# STAFF SHORTAGES

#### **HUGH SCHUITEMAKER**

A NUMBER of Renmark's largest businesses are struggling to maintain necessary levels of staff.

The operator of one of Renmark's largest retail outlets – speaking to The Murray Pioneer under the condition of anonymity – said regular turnover and the need for extra on-boarding had presented ongoing

staffing challenges.

"It's hard to get the levels of staff we need," the operator said.

"The number of applicants in the Riverland is low, so there's a limited pool you're choosing from.

"The level of investment needed from the business, in terms of the time needed to build a staff member, might be double than it usually is. "The flip side of that is how long do they stay for? A lot of people move onto 'bigger and better' things quickly, so you've invested a lot of time and you've got to start again.

"It's the hardest thing as an employer to say 'don't go better yourself'... you've got to encourage people to always learn, and build themselves, but it's a real struggle to

keep that level of staffing up."

Renmark's Telstra store, located in Renmark Square, is also understood to have seen recent challenges due to staff numbers.

However, a Telstra spokesperson said ensuring a high level of service at the store remained important to the business.

His car was impounded for 28 days, and he will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.





MLC Sarah Game is today set to introduce a Bill to State Parliament requiring wine processors to release indicative prices for grape varieties by September 30 each year.

However, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said "while I think indicative pricing is a valuable tool, I am cautious that uninformed legislation has the potential to create division among growing regions and the industry at

"This amendment to the Wine Grapes Industry Act must be handled with care, and any change must work for everyone in the industry," Mr Whetstone said.

"While the Bill has not yet been tabled in Parliament, my understanding is that is hasn't been run past a number of stakeholders within the wine industry who should be consulted on what it hopes to achieve.

'I have concerns with the lack of consultation with the wider industry, and the lack of due process... consultation and due process are critical for good outcomes for both growers and wineries.

"Once the legislation is tabled, I'll be looking for a sustainable outcome for wine grape growers and winemakers to put the industry in the best shape during these uncertain

# Tim 'cautious' over indicative pricing Bill THE Riverland's State MP believes necessary Indicative pricing Bill Cative pricing Bill pr Bill hits parliament

STRUGGLING Riverland grape growers would have a better chance of staying in the industry – and sustaining the region's economy - if an indicative pricing Bill being introduced to State Parliament today becomes law, an SA MP says.

The Bill would force processors to release indicative prices by September 30 each year, giving growers the choice of opting out of loss-making vintages months in advance, rather than plunging further into debt.

Currently, growers are typically forced to wait until December, January and even February to receive indicative – or estimated prices, meaning they have already committed water and other inputs to their vineyards, without knowing if their investments are worthwhile.

MLC Sarah Game will introduce the Bill to the upper house this afternoon and said it has the support of Riverland growers.

"It's important members know that local growers back this legislation and are in fact writing to the Premier, to the Leader of the Opposition in this house, and to other SA politicians pleading for their non-partisan support," Dr Game will tell her fellow MPs.

If growers had earlier notice of what prices per tonne their grapes were likely to fetch, they would suddenly have a powerful new business tool.

"This tool would allow them to make crucial decisions two or three months earlier: Whether to opt out of the coming vintage or

Dr Game - who recently launched her Fair Go political party – will tell her fellow members that having indicative prices by September 30 would "stop the bleeding for many growers" already in debt.

"It would ensure they're not pointlessly ploughing more money into loss-making crops," she will tell her fellow MPs.

And by doing so it would enable them to potentially ride out a bad year, minimise their debt, and remain in the industry in the medium to long-term.

"Wine-grape growing remains the main financial driver of the region, but our recent discussions with industry figures, including growers, and even with a local-government leader from the Riverland, confirm our worst fears: People are exiting the industry.

Dr Game said while preparing her legislation, her office heard anecdotal reports that up to 50 per cent of full-time Riverland grape growers were currently receiving Farm Household Allowance.

Dr Game told The Murray Pioneer, that unlike other recent State Government "handouts", her Bill presents no extra impost on the state's taxpayers.

"If mental health and the preservation of functioning family units matter in places like Whyalla and Port Pirie, and in communities impacted by the algal bloom disaster, they should also matter in SA grape-growing regions, like the Riverland," she will say.

Dr Game said any actions resulting from a recent Senate committee and federal review into existing winegrape purchasing arrangements would come "too late" for Riverland

"The Telstra store at Renmark continues to service our customers and we encourage you to visit us in store to meet with a Telstra team member face to face," the spokesperon said

"We are also available online, through the MyTelstra app, or via our contact centres.

"We are maintaining store staffing levels at Renmark providing a consistent customer service and have filled positions with staff from other locations as needed.

"We also currently have a full time role advertised for a Telstra Retail Customer Service & Sales Consultant at the Renmark store."

The 5RM and Magic 93.1 radio stations have struggled to recruit a staff member throughout the year, resulting in the particular role being put on hold.

The Murray Pioneer has had its own challenges in trying to fill a 12-month maternity leave role, with this position now also on hold and being managed by other staff within the business.

A senior manager at the newspaper said "the pool of applicants is small and often they lack necessary experience to fill certain roles, it's certainly an ongoing challenge for the Riverland".

The Renmark business operator said ongoing difficulties in recruiting staff would negatively impact the local economy.

"Having dedicated staff is what makes a difference to people coming into a store, compared to buying online," the operator said.

"If businesses can't commit to investing in staff, we'll get less and less applicants, and eventually we won't have the services we need in the Riverland.

"Businesses will shut down, because it's not profitable to run if you can't get enough stoff"

# Whiz kids

A RIVERLAND school has recently received a grant to extend their science and technology program, with the new funding part of a more than \$50,000 investment into local budding scientific and inquisitive minds.

Barmera Primary School received \$12,447 from the Murraylands Riverland Landscape Board's (MRLB) 2025-26 Grassroot Grants program to support a 'Networking Science in the community — Dirty Science project' last month, with this most recent funding helping the local science and technology program become one of the best in

"The Dirty Science project is a school-based project that is aimed at developing and extending student knowledge of Australian and local soil," Barmera Primary science and technology teacher Leighton Pearce said.

"This funding has allowed us to purchase soil science equipment, as well as geological resources, so students can not only learn about soil composition, but where soils originate from.

"Such learning is something we have noticed that is missing from (the primary school science curriculum), so this funding is a fantastic way to reintroduce it to our students in an engaging and hands-on way.

"For us, since a lot of our students come from a

farming background, and possibly might go into farming when they leave high school, it was important to ensure we provide (foundational) knowledge to assist in any life pathway they may choose.'

With a background in agriculture and horticulture, Mr Pearce found a true passion in teaching the magic of science and technology at Barmera Primary five years ago, after a career change into teaching.

Along with increasing student time spent in the classroom, since taking on his position, Mr Pearce has also acquired numerous grants for equipment and programs to enhance Barmera Primary's science and technology program, which he estimates now sits at more than \$50,000.

"Our junior primary students now get extra sessions, with higher-level primary students getting the maximum amount of time possible in the classroom as well," he said.

"Over the past several years, we have also been able to purchase biological microscopes, and significant science and technology learning equipment — this coming from (local) grants and internal education fund-

"A lot of schools don't have these kinds of resources, or haven't had them in a long time, so Barmera Primary School is quite unique in the sense.

"It's fantastic, because it allows our learning to be all hands-on, and we have been able to purchase multiple products so every student is able to play and learn from the materials — no student misses out."

Mr Pearce said the investment has allowed the program and student learning to keep up with current scientific ideas and developments, encouraging students to see science and technology as possible career path-

"We have recently introduced learning on Robotics, 3D printing, and are currently considering looking into virtual reality in the next six months," he said.

"I have found science and technology is a great equaliser for students, with those who struggle with literacy and mathematics not having the same difficultly in this classroom as they are subjects which deal with real-life problems and are hands-on.

"I really love the subject, and I think that makes the kids feel excited about the learning too.

"At the moment, we have a focus on possible careers in technology and science, with posters around the room of women (in the field) — it's super exciting stuff that the kids are overjoyed about.

"Everything takes a little while, but we are definitely building something at Barmera Primary School that would be the envy of many schools, not just in the region, but the state."

#### Lyrup rebuild to enhance floodplain connectivity

THE Department for Environment and Water (DEW) is collaborating with a Riverland council to deliver a \$90.79m project that will see the combination of environmental health measures with infrastructure along Lyrup

Lyrup Road was severely damaged during the 2022-23 River Murray flood, but instead of replacing the road like-for-like, the project is integrating culvert infrastructure into the reconstruction of the road to improve floodplain health.

Berri Barmera Mayor Ella Winnall welcomed the States Government's commitment to fully fund the road's reconstruction, with the general rebuild funded from the Local Government Disaster Recovery Assistance Arrangements, and DEW funding the cost of the culvert.

"Council is pleased the State Government has identified this enhancement for the repair work needed to properly re-open Lyrup Road after the flood" Mayor Winnall said.

"By bundling the flood repair and constraints work, the road will get fixed at the same time as improving environmental outcomes, which is a great win-win."

The road, which intersects the 2000-hectare Lyrup Flats floodplain, known for its diverse habitats and recreational opportunities within the Murray River National Park, was identified as a priority site for modification to improve water movement across the surrounding floodplain.

As part of the rebuild, a culvert structure to channel water underneath the road will be installed to support natural floodplain connectivity, and reduce the barrier to natural flows created by the road embankment.

DEW's program leader, constraints measures Michael Colagrossi explained that the ecological benefits achieved through installation of the culvert are significant.

"The western side of the Lyrup Flats floodplain naturally inundates with moderate river flows (approximately 45 GL/day), but Lyrup Road creates a blockade to this water, meaning the eastern side doesn't get the water needed to sustain precious flood-

plain ecosystems" Mr Colagrossi said.

"Currently, vegetation east of the road is degraded due to this limited water access, however the culvert will allow water to flow under the road, increasing connectivity between the river channel and eastern floodplain.

"This increased connectivity will improve habitat quality of the lignum shrubland, which is essential for native species of frogs, birds, reptiles and insects."

In addition to Lyrup Road, the SA Constraints Measures project is working with Berri Barmera Council to deliver upgrades at Bruno Bay, in Cobdogla.

Following extensive community consultation in late 2024, upgrades will be made to the site's boat ramp, access road, carpark, barbeque shelters, seating and toilet facilities, to improve community access to the site during periods of high flows.

Both Lyrup Road and Bruno Bay projects are scheduled for completion by December

## Changing the cycle?

THE announcement that Independent MLC Sarah Game will today introduce a Bill into state Parliament establishing an indicative pricing structure for wine grapes – as detailed in today's edition of The Murray Pioneer – is a move that is set to have numerous implications throughout the wine industry.

While it's fair to say that if 'something is yet to be broken, it will not need fixing', however, it's probably pretty clear to most inside the wine industry at the moment – not just in the Riverland, or South Australia, but across the globe – that current processes are hurting financial sustainability on all levels of the production chain.

Many figures and numbers surrounding consumption levels could be repeated here, however a rather stark illustration of the current situation can be seen through the numerous long-term local grape growers who are now in the process of pulling out their vines.

It seems that for as long as there have been vintages in the Riverland, grape growers have had to wait until there are a few months – or at the worst weeks – before harvesting to receive a gauge of how their financial returns will look.

During positive periods, or even if some light could be seen at the end of the figurative tunnel, this might not be so detrimental. However, most speculative minds indicate that the financial picture in the 2026 vintage will be as bad, or worse, than what was seen this year.

The necessity to maintain at least some semblance of a wine industry, for the state's and wider country's economic health, means that driving forward through increasing challenges would have simply been unsustainable.

The perspectives of the local grower – as reflected in today's newspaper – certainly illustrate the clear benefit for growers, but how would the introduction of indicative pricing be felt through the industry?

In theory, growers being able to make this decision earlier in the season will prevent the risk of further wine oversupply, as there would be less overall desperation to have every grape sold, no matter the price, which in turn was leading to vast volumes of undrunk wine being left to sit in tanks.

However, we also see the view, which is probably not entirely unfair based on the current economics of operating a business in SA, that adding pressure on wineries to set somewhat of a 'minimum price' each year may also be shifting the issue to a different set of bands

It's almost certain, therefore, that the outcome of Ms Game's move to introduce the bill will have crucial implications for the region.

It was a rare situation for SAR in that the railway preceded and was a catalyst for farming settlement. The State Government, prompted by this success, then constructed railways (1913-14), into the Northern (Murray) Mallee, similarly opening these districts to cereal production. This involved railways that terminated at Paringa, Loxton, Waikerie and Peebinga. But a fifth railway from Wanbi to Yinkanie was different. Farmers from the Northern Mallee, south from Kingston-on-Murray, had been farming for a decade since the other lines had been built, and they desperately needed a rail transport-link to continue farming. The Yinkanie Railway Station Office (pictured) was donated to the Loxton Historical Village, in 1971. It has been a feature there since the Village opened in 1973. The office and other railway memorabilia will be on display at the centenary celebrations of the opening of the Yinkanie line, at the Loxton Historical Village, on September 6, 2025. #### On Riverland mental health care costs

WHILE the Federal Government sits on its hands, thousands of Australians, including many in the Riverland region, remain desperate for accessible and affordable psychological care ('Delaying mental health care due to cost'). The Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Agreement review interim report showed that more people were being forced to go to emergency departments to get the basic mental health care they needed.

In July, the 2024 report card by the National Mental Health Commission showed more than one-in-five Australians have delayed seeing a mental health professional due to cost.

No person should have to choose between food on the table and getting quality help.

An antiquated loophole in the Medicare rebate system means that only a small portion of psychologists can currently offer patients the full Medicare rebate of \$145.25, regardless of their experience or further education. The vast majority of psychologists are still only able to offer patients a maximum rebate of \$98.95, leaving people in the Riverland short-changed.

This is a cost barrier that must be fixed.

That's why we are calling on the Federal Barker MP Tony Pasin to join our call for a fair rebate for every psychology session.

All psychologists in Australia have completed at least six years of training and education before qualifying as a registered psychologist.

There is simply no evidence to warrant a difference in funding or endorsement.

Making the Medicare rebate for all psychology sessions a consistent \$150 across the board is a realistic amount that will make a big difference to the Riverland community.

We must make this right before it's too late.

#### **Homelessness hits** the unexpected

THE recent Homelessness Week in Australia was a time to take a moment to think about those in our community who are facing some of the most challenging circumstances, and realise that it may be affecting people that we don't expect.

The Salvation Army is one of the largest providers of homelessness services in the country, and in our over 140-year history in Australia, we have seen it all.

We support over 8000 people every month across Australia who are experiencing homelessness, but what can sometimes shock me more than these numbers is the individual stories behind each person that reaches out to us for help.

We have seen people reach out to our homelessness services who have been donors to the Salvos in the past. We have seen people who are perceivably 'well off', but due to one unforeseen personal crisis, like a family member falling ill, they have slipped into homelessness.

Homelessness isn't just sleeping rough on the streets. It manifests in a number of ways, like couch surfing, staying in emergency accommodation, or sleeping in your car.

In a recent survey of people who reached out to the Salvos for financial support, one in five (19 per cent) had couch surfed or



lived in their car at some point in the past 12 months.

That is why, this Homelessness Week, we want to shine a light on what homelessness really looks like in Australia. At the Salvos, we want to encourage people to reach out to their friends and family, notice the signs, and know where to go if you or someone you know is experiencing home-

#### **Kids miss out on free** dental care

WITH a massive underuse of a free dental scheme for kids, which sees 1.5 million kids a year missing out, dentists are calling on the Federal Government to put an end to the misinformation surrounding the scheme - and better promote it to parents.

Released ahead of Dental Health Week, new data from an Australian Dental Association (ADA) survey of 25,000 adults

shows that 29 per cent, or around one-in-four parents, believe their child is eligible for free dental treatment under the Federal Government's Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS).

Yet only 36 per cent, or around one-in-three families, who are eligible for the free treatment, actually use it. Meanwhile the ADA survey has found the scheme is shrouded in confusion and misinformation, with many parents unaware of its existence or unsure of their eligibility, leaving millions of young mouths at risk.

In real terms, this dramatic under-utilisation rate means of the 2,595,862 children who were eligible for the CDBS in 2020-2021, just 1,003,838 children used its services. That means around 1.59 million children are going without the free dental care that's rightfully theirs.

This leaves millions of eligible Australian families either going without dental care or paying more out of pocket than they need to, when it could so well fund a child's first dental visit

For eligible families, typically those in receipt of Family Tax Benefit A, the CDBS provides up to \$1132 over a two-year period for dental services such as examinations, x-rays, cleaning, fissure sealing, fillings, root canals and extractions for children aged from newborn to 17.

Of those who believed they were eligible for the scheme, only 56 per cent have used it for their children, and 38 per cent said they hadn't, the survey found.

Many parents who took part in the survey said they didn't use the CDBS as it doesn't cover orthodontics which is so frequently needed with children. They were also under the incorrect impression that neither restorative nor cosmetic dental care were covered.

Other reasons for not using the scheme included:

- ☐ The scheme is not well publicised, nor are its details easily understood.
- ☐ The amount, or balance each child has and when it is to be used by was unclear, with plenty of parents believing their kids were only entitled to one visit, every two years.
- ☐ Many were unaware the CDBS could be accessed through a private dentist, assuming if the government was providing the service, it would only be available through the public dental system
- ☐ Around 20-25 per cent said that although they believed their child/children was eligible, they were waiting for confirmation of eligibility from Services Australia.

These results point to a catalogue of confusion, misinformation and lack of clarity around what's in reality a good scheme that could potentially be meeting the oral health needs of nearly 2.6m kids a year.

We're keen to work with the government to help clarify the basic elements of the scheme and promote it to patients and parents to ensure millions of kids are get ting the dental treatment and care they need to set them up with healthy mouths early in life.

#### Massive hay donation brings relief to Riverland farmers

DROUGHT-affected farmers in the Riverland were given a much-needed morale boost last week, as the Rapid Relief Team (RRT) hosted its Farmers Community Connect event in Paruna, near Loxton.

Held at the Brown's Well Football Club, the gathering provided donated hay, hot meals, and vital support services to 140 local farming families.

More than 600 tonnes of donated hay were delivered to farmers across the Riverland, offering relief to livestock producers struggling through a second-consecutive year of below-average rainfall.

Fourteen trucks carried over 1000 bales of premium-grade hay from Merriwagga, New South Wales, across the SA–Victorian border, with 18 RRT volunteers driving the load overnight. A further 32 volunteers served more than 300 meals – including RRT's Signature Burgers – and distributed 140 food boxes.

RRT operations manager Mick Dunn said the event aimed to lift spirits and show solidarity.

"Times are tough in South Australian

farming communities right now, but these farmers are tougher, and we want to show them that we are still here for them," he said.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone also praised the efforts of RRT.

"I want to thank every RRT volunteer," he said in a post on Facebook.

"If you look around, people are enjoying this time at the event.

"One particular farmer hadn't come out of his house for a couple of weeks – the wind's been blowing, it hasn't been raining, and he's been watching everything blow away.

"He's come out here this morning, picked up his load of hay, and will return home with a bit more spirit."

Support services on site included representatives from PIRSA, rural financial counsellors, mental health professionals, and veterinary advisors.

The hay transport was made possible through a grant from the South Australian Government's Drought Donated Fodder Transport Assistance Scheme, administered by PIRSA. While the grant covered freight costs, the hay itself and the event operations

were funded by RRT through its charitable contributions and volunteer support.

This was RRT's third such event in South Australia, having so far assisted over 500 farmers and delivered more than 2600 hay bales, and 250,000 tonnes of livestock feed.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the State Government was proud to support the initiative.

"We are proud to partner RRT on this important initiative to ensure much-needed support reaches those in the Riverland and Murray Mallee regions," she said.

"Producers receiving the donated fodder will also be linked with expert advice through the new Technical Advisory Service, to support decision-making for their businesses in the season ahead."

Despite some winter rainfall, many farmers say it has not been enough to maintain livestock numbers across the region. The hay delivery offers immediate relief, but the broader package also aims to support long-term recovery.

Through the new Technical Advisory

Service, fodder recipients will receive priority access to agronomic, livestock, and soil management advice, designed to help producers build resilience and make informed choices.

The State Government has also committed \$50,000 to Livestock SA to deliver livestock-focused technical events, and farmers receiving fodder are encouraged to attend.

More than 3000 producers across South Australia have taken up on-farm infrastructure grants to improve drought preparedness, while 100 drought support events have been held under the Connecting Communities program.

The broader Drought Support Package continues to provide direct financial relief, community grants, and advisory services for affected farms across the state.

# Mid Murray growth management and housing strategy

THE Mid Murray council has authorised the CEO Ben Scales to make final amendments to its Mid Murray Growth Management and Housing Strategy for publication and submission to the Federal Government.

Planning firm URPS was engaged to assist in the preparation of the plan, which received funding of \$341,000 from the Federal Government.

The program aims to help achieve the National Housing Accord's target of building 1.2 million new, well-located homes over five years across Australia, from July 1, 2024.

In a report to the council at its July meeting, the director of development and community services Gary Mavrinac said the draft strategy represented a significant milestone to increase housing supply across the Mid Murray region.

"It identifies areas for future growth, assesses land supply and demand (residential and employment), and outlines infrastructure needs, challenges, and opportunities within individual towns," he said.

"The development of the strategy was underpinned by a robust community and stakeholder engagement process, ensuring the final strategy reflects the needs and values of the Mid Murray community."

Mid Murray Council received 51 survey responses and eight written submissions during a formal consultation process conducted between April 28, and May 26.

Most were residents (40), and or rate pavers (28).

The draft strategy suggested Swan Reach, an area west of Morgan, Truro and Mannum, as having the most potential for accommodating development.

In the feedback received, some uncertainty was expressed about Swan Reach being one of the focus towns for growth.

Mixed views were also expressed about Mannum with some of the survey participants supporting continued investment in the town, while others felt it had received enough and wanted focus shifted to smaller towns.

Mr Mavrinac presented a report on the feedback and proposed amendments to the Strategy to Elected Members and members of the Strategic Growth and Economic Activation Committee in June.

The post consultation version of the growth strategy was presented to council on July 15 for adoption, signalling the conclusion of this stage of the project.

A final document will be published by the council and submitted to the Federal Government in line with funding reporting

#### Morgan, Cadell and Blanchetown's growth potential highlighted



MID Murray Council consulted the community on its draft Growth Management and Housing Strategy and sought feedback from the public from April 28, to May 26.

According to the projects Engagement Summary Report, comments received from the respondents providing feedback on the strategy included a desire for its focus to "centre less on investment in Mannum, and to focus more on investment in smaller towns, especially Morgan, Cadell and

Blanchetown".

It was also suggested that council remove restrictions on building on surrounding rural land (the 900 hectare rule), and reduce minimum block size in Morgan..

A need for more social housing in Morgan was also identified.

Concern was also expressed that Swan Reach had insufficient job opportunities to support growth, and views were mixed about the appropriateness of the town as a key growth

Among the submissions received were calls for council to be considerate of flood risk in the identification and plan-

ning of development areas, and consider flood levees.

Some of the respondents also asked council to ensure future growth had no impact on the functioning of identified transport and infrastructure-focused corridors in relation to freight, and the High Productivity Vehicle Network, and major highways.

The survey on the draft strat-

egy attracted 51 respondents, and eight people provided written submissions.

Those who took part in the public consultations included eight people from Morgan-Cadell and surrounds, six from Swan Reach and surrounds, six from Blanchetown and surrounds, and one from the Walker Flat-Nildottie-Purnong area.

#### Kerbs to reduce stormwater flows

MID Murray Council has installed a standard concrete kerb and water table to control storm water flows on a portion of Adam Street, in Blanchetown.

Mayor Simone Bailey said similar infrastructure has also been installed on Upcher Street, in Blanchetown, to redirect stormwater from the street and property boundaries.

She said the kerb and water tables assist in providing stormwater control methods in the area.

#### Mid Murray's strong vision for the future

I'D like to share a few highlights from Mid Murray Council's August meeting.

Flood recovery remains a major focus, and council received another update on the progress being made. While there's still a long road ahead, it's encouraging to see projects moving forward.

Council also discussed an accelerated works program, which will allow catch up on upgrades and maintenance that were delayed while we concentrated on the immediate needs of recovery.

Another important item was the Draft Stormwater Drainage Asset Management Plan.

This 10-year plan will guide how council manages stormwater across the Mid Murray.

If you've ever experienced pooling water in your street or town, this is your opportunity to help shape the solutions.

The plan is now out for public consultation, and I strongly encourage you to take a look and provide feedback, your local knowledge, and experiences will make a real difference.

Tourism was also on the agenda, with council considering the Mid Murray Tourism Precinct Planning Project.

Thanks to a \$1.5m Federal Government grant, we now have the chance to develop a long-term vision for tourism in our region.

Tourism brings visitors, jobs and investment, and this planning work will ensure we can build on our strengths and showcase what makes the Mid Murray such a special destination.

We also began a review of council's tourism, heritage and maritime operations.

Tourism is a vital part of our local economy and a key goal in our Strategic Plan.

The first stage of the review focused on our maritime assets and operations, including our historic vessels and the dedicated volunteers who support them.

A draft report has been prepared, setting out options for how these assets could be managed into the future to ensure their longterm sustainability.

No decisions have been made. The next step will be further investigation, along with consultation and engagement with key stake-

I want to reassure the community that your input will be sought and valued before any changes are considered.

I always find the infrastructure reports in our agendas insightful, they highlight the breadth of work underway across our vast

From roads and footpaths to parks and community facilities, it's clear our staff are working hard every day to keep our communities moving and thriving.

In the infrastructure report, there was some welcome news about standpipes, which have been a concern for both council and the community, particularly around funding the automation to ensure long-term sustainability of these assets.

The State Government is supporting six automations through \$207,500 in grant funding from Primary Industries and Regions SA (PIRSA), under the Strengthening Industries

Additional funding has also been provided for the automation of the Palmer and Summerfield standpipes from energy developments in those areas.

Council has already undertaken a tender process for automation works at Blanchetown, Cambrai, Morgan, Sedan, Stonefield, Truro, Palmer and Summerfield.

On top of this, I have just heard that council has been successful in securing support through the State Government's Publicly Accessible Standpipe Upgrade Fund (part of the drought funding program), which will

allow two more standpipes to be automated. I am very grateful for the support of the State Government and our partners in helping to ensure this much-needed service remains available for the community.

Beyond the formal agenda, I've also been raising awareness of the Landscape Levy. This levy appears on your council rates notice, but it's important to understand that it is not set by council, it is set by the State Government, and councils simply collect it on their behalf.

A number of councils, including ours, are questioning the fairness of the system, especially for regional communities like Mid Murray.

I've shared information on my social media channels encouraging residents to have their say, because the more voices we have, the stronger our case will be for a fairer approach.

Finally, I'd like to remind you that if you can't attend our council meetings or briefings in person, you can still stay informed, all meetings are recorded and available to watch on YouTube for six months.

It's a great way to stay connected and see firsthand how decisions are being made on

Council is here to serve you, and your input is vital. Whether it's through consultation feedback, sharing your ideas, or simply stopping me for a chat when you see me out and about, your voice matters.

He said the money raised will be used to buy items to assist residents with dementia at Pioneer Haven.

'This could be a special chair, or an aquarium with fish," Mr Gillett said.

The event featured a sausage sizzle, with sausages donated by Rollbusch Quality Meats, and bread from Foodland.

Local bands JD and the Black Hats, and the Mallee Road Band, entertained those who took part in the fundraiser.

Mr Gillett said plans were being made for a bigger fundraiser on the Waikerie riverfront next year, to help Pioneer Haven purchase equipment for dementia patients.

He said music is an ideal way to entertain those affected by dementia.

JD and The Black Hats volunteer their time each Friday, from 12.30pm to 2pm, to entertain the residents at Pioneer Haven.

Mr Gillett said music enabled people with dementia to relax and enjoy themselves. "It puts a smile on their

face and the carers at Pioneer Haven also love it," he said.

"They get the patients up and those who are able to walk and do things, can dance to the music.'

Mr Gillett said his band tried to pick songs that the residents recognise.

"It enables people to remember things, it could be about a special time in your life," he said.

"It could be a dance from years ago, or when they met their partner."

The RFDS has 83 planes on the ready at short notice to proceed to any landing spot in Australia, as and when called. This must require the most efficient procedures and dedicated

Since the completion of the Patient Transfer Facility, in Renmark, RFDS SA NT has built a virtual remotely controlled health centre in William Creek, a new Patient Transfer Facility in Tennant Creek, and are expanding the Port Augusta Operations into a training centre as well.

Drones are being trialed for the delivery of pharmaceuticals in remote areas, and for flood

Together with partners, the RFDS has developed a mobile CT machine for identifying whether a stroke is a clot, or bleed. This world-first piece of technology is a game changer for people without ready access to a hospital with a machine.

To prevent permanent brain damage and physical disability, it is vital that a stroke is diag-



nosed and treated as soon as possible. This machine can be installed in planes, ambulances and in remote health centres. No doubt our members' fundraising will be assisting in the purchase and supply of this game-changing piece of medical technology.

#### Amanda's life changed by RFDS support

Amanda is a married mother of three children, aged 19, 16 and 12, and on August 1, 2024, her life changed.

In November 2023, she had to give up work due to an unknown illness, and had been through many medical tests

After travelling in June 2024 and returning home, two months later Amanda found herself calling an ambulance. She had severe chest pain.

By ambulance she was transferred to a local hospital, and was told she would be flown to Adelaide for heart surgery. She was transported to the RFDS patient transfer station, in Renmark, where she waited

The plane arrived. She was nervous and terrified, as she had no idea what was happening.

The doctor, nurse and pilots were amazing. They kept Amanda calm and made the impossible seem easy for her.

Amanda said "the care they gave me can't be explained in words... I felt safe". "Without the Royal Flying Doctors Service, regional Australians would be so isolated and wouldn't be able to get the care they need," she said.

#### Donald's 'lucky' experience with RFDS

It was an early morning start, a nice calm day, perfect to catch up on some 'weedicide-ing' on my property. I always say I never know where my day will end

This was one of those days, in a big way. While making up a spray tank of chemical I felt a bit wonky and a bit of indigestion set in. I thought a good burp will sort it out, as a couple of nights before the same thing happened. After a few Mylanta and a good burp it went away, and so I thought indiges-

Then I ended up leaning on my work vehicle vomiting, and had a few head spins. Later I finally thought 'this ain't right'.

Lucky I had my phone with me. I rang a good mate and explained the situation, and needed to get to Berri emergency. I got into his ute and straight away I had never felt so

buggered. For a long time I was battling to get into wheelchair at Berri. It took all my

In the emergency area in hospital I was put in a bed with brand new clean sheets. I was in my work clothes and boots, and was thinking about how much dirt I was putting on the sheets.

They took off my boots and the nurse had a chuckle that I had different colored socks on. My shirt was cut off and the doctor said "put him straight into the resuscitation room"

Once again I thought this ain't good.

I had another episode of dizziness and vomiting. When I got my breath back, I asked the doctor what he thought was going on. He said I was having a massive heart attack. Strangely it felt better knowing what's going on.

Wire tubes and staff everywhere, all of a sudden I felt lot better, as the clot had dislodged or broken up. I was expecting to go home shortly and finish my work, but the doctor explained I was going to be flown to Adelaide, to Flinders Hospital.

About four-hours later the ambos came and loaded me up, and took me to the new transfer station at Renmark Airport.

My house is in the flight path of RFDS, so I see them go over all the time on any day or night. I never thought one day I would be in one of those aircrafts.

I was feeling pretty good, and enjoyed the flight down to Adelaide, chatting to the flight nurse most of the way.

The trip down was very quick, and from Adelaide Airport to Flinders was by ambulance. The changeover was very well coordinated, all on the same stretcher, which fitted the plane and ambulance.

A few days later, with a stent put in, I was back home. Being a small world, I found out my first cousin worked in the transfer station at Adelaide Airport, I contacted her and she found out who the pilot and nurses were on that flight.

Being a wine grape grower, I thought it's a must to get a few bottles of good Riverland wine to the people that helped

Everyday the RFDS still flies over my home and I think "hope the poor bugger in that plane is as lucky as I was".

I must thank the RFDS doctors and all involved in my recovery.

#### Better stroke care in the regions

The RFDS research team has been working closely with the Australian Stroke Alliance, and its 40 partners, to bring lightweight portable brain scanners to rural and remote populations.

Traditional CT scanners are large, heavy, expensive and require specialists to operate, and thus are usually located in metropolitan or large regional centres.

To overcome this inequity in care, the Australian Stroke Alliance was formed to bring world-first innovation and time critical stroke treatment to the patient, through the development of portable brain scanners and improving access to tele-neurologists.

Significant progress has been made in deploying portable brain scanners, with collaborations involving the SA Ambulance Service, SA Health, and Alice Springs Hospital.

A usability trial with EMVision's helmet scanner is planned for early 2025, marking a great step towards enhancing pre-hospital stroke care in underserved



#### New grants to help SA businesses cut power bills

RIVERLAND businesses are encouraged to apply for a state funding program aiming to help reduce energy costs.

The State Government last month opened applications for round 3 of the Business Growth Fund.

Minister for Small and Family Business Andrea Michaels said economic support for businesses was vital during current challenges.

"We know that power bills are a particular pain point for South Australian businesses and this grant is providing real relief where it is needed with businesses... saving tens of thousands of dollars off their power bill each year as a result," Ms Michaels said.

"In round 3, we are extending these grants to medium sized businesses, helping even more SA business owners to take control of their energy costs, invest in upgrades and new technology to reduce costs.

"I encourage businesses to take advantage of the opportunity to have the State Government match them dollar for dollar in their investment into their business.

Grants of between \$2500 and \$75,000 are available, with the State Government matching business contributions dollar for dollar to support projects under two streams:

- Stream 1 Solar and battery projects: support for the purchase and installation of batteries and solar systems with accompanying battery storage.
- Stream 2 Energy efficiency projects: funding for equipment or infrastructure upgrades, such as refrigeration, insulation or lighting improvements that reduce energy use and

Businesses that received a grant under round 2 of the Business Growth Fund are eligible to apply again for new projects or activities or to expand on previously approved projects.

Edwardstown-based Kyton's Bakery owner Sharon Sutton said her business was expected to save the up to \$29,000 a year on electricity costs through the installation of solar panels and battery storage, supported by the grant program.

"Bakeries use a lot of electricity, especially for ovens and refrigeration," Ms Sutton said.

"Electricity was a big cost to the business. The 60kw of solar panels and battery we purchased with the Energy Efficiency Grant has meant a saving of 30 to 60 per cent on our monthly power bill - freeing up money for us to spend in other parts of the business."

Grants will be open until Friday, October 31, or until funding is fully allocated.

#### Volunteers needed for malleefowl monitoring

THE Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) is calling for Riverland volunteers to help monitor the nationally threatened malleefowl.

The landscape board has been part of the National Malleefowl Program for more than 30 years, with more monitoring sites than any other region in Australia.

Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board's senior ecologist Craig Gillespie said because malleefowl can cover a vast area of mallee scrub, "volunteers are vital for the monitoring programs success".

"Volunteers are the backbone of this program," he said.

"Their dedication means we can track how the malleefowl are faring in our region and contribute to national research that is helping to shape the future of malleefowl conserva-

The data gathered by volunteers has already contributed to long-term studies that assess the impact of various environmental factors, such as climate, habitat condition, and predation, on malleefowl breeding success.

"Every mound volunteers check, every bit of data collected, is a valuable piece of the puzzle," Mr Gillespie said.

"It's a rare chance to play a hands-on role in protecting one of Australia's most iconic ground-dwelling birds."


No prior experience is needed, just a willingness to work outdoors, and an interest in wildlife conservation. Training and guidance will be provided, and surveys are conducted in pairs or small groups.

Malleefowl monitoring for this season will take place from mid-October until December at sites nearby to Murray Bridge, through the Murray Mallee, to Lameroo, and north to the Riverland, and beyond.

#### **Next regional workers** to tour the Riverland

NURSING, social work, engineering and teaching students will travel to the Riverland this week to meet local employers facing skills shortages in the region.

#### Separating fact from fiction on accessing super early

THE Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is warning Riverlanders against the risks of accessing superannuation (super) early to pay for noncritical medical procedures or lifestyle expenses.

ATO deputy commissioner Emma Rosenzweig cautions those who are considering accessing their super to carefully consider their circumstances and the impacts it can have, both short and long term.

"Superannuation is saving for your retirement," Ms Rosenzweig said.

"Your employer pays 12 per cent super on top of your salary or wages as a long-term investment which grows over time and generally cannot be accessed until you reach preservation age or

"Access to super on compassionate grounds is available in very limited circumstances for critical medical procedures, and should only be considered as a last resort where all other options of paying for the eligible expenses have been exhausted.

"We have seen an increase in dodgy advice and misconceptions around when individuals can access their super early, and we want to make it clear that Australians should not be considering early access unless they are eligible and it is absolutely necessary for their circumstances.'

#### 'My dentist advised me I can use my superannuation for cosmetic veneers'

Health practitioners prepare medical reports that are used by their patients to apply for early access to super on compassionate grounds.

"We rely on the information within these reports when assessing applications, so it is important that practitioners undertake proper examinations of their patients and provide complete, true and correct information in their reports that reflect their professional opinion.

"We are aware of various reports about the conduct of some health practitioners who support individuals to access their superannuation on compassionate grounds," Ms Rosenzweig said.

"While we believe most health practitioners act in their patients' best interests, we are increasingly hearing about concerning behaviours.

The se behaviours include:

- Preparing inaccurate medical reports to support patients access their super where they are ineligible, such as for cosmetic purposes.
- ☐ Preparing a medical report where the practitioner hasn't performed a comprehensive consultation or examination of the patient.
- ☐ Placing profits ahead of patient care, by recommending higher cost treatments, premium pricing or overservicing without providing information on all available treatment options.
- ☐ Collecting and using patients' myGov details to submit applications, when individuals are required to submit applications themselves.
- ☐ Charging fees to assist patients prepare or submit applications without being a registered tax agent.
- ☐ Encouraging or advising patients to access their super to pay for health treatments without an Australian Financial Services license.

"When preparing medical reports to support an application, health practitioners must ensure they perform their role ethically and to the expected standard, while ensuring they don't provide services they aren't competent to provide or trained for," Ms Rosenzweig said.

"We are working with other regulators, including the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA), to address any inappropriate behaviour."

#### "Just fudge the form, everybody does it and the ATO will never find

"Individuals who apply with the assistance of a third party need to review their application and the supporting documents before it is submitted, to ensure it is accurate," Ms Rosenzweig said.

"Where a third party acts inappropriately on an individual's behalf, the individual can still be liable for any consequences, including penalties for making a false or misleading statement.

"Applications for early access of super on compassionate grounds must only be completed by the person seeking the release. If someone requires assistance in completing an application for compassionate release of super, help is available on our website, or by phoning 13 10 20."

#### "I can access my superannuation for cosmetic treatments".

Medical treatments undertaken solely with cosmetic intent normally would fail to qualify for compassionate release of super as, under the law, an individual must require the treatment to either:

- ☐ Treat a life-threatening illness or injury.
- ☐ Alleviate acute or chronic pain.
- ☐ Alleviate acute or chronic mental ill-

"Applicants should be aware that submitting an application for health treatments that are not necessary for one of these reasons would be making a false or misleading statement to the Commissioner, which

can attract severe penalties," Ms Rosenzweig said.

These penalties can also apply to health practitioners who make false or misleading statements in medical reports.

"I can access my superannuation for investments, holidays and day-to-day expens-

"Accessing super on compassionate grounds is only available in very limited circumstances where individuals are unable to pay for an eligible expense using any other means. It is not 'free money', and it will reduce the amount available in retirement and results in you paying more tax," Ms Rosenzweig said.

"Individuals who apply need to ensure they are eligible and that they provide accurate information and documents in their application. Where applications are approved, individuals should remember that they have declared in their application that they will use the money to pay for the approved purpose and keep receipts to support this.

"There can be significant consequences for people who attempt to inappropriately access their super, including severe penalties for making false or misleading statements or adjustments to their income tax return so they are required to pay addition-



THE Butterfly Women is an historical fiction novel, set in Melbourne in the 1860s, a time when the city was booming from the gold rush, but also hiding deep social problems. The novel takes readers into Little Lon, a red-light district where many women lived and worked in harsh conditions. Through vivid storytelling, the book explores themes of survival, justice, and the fight for dignity in a society that often ignored women's voices.

The story shows the contrast between rich and poor, and between those who lived respectable lives, and those who were forced into dangerous work such as prostitution. It also includes a mystery, as a killer begins to stalk the streets, adding suspense and tension to the story.

Johanna's experience helps readers understand the daily struggles faced



by women in Little Lon.

Harriett Gardiner is a journalist from a respectable family who wants to write serious news, not just fashion pieces. When a killer begins targeting women in the district, Harriett risks her reputation and safety to investigate. Her role highlights the power of truth and the importance of speaking out, even when society tries to silence you.

Supporting characters include William, a stern magistrate, and his charming brother Henry. These characters add depth to the story and show how different parts of society react to injustice.

Madeleine Cleary brings The Butterfly Women 1860s Melbourne to life with rich detail and emotion. The novel blends history, mystery, and drama, showing how women from very different worlds come together to uncover the truth and fight for justice.

Overall, The Butterfly Women is a moving and eye-opening look at a part of history that is often forgotten. It's a great read for anyone interested in Australia's past, women's stories, or historical mys-



#### Waikerie students explore vocational education







# Getting toward the end goal

TODAY, Wednesday, September 3, Sarah Game MLC will present an amendment bill in SA Parliament. This is the South Australian Wine Grapes Industry (Indicative Prices) Amendment Bill.

Praise should go to Sarah Game, and her senior staff member, who has spent a great deal of time and effort on this, far from a simple process.

If approved by the SA Parliament, it will add a clause to read "taking into account any order of the Minister under section 5, a processor must, on or before 30 September in each year, provide written notice to each producer who is contracted to sell wine grapes to the processor of the indicative price (expressed as an amount per tonne) for each variety of wine grapes grown in the production area to which the contract relates, for the upcoming harvest".

If passed by our political representatives, it will enable growers to make decisions on expenditure earlier in the growing season.

Given the time it has taken to get this far it is unlikely to be in place for September 30, 2025, but it would provide some improvement for next year and beyond.

#### Some background

This process originated before the 2025 Federal Election. It was evident that the federal government would move slowly on a national mandatory code. We know that the Senate Inquiry and the Emerson Report both recommended a mandatory code for the grape industry. Growers need this indicative

price measure in place as soon as possible.

Originally, I pushed to include two other clauses:

- ☐ An 'expert determination' process, with the decision reached, to be binding under state legislation.
- ☐ Every wine grape grower be given a 'security interest' over their grapes by legislation

My reasoning was that the industry is in a volatile state for several reasons. International market pressures and instability of foreign government policies regarding tariffs could see some wineries in the future go into administration. Growers should be protected in that event by state legislation.

Unfortunately, neither were able to be included in the final draft, but I am hopeful they can be included in the formation of a national mandatory code.

I only have limited understanding of the process, but my understanding is that parliament can have some weeks to discuss and question the Indicative Prices Amendment Bill before voting on it.

#### Why we need it passed

Every grape grower in our region is acutely aware of the significant downward trend of prices for some years, to the point where grape growers are running at significant loss and many will not get through the 2026 vintage.

Some Riverland vineyards have been valued higher if the vines are pulled out, than as a functioning vineyard.



Our governments must bear responsibility for this situation. Band-aid measures from the state and federal governments are not worthy of recognition as policy.

Along with falling returns for our grapes, we have the pressures of increasing costs for leased water. Many growers have already been forced to sell their freehold water simply to stay in business.

Growers desperately need to know indicative prices earlier in the growing season, so they can make critical decisions on water purchases and which varieties to irrigate. Growers simply cannot be expected to run a business on guess work to grow crops, and only know the minimum prices in late

January, and even into February, when the grapes are already being delivered over the weighbridge.

Our grape industry and our food security are at severe risk if we do not have an urgent 'big picture' look at the situation and have much better policy.

We have not increased water storage facilities or constructed more dams for a very long time. We have a flood, and politicians forget. We have a drought, and they eventually acknowledge it six-to-eight months after it has already impacted on our farmers.

Now it is time for our politicians to vote for this sensible amendment.





Yet, the Panthers were unable to continue their strong run of accurate goalkicking, and Ryan Turner levelled things at 15 apiece moments before the break.

North captain Codi Voumard had a strong first quarter, taking several intercept marks, ensuring the Magpies were unable to take the lead at the opening change.

However, Waikerie did manage to take the lead into the main break after a pair of Shaun

King goals either side of a classy finish from Neale had the Magpies four points ahead.

Waikerie threatened to blow the game wide open in the third quarter, kicking three goals to one, after Spencely took his tally to three for the day, and reigning Whillas medallist Kade Hilton also found the goals.

However, a goal from Panther big man Brok Viney-Obst stemmed the flow of Magpie momentum, and kept his side in touch at the final break.

Needing to arrest a 15-point deficit at the final break, Loxton North missed several chances in the final quarter, but Neale's third had it within five points.

Second-year Panthers coach Dave Higgins said his message to the group at the final change was to enjoy the battle.

"I just told them to have a good time, and enjoy the game, but still play within our team rules and how we want to play the game," he said.

"We just wanted to put speed on the ball as much as possible because we were coming from behind, and we did need to catch up.

"We did some tinkering with the team where necessary, and it all worked out, and the players were great."

Soon after, Voumard received a 25m penalty following a push after an intercept mark, and had a shot from 45m out.

Voumard struck the ball brilliantly, and put his side one-point ahead with just minutes left on the clock.

"I've got so much confidence in Codi, and he's just a really determined footballer," Higgins said.

"I think everyone knows how good he is in the air, but just to see him finish off his work was tremendous, and I was really happy for him when that went through."

Waikerie charged forward with several attacking pieces of play, but the Panthers defence held up, and a late intercept mark from Wooldridge, followed by Voumard having the last kick of the day saw North book a preliminary final spot.

Higgins said the feeling after the game around the group was one of pure jubilation.

"Obviously it was really exciting, the boys were pretty happy with themselves, and obviously there was some relief there, but there was also just a lot of pride," he said.

"We looked at videos of them during the week, and tried to come up with some sort of plan, but they don't always work out, and Waikerie changed some things up that they hadn't been doing.

"That was to be expected, but I would suggest that 75 per cent of our thinking was about us, and about how we wanted to play and impact the game.

"We've got some really good leaders on each of the lines, and not just the guys with the title, and out leaders made sure we stayed in the game, which we've been able to do really well over the last two months.

"We know that we're a reasonable second-half team, and we did enough to stick around, and in the end that was enough."

In what was a disappointing day for Waikerie, with the season ultimately now drawing to a close, captain Jarrad Bee put in a strong performance through the middle of the ground.

Bee fought hard right throughout the afternoon, while key defender Jack Burgemeister continues to emerge as one of the brightest stars in the competition, and Spencely's three goals kept his side intact.

Neale and Voumard were sensational across the entirety of the match for the Panthers, while Joel Worsfold also worked hard as usual, and Scott Lewis rarely wasted possession.

Facing off against Renmark at Loxton this Saturday afternoon in the preliminary final from 2.40pm, Higgins said his group is daring to dream of glory this September.

"It's certainly important, but you've got to dare to dream, and there's no question that we want to play in a grand final," he said.

"But our respect is so high for Renmark, and we can't afford to take our eye off the ball, so we'll just be running out on Saturday thinking purely about Renmark."

Tyler Wagner poses a significant aerial threat, James Neale is one of the most exciting players to watch in the competition, and Scott Lewis is also in strong form.

Despite having met on four occasions this year, Higgins believes Renmark playing coach Josh Vater will have something new for him to think about.

"I know Josh Vater is a pretty clever coach, so he's going to be thinking about us and working out plans for our guys too," he said.

"I'm not expecting to see what we saw two weeks ago, and the win against them was a long time ago too.

"That being said, it is something that will certainly give the boys a lot of confidence moving forward."

Renmark and Loxton North will do battle for a spot in the decider from 2.40pm this Saturday at Loxton, with the game to be commentated live on 5RM.

# Are the Redbacks facing the final siren?

ALTHOUGH the Blanchetown-Swan Reach (BSR) Redbacks are currently preparing for a crunch first semi-final this Saturday against Brown's Well, it could be the club's last ever game.

"In country footy at the moment we haven't got as many locals playing, so there's less interest in coming to the football I guess."

Having been in existence for

more than five decades, BSR has been the home for many footballers and netballers over a long history.

Formerly playing as the Bulldogs, the club will hold a celebration of its past at the planned presentation night, at its Blanchetown Clubrooms, on Saturday, September 13.

Mr Zadow said it is a good opportunity for the club to come together and celebrate the history, as well as cheer the current group on during its finals run.

"It's very heartbreaking, and there's some very difficult situations we have to work through, and when it gets to times like this you have to take the emotion out of it to come up with the right decision for the club," he said.

"It would be a dream come true to go out with a premiership, and it might even revive a few people, and you never know, a few people might jump back on which is what we need

"For anyone interested, don't be scared to put your hand up, because it isn't a big job, and it isn't a hard job.

"It's a great way of becoming involved in the community, and we have until the end of October when we have the AGM, and feel free to contact me if you have any questions."





"You can purchase tickets online, even on the days of the Field Days event, and the price won't change regardless of when they are purchased," said Emma Gwiazda, Field Days manager.

Limited cash will be on hand at gates, and Eftpos machines will be operating.

"We are accepting cash at the gates, but there won't be much change available," Mrs Gwiazda said.

"We're encouraging people to bring either the right amount of money for the amount of people in the group and just be aware that we might not have change for bigger notes."

Organisers say having online bookings helps to reduce the workload on the Field Days volunteers, and is a convenient way for patrons to get their tickets.






















# Field Days Safari keeps getting better

THE children's Safari is back and bigger than ever at this year's Riverland Field Days.

The time-honoured tradition will feature nearly 50 exhibitors on the trail map and have plenty of children joining the fun across the two days.

The ever-popular trail encourages children to visit exhibitors and collect their promotional materials throughout the site,

from outdoors in the main rows to the pavilion and marquee pavilion, similar in concept to the Yellow Brick Road at the Adelaide Show.

Interim Safari co-ordinator Samantha Prider, from Rivergum Christian College, is optimistic about participation this year, despite the clash with other local sporting events.

"You could plan to visit on


















# Factory FMX to stun Field Days audience
