legislative amendments to the Return to Work Act 2014:
 - (i) to prescribe that when a serving or former police officer is diagnosed with post traumatic stress disorder, it is presumed to have arisen from their employment in the absence of proof to the contrary;
 - (ii) the extent to which other first responders who deal directly with emergency situations when performing paid or voluntary work should be captured in the legislative amendments, including but not limited to ambulance officers, firefighters, nurses, medical practitioners, members of the SACFS and SASES, correctional services officers and train drivers; and
 - (i) Any other relevant matters.



Mighty amount raised by River Run

THE Novita Mighty River Run has raised more than \$1.1m dollars in 2022 and 2023 to support children, youth and adults living with a disability.

A total of 36 crews on boats from across the state recently spent five days travelling along local stretches of River Murray.

They began at Waikerie and took part in activities at Loxton, Berri, the Woolshed Brewery, Renmark, Moorook South, Barmera, and the Overland Corner Hotel, before ending the event with an official dinner at the Waikerie Golf and Country Club.

Novita's donor development specialist Matthew Robran said \$620,000 was raised this year and about \$500,000 was raised last year, even though the flood lead to the event

being cancelled.

This year's event featured a tribute night to former AFL footballer and coach Russell Ebert OAM, who died in 2021.

Mr Ebert and fellow Mighty River Run ambassadors John Riddell and Jason 'Snowy' Carter created the annual Novita fundraiser 16 years ago.

Mr Robran said the auction of a painting of Mr Ebert, by Adelaide artist Ann Shannon, raised \$21,000 during the tribute night at Berri, where the football legend was born.

The winners of the portrait were Paul and Heidi Sweet, from Adelaide.

"Paul in particular is a big Russell Ebert fan and was absolutely delighted when he was the winning bidder," Mr Robran said.

He said another highlight of this year's River Murray fundraiser was the lunch at The Precinct, in Loxton, with about 40 of Novita's clients.

"It was an opportunity for the River Run fundraisers to meet the clients who benefit from what they do," Mr Robran said.

"It is not a sit down lunch, we play games and all the boaters come dressed up in their costumes."

Mr Robran said Novita Berri client Bryce Westbrook, who is presently doing work experience at Woolworths in Berri, was an inspiration to meet with.

Mr Westbrook on his own raised \$1300 by

The ball fizzed into the right hand of Ben Lennon at second slip, and the momentum began to shift, with Sumner now the last recognised senior batsman standing in the Berri line-up. The Bluetongues remained vigilant, continuing to hone in on a good length outside off, and the patience paid off as Peter Efthimiou was dismissed for a duck, before Cody Reese snagged the prized wicket of Sumner.

Berri's number five had gritted his teeth for 137 balls on his way to 43, before Reese found the edge, which travelled safely into the gloves of Tarque Williamson.

Reese soon picked up the wicket of youngster Aaron Nobile, before Boon secured the points for North as Brad Oakley skied one to bring the innings to a close.

The Bluetongues batted out the remaining 26 overs of the day, with the scoreboard reading 4/55 at stumps.

Dean Hill was best with the bat in the second dig, surviving 75 balls for an unbeaten 25, while Brad Rosenzweig picked up a further three wickets, taking his total for the match to 8/50.

In the absence of an A grade contest, Loxton scored an impressive win in the B grade, thanks largely to another strong showing from veteran batsman Michael Gutsche, who finished with 84 in his side's clash with

Renmark North. Meanwhile, Waikerie Ramco emerged 90-run winners over Monash, while Brown's Well secured the points against an undermanned Gerard.

The two-day action is set to continue in the A grade this week, with Berri scheduled to travel to Parilla and Loxton to host Renmark North in a grand final rematch.

Tim's time finally comes

THE old adage of good things come to those who wait will ring true for one local hockey star next year, when he dons the green and gold in New Zealand after half a century of honing his craft.

Tim Cass' hockey journey began in the mid-1970s with the Loxton Hockey Club, and the soon-to-be Australian Masters representative has never missed a beat, playing in every season since.

His two years in Adelaide in the early 1980s aside, Cass has turned out for Loxton year after year, and took up masters hockey in 2005.

He has gone on to rep-

resent South Australia in all but one year since, and following a particularly strong individual 2023 national tournament in Perth, finds himself in the Australian over 60s side.

"It goes up every five years, so I'm actually a junior this year – I'm a young bloke in the team," he said.

"I've put my name down a few times to be looked at for Australian selection and last year I was a reserve in the over 55s, but this year I snuck into the 60s."

"Perhaps they think I've got reasonable pace in the 60s."

Cass has tried his hand at coaching over the years, and even mentored future Olympian Grant Schubert during

his junior days at Loxton, but playing the sport has always been the stalwart's passion.

He recalls the early days of playing in the backyard with his siblings, when playing for his country was nothing more than a dream.

"When I was a kid my older brother and sister were playing, and all I wanted was a hockey stick," he said.

"Once I got one all I'd do was play hockey, right from the start."

"When we were over there in Perth we had a team dinner night, where all the SA teams go out to dinner, and this year we had (current Kookaburra) Tom Wickham there speaking."

"Our age groups range from your 40s through

to the 75s, and someone asked Wickham why he keeps coming back to play. He just went 'well, I just f***** love hockey', which I thought was probably not what I would've put out to the crowd."

"But, I think that's probably the whole thing for me – I just love playing the game."

A farmer by trade, the Loxtonite is looking forward to playing in a world cup alongside the nation's best in his age group, and he has no plans on slowing down any time soon.

"This year being a world cup, a lot of people want to go and play," he said.

"There was one year I was going to Johannesburg and I

wasn't too sure if I wanted to go, and my wife said the same thing, so I didn't nominate that year."

"One bloke said I should've put my name down because I'd been on the edge of getting in."

"I'm so happy that I get to play in something like this, and I'm thinking I've got a bit of work to do next year."

"2005 is when I think I first went away with the South Australian team."

"I've made many, many friends and it's become a bit of an annual holiday in a way."

"For SA, we aren't great or overly strong. We always pick up a few players from interstate to fill in for our teams, so you get to know so many new people."



A LOCAL cricketer will receive one-on-one lessons from one of the state's best batsmen since the turn of the century after a standout performance with the ACA All-Stars on Friday night.

Waikerie Ramco youngster Flynn Andrew snaffled a \$1000 scholarship for his efforts last week, plus a mentorship opportunity with Dutch international and former Redback Tom Cooper.

Originally selected in the Murray Districts representative side, a late change saw the up-and-comer switch allegiances to the travelling team, in a move that would pay dividends for the 16-year-old.

"On the email we were all sent, there was a chance one or two of us might have to play for the masters," he said.

Kurt Miegel, who was one of the organisers, came around to us when we were getting ready and asked if anyone wanted to play for them, and you basically could hear crickets because nobody really wanted to.

"I thought I may as well do it, so I stuck my hand up."

Andrew would go on to play a pivotal role in the travelling side's victory, scoring an unbeaten 28 with the bat while also picking up the prized wicket of Riverland Cricketer of the Year Brad Rosenzweig.

He would also spend a long period of time at the crease with Cooper, who went on to post an unbeaten century, hitting some long bombs along the way.

"It was a really good night and a great experience," Andrew said.

"Out there he was telling me heaps of things and keeping me calm throughout everything, and if I made a mistake he wasn't hard on me or anything."

"Mostly he was saying 'don't try and overhit the ball'. Later on when I had my eye in a bit more I was trying to hit it further and a bit harder, but it wasn't coming off the bat as well as when I was warming up."

"He said to me 'you don't need to go 100 per cent power with no timing, it's more about the timing in your shot than anything else'."

"Then he hit that one right into the top row of the grandstand which was pretty nuts, and then another one straight back over the bowler's head for six."

The youngster had a bit of luck along the way, including a dropped catch from his brother Naish, which Flynn conceded was a "tough chance".

While he is still unsure as to what the \$1000 scholarship will go towards, the up-and-comer is keen to work with Cooper and make the most of the opportunity.

"I think it'll be training sessions, or some online video calls, or some recorded net sessions, and hopefully he will be able to pick up on a few things and help me out," he said.

"He was teaching me things out there, but it would be even better to get some more one-on-one time with him."

"Even playing for the masters it was still a good experience playing at a high level against the best from the Riverland and the Mallee."

Andrew went on to score a half-century the following day for Waikerie Ramco's senior side, opening the batting in his team's win over Monash.
