# Berri local

Adelaide, have both lost their lives following two major car accidents occurring within 30 minutes last week, with an involved driver set to appear in court.

Police were called to Ral Ral Avenue, in Renmark, just after 5pm on Thursday, May 18, after reports a Yamaha motorbike had crashed into a

The rider, 47-year-old Bradley Pryse, from Berri, died at the scene, while the driver of the HiLux was uninjured.

Ral Ral Avenue was closed for several hours following the accident.

a crash on the Sturt Highway near Paisley Road, outside of Blanchetown, involving three cars and a truck, just after 5.30pm on the same day.

The driver of a Mitsubishi sedan, a 43-year-old man from Somerton Park, died at the scene.

A 26-year-old Swan Reach woman driving a Holden sedan was taken to the Angaston Hospital with minor injuries, and a 27-year-old man from West Croydon driving a Nissan sedan was taken to the Lyell McEwin Hospital with nonlife-threatening injuries.

The truck driver was not

Major crash investigators subsequently arrested the West Croydon man and charged him with causing death by dangerous driving. He was also issued with an instant loss of licence to avoid driving until further order.

It is understood he was bailed and will appear in the Waikerie Magistrates Court on July 3.

The deaths were the 51st and 52nd on South Australian roads so far in 2023, compared to 30 at the same time last year.

# Unemployment rise "not unexpected" to Treasurer

THE state's Treasurer says exports and construction will provide job opportunities for Riverlanders, despite an increase in South Australian unemployment numbers.

April figures revealed South Australia's unemployment rate was the nation's highest at 4.3 per

Opposition treasury spokesperson Matt Cowdrey said the figures added to current pressure surrounding rising costs of living.

'Not only is South Australia becoming the most expensive place to live but (also) the hardest place in the country to find a job," Mr Cowdrey said.

"Having the highest unemployment and inflation rates in the nation is not something to be proud

"It's a huge blow to the state to have an extra 5400 South Australians joining the unemployment queue - especially during a cost of living crisis, where the everyday family is \$17,000 worse off."

Adelaide's current inflation level of 7.9 per cent was also the highest of Australian capital cities.

However, Treasurer Stephen Mullighan expected high demand for construction would support South Australia's workforce.

"There are currently 941,100 South Australians in work," Mr Mullighan said.

"That is the second-highest result on record and 33,000 higher than at the time of the March 2022 state election. Of those 33,000, 20,000 are full time.

"Records were never going to continue to be broken indefinitely. (This) result, while disappointing, is not unexpected as interest rates



Mullighan and inflation begin to bite.

"SA is coming off a very strong base with employment, construction activity, equipment investment, population growth and exports all still at, or near, record highs. There is also a strong pipeline of work, with \$14.7bn of construction work still in the pipeline."

# **Code Blue response** extended to Monday

THE Riverland Code Blue response has been extended, with cold overnight temperatures set to remain this week.

First activated on Tuesday, May 16, the Code Blue will now go until Monday, May 29.


"The decision has been made to extend the Code Blue in the Riverland... due to forecast low temperatures overnight again this week," said Nat Cook, SA Minister for Human Services.

"The biggest risk in extremely cold conditions such as those predicted in coming days, is that people can quickly become unwell or even hypothermic. This can pose a serious risk to health.

These Code Blue responses help people experiencing homelessness who are most affected by extreme winter weather to remain warm and safe.

"I encourage rough sleepers, or anyone who knows a rough sleeper, to call Homeless Connect SA – these services are here to help."

Homeless Connect SA (1800 003 308) operates 24/7 to assist with emergency accommodation for those experiencing, or at risk of, homelessness.

LOCAL residents and community organisations have been urged to participate in the first Christmas pageant to be held in Renmark since 2018.

The Renmark Christmas Celebration Committee Incorporated is now seeking floats to be entered for the planned return of the Renmark Christmas Pageant, on December 1.

Former Renmark Paringa Mayor Neil Martinson - who established the new group – said he had already been approached by locals seeking to join the pageant.

"We're looking for clubs, sporting clubs, schools and service groups that want to promote their own organisation and get involved in the pageant," Mr Martinson said.

"At this stage the pageant will be led by the old fire truck that is currently at Olivewood. They have agreed to allow that truck to come out of hibernation for a little while.

"I have got two or three other floats that people have already rang me about.

"I'm just keen to get as many floats as possible to make it the success that we want it to be."

Renmark Paringa councillors, at a special meeting held earlier this

month, voted to provide in-principle support for the reinstatement of a Renmark Christmas Pageant, although council will avoid managing the event.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said many community members had expressed a desire for a Renmark pageant to return.

"Renmark, Paringa and Lyrup communities are excited to hear of the resurgence of the pageant in 2023," Mr Hunter said.

"This joining together is an important part of the (Christmas) celebrations. Please put the date in your calendar and consider how you or your workplace might be able to support Neil Martinson and his team of volunteers, as they develop and present the 2023 event.

"All of us have memories of pageants growing up, from the bands playing, the colour and spectacle (and) the arrival of Father


"We are honoured to receive this award and to be recognised for our efforts in managing the impacts of the River Murray flood," Mr Pfeiffer said.

# Fix needed for deadly highway

THE Sturt Highway is a vital piece of infrastructure for the economic wellbeing of the Riverland.

It supports the trucking industry that rolls through our towns, the tourism industry that brings money into our local businesses, our agriculture industries that transport innumerable tonnes of produce to the state, nation and the world, plus much

Last Thursday's fatal crash on the Sturt Highway at Paisley, near Blanchetown, marked the third fatal accident, and the fifth death, on the Riverland's most important road so far in 2023.

The highway has now been the scene for about 50 fatalities since 2018 - that is dozens of family members, friends and loved ones who have been lost on the road we all rely on.

Calls for drivers to pay attention to the 'fatal five' and road safety campaigns specifically targeting country drivers are clearly falling short when it comes to curbing major crashes, where the Riverland appears to be seriously overrepresented.

Despite a major investment of more than \$80m by state and federal governments to upgrade the highway from Gawler to the border, including the potential Truro bypass, the extra roundabouts, overtaking lanes and safety barriers scattered along the highway appear to have had little impact so far on reducing fatalities on one of SA's major freight routes.

With trucks only getting bigger, and the amount of freight hauled in, out and through the region growing, the need for a serious rework of the highway will only grow.

While the Sturt Highway has proven a valuable tool for political point-scoring by both major parties while in opposition, the lack of public planning or consultation on a strategy to save the lives of Riverlanders using our roads has proven frustrating for the local community.

There needs to be recognition by government, at both the state and federal level, that the highway does not end at the Barossa Valley.

All three Riverland mayors, plus Barker MP Tony Pasin, are now united behind the idea that full duplication from the end of the dual carriageway at Nuriootpa to Waikerie is required.

Yes, such an investment would be a major expense both financially and time-wise, plus a major inconvenience for commuters while the works are being undertaken.

It seems unlikely that any major projects along the highway are on the way any time soon, especially given the works covered by the \$87.5m investment are still ongoing – or, in the case of the Truro bypass, are yet to commence - and the large amounts of funding for other recent infrastructure projects around the state, including a \$260m project to duplicate sections of the even more deadly Augusta Highway.

But, if the Sturt Highway is to continue as a key part of Australia's heavy vehicle network into the future, there must be a serious commitment to planning how to make it safer for our truck drivers and commuters, and it is clear that plan needs to include duplication.

It remains to be seen how many lives are lost before that need becomes clear.



A reminder of yester-year: The former Institute and School at Bugle Hut, east of Loxton, now sits remotely in a paddock in 2023. While other areas of SA were being opened for farming, settlement of the Northern Mallee, east of the River Murray and north of the Pinnaroo railway, was not happening. In the 1850s to 1860s, the pastoralists had begun running sheep. By the early 1890s the State Government surveyed the region for closer settlement and paved the way for farming pioneers, but they took up little land distant from the Murray. The main reason for this and for the lack of First Nations People there was the lack of water. There were no rivers and some underground water, but, if present, it often was salty. An effective form of transport was also needed. With the coming of a railway branching into the region from 1913 onward, transport became possible and enabled many little townships, often just 8km apart, to grow near these lines. One was Bugle Hut. The Institute was built in 1917, but from the 1950s farmers used bigger equipment, road transport improved, the regional population declined, and the little towns disappeared. # **Unanswered budget** questions

THE National Irrigators' Council (NIC) acknowledges the release of the federal budget, noting it leaves open a number of unanswered questions particularly on food security, the cost of living and water management.

The federal budget listed over \$872m of savings from abandoned water infrastructure projects, while pausing an additional \$19.1m earmarked for Wyangala Dam Wall Raising and the Hughenden Irrigation Scheme.

Water infrastructure is vital to ensure we drought-proof our water and food production systems, as best we can, to make sure we can grow produce to feed and clothe Australia and our trading partners, and keep the taps running for drinking water and hygiene.

Water infrastructure also helps store and deliver water for the environment and keep the rivers flowing in dry times.

Cancelling these projects is short-sighted and risks our future food and water security. The budget notes savings from these projects will be 'redirected to fund other Government priorities'. It's reasonable to ask what priorities could be more impor-

commitment to National Water Grid projects, but is sceptical of the need for \$70.9m to increase resources of the National Water Grid Authority, particularly with its seemingly reduced workload.

That money should instead be funding real projects and delivering real results – not more bureaucrats.

On paper the budget seems to deliver on biosecurity with a \$1bn commitment, but it's farmers who will be slugged with the bill. While importers will pay a little more, it's not enough.

They are the ones creating the risks to our economy and food production, and they should be paying, not farmers.

If buybacks go ahead and farms close, we will be forced to rely on more imports, and who will the Federal Government get to pay then?

Over \$103m has been allocated to the Murray-Darling Basin Review.

NIC welcomes the renewed focus on science and urges the Murray-Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) to ensure it considers the socio-economic science when evaluating the plan, reviewing its impact and preparing for its future.

NIC also encourages MDBA to allocate sufficient resources to communications and genuine consultation.

A total of \$44.9m has been put aside for the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water to provide advice and work with the States and Territories and affected communities.

Another disappointing feature of the Budget is the reduction in the Instant Asset Write Off value to \$20,000.

Not many assets for use on farms can be bought for less than

NIC also remains concerned at the inadequate funding allocated to regional roads, especially after the significant flooding events which left our roads in appalling and dangerous conditions.

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

Give a wave of thanks for a fatality-free future on SA roads NEW research has been

released, amidst climbing road-So far this year, 53 lives have death tolls, detailing attitudes and actions of South Australians been lost on South Australian to help prevent further tragedy on local roads. The Australian Road Safety

Foundation (ARSF) research, released to launch its annual Fatality Free Friday initiative, reported a number of insights, including a rise in road aggression combined with bad behaviour and a decline in common road etiquette.

Fatality Free Friday, held this year on May 26, is one of Australia's largest communitybased road safety campaigns, instilling the belief in road users that going one day without a

death on the road can help create a fatality-free future.

roads, including two in the Riverland last week, compared to 32 at the same time in 2022. Out of the 1016 South Australian adults surveyed,

more than half (51 per cent) reported increased levels of aggression on the roads over the past year, while 57 per cent admit they take risks when using the road.

ARSF chief executive officer and founder, Russell White, said the new research showed "encouraging statistics" of further education and simple chang-

"When confronted with the road toll numbers, 80 per cent of South Australian residents admitted it made them think or act safer, which means keeping the conversation going can and will make a difference," Mr

"The vast majority (83 per cent) of South Australians recognise that it's individual road users who can have the biggest impact, so our job now is to help people understand that it's not just the big choices that have grave consequences."

According to the research, all South Australian road users believed the return of the 'thank you' wave could contribute to improved road safety, while 51 per cent believed the symbolic gesture was on a decline across the country.

Mr White said the ARSF encouraged all South Australian road users to bring back the wave.

"We want all South Australians to put their hand up for road safety, and in doing so, help combat rising aggression, remind other road users that their decisions impact more than just themselves and inspire safer road choices," he said.



# Flood recovery BBC's funding priority

BERRI Barmera Council will deliberate on how to use nearly \$500,000 in Federal Government funding as part of ongoing budget discussions, with urgent post-flood needs to be considered first.

The council has been allocated an additional \$172,905 in part B of the fourth phase of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure

Program (LRCIP), having already been allocated \$299,755 in part A, bringing council's total to \$472,660.

"We are very thankful to the Federal Government for the ongoing assistance council has received in infrastructure funding in programs like the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program," said Ella Winnall, Berri Barmera Mayor.

"It is a proven way to charge

local government with the decision making and delivery responsibility of tending to our priority infrastructure projects."

Ms Winnall said discussions over the allocation of the funding were ongoing.

"The needs of our flood recovery projects are likely to be far in excess of that allocated to us, and council will need to consider the urgent needs first," she said.

Previous LCRIP allocations have funded projects including an upgrade to Berri's Colin Jennings Apex Park and the Barmera Oval multisport changeroom and lighting upgrades, which was joint-funded by the State Government.

The nearby Gerard Reserve Council has received \$161,454 total for phase four of the LRCIP – \$102,392 in part A and \$59,062 in part B.

# State Government's opposition to regional bank service reductions

AN SA government decision to provide a submission to the Federal Parliament's inquiry into bank closures in regional Australia follows the reduction in operating hours for a Riverland ANZ branch.

The submission to the Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport References Committee outlines the concerns of many regional communities who have had bank branches significantly reduce services, or close all together.

From May 1, Waikerie's ANZ branch stopped operating on Friday and is now only open for face-to-face customers on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday, from 9.30am to 12.30pm.

State Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said it was concerning big banks were putting profits before peo-

ple, at the expense of regional communities who often had no alternate or adequate services to offset the loss of local bank branches.

"It is also concerning that neither the State Opposition, nor the SA Greens made submissions to the inquiry about regional banking despite my encouragement to do so," she said.

"Whilst bank closures are commercial decisions taken by private corporations, to make meaningful change, this issue requires a bipartisan approach."

Ms Scriven said the State Government's submission outlined the disproportionate impact closures caused in regional areas, and had on people such as the elderly who relied on face-toface services.

She said some residents in rural areas also had limited connectivity to the internet.

"I will continue to advocate on behalf of regional communities," Ms Scriven said.

She said governments and consumers should voice concerns regarding bank decisions that impact regional communities where closures have occurred.

"It can be argued that banks owe a moral responsibility to their customers to have adequate and alternate services in place, and means for people to do their banking," she said.

Ms Scriven said banks should be meeting the needs of the elderly who were often "longstanding and loyal customers".

She said supporting these older people could take many forms, from improved banking services at Australia Post outlets that were tailored to the needs of the community, to improved connection and digital literacy for elderly people.

"First and foremost, pressure needs be placed on big banks to keep branches open," Ms Scriven said.

# Guaranteed buybacks a 'lazy' approach, says Tim

A SENIOR Riverland MP believes the State Government is taking a "lazy" approach to fulfilling the Murray-Darling Basin Plan, as the Deputy Premier confirms water buybacks are now "all but guaranteed".

The State Government last week opened public submissions to the Productivity Commission's Murray-Darling Basin Plan implementation review, which revealed just 4.5GL of the plan's targeted 450GL had been recovered so far.

Minister for Water, and Deputy Premier, Susan Close said voluntary buybacks were "the most efficient and cost-effective way to return environmental water to the river system".

"The recovery of the full 450GL of additional water for the environment is a priority for the State Government, and there is a long way to go to get there," Dr Close said.

"The inaction from upstream states needs to stop and has all but guaranteed voluntary buybacks as the only viable way we will recover the water we need to keep the system alive through the forecasted drier periods.

"So much of our state's wealth, prosperity and environmental sustainability comes from the river and we must return to more sustainable water use for the future of South Australians."

However, Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said exploring other methods of improving water efficiencies would benefit both the environment and irrigation communities.

"River communities have found efficiencies and they will continue to find efficiencies," Mr Whetstone said.

"The State Government needs to go out there and lobby the Federal Government to achieve more efficiencies, to find ways that we can put more water back into the Commonwealth Environmental Water Holders' kitty so that we do achieve the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

"We have off-farm efficiency programs

that are not being taken up."

Mr Whetstone said sustaining Riverland irrigation was "critically important to the future of our food production".

"The mixed messages are having a really detrimental effect on those river communities," he said.

"The basin plan... is far from finished, yet we have a government that continue to play the blame game (for why) we are not achieving it.

"I have already said this government is taking the lazy Susan approach. That is, blaming everybody else bar itself."

It is understood meetings will also be held in Murray-Darling Basin communities to enable direct input into the review.



survive winter in the SA Riverland - they will hide away in the cold weather and emerge to feed if the weather warms up," Mr Size said.

"This presents an opportunity on warmer winter days to kill the fruit flies with bait and traps.

"If you are a grower with and without fruit in season during winter, please support fruit fly eradication by applying bait or deploying traps on your property."

The current end date for all outbreaks is December 22, 2023, however this may change if further fruit flies are detected.

# Woodleigh project one step closer

LOXTON'S childcare capabilities will double in the future after a relocation project was given council support last week.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie (DCLW) agreed to support the Loxton District Children's Centre 'Woodleigh's' proposal to relocate to the former NRM site on Kokoda Terrace.

Woodleigh director April Watson said she was "super excited" to see the project reach its next stage.

"We look forward to being the service of choice for both families and staff," she said.

"It will give an additional 70 spaces.
"Our focus is for the community and to make it an inclusive centre."

Mrs Watson hoped to see the project go to tender at the start of 2024 and be completed by the end of 2025.

Woodleigh chairperson Donna Manuel said the project was "long overdue".

"We are now in position to rebuild and we weren't five years ago, even though it was a

wish," she said.

"We now have a lot of room for expansion and there's future plans for older children as well."

The land surrounding and adjacent to the former NRM building is crown land, under the care and management of council.

At last week's meeting, council agreed to support the relocation subject to State Government support and planning approval.

Council also agreed to support the provision of a grant writer to compile the application for funding.

In addition, council will also consider a loan through the Local Government Finance Authority with Woodleigh responsible for the repayments if required.

If successful in its funding application to build a new centre, council will also offer the former NRM Building for use as after-hours care.

DCLW Mayor Trevor Norton said the proposed development was an "exciting opportunity" for Loxton and the surrounding district.

"It will greatly increase their capacity to continue to provide excellent childcare and early education," he said.

"It will have positive impacts on the local economy during the build and for the community ongoing."

The current Woodleigh site on Tobruk Terrace has specifications of 1657sq m and parking area 1799sq m, while the NRM site


on the corner of Kokoda Terrace and Coral Street is potentially 10,000 to 15,000sq m.

"The proposed greenfield site meets required expansion now, with plenty of room for future growth," Mr Norton said.

"Off-street access on a quiet street rather than a main road will solve many current safety concerns for parents, carers, and staff"

Meanwhile, DCLW CEO David Beaton said the move from the busy Tobruk Terrace, which joins onto the Brown's Well Highway, was a major advantage.

"They can plan the flow of the traffic and put the building in the best possible place to allow for the flow of traffic," he added.

# RPC's 'urgent' approach to riverfront flood recovery

A RIVERLAND council was forced to act with "urgency" in order to successfully conduct flood recovery works on a local riverfront.

Documents last week taken out of confidence by Renmark Paringa Council revealed councillors, at a special meeting held on February 28, passed a motion to allocate \$82,000 toward recovery of the Taylor Riverfront Precinct from effects of the River Murray flood.

Councillors also endorsed the waiving of some requirements identified within council's procurement policy, and to engage Adelaide-based LCS Landscapes to undertake the project.

While council's regular procurement policy requires a tender to be issued for works valued above \$50,000, LCS Landscapes the principal contractor for the initial redesign of the riverfront – was the only supplier approached as other landscaping contractors were unavailable, and the company's ability to complete the works "in a reasonable timeframe and to the high standard expected".

Then Renmark Paringa acting director infrastructure and environmental services Tarik Wolf said rehabilitation of the space

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had been a priority for council.

'The response to the flood event is currently not budgeted for within the current Annual Renmark Paringa Business Plan, therefore staff are presenting

this report for council's endorsement to allocate these funds and proceed with the remediation," Mr Wolf said in a council

# **Praise for Murray** crayfish release

A LOCAL fishing enthusiast and volunteer native fish researcher has commended the ongoing work of those involved in the reintroduction of hundreds of Murray crayfish back into the River Murray.

Renmark man Peter Teakle was present for the release – led by North-West Aquaculture, Nature Glenelg Trust and Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board - last week and said it was "great to be part and contribute to the process"

"(The team) worked on it for quite a few years and it's finally come to fruition, which is great, and rather fitting that the release took place following the recent interesting yabby and Murray cray community information evening at Renmark," he said.

"It was interesting to see these creatures in the flesh (shell) as I've only seen pictures

"We've got experts on-hand now, and these scientists know what they're talking

about. Through years of much tedious and strategic hard work, they managed to get all the essential permits and approvals through various government departments for the project to go ahead. It's a credit to them.

"Scientific research basin-wide is ongoing with all native fish species. We have good scientists and I've always said that research

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and science never sleep."

Through the project, supported by the River Murray and Mallee Aboriginal Corporation's (RMMAC) River Ranger team, a number of Murray crayfish will be monitored using tracking devices.

Mr Teakle said he was looking forward to keeping up with the reintroduction progress.

We're not going to see an instant result for quite some time as they are slow growing and take a long time to breed up," he said.

"Where we've put them, the location will be regularly monitored to see how they survive and hopefully repopulate to a number where in the future we can catch one.

"So, local cray fishers will still have to utilise interstate open seasons and dag limits for their catch for some time yet."

He said historical records showed Murray crayfish were "quite common in the Riverland through to Murray Bridge".

"Overtime, the river itself has changed and there may be lack of flow, pollution and other impacts that has led to their demise," he said.

"The main thing with all of our native fish species is flow – we must have that flow and maintain good oxygen levels throughout the system as all native fish species need the right habitat and conditions to survive.

"As a long shot, I would like to see the similar research for the virtually extinct species of trout cod for reintroduction in the lower Murray."

WAIKERIE horticulturalist Teish Lochert's dedication to the field has earned her the inaugural Premier's Women in Horticulture Award for 2023.

Ms Lochert was presented with her award at a gala dinner at the National Wine Centre in Adelaide last week.

She said winning the award was a "great honour".

"Being nominated by my peers in the industry makes me feel honoured I was worthy of their (recognition)," Ms Lochert said.

Ms Lochert is presently the general manager of Solan, a Waikerie-based company that cultivates early-generation potato seeds from tissue culture through to mini tubers, which are kept in cold storage before being distributed to certified seed growers.

Ms Lochert has worked at the company since 2013 and prior to the role, propagated olive trees at Waikerie for the international Agromillora Group.

She met husband James when they were both studying horticulture at the University of Adelaide's Roseworthy campus, formerly known as Roseworthy Agriculture College.

The pair were married and Ms Lochert joined him on the property they run together.

"I was picking and packing fruits and vegetables for the first few years, and doing the backside of the business and the counting while the kids came along," she

Ms Lochert said running a property could be challenging at times with four boys aged five and under

"It was interesting taking them out to pick persimmons, zucchinis or stone fruit and taking them to the packing shed to pack it, and then to the market," Ms Lochert said.

The couple also had an ornamental plant nursery and worked with a family member to supply plants to Adelaide.

Ms Lochert grew up on a fruit property at Merbein, north of Mildura, in north-west Victoria, while her Uncle and Aunt had a grain growing property near Robinvale.

She said it was difficult to identify a career direction during her secondary school years at St Joseph's College, in Mildura, but her family background influenced her.

"I knew I loved being outdoors and growing things," Ms Lochert said

"I was always doing this with mum."

Ms Lochert said the Premier's Women in Horticulture Award rec-

# **Local midwives recognised for their excellent support**

AN initiative to help secure the future of midwifery services in the Riverland and provide better care for expectant mothers has been recognised with a statewide award this month

The Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) Midwifery Model of Care Team – a co-designed rural midwifery-led model of care at Berri's Riverland General Hospital and Murray Bridge, and soon at the Loxton Hospital – won the award for Excellence in Practice – Team at the 2023 SA Nursing and Midwifery Excellence Awards on Friday, May 12, in Adelaide.

The Midwifery Group Practice model of care was launched in late 2021, with a midwife allocated to a maternity patient, and available to the expectant mother throughout the pregnancy and up to six weeks postpartum.

The model allows for continuity of care, instead of women seeing a different midwife depending on rostering.

RMCLHN advanced midwifery manager Vanessa Drummond said the award was a "wonderful recognition of the hard work, commitment, heart and soul" that had gone into supporting local mothers-to-be.

"The dedication of the team has been so inspiring and we're so surprised and delighted that it has been recognised with this excellence award," she said.

"It was a strong group of finalists who would have been all worthy to take the honour.

"We had 16 of us from the project team and midwives who were present on the night. There were some members of the team who couldn't make it as they were caring for mums and babies across the region.

"We're looking forward to coming together and celebrating the win very soon."

State Health Minister Chris Picton said he was "pleased to be able to celebrate" with the winners and finalists.

"Nurses and midwives go above and beyond in their dedication to caring for patients, their families and their communities, delivering outstanding care to all South Australians," he said.

Department for Health and Wellbeing chief executive Dr Robyn Lawrence said all finalists and winners should be "proud of their achievements" and for making "a significant difference in the lives of patients every day".

"Nurses and midwives are an integral part of our health system, providing the essential care and support people require through the different stages of their life."

# **Expanding eligibility** for mosquito virus jab

MORE Riverlanders now have access to the Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV) vaccine, with the State Government expanding eligibility criteria.

The expansion removed the requirement to be outdoors for four hours or more on most days for people living or engaging in flood recovery efforts in River Murray com-

The expansion brings South Australia's eligibility criteria in line with Victoria and New South Wales.

"There is a limited supply of the JEV vaccine nationally and this expansion is targeting those who are most at risk," said Chris Picton, SA Health Minister.

"I encourage South Australians who are looking to receive the vaccine to book in their appointment now."

Since the vaccination program began in October last year, almost 23,800 JEV vaccines have been administered across the state.

An extra 9000 vaccines are also available to SA Health.

Chief Public Health Officer Professor, Nicola Spurrier, encouraged eligible people to get vaccinated against JEV.

"The JEV vaccination produces lasting protection in most people, so it's important for eligible people to take up the vaccine now whilst available in order to protect themselves against the virus in the warmer months when mosquito activity increases," she said.

Nine people in South Australia acquired JEV last year, with all cases hospitalised and two deaths.

There have been no cases reported so far

# 10 per cent increase to hit Mid Murray?

MID Murray Council is proposing a 10.2 per cent average rate increase in its draft annual business plan and budget for 2023/24.

The increase is part of council's focus on rebuilding following the major River Murray

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey said flood recovery was the biggest short-term challenge facing council, with a \$2m provision included in the draft plan for ongoing

"This has combined with the substantial costs already incurred by council for preparation and recovery during 2022/23," she

Ms Bailey said due to the floods, council had experienced escalating cost pressures across its operations and soaring inflation

"The flood disaster and the huge damage bill it has left behind has exacerbated this and made financial planning for both the immediate future and the longer-term incredibly difficult," she said.

"As a council, we cover a large geographic area, however, our population and, therefore, our rate base, is quite small.

"The floods inundated over 2300 properties, or 35 per cent of homes in our area, which accounts for 36 per cent of our rateable income."

Council is expecting a deficit of \$2.19m, and capital expenditure of \$10.07m

Its proposed borrowings will increase by \$4.097m, to \$19.1m, by the end of 2024.

Council is proposing to increase its general rates on average by 10.2 per cent with an additional 0.5 per cent in growth, equating to an estimated increase of \$137 on average per rateable property.

It is understood the exact amount would vary between individual ratepayers, depending on individual property valuations.

Council's key projects outlined in the draft 2023/24 annual business plan and budget include a review of the strategic plan, the development of a financial sustainability plan, implementation of a Reconciliation Action Plan and development of a council growth strategy.

Mid Murray Council is also working on an Astro Tourism strategy for the River Murray International Dark Sky Reserve, a Blanchetown water re-use and playground project, upgrades of Len White Reserve in Swan Reach, and a Morgan stormwater pro-

The proposed budget also allocates funding for stage three of the construction of the Murray Coorong Trail, and the completion of the PS Canally restoration project in Morgan.

Ms Bailey said the draft budget sought to balance significant cost pressures with council's responsibilities to provide essential and efficient services, infrastructure, and projects to the community.

She said following a natural disaster, the council was facing limited resources and economic vulnerability.

Public consultation on the proposed business plan and budget opened last Thursday and ends on Thursday, June 8, at 12pm.

Community input over this period is also being sought on the council's draft long term financial plan for 2023/24 to 2032/33.



I PLANT my left foot into the stirrup, eagerly hoist myself up into the saddle and wait until all horses have riders.

The music starts and we gather speed and height. Pulling on the reins, I feel like my horse and I are flying freely among the night

Darryl Braithwaite's iconic song Horses wasn't yet released, but its lyrics describe those exhilarating times:

That's the way it's gonna be, little darlin' We'll be riding on the horses, yeah Way up in the sky, little darlin'

And if you fall, I'll pick you up, pick you

I look down to check whether waiting friends are impressed by my vigorous riding, but they're chatting, uninterested in my heroic imaginings.

As we circle again, all the show's activities are spread out below - the razzamatazz of coloured lights, crowds of people, music, and the sweet carnival smells wafting across the night air.

The real horses are jumping elegantly on No. 1 oval, and the sideshows and rides are pulsating on No. 2.

Like Christmas, The Renmark Show takes ages to come around, but finally here it is.

We had arrived early for the afternoon Grand Parade on the main oval, led by Miss Renmark Showgirls, Senior and Junior, waving with long, white gloves.

Marching girl troupes, bands, new cars and tractors, plus the blue-ribboned animals



judged as Grand Champions, followed on.

Next to the KM Tucker Hall for a quick look at the dressmaking, baking, embroidery, flower arranging and cake-making displays - and to check whether our school books had been chosen for display.

Judges had made choices about all sorts – wool fleeces, dried fruit exhibits, jams and so on. Those talented kids who won first prize for their scones or plated floral arrangements earned 20c to put toward more rides.

# Nominations open for mental health prize

RIVERLANDERS are being encouraged to nominate locals who have made outstanding contributions to the promotion of mental health or prevention and treatment of mental illness for a national prize.

Nominations opened on Monday for the Australian Mental Health Prize, run by UNSW Sydney, which recognises individuals who have made a significant contribution to mental health.

"The launch of nominations for the Australian Mental Health Prize is a timely reminder of the urgent need to address the mental health challenges in our country," said Professor Henry Brodaty from the UNSW Sydney.

"By recognising those who are making a difference in this space, we can raise awareness of the issue and inspire others to take action."

Co-chair of the prize's advisory committee, and previous recipient, Professor Allan Fels said the state of mental health in Australia was "concerning".

"The shortage of mental health professionals poses a significant challenge, leading to a workforce crisis in the sector. "Additionally, the low priority given to mental health in comparison to other areas like defence, NDIS, and aged care is a cause of great concern."

Prize categories include Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, lived experience, professional and community hero.

Nominations close on July 17, with winners to be announced in late September.

# **Funding certainty for homelessness services**

SERVICES supporting Riverlanders experiencing homelessness have been given more certainty, with the State Government committing to two years of funding for SA's Homelessness Alliances.

The State Government announced an investment of \$115m over two years to specialist homelessness services across SA, as communities face cost-of-living pressures, higher interest rates and record-low rental vacancies.

The funding gives services more certainty, with current homelessness service contracts due to expire on June 30, and the Federal Government only offering a one-year extension while it develops longer-term plans for housing and homelessness

The funding announced last week will renew contracts for a further two years until 2025.

SA Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said the investment offered certainty for services to retain skilled workers and "to care for those who need it most".

"This is about prioritising the safety of our most vulnerable, as well as many people who are accessing services for the very first time," she said.

"Without this certainty, services are likely to lose a committed, knowledgeable and effective workforce."

The Riverland is part of the Country South Homelessness Alliance, with ac.care as the lead agency.

Country South Homelessness Alliance leadership team member Kirsty Barnett said the alliance had created "stronger and more positive relationships between partners".

"These relationships have enabled us to secure achievements, such as creating unique individual client outcomes as well as responding quickly and effectively to people affected by the recent Murray River floods," she said.

"But perhaps most importantly, our Alliance has enabled us to learn from the wisdom of our Aboriginal partners – Moorundi Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Service and Pangula Mannamurna Aboriginal Corporation – to influence change in thinking and create better outcomes for all, especially Aboriginal people."

The Homelessness Alliances, comprising groups of service providers first contracted in 2021 following a sector reform, make up around two thirds of the state's homelessness services.

Homelessness services in SA assist around 6000 people each month.

# Cost relief for community organisations

LOCAL not-for-profit organisations are set to receive state government relief from rising inflation over the next four years.

The State Government will provide \$55m to support organisations in the community services sector – including social, community, home care and disability services – to help with cost-of-living pressures.

Since 2017, indexation of 2.5 per cent has been applied to multi-year funding agreements between state government authorities and not-for-profit organisations for block-funded agreements.

However, in recognition of higher costs the community service sector is currently facing, eligible organisations are set to receive a supplementary payment of 2.6 per cent, bringing the maximum indexation rate to 5.1 per cent for the 2022-23 financial year.

This higher amount – more than double the usual – will be the base for future indexation.

Uniting Communities, which has a Riverland office in Berri and offers disability and older persons support, youth health, and residential foster care, is among a list of organisations set to benefit from the funding.

"The increasing financial pressures faced by community organisations who are supporting households grappling with the rising costs of living is placing unprecedented stress on our ability to meet demand for assistance," said Simon Schrapel, Uniting Communities chief executive.

"The additional South Australian Government funding is a welcome commitment so we can keep doing the work that matters and, in turn, keep supporting our communities as we face these challenges."

SA Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said organisations like Uniting Communities are "essential in the provision of services to many community members".

"Our not-for-profit sector is playing a major role in helping South Australians struggling under cost-of-living pressures," she said.

"These organisations are at the coalface of providing support to vulnerable South Australians and those in need of a helping hand.

"Rising costs and the effects of inflation have impacted South Australia's social, community, home care and disability sectors.

"That's why the State Government has committed \$55m over four years to support these organisations doing such important work in our community.

"By helping them, we are helping those communities who need their support."

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# Technology the key to bees and pollination

THE use of technology to improve understanding of bee health is key to the ongoing pollination of food crops, such as Riverland almonds, according to a university professor.

The research comes as Riverland almond growers face the ongoing challenges of poor pollination and reduced production following a shortage of available interstate beehives.

In celebrating World Bee Day last Saturday, May 20, Monash University associate professor and NativeBee+Tech Facility director, Alan Dorin said it was "vital we study and protect bee biodiversity to protect the wellbeing of these vital insects that are an essential requirement to sustain our terrestrial ecosystems".

"It's important to remember that the social honey bees and bumblebees we are so familiar with, and so dependent on for our crop pollination, are a drop in the ocean of around 20,000 species of bee, the majority of which we know relatively little about," he said.

"If used cleverly, and carefully, technology can help to reveal the intricacies of native bees' interactions with ecosystems, without damaging them.

"It's essential for technology developers and researchers to remember that development should not be our goal. Instead, our goal is to better understand, support, and improve our custodianship of natural biodiversity.

"Technology can play a role in this, but it must never be allowed to replace or diminish our responsibilities to organisms and ecosystems

"Future farming using advanced AI (artificial intelligence) and tech-

nology to monitor bee population and movement for precise pollination and tracking hive health, among other things, can improve management of crops and other natural resources. "Technology can assist us to support and sustain the wild and native bee populations upon which our food security and ecosystem sustainability depend.

"To achieve this goal, we must

consider not only the local impacts of technology's application, but also the upstream and downstream costs and cascading impacts of technology development, manufacture, application and disposal."

# **Tough laws for unsafe protests**

NEW state legislation is aimed at discouraging protest events that impact the safety of Riverlanders.

The State Government last week introduced the Summary Offences (Obstruction of Public Places) Amendment Bill 2023.

Premier Peter Malinauskas said the new measures aimed to decrease protest events that "put the safety of protesters and the public at risk".

"Peacefully protesting is a fundamental part of our democracy, but some of what we've witnessed... is not acceptable," Mr Malinauskas said.

"Protesters do not have months imprisonment.

the right to cause huge disruptions to others, damage businesses and put the safety of the public and emergency services at risk.

"That's why we're taking swift action to provide a genuine disincentive to those who seek to repeatedly engage in this sort of reckless conduct."

Four people were arrested in the Adelaide CBD last Thursday after staging a protest at a Flinders Street business.

Under the new bill, a person who "wilfully obstructs the free passage of a public place" faces a maximum fine of \$50,000, or three-months imprisonment

However, Attorney-General Kyam Maher said offenders would also be required to pay "reasonable costs and expenses" for emergency services needed at the protests.

"This bill sends a strong message to those who seek to make their point by causing harm, disruption and risk to others," Mr Maher said

"These penalties have not changed since the 1990s and, to be frank, are not in keeping with public expectations.

"This bill will give the courts the options they need to ensure that appropriate penalties are applied."

# Regional rental affordability highlighted in new report

REGIONAL South Australia has the greatest share of rentals listed for below \$400 per week in the country, according to a new report.

The PropTrack Market Insight Report found regional SA had an affordable rentals share of 71.5 per cent in April, down from 84.2 per cent last year.

The share of houses for rent in regional SA for \$400 per week or less has con-

stricted more than units, falling to 66.1 per cent from 80.9 per cent a year earlier. The report found 91.3 per cent of units are available at the same price point.

"Although the increase to Commonwealth Rent Assistance is the largest in more than 30 years, rent assistance payments have long fallen behind soaring rental prices," said Eleanor Creah, PropTrack senior economist.

"The nation's rental market is in dire straits, with little sign of meaningful reprieve on the horizon. Advertised rents are recording strong price increases and vacancies are at historic lows amid a shortage of rental supply.

"The share of affordable rentals is plummeting, meaning conditions remain challenging for low-income Australians."

# That's not a rat, it's a rakali

nature walk in Berri last week had the rare experience of watching a rakali feasting on a number of small carp.

Berri Barmera Landcare have been conducting a series of guided nature walks at Martin's Bend over the past few months, highlighting the environmental benefits of the recent flood.

As a part of the guided nature walks, Berri Barmera Landcare general manager Sharon Schrapel and environmentalist Andrew Walladge explain while a rakali is a native water rat, it looks and behaves more like an otter than a rat.

It is a protected species and cannot be caught, relocated or killed. It is a semi-aquatic mammal found in heavily vegetated areas that have a permanent water source.

Rakali numbers locally have declined due to long periods of drought, however the flood ignited their numbers and they can now be seen in creeks and along the banks of the main river.

Rakali have a blackto-brown fur coat and an orange-to-white belly, can grow up to 40cm and weigh up to 1kg.

They have partially webbed hind feet, long whiskers, small eyes and ears, and a long white tip on the end of their tail.

Importantly, rakali eat carp and are a key part of the biodiversity on floodplains. During drought their numbers reduce dramatically, however at a time like after a flood their numbers increase and help to control the invasive fish species.

As a part of South Australia's History Festival, during May, the Berri Visitor Information Centre has a rakali on display on loan from the SA Museum.

The guided nature walks and the display are initiatives of the Berri Barmera

# Drought resilience focus for upcoming ag forum Online course examines farming, climate

RIVERLAND primary producers have been invited to participate in a national agricultural conference focused on improving drought

The Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) will next month hold the annual Future Drought Fund's Science to Practice Forum, from June 6 to June 8.

DAFF deputy secretary of agriculture, food policy and research, Rosemary Deininger, said the three-day event - taking place online would highlight "innovative" tools and practices being used to build drought resilience and sustainable primary production.

"The Science to Practice Forum is an opportunity to collaborate and network with likeminded people committed to growing a sustainable agricultural sector," Ms Deininger said.

'It also demonstrates how integral the implementation of the Future Drought Fund, and its \$100m-a-year investment, is performing right across the country.

"Hearing the stories of how Australian farmers and communities are using innovative tools and practices to build drought resilience can influence the decision-making of both farmers and policy makers."

Day one of the event will focus on research and development, with day two examining farmers and agricultural advisors, and day three discussing community and policy.

RIVERLAND agriculturalists are encouraged to register for a series of free information sessions focused on climate change science

and carbon farming. Farmers for Climate Action, in collaboration with Australian National University, will next week hold an online Climate Essentials for Farmers Workshop.

Co-ordinator Ellen Litchfield said the halfday course was aimed at increasing resilience to climate change and understanding of agripolitics.

"We know farmers are keen to learn more about climate adaptation and carbon farming," Ms Litchfield said.

"Surveys... last year found that just 10 per cent of farmers are growing and selling carbon and 70 per cent say they don't understand the carbon market."

The process of carbon farming involves the changing of agricultural practices to increase the amount of carbon stored in the soil and vegetation, or reducing greenhouse gas emissions from livestock, soil or vegetation.

The online Climate Essentials for Farmers Workshop will take place next Wednesday, May 31, from 10.30am to 3.30pm.





# Young environmentalists visit local reserve

WAIKERIE Primary School (WPS) participants in the Young Environmental Leaders (YEL) program visited the Wilabalangaloo Nature Reserve at Berri recently.

The 10 year 5 and year 6 students participated in a regional forum – supported by the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board – featuring other YEL from across the Riverland.

WPS specialist science and environmental studies teacher Jeany Winter said the students explored parts of the Wilabalangaloo walking trail and learned about the preservation of local natural landscapes.

Mobile environmental education service Animals Anonymous also took part in the forum and brought a range of animals to learn about.

Ms Winter said the students shared information about their experiences at the nature reserve

at a press conference organised by classmates who were unable to attend the event.

The YEL also wrote about their experiences during the forum.

Year 6 WPS student, Allira, and other students met a Murray-Darling carpet python called Bill and learned about the species' breeding habits and diet.

"They can lay up to 50 eggs," Allira wrote.

"They like to live in long grass and in trees and they are non-venomous.

"They are aggressive but easy to handle and their diet is rats, small birds and possums, and sometimes they don't need to eat for 5 to 6 months."

Year 5 WPS student Taj wrote about the presentation by Animals Anonymous.

"They came and showed us lots of animals," he said.

"Three of them were native to the Riverland.

"The Tawny frogmouth is

nocturnal. People think a Tawny frogmouth and an owl are the same thing, but they aren't."

Ms Winter said the YEL program had been running at the

school for 18 years.

She said it was important for students to learn about the environment and how to protect it for their future.

# New surfaces a solution to South Australia's crashes?

A NATIONAL road safety company is encouraging the adoption of high-friction surface technology to decrease the number of serious car accidents occuring in the Riverland.

Victorian-based OmniGrip Direct has developed a new road surface, blending recycled glass and other materials, aimed at reducing crashes on roads.

OmniGrip Direct technical advisor Dave Jones said high-friction surfaces were effective at reducing crashes in both dry and wet weather conditions. "High-friction surface treatments have been proven as a real and ready solution to road crashes at high-risk locations such as intersections, pedestrian and school crossings, bends and ramps — anywhere where drivers and riders may approach too fast and brake too late," Mr Jones said.

"The special surface has high skid-resistance properties, enabling vehicles to stop faster.

"Tyres stick to it better on tight bends, reducing the likelihood that drivers and riders will lose control.

"This would also save hundreds of millions of dollars in the health system, insurance industry and ultimately, our pockets."

OmniGrip Direct developed the surface, in co-operation with the Australian Road Research Board, to skid-resistance and texture levels exceeding requirements from the Victorian Department of Transport and Planning, and Queensland's Department of Transport and Main Roads.

A total of 53 lives have been lost on South Australian roads so far in 2023, compared to 30 at the same time last year.

# Cost of living, availability leaves locals with 'sub-standard' rentals

RECENT research from a state university has revealed poor conditions in a "large proportion" of Riverland rental properties put the health of residents at risk.

UniSA enterprise fellow and associate professor in architecture Lynan Daniel said existing South Australian housing stock remained among the least energy efficient in the country.

"People who are renting a home have a right to expect that their housing is fit for living," Dr Daniel said.

"But when we are continually seeing reports of mould, disrepair, and other awful conditions, we know that something

"The evidence shows that formalised standards reduce substandard housing conditions.

"Australia has no such legislation. This leaves many people with no option but to endure poor living conditions."

Dr Daniel said numerous factors limited the rental properties

Riverlanders could choose from. "Cost of living pressures, record low vacancy rates and a housing stock largely unregulated in terms of quality and condition mean that many households have no choice but to put up with conditions that may be harming their family's health," she said.

# **Strengthening** protections for Aboriginal heritage sites

THE State Government last week introduced stronger penalties for people who disturb or destroy Riverland Aboriginal heritage sites.

The changes will raise the maximum penalty for damaging, disturbing or interfering with Aboriginal heritage from \$50,000 to \$2m for body corporates, and from \$10,000 or six-months imprisonment to \$250,000 and/ or two-years imprisonment for individuals.

It is understood the courts will be empowered to order offenders to pay for and take actions to repair damage.

An additional lower-level offence will also be created where a defendant would need to prove they were unaware of impacting Aboriginal heritage, or that the expectation to have known would be unreasonable.

Minister for Aboriginal Affairs Kyam Maher said a new obligation to consult with traditional owners would improve the management of new heritage discoveries.



"SA's current Aboriginal heritage protection laws are failing to deliver the protections that our ancient cultural heritage deserves. These proposed reforms will change that," Mr Maher said.

"By legislating a 10-fold increase in penalties for some offences, we are sending a clear message that Aboriginal heritage is to be both protected and respected.

'We have also taken steps to make it clear exactly when and how Aboriginal heritage discoveries must be reported, including where there is an authorisation to impact heritage under the Aboriginal Heritage Act.'

"It touches everybody," she said.


"Waikerie is such a wonderful supportive community of people that are unwell, that are going through treatment or that have had treatment, or have lost family members," she said.

# Better road safety education prioritised

A COLLABORATIVE meeting between road safety ministers from across the country last week focused on practical steps to reduce fatalities on the road.

Held in Perth last Friday as part of the National Road Safety Action Plan, the Road Safety Ministers Meeting came as the road toll in South Australia reached 53, with two lives lost within 30 minutes in fatal crashes at Renmark and Blanchetown last week.

The meeting considered current data, trends and cross-jurisdictional education campaigns on road safety to work towards the Federal Government's Vision Zero aim of no deaths on Australian roads by 2050.

SA Minister for Police Joe Szakacs asked other state and territory ministers to consider better collaboration to reduce road trauma.

"Better driver behaviour is a priority that doesn't recognise state borders," he said.

"Key dialogue between state and territory Ministers is critical as we pursue zero road deaths by 2050."

In South Australia, police campaigns focus on the 'fatal five' – speeding, drink and drug driving, distraction, seatbelts and dangerous road users.

Current SAPOL campaigns target key road safety markets such as regional drivers, older road users and cyclists.

Through the Federal Budget released earlier this month, road safety funding was increased to continue delivering road safety improvements with more than \$976 million available for new infrastructure projects across 2023-24 and 2024-25.

A further \$43.6m has been committed to the new National Road Safety Action Grants Program over four years to provide noninfrastructure grants with a focus on First Nations road safety, vulnerable road users, community education and awareness, technology, innovation, research and data.

"The Australian Government is committed to working with state and territory governments to curb deaths and serious injuries on our roads, in line with Vision Zero," said Carol Brown, Federal Assistant Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, who chaired the meeting.

"Any life lost is one too many and I am confident that united, we can work towards road safety solutions for the benefit of all Australians."

# Riverland students take part in state teams' championship in Adelaide...

LOCAL students from two high schools recently travelled to a school-based mountain bike teams' championship to compete against schools from across the state.

Competing for the first time, year 7, 8 and 9 students from St Francis of Assisi College and Loxton High School headed down to Sturt Gorge Recreational Park in Flagstaff Hill on Thursday, May 11 and Friday, May 12.

In the year 7 and 8 boys event, the St Francis team placed 20th and Loxton High School placed 26th, out of 82 teams.

St Francis of Assisi College co-ordinator for the event, Luke Prokopec, said the school entered the competition with a philosophy of "there is a sport for everyone".

"If they're active, they're healthier and happier, and they're more willing to extend themselves," he said.

"We want to ultimately give kids as good a range



of sports to choose from as possible, just to give them the chance to dip their toes in everywhere."

Following the flood event, Mr Prokopec said the school looked at several options for mountain biking around the school ahead of the race, including along Ral Ral Creek. However, flood damage to the area and safety concerns forced them to look elsewhere.

"So many kids were keen to race, but giving them a place to race was pretty tough," he said.

"Alvanos Earthmoving were preparing the land for the new year 10 to 12 classrooms. They said, 'We'll bulldoze you a track, you just have to plan where you want it'.

"We got out there with a GPS and marked it out with Anthony Pickering from the

Riverland Mountain Bike

"Without help from the Alvanos crew, we wouldn't have had the track to race on and we probably wouldn't have gone down to Adelaide.'

Sixteen St Francis students were selected to go to Adelaide following a school race, in which students completed as many laps as they could in 30 minutes.

"These kids went out (at Sturt Gorge) and they absolutely smashed out times, keeping up with kids who ride those tracks probably every weekend," Mr Prokopec said.

"Out of our group of 16 we only had two who had raced before. One student, until about 15 minutes before the race, didn't really know how to change gears properly.

"At the end of the day, some of the comments coming out from the kids on the way home showed how pumped they were about their efforts.

"Some of them were coming back from stacks, all grazed up, but smiling from ear to ear about how much fun it was.

"One kid we had there tries everything, but he hadn't found anything that he was really good at. He was part of the mixed team who came second... He won the medal and the entire way home he said, 'Mr Prok, I'm never taking this off. I'm so proud of this medal and I've finally found a sport I'm really good at'.

"It was totally worth it, and we're looking forward to next year. There's a bit of talk about how we can improve and kids wanting to start up a riding group to ride at lunch.

"Every single one of the kids that went down over the two days had to push themselves past physical boundaries. They realised if they get around a competitive atmosphere you're in a position where you might not necessarily win but you'll be challenged by other people."





# Magpies 'pumped' after bounce-back win away

WAIKERIE returned to the RFL winners' list on Saturday afternoon, with an impressive victory over Barmera-Monash at Barmera Oval.

"Our fitness got us over the line."

The home side managed to get the jump on the visitors, shooting out to a two-goal lead at quarter time, before the Magpies reeled the Roos in, keeping Fraser Sampson's team to just one goal for the remainder of the match.

Skipper Sam Butterworth starred without co-captain Michael Mock, while club legend Dillon Millard made his first A grade appearance for the Roos since returning from a coaching stint at Loxton.

Youngster Ayden Hodgson kept his strong season going with another impressive performance, but the Roos failed to match it with a hyped-up Waikerie outfit.

Wingman Noah Hyde was named best for the visitors, gathering plenty of outside ball and disposing of the footy effectively, while recruit Sam Chambers continued his stellar campaign.

"He can play tall or small, but his weapon is the way he reads the footy," Kilsby said of Chambers.

"He's a smart footballer and that's one of the reasons why I wanted to get him up here to this league.

"If you're young and fit with football IQ, you'll be able to play some decent footy in the country.

"We've had the same back six pretty much all year. 'Brauny' (Steven Braun) was out this week which hurt a bit but 'Smythy' (Shaun Smyth) came back from the mines and stepped into the role.

"That back six has been setting us up. We want to open up these big grounds and the backline has been doing it perfectly."

Jack Burgemeister booted two goals in the win, as did young forward Ryan Turner, while Barmera-Monash had four individual goalscorers including veteran Jake Smith, who was named second best for the Roos.

Sampson's side will get the chance to bounce back this week as Barmera-Monash travels to Berri to contest the Fisher Cup.

## Riverland's chance to Gather Round

CHAFFEY MP Tim Whetstone has officially launched the Riverland's bid to host a Gather Round fixture in 2024 following a meeting with South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas on Thursday

The inaugural edition of the AFL's Gather Round was a roaring success, with footy fans flocking to the Adelaide city centre, plus Mount Barker and Norwood Oval.

Mr Whetstone met with the Premier for the sole purpose of discussing the Riverland's chances, and while he acknowledges "it will be a tough road ahead", he remains hopeful the region can host an AFL match next season.

"He (the Premier) tells me that the AFL have put quite rigid stipulations on what you can and can't do," Mr Whetstone said.

"We have a lot more time to negotiate when, where and how. They're looking for something that's close by and convenient, or airport driven.

"I'm saying if it has to be a big plane it can land at Mildura, and we have a lot of Victorians and football lovers that drive right through the region.

"That's what hurdles are for. You have to negotiate hurdles to get a favourable outcome."

Mr Whetstone previously wrote to the Premier earlier in the month



to put forward the Riverland's case.

The Chaffey MP has urged the Riverland Football League, local councils and the region's football lovers to do the same, stressing the importance of presenting a united

Among the region's greatest drawcards, Mr Whetstone believes, is its rich football history.

"We've got a proud history of AFL stock out of the Riverland," Mr Whetstone said.

"Ebert, Modra and Ricciuto are names synonymous with footy, but we've got a significant next tier of players.

"Whether it's the Lindners, Fielkes, Schammers or Francis', there are many.

"We've been through the pandemic with everyone and we're fighting an economic battle at the moment due to the flood.

"The wine industry is going through a flat time at the moment as well, so I think we need to have every opportunity to look at ways that we can build confidence and put a spring in peoples' step.

"As proud Riverlanders, it's time to be a part of this. As part of the flood recovery, it's a really nice fit."

Loxton looms as the strongest potential candidate as host, having supplied the venue for two SANFL matches in the past 18 months as part of the Russell Ebert tribute

Mr Whetstone remained "reluctant to say that it has to be Loxton", but acknowledged that The Precinct would be "the best fit".

"I think Loxton is probably the preferred site, with the new facilities there, but we as a region need to reach out," Mr Whetstone said.

"We can't reach out as independent towns.

"I'm hoping the Riverland community as a whole will support the bid so we have a united voice and a united front.'

Mr Whetstone will also be lobbying current AFL CEO Gillon McLachlan, as the Chaffey MP looks to strengthen the region's bid, with the AFL to make the final fixture decision.

"Ultimately, the AFL will make the decision as to where future fixtures take place," a state government spokesperson said.

"Securing the event for the next three years means we can now look at making this event bigger and better with certainty.

"It's pleasing to see communities around the state recognise the value of this opportunity.

Mr Whetstone has the support of RFL chairperson Henry Crawford, who believes the local game will prosper significantly should the region be granted a match.

"Mr Whetstone has been in touch with the RFL and we've written to the Premier about potentially getting a Gather Round game up here," Mr Crawford said.

"The Riverland has a great footballing community and it would be fantastic to get the chance to showcase that on a national stage, with a match broadcasted to the whole country."

A long process remains, but Mr Whetstone is adamant he would continue to advocate for the region as the AFL considers its options.

"I think it's very real that it can play into our hands and if we don't put our pitch in, and I don't put a bit of pressure on the Premier, it's just wishing," Mr Whetstone said.

"The AFL will have the final say and it's up to me working with the Premier, keeping the pressure on the government and making sure ministers are fully briefed and on the same page.

"We need to make sure the region is pitching with one voice.

"If Riverlanders are serious about putting the Riverland on the map and supporting the local economy, we have to go out there in

## **Magpies swoop to stun Barmera**

WAIKERIE has ended a seven-plus-year A1 netball losing streak and in doing so, relegated a recent competition juggernaut to the bottom of the ladder.

The Magpies travelled to Barmera for the clash with the Lakesiders and hit the front early, capitalising on turnovers created by Zali Schutz in the Waikerie mid-court.

Barmera worked its way into the contest and was able to put together a late run, outscoring the visitors 11-5 in the final quarter, but the damage was already done.

Waikerie goalie Shae Glacken was on song, making 27 of her 29 shots, with Taylah Gore supporting her well in the circle with 15 goals of her own.

Glacken was named in Waikerie's best players alongside Schutz, while Hallie Hodgson and Katri Stavrou battled well for Barmera, with the home side missing star goalie Ashleigh Haigh.

At the other end of the table, Loxton continued its unbeaten start to the season with a 25-goal win over mid-table Berri in what coach Meegan Frost described as "arguably Loxton's hardest challenge so far".

The travelling Berri side broke even with Loxton in the second quarter, heading into the main break seven goals down, before the Tigers turned the screws in the second half.

Berri brought plenty of energy and noise to the contest, but Elise Foulds stood tall at centre for Loxton, as she has done all season.

Foulds was able to find Loxton goalies with ease in the final quarter, despite the best efforts of youngster Amelia Morgan, who was named best for the

# Waikerie returns to winning ways

WAIKERIE'S leap of faith back into the Riverland A1 netball fold in 2022 has finally paid dividends, with the club securing its first win since returning to the competition, defeating Barmera on Friday night.

Club stalwarts and officials are still trying to determine when the Magpies last won an A1 contest, including drought-breaking A1 coach Ashleigh Leuders, who has been involved at the club for over a decade.

"We don't know for sure how long it's been, but it's going back at least seven years," she said.

Leuders' side burst out of the blocks and withstood a late comeback from the Lakesiders to secure the points, with Leuders and her players elated as the final buzzer went.

Waikerie's combined losing margin heading into the clash across the first four rounds was out to 162 goals, but the side was rewarded for its resilience with the two-goal victory on Friday.

"It was amazing," she said.

"It was really good to get the win and it was such a good confidence booster for the girls," she said.

"Going out and getting flogged by 30 to 50 goals each week can be really hard.

"The week prior we played Loxton North and the girls just didn't want to be there.

"They had come off a couple of really big losses, so to come out on Friday

night and put together what they did and be able to win that game was amazing, not just for the squad but for the club in general."

Many involved at the club were sceptical when the decision was made to return to A1 competition last year following a lengthy hiatus.

"It was hard to convince a lot of people around the club that it was the right thing to do," Leuders said.

"We had people saying we were going to lose players, but for me, being in Riverland sport for a long time, I've seen other clubs go through what we've been through.

"There are girls here with really good potential and it was a bit of 'if we don't take this step now, when will we take it?'.

"We had about 20 girls last year including the under 17s that wanted to play A grade and, in our opinion, if you have girls wanting to play, why wouldn't you

"We explained to them that it was going to be tough and that they're probably going to get flogged sometimes, but you need to take it in your stride.

"We were hoping to push forward and have that win eventually, but I didn't think it would come this soon."

The win helped lift

Waikerie off the bottom of the A1 table, with Barmera still yet to register a win in 2023.

But, Leuders is confident her players, while enjoying the win, will continue to stick to the task and "take it game by game".

"We don't want to look too much into the win and will pop it on the backburner a little bit," she said.

"We won and that's awesome, but our next game is against Renmark and after that we play Loxton, so we have the two top teams in the competition.

"It's probably going to be tough in those games, but it's going to be a matter of getting the girls to understand that it's okay.


"It might be one step forwards and two steps back, but that's what happens when you're trying to rebuild.

"It's not necessarily about winning the game but about going out there and seeing the improvement."







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


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
