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Riverlanders asked to plan for the future

PUBLIC consultation for the Berri Barmera Council's draft Long Term Strategic Directions is now open, with community input to influence development of the Strategic plan for 2024-34.

Mayor Ella Winnall encouraged people to view the draft directions document and share their views for the area going forward.

"We know our community is changing in terms of population, economy and environment and with these changes brings new opportunities, as well as challenges" she said.

"The decisions that council makes are really crucial to the long-term future of our community, and it's important for us to have

a really solid evidence base to rely on when making those decisions.

"We know the strong evidence base needs to be coupled with a strong community voice. The Long Term Strategic Directions also helps our community be informed with the same information we are when making decisions for our future.

"It's important for the community to provide feedback to council during the consultation so we can take it into account before finalising the document."

The Long Term Strategic Directions provide evidence to understand the key drivers of change in the community, the challenges ahead and opportunities that can be created.

SA vulnerable to Varroa, says Nicola

A SENIOR Riverland politician claims action to prevent Varroa mite entering South Australia is moving at a “slow pace”, however the State Government says growers and industry are being provided information to minimise outbreak risks.

Agriculture Victoria last month confirmed Varroa mite had been detected for the first time in Victoria, at a property in Nangiloc, near Mildura.

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti, said key local horticultural sectors remained vulnerable to Varroa.

“The Riverland is a prime horticulture zone, with important almond groves and fruit orchards requiring pollination,” Dr Centofanti said.

“As a Riverland resident, many agricultural and horticultural properties are reliant on honeybees for pollination.

“We have seen the preference to

be reactive rather than proactive on a number of biosecurity and industry issues.

“Our primary industries are far too important to our communities and to our economy to risk with a lazy and reactive approach.”

Dr Centofanti said “greater transparency and leadership” was required in order to minimise the risks of a Varroa outbreak in South Australia.

“It is unacceptable that the Government have known about this impending risk since mid-2022 but has only just begun consultation on their draft plan for Detection Response and Transition,” she said.

“The consistently slow pace from (Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven) when it comes to issues of biosecurity is not good enough and our primary producers deserve better.

“We are all taking advantage of the online training resources, we are working together, but we want to know what the government is doing. How are they going to step

up when this hits?”

“How are they going to protect our food production and fresh food security? Who is going to cover the mitigation costs and loss of production costs? These are real questions facing industry that we do not have the answers to.”

However, Ms Scriven said “it’s extremely disappointing to see the opposition leader creating undue fear among the apirary industry on what is a very important biosecurity matter”.

“In the past, governments and oppositions have taken a bi-partisan approach to biosecurity challenges in the interests of our state, but in recent times, the shadow minister has instead opted to seek cheap political headlines,” Ms Scriven said.

“It is an extraordinary attack by the Shadow Minister on the apirary industry who have nominated members to the South Australian Varroa Industry Advisory Committee (SAVIAC).

“The SAVIAC worked over many months to develop the SA plan. Is she suggesting that govern-

ment should have imposed a top-down plan, instead of seeking the industry’s advice?”

“Our government understands the importance of working with the industry on a specific response to the potential incursion of Varroa mite in South Australia.”

Ms Scriven said industry feedback toward the State Government’s draft Detection Response and Transition to Management Plan was crucial.

“Should there be an incursion in South Australia while the Plan is out for consultation, the department would convene an urgent meeting with the SAVIAC to determine the immediate response to the detection in consultation with those representatives, taking into account the specific circumstances of the detection and informed by the draft plan,” she said.

“Other measures are already in place through the National Management Plan, which is currently being rolled out across Australia and is providing free training and other support for all apirarists including the South

Australian industry.

“The program is rolling out 100 large scale, face-to-face workshops dedicated to Varroa management across Australia, with eight workshops scheduled to South Australia. Three of these have already taken place.

“All apirarists, including both commercial and recreational, regardless of whether they are registered or not, are encouraged to participate in these workshops to enhance their skills and knowledge regarding the management of Varroa.

“The industry can get involved by providing their feedback on the draft of the South Australian Varroa Program: Detection Response and Transition to Management Plan through the open consultation on the yourSAY website, and stay confident that we continue to work hand in hand with them to protect our SA’s honeybee industry.”

Riverlanders shine a light on suicide prevention

RIVERLAND residents are preparing to walk in the memory of those lost to suicide next Tuesday and raise preventative awareness.

Meeting at 10am, at Lake Bonney, participants are to gather in the sheltered rotunda before embarking on a walk along the foreshore to the Bluebird Cafe.

Lifeline Australia’s Out of the Shadows Walk is a National initiative to mark World Suicide Prevention Day, being held on 10 September. While also remembering those lost to suicide, walks across Australia will raise funds for the organisation’s preventative

services and 24-hour crisis support.

With more than 3000 Australians losing their lives to suicide every year, Barmera resident and organiser of the Riverland effort, Annie Wilden, is hoping to raise \$1200 for the cause and help “shine a light... and ensure no one has to face their darkest moments alone”.

“Our fundraiser, Barmera Talks Break Cycle for Life, is about the fact there is always someone to help, listen, and speak to” Ms Wilden said.

“Everyone goes through tough times, and everyone can get low, but we need to choose to seek help. We hope this can encourage people to make that step.

“If something was

wrong with your knee, you would go to the doctor — this is no different.

“We just don’t want people feeling like they have to battle this alone.”

Along with fundraising efforts, the Barmera walk will also include a sausage sizzle for lunch, with participants encouraged to bring their own chair, drinks, and a plate of food to share. Water will be supplied.

Boats grounded on the Riverland

HOUSEBOATS traveling along a section of the Murray River are facing challenges, due to low water levels, forcing operators to limit mobility through the Riverland.

Changes in the river's water flow following environmental conditions have recently seen a group of boats unable to travel between towns like Renmark and Berri.

Volunteer skipper for the PS Industry, Michael Polson, said "these issues have been there for many years in places like Settler's Bend, where basically the water comes down, runs around and comes back towards itself, forming a cutting, which is not new".

"They've been slowly forming for years, but after the last flood the cuttings got to around 35ft deep, which allowed more water to go through them, but also filled it with dead gum trees and huge amounts of sand, limiting its navigability," Mr Polson said.

In certain places along the Murray River, pieces of timber were used as underwater fences to divert water flow onto one side and help create a channel, with dredging being done to keep a navigable channel open.

"You can't pass, either through the cutting because its full of sand and other things, or through the bend because now the water level is too low," Mr Polson said.

"All the places that are now shallow have been mentioned and highlighted to council for more than 100 years.

"The slow speed of the water is pushing sand onto the other side of the river, slowing other areas and with water levels reduced, this increases the problem."

Mr Poulson said the last Murray River flood worsened most of these issues, opening new cuttings and pushing huge amounts of sand and debris through the river bed, creating natural dams that pose a threat to houseboats with the increased possibilities of them running aground.

"I just don't want to get to a stage where we sacrifice navigation on the river," Mr Polson said.

"When I found out that there's no boats going from Renmark down to Berri, it wasn't a nice feeling."

"They're pretty much told to get on a boat at Paringa, through the bridge and only go upstream and maybe just above Border Cliffs, but that is blocked off as well.

"We just need someone to go and say yes, it's worth it to keep that, let's make an effort.

"Someone that says we'll either pull those snags out of the cutting so that river traffic can go through there, and there's plenty of those cuttings that are still navigable.

Mr Poulson said wet-

lands and some tourist and caravan park areas were in danger of getting cut-off and only accessible by small boats or even cars."

"As much as I'm extremely in favour of environmental flows down all the backwaters, if we've only got four gegalitres a day coming through, you've probably got half of that going around Pike Creek through the little regulators and freshening up around that back area," Mr Poulson said.

"In our lifetime it hasn't really changed a lot but we've got to find some way of adapting to it and helping out navigation for the sake of keeping boats like the Industry moving," Mr Poulson said.

"We have to keep a really good tourism industry going that provides a lot of jobs, with people from Berri going to Loxton and spending their money there and vice versa.

"We have spoken to (Renmark Paringa Mayor) Peter Hunter and he is getting together with other councils in the area to try and work out a common goal for everyone, and a common goal for the region."

"(Chaffey MP) Tim Whetstone is so far the only one that's responded with a possible solution, saying that he is willing to have a look at it and see what they can do and try to approach different departments."

Last lease extension for the MRQ?

RENMARK Paringa Council is confident the Murray River Queen (MRQ) will be moved from its current location at the Renmark riverfront before the end of 2024.

Renmark Paringa councillors at last week's general meeting passed a motion to endorse a deed of extension to the sublicence agreement for the MRQ for a period of two months.

Council has previously granted five deeds of extension regarding the MRQ,

with the latest ending on 31 July.

However, Renmark Paringa chief executive officer Tony Siviour expected no further extensions would be necessary.

"Council has been given an assurance by the owner of the (MRQ) that the vessel will be leaving the wharf and moving to the Renmark Dry Dock for some programmed maintenance, before relocating to the Loxton riverfront," Mr Siviour said.

Mr Siviour said council's

current commercial lease would be revoked after the MRQ departed, with the area to be reverted "back to recreational vessel use".

The council motion will also see ownership of electrical infrastructure relating to the vessel transferred to council following disconnection.

It is understood Queenie Enterprises Pty Ltd – which operates the MRQ – has confirmed that the MRQ can relocate to Loxton permanently and the mooring site is available.

Traffic congestion challenge picks up at Riverland school drop-off

BERRI Barmera Council is addressing reports of heavy traffic congestion following the combining of two local schools.

In 2022 the Department of Education made the decision to combine the 380 students of Glossop High School with 250 students of the Berri Regional Secondary College, previously holding only Year 11 and 12 senior students. Now with a population of almost 700 students, local residents and school goers say road safety and accessibility at the Berri junction of Kay Avenue and Fenwick Road has been compromised with severe traffic congestion.

With the neighbouring Riverland Special School, which holds more than 50 students, the August Berri Barmera Council report outlined while the vehicle and bus access point of Stadium Drive had previously held a "degree of congestion in the vicinity of Stadium Drive and Glassey Park in the past, more than doubling the student numbers at the site has significantly compounded the issue."

Berri Barmera mayor Ella Winnall said the council had "heard from (the) community that there are several traffic challenges around both schools that have intensified since the expansion of the Berri Regional Secondary

College site and student population".

"This issue has not been caused by the local schools, or council. However, the issue does need to be resolved and we are standing alongside our local schools in assisting with their advocacy to address these traffic management issues," she said.

"Berri Barmera Council looks forward to collaborating with both schools to advocate for solutions that improve the safety in our community."

A spokesperson from the Department of Education said "as part of the State Government's \$6m School Crossing Program, the Department for Infrastructure and Transport and the Department for Education have been working closely with the Berri Barmera Council to improve road safety at the junction of Kay Avenue and Fenwick Road".

"Three speed humps, signage and a pedestrian crossing have been installed to help improve student pedestrian safety," the spokesperson said.

"Pick up and drop off times have also been staggered by both schools to help alleviate pressure during peak times.

"There continues to be further discussions with the council about the possibility of diverting buses to Kay Avenue to create a separate entrance to the Special School."

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Volunteers needed to continue a Riverland miracle

A BERRI equine charity is searching for volunteers so its therapy services for the wider Riverland community can continue.

Born from a childhood love of horses and a deep passion for helping others, Mel Sargent said that Miracle Park Stables has been her “dream for 20 years”.

With extensive experience as a registered nurse, Ms Sargent, and her husband, began the initiative in 2021 — with the Berri charity now a stable equine team that hope to make lasting change in community mental health and animal welfare.

“There is a huge gap of mental health programs that work,” Mrs Sargent said.

“Especially here in the Riverland, there are very little options for services and the chance for healing.”

However, with the recent assisted RSPCA rescue of three Kosciuszko Brumbies and the expanding services the Miracle Stables provides, the charity is in need of volunteers to keep facilities running for Riverland clients.

“We currently need people with horse experience and preferably with disability experience,” Ms Sargent said.

“In our sessions we don’t have horses tied up — they are loose in the stable area so they can be groomed, decorated, and interact freely, or otherwise wander in the main herd.

“So, for the work that we do, and to keep our clients safe in paddock with loose horses, we need a facilitator who recognises and can understand horse body language.

“However, there are roles for people without such knowledge — and we encourage those interested in helping with the basic care and management of horses to contact us — but, to run client sessions we need that experience.”

Over the past three years, Miracle Park Stables have provided therapeutic avenues for those struggling with mental health and/or have a disability to build self-esteem, self-efficacy, resilience and emotional regulation skills through a variety of programs, including:

□ **Equine Partnered Experiential Therapy:** A program offered for complex mental health issues and anyone wanting to delve deeper within themselves in a safe, therapeutic environment. Partnered with a trained facilitator, the program involves observing and interacting with the equine partners in a therapeutic space with no riding involved.

□ **Therapeutic Riding:** A program available for NDIS participants, providing therapeutic benefits and assisting with improved balance, co-ordination, strength and greater range of movement. Therapeutic riding will also help participants to develop self-awareness and will improve emotional regulation and social skills.

□ **Therapeutic Horse Connection:** A program available for NDIS participants who may choose not to, or are unable to ride horses. These sessions can include activities such as grooming, decorating a horse or pony’s mane, art therapy involving the

ponies, leading the horses or ponies through our obstacle course, or learning from them in their herd environment.

□ **Equine Assisted Learning:** An introductory program is a mini module on boundaries and consent. This program is a valuable tool to help kids learn important communication skills, including understanding non-verbal body-language.

□ **Horse Time:** An unstructured program that includes mindfulness exercises and games with an equine partner. The program also provides the opportunity to groom a pony, or just sit in the yards and watching them play.

□ **Equine Mindfulness Experience:** A program designed for individuals, families, groups and corporate team building to relax while also learning about self-care, resilience, boundaries, temperament types and personality profiling to enhance communication, with no riding involved.

□ **Responsive Horsemanship Coaching:** A three-stepped program that teaches horse riding. Each step will build on the previous sessions to develop a well-rounded understanding of caring for horses and learning to communicate with horses in a natural and holistic way.

Ms Sargent said that horses operate in the present, respond immediately and honestly to what is happening in the moment, and are experts at reading non-verbal signals and body language.

“Horses have a really similar social structure to people — they experience the same emotions as people,” Ms Sargent said.

“They are amazing mirrors of our emotions.

“They will reflect back what the person is feeling. Even if someone is saying they’re calm, if they’re in the herd and dysregulated, the horses will be very wary because they can feel that incognisance.

“So, when we do breath work and grounding the horses will come back because you become a safe space — ultimately you learn to self-regulate, because if you want the horses near you, you have to do the work.”

With an inherent, gentle nature, curiosity, and a drive to work in a herd which causes

horses to seek connection, even with people, Ms Sargent said such feedback enables a deepening in awareness of self and can encourage confidence and improve personal strengths.

“You can just imagine how healing it can be when a horse is choosing to interact with someone,” she said.

“Of course, being around the horses can help the person regulate, but healing can also come from the interaction with the horse and the connection that can be built.”

Ms Sargent said it was her own experience with complex PTSD and the peace she found with horses that inspired her to share the experience with her community.

“I am so passionate about helping people with trauma,” she said

“Having a horse provide that secure base is what helped me and I really just wanted to provide that for others — watching people heal, grow, and change has been magical.

“We recently had a couple of kids come through that have significant childhood trauma — they were selectively non-verbal and very shy.

“Since engaging with our programs, one has been able to go back to school and begin to make friends.

“It’s that transition from insecure attachment — the relationship and attachment with one of the ponies has been able to model a secure attachment, which allows the child to develop a capacity to explore the world and make connections with others... it’s really beautiful.”

Ms Sargent said Miracle Park Stables was also open to anyone wanting a place to relax or spend time with animals.

“There are always positive benefits to being around these animals,” she said.

“Even when we teach riding — only using a bareback pad and a halter without bits in their mouth so the horse is comfortable — it’s therapeutic because we teach first being a partner with the horse. We lead the rider around the arena, and have them feel the horse’s movement and gently guide the animal around an obscure course.

“The horse-riding skills are based on communication first — it’s about using your

body, energy, and position to inform the horse of your intention, it’s not just pull and kick.”

Along with finishing her Masters in Counselling, Ms Sargent hopes to continue expanding the services at Miracle Park Stables.

“We are hoping to expand our services to those with a physical disability soon,” she said.

“We are also in the process of setting up a Pay It Forward fundraiser for our pony Zim, who passed away a few weeks ago to colic.

“He was the absolute best with children, so we want to create a legacy in his name of funding that can be set aside for those who cannot afford our services.”

THE YEARS GO BY

The key recruits

WHETHER it's players arriving or leaving, recruitment is a big factor in the potential for success for all sporting clubs.

This weekend will see the 2024 Riverland Football League A grade season culminate with another must-see clash between Renmark Rovers and Barmera-Monash.

The occasion provides a rematch from the 2023 grand final, and a chance for the Rovers to avenge last year's loss on Riverland football's grandest stage, while for the Roos, who could claim a second-straight premiership, it's the opportunity to assert themselves as arguably the league's powerhouse.

If Barmera-Monash are to claim consecutive crowns, star recruit for 2024, Jono Beech, will undoubtedly have a decisive role to play. For fear of this becoming a sports editorial we'll avoid listing his previous experience in detail, but the ex-Adelaide Crow has been a large focus of this RFL season since his return to the region was speculated earlier in the year.

He has lived up to those lofty expectations, as while despite only featuring a handful of times for the Roos throughout the campaign, he made a large impact on the result in every appearance.

Beech has also been aided by another recruit with high-level experience – and another in a second stint lakeside – in defender Luke Thomas, who has featured in SANFL grand finals for Norwood.

On the opposing end of the field, Renmark – the RFL's top team before Barmera-Monash's 2023 success – boasts its own ex-SANFL powerhouse in Nick Gillard, who many would rank among the top five performers in the competition this year.

This point of recruits being so influential has drawn the debate of Murray Pioneer readers, even in today's edition, and is one with both potential positive and negative impacts.

Criticism seems to centre around star recruits taking priority away from the potential development of local names.

This is definitely a possible concern if it indeed is the case at any club, however, potential talk of Barmera-Monash being a one-dimensional side focused on Beech can be countered with the observation that the Roos will feature in every one of Riverland football's grand final fixtures this weekend, from the juniors to the seniors.

With the names Beech and Gillard also being so dominant for their respective clubs during 2024, is the only solution for a Berri, or Loxton North – two other clubs that have drawn reader observations in recent editions – to find a former AFL, or SANFL goal-scoring machine of their own?

On the positive side, it's apparent the almost superstar-level effect these recruits have on the field, and their talent – and goal tallies – have been entertaining RFL fans all season. Having these kinds of names in our region undoubtedly creates more attention for the RFL as a whole, and that benefits all the region's towns.

Saturday's grand final will provide another chapter to the debate.



The SANFL Magarey Medal has, over the years, been awarded to several former Riverland footballers. The 2024 medal count will be held next week, on 9 September. This award, the highest in South Australian Aussie rules, is the oldest of its kind in Aussie rules (WAFL Sandover Medal, 1921, and AFL Brownlow, 1924). The 'Magarey', introduced in 1898, has been awarded nearly every of the 127 years since. Medals were not awarded during the two world wars, WWI (1916-1918) and WWII (1942-1944). Mystery surrounds why there is no record of any medal in 1900 and 1904. In the 'rough'n tough life' in the early days of SA football, it was common for players to 'have a wack' at an opponent who 'got in the way'. In 1897, the then SA Football Association (SAFA) chairman William Magarey, an Adelaide solicitor of note, reflected upon football and the lack of respect the players gave umpires. As commissioner, he assigned penalties for unduly rough play or disrespectful behaviour, but he 'thought it might be useful' to provide an annual end-of-season medal as an incentive to the 'fairest and most brilliant player' of the season. 2. Adopt the Draft Community Land Management Plan for Crown Record Volume 5755 Folio 640 formerly the Paruna Golf Course for public consultation purposes.
3. That Council review its Community Land Register to ensure compliance with legislative requirements and review and amend its Community Land Management Plans as required over the next 12 months."

As per item 3 above, I urge all residents and ratepayers to contact Loxton Waikerie council CEO David Beaton if they have any community land that the council has dealt with in a non-compliant manner.

Paruna residents/ratepayers complained bitterly when the council took over the generous donation of the pioneer Pocock family's block of land, donated for a park and children's playground.

This land adjoins what was the then town-hall, and is now the Paruna RV park. Eileen Pocock's donated land was commandeered by the council via a declaration on the grounds that it was not a 'dedicated' park. See The Murray Pioneer as per Jody Flavel's response.

This quiet declaration only saw the light of day – other than the council minutes – months

later.

This community land declaration was done to enlarge the Paruna RV park on what I consider spurious grounds that a cavalcade of caravans was inundating the town. Reliable and accurate figures prove otherwise.

Community land is precious, once it's gone that's it, there's no more public land to enjoy in your town.

I understand Paruna residents will again be making a complaint to Mr Beaton over the Eileen Pocock Memorial Park land that was, without appropriate public consultation, taken over for the purpose of enlarging the poorly patronised RV park.

Confusion and destruction

The recent passing of the Labor Government's 'Nature Positive' legislation has resulted in the inclusion of Scope 3 emissions in greenhouse gas reporting. This has introduced a layer of confusion and panic, particularly for farmers and small businesses.

Scope 3 emissions are indirect greenhouse gas emissions that occur in an entity's value chain, encompassing both upstream and downstream emissions, including those from financed activities. This broad definition has not only complicated the regulatory landscape, but has imposed unfair burdens on smaller entities such as farmers and small family businesses across the nation.

To be clear - Scope 3 emissions are notoriously difficult to measure and control. Unlike direct emissions from a company's own operations or those from purchased energy (Scope 1 and Scope 2), Scope 3 emissions include a vast array of indirect activities. This includes emissions from the production of goods, transportation, waste disposal, and even the use of sold products. For farmers, this means their emissions are intertwined with those of various suppliers and buyers, creating a nebulous web of responsibility that is challenging to manage.

The most pressing issue is the uncertainty Scope 3 emissions introduce for farmers and small businesses. The lack of clear guidelines and support means that these entities are left grappling with how to accurately measure and report their emissions, despite being mandated to do so through amendments to

the Corporations Act 2001. Such uncertainty often translates into significant operational stress and financial strain.

With this change, there is a real risk that larger companies, which are more directly targeted by Scope 3 reporting requirements, may offload their compliance costs and risks onto their smaller suppliers. This is already happening with the Modern Slavery Act, which places significant burden on individual farmers and businesses. Consequently, a farmer who relies on a major agribusiness for financing or supply may find themselves facing unexpected demands for emission reductions or additional reporting burdens.

Moreover, the imposition of Scope 3 requirements without adequate support for small businesses exacerbates the risk of economic inequity. Small entities, which often lack the resources or expertise to navigate complex emission calculations, may struggle to meet these new demands. This scenario could lead to smaller players crumpling under the high cost of compliance.

We must ensure the burden of emissions reporting does not disproportionately harm the very entities that are crucial to our economy and environment.

Connection Centre opened for St Francis of Assisi College

ST FRANCIS of Assisi College in Renmark celebrated the official opening of the \$9.5m Connection Centre on Monday.

A senior learning centre for year 10 to 12 students, the building consists of classrooms, flexible learning spaces, student kitchens, a wellbeing area and a study hub. The opening also celebrated two additional senior science laboratories — supporting learning in physics, chemistry, and biology — plus a kitchen garden area created to enable students to plant and grow their own vegetables, fruit, and herbs.

The blessing and opening of the buildings were attended by more than 250 students, staff, families, and guests, including Catholic Education SA executive director Neil McGoran, Catholic Education Port Pirie Diocese director Nichii Mardon, and South Australian Commission of Catholic Schools chairperson John Neate.

Opening the ceremony with an Acknowledgement of Country, local Aboriginal representative Sam Mitchell conducted a smoking ceremony, before being followed by a Blessing Liturgy by SDS Bishop of Port Pirie Diocese, bishop Karol Kulczycki.

“Today celebrated another significant milestone for our college community,” prin-

cipal Nathan Hayes said.

“These additions consolidate our commitment to provide an excellent Catholic education for our students as they progress through their senior education years.

“The celebration was also an opportunity to acknowledge the efforts of the many people who have contributed to the vibrant Catholic school community we have become.”

The new Connection Centre was the second stage of a learning expansion for St Francis of Assisi College, which is in its third year of operation. This recent build followed a first stage \$17m development of a year 7 to 9 teaching building, with an additional admiration building and a multi-purpose building that allows for learning in visual art, food technology, and science. A third stage of planned development will include a single-court stadium, inclusive of some performing arts facilities, additional parking, and expansion to the oval.

Vine resting not a long-term solution?

FURTHER trials of a chemical that rests grape vine production has been labelled as a ‘band-aid’ fix for wine industry challenges, according to senior Riverland politicians.

The State Government last week announced a new round of its vineyard resting trial, aimed at providing growers with “additional time to make diverse business decisions”.

However, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said growers required further information regarding the specific varieties to rest.

“My concern is that we’re not addressing the issue, and that is what varieties do the wineries want, or what varieties do our global trading partners want?,” Mr Whetstone said.

“At the moment we’re going to rest vines, but which need resting, (and) which need pulling out?”

“The ethephon is a band-aid... a stop-gap measure that’s not addressing the longer-term issue.

“We need to have the data that will give us a much-clearer picture of vineyards that need to retain vines in the short term, and data about vineyards that need to be removed.”

Mr Whetstone said the use of ethephon could have long-term negative effects on vines.

“It’s a tool that can be used, but there will definitely be a long-term impact,” he said.

“There’s no such thing as human intervention with natural resources that won’t have an adverse impact.

“It’s an approach with one eye shut. You can’t just spray the vineyard and turn the water off, you need to keep the root system alive and in good health.”

Riverland-based MLC, and opposition spokesperson for regional South Australia, Nicola Centofanti said resting vines would fail to alleviate wider industry challenges.

“This is a band-aid on a bullet wound and a failure of the Malinauskas Labor Government to show leadership and provide solutions,” Ms Centofanti said.

“We have a dire situation in our wine industry. The Minister obviously knows that China re-opening has not significantly improved grape prices and that there is still an ongoing oversupply issue, which is not going to be solved in the short term.

“Asking growers to mothball their vineyards for the season will do little to assist them in the long term.

“I have been calling on (Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven) for over a year now to provide some meaningful practical resourcing to support growers to diversify their crops, ensuring that the land remains productive within our regions, maintaining our regional economies. They are offering a short-term fix to a long-term problem.”

It is understood research undertaken by the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI) in collaboration with Wine Australia found the yield of vines treated with ethephon returned to commercial levels, and no residues were detected, in fruit during the following season.

Ms Scriven said avoiding harvest on blocks where ethephon had been used would result in “a significant additional saving” for growers.

“We are very fortunate to have SARDI continuously undertaking world-class research, and the extremely positive research outcomes shows that ethephon can have a real and meaningful impact in reducing the costs of red wine grape growers,” Ms Scriven said.

“I have heard extensively from red wine grape growers in the Riverland and across South Australia of their concerns with managing their vineyards in the face of oversupply and I encourage them to look at this vineyard resting trial and rebate to reduce those costs.

“Importantly, the research undertaken here has shown crops bounce back in the following season with no residue detected, so they can apply ethephon with confidence.”

STUDENTS of St Joseph's School Renmark have raised money to donate 11 sleeping bags to Riverlanders facing homelessness.

Amassed by the SRC planned pyjama day and with donations to a canned food and recycling drive by school-based members of St Vincent De Paul — The Mini Vinnies — St Joseph's decided to direct their semester 1 fundraising to the Riverland branch of ac.care.

"Our focus for our SRC fundraising changes every semester," SRC co-ordinator and teacher Amy Thompson said.

"This semester we were raising money to support the community. This was also with a routine school awareness campaign that ties into learning — so this worked perfectly.

"While (the children) may witness homelessness when they visit the city, chances are that they just aren't aware of this issue in the Riverland.

"One of our key learning focuses was for the students to feel

grateful for what they do have — hopefully they understand how lucky they are and this can encourage social justice within themselves.

"How to help others in need without judgment is something we really focus on."

Receiving the 11 sleeping bags last Thursday, ac.care regional manager homelessness Michelle Story said the number of Riverlanders rough sleeping this year is "staggering".

"This year alone we have had 80 days of code blue, which has essentially been the entire winter," she said.

"Awareness of this issue is so important, because when people know they want to help."

ac.care case manager Kristie Couzens said tangible donations make "a real difference" to the local community.

"We are so thankful for the support," she said.

"Being able to physically give someone a bag when they have nowhere else to go can ensure they will still be able to stay warm."

Fertiliser workshop for Riverland land managers

THE Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) will host a free workshop demonstrating how to produce and use fertilisers to Riverland land managers.

Hosted on farm at Brinkley, on the 24 September, the event will take attendees through the process to ferment base cultures that can be used as the basis of liquid fertilisers to help improve soil health and performance.

The day will be facilitated by David Hardwick, from Soil Land Food, who has worked on the research and development of bio fertilisers, in addition to his experience in agronomy and soil health.

Bio fertilisers contain living organisms, including bacteria and yeasts, which help to stimulate plant growth and soil health. As a form of fertiliser that can be made on-farm at a cost-effective price point, more and more land managers are considering bio fertilisers as a practical part of their approach.

MRLB soil extension officer Barrie Williams said workshop attendees will learn how to produce a base bio fertiliser that can then be customised to address more specific constraints.

"The workshop will step land managers through the process to make a fermented *Lactobacillus* culture which is rich in microbes and will boost soil fertility and plant health," he said.

"The base culture can then be added to products such as seaweed, calcium, magnesium, micronized biochar, zeolite, wood ash, humic acid and other macro and micronutrients, depending on the landholder's requirements.

"We'll also be cooking up a batch of bio fertiliser that is rich in micronutrients, and a hydrolysate by recycling fish products, which is capable of increasing soil fungi and providing trace elements in a plant-available format."

Mr Williams said that there were many advantages to the use of bio fertilisers.

"Bio fertilisers offer land managers a highly cost-effective way to feed their plants while also tailoring their fertilisers to address specific constraints and deficiencies," he said.

"They are easily scaled for any size farm. The cost of set up is relatively inexpensive and the process uses equipment that most farmers would already have in their shed."

Mr Williams said there were also a number of advantages to bio fertilisers, compared with commonly used fertilisers such as DAP and urea.

"Bio fertilisers are better for soil microbes, provide nutrients in a more plant available form and improve the capacity of soil to retain water, making crops and pastures more resilient in dry times," he said.

The workshop is free to attend, but registrations are essential. Attendance includes lunch and take-home resources.

New SA concession payment to ease cost of living

ELIGIBLE residents and seniors living in the Riverland will receive a concession payment aimed to provide support with the rising cost of living.

South Australian households will at the end of August receive the State Government's Cost of Living Concession (COLC) payment, focused on providing immediate and targeted support to low or fixed income households.

For the first time, payments made to tenants and self-funded retirees who are Commonwealth Seniors Health Card holders have been doubled to match the amount received by homeowner-occupiers.

The \$255 payment will be deposited into the bank accounts of approximately 210,000 South Australians.

SA Premier Peter Malinauskas said "we know people are doing it tough and cost-of-living pressures are continuing to have an impact on many South Australians".

"Our increased Cost of Living Concession payment, which for the first time will see tenants and eligible seniors receive the same amount as homeowner-occupiers, demonstrates our strong commitment to providing real cost-of-living relief to those who need it most," Mr Malinauskas said.

The State Government expects approximately 56,000 tenant households and 14,000 households with a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card will benefit from this payments.

Opposition Spokesperson for cost of living Heidi Girolamo said "the government's announcement today of a one-off payment of \$255.60 to tenants and self-funded retirees is too little, too late".

"South Australians are \$25,000 a year worse off," she said.

"While I'm sure the payment will be welcomed, it will hardly cover a weekly grocery shop, let alone rent and increasing water and energy bills."

The COLC is paid to one person per household and the assessment is based on individual's circumstances on 1 July of the relevant financial year.

Households are unrequired to reapply if they have received a COLC payment previously and applications can still be made for this financial year until 31 December 2024.

Recipients must:

- Live at the property
- Hold an eligible concession card.
- Receive an eligible Centrelink payment.
- Meet low-income provisions.

Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said: "When we came to Government in 2022, we made a commitment to review the concessions systems in South Australia to make it more equitable – and we are delivering. "I'm so pleased our 210,000 COLC payments will help people on low and fixed incomes with living expenses

as the cost-of-living continues to bite."

"All payments should be cleared in bank accounts by early next week, including everyone who received a payment last year and who is still eligible, as well as new applications which have been processed up to now," Ms Cook said.

Shadow Minister for Cost of Living, Heidi Girolamo said "The Government has come out today and reannounced an old payment."

"It has failed to announce any new initiatives to support South Australians while the Government is generating record revenue and pocketing the cash for passion projects instead of returning the benefit to hardworking South Australian households and businesses."

"Many South Australians are not eligible for these concessions, especially those working multiple jobs to cover the ever-increasing cost of the household budget. The average household is having to find an extra \$500 a week just to stay afloat."

The payments, which total more than \$53 million, should be cleared in bank accounts by the end of August.

New biosecurity bill to protect SA's agriculture industry

RIVERLAND farmers and producers will benefit from new biosecurity regulations aimed to protect the agriculture industry.

Introduced last week, the new Biosecurity Bill 2024 is focused on protecting South Australia's agribusiness sector from pests, diseases and other biosecurity matter from the increased movement of goods and people, climate change, changes in land use, e-commerce and recent changes in global pest and disease distribution.

Recent modifications have created increasing pressure on

the state's biosecurity system, in order to provide market access and a safe supply of agricultural, fisheries and forestry products to local residents, interstate and overseas markets.

Included in the bill are the use of traceability systems to verify the health status of goods, the point of origin and movement through the supply chain, delivering protection to primary industries, infrastructure and companion animals.

"Ensuring we have the strongest regulatory tools to respond to current and emerg-

ing biosecurity risks in South Australia is vital", Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said.

"The Biosecurity Bill provides a consistent, flexible, and future-proofed biosecurity regulatory framework to protect South Australia's economy, community, and our terrestrial and aquatic environments. "It will introduce contemporary tools to prevent, control and manage biosecurity risks and impacts in South Australia, and recognises that biosecurity is

everyone's responsibility."

Following an in-depth review and stakeholder consultation of current legislation, new regulations are set to allow a modern and responsive approach to biosecurity management, featuring shared responsibility and general biosecurity duty across the entire industry, government and the local communities.

Recent interstate outbreaks include avian influenza, varroa mite and foot and mouth disease, which all pose a significant threat to local producers if detected in South Australia.

Loxton's new heritage silo in the (art)works

A NEW tourism project aims to celebrate birdlife and fauna from the surrounding district and showcase the talent of Riverland artists.

Commissioned by the Loxton Community Future's (LCFI) Tourism Workstream, several mini-silos will be painted and located around the western end of the Loxton Community Conservation and Heritage Park, on the Karoonda Highway.

The concept of mini-silos was based on 'Re-use, Re-cycle, Re-purpose', which looks to see old irrigation pumps and pipes start a new life as artistic sculptures, in an effort to link these to the Australia-wide silo art trail.

Seven structures in total will be delivered to the Loxton community, with three of them being vertically stacked sumps, and the other two horizontal cement pipes, items commonly found on local fruit blocks.

With the approval of Loxton Waikerie council and Robert Fielke, the structures were constructed with the help of locals Julian Nickolai, Barry Davis and Rick Frankel.

Loxton Community Futures Incorporated secretary Kathy Schliebs said "local artist Jarrod Loxton has been designated to paint each installation, with the structures featuring a monarch butterfly, two stately kookaburras and one of the structures will showcase a blue tongue lizard and an

echidna". "The art structures will also feature the famous yabbies, a blueface honeyeater, night-dwelling possums and our local kangaroos," Ms Schliebs said

"We would love to hear from interested parties to complete the painting and finalise the project."

Four of the mini-silos have been sponsored, with a cost of \$3200 that covers construction costs and painting, and a commemorative plaque at the base of each silo, acknowledging the sponsor and the information about the portrayed fauna.

Building resilience and leadership

PARTICIPANTS of the 2024 Regional Development Australia Murraylands and Riverland (RDAMR) leadership program at a recent workshop were encouraged to develop a deeper understanding of their emotions, and how to foster a more resilient mindset.

The 21 selected participants are being encouraged to understand themselves better to assist them in becoming effective leaders in their workplaces and community.

The recent workshop in the Karoonda Institute, facilitated by Tanya Lehmann from Aurora Meliora and Susannah Dodd,

from LeadersHP, encouraged participants to explore the intricacies of mood states and brain function.

RDAMR project manager Mandy Tennant said the sessions were designed to help individuals recognise and manage their emotional responses better, and foster a more resilient mindset.

“Understanding how the brain processes stress and emotions is crucial for leaders to remain effective, particularly in challenging situations,” she said.

“One of the primary goals of this training is to encourage participants to deepen their self-awareness.

“By doing so, they are more likely to contribute positively to their roles and organisations, leading with empathy, clarity, and confidence.”

Ms Tennant said resilience was not something developed overnight.

“It requires ongoing self-care and a commitment to personal growth,” she said.

“The training emphasises that by taking care of oneself, leaders can better perform and support those around them.”

Ms Tennant said access to the right networks and guidance was critical in building resilience.

“It’s essential for individuals to seek out supportive communities and mentors who can offer advice and encouragement.

“This support network plays a vital role

in helping leaders navigate the complexities of their roles and maintain their well-being.”

The workshops are being held at various locations across the Riverland and Murraylands to ensure broad participation from all corners of the region.

The leaders come from diverse backgrounds and towns such as Berri, Taplan, Loxton, Waikerie, Murray Bridge, Tailem Bend, Renmark, Barmera, Monash, and Peake and represent the eight local government areas in the Murraylands and Riverland

Ms Tennant said hosting the workshops in different towns, like Renmark’s Calperum Station, Karoonda, Bowhill, Berri, Loxton and Murray Bridge not only boosted local businesses by bringing in participants from across the region but also showcased the unique qualities of each town.

“This helps spread the word about the region’s offerings, potentially attracting more visitors and business opportunities in the future.”

Ms Tennant said the RDAMR’s Regional Leadership Development program was not just about building individual resilience.

“It is about strengthening the fabric of the entire region by empowering its leaders to be the best versions of themselves.

“This initiative is set to leave a lasting impact on both the participants and the communities where they reside and work.”

Mid Murray Council protects Dark Sky Festival name

TOURISM Western Australia has withdrawn its application to trademark the term 'Dark Sky Festival' after it was opposed by Mid Murray Council.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey has welcomed the decision, but said it was unfortunate the WA Tourism Commission failed to withdraw its application before the council had to spend \$30,000 in legal fees.

"It is definitely a positive outcome as it ensures that the 'Dark Sky Festival' name remains available for community events without any legal challenges," she said.

"We were against somebody trademarking that name, when there are many dark skies in Australia and we think it should be open for anyone to use."

The Mid Murray district is home to a significant part of SA's River

Murray International Dark Sky Reserve, that is based on the northern border of the Murray River, Lakes and Coorong region.

Ms Bailey said council felt that the Mid Murray district and other communities with dark skies should have the option to use the 'Dark Sky Festival' if they also wanted to run such an event.

"We should be sharing our resources like this and we felt strongly that the name should be available for everyone to use."

A spokesperson for Tourism Western Australia said they discontinued the application to trademark the name once it received advice it was unnecessary to deliver future events using this branding.

"The inaugural Dark Sky Festival in Western Australia took place as part of celebrations for the 2023 Total Solar Eclipse, bringing 14,800 visitors to events held across Coral Bay, Exmouth and

Onslow, and injecting more than \$16.1m into these regional economies," the spokesperson said.

"Given this resounding success and future dark sky tourism opportunities, we continue to explore how we can leverage our state's assets and strength in this space.

"This included looking at a potential trademark for the name 'Dark Sky Festival' to activate for future potential events.

"This was discontinued once advice was received that it wasn't necessary to deliver future events using this branding."

Mid Murray Council has decided to avoid attempts to recover the legal fees it spent to safeguard the 'Dark Sky Festival' term.

"We have been advised that we would only be able to pursue a small award for costs," Ms Bailey said.

"Given the effort involved, we did not think it would be worth the

time and resources for that limited financial return."

Ms Bailey said the money spent on opposing the Dark Sky Festival trademark application could have been spent by council's planning code amendment to protect the district's dark skies.

"We are seeking a private partner to help us with this amendment," she said.

The Dark Sky Reserve in October 2019 received accreditation from the International Dark Sky Association.

Ms Bailey said the dark sky reserve was becoming a significant tourist attraction for the state.

"These include tourism and economic benefits in running star gazing tours and astronomy festivals," she said.

Ms Bailey said the dark sky reserve gave primary producers, who often faced challenges such as drought, a chance to diversify the

use of their properties.

Mid Murray council's section 41 Dark Sky Committee member Chris Tugwell said community members involved with the reserve were "extremely pleased" with Tourism Western Australia's decision to withdraw its trademark application.

Mr Tugwell is also chairperson of Mid Murray Landcare SA.

"An expression like 'Dark Sky Festival' is very common, it is not unique and there are many Dark Sky Festivals around the world," he said.

"There is one in the Northern Territory and in the Blue Mountains in NSW."

Mr Tugwell said the Mid Murray district when applying for the international accreditation for the River Murray International Dark Sky Reserve had also mentioned the concept of running such a festival in the future.

Farmer by name, farmer by nature for family-owned Australian potato dynasty

SOUTH Australia is the heartbeat of the Australian potato industry, and the Farmer Group – headed by Matthew Farmer and his son Luca – are changing the game with exciting new technology.

Farmer Group's roots date back to 1956, with Matthew's grandfather Jack Farmer beginning in horticultural; it was Matthew's Father Barry Farmer who with his foresight and aptitude built the foundations of the family's potato business.

Four generations later the business has continued to go from strength-to-strength, expanding from the original 40 acres to 90,000 acres. In fact, the purchase of their south-east property Kangaringa in 2003 has allowed the family to grow the plantings from 141 hectares to more than 1,600 hectares today.

As well as potatoes, Farmer Group has invested in complimentary products including onions, almonds, broadacre crops, Merino Sheep and Black Angus cattle, with next generation of Farmer, Luca, explaining how they all work in harmony.

"Across our 170-plus pivot sites we cycle through various crops, to ensure soil quality is maintained," he explained.

"It's really, just about having a diverse farm that works in unison. We utilise the crop cycle to organically rejuvenate and prepare soils for our primary crops, potatoes and onions.

"Rhizoctonia (a soil-borne fungus that causes rot) can be a real problem in potato pivots; a canola crop is a good way to mitigate that risk whilst also using the benefit of its large taproot to open the soil ready for the next potato pivot.

"As a farm we work hard towards having zero product wastage. After a potato harvest, the potatoes that have

been left behind become a great nutrient source for our livestock."

Farmer Group clearly has a deep understanding of the science behind farming, and the business has also recently turned to technology to advance their state-of-the-art potato packing facility, which features specially designed machinery not found anywhere else in the country.

The facility was first built in 1986, but in recent years Farmer Group has collaborated with some of the world's top minds in the automation industry to create one of Australia's most impressive, high-tech packing operations.

Chief operating officer Jessica Avery explained.

"During the past five years we decided it was 'go time', we started to design a line that would fit in our custom-built packing shed," she said.

"We did apply for many different government grants, and were unsuccessful, so the Farmer family agreed that the only way forward was to provide the funding themselves for the \$55million investment.

"It has been a rewarding opportunity to work with world leaders in automation. Barry Farmer spent a lot of time researching automation, including various trips overseas to look at European packing facilities – engineering has always been a passion of his.

"The last two years have seen that life's passion and all our planning come together. In October 2022 our first shipping containers started to land; we took delivery of 88 40-foot shipping containers within the first three-month period.

"By the following October we were running potatoes through the line, within a short 12-month turnaround to be able to stand all that equipment in the packing

shed was quite an achievement for us.

"Now 12 months on we are still astonished at the sheer volume and the quality of what we can put through the processing line, and we're going to continue to evolve and develop – and even that isn't the end for us, it's looking at what comes next now.

"In the past when we were always striving and looking for more, we were having to say no to different orders because we just couldn't meet the turnaround, whereas now we don't have to say no – we can fill a 40-foot shipping container in around three hours. It's a total game-changer.

"The automation has allowed us to have better control over the potatoes that are coming through the line, it's now about 'how do we best commercialise more of that crop?' and 'what's next for the Farmer Group in the way of potatoes?'"

Ms Avery went on to discuss the state of the industry, post-Covid.

"The entire potato industry has enjoyed a strong uptick since the pandemic," she said.

"Pre-Covid times the potato industry within Australia was actually in decline, but since then and as the economy has started to struggle and families are under more financial pressures, the humble potato is in demand.

"It is one of the most cost-effective and versatile commodities on the supermarket shelves and we are finding that the consumer demand for it has grown.

"Internationally the consumer demand for potatoes is also on an increase. In the past the Asian nations were large rice consumers, they are now becoming substantial consumers of potatoes.

"Australian table potatoes are the best in the world, from both a visual and

palatable point, but it is also our family farming story and security over controlling the full process from planting, growing, harvesting to packing that has become a large component of why our product is in such high demand internationally.

"Did you know that potatoes are the original superfood? They have amazing health properties that are regularly overlooked.

"They have more Vitamin C than an orange, they are rich in antioxidants and when cooked and cooled they release a starch known as resistant starch that is great for gut health."

To continue the next generation of the business, Farmer Group is looking for the next generation of farmers to get on board.

"To anyone local in the area that is looking for employment, we are always looking for skilled labour within the automated factory and on the farms," Ms Avery said.

"We are particularly looking for that next generation, that youth, to get involved in farming.

"It's one of the greatest struggles facing many in agriculture across Australia – horticulture and farming is not appealing to the youth – and I believe it is because they don't understand what's available.

"There's a preconceived notion about what a potato-packing shed looks like versus what it is, which is state-of-the-art, amazing technology.

"It's the same when you start going onto the farms, trying to get more people involved in farming and out to our regional areas. Honestly, if you want an opportunity to drive a piece of equipment worth millions, go farming."

Some fruit and vegetables cannot move from properties in the outbreak area.

We have begun eradication activities in the area. PIRSA field staff with ID will be visiting properties to apply organic fruit fly bait and check fruit for signs of fruit fly. If you need to discuss special arrangements for moving commercial produce from outbreak areas, please call the industry hotline on 1800 255 556.

What you need to do:

- **Keep** fruit on your property – do not share, sell or give it away.
- **Provide** us access to your garden so we can do our work quickly and efficiently.
- **Pick** your ripe fruit and vegetables.
- **Collect** fallen fruit.
- **Check** your fruit for blemishes and maggots.
- **Call** the Fruit Fly Hotline on 1300 666 010 if you find any maggots in fruit, seal the item in an airtight bag and arrange collection.

To dispose of homegrown produce, double bag the waste, seal it closed, and put it in a general waste bin.

SA won a bronze medal in the 12-year-old boys combined team scores.

SA team supporter and proud mum of Chloe, Julia Golding, said it was noted the SA team was "very supportive" of their teammates, and also those from other states.

"They were high-fiving athletes from other states and helping them up after they were collapsing over the finish line," she said.

School Sport SA Cross Country Championships coach Richard Coote said the team certainly deserved to win a medal for the best team spirit.

"Thank you everyone for your support of each other," he said.

Mr Coote, who is also

the Riverland Athletics Development Squad coach, was also awarded and recognised for his 10 years of service with School Sport Australia, in both Cross Country and Track and Field.

Ms Golding said Mr Coote had worked tirelessly to bring the best out of the SA athletes.

"How deserving it was to be commended on such commitment and dedication," she said.

Mr Coote is set to retire from School Sport SA coaching.

Team relays were held on 23 of August, with the SA 10-year-old girls running 1km legs each, and finishing 5th.

The SA 12-year old girls' team ran 1.5km legs each, also crossing the line in 5th place.

"Many new friendships, amazing memories and an understanding of what it takes to compete with the best in Australia are just some of the things the SA girls will take away from this amazing experience," Ms Golding said.

"We can't wait to see what the future holds for these talented young athletes."

Village life for Riverland foster carers

AS the expression goes, it takes a village to raise a child – and never more so than for Riverland foster carers Leonie and Malcolm.

The saintly couple, who live on a 2.5ha block alongside the River Murray, near Blanchetown, are currently caring for nine children, most with special needs.

They also have three biological children in their 30s, and 11 grandchildren.

"It's our village," Leonie said.

"We had influenza go through the place a little while ago and I had to spend a week in hospital with the 15-month-old baby. Everyone pitched in."

The couple, both 56, who are being celebrated by the Department for Child Protection during Foster and Kinship Carer Week – running from 8 to 14 September – moved to the Riverland 11 years ago.

They were living in Andrews Farm and travelling to a holiday home every weekend before they finally decided to buy the block near Blanchetown, which now has a nine-bedroom home.

Malcolm, who Leonie describes as a rock, still commutes to Adelaide every day to operate his construction business.

"A lot of our kids were struggling in town, so we decided to make a lifestyle change," Leonie said.

"We've never looked back."

The couple has had seven children and young people under long-term guardianship, including three who are now adults and who have since moved out. One of those adults, a 24-year-old woman who needs lifetime care, now lives with Leonie's daughter, Monique.

In the home, ages range from the 15 month old, to 17-year-old twins.

The couple, supported by provider ac.care, became carers in their early 30s and around the same time Leonie suffered her second bout of breast cancer.

"I was worried the cancer would end my caring journey," she said.

"But I took my babies with me when I had chemo. It kept me going.

"We've been very clear why we do it – we just wanted to make a difference.

"You can't paint it with roses; it's been a challenge.

"I was never going to be a doctor, I was never going to be a dentist, but I've always loved children."

Department for Child Protection chief executive Jackie Bray said Leonie and Malcolm were among the state's most incredible carers.

"Leonie and Malcolm have given up so much of their lives to care for vulnerable children," she said. "Their little village of love in the Riverland is just so inspirational.

"Foster and Kinship Carer Week is a wonderful opportunity for all of us to celebrate people like the Leonie and Malcolm, and to remind those who are considering becoming a carer just what the rewards can be."

ac.care Out Of Home Care lead practitioner Shalini McCarthy said the country agency was fortunate to work alongside an incredible network of foster carers who support children and young people to shine every day.

"These amazing people from all walks of life provide the safety, care and support to vulnerable babies, children and young people when they need it most," she said.

"Their care is transforming the lives of young people and we hope their commitment inspires more country people to start their own journey to becoming a foster carer.

"Long-term foster carers are vital, but there are varying levels of time and commitment you can provide to support a child or young person, including respite for weekends, through to emergency, short-term or long-term care."

Leonie's reward is supporting the varied needs of the children she cares for, most of who battle health issues.

She urges others to consider caring, pointing out there are so many children who need support.

But she argues you don't have to be Wonder Woman or Superman.


"At the end of the day anybody can do this," she said. "All you need is a room, love to give and time. You need plenty of time."

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The following is the first in a series of columns looking at the international travel experiences of Riverlanders, with Berri man TOM TRIFONOFF discussing his recent trip to Gallipoli...

Destination: Gallipoli

GALLIPOLI is a place that is special to many Australians. It was the first time Australian soldiers had fought as a nation and under the Australian flag. The ensuing battle, while a military disaster for the British, created and enhanced the reputation of the ANZACS as brave and gallant fighting soldiers under horrific and desperate conditions.

My wife and I were fortunate to visit Gallipoli on our recent overseas trip. It was a very emotional and powerful visit as we paid our respects to the bravery and comradeship of all the soldiers who fought there, especially at Anzac Cove, where the troops landed on 25 April 1915.


Our visit was part of a two-day guided tour, which also included a tour of the ancient city of Troy. Our tour was also mostly made up of Australian, plus a few New Zealand tourists. You could tell whether young or old, Gallipoli means a lot to our two nations.

The best way to visit Gallipoli is with a guided tour, given by a knowledgeable tour guide who covers all the aspects of the battles and explains all the famous sites, memorials

and monuments, and their significance to WWI. Our highlights included the 1934 memorial, featuring the very powerful words from then president of Turkey, Mustafa Kemal Ataturk, who nearly 20 years earlier had fought to repel the invading soldiers, and in 1924 became the first president of the newly created Republic of Turkey. Reading these heartfelt words from a man who was there in 1915 and then became a legendary and inspiring leader of his country, all the while respecting the enemy, was a very emotional moment.

Other highlights included visiting the grave of arguably Australia's most famous and well-known soldier of the Gallipoli campaign, John Simpson Kirkpatrick, or as he was known, 'The man with the donkey'. He was killed in action, while returning wounded soldiers back to base on his donkey, on 19 May 1915, at the age of 22.

There was a visit to Anzac Cove, the Anzac Commemorative site where the Dawn Service is held every 25 April, the Battle of Lone Pine Memorial, as well as Turkish memorials and a

visit to trench sites which showed that, at times, the frontline trenches were only metres away from the enemy. The Respect to Mehmetçik Monument is another powerful image of

Gallipoli. It is a sculpture of a Turkish soldier carrying an Australian officer. The sculpture is based on an event in the Gallipoli campaign of WWI in which an Ottoman soldier, after

raising a white flag, carried a wounded Australian officer to Australian lines and returned to his lines before fighting resumed.

Our guide was very pleasant and explained very clearly each site that we visited. We all learned something from him.

Our trip included pick-up from our hotel in Istanbul, a comfortable coach ride to stop-off points, overnight hotel accommodation in Cannakele, breakfast and lunch on the first day and the return coach trip to our hotel in Istanbul. Ours was a two-day tour, starting early at 6am on the first day, and concluding at around 9pm on the second day. Some travellers may wish to do just the Gallipoli visit, or they can book larger

tours which include Troy and Helles. There are a number of tour options available and I would recommend that you book all the tours in Australia, and keep a record of everything that is booked.

Other people may wish to hire a car and do the visit by themselves, but you need to plan where these sites/memorials are exactly and be organised, so that you are not searching for them when you are there.

Our Gallipoli tour was very memorable and it was one of the highlights of our recent overseas trip. If you visit Turkey, then a trip to Gallipoli is a must and should be on your bucket list.

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Tree nut industry ready for growing appetite

NEW Almond and macadamia orchards, including those located in the Riverland, are set to reach maturity in the near future, opening opportunities to growing international demand according to new industry research.

The recent Rabobank report 'Australian Tree Nut Outlook – Opportunities and risks in almonds and macadamias' outlines innovative product offerings, aimed to increase demand locally and in export markets such as China.

Australian almond exports have increased at a steady rate, faster than the global average, compounding an annual growth rate (CAGR) of nine per cent over the past decade, if compared with global exports currently sitting at five per cent.

Still, Australia accounts for only 9.5 per cent of global almond exports, with an estimated 110,000 metric tons exported in 2023.

Macadamias represented 172,000 metric tons in 2023 accounting for 25 per cent of total global trade.

"Positive consumption trends in tree nuts and more broadly in snacking will drive Chinese consumption growth over the next decade," said RaboResearch analyst Pia Piggott.

"As China and India, another major tree nut market, have limited domestic production, we expect further growth in imports will be required to meet demand, which Australia's growing production is well placed to provide," she said.

Other key export destinations that drive demand include Vietnam, Spain and Turkey. Within the report, China has been outlined as the most critical market for Australian almond and macadamia exports, with over half (54 per cent) of Australia's exports, sent to China during 2023.

"China is a key market for Australian almonds," Ms Piggott said. "An indefinite tariff on US almonds going into China makes Australian origin almonds less expensive than California almonds, which supports preference for the Australian product and a price premium."

"Low per-capita supply, rising health awareness, the rise of discounted snack stores and recovery in Chinese consumption support continued growth to China as the largest market for Australian almonds and macadamias."

Ms Piggott said "domestic demand has been limited, even with health and convenience trends growing in recent years.

"We see this as an opportunity to grow local demand, due to innovative offerings of tree nut products are presently limited in the domestic market," Ms Piggott said.


"The domestic market consumes 19 per cent of almond supply and 22 per cent of macadamia supply.

"Australia has the highest per capita consumption rate of macadamias in the world at 0.15kg/year, however, as a premium-priced tree nut, household penetration is low, with only 14 per cent of households purchasing macadamias per year.

"Australia also has high almond per-capita consumption, at 0.95kg/year in 2023 but only 39 per cent of households purchase almonds, because Australian consumers often see tree nuts as a snack," Ms Piggott said.

2023 saw prices of almonds and macadamia fall to an unsustainable level and although the operating environment remains difficult, prices partially recovered in 2024.

"Macadamia prices should recover to more sustainable levels,

however there is downside risk as global supplies are increasing rapidly," Ms Piggott said.

Permanent plantings in the Murray-Darling Basin – a key almond-producing region – are at risk of water shortfalls in periods of drought, although almonds are likely to remain the highest-value "use case" for water.

"As current almond and macadamia orchards in Australia

mature over the next few years, she said, further orchard development opportunities exist, but production growth will be restricted by resource availability and rising global competition," Ms Piggott said.

The Rabobank report says, industry forecasts Australian almond production to grow at four per cent, reaching 210,000 metric tonnes equivalent by 2030.

Funding initiative promoting more bee-friendly trees in the Riverland

RIVERLAND growers are encouraged to apply for a grant funding aimed to benefit farmers, bees and the environment.

Bee Friendly Farming's Tree Grants have opened up another round of grants of up to \$10,000 for growers and land managers to plant pollinator-friendly trees native to their farms.

Bee Friendly Farming will also provide land managers and farmers with a one-dollar incentive for every tree planted.

When Bee Foundation CEO Fiona Chambers said the the Tree Grants support pollinators while also benefiting farmers.

"The Bee Friendly Farming Tree Grants program is a great opportunity to give landholders an extra incentive to expand their tree planting and provide habitat and diverse floral resources to support pollinators," Ms Chambers said.

"The grants are one way the Bee Friendly Farming program supports and empowers landholders to manage their land in a way that both supports pollinators and enhances yields from crops."

Farms must be certified with Bee Friendly Farming to receive one of the Tree Grants,

which start at \$1000, and they are aimed to cover certification costs, being a good alternative for the environment and a good business investment.

Being the third year of the Tree Grants, at the moment 33 Bee Friendly Farming Certified landholders have been approved for grants, totalling more than \$81,000.

"The grant program has far exceeded our expectations in terms of area of certified land, coverage across Australia and the range of farmer enterprises signing up to be certified," Ms Chambers said.


"To date the grant funding is helping establish 92ha of pollinator habitat and that number continues to grow."

The program is also supporting reforestation projects across the planet.

Last year, the organisation planted more than 51 million trees across 400 projects in 72 countries.

Every project is managed with local communities to accomplish different objectives such as forest fire recovery and wildlife habitat expansion.

Its tax time, not scam time

SAPOL have issued a warning for all local residents to stay alert for unusual messages used to impersonate the Australian Tax Office (ATO) through emails, phone calls, text messages or social media.

During tax time, scammers are sending fraudulent myGov login links which redirect people to fake ATO or myGov websites that may look real, but are used to steal personal information and hack bank accounts.

Police say these links are often paired with unusual or misleading phrases designed specifically to trick people.

The ATO observed that some of those phrases include:

- ❑ "You are due to receive an ATO direct refund".
- ❑ "You have a new message in your myGov inbox - click here to view".
- ❑ "You need to update your details to allow your tax return to be processed".
- ❑ "We need to verify your incoming tax deposit".
- ❑ "ATO refund failed due to incorrect BSB/account number".

❑ "Your income statement is ready, click on the link to view".

The ATO has released a list of tips to help avoid this scam:

- ❑ Don't click on links within emails or text messages. The ATO will never send links within a text message, email or social media message.
- ❑ Always log directly into your myGov account to view correspondence.
- ❑ Don't trust caller ID or the 'sender' of an email, as scammers can manipulate these.
- ❑ Never provide personal information or bank details via SMS, social media or email.
- ❑ If you're unsure, contact the ATO on 1800 008 540, or go to the ATO's verify or report a scam webpage, to see how to spot and report a scam.

Gardening unites locals in flood recovery effort

A GARDENING initiative co-ordinated from Blanchetown is helping flood-impacted communities along the River Murray rebuild and heal.

The 2022-2023 flood devastated the Blanchetown Community Garden, and many gardens and properties in the Riverland and Murraylands.

River Murray Flood Recovery wellbeing officer Shelley Rose, who is based with Mid Murray Council, said work towards rebuilding the community garden began in spring last year.

Ms Rose is responsible for assisting all towns impacted by the flood along SA's River Murray.

"Most of the volunteers involved with the garden at Blanchetown were also personally affected in their own homes," she said.

Ms Rose said the community garden has become a meeting place for many locals impacted by the flood.

She said people from River Murray communities unaffected by the flood also wanted to contribute to the recovery effort by helping restore damaged gardens.

Ms Rose said the first focus was to rebuild the Blanchetown Community Garden.

"It looked like a war zone and all the infrastructure had been washed away and the shed had been destroyed," she said.

"All the plants and everything had gone and there was really nothing left."

Ms Rose said Mid Murray Council assisted the community in obtaining a \$10,000 grant from the Commonwealth and State of South Australia, under the Disaster Recovery

Funding Arrangements, to rebuild the community garden.

The money was used to purchase a new shed and wicking beds to grow vegetables to share in the community.

Mid Murray Council also donated some materials to use in the garden, and also contributed in-kind support.

Ms Rose said garden recovery workshops run by environmental educator, horticultural consultant and ABC Gardening Australia television presenter, Sophie Thomson, also encouraged the community to band together to rebuild the gardens of those impacted by the flood.

Ms Thomson's sessions taught residents techniques on how to rebuild the soil in the gardens that were engulfed with water.

Ms Rose said the flood suffocates the soil and destroys its nutrients, and Ms Thomson's guidance on repairing affected areas was invaluable.

She said once the community garden starting being re-established, a plant exchange was set up.

Ms Rose said nurseries across SA donated plants, seedlings, fruit trees, natives, and soil to help flood-affected residents rebuild their own gardens.

She said fruit trees were donated by Balhannah Nurseries, Living Colour supplied punnets of edibles, Neutrog provided organic products for the soil to rejuvenate and Wagner's Rose Nursery donated hundreds of roses.

Ms Rose said since the conception of the community garden, \$12,000 worth of roses and \$30,000 worth of fruit trees have been distributed.

Some memories of the Loveday Internment Camp

JOHN BEECH

AS we approach the 80th anniversary of the winding up of the Loveday Internment Camp complex, I reflect on some of my memories of that early post-World War II time.

In particular, when our family moved into temporary housing, located in the recently vacated group headquarters complex.

This property was located about 2km from where our new home was being built – on our recently allocated 32-acre war service property.

Unlike the other three camps in the complex, where security fencing was required to confine the internees, the group headquarters – as the administration centre, run and staffed by army personnel – had its boundaries defined by a line of bamboos (even today residual bamboo plants remain).

It was in early 1948 when the family packed ourselves and our worldly possessions into our trusty Hupmobile Buckboard (although through lack of room I followed behind on pushbike) and left our home on Tonkin Road, east of Barmera, to make the 8km trip our temporary home at group HQ.

As we approached the camp area, off the main road (now Thiele Road), we entered the long bamboo-lined avenue, leading to our temporary residence.

Like the majority of camp buildings, this building was constructed of timber and iron.

As most goods and materials were scarce during and after the war, it was necessary that everything was basic – and local resources used as much as possible.

Bamboos saved fencing materials and were also used extensively as wind breaks in camp areas.

The many gardens put in place to soften the camp atmosphere were bordered with local limestones and sometimes empty, inverted pickaxe beer bottles.

Brush fences were constructed in the camp as features and doubled as wind breaks for the gardens.

As we settled into our new surroundings, the camp areas became our playground, and we were able to observe the removal of the remaining buildings.

Sometimes the contractors brought family with them and we enjoyed the extra company.

By the time we settled into the camp, the old camp recreation hall had been acquired by the Loveday community and was already the venue for town and school functions.

A weekly feature at the hall was a Friday night old-style dance, which we were able to attend under supervision.

Unfortunately, over the years the hall has been neglected, along with the camp area.

In conclusion, in the scheme of things, we are not a poor area and now, as a growing tourist area, we should be reinvigorating this unique asset as a memorial to those who served, and the war served families who laid the area's foundations (and later helped reinvigorate the Loveday area).

Ed: Berri Regional Secondary College teacher Trent Dolling and students yesterday teamed up John Beech, who provided 'tips to propagate original bamboo stock' at the Barmera RSL sub-branch. The stock planted will be taken back to the school's shadehouse for development. The pots, rooting powders, soil nutrients and potting mix were donated by Beech Hardware Barmera.



BLACK Silk & Sympathy is an historical novel that explores Victorian funeral customs and life in Australia in the late 1800s.

The story commences in London with Tatiana Caldwell losing both parents within a short time of each other. Devastated and in dire poverty, she emigrates to Sydney to make a fresh start. She stays at the Sydney Female Immigration Depot waiting for someone to employ her. After three weeks she starts to worry that nobody wants an educated woman, but local undertaker, Titus Crowe, can see the benefits of hiring a woman as his assistant.

Tatiana, keen to build a business of her own one day, works hard and learns the business of undertaking. She learns how to lay out the body, dress the deceased and prepare for the vigil. She travels by mortuary train with the deceased and their family and friends to the cemetery to ensure all goes well for the burials.

As she accompanies Mr Crowe to the home of the deceased on more

occasions, she discovers he is more interested in taking advantage of people during the loss of a loved one than offering compassion and support. She is appalled his main concern is about making money. She soon learns to speak her mind to ensure customers don't pay for services that they cannot afford.

Titus sees the benefits of Tatiana's influence and asks her to marry him. It's a mismatched proposal but Tatiana is ambitious and sees this as an opportunity to reach her goal.

Titus soon dies and Tatiana inherits the business to become Sydney's first female undertaker.

I found the account of Victorian funeral customs to be both captivating and informative. This combined with some mystery made for an enjoyable read.

Black Silk & Sympathy is the first novel in a new historical trilogy.



Rovers head to sixth straight decider

SURVIVING a scare throughout the match at times, Renmark is through to a sixth-straight RFL A grade grand final, defeating arch-rival Waikerie by 17 points in the preliminary final at Renmark Oval on Saturday afternoon.

The match was the fourth time Renmark emerged victorious against Waikerie this season, but this one meant a little more to the Rovers.

Just one point separated the sides at quarter time, before the Magpies booted the first of the second term through Kade Hilton's magnificent solo effort, putting Waikerie in the lead at the midway point of the second term.

However, Renmark capitalised on a lack of concen-

tration from the Waikerie backline, as Nick Gillard put the Rovers ahead by three points in windy conditions at the major break.

Renmark playing coach Josh Vater said the message to the group at half time was about understanding the game situation.

"We spoke about how the game was unlikely to be broken open at any stage, for a few reasons," he said.

"It's a preliminary final and no team is rolling over, and both teams are good enough to be there, so you can't expect it to blow open at any stage.

"Further to that, when you do have the momentum you can't expect it's always going to go your way, so you have to ride the ins and outs.

"On top of that, the wind was really challenging and

we certainly felt at times that we had a lot of play in our front half, but found it difficult to get good, effective shots on goal.

"That can be a mental challenge because you can feel like you have the momentum, and if you haven't made the most of your opportunities when the momentum does swing, it can get you down, so I thought our players responded really well in the second half."

Gillard turned it up a gear in the third quarter, ultimately proving to be the difference in the game with two goals in quick succession as the Rovers moved to an 18-point three quarter time advantage, keeping Waikerie scoreless in the process.

Vater said Renmark is "fortunate" to have Gillard

in the side, with the former junior returning to the club this year having spent time with both Central Districts and Walkerville.

"Having him and his family around the club more is fantastic, and he's been really valuable with the x-factor he has about him," he said.

"He can certainly turn it on and that gets the boys up and about, so we love having him in the side.

"The three quarter time message was around work rate and making sure we left no stone unturned, and walking off the field with no regrets.

"We wanted to outwork them both offensively and defensively to make sure we do limit their opportunities, because they're going to have opportunities.

Gillard finished the after-

noon with three majors, while young gun Declan Johnson's two-goal effort was also crucial to the Rovers.

Vater himself amassed possession of the ball with ease across the day's entirety, while young guns Bailey and Lucas White also provided Waikerie headaches.

Waikerie came into the preliminary full of confidence after its elimination final win over Loxton the previous Sunday, and Vater said he knew curbing the influence of star Magpies would be crucial.

"There were a few things we noted from their game, particularly around key players who can take the game away from you, and they don't need too many opportunities," he said.

"We were conscious of

those players, but it was about worrying what we could control and not being too focused on the negative of just looking at Waikerie."

Tristan Geehman fought hard for Mick Kilsby's side across half back, while Byron Sumner and Jake Spencely gave everything they had across the afternoon.

While it is an improvement on 2023 for the Magpies, it will now be a case of looking forward to 2025 following another missed premiership opportunity.

Renmark's attention now turns to Panther Park this Saturday afternoon in the 2024 decider, with Barmera-Monash standing in the way of the Rovers returning to the top of the RFL mountain.



Renmark VS Barmera-Monash

A RIVERLAND Football League season blessed with a plethora of twists and turns will come to an end on Saturday afternoon at Panther Park, with the winner set to etch its name in the league's rich history.

Saturday afternoon's RFL A grade grand final will see a rematch of the 2023 decider, where Barmera-Monash broke an 11-year

premiership drought, taking on Renmark in a contest set to excite footy fans.

The fan battle sees the Rovers pack face off against the Roo crew, but only one side's supporters will be celebrating when the final siren sounds.

The history

When you think of these two

outfits in a grand final it's hard to avoid immediately thinking back to last year's decider.

Coming in as heavy underdogs, Barmera-Monash played Fraser Sampson's game style to perfection, winning a low-scoring encounter by nine points.

Although that grand final result is particularly recent, both line-ups changed a lot throughout the off-season, and a different fixture can be expected this time around.

"Certainly, we take confidence out of last year, as well as our performances this year against Renmark," Sampson said.

Renmark playing coach Josh Vater understands that some of the Renmark playing group will be wrestling with the emotions of falling at the final hurdle last year.

"I assume every player probably has a fair bit burning deep down around the disappointment of last year," he said.

"But at the same time, the highest motivating factor is the chance we've got to win a grand final and that's what we've given ourselves.

"The balance of having players that are really experienced and can steady the group and know what to expect, combined with having young players who haven't played in a grand final's energy, is something which can help us.

"At the end of the day, once the siren goes it's another game and everyone has to go out and have their moment and be able to deliver when they need to."

The Rovers are no stranger to the decider, preparing to play off in a sixth-straight grand final, winning on three occasions – 2019, 2021, and 2022.

Vater is a three-time premiership coach, but intriguingly, Roos boss Fraser Sampson was a Rovers premiership player in each of those wins.

The Roos and Rovers are begin-

ning to develop a stunning modern-day rivalry, and it grew over the off-season with key pillars Tom, Jack, and Dain Austin all crossing to link up with Sampson, and play a key role for Barmera-Monash.

Conversely, Barmera-Monash's 2023 triumph broke an 11-year premiership drought at the time, and the Roo crew certainly don't appear to be content with one victory to their name from this somewhat of a golden generation.

The form

Both sides will enter this weekend's contest full of confidence, after an impressive final stretch of the home and away season, plus a relatively successful finals campaign thus far.

After a slight hiccup after the midway point of the season, Barmera-Monash burst back into form, emerging victorious in the final three games of the home and away campaign, before squeezing past Renmark in the second semi-final to earn a place in the big dance.

Similarly, the Rovers played a brilliant past two months of football, dropping just two of their last five fixtures, both of which have come against Barmera-Monash.

Across the five matches we've seen of these two sides this year, Barmera-Monash certainly has the

upper hand, winning four of the fixtures.

However, two games have come down to margins of six and three points, showcasing there is little separating the sides.

"Most of the times we've played them lately it's been around whether we can execute," Vater said.

"When we've had our opportunities we just haven't been able to effectively make the most of them when we've needed."

That being said, the reigning premiership coach knows what his side will need to do to lift the premiership cup for the second straight year.

"Any finals experience, and Grand Final experience in particular, is helpful. However, we know that Renmark have probably more finals experience within their side," Sampson said.

"We always put a fair bit of work into the opposition. Quite often if we are able to stop the opposition then it helps us to get the game on our terms."

The personnel

Cruelly, injuries are unfortunately part of the game, and there will be some hard luck stories missing this weekend, as seems to be the case with every year.

Renmark will be without big man Alex Haynes who has flourished this year as a genuine key forward, but picked up an injury in round 15 against the Tigers.

Last weekend saw the Rovers welcome back small forward Liam Jackson and ruckman Zach Gartery, but Nathan Zunic is still out of the team, hoping to prove his fitness this week.

"Everyone pulled up well from the preliminary final, and there's no major concerns apart from general soreness," Vater said.

"We should go in cherry ripe otherwise and Nathan will train this week and give himself the best opportunity."

Barmera-Monash should enter the match with a relatively clean bill of health, with the week off already under its belt, helping small forward Matt Wutke make an expected return to the team.

"We have a really healthy squad, which makes selection really tricky this week," Sampson said.

"There are no forced changes,

but certainly a few guys are available that we will consider."

The match-up

Unlike previous years, and as recently as last year, both Barmera-Monash and Renmark have looked to open up the field, generating scoring opportunities.

While team defence is a clear focus for all to see, each team houses one of the top-two leading goalkickers in the competition, both of which are recruits this season.

Renmark had the best overall percentage in the competition's home and away season this year, recording 1302 points for - 206 points better than the next best.

While Barmera-Monash scored the third-highest amount of points, its percentage of 61.77 was brought about having conceded just 669 points.

Despite having only been victorious on one of five occasions this year, Vater believes his side has the ingredients for success.

"We're really conscious they have some quality players we need to be mindful of, and they like to play quite defensive and get numbers behind the ball," he said.

"That being said, when we get in front of goal, we need to make the most of our opportunities, which we haven't been effectively able to do so far."

Sampson said his side will continue preparations as normal this week, which will include zoning in on Renmark's weapons.

"We always put a fair bit of work into the opposition," he said.

"Quite often if we are able to stop the opposition then it helps us to get the game on our terms."

Attention will turn to the middle of the ground very quickly, and the first centre bounce, where Zach Gartery will be up against Mason Middleton, and whoever can give their midfielders first use will go a long way to winning.

Sam Butterworth has produced what is arguably a career-best season, and works well at the contest with Jake Smith and Ben Drogemuller, helping feed the ball out wide to the likes of Paul Spilios and Jameson Whitbourne.

The key cogs in the Renmark midfield are the ever-consistent Woolford trio of Matt, Tim, and

Dan, while Vater and Bailey White will also have an influence.

The final word

In an incredible feat, Barmera-Monash will have five grades represented on grand final day, with the under 13s, 15s, 18s, Bs and A grade all finding their way to the decider.

As the A grade coach, Sampson said he has ramped up his work with the juniors this year, while Sam Butterworth's day will begin in the morning as he hopes to lead his under 15s side to glory.

"It's obviously a huge achievement by the club to have five grades playing in the grand final," Sampson said.

"Mike Allder, Mark Henwood and the rest of the board have done a great job getting the club into this position.

"I am starting to get to know the under 13s and under 15s more this year, but I don't get too involved because they have some great coaches to learn from."

Renmark's under 15s is also through to the grand final, and Vater said it's something which he's proud of.

"It's nice to see an even spread

across the whole club of success, and it's nice to see a big spread of teams competing in the finals series," he said.

"You don't want to see any teams competing without any success, but for our club it's a proud moment to have good people in coaching roles developing the kids.

"Further to that it's good for them to go on and have some success as a team while playing deep into finals, and hopefully the under 15s can put on a good show."

The A grade grand final begins at 2:40pm, while the under 13s are the first game of the day, beginning at 8:20am.

Hilton's history making moment

WAIKERIE young gun Kade Hilton etched his name in Riverland football folklore on Monday night at the Berri Hotel, taking home the Whillas Medal.

Hilton, aged 20, is the youngest player to win the award since 1979, the third youngest of all time, and the first Magpie to win the prestigious award since teammate Jake Spencely in 2018.

The star Magpie picked up 20 votes on the night, which helped see him squeeze ahead of Renmark's two-time medallist Tim Woolford (17), and Rovers ruckman Zach Gartery (15) in a thrilling count.

The medal looked to be heading the way of Woolford, but a stunning second half of the season saw Hilton make his move in the latter part.

Hilton did the bulk of his work between rounds nine to 14, amassing 12 votes across the six-round period.

"I would like to thank the Waikerie Football Club, and all of my teammates who got around me throughout the year," Hilton said after claiming the medal.

"Coming back from West Adelaide this year, I enjoyed being out there so much and

playing each week."

Hilton thanked current RFL Interleague coach and former Waikerie boss Damian Stevens during his speech, who he said has had a big influence on his career thus far.

"(Stevo) as a boss has taught me a lot about football and I couldn't thank him enough for what he's done for me," Hilton said.

"At Waikerie I've got the opportunity to play midfield which is great, particularly coming from playing a lot up forward with West Adelaide.

"I enjoy playing in the midfield because it brings new opportunities, and helps me be at my best each week."

Stevens, who won a Whillas Medal in 2010 with the Magpies is Hilton's boss, and said Hilton is a very coachable player.

"Kade makes it really easy because he's such a hard worker and is really driven to always get the best out of himself," Stevens said.

"He won't rest on last night's result and think it's career made, he'll keep looking to improve different aspects of his game, so as far as coaching goes it's a bit of a coaches dream when you

have players who are always looking to strive to improve and get better.

"We talk a lot, but I tend to let his coaches do most of the talking, but if I've watched the game I'll talk about things he might want another set of eyes on or another voice about.

"While I'm not in any coaching roles at Waikerie I try not to interfere too much, and if anything, it's just an old midfielder talking with a new one."

The Magpies on-baller is one of the flashiest players in the competition, and his burst at stoppage and goal sense is what sets him apart from the rest.

"I don't really think about it too much when I'm at a stoppage, it's just a case of see ball get ball from the outset," he said.

"You wouldn't think it because I've got a skinny build, but I'm a quick runner so if the ball is bouncing my way I can back myself in."

Stevens said Hilton's fitness was one of the major reasons he earned selection in the RFL Interleague side in June, as well as the Eastern Zone squad, which Stevens was an assistant coach for.

"He really improved on his team first skills. That

might be handballing it off to put other players in a good position exiting stoppages which is really important," he said.

"To have a guy that can run and carry the footy, hit up forwards in space and then go inside and win his fair share of footy, and then go forward gives him a point of difference.

"As a midfielder you want to be someone who can play in multiple roles and be effective, and he definitely does that.

"Right from the first game he played for the Eastern Zone side he made a few important plays, and then played some really consistent footy, so he definitely was not out of place in that at all."

Barmera-Monash veteran defender Justin Bonney finished in equal fourth place with 13 votes alongside 2023's winner Dan Woolford.

Panthers skipper Codi Voumard rounded out the top five with 12 votes ahead of teammate Zac Wooldridge on 11, while trio Jarrad Bee, Mason Middleton and Josh Vater each amassed 10 votes, claiming finishes inside the top 10 in the process.

Meanwhile, Barmera-

The star forward's 42-goal season helped him poll 31 votes overall, finishing three votes ahead of second-place Loxton playing coach Luke Harder.







Coach aiming to topple former club in MVFL decider

The Blues beat Sedan-Cambrai 31-30 when the teams met in the second semi-final.

Hilton, aged 20, is the youngest player to win the award since 1979, the third youngest of all time, and the first Magpie to win the prestigious award since teammate Jake Spencely in 2018.

The star Magpie picked up 20 votes on the night, which helped see him squeeze ahead of Renmark's two-time medallist Tim Woolford (17), and Rovers ruckman Zach Gartery (15) in a thrilling count.

The medal looked to be heading the way of Woolford, but a stunning second half of the season saw Hilton make his move in the latter part.

Hilton did the bulk of his work between rounds nine to 14, amassing 12 votes across the six-round period.

"It's a massive honour to be accepting this, and it's something I didn't expect," he said.

"I would like to thank the Waikerie Football Club, and all of my teammates who got around me throughout the year," Hilton said after claiming the medal.

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

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

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


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Field Days Safari reaching new heights in 2024
