

## Minor injuries in car rollover at Waikerie

POLICE were called to the Sturt Highway, east of Murbko Road, at Stockyard Plain, south west of Waikerie, at about 3.45pm on Saturday following a single vehicle rollover.

The Toyota Hilux ended up on its roof in nearby scrub.

A police spokesperson said two occupants in the vehicle, a 58-year-old man, from Parafield Gardens, and a 67-year-old man,

from Paralowie, received minor injuries and were treated at the local hospital.

SA Ambulance, Waikerie CFS, and the Blanchetown SES also attended the incident.

## Two vehicle incidents at Waikerie last week No injury after ute hits parked caravan

EMERGENCY services attended two road incidents in the Waikerie area recently.

Police and the Waikerie CFS were called to an incident on the Sturt Highway at Lowbank, east of Waikerie at about 12.20pm, on Friday 11 October.

Police said a trailer that

had been attached to a vehicle went down an embankment in the area.

They said the driver and the occupants were not injured.

In the second incident, the elderly female driver of a sedan was taken to hospital for an assessment on Friday

after her car crashed into two rubbish bins and an unoccupied car in Waikerie's CBD.

Waikerie CFS, SA Ambulance, and police attended the scene in White Street.

Police said on Monday no expiation notices had been issued in relation to this incident.

A 58-YEAR-old woman escaped uninjured after the Nissan utility she

was driving crashed into a Stobie pole

and a parked caravan, at Morgan, in the early hours of Sunday morning.

Police said the woman, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle, was taken to hospital for a check-up.

They said investigations were continuing into the cause of the incident.

## Covid-19's impact still being felt on Field Days

RIVERLAND council has agreed to support one of the region's most iconic event by extending its loan repayments.

Berri Barmera Council recently allowed the Riverland Field Days to extend its loan and remain two repayments behind due to the lasting financial impact of Covid, leaving the event owning council a total of \$37,117.40.

Riverland Field Days fell behind the two \$18,558.70 six-monthly repayments during the beginning of Covid, and when the event had to be cancelled in 2021.

A motion was put to the Ordinary Council meeting on 28 September 2021, with the assumption that the Riverland Field Days would catch up on the repayments after the event held in 2022.

"We were hopeful that the 2022 Field Day would financially restore our resources, even with a great event, though this was not the case," a July 2024 email from Riverland Field Days organ-

isers said.

"We are looking at a smaller Field Days event again this year. With this in mind, we are hoping to be able to continue being two pay cycles behind."

At the September council meeting, it was agreed the Riverland Field Days would be allowed to remain two loan repayments behind, with the loan term extended from eight to nine years to allow the group to recover from the problems of Covid and remain financially viable.

"Like many businesses, organisations and committees, the Riverland Field Days endured some hardship during Covid, especially as they had to cancel both the 2020 and 2021 event," Berri Barmera Council CEO Tim Pfeiffer said.

"Allowing the Riverland Field Days to remain two loan repayments behind is a way for council to support this event, which provides significant economic benefit to the district."

Tianyu Wool, led by billionaire Qingnan Wen, has recently purchased numerous agricultural landholdings across Victoria.

The Advertiser reported a \$9.2m payment would be made for the Salena Estate sale.

Mr Whetstone said ensuring the winery returned to operation was crucial to the Riverland wine industry's overall recovery.

"I would like to think that we as a region will see the benefits of a new owner, and the connection between the new owner and this region needs to be harnessed," he said.

"It can't be understated how important it is for that relationship to grow, and give some certainty to an industry doing it tough."

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the situation "reinforces the need for government to support the inland wine sector through what is a major re-adjustment of the industry globally".

"The collapse of Salena Estate, leaving millions of litres of bulk wine effectively without a home (and) suppliers to be paid only five per cent of what they are owed is another devastating blow to growers and the Riverland wine industry more broadly," Mr Pasin said.



"Governments around the world have acted to support their growers to either exit the industry or move to alternative crops for the benefit of their regional economies and communities as global wine markets adjust to changing consumer behaviour. Without government support during the transition of the Australian wine sector, we will likely see an increase in insolvencies, each one reverberating throughout Australia's inland wine regions."

Salena Estate had entered into administration in February.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti said examination of arrangements between wineries and grape growers was required.

"While there is some good news with the local winemaking business being able to continue through the sale to a new owner, it is really unfortunate to read reports that some creditors will only receive 5c in the dollar," Dr Centofanti said.

"This is an ongoing problem that grape growers are unsecured creditors in normal contractual arrangements with wineries and really highlight the issues relating with the current commercial trading in the wine sector and renewed focus on the wine industry code of conduct."

"I have been calling on government to step up on this issue for over two years now. I reiterate my calls for government to immediately increase resources and expand the team of Rural Financial Councillors in South Australian and I strongly encourage growers and suppliers of Salena Estate to seek financial advice from the team at Rural Business Support.

## 100 years of Renmark North Primary School celebrated

THE centenary of Renmark North Primary School was celebrated by students, teachers, families and alumni last weekend, with generations of Riverlanders coming together to mark the milestone.

Renmark North Primary School hosted a weekend of community reflection and reminiscing, kicking off celebrations with the 65th continental last Friday, before holding a centenary dinner on Saturday night and finishing with a school open day on Sunday, including the showcase of classrooms filled with memorabilia.

Renmark North principal Mary Shannon said the event recognised "100 years of inspiring young minds, fostering a love for learning, and creating vibrant community".

"Each generation has contributed to the rich tapestry of our history, and it is a privilege to stand here today and reflect on what we have achieved together," she said.

"Throughout the years, Renmark North

has been a place where dreams take flight, students discover passions, and develop life-long friendships.

"Today is a time to recognise the incredible strength of our community and the connections we share — that's what makes our school truly special."

Classrooms decorated with memorabilia from the last 100 years were opened to the public on Sunday, along with an unveiling of a student time capsule, set to only be opened again in 2049.

"Our school has been changing the lives and futures of generations for 100 years," Renmark North Governing Council chairperson and former student Emma Mullin said.

"It has been a wonderful weekend of celebrations, and it has been really special witnessing the reconnections taking place, hearing the many stories and memories as reminiscing went into overdrive.

"Renmark North School holds a special place in many hearts — this school has always been more than a place of learning, it's a community that nurtures, inspires, and supports.

"It's a connected village that would probably have many other schools in awe — this centenary isn't just about looking back, but celebrating the legacy we are building."

Renmark Paringa Mayor and former Renmark North Primary School principal, Peter Hunter said the community was fortunate some took the "punt" to establish the school a century ago.

"I just want to say thank you to those before us that put up with so much so we can be here today," he said.

"There was also so many times throughout our history that parents and staff came together to make the place better, and improve what we offer to our children.

"It's a time today to talk about memories and remember those who helped us to get where we are... not just those in the 1920s, but those present throughout our lives."

## Council chat key to Coalition's housing plan

COUNCILS across Barker were among those consulted in formulating a new Coalition plan to boost home building numbers across Australia, Tony Pasin says.

The Liberal Barker MP says over the past two years the Coalition spoke to hundreds of local councils across the nation to discuss new housing supply constraints and practical ways to overcome these challenges.

"This consultation, including my own discussions with councils in Barker and across the nation, has made clear that one of the major impediments to new housing projects is the lack of funding support for critical enabling infrastructure," Mr Pasin said.

"Whilst it is not the traditional role of the Federal Government to fund enabling infrastructure like water, power, sewerage, and access roads, the scale of Labor's national housing crisis means the Coalition

will, on a time-limited basis, unlock necessary new housing supply and keep the Australian dream alive."

Under the Coalition's plan, the Federal Government would invest in shovel-ready infrastructure through a new housing infrastructure program.

Mr Pasin said an elected Coalition government would commit \$5 billion to get these projects moving, unlocking up to 500,000 homes to be delivered more quickly through a mixture of grants and concessional loans.

"We know there are hundreds of greenfield sites across the country ready for development, including here in Barker, but progress has been stalled due to a lack of funding for essential enabling infrastructure," he said.

"Our approach is focused on investing in enabling infrastructure to unlock the supply of shovel-ready new housing developments."

The funding will be offered on a 'use it or lose it' basis. This means if there is no progress on successful projects within 12 months of contracting, then the funding will be terminated.

"The Albanese Labor Government's housing crisis is failing Australians," Mr Pasin said.

"Labor's promise to build 1.2 million homes over five years has already failed, with industry leaders confirming a likely shortfall of more than 400,000 homes."

The Coalition has previously announced commitments to bring down demand and free up supply by reducing migration, a two-year ban on foreign investors and temporary residents purchasing existing homes in Australia, and capping the number of overseas students. Mr Pasin said these changes would free up over 100,000 homes for Australians over five years.

## Mobile Coverage audit 'not serious about blackspots'

AN audit utilising post office buildings and delivery vans to assess mobile coverage data will fail to highlight issues in regional communities, according to a senior Riverland politician.

The Federal Government last week announced that mobile coverage data is being collected by posties, as part of a pilot program under the Better Connectivity Plan for Regional and Rural Australia, with testing meant to cover a significant portion of the Riverland and capture important data to determine actual coverage and capacity of mobile network signals.

Renmark is set to be one of the locations where mobile-measurement devices, aimed to identify current blackspots, will be installed on post office locations and on delivery vans.

However, according to Barker MP Tony Pasin, the coverage of Australia Post fails to reach many regional areas where mobile signal is known to be an issue.

"Prior to the 2022 Federal election, Labor announced an investment of \$20m for an independent national audit of mobile coverage to establish an evidence baseline to guide future priorities, including using Australia Post trucks to measure signal," Mr Pasin said.

"I wrote to the Federal Minister for

Communications in June 2022 pointing out that Australia Post does not service many parts of regional Australia where mobile communications are an issue."

"I also highlighted that local communities are best placed to inform government of mobile service, because they live it every day."

"No one knows the locations of blackspots better than the people impacted by it on a daily basis."

"The fact that the main audit has taken over two years to commence underscores that this government is not serious about addressing mobile blackspots."

Minister for Communications Michelle Rowland said "the government understands that rural, regional and remote communities value reliable mobile coverage, and that every Australian deserves access to reliable mobile coverage regardless of where they live".

"The Albanese Government is delivering improved mobile coverage through our Better Connectivity Plan for Regional and Rural Australia," Ms Rowland said.

"The National Audit of Mobile Coverage will provide important national data to help target future investment."

"Engaging Australia Post in the audit, and leveraging its networks, will help to ensure we get a comprehensive picture of mobile coverage across the country."

# Anti-social behaviour in Berri on the rise

Meeting with the District's superintendent today to discuss the issue, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said he has a "concern for the whole region".

"As a regional centre, we are not seeing an increase presence of police on our beat," he said.

"We have the Renmark police station that is closed, we have more pressure put on our front-line responders — filling out paperwork more-so than being out there visible on the beat."

"And this is a concern right across the

"SAPOL are having issues with recruitment (and) they are having issues with retention of police officers, and in the regions, it is becoming more and more evident than ever that there is more pressure put on fewer officers to do the job of what should be one of many."

## Pasin calls out lack of frost support

THE state's primary industries minister is "taking action" to support wine grape growers that suffered frost damage, however, the region's Federal MP says local producers are feeling "death by a thousand cuts".

Barker MP Tony Pasin last week criticised a lack of direct state government support for wine grape growers that suffered damage from recent frost conditions.

"The recent frost event resulted in significant losses for many across the Mallee, Riverland, Barossa and Mid-North and for South Australian Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development (Clare Scriven) to deny support to wine grape growers in particular is simply ludicrous," Mr Pasin said.

"The minister knows very well that insurance against frost is not an option for most growers at the best of times, let alone when so many are already selling off

assets just to stay afloat.

Minister Scriven's lack-lustre announcement about satellite mapping was nothing more than deflection coming from a government (that) has refused to support wine grape growers through one of the most significant shifts in market conditions in decades and is now running away from offering much-needed assistance for those staring down the barrel of reduced volumes as a result of frost damage."

However, Ms Scriven said numerous initiatives could be utilised for growers to access current support measures.

"I am acutely aware of the significant financial and wellbeing challenges in regional communities, resulting from the various compounding challenges our farmers are facing, and continue to be in conversations with producers and industry associations around the state," Ms Scriven said.

"The State Government is taking action on a number of fronts, including the activation of the Drought Advisory Group and convening of regional roundtables to hear directly from industry about impacts that are being felt by producers across the state due to drought, frost and other weather conditions, and to provide advice to government on support measures.

"Immediate assistance is available to help grape growers via a range of measures, including the Family and Business (FaB) mentors program. Funding has also been made available for immediate grants of up to \$1500 through Rural Business Support for eligible grape growers to cover day-to-day costs, and is available in conjunction with Rural Financial Counselling.

"These grants aim to alleviate stress for grape growers who rely on agriculture for their primary source of income and have felt significant impacts from market disruption, severe weather events or natural disasters."

## Leader prescribes community connection to Renmark tragedy

A PACIFIC Island community leader says further practices focused on cultural integration are needed to help migrant workers settle in the local community.

Joe Koumera, 42, was working in the Riverland as a seasonal fruit-picker as part of the Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) Scheme, before he went missing in the Renmark area on Sunday 13 October.

After launching a search, SA police discovered Mr Koumera's body in the water at 6pm on Monday 14 October. Though police are still investigating the circumstance surrounding the man's death, and a report will be prepared for the Coroner, it is believed Mr Koumera had been drinking with friends shortly before the incident.

Pacific Islands Council of South Australia president Tukini Tavui said there were many challenges PALM Scheme participants face on their move to Australia, believing that alcohol contributed to the high number of 46 deaths in the program that have occurred in the last two years.

"The first component, that I have been speaking on for a number of years now, is the recruitment process," he said.

"The employers and the labour senders from each country are focused on skills and work capacity... but, the question that needs to be asked is 'how are they being identified as appropriate candidates to come and work in Australia'.

"Though they might have a strong work ethic, and skills, the component that does not receive a high level of attention, is the level of maturity and the character for the candidate that are coming to work in Australia... do they have the capacity to manage themselves in a foreign country, to manage being so far away from home?"

"The level of support regarding cultural awareness also needs to be addressed then. The employer does talk to them about cultural difference in Australia and access to information, which is a start, but it's not sufficient — how can you fit into the culture if you don't understand the culture?"

"These information sessions and training (about culture) need to happen on arrival, not once, but regularly."

Though Mr Tavui said managing the issues in the workplace is easier to tackle, it was "afterwork, that social space, where the problem is significant" and where workers can begin to have problems with alcohol.

"They are left to their own devices," he said.

"That's why those early stages of their move to Australia is so important and critical — it sets them up to establish and integrate in the community."

"Employers can definitively help with this, discuss the activities they can do outside of the workplace and connect them with people, and we have seen some do it incred-

ibly well."

"There have been a number of initiatives employers have taken to mitigate (alcohol consumption), but we need to create self-agency and the workers can manage the adjustment. If we have good leaders and good structure, issues can be dealt with, and we have groups in PALM around Australia that are a testament to this."

Though combating the challenges that arise for PALM Scheme participants is a work-in-progress, Mr Tavui said the Riverland community could also lend a helping hand.

"These are communal people in which living in a community is critical for them," he said.

"These workers love to be part of things, help out, be part of a church or a local sports club, so, the general community can be really beneficial."

"The success of the program is not just what the (participants in the program) do at work, but how they fit in the community and that can only happen if there is a collaborative approach."

## THE YEARS GO BY

### Going once, twice... sold

THE news confirming the Salena Estate winery had been sold – somewhat ironically to a Chinese buyer – is the latest headline in an ongoing story many across the Riverland have kept a keen eye on.

It is also a saga that has been somewhat illustrative of the last two years for the Riverland wine industry as a whole.

There was a time when much local excitement surrounded Salena Estate and the modern, Mediterranean styled, easy-to-drink wines they were producing. Equally exciting was the opening of the Cucina 837 restaurant where – at the risk of alienating some sections of the audience – possibly the Riverland's best pizzas were served for a time.

It would have been during this period where wine sales into China were also very beneficial, not just for Salena Estate but evidently South Australia as a whole.

However, the imposition of China's tariffs sent quick and resounding shockwaves across the state's wine industry, resulting in a winery such as Salena Estate – which many would have considered as 'in vogue' among Riverland producers – now being sold to overseas interests.

So, what effects will this have on the rest of the Riverland?

As pointed out by our local State MP in today's edition of the Pioneer, perhaps the most concerning aspect of Salena Estate's sale for the region is the revelation that unsecured creditors may receive just 5c on the dollar for the amounts they are owed.


Without gazing into a crystal ball-esque list of such unsecured creditors, it would still stand to reason a decent proportion of them would be locally based.

Therefore, while a sale was necessary to progress the situation, this outcome could result in further dollars exiting the Riverland economy, from businesses that are already struggling due to the wine industry picture.

Another less-than-ideal aspect of the sale is that the current stockpile of wine will still need to be sold off by administrators, although money reportedly being put aside to ensure redundant employees receive full entitlements will be a relief for those families.

As touched upon further in today's edition – by the region's federal member – does this strengthen the case for economic support to be provided to growers in a region like that Riverland that has seemingly taken punch after punch to the value of its wine production?

While we may only be seeing a somewhat isolated case when it comes to Salena Estate at the moment, without mitigation and support, the closures and sales will start becoming more frequent.



Dedicated, friendly, and community-minded, former Renmark, Riverland and South Australian distinguished rural journalist, Arch Grosvenor, was born in Victor Harbour, in April 1911. His family were early settlers in Encounter Bay and the young Arch began working life sweeping floors for the local newspaper, the Victor Harbor Times. His talent for writing was soon recognised and he rose rapidly through the ranks, becoming rural journalist and editor of the Times. A keen and talented sportsman, he rode his horse on Saturdays from Victor to Adelaide to play cricket for Glenelg. In the early hours of Sunday 3 April 1938, Arch was riding the overnight 'mail' bus to Renmark on his first visit to the Upper Murray (now, the Riverland). He came as editor of The Murray Pioneer, a position he loved and excelled in until his departure in 1965. At Renmark, he and wife Judy, from Maitland, were associated with most aspects of community and sporting life. He was a councillor on the Corporation for six years, a Justice of the Peace, and a delegate to the Murray Valley Development League. His diligence observing and recording both his own activities and community events laid basis for his writing books of significance to Renmark and SA at large: The Murray Pioneer's Flood Diary (1957); the Irrigators chapter in The Book of the Murray (1975); and Red Mud to Green Oasis (1979). ### River navigation sticking point

OVER the last couple of months after getting the PS Industry stuck at Settlers Bend, below Lock 5, I have been trying to get something done about navigation issues on the River Murray.

I have been met with a complete lack of interest by the State Government, and the Department of Environment and Water (DEW) handballing it to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT).

They say that because in 1995 the River Murray was omitted from the list of harbours and ports in SA, that it is no longer any government department's concern.

We currently have houseboat companies not allowing vessels to go below Lock 5 as they end up getting stuck at Settlers Bend and the SES is called out to assist.

The PS Industry volunteer group has taken time off from their normal daily lives to take the vessel to Mannum for the celebrations of the PS Marion in November and while it looks like we will have enough water at this stage, it would be a complete shame to only get to Settlers Bend and have to turn around.

There were many vessels who could not get to Wentworth

for the Junction Rally in June because of Warrakoo only being 400mm deep in sections.

So the PS Industry, the Oscar W and other smaller vessels missed out on a great opportunity to put money into the historic vessels' coffers for their upkeep.

Now they are spending upwards of \$5 million to run up to 200 megalitres a day down Bookmark Creek to make it canoe accessible and a habitat for native fish.

Bookmark Creek runs out right into the middle of Settlers Bend and when asked about the impacts of this, there was no answer from DIT or DEW, as they hadn't considered the long-term impacts.

I can tell you the impacts will be a complete obstruction of what little channels remain there, with a lot of the water bypassing it already to go down Pike Creek and already further reducing the flow down the main channel.

When are we finally going to say enough is enough and get the government to fix up the dozen or so shallow spots on the river to allow navigation from Goolwa to Mildura, as was originally in the 1915 agreement between states?

This is slowly getting worse every year and it won't be long before we are locked above each lock and weir, even though pool levels are normal.

This is costing money in lost tourism, as houseboats cruising to different towns to spend more money does not happen anymore.

I am all for environmental efforts to assist in helping the native fish thrive once more, but how much of the \$5 million is to allow canoeists down a small creek, when we have hundreds of kilometres of creeks above Renmark?

I do not want to see navigation on the River Murray cease to exist unless we have floods.

It used to be the Kings Highway, and for the sake of a dozen or so spots it could be again.

# Hopes rain will break drought pattern

THE organisation representing farmers in the Mallee is hoping the arrival of the first decent downpour of rain since January has broken a pattern of drought conditions.

Mallee Sustainable Farming (MSF) delivers Research Development and Extensions services to farmers based in low-rainfall areas of the Riverland, Murray Mallee, north west Victoria and south west New South Wales.

MSF communications and extension manager Tanja Morgan, who is based in Geranium in the Murray Mallee, said for growers who had sowed their crops a bit later in the season, last week's rain may have been beneficial.

"For anyone who still has some green crops, it would probably help fill the grain that is there a little bit better," she said.

"But in terms of improving the outcome of a poor year, we are way too late for that."

"It will only help whatever is not

yet ripe to finish properly."

According to the Bureau of Meteorology, 32mm of rain fell between 9pm on Thursday, until 3am on Friday, at Loxton.

A total of 25.2mm of rain was recorded at Renmark between 3pm on Thursday, to 9am on Friday, and Glue Pot Station, at Waikerie, received 29.2mm of rain on Friday.

Ms Morgan said for farmers who had already started harvesting their crops, the rain had arrived far too late and was probably more of a "nuisance".

She said some grain producers had also started making hay and too much rain could cause damage.

But Ms Morgan said farmers would welcome more rain in summer to replenish the soil moisture for next year.

She said the Bureau of Meteorology rainfall records indicated many Mallee farming areas in SA had experienced six months of drought conditions.

Ms Morgan said she had experienced her lowest rainfall season

on record on her grain and hay-producing property at Geranium.

"It has pretty much written off the growing season," she said.

Ms Morgan said farmers that were able to put in place good practices, such as storing fallow moisture with good summer weed control, had managed to sow early.

She said those that had established seed on better soil types would have had some crops come up early.

But Ms Morgan said the devastating frost last month wiped out a lot of the wheat, canola, pulses and some barley.

She said it would assist farmers if Australian governments publicly acknowledged a drought.

State and federal governments no longer officially make drought declarations.

"It is important that governments acknowledge what farmers are going through," Ms Morgan said.

She said she understood why they no longer made drought dec-

larations.

"I see why they do it as they don't want it to come with requests for a hand out," Ms Morgan said.

However it is really important that farmers feel validated with what they are going through and the flow on effect it has on rural communities.

"In the past, exceptional circumstances have been declared after two years of drought."

Ms Morgan encouraged farmers going through financially tough times to reach out for business support through rural financial counselling.

"That would be the first point of

call," she said.

"When those services are used a lot, that gets fed back to government departments and can trigger a response in terms of validating current hardship."

Farmers in NSW and Victoria will donate hay to struggling livestock producers across SA.

Aussie Hay Runners, operated by the Heyfield Lions Club, in Gippsland, Victoria, is expected to arrive in Tailem Bend early next month.

The trucks will then deliver hay to farmers in areas that include Morgan, Mt Mary, Loveday, Parilla, Truro and the Mid North.

# Key issues heard at Bush Summit

CHALLENGES surrounding increasing power and agricultural input costs were among the main topics at a recent regional forum.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone was among attendees of the recent Advertiser Bush Summit, held in Maclaren Vale.

Mr Whetstone said the forum provided an opportunity to highlight the key issues facing regional communities.

"The Bush Summit is aimed to give regional Australia a platform, and particularly for (regional) South Australia," he said.

"It highlights where we see blockages, (and) where we see government intervention having an adverse impact."

Mr Whetstone said difficulties resulting from increasing farming input costs were highlighted at the forum.

"The cost of producing food now has gotten to a point where it's really impacting on the viability of a farm," he said.

"There's input costs and power costs, and sometimes they can pass the costs on, but a lot of the times they can't."

"That's a real conundrum for farmers, and what does it mean for the future of farming?"

Mr Whetstone said increased support was needed for South Australian farmers to grow international trade and lower energy costs.

"A lot (of discussion) was focused around trade," he said.

"If the farmer is going to continue to invest... they need to have the confidence they can do that."

"The majority of the primary industries have been proactive, they've put in solar power, more efficient pumps... doing everything they can in the shed."

"Everyone's playing their role to reduce costs, the only one who isn't playing that role is the government."

Mr Whetstone said discussions at the event illustrated more information was also needed for local wine grape growers beginning preparations for the next vintage.

"I have concerns we aren't addressing the issue, and what varietals do the wineries – or our global trading partners want?" he said

"There needs to be more of that information being given to the grower."

## Survey for SA ageing plan

"This is why we want to hear from South Australians aged 50-plus on what ageing well means to them and what issues they are facing," Ms Cook said.

"By taking a few minutes to complete the survey, people will contribute to shaping policies that directly affect so many of us, help to identify what's working well and what needs improvement, and ensure their voice is heard in planning for the future of ageing well in South Australia."

These insights will help ensure that future government policies and initiatives align with the needs and aspirations of South Australia's diverse ageing population.

## Rural ambulance volunteers struggle with birth emergencies

VOLUNTEER ambulance officers (VAOs) are vital to Australia's healthcare system, particularly in rural and remote communities like the Riverland, however, new research has revealed that many VAOs frequently feel unprepared and under resourced when faced with unplanned out-of-hospital births.

Although unplanned out-of-hospital births are rare (less than one per cent), VAOs must be prepared to provide critical care in these high-risk situations. However, new Edith Cowan University (ECU) research has revealed that many VAOs frequently feel unprepared in such emergencies.

The study, led by ECU PhD Candidate Michella Hill, investigated Australian VAOs' perceptions of their training, experience and confidence regarding unplanned out-of-hospital births, and planned homebirths with obstetric emergencies where ambulance assistance is required.

"There are more than 7000 volunteer ambulance officers in Australia," Ms Hill said.

"They are unsung heroes in rural and

remote areas providing a vital service, with some communities relying solely on VAOs in medical emergencies.

"However, our research has shown that these volunteers are facing significant challenges when attending unplanned out-of-hospital births."

The study found many rural VAOs felt anxious and uncomfortable attending unplanned out-of-hospital births and obstetric emergencies, perceiving they may have limited ability to manage complications due to a lack of education, training, exposure to births, and a narrow scope of practice.

VAOs were also concerned about the availability of backup from a registered paramedic, and the reliability of telecommunications in remote areas for online clinical advice and support.

"Given the distances to hospital care in regional Australia, these findings have serious implications for patient safety," Ms Hill said.

The study identified four areas of concern, including:

- Confidence and anxiety where a lack of education and exposure to birth resulted in low confidence.
- Most participants reported significant anxiety attending obstetric callouts and explained under-utilisation of specific obstetric and neonatal skills meant skills decline was an issue.
- Limitations to scope of practice and medical equipment: All participants described the VAO scope of practice as restricted. If complications occur during childbirth, guidelines specify that VAOs seek assistance from a senior support officer and/or provide rapid transportation to definitive care (hospital). However, there was considerable apprehension regarding availability of senior support officers in rural areas.
- Logistical and communication difficulties: Long distances to hospital care, potentially limited backup during emergencies and possible unavailability of aeromedical retrieval increased perceived complexity of cases. Telecommunication 'black holes' created a sense of further isolation for VAOs requiring support from senior clinicians.
- Community expectations versus service delivery: There was a perception that many members of the public were unaware VAOs often staffed the local ambulance and expected VAOs to have the same scope of practice as a registered

paramedic.

The NEONATE in VR simulation program (Novel Educational Overview of the Neonatal Apgar and Treatment Experience in Virtual Reality) is specifically designed to provide virtual exposure to a neonate born out of hospital.

The training helps refresh essential skills in assessing and managing newborns, including the one-minute Apgar score taken right after birth. It's designed to strengthen basic knowledge, helping users understand what's normal, and not normal, for neonates and the clinical management to ensure the best outcomes.

"The VR program offers consistent feedback without needing an educator, making it a flexible tool that can fit into any schedule," Ms Hill said.

"Given the medical profession has embraced VR for surgical training, it seems timely that paramedicine adopts similar innovations for clinical education."

The NEONATE in VR simulation program is expected to be available later this year.

# Council hears call for extra road funding

A RIVERLAND council has been asked to support calls for expanded funding to maintain and upgrade regional roads.

Loxton Waikerie councillors at last week's general meeting noted a letter received by Wattle Range Council Mayor Des Noll regarding the condition of South Australia's regional road network.

In the letter, addressed to South Australia Premier Peter Malinauskas and shared with different state councils, Mr Noll explained the current condition and disrepair of several Department of Infrastructure (DIT) roads within his area and urged other councils to support a signed letter, asking the State Government for a DIT maintenance budget increase.

"I am advocating for a significant increase to the Department of Transport's annual maintenance budget to clear a \$1.9b backlog in road maintenance and retaining the

department's ongoing maintenance funding at a sustainable level," Mr Noll said.

"We are also advocating for the return of suitably qualified and authorised department resources to the regions to oversee the condition of the regional road network and provide greater oversight over private contractor performance."

Loxton Waikerie council director of infrastructure services Greg Perry, in response to the letter said "most DIT roads in the Loxton Waikerie district are currently in reasonable condition".

"Road edge maintenance is becoming and will continue to be an issue with the larger heavy vehicles that are now common on most of the DIT roads, and may mean that future road edge sealing is required," he said.

"The worst DIT road in our council area would be Bookpurnong Road from Loxton to Berri, which is very undulating and rough, particularly across the top of Bookpurnong Hill.

"As traffic increases, attention is also needed at a number of intersections that lead on to Bookpurnong Road, close to Loxton."

Mr Perry said "expenditure and capital work in future years will need to be increased to ensure roads are kept at current levels".

"The major upgrade this financial year is the last stage of Billiat Road to council's

boundary with Southern Mallee, widening and resealing a 16km section with the assistance of Roads to Recovery component of the Special Local Roads Program federal funding," he said.

"Council has started some of the roadside preparation for civil works which will begin in the coming months."

With the upcoming upgrades to different roads across council, approval times between the proposed repairs and the start of civil works, can vary between projects.

"There are many factors to be considered such as current condition, vehicle numbers, types and sizes of vehicles, the purpose of the road (local commuter, tourism, heavy vehicle freight use), overall costs, timing and available funds," Mr Perry said.

"Generally speaking, projects like this will be considered as part of the budgeting process ahead of each financial year and are endorsed as part of the Annual Business Plan."

## South Australian driver training set for major overhaul

A MAJOR overhaul of the state's driver training procedures, covering new Riverland drivers, is part of a new proposed bill to Parliament aiming to improve motorist skills, tackle corruption and predatory behaviour.

Driver training laws are set for a major reform under the proposed bill, which will see practical driving tests for Class C (car) licences start to be carried out by government examiners instead of private operators, with the State Government committing

to strengthen industry standards, enhance accountability and improve safety outcomes for new drivers.

The new proposed legislative change include:

- ❑ Competency Based Training Assessment (the logbook method) will have a new format, with learner drivers required to pass a practical driving test with a government examiner to obtain their provisional licence.
- ❑ Driving instructors will be required to

demonstrate good character, provide evidence of medical fitness and will be subject to enhanced practical driving and theory tests to enter the industry and maintain accreditation.

- ❑ Industry standards of behaviour will be formalised into a Code of Practice with sanctions for breaches.
- ❑ Mandatory cameras and GPS will be required to be installed in all driver training vehicles, providing protection for both the trainer and student.
- ❑ Instructors will be required to increase transparency by disclosing information in writing about their payments, fees and services.
- ❑ Additional learning resources and consumer information will be developed to help better inform and prepare parents, industry members and the learner driver.

"The changes will create a safer environment for learner drivers and drivers, while cleaning up the corruption, misconduct and low standards in the industry," said Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis.

"A competent driver training industry will lead to more skilled, competent and safer motorists on our roads, improving safety for everyone."

"Driving students will benefit from more affordable tests and they can have confidence that they will receive higher standards of training for their money."

"The seriousness of the misconduct and corruption in the industry requires practical driving tests to return to government hands," said Mr Koutsantonis.

Private operators under the current outsourced program will be able to continue delivering driver training, but with new and higher mandatory industry standards.

A recent survey showed the median price for on-road testing was \$319, with some instructors and businesses charging in excess of \$300 and some charging \$400 or more.

The proposed reform would lower the cost of a driving test to a standardised fee of \$240.

A two-year transition period with industry engagement is anticipated if legislation is approved and authorised examiners can submit their test and application for a Government Examiner position.

A review into the industry by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport sparked the upcoming reforms, with the department noticing the necessity to strengthen current industry standards and address serious issues of inappropriate and criminal behaviour.

At the moment, South Australia is one of two states that have fully outsourced training and examination functions.

Heavy vehicle training is set to remain within the private sector, adding cameras and GPS tracking with the introduction of a mandatory code of practice.

# Another steam locomotive for Cobdogla

THE Cobdogla Steam Friends Society took delivery of its latest acquisition on Sunday 6 October with the arrival at their Loveday Workshops of a 1938 Perry Locomotive.

This locomotive was manufactured by Perry Engineering, in Mile End, as the second of a class of 18 locomotives built for the sugar mills in Queensland.

The loco was in service for only 20 years before being retired to a playground. It was then purchased for preservation.

After many years as a static exhibit on a private railway in Junee, NSW, the loco will be the

society's third major restoration project.

The first project was the restoration of the big ploughing engine George William, donated to the society by former Barmera identity George Woolmer.

The current project is the soon-to-be-completed steam roller donated to the society by the Adelaide City Council. This project has been underway for a number of years and involved the complete strip down to component parts for rebuilding.

Currently the boiler has been made ready for steam testing, and once this has been completed, the

steam roller will be reassembled and ready for a return to the museum when it is reopened.

The Steam Friends have formed a syndicate of members and friends to fund the purchase and restoration of the Perry loco. To date well over half the funds required have been raised, with shares being \$250 each. Shares are still available for purchase by friends of the museum.

The Steam Friends have not been idle since SA Water closed the museum due to the flood. Members have been working from their Loveday Workshops on a number of projects, including

a contract restoration of a Steam Traction Engine for the Franklin Harbour District Council. This project is also nearly completed.

The members have used the time since the flood to improve the workshops at Loveday and are currently rebuilding a front-end loader that suffered an electrical fire earlier this year.

The workshops are fitted out as a heavy engineering repair depot, with suitable machinery such as a big lathe, milling machine, shaper and surface grinder, 3 ton and 5 ton overhead gantry cranes and other machinery, to enable the members to undertake most of

the various jobs needed in restoring heavy machinery. As can be imagined, parts for old machinery are no longer on the shelf, so all this machinery enables members to fabricate or repair whatever is needed for the restorations, and the old-time skills to do this work are kept alive.

The Steam Friends are hoping that the negotiations currently being held between SA Water and the Berri Barmera Council will mean the Crown lease for the museum will be handed to council to manage, with the Steam Friends being the operating body for the museum.



## RFDS receives major new investment

RIVERLANDERS needing to be transported to Adelaide in emergency medical situations will benefit from new funding for the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

The State Government last week announced a \$500m investment in a new agreement with the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS SA/NT) to significantly boost aircraft services and staff, enabling faster patient transfers.

The new funding will increase RFDS operational capacity to four aircraft during the daytime and three for overnight flights, including a dedicated emergency response aircraft.

The 10-year contract is part of a government-funded partnership to assist health services around the state.

The funding will also enable patients to be picked up faster, with new KPIs more than halving the target response time of take-off for priority 1 and 2 regional fixed wing retrievals and Inter Hospital Transfers contracted to the RFDS through SA Ambulance Service (SAAS).

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said "this huge new investment means patients in emergencies in our regions will be able to be retrieved for life-saving care faster than ever before".

"We want every South Australian, no matter where they are in the state, to have access to efficient and high-quality health care," Mr Picton said.

The RFDS frontline team will increase by 23.4 FTE staff, including nurses, pilots, engineers, clinical support and operations communications staff. Importantly, two dedicated nurses will be stationed 24/7 at the Adelaide Patient Transfer Facility, ensuring continuous patient care while keeping RFDS flight nurses ready to fly.

Under the new agreement, aircrafts have to be airborne within 20 minutes of being assigned to an emergency, reducing the previous 45-minute target by half, and the updated rapid response capability will allow SAAS to quickly access areas that previously required longer helicopter flights, dramatically enhancing access to critical care.

Royal Flying Doctor Service SA/NT Chairman Peter de Cure AM said "we are honoured to continue what is a remarkable partnership with the South Australian Government."

"This new agreement will take this partnership to almost 40 years of collaboration and service, and Together, SAAS MedSTAR retrieval teams and RFDS aeromedical teams will deliver exceptional care for thousands of South Australians every year," Mr de Cure said.

Each flight will be staffed with RFDS nurses for inter-hospital urgent transfers or SAAS MedSTAR critical care teams of doctors, nurses and/or paramedics for retrieval cases.

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

# Clarrie coming to promote dental health

STUDENTS and aged care residents in two Riverland towns will be able to access free dental care through a national initiative.

The Australian Dental Foundation (ADFi) will spend three weeks visiting schools and aged care facilities in Berri and Renmark with the dual surgery mobile dental clinic known as 'Clarrie'.

ADFi chairman Greg Miller said working with children, aged care residents and

vulnerable groups such as those living with homelessness, disability, or in regional areas, was a priority.

"Taking dental care to children at their school is the most effective way to make sure our kids get the check-ups and treatment they need and it's also a great way to educate the students and their families about the importance of regular brushing and dental care," Dr Miller said.

The mobile clinic will be set up at Our

Lady of the River until 25 October, then at Berri Secondary College and Berri Primary School, with portable equipment for outreach to aged care in Berri and Renmark.

South Australia recorded a total of 8446 hospitalisations due to dental conditions in 2022-23.

Dr Miller said the rates increased in regional areas.

"Almost a quarter of the admissions, about 2000, were for children aged 5 to 9.

I think that would shock most people who would probably expect that older people would be more likely to be admitted for dental conditions," he said.

"Last year we visited about 250 schools, childcare centres and kindergartens in SA, in the most disadvantaged areas. We provide checkups and treatments for children at no out-of-pocket expense for families, so we can reach the children who need us, before they end up in hospital."



## \$48m investment to support disengaged students

WITH the aim to ensure more students with complex needs continue their studies, a \$48m state government investment is set to deliver major reform to Riverland public high schools.

Funding additional staff, support for students, and ensuring a follow-up monitoring of student engagement and progress of those who have disengaged from school, the investment will develop a state-wide delivery of Tailored Learning, originally a support for students called Flexible Learning Options (FLO) that operated in SA since 2007.

Supporting secondary students from years 8 up to the age of 21, the \$48.3m initiative will be delivered over three years following successful trials in 12 public high schools, which have seen students receive additional in-school support to help them overcome adversity and re-engage with their education.

A 2020 review of suspensions, exclusions and expulsions in South Australian government schools recommended the decommissioning of FLO, finding that, in many cases, it appears to compound student disengagement and segregation.

Currently, there are 4360 students that access the FLO program, at 85 schools.

The re-designed model gives schools greater oversight of the programs offered, puts more individualised supports in place for each student based on their needs and challenges, and encourages supports to be delivered within the school setting rather

than offsite and away from their peers.

The resulting learning plan, developed in consultation with the student based on their specific needs, skills and interests, will be delivered through:

- Part-time or full-time school study
- Vocational courses
- Online learning
- Work placement
- Volunteering
- Individual wellbeing and social programs

"This is an important step forward in supporting some of our most vulnerable students to ensure they continue learning – making sure school works for every young person," Minister for Education, Training, and Skills Blair Boyer said.

"We have long recognised that education is not one-size-fits all and this program is about reconnecting young people with their learning in a way that works best for them.

"The best place to provide these supports is in a highly inclusive school setting where they can remain connected with their classmates and their teachers."

## Grants available to support Youth Week events

GRANTS for Riverland community groups, non-government organisations, and local councils to run events and activities for next year's SA Youth Week are now open for applications.

SA Youth Week is the largest annual celebration of young people and youth culture in South Australia and in 2025, SA Youth Week will be held from April 9 to 17.

The SA Youth Week Grants provide funding of up to \$2500 for organisations across the state to run youth-focused events that encourage 12 to 25 year olds to participate in their local communities.

The grants will support young people to be involved in the planning and delivery of activities that celebrate youth culture and provide opportunities for young

people to express their ideas and views, showcase their skills and talents, and act on issues that affect their lives.

The grants also aim to see the wider community listen to young people, and acknowledge and celebrate the positive contributions that young people make to their communities.

Total funding available this year is up to \$70,000 – with 60 per cent of the funding being available for events in regional areas of the state.

"I encourage grassroots organisations to get on board and apply for these grants which provide an opportunity to put on some innovative events and activities for our young people," Human Services Minister Nat Cook said.

"This year the individual funding amount available to organisations for these

grants has increased from \$2000 to \$2500.

"Organisations have until late November to apply, and then, for the first time, young people from my Youth Ministerial Advisory Council will form part of the grants assessment panel, meaning young people themselves have a say in the judging process.

"I encourage organisations to embrace the opportunity to apply for these grants, join the celebrations and play their part in positively impacting the future of young South Australians."

Applications for the grants close at 3pm, on 29 November.

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# Driver training laws to receive major change

A MAJOR overhaul of the state's driver training procedures, covering new Riverland drivers, is part of a new proposed bill to Parliament aiming to improve motorist skills, tackle corruption and predatory behaviour.

Driver training laws are set for a major reform under the proposed bill, which will see practical driving tests for Class C (car) licences will start to be carried out by government examiners instead of private operators, with the State Government committing to strengthen industry standards, enhance accountability and improve safety outcomes for new drivers.

The new proposed legislative change include:

- ❑ Competency Based Training Assessment (the logbook method) will have a new format, with learner drivers required to pass a practical driving test with a government examiner to obtain their provisional licence.
- ❑ Driving instructors will be required to demonstrate good character, provide evidence of medical fitness and will be subject to enhanced practical driving and theory tests to enter the industry and

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## Public consultation open for review of South Australian environmental policy

THE EPA is proposing important changes to ensure the quality of Riverland water environments in a review of the Environment Protection (Water Quality) Policy 2015, with aims to provide improved protection of groundwater systems against pollution.

The EPA is also proposing to recognise cultural and spiritual values in South Australian waters, with the revamped policy aiming to acknowledge that waters in South Australia have significance to First Nations Peoples that goes beyond primary industry uses, drinking water uses, and aquatic ecosystems.

The consultation, which opened last week, outlines five areas for proposed policy improvement, including:

- ❑ Improved protection of all underground (including saline) waters for future use.

❑ Updating the policy to reference the latest Australian and New Zealand Guidelines for Fresh and Marine Water Quality, which includes recognition of cultural and spiritual values of waters.

❑ Align the Water Quality Policy with the Planning and Design Code requirements in the Mount Lofty Ranges Water Supply Catchment, allowing the EPA to require that development applications referred to it have a neutral or beneficial effect on water quality.

❑ Align the Water Quality Policy with the updated Code of Practice for Vessel and Facility Management (Marine and Inland Waters) 2019 (Vessel Management Code).

❑ Updating schedules to ensure best practice, including: schedule two – class one pollutants, schedule three – class two pollutants, and schedule four – codes, standards, guidelines and other documents.

“Water quality in South Australia is protected by the Environment Protection Act 1993 and the environment protection poli-

cies made under it,” EPA science services acting director Steven Sergi said.

“The EPA uses the Environment Protection (Water Quality) Policy 2015 as the primary policy to regulate water quality as it provides the most specific and detailed protection of the state’s surface, marine and underground waters.

“The recognition and acknowledgement of cultural and spiritual values will also be reflected in a revised policy following consultation and submissions.

“Climate change is expected to place increased reliance on our groundwater systems for a range of purposes, which places an increasing need for water in those environments to be protected within reasonable and practicable limitations.

“I encourage all interested stakeholders to have their say and participate in the consultation.”

## Preventing dog attacks on local posties

THE State Government released a new campaign, aimed to prevent dog attacks on postal workers, including those in the Riverland.

As part of a joint campaign from Australia Post and the State Government, more than 314,000 registered South Australian dog owners will receive letters including dog bite information and recommendations to prevent further incidents.

The new campaign features Buddy – the dog bite safety educator – who looks to deliver practical safety messages to protect SA’s posties and reduce the overall number of dog bites in the state.

Additionally, free bumper stickers and collectible dog safety leaflets will be available to collect from South Australian post offices, with the letters being delivered free

of charge to all registered dog owners.

Deputy Premier Susan Close said “Dogs are loved by most South Australians, but the reality is that hundreds of people are bitten by them each year in our state.”

“Posties do a very important job and they should be safe to do their work,” Dr Close said.

“This campaign is not about demonising or stigmatising any dog, it is about raising awareness on how to keep yourself, other people and our dogs safe.

“We love dogs, and it is important to protect them as well. That’s why some of the safety messaging contains information about what we as humans can do to recognise how we might be in danger of being bitten.”

In the first half of 2024, 114 postal workers were attacked by dogs in South Australia, with 503 people attending public hospitals due to attacks in the last year.

Figures also showed more than 1000 posties are attacked across Australia each year.

According to the State Government, 1200 dog attacks were reported to South Australian councils last year but there are concerns that many more incidents were unreported.

Postal workers have been caring for their safety and according to Australia Post, will avoid delivering to a home or business unless it is safe for them to do so and will stop delivering to an address until there is no more danger.

Any dog-related incidents are reported to local councils to ensure enforcement is actioned.

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# Recognising Riverland war widows on their special day

LAST Saturday 19 October officially marked a special day of dedicated commemoration for the National War Widows Day in South Australia.

It was only last year, in March 2023, that the South Australian Government first declared 19 October as War Widows Day, following strong advocacy from the Australian War Widows (SA) Inc.

The occasion is now commemorated by states and territories nationally each year to recognise and pay tribute to the strength, courage, and unwavering commitment of those who have lost a spouse or partner through service for the

Australian Defence Force.

One Riverland war widow, Stella Reinertsen, has a special reason to honour and commemorate War Widows Day 2024, because of the recent recovery of the Vietnam War service and campaign medals earned by her late husband, Christopher, during his deployment to Vietnam as a Royal Australian Regiment infantryman in 1967.

Riverland Vietnam Veterans has been assisting Mrs Reinertsen to be granted a full set of her husband's RAR medals and service awards not yet received from the Department of Defence Directorate of Honours and Awards.

## New grants available for Riverland clubs

LOCAL clubs can now apply for a new grant aimed to support community members in staying active and boosting physical activity levels.

With round 53 of the State Government's Active Club Program now open, Riverland sporting clubs are being invited to submit applications for a share of \$1.3m funding, focused on supporting active recreation, sports and recreational fishing clubs.

Each club is eligible to receive up to \$3000 to cover the cost of essential sporting equipment, uniforms, and other resources that will enable participation and allow community members to stay active.

Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Katrine Hildyard said "we want clubs across our state to have the equipment they need to include people in sport and programs in place that help them build great cultures that welcome all".

"Through this grant program, we are encouraging clubs to think about actions they can take to break stigma around periods and we are helping make things a bit easier financially for people needing a hand to be involved," Mr Hildyard said.

"I am very pleased to invite the many excellent clubs across our state to apply

for these grants that will allow more South Australians to experience the social, health and lifestyle benefits hardworking volunteers ensure are offered."

The program also allows eligible clubs to cover the costs of memberships for community members who are experiencing hardship.

The State Government is also encouraging clubs to utilise funding to help break down barriers that can impact female participation in physical activity.

Within their applications, funding can be allocated for period products, flexible uniform offerings, menstrual health training and menstrual health resources, or through encouraging conversations about menstruation and raising awareness at local clubs.

## Students to learn about dangers of social media

STUDENTS across the Riverland will be taught about online safety and the dangers of social media, as part of state reforms to the child safety curriculum.

South Australian schools will now deliver a program focused on preventing or mitigating issues associated with online safety, cyberbullying, body image, mental health and wellbeing.

The curriculum will have added content on coercive control, strategies for detecting deepfakes, understanding artificial intelligence, and the impact of negative online influencers.

It has also been strengthened and updated around contemporary online issues including recognising and reporting image-based abuse and sextortion, cyberbullying, privacy and understanding how to detect scams and fake news.

Educating students about the risks posed by unsafe or inappropriate online behaviour and engagement will be addressed, along with providing strategies for students to seek support.

The Department for Education has worked closely with the eSafety Commissioner, and the Australian Federal Police (AFP) led Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation (ACCCE) in developing the curriculum. The curriculum is mandated in all Education Department and Catholic Education sites and is used by schools from the Association of Independent Schools SA, with the new curriculum also to be taught in those schools.

A recent survey of staff, students, and families conducted in the wake of the first year of a full mobile phone ban found more than three-quarters of 3000 respondents said it was having a positive impact.

When staff were asked what they had observed about different aspects of school life since the ban was introduced, it was found:

□ More than three-quarters reported the time they spent on asking students to put devices away or following up issues with

phones had decreased.

□ Two-thirds reported that students' focus and engagement during learning time had increased more than 70 per cent.

□ An increased level of positive break-time activity, such as social interaction, play, physical activity, and interest in lunchtime clubs.

"We must do everything we can to protect our children," Premier Peter Malinauskas said.

"The State Government has already banned mobile phones in schools, we have made significant moves towards banning social media for children, and now we are doing what we can to educate our children about the harms of social media.

"The evidence is clear, social media is causing our children harm. Knowledge is power, and we are taking a proactive approach to ensure our young people are well equipped for the world they are growing up in."

## Double the prize money at Waikerie regatta

**ROWING** South Australia's omnium at Waikerie on Saturday will offer \$4000 worth of lucrative prize money to be shared among the category winners this year.

Waikerie Rowing Club captain/coach Leslie Lennell said doubling the prize money on offer compared to last year would hopefully attract more competitors.

It is the only omnium event held in SA and was held for the first time in the Riverland town last year.

The 2024 5RM/Magic 93.1 Waikerie Omnium will feature

three different distances, a 2000m time trial, 1000m small field race, and 500m sprint.

Category winners will be determined by the average prognostic rowing speeds across the three distances.

This year, prizes will be awarded to the first, second and third placegetters in the club, masters and school categories, and to the overall winners.

The winners will receive \$600, runners-up \$300, and those in third place will receive \$100.

Mr Lennell said the Waikerie Rowing Club was grateful to the Loxton Waikerie council for pro-

viding a \$7000 grant and logistical support for the regatta, and to the Rotary Club of Waikerie for its help.

He said local businesses had also provided sponsorship for the event, which had led to the increase in prize money.

For the first time, the Flight Lieutenant Douglas Howie Memorial Cup, donated by the Waikerie RSL, will be awarded to the overall winner, and Rivergum Christian College will be donating medals for the winners.

Mr Lennell said the late Douglas Howie had been a lifetime member of the Waikerie and Adelaide row-

ing clubs.

Mr Howie served in World War II in the Royal Australian Airforce, and died in 2009.

Mr Lennell is hoping this year's Waikerie regatta will attract a range of participants from across SA and interstate.

Last year Unley High School won the school girls' eights division, and the club men's open eights with its schoolboys' crew.

Mr Lennell is expecting the school to return this year to defend its two titles.

The Renmark, Riverside and Torrens rowing clubs are also expected to compete.

Mr Lennell said the Waikerie event was starting to gain momentum and interest.

He said the town's close location to Adelaide and its long stretch of riverfront made it ideal for rowing.

"There is so much room for spectators, boat trailers, and boats," Mr Lennell said.

"It is a nice, straight course.

"You can stand at the finish line and see the 2000m start line, so it is great."

The omnium on Saturday starts at 9am, and is expected to finish around 4pm.

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## Help reduce the spread of African lovegrass

RIVERLANDERS are being encouraged to join a program that aims to control weed infestations within their properties.

The African lovegrass program is being delivered by the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board, in partnership with the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA), with the objective to reduce the spread and negative impact of this highly invasive grass within our environment.

Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board district manager Casey Henderson said, "we encourage eligible landholders with suspected African lovegrass outbreaks to register for the program".

"We had 61 landholders

sign up to the 2023-24 program and now that we've expanded our targeted area, we're hoping to get more on board this year" Mr Henderson said.

"African lovegrass is a hard-to-control weed so we encourage all landholders in the area with an incursion to take advantage of this initiative, as with all weeds, control works best if we can coordinate neighbouring landholders, so you're encouraged to talk to surrounding landholders and get them on board too".

According to the Landscape South Australia Act 2019, landholders are required to control African lovegrass incursions within their terrains.

"Participating in this free initiative will help land-

holders meet their obligations to control the declared weed on their property," Mr Henderson said.

Participating landholders are required to provide access for landscape board staff and contractors to monitor treated incursions and undertake follow-up activities to ensure control works are successful.

Eligible landowners can register by visiting the website ([www.landscapesa.gov.au/mr/pest-plants-animals/managing-pests/african-lovegrass-targeted-assistance-program](http://www.landscapesa.gov.au/mr/pest-plants-animals/managing-pests/african-lovegrass-targeted-assistance-program)) or by calling Russell Norman on 0427 095 313.

Funding is limited, and participation is available on a first-come-first-served basis with registrations closing on 8 November.



# The right way to achieve our goals?

I RISE today to discuss a pressing issue regarding the Federal Government's proposal to classify the Lower Murray as a threatened ecological community under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (otherwise known as the EPBC Act).

This proposal, while Labor might spruik that it is well intentioned, raises serious concerns that we must address thoroughly.

First and foremost, we must express our concerns as a Liberal opposition about this proposal. The Federal Government seeks to list the Lower Murray, which includes significant riverine and flood plain ecosystems, as a critically endangered ecological community.

While the intent to protect our environment is commendable, we must consider whether this classification will effectively achieve that goal.

The core of our argument lies in the understanding that the species and habitats within the Lower Murray are already protected under existing legislation. This redundancy calls into question the necessity of additional classifications that may not provide any real benefits but instead complicate existing regulatory frameworks.

It is essential to acknowledge the historical context surrounding this proposal. Just prior to the federal election in 2013, the then Labor Federal Government pushed through regulations for the inclusion of the Lower Murray in the EPBC Act.

However, when the Coalition government took office, a disallowance motion was successfully passed, emphasising two key points: the potential for increased bureaucratic hurdles, or 'red and green tape', that would impede development in the region; and the existing protections already in place that were deemed sufficient to safeguard the environmental health of the area.

Previous South Australian Labor water ministers have assessed and ultimately rejected similar calls for inclusion in the EPBC Act. In fact, it was Ian Hunter who rejected the proposal back in 2013.

These decisions were based on

comprehensive evaluations indicating that the existing protections were adequate for preserving the ecological integrity of the Lower Murray. The arguments presented during that time remain relevant today, and we must carefully consider the implications of this new proposal in light of that history.

It is crucial to remember that the species and habitats along the Lower Murray are already safeguarded under various frameworks, including the Murray-Darling Basin Plan. This plan represents a bipartisan agreement aimed at sustainable management of our nation's largest river system. It imposes stringent limits on water extraction to protect the vital ecosystems supported by the river and its flood plains.

The recent amendments to the Water Act 2007, collectively known as the Water Amendment (Restoring Our Rivers) Bill 2023, reinforce these protections. This legislative framework not only recognises the ecological significance of the Murray-Darling Basin but also provides for the ongoing health of our water resources.

The Murray-Darling Basin Authority plays a vital role in overseeing this management, ensuring that all stakeholders work collaboratively towards common goals. The upcoming 2025 Basin Plan Evaluation is set to assess our progress and identify further areas for improvement. Any attempt to classify the Lower Murray under the EPBC Act before this comprehensive review is, at best, premature.

One of the most significant concerns around the inclusion of the Lower Murray in the EPBC Act is the anticipated increase in bureaucratic hurdles, often referred to as 'red and green tape'. This issue is not merely a matter of inconvenience; it has real consequences for the communities that depend on the river for their livelihoods and wellbeing.

Local residents and businesses face a challenging landscape when it comes to obtaining the necessary approvals for development projects. The processes involved in securing EPBC Act approvals can be arduous, time-consuming and financially burdensome.



For example, a recent select committee hearing revealed that SA Water had to abandon plans for a critical desalination plant at Seaford West and one of the reasons was because the EPBC Act approval process was deemed too lengthy and expensive. I will repeat that again: the process of gaining EPBC Act approvals was deemed too arduous for SA Water to deal with, so imagine the implications and barriers for regular residents and businesses.

This situation will create inequities between communities along the river and those in metropolitan areas where development processes are much more straightforward. The imposition of additional regulatory requirements will only exacerbate these disparities, leaving river communities feeling marginalised and frustrated.

Given these concerns, I am calling on the Malinauskas Labor government to follow the precedent set by its predecessors and reject the current push for the Lower Murray to be included in the EPBC Act. We must prioritise solutions that promote environmental protection, while respecting the rights and needs of our local communities. We should advocate for localised approaches to conservation that empower communities rather than impose blanket regulations.

By recognising the unique circumstances of the Lower Murray and leveraging existing frameworks, we can achieve effective environmental stewardship without adding unnecessary layers of bureaucracy. For instance, programs that promote sustainable agricultural practices, water efficiencies and habitat restoration can yield positive outcomes for both the environment and the local economy. Community-led initiatives that foster collaboration between stakeholders, farmers, environmental groups and government agencies can and do ensure that conservation efforts are tailored to the specific needs of the region.

It is also crucial to understand that broader classifications like the EPBC Act can dilute the focus of conservation efforts.

Allow me to set out an example. The Murray cod, one of Australia's largest freshwater fish, is already classified as a vulnerable species under the EPBC Act. Including the entirety of the Lower Murray in the EPBC framework may hinder targeted conservation strategies for this species by stretching resources too thinly across a larger area.

Conservation efforts should be directed where they can have the most significant impact. By concentrating our resources on specific

high-priority areas and species, we can maximise our effectiveness and enhance the resilience of our ecosystems.

In conclusion, while the intention behind the Labor Government's proposal to include the Lower Murray in the EPBC Act may be rooted in a desire for environmental protection, we must critically evaluate its implications.

The decisions made both in this place and in our federal parliament matter and they matter more than just a newspaper headline. They have real-world implications on people's lives. The existing protections provided by the Murray-Darling Basin Plan are already substantial and additional classifications may only serve to complicate an already intricate regulatory landscape.

We must heed the lessons from history, recognise the burdens of red and green tape and advocate for policies that empower local communities while safeguarding our natural resources.

So, therefore, I urge the Malinauskas Labor government to reject this proposal and prioritise a more balanced approach to environmental protection, one that acknowledges the unique circumstances of the Lower Murray and respects the rights and the needs of its residents.

She said the two judges, Alethia Quick OAM from Adelaide, and James Argent from Angaston, were impressed with the high standard and number of entries.

The floral art workshop run by Ms Quick on Friday afternoon attracted 20 participants, and children's workshop on Saturday drew 25 attendees, consisting of both boys

and girls.

ABC Gardening Australia presenter Sophie Thomson also visited the Waikerie flower show on Saturday and met the committee.

Mrs Crawford said it was exciting to have her attend.

The magical 'At the Bottom of the Garden' display by Riverland West artistic experts Carole Walker, from the Waikerie and Districts Garden Club, and Kathy Elliot, also was a show highlight.

Mrs Crawford said the children loved visiting Rosie and Ryder and their two live fairy friends in their patch of garden, which featured mushrooms that Riverland artist Jarrod Loxton helped paint.

She said Mrs Walker's input was "amazing".

"A lot of hard work went into the display, and it really paid off," Mrs Crawford said.

"The garden scene was a popular place for taking photos."

"I think they are the 'most photographed fairies', which is lovely, and the children were very excited."





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

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# Inspirational John rides for special cause

THE Great Cycle Challenge is one of the most inspirational challenges Australians can do, and its reach stretches far and wide.

The challenge focuses around riding a set goal for a kilometre amount in the hopes to end childhood cancer and save lives in the process.

Promoting a never give up attitude, the goal is to raise enough money to help find a cure, and Loxton local John Krause is no different.

Mr Krause no longer rides on the roads of the Riverland, but on a bike in his home, and he said the reason he does it, now in his sixth year, hits home a little harder.

"I came back to the Riverland over six years ago, and I wondered where I could connect with

people, so I started riding a push-bike," he said.

"By getting involved, this challenge came up somewhere, and I thought it could make a difference in someone else's lives."

"I suppose I related it back to my sister, who passed away 55 years ago, and I thought this was a cancer of the heart and I can make a difference."

"I can shine my sister's light in other people's worlds, and I'm still keeping fit and raising some money and awareness in the process."

Mr Krause has raised more than \$7000 across his six years so far, and is currently at \$644 just this year.

Having ridden over 4339km in that time, his goal this year is to ride over 400km, riding 100km each week.

Mr Krause's legacy is undeniable, and with all funds raised supporting the Children's Medical Research Institute, he said he worked out what is important, which contributes to his motivation.

"I worked in a church community and I looked after welcoming, and for me it was about the chil-

dren who came through the door," he said.

"I wanted to make them feel valued, and that impact would then carry through to the parents, and that's the way I look at it now."

"If I can help a young person and bring joy into their hearts through what I do, it would then be passed on to the wider com-

munity."

While Mr Krause has spent a lot of time on the Riverland roads, he now carries a lot of his journey out on his exercise bike.

"I have a bike in the shed which is connected to my computer, and I can go to any part of the world and ride a course," he said.

"It features hills so it's quite simulated, and I started doing this because I worked out I had a heart complication, and that initially took me off the road."

"I thought I can keep doing this from the safety of my own home, and it gives me inspiration along the way."

"I still get off the couch and do what I can to make a difference."

"I did the coaching role with a few of my good mates in Darwin, and we as a group spoke about how important it is to have everyone on the same page early so they can make that transition really easily," he said.

"Most of these kids have got those two or three years where they can understand the language of footy terms, and that's what I'm trying to deliver."

"It's about the fundamentals of football and the wording around it, so when they get to under 18s and senior level, they know what they're doing and they feel more comfortable."

Although Berri broke a two-year winless streak, and won the Fisher Cup in 2024, they were its only two wins for the season.

However, the Demons were competitive in a large portion of their games, and that competitive-

ness is something the 42 year old wants to see from his side once again.

"Setting ourselves with little goals and little wins throughout the year is my first priority," Labastida said.

"We have to be realistic as well about where we're at right at this stage, but of course we want to be really competitive."

"There were games last year, where if we just touched up a few little things that we need to develop and learn."

"It can be little things like hitting easy targets with the ball rather than going for more difficult kicks, and I hope we can practice those things through the pre-season."

One of the younger sides in the competition, Berri will no doubt

"Recruiting is always a difficult task, and back home we would be able to recruit well because it's off-season for other clubs," he said.

"At the same time, you have to look after the guys that live here, especially the under 18s boys who have a lot of years at this club ahead."

"You really want to bleed them and get them a lot of experience at the senior level."

"Recruiting is always something you have to do, and while it's hard to recruit at this stage of the year, we'll go through our list and work from there."

In other news at Berri, A grade star, and runner up best and fairest Shay Hawkins will take charge of the under 18s side.
