23 ways to be better prepared

STRONGER support for local councils and better communication between government agencies – including for levee maintenance – are among 23 recommendations the State Government has been urged to adopt before the next flood hits the Riverland.

Informed by over 75 witnesses and 37 written submissions, a new report into the government's response to the 2022/23 River Murray flood contains both praise and criticism of agencies involved in the flood event, which wreaked havoc on the Riverland for months, forcing major road

closures and infrastructure damage, and impacting local businesses and councils.

Riverland-based opposition spokesperson for water resources and the River Murray, Nicola Centofanti, praised the resilience of river communities while condemning the government's "failure to initiate an independent review into its own handling" of the flood response.

"This select committee should never have needed to be formed," Dr Centofanti said.

'Hard truths' in final flood report

missioned an immediate, independent review. Here in South Australia, the government chose to do nothing.³

23 ways to be better prepared

Dr Centofanti claimed the committee found a system "built for bushfires and short-term events, not slow-moving, complex disasters like this flood".

"Agencies operated in silos," she said.

"Communities were left in the dark. Vital infrastructure like levees was neglected. And the communication failures, both within government and with the public, put lives and livelihoods at risk.'

Dr Centofanti criticised the flood waste clean-up, managed by the SA Government's Green Industries SA (GISA) unit.

'What should have been a transparent, fair and locally focused process turned into a \$56 million contract handed to a Melbourne-based Tier 1 contractor with little explanation and no competitive process," Dr Centofanti said. "Dozens of local businesses were misled, sidelined, or ignored. Cost-plus contracts were used, despite their known risk of cost blowouts and lack of accountability. And the Government's own probity review confirmed it failed to meet basic standards." Minister for Climate, Environment and Water, Susan Close, conceded that GISA "could have" managed aspects of the flood strategy better, but said it was a "unprecedented" event.

"(The) River Murray flood was an unprecedented natural disaster of significant scale, posing considerable challenges for emergency management, recovery, and clean-up efforts across the state," she said.

"The procurement process undertaken by GISA occurred under emergency management provisions, aiming to expedite recovery efforts and mitigate the immediate impacts of the flood disaster.

"Any confusion experienced by local businesses, while regrettable, was minor in scope and reflects the broader complexity involved in rapidly mobilising resources under such urgent circumstances.

"It is not uncommon in procurement processes, particularly those responding to emergencies, for businesses to submit tenders without ultimately receiving work, and we recognise the associated efforts and costs involved."

Dr Close said GISA has since strengthened capabilities and professional development for staff working in emergency response and recovery, and that South Australia was now "better prepared for and responsive to disaster events, including the resourcing of multidisciplinary teams for future recovery programs".

Dr Centofanti said the report's recommendations ranged from improving emergency governance structures and real-time cross-agency communication, to levee maintenance funding, fairer grant processes, and stronger support for local councils during recovery. "This is not just a report, it is a roadmap," she said.

"It calls for urgent reform, smarter planning, and honest reflection. But most importantly, it reminds us of what happens when government ducks responsibility and refuses to learn from its mistakes." Dr Centofanti called on the government to adopt all recommendations in full and commit to releasing a formal response within 60 days. "The next flood won't wait for this government to get its act together," she said. "The time to act is now."

Concrete set to be removed out from Chambers Creek

THE Department for Environment and Water (DEW) will next week commence works to remove the concrete materials in the base of Chambers Creek.

During dredging of Chambers Creek, undertaken last November and undertaken on behalf of the State Government to remove a leftover levee from the 2022/23 River Murray Flood, Berri Barmera Council found a significant block of concrete, previously thought to be removed in 2010.

A resolution with the DEW and Berri Barmera Council was reached, with the department committing \$180,000 to remove a concrete slab from the River Murray, near where Chambers Creek joins

Lake Bonney.

Installed during the Millennium drought, the slab was a base for a water regulator to control flows into Lake Bonney, and is now scheduled to be removed this month, with a period of four weeks needed for works to be completed, including:

□ Installing temporary cofferdams to create a dry watertight working environment at the site.

- □ Installing temporary silt curtains to control the settling of silt and prevent these particles from spreading within the channel.
- □ Installing temporary fencing and appropriate signage, with an approved traffic management plan in place.

Drivers stopped over the weekend

MURRAY Mallee Police charged two drivers with traffic offences in the Riverland over the weekend.

On Saturday May 17, Waikerie Police stopped a 36-year-old man from the mid north on the Goyder highway, at Morgan, for a mobile driver test.


The man recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.058 and was reported for drink driving. He will be summonsed to appear at the Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Sunday 19 May, Police stopped a 60-year-old man from Morgan on Seventh Street, at Morgan, after she was stopped for a mobile driver test.



The man recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.125 and further checks revealed the man was disqualified.

He was issued with a sixmonth instant loss of licence, had his vehicle impounded for 28 days, and will be summonsed to appear in Berri Magistrates Court at a later date.



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'Hard truths' in final flood report

THE Riverland's State MP says a report into the 2022/23 Murray River flood response shows preparations for the emergency "fell short" of what was necessary.

The final report of the Select Committee into the River Murray Flooding Event was released last week.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the report illustrated better preparations could have been made for the flood.

"The resilience and determination of our River Murray communities during one of the most significant natural disasters in South Australia's history is to be commended, and I can't thank our locals enough for their collaboration and community spirit during that time," Mr Whetstone said.

"The final report from the Select Committee reveals some hard truths about how the government, at all levels, fell short of what our communities needed and deserved.

"Despite having weeks of notice, the report highlights unacceptable gaps in flood preparedness and the confusing, often incorrect communication around river flow data.

"The government should have better prepared all the river communities and the river corridor for the flood, but they were slow off the mark to gain federal funding.'

Mr Whetstone said the economic burden of recovery from the flood event also impacted Riverland councils.

'There was little consideration around how much the river valleys have changed shape, with river constraints affecting the whole system," he said.

"People were asked to make life-altering decisions with shifting and sometimes inaccurate information.

"Additionally, there was a lack of transparency around procurement during the recovery process. Our local businesses were sidelined, and the use of cost-plus contracts raises serious questions about value for money and accountability, when the focus should have been about delivering fast support to the people who need it most.'

"Our local councils bore the brunt of the recovery work and responsibility without adequate resources, with most still counting the cost three years on."

Premier Peter Malinauskas - speaking to media last week - said "the response to (the) flood has been recognised as being one of the more professional and expeditious roll-out of services to support affected communities.'

However, Mr Whetstone said impacts from the flood were still evident on numerous Riverland communities.

"The Premier's comments, making light of the report and describing the response to the flood being 'one of the more professional and expeditious' in the state's history, was not the experience of many on the ground in our community," he said.

"To portray the government's response to the flood as positive is a blow to those on the ground who are still cleaning up the mess. Ignoring the shortcomings in this report would be a disservice to every household and business affected by this flood.

"Our community faced panic and uncertainty due to shifting forecasts, followed by a recovery filled with delays, confusion, and unanswered questions around public spending.

"We are still rebuilding roads, causeways, infrastructure, and housing, and we continue to witness the damage. However, we lack the necessary funding to repair and prepare for the next flood that is coming."

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Bridge back open

A REBUILT major bridge connecting the Renmark township to its surrounding areas has been unveiled to the community.

Renmark Paringa Council last Friday held an official opening for the new Twentyfirst Street Bridge, in Renmark.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Peter Hunter said the new bridge's completion marked a further milestone in the district's flood recovery.

"It's just magnificent," Mr Hunter said.

"The work staff have put in, at the same time as dealing with normal things, those big projects from the (Community Wastewater Management Scheme), to the wharf, the Paringa township and the rowing dock. These things have all happened in the background.

"To stand here as we are... it's just magnificent to see."

Mr Hunter said the new bridge would withstand similar water levels to those experienced during the 2022/23 flood event.

"If we were to just build it back as it was, the next generation might have to deal with it as well," he said

"This should last us 100 years."

Mr Hunter said contractors for the project BMD Constructions ensured economic benefits flowed into the local economy.

"There were 12 local contractors, and over \$1.1m directed back into the community," he said.

"Over 20,000 tonnes of earthworks have been done here.

"The way BMD rolled that back into the community was really significant.'

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone – in a video posted to Facebook - said "it's a great out-

come after the 2022/23 floods.' "I want to congratulate the council, and the local community that have waited very patiently for the rebuild.

"This bridge is a great piece of infrastructure."

Mr Hunter said attendance by locals at the opening event reflected the bridge's importance to the community.

We really weren't sure, as it was short notice," he said.

"I was very pleased to see 200 or 300 in the end. There was lots of smiles and it was a really positive atmosphere.

"It opens it all back up to how we were."

Renewable energy shift necessary in the Riverland?

A RIVERLAND council's increasing utilisation of renewable energy sources is following national trends, according to the local mayor.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said "council is well in tune with the national trend to 40 per cent renewable energy sources as part of our response to ever increasing costs of business".

"We have installed solar panels with batteries at The Precinct, Loxton, and the Waikerie office/ library, with solar only at the Loxton office." Mr Norton said.

"Our Community Wastewater Management Systems (CWMS) at Loxton and Waikerie are also powered with solar and have battery storage.

"The savings assist in keeping operational costs in check, which means lower rates in most cases. "This also forms part of a responsible environmental man-

agement program demanded by the greater community." RE-Alliance, an independent not-for-profit, recently called for bipartisan support to put the energy needs of the regions first. National director Andrew Bray said "the Federal Election result was emphatic in removing any uncertainty of Australia's national direction towards an energy system primarily powered by renewable sources".

"We now need to redouble our efforts to ensure the shift to renewables is actively contributing to the strength and resilience of our regions," Mr Bray said.


"Australia's national grid is already powered by a 40 per cent mix of renewables and storage. By the next federal election, Australia's main electricity grid is expected to be more than twothirds powered with renewables and storage.

"We now have a chance to reset and come together in renewable energy regions. Let's take the opportunity to work with our communities to ensure that renewable projects are done right for locals."

"Data shows people in the regions generally support the shift to renewable energy, as long as it's done in a way that benefits our communities and minimises impacts on nature.

"We look forward to working with regional MPs from all parties on practical solutions, like local energy hubs, that ensure regional communities have the information and resources to participate in and benefit from the energy shift that is underway across the country.

"There is no stronger way to indicate to rural and regional Australia that you're putting them first in the rollout."

EDITORIAL THE YEARS GO BY

Bridging the legacy

THE level of attendance by locals, and high excitement in the air, last Friday morning as the new Twentyfirst Street bridge was opened was a little surprising, but illustrative of how important a few-hundred metres of road can be in a country town.

It was shortly before the Riverland went into proper flood mode toward the end of 2022 that Peter Hunter was elected, and although the water levels peaked at the end of December that year, the flood event, and its lasting impacts, has arguably been the defining challenge of his first term in the mayoral chair.

The quick action of Renmark Paringa Council in reinstating, and making necessary improvements to its levee network early in the flood event, plus the round-the-clock monitoring efforts that followed, is always worthy of positive recognition.

However, recovery from the flood has taken far longer than the actual event itself, and may have caused even more headaches for Mr Hunter, and his fellow Riverland mayors.

There were high levels of pressure in the Renmark Paringa council chamber on the evening the options for the bridge's redevelopment were presented. The cost for the project was going to be in the millions, and the timeline for any of the possible designs would likely draw criticism from some sections of the community.

It was undoubtedly one of the tougher decisions Mr Hunter and the current Renmark Paringa elected members have had to make as a chamber.

The journey since has been one requiring patience from both those on the council side and the local community, particularly those operating the nearby mini supermarket, working at Angove's, or needing to take their children to the St Francis of Assisi school.

It took time, a sizeable amount of funds, and the largest crane ever seen in Renmark, however the first impressions of those who made the first steps across the bridge after its official opening appeared favourable.

With completion of the new Twentyfirst Street bridge, alongside the reconstructed Renmark wharf, Renmark has largely finished with recovery, with these two assets also – hopefully – better prepared for similar future flooding scenarios.

Council needing to balance out the economic effect of these two projects, while also trying to minimise potential rate rises for residents, is likely to present the next challenge.

While having to face an historic flood event within your first six months as a mayor is probably a task so daunting you would avoid wishing it on your worst enemy, it is the type of experience that makes a person, a group of councillors, or even a town, that much stronger.



Historian Joan Wachtel: A lifetime in view of the river. Joan was born to Claude (Tom) and Myrtle Lawrence Smith, in 1915, in Adelaide. She came home to a farm on the Murray River. At age four Joan's family moved upstream to Devlins Pound, an isolated spot on the river 8-miles (13km) west from Overland Corner. In the early 1930s Joan began nursing at the Loxton Hospital, and in 1936 moved to the Royal Adelaide Hospital. In 1937, Joan married Fred Wachtel and went to live in Moorook. The couple eventually purchased a fruit block there and ran a bulk meat business. Joan was active in the businesses and was the chief bookkeeper while being very involved in the community. After Fred died in 1976, it was suggested to Joan that she write a book about the history of Moorook. She threw herself into researching the project and produced a valuable book 'Moorook, Bend in the River', which soon sold-out two editions. Interested in 'everything and everybody', Joan enjoyed oil painting, lawn bowls and 'adventurous travel'. Moving to Loxton, she spent her remaining years in the independent units of the Lutheran Rest Home continuing to make new friends. Joan died in 2005. Gender-based violence in schools

A LANDMARK new blueprint from national prevention organisation Our Watch is calling for stronger investment in respectful relationships education (RRE) in Australian schools — outlining key issues such as AI generated pornography, tech-facilitated abuse, sexual harassment of female teachers and students, and sexualised bullying.

Based on over a decade of research, Our Watch's Respectful Relationships Education: A blueprint for preventing gender-based violence through education systems provides evidence-based solutions to address the serious and pervasive problem of gendered violence in our schools.

The blueprint outlines the urgency for governments to prioritise and fund a 'whole-ofschool' approach to respectful relationships education (RRE), rather than one-off programs or a few classroom lessons.

RRE is focused on addressing gender-based violence through age-appropriate lessons about healthy relationships, gender and respect alongside changes to school policies, structures and environments. Research into RRE has shown reductions in sexual bullying, improvement in classroom behaviour, increased knowledge about gender and abuse, and schools developing more equal cultures.

The blueprint arrived at a crucial moment for Australian students and teachers who are facing alarming rates of gendered violence and looking for answers.

It is deeply concerning that nearly every week there is a new incident in the school environment – whether that be young men sharing deep fake porn of young women they know, or female teachers leaving the industry because they fear for their safety.

Research shows a clear connection between sexism, disrespect and gender-based violence. This landmark blueprint not only outlines the problems but also provides an evidencebased roadmap for governments on how the education system can help prevent gender-based violence.

Young people are increasingly exposed to harmful messaging about sex and relationships and report wanting more information and support.

Shock at survey findings

THE Salvation Army have released shocking new research highlighting the desperation of Australia's most vulnerable people, with the survey of those who reached out to the charity for help finding over half (55 per cent) were skipping meals because of financial hardship, 57 per cent could not afford prescription medication and almost a quarter (23 per cent) were forced to eat expired or spoiled food.

For families with children, the situation is even more dire, with 62 per cent of parents saying they went without food so their kids could eat, 43 per cent couldn't afford essentials like formula and nappies for their young children, and over a third (36 per cent) struggled to cover the costs of basic nonprescription medications like paracetamol or ibuprofen.

A 30-year-old mum who had received support from the Salvos said "I'm extremely depressed. I feel like I am failing as a mother. I'm a public servant and still cannot provide. I have considered quitting my job to save on the cost of petrol, parking, and childcare".

Another community member said "I just drink water to fill up my tummy. And the milk for the baby, for example, one bottle is for four scoops of milk, I always put two scoops in every bottle. I don't use nappies for the baby because I can't afford to buy nappies for her. And also, when we wash our clothes, we are not using soap. I can't afford that".

forced to use buy now, pay later services to cover essentials like food, utilities and medicine, and a disturbing 83% were living below the poverty line.

The research surveyed 3586 community members who had received food, financial assistance or material aid from The Salvos and found that 90 per cent of respondents said they wouldn't have managed without the support of The Salvation Army.

It is truly shocking in a country like Australia that we are seeing these devastating numbers. No one should be forced to eat expired food or to eat out of rubbish bins. The fact that over one in 20 (6 per cent) of those we surveyed said they were eating from dumpsters breaks our heart. Those presenting to us are some of the most marginalised and disadvantaged in our community, and the Salvos are there to not only bridge the gap, but to walk alongside Aussies doing it tough to see real change in their lives, and we need the support of the Australian public to help us do this.

A 43-year-old mum said "I go without and try to give my children what they need. I have payment plans with electricity so my power does not get turned off...I buy the same food every week because that's all I can afford. I haven't eaten meat in many months. I have to use Afterpay to get washing powder and food.

A 62-year-old woman added "(I'm) going without meals. I

eat only one small meal a day now. I've cut down on my medication, only taking half of my meds. I have considered eating dog or cat food."

The level of hardship also extended to an inability to pay for utilities and bills. A total of 43 per cent revealed they often showered less to save on water and electricity, one in five (20 per cent) were living in darkness to cut electricity costs, and one in eight (12 per cent) relied on public bathrooms and shopping centres to avoid using utilities at home.

This research coincides with The Salvation Army's Red Shield Appeal, this year aiming to raise \$38 million to ensure their 2000 services across the country can continue to support Australians doing it tough.

Big expansion for two Riverland Parks

A RIVERLAND mayor says expansions to the boundaries of two popular Riverland national parks will lead to environmental and community benefits.

Murray River National Park, near Loxton, and Maize Island Conservation Park, near Waikerie, will have terrains expanded as part of state government initiative.

Murray River National Park provides recreational activities and an opportunity for visitors to experience the Murray River floodplains.

Loxton Waikerie Mayor Trevor Norton said "the Loxton Waikerie District Council has handed over several riverfront areas to the control of National Parks SA".

"Previously, Thiele's Sandbar

(Loxton), Mabel's (KOM), and most recently Maize Island Conservation Park, at Holder," Mr Norton said.

"This is a win-win for everyone as the natural flora and fauna will be protected and maintained to be experienced by all, well into the future.

"Ratepayers and council will not be required to pay to regulate their use, but will remain an active partner providing waste removal and some road maintenance at these sites.

"The ongoing benefits of keeping our riverfront parks as assets for use by locals and visitors cannot be expressed in just numbers - but current data indicates 70 per cent of South Australians visit them each year.

"They are key to ongoing economic activity as part of the visitor experience in the Riverland."

"Access to the parks from the river by boat or canoe is also part of the experience, and this drives council's continuing program to improve and maintain boat ramps and other boating facilities.'

Maize Island Conservation Park is home to one of the state's first village settlements along the River Murray, including ruins of some original dwellings and old horticultural plantings.

These additions will help the State Government better manage and protect land that is home to valuable biodiversity, and culturally significant and sensitive sites.

Minister for Climate, Environment and Water Susan Close said "this expansion will provide enhanced protection of threatened species and increased opportunities to connect with nature".

"Murray River National Park and Maize Island Conservation Park provide habitat for nationally threatened birds, including the regent parrot, southern bell frog and blue-faced honeyeater," Dr Close said.

"South Australia's national and conservation parks are home to an abundance of native animals and plants that we must protect now to ensure they remain sustainable in the future.

"They are also hugely popular with seven-out-of-10 South Australians visiting our parks annually."

The additions align with the State and Federal Government's 30-by-30 commitment, aiming to protect 30 per cent of Australia's landmass and marine areas by 2030, in an effort to halt further biodiversity loss.

Celebrating volunteers in the Riverland West

LOXTON Waikerie council has celebrated the contribution of volunteers in its district with events at both Waikerie and Loxton to mark National Volunteer Week.

Mayor Trevor Norton said volunteering benefits the wellbeing of local communities. He said those who received assistance benefit and those who donate their time also experience the rewards of connecting with

others. About 80 volunteers attended a morning tea `to mark National Volunteer Week 2025 on Monday at the Waikerie Bowling Club, and an afternoon tea held at Loxton.

Mr Norton said according to the data for SA, 46 per cent of volunteers did it informally without being attached to a group, one-third volunteered on their own, another third did it as part of a community, and the final third enjoyed doing a mixture of both.

Mid Murray's economic growth potential highlighted

SWAN REACH, west of Morgan, plus Truro and Mannum, have been suggested as having the most potential for accommodating development in a draft Growth Management and Housing Strategy for the Mid Murray.

Mid Murray Council has released a draft of the plan to the community and is seeking feedback on its recommendations.

The Federal Government provided funding towards developing the strategy as part of its \$1.5bn Housing Support Program.

The program aims to help achieve the National Housing Accord's target of building 1.2 million new, well-located homes over five years, from July 1, 2024.

Mid Murray Council has engaged Adelaide-based planning firm URPS to prepare the growth strategy.

The document outlines key principles for

supporting residential growth, prioritising Mannum, Swan Reach and Truro as focus areas for council investment.

"Regarding employment land, there is a reasonable provision across the council area," the study said.

"However continued employment land planning is essential for long-term economic sustainability."

The draft strategy said the River Murray Dark Sky Reserve presented significant economic development opportunities across several industries including tourism, science, and defence.

The reserve covers more than 3200km2 in the Mid Murray district, and its core site is located within the Swan Reach Conservation Park.

Significant economic potential for intensive agricultural production, processing, and ancillary industries have been identified in the Rural Intensive Enterprise Zone, west of Morgan, according to the draft strategy.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey said the draft Growth Management and Housing Strategy was developed following community and stakeholder engagement late last year. She said the document provided a stra-

tegic direction to accommodate envisaged growth and stimulate economic activity. "It aims to assist council in where it needs

"It aims to assist council in where it needs to strategically invest in infrastructure to support the identified growth opportunities," Ms Bailey said.

Mid Murray Council is seeking feedback on the draft strategy, which elected members endorsed at last month's council meeting to release for community engagement.

Ms Bailey said council was keen to receive community input on the strategy's content and direction.

Ms Bailey said feedback on the objectives and development opportunities identified for each of the nine planning areas was also being sought.

A survey on the draft strategy is part of the consultation.

The community consultation opened on April 28, and closes at 5pm on Monday May 26.

Stop risky road behaviours, help save lives and reduce the SA road toll

NEW research shows SA's road users, including those in the Riverland, are putting driving lifestyles ahead of priorities when driving, with the state's road toll continuing to climb due to preventable accidents.

The Australian Road Safety Foundation (ARSF) has launched its annual Fatality Free Friday initiative, urging South Australian drivers to rethink their priorities and put a stop to preventable road deaths.

Fatality Free Friday is one of Australia's largest communitybased road safety initiatives, which calls on all road users to take responsibility for their contribution to road safety in a mission to create a future that is fatality-free.

New research released today by the ARSF reveals, despite the devastating impact of road crashes, many South Australian residents place a higher value on staying socially connected and maintaining routines over making safe choices on the road:

- 44 per cent would rather give up social media for a year than stop speeding.
- 22 per cent rather give up coffee than stop using their phone behind the wheel.
- □ 43 per cent said they would find it harder to give up their phone for a year than their car.

Alongside these attitudes, the research confirmed the high levels of risk that drivers are engaging in on the road, with more than twothirds (69 per cent) admitting to dangerous behaviour.

Additionally, almost six-in-10 drivers, or 58 per cent, openly admitting to breaking road laws with speeding as the most common

offence, with almost 49 per cent admitting to exceeding the limit.

Further to this, almost four-in-10 drivers (39 per cent) have driven while fatigued, a risk that significantly impairs reaction times and decision-making.

While distraction is one of the most underreported causes of crashes, almost seven-in-10 South Australian drivers (69 per cent) admitted to experiencing some form of distraction while driving.

This damning research comes as South Australia recorded 91 road fatalities last year, a decrease from 117 the previous year, which marked the state's highest road toll in a decade. However, 26 lives have already been lost on the roads so far this year.

ARSF chair and founder, Russell White said it was time to stop treating road safety as an afterthought and start making it a daily priority. "These findings paint a troubling picture because it tells us that despite the risks, too many South Australian drivers are still choosing convenience over safety," Mr White said.

"Road trauma doesn't just happen, most of the time it's the direct result of poor choices made behind the wheel, from the passenger seat, on two wheels or even just walking down the street.

"But that means we also have the power to create real change, to stop this needless loss of life by choosing road safety and encouraging each other to do the same."

The ARSF research confirmed the role education and awareness can have on driving change.

Almost nine-in-10 (89 per cent) drivers said road safety messaging inspired them to engage in safer behaviour, and more than eightin-10 (81 per cent) reported simply being reminded of the road toll makes them think or act more responsibly.

EGM CTP insurance and advocacy Michelle Bain said, "the keys to road safety, and achieving a fatality free Friday, are in all Australians' hands".

"We know that road trauma is preventable. Road safety is a choice we can all make and a responsibility we should all carry when we travel on the road, whether we drive, ride, cycle or walk," Ms Bain said.



Targeted grants available for struggling farmers

RIVERLAND primary producers experiencing economic strain can access targeted relief through a local financial counselling service.

The State Government recently launched the Rural Support Grants – delivered through the Rural Business Support (RBS) Relief Fund – to assist rural and regional communities experiencing financial strain.

The grants provide up to \$1500 in financial assistance to eligible South Australian farmers and rural small business owners, and are designed to help primary producers, ruralrelated enterprises, and regional small businesses cover essential household expenses and bill relief during times of financial distress. RBS CEO Brett Smith said the funding was an acknowledgement of the serious impact ongoing dry conditions are hav-

ing across the state. "This additional support is a direct result of listening carefully to farmers and industry leaders who've shared — sometimes with great vulnerability — how deeply these dry conditions are impacting them, their families, and their communities." Mr Smith said.

"Through the Drought Roundtables and our work on the Drought Advisory Group alongside respected voices from AusVeg SA, GPSA, Livestock SA, PPSA, the SA Produce Market, WGCSA and others, we've been able to bring those lived experiences into focus.

"We're grateful to the State Government for responding with compassion. By providing additional Rural and Small Business Financial Counsellors together with grants to be distributed through the RBS Relief Fund, we aim to give families the breathing space they need to regroup — because we know recovery starts with hope, and practical relief is the first step."

Rural and Small Business Financial Counselling teams provide practical, one-on-one guidance to help:

□ Understand your current financial position and identify options for managing cash

flow.Explore strategies to arrest and reduce debt.

□ Plan for the future with sustainable business goals and decision-making support.

\$650,000 available for regional environmental projects

APPLICATIONS are now open to Riverland not-for-profit groups (NFPs) for funding aimed to support environmental projects that reduce emissions and address the impacts of climate change.

The Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal (FRRR) is receiving applications



for its Community Led Climate Solutions Program (CLCS) with a total funding of up to \$650,000 available to enable community implementation driving positive and sustainable environmental, social and economic outcomes, via two streams:

- □ Engage and Deliver: Grants up to \$20,000 for local projects that implement or build awareness of practices and solutions that can reduce emissions and benefit the community.
- □ Scaling: Grants from \$20,001 to \$75,0000 to scale locally-led initiatives that alleviate socio-economic challenges resulting from the changing climate and enable communities to decarbonise, adapt and thrive.

The available grants can be used for a range of purposes, including education of locals to adopt clean energy practices, support First Nations climate-focused initiatives, reduce emissions, implement low carbon power sources and embrace/reuse regenerative practices.

The funding is also available to support solutions that deliver sustainable agriculture and food systems, encourage biodiverse ecosystems and to ensure the transition is balanced.

FRRR Climate Solutions portfolio lead Sarah Matthee said "the CLCS program is flexible and funds a wide range of initiatives, because FRRR recognises that different communities are at different stages of their climate journey".

"Every place is different, and the priorities of each community are different, including when it comes to responding to the impacts of our changing climate," Ms Matthee said.

"That's why we have kept the guidelines for this program broad – enabling not-forprofits to seek support for the project that will be right for their context, their climate and their community."

"Anyone thinking about applying should first read the guidelines carefully to make sure we can back your project idea, and of course, our team is also available to chat about project ideas too."

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Progress made on Lyrup Road repair

BERRI Barmera Council is continuing to work towards the repair of Lyrup Road following last year's funding announcement.

In October, the State Government committed to fully funding the repair of Lyrup Road, which was considerably damaged by the 2022/23 River Murray flood.

Berri Barmera Council CEO Tim Pfeiffer said while the initial funding was for a like-for-like rebuild, council is now working with state government departments for potential flood-mitigation measures.

"The repair of Lyrup Road is going to be significant, and we thank the relevant State Government departments for wanting to futureproof and make additional upgrades to this important Riverland road," he said.

"Berri Barmera Council looks forward to completing this project as soon as possible and we thank Lyrup Road users for their patience and adhering to traffic-management measures in the meantime."

In November 2023, about nine months after flood waters subsided, Berri Barmera Council became aware of significant longitudinal cracks along the verge of Lyrup Road.

Had the damages been identified within three months of the water subsiding, the State Government would have fully funded the repairs as part of Local Government Disaster Recovery Assistance Arrangements (LGDRAA).

However, the damages were identified after the three-month deadline, meaning council was expected to fund 30 per cent of the estimated \$2.99m repair cost.

Mr Pfeiffer said he was proud of the way the three Riverland councils "tirelessly advocated" for the road's remediation, resulting in the State Government funding agreement.

Renmark Paringa Council CEO Tony Siviour said it was a positive step for the project to see the State Government willing to make improvements to the road.

"The need to upgrade the road presents an opportunity to improve the infrastructure and to ensure there is a reduction in the impediment to flow in future flooding events," he said.

"We commend Berri Barmera Council for continuing to push for those improvements, which we have been passionate about in the past and have written to the State Government seeking their support.

"We look forward to seeing the road restored and the important access point to Lyrup reinstated."

SA business confidence still lowest in Australia

SENIOR local politician said businesses in the Riverland are struggling through uncertainty and challenging economic conditions.

According to the latest NAB Business Survey, ongoing economic pressures have seen South Australia record the lowest business confidence compared to all states.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said "our regional community is feeling the brunt of this decline in business confidence more than most".

"Local tourism, retail and agriculture operators are telling me they're struggling with rising input costs, leaving less money in people's pockets to spend locally," Mr Whetstone said.

"The Riverland economy is built on the back of small businesses, and when they suffer, the entire region is affected.

"I fully support the Tarzia Liberal team's commitment to abolish payroll tax up to \$2.1m and reverse Labor's water tax. These are practical steps that will help Riverland businesses thrive and grow."

Opposition treasury spokesperson Sam Telfer said this is the fifth report in as many weeks that highlights the growing pressure faced by small businesses in South Australia, Riverland included.

"We've seen highly regarded reports from CommSec, NAB and the South Australian Business Chamber, all pointing to a sluggish economy and weakening confidence," Mr Telfer said.

"South Australian businesses are doing it tough. They are paying more for their electricity and they are also facing skyrocketing water bills.

"Businesses have also pointed to restrictive red tape and imposing taxes as hampering their ability to stay afloat.

"That's why, if elected in 2026, we are committed to provide immediate relief for small business by lifting the payroll tax threshold from \$1.5m to \$2.1m.

"We are also committed to reversing the Government's tax on water bills, which will not only help small businesses, but will also put more money back in the pockets of South Australian households.

"Local business owners can't afford to wait any longer for support. The government needs to be listening to these concerns and do everything they can to ensure businesses stay open and thrive here in South Australia."





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

THE River Murray Safety Working Group has made significant progress in enhancing water safety and drowning prevention efforts in South Australia's Riverland region over the past 12 months.

The group was formed in part as a response to Royal Life Saving Australia Drowning Reports that 17 people had drowned in the Riverland between 2002 and 2023.

The Working Group is a collaborative initiative of cross-governmental departments, emergency services local councils, water safety agencies and community organisations, and is being led by South Australia Police, supported by Royal Life Saving.

The group has made significant strides in co-ordinating the delivery of water safety education messages and programs to users and communities along the Murray River, having now delivered a number of joint campaigns and programs over the past 12 months, leading to critical localised drowning prevention and water safety messages getting to more people and places across the region than ever before.

"The River Murray Safety Working Group is a powerful example of what's possible when multiple individuals and organisations come together with a shared purpose,' Brooke Cherfils said, on behalf of Royal Life Saving.

Updated drowning analysis by Royal Life Saving has shown that 16 people also drowned in the Murraylands region over a similar period of time. With the success of the Riverland model, advocates are seeking to expand the model to address drowning in the Murraylands as

well. "Driven by principled collaboration and a deep commitment to community, we are seeing significant progress in the co-ordination and sophistication of drowning prevention initiatives across the Riverland, and we now look forward to seeing what can be achieved in the next twelve months as this model expands into the Murraylands region," Ms Cherfils said.

Initiated under an Australian Governmentfunded Inland Communities Water Safety blackspot program, which supports the aims of the Australian Water Safety Strategy 2030, the Working Group has measured its success by developing and delivering on the four key goals of a Riverland Water Safety Strategy.

SAPOL Senior Sergeant First Class -Riverland operations Mark Howie said the group's impact is being felt at both a local and state level, thanks to its alignment with key strategic priorities.

"By intentionally addressing local challenges through these four focus areas, we are not only meeting regional needs but also contributing to state and national goals to reduce drowning," Mr Howie said.

"The group's success has now led to broader collaboration, with the launch of the Murraylands Working Group. These

groups will not only expand coverage across a greater area of the state, but will also allow for crossover between the Riverland and Murraylands regions and the sharing of resources where drowning risks and water use patterns are similar."

Last year's achievements include:

- Ongoing Collaboration: Identified highrisk swimming zones and existing CCTV in the region with councils and agencies, co-ordinated resource deployment through a special event calendar, shared resources, such as lifejacket clinic schedules and boating safety strategies, and aligned messaging on water user behaviour.
- □ State Policy Engagement: Rolled out stronger enforcement initiatives during peak periods, with co-ordinated marine safety patrols, alcohol and drug testing on vessels, and expanded jet ski patrol coverage thanks to partnerships between SAPOL, the Department of Infrastructure and Transport, and the State Emergency Service.
- □ Joint Campaigns and Messaging: Rolled out high-visibility awareness campaigns with consistent messaging across multiple media outlets and social platforms

for World Drowning Prevention Day, South Australia Water Safety Day, and the Riverland Dinghy Derby.

□ Swimming and Water Safety Skills: Circulated key messages to migrant workers in the region (following the highprofile drowning of a migrant worker), targeted programs delivering resuscitation training through the Indo-Australian community, and supported ongoing swimming lessons offered by Belgravia Leisure, migrant water safety and inland water safety programs delivered by Royal Life Saving - South Australia, and a VACSwim partnership with the Department for Education.

The Riverland and Murraylands Working Groups will meet jointly for the first time, in Loxton, to celebrate the wins of this past year and set the trajectory for the next 12 months. The two working groups intend to meet quarterly in their regions and join together annually.

of enthusiastic children dressing up as George and Ruby Farmer for their school Book Week parades.


"The Rabobank partnership promotes agricultural literacy, which will not only educate many children but also hopefully inspire them to pursue careers in agriculture."

St Agnes Distillery co-managing director Richard Angove said the limited release, of 500 bottles, "honours five generations of distilling excellence at Australia's oldest family-run distill-

ery". "This release is the pinnacle of our centurylong pursuit of greatness," Mr Angove said.

"When my grandfather Thomas Angove decided to distil incredibly small parcels of exceptional spirit, he wasn't thinking about today or tomorrow

- he was thinking decades ahead.

"He believed this spirit had the potential to become something truly exceptional, and that's exactly what happened. We've watched and waited, allowing time to do its work, and have been rewarded with an incredible spirit that we can't wait to share.

Big change for state house planning rules

CHANGES to current house planning rules are set to be introduced later this year, covering the Riverland, in a bid to increase housing diversity and provide affordable homes within existing suburbs across the state.

The Minister for Planning recently adopted the Future Living Code Amendment, which will introduce a new form of co-located housing, allowing more homes to be built in established suburbs without impacting their existing character, heritage and streetscape.

The new policies are aimed at allowing existing homes to be retained, altered, and extended to create 'co-located' housing, rather than demolishing a house and subdividing the site to build multiple homes.

The reform will also state all homes within the development have to be of similar scale.

These changes will aim to preserve the character of these suburbs, including mature trees and established gardens, as well as build a greater sense of community, through shared open space rather than small private gardens.

Each home inside the co-located housing development could be bought and sold separately and would be managed through a community title scheme, which would include rules governing behaviour and responsibilities.

Minister for Planning Nick Champion said "this is an example of the State Government working with local government to explore unique and creative ways to tackle the housing crisis".

"This type of housing could allow large families to live in multiple homes on a big block or suit people looking to downsize or age in place," Mr Champion said.

The State Planning Commission has worked in partnership with the University of South Australia and different suburbs across the state to develop the code amendment.

Participating councils will be able to review the policy framework and upon their confirmation, the new planning rules would come into effect in their specific area.

Any interested councils can now apply through their own code amendment processes, which would include consulting with their local communities.

There will be clear guidelines to help inform design and development plans, such as specifications for a minimum of 24m2 of communal open space per dwelling on the block of land, with required safe and convenient pedestrian access throughout the site by avoiding steps in pathways, parking areas and common areas.

There will be a requirement for at least two off-street car parking spaces for colocated housing comprising three or more bedrooms, with all car parking to be in a shared arrangement.

While this new form of housing was originally conceived for older people wishing to downsize in their own community, co-located housing is also expected to appeal to a range of South Australians looking for more diverse, small and affordable housing options.

Disaster Relief's Big Map heads to Riverland

RIVERLANDERS are invited to an information session highlighting how to better prepare for and manage the impact of future fire and flooding events in the region.

Volunteer-run non-profit organisation Disaster Relief Australia will this weekend hold two of its Big Map events in the Riverland.

The 'Big Map is a giant floor map, prepared by Disaster Relief Australia's Geographic Information Systems (GIS) specialists. During the session, community members walk the map alongside the organisation's experts to identify areas at risk of flooding and fire and explore ways in which to build community resilience and help reduce the impacts of future disaster events.

Disaster Relief Australia director of preparedness Wayne O'Brien said the event combines local knowledge with the organisation's disaster management capability to plan for scenarios and discuss topics including flood warnings, bush-fire mitigation and hazards.

"Communities across the country are facing growing challenges from disasters, with these events becoming more frequent, intense, and widespread," Mr O'Brien said.

"It is therefore imperative that

we equip ourselves with the education and strategy to manage the impacts.

"Effective disaster management, mitigation and preparedness help a community build resilience and that is why initiatives like the Big Map are essential for Australia's changing landscape.

"Collaboration between governments, individuals, businesses, and industry increases awareness and readiness for a disaster event and helps reduce property damage, economic loss and disruption to assets and services."

Big Map sessions will be held between 10am and 12 noon at the Bonney Theatre, in Barmera, on Saturday, and at The Precinct, in Loxton, on Sunday.

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State road safety program drives message home to school students

RIVERLAND high school students are among those participating in a statewide program highlighting the dangers of irresponsible driving.

The Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth (P.A.R.T.Y.) Program will this year hold sessions in 30 regional high schools.

Minister for Police Stephen Mullighan said the initiative was "designed to get high school students thinking about the consequences of risky decisionmaking".

"The aim of this powerful program is to help young South Australians understand that one poor decision on our roads can change their life forever and have a lasting impact on everyone around them," Mr Mullighan said.

"Between 2019 and 2023, young drivers and riders aged 16 to 24 accounted for 19 per cent of all lives lost and seriously injured in South Australia.

"It's important we continue to drive home these road safety messages with more students than ever getting an insight into life-long impact risky behaviour and poor choices can have on the community."

Road crashes are one of the major causes of death for 15 to 24 year olds in the

state. Between 2019 and 2023, an average of 19 people aged 16 to 24 lost their life on South Australian roads each year, while 148 were seriously injured.

Minister for Education Blair Boyer said young people living in regional or remote areas were also more than twice as likely to lose their life, or be seriously injured in a crash, compared with Adelaide residents.

"We want to do everything we can to inform the next generation of road users on the impact their decision making can have, which will in turn improve the health and safety of our communities," Mr Boyer said.

"The power of the program is in its realness. This is a one-day experience that sticks with young people long after they leave the hospital.

"The program is a unique opportunity for young peo-

ple to see firsthand the consequences of risky behaviour."

Trauma ambassador Najee Al-Sarawi shares his story of a near-fatal motorcycle accident, which left him with a 10 per cent chance of survival and requiring 17 surgeries, as part of the program.

Mr Al-Sarawi said the sessions gave students insight into the real-world consequences of trauma and the physical, emotional and social costs associated with risky and dangerous driving behaviours.

"Every choice on the road is a life in the balance," he said.

"If my story can stop one crash, it's worth telling a thousand times.

"Surviving was one thing, seeing what it did to my loved ones was another. My friends and family lived every second of that nightmare with me."



Risk remains as fire danger season ends

RIVERLANDERS have been advised to avoid complacency regarding fire dangers, despite the region's Fire Danger Season officially ending last week.

Minister for Emergency Services Emily Bourke said current soil dryness, high forest and scrub fuel loads, and forecasts of no meaningful rainfall had increased potential fire risks.

"The end of Fire Danger Season does not mean communities can start to become complacent," Ms Bourke said.

"Conditions are some of the driest we've seen and risk remains across the state, with lack of rainfall continuing to have a severe impact.

"Our aerial fleet will be on standby... to support volunteers, who tirelessly serve their communities year-round."

The Bureau of Meteorology recorded the period from October 2024 to April 2025 as one of the hottest and driest on record, with maximum temperatures the highest seen for much of the state, and rainfall in the bottom 10 per cent for most districts.

CFS chief officer Brett Loughlin urged locals planning to conduct any burn offs – especially in proximity to any scrub or timbered vegetation – to maintain safe practices.

This includes preparing a clean field break of at least 4m around the area, ensuring a sufficient water supply, and that a responsible person is on scene.

"CFS volunteers have worked incredibly hard through one of South Australia's hottest and driest Fire Danger Seasons and have ensured the losses and impacts of major fires have been significantly minimised," Mr Loughlin said.

"Every volunteer should be proud of the work they have put in to protect the community. As an all-hazard agency our volunteers will continue to respond to incidents across the state, despite the end of the Fire Danger Season.

"Complacency is a major risk for our agency at this time of year, particularly with dry conditions and minimal rainfall forecast for the near future, so it's imperative the South Australian community are adequately prepared and vigilant should they decide to conduct any burn offs, especially in proximity to any scrub or timbered vegetation."

SA palliative care report recommendations welcomed

A MAJOR report into palliative care in South Australia has been delivered, with the State Government accepting all recommendations to best meet the needs of Riverlanders into the future.

The inquiry was commissioned by Health and Wellbeing Minister Chris Picton in 2022 to examine the current provision of palliative care services in SA, best practice models in Australia and internationally, and recommendations to enhance services.

Palliative care helps people live their life as fully and as comfortably as possible when living with a life-limiting or terminal illness.

It identifies and helps treat physical, emotional, spiritual or social symptoms.

As it is based on individual needs, the services offered for each person will differ, but early referral can often support a better quality of life in a person's final stages. The Health Performance Council's report projects with an ageing and growing population there will be a significant increase in the number of deaths that could require palliative care services over the next 20 years in South Australia.

It made several findings and recommendations, including:

- Lack of access to consistent and reliable data across national, state and private sector systems to help inform palliative care service design and funding decisions.
- □ There is an under-reporting of patients accessing palliative care across all sectors.
- □ The number of people dying in South Australia that could benefit from palliative care in their final stages is increasing due to rising rates of chronic disease and our ageing population.
- □ The Department for Heath and Wellbeing's existing 2022-

27 Palliative Care Strategic Framework could provide greater clarity for the future intentions of palliative care services within SA, with better connection between key goals, objectives and actions and outcomes.

- □ The Department should continue to focus on increasing outof-hospital services, including virtual care and in-home care palliative care services, aligning with recommended best practice approaches and enabling patients' access to care in their preferred setting.
- By reviewing resource allocations, SA Health should aim to increase equity in palliative care service usage rates across the regions of the state.
- □ The need to improve equity of access for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- □ A recommendation to engage with ministers from the Federal Government, and other states

and territories on cross-jurisdictional improvements.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said "palliative care is an incredibly important service for South Australians with a life-limiting or terminal illness".

"It helps people live as fully and comfortably as possible in the later stages of their lives," he said.

"I commissioned this report to provide a better understanding of palliative care services and needs in South Australia and to examine best practice models around Australia and the world, so that we can make our services even better.

"I thank the Health Performance Council for its report and we accept all its recommendations.

"We want to ensure that all South Australians have access to the highest-quality services for themselves and their loved ones."

Following the report's findings, Mr Picton has asked the

The implementation plan will include a review of the 2022-27 Palliative Care Strategic Framework.

Gazettal of Key Road Sections The District Council of Loxton Waikerie is seeking community feedback on two proposed road network changes that would allow Road Trains operating under the Heavy Mass Limit (HML)

scheme to use specific local roads. These changes aim to support local industry and improve freight efficiency while ensuring safety and minimal community impact.

Proposed 30m Road Train HML Gazettals

- Council is considering the gazettal of 580 metres of Railway Terrace, and 145 metres of Schubert Road in Paruna.
- 2. Taplan Road, Badcoe Road and Kokoda Terrace (from Taplan to Bookpurnong Terrace, Loxton) are also proposed to be gazetted.

This would allow current 30-metre Road Trains operating under the HML scheme to access these sections without the need to seek permits for use, potentially improving freight access for agricultural and industrial operations. FOR the fourth year in a row, the Gill-Lehmann Cup will be staying at Renmark Oval, following a professional performance from the Rovers last Saturday against the Magpies.

In a tight start to the battle, Renmark held a three-point advantage at the first change, which only extended to nine at the half time interval, with Waikerie structuring up well throughout the half.

However, the Rovers were able to break the game wide open in the third term, kicking four goals to nil, and the domination continued into the final term, helping the Rovers run out 33-point victors.

Renmark playing coach Josh Vater said he was pleased with the way his side fought it out, knowing his group had an ability to go to another level after the clash with the Demons the previous week.

"I was much happier this week with the things that are in our control, and that's around effort, intensity, and intent," he said. "We've been well off where we need to be, and the standards that we set for ourselves, so it was nice to have those areas rectified this week.

"I thought our effort, work rate, and energy was much better this week, so I was very pleased with the performance, considering we had a few injuries across the day."

Renmark had nine individual goalkickers across the day, but it was the returning Nick Gillard who stood tallest.

Gillard showed his class around the big sticks, finishing with three majors, while the performances of Matt Woolford, Ricky Garrett, and Lachlan Lellmann were particularly impressive.

"We've gone down in a few first round clashes against them in the last few years, so it's a nice challenge for us to come up against a team that will be absolutely firing.

"We'll have some more changes this week with the injuries, so there's going to be a bit more pressure on, and an opportunity for those who get selected to come up against a good side."

Both A grade clashes will kick off from 2.40pm this Saturday, with Waikerie's contest set to be called live by the 5RM team, directly following The Sideline View.

ALL six Riverland Football League A grade sides have officially recorded a win in 2025, after Berri recorded its first of the campaign against Loxton North, at Berri Oval, last Saturday.

Berri came into the contest after three losses to open the season, however, proved competitive against Loxton and Renmark in the fortnight prior.

Meanwhile, Loxton North entered the clash high on confidence after securing the Proud Cup against the Tigers the previous week.

In a slow start to the battle, Berri held the lead by three points at quarter time, and missed opportunities in the second term had the margin at 12 points at the major break.

A gritty third term both ways saw Berri leading by just 11 at the final change, after neither side booted a major in the penultimate quarter.

Riverland holds Teams Tennis Cai

DESPITE tennis finishing up locally in March, a whopping 74 teams converged on the Riverland last weekend for the annual Teams Tennis Carnival.

Held for across the entire region, tennis was played across Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, with some sides entering the region from as far as Sydney.

With local players also involved, the tournament offers players a chance to hone in on their skills, in what is considered the largest grass court tennis event in Australia.

Co-ordinator Mike Horsman said the tournament was a successful one, with the Riverland Tennis Association hoping to continue to register more numbers in the future.

'We had 43 women's sides and 31 men, from as far a field as Sydney, Canberra, and Victoria, and the rest come from all around the state, with places such as the Barossa and the South East," he said.

"It's a massive event because there are 500 players, and almost that same number of spectators and spouses hanging around.

"We start on open grade, and veteran tennis starts at aged 30, and then we go to 40s,

50s, 60s, and 70s, and all grades are well supported in numbers, but we can always have more teams.

"The standard of the open has been very strong, and it's something we hope to only get bigger over time.

"To have this event in the Riverland over four venues, speaks a hell of a lot for our clubs and the fact we can do it.

"We had 99 teams pre-Covid, but like a lot of things, people were unable to go back, and the cost of living and cost of fuel is significant."

Mr Horsman said the tournament is one that can continue to grow, hoping to delve into the online side of things in the near future.

"Ultimately the numbers we've had have been solid, but we're still looking to get bigger, and one way to do that is through Facebook, and promote it on websites," he said.

"Given that we've got 54 lawn courts available to us, 90 teams is something we feel is definitely achievable, we'd just need to work out that logistics around it all.

"We changed from moving players all

around the venues, and that makes it easier for a lot of the players.

"Giving each club the chance to get involved and cater was a bit of a radical idea initially, but it's certainly been something which has worked.

"The clubs are all behind it, and that's been really helpful, with most of the clubs on the committee so they all get involved."

Mr Horsman said keeping the momentum of tennis flowing in the region, even during the off-season is particularly important for helping grow the sport.

"There are a lot of advantages of it, because a lot of the club people see it, as do the juniors, and they've been helping out at the clubs too," he said.

"It's kept tennis still up front in the middle of May, and one of the problems with tennis is that we die off a bit in the winter.

"This keeps it alive through to the next month, and then we'll have a bit of a hiatus between now and September.

"If we can get more locals involved that would be awesome because we can get more people involved in their age group and keep it competitive for everyone.'

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Underwater adventures

CINEMATOGRAPHER on David Attenborough's *Planet Earth* documentaries as well as a *National Geographic* explorer, adventurer and wildlife filmmaker, Bertie Gregory has fit an incredible amount of experience into his 32 years.

For his second standalone TV series [after 2022's *Epic Adventures*], Gregory braves sub-zero seas, climbs snowcapped mountains and sleeps suspended in mid-air to bring the daily lives of extraordinary animals and the challenges they face to your living room.

Tuesday's episode finds Gregory and his team in the Galápagos Islands, where they spend time with marine iguanas, sunbathe with sea lions and swim with eagle rays and sharks.

"For the opening of this episode, we filmed marine iguanas [on Fernandina Island]," Gregory told *Forbes*. "They are the only lizards in the world to regularly swim in the sea. They look like mini-Godzillas. They eat seaweed. The best nutritious seaweed grows where they live, an area with very strong currents and waves. These marine iguanas have adapted to be pro-surfers that can duck dive under 10-foot waves."

"We wanted to show their unique skill — and the only way to do so was to be in the waves with them. I found rather quickly that I got a big slice of humble pie. Those marine iguanas are very at home in the 10-foot waves. We camera people struggled more."

You won't believe your eyes when you see what Gregory can reveal thanks to those struggles – his team's footage and insights are a modern marine marvel.






INGREDIENTS:

- 2 green onions, thinly sliced
