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Former Glossop High School campus put onto the market... Golden opportunity?

THE old Glossop High School site – officially now up for sale – should be repurposed as a centre for Riverland youth, rather than sold off to private interests, a long-time local says.

Dormant since 2022, the vast 17-hectare site is now on the market, but local man Ian Penno says the Riverland is “losing an opportunity” to address concerns with troubled young people in the region.

“We have success stories such as Operation Flinders and the Aboriginal Youth Pathways to Employment Pilot,” Mr Penno said.

“The former Glossop High School would be a perfect precinct for such programs. (It has) ready-made classrooms, technical rooms (and) sporting grounds.

“Be involved in country-style community programmes. Be involved in local horticulture

and industry.

“Have the participant build motel-style, self-contained units to live in and learn self-sufficient living and care.”

It is understood the property is being sold by RWC Adelaide, on behalf of Renewal SA.

RWC partner Jack Dyson told The Advertiser the property had potential to be re-purposed for different uses.

“Located on the corner of Old Sturt Highway and Distillery Road, the former high school presents an exciting opportunity to own and operate the education facilities, or develop to suit horticulture, residential or commercial uses,” Mr Dyson said.

“There are multiple teaching and administration buildings, a gymnasium and storage sheds, across six titles to cut and carve to suit requirements.”

However, Mr Penno said ensuring the site continues to

benefit the development of young Riverlanders should be a priority.

“The Riverland needs to lead change, needs to take and have control of our communities,” he said.

“Set the benchmark. This is our opportunity to give these kids life experiences (away from) the streets and experience

what life really has to offer.

“The easy option is a sell off and then take the funds to some useless project in Adelaide that would have absolutely no benefit to the youth of South Australia or the Riverland.”

Expressions of interest for the site are set to close at 4pm on 3 October.

New Riverland fruit fly outbreak confirmed at Murtho

ONE new fruit fly outbreak has recently been declared in the Riverland, with home owners and commercial growers urged to take preventative measures as temperatures warm.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) declared a new Queensland fruit fly outbreak on 28 August, named Murtho E, after five male adult Queensland fruit flies were found in monitoring traps.

Fruit Fly officers will deliver relevant information to residents and businesses within the outbreak area and will be making visits to check for signs of fruit fly and apply bait.

Incident controller of the fruit fly emergency response, Jason Size, said “the response team was diligently applying control measures to protect

the state’s \$1.3 billion horticultural industry from this economically damaging horticultural pest”.

“We know that fruit flies will be moving around in warm weather, so our baiting teams are talking to affected landholders every day and providing support to them,” Mr Size said.

“It’s positive that we haven’t detected any flies in 27 of the 52 outbreak areas for the last 12 weeks – and some of them for more than a year.

“I urge the Riverland community to keep persisting in the actions needed to achieve eradication – clean your backyards, prune your trees, and allow our staff to visit so they can do their baiting work quickly.”

Staff from the response team will be at the Riverland Field Days this 13 and 14 September, with Mr Size remind-

ing people travelling to the event from outbreak areas to leave their produce at home.

“I encourage everyone attending the event to have a chat with us at the Field Days, or call the Fruit Fly Hotline on 1300 666 010, with any queries,” he said.

“But please leave your home-grown restricted fruit and vegetables at home. To dispose of any waste, double-bag it and put in a general waste bin.”

Sterile fly (SIT) releases are occurring at Cadell, Overland Corner, Sunlands, and Waikerie until 14 October.

Docking area fixed at Morgan

MID Murray Council has repaired the flood-damaged surface of the Morgan riverfront precinct docking area.

“The PS Canally will be moored there when it returns and the Murray Princess should also be able to come back into the area,” she said.



Lifetime achievement for Loxton's Richard

A RIVERLANDER was honoured with an important award for his more than a decade of contributions to a significant historical-Loxton landmark.

Richard Wood was earlier this month granted a Lifetime Membership Award by the Loxton Community Heritage Group for his 23 years of involvement and contributions to the maintenance and restoration of The Loxton Historical Village.

Born in 1944, in Adelaide, Mr Wood joined the Historical Village Management Committee in 2001 after completing a 38-year career in the former SA Department of Agriculture.

Mr Wood has contributed to the curation process of numerous objects and exhibits inside the village.

"I was very surprised to be awarded life membership of the Loxton Historical Village as I am very happy to volunteer there, remain active and enjoy the teamwork there," Mr Wood said.

"I've always had a passion for railways, so my interest lined up with the restoration of several items of railway memorabilia within the village.

"Probably my most interesting contribution was gathering a small team of volunteers to rebuild a 125m section of railway track that was laid in the year 2000.

"It had largely deteriorated, so

we dismantled it, took the track away, cleared all the old rotten sleepers and relaid the line to the end, which is just 125m.

"Now that this has been rebuilt using original steel sleepers reclaimed from the Wanbi-Yinkanie line (closed in 1971), our aim is to operate a small section car on the line as an attraction to our visitors.

"It's the people, the team work, and when you've got a job to do, you regularly turn up and you do what has to be done, so we were doing this project every Wednesday morning from about last November.

"Now we're going through a process of accreditation so that we can operate a vehicle on this track.

"As a committee member, I have contributed to the work of the Collection Committee helping our curator to manage the collection to a high standard and a great deal has been done to develop a better flood-recovery strategy and safe storage of our significant items since the 2022 flood."

In 2001, the Loxton Historical Village was managed by a Section 41 Committee of the Loxton-Waikerie District Council, before being transferred to a committee of the Loxton Community Heritage Group (LCHG). Mr Wood believes this improved the attraction "significantly" under their management.

Mr Wood has also been involved with some of the aesthetics choices

of the Village, including reinstating some of the displays and signage for different houses and exhibits, but it is the Post Office building he is particularly proud of.

"One of the things that I'm interested in is home-generated electricity, and inside the post office building, I helped to organise and set up a small room that represents a 32-Volt home from the rural areas," Mr Wood said.

"We have a small fan that turns on when you press a button, alongside many appliances such as washing machines and fridges, which are all powered by an energy converter located in the wall that transform the power from the outside energy generator."

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Council changes mind on Patey Drive development

A RIVERLAND council's aims to increase housing development saw elected members rescind a recent decision.

Renmark Paranga councillors at last month's general meeting passed a notice of motion – put forward by councillor James John – to rescind a decision made at the 25 June general meeting, which saw council refuse to support a waiving of the existing Patey Drive Encumbrance for a proposed land division at 44 (Lot 4) Patey Drive, in Renmark.

Renmark Paranga chief executive officer Tony Siviour said ensuring the community could increase available housing was a priority.

“Council resolved to waive an encumbrance adjacent to a property on Patey Drive to support the development of three housing allotments,” Mr Siviour said.

“This decision is in line with the principles of council's growth strategy and the feedback we have received from the community on our growth strategy to date, which is the desire

to see more land available for housing in appropriately zoned areas.”

A council report from the 25 June meeting states “the existing Patey Drive encumbrance was developed to ensure safe vehicle access and pedestrian safety”.

“This was done by creating a common vehicle access point from lots 2, 3 and 4 onto Patey Drive,” the report states.

“An encumbrance was considered necessary given the number of allotments, location, and alignment of the adjacent road and pedestrian/bicycle path.”

Engineering advice provided by the applicant, also contained within the 25 June report, states:

- ❑ Traffic generation from the development will have minimal impact on the capacity of Patey Drive.
- ❑ Adequate sight distance is provided for the driveway (based on desktop assessment).
- ❑ Passenger vehicles will be able to enter and exit the driveway in a forward's direction, and that this can be further ensured during development applications for the future dwellings.

THE YEARS GO BY

Getting beyond control

Any locals or visitors to the region that were camping by the River Murray last weekend would have been forgiven for noticing the water looked a little green and brown, and perhaps was failing to give off the pristine views we so regularly enjoy.

When we discuss the natural resources of the River Murray, numerous perspectives and maybe even political leanings can affect our opinions. Some lean toward prioritising the production of food for a growing population, and others would say sustaining the environment deserves just as much focus.

Overuse of water resources for primary production is a factor often pointed toward as being detrimental to the river's health, although the increasing plantings of almonds and cotton along the river system may illustrate that point of view as being under pressure.

However, what is agreed upon among the vast majority of politicians, scientific experts, and the everyday River Murray user, is that carp have been a highly damaging force in the water.

As pointed out by a senior local irrigation industry figure in today's edition of *The Murray Pioneer*, despite our common desires – and the efforts of some – towards any potential idea of eradicating the pest fish, carp are becoming an overwhelmingly-dominant species in the Murray-Darling system, something which continues to have disastrous effects for anything but themselves.

According to some observers, carp already make up a high majority of the total biomass in the river system. Trying to imagine the amount of native fish, and yabbies, that have been negatively impacted by the presence of carp almost becomes an exercise in self-torture.

So how long do we continue to willingly live with this issue on our doorsteps (or houseboat decks)?

Do we have to wait until we reach the point where carp have consumed and destroyed so much of the river's ecology and environment the species can no longer support such astronomical population numbers?

While the more imaginative of us might think of this perhaps leading to some sort of Jaws-esque scenario, where carp have even kicked humans out of the water, the more likely outcome is a complete collapse of the species, and the millions of dead fish floating around our towns that would accompany such a result.


That seems hardly any better than having murky water.

Although somewhat unspoken about since the River Murray flood, it would seem as though utilisation of the proposed carp virus poses the most-effective solution.

It may be akin to 'ripping off the band-aid quickly', but any unsightly effects from the virus are surely worth the potential to see crystal-clear waters in the river again.

Former Riverlander, Magarey Medallist and West Adelaide wingman, Ken Eustice, receiving his coveted award in 1962. Ken was born in Barmera in 1929. Not long after, his parents Frank and Jean moved to Maggea, 50km west of Loxton, to run the local post office and a general carrying business, and to farm cereals. Ken attended the local primary school of some 10 students. One Saturday afternoon, when a skinny young 14-year-old, Ken 'filled in' for United (his Uncle Bert's team from Maggea, Mercunda and Mantung). On the Mantung Oval, Ken 'stood' in the forward-pocket against Ramblers (from Wanbi, Halidon and Mindarie). The ball soon came toward him, so he chased

and grabbed it, and then '...ran like the wind and booted it through'. He had kicked a goal with his first kick in senior football. Ken later played with Swan Reach, then West Adelaide Colts, before at aged 18, playing his first league game with Westies. He went on to play 110 games with the club, plus 62 for Centrals, and 52 for Glenelg. He captain-coached the latter two clubs and represented SA a total of 25 times. He won numerous club awards, played in Westies' premierships in 1961, and was inducted into the SANFL Hall of Fame in 2002. He was awarded the Magarey Medal, his treasured honour, at age 23. Plan targets the wrong cats

THE RSPCA has welcomed investment in new technologies and research into the best and most humane approach to managing feral cats across Australia, but has called on the Federal Government to reconsider its decision to include domestic cats in its Feral Cat Threat Abatement Plan, a move that could put thousands of cats who live alongside humans at risk.

Cat management is complex, and of course there's a need to control feral cats to protect wildlife.

Under the most recent draft we've seen of the government's Feral Cat Threat Abatement Plan, there are now only two types of cat - 'feral' and 'pet'. "This means that unowned and semi-owned cats - cats who live alongside humans and have some form of contact with and reliance on people - will now be classed as 'feral'.

This includes cats who are provided with care by someone, often multiple people - people who often have strong relationships with the cats they care for. The cat who stops by your neighbours' houses for a pat and to get fed is not the same as a cat who lives completely wild - but this plan treats them the same.

This means that thousands of domestic cats will be classed as feral, meaning at best it will add a greater burden to organisations that are seen as responsible for managing stray cats, and at worst, more cats will be killed - not to mention putting up an additional barrier to these cats being adopted or rehomed.

The language used by the government was also concerning. Vilifying cats and declaring 'war' on them shifts the focus away from what should be the key objective - to protect and conserve vulnerable native species - to instead promoting the killing of as many cats as possible.



ment for feral cat management. Oversimplifying the issue, and simply locking up or killing cats is not going to solve the problem - a considered and collaborative approach including community engagement, desexing, microchipping and encouraging keeping cats safe at home will be more successful in the long run.

Housing affordability plummeting

THE total value of new housing loans continues to rise as the housing affordability crisis reaches new heights.

The latest ABS figures show the total value of new housing loans rose 3.9 per cent in July to \$30.6 billion.

Housing affordability is now more than a growing concern, with the proportion of family income required to meet loan repayments reaching significant levels.

The latest REIA Housing Affordability Report shows that

the average loan repayment today is a whopping 48.1 per cent of income, placing housing affordability at its lowest in almost three decades.

The ABS figures show the total value of new housing loans rose 3.9 per cent in July to \$30.6 billion.

The value of new investor loans rose 5.4 per cent to \$11.7 billion, which was 35.4 per cent higher than July 2023, while the value of owner-occupier loans rose 2.9 per cent to \$18.9 billion, 21.4 per cent higher than July 2023.

The value of new owner-occupier first home buyer loans rose 0.8 per cent in July, which was 19.7 per cent higher than July 2023.

With the chronic housing shortage putting pressure on rents, first home buyers have found themselves competing in a tighter market, pushing them to act quickly despite higher borrowing costs.



Cycling national championship heads to Loxton

MASTERS and junior cyclists from across Australia will head to Loxton this month in pursuit of coveted winner jerseys across three different age categories.

Loxton's main street will host one of the most important stages in the 2024 AusCycling Masters and Junior Road National Championship, involving under 15, under 17 and masters 30+ cyclists from all over Australia participating.

A 430m pinch, named the 'Loxton Kicker', is the centrepiece of the event, with a stinging climb on Loxton's main street testing cyclists.

With an average gradient of 6 per cent, the event starts on Allen Hosking Drive and hits maximum slopes of 8 per cent as it sweeps onto

East Terrace, with the climb making up a third of the 1.4km circuit.

"After two flat criteriums in Wollongong and Shepparton, it's exciting to bring a different kind of challenge to the national championships," said race director Jeff Corbett.

"We're delighted to bring the race into the centre of Loxton, right alongside the Murray and among local shops and businesses.

"This criterium circuit is going to make for exciting racing, and isn't straightforward for the sprinters, because it gives plenty of opportunities for attacking riders to break away."

The road race and time trial will showcase the Riverland's terrain, vineyards and orchards, with the flat and open roads east of

Loxton lending themselves towards an exciting sprint.

When it comes to the individual time trial, the out-and-back course near the aerodrome should suit powerful specialists.

"Together with the District Council of Loxton Waikerie, I think we've put together three excellent courses that will suit a variety of riders," Mr Corbett said.

"Everything is primed for four days of high-quality racing that will produce deserving national champions."

The event will take place on 19-22 September and volunteers are still being required, with those interested can contact the Loxton Waikerie council through their website (www.loxton-waikerie.sa.gov.au).

Creatives intersect the Riverland

COUNTRY Arts SA and Guildhouse held the third stop of the Intersection tour at the Chaffey Theatre last Friday, with the open community event hoping to strengthen regional professional artistic practice, confidence, and connection.

A collaborative initiative between the not-for-profit league, Guildhouse, and Country Arts SA, Intersection works to connect creatives in regional communities across South Australia to each other, and professional opportunities.

Beginning in May in the Fleurieu Peninsula, before heading to the Yorke Peninsula in July, Country Arts SA visual arts manager Lauren Mustillo and Guildhouse artistic program manager Samantha Faehrmann's state-wide tour made its third stop in the Riverland.

"Intersection is about supporting regional artists where they live and work," Ms Mustillo said.

"It's about coming to their home turf — finding out what they make, what their challenges are — and seeing how we can support them.

"By listening to such feedback, we can provide our knowledge and support."

Kickstarting the Riverland program with an open community event at Chaffey Theatre, Ms Mustillo said Intersection was split into two important models to offer

support for rural creatives.

"The first part is the one-on-one visits," she said.

"This is where we go into people's studios... and learn about their practice and provide direct bespoke feedback based on what their goals and challenges are.

"The second part are the community events. These are open and we invite anyone creative in the community and at any career stage — these events are also accompanied by local artists who share their experience in the region."

Over the course of the tour, Ms Faehrmann said one of the major challenges for rural artists has been isolation.

"I have come to have a broader sense of the feeling of isolation for rural artists," she said.

"Not only from a location point of view, but even for artists who might be the only creatives in their family or community. Isolation can even come from being at different stages of practice from peers or the only specialist — how can you learn or grow?"

"There is also isolation that can come from being told that the community is uninterested in the art the person may be creating. However, we can be a connector to a wider arts community beyond that circle.

"I think even us being able to come and acknowledge, validate, and be inspired by the work that artists are doing can help — so

often we hear people say 'thank you for caring'."

Ms Mustillo said isolation through access is also a major challenge for artists.

"For example, not being able to go to an art shop and get high quality supplies or being able to print to a large scale — many artists often have to travel," she said.

Hearing similar feedback from Riverland artists, Ms Faehrmann said a resounding desire from the local community existed for more exhibition opportunities to break down the "insular rural experience".

"We conduct surveys as well... and the 100 per cent need was exhibition opportunities," she said.

"This is fantastic to know because when we are approached by festivals or local government funding we can place it in areas it is needed."

Local artist Lyn Anstey was also invited to speak to the Riverland audience about her experience in the Country Arts SA Nebula program — a three-day workshop, forum, and networking opportunity — and the Guildhouse Catapult Mentorship program — funding and a mentor to support and develop artist practice.

Riverland creative, Kerry Servin, then spoke on her current Chaffey Theatre exhibition *A Long Goodbye — A love letter to you...*, a body of work about Alzheimer's.

"Country Arts SA have been fantastic," she said.

"A space like (the Chaffey Theatre) is cool because many people are coming here often to watch a performance or film — your art reaches people who it otherwise would not.

"As an artist, being able to showcase my art and connecting with people is what it's all about — it's the best feeling."

Through a travel grant from

Gordon Darling foundation and support from The Ades Family Foundation, Intersection will make its final stop for the 2024 program in the Limestone Coast this October.

Environmental flows benefit local wildlife

RECENT environmental flows into the River Murray are delivering benefits for native Riverland waterbirds and floodplain vegetation.

Four gegalitres have been pumped by the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) from upstream storages, under The Living Murray program, into Lake Limbra on the Chowilla Floodplain.

This release has boosted the site's vegetation and provided important habitat and food sources for the birds, which includes threatened species such as the musk duck, blue-billed duck, and the Australian shoveler.

DEW has been able to consistently record 2000 individual birds at the site during the April and June morning surveys. Monitoring along the river has also found vast improvement in the condition of floodplain trees, including river red gums, black box, and River Coobah, following the 2022-23 River Murray Flood.

A \$4m project, funded under the wider Healthy Coorong Healthy Basin program, has also allowed for the completion of works to improve flows between Lake Alexandrina and the two basins at Teringie Wetlands.

"Water for the environment is vital to

maintaining a healthy River Murray and floodplain system," Minister for Climate, Environment, and Water Susan Close said.

"DEW works closely with other environmental water holders to deliver water for the environment to rejuvenate and sustain important habitats and environments for our native species.

"It is our job to care for our waterways and to help them thrive. All of this work highlights the importance of recovering the final 450 gegalitres of environmental water under the Murray-Darling Basin Plan to ensure we deliver better outcomes for the River Murray.

Telco's poor coverage is impacting Riverlanders

REGIONAL, rural and remote Australians, in areas such as the Riverland, have been severely impacted by poor mobile service, service quality, faults, outages and accessibility barriers.

According to recent data collected by the Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman (TIO), between 1 July 2021 and 30 June 2024, 51,854 phone calls and internet complaints were received from Australians living outside of metropolitan areas.

Consumers told the Ombudsman service problems and recurring faults take longer to be resolved and, in some cases, regional customers report the same fault over the years with no improvements to the service.

"Regional, rural, and remote consumers are getting left behind, and it's time that serious efforts are made to address the digital divide in this country,"

TIO Cynthia Gebert said.

"Telecommunication services are essential services, as important to our health and way of life as the electricity and water in our homes.

"We rely on phone and internet services in emergencies, for work, banking, telehealth services, social cohesion – everything, and we need a policy agenda that reflects the indispensable nature of telecommunications."

Another important complaint made by consumers was the availability of service when signing up to a mobile service, stating that operators assured there was coverage in their area, only to find they had no service in their remote location.

Reliable access to mobile services is essential in the coordination of disaster response and recovery, especially during bushfires, floods and other natural disasters.

Regional residents have experienced a number of constraints due to dependence on landlines or satellite services when other options become unavailable.

Satellite services can resolve these issues, but they are dependant on weather conditions and tend to be more expensive.

The TIO issued a series of recommendations to improve mobile and internet services for regional areas, which include:

- ❑ One coherent, robust and modern regulatory framework rather than the Universal Service Obligation (USO) scheme, Statutory Infrastructure Provider (SIP) regime, and Coal Seam Gas (CSG) regime to offer standards for different services.
- ❑ The SIP regime should have clear benchmarks and standards so that consumers can seek compensation from a SIP.
- ❑ Reviewing the USO framework, the government should consider the essential nature of mobile services, to ensure the regulatory framework meets community expectations.
- ❑ Mobile coverage maps should be standardised, accessible to all consumers, and should include information about geographical location, quality of coverage, and data speeds.
- ❑ First Nations consumers should be consulted on plans about how to help close the digital inclusion gap.

Motorbike learners set for new South Australian requirements

RIVERLAND motorcyclists will have to undertake new training requirements aimed to better prepare them for road conditions and improve overall safety.

From 9 December, anyone who wants to obtain a motorbike learner's permit or an R-Date licence will be required to pass new extensive training requirements as part of the Rider Safe program, the practical training component of the Motorbike Graduated Licensing Scheme.

The new program has its focus on better preparing riders with the necessary skills and experience, increasing competency and expertise on the roads.

Relevant changes to the program include:

- ❑ Introduction of on-road

assessments to complement existing training.

- ❑ Expanding the current curriculum to increase its focus on safety awareness.
- ❑ Positive focus on judgment and decision-making.
- ❑ Motorbike-specific hazard perception and rider knowledge course.
- ❑ Two-day practical course.
- ❑ Pre-licence course and a licence assessment.

The final on-road assessment will provide riders a set route to travel along while an instructor observes and assesses their ability to ride safely and effectively.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said "it's clear motorbike riders are overrepresented in serious and fatal crashes and more needs to be

done to improve training and equip them with the knowledge they need to navigate our roads safely".

"The Rider Safe reforms will complement the existing training and include new on-road assessments as well as an online rider knowledge and hazard awareness course," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"These additions will have a strong focus on safety awareness, judgement and decision-making, improving the skills and attitudes of learner motorbike riders."

Barmera is one the main training locations across the state, with all novice riders required to complete the online motorbike-specific hazard perception and rider knowledge test before doing any other assess-

ments at the training location.

Designed in consultation with industry bodies, current trainers and by reviewing assessment requirements in other states and territories, the State Government has assigned almost \$4m over five years to provide these reforms with the aim of reducing the number of serious and fatal crashes.

After the successful completion of all assessments, a learner's permit must be held for 12 months before applying for an R-Date licence, allowing riders to use a learner-approved motorbike.

The new training will increase the costs of obtaining a motorbike licence, which will go from the current \$811 to \$1400.

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RFDS groups kicks off Rose Festival raffle

THE Riverland Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) Support Group has launched its raffle for the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival and is actively selling tickets at locations throughout the Riverland, at the Field days, and privately via members.

A 'Rambling Rose' quilt has been crafted by local quilters from the Renmark club P's and Q's, and was donated to the RFDS Riverland Support Group.

The fabric and pattern for the quilt was found in a box bought from another quilter who was down-sizing, and RFDS member and quilter Bronwyn Cant initiated the project.

The artwork is a reversible quilt, the size of a queen-size bed, featuring rambling rose blocks on the front and a matching rose pattern on the reverse.

Many hours were spent by the P's and Q's Club meticulously constructing the quilt and it has been formally valued by SA Quilters in Adelaide at \$4750.

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

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Water Matters: Who controls our river?

THE states in the Murray-Darling Basin have been arguing, seemingly forever, about how to look after and share the rivers.

Even the thinkers behind Australia's federation in 1900 had to concede in our first Constitution that "The Commonwealth shall not, by any law or regulation of trade or commerce, abridge the right of a state or of the residents therein to the reasonable use of the waters of rivers for conservation or irrigation".

Yet the States and the Commonwealth still continue the debate on who regulates and controls our river, and "the reasonable use of the waters", in the Murray-Darling Basin.

Yet the Murray-Darling Basin communities can agree that we want a healthy river. At the MDBA River

Reflections conference in Albury, the audience was asked to explore 'what does a healthy river mean to you?'

Members of the Basin Communities Committee were asked to captain tables to facilitate the discussion. Some tables said healthy communities (economically and socially), some said water security, some said healthy floodplains, some said a sustainable natural ecosystem, some said thriving towns and irrigated agriculture. Many visual concepts came forward.

I quickly found the majority of people sitting at my table were fish people (researchers, professors, conservationists and fishery experts). There is something about fish people that seems to cut through to the core. They said it is simple, we'll have a healthy river when there are "no carp, native fish are increasing in abundance, and no dead fish (referring to the Lower

Darling mass native fish kills)".

This says it all. The University of Adelaide has been monitoring conditions at the Lower Lakes since 2007.

In March 2022, 179 carp were counted at 19 sites. A year later, 38,111 were collected from 21 sites. Native fish numbers were significantly lower, with some species not found at all.

People participating in the annual SA Carp Frenzy, at Lake Bonney, would fail to be surprised by that. Researchers from Victoria's Arthur Rylah Institute, monitoring the condition of native fish and crayfish in the Barmah-Millewa forest in 2022-23, produced similar results. Using drift net sampling, the researchers found "nine silver perch eggs, seven golden perch eggs and 3139 carp larvae".

Experts from Charles Sturt University are also raising a red flag on the

increasing density levels of carp to the detriment of our native aquatic species.

Some of us are lucky enough to remember when the waters of our river and lagoons ran clear. As a young child in the Riverland, I watched a fish being slowly reeled in by my uncle. I was mesmerised as the fish swam among the native grasses on the river bed, clearly visible in the dappled sunshine, closer and closer to my yummy dinner. Now that was a healthy river. The fish people in Albury are definitely onto something.

But then the carp came, muddying the waters, and now making up nearly all the biomass in the Murray-Darling Basin. Sorry, States and Commonwealth, it is the carp that have control of our river.

Farmers, communities and fish people in the Murray-Darling Basin have long been calling for the carp to be controlled. We agree, we have a common vision.

Controlling the carp is a key step that must be taken to attain a healthy river.

Water quality and habitat will be improved and native fish, crayfish and yabbies will be given the desperately needed uplift to thrive.

Doing nothing is no

longer an option – we cannot have the carp stay in control of our river.

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Riverland NAPLAN results remain steady as numeracy starts to add up

RESULTS from NAPLAN testing of Riverland students are remain consistent with promising trends starting to show in numeracy.

With testing conducted earlier this year, more than 80,500 South Australian students were assessed in years 3, 5, 7, and 9 in reading, writing, spelling, grammar, and punctuation, and numeracy.

Results reveal that primary school-aged writing scores had increased for all year levels in 2024 compared to 2023. With good trends in grammar and punctuation, there were particular increases in years 5 and 9 in terms of more students being 'strong' or 'exceeding'.

The number of students in year 3 and 5 who fell into the 'strong' and 'exceeding' categories in numeracy also improved in 2024.

However, year 5 reading has dipped.

"Across each NAPLAN

test, only year 5 reading results changed by more than the margin of error compared to last year," Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said.

"While the difference is relatively small, it is certainly something we are watching closely."

Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) CEO Stephen Gniel said that "over the last two years, schools have adjusted to both the earlier timing of the NAPLAN tests and the changed reporting system with new proficiency standards".

"The fact that the results of Australian students have remained stable through these changes, with no significant difference in average scores, is an important achievement," he said.

"The challenges remain with supporting those students identified in the

'needs additional support' category and tackling the ongoing educational disparities for students from non-urban areas, First Nations Australian heritage and those with low socio-educational backgrounds."

Mr Gniel noted caution must be exercised in trying to interpret any clear trends at this early stage of reporting against the new measurement scale and proficiency levels introduced last year.

"We have two years of data and, this year, a new cohort of students took part in the NAPLAN assessments," he said.

"National data rarely shows any significant change over a single year. The trends in NAPLAN data are likely to take several years to emerge as they start to show differences from both the immediately preceding year and the base year of 2023."

Riverland MLC says ‘let farmers farm’

CONSULTATION with farmers and “flexibility” in responding to disease outbreaks are necessary to improve the state’s biosecurity protection for agriculture, says a senior Riverland politician.

The State Government last month introduced the Biosecurity Bill 2024 into Parliament.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti, said “sensible and pragmatic ways to support biosecurity in the globally connected food and fibre sector” were required.

“Having grown up on a productive citrus property and been a mixed-practice veterinarian for 15 years, I’ve been on the ground on an almost daily basis with farmers and I absolutely know the critical role that biosecurity plays,” Dr Centofanti said.

“It is my strong view that the role of the government should be to continuously review pest species and diseases, review the latest science and review response processes to any potential threats of disease outbreaks or incursions in terms of both prevention and detection.

“At the end of the day we need to let our

“Too often there are excessive powers given to the executive without parliamentary oversight, rather than allowing sensible flexibility to react quickly to potential disease incursions. The Opposition will be watching to see that the new legislation strikes the new balance.”

Tim hopes you like jammin’ too

THE Riverland’s state MP continues to earn success at Adelaide’s biggest agricultural show by highlighting local fruit varieties.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone last week earned a third place award at the Royal Adelaide Show for his ruby red plum jam.

Mr Whetstone said “Each year I enter my homemade jams at the Royal Adelaide Show and country shows to encourage the

community to participate and support these important regional events”.

“I have a lot of fun making and entering the jams,” Mr Whetstone said.

“Without doubt, the essential element is the quality of the fruit for my jam which I source locally.

“It’s a great opportunity to showcase the variety and quality of our products in the Riverland.”

Think about protecting local vineyards and avoid negative spray drift impacts

RIVERLAND primary producers have been reminded to minimise the risk of potential negative spray drift impacts on newly shooting grape vines.

PIRSA director of biosecurity operations Laura Bruce said newly shooting grapevines were highly susceptible to many broadacre herbicides.

“Operators need to understand the way that different chemical formulations behave in the atmosphere,” she said.

“It is vital that spray operators carefully select the right chemical for the job, taking into account weather conditions and the risk of off-target damage or unacceptable residues affecting neighbouring land, plants or animals.”

Certain weather conditions such as hazardous inversions can result in spray drift damage up to

tens of kilometres from the application site.

Ms Bruce said producers must consider sensitive crops – even if they are some distance away – when planning a spray operation.

“It is of critical importance that no spraying should take place under hazardous inversion weather conditions, which generally exist from late in the evenings, right through the night until early morning,” she said.

Producers must comply with all mandatory label conditions and are urged to take advantage of all weather station technical services, particularly including the Mesonet weather station grid, which provides observations to clearly identify inversion conditions.

Agricultural chemical users are reminded to comply with instructions on the product label, noting many

products now direct a specific droplet size for applications, plus buffer zone requirements.

PIRSA will be conducting ongoing compliance checks to identify poor spraying practices and will pursue any instances of deliberate or negligent use of chemicals in contravention of label instructions.

Offences carry a maximum penalty of \$35,000 per offence, reflecting the seriousness of failing to follow mandatory label instructions.

PIRSA encourages all community members and producers to report any incidents, alleged misuse or observed damage to the Spray Drift Hotline 1300 799 684, or email (pirsa.ruralchemicals@sa.gov.au).

People can report anonymously to the hotline, and all reports will be assessed for further action.

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Children's Concussions in sports not to be overlooked

PARENTS of Riverland kids are being warned about the implications of concussion injuries, in an effort to reduce future implications on their development.

According to recently released data from the Women's and Children's Hospital's Child and Adolescent Brain Injury Rehabilitation Service (CABIRS), children will always be more likely to suffer from concussions due to their brains still developing and their neck muscles being unable to sustain elevated forces, making their brains more prone to forceful traumas.

CABIRS also noted that it had 121 referrals in 2024 –

compared to 178 in 2023 – with 3.5 per cent of those injuries being sports related, and specifying that 60 per cent of those patients were boys.

The service looks after children aged between two and 18 years of age, with the seriousness of child concussions and their symptoms can be sometimes overlooked by parents, which is why experts are warning parents not to 'take it easy' after an incident.

"Sport should be fun, especially for our kids," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"It's always better to err on the side of caution when it comes to a head knock, and the

consequences can be devastating."

With no two head injuries being the same, normal recovery can take up to four weeks, but according to CABIRS, between 20 to 25 per cent of children injured may require additional time and extra help to recover and return to their normal activities.

A concussion may be difficult to identify, with parents advised to look for subtle signs after a head injury, which may include:

- Headaches
- Sensitivity to light and noise
- Confusion and difficulty concentrating
- Nausea and dizziness

- Mood changes
- Sleep changes

Parents, trainers, coaches and teachers can download the HeadCheck App (www.headcheck.com.au) which can help to recognise concussions, based on real information, in the event of an accident and their guide to manage recovery.

Vulnerable Riverland households set to receive energy relief

RIVERLAND households are among those set to receive energy bill relief under an expanded payment scheme.

The State Government last week announced expansions to the electricity payment scheme would provide up to \$800 for vulnerable households.

Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said "Ensuring our state's concessions are well-targeted and delivered efficiently to best support those who need it in the community," was a priority.

"Expanding the electricity payment scheme is among important reforms identified during the review, and this

increased payment will be available from 1 July – as winter is kicking in and households are running costly electrical appliances," Ms Cook said.

Part of a \$266m relief package, the energy relief will benefit four times as many households.

It is estimated more than 1300 households will benefit annually from the scheme.

The changes include removing the debt cap of \$2000 and increasing the payment frequency to every two years.

"Of course, this is in addition to other measures from our government including the additional payment to 2023-24 Cost of

Living Concession recipients," Ms Cook said.

"Our record investment in concessions will support more people to meet the cost of living, and initiatives like the expansion of the electricity payment scheme will offer much needed support for SA

households on low and fixed incomes."

Payments are made directly to the electricity provider and are applied as credits on the electricity account.

Watch out for investment scams

RIVERLANDERS are being urged to watch out for investment scams, with police highlighting on red flags to be aware of and important prevention measures.

Part of Scams Awareness Week held earlier this month, SAPOL says investment scams are claiming more money from Australians each year than any other type of scam.

During 2023 investment scams accounted for more than 60 per cent of fraud reports to the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission's Scamwatch, with South Australian residents losing \$10.2m to scammers.

"While this amount is alarming, actual losses may be significantly higher due to many people not reporting when they've been scammed," Cybercrime Senior Constable Casey Morrison said.

"Investment scams involve promises of big payouts, quick money or guaranteed returns," Mr Morrison said.

"In addition to the traditional way of transferring funds through bank transfer, cryptocurrency is becoming more popular because of the perceived anonymity it offers."

According to SAPOL, victims aged 65 and over are the most vulnerable and have registered the highest amount of losses due to investment scams, with a median amount loss of up to \$30,000.

Police recommend to watch out for these red flags:

- Fake news stories or ads where celebrities endorse schemes for people to make 'big money'.
- Emails, websites or ads with testimonials and over-the-top promises of big returns.
- An online friend or partner you've never met bringing up the topic of investing.
- High-pressure tactics designed to rush you to act so you don't 'miss out'.
- You are asked to promote the scheme to friends and family to earn commission.
- Profiles on dating apps speaking to you about investments.

Police have also issued a series of prevention tips:

- Be wary of advertisements found on social media sites offering investment opportunities. Scammers use these platforms to lure potential victims and direct them to fraudulent websites.
- Always be suspicious of any investment opportunities that promise a high return with little or no risk – if it seems too good to be true, it probably is.
- Never allow anyone access to your device to assist with creating accounts.
- Do not send copies of identification such as your driver's licence, passport or Medicare card to people or businesses you are unfamiliar with.
- Watch out for poor grammar and spelling. A legitimate company will take great care in having a professional look over their site.

Bird swooping: know what to expect this spring

AS spring approaches in the Riverland, locals are warned some native birds may swoop during their breeding season. Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) senior wildlife projects officer Simon Ruff said “every spring, some native birds swoop to defend their eggs and chicks for a short time while their young are most vulnerable”. “While swooping is unsettling, it’s normal behaviour for a range of native birds, warning people and animals not to come near their young,” he said. Native birds swoop in rural areas, parks and gardens, along bike tracks or

anywhere they are nesting. Species that may swoop commonly include magpies, masked lapwings and butcherbirds. “Not all birds swoop during the breeding season, so the presence of magpies or other common swooping birds doesn’t necessarily mean you’ll be swooped,” Mr Ruff said. “Remember, the swooping behaviour will only last a short time, normally stopping soon after the young leave the nest.” If you are worried about a protective bird this spring, some steps to take to feel safe, while also helping our native birds, include:

- Move quickly but do not run if you find yourself close to a swooping bird.
 - Wear protective head and eye coverings.
 - Don’t harass birds – this can make swooping worse.
 - Don’t feed the birds and do not destroy their nests.
 - Avoid known swooping hotspots by planning your route.
- All native wildlife is protected by law. Penalties apply for harassing, harming or disturbing native birds and other wildlife. To report wildlife crime, contact Crime Stoppers on (1800 333 000).

Future of the Waikerie CWA uncertain

THE high cost of living and membership fees could cause the Waikerie CWA to fold.

After 79 years of operation, the branch went into recess about two months ago.

Waikerie CWA treasurer Rhonda Leithes said the \$96 annual fee had become too much to pay for those who had previously been members.

"Some of us don't want to pay the full year's membership if we do end up folding," she said.

"We are waiting to see what will happen."

The Waikerie CWA had its first official meeting on 18 October 1945, and became a popular group for women in the town.

Its oldest member Vene Trezise is 94, who is famous for her delicious scones.

Ms Leithes said the group was especially active during the 1980s and 1990s when it ran fundraisers and community events, including a fashion parade.

The Waikerie CWA also raised enough funds to build its own headquarters in Coombe Terrace, which was officially opened in 1957.

Last year, the Waikerie CWA had seven members, but now it only has two whose fees are still paid up until October.

Mrs Leithes said over the years the annual membership fee had risen to its present amount of \$96.

She said other CWA branches in Victoria and NSW pay lower membership fees than in SA.

"Why is it so high?" Mrs Leithes said.

"We would attract more members if it did not cost so much.

"A lot of people, including farmers, no longer have that amount of money to pay."

However, Ms Leithes is still hoping to attract some new members to the organisation to prevent it from folding.

The Waikerie CWA meets each Wednesday, from 10am to 3pm with a drop in session at its hall, offering a cuppa and freshly baked scones, cake or biscuits.

The women who attend, including some past members, bring their knitting, crochet and other craftwork with them.

Ms Leithes said the gathering each week also offered people the chance to learn crafts such as knitting, crochet or tea cup painting.

"Last year we taught a lady from Sri Lanka who was holidaying in Waikerie to knit and crochet," she said.

Ms Leithes also recently invited a couple visiting from Port Augusta to come in for a coffee and a chat and two men also regularly attend and play cards.

She said mums with young children are also welcome to attend.

"There is plenty of room to put a playpen in the corner," Ms Leithes said.

The Waikerie CWA building is also available for community groups to hire.

Ms Schumann said the Cadell CWA also folded a few years ago and towns such as Barmera, Glossop and Cobdogla no longer had branches.

But she said the CWA still had two active groups in Berri

and Loxton.

Ms Schumann said the SA CWA Riverland Evening branch met at the Berri Hotel on every second Wednesday of the month.

Members of this group range in age from their 30s through to their 70s.

"Most of them are still working women," Ms Schumann said.

"It is a good thing to have a multi-generational atmosphere in your branch.

"It is a mixture of experience and enthusiasm."

Ms Schumann said the Loxton CWA was also still active, with some of its members volun-

teering last week at the Royal Adelaide Show.

She said branches could also restart in towns where they had folded if interest existed.



Owner Nigel Rollbusch and his son Alex, who is also a butcher with the family business, were presented with the plaque at a presentation dinner in Sydney recently.

The award-winning chicken kabana, made by Alex, features jalapeño, cheese, and garlic.

"It is pretty popular and is made from fresh SA poultry," Mr Rollbusch said.

The Waikerie and

Barmera-based butcher competed against 150 entries in the chicken kabana category.

It also won silver for their boneless ham and bacon.

Last year, Rollbusch Quality Meats won the Australian Charcuterie Excellence Awards boneless ham category with its ham cured in a traditional maple brine.

It also won gold last year for its kransky, maple bacon, dry-cured Spanish bacon, and chorizo.

Mr Rollbusch said it was difficult to predict the outcome of the competition each year.

"Every year what the judges do is different, the

criteria varies," he said.

"They may not have the same judges as last year and they all have different tastes, there are so many factors to it."

Mr Rollbusch said entering these competitions helped butchers gauge how they were performing.

The Riverland butcher now supplies 11 supermarkets across the Adelaide Hills, Adelaide, and the Riverland with its small-goods.

SA regions need access to cash, says One Nation MP

BANKS should ensure rural South Australians – like those living in the Riverland – have access to cash, a state MP says.

One Nation's Sarah Game is introducing a bill to SA Parliament this week to protect the right of South Australians to pay cash for all government services, including council fees and charges.

While her Public and Audit (Cash Payments) Amendment Bill 2024 would compel designated authorities, including SA's 68 councils, to accept payments of legal tender – in the form of cash – for any transaction under \$10,000, Ms Game said banks also have "a role to play" in ensuring cash survives in rural areas.

"I believe banks have an obligation to provide cash services for their communities, especially rural communities," she said.

Ms Game said rural areas were particularly vulnerable to having their right to use cash stripped away.

"Due to the closure of more bank branches, rural customers are being forced to travel further to banks to access their own money," Ms Game will tell her upper house colleagues.

"To add insult to injury, people forced to use other banks' ATMs – because their bank has left town – also get charged for the privilege of accessing their own money. But they have no choice.

"So, not only do we support the right of people to use cash, we also support their right to access their own cash – without being expected to travel unreasonable distances to do so.

"If banks stop people from accessing their own cash, they effectively stop people from using cash."

Ms Game said her office had been "inundated with support" since her campaign for cash gained publicity.

"Earlier this year I alerted the State Government to an incident involving a consumer who attempted to pay for their vehicle registration in cash at the Services SA outlet in Mount Barker, but was turned away," Ms Game said.

"This is an example of what sort of practices would be outlawed via my bill."

Ms Game said her bill would "not... target private businesses".

"But we do encourage private businesses to keep using cash for the sake of their customers, but for themselves as well, because it actually gives them an operational advantage," she said.

Ms Game said her Bill was a "first step" in fighting for the rights of people to use cash, and said the July 19 Crowd Strike incident, which temporarily brought the working economy to a halt, was an indicator of what a cash-free future could look like.

Positive signs ahead for our Riverland sporting leagues

FOR the first time in recent history, Saturday afternoon saw the Riverland Netball Association (RNA) and Riverland Football League (RFL)'s grand finals held on the same weekend at Loxton North.

While the A1 and A2 netball deciders were held at The Precinct on Friday night, the other 15 grand finals coincided with the five RFL deciders, in a decision which is said to have been well received by Riverlanders.

RFL chairman Henry Crawford said the decision was made by the two competition's following consultation prior to the leagues' fixtures being released.

"It was a discussion that we had with the

RNA before the season even started, because we wanted to align our seasons," he said.

"We recognised it was Loxton North who were hosting so it would be a unique opportunity to have them right there together at the one venue.

"It's not necessarily something we can replicate at every ground across the league but it was a once-in-six-year opportunity, so we made that approach to netball and they went through their processes and agreed to it.

"In the end I think it was a great success and no one has told me it was a mistake and I think the crowd which was there on Saturday reflected why it's such a great thing."

Mr Crawford said one of the key reasons for the decision was to allow Riverlanders

the flexibility to view both grand finals.

"It's a unique thing that Riverland netball and Riverland football aren't locked into each other," he said.

"Everywhere else you go football and netball go together and that's what we wanted to replicate here.

"It's more about the families than the sport because people want to travel and stick together, and that's why I'm such a big supporter of it.

"I think it's the way we should be, and hopefully Saturday's experience is enough for people to see that's the way we should be going in the future."

While Mr Crawford said Loxton North is the ideal location for the games to be held,

other towns' venues will be just as suitable.

"It has to be all worked out for future years, and there will be a review process but I take the view that while some facilities are not as ideal that isn't a reason to not do it," he said.

"At the end of the day the alternative is that you're playing in completely different towns so it might not be as effective at other clubs, it's still better than what it has been in the past.

"If this was to become the norm in time as facilities continue to get upgraded people would take it into consideration.

"Whereas if it's less separated then people are not as motivated to bring the facilities together."

Track 'superb' for \$200,000 cup day

OVER \$200,000 in prizemoney is up for grabs at this Sunday's 2024 Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club meeting, which will also showcase new on-track facilities, an inaugural \$4000 novelty wheat bag race for local clubs, and strong support from SA's thoroughbred racing industry.

Final acceptances will be confirmed tomorrow, with the opening event on the seven-race card likely to be scheduled shortly after midday.

Club officials said yesterday they were "rapt" with the current state of the Halidon racecourse track and surrounds.

A new \$50,000 bar facility and shaded area – jointly funded by the club and Racing SA – will be officially unveiled on Sunday, when many of South Australia's top jockeys and trainers will descend on the tiny town for the district's biggest annual event, expected to attract a crowd of around 2000 people.

"It's come together really well," said club vice-presi-

dent, Greg Griffiths.

"Our members and volunteers have put in a lot of time and effort at recent working bees, and the course – including the track – is looking in superb condition."

Last year's meeting was abandoned on race day, following a freak irrigation leak that impacted a small section of the track, however with that problem now "well and truly taken care of", Mr Griffiths said the club was banking on strong support from the Southern Mallee and Riverland communities.

"We want a big crowd for the return of the races this Sunday," he said.

"It's such an iconic event, and although it takes a massive effort to stage it every year, the SA industry has been right behind us all the way. Now we just need people to come to the track on race day and make it a memorable cup meeting."

To be run over 1800m, this year's Swan Reach Hotel Mindarie-Halidon Cup offers \$40,000 in prize-money, plus an additional \$11,000 to owners of horses eligible for a Racing SA

breeders' bonus.

The remaining six races will each provide prize purses of \$19,500, however when all bonuses are considered, total prizemoney on offer tallies \$205,950.

The new bar facility will be officially opened at 11am on race day, and Mr Griffiths said it would be named after a life member. A novelty "human race" will be a new feature of the cup day meeting (see opposite).

Tickets to the meeting will be available for purchase at the gate, but can be pre-purchased online via Moshtix (just Google 'Moshtix Mindarie-Halidon').

Mr Griffiths reminded patrons that while Optus mobile phone coverage is fine, Telstra can be patchy.

The event features full on-court catering and entertainment, including live music and a free jumping castle for under 12s.

Gates open at 10am. No BYO alcohol permitted, however people are invited to bring their own chairs and picnic tables.

Roos revel in back-to-back under 18s premiership glory

BARMERA-Monash made history on Saturday afternoon in the under 18s decider, becoming the first team to win back-to-back premierships in the grade since Renmark's triumphs from 2017-2018.

The Roos took on arch rival Berri in the decider, and following a cagey start to the game, were able to break it open during the second half.

Both sides recorded just one goal in the opening half, with Barmera-Monash holding a tense one-point advantage at the major break.

However, Barmera-Monash kicked three goals to two in the third term to open the lead up to eight points, before holding out in the final term to secure a memorable 13-point victory.

Roos coach Stephen Marks, who guided the side to the premiership win last year, said he was "proud" of the way his group performed on the way to victory.

"We had a squad of 32 players so we had to rotate everyone during the year and then settle things down for finals, so we were rapt with the way they went about it across the two finals games," he said.

"We knew it was going to be a tough game and that's how it played out, but our guys stuck to the task and got it done, so I'm really proud."

Barmera-Monash finished in second place after the home and away season, before dismantling Berri in the second semi final to the tune of 54 points.

The Roos coach believes the reason for the close clashes throughout the year was due to both sides being filled with quality players.

"Berri definitely got hold of us a few times during the season and had two strong wins over us, which fuelled a bit of hunger for us to improve a little bit more towards the back end of the season to know we had to lift our performance to get over a team like that," Marks said.

"That was something we worked fairly hard towards, and I think even though we did the second semi final pretty easily on the day, Berri went away and did a bit of work and came back hard in the grand final so it was a tough one for us.

"There are players in both teams who have pushed and made it into the A grade side this year, so it's great that both clubs are pushing for these junior kids to progress their footy."

Roos utility Tony Drogemuller took home the best on ground medal following a strong defensive outing, and Marks said he was given the role following his semi final performance on Demons forward Brock Wenman.

"He's a really versatile player and we can throw him forward too, but we thought this role really suited him from our team structure and he played it so well," Marks said.

"He used the ball so well whenever he got it, and he just had an outstanding game and an

outstanding finals series.

"It's a real credit to him because he's a bottom age player in our group so as one of our younger players he did an amazing job."

Barmera-Monash had all five men's and junior grades competing on grand final day, and Marks said his side works closely with the A grade team to help set up for success.

"We definitely do a lot together and a lot of our trainings are as a big senior and under 18s group," he said.

"We do try and transfer game-plans from one grade to the next to try and suit the group you've got.

"That makes the transition for the players going up not as daunting, because they already know the basic team structures and Fraser Sampson has been one to really drive that.

"It's really good, and it seems to have worked pretty well for our club."

ON an afternoon of thrilling football finishes, arguably the most exciting came through the under 15s decider.

Mason Morris made a strong impact for Barmera-Monash on the scoreboard with two majors, while Cooper Klingbiel, Ivan Ness, and Kane Ogle all hit the scoreboard alongside Alder.

Up-and-coming gun Mitchell Johnson took out the best on ground honours, while Harry Banks and Dillon Marks also produced strong showings.

From a Renmark perspective, Noah Martinson finished with two goals to lead the scorers, while Jack O'Bryan, Samuel DePalma, and Riley Harding all found a lot of the football.

Butterworth said Johnson, who recently represented South Australia, is "very dedicated", and is someone who he believes will go a long way in football.

"He works on his football a lot, and he's a really good size for a footballer," he said.

"He's starting to get in those teams where you do sort of get seen, so it's hard to say, but I do believe he is one for the future who can go a long way for our club."

Lions combat skin cancer

MORE than 200 Riverlanders have been safeguarded from skin cancer thanks to a local initiative.

Part of the Lions Medical Research Foundation — an initiative that has scanned more than 26,000 people so far — the Berri Lions hosted a skin cancer drive at Bunnings in August.

Of the 213 Riverlanders screened, 35 were referred to their GP for further investigation.

“I’d like to think some lives may have been saved of those otherwise would not have had their skin checked,” Berri Lions second vice president Willemina Boekhout.

State-wide survey highlights small business concerns

RISING COSTS and lack of housing for workers is negatively impacting the state’s small businesses, including in the Riverland, according to a new major survey.

The South Australian Business Chamber earlier this month released its Regional Voice 2024 survey.

SA Business Chamber CEO Andrew Kay said the cost and availability of labour, high energy prices and access to housing were among the top issues constraining regional businesses.

“While each of the regions has their own unique set of opportunities... or are reporting off the back of specific challenges, such as floods in the Riverland, there are consistent themes that have emerged,” Mr Kay said.

“These results have captured the sentiment that we have been hearing from our regional members for some time and are only slightly more optimistic than our 2020 survey, conducted amid the Covid-19 pandemic.”

“Businesses across the state are feeling the impact of a slowing economy and rising costs and are struggling to find and afford the workers they need, with lack of suitable housing compounding this issue.”

“The results show how integral housing availability is for regional growth and attracting and retaining staff. An increasing number of businesses are unable to make the hiring decisions they want simply because of inadequate housing supply.”

Mr Kay said measures to ensure small businesses remained competitive were necessary.

“A regional payroll tax discount of 50 per cent is necessary to make our regions competitive with their interstate neighbours who already receive a reprieve from their governments,” Mr Kay said.

“Events and tourism activities that drive visitation to the regions and programs or grants that help businesses innovate and prosper make a genuine difference.”

“These people are not looking for hand-outs. They are very resilient and come together to support their own communities and any investment that comes their way is put to good use.”







Murrayville simply the best

A COMPLETE team performance – highlighted by a few star turns – helped Murrayville to a comprehensive 2024 Murray Valley Football League premiership victory last Saturday.

In an emphatic grand final performance, the Blues beat Brown's Well by 82 points, kicking six goals in each of the opening two quarters, then five in both the third and final quarters, to give coach Mick Durdin a flag in his first year at the helm.

Murrayville was right at home playing at Cambrai Oval, and took charge of the match after a typically robust first few minutes of the decider.

Uren enters netball history books

WHEN Loxton netballer Nyah Uren trialled with the A1 side at the beginning of 2024, little did she know she was about to etch her name in Riverland sporting history.

In what is believed to be a Riverland record, Nyah, aged 13, played for Loxton's A1 winning premiership side, before backing it up the next day with a best on court performance in the under 13s competition.

Nyah's mum, Ali, who is a former Loxton netballer and A1 coach, said the thought of introducing Nyah to the A1 competition came over the summer off-season.

"At the start of the year Nyah had a huge growth spurt and I thought she might be able to play senior netball, or at least have a bit of a go," Ali said.

"I took her out to the A1/A2 trials and we had to get an exemption from the RNA, and once that all went through she started training with the A1s.

"It started off with her sitting on the bench, and doing what you do as a junior in terms of persisting with training, and eventually she got her opportunity in both A1 and A2 in the same round, and then just continued to push for her spot in the side.

"Obviously going into Friday night, we didn't think she was going to go on unless something wasn't working or unless they were down, which hadn't happened much throughout the year, so when we saw her warming up it was a bit of a surprise."

Nyah entered the court during Friday night's thrilling A1 decider in the second quarter, subbing in for Aimee Holmes.

The move surprised Ali, who said she was downstairs at The Precinct when Nyah

entered the court in the second term.

"Someone came in and told me 'Nyah's in at goal attack' and so I raced out and goal attack wasn't a position I'd seen her play in a lot.

"She played in shooter a bit with the A2s, and she's super versatile, but I was surprised when she initially came on and in the second half she came on to wing attack, which is where she's played most of her time in the A1. That made her a lot more comfortable."

Nyah backed up her A1 premiership performance with a starring performance in the Tigers' u13A grade's 11-goal win over Berri, on Saturday morning, at Loxton North.

Ali said playing in the A1 side helped Nyah adjust to the slower pace of the u13A competition each week.

"She's usually a little bit more tired on a Saturday after the Friday night game, so she has to slow her game down which has been helpful," she said.

"It's been nice that she's been able to play with the under 13s and obviously she had a great game.

"It can be tough with the late nights sitting on the bench, then being up first thing for her own games has been pretty tiring on her.

"She's definitely loved it and we're super grateful, especially to her teammates with the way they bring her into the game.

"I couldn't imagine how nerve racking it would have been for her coming on in a tight A1 final, but the girls were amazing.

"Bailey Hahn is one who's always a back-up option for Nyah, which meant she didn't have to play risky, and playing safe netball really helped."

In one of the best moments of the win, Nyah took to the A1 court with her aunty

Ali said it was a special moment for the family, but Leah was one of many players who Nyah knows in the A1 side.

"Jono Hartley has been great as the A1 coach with promoting the juniors, and his encouragement towards Nyah was one of the reasons she kept persisting with training and putting in the work."

Tiger time in RFL reserves

A WARM spring day greeted the two best sides in the Riverland Football League's B grade competition on Saturday afternoon, and a hotly contested affair played out throughout the afternoon in hopes of claiming the ultimate prize.

It was a true case of the best two teams in the competition making it to the grand final, with ladder-leaders Barmera-Monash facing off against Loxton in front of a healthy crowd at Panther Park.

A see-sawing contest, which typified a highly competitive season of reserves football, saw the Tigers emerge victorious by just two points after a late surge from the Roos pushed Mitch Guidolin's side to the dying stages.

Guidolin, who guided the Tiger reserves to a second premiership in three years, described the feeling of being a premiership coach as "fantastic".

"I only had 10 players on my list at the start of the year, so to end up going through 53 on our list over the year, it took a lot of work to get us to where we got to over the weekend," he said.

"I played in the grand finals in 2022 and 2023 but I hung up my boots this year through injuries and decided to put the coaching hat on.

"We had a mass exodus from our group, and some of our players went to Brown's Well and Murrayville and other clubs so we had to rebuild a little bit I guess.

"We had a core group of senior boys who

were 100 per cent committed to each other and getting it done and we just built from there."

Barmera-Monash finished the 2024 home and away season undefeated, before falling to Loxton in the second semi final at Tigerland by seven points.

However, the Roos quickly responded on preliminary final weekend, pushing past Berri with ease to claim a 46-point win.

Guidolin said the losses throughout the year were beneficial for the Tigers, who took a lot of lessons from the defeats.

"Our team is really experienced, and we learned a lot in the losses by taking notes and getting feedback from the senior boys in the team," he said.

"We had a plan and process ready and it just worked.

"We let the legs really rest up during the

week off, and then we had a really big training on the Saturday, so by the time Tuesday rolled around it was just all eyes on the weekend.

"We just looked forward to the weekend, and made sure we didn't think about it too much else and remained focused."

Loxton got the jump in the opening half of the decider, kicking more accurately to take an 8-point lead into the major break.

In an even third term, the Tigers held off a hardened Roos side to take a 10-point lead, before a late Barmera-Monash charge almost stole the show for the minor premiers.

Talyn Eagle was the star of the show in attack for Loxton, finishing with three majors, while Oliver Ackland and Brandan

Tregeagle also each hit the scoreboard.

Eagle's efforts landed him the best on ground medal, while James Boughen and Tristan Jackson fought well alongside skipper Jayden Logos.

As an ex-player himself, Guidolin believed the experience of playing in recent RFL B grade deciders aided him to help guide the players through the week.

"I've been in their situation the last two years and I think it helps you stay level headed and calm," he said.

"We identified what we needed to do, and then it was just a matter of staying calm and doing the process.

"You can be pretty easily over-awed as a younger kid, and being an ex-player is definitely helpful in those situations."

With Barmera-Monash charging late, and kicking the match's only final quarter major, Guidolin said the final quarter was nerve-racking for him.

"I was very nervous, because obviously the game was on the line," he said.

"Luke Zdanowicz was the only one who had any legs left and he chased the bloke down in the goal square and then followed up again on the outer wing with another chase and it really won the game for us to be honest."

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Rovers back on top of the mountain

A SEASON filled with twists and turns culminated in a thrilling Riverland Football League A grade grand final on Saturday afternoon in front of a massive crowd at Panther Park.

Renmark made it a 19th A grade premiership, and its fourth in five seasons with a 17-point win over Barmera-Monash.

Those at the ground were treated to a rather cagey affair for the opening nine minutes of the match, with many turning their minds back to last year's low-scoring decider between the two sides.

However, the deadlock was broken when superstar Renmark recruit Nick Gillard opened the scoring with a snap on goal in front of the Rovers pack and the game was well and truly underway from there.

In a high-pressure contest, both gave maximum effort with the result in the balance across the entirety of the day.

Late goals from Renmark midfielder Tim Woolford did the damage and as the second one sailed through with under a minute remaining, the Rovers supporters were in raptures as the final siren rung around Loxton North.

Four-time Renmark playing coach Josh Vater said while the premiership was still sinking in, he was proud of the way his side played across the day.

"It's an incredible feeling, and it's still sinking in for me, but I say to our club all the time that I am very much conscious of the fact that I am a small cog in the machine that is our sporting club," he said.

"I just play my role and my message to the playing group is for everyone to just play their role, and if everyone does that we'll be okay and do what we can control."

Renmark begun season 2024 with a 35-point win over the Roos at the Lakeside, and while dips in form occurred throughout the year, the Rovers remained top two across the whole season.

The Rovers were defeated by nine points in last year's grand final at Waikerie, and that was something Vater said motivated the group across the pre-season.

"The disappointment of last year really drove the hunger

to make us really conscious of what wins you grand finals, and we had ourselves to blame last year," he said.

"But we changed some game style things right from the beginning of the pre-season and we made some changes mid-season as well, so I think that provided a spark to keep players engaged and really interested."

With just one point separating the two sides at the quarter time break, Renmark broke the game open in the second quarter with three goals unanswered, taking a 19-point half time advantage.

Vater himself booted two, while Gillard's second of the day had the Roos under significant pressure.

"One of the more powerful assets you can have as a playing coach is the fact that you can do your very best to live and breathe what you're asking the players, and showing them what and how you want something done," he said.

"Right throughout my coaching journey that asset is something I've been very conscious of being able to say, this is what we're doing and I'll go and show you what I mean by that, and hopefully drag some others along.

"We've got a heap of players who stand up and are real leaders at the footy club and all of them stood up particularly over the last six weeks.

"There's been a real lift in our leaders and our whole group has followed them."

While the Rovers had the momentum into the half time break, Barmera-Monash quickly responded in the third term with a big goal to Mason Middleton.

However, Renmark ruckman Zach Gartery flipped the game back in his side's favour with a stunning attempt from the boundary line, helping see the Rovers to a 16-point lead at the final break.

Vater said he felt the goal from his star ruckman was a major turning point of the match.

"That was from a slow build up and it was into the breeze... and then for him to have the composure to go back and slot that at a really crucial time was massive," he said.

"When there are only seven goals kicked by us on the day, every one becomes really vital,

particularly considering both teams had kicked a lot of points too.

"That's been a bit of a story for us across the last two years in the games we've lost against Barmera-Monash.

"We've felt we've had our chances but we've kicked too many points, so for Zach to kick that was crucial."

Barmera-Monash's goals came through star forward Jono Beech, who booted two while spending time in the middle of the ground, alongside Middleton's second quarter finish.

Playing coach Fraser Sampson made good decisions with ball in hand for the Roos, while young gun Ayden Hodgson drove Barmera-Monash out of stoppage throughout the match.

Beech turned the momentum of the game in the final quarter with an early snap, and just two minutes later Dan Westley kicked truly for Barmera-Monash to cut the margin to five points.

Woolford starred for Renmark across the day, finding the ball with ease prior to his two final quarter goals, while Ricky Garrett and Bailey White had major moments of composure, and Nick Gillard created a spark

inside attacking 50.

Woolford took home The Murray Pioneer Best on Ground medal, and Vater said he was confident when the star midfielder lined up for the late goals.

"I was right next to him with the first one, because the wind had dropped by that stage and it was pretty calm and he's a composed set shot so I was really confident with the first one," he said.

"He then went straight into the centre bounce, earned the free kick and that was pretty fortunate, and made us feel a little bit safer.

"We knew there wasn't much time left at all and then he kicked that one which made it even safer so there were no nerves from me."

While Vater understands exactly how Barmera-Monash is feeling, he said his opposition should be "proud" of the way it performed across season 2024.

"Losing is a part of sport, and in a sense it's what drives a lot of the desire for people to play sport," he said.

"Even the anxiety of watching and barracking for a team or playing is the fact you don't know who's going to win, and unfortunately not everyone can win.

"I'm glad it was us that got to win this time, but we were in their shoes last year and it's a bitter pill to swallow.

"It doesn't make much of a difference to them, but you do mean it in saying that you have to always be proud of the year you've had.

"To go through and only lose a couple of games for the year and be in a strong position, they should be really proud of themselves.

"We've looked forward to building towards playing them all year, and we sort of knew after the year they had last year, and the people they had recruited that they were going to be the ones we'd have to prepare for all year."

After winning the premierships in 2019, 2021, and 2022, Renmark will once again enter the next season as reigning premiers, and be the hunted side for all other five RFL clubs to strive towards.

"It's always nice to get a few early kicks and just feel the ball and try and get involved in the game and just go from there."

AFTER one of the most incredible A1 Riverland netball grand finals in history, Loxton is the competition's newest premier, downing Loxton North in an overtime classic at The Precinct on Friday night.

Throughout the entirety of the game fans were on the edge of their seats, as the top two sides traded goals from the outset.

In a tight start, setting the tone for the clash, it was Loxton who took a one-goal lead into the first change, with many predicting the Tigers would run away with the win.

However, North responded in significant fashion throughout the second quarter, capitalising on turnover and converting opportunities, turning the game on its head with a five-goal lead at half time.

Loxton North young gun Maddie Groth starred during the opening half, shooting from all angles on her way to 40 goals for the night, benefiting from the service provided largely by Jenna Barry.

In a relatively even third term, North held a three-point buffer as A1 association medallist Ella Anderson proved pivotal, working well with Brooke Pietrolaj and defender Paris Lawrie.

Loxton got the jump in the final quarter, before North pulled back the margin, and when Mackella Hogan's last chance shot missed, the game was sent to overtime.

Loxton A1 coach Jono Hartley said the focus for his side was making sure it reset ahead of a tense overtime period.

"When we missed the last shot... it doesn't matter, because at the end of the day it was just one shot and we probably had 15 turnovers," he said.

"At the end of the day that particular shot wasn't telling to the whole story, it was about the whole game.

"My message was about pulling everyone back together and explaining this is what's happening and how we're going to attack it."

With seven minutes scheduled each way for the overtime period, it was Loxton North who got the initial jump, taking a one-goal lead before the change of ends.

"At the first break of overtime we knew we had the fight in us and we

knew we could sustain a really hard period," Hartley said.

"We knew if we had one quick intercept we had to have the centre pass and we could go forward quickly.

"Our biggest letdown was probably our corners, which Loxton North absolutely exploited, however, where there's a will there's a way and we just had to calm the nerves, reset and go again."

With less than 40 seconds to go, and trailing by two goals in the second overtime period, North sent the ball forward, which Groth converted.

Racing back to the centre pass with 16 seconds on the clock, Anderson took the ball forward and the strong link-up play saw the ball sent in to the circle, and Groth levelled the score with just eight seconds left.

Yet the Tigers had one last play in them and with the ball sent long from Aimee Holmes, Hogan caught the ball and scored on the buzzer, sending the Tigers' faithful into raptures as their side secured a one-goal win.

Hartley said he was proud of the way his group responded throughout the night, securing back-to-back A1 premierships.

"We knew what we had to do, it was just about having a mature mindset and how we moved forward because we knew we had it in us," he said.

"We missed the first opportunity so we knew we had to bounce back, and I had full faith, but Loxton North pushed us to every limit we had."

The win capped off a remarkable undefeated season for Loxton, which earned a week off after dismissing of North in the qualifying final a fortnight prior.

Hartley said while the group was pleased with its season, it remained focused on the grand final during preparations.

"We took a bus load over to Renmark last week and sat together as a team and watched it," he said.

"We thought it was quite a scrappy game between the two of them, and it was one which could have gone either way.

"During the week off I've never seen a group of girls be so ready to take on an opportunity, and we've been talking about what it means.

"You don't want confidence being too high, especially coming off a 22-goal win, so we had to make sure we shut that down and this was the job ahead."

Groth worked well in the goal circle alongside star shooter Helen Schober throughout the night, allowing Schober to score 32 goals, while Kirriley Wagner also tried her best to shutdown Hogan in a strong defensive showing.

Elise Foulds dominated the mid-court for Loxton, while Aimee Holmes and Hogan combined for 73 goals to help secure victory.

Tigers defender Summer Smith proved why she is one of the best up-and-coming netballers in the state, taking home the best on court award, and Hartley was full of praise for his star player.

"Summer is an absolute pivotal asset to this club and to the role of A1 netball, and we have many juniors at the club who aspire to be just like her."

While the result remained in the balance during the last quarter, it appeared Barmera would take the win before two late goals from Berri evened the game up as the final siren sounded.

In an electric atmosphere, Berri tied the game as the ending of overtime neared, and with the scores level, the winning team would be required to go two goals ahead to win the grand final.

Berri held its nerve at the offensive and defensive ends in crucial moments to secure the

tense victory, with young gun Mackenzie Pitt taking home the best on court award.

Pitt poured in 48 goals, combining well with Clara Reid who notched up 16, while defensive pair Kayla Mudge and Taylah Glen snuffed out several Barmera attacks.

Georgia Tsorotiotis generated a lot of run for Barmera, dominating the midcourt battle and feeding the ball to Meg Kassulke, who scored 47 goals to give the Lakesiders a chance.

Barmera did, however, taste victory in the 17A game against home side Loxton North on Saturday afternoon, winning by a comfortable 25-goal margin.

Hallie Hodgson led the way with 34 goals, while Macy Bourton's 27 goals and Chelsea Wutke's efforts in midcourt told the story.

Barmera also defeated Loxton North in the 15A grand final, on the back of a starring performance from Meg Kassulke, who scored 44 goals.

Layla Hutchinson and Sophie Tullett generated continual scoring opportunities for North, but it was ultimately a bridge too far for the home side.

Honest mistakes

SET IN Melbourne and inspired by real events, this fast-paced crime series will inevitably draw comparisons to *Underbelly*, which is a compliment, but *Human Error* is really a showcase for a compelling female detective and star turn from *Wentworth*'s Leeanna Walsman (pictured).

Dogged homicide detective Holly O'Rourke (Walsman) is pushed to her limit trying solve the gangland-style murder of a suburban mother who has no criminal connections whatsoever.

With an onslaught of media attention on the case, Holly stakes her reputation on the victim's husband being responsible, but she soon discovers the murder is a case of mistaken identity and then uncovers a complex web of crime and corruption that leaves more than just her job on the line.

While her professional life goes from bad to worse, Holly's personal life is also in shambles. Her marriage to lawyer Luke (Matt Day) is in crisis as she is pregnant to another man (Stephen Peacocke), and her precocious daughter (Rosie Mitchell) is causing endless grief. Steve Bisley puts in a memorable turn as Bear, Holly's retired detective father who is full of unwanted advice.

From an ensemble writing crew responsible for *Underbelly*, *Love My Way* and *Bump*, and with crime reporter John Silvester as consultant, this six-part series feels fresh and satisfyingly gritty.
