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Riverland community mourns popular DJ

MEMBERS of the local community are mourning the sudden passing of a well-known Adelaide-based DJ who was a regular fixture at local Greek and multicultural events for decades.

Stelio Mitsos, affectionately known as DJ Stelio, passed away peacefully last Saturday, after a sudden cardiac arrest.

Known for bringing life to countless weddings, engagements, birthdays, and festive gatherings across the region, Mr Mitsos had long been considered the go-to entertainer for Riverland families and community groups.

Riverland Greek Hall committee member Maria Sialas said his absence would be deeply felt.

"He was the popular one that people used often," Ms Sialas said.

"He was well-known in the community, and it'll impact us because he was a go-to person.

"Even if he couldn't do it himself, he would always help out and refer us to someone else."

Mr Mitsos' musical versatility set him apart as one of the few entertainers able to deliver both English and

Greek music with ease, providing a unique cultural bridge for many in the region.

"He was a great entertainer, and it's not easy to find someone who can play foreign music like Greek music," Ms Sialas said.

"There's no entertainer like that here in the Riverland, so we really relied on him to come down from Adelaide for our events."

His contributions extended to major community celebrations, including New Year's Eve dances, Christmas events, and countless private functions held at the Renmark-based Greek Hall and beyond.

While another DJ has been arranged to fill in for upcoming events, Ms Sialas said Mr Mitsos will not be forgotten.

"On the night of the Riverland Rose and Garden Festival gala dinner, we'll definitely mention that we'll be missing Stelio doing what he usually did for us," Ms Sialas said.

"We've had to organise someone else to come in – DJ Sarez – but it won't be the same without Stelio."

Ms Sialas said Mr Mitsos leaves behind a legacy of generosity, energy, and cultural connection through music — one that touched the lives of many in both Adelaide and the Riverland.

Funding boost for local community projects

RIVERLAND community groups and local organisations are being encouraged to apply for the next round of Thriving Communities grants, aimed to fund initiatives that strengthen local connections and enhance wellbeing.

The Thriving Communities Program is part of the State's Government's \$15m Thriving Regions Fund, with grants of between \$20,000 and \$50,000 available to eligible organisations, with previous grant recipients across South Australia using the funding for a wide range of community improvements, including sports infrastructure upgrades, accessible community hubs, youth activity zones, and public space revitalisation.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said "the State Government is pleased to open a new round of funding through the Thriving Communities Program after its popularity and success in recent years".

"This program enables regional groups to deliver vital infrastructure and services that improve quality of life, strengthen resilience, and help our regional communities thrive," Ms Scriven said.

"Regional industries contributed nearly \$36bn to South Australia's economy in 2023-24, and we want to support regional communities to remain vibrant, sustainable and attractive places to live and work.

"By investing in local projects, we are supporting the people who make our regions strong and ensuring that opportunities are shared right across the state."

Eligible projects can include infrastructure upgrades, training programs, services, and events that promote community wellbeing. All projects must be completed within 12 months.

Applications will be open until October 15.

Varroa mite shakes Riverland beekeepers

A WELL-known Riverland beekeeper is examining how to adapt following the first detection of varroa mite in South Australia, with concerns rising over how the pest could impact both commercial hives and pollination services vital to local horticulture.

Loxton-based commercial beekeeper Ian Cass said he has been preparing for varroa since PIRSA's varroa development officers (VDO's) began holding training sessions.

"As a commercial beekeeper, firstly I have attended several varroa sessions run by the PIRSA VDO's to learn all I could, so I could, so I could make the best decisions I can, when we have to face varroa here," he

Mr Cass said his plan includes a combination of chemical, physical and alternative measures.

'We are looking at all the different options as to how we can control Varroa in our hives, like the different chemical treatments, and an entire program to alternate the treatments in order to stop resistance from the varroa to the different chemicals," he said.

"A complete program was created to fit in with the timing of honey flows and pollination services, as well as strengths of the hive over the

"Physical controls like vented bottom boards on our hives mean when the bees dislodge a varroa mite, they fall through the vents to the

ground and die there, as they must have the host bee to live on. This is only a 10 to 20 per cent control."

However, Mr Cass said lessons from overseas show some ideas are unsuitable to the Riverland's conditions.

'One good example was a robber board idea used in New Zealand which controls bees with varroa from other hives entering our hives,' Mr Cass said.

"(This) sounded great until it was pointed out that our bees would not be able to cool their hives as they do with that idea, so it can't be used in our very hot summers."

Mr Cass said the greatest danger in the short term is when varroa spreads into wild bee populations.

"The biggest short-term risk will be when varroa gets into the wild bee populations, and we have been told to expect 90 to 95 per cent loss of those colonies," he

"That also brings issues with those bees with highmite loads trying to invade our hives when varroa has badly damaged their hive health. Another issue is our bees finding the wild bee colonies and robbing them, but that brings the risk of huge numbers of varroa entering our hives, and American foul brood and other diseases which can be in those unchecked hives."

Mr Cass said more training and extension support is needed for local bee keepers.

"I believe there needs to be an extension of time that the VDOs are employed, and

more sessions for all the beekeepers, who have missed the training so far," he said.

"Many local beekeepers have attended the varroa sessions run by the VDOs and there is also a lot of talk between beekeepers, all looking at the alternatives as varroa is going to change beekeeping majorly and permanently. Any mistake can involve a serious loss of bees and large colony losses if we get this program wrong."

Mr Cass said the cost of treatment programs is also a looming challenge.

"The other huge risk is the cost of the treatments, as it is looking like between \$60 to \$70 per year, per hive, for chemical treatments with no allowance for labour costs which will be considerably more as well," he said.

Mr Cass also warned backyard beekeepers that managing hives would soon become far more complex.

"This will involve far more work than they have standardly done to their hives, including monitoring of varroa numbers using either alcohol or sugar shakes, treatments and removal of used treatment materials, the removal of honey supers in some treatments, and storage until they can be put back on after the treatment has finished," he

"This is a lot of work and cost, but the returns will be far greater if you wish to continue growing fruit and vegetables at home.'

New studies confirm mental health benefits of school phone bans

SOUTH Australian experts have produced more evidence of the potential benefits to Riverland student wellbeing, mental health outcomes and their overall lived experience.

New research by Flinders University and international experts focused on school students' feedback before and after mobile phone bans were introduced in South Australia in June 2023, as well as in-depth follow up insights from hundreds of students on the mobile phone ban.

"Together, the two studies highlight that phone-free schools seem to provide students with a valuable 'digital break' that supports both mental health and learning," Flinders University College of Education, Psychology and Social Work research fellow, and clinical psychologist, Marcela Radunz said.

"The findings also reaffirm that while bans can be a cost-effective tool, they should be paired with broader strategies, including digital literacy and mental health programs, to prepare young people for life in an increasingly digital world.'

The latest study published in Computers in Human Behaviour highlights a range of positive responses among wide-ranging student feedback, taken from about 7000 openended survey answers completed by more than 1500 students, from five SA schools.

These include:

- ☐ STRONGER social connections: more face-to-face interaction, better quality conversations, and greater awareness of peers and their surroundings.
- ☐ IMPROVED classroom focus: less distraction, greater engagement in learning, and reports of higher grades, with teachers also spending less time managing phones.
- ☐ BETTER health and safety: reduced screen time, more exercise, improved mood, and less cyberbullying and conflict. Many students described their

schools as happier, friendlier, and safer environments since the ban.

The earlier study compared student mental health between schools with and without bans, before and after SA's statewide ban was introduced.

The results showed a clear link between phone bans and lower levels of psychological distress, including reduced symptoms of anxiety and depression. Students also reported fewer negative effects tied to problematic phone use, such as fear of missing out, risky behaviour, and social comparison.

Psychology Professor, and senior author, Dan King said "although improvements were modest, research is supporting the idea that even small reductions in psychological distress could have important public health implications if implemented at a large scale.'

Smartphone ownership among young people has skyrocketed in recent decades, with ownership exceeding 90 per cent in many countries.

As phones become an everyday part of adolescent life, there are growing concerns about their impact on mental health.

There is a growing body of research showing that excessive smartphone use can negatively impact wellbeing, contributing to increased anxiety, depression and stress among adolescents.

In response, many countries, including Australia, have introduced mobile phone bans across schools in an effort to reduce potential harms and support student wellbeing. However, until recently, evidence of their effectiveness has been limited and

"These new studies shed light on how phone bans are influencing young people in South Australia, both in terms of mental health outcomes and students' lived experiences," Dr King said.

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

Hives gone, but the varroa risk remains?

INTERSTATE beehives connected to South Australia's varroa mite incursion have been removed from the state, however the risk of the pest spreading still remains.

PIRSA last Thursday held a community meeting in Loxton to provide local beekeepers and growers with the latest updates regarding the pest's presence in South

An ABC report regarding the meeting said a PIRSA representative confirmed to attendees there was a chance varroa mite was still in the area.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said a South Australian beekeeper with hives located within the 25km surveillance buffer was under active monitoring, with samples sent to the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI) for further examination.

"We know varroa mite poses a significant challenge for our beekeepers, growers and pollination services, and that is why the Malinauskas Government has acted swiftly to remove interstate hives and put strong surveillance in place.

"Beekeepers are the frontline in managing this pest, and their cooperation in monitoring, reporting and staying engaged with PIRSA is absolutely vital.

"Sentinel hives, catch boxes and ongoing testing are critical tools in this stage of surveillance and management, and the input of beekeepers in monitoring and reporting remains essential."

A state government statement on the matter advised the hives on the impacted orchard were treated with acaricides, and sticky mats were deployed to support con-

"While in a perfect world we wouldn't have varroa in our state, unfortunately it is not considered eradicable at a national level given its presence in New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and the ACT and that's why over the past 18 months, we have been working with industry to develop the SA Varroa Detection Response and Transition to Management Plan," Ms Scriven said.

"Pollination-dependent industries such as the almond, apple, cherry and blueberry industries are collectively worth about \$1.7bn to South Australia's economy - so it's important varroa is managed in a way that minimises its impact, while ensuring business continuity for our agriculture and horticulture sectors."

All South Australian beekeepers are reminded to inspect their hives regularly using one of the recommended methods, report any suspected detections immediately to PIRSA via the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline on 1800 084 881, and ensure they are registered with PIRSA to receive up-todate biosecurity notices.

Katherine fights for donor justice

RIVERLANDERS are being encouraged to sign a petition to introduce the state's recently updated donor conception laws Australia-wide, with the national change set to enforce necessary regulation and access to information guaranteed for any other medical system.

Advocates — such as Renmark-raised Katherine Dawson — are hoping SA Health's South Australian Donor Contraception Register and legislation can soon become a national standard, with a petition to introduce Federal Assisted Reproductive Technology (ART) Laws and a National Donor Registry now open, and set to address the serious ethical, medical, and legal concerns of patients and donor-conceived people across Australia.

"We want to try and get South Australia's legislation Australiawide — it's the most progressive, enforcing a removal of donor anonymity and a free, accessible donor registry, (while also) providing counselling for families, patients, and donor-conceived people," Ms Dawson told The Murray Pioneer.

Though currently receiving significant public funding through Medicare, ART has no consistent federal regulation, nor a national donor conception reg-

With standards varying widely, and barring donor-conceived people from accessing accurate information about their genetic origins, while also undermining accountability in the use, and tracking of donor cells, patients and families are denied basic protections available in any other medical system.

"Currently, most information from donor are taken in good faith, including identification, health information, whether or not they are donating at another clinic or privately," Ms Dawson said.

"All the ownness is on the donor, and (while donors can no longer be paid, or remain anonymous in Australia), if there is someone who is mentally unwell, or doing it for their opportunistic reasons, they might face a small fine, but I have never really seen that fine be given out.

'(Additionally), international donors — who are paid, and have lax donating limits — are often pushed onto parents to avoid the wait of a local donor."

Born from IVF, Ms Dawson said she knew from a young age she was conceived from a donor, and due to being born in Victoria, she was finally able to discover the identity of, and contact, her biological father in 2017 after legislation was passed for the retrospective removal of anonymity.

However, this self-investigation led Ms Dawson to uncover the distressing lack of a medical duty of care undertaken.

Through the use of multiple names, and consequently generating different donor codes, Ms Dawson discovered poor vetting practices had allowed her father to donate for at least six years - between 1983 and 1989 - and has now located 53 confirmed half-siblings, four of which were born in South Australia.

Information about her paternal side, and connection with her half-siblings, has also allowed her to know she may be at risk of medical conditions, including bowel cancer and schizophrenia.

"The exact number of my half-siblings are unknown, and they could be between from 23 to 42 years old," Ms Dawson

"You never know how your siblings are, or how they're going, or if they know this information about themselves.

"I have really been trying to get medical information to my siblings, but in Victoria, the best you can do is get the clinic to reach out to possible siblings, through their parents, and through addresses on file when they were being conceived.

"The effort level (of clinics) is so minuscule, but it all costs money, which they place on the those who are (searching for biological connections) money talks, and anything that has come out has been because of people outlaying costs, not because of any duty of care.

"This is why we want the legislations nationwide, and to have donor information given to a department of health as a register so people have the chance to know their history in an accessible, verifiable way."

Since the discovery, Ms Dawson has been advocating for change, leading the charge this February on the SA Parliament steps, and now setting her sites on an Australia-wide reform.

Leading in progressive policy, South Australia has enacted strong, bipartisan legislation, and established donor conception registers, providing, as Ms Dawson states, "a clear model for national action".

Though already receiving more than 1000 signatures, Ms Dawson said 'Petition EN7525 Introduce Federal ART Laws and a National Donor Registry needs 10,000 to bring the discussion to parliament floor.

"Making a child via IVF, using donor conception, and solo-mothers by choice are all very common, so it's time to make the legislation up to date," Ms Dawson said.

"There is also just huge amount of people who don't know they're donor conceived or their medical history — this is the best step forward to allow people to make informed decisions about their future and their

"This is life changing and life saving information, and I just want it to be there for people."

Petition EN7525 - Introduce Federal ART Laws and a National Donor Registry will close on October 3.

Barossa grower cautious over pricing Bill

A SENIOR SA grape grower believes national structural industry adjustment is needed to properly help wine regions like the Riverland.

Barossa Valley grape grower – and Wine Grape Council of South Australia region two chair - Adrian Hoffmann said outcomes of a new indicative pricing Bill introduced to SA Parliament were difficult to predict.

Put forward by Fair Go MLC Sarah Game earlier this month, the amendment would force wineries to provide indicative prices to SA wine grape growers by September 30 each year - a measure Dr Game claimed would allow "struggling growers to plan, opt out of a loss-making vintage if necessary, but potentially stay in the industry".

However, Mr Hoffmann warned of "unintended consequences".

"My big concern is... all about the unintended consequences of what's going to happen with those codes being put in place," Mr Hoffmann said.

"For me, the Bill is mostly looking like

a short-term win, but I think Dr Craig Emerson covered that in his report... in trying to get more indicative prices for grape growers in gen-

the bigger wineries interact with the smaller wineries, and by looking at what they are asking for in (Dr Game's) Bill, I don't think it will change that.

"I think more of a national approach needs to be taken. It's all well and good binding it up in SA legislation, but we've got legislation to protect payment terms already.'


Mr Hoffmann said the co-ordination of a national approach to implement recommendations from the recent Emerson Review would be more effective for industry.

"The ACCC told the wine industry to pull up its socks (years) ago, and very little had gotten done in that space," he said.

"A lot of the recommendations from the ACCC weren't followed through, and that's why we've had a full report done on the

"The Emerson Report has 14 recommendations, and I think if those 14 recommendations were (instigated) it would go a long way in protecting at least 80 per cent of all transactions between grape growers, and wineries, going forward.

Growers have been dealing with this for a long time, and there's an opportunity to focus at the national level."

"I was humbled to be awarded," Dr Stanton told The Murray Pioneer.

"I know doctors who have previously also achieved this award for rural practice, so to be put in the same class as them was absolutely amazing and an

Dr Stanton moved from Adelaide to the Riverland in 1988, taking a position at the Berri Medical Clinic, where he has now completed almost 40 years of service to the commu-

Always harbouring an ambition to become a GP, Dr Stanton

"As a GP, you become a jackof-all-trades and you learn how to cope with a lot of emergencies," he said.

"However, I always thought it would be a pity to waste the training as GP working in the city, because, in rural areas (the demand) allows you to utilise all your skills.

"Over the course of my time in Berri, I did anaesthetics, surgery, looked after trauma, and any medical cases that came through, as well as delivering more than 1000 babies.

"There were also times that I was able to save lives in roadaccidents, or when someone was experiencing a cardiac arrest (in public) — so, it feels like quite an achievement, and great to look back on.

'(Additionally), Berri Medical Clinic have had a hand in teaching Flinders Medical School students since 1995, and I have been a supervisor for 46 of them, on top of many registrars that have come through the clinic. Being able to pass on my knowledge that way has been amazing.

Though set to retire next year already planning an international cruise, time with his grandchildren, and a long reading list of military history books — Dr Stanton said it has been "wonderful to service the Berri community all these years".

"Because you know people so well you really become invested and part of the community, which helps allow me to be the best GP I can," he said.

"I am really going to miss the all the staff and community.

"It's been a lovely career, and I really have to pay tribute to my wife and family who have put up with me always working — without them, I wouldn't have been able to do what I have done.'

Having begun his work and training in Kenya, Somalia and South Africa, Dr Torome migrated to Australia in 2001 and is now the senior GP, working at Barmera Medical Clinic for more than 20 years.

"It's a big thing, to be recognised like this alongside and in front of my peers," Dr Torome said.

"I don't think any doctor comes to work expecting to get recognition like this, so to have that appreciation was great."

Dr Torome said he owns the "support from patients and staff" to his long-service dedication to the Barmera clinic.

"Staying in one practice can be hard, but I receive so much support from everyone here," he said.

No going back now

SOMETIMES the things that are hardest to see can cause huge problems.

Few among us would want to be reminded of the absolute global havoc caused in recent years by the Covid-19 virus, and a small crack can eventually develop into a fissure that brings down a house.

For those in the Riverland – particularly local beekeepers and horticultural producers reliant on pollination – we are now beginning to understand the full seriousness of the issue caused by varroa mite entering South Australia.

In the time since the initial outbreak at Pooginook, outside of Waikerie, we have seen the State Government portraying the image that PIRSA has snapped into action in order to best manage the situation.

However, are the actions that have followed this initial outbreak setting the foundation for an effective response?

First, we heard the urgent message for beekeepers to register the locations of their hives in order for a network to be established, that could be monitored and would indicate the pest's potential.

Last week we were also given the update that all infected hives associated with the outbreak had been removed from South Australia, following the undertaking of some rather strict-sounding treatment and control measures at the site.

However, media reports soon confirmed that despite these hives being removed, the hard-to-detect pest could very much still be present in the area.

This reveals that another risk indeed lies within PIRSA's communication.

Those involved in Riverland horticultural production probably need no catching up on the difficulties in obtaining clear answers from the department in terms of its response to Queensland fruit fly entering the region so many years ago. The same could likely be said for the many local homeowners whose backyard trees are seemingly sprayed on a weekly basis.

The same mistakes cannot be repeated in the response to varroa mite. Clear communication with beekeepers and a defined approach are needed in order to minimise the potential opportunities the mite has to spread.

When areas where bees are brought in for pollination from multiple different states are taken into account, the difficulty of keeping the mite contained in one place is truly illustrated.

As pointed out by experienced beekeeper Ian Cass, the entire apiarist industry is facing a dramatic shift in having to deal with ongoing varroa mite monitoring, and treatment.

This adjustment will seemingly require the necessary levels of ongoing support so beekeepers can maintain the healthy hives that are in-turn so important for Australian food production.

On July 15, 1948, the SA Department of Lands affixed a brown 6d (6 penny) Kookaburra stamp to a buffcoloured envelope with perhaps the most significant letter he ever received. It approved his request for Section 417, Loxton Irrigation Area, of the War Service Land Settlement Scheme. It detailed soil type (such as sandy, loam, or clay), and horticultural land use (citrus, deciduous tree-crops (apricots, peaches, or wine grape vines). It also detailed types of irrigation (spray, or furrow), location of pipelines, recommended planting spacings, and location of house. Rex's initial accommodation was however a simple corrugated-iron-and-timber hut. His section incorporated a sandy ridge which he, and new neighbour Peter Nicholas, planted to citrus. Their blocks were on present-day Anderson Road, Loxton North. Rex's wife Una and family arrived from Curlwaa, NSW, in December 1949. The pegging out for, and planting of the trees, and watering and hoeing '...became very tiring,' recalled Rex. 'Then the portable spray pipes caused more backaches. This was changed to a degree when we were allowed to convert to overhead sprinklers. I was a member of the Spray Committee, (which) eventually convinced the Department to the change,' he recalled. Growing cash crops like tomatoes greatly assisted their needy finances. 'one season we harvested 43 tons and 1500 half-bushel cases. We were so busy picking and sorting tomatoes and travelling to and from market in Adelaide that we were exhausted. But our finances were helped greatly". PHOTO: Mark Calleja.

Tip of homelessness iceberg?

AS one of the largest providers of homelessness services in Australia, during Homelessness Week The Salvation Army highlighted the catastrophic number of young children who are experiencing homelessness, with more than 5000 children under 14 (one in seven) seeking support through its homelessness services this year.

These shocking figures are reflected in newly released Homelessness Australia statistics, which showed a 20 per cent increase in women and girls who were currently experiencing homelessness when they reached out for support.

Of the women and girls seeking homelessness support, a massive 45 per cent report having experienced domestic and/or family violence.

The increase in women and children experiencing homelessness is a tragedy.

Only 20 per cent of the national homeless population

can get help from Homelessness Services due to limited resources, so we are only seeing the tip of a very large and nasty iceberg.

Overwhelmed Homelessness Services are forced to prioritise the needs of people who are already experiencing homelessness, rather than have a focus on the vital areas of early intervention and prevention.

The Salvos Homelessness Services nationally already work with around 8000 people experiencing homelessness every month.

A recent report from The Salvos surveyed over 3500 community members who had received food, financial assistance or material aid from The Salvation Army, and found that accessing and maintaining safe, secure housing was a persistent struggle, with high housing rental costs placing significant pressure on already over-stretched budgets.

Housing stress, instability, and fears of homelessness were common, reflecting the compounding impact of financial hardship, limited affordable options, and complex personal circumstances.

Australia's plummeting standard of living

A NEW report on Australia's standard of living has found that low real wages, underfunded public services and skyrocketing prices have left many families experiencing hardship and hopelessness.

But the recent report, Solving the Crisis – Raising Living Standards of Australian Workers, also concludes that there is hope, and suggests a range of reforms to improve our way of life.

Compiled by the Centre for Future Work at The Australia Institute, the report found that official inflation data does not reflect the pressure families are experiencing as they struggle to afford essentials like food, housing and energy.

It found the Reserve Bank

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of Australia's response to high inflation – repeatedly lifting interest rates - was a case of victim-blaming and acted as a double punishment for working families.

Recommendations in the Solving the Crisis report include: ☐ Treating housing as a human right.

- ☐ Restoring the minimum wage to a minimum of 60 per cent of the median wage.
- ☐ Greater investment and fasttracking of clean, affordable, renewable energy. ☐ Making fossil fuel-mining
- companies pay their fair share of taxes and royalties. ☐ Raising all income support payments to the level of the
- age pension. ☐ Fixing the broken employment services system.
- ☐ Abolishing the capital gains tax discount and negative gearing.
- ☐ Better funding of Medicare, public hospitals, early childhood education and care, and public schools.

Productivity might be the word on everyone's lips in the lead up to the economic reform roundtable. But weak productivity isn't the cause of many of the problems facing Australian families today.

The key to raising living standards is focusing on the experience of workers and their families with a multidimensional approach rather than a narrow concentration on productivity.

There are better, fairer alternatives to managing economic challenges than simply tightening workers' collective belts.

By centring workers' experiences and building a robust evidence base, we have mapped a path to a progressive economic agenda that lifts living standards, reduces inequality, and strengthens democracy.

Food system in need of urgent reset

THE Australian Conservation Foundation (ACF) has welcomed the release of the Federal Government's National Food Security Strategy discussion paper as a once-in-a-generation opportunity, and renewed calls to deliver a food system that works for nature, consumers and farmers.

The announcement by



Minister for Agriculture Julie Collins is part of the government's election promise to develop Feeding Australia: a national food security strategy, and follows a CSIRO report that revealed the hidden environmental and health costs of Australia's broken food system could be as high as \$274 billion.

Australia's food system is in need of an urgent reset.

The food system we currently have is delivering healthy profits for supermarkets and chemical companies, but it doesn't work for farmers, consumers, or the planet.

Any national strategy must ensure that all Australians, including future Australians, have access to nutritious food they can afford, and to achieve that the food system must operate within environmental limits.

Every sector of the economy is dependent on nature to varying degrees, but no industry is more directly reliant on nature being in good health than agri-

Farmers manage more than half of the Australian land mass, meaning no one has a bigger opportunity to protect and restore nature, and we should reward those farmers that protect nature, because we all benefit.

Business as usual is not sustainable. We have cleared half of the country's forest and woodland, and redirected whole rivers, to grow and export agricultural commodities, and the degradation that has resulted is,

along with climate change, the biggest threat to food security.

Minister Collins should be applauded for committing to a whole food system, and a whole of government approach, as the success of the food system relies on much more than how many tonnes of beef or wheat we can produce each year.

Australian consumers, health experts and scientists, should have as much say in the food system as big players in the beef and grains industry. They must be given a seat at the table ahead of vested interests who are chasing bigger export volumes, lower environmental standards, or more opportunities to sell chemicals and fertilisers.

The college's rural generalist (RG) doctors share a deep commitment to the women in their communities.

Rural women show incredible strength, but their health outcomes tell us the system is not keeping up.

They are more likely to experience preventable cancers, chronic disease, poorer maternal outcomes and, tragically, higher rates of family and domestic violence.

For First Nations women, these barriers can be greater without access to culturally safe and community-led care.

Rural generalist doctors see first-hand the impact of these inequities.

RGs live and work alongside the women they care for, they are neighbours, friends, and trusted community leaders.

They provide maternity care, reproductive health, emergency medicine, chronic disease management and, importantly, they are often the first to recognise when a woman is at risk of violence or harm.

Their role is to listen, to support, and to help women navigate care in a way that is safe and respectful.

ACRRM is calling for greater investment in rural women's health services, culturally safe and woman-centred maternity care, and support for rural generalist training to ensure more doctors are equipped to serve women living rural, remote, and First Nations communities.

When rural women are supported to live healthier, safer lives. the whole community thrives.



South Australia leading the way on protecting tenants private information

INCREASING the protection of Riverland rental tenants' private information is the aim of new state-wide legislation.

The State Government last month introduced a prescribed form for tenants to use when applying for a rental property, ensuring personal information requested is relevant to their potential tenancy and preventing them from being asked for irrelevant personal details

Minister for Housing Andrea Michaels said "protecting tenants' private information was one of the (State) Government's key priorities when we began reforming South Australia's rental laws".

"South Australia has led the way on better protecting tenants while still ensuring that landlords' rights are respected," Ms Michaels.

"This new application form will ensure the personal information requested of tenants when applying for a rental property is relevant to their application and that they are not being asked needlessly for irrelevant personal information.

"It complements the work we have already done to protect tenants' privacy and increase their security in their rental homes."

SYC (Rent Right) chief operating officer for community services Kiara Kerr said "this change helps ensure that only relevant personal information is requested, giving tenants greater confidence and security when applying for a home."

"Rent Right SA welcomes the introduction of the new rental application form in South Australia as a significant step forward in protecting renters' privacy," Ms Kerr said.

A new information campaign will be run by Consumer and Business Services, supported by the Real Estate Institute of SA (REISA), to educate landlords, tenants and real estate agents on the changes.

REISA chair Cain Cooke said the introduction of prescribed reasons for landlords to end a tenancy - such as wanting to move into or renovate their property, and an extension to the notice period to end a fixed-term tenancy, from 28 days to 60 days, balanced the needs of renters and owners.

"REISA supports the introduction of provisions that better balance the rights of landlords and tenants," Mr Cooke said.

"The right to terminate a periodic lease or not renew a fixed-term lease because the landlord has entered into a sales agency agreement is a welcome move from the government to enable landlords to prepare their homes

for sale.


"We welcome the constructive dialogue that we had had and continue to have with the government."

The prescribed application form can be accessed by visiting the website (www.cbs.sa.gov.au/documents/tenancy/forms/Form-A1_Application-for-a-prospective-tenant. pdf). There will be a transition period with industry and landlords having until January 1, 2026, before the form becomes mandatory.

RYT shining a light on rural artists

RECEIVING \$39,995 worth of state funding to develop as local community artists and storytellers, a group of young Riverlanders are set to design a podcast to connect with, and spread the word on, rural creatives.

Announced to be sharing in \$1.3m state government arts and culture grant funding this month, The Riverland Youth Theatre (RYT) — soon to be known as Ramble Arts — is set to lead a youth-led podcast project, Lighthouse Keepers.

A project that will have RYT members learn how to create a podcast and about the impact of community arts, Lighthouse Keepers is set to be a host for a series of interviews with rural and regional artists across the state.

"Over the past couple of years, RYT has really become a leader in the (artistic) sector, so we have really wanted to reach out to others, and create something that can share the amazing things that are happening in this space," RYT associate artist, and project led, Fleur Kilpatrick said.

"So, this is not only a way for RYT to create connections with artists — showcasing their brilliant work but it also allows us to connect rural artists who have the same goals with each

"On top of it all, the entire project will be led by the curiosity of young people, many of whom have been asking us about (future) pathways, and the reality of being an artist, particularly

if they want to stay in a rural area and give back."

Working and co-ordinating with RYT associate artist Stuart Watkinson, Ms Kilpatrick said she has been "dreaming of Lighthouse Keepers since 2023"

"The idea actually started through a letter from the (artistic director) of Whyalla D'faces (youth arts organisation), which was signed off 'from your fellow lighthouse keeper'," Ms Kilpatrick said.

"Regional youth arts organisations are always putting out a light and saying 'we're over here'.

"So, it's a way to build on that — to broadcast our fantastic peers, have RYT become the glue, and a mapfinder and maker for regional and rural organisations across the state, and begin to ease the load and making artists feel less lonely through that connection.

Working in the regional art sector for the latter half of her career, Ms Kilpatrick said the industry is unique due to its "often urgent need for services".

"When I came to the Riverland, there was an urgent need for joy and connection," she said.

"You are also having to hold so many roles, as well as filling gaps for services that just aren't available rurally through more traditional means.

'Working rurally means you have a lot more responsibilities, which includes the burden of making it sustainable, but there's also a lot more opportunities to do good for your community."

"Often our artists also experience a lot of loneliness by being isolated in rural towns, so to create a network is so important.

"We need to champion our community-based artists, and give them a reason to keep going — which I hope this project can begin to do."

Set to begin production on Lighthouse Keepers in October, to be released to the public in March 2026, Ms Kilpatrick said she encouraged locals to tune in on any streaming platform.

"Sometimes the arts can feel a little foreign, so this is a grassroots way of showing communities the ways arts can be used locally, for wellbeing, connection, education, and health," she said.

Minister for Arts Andrea Michaels said "the variety of funding in this round highlights the incredible scope of talent we have in South Australia".

"The (State Government continues to focus on growing our thriving arts and cultural sector, as well as giving opportunities for artists to develop their pathways and further their careers," Ms Michaels said.

"Importantly, this funding also aligns with the ambitions in our new \$80m State Cultural Policy, which seeks to make South Australia a world leader in supporting artists and creatives to live and work at every stage of their careers.

"We are supporting artists across the state including showcasing works in metropolitan and regional South Australia as well as overseas and interstate to highlight the extraordinary talent we have here in SA."

A firefighting boost for Berri MFS

A FIRE truck upgrade has increased safety and the capacity to help the community for a Riverland emergency service unit.

The Berri MFS unit was earlier this month the recipient of a new Heavy Urban Pump

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Rescue appliance.

MFS chief officer Jeff Swann said the new vehicle prioritises crew safety, while improving capability and community response.

"The MFS is continuing to upgrade and modernise its fleet in regional South Australia to reflect our commitment to protecting the community," Mr Swann said.

"These upgraded appliances prioritise an increase to the safety of our crews through added protections and capabilities.

"Enhancing our ability to respond in fire and rescue emergencies is key to how we best serve South Australians."

The new truck has burn-over protection systems for crew safety in wildfires, plus dedicated internal storage of PPE, like helmets, advanced battery-operated power tools for road crash rescue, thermal imaging cameras and fitted trauma kits.

Other features include:

- □ 3000L water tank capacity
- ☐ 150L foam tank capacity
- ☐ 4300L/min main pump, 290L/min high pressure pump
- ☐ Telescope remote-control monitor 5000L/min
- ☐ In-built personnel decontamination/ hygiene station

Minister for Emergency Services Emily Bourke said improving safety for firefighters would benefit regional communities.

"Delivering upgraded trucks with modern equipment helps protect our firefighters while they protect South Australians," Ms Bourke said.

"These appliances will support regional firefighting operations and help keep (Riverland) communities safe.

"We're continuing to bolster the MFS' capacity and replacing old equipment to ensure crews have access to the latest tools available across the state."

Jeff makes the fight for cannabis reform local

A RIVERLANDER fighting to reform cannabis laws has recently been named the Legalise Cannabis South Australia candidate for Chaffey.

Launching his campaign at the Riverland Field Days earlier this month, Jeff Knipe, of Barmera, will represent the Legalise Cannabis South Australia at the upcoming 2026 state election.

"Our major goal at the moment is to get a voice into parliament," Mr Knipe told The Murray Pioneer.

"At the moment we just don't have one."

With the party first established in Queensland, at the 2020 state election, The Legalise Cannabis Party works to advocate for the decriminalisation, legalisation, and regulation of the substance to reduce harm, create jobs, save money, and promote consumer safety.

Mr Knipe said he became invested in the fight to legalise cannabis after the substance gave him relief from the effects of twice surviving cancer.

"This (cause) is personal for me," Mr Knipe said.

"Like many others (who have survived cancer), I was handed a long list of pharmaceuticals that did little to help.

help.
"(However), a close friend of mine, who was ter-

minally ill, introduced me to cannabis — he sent me some edibles and it changed everything.

"I saw a real difference in my quality of life — my sleep improved, pain eased, appetite came back, and the mental fog began to lift.

"It was the first time in years I felt something was actually working."

Wanting to understand more, Mr Knipe's political career began when he joined Legalise Cannabis Victoria, in 2022, and stood as a candidate in the state election.

"I teamed up with Rachel Payne for an Upper House seat," Mr Knipe said.

"With only two weeks of pre-polling and a lot of energy, we helped Rachel become Victoria's first Legalise Cannabis MP — it was an incredible moment.

"Later, I returned home to Queensland and ran in the 2024 state election for Hervey Bay, where I proudly earned 7 per cent of the primary vote.

"Not long after, I was asked to step in for the federal election on the Gold Coast, and I did my best to support our Senate candidate and push our message into the national spotlight."

However, it was in 2025 when Mr Knipe was contacted by the South Australian team with a goal to reactivate the state party. Joining the executive, Mr Knipe said he is now "com-

mitted to using everything (he has) learned to support the party's growth", and "run for the seat of Chaffey in the 2026 state election, (while also) backing the Upper House candidate along the way".

"Too many Australians are being treated like criminals for using prescribed cannabis," Mr Knipe said.

"A positive test does not mean someone is impaired, but our laws still act like it does. Around 700,000 Australians used cannabis for medical reasons in the past year, including many who self-medicate — every one of them is at risk of prosecution under current laws.

"That has to change.

"I also believe every Australian should have the right to grow their own medicine — no one should be punished for wanting to heal themselves in a safe and natural way.

"Reforming hemp and cannabis laws is at the heart of what I do, every single day, (and) I am proud to stand up for what is fair and what is right.

"My goal is to bring these conversations into parliament and make real change happen."

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
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R&J Sonntag – A Riverland legacy coming to an end

FOR more than seven decades, R&J Sonntag Pty Ltd has stood as a cornerstone of the Riverland's building and hardware industry.

Now, as the family prepares to close the doors of their Loxton store, the community reflects on the incredible journey of a business that helped shape homes, farms and workplaces across the region.

A family business built on hard work

The Sonntag brothers began their carpentry business in 1953, when Ray and Geoff started out at 27 Wodonga Avenue, Loxton.

Just three years later, in 1956, they built new premises across the road at 20–22 Wodonga Avenue, where they installed new woodworking machinery. This workshop gradually expanded over the following years — and remarkably, it remains the company's base today.

In 1981, Geoff left the partnership and Ray's son, John, who had completed his carpentry and joinery apprenticeship, joined his father to form R&J Sonntag Pty Ltd. The business continued to grow, with increasing demand for building materials across the Riverland. Deliveries were made daily to Berri, Renmark and Barmera, and soon a second outlet was opened on Hughes Street, Berri, under the name Modern Home Linings. This new store incorporated a large plasterboard and ceiling contracting business and, at the time, the business employed 12 full-time staff.

By 1991, Ray and John expanded further, purchasing the premises of Banner Hardware at 26 Bookpurnong Terrace, Loxton, where they established a new showroom and retail store.

Building innovation and community service

Over the years, R&J Sonntag provided a wide range of services, including:

- Building supplies and retail sales
- New home and commercial building

The closure of R&J Sonntag marks the end of an extraordinary chapter in Riverland business history.

- Cabinet making
- Aluminium door and window manufacturing
- Timber sales and machining
- Plasterboard sales and contracting

The Sonntag brothers also achieved a milestone as the first distributors of plasterboard in the Riverland, introducing a product that revolutionised building practices in the region.

At its busiest, R&J Sonntag managed more than 500 accounts each month and employed tradespeople to machine timber, cut products to size and support customers with specialised orders. The business was also a proud member of the HBT buying group, helping independent stores remain competitive while retaining their local identity.

A proud Riverland legacy

Looking back on more than 72 years in business, the company has seen its Berri store operate for 40 years and its Loxton showroom on Bookpurnong Terrace serve customers for 34 years.

From humble beginnings in a backyard shed to becoming one of the Riverland's most trusted suppliers Sonntag's story reflects the hard work, innovation and community spirit that built the Riverland itself.

As the business prepares to close, John Sonntag will continue with his building and renovation work, but he is also looking forward to pursuing new interests and enjoying some well-earned holidays with his family.



Appeal for social media kindness

POLITICS has never been easy, but now the pressures are magnified by social media.

Every decision, every comment, every photograph can be dissected, debated, and sometimes deliberately distorted.

For those of us in public life, it can be disheartening when your tireless efforts and positive outcomes are overshadowed by negativity.

Through the 'Pathways to Politics for Women' program, I have had the chance to build skills in e-safety, media, and stress management.

These sessions have been invaluable, but it is sobering that they are even needed.

The reality is that every politician, no matter their role or tier of politics, faces a level of online commentary that can be confronting.

I have had plenty said to, and about me, that bears little resemblance to the truth, and yet I remain committed to giving my best for our community, because the positive outcomes matter more than the noise.

This reality was brought home again when I read of the resignation of our deputy premier Susan Close.

The words written about her by some social media users were not only unfair

but, at times, downright vicious.

It is troubling that in 2025, when we speak so often about respect and wellbeing, we still tolerate public servants, especially women, being torn down in this way.

I want to share a different side of Dr Close.

To me, she represents the best of politics. One of my constituents once told me how he invited her to see his flood-affected home in Swan Reach.

She arrived the very next day, gumboots on, climbed into a dinghy, ready to see, listen, and understand his situation firsthand. That is leadership.

I also carry my own memory of her kindness. Last year, I was having a particularly flat day. She saw me, asked how I was doing, and when I brushed her off with "you probably don't want to know," she stopped, invited me into her office, and simply listened.

Here was the deputy pre-

mier of South Australia, with endless responsibilities, yet she found time for me. That simple act reminded me that compassion and empathy still belongs in politics.

I share these stories because behind every politician is a human being, carrying the weight of responsibility, navigating pressures, and, in most cases, driven by a genuine desire to make life better for their community.

I wish Dr Close all the best for life beyond politics. She has given so much to our state, as has the outgoing treasurer, Stephen Mulligan.

Next time you see someone being abused online, don't just scroll past. Be an upstander: show your support, call the abuse out, express solidarity, or report the content.

Even a small act can reduce the impact of isolation for the person being targeted.

Social media isn't going away, but we can choose how we use it.

We can allow it to be a space that tears people down, or we can make it a place for healthy debate, where achievements are celebrated and humanity is acknowledged.

I hope as a community we strive for the latter because politics, at its heart, is about people and when we remember that, we all benefit.

Flood recovery continues

MID Murray Council is still continuing remediation works required across the district due to the 2022/2023 Murray River flood that caused damage to infrastructure and community assets.

The council's director of infrastructure and field services David Hassett, in his report to the August council meeting, said \$9.4m reimbursement and support had so far been received through various state and federal government funding streams.

He said given "council's resources and financial challenge", it had utilised and submitted funding applications to relevant government funding programs.

"The majority of infrastructure remediation has been undertaken, however various roads, camping and river access areas, marine and river facilities, and open space facilities still require further remediation," he said.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey told The Murray Pioneer significant works had been undertaken over the last few years to repair the community assets and infrastructure damaged in the flood.

"We were only able to do what we were able to do as funded under the Community Recreational Asset and Restoration Program (CRARP)," she said.

"Unfortunately some elements of council's submission remain unfunded."

The staged priorities of Mid Murray Council's initial recovery program were: road access to approximately 150kms of inundated roads and access to 2300 properties, and the recommissioning of 28 community wastewater management systems.

Other priorities included waste control and management following the flood, such as removing flood-affected damage and landfill, and levee removal and remediation.

Ms Bailey said the levee that was constructed to protect Morgan's caravan park and town from the flood had been removed.

"There are still works needed to be undertaken including the re-turf of the area at the front," she said.

Ms Bailey said some of the roads at the caravan park had also been restored.

She said the flood remediation at the Morgan Riverside Caravan Park was still ongoing.

Mr Hassett, in his August report to council, said silt contamination was still evident on roads in various areas, and these were being addressed as an ongoing matter.

He said the Morgan Wharf and river-side facilities were an area of concern.

"A cost estimate in excess of \$2.5m based on remediation assumptions and excluding potential variations that could inhibit the project has been received," Mr Hassett said.

"This has been provided to the State Government to seek funding for, with a 25 per cent commitment required from council to facilitate the works," his report said.

Mr Hassett said this would equate to a contribution from Mid Murray Council of \$625,000 should the funding be successful.

Ms Bailey said an engineering assessment had been undertaken of the damage to the Morgan Wharf caused by the flood.

She said council had replaced the playground at Cadell's Graeme Claxton Reserve, and completed the riverfront turf remedia-

"We have done the main works, which the public would have noticed, but we still have some things that we would like to do," Ms Bailey said.

She said across the district a number of community groups and private landowners still had not been able to begin rebuilding their homes and infrastructure, three years after the flood.

Ms Bailey said some of the residents across the district who had their homes inundated by water were still experiencing trauma.

RAISING \$2250 for crisis support services and cancer research, two Riverland firefighters this month took on the charity climb of 28 floors of Melbourne's Crown Metropol Hotel.

Donning up to 25kg worth of turn-out gear and a breathing apparatus, SA Barmera Country Fire Service (CFS) members Brodie Batty, and Beatrice Walladge, made the trek to the 12th Annual Firefighter Stair Climb on September 6, with the challenge raising funds and awareness surrounding health and wellbeing issues faced by first-responders and their families.

With both completing the climb under 10 minutes, Mr Batty said the fundraiser "was all the challenge (they) thought it would be and more".

"(It took) Beatrice 8:25 minutes, and myself 6:28... and the event generated a new all-time high of \$1.1m (for charity)," he said.

"The event was memorable, and personally I was honoured to be a part of something that was such a good cause - even when I felt my legs burning and I looked up and saw level 4, (and) knew there was more to go.

"Now we just need to convince more members to join us to climb for a cause in 2026.'

Support program for babies expanded to Riverland

A PROGRAM supporting families with babies who are showing early differences in their social interaction and communication development has been expanded to the Riverland.

The Inklings Program helps parents and carers better understand the needs of infants between six months and 18 months of age, building the capacity of families to better support and communicate with their child.

This evidence-based program was developed by The Kids Research Institute Australia and aims to support caregivers as early as possible in their child's development, to better understand them while also learning how to adapt the environment to meet the needs of how the baby naturally communicates and interacts.

The program — delivered across the state - is at no cost to families, and includes sixto-10 sessions led by trained practitioners.

The State Government has now expanded the program to the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN), with two Inklings practitioners providing in-person and telehealth services to families across the region.

Based in the Riverland, and Murray Bridge, Sarah – an occupational therapist - and Amy - a speech pathologist - are supporting families through the journey of understanding their loved ones and delivering the care they need to thrive and feel loved.

"I am looking forward to delivering a research-based program for families that will strongly support the relational interactions

between parent and child," Sarah said.
"In my role as an Inklings practitioner, I will work with a strength-based approach to further build the confidence of caregivers in supporting their baby's unique way of playing and communicating."

Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network acting CEO Karen Hollitt said she was "delighted to offer a pilot of the Inklings Program within our Riverland Mallee Coorong communities"

"The evidence-based program is expected to help eligible babies with early communication differences and their families to implement improved communication that is tailored to their needs.'

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said he was "very excited to see the successful Inklings Program expanded to provide support to families in our Riverland... communities".

"Babies are born with remarkable abilities to communicate, however, sometimes the social and communication skills of babies can develop differently to what is expected and this can often be confusing for families and caregivers," Mr Picton said.

"By helping families better understand and communicate with their baby, the Inklings Program can help give confidence to families and provide new knowledge to caregivers to help their child thrive.'

Minster for Autism Emily Bourke said "throughout consultation on the state's first Autism Strategy it was made clear that families are wanting support as early as possi-

"In collaboration with the Federal Government, our state is continuing our position as a national leader in inclusive supports and initiatives by providing the Inklings pilot program at no cost to families," she said.

"By providing new knowledge to families and caregivers, this program is enabling parents and caregivers to better understand and support their baby's needs by changing the environment around them.

"It's great to see this program being rolled out across our regional communities to ensure more families can access this service, broadening its life-changing impact.

Federal Minister for Health and Aging, and Minister for Disability and NDIS, Mark Butler said he was "proud to be working with the SA Government to support the Inklings Program".

"It is very pleasing to see governments giving families raising babies and young children the targeted support they need," he

"The Inklings Program will sit alongside

the Albanese Government's commitment to working with states and territories, experts and the community to establish additional supports outside the NDIS to help kids to

"Getting the right supports for children is crucial - whether it's a bespoke scheme like the NDIS, programs like the Inklings Program or our plan for Thriving Kids.

"We must ensure that the needs of children with developmental challenges are appropriately met and that parents feel confident their children are getting the best possible care."



Have your say on Canally's future

MID Murray Council is asking for opinions from the community, businesses, volunteers and tourism partners to help guide the future of Morgan's historic PS Canally.

Mid Murray Council last week announced it would review the future operations of the vessel - along with the PS Marion, and PS Mayflower, both in Mannum - as part of its ongoing review into sustainability.

A council statement on the matter said "a priority is to identify options to ensure the boats can remain as a Mid Murray attraction in a sustainable way well into the future".

The vessels deliver more than \$1.2m each year in wider community and economic benefits, while requiring an ongoing council investment of approximately \$200,000 annually to oper-

Mayor Simone Bailey said council was committed to protecting the heritage value of the fleet while also ensuring long-term sustainability.

'This is a genuine opportunity for our community to help shape the future of our



riverboats," Ms Bailey said.

"We know how much they mean to locals and visitors alike, and we want to make sure they remain a source of pride, connection and tourism well into the future.

"No decision has been made - your feedback will guide us before we take any further steps."

The statement said council has already undertaken a draft management review of maritime operations and is now seeking public input on the most sustainable models for the fleet.

Options include continuing council operations, leasing or outsourcing operations to other entities, or exploring alternative partnership mod-

The "knowledge, commitment and passion" of volunteers also remains vital to the vessel's future operations.

"As part of the process Council will explore ways to ensure volunteering is sustainable into the future

to ensure their long-term involvement," the statement

"A key priority will also be retaining these operations within the Mid Murray region, so that the history, pride and benefits they bring remain local."

Council is open to exploring a range of operational models, from continuing current arrangements to new partnerships, leasing or other shared models. Interested individuals, groups or organisations are encouraged to email (postbox@mid-murray. sa.gov.au) to arrange a further discussion.

Local stores hit in illicit tobacco crackdown

RIVERLAND stores have been targeted in the State Government's ongoing crackdown on illicit tobacco, with long-term closure orders issued in Berri and Barmera under the state's tough new laws.

The State Government has now issued numerous 28-day closure orders to shops caught selling illicit tobacco and vapes since the state's closure powers came into effect on June 5. Almost 20 per cent of raids have taken place across regional SA, including recent action in the Riverland.

Inspectors found cigarette packets, vapes and nicotine pouches in stores, which have now been seized, with some outlets across the state having faced repeated closures.

In the Riverland, the towns affected by 28-day closures include Berri (1) and Barmera (1), highlighting the State Government's commitment to keeping communities safe and shutting down illegal trade.

Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels said, "we have now issued 50 closure orders to stores caught selling illicit tobacco and vapes in South Australia".

'We know it is largely organised crime

that is behind this trade and closing down stores significantly disrupts their business model.

"The State Government's response to this issue has been recognised as the best in

"We have tough penalties backed up by closure orders, and our illicit tobacco taskforce continues to relentlessly conduct raids right across the state.

"Anyone selling illicit tobacco and vapes in South Australia is on notice that you will be shut down."

The illicit tobacco taskforce is working closely with SAPOL's Operation Eclipse and Border Force to prevent illegal products reaching South Australian streets.

The State Government says it has seized more than \$40m worth of product so far and will continue shutting stores down.

South Australia is also leading the nation in combating illicit tobacco, earning an A+ on a national scorecard by the Australian Council on Smoking and Health, with penalties of up to \$6.6m for those caught selling large commercial quantities.

Nature Festival event shines light on rare snake

RIVERLANDERS are encouraged to attend an upcoming Nature Festival event, where the spotlight will shine on one of South Australia's rarest snakes, the Murray-Darling carpet python.

Hosted by the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB), the family friendly event will be held on September 28, from 1pm to 4pm, at the Overland Corner Hotel.

MRLB threatened fauna ecologist Mel Burford said the event focused on celebrating nature, while also supporting conservation.

'Carpet pythons are incredibly elusive, which makes them difficult to monitor," she said.

"That's why we rely on the community.

"Every sighting logged on iSPYthon helps us to understand where they are living and moving, and guides the work we do to protect them.

"They may be spotted on the ground, in vegetation, near waterways, rocky outcrops, in rabbit warrens, in tree hollows, trees, and even pump sheds and crossing

Carpet pythons are an important part of the Murray Murray ecosystem, helping to control pest species such as rats and mice. However, habitat loss and predation have made them increasingly


Including species such as Murray hardyhead, southern pygmy perch, olive perchlet,

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
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Morgan takes out SA tap water award

In 2024, expert scammers stole more than \$192.9m across 7412 reported scams affecting Australian victims. In South Australia alone, more than \$7.8m was lost to 413 reported investment scams.

Already this year more than \$2.3m has been lost due to 165 investment scams reported in South Australia, with \$74.2 million across 3165 scams reported in Australia overall. Men over 65 have suffered the highest individual

"Investment scams involve promises of big payouts, quick money or guaranteed returns, often using fake data and highpressure tactics to appear

> "These scams often aim to gain private information such as security codes, or trick an unsuspecting person into sending cryptocurrency to a compromised digital

Scammers use tactics like allowing small withdrawals to build trust, only to block larger withdrawals later, trapping investors' funds.

"Significantly, in the past financial year the number of male victims over 70 has spiked, becoming the largest single demographic," Mr Featherby said.

"Younger people are not as easily affected due to them having less access to cash for investment 'opportunities'.

SAPOL advises to be wary of the following:

- ☐ Advertisements on social media for investment opportunities.
- ☐ Celebrity endorsements for strange, or unknown brands/companies. ☐ Low-risk, high-reward
- investments that seem 'too good to be true'. ☐ 'Crypto experts' offering
- free financial advice. ☐ Complex investment strategies that are confus-

ing or unclear.

- ☐ Asking you to lie to banks or family about your investment.
- SAPOL tips to avoid these scams include:
- ☐ Visit a trusted financial advisor for investment advice and opportunities.
- ☐ Celebrity-endorsed videos are often created by artificial intelligence called DeepFake. These can often look convincing but blurred images and strange movements can give them away, so scrutinise any videos.
- ☐ Never send copies of identification such as your driver's licence, passport or Medicare card to people, or businesses that you are unfamiliar with.
- ☐ Watch out for poor grammar and spelling. A legitimate company will take great care in having a professional look throughout their site.
- ☐ If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. Do your research.

A real-life example of impacts from AI scam

SOUTH Australian 'Phil' was looking through social media when he came across an investment opportunity backed by a famous entrepreneur.

He visited the website, Quantum AI, and watched an interview where the celebrity explained the stock trading platform, stating it was 'the next big thing' and it was an opportunity to get rich.

Phil followed the link at the end of the video, which led to a call from a receptionist at Quantum AI, with Phil investing

Two weeks later after being shown the profits he had earned, Phil transferred a further \$10,000.

It wasn't until Phil tried to withdraw his money that the receptionist asked him to pay transaction fees that slowly increased in value, and Phil realised he had been fleeced of his \$35,000.

to take extra care on roads

ROAD safety is again in the spotlight across regional South Australia, including the Riverland, with "alarming" new figures revealing an increased number of children have been treated for serious road trauma at Adelaide's Women's and Children's Hospital since 2023.

The hospital's paediatric trauma service says many of the incidents occurred on country roads and in driveways, with injuries ranging from fractures and internal damage, to moderate and severe brain trauma.

In the Riverland, September's Rural Road Safety Month is being used to remind families that long distances, fatigue and isolation can make the region's roads particularly dangerous.

South Australian Health Minister Chris Picton said

the statistics were confronting.

"The thought of any child being injured on our roads is absolutely gutwrenching," he said.

"When the worst happens, our trauma team at the Women's and Children's Hospital does an incredible job at caring for kids with horrific injuries.

"It's so important to raise awareness and speak to children and teenagers about staying safe and being responsible on our roads."

Women's and Children's Hospital paediatric surgeon Michael Ee said the toll on young people was deeply concerning.

"In the last year, we have seen too many children come through our doors with incredibly serious injuries as a result of road incidents," he said.

"Instead of being at school or socialising with their friends, they're in hospital recovering from trauma injuries like fractures and liver and spleen ruptures.

"We urge everyone to be responsible on the road and around cars. Stay alert, teach children about road safety rules and share the road responsibly."

Kidsafe SA chief executive Holly Fitzgerald said parents had a vital role in prevention.

"Children are our most vulnerable road users and the best thing parents can do is teach their kids about car safety at every opportunity," she said.

"Educating them 'in the moment' is important: for example, when children are complacent around cars, even parked at home, or they try to remove their seatbelt in the car, these moments provide great opportunities for real life lessons.'

HAVING tasted defeat on the biggest day of the season just 12 months earlier, Loxton United was officially crowned men's Top Four Cup champions on Saturday afternoon.

Travelling to the Steve Poutakidis Sports Ground, on Saturday, for a clash with home club Renmark, as was the case one year earlier, Loxton appeared desperate to reverse the result from Olympic's 4-2 victory last year.

But the game was never going to be without its challenges for the visitors, facing a Renmark side that also had taken out the premiership.

Olympic stormed through to Saturday's final after a 6-0 win over Berri, while Loxton got past a highly-touted Barmera side 3-1.

United centre back Travis O'Shaughnessy said his side were fully aware of the challenge that laid in front of them.

It was a relatively even battle during the first half of Saturday afternoon's final, before the deadlock was broken after 38 minutes through Loxton's Ulysses Carney, taking the lead into the break.

Hoping to continue the momentum in the second half, the game failed to play out in that manner, and Olympic launched several attacks.

But it was a slog for the Loxton defenders, picking up four yellow cards in the space of 20 minutes as desperation set in, ultimately hanging on for a one-goal victory.

O'Shaughnessy said the winning feeling was something he had been yet to experience, after a rollercoaster season.

"It's been 37 years since we won an A Grade Men's trophy, so to be able to do it with the lads we have was pretty special," he said.

"We had a bit of a mass exodus of players at the end of last year, so as a club we weren't really sure what it was going to look like moving forward, so to be able to win the trophy was amazing.

"We were really lucky with the committee, and Matt Perram as president, who provided us as a club with the right people coming into the right areas.

Annie's making a splash for SA

AS the warmer weather begins to approach, many are turning their attention towards the summer sporting scene.

But, for one dedicated young Riverlander, who will represent South Australia in Ballarat next month, swimming training has been occurring all winter.

Renmark local Annie Hooper travels to Adelaide each week for swimming training, and is awake before light to make sure she gives herself the best opportunity to perform well.

Annie's father, Paul, said his daughter is committed to becoming the best swimmer she can be.

"She won all of the local SAPSASA events, and then went on to represent the Riverland at the Marion Swimming Centre, back in April," he said.

"She ranked one for her 50m butterfly, four for freestyle, and second for backstroke.

From there they took the times, and she was selected to represent South Australia.

"It's basically a national Australian school-wide competition, and she's competing in the 50m butterfly, 100m butterfly, 50m freestyle, and 50m backstroke, as well as the 4x50m freestyle relay, plus the 4x50m medley relay.

"She was really excited to make the team, and so were we, and obviously there's a bit of nerves as well.

"She worked really hard to get there, and since she's been selected, which was in June, she's been training up to six times a week, morning and afternoon.

"She's also been travelling down to Adelaide once a week to train at the Playford Aquatic Centre, which is the only 50m pool other than Marion that is open at the moment.

"It's a great opportunity for a kid from Renmark to go up against the state's best, and be successful, and it's really exciting for the whole family, and we're keen to get over there and see how she goes."

Despite the recent state selection, the 10-year-old only started swimming in 2023, learning her trade at the Renmark Swimming Pool, and a home pool.

But after some early career wins, Mr Hooper said her talents started to be realised and taken seriously by the family.

"My family always enjoyed swimming and we had a pool at home, and we probably noticed even at home when she was just splashing around that she could swim, so we just put her out there," he said.

"We took her to Vitor

Renmark one night, and she sort of trained from there with a few people, and she was a bit nervous before competing, but after that, she just improved really quickly.

"But it was still a surprise when she went to Adelaide, because she is just this little country kid, and she's pretty competitive up here, but to be number one in butterfly at nineyears-old, I think she shocked a few people.

"She ended up doing really well, so we always knew she could swim, but she's certainly exceeded our expectations with everything she's done so far.

"She swam recently, and beat a couple of club records, and improved her personal bests by a considerable amount, so all of the training is paying off.

"It was a little bit surprising when it first happened, but we're now at a point where we do realise where she's at, and she probably has a bit of talent that needs to be harnessed, and just keep developing now and seeing how she can go."

Hooper said his daughter's dedication to get better at swimming, and be the best she can is clear, despite 5.30am wakeups most mornings.



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Taking flight

PICKING up one year after the events of season two, Logie Award-winning high-octane outback medical drama *RFDS* has plenty of ground to cover.

Following both the professional endeavours and also personal developments for a Royal Flying Doctor Service team operating out of Broken Hill, the third season premiere gets off to a flying start when a bus carrying Pete Emerson (Stephen Peacocke) crashes and tips over on a remote highway, leaving several passengers in critical conditions and reuniting the nurse with the team he left behind.

Actor Emma Harvie joined the cast in 2023 as charismatic mental health nurse Chaya Batra, who attends the intense scene as a spare pair of hands.

"This crash is the epicentre of the drama, which so many storylines stem from," she explains.

"When Chaya attends the bus crash, she is really affected by what happens. She assists Eliza (Emma Hamilton) with an operation on site, which has long-term implications for the patient."

Triaging critical patients due to a lack of available resources, Dr Eliza Harrod is forced to make harrowing decisions in Wednesday's premiere, the consequences of which reverberate throughout the season.

"Chaya becomes a support for [the patient's] family and struggles as she deals with her own emotions and PTSD at the same time... ironically, the mental health nurse's mental health starts to deteriorate," Harvie says of Chaya's response to the traumatic scenario.

"We know Chaya has a history of addiction and struggles with sobriety, so the aftermath of this crash, combined with an injury sustained at the Christmas fundraiser, could lead to everything blowing up in her face."

RFDS retrieval scenes are almost as extreme for the actors – Harvie and her colleagues have a lot of medical lingo to land in emotionally charged moments.

"We get to do medical rehearsals with doctors and nurses on set where they walk us through what you do first, who would sit where, and who would hold what equipment," Harvie explains.

"Chaya is the mental health nurse, so she doesn't have as much of the jargon that Rob Collins, Stephen Peacocke or Emma Hamilton have to say, and for that I am so grateful. I will say some blood pressure stats, and then I'm good to go!

"I do take my hat off to those who have to say a giant monologue of medical terms, and numbers, on top of knowing their blocking for the cameras, and also needing to remember the medical instrument they need next and what drawer or bag to retrieve it from."

The RFDS action isn't restricted to the medical drama: there's also a touch of romance planned for the first responders.

"Chaya may have a new love interest on the horizon in the shape of a cute policeman," teases Harvie.

"Let's just say, we see a flirty side of Chaya when she's around Caleb (Mark Fantasia)."

Due to upgrade work at Broken Hill's airport, this season was filmed at the real-life RFDS base in Port Augusta.

"I loved checking out the beaches," enthuses the Sydney-based Harvie.

"South Australia has some stunning beaches. We shot some scenes at a beach for one of the RFDS rescues down at Port Willunga, and while I wasn't meant to be filming that morning I went down to set and I was just blown away as to how incredible it was. I didn't know Adelaide had this secret beach culture!"


